40 years of Vane Farm

This year the RSPB is celebrating 40 years at Vane Farm. In addition to the monthly report in our Nature pages, here the RSPB gives a history of the reserve and tells you a little bit about the special Open Day on 17 June.

When Vane Farm was bought by the RSPB in 1967, the aim was to create a safe habitat for birds and wildlife, as well as to establish the first ever RSPB centre for field teaching in the UK.

Following the initial purchase of Vane Farm, work began to develop wildlife habitats and educational facilities. The reserve had a major extension in 1990 with the acquisition of East Brackley farmland. This area was an excellent area to carry out land management for declining wetland bird species. Our highest priority is the successful maintenance of the wet grassland habitat as it is the habitat of lapwing, redshank, snipe and curlew, our priority breeding wader species. Wintering pink-footed geese, farmland birds of conservation concern and the restoration of lowland raised bog are also key areas of land management at Vane Farm.

In recognition of Vane's contribution to the conservation of wetland birds, on 21 November 2002 it became part of Loch Leven National Nature Reserve working alongside Scottish Natural Heritage. Today Vane Farm, at the heart of the National Nature Reserve, offers an ideal day out for everyone, from the casual visitor to the enthusiastic birdwatcher.

The reserve also has a good variety of other birds in the woodland and scrub areas, including warblers, thrushes, finches and woodpeckers. The woodland behind the visitor centre consists mainly of a natural regeneration of birch, but some older ash, oak and other species, the remnants of old hedge lines, are also present.

Visitors can explore our two nature trails and visit the three bird watching hides and for those who enjoy a walk, the path to the summit of Vane Hill, through the birch woodland, gives spectacular views over Loch Leven. During the summer, you can see breeding wading birds and ducks as well as ospreys. Autumn and winter bring migrating ducks, geese and swans to the reserve. Today Vane Farm, at the heart of the Loch Leven National Nature Reserve, offers an ideal day out for everyone, from the casual visitor to the enthusiastic birdwatcher.

A programme of events runs throughout the year, with

activities to suit all interests and age groups. To discover our fabulous facilities for yourself, why not come along and help us celebrate our 40th birthday at our **Open Day** on **17 June**, with live music, family fun activities and free access for all. (See page 27 for details of the shuttle bus).

The Visitor Centre with popular café, observation room and superb shop, is open seven days a week 10am – 5pm, except Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Years Day and 2 January.

RSPB Vane Farm Nature Reserve lies on the south shore of Loch Leven on the B9097, two miles east of junction 5 on the M90.

Kirkgate Park - Phase One

Hopefully by the time you are reading this, current works at Kirkgate will be nigh on complete. We would like to take this opportunity

to welcome you to enjoy the improvements, thank you for your patience and explain some of what has been done and why.

Car Access – There are speed cushions being placed in the narrow dyke access, as well as a couple of other places on Kirkgate Road. This is primarily to enable the safety of pedestrians and cyclists. No other changes to roads and parking have been made at this stage.

Paths – There is a fairly extensive paths network linking the pedestrian access into the Park, from the main car park, and through to the start of the TRACKS works at the Watchtower. We hope that younger children on bikes and trikes will be able to use these paths but would of course ask that pedestrians are respected.

Toilets – Toilet facilities are available at The Pier. The toilet block that exists in the park will remain closed. We believe Kirkgate is to get an automated toilet unit, however we have no idea when that might happen. We hope the play areas are close enough to the toilet facilities but we need to know what you think.

Dog Control – A fence was planned around the junior play area but was removed at a very late stage by P&KC due to cost. We request that dog owners keep their dogs on leads in the area shaded on the map shown; this leaves a huge area of the park where dog owners can freely exercise their pets. Dog owners should also ensure that their dogs are suitably controlled in all areas of the park; lively dogs can be alarming for many people, particularly small children. Dog Owners should also bear in mind that they are blazing the trail in terms of showing the rest of us how to care for the park.....please pick up!

Friends of Kirkgate Park is reaching a stage where it is reviewing its next priorities.

1. There are immediate issues in evaluating how the improvements are working for people, so we are keen to get as much feedback as possible on the above items over the next few months.

- 2. We have an official opening event scheduled for 1 − 2 September (Discovery Weekend). There is scope for involvement of local groups in this event. Please get in touch if you would like to join in. You can find more details of this event at www.friendsofkirkgatepark.co.uk
- 3. There is an evaluation of what Phase Two might entail. At this stage this is scheduled to involve improvement to traffic management and car use. Other items are: improvements to the setting of the Watchtower and the South Gates to Kinross Estates, the Jingle Dyke Timeline, Willow Tunnels, Wetland development and wildflower planting.
- 4. The new amphitheatre will be available as an events space. It's all yours, just double check with us before you make plans to ensure it is not already 'booked'.
- 5. There are other items which people may be interested in pressing forward with, these include: Carbon dating Crannog remains and developing explanatory material; Refurbishing the burial ground; Creation of dog friendly areas; Dog mess awareness campaign; The development of 'Green' initiatives such as: Tayside Biodiversity Festival, Green Graveyard Initiative, Bee Wild Project, Wildlife Tree Project, Green Tourism Scheme.

My personal intention is to *enjoy* the park for the time being! I would however appreciate if anyone who is interested in any of the above give it some thought. If there are particular items you would like to get involved with or you have any feed back at all, please get in touch by emailing me at susan@friendsofkirkgatepark.co.uk

Loch Leven Heritage Project

A large number of walkers, cyclists and wheelchair users attended the opening of Phase 1 of the Loch Leven



Heritage Project at Kirkgate Park on Thursday, 17 May. Many then set off to explore the 7km of trail, which gave them a view of the loch that most had never seen before.

Councillor Willie Robertson, the chairman of TRACKS, welcomed the crowd and likened the long gestation period of the lochside trail to the distillation of the best whisky. He said that TRACKS had been working on the project for at least ten years, although the idea was first mooted in 1975. As with such whisky, he thought that the trail would be "savoured by the people of Kinross-shire and the people that follow for generations to come".

Councillor Robertson handed over to the project director Neil Kilpatrick, who previously had been largely responsible for Cleish village enhancement scheme.

Neil Kilpatrick thanked the various people that had made the project possible, in particular the landowners who provided the land, the sponsors who provided the funding, Scottish Natural Heritage, who manage the National Nature Reserve, and the contractors and project manager, who worked through extremely wet weather in the winter months

He then said,

"You are not looking at the finished article tonight. Because we've built the trail, we thought it only right to let the community get on and use it, but we have a number of important things still to do.

"For example, the interpretation is only really just beginning. In this area, we will have a viewpoint, which is currently being designed, and we will build gateways here, at Findatie and at Burleigh Sands. There will be seating at various places and signage for giving directions and to highlight heritage sites. We've already put in a splendid bird hide in a reed bed along from here, and I'm sure you'll find it a beautiful spot.

