On attending the World Café evening which rounded off the Community group discussions on the Draft Appraisal of the Kinross Conservation Area, I was both stunned and appalled to ascertain that, in this the Year of The Homecoming, P&KC is selling off the Kinross family silver; included in the package of Town Hall, Library, and Old Post Office buildings is the Church Tower, with bids allegedly already on the table. Having liaised with Historic Scotland prior to the meeting, and not knowing that this part of Kinross's heritage was for sale, I made the suggestion that the building of lesser historic status (i.e. The Old Post Office) be carefully dismantled, leaving the church Tower building to be refurbished as a possible Tourist Information Office (now lacking), and as one of two most attractive focal points in the resulting Town Square (the other being the fountain). The Old Kirk was originally erected in 1741, the tower added in 1751, and the clock in 1875.

Historic Scotland informed me that the church Tower is of National importance Listed Category B, as is the Old Post Office, but is also a Scheduled Ancient Monument, known as SAM 998 Clock Tower, and any development must be sensitive to its setting and subject to certain constraints. It would have to be demonstrated that every effort had been made to retain The Old Post Office before it could be delisted and demolished, with Government Ministers having to authorise any action. Perth and Kinross Council assured the 60 attendees at the meeting that past mistakes would not be repeated and that we should move on. We already have a perfect example of what planners, Historic Scotland and Government Ministers can produce, supposedly sensitive to its setting the Parliament building - extensive use of concrete and bamboo having passed the sensitivity test!

Can our community conscience allow the sale and unknown fate to befall this irreplaceable landmark in the hands of developers, not known for their sensitivity and possessing an uncanny ability to dodge constraints? Stand united with common voice - ideally to our MSP, and we may have a Town Centre for future generations to be proud of Stand by and do nothing and past mistakes will undoubtedly be repeated.

Portmoak Traffic Calming Measures 1.09.

I noted with interest comments in the Milnathort CC minutes, which were also raised at the successful Placecheck community meeting in Milnathort, commenting in a somewhat negative light on the installation of traffic calming measures recently implemented in Portmoak. I also attended a community meeting in Portmoak on the subject of the traffic calming measures where, again, the attitude toward these measures was somewhat negative. As a resident of Portmoak and a regular attendee of the CC meetings, I have over the past two years or so, noted the discussions and developments regarding traffic calming in the area and the installation of the build outs. To be honest, I did not think that there was a significant issue with traffic moving fast through the parish, but as a fairly new resident and aware of the strong body of community feeling that traffic did need to be slowed through Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell, I felt it inappropriate to state this at the time. I attended several very well attended community meetings where the case for traffic calming was very clearly made, and a planning meeting where the location and design of the build outs was agreed, by a large section of the community (at least as large as the voice being negative about them in the August meeting!) as the best way forward.

Now these measures are in place, we find a strong voice not present in any of the discussions leading to the installation of the build outs - stating that the build outs are dangerous. I drive through the parish at least twice a day, passing through many of the build outs, and struggle to see what the difficulty is. If you approach the build outs on the right side of the road, at the correct speed limit, the visibility is fine, and there is plenty of room to stop for oncoming traffic. I admit, that the initial build out heading into Kinnesswood near Gamekeepers can cause problems when traffic is busy with people turning in and out of the junction, and again, the build out coming into Scotlandwell from the Leslie direction does have reduced visibility meaning you need to slow to beneath the speed limit to check its clear, but essentially, the build outs themselves are not dangerous. It's the drivers. As I say, I drive along the road regularly and stick to the speed limit. The number of times I am caught by a vehicle, me doing 40 in a 40 limit so they obviously exceeding the limit, or, worse, being overtaken whilst doing 40 in a 40 limit, is quite worrying. And these drivers live locally, as I see them turn into or out of side streets and residential streets.

A build out cannot be dangerous. It's a static piece of tarmac, curbed, with bollards, again static, affixed to it. If a driver is approaching too fast, on the wrong side of the road, or simply not being observant, then it is the driver at fault, not the bollard. I am not saying they are perfect; better signage, greater visibility and perhaps adjusting the position, or removing one or two of them might make them better, (as the Council have suggested they will do), but the build outs essentially are not dangerous. They may well be inconvenient - but then that's what we wanted - to slow traffic down through our villages.

I have no doubt that this will provoke letters stating that the build outs are dangerous and I admit, I may well be a lone voice, but personally, I do not see a problem with the traffic calming undertaken in Portmoak.

Campus construction update

For works up to 31 August 2009

We have a progress report from month 18 of the 20-month build period when activities on site were as follows:

- "Snagging" of the completed brick work, render and cedar cladding was taking place.
- Mechanical and electrical works were proceeding in all areas
- Internal paint work was carried out on the Sports, Music, Assembly and Teaching areas, which also received their ceiling and floor coverings.
- Hard landscaping, including the external site road crossings for toucan crossings was carried out. The sewer connection was completed.
- The climbing wall was completed in the Street Area.
- Woodsorba and Pregybel to the Games Halls and Assembly Hall are complete.
- Externally, water, fire hydrant works and gas pipes were installed to the building. So ft landscaping was continuing on schedule.

As we produce this Newsletter we are in month 19 of the build. When it is published it will be the 20th and final month, with everything on schedule for the agreed entry date of Monday 26 October.

Opening arrangements for new campus

Preparations for the opening of the new Loch Leven Community Campus are well underway and P&KC has confirmed arrangements for the moves of Kinross High School and Kinross Library to the new campus.

To make facilities ready for school pupils, library users and the wider community, the school and library will close towards the end of October for a short period of time.

KINROSS HIGH SCHOOL will be **closed** to pupils for normal school work on Friday 23, Monday 26, Tuesday 27 and Wednesday 28 October to enable the school to move to the community campus. Orientation tours of the campus for pupils are planned for Wednesday 28 October. The school will advise pupils of details (*See also KHS news on p. 29*).

KINROSS LIBRARY (at the County Buildings) will close at 8pm on Thursday 22 October and will re-open at 10am on Thursday 29 October in the new Loch Leven Community Campus. The opening hours of the new library will be:

Monday	10am – 6pm
Tuesday	10am – 8pm
Wednesday	10am – 8pm
Thursday	10am – 8pm
Friday	10am – 6pm
Saturday	10am – 3pm

During the closure period, all library users will be able to borrow up to twice as many items as usual. Loan periods will also be extended to avoid any worries about books becoming overdue.

Staff are looking forward to welcoming the whole community to the stunning new library, which provides a wide range of new resources, lots of comfortable social space, meeting rooms, vending services and much enhanced computer provision, including wi-fi.

The brand new community library will be among the wide range of facilities available for all members of the local community at the Loch Leven campus. State of the art classrooms will combine with the latest sports and cultural facilities including fitness suite, gym, dance studio, outdoor sports pitches, meeting rooms, a hall with cinema-style projection, art and design rooms, drama and recording studio and ICT suites.

Catering facilities will provide drinks and snacks throughout the day. A great range of hot and cold snacks will be on offer from the Food to Go kiosk and vending services will also provide refreshments throughout campus opening hours.

News from the Health Centre



The autumn seems to have come round quickly again and it is time for the annual flu campaign. At this stage, arrangements for a vaccination programme for swine flu have not been finalised. We are therefore going to proceed as usual with Saturday morning clinics to administer the seasonal flu vaccination. Any swine flu vaccination which becomes available will not be administered at these clinics and separate arrangements will be made to vaccinate those in the 'At Risk' groups for swine flu.

Clinics to administer the seasonal flu vaccine will be held on the following dates:

> Saturday 7 November Saturday 14 November Saturday 21 November Saturday 28 November

The clinics will run from 9.30 am until 12 noon and appointments may now be booked with reception. However, we would ask that if a child requires a seasonal flu vaccination, a routine appointment with a GP or nurse is made rather than Saturday flu clinic appointment as the Saturday clinics tend to be a bit busy and overwhelming for young children.

We would encourage all those in the following groups to come for a seasonal flu injection:

Clinicians will visit the day centre, and the residential and nursing homes as usual. Any patients who wish the seasonal flu vaccination but do not fall into any of the above categories should attend one of the pharmacies who offer this service as the practices are unable to vaccinate anyone not in one of the above categories.

Patients who have just become 65, or will be 65 by 31 March 2010, will also be offered the pneumovax vaccination.

Positive discussions at community consultation

Residents and Council officers met on 10 September to discuss the future of Kinross at a World Café event.

A wide range of matters were discussed at the World Café, which is the second stage in a series of consultation events held by the Council in Kinross. Points raised included the recent Conservation Area Appraisal, the development of the link road proposal and the regeneration of Kinross town centre.

