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Microlight Nuisance

The British Microlight Aircraft Association claims that flying a microlight is "the best fun you can have out of bed".

Over recent months residents on the west side of Kinross and Milnathort and surroundings will be aware of the noise and inconvenience that accompanies such "fun".

The microlights operate from Balado Activity Centre, which now appears re-branded as Balado Park and which proclaims itself as "the centre of Scotland for aviation events"

As a result of contact with others in the community, I know that the regularity of the droning microlight engines has become an intolerable nuisance to many residents.

On fine days, just when you might wish to enjoy the tranquillity of your own garden, the pilots of these "flying chainsaws" as they have been described, buzz about for "fun".

These craft are piloted generally by people who come from out-with the Kinross area to enjoy their day out, presumably because their own neighbourhoods sensibly do not offer the scope to pester the locality they reside in.

A current planning application now seeks permission to build aircraft hangarage to accommodate 40 aircraft plus offices and associated facilities for this expanding business.

The increase in activities that this proposed development signals can surely only create a greater number of flights and therefore more noise and nuisance.

I noted that the minutes of the October meeting of Kinross Community Council reported that the microlight hangarage planning application, (although wrongly described and listed for discussion as a "garage") had not been scrutinised as "it was intimated that the location of the application was outwith the Kinross Community Council area."

I understand this "intimation" came from the applicant.

I was also interested to note that the minute stated that Community Council member Mr Jack had "raised a query re. noise levels in relation to this application."

The purpose of the CC is to ascertain the views of the community they represent.

I therefore attended the November Community Council meeting to voice my concerns to the CC regarding the noise nuisance and its impact on myself and others in the community with whom I had been in touch. I pointed out that it was the duty of the CC to record this nuisance and inform Perth and Kinross Council accordingly.

I was supported by another member of the public, being five present at the meeting, who confirmed the microlight nuisance. Kinross CC had no paperwork to illustrate the details of the development. Instead, they asked Mr Alexander, who was present, for his view, despite him being the applicant and residing outwith the Kinross CC area. Then, having barred their own council member, CCllr Mr Jack from a vote, due to his interest (?) Kinross CC unanimously voted to take no action and chose not to heed my request to inform P&KC.

I believe this decision by Kinross CC has exposed their lack of objectivity and competence and it is my intention to pursue these matters further.

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Campus road safety failure

We have a fantastic new Community Campus, incorporating Kinross High School, at Lathro, however we (a group of parents) are at our wits end trying to get safe access for our children entering the campus grounds at the north end (nearest Milnathort).

An access point was quite deliberately made within the wall at the north end of the campus. This was brilliant; taking pupils and community off the roadside pavements, mostly behind a brick wall on a pavement that can walk at least four abreast.

The issue comes with pupils (and community) trying to access this fantastic walkway. Pupils from some areas within Milnathort have no safe way of crossing the busy A922 (which is particularly busy at the time that pupils would be crossing in the morning and at night). The pavement on the east side of the A922 and just north of the entrance is only 0.7m wide. Some of the pavement just north of that is rough tarmac, under trees (so that at this time of the year the leaves are wet and slippery). If pupils walk on the (better) west side of the A922 and then cross at the north entrance to the campus grounds, they cross in a 40mph speed limit with absolutely no assistance.

Pupils accessing the campus from the Kinross end have three tou can crossings to choose from, two of which are in 20mph zones. The toucan crossing sited just north of Gallowhill Road actually has a crossing patroller pressing the button, waiting for the traffic to stop and then crossing the children over. From what I understand there is no legislative issue with moving the crossing patroller immediately from one site to the other.

We have written to various different departments and people. Some departments completely washed their hands of the issue with the infamous "it's not my job", with correspondence being forwarded on to the correct people who declined to even directly respond or provide any further information. Some others, such as Dick Keatings, Campus Manager and Head Teacher of the School, have verbally agreed with our issues. Mr Keatings even gave an assurance that things would be in place last week and keeps asking us to be patient. Our question is: how patient? How long and how many children have to be hurt or killed whilst we wait? From a drivers' point of view (and having driven down this stretch of road in the morning) it can be quite daunting with, for example, children overtaking slower children on an already narrow pavement in a 40mph limit etc.

Willie Robertson, our local Councillor, has been very supportive and has also been in touch with P&KC. He has also been given assurances that the pavement will be widened and his hopes are that there will be a barrier between the side of the pavement and the road directly outside the access point. As yet no dates have been intimated for this work.

Pupils (and community) from Milnathort have just as much right to safe access to the campus, through the purpose built access point, as those accessing from Kinross. The crossing patroller can be moved immediately to promote this. A "20s Plenty" sign could be put up (it doesn't have to be a "School 20 mph" sign) and at least a zebra crossing installed.

News from the Health Centre



It is a very busy time for us at the moment in the health centre as we are currently immunising people for seasonal flu vaccine and have started immunising people against swine flu vaccine too.

The clinical priority groups for those entitled to have swine flu vaccination as identified by the Scottish Government health department at the moment are, in order of priority:

- a. Individuals aged six months and up to 65 years in the current seasonal flu vaccine clinical at risk groups
- b. Pregnant women
- c. Household contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- d. People aged 65 and over in the current seasonal flu vaccine clinical at risk groups

We are working hard to immunise according to this guidance and aim to ensure that everyone who qualifies for the vaccine should have it.

Some of you will remember Lynne Ferguson, a senior physiotherapist who worked at the health centre since the early 1990's. Sadly, Lynne died in June this year and in remembrance of her the health centre staff planted a lovely crab apple tree in the grounds of the health centre in November.

Tea at the Palace for Kinross resident

Well-known Kinross resident Chris Renton had afternoon tea with members of the Royal Family at Buckingham Palace on 21 October. The visit was part of an event held to recognise the work of the Women's Land Army (WLA) and the Women's Timber Corps (WTC). The women in these services carried out essential work during World War II, keeping Britain supplied with food and timber.

There was no official recognition of the WTC during or just after the war, but in recent years some amends have been made: A statue was erected at Aberfoyle in 2007 and commemorative medals have been issued to former 'Land Girls' and 'Lumber Jills' as the women in the WLA and the WTC were known.

Over ninety veterans from various parts of Britain attended the event in October. Chris was one of seven former 'Lumber Jills' from Scotland who made the journey to London. Earlier in the day the ladies attended a special lunch at the Royal Opera House, hosted by Environment Secretary Hilary Benn, who said:

"I'm delighted to welcome the Land Girls and Lumber Jills to London as representatives of the thousands of women who provided food and timber for the nation during World War I and II. Over 34,000 members of the Women's Land Army and Timber Corps have now received a commemorative badge which recognises their service and acknowledges the debt that we owe them. This will be a fitting tribute to their great efforts when our country was at war."

The lunch at the Opera House was bangers and mash followed by apple crumble – typical wartime fare.

In the afternoon the ladies joined the Queen in the grandeur of the Buckingham Palace ballroom to enjoy afternoon tea and reminisce about their war-time experiences. Also present were the Duke of Edinburgh, the Duke of Gloucester, the Duchess of Cornwall, Princess Alexandra and Princess Michael of Kent, with a member of the royal family at each table.

Chris was delighted to be seated next to Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh. He asked her exactly what members of the WTC did. Chris recounted their conversation:

"I told him 'we cut down trees' and he said 'with a chainsaw?' I said 'Don't be silly! It was an old cross-cut saw we used!'"

Chris went on to explain to the Duke that the larch trees the women cut down were used for telegraph poles, Scots pine for pit props and hardwoods for furniture and coffins.

Laughing at the memory of telling him he was silly, Chris said, "In fact I found Prince Philip charming and very interesting. And he knew where Kinross was!"

During the tea of dainty sandwiches, assorted cakes and scones with clotted cream and "little scarlet jam", an orchestra played war-time tunes.

"It was a superb day", Chris said, "and it was wonderful to meet up with some of the ladies from the reunion we had in Aber foyle a couple of years ago."