"Out there, we have 7km of finished trail that includes a spur from Mary's Gate up to Kinross. We've effectively created a circular town loop of about 4km, which I think might prove very popular. You can come down here to Kirkgate Park, walk along the front of Kinross House to Mary's Gate then go up the side of the golf course to Sunnypark.

"The main trail continues all the way past Burleigh Sands to the Pow Burn, where it stops for now. You can get up from the Pow Burn to Loch Leven's Larder, where there are refreshments and the facilities of the farm shop.

"The future programme is that we're going to do Phase 2 this summer at the other end of the trail, working from Levenmouth Wood to Vane Farm. That will add about 3.5km at the far end. It leaves a section in the middle, which we'll do next year to complete the whole project."

Neil Kilpatrick then introduced Sir David Montgomery, who had kindly agreed to cut the tape and open the trail formally.

"Sir David is known very well by most of you. He is an extremely generous landowner and he has made available, through his son Jamie and through the Kinross Estate Company, the land for this trail. He has been an enthusiastic supporter and the provider of a lot of good ideas, many of which we have picked up."

Sir David said a few words before wielding the scissors. He reiterated comments Neil Kilpatrick had made about Loch Leven being a National Nature Reserve, with sensitive areas where the birdlife needed respect, and added,

"I hope people using this trail will follow the Outdoor Access Code. The trail goes through areas that have livestock in them, so obviously dogs should be kept under control. And it's important that everybody takes their litter home with them.

"I only hope that in due course we will be able to complete the full circle of Loch Leven if an acceptable route can be found through the RSPB reserve. It would be marvellous for the people of Kinross and the local neighbourhood to be able to walk or cycle all the way round. The trail will be an enormous tourist attraction for people coming to the area and will be very important in helping us to build up tourism."

News from the Health Centre

New Clinical System

Last year we were due to install a new clinical system. This was, however, delayed and the transfer is now scheduled for 17 – 31 July. The new system, called Vision, is much more robust than our existing system and it will enable us to store, access, manage and process our clinical data in a more effective way. All clinicians and staff will require extensive training to become proficient in the system and this will be taking place over the coming months. We will try to keep disruption to a minimum during this time, but will have to make some changes to our usual services. We are unable to transfer appointments to the new system, so we will not be making advance bookings for 26 July onwards. Patients on repeat medication are asked to order medication a month in advance of this period as any requests received during this time are likely to be subject to significant delay. If any patient notices any discrepancies with their repeat order slip or prescriptions during this time, a member of the Health Centre staff should be informed. We will also be suspending Chronic Disease Management clinics such as asthma or diabetes in the week prior to the This is the biggest single challenge we have faced for some years and we would ask patients to bear with us whilst we transfer to and master this new software. Further details will be published in the Health Centre Newsletter which is available in our waiting room.

Travel Advice

Members of our nursing team have been specially trained to provide up to date, accurate information regarding travel health and immunisations. If you are travelling abroad and wish advice, please collect a travel form and a leaflet about our Travel Service from reception. The form should be completed and returned to reception and an appointment for the Travel Clinic made. An appointment is required for each family member travelling. The nurse will give travel advice specifically tailored to the country you are visiting and the areas within the country. The Health Centre is also a registered Yellow Fever Centre and can administer Yellow Fever vaccinations to registered and non-registered

SNH carried out extensive work at Burleigh last year, with new planting, mowing and creation of ponds as well as the building of the hide and walkway.



Police Box

Motorcyclists

For several years, Tayside Police has been aware that the road network within Western Division has been recognised by motorcyclists as one of the most attractive for weekend motorcycling. The number of recreational motorcyclists has shown a marked increase both within the Divisional area and nationally.

The numbers of motorcyclists that travel within Western Division at the weekend, predominately on a Sunday, has led to a corresponding increase in the number of collisions involving motorcyclists and an increase in the number of complaints received with regard to these motorcycles, such as their speed, manner of driving and the anti-social nature of the excessive noise that they can produce.

We would ask you to report any such behaviour and where possible obtain the makes and registration numbers of the motorcycles involved.

Throughout Perth and Kinross during the summer we will be monitoring such problems and to do so will provide, among other things, high visibility patrols and static checks at hot spot areas with regular assistance from our Mobile CCTV Van and the Tayside Safety Camera Partnership.

Kirkgate Park

Most of you will be aware that extensive work is being carried out to improve the facilities at Kirkgate Park and that the work is going well, despite early fears that progress might be hampered by vandals. To date we have only had one such act reported to us and that was soon after the work commenced. Since then we have increased our patrols in the area and have responded promptly to the few calls from the public that have reported persons acting suspiciously or that have been suspected of causing damage. However, just because things are going well, we will not become complacent and will continue to give the park regular

attention and would ask the public to continue to contact us if they witness any incidents that might be a cause for concern.

Isolated Car Parks

The above are popular with people who enjoy a walk in the country, particularly to exercise their dogs. Unfortunately cars parked at these locations are occasionally broken into and items stolen from within. We strongly advise people not to leave any valuables within their vehicles, unless they can be locked in a boot. Although it is good practice to keep valuables out of sight, previous experiences have shown that this is not entirely effective. Once a car is broken into, thieves will look under seats, look inside glove compartments and lift parcel shelves to look into tailgates. Unless you have a lockable boot, do not leave valuables inside your car. We would also ask persons who visit these places to be aware of suspicious persons or vehicles. If you see a car or person acting suspiciously, report it to the police and whenever possible remember to note registration numbers

Archaeological Finds at New High School Site

Some archaeological discoveries have recently been made at the site of the new high school, shedding light on the ancient history of the area.

The excavation at the site, adjacent to Lethangie Farm, has been undertaken by SUAT Ltd, Perth-based archaeological consultants and contractors. During the planning application process, the development site was recognised as being of archaeological interest by archaeologists from Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust, who provide archaeological advice to P&KC's planners. The excavation is also part of planning consent conditions for the development, part of the Council's Investment in Learning Programme.

The development site includes a Scheduled Ancient Monument (an archaeological site designated as being of national significance), in the south field. Identified through aerial photography, the buried archaeology here is considered to represent the remains of a prehistoric settlement, at least 2000 years old. The scheduled area will be protected and will be encompassed within the new school grounds.

A ditch on the south side of the scheduled monument turned out to be a rather large pit, which interestingly contained small pieces of broken medieval pottery and burnt material that will be analysed.

In the north field the features so far investigated include the base remains of rig and furrow (medieval ploughed strips of land); a narrow linear trench running across the site, which was interpreted as a fence line, probably medieval; a large pit with domestic rubbish in the form of small pieces of medieval pottery shards, bone and oyster shell; a small hearth; a large pit with burnt stone; a large circular enclosure ditch containing small broken pieces of medieval pottery and many rodent burrows were also identified. Many of the deposits have been sampled for further analysis, and charcoal has been recovered for possible dating.