In relation to property matters, the Kinross High School site is presently being marketed and is due to be boarded up shortly after the school moves to the new Loch Leven Community Campus. There are currently no plans to demolish the existing buildings on the site, but plans are being made to allow the main car park to be temporarily retained for public use.

The Council at its Strategic Policy & Resources Committee on Wednesday 16 September approved the application of £150,000 of Council Tax Income on Second Homes funding towards the future renovation of Swansacre for social housing in partnership with a registered social landlord.

Kinross Town Hall is currently being marketed for sale and early notifications of interest have already been received by the Council. A decision will not be made on the setting of a closing date for offers until the later part of October 2009. This decision will be market-driven as notifications of interest do not always result in the submission of an appropriate offer.

Council officers also explained that the Council is always looking to secure best value for communities and maximise the return on significant investments such as the Loch Leven Community Campus. The co-location of staff for the benefit of the community, to improve customer and frontline services are options being actively considered and, if adopted, will require alternative uses to be identified for traditional civic buildings in the town, for example the County Buildings. Discussions were encouraged on how community groups could work together with the Council to develop ideas for enterprises that could attract funding necessary to support new uses of vacant buildings.

Alongside this, a number of ideas were suggested about what could be located in the town centre in the future as well as how to promote and publicise the Loch Leven Heritage Trail as a tourist attraction. The Council is keen to work with interested parties in the community to put together a business plan for potential projects that would regenerate the heart of the town centre. Officers will be in touch with local representatives to set up a meeting to discuss this further.

Design work on the link road is currently underway and a detailed programme for delivery of the project is being developed. Whilst early indications were that an on-site start in June/July 2010 was feasible, it is now more likely to be January 2011 when work starts. The road is dual purpose with the aim being to relieve the main street of through traffic and also open up development land which requires the road to be fully serviced. This necessitates programming with a number of different utility companies to get the necessary agreements and commitments in place. It is anticipated that works on site will take 16 to 18 weeks to complete.


Consultation on the review of the Kinross Conservation Area Appraisal took place during the same period and closed on Monday 21 September. The review of the Appraisal provides an opportunity to identify conservation and design issues that should be considered in managing development in the area and identifying proposals for enhancing the built environment in Kinross. The exhibition held in the town was attended by 84 people and comments to date have been positive in relation to the issues identified as being important in the area and the opportunities for enhancing the town centre.

In addition, a new Senior Community Worker has been appointed for the area. Tracey Ramsey will take up post on Monday 21 September and will work to support the community in taking forward initiatives.

Council Leader, Councillor Ian Miller said: "On behalf of the Council I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members of the local community in Kinross-shire who attended the World Café event and the recent focus groups. Residents' participation in this consultation process is vital and we are looking forward to continuing to work with the community to keep them updated and involved.

"If anyone in Kinross or Kinross-shire has other issues they wish to raise about the future of the area we would also like to hear from them and I would encourage them to come forward by contacting the Council's Senior Community Worker locally in the first instance. They will be based initially at Kinross High School and then at Loch Leven Community Campus once it opens later this year."

The local community in Kinross-shire will receive further updates on the consultation in due course.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail

We were disappointed not to win the National Lottery Award for the best environmental project in the UK, but we were runners-up with over 5000 votes. From a relatively small LOCH LEVEN community that is an impressive voting HERITAGE TRAIL



response and we are extremely grateful to all those who supported us so enthusiastically. We have had some excellent publicity from the event and the BBC TV show, and this will be valuable in attracting support for future development.

Regular users of the trail will have noticed two new features that were installed in August. At the Kirkgate viewpoint there is now a curved stainless steel handrail that depicts the heritage features of the loch against the actual background terrain. This is the work of David Wilson, the Perth artist who was also responsible for our stone entry gates and their end-piece heritage carvings. It is a fine piece of work and worth some detailed study. At Burleigh Sands there is a new tree seat that is wrapped round the lovely Scots Pine by the waterside. This is the work of Patrick Green who designed and constructed our other seats on the trail.

Everybody is now asking us when we are going to finish the trail by completing the missing section between Vane Farm and Kinross Pier. We are now well into negotiations with the landowners and Scottish Natural Heritage in order to establish a possible route through the ground. This will take some further time and then we shall have to seek planning consent and obtain the funding required. In the present economic climate raising the money may be more difficult than usual. If all goes well we would aim to start work on the ground in 2010 and complete the whole trail in 2011.

A second Visitor Survey was conducted in July which involved over 100 face to face interviews. The results indicate that 25% of the trail users are day visitors from outside the area and nearly 10% of them stay overnight. Over 90% of those questioned were very satisfied with their trail visit. Suggestions for improvement included bicycle hire facilities and a better bus service with bike racks and pram storage on board. The final survey this year will take place in October. We are very grateful to all the volunteers who helped collect the survey data.

Cleish Church Lights

The original lights at the top of the Church steps were stolen nearly five years ago, and have never been seen since. However, thanks to Fred Whalley who knew where the original photographs could be found, and to Bert Ironside, replacements have been made and installed, five long years later

On Wednesday 26 August Donald Erskine performed the switching on; by some miracle the day-long rain stopped and some 30-40 adults and children attended.

In his speech Donald reminded all those present, and no doubt told some for the first time, of the history of the original lamps which, inspired by the Bruce Statue at Bannockburn and sculpted by one of Scotland's foremost sculptors, Pilkington Jackson, were also sculpted by the same man. They were the gift of Mr Walter Scott Davidson of Dowhill, the dedication was by our then beloved Minister, the Rev. Dr Alfred Reid, and were switched on by the Prime Minister of the time, Sir Alec Douglas Home. Also present were Lady Douglas Home, Lord Clyde, Lord President of the Council, the Lord Lieutenant Captain Charles Adam of Blairadam and Mrs Adam, and the Kirk Session. There were some 300 at the ceremony, many of whom were afterwards entertained by Mr Walter Scott Davidson at his home.

Why did we need lights at the top of the church steps? That too is worthy of explanation, going back again to Dr Reid who instigated the Midnight Carol Service in Cleish in 1962, and, as we all know, the unlit steps were a hazard.

Finally, back to Walter Scott Davidson, He was a well know figure in Cleish, which he loved, and could often be found gardening and generally tidying up in the village. He was our County Councillor, and Chairman of the Village Hall Committee from 1952-1978 and in addition to the two lamps he gave to the Church, he gave the flagpole to the school, arranged for the repair to the school clock, for the re-roofing of the Beadle's store and was responsible for transferring the four street lights from Blairadam when they became redundant. Morale high at Seamab

The third and fourth of September were important days in Seamab School's calendar this year. The school makes provision for children who have, in the main, been abused or neglected and who have not had the opportunity to form the solid and secure attachment to a parent that is so essential for their further development. At Seamab, children are helped to make attachments. The work is based firmly on up to date ideas about attachment theory, mainly on the work of Dan Hughes, an American psychologist who has made a life-long study of the subject and is now recognised internationally as a world expert. Most of the Seamab staff have done training with him on his rare visits to Scotland, several to an advanced level. This year, despite having only a few days in the country, Dan agreed to spend two days at Seamab.

He was really impressed at the work going on there and in particular with the commitment and professionalism of the staff. Anne Anderson, Principal of Seamab, said: "It was a great privilege for us to have Dan Hughes for two whole days. He spent his first day seeing everything we do and talking to lots of staff on the Saturday he presented a seminar to all the staff who could manage to come. It was a wonderful experience and left us feeling inspired and energised. It was so helpful to know that he approved of our work, in fact he was very enthusiastic about it. We look forward to seeing him again in the future and will continue to put his ideas into practice here in Rumbling Bridge."

Morale is very high among Seamab staffjust now. Shortly after Dan Hughes' visit, the school was inspected by the Care Commission, as happens every year. Anne Anderson said, "The Care Commission Officer could not have been more positive and we are looking forward to seeing her report when it is published."

There is no doubt that Seamab's work has a profound effect on these most vulnerable children. Recently collected statistics show that nearly 65% make a successful return to family life and nearly 80% move on to local educational provision.

Community Council News

Kinross Community Council

News from the September Meeting

D Cuthbert (Chair) welcomed CCllrs D Mackay, D Colliar, M Scott, M Blyth, S Bathgate, L MacKay and J Richardson to the meeting held on 2 September. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs K Baird and W Robertson; PC Ishbel Wallace and six members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllrs I Jack, C Watson and B Davies.