Swansacre update

The prominent corner High Street property, 2 Swansacre, located in the Kinross Outstanding Conservation Area, was acquired by Perth & Kinross Council in August 2004 following years of neglect by the previous owner. The Council has agreed the building will be redeveloped by Hillcrest Housing Association to provide two affordable housing units in the centre of Kinross. To cover the costs in the repair and conversion of this property to residential use, the Housing Association expects to receive grant funding from the Scottish Government plus a grant of £80,000 from the Council's Developers' Contribution fund and a further £50,000 from the Council's Conservation and Regeneration fund.

Development will begin once all funding has been approved. It is expected that approval should be given early in 2010 although this is subject to full planning permission being secured. Restoration of the building will be to a high standard in order to enhance this Outstanding Conservation Area.

Advice on community funding

P&KC will be holding a special workshop for community and voluntary groups in Kinross-shire, to advise them on accessing funding sources for their organisation.

The training event has been organised after a request from members of the local community and will be held on **Monday 30 November** at Loch Leven Community Campus from 9.30am to 12.30pm.

At the workshop, Council officers will provide advice and guidance on who can support community organisations and how to complete funding applications. There will also be discussions led on the wider use of funders and grants and opportunities for fundraising.

Milnathort Placecheck update

Residents of Milnathort will get an update on the Placecheck initiative running in the village at a special follow-up event on **Saturday 28 November**.

Placecheck is an opportunity for the community to tell the Council what makes the place they live in special, and to work together in partnership to maintain that, including public space improvements agreed as priorities.

The follow-up event will detail what has come from the initial event in August 2009. This saw the village split into five 'zones' and residents walking around the zones to identify things they would like to see improved in open spaces, before prioritising the issues that were raised from the walk.

Since then Council officers and community members have been looking at the priorities to determine what improvements can potentially be taken forward. There will be information about actions taken so far, and discussion on what happens next at the event later this month.

The follow-up event will be held in the Milnathort Thistle Hotel on Saturday 28 November from 9am to 12.30pm. Parking is available in the car park to the rear of the hotel and crèche facilities will again be provided at Milnathort Primary School.

Places for both the event and the crèche must be booked in advance. Local residents were able to do this either by returning the booking slip sent with a letter to all households in Milnathort or by emailing

Curling Academy gets go-ahead

The outline planning application for a curling rink located at the Market Park in Kinross was unanimously approved by P&KC's development control committee on 18 November. The committee decided the economic benefits of bringing the proposed national curling academy to Kinross outweighed the loss of open space. The development control committee stated that there should be as much public consultation as possible.

On 16 November the Kinross Curling Trust – the body which will build, own and operate the facility – held its inaugural AGM. The following were elected as trustees: Bob Anderson, Sheila Harley, Jamie Montgomery, Mary Morgan, Robin Niven and Willie Young. In addition there are three trustees on the board appointed by the Royal Caledonian Curling Club: Bob Tait, Colin Grahamslaw and Bob Kelly.

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Role of Milnathort CC relating to 'Milnathort Futures Trust'

- 1. The role of the CC is to assess the potential level of support within the community for the proposal to establish a Community Development Trust, and to look into the viability of such a project.
- 2. It would be for others within the community to set up the trust and to create a trading subsidiary. The only involvement of the CC thereafter would be to have a Community Councillor on the board of the CDT to report back the CC.
- 3. Milnathort CC unanimously desires its area to have a CDT to take a share in a possible wind cluster at Tillyrie Hill, and is embarking on a public information and consultation exercise with the community.
- 4. As yet, no CDT has been established; no planning application has been lodged; no money has been spent by the CC in furthering the project.
- 5. There is a long road to travel for the scheme to reach fruition and the CC accepts that all views, for and against, will need to be weighed. Those opposed in principle to renewable energy from wind turbines will have a full opportunity to make their objections in detail to the Planning Authority when, and if, an application is lodged. If the scheme is found to be fundamentally flawed in planning terms, it should be rejected at this stage.
- 6. There are, throughout Scotland, numerous CDTs. On Gigha and at Fintry, CDTs exist to operate wind turbines for the benefit of their communities.

News from the November Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 4 November were CCllrs C Watson, D Mackay, M Scott, M Blyth, D Colliar, L McKay, J Richardson, B Davies and I Jack. Also in attendance were P&K Cllr Kathleen Baird, PC Ishbel Wallace and five members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs D Cuthbert and S Bathgate and P&K Cllrs S Miller and W Robertson. In the absence of the CC Chairman, D Cuthbert, the meeting was chaired by Vice-Chair, CCllr Watson.

Minutes of previous meeting: The minutes, having been circulated prior to the Meeting and under correction of the reference at Planning to "garage" which should read "hangarage", were proposed by CCllr Colliar and seconded by CCllr Richardson.

Police Report: Sands Warehouse at Clashburn was targeted again and police enquiries are ongoing. A house on the south loch road was also broken into during the day. The Police again stress the importance of ensuring that all property is secure after dark.

Planning/Balado: The Chairman read out a letter received from Mr Ken Miles in relation to the planning application for Balado. This application was outwith the CC area and no discussion was held last month other than that it was noted that CCllr Jack had raised concerns regarding the noise Mr Miles stated in his letter that the proposed development impacts on his own household, those of his neighbours, including the Balado settlement, and that all are KCC electors. He continued that the CC was wrong in dismissing this. Mr Miles was present this evening to address this issue. A member of the public also commented that the microlights create a distraction to passing vehicles. Alexander stated that noise levels are scientifically measured and that no complaints had been received over the last twenty years; however, it had been decided to re-route the circuit. It was noted that Balado Park is also registered with the Civil Aviation Authority and is zoned for tourist related activities. Following this discussion the CC unanimously agreed that the decision reached last month should stand. CCllr Jack abstained due to his interest in this case.

Autograss: A public meeting was held on 21 October. CCllr Jack, although unable to attend personally, advised that around twenty people were present and that it would appear that the promoters are an offshoot of the main body. The noise survey is still awaited from the Council. Cllr Robertson was chasing this up. The Secretary has also written a reminder to the Council.

Community Campus: Cllr Baird advised that each group has been contacted by PKL. She could report that a football club using the new premises was very pleased with the charges. Each booking is treated individually.

St Andrews Day Parade: Cllr Miller is requesting that P&KC include the CC in this event.

CC Grants: Cllr Robertson approached P&KC about an increase for CCs who wish to book the school to hold their

monthly meetings. A paper highlighting the funding issues of CCs is to be presented at a future Council meeting.

Draft Area Conservation Appraisal Document: Following discussion it was agreed that we should request that the Council extend the conservation area to include the large properties on Station Road (up to the Primary School and also to include those properties erected in the rear gardens) and along the Muirs to the junction with Gallowhill Road.

North Cemetery/Grass Cutting: Complaints were received that the grass had been cut and not lifted. The verges have disappeared and headstones are now sitting on the paths in certain areas. Cllr Baird will check this out.

Planning

09/01763/FLL 25/27 Montgomery St: alteration /extension to house.

09/01790/FLL Land to the east of Baltree Farm, Hatchbank Road: erection of a dwelling house (Plot 4 - change of house type).

09/01810/FLL Unit D Business Park, Clashburn: erection of office, showroom and works with associated parking.

There were no objections to any of the above.

09/01686/FLL Change of use of former MoD property to office accommodation at the NATO Complex: A discussion was held on this application. It was noted that there is no designated use for this site in the Local Plan and accordingly there is no restrictions on how this ground could be utilised. It was agreed that, although we held no objections to this application, there should be an agreed policy on the use of the land and the CC would recommend either commercial or industrial. Cllr Baird will enquire informally about this site and the CC will write to P&KC requesting a 'holding period' meantime

09/01529/FLL 86 High Street: Change of use from ancillary residential accommodation to self-contained flat: Approved. CCllr Jack raised a query as to the advertising of applications and the timescale involved for commenting on same. It was noted that applications are listed in the Perthshire Advertiser on a Friday.