News from the AGM

Chairman's Report: CCllr Colliar reported that the CC had been fairly busy over this past year, however in certain cases the progress in reaching a conclusion in matters was very slow. Discussions held last year in relation to the road junction at Lethangie and the crossing at Springfield Road being appropriate examples, having only now come to fruition. The Park and Ride site is progressing and should be opened shortly. On the down side, the CC were disappointed in the decision reached in relation to "Ivy Cottage" and had hoped that this building could be preserved. One of the other major planning applications during the past year was the 53 retirement flats at the Green Hotel. TRACKS are also to be congratulated for their progress in developing the paths Comment was made to the delay in the around the Loch. construction of the new School. Tayside Police were thanked for their support and for updating the CC on occurrences and crime prevention in the town. CCllr Colliar also conveyed his gratitude to the three Councillors for their support and attendance at the CC meetings. It was noted that Cllr Hayton was moving further north. The Chairman advised that CCllrs Eileen Thomas and Ross McConnell had decided to retire from the CC and he passed on his thanks to them for their contribution and efforts during their term of office. Further thanks were conveyed to Mr McConnell in respect of his involvement with the Light Up Kinross Committee. In closing, the Chairman thanked all the CC members for their support and assistance over this last year.

Finance Report: Treasurer, Ian Jack presented an audited account covering the period from 1 April 2006 to 31 March 2007. In relation to the sum received for Poppy Wreaths it was noted that the Army have still to pay for their Wreath. Planning

Eileen Thomas advised that she received a reply to the CC's comments made to P&KC in relation to planning matters following P&KC's request for comments on "Development Standards". Mrs Thomas had reiterated points that had been raised to Planning in the past. The consultation period has been amended from 14 days to 21 days, however this can be extended to just prior to the Development Control Meeting. Mrs Thomas had pointed out that the name of the CC is not always entered on the Public Access Database and thus creates a difficulty in using the search vehicle. Despite this reminder, Mrs Thomas advised that having checked the site today this information is still not recorded in certain cases. With regard to the issue we raised in respect of "Ivy Cottage", (prior notification of demolition), this is a point that requires to be raised with the Scottish Executive. The final point raised related to the CC not being notified of alterations to planning applications following on our commenting on the initial application. This particular matter has been reviewed and the regulations are now much stricter, applications have

Report from P&K Councillors

Waste materials: P&KC are considering changing collection of the general waste to once every fortnight with the paper bin is to include all types of recycling materials, such as cans, plastic bottles etc. Some discussion was held on this subject, however it was agreed that as at the moment it is only a consultation exercise we leave matters in abeyance until next month.

Dog Fouling. Following on a number of complaints received, Cllr Robertson recently spoke to the Dog Warden who is planning to mount extra patrols covering the pathways around the Primary School, Nursery and High Street. They will be mostly carried out during the early morning and late evening. If caught, the person is reported to the Council who pass on details to the Sheriff the names are published and it is at the Sheriff's discretion whether or not a fine is awarded. CCllr Mackay enquired again as to the replacement of the **barrier** at the playpark in Green Road.

Kinross Common Good Fund: Cllr Robertson advised that the Fund is in deficit due to the legal costs incurred by P&KC. The sum of £600.00 approx was incurred by the Council in instructing Solicitors to represent their interests in the Town Hall case. It was also noted that any financial costs incurred in respect of heating, lighting, marketing costs etc in relation to the Town Hall would be met from the Kinross Common Good Fund. A lengthy discussion was held on this subject. It was pointed out that it was unfair that the fees and outlays incurred by the Council in pursuing the Court case should be met from the Common Good Fund. Cllr Robertson is to obtain more in-depth information on the procedures involved in managing the Common Good Fund and the rights of the Council in holding the Town Hall as "Common Good Property".

General Correspondence

Public Access: Eileen Thomas advised that a redesign of the P&KC website was planned and that there would be easier access to "Public Access". It may be that a link to all CCs would be made available on the P&KC site.

Vane Farm Planning Application: Report from Scottish Executive.

Rates Bill for Mortuary: Now showing a nil balance.

Grouse & Claret: Communication received from owners re disposal of waste products and uplift of same by Council. The Council have refused to collect items as they state that the bridge on the access route to the property is in a dangerous condition and deemed unsafe. Apparently an inspection was carried out by the Council without the knowledge of the owners. The owners have returned their permits and requested a refund.

T in the Park: Communication received from a party questioning the decibel level for the sound at T in the Park, claiming the level had increased to 140 decibels. It was commented that the level had been 140 over previous years and that there has been no change.

Roundabout: An email was received from a resident enquiring as to the justification in placing a mini roundabout at the T Junction in Sutherland Drive/Springfield Road. The resident felt that it would be more appropriate to place a mini roundabout at the junction in Springfield Road/Muirs. It was mentioned, however, that the stone walls at this location make it unsuitable for such a proposal. The roundabout at Sutherland Drive/Springfield Road was paid for by the Developer and constructed with the purpose of slowing down the traffic before reaching the new crossing.

Myre Car Park Resurfacing: In response to a query from CCllr Jack, Cllr Robertson advised that there is money available in the Council Budget and the KGV will also contribute towards the works. However, the delay has been caused due to surface and drainage problems.

Structural Plan/Housing Projections: Cllr Barnacle attended a meeting in November with representatives of all CCs and the Civic Trust. Following this Cllr Barnacle wrote to the Chief Executive and the CC also forwarded a letter to P&KC endorsing the comments made by Cllr Barnacle. We have now received a letter which the P&KC sent to all CCs. They do not appear to have received our earlier communication. The Council are proposing to make changes to the Structure Plan which will have an effect on the figures previously referred to. It was agreed that this matter would be added to the Agenda for the next meeting.

Anti-Social Noise Officers have offered to address this subject in talks to various groups. This is to be added to the

Agenda for the next meeting.

Gritting: Mrs Thomas advised that she had received a communication from the Council asking for comments on the snow clearing/gritting over the winter period. It was suggested that reference to this be made in the Newsletter with a request for comments. However, comments are required by 4 May.

Other Business

Area Based Initiative: Cllr Cuthbert reported on the present position in relation to the Steering Group and recent meetings. An Action Plan has been drawn up to address areas for consideration. A leaflet housing a plan of the area and showing local walks, the town centre, details of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and list of suppliers etc, has been printed and will be available for distribution shortly. There will be no charge levied for a copy. A competition for children is also included. A report should be forthcoming shortly and CCllr Cuthbert will ensure that the CC receive a copy.

T in the Park: A meeting is to be held on 14 May at the Green Hotel. Representatives from all local CCs, Big Day Out and the Police will be in attendance. Two representatives from the CC are invited to attend.

News from the May Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 2 May were: CCllrs David Colliar (Chair), David Cuthbert, Ian Jack, Margaret Scott (Secy), Margaret Blyth, Carole Drummond and Dot Mackay. Also present were Eileen Thomas and Ross McConnell as Editor and Treasurer of the Kinross Newsletter respectively and three members of the public.