Minutes of August meeting: Under correction on the last page of the reference to Swansacre, which should read Gallowhill Road, the minutes were approved.

Police Report

PC Wallace reported that there had been few incidents over the last month until recently, when there were reports of the fis, one being a car from the motor auction. Sands' storage facility was also targeted and enquiries are ongoing. The Police again stress that anything suspicious should be reported IMMEDIATELY to the Police so as to allow the matter to be investigated promptly. The police are grateful for calls from the public and should it result in a false alarm no harm is done. The number to phone is 0300 111 2222.

Answering a query from CCllr D Mackay regarding the Neighbourhood Watch Schemes in Kinross, PC Wallace advised that a computerised system manages this information and that it is not capable of differentiating between areas. As such, information is forwarded notifying of crimes which are happening in other locations. The Police hold a list of the Neighbourhood Watch Schemes; this requires to be updated and should be reviewed shortly.

CCllr Richardson mentioned that a quad bike was running over the pitches in the Myre. On phoning the Call Centre he was advised that the police "could not do anything about this". PC Wallace explained that Perth would have to relay this to the local police and it would not be an "instant" response. She confirmed that they were aware of this. It was noted that the owner of the land has to provide permission for bikes to be used on their ground.

A member of the public stated that cars legally parked near the junction between Gallowhill Road and the Muirs were creating a visual obstruction. This is due to the bad design of the road in this area. It was suggested that the Police intervene and alert residents to the problem. It was noted, however, that there is no parking spaces for the residents' cars, their only option being off the street. The CC has requested double yellow lines at this location. It was agreed that we should wait until the school opens and we can determine the extent of this problem at that time and, if necessary, invite a representative from the Roads Department to a meeting.

CCllr Bathgate stated that there is a problem with traffic parking at the junction on to Station Road from the High Street. This also creates an obstruction to both vehicles and pedestrians. The Police will act on any call received relating to traffic offences if received at the time of the incident.

Planning Applications Received

09/00968/AML Land to the north of Kellieside: Erection of two dwelling houses. No objection.

Planning Applications Determined by P&KC

08/01085/FULL Goudierannet Farm: Conversion of farm steadings to three residential units. Approved.

Sainsbury's Extension/signs for supermarket. Approved.

It was noted that under the new legislation we have a deadline of seven days from the date of the Weekly List to intimate that we wish to be consulted on a planning application.

Other Planning Matters

Training meeting: CCllr Colliar's name had been put forward for this meeting on Monday evening. Unfortunately, he was now unable to attend. No-one else was available and it was agreed that we cancel the booking for his space.

Baltree: A further copy letter of objection was received in relation to the proposed erection of 3 residential dwelling houses at Baltree Farm.

Curling Academy: An acknowledgement was received to our communication to the Council regarding this application. The CC also received a letter of support from a local resident.

Autograss: Representatives from this organisation advised that they were planning to hold a consultation meeting in September. It was suggested that they advertise in the Newsletter and that a possible venue could be the Church Centre, with the meeting to be held in October. (See p. 81.)

Report from P&K Councillors

Cllr Baird advised that there was little to report on the **derelict buildings** in the town. It is hoped that movement on Swansacre will happen shortly and no decision has been reached on the other buildings.

The Focus Groups proved to be very successful. Cllr Baird reported that she attended the **Tenants' Meeting** last month and that they raised similar issues to those raised at the Forums.

A977 Improvements: A meeting had been held with representatives before summer regarding this road and they were to return with proposals to Kinross CC with Fossoway CC being invited along to the meeting. Unfortunately, the Council organiser failed to do this. A further meeting was held today to discuss the ways to improve the road and make it safer for pedestrians and vehicles. The CC should receive information before our next meeting and, if necessary, we can invite a representative down to our meeting to discuss the proposals. The plan is to start from Kinross and work towards Fossoway. Pathways, cycle ways, bus shelters etc are to be looked at. It was agreed that in light of this proposed work we should write to P&KC requesting once again that a reduction in the speed limit be introduced between the MOTO Services and Kinross. It was noted that a high number of accidents happen in this location.

Resurfacing: Cllr Robertson reported that the roadway has been resurfaced between Kinross and Milnathort. CCllr Colliar stated that the bus shelters have been removed. Cllr Robertson confirmed that they are to be replaced.

The Housing in the Countryside Policy has now been published and the CC should receive a copy.

Perth City Hall: It was noted that the proposals for the Hall in Perth have fallen through. The building has been vacant for five years. The CC expressed its support for the people of

Perth who could now be facing the prospect of a dilapidated building in their town centre.

Flooding at Lethangie: Cllr Robertson advised that the flooding in Lethangie Road at the entrance to the school is to be addressed. CCllr Bathgate also asked if anything could be done about the ponding of water on the road to the rear of the old Health Centre.

Overhanging bushes: CCllr D Mackay reported that a number of bushes/trees are overhanging at properties in Station Road making it difficult to walk past on the pavement. The trees at Queens Crescent also require to be cut back. CCllr Colliar further added that a tenant in Bowton Road has her grass cut by Council staff, however they advised that the overgrown hedge at her property would not be cut until October. Primary school children have to go out on the road to get by the pavement. CCllrs Scott and Cuthbert also mentioned a complaint from a resident at Green Park in regard to the path and open spaces; the person had spoken to Council officials regarding general maintenance. Finally, CCllr Cuthbert reported similar problems at Lathro Park. Mention was also made to the area zoned for the Fire Brigade. Residents had planted over this and it was now difficult to access. Residents are asked to cut back any overgrown trees/shrubs which are obstructing roadways/ pavements.

Correspondence

Premises Licences: Somerfield and Sainsbury's. Mention was made as to the delay in retailers receiving licences and the fact that legally these are to be displayed on the premises.

TAYplan Strategic Development Plan Authority Awareness Raising Consultation Database: TAYplan are the body set up to prepare the Strategic Development Plan for Kinross and other areas. It was agreed that we should register to be included on their Database in order to be kept informed of progress being made. Consultation is until 18 September. Main Issues Report expected to be published in June 2010 which will be the key stage of engagement. There will be a formal consultation at that stage, to seek views of individuals and organisations.

P&K Draft Placemaking Guide Consultation: online guide to set out the vision and best practice for making our public spaces and settlements better places. Website www.pkc.gov.uk/placemakingguide. It was agreed that CCllr L MacKay would check out this information. Consultation period ends 13 October.

Local Development Plan: Submissions will be displayed on

the website.

Association of CCs: We have still to renew our membership. The Secy will arrange for a cheque to be forwarded to the Association.

Age Matters event: Dewars, Perth on 1 October from 11 to 3. This is a free drop in day of activities and information on services for older people. There will be demonstrations of Country Dancing, Kurling, Aerobics, Computer Awareness etc.

Other Business

Council Budget: Cllr Robertson advised that there is to be little monies available over the next two years.

Newsletter: A sub committee meeting is to be held on 14 September. CCllr Colliar mentioned the recent announcement in the Newsletter advising that a Scotlandwell business would no longer be able to advertise in the Newsletter. He stated that such decisions are the responsibility of the CC as owners of the Newsletter and should not be made by editorial staff. It was agreed that clear guidelines should be set down for the Newsletter staff.

Remembrance Sunday: The Secy was asked to circulate notices to the various bodies notifying them of a meeting to arrange the Parade.

Common Good Fund: Following on further discussion, we are to write to P&KC intimating that we wish to be involved in the Common Good Fund for Kinross.

Kinross Conservation Area Appraisal: CCllr Cuthbert informed the meeting that P&KC had produced an excellent publication, entitled "Draft Kinross Conservation Area Appraisal" which he commended to all residents for close study. This can be downloaded from the Council website. It was agreed that we should invite Rachel Haworth to our next meeting to go through the proposals.

New Surgery: A member of the public questioned pedestrian/vehicle access to the Health Centre, there being no pavement and the Surgery not being served by buses. This was discussed. It was suggested that the route could be along the side of the Bed and Break fast. It was noted that only one bus service would be stopping in the school grounds.

The next meeting of Kinross CC will be held on Wednesday 7 October in the Masonic Hall at 7.30pm.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the September Meeting

CCllr Cottingham, Vice Chair, welcomed CCllrs Bennet, Smith and Lamont to the meeting held on 10 September. Also in attendance were Minute Secretary E Rougvie, two representatives of Tayside Police and three members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllr Giacopazzi (Chair), CCllrs Porter and Thomson, and P&K Cllrs Baird and Robertson.