Gellybank: A member of the public questioned the outcome of this application. The CC understood that this had been approved, however it was now stated that this might be under appeal with the Scottish Office. CCllr Colliar will check this out.

Reports from P&K Councillors

Councillor Baird reported as follows:

World Café: P&KC are collating the information gleaned from this exercise and will meet shortly with interested groups to discuss the way forward. CCllrs Richardson and Bathgate are to attend this meeting in Perth.

Loch Leven Campus: Officially opened and procession of pupils has now taken place. A number of free events are to be held in the campus at the end of this month (Nov) and the Library should be opened around that time. CCllr Colliar stated that the car park should be nearer to the Library. It was mentioned that there are five disabled parking spaces and CCllr Colliar added that there should be signs in this area to alert people to a one-way system. There are still a number of "snagging" issues to be addressed. There was a recent problem in the computer room and the equipment was damaged through water ingress. Both the Police and Council are monitoring the traffic at the locus of the campus.

The New Health Centre has also been officially opened. CCllr D Mackay enquired as to the bus service and it was answered that the bus will stop at the campus.

The High School has now closed. It has already been targeted by vandals. The premises have not been boarded up as there are furniture, equipment etc to be removed.

CCllrs/Council Committees: CCllr Richardson questioned whether CC members are eligible to sit on Council Committees. It was answered that they are unable to take part in any Council policy decisions as a CC member but it may be that they are involved in some other capacity.

Correspondence

Gallowhill Road/A922: Response received from P&KC. They will monitor the operation of the new junction under the most demanding periods of use, i.e. school opening and closing times, however they have no plans to make any more changes at this time. Unless this review reveals significant operational or safety concerns, which they believe unlikely, changes to the layout would have to be funded by the public purse. At this time there are no budgets available to consider any such change and there are no plans to include yellow lines.

A977 proposed mitigation measures: Copy of letter from Fossoway & District CC to P&KC advising that both the CC and members of the public present at the presentation on 9 October were unanimous in opposing the majority of measures proposed, as these were not traffic mitigation measures on the A977. Cllr Baird stated that the proposals were agreed by Fossoway CC in 2006, however at that time no funding was in place. CCllr Richardson stated that the Convention supports the view of Fossoway CC. Cllr Baird is to obtain statistics in relation to traffic on this road. It was also mentioned that a further meeting was held last night (i.e.

3 November).

CC Autumn 2009: These publications were handed to the Chair and CCllr Colliar.

Milnathort Place Check: Newsletter, poster and details of follow-up event received.

STUC: Asking for input and support for the STUC's Rebuilding Collective Prosperity Campaign.

The Association for the Protection of Rural Scotland helps local rural communities to engage with the planning system and to protect their local landscapes. www.ruralscotland.org.

Other Business

Memorial seat: CCllr Colliar asked CCllrs to inspect the seat at the County Buildings prior to the next meeting. He suggested that it be replaced.

Remembrance Day: Details for local procession were given. **Boundary maps**: CCllr Colliar handed out boundary maps to CCllrs.

Kinross Newsletter: CCllr Watson confirmed that the Company is now in place and has full charitable status. A meeting is to be convened to discuss and agree a policy for running the Company in the future.

Light Up Kinross: Details were given.

Kinross CC: The Treasurer advised that a replacement auditor is required. It was agreed that we should approach Ross McConnell.

The next meeting of Kinross CC will be held at the Masonic Hall on Wednesday 2 December at 7.30pm.

Members of the public wishing to address Kinross CC are requested to contact the Secretary in advance and supply a copy of any relevant papers.

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Milnathort Community Council

News from the November Meeting

In attendance: CCllr Giacopazzi, Chairman, welcomed CCllrs Cottingham, Thomson, Bennet and Smith to the meeting held on 12 November. Also in attendance were Minute Secretary E Rougvie, PC Petrie of Tayside Police, P&K Cllr Baird and 14 members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllrs Porter and Lamont and P&K Cllr Robertson. CCllr Giacopazzi opened the meeting by apologising for the room, which he said had not been properly laid out despite it having been booked for the CC

Minutes of the October meeting: CCllr Giacopazzi asked for an amendment to the October minutes, pointing out that he had not given a presentation from the solicitors' firm Burness, but that he had drawn attention to the information that was available on their website. This having been done, the minutes were proposed by CCllr Smith and seconded by CCllr Bennet.

Milnathort Futures Trust: CCllr Giacopazzi had received three letters in relation to Milnathort Futures Trust and invited one of the correspondents in attendance to outline the points he had made. CCllr Thomson joined the public for this item. The member of the public pointed out that the site on which it was proposed to create a three-turbine cluster had already been the subject of two applications, both of which had been unsuccessful. He asked on what basis had the CC decided to ignore previous findings and why they were this particular commercial v enture. supporting CCllr Giacopazzi said that the community wind turbine proposal had been offered to the CC and they supported the idea although would have no influence on Milnathort Futures Trust or the Tillyrie Hill windfarm project. Consultations with the community were at an early stage and if residents were in favour the next steps would be taken to establish the trust, which would be an independent body of volunteers with charitable status responsible for disbursing the revenue from the community wind turbine. The money would be used for environmental projects such as making the village more energy-efficient or installing flood defences. Another member of the public took issue with the minutes of the October CC meeting, at which she had raised concerns about the proposed windfarm site. She gave the Chairman her own set of minutes which she had written from the notes she had taken and which included the comments she had made. CCllr Giacopazzi replied that the minutes of CC meetings were taken in shorthand and he was satisfied that they were a fair and accurate record of proceedings. He drew attention to the minutes of the full P&KC meeting, which did not include comments by individuals. The member of the public was also reminded that all CC minutes that appear in the Kinross Newsletter were subject to editing and were not necessarily a full account of meetings. The member of the public was also unhappy about the article that appeared in the Newsletter by CCllr Giacopazzi. She felt that the only beneficiaries of the project would be the landowners and that the figures given in terms of the benefits to the community were misleading.

CCllr Giacopazzi responded by saying that the purpose of the exercise was to reap environmental benefits, and that a grant of £150,000 - not £15,000 as the member of the public had reported in her own version of the minutes – was available, which he felt should be taken advantage of He emphasised that a series of meetings with residents would be necessary

before any further progress could be made.

At this point CCllr Cottingham moved that the discussion should be brought to a close and that the CC should move on to other matters. He was seconded by CCllr Smith, and CCllr Thomson re-joined the meeting.

Police matters: PC Petrie advised that she was the community crime officer for the Kinross area while PC Brian Easton was now the community crime officer for Milnathort and would be attending CC meetings in future. There was a re-structuring programme of community engagement officers in place as a result of the opening of the new community campus.

There had been a daytime break-in at South Loch Road and at Websters' yard, in which tools had been stolen, and PC Petrie urged people to get in touch should they see anything suspicious or sense that something is wrong. If possible, they should note vehicle registrations and take descriptions of suspects. The police would rather deal with a false alarm with good intent than not be informed of suspicious activities. PC Petrie advised that an incident in which three hoax calls were made alleging bomb threats were being investigated at present.

She added that the security within the community campus was very good and parents could be reassured that the pupils were safe and secure even though it was a community facility as well as a school.

Matters Arising

Placecheck: CCllr Bennet said that a Placecheck grants workshop would be held at Loch Leven Community Campus on 30 November. The follow-up community event was in the Thistle Hotel on 28 November. Leaflets had now been distributed throughout the village.

Dropped kerbs and drains: CCllr Giacopazzi reported that the kerbs in New Road had now been dropped and drains repaired. On behalf of the CC, he expressed his appreciation to P&KC for the speed with which the work had been done.

Correspondence

- P&KC Environmental Services Guide to Recycling: officers are available to speak to community groups about the initiatives set up under the council's Towards Zero Waste scheme. CCllr Giacopazzi advised that from 2010 batteries can be taken to his shop for re-cycling and CCllr Bennet said that Milnathort Primary School was collecting batteries for fund-raising purposes.
- Letter from P&KC about the BT 'Adopt a Telephone Box' scheme. Noted.
- Letter from P&KC finance department advising that the CC had a certificate of employers' liability. Noted.