Apologies were received from Councillor W Robertson.

Kinross Newsletter AGM

The Editor, Mrs Eileen Thomas, presented a report as follows:

"It has been quite a year of change for the Newsletter. This time last year Ian Thomson confirmed his intention to retire in November after 14 years' involvement with the Newsletter, nine as Joint Editor. This allowed us time to find someone with the appropriate skills to replace him and also allowed a generous hand-over period without any disruption to production of the Newsletter. Tony Dyson joined the Newsletter team to do typesetting and layout which had been Ian's main duties. Shortly after Tony joined we started to present the Newsletter to the printers in a fully electronic format which has allowed greater freedom to include photographs and graphics throughout. Tony has taken full advantage of this and has put a lot of work into giving the Newsletter a fresh look with new headings and so on. An experimental colour front cover was so well received that we have converted to colour front covers every month, although this has extended the amount of time that needs to be spent on the Newsletter each month and has increased printing costs. Another development is the Newsletter website. There is not enough room in the Newsletter to give advertisers and readers all the information we would like, such as explaining our advertising structure and giving advice on how to submit items, so the website has been a useful addition and thanks go to Tony for setting that up. Contributors can also find a list of deadlines for months in advance on the Newsletter website.

The Newsletter has become larger in recent months. This is partly due to the extra photographs, but I have also introduced more news stories. I think submissions may also have risen. We receive around 60 items by email each month and around 25 handwritten or hard copy items which need to be word-processed or scanned. Sales have risen from 1800 in

September to 2000 in recent months.

We've had closer collaboration with the kinross.cc website. Together we produced a 'Yellow Pages' of community contacts for the March issue and we plan to do this at least yearly. We mention the kinross.cc website frequently in the Newsletter and we have links between our websites and regular exchanges of information. And we've continued to print a two-page news update from the Kinross-shire Partnership within our pages every six months.

Apart from Tony joining, there have been no other changes to the Newsletter personnel this year. Julia Fulton continues to do an excellent job on word processing. Ann Harley has kindly taken on looking after subscriptions as well as advertising. Ross McConnell looks after the finances and Craig Williams continues to distribute the Newsletter and has added two new outlets, Somerfield and Dobbies. Everyone on the team is enthusiastic about the Newsletter and always looking for ways to improve it.

I'd like to thank the team for all their hard work and support. Thanks also to Ian for the training and support during the handover. I'd also like to thank Isabel Gillon, former joint editor who receives items for us in Milnathort and who is always a source of advice and encouragement. Also, thanks to our regular contributors Lyn Haworth, Malcolm Smith for the weather reports, Fiona Turnbull for the farming column, Gina Long and the Historical Society for the loan of photographs, Helen Glover for various contributions, the police, SNH, the RSPB and all the clubs, community groups and individuals who send us contributions. Thanks also to all the shops and outlets throughout Kinross-shire who stock and sell the Newsletter for us."

The Treasurer, Ross McConnell, circulated copies of the Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended 31st March 2007. He explained that although the deficit recorded in the accounts is shown as £1,088.95, it should be noted that donations of over £5,000.00 were made during this financial year to a number of organisations, which included the following: Kinross in Bloom £1.000. Milnathort in Bloom £1,000, Light Up Kinross £1,000, Kinross & District Pipe Band £500, The Web Project £400, Loch Leven United Football Club £300, £100 each to three High School Pupils (Karate) £300, Swansacre Playgroup £250 and Kinross-shire Volunteer Group & Outreach Scheme £250. A £1,000 pledge was also made to Friends of Kirkgate Park last year and has only recently been settled, this sum requires to be deducted from the figure recorded under the bank balance. The £50 under "Other Income" relates to the sale of a surplus printer. The printing costs have increased due partly to the fact that the Newsletter now features a colour cover and back page. This change in format attracts an additional cost of around £300 per month. The number of issues being printed has now risen to 2000 and the number of pages in each edition has also increased. The sum under "Retiral Presentation" represents payment of three retiral gifts and two lunches at the Green Hotel. A remuneration is paid to the editor on the basis of an eleven month period. It was noted that Mr Dyson's work on the Newsletter website is included as part of the typesetting layout and no extra payment is received by him for this. The website domain registration covers a two year period for £80. Finally, the sum at credit of the Bank Account was recorded as £20,966.31, however the payment of £1,000 to Friends of Kirkgate Park should be deducted to give a true figure of £19,966.31.

Ian Jack adopted the accounts, seconded by David Colliar. The Chairman on behalf of the CC conveyed our gratitude to the Newsletter Team for all their efforts over the last financial year, with special thanks to the Editors, Ian Thomson and Eileen Thomas, as also to the Treasurer, Ross McConnell. Mr Dyson was also to be congratulated for the recent changes in the form at of the Newsletter.

The Chairman mentioned that he had received an email from Susan Bathgate questioning the practicalities of having two Kinross Websites, i.e. Kinross CC and the Kinross Newsletter. Mrs Bathgate raised the point that the Newsletter website is duplicating information which should be readily accessible to users of Kinross CC. She explained that funding was available to fully develop the attractions/events and diary sections on the Kinross CC Website and that it was inappropriate for duplication to be taking place. It was agreed that a meeting of the Sub-Committee be arranged to discuss this matter and a reply would be made at that time.

A further communication was received from Susan Bathgate as representative of Friends of Kirkgate Park. organisation has just received a £1,000 donation from the Newsletter fund, which had been pledged last year. However, Mrs Bathgate explained that an event was planned for the week end of 1-2 September that would involve various community groups, as well as P&KC, RSPB, Friends of Kirkgate Park etc. Funding was required to host this "Discovery Weekend" and any contribution would be most welcome. This was discussed at great length. However, in view of the donations that were made last year, the fact that a payment of £1,000 is to be made in respect of the kinross.cc website support (covering a two year period and in line with the agreement reached previously), the £1,000 paid out to Friends of Kirkgate Park, £1,000 to Light Up Kinross and the £2,000 earmarked for the Town Hall legal fees, it was decided that it would not be possible to donate any further monies at time. Once the Newsletter fund has built up some capital the situation can then be reviewed. The officers for the following year were agreed as follows: Editor - Eileen Thomas, Treasurer - Ross McConnell, Typesetting - Tony

Matters Arising from the April Meeting

Bus Changes/Park and Ride – It was noted that the Park and Ride site will open on 27 May with relevant bus and coach services diverted from that date. Both Scottish Citylink services that operate through Milnathort and also the Megabus journeys that operate on the M90 will be serving this site. However, as explained previously, the Citylink service will no longer travel down the High Street but will serve the bus stops at Station Road (Lomond Mews) and High Street (Kirklands Hotel). There is another Citylink stop at the Green Hotel. Stagecoach Service 23 and a new Service 36B timetable from Glenrothes and Falkland will also serve the Park and Ride Site. These services are detailed in an updated edition of the Kinross-shire and Bridge of Earn Public Transport Guide. Also from 16 April 2007 two new morning journeys were introduced commercially by Stagecoach Fife. Finally, once operational the Council would appreciate feedback from local residents, they themselves will keep the bus arrangements under review. An automated public convenience will also be provided at the Park and Ride Site once funding is available.