Police matters: The police reported that there had been three break-ins to cars in the Auld Mart Road area, which were thought to be related. One vehicle had not been secured. Once again the public are urged to remain vigilant and report any suspicious activity, as the police would rather have to deal with a well-intentioned false alarm than a crime. People are reminded that they should not leave anything of value in their vehicle, even if it is parked in a driveway. Items such as sat-navs, mobile phones and handbags are particularly vulnerable and should be kept out of sight.

Matters arising

Venue for CC meetings: CCllr Smith reported that CCllr Giacopazzi had asked him to contact P&KC to ask for a booking form in order to secure the school for CC meetings. In the past this had been free of charge but now a fee had been introduced of £5.60 per hour or part of an hour, to the dismay of a number of other CCs. The Town Hall is used during school holidays at a cost of £8, which is not refunded by P&KC. It was also considered that the Town Hall would not be a practical option because of the number of other activities that are held there. The possibility of using a room at the new community campus was suggested, but dismissed as inappropriate as it was felt MCC meetings should be held within the village. After further discussion, it was agreed that CCllr Bennet would contact P&KC to ask if the CC's grant could be increased to cover the extra cost. No action will be taken to complete the booking form until the Chairman's

Placecheck: CCllr Bennet reported that she had been out with pupils from Milnathort Primary School the previous Monday and they had come up with a lot of good ideas in terms of improving the village under the Placecheck scheme, which they would bring either to a future CC meeting or to the public meeting in November. The Placecheck event on 29 August had attracted around 40 villagers. The Thistle Hotel, while a good venue, did not have disabled access, and a discussion followed about the most suitable venue for the November follow-up event. CCllr Bennet agreed to contact Diane Cassidy of P&KC to discuss this further. CCllr Smith said that it seemed that Placecheck was already resulting in benefits, as a link chain at the telephone box at The Cross was repaired the following week.

Wheelie bins: CCllr Bennet referred to a property in South Street where four bins were always lined up on the pavement

despite there being a large garden. Villagers are asked to put out wheelie bins only on pick-up days to avoid blocking pedestrian access.

New planning regulations: CCllrs Cottingham and Smith reported on a meeting hosted by P&KC that they had attended, along with CCllr Thomson, about the new planning regulations that came into force on 3 August. The key changes are as follows:

- Detailed planning applications are now suffixed FLL and outline applications suffixed IPL.
- In terms of the implications for the CC, the response period has changed to 21 days, which means that if a contentious application is issued during the first week after the monthly meeting, an opportunity to comment could be missed. It was agreed that CC members should monitor applications closely and that a meeting should be called if there were any applications that required a response.
- It is now the responsibility of P&KC and not the applicant to issue neighbour notification after an application has been validated and the area has been extended to 20 metres
- There will be more freedom to carry out alterations without planning permission.
- What are deemed to be major developments will require a pre-application consultation with a view to addressing any objections before the developer starts work.

The new legislation has been introduced on a national level and Planning Aid Scotland is to hold a further meeting in the new Loch Leven Community Campus at the end of November which will give CCs and individuals the chance to find out more about the new Act.

Planning applications: Formation of a bal cony at 38 New Road. Noted.

Other business: CCllr Smith said he had been approached by people about the state of the hydrants in South Street, particularly the one by the bus stop at the former church. Concerns were also raised about the hydrants in Burleigh Road and Whyte Place. After discussion, it was agreed that CCllr Bennet would e-mail Diane Cassidy of Placecheck to find out whether these had been earmarked for attention under the Placecheck scheme.

Members of the public: A member of the public asked for the CC's support in a personal dispute he was having with P&KC. It was explained that it was outwith the CC's remit to take up individual grievances but if representations were received from 20 people then they would be obliged to call a public meeting.

Another member of the public asked for an update on the situation regarding the semi-circle at Bridge fauld Road. P&KC had indicated that raised beds would be established but this hadn't happened and the grassed area was being used for football, raising safety concerns in surrounding households. It was hoped that this was on the Placecheck list and the situation will be addressed at the October meeting, when Diane Cassidy of P&KC will be in attendance.

The same member of the public reported that one of the two gardens in Crawford Place that were badly overgrown had now been tidied up.

The next meeting of Milnathort CC will be held on Thursday 8 October at 7.30pm in Milnathort Town Hall.

Previous minutes were approved following an addition previously notified by a resident.

Police Report

Two reported break-ins, both at Lochend Farm shop, week ends of 15/16 and 21/22 August.

Thef of scaffolding at the stables, entrance to the Moss. Police would be pleased for any information.

Replying to a question from a Cllr, the Police had no knowledge of a dog being caught in a snare trap at Portmoak Moss.

Treasurer's report: £409.74 in the bank account.

Planning presentation

Mr Peter Marshall, Planning and Sustainable Development Manager, gave a presentation on the planning services provided by P&KC. He outlined the planning services and discussed in detail the new Planning Act, Strategic Development Plans and the Local Plan. Recently the planning team had been increased to include more enforcement officers and a new post of A ffordable Housing Enabler.

The first stage of the preparation of the new local Development Plan has just been completed and as part of the process of keeping the public better in formed the 500+ initial comments received from people and groups within the area will shortly be available on the P&KC website.

The increase in housing in the Portmoak area, 2001-2009, has been around the P & K average of 10%.

Generally for Kinross-shire, 2008-2020, there is an expected increase of 855 houses. Taking into consideration present planning consents, there is an expected increase of 460 houses; 400 for Kinross and Milnathort and 60 for the 'landward' area of Kinross-shire. Due to different accounting techniques the quoted figures are for developments of 5+ properties, however, single or less than 5+ (windfall) add some flexibility into the system.

Following the presentation there were a number of questions on the following topics: enforcement conditions, standards of developers, neighbour notification, local roads, streetscape design, amending plans once agreed, permitted development rights, independent review bodies.

Peter closed his presentation by informing the meeting of further training events on the new planning system and introduced 'Planning Aid for Scotland', a body set up to assist anyone with planning problems. Their helpline number is 08456037602.

The Chairman thanked Peter for his presentation.

Matter arising from previous minutes

Mail box at Post Office: Following the report sent to Edinburgh Office, one letter received to say that the letter had been sent to London Office and second letter received from London office acknowledging letter.

Website: Webmaster on holiday until 14 September, so current minutes will be late.

Notice Board: Minutes at Kinnesswood notice board regularly removed.

Cleaning of roads: The B9097 between B996 and B920 and the A911 between Easter Balgedie and Burleigh Sands were reported as needed cleaning. Mechanical Cleaner is presently broken.

Subcommittee reports

Paths Group

There is not generally a problem raising money to create new paths but there is a problem raising money maintaining them. As a community if we want to keep the walks in our area then we need to come up with an idea to raise the money to maintain them and one way would be to ask for sponsors. This would be especially useful for those areas outwith any other area of responsibility, which is approx 2 kms of the Michael Bruce Way. Maintenance for this part of the MBW works out to approx £500 and if sponsorship could be arranged for 25p/metre it would require 25/30 people who would be given a certificate of sponsorship as a receipt. People who might wish to participate are businesses and people who use the paths for pleasure and dog walkers. Posters on the MBW could also be used to advertise for sponsors. The signage for the MBW should be ready in the next couple of months.

Cllr Robertson added that the Countryside Trust was looking at the problem of maintaining walks and had asked for a paper to be prepared on the subject and was keen to keep in touch with this proposal.

A resident stated that the lack of maintenance on the walk meant that the bracken was nearly taking over the path in certain areas. The owner of the land could apply for a maintenance grant but it was not known whether he had done so.

A resident raised the question of responsibility of the path from Gamek eepers to the Cobbles which was used by school children to keep them off the busier roads. It was suggested that this should be maintained by P&KC. Action required.

Cllr Robertson suggested to the meeting that since this was the last winter when a commonly used weed suppressing chemical could be used by anyone (now a Government banned substance) is was likely that path maintenance would become more of an issue.

Planning Group

The following planning applications were discussed.

09/01465/FLL Change of use from disused farmy ard area to garden ground for dwelling units 1 and 2, Former Hay Store, West Bowhouse Farm, Leslie: No objection.

09/01487/FLL Erection of an agricultural shed, Wester Balgedie Farm: The CC had previously objected to this proposal and found no grounds to move from their previous position. The applicant was present and queried the decision by the CC. It was agreed to write to the applicant setting out in summary the reasons for the objection.

09/01436/IPL Erection of a dwelling house for an agricultural worker (in principle) Kirkness Farm, Lochgelly: No objection.

There was no further news on the planning application at Friar Place.