CCIIr Smith also confirmed that the CC was entered in the Data Protection Register and that the £30 registration fee would be paid by P&KC.

Planning Matters

TAYplan consultation: CCllr Cottingham gave an outline of what was involved in TAYplan, the strategic development plan for Dundee, Perth, Angus and north Fife which is currently being drafted. It will be available for public consultation shortly and the consultation process is expected to take about a year. Information is available at www.tayplansdpa.gov.uk

There followed a discusion about the siting of the 400 houses that are required in the area especially in the light of restrictions resulting from the new building in the countryside policy, but CCllr Cottingham gave an assurance that everyone would have the opportunity to make comments in due course.

Planning correspondence: CCllr Bennet thanked CCllr Giacopazzi for his hard work in terms of corresponding with P&KC on planning matters but felt it would be helpful if the other CC members could have sight of letters and e-mails before they were sent. She acknowledged however that this would result in a delay in issues being addressed. After discussion, it was agreed to include this as an item on the next agenda.

Applications: The following applications were noted: erection of general purpose storage shed at Seggie Bank farm steading; erection of two houses at Tillyrie Farm (in principle).

CCIIr Cottingham drew attention to what seemed to be an inconsistency in planning decisions. An application for the erection of 21 houses on land north of Auchtermuchty Road

had been refused because the land had been zoned for industrial use, despite there being a lack of demand for industrial land, yet an application for an agriculture-related development on Cupar Road had been approved because there was considered to be a lack of space elsewhere for industrial development. The CC had objected to the latter application and a member of the public was concerned that consent had been given without a Section 75 agreement having been signed, despite this being a condition. P&K Cllr Baird agreed to follow this up.

Other business

Community orchard: CCllr Bennet said she had written to two landowners with a view to establishing a community orchard but had had no reply from one and a definite 'no' from the other. After discussion, it was agreed that CCllr Bennet would write an article for the Newsletter asking about the availability of land.

Before the meeting drew to a close, the following points were made:

Room hire for CC: CCllr Baird said that she would investigate the issue of funding to pay for the hire of the school, since the room in the town hall was not suitable. She also undertook to ask that the P&KC minutes were distributed electronically.

Community windfarm: A member of the public commented that several people in the room during the meeting took a more positive view of the community windfarm proposal.

The next meeting of Milnathort CC will be held on Thursday 10 December 2009 at 7.30pm in Milnathort Town Hall.

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Portmoak Community Council

News from the November Meeting

The meeting held on 10 November was attended by CCllrs I McGrattan, J Shepherd, J Bird, R Cairncross, S Garvie, C Weedon. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Baird, Barnacle & Miller; PC Brian Eastern, Sgt Grant Mitchell and 14 residents. Apologies were received from M Hally and P&K Cllr Robertson.

Police Report: PC Brian Eastern introduced himself to the meeting as the new Community Police Officer for Portmoak. Incidents within Portmoak area: Vandalism in Kinnesswood during October, including damage to two cars, fencing at the school as well as planters. Two juveniles who live outside the immediate area have been connected with the problems and a report submitted to Police in Perth.

Neighbourhood Watch Scheme: there is currently only one scheme active in Portmoak: Bishop Terrace, Kinnesswood. Anyone interested in taking an active role in setting up a scheme in their area should contact the Police or the CC.

The mobile Police Station will be in the Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell area, Wednesday 18/11/09. It is hoped this new facility will enable a more 'local' Police presence in the community.

Treasurer's report: £409.74 in the bank account. £0.00 in Tetley Trail (MBW) Account.

Michael Bruce Way: Fergus Cook and Angela Hughes have been working on the production of the content on the two Interpretation Boards which were proposed for the MBW, one at Kinnesswood and one in the vicinity of the Church. Fergus spoke to the CC explaining his thoughts behind the proposal explaining that there was so much history in the area it was a difficult job to keep the information on each board to a reasonable 300 words. The boards did not contain a map of the walk and it was noted that no money was available for the production of a walk pamphlet. It was agreed to have the content of both boards placed on www.portmoak.org for comment by residents and a then a final decision on the content made by 31.12.09.

Matter Arising from Previous Minutes

ASCC: Conference on 14 Nov, Edinburgh.

Mail box at Post Office: Letter received 22 October from Royal Mail, London Office. Request still being considered, engineers have attempted to fit a larger front to present box but unsuccess ful. Royal Mail said it will now be treated as a matter of urg ency.

Notice Board: Copies of minutes now kept in Kinnesswood shop.

Cleaning of roads: The B9097 between B996 and B920 and the A911 between Easter Balgedie and Burleigh Sands were reported to 'Clarence' on 23 July 2009. Each month since, prior to the CC meeting, a progress report has been requested. The same reason has been given for non-completion - road sweeper is broken down. Update requested on CC date, informed that the road had been swept. Road cleaning dept asked to confirm that position: not evident that cleaning had taken place and further contact agreed to be made w/c 16/11/09.

Signage at Scotlandwell: Request made to Clarence to remove picnic signs and replace with Well Green sign. Following an e-mail from a resident in Scotlandwell it appears the signs are on private ground (this wasn't previously stated). A further request has been made to remove the signs from the private property.

Lomond Country Inn: Planning application now followed the correct procedure. A number of local residents have raised the issue of noise from the outside bar area, especially if live or recorded music was played outside. It was unclear whether this was a planning or licensing arrangement; clarification was required.

Land behind Wellside Motors: Building work has now started; residents will be able to see the depth of peat which has been removed before a sufficient sub structure of hard sand has been found as a sufficient basis for the construction of the road leading into the area.

The builders have cleaned out the ditch which runs alongside the access road to the Moss and they have also fenced off an area that was used as an 'unofficial' car park to the Moss. This piece of ground was auctioned off last year by the Water Board and is not part of the planning application process associated with the new houses. Any change in use of this piece of ground e.g. to be included in the 'house development' is likely to need planning approval but the latest contact with the builder confirms that the intention is to leave a number of parking spaces to be used by anyone accessing the Moss although the area will not be as large as the present 'unofficial' car park.

There is also some scope for consultation with the community regarding a small piece of ground alongside the track adjacent to the Causeway road. This will in fact be the entrance to the village and it may be an area that Scotlandwell in Bloom may wish to look at.

Wester Balgedie Appeal: Copy of a letter to Planning and Environmental Appeals received from local resident disputing a number of points in the Appeal Report and the hearing process. Letter is a request to have those points reviewed prior to the ratification of the Notice of Intention.

Insurance cover for CC members: The insurance cover has been renewed. There is still some detail required to be decided in the event that a CC was taken to Court.

Payment of school lets: Contacted the Chief Executive's office re extra expense not in this year's budget. The budget is to manage the CC which is made more difficult if a further expense is imposed.

Hedge alongside playing field, Bishop Terrace, Kinnesswood: Reported to Clarence. No contact has been made with CC as yet.

Subcommittee reports

Paths Group: The MBW sponsorship programme is now 'open' for residents to sponsor the walk. Notices will be put up explaining the system. Anyone wishing to take out

sponsorship should contact a CCllr or Stuart Garvie direct on 01592 840825.

Path between Gamekeepers and Cobbles, Kinnesswood: The Paths committee have made a site visit and investigating the possible direction they can take to improve the path.

09/01835/FUL Alterations and change of use from garage/ workshop to dwellinghouse. Carraigin, Arnot Tower, Leslie, KY6 3JQ.

Management Group

Traffic calming: P&KC have decided to move the build out at Gamekeepers and also the one at the Leslie end of Scotlandwell to just inside the speed limit signs. This is to "include all the houses in both villages and give everyone the benefit of the system". They are also hoping to get the antiskid surface extended on the Scotlandwell hill before the winter sets in. The new signs are also in the pipeline with all these items currently in the queue for the contractors. A resident raised the question of how far up the hill the antiskid was due to be placed. He suggested it should be laid to the top of the hill and not the 30 metres planned.