Anti-Social Noise Team: It was agreed that we should invite them to the June meeting or if this date is inconvenient to the August meeting.

Collection of Refuse: The Chairman had received a communication from Mr and Mrs Fu Tong, Grouse & Claret, advising that their grievance had been that they were not

given advance warning from the Council of the proposed inspection of their bridge. They have now engaged the service of a private firm to collect their glass bottles and waste

Litter Problem: Councillor Barnacle had attended a recent meeting the outcome of which was that a Litter Action Plan is to be set up to address the problem. Waste Services Department of P&KC will undertake to co-ordinate the writing and signing up of a Litter Action Plan in conjunction with Kinross High School, Tayside Police, local businesses etc.

Gritting and Snow Clearing: This subject was given mention on the website Bulletin Board. CCllr Jack reported that the eastbound A977 is neglected, that the westbound is gritted but the eastbound overlooked. We should raise this matter with P&KC.

Planning Applications received

Alteration/Extension to dwellinghouse, Carsegour Farm, Kinross: No comment was made on this application.

Planning Applications determined

Erection of Sun Lounge, 29 Montgomery Way.

Erection of a general store for equipment and covered parking, Balado Mushroom Farm: This application falls under Permitted Development for agricultural use.

Other Planning matters

07/00885/FUL, Erection of floodlights on two tennis courts, tarmac area in front of clubhouse and to create play area at Kinross Tennis Club, Station Road, Kinross.

The plans were available for perusal this evening. However the application form was not enclosed with the letter received from the Council. The application is in respect of two floodlights between Courts 1 and 2. A letter of objection to this proposal was received from a neighbouring proprietor on the grounds that the proposal was not in keeping with the residential area, would result in the neighbouring properties depreciating in value, inconvenience would increase (at the moment windows and plants are broken/destroyed by tennis balls), etc. It was also commented that this ground was leased by the Tennis Club and that Hay field Estate may also hold an interest in any planning matters. Having discussed this matter at length, and not having access to the dimensions etc. or application details, it was decided that on the merits of the information at hand grave concerns should be raised in relation to the glare of the lights affecting passing traffic on Station Road, as also the detrimental effect this would have on neighbouring properties. We would also question the usage of the lights, would these be on throughout the year or just at certain times. We are to write to the Council in these

At the moment it is recorded as an invalid application. A letter of objection was received from a neighbouring proprietor, however it was agreed that this matter be shelved until the application is under consideration. Concern was raised at the felling of the trees and we are to write to the Council requesting that a Tree Preservation Order be raised in an effort to prevent any further cut back of the beech and oak trees. Mr Alexander confirmed that the Forestry Commission regulate the felling of trees and it was noted that a Licence is required.

Report from P&K Councillors

The Councillors were not present this evening, however Cllr Robertson had provided a written Report.

Election – Four Councillors will represent Kinross and one of the issues to be addressed following the Election would be the determination of the Town Hall position. The situation, as explained at the last meeting, is that any maintenance costs are paid for from the Common Good Fund. A broken window at the Town Hall recently had to be repaired. Cllr Robertson would hope that we could address the condition of the centre of the town and improve the position. CCllr Cuthbert reported that the Solicitor representing the Town Hall Committee had Petitioned the Sheriff and a Hearing has now been set for 26 June.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail – The opening ceremony for the first section of the Trail is to take place on 17 May at 6.30 pm in Kirkgate Park. Representatives from the Community Council are invited to attend. Sir David Montgomery will officiate at this Ceremony and CCllr Colliar will attend on behalf of the CC.

Other Business

CCllr Jack mentioned that Tony Brunton, a Central Heating Engineer/Plumber, had offered to attend one of our meetings to speak on "the awareness of carbon monoxide". Would also be prepared to write up an article for the Newsletter or Website. He is to be asked to forward a request in writing to the Secretary.

Cllr Mackay mentioned that she had handed over the **garden competition trophies** to Cllr Drummond for use by Kinross in Bloom for their garden competition with the proviso that they are returned to Kinross CC if Kinross in Bloom should cease to exist in the future.

Cllr Colliar mentioned that the area in front of the **County Buildings** had been resurfaced recently. Unfortunately, the Council workmen had failed to remove the memorial seat to Jack Wilson prior to carrying out this work and the tarmacadam was covering the legs of the seat. The seat is now so low that sitting on it is uncomfortable. The CC owns the seat and we are to write to the Council (Housing and Roads) expressing our grievance at this matter; we were not informed that this work was to be undertaken and we would ask that they now rectify the position, dig up the tarmac, remove the seat and resurface. Should any damage have been sustained to the seat we would, of course, hold them liable for repair.

The Chairman reported that he had received two enquiries regarding **vacancies** on the Committee. Nomination forms are to be handed out to the parties. We are to explain that should there be more than four nominees, a By-Election would be held in September.

Sub-Committees: A meeting is to be held at the Green Hotel on 9 May to organise sub-committees.

The next meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 6 June at 7.30 pm in the Masonic Hall.

Milnathort Community Council

In attendance: CCllrs Giacopazzi, Smith, Cottingham, Porter, Ross, Bennet and Thomson; minute secretary E.Rougvie; P&KC Cllrs Robertson and Baird; PC Stephen and nine members of the public. Newly-elected CCllr Lamont submitted his apologies, saying he would arrive later.

CC elections: Results were as follows:- J Porter 131; A Ross 118; J Giacopazzi 110; D Cottingham 105; S Smith 104; J Lamont 103; D Thomson 91; L Bennet; 91; A Dawson 60; P Hessey 56; R Halford 42. J Porter, A Ross, J Giacopazzi, D Cottingham, S Smith, J Lamont, D Thomson and L Bennet were duly elected.

Office-bearers: CCllr Giacopazzi indicated he would be prepared to continue as chair and secretary meantime; CCllr Ross will continue as treasurer. CCllr Giacopazzi expressed his appreciation for the help received in organising the election; Kinross Rotary Club had done an excellent job in manning the polls and Sheriff Forbes had worked into the night to produce the election results. It was agreed that the CC would write to both to express their thanks.

Minutes of the April meeting were proposed by CCllr Ross and seconded by CCllr Porter.

Police matters: PC Stephen reported the following incidents; an act of vandalism had occurred overnight on May 7, whereby a stone dyke was pushed over between Sunnypark woods and Burleigh Sands; a woman parked on the A91 near Gateside had had her mobile phone stolen by a man purporting to ask for directions.