Management Group

The Chairman gave an update on the Traffic Calming situation. An e-mail had been received that afternoon explain that the new bollards were not in stock and new ones were not available until later in September. The CC had in formed the P&KC Roads dept that they would support the request of local opinion to move the 'Gamekeepers' build out.

Cllr Robertson informed the meeting that he had asked P&KC to have a speed restriction placed on the road between Mawcarse old railway bridge towards Balgedie.

A resident asked if build outs were the best method of traffic calming. The Chairman explained despite everyone having an

opinion on the subject, the build outs were the chosen method by the experts.

Further questions on the build outs were asked by residents concerning benefit to the community, lighting and drivers continually speeding.

Fossoway and District CC

News from the September Meeting

Present at the meeting on 1 September were: Sandy Morrison (Chair), Sheila Anderson, Rod Paterson, Alastair Lavery, Trudy Duffy, Marion Anness and Hugh Wallace. Also in attendance were P&K Cllr M Barnacle and 15 members of the public. Sandy Morrison declared an interest in planning application 09/01324/OUT, Muirfield, Drum.

Community Policing: no issues raised.

CC business: A response to funding queries for FDCC is expected from John Swinney 09.09.09, but P&KC have agreed to have invoices sent to them as an interim measure. Cllr Barnacle confirmed that charges will be introduced for using Council properties in the future.

Lambhill Forest Blairingone: About 20 people attended the walkabout which was very well received. A further meeting at Blairingone School is scheduled for 16 September as a consultation measure.

P&KC Consultation Local Plan: Cllr Barnacle wrote on 30.06.09 re the single development plan against the expansion of Kinross to the West of the M90. KCC disagree. 12.08.09. Strategy Group Meeting. 20% response to survey re area plan to 2020:

- Bulk of population in the middle retirement age, with low unemployment
- More rental/ sheltered properties needed
- No material alterations to plans other than the Crook of Devon Naemoor Road small development to be removed FDCC, 25.08.09: Private meeting giving a response to the letter, including road traffic and drainage.

Fossoway after school care: Having financial difficulties. A child with mental health issues requiring additional cover, the costs of which threatened to close the club. Trudy had a meeting with P&KC and Keith Brown questioned the Council's obligations to provide care. One year's funding of £4,500 has been secured as an interim measure from a charity.

Blairingone Church memorial: Cllr Barnacle is encouraging removal of the scaffolding in advance of Armistice Day and resolution of the dispute thereafter.

New waste uplift: Some houses across the ward did not receive information but problems now seem to have been resolved, although there is concern over domestic and commercial uplifts coinciding. Rob Patterson suggested that Rab Beattie at PKCC should be contacted.

Traffic survey Fossoway: FORK's recent survey reported an overall increase of 14%, with lorries down by 7% apparently due to increased use of rail freight and falling trade volumes through Grangemouth are also likely to have had an effect. There has therefore been a very significant increase in car and light commercial road traffic.

Reports by P&K Councillors

Cllr Barnacle explained that at Dunning Glen there are no litter bins but there is an advisory sign on camp site with contact numbers. Bins in the past were burnt and vandalised. Request for litter bins still being pursued.

Cllr Barnacle is in dialogue with Scottish Water: £1,000 to the Institute for Station Road upgrade, given to Sandy Morrison. Meeting to follow re costs and adoption of plans for leakage.

Is there a law for bikes to have bells?

Cllr Barnacle to attend a meeting on 2 Sept re A977. To determine start of work on mitigation measures; thus far only crossings in Powmill and Blairingone have been completed.

Additional funds mooted.

No progress re speed limits and traffic lights on Rumbling Bridge.

Japanese knotweed along the Devon: some clearance has been done and P&KC Ranger to investigate further.

The Development Control Committee has approved the Barnhill Steading Development despite representation by Councillors. The Committee followed the planning officer's advice, many community and local views were ignored. The review on the Housing in the Countryside policy should tighten these procedures up. The Barnhill Development seemed to be contrary to the local plan, overturning previous decisions. Cllr Barnacle reiterated that the majority of applications are delegated to officers in the absence of six valid objections.

Planning

Relatively quiet month!

09/01299/FLL, North Claysyke Farm, Carnbo: Erection of storage sheds. No CC comment.

09/01324/OUT, Muirfield, Drum: Renewal of previous consent (07/00312/OUT) for erection of four dwelling houses. Application withdrawn.

09/01409/FLL, White Wisp, Crook Of Devon: Erection of replacement house. No CC comment.

09/01413/FLL, Middleton Stables, Fossoway: Erection of a guest house. No objections had been received by the CC at the time of the meeting and a general call was made for people to object if they felt minded to do so, to force such applications to be considered by the full Development Control Committee.

09/01481/FLL, Middleton of Aldie: Extension to house. No CC comment.

Correspondence

Discussion about an objection to a wind turbine in Drum. FDCC felt P&KC should develop a clearer policy to counter the presumption in favour of small scale wind turbines. FDCC will object to the planning application in question.

Other business

A member of the public reported concerns that Seamab children running away pose a risk to local farm safety and requested that Seamab notify local farmers when this occurs, as they have previously committed to do.

George Lawrie, project officer of TRACKS, intimated plans re Crook of Devon bridleway between the Aldie Road and waterworks, and to have a cycle path from Kinross to Powmill.

A comment was made that SERAD are the appropriate authority to contact re ragwort at the Monarch Deer Farm.

The next meeting of Fossoway & District CC will be held on Tuesday 6 October at Moubray Hall, Powmill. All welcome.

News from the August Meeting

The CC met on Monday 24 August in Cleish Village Hall and was attended by five CCllrs, P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and Cllr K Baird; George Lawrie representing TRACKS; a representative from Perth and Kinross Police; 15 members of the public and the Cleish & Blairadam Newsletter Editor.

Apologies were received from Sandy Morton and a welcome given to Hugh Somerville, the new member of the CC.

Kerbside Recycling: The Chairman introduced Ellen Scott from P&KC who gave a presentation concerning the new bin collections; although leaflets had been handed out, generally there was still some confusion regarding what goes into which bin when and where. To sum up: Blue lidded bins contain paper, cardboard, clear plastic bottles (no lids or envelopes). Brown lidded bins contain garden waste and food. Green lidded bins contain non recyclables and that includes glass bottles.

There were several questions from the floor which were answered and also taken on board were the problem of no bins Foreland road and westward. It was hoped that this would be put right before too long.

Crime Prevention: The Chairman welcomed P.C. Wallace who began by saying that it was most important to report anything of a suspicious nature to the police AT ONCE - tomorrow may be too late.

The Chairman gave a report on a meeting held at the end of July regarding the activity on the hill road which is still giving serious concern. Whilst it is impossible to stop all activity, the dumping of 'unreasonable' rubbish near Loch Glow is putting off walkers, and there is still the reporting of car parking in parking places by single men, and meeting places at Loch Glow. It is hoped that during the winter the Forestry Commission and the Environmental Services will have a clear up, and in the spring there could be closing off of the upper car park.

Unfortunately Till Hill were not represented at this meeting, and again there is dumping of rubbish. PLEASE do tell the Police of such dumping; they can check the rubbish and very offen trace its origins.

Appreciation for all the Police do regarding the worries on the Hill Road was expressed not only from the CC but also from the floor. P.C. Wallace was thanked for her attendance.

Kinross Museum

With the opening of the new Loch Leven Community Campus in late October, a museum in Kinross will be created after a gap of 13 years since the closure of the Marshall Museum next to the Carnegie Library in 1996. Sharing space with the Public Library, the museum will be managed by the Kinross (Marshall) Museum Trust with help from the Friends of Kinross Museum.

A museum was first opened in Kinross following the death of the local antiquarian, archivist and collector David Marshall who died in 1903 leaving his entire collection to the town. For a few years some items were put on display in the Carnegie Library, but it was not until 1974 that the Joint Library Committee of the Town and County Councils of Kinross were able to mount a full display with assistance from members of the Kinross-shire Historical Society including Nan Walker, Robert Buchanan and David Munro. Following the closure of the museum by P&KC, the Kinross (Marshall) Museum Trust was set up in 1997 as a charitable trust aiming to re-establish and manage a museum for Under the chairmanship of Professor David Munro, the trustees are currently in the process of planning the move into the new community campus at the end of October and the creation of a number of public displays on a variety of themes including 'Kinross Burgh Folk', 'A Sporting Loch' and 'Made in Kinross-shire' in time for the campus community event in late November.