Councillor Reports Cllr Baird

The new Community Campus was up and running and well worth a visit.

There had been some good feedback regarding the World Café event in Kinross.

The Chairman had attended the event and did not share the same feelings as Cllr Baird. Whilst agreeing that the concept was excellent, more could have been achieved. He considered that there were a number of important points which could have been improved upon:

- Poor facilitation. One example was: following the group discussion, a summary was produced of key issues, although the facilitator had not visited each group to note their comments and it therefore appeared that this had already been written.
- Council asked to talk about key issues which were important to the community but only discussed issues pertinent to the Council, an attempt to steer discussion. An example of this was the time devoted to the topic, one hour, with 40 mins of that used by the Council to talk about the new campus. The residents were happy with the new campus so therefore did not wish to discuss the subject but wanted to talk about issues which they were not happy with.
- Council personnel not taking the exercise seriously enough.

Cllr Miller

Agreed that the turnout of residents had been quite disappointing and no doubt some things could have been done better but overall it was considered a worthwhile project.

Cllr Barnacle

Was unable to attend the World Café and understood that the Council leading the discussions was an issue. The important issue was to make something happen rather than have too many talking shops.

He had detailed previous concerns over the figures proposed in the Council Development plan, especially the numbers of new houses involved within the landward areas of Kinrossshire. His felt his concerns are justified following one housing development in Powmill area of around 300 houses compared with the P&KC estimate of 320 overall. It was suggested that further discussion with developers and the Council were required.

The recycling facilities at Kinross had now been improved.

Other Business

- 1. A resident raised the question whether the new Health Centre and School could cope with the apparent large number of new houses due for the area. The Cllrs confirmed that both sites could manage.
- 2. A resident queried the suitability of the homeless accommodation in Brough Terrace, Kinnesswood, detailing a number of different problems of living in this particular area quoting from his experience in working in this particular field. The Chairman had been in contact with the appropriate authorities very recently and the issues raised by the resident had already been discussed.
- 3. Kinnesswood in Bloom had written requesting the CC support and comment about a proposed booklet "A walk through Kinnesswood". Although no financial aid was possible the CC would assist where possible.

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Fossoway and District CC

News from the November Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 3 November were A Morrison, Alistair Lavery, Hugh Wallace, Sheila Anderson, Roderick Paterson and Marion Anness. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Robertson and Barnacle and 15 members of the public. Apologies were received from Trudy Duffy-Wigman. There were no declarations of interest.

Community Policing: The police had telephoned the chairman to inform him that because of operational matters they could not attend. No matters were raised by the public.

Minutes of the last meeting: Two amendments were made before signing off.

Mitigation measures for the A977: The CC and FORK had written to P&KC regarding the proposed measures. Mr Irons had responded and requested that the CC detail their preferred measures prior to a meeting with P&KC and the local ward councillors. Cllr Barnacle pointed out that the CC had agreed the proposals twice in the past when asked what they wanted the £250000 spent on. The community had agreed on smaller measures rather than one roundabout. It was felt that there were too many plans for things such as cycle paths that would contribute little towards making the road safer. There was only a limited sum available and it was important that the money should be spent wisely. After much discussion, it was felt that signs that lit up and indicated the speed of on-coming vehicles would be the most cost-effective way of slowing up the traffic and making the road safer. It was generally agreed that the whole project was underfunded. The volume of traffic, and the anticipated increase in volume, was a major concern which should be dealt with by implementing all the proposed measures. However, the priorities in the short term which were identified by the community were items 3, 4, and 5 from the list plus, a) signs which lit up and indicated the speed of the oncoming vehicles, and b) a Puffin style crossing in Crook of Devon on the road north of the Institute.

The meeting with the council and local councillors should also include representatives from Kinross CC and FORK.

The community also recorded their thanks to Cllr Barnacle for his efforts in securing the £250000 from the Scottish Government.

Lambhill forest: No more information at present but Jenny Crick will be contacted by Marion Anness for an up-date.

War Memorial, Blairingone: There seems to be some disagreement between the developer and the council over the site which has delayed the removal of the scaffolding on the site. Members of the public were concerned that this should be resolved before Remembrance Sunday. The CC will write to P&KC. There was a suggestion that contacting the press might yield results. Also contacting the British Legion was discussed.

CC Business: Sandy Morrison reported that Trudy Duffy-Wigman had attended a meeting of the Convention of Perth and Kinross CCs. It was thought to be good to keep in contact as it may help influence P&KC re finance and assistance. A Model Code regarding CCs and how they should operate has been produced by the Scottish Government. The code has not yet been sent out by P&KC and the chair will follow this up with P&KC.

P&K Councillors Reports: Cllr Barnacle had contact from residents in Blairingone expressing their concerns over stones on the verges. He is in discussion with the council to assist with their removal. Cllr Robertson was dealing with

complaints about over-grown hedges. He also announced that the Loch Leven Community Campus would be hosting an Open Day on 22 November. All welcome. He also confirmed that the facilities would be available for community groups. There is also a new Health Centre.

Development Proposal: There is a proposal from Thomson Homes for a development of 300 houses at Powmill. As it is a sizeable development, there will be a special meeting to discuss and consult with the developers. The meeting is on 16 November at 7.30pm in Mowbray Hall, Powmill. Residents from the Fossoway area are urged to attend this special meeting.

Planning Applications

09/01657/FLL Alterations and extension to house, Threapmuir Farm, Kinross, KY13 0LL. Extension to existing farmhouse buildings. No CC comment.

09/01650/FLL Erection of a dwelling house and garage, land 30 metres south-east of Mill Cottage, Crook of Devon. Four-bedroomed house, 1½ storeys of conventional design on a green field site. No CC comment.

09/01489/FLL, Erection of a log cabin (holiday let) (plot 1) Cairn fold Bungalow, Blairingone, FK14 7ND. An application for a log cabin for a holiday let. The site is a complex one with several other permissions granted. A previous application, 08/01597/FUL, was withdrawn. The CC approved but with reservations on siting, relationship to other applications on the site and its purpose. The current application does not address these issues. CC's recommendation: Refusal, on the grounds of commercial viability and location on a complex site.

09/01686/FLL Change of use of former MoD property to office accommodation, NATO complex, Kinross, KY13 0NW. Though this site is not in the CC area, concern was expressed about the current security lighting and the impact on the roads in the area. Recommendation: Letter to P&KC, asking for lighting levels to be restricted in the new development.

Appeal

08/00687/OUT. Two houses on land adjacent to Churchmouse Cottage, Carnbo.

General Correspondence: All in-coming and out-going correspondence was available for reading and comment. The chairman made the following comments: a) ASCC. The CC has renewed its membership. b) Redrawing boundaries for voting in Powmill area. Noted, no action necessary. c) Milnathort Community Police Check event. Cllr Robertson explained about the event and the scheme. Fossoway CC to investigate further. d) STUC conference, no volunteers. e) Recycling in Perth and Kinross. CC to follow up and arrange a presentation.

Other Business: There was a concern that parking at St Serf's Church in Crook of Devon was beginning to cause obstruction. The church itself would look into the matter. The telephone kiosk at Powmill was available for adoption by the village, parish or CC for £1. There was discussion as to the merits of this arrangement but nothing was decided. More information was required.

The next meeting of Fossoway & District CC will take place at Carnbo Village Hall on Tuesday 1st December at 7.30pm.

News from the October Meeting

The CC met on 19 October in the Tabernacle Hall, Blairadam. As only three CCllrs were able to attend, the Chairman said that although all items on the agenda would be discussed, no decisions would be taken. Apologies for absence were received from Richard Jeffrey, Margaret Traylor and Sandy Morton. In attendance were P&K Cllr Mike Barnacle, PC Lynn Petrie and the C&B Newsletter Editor with 10 members of the public.