PC Stephen then reported figures released for Western Division of Tayside Police relating to traffic offences that had taken place between April 2006 and March 2007. These included 948 instances of speeding; 1329 instances of using mobile phones and 10,784 seatbelt offences.

CCllr Lamont joined the meeting at this point.

Matters arising: P&KCllr Robertson expressed his dissatisfaction about the fact the report into the December floods was unlikely to be discussed by the Council until June. He said that as soon he knew the date he would contact all interested parties to let them know, and a public meeting would be called after that.

P&KC Cllrs: Following the re-definition of Council wards, there are now four councillors representing the Milnathort area. Cllrs Robertson and Baird said they would attend CC meetings on a regular basis, and would work together as much as possible. If any residents had issues to raise they should approach the councillor they thought would be best placed to help.

P&K Cllr Sandy Miller joined the meeting at this point.

Planning matters: The following applications were noted:-erection of a garden room at 26 North Street; formation of a disabled ramp at Orwell Church; extension to Seggiebank House, Shire End: CCllr Thomson joined the public while this issue was discussed. There was considerable disagreement over whether this lay within the boundaries of MCC, and after discussion it was agreed to postpone further consideration until advice had been sought from P&KC's planning department.

Royal Hotel: The application for change of use from hotel/bar to flats prompted a lengthy discussion. After a vote, it was agreed unanimously that the CC would lodge an objection on the basis that the building should be retained for commercial use.

Other business: CCllr Bennet said several members of the public had said there was a need for a crossing in South

Street, possibly at the War Memorial. P&KCllr Robertson will investigate.

In answer to a query by CCllr Giacopazzi, Cllr Robertson said that Scottish Water are to be charged for work to re-instate a pavement in Back Loan.

There was a discussion about the Tourist Information Centre at Turfhills, whose lease expires in September. Cllr Robertson said that efforts were being made to re-locate it to the Council buildings in Kinross.

CCllr Porter raised the issue of hedges and bushes obscuring paths in and around Milnathort. After discussion, it was agreed that CCllrs Porter and Smith would draw up a list for the Council's head of grounds maintenance. Cllr Robertson pointed out that many hedges were privately owned, and he urged people to ensure they were cut back.

Cllr Robertson said he would find out what was happening with regard to the path at Burleigh Castle. It would not be going through the castle itself because of objections by Historic Scotland.

Recycling: CCllr Giacopazzi said he felt the CC should be more pro-active in terms of encouraging recycling, but didn't think P&KC provided adequate facilities. A fler discussion, it was agreed that he would contact the Council's recycling office to invite him to address the CC. P&KCllr Robertson agreed to take up the issue of the condition of Stirling Road in between Kay's Trailers premises

Minutes of the last meeting: Approved with one amendment - there are no road improvements agreed from Institute to Broomhill Kennels by the Council as this road is privately owned.

Matters Arising

Devonshaw Quarry: The Landowners response to safety concerns is of empathy. Gates have been installed, safety equipment and signs erected, however these continue to end up at bottom of quarry. They have considered filling the quarry but it is used by Central Scotland Police for diving practice. Cllr Barnacle has visited the site and raised the point that it may make a good Country Park and suggested that the Secy write asking the P&KC to liaise with the landowner to consider possible developments designed to provide a safe amenity. Until then the FDCC recommend that the landowner ensures that he has Public Liability Insurance.

Speeding in Carnbo: A letter has been sent to C Haggart, P&KC Head of Traffic and Road Safety requesting a speed survey be conducted at Carnbo during Knockhill racing events and report on findings and advise on possible reduction measures.

Speeding in Blairingone: A letter has been sent to C Haggart, P&KC who has been asked urgently about the progress of the pedestrian crossing and roundabout works agreed at the public meeting as to the best ways to reduce speeding through Blairingone.

Pitcairnie Development: A letter has been sent to P&KC Jim Irons relating the concerns of the Carnbo Community over planning application 05/02389/REM and asking for an urgent meeting on site before 3 May. It is noted with disappointment that no acknowledgment or response has been received from P&KC to date; also a letter has been sent to Scottish Inquiry Reporters Unit asking for the appeal to be heard urgently and relating the view and concerns of the community.

ASBO presentation provisionally booked for 5 June FDCC meeting: Donald Strawson and Sandy Robertson have confirmed they will give a short presentation on the work of the ASBO noise team at the next FDCC meeting on 5th June 2007 at Powmill.

P&KC Business – Cllr M Barnacle

The Chair asked Cllr Barnacle to give feedback on **Fossoway Settlements Development Strategy Group** meeting on 17 April. Cllr Barnacle reported that as a result of the four public meetings held at each village a letter has been sent to P&KC Forward Planning noting the following:

Blairingone: Area B3 Blairingone had a few objections to the assessment area; the Council should provide cost figures for a by-pass; the group recommend the under grounding of the overhead pylon route; the area to the south of the bypass line should be considered as a rural development site.

Crook of Devon: Drum area requires a rural development site; area CD11 (fish farm) has potential as a holiday/leisure development; conservation status for Back Crook area; the group recommended the under-grounding of overhead pylon route.

Powmill: There is concern about the amount of development at Powmill and there should be a reconsideration of zoning of this development site: area P6 recommended as recreational provision: there should be provision for a pedestrian crossing. Rumbling Bridge: Birkfield Rural Development Site should be re-assessed in light of recommendations for Crook of Devon and Blairingone.

As a general comment Cllr Barnacle states that Development potential should not mean just Housing and any large scale development on edges of villages should be recommended for refusal before the strategy is in place to protect the edge of the village. Continuing as a result of these meetings, it is recommended that there be four safe crossing points of the A977.

A map for each village is to be produced re Strategy meeting conclusions.

Other Matters: The fly tipping is continuing between Drum to Cleish particularly at the lay-bys. While this is technically the landowner's responsibility it is recommended that the problem lay-bys should be closed to prevent further fly tipping.

Fossoway Primary School: There continues to be a problem with traffic management in the area at dropping - off and pick-up times. People are advised not to park on the zigzag lines along the school perimeter. A letter is to be sent to the school reminding users of the concerns we all share on this issue.

Members of the public requested in formation from FDCC on how to set up a Community Group to take action on local traffic control issues. People are advised to contact the Police with their concerns at the blockage of driveways and speeding near the school. A letter is to be sent to the police asking for enforcement action to prevent illegal parking and obstruction to footpath and driveways.

Re speeding in Powmill and on the A977 generally the council is prevented by legislation at putting up speed cameras unless accident statistics support their deployment. Members of the public are urged to contact their MSP about the speeding of vehicles on A977 and the need for a change in the legislation to allow speed cameras at any speeding locations.

Drum Sewage: Power installation will be on 18 May and connection to householders thereafter.

Kevin Bell from Scottish Water is to be invited by FDCC to discuss all matters regarding connections.