The Museum Trust hopes to refresh the exhibition on display to the public on a regular basis and hold events at the museum. Watch this space for regular reports and features on Kinross-shire items of special interest that will be on show



On 17 August Guthrie Hutton spoke about the Forth and Clyde canal, from the first excavation

in 1768 to its most recent upgrade and reopening as the Millennium project in 2001. Work commenced at the River Carron at what is now Grangemouth. By 1773, construction had progressed as far as Kirkintilloch and in 1790 the canal was finally completed to Bowling, with a branch into Port Dundas. Through a series of locks, the canal rises to 156 feet above sea level at its highest point. Unfortunately, with the advent of the railway system, commercial traffic waned. The canal was used solely for pleasure cruises from about 1867, with the last cruise in October 1962. The canal was finally closed on 1 January 1963 when the A80 was upgraded at Castlecary and a culvert was constructed under the dual carriageway. Today, the canal is open again for its full length, including the Falkirk Wheel, thanks to Lottery Funding.

Our annual Charity Golf Tournament was held on 21 August when, thank fully, the rain stayed away long enough to allow the 19 competing teams to enjoy a pleasant afternoon's golf. There was stiff competition for the various prizes.

Our speaker on 24 August was Dr Miriam Faulds, who spoke about micro finance in third world countries and about Ghana in particular, having visited that country in 2003 to see for hersel fhow Opportunity International organises a small loan scheme for the poorest in society. The scheme has HRH Princess Anne as patron and operates on Christian principles, although loans are granted irrespective of religion. Loans are given to assist people to set up their own businesses, buy farm animals, etc. and are for a period of four months, after which they are repaid, with generally 95 to 98% success in repayment. Education, training and monitoring is also carried out and where candidates have proved worthy, individual loans are granted allowing them to start up their own businesses. This generates more money for the individuals who can then afford to send their children to school.

We were entertained on 31 August by an illustrated talk by David Goslin who described his journey by train from Milngavie to Beijing. Although he experienced some security problems en-route, all trains ran to time and the route took him via London, Moscow and Ulaan Bataar.

Club members assisted with traffic marshalling at the Girl Guides Centenary celebration on 6 September and at the Gazebo Gathering on 12 September.

At the Business Meeting on 7 September, President David Reid congratulated Rotarian Barry Davis on his appointment as Group Leader for the 2010 Group Study Exchange from our District to Arizona. More of this in later editions.

14 September saw an interesting illustrated talk by John Dein from the Dundee Club, on shipbuilding at the Caledon yard in Dundee. John had been employed at the yard as an apprentice draughtsman and has in later years built up a fascinating history of shipbuilding in Dundee from its outset in 1866 to its final demise in 1981.

It was with great sadness that we learned of the sudden death on 11 September of Rotarian John Stewart, whose cheery demeanour and ready wit livened many of our meetings. John joined Rotary in Monifieth in 1981 and the Kinross Club in 1993, following his move to the town as manager of the Bank of Scotland. He served as President in 1997/8 and was a great stalwart in upholding the traditions of the Rotary movement. He will be greatly missed and our sympathies and condolences are with Betty and daughter Karen at this sad time.



Probus Club

On 2 September, the President, Duncan Stenhouse welcomed the members to the first meeting of the season when the subject was "Street Pastors" The speakers were Rhona



and Michael Archibald. Every Saturday night about 3,000 people gather in the centre of Perth. These are the night clubbers who frequent the bars and night clubs of the town and for the past 18 months they have been joined by groups of "Street Pastors" who come in a uniform with the words, STREET PASTOR written on the back of the jacket, working in teams of three or four, and their aim can be summed up under three headings: Caring for the night clubbers, Listening to the night clubbers and Helping the night clubbers.

Each team is equipped with (1) flip flops (the young girls wear very high heels) (2) space blanket (some of the young girls wear very little and can get cold) (3) spikes (for the beer and wine bottles) (4) bandages (5) paper handkerchiefs (6) matches (for cigarettes) (7) torch (8) mobile phone (9) pocket Bible. Rhona and Michael started their talk with a mock interview of a street pastor meeting a drunk girl, to show how easily contact is made, and how quickly the conversation can move to serious matters of faith, mainly because they are considered friends of the night clubbers. Their presence has a good effect, and the Scottish branch of the organisation say that it has led to a 25% reduction in crime. The English branch claims an 80% reduction in In Scotland there are now 800 Street Pastors working in 26 different towns. To be a Street Pastor you have to be recommended by your minister or priest and undergo a period of training. People join because it is good fun, and they are committed to be on duty once a month from 9.40pm to about 3.30am. Ken Morrison gave the vote of thanks for a very interesting afternoon.

"A Haunted House in Fife" was the title of the talk for the Probus meeting on Wednesday 16 September. The house in question was Pitmilly House near Kingsbarns in the East Neuk of Fife. The talk was illustrated by pictures taken Dr. Lorne McIntyre, the speaker. Pitmilly House was owned by the Monypenny family for a couple of centuries, but the Victorian owner of the property, Sir William Charlton-Monypenny, ruined the reputation of the family by his character and behaviour. This reputation transferred to Pitmilly House, and by the 20th century the house was said to be haunted. Strange stories circulated about curtains going on fire for no reason at all, and heavy objects being flung about the house by poltergeists. The house by this time had been bought by the Jeffrey family.

Come the Second World War, and the house was requisitioned for war purposes. A detachment of Polish soldiers were billeted in the house, but the mysterious happenings continued. An American war correspondent heard about this, and wrote a sensational report on the poltergeists of Pitmilly House, and, of course, Pitmilly House became the centre of attraction. Dr McIntyre had done a lot of research on the history of the house, and had interviewed many of the people concerned who were quite adamant that these strange happenings occurred. The curtains did catch fire of their own volition. Heavy objects were flung around the house as if by Poltergeists. Bill Scott gave the vote of thanks for an interesting and thought provoking afternoon.

Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire Cleish Kirk

Immortalised by Sir Walter Scott as the Kirk of Cleishbotham in his novel The Abbot, the Parish Church of St Mary in Cleish stands on a small mound at the heart of a conservation area that was designated in 1980. It is unusual amongst the parish churches of Kinross-shire in that it stands on its original site. All of the other churches moved to new locations in the 17th and 18th centuries in order to be closer to growing centres of population. To give it its full title, the hamlet of Cleish is the Kirkton of Cleish, a name that signifies the importance of the church in the development of this small rural settlement. The mound occupied by the church may well have been used in pre-Christian times but for nearly 500 years the 'Chapel of Cles' was linked with the Church of the Holy Trinity of Dun fermline. Part of a cross dating from the 12th or 13th century stands in the churchyard.

In 1775 the church was rebuilt for an expanding congregation to a design by John Adam, elder brother of the famous architect Robert Adam. Destroyed by fire in 1832, a new church designed by Daniel McIntosh was immediately erected. This was a simple rectangular building with the pulpit on the west side. Sixty-five years later, as part of the celebrations marking Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, a chancel and crenellated tower, designed by Edinburgh architects Hardy and Wright, were added to the church.

In 1964 two new outside lights designed by Pilkington Jackson and presented by W Scott Davidson of Dowhill were switched on by local MP and Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home and in 1966 a vestry was built. Both the modern vestry and the older church were built of local sandstone from nearby Nivingstone Quarry.

A small crow-stepped session house stands next to the entrance gates, and in the churchyard can be found an ancient font, the grave of Marie Lundie Duncan who wrote the hymn "Jesus Tender shepherd, hear me", and small crosses marking a former debtors' sanctuary.

Inside the church are memorials to the Adams of Blairadam, a chandelier from St Giles Cathedral in Edinburgh, and a wooden cross made of timber from HMS *Victory* gifted by the Rev. Hugh Purves, a former Royal Navy chaplain.





9 Oct: A new walk in the area of Eccles McGridle of about 8 miles and 1500 feet of as cent.



Portmoak Community Woodland

All summer long there's been a banner in the field opposite Portmoak Village Hall telling people it's the site of their new community woodland and inviting passers-by to, "Watch this space grow". But so far all they have seen growing is the grass. Now the 'Field Abin the Kirk' is beginning to change shape.

The former grazing land acquired by the Woodland Trust, after a huge fundraising effort, lies next to the ancient Kilmagad Wood which is already owned by the Trust and jointly managed by the Portmoak Community Woodland Steering Group. So, in the past few weeks, the fences between the two areas have been removed and the stiles taken down. Perth and Kinross Council have helped replace the old steps with smart new ones leading up to the wood from the main A911 road. All this means that access is a great deal easier.

In a few weeks time the Trust will prepare the ground for tree planting. Deer fencing will go up to protect the young trees and there'll be self-closing gates at various access points. Not everyone likes the idea of fencing but most prefer it to the alternative of five thousand plastic tubes.