Crime Prevention: PC Petrie had very little to report, apart from the theft of a plant pot in early September, and a case of fly tipping at Maryburgh in October. It was possible to establish the identity of those who had dumped the rubbish and action had been taken. Fly tipping is an increasing problem, not just in our area but all over the countryside, with farmers and others suffering from this form of desecration. We are asked to take this matter seriously, and to note registrations of suspect vans and lorries which are driving around, and also to have if possible a description of the occupants of these vehicles, and to report at once. It is also helpful to see if there is any form of identification among the rubbish which is being dumped, all of which can aid the police in their work.

The Chairman asked if there was any further information as to how Loch Glow might be promoted for leisure activities next year. Agreed that a contact with the fishermen would be helpful.

Cllr Barnacle is still awaiting a response from Till Hill concerning the entrances to the Forestry which can encourage the activities of the "undesirable" users of the hill road.

Tracks and Trails: Cllr Barnacle said that he had had comments to make on the proposals – this matter to be kept on the agenda.

Procedural Changes: Patricia Kitchin and Hugh Somerville had attended a long and useful meeting on this very important matter – Community Engagement in the Planning process/New Development Plans – Perth and Kinross:

The changes would include the following:-

Tayplan 2014 – this would involve the whole of the region i.e. Dundee, Perth and Kinross, Angus and North Fife.

The six development plans would now fall into one Development Plan.

The Council would be responsible for Neighbour Notification and boundaries would be increased to 20m.

Objections must be lodged within 21 days although the CC may ask for a 7 day extension if there is no meeting before the deadline.

It is most important that we all monitor the weekly lists – this affects the whole community – please do not wait to submit your comments, otherwise it might be too late.

Six objections are valid, although each household, not each member of the household, counts as one.

The CC counts as one.

A major development consists of 50 or more houses, 49 and under is a local development.

Appeals – a delegated decision will involve 3 councillors, with no obligation to visit the site.

A non delegated decision involves the Scottish Minister.

The CC can ask for an application to go on hold if there is no meeting within 21 days.

The full report of this meeting is available for anyone to read – please contact any member of the CC.

It was reported that the MSPs had asked for the Fast Track

procedure.

The Chairman said that the Website is very slow to respond and that something should be done to resolve this unsatisfactory situation.

She ended with two pieces of advice – the whole community must be involved in the planning process and keep to the deadline. She reminded the meeting that we had missed the deadline to comment on the proposed Wind Turbine at Nivingston.

It was reported that the Civic Trust had expressed concern at the plethora of individual turbines. A small single turbine will be permitted as from March 2010, subject to conditions.

Planning Applications

The following had been approved:

Woodlands, Nivingston – alterations and extension to garage. West Mains, Cleish.

Greenacres (retrospectively) the Planning Department are very reluctant to come to a meeting suggested by the CC.

The following are still pending: Woodlands (erection of 3 houses), Lochran Moss, Sunnyside, Kirkdale, Boreland Farm, Cleish Mill Farm, Dunvegan. For some reason Boreland Farm has disappeared from the website.

Chance Inn – application for 10 houses, reduced from 17. It was asked if this should not be the subject of a new application.

Housing in the Countryside – Policy Review: The Revised Policy was passed on 30 September 2009.

Roads: The tree stump at the entrance to the cemetery had been removed. Work has been done on the road at Templeton Farm

The next meeting of Cleish & Blairadam CC will take place on Monday 7 December at 7.30pm in Cleish Village Hall.

A Himalayan Climb

High on the mountain a cloud of spindrift tore across the upper slopes and out into space, the swirling snow briefly obscuring the rising sun. It was 7.30am and there was no sign of human activity. We feared that high winds over Ama Dablam would keep the climbers pinned into Camp 3 on what had been planned as summit day.

The tension was considerable, knowing that the five climbers and four sherp as above included my 16 year old son, Calum, who was extending his October school holiday in order to climb a 22,000 ft Himalayan peak. I wondered how he was dealing with the wind, the snow and the cold on a mountain which Sir Edmund Hillary had once described as "unclimbable".

We arrived in Kathmandu on 4 October, joining friend and mountain guide, Sandy Allan, along with other members of our Team Ascent expedition. Three days later, with food and equipment for a month in the mountains, we clambered into a small plane for our flight to the Everest region. This was scary. Mist and rain obscured most of the landscape until we suddenly plunged down through a gap in the clouds. Moments later, somewhat relieved, we landed at a tiny airstrip perched between terraced fields and a steep rocky hillside.

Two days later the sun came out and marvellous weather followed – blue skies every day. Only Everest, with its everpresent plume of cloud and wind blown snow, reminded us that up near the summits conditions were going to be harsh. For over two weeks we prepared for Ama Dablam, walking several hours a day through fields, villages, forests and rugged hillsides. We slowly adjusted to the altitude, resting frequently. We practised our climbing techniques and ascended through steep snow and ice to 20,000 ft on a training peak. We walked to Everest base camp and then fin ally arrived at Ama Dablam base camp on 19 October.





At this stage plans had to change – a chest infection was constraining my acclimatisation. Having had my voice box removed in a hospital operation in January, as a result of cancer, I was already restricted to breathing through a hole (stoma) in my throat. So a more passive role followed as I swallowed the antibiotics and prepared to follow the climbing action with my binoculars.

For three days I watched the climbers move up to Camp 1 and then along a narrow ridge. Rock slabs, pinnacles and towers barred the way. Rest was not easy, in small tents perched on ledges over massive precipices. The approach to the final camp required steady balance with steep snow slopes falling away to each side and large ice cliffs nearby. Then, at 7.45am on 25 October, the wind began to ease. The climbers appeared, ant like figures, black dots on a white backdrop, slowly moving up the snowy ridge that led to the top. Just after 1pm they reached the summit and excited voices over the radio said everything was OK. Summit photos were soon followed by a steady descent to the camps below. Four hours later Calum reported he was back in camp 3, drinking tea and getting the warmth returning to his fingers and toes. Next day the climb ended with the long descent to base camp, covering the final slopes by moonlight. Then followed the satellite phone call home to Kinnesswood to report the good news of a successful climb - and to hear about the excitement of the first few days in the new Kinross High School!

What is an e-Bike?

Local residents will have noticed the former 'Hope Chest' premises being fitted out in recent weeks. Proprietor Bob Watson told the Newsletter more about the new business starting there:

From its position in Kinross High Street, close to the start of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail, **The Scottish eBike Centre** sells and rents electric bicycles along with standard bicycles. The first thing most people ask though is: "What is an electric bicycle?" Basically, an electric bicycle is just like a normal bicycle but it is fitted with an electric motor in either the front or the rear wheel and has, usually, a Lithium Ion battery to provide the power. To operate it, the rider can pedal as normal or use a "throttle" to get assistance when required – particularly for hills or headwinds.

Most people will view an electric bike like a "moped" except the big difference is that an electric bike has absolutely no emissions and is extremely cheap to run – around the equivalent of 1000mpg! The important thing though, is that an electric bicycle or electric powered tricycle gets you out and about on a bicycle without you breaking into a sweat. If hills, headwinds, longer distances, getting on a bit or illness were once a hindrance, an electric bicycle can remove these boundaries and leave nothing but wide-open freedom and fun.

Not only will The Centre be selling electric bicycles but they will be available for hire and we will be working with local hotels and other businesses to provide "Cycle Break Holidays" in and around Kinross. This should help to bring much needed tourism into the town.

Customers can rent an ebike by the half-day and we are catering for whole families by having standard bicycles available for rent as well as kids' bikes. The Loch Leven Heritage Trail provides an easy and safe day out for everyone.

We also do not expect everyone in Kinross to suddenly decide to buy an electric bicycle and we will be advertising The Centre all over Scotland. Kinross is easy to get to from virtually anywhere in Scotland due to its proximity to the motorway network and once again, we are hoping that this will increase the amount of people coming to Kinross.