Planning Matters

07/00555/FUL – Plot 5A Powmill Farm, this is the fourth application at this site for a Dwelling House. P&KC approval has been refused at three applications and the Scottish Executive has refused two appeals. The applicant has reduced the height of the building however significant concerns are still remaining. FDCC recommend refusal on the count of six reasons including conflict with KALP policies.

07/00585/REM – New Guest House, Wester Fossoway. The applicant advised that the guest house will be changed and the FFDC request that the current outline application be withdrawn and a fresh application be submitted for development of the site.

07/00667/FUL – Alterations and extension to Cocklaw House, Powmill. FDCC recommends approval subject to written confirmation of materials proposed, landscaping work including trees to be retained and access provisions at the site.

07/00762/OUT – Erection of 2 dwelling houses at East Coldrain. FDCC recommend approval on the basis of the applicants supporting proposals.

07/00781/FUL - Modification of existing proposal at Culbin Field, Rumbling Bridge. FDCC recommend approval subject to satisfactory landscaping proposals.

07/00727/FUL – New Dwelling between Fall Nursery and Turbine Cottage, Main Street, Crook of Devon. FDCC recommend approval subject to satisfactory plot ratio and flood risk reports and finishes compatible with neighbourhood dwellings. A similar proposal was previously refused on drainage grounds before extra work revealed that there is spare capacity in new system for a total of 12 houses within the new Waste Water Plant.

Cllr Farquhar indicated that a meeting has been arranged with P&KC planners to discuss concerns about the application of policies to planning applications in general and particularly relating to Steading developments.

Save NHS Dentistry Campaign

At the May meeting, campaigners discussed correspondence from the Community Health Partnership which had been passed to us by Gordon Banks MP who is helping the group. There continues to be conflicting information as to whether Kinross will benefit from a mobile dental unit that is one of two apparently operating in Tayside. Gordon Banks is due to meet the Director of CHP and there will be a report of his meeting when the group next meets in June. CHP has told our group that two new salaried dentists are to start work in new premises in Perth soon and it appears that the new Dental Treat and Teach centre is likely to be sited at Broxden Business Park in Perth. We continue to highlight our grave concern that NHS dental services need to be local so that elderly and disabled people, or those without

Apart from anything else, this new centre will not be open until 2009 at the earliest and we want to know what people are supposed to do for the next two years?

transport, can access them.

Now that the new Scottish Parliament has reconvened, we will be pursuing our petition again and calling on the Executive to legislate for a statutory obligation to provide NHS dental services to everyone in Scotland.

It was interesting in this respect at the election hustings in Kinross Parish Church, that the candidates from the main parties, including SNP, when asked if they would support such statutory provision, were not prepared to. We can't understand how the dental crisis can be tackled other than putting legislation in place which provides for a long-term strategy that requires more NHS dentists to be trained and employed here, rather than leaving dental provision to the vagaries of the private market.

We hope to have more news on these issues at our next meeting on **Wednesday 13 June** at 7pm in the Church Centre. Please feel free to come along if you have any "dental issues" or alternatively phone Felicity Garvie on 01592 840825.

The last meeting of the 06-07 session was held on 18 April when the club was privileged to have as their speaker Vanda Salmon, who had worked as a private



secretary for Winston Churchill for a year in the 1950s. She started off by describing the first interview she had with Mr Churchill. She arrived at his London Home, 28 Hyde Park Gate, at 10.30am, but at 12 o'clock she was told that Mr Churchill could not see her that day; could she come tomorrow, and so on the next day she again appeared at 10.30 but this time she was met at the front door by Jo Stirling, head of the typists and duly ushered up the stairs to what Vanda imagined would be Winston's office, but when the door was opened she found herself in Winston's bedroom with the man himself propped up in bed with a budgie on one side of the bed, an amaryllis on the other and Rufus, the poodle, lying at the foot. "Delighted to see you" said the great man "Thank you very much for agreeing to be my secretary." She was then informed by Jo that they started at 8.30 in the morning, and that was the end of the interview. Next day she discovered why they started at 8.30am. Most people's mail comes through the letter box; Winston Churchill's came in several large sacks, and had to be divided up into three piles – Personal, Parliamentary and Constituency and fan mail. The fan mail was by far the largest.

Despite that strange start to her year she enjoyed her time with the great man, who worked extremely hard, if possible never wasting a minute - remember he was Leader of the Opposition at that moment and he was determined that the Conservatives would make their case in the House of Commons. He was also writing the monumental history of the Second World War, running to ten volumes. This historical work was mainly done at the weekends. But he cared for his staff, happy to introduce them to some of the famous people of the time such as Vivien Leigh and Sir Lawrence Olivier. In dictation he gave the secretaries time to get their words down. As well as having a fantastic command of the English language, he loved life, including cats, dogs and flowers. Altogether Churchill was great fun to work for and although this period in her life was over fifty years ago, Vanda still has vivid memories of Winston Churchill. She finished with an evocative description of his funeral. Tony Jones gave the vote of thanks.

Fair Break Café News



Studying music and psychology she soon discovered ways in which music could help the physically and mentally handicapped. Whilst training for the ministry and working at special needs schools she had found that music could again be a great help in helping the children overcome their difficulties. She went on to relate by describing in emotional detail some examples of how whilst working as a hospital chaplain and by using music therapy she had been able to transform some lives and reduce the frustration felt by others in distress. Rotarian Rev John Hegarty gave the vote of thanks.

Bronze Age Kinross was the subject of the talk given to the Club on 23 April by Trevor Cowie, a senior curator in the archaeology department of the Royal Scottish Museum. Trevor explained how a chance find by a metal detector user had led to further investigations and finds. The earliest find has been a flat axe head from the period 1900 – 1700 BC. Other items found have included swords, socketed axe heads and gouges some thought to have originated in northern England. It is felt that the items were probably buried on purpose to identify boundaries.

A group of fourteen Rotarians enjoyed an enjoyable and informative visit to RAF Leuchars. During the visit the strategic role of the RAF today was explained and the group were taken on a tour of the maintenance areas, radar facilities and the control tower. The highlight of the visit for the aviation buffs was the opportunity to sit in the cockpit of one of the Tornados based at the station.

Six years after they placed an option on the land, Stewart Milne was able to commence building in May 2006 on their 6.7 acre site at Burnbank Meadows. Steve Loomes, the Company's Land Director explained to the meeting of the Rotary Club on 30 April the complexities of meeting all today's planning requirements and the various approvals that are now required. A total of 41 houses were to be built on the site and as part of the planning requirements the adjacent road is being re-aligned to improve the sight lines and a new bridge is being built over the burn to give access to Sunnypark. Following on their success in Scotland, plans were now well established to extend the company's activities into England and Wales.