Roy Barlow, senior woodland officer with the Woodland Trust, says: "The trees will need to be protected from rabbits and deer, both of which are plentiful in the area. This can be done be using plastic tree shelters on each tree or by fencing. At an open consultation meeting last March it was decided to go with fencing – it's far less obvious in the landscape and the trees will grow stronger and to a more natural shape."

Tree planting will begin on **30 November** when ten primary school classes will help to put in native varieties like rowan, oak, ash, birch, hazel and holly. On **5 December** there'll be a public planting event to coincide with a national 'Tree O'Clock' project. There'll be more details nearer the time. As it says on the field banner: "Watch this space."

Parent Forum Edited summary of draft minutes of AGM held on 14 September 2009.

Clerk — Sheila Herron. AH was in attendance for a few minutes at the start of the Forum. **Apologies:** Dave Cochrane, Walter Cambers, Gill Freeman and Susan Britten

P7 Presentation of Milnathort Placecheck – Excellent presentation by Cameron Nelson and James Simpson about Milnathort Placecheck. The process, timeline, conclusions and what happens next were presented. AH, CN and JS left the Forum at this point.

The Parent Forum – BB advised how the Parent Forum was first initiated, the aims and membership. Also provided information of the Scottish Schools (Parental Involvement) Act 2006.

Parental Involvement - Outcomes for 2008-09

BB advised the Forum of the activities of the Parent Council throughout the academic session of 2008-09.

The most significant were: Worked to maintain an open door policy for accessibility for parents/carers; Held two meetings per term to determine and take forward Council business: Supported parent and community concerns and issues such as composite classes, safe parking and school staff industrial action; Successful distribution of Parental Involvement Grant to Growing Ideas and Let's Play; Discussions held with Community Co-ordinator for the New Community Campus; Held Parent Drop In sessions at Common Grounds linking the Council, school, community and Common Grounds; Worked in partnership with school staff to produce a homework audit. Providing questionnaires to parents/pupils, collating results, concluding the audit and relating this back to parents; Liaised/consulted with P&KC re issues of interest to parents, such as the Parental Involvement Strategy, Standards and Quality Report and Lifelong Learning Committee; Liaised/consulted with Scottish Government and other National bodies on issues of interest to parents through completion of surveys. The Council also took note of opportunities of availability to attend National Conferences; Maintained links with Community Council, local Councillors and other Parent Councils.

Parental Involvement – Ongoing Activities for 2009/10

Areas which could be continued by the Parent Council in 2009-10: To ensure continued links with the school, parents, MSA and the community; Continue to maintain open door policy for accessibility for parents/carers; Work in conjunction with school and Child Exploitation and Protection Online (CEOP) to ensure safety for our children on the internet; Organise and implement the Walking Bus to School – most of the organising has been completed (it had been postponed from June); Ongoing commitment to school for the School Travel Plan and Health Week; Continued planning for Parent Drop In Sessions; Encourage and commit to parental support for musical activity within the school; Support with and contribute to the school website; Encourage Parent Council representation at all school events; Continue links with the School Improvement Plan priorities.

Supergrounds and Growing Ideas

Susan Parks gave a very informative account of the timeline,

history and installation of the Nature Trail within MPS grounds. SP stated that over £4000 had been given to the school by the RBS Supergrounds project.

Alice Getley followed this with a very informative talk on Growing Ideas. She reported that: residents of Ashley House had received lavender bags, hyacinths and hand-made cards during the year; the vegetables grown had gone down extremely well again this year; each class within the school will be encouraged to take ownership of a plot of land to be used as seen fit by each class and enable access to other areas of the curriculum. BB thanked both Susan and Alice for their time and commitment for each project.

Milnathort School Association

MK gave a full and informative talk about the MSA, its aims and achievements. The MSA had successfully held a Halloween disco, Christmas Fair, Summer Fete, Quiz Night and Ceilidh. It has raised over £4600 for the school this year and over £12000 during the last three.

Accounts Approval – Accounts from 07-08 and 08-09 were presented to the Forum, assessed and passed.

Nominations and Elections

BB advised that most of the current Council were stepping down. She asked for a raise of hands to show who would be willing to stand this year. The following showed hands: Mark Koziel, Lynne Dunn, Neil Fuller, Lesley McCormick, Gerrold Kuijpers, Graham Irwin, Gillian Sands, Deidre Hutson, Lorraine Holdsworth, Chris Edwards and Gavin Anderson. The number of people willing to stand for the Parent Council was within the maximum number within the constitution, so no contested elections had to be held. All those who stood were duly elected to this year's Parent Council.

Nomination had been received for Mark Kozi el to be elected as the Chairperson for the Parent Council. This was uncontested and Mark was unanimously voted in post.

Mark thanked the outgoing Council for their commitment and hard work over the past years. He made particular thanks to Bridget Barker for her personal contribution as Chair. This was supported by the Council and floor.

out of the way, Kinross Otters blew the cobwebs away with the Fins Graded Meet in Kirkcaldy on 22 and 23 August. A team of 20 swimmers was entered and unusually it was the senior swimmers who led the way and showed what they could do.

The most impressive Kinross swimmer was Ruth Miller who won gold medals in the Girls 14 and over 50m Front crawl (29.94 secs dipping under the magical 30 secs for the first time), Back crawl (35.51 secs taking a ridiculous 8 secs off her personal best!!) and Breaststroke (37.21 secs) and a silver medal in the 100m Front crawl (1.04.75 secs). She smashed her personal best times in all events.

Kayleigh Reid continued the Kinross Girls 14 and over dominance with two gold medals in the 100m Breaststroke (1.27.81 secs) and 100m Back crawl (1.21.24 secs), again both in personal best times.

Ruairidh Haig continued to improve rapidly as he has done of late with excellent swims in the 12-13 year old Boys 100m Front crawl where he won the gold medal with a new personal best time of 1.06.59 secs (knocking some 3.5 seconds off his personal best) and in the Boys 50m Front crawl where again he too dipped under the 30 sec barrier for the first time in a time of 29.96secs to win the silver medal.

For many of them this was their first gala and the whole team acquitted themselves very well.

Cameron McCloskey led the way for the Otters with a clear and very significant win in the 11 yr old Boys Crawl in 36.50 secs and is now ranked number ten in the UK behind King who is ranked a very clear number one smashing the meet record in an incredible time of 32.00 secs. Athletics

It was reported in the last edition of the Newsletter that Kinross 400m hurdler Eilidh Child had gained selection for the Great Britain and N.I. team for the World Championships held in Berlin last month. Eilidh was drawn in lane 7 in her heat and finished comfortably in



third place in a time of 55.96 seconds, just ahead of American Sheena Tosta, the world ranked No. 2. In the semi final Eilidh again found herself in lane 7 but ran a steady 56.21 seconds to finish 6th in the race. Her time of 55.96 seconds in the heat ensured she was the 16th fastest out of the 40 or so athletes who competed in the event.

Her targets for the 2009 season were to run under 56 seconds and to win a medal at the European Under 23 Championships. Not only did she run under 56 seconds but did so on no fewer than seven occasions. Throughout the season she ran five personal best times and set her current personal best time of 55.32 seconds, winning the silver medal at the European Under 23 Championships in Kaunas in July. Eilidh ended the season ranked 18th in the world, 10th in Europe and 3rd in the United Kingdom and achieved the qualifying time for the 2010 Commonwealth Games on seven occasions. In addition to being selected for the World Championships, she was also selected for the Great Britain and N.I. team for the Europa Cup held in Portugal in June.

Her targets for the 2010 season are to run below 55 seconds and to be selected for, and reach the finals, of both the European Championships to be held in Barcelona and the Commonwealth Games to be held in New Delhi.

Eilidh would like to thank everybody from Kinross-shire for all the support, encouragement and kind words they have given her throughout the season and hopes to come out next season and do even better.



No be long noo, tho, till the skies are ringin wi the sound o winter as thoosands o pinkies return fae Iceland, probably by the time ye read this they will be arriving in droves.

Anither camera hiz been installed oan the loch shore lookin ower Vane bay so that shid gie us some richt close up views o the geese when they are feedin oan the Carden strip. Ye kin play about wi it in the centre tae see whit ye kin spot hiv a go the next time yer in.

Sale time again in the shop. Help yer gairden birds n beasties through the winter, by getting them a hoose tae shelter fae the winter snell. Burds, bees frogs, insects we hiv a selection oan show tae hoose them awe.