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Local children need you

A safe and welcoming home is something that most of us enjoy. It is something that all children need. Some children, however, cannot rely on their own families to care for them. For vulnerable children, foster carers and adoptive parents can provide a vital lifeline to a safe and happy start in life. The rewards of fostering or adoption can be as great for the carers as they are for the youngsters.

Ann adopted two children, sister and brother. She says: "Adoption can be an amazing outcome for families. The bond we have with our children is exceptional, they are incredible, loving children and every day they make us

proud to be their parents."

Lesley, who has been fostering children for four years, says: "The good things about fostering are working with the kids and seeing the results as they grow and recover in our care." P&KC is appealing for more people to open their homes and lives to local children and young people needing a secure and caring family environment.

The Council is looking for a range of carers:

- Foster carers for children of varying ages, to provide a supportive family home on a long-term basis;
- Full-time carers for teenagers;
- Adoptive families for sibling groups, to give a permanent home to help brothers and sisters stay together; and
- Carers willing to provide supported accommodation for young people over 16 leaving care and moving on to independent living. In most cases the young person would be attending work or college.

Andy Turnbull, Service Manager, P&KC Children's Services, stresses the amount of support and training that carers receive:

"As all families will know, looking after children can at times be difficult. If youngsters need to turn to foster carers or to adoption for a secure family life, it may mean that they have had to live through difficult experiences they need help to move on from. We provide every foster carer and adoptive family with on-going support from the time they make their first enquiry for as long as they need it."

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Janice, a foster carer for teenagers, says: "The initial training and preparatory process is thorough and well presented, with ample opportunity for open discussion. Good quality training is available on an ongoing basis, covering a wide range of subjects to help meet carers' needs, extend your knowledge or develop your skills. Every foster carer has their own support worker, and assistance is always readily available. There is also a good support network of carers and regular opportunities to meet with people who understand what you are striving to achieve and why you do it."

Ann backs this up in terms of support for adoptive parents: "We had to attend an intensive preparation group which helped us to understand the needs of children, to develop parenting strategies and prepare for lifestyle changes. This was very helpful and we have remained in touch with other people in the group. This has been an important source of support. We have also had excellent support and advice from the Council's Permanence Team. They have been very responsive to our needs. The needs of our adopted children will change as they grow up and there will probably be long periods when we don't require advice but we know it is there for us and the children at any time."

As well as support and training, allowances are provided for carers, and a salary for teenage foster carers.

Councillor Elizabeth Grant, Convener for Lifelong Learning, underlined the important role that carers play:

"It is vital that we as adults do all we can to give children and young people a happy start in life. Carers, through fostering or adoption, can make this possible for vulnerable children."

Andy Turnbull says: "If you feel you could give a child or young person the care and support they need, through fostering or adoption, or by providing supported accommodation, please get in touch. We will be happy to answer your questions and give you the information you need."

One of the boats which ferries visitors across the waters to Lochleven Castle now proudly bears the name "Mary's Spirit" thanks to local schoolgirl Rosie Cormack.

Earlier this year the 10-year-old won a competition in which Kinross Primary School pupils were invited to come up with a name for the vessel.

There were lots of excellent entries, but Rosie's was the winner because it captured the romance of the castle and its links to Mary, Queen of Scots.

Now the name has been painted on the side of the boat and a little plaque has been fixed inside which commemorates the competition and its winner, who was nine at the time.

In October Rosie and her mum Elaine and brother David were invited along to take a look at Mary's Spirit.

She said: "I picked the name because we had been doing a project on Mary, Queen of Scots at school and because of the story that her ghost still wanders the castle."

The queen was imprisoned at the castle for nearly a year before making her escape in 1568, after which her forces were defeated at the battle of Langside and she fled across the border to exile in England.

Willie McMaster, the Lochleven Castle guide who organised the competition, said: "It seemed a shame that a boat which takes visitors to and from the castle did not have a name, and it seemed like a good idea to ask the schoolchildren to help.

"We were very impressed with the number of good ideas and it was hard to choose just one winner.

"But we went for Mary's Spirit because so many of the people who come here are fascinated by the tale of how she escaped from the castle by boat."

Rosie's prize was a £40 book token and a trip to the castle in the boat she named

Duncan retires after 11 years at Lochleven

Duncan McMillan, monument manager of Lochlev en Castle for the past eleven years, has retired.

Mr McMillan said: "I've really loved my time here. The island is such a peaceful place, and whichever way you look the view is beautiful.

"While I've been here we have had thousands of visitors from all over the world, like Hawaii, Alaska, Russia and the old Iron Curtain countries, and further east from China.

"Some people love the place and come back year after year and sometimes you build up a real rapport with visitors".

"I remember one American group leader and his woman assistant who brought a group here as part of a tour of the gardens of Scotland. The next year they returned with a bottle of champagne. They had got married that day and wanted to toast the event on the island. A couple of years after that they were back with their first child."

Mr McMillan spent 32 years with the Fife police before becoming involved with the heritage industry, spending a year at Glamis Castle, which is closely associated with the Queen Mother. But it was while working for Historic Scotland at Lochleven he first met a royal, in 2001 when he provided Princess Margaret with a guided tour of the castle. Other visitors have included the screen historians and personalities David Starkey and Neil Oliver.

The job at the castle appealed to Mr McMillan because he had always been interested in history, and also had fond childhood memories of fishing expeditions with his dad on boats out on the River Forth.

At 65, however, a whole new chapter is opening up. "My wife has lots of plans for us, and I'm looking forward to spending lots of time walking the dogs and I'm also hoping to blow the cobwebs off my golf clubs."

Grants for private water supplies

If your home or business is served by a private water supply such as a burn, borehole or spring, you can receive up to £800 in grant from Perth & Kinross Council to improve the safety of your water.

Private water supplies are especially vulnerable to contamination which can cause illnesses such as E.coli 0157 or campylobacter.

Grants are available to fund work that will protect water supplies from contamination, such as tank improvements, disinfection treatment systems, fencing around water sources or establishing a new source.

Over 300 properties in Perthshire have already benefited from grants totalling more than £225,000. Grants are not means tested.

One group of residents near Blairgowrie used their grant to assist with the costs of renewing the protection of their spring source. They also installed new tanks and treatment systems at their properties.

Martin Barrow, a resident who led the project, said:

"The availability of the grant from the Council made the cost more acceptable as we were able to put every householder's grant towards the project which lowered the end cost to each property.

"The Council team were very helpful and did everything they could to assist us in upgrading our system in the most practical way, and so we were able to bring it in on time and only a little over budget."

Community Safety Convener, Councillor Willie Robertson, said:

"The Council's Water Team is available to carry out free checks of private water supplies. A member of the Team will examine the water source and its infrastructure, provide advice on possible improvements, and explain the simple process of applying for grant assistance. A clean water supply is obviously essential to good health. If you have a private water supply I would encourage you to contact the Team and find out if any action is required to keep your water safe."

The speaker at the November meeting was textile and costume expert, Naomi Tarrant, whose topic was "Simply Samplers". The emphasis was on Scottish samplers and although we saw an English example dating back to 1598, the earliest known Scottish example dates from 1710. Early samplers were stitched in green and red, but gradually, other colours appear. While it is often assumed they were stitched by young girls, some were the work of more mature women. Early examples lack the letters J and U. Popular patterns include Adam and Eve, rosebush trees, milkmaids, and dogs chasing rabbits. Lilies were a popular flower and often seen animals were leopards, lions, deer and the unicorn.

Young girls were rewarded for mastering the art of plain sewing by being permitted to work on a sampler, many of which featured a religious admonition or an example such as "I have done this to let you see what care my parents took of me." By the seventeenth century, girls were given an education to enable them to look after a household or get a job as a seamstress. Similarities in some samplers show the influence of local school mistresses. Their pupils certainly went out into the world well prepared for their stitching duties.

Probus Club

The speaker for the meeting on 21 October was Bill Connolly, a member of the club and his subject a holiday that he and his wife, Jean, had in the United States of America in



May of last Year. They were met at the airport by members of Montgomery County Police Force who provided a motorcycle escort for their car into Washington city.