A party from the Club made a visit to the SSPCA Wildlife Centre at Dunfermline. The Society now receives 100,000 calls per year and the group were shown the excellent work being undertaken not only to rehabilitate injured and sick animals but to educate the public in animal welfare issues. The staff stressed that a lot of the problems they came across were caused by the careless disposal of litter.

The organisers of T in the Park have kindly donated £5000 to the Club to be used to support local charities.





Athletics

After an excellent run in her first outdoor race of the 2007 season, reported in last month's newsletter, local athlete **Eilidh Child** has continued to set the track alight with a string of good performances. On 21 April she competed in the

Scottish University Championships at Grangemouth and won the 400 metre hurdles title in a new personal best time of 59.33. This was her first PB in just under two years and she was understandably delighted with the time.

On the following day, competing for Pitreavie in the Scottish Women's League at Meadowbank Stadium, she won the A string 100 metre hurdles race in 14.70 and then won the 200m B string race in another personal best time of 24.62 seconds, a time that was fast enough to win the A string race.

On 5 May she travelled south to Bedford and competed in the 400 metre hurdles for Edinburgh University at the British Universities Athletic Championships. She won her heat comfortably in 59.90 seconds and then went on to win the final in another personal best time of 59.05 seconds, beating last year's winner by nearly 2.5 seconds.

On 13 May at Scotstoun Stadium, Glasgow, in conditions that were less than favourable, she won the Scottish Closed Championships 400m hurdles in 59.42 seconds. On 20 May she ran for Scotland at the Loughborough International in a 400m hurdles race that featured Commonwealth Games medallist Lee McConnell (Loughborough University) and athletes representing teams from England, Wales and Great Britain and Ireland Juniors. She finished second to McConnell in 58.42 seconds, yet another personal best and a season's target, which was to run under 59 seconds. Her new target is to get under 58 seconds and should this be achieved she will qualify to run at the European Under 23 Championships to be held in Hungary in July.

Kinross Hockey Club

The final game of the season saw Kinross away to Edinburgh University to decide the title of Division 3 with Kinross having to win to secure the title. The game started at a frantic pace but a lack of killer instinct by both sides saw no goals until Edinburgh Uni scored after a torrent of shots at goal. Vane Farm

Summer migrants continue to return in dribs n drabs with one of the latest being Garden warbler which we heard burbling away around the centre on 15 May. Swallows are well advanced in hoose construction and some of the reserve birds have babeez already. Several swan pairs and lapwing pairs are on nests so spring is well on the way. A rarer garganey, a small duck has also been around on the flood as well.

Our new Bumblebee meadow has been sown in the field in front of the centre so that should develop nicely ower the next few months. We have done this in partnership with the Bumblee Conservation Trust to increase the biodiversity on the reserve and provide more habitat for some bee species which, like a lot of birds, are in decline.

The coffee shop has undergone a bit of a refurbishment and by the time you read this should be rejuvinatit. We are also pittin in a new coffee makin machine to further increase the quality of drinks we have available. It's wan o they skoosh, woosh sook blaw soondin kinds wans wi fresh beans n milk type o thing, sounds yummy!! We have also provided more space and some com fier seatin fur yer hurdies.



Loch Leven NNR

With the better weather, longer days and the opening of the first section of the Loch Leven



Soon, as the hundreds of tufted duck, mallard, gadwall and shoveler eggs on St Serf's hatch out, females will bring their young to feed and shelter in the shallows around the loch edge where the male ducks have been busy defending territories. Kirkgate Park, Burleigh Sands and Findatie are the main public gateways to the Reserve and are the best places for people to freely enjoy the loch shore. Outwith these areas, our general advice is to keep well back from the shoreline; this way you can minimise the risk of disturbing duck broods. By causing fright to birds at this time of year, they can abandon their young or the young separated from their parents can be picked off by predators such as gulls, or suffer from exposure if the weather is poor.

The presence of dogs can be particularly frightening for wild birds and so outwith Kirkgate Park, Burleigh Sands and Findatie, where dogs can run free, if you do have a dog with you, please keep it out of the water and under close control

From February 2005 to December 2006, SNH conducted a survey of access on the Reserve. The surveying rather disappointingly showed that every observation of dog walking outwith Kirkgate Park, Burleigh Sands and Findatie did not follow our guidance. Dogs were off-lead, roaming widely and were offen in the water. On one occasion a dog bounding into the water caused about 7000 pink foot geese and 2000 dabbling ducks to fly off in panic from the shore to the safety of St Serf's Island. This should not happen on a National Nature Reserve.

With all the wonderful new visitor facilities which have recently gone in at Burleigh Sands and at Kirkgate Park, and with stretches of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail now open, it is a great time for people to enjoy the outdoors and the wildlife of the loch. We ask that you do this in a responsible manner and respect the special nature of Loch Leven National Nature Reserve.

Farming



LEAF - Open Farm Sunday

How much do you know about farming? I am hoping you know the basics, milk comes from a cow, carrots and potatoes grow in the soil, barley is made into malt then beer You may have picked up more knowledge of farms from helping out when you were young or visiting relatives that were farmers. It seems our young people of today are missing out on learning this information. Recent research suggests nearly half of seven to eleven-year-olds are not involved in growing food, and a quarter never visit the countryside. It also found many children lived in such an "unreal world" they did not understand where much of their food came from. Many children do not know that their vegetables come from the ground - to them they come from packets or out of tins. This is a tragedy for the farming industry, as if the consumers of tomorrow do not understand the basics of the production cycle, they will not appreciate the high quality of the food produced by Scottish farmers. Instead of choosing Scottish beef because they know it enjoys grazing outside all summer producing a tender mouth watering steak, they will choose either the cheapest product or one with the most attractive packaging. They may be disappointed.

Scottish Farmers do not have access to million pound advertising campaigns. They can't afford celebrities to push a brand, like Walkers Crisps, but they can use their resources to educate and promote a positive message about their produce. This is the ethos behind 'Farm Sunday'. Open Farm Sunday is a national Open Farm Day coordinated by LEAF (Linking Environment And Farming) so people can hear and see the positive steps farmers are taking to look after the fabric of our countryside whilst producing safe, wholesome and affordable food. This year farms up and down the United Kingdom will be opening their gates to visitors on Sunday 10 June. Probably the farm closest to Kinross-shire that is participating is West Gilston Mains, New Gilston, by Leven, Fife. Run by Edward Baxter, it is a mixed arable and stock farm. They plan to have a walk around the farm where people will be able to see oats growing in the field (and Quaker Oats from Cupar will be there to talk about oats and their new cereals), Belted Galloway cattle and old and young woodland. They are keen environmentalists "active environmentalists not environmental activists" is the strap line and there will be plenty of opportunity to see how this is put in to practice. They are having an "old and new" machinery exhibition the machinery and tractors used today compared to olden days. They also plan to have stalls, a burger bar offering Beltie Galloway burgers, tea, bales to play on and a wet weather option! Sounds pretty much like a fun way to learn about something new. 