Next events comin up are a "Dawn Goose Watch" on Saturday 17 October stertin at 6.30am until 9.00. Diz whit it says in the title, watch geese takin aff at dawn ... awesome, followed by if yer still awake at 11am by "Wild Goose Chase" endin at 4pm, a veritable goose fest o a day. Loch Leven NNR

Autumn is a great time of year for wildlife enthusiasts at Loch Leven National Nature Reserve, with passage migrants and wintering wildfowl returning daily. Shoveler, Teal, Wigeon and Pintail are all being seen, and a selection of waders including Black-tailed Godwit, Green Sandpiper, Greenshank, Knot and Ruff are passing through on their way south. Others to look out for

this month are Green Woodpeckers, Common and Black Darter dragonflies, and Otters as they fish the River Leven and nearby pools.

This month features two Fungi Forays, o n Sunday 4 October at Findatie car park and Sunday 25 October at Burleigh Sands car park, both meeting at 2 pm. Tony Wilson from the British Mycological Society will be leading us in to the lochside woodland habitats to explore the rich diversity of mushrooms on display throughout the season. Following his illustrated



talk at our recent volunteers' Any agaric mushroom meeting, people will have the opportunity put their identification skills to the test in the field.

Look out for the last in this year's series of volunteers' meetings on Tuesday 11 November, when we'll be welcoming special guest Roy Dennis to Loch Leven for a talk about his acclaimed work radio-tracking raptors in Scotland. As one of the country's leading ornithologists, it is a privilege to have Roy join us for the meeting, and we are anticipating a busy evening. More information follows in next month's newsletter.

With the return of the Pink-footed Geese, locals will now be seeing movements of large skeins as they travel to feeding grounds from their night time roosts on the loch. Scottish Natural Heritage has two **Dawn Goose Watches** planned on Sunday 11 and Saturday 17 October. Both will take place at 6.30am, meeting at the Watchtower in Kirkgate Park, where you will have the chance to witness the spectacular sight of several thousand geese rising from the loch shore.

Farming



Mamma Mia! Wasn't the Gazebo Gathering a fantastic family day out? The kids and I made camp about 1 o'clock just as Vital Sign were warming up the crowd with a few old favourites. We had packed enough sandwiches, sausage rolls, cakes and bakes to last about a week and settled down with our camp chairs to enjoy the sunshine. By the time Abba-mania came on stage we had already met more than a few friends, caught up on their news and joined the crowd in front of the stage. Bumping into a neighbour, I stopped for a chat and soon realised I had joined the end of a row of farmers' wives. Now if you are thinking we may all have been wearing checked shirts and jeans held up with baler twine you can stop there! I reckon there were eight of us and there wasn't a checked shirt in sight. I only noticed we stood out because we were all missing the same thing. A man! Each of us had left our husband or partner at home making the most of the sunshine. My husband was combining, I think someone else was baling and I imagine that catching up with field work meant that everyone else had to forfeit their Gazebo wristband and make do with the radio instead. To be honest I doubt that anyone minded too much. The constant rain in August and the first half of September put a stop to harvesting and it is now a race to make up for the lost time. It's not just getting this year's crop off but getting next year's in that can become difficult, when everything is so soggy. Fewer fields than usual that grew Winter Barley have been ploughed and sown with Winter Oil Seed Rape. With a growing season just short of 12 months, early establishment is crucial. From now on many fields of potatoes will also be ploughed shortly after the harvester has left to get winter wheat sown. The aim is to get the crop off to a good start before the November frosts.

Working under pressure is part of many jobs and at this time of year farming is no exception. Eating on the move can seem like a good idea to make the most of the day so a large piece box is usually required, unless of course you have a wife that visits the field laden with supper and flasks of tea. Yes, I think only one of us slipped away from the gathering to make sure the squad was fed and watered. You know who you are and I expect that everyone in the field was delighted to see you. I just hope they know how lucky they are!

Obituaries

JOHN WALTER STEWART, D.L., of Green Wood, Kinross died at home on 11 September 2009, aged 64.

John was born on a farm near the village of Hutton in the borders on 23 June 1945 and brought up by his grandparents. He attended Berwickshire High School in Duns and was encouraged by an uncle to sit Highers. He then joined the Bank of Scotland, working in East Lothian. While in hospital in Haddington he met Betty, who was the ward sister, and they married six months later. John's career with the bank took them to various parts of Perthshire and Angus. His first post as manager was at Broughty Ferry, then Perth, before coming to Kinross in 1993.

John must have been known to almost everyone in Kinross through his involvement in so many aspects of the town's life.

- as Manager of the Bank of Scotland, before he was transported to 'Cheerybank' as he called it that word transported used to refer to criminals banished to Australia, and I think that Cherrybank felt a bit like that for John. He missed the daily contact with his customers. What other bank manager have you known who would come out of his office to meet you! From his office to the right of the main door he kept an eye on who was coming in to the bank.
- as a Rotarian of many years.
- as a curler he was a member of Kinross Curling Club and competed in the Rotary World Curling Championships in Canada in 1996 and 2000.
- as a golfer, an early morning runner and cyclist.
- as an Elder in Kinross Parish Church.
- as the 'Town Auditor' he seemed to audit the books of most voluntary organisations in the county.
- he was Deputy Lieutenant of the County of which he was very proud.
- in disguise as Santa, with a schedule leading up to Christmas that only the real Santa could beat. He had been originally asked to be Santa for Light Up Kinross the annual switching on of the town Christmas lights but his Santa job grew and grew. Perhaps he had the right shape, and he certainly had the right style. Dressed as Santa on a surprise visit to a Kirk Session meeting last December, he persuaded the minister (Joanne Finlay) to sit on his knee.
- then there was MTKY Musical Theatre for Kinross Youth. John helped out from the start ten years ago, drummed up support from the town, and always helped front of house.
- and finally, in a disguise that fooled no-one, John was the 'grumpy sheep', dressed in a loose-knitted sheep costume in the annual Kinross churches' Family week for 200 children in August. Throughout the year, children would recognise him in the street as the grumpy sheep – though 'grumpy' was not really in John's nature.

It is this last activity that tells us so much of John's true character. He had no sense of sel f-importance about him, in spite of his many achievements. He was very happy to mix in with the team and if that meant being a figure of fun for the children, so be it. John was always looking for a way to lighten the mood, to find the pulse of life in a situation and to lift people up.

John was a Rotarian, joining in Monifieth in the early 1980s, and a member of St John's in Perth before coming to

Kinross. The Rotarians' motto was John's motto for life: 'Service Above Self'. There was no one he would not offer to help. If ever there was a breach, he would step into it. — Look up the meaning of that phrase, 'stepping into the breach' and you'll find:

"to do someone's work when they are suddenly not able to do it."

"to do work that someone else is not able or not willing to do."

The phrase fits John. Not only would he stand in at short notice, but he would also do the work someone else was not willing to do. When he took early retirement from the Bank, he had even more time to help. In Kinross Parish Church I knew that I could rely on John to volunteer. He would stand in as Beadle on Sundays, and at funerals. On a Sunday, when someone didn't turn up to count the collection, John would do it without being asked. Quietly he would cover in all sorts of situations without seeking thanks. You could rely completely on him.

John made everyone feel welcome and appreciated. I think he himself knew how important it is to be loved and to belong, and so he went out of his way to help others to belong and to feel appreciated. John was loveable and mischievous with as sense of humour matched only by his humility.

He made Kinross his home for the last 16 years, and I think Kinross is a place where he truly felt at home, right here in the midst of people, one of the team, enthusing others. John is survived by his wife Betty, daughter Karen and son-

in-law Andy.

Tribute by the Rev Dr John Munro

STUART BAND of Benarty, by Vane Farm, was killed in a tragic car accident Thursday 3 September 2009. He would have been 26 on 11 October.

Stuart was born in Bedford and when he was nine the family moved to Scotland. Stuart attended Milnathort Primary School, Kinross High School and Perth College (University of Highlands and Islands) where he attained a BSc in Computing and Software Development. Stuart was always hardworking and dedicated; while at college he worked at Moto in the forecourt and the shop, often on night shifts. After his graduation he started with David Sands full time in IT support, travelling extensively to sites throughout the local area. He moved to VME retail at Crook of Devon where in a similar job he covered a wider geographic location.

Stuart enjoyed spending time with friends, music, modifying his black competition Saxo, driving and computing. Stuart had a wide circle of friends and acquaintances from close friends who he had known since his primary school days to others who he met on web forums. Many of his friends have said he was always there to listen and offer words of wisdom. Stuart had a wicked sense of humour and was liked by everyone.

Stuart was a much loved son, brother, cousin, nephew and friend, and will be sadly missed.