The United States of America has a special day, 15 May, when it remembers all the policemen and officers of other agencies such as the FBI and the customs killed while on duty. The practice dates back to 1962 when President John F. Kennedy signed a decree designating 15 May as "Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Day", and the week on which it falls as a special remembrance for the police and other agencies. Bill showed a series of pictures of his holiday with particular emphasis on events to mark this special week. The memorial to the officers is in Washington DC and consists of two walls on either side of a memorial pond, where the names of every single officer killed while on duty are recorded. Each year there is a special picnic to commemorate these officers to which parents of those who lost their lives are invited and during the proceedings the names of all those killed during the past year are read out. Last year 190 names were read out. Robin Webster gave the vote of thanks.

The speaker for the meeting on 4 November was Dr John Blair, and his title was "The Conscript Doctors". John, as well as being a doctor, is a military historian and with others wrote "The History of the RAMC." The RAMC has an illustrious history but John wanted to concentrate on the period 1945 to 1960. This period is unique in the history of Britain, because it is the only time when there has been conscription during peacetime. The National Service Act decreed that every British male should serve two years with the armed forces and five years with the Reserves on reaching the age of 18. Many had their national service deferred until they had finished their training. This applied to all the doctors in the RAMC who completed their five years medical course before being called up. During these 15 years British forces were spread all over the world, including such places as Korea, Malaysia and Kenya. In all these conflicts the RAMC was there to give its medical support to the troops. They also looked after the health of the large number of troops in Germany guarding against the threat of an attack from Russia. 

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Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire Milnathort Town Hall

On 2 May 1855 a special dinner was held to mark the opening of Milnathort Town Hall, a significant occasion for this rapidly expanding Kinross-shire market town and weaving village. It was the idea of James Simpson of Mawcarse, a local gentleman farmer of some influence in the county, whose notion was to give the settlement a building of status that could act as a meeting place as well as a centre of administration. Built at The Cross, which had become the focal point of the town following the construction of the new turnpike roads, its steeple rises to 95 feet to form a prominent landmark in the heart of Milnathort.


The Town Hall, which was built at a cost of £800, was designed to hold 400 people at public meetings and social occasions but also had its own jail and constabulary office. The main body of the building straddles the Back Burn which provided water via a lade to the meal mill that once stood on the opposite side of The Cross on the south side of the Stirling Road. The arched doorway and louvered windows above lead the eye upwards past a clock with illuminated dials to the lead spire and weather vane, the whole frontage forming an elegant Gothic Revival style tower. Outside the main door is one of the many water pumps that once provided the people of Milnathort with water.

The village of Milnathort continued to grow with the subsequent arrival of the railway in 1858 and the building of a power loom factory and spinning mill and dyeworks in 1858 and 1866. Too small to meet the needs of the people, an enlarged and renovated town hall was eventually inaugurated in December 1887 when a concert was held to mark the occasion. Remnants of the interior decor reflect attempts to create a salon-style atmosphere for cultural events such as this.

Portmoak Community Woodland

We now have full details of how you can be involved in our world-record-breaking attempt, on Saturday 5 December, to plant the largest number of trees by volunteers in one hour at different sites. Our new community woodland has been chosen by the Woodland Trust as one of only three of their sites in Scotland for this mighty effort. As their partners in managing the woodland, the Portmoak Community Woodland Steering Group are hoping for a very good turn out from the Kinross area.

It's part of a UK wide event called Tree O Clock, a BBC Breathing Spaces project. On a newly acquired site at Kilmagad Wood, next to the A911, just outside Scotlandwell, we're aiming to plant 2500 mixed woodland trees. No experience is needed, young and old are welcome but please bring your own spade

The planting will be from 1100 to 1200 precisely. We need you to arrive by 1030 am, latest, as we have to count everyone who'll be taking part and make sure you know what to do. The entire event has to meet the Guiness World Record criteria.

Afterwards there will be hot drinks, soup and rolls and home baking. There'll also be craft demonstrations and participation (including woven willow tree decorations) and traditional wooden games to try, from giant ninepin skittles to 'bat the rat' and 'tic tac toe'.

The event forms the last day of our planting week, in which ten classes of children from local schools will participlate in tree planting on the site. We're starting with an empty field (the Field Abin the Kirk) but by the time we've finished there'll be a whole new native woodland, to add to our existing two. We hope you'll want to help create this lasting legacy.

Winter is a time for putting one's feet up, eating lots of rich food and staying warm. Not in the cycling world! Winter is the time



for laying the foundation of fitness-long rides (2-3 hours) at a comfortable, steady pace. It is essential, however, that adequate preparation is made for winter riding. Your bicycle must be in good condition and displaying front and rear lights in low light conditions. Make sure your tyres are adequate for winter roads. Carry spare tubes and the equipment to inflate them! Practise changing a tube in the com fort of your own home - if you ride enough, you will get a puncture out and about. Arguably, you should even carry a spare tyre. You, the rider, should have adequate clothing and decent gloves for cold conditions. Forget fashion - high visibility jackets, ideally with light reflection strips, are essential. Spoke reflectors and lights give visibility from the side. Take these steps and you can avoid the dreaded SMIDSY ("Sorry mate, I didn't see you"). Drivers of motor vehicles should take special care in poor winter conditions when encountering cyclists. If all this sounds like too much, get a turbo trainer and set your bike up in the garage or shed. Just make sure you take your iPod or similar to entertain yourself!



Health and Fitness

(New regular feature)

My name is Tony Brotherton and I am a personal fitness trainer based in the

Kinross area, where I run my business Fit and Happy. I am delighted to be have the opportunity to write a regular monthly article on health and exercise related topics for the Newsletter. This month something for everyone:

Nordic Walking - Great exercise in the outdoors!

The gym environment not for you? Want to enjoy the company of friends and feel the health benefits? Do you enjoy fresh air and scenery? Then why not Nordic walk your way to greater fitness or to lose that little bit of extra weight and at the same time meet new friends?

I recently attended a Nordic walking instructor-training course in Cardiff run by Nordic Walking UK and was pleasantly surprised to find that it was significantly more than just walking with poles! It is in fact a structured progressive exercise concept that can be tailored to each individual taking part but which has the collective spirit of a good walk out with friends. It is one of the fastest growing outdoor activities and is suitable for all ages.

Nordic walking is a lower intensity option to running or jogging and attracts people who wish to lose weight and/or gain health. With the involvement of over 90% of the skeletal muscles in Nordic walking propulsion, numerous studies have shown the increased health gains of this type of exercise over normal walking when engaging the use of poles. An 18% increase in energy expenditure by women and 21% by men burns more calories per stride! This energy expenditure comes without a significant increase in perceived exertion. With the correct technique, the poles do the work!

Nordic walking is an outdoor activity and a third of UK adults, when asked, said they prefer to exercise outdoors. We have some beautiful local scenery in which to enjoy this activity throughout the year. Participants can choose to get into their own personal rhythm or chat as they walk along with their friends. Groups are no bigger that 12 walkers and walks are about an hour.

The health and social benefits are significant given regular participation. You need only some suitable outdoor clothing, footwear and a small rucksack for refreshments and something to eat along the way. Numerous studies have shown that exercising outdoors generally leads to increased overall activity levels, has a positive effect on mood and reduces stress levels.

My training was really enjoyable and very thorough. Supported by the Nordic Walking UK national body, I propose to introduce and lead group walks based from the Kinross area. Established walks will be about one hour long and, on the whole, relatively flat. We will have some fun on the way! The walk will be timetabled and composed of a warm up, cardiovascular and resistance components and finishing with a cool down and some stretching. You need have no previous experience and it's suitable for all ages. Walkers will have to complete a PARQ (physical activity readiness questionnaire) before starting the taster session.

All equipment is provided. Please note that Nordic walking poles are not basic hiking poles.

If this all sounds like a different language then it's about time you started up the internet and logged on as a new member of one of the above just to discover what it's all about. 


