"No issues of concern over Gordon Banks' expenses"

It is excellent news for our MP that, unlike three of his Labour colleagues who are under Police investigation and face possible prison sentences, his expense claims have given no cause for concern. He has acted within the rules.

In 2007-08, our MP claimed £23,083 Additional Cost Allowance. The maximum permissible is £24,000, so his claim was within the rules. I did, however, note with interest that not all MPs claimed a sum close to the maximum. Michael Meacher MP claimed £8,944, while Vince Cable MP claimed £0.

After his election in 2005, Gordon Banks claimed over £10,000 for legal fees and stamp duty incurred in buying a London property. This was within the rules.

Yet it rankles to think that the taxpayer has to pick up the tab for our politicians buying and selling property, generally for a fat profit. The departing MP Geoff Hoon has reportedly built up property assets of £1.7 million by buying and selling property. It seems he has paid not a penny piece in Capital Gains Tax while, doubtlessly, charging the Stamp Duty and legal fees to the Taxpayer: all within the rules.

Do you know what your MP earned in the year in question? £64,766, over and above his expenses, a sum described by many MPs as 'inadequate'.

I shall bear all this in mind when I cast my vote in the coming months.

Walking for the rainforest

Pupils from Kinross Primary School braved the elements in fancy dress on Tuesday 2 February to raise funds for a rain forest campaign.

The walk was sponsored, and Sky, working in conjunction with the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF), has promised to match any money raised by the school. The money will be used by WWF in their efforts to prevent deforestation.

The class is also busy creating a play about the rain forest, the 'Lost Tribe', which will be performed to parents who will also be able to see a fashion show of the outfits worn on the walk.

Planning meetings for Fossoway

Cllr Mike Barnacle has written to all residents in Fossoway, encouraging them to attend public meetings to make their views known on future development for Fossoway. The meetings will take place in March.

P&KC has received significant proposals for development in Fossoway from builders. The Council's Planning Service will have to appraise these for the Main Issues Report for the new single Development Plan. (This Plan covers the whole of Perth & Kinross and will replace the old Local Plans.) When taken together, the development proposals for Fososway add up to six residential sites at Blairingone, four at Carnbo, 13 at Crook of Devon/Drum and five at Powmill. At the public meetings Cllr Barnacle will report on the findings of questionnaires which he has previously circulated to the community and update residents on recent house completions and populations changes. He would also like to outline the proposals put forward by the development sector and let residents know about the timescales for comment on the new single Development Plan and TAYPlan, a strategic plan drawn up by Perth & Kinross, Dundee, Angus and Fife Councils.

Maintenance work on Heritage Trail

Maintenance works on the Loch Leven Heritage Trail began on Monday 15 February, requiring temporary path closures during the five weeks of the works.



The following sections of path will be repaired and resurfaced:

- Kinross Pier to Kirkgate Park
- Kirkgate Park to Mary's Gate
- Mary's Gate to Burleigh Sands Car Park
- Carsehall and Blackwoods from Loch Leven's Larder and Grahamstone Farm
- Levenmouth Woods from Grahamstone Farm and Findatie Car Park
- Findatie Car Park to RSPB Vane Farm Visitor Centre In the interests of public safety, these sections will be closed during the works. Alternative routes will be signposted and the Trail will be open as normal at weekends.

Local Councillor and Chairman of TRACKS, Cllr Willie Robertson said: "The Trail attracts an estimated 150,000 visitors each year, and to ensure the continued popularity of the path, the Council aims to maintain it to a high standard through regular maintenance. These works have been timed so the repairs and resurfacing are done at a quiet time of the year."

Any inconvenience caused as a result of the closures is regretted.

Cold weather payment progress

Many residents in the Ochil and South Perthshire constituency who are entitled to cold weather payments have been treated more fairly this winter after the introduction of an additional monitoring station.

In winter 2008-09, Gordon Banks, MP for the area, put pressure on the Dept of Work & Pensions, pointing out the unfairness of hilly, rural parts of his constituency having to rely on the weather station at Leuchars in Fi & registering a sustained period of freezing temperatures before cold weather payments were triggered.

In October 2009 the Dept of Work & Pensions agreed to a new monitoring station at Strathallan. Most of the postcode areas affected by the change are in Perthshire and parts of Stirling. The Kinross area continues to be monitored by the Leuchars station.

Cold weather payments are made to people on Pension Credit, Income Support and some other benefits. The first payments triggered by the new station were made in late December 2009.

Mr Banks said: "The introduction of a new station at Strathallan gives more accurate data for those residents now covered by this station, and this means that people can benefit more appropriately from local temperature measurement."

Policy needed on single wind turbines

Cllr Mike Barnacle and Fossoway & District CC have called on Perth & Kinross Council to issue guidance on the building of single and small cluster wind turbines.

Both the Councillor and the CC made their comments in letters of objection to the Council on a planning application for the erection of three 15kw wind turbines at Barnhill, Powmill.

Cllr Barnacle writes: "I have noted a recent spate of single and small cluster wind turbine applications, usually recommended for approval by the planning service despite the fact that I understand we have, as a Council, no current policy to assess same, although I am assured by Nick Brian it is being worked on. I suggest strongly that until such a policy for assessing single/small turbine proposals is in place, we should not as a Council be approving same. These applications appear to be examined in isolation with no account of possible cumulative impact of a number of applications in a community area. I would rather see a cluster development to serve a community in an appropriate location than a proliferation of individual proposals."

The Councillor is also critical of P&KC's decisions to allow housing development at Barnhill and nearby Pitfar and Tethyknowe, saying: "all within a distance of 1.5km there will be three significant groups of new houses served by inadequate narrow rural roads and visually very prominent on hill sites. This is wholly unsustainable and there remains a complete lack of overview of the cumulative effect of planning decisions on the Kinross-shire landward area of Fossoway and a clear determination to sanction creeping settlement development throughout my ward area, contrary to the local plan and representation."

New workers at the Web Project

The Web Project, which offers young people advice and support, has welcomed two new workers to its base in Milnathort.

The project encourages community involvement of young people and provides support around risk behaviours, such as alcohol and drug misuse and sexual health

The WEB is funded by the NHS, The Gannochy Trust, Lottery Fund and Perth and Kinross Alcohol and Drug Partnership.

The services The WEB provides include pregnancy testing, Chlamydia testing and the C Card scheme.

Workers can meet young people in the local base or somewhere else where they feel safe. The service is completely free and confidential.

On Monday and Friday there are sexual health drop-ins, which run from 3.45pm until 5pm. Young people can pop in and access the WEB services.

On Thursdays there is a more general health drop-in from 7pm until 9pm. These are informal sessions where topics chosen by the young people are discussed. Young people can also get involved in volunteering.

Marielle of the Web Project says: "We are having an **Open Day** on **Saturday 27 February** between 11am and 2pm at our base on a drop-in basis. Come along for a chat and find out more about our work with young people in the Kinross-shire area. We are undertaking a needs analysis of the area and your opinions would be most welcome. Our friendly workers look forward to meeting you!"

Launched in October 2009, KCSP's aim is to provide 'Community Driven, Professionally Supported' sports development in the area. The partnership has had initial success in helping the KGV Management Committee to get the synthetic pitch rejuvenated, and in enabling the use of the new facilities at the campus. The next step is now to develop links and engage even more with local sports people to develop the potential that exists in Kinross-shire.

The Club Forum will highlight the work that has already taken place within a number of local sports clubs and give people present the opportunity to discuss their own needs with those organisations. Representatives from the Council's Sports Development and Active Schools teams, Perth & Kinross Leisure, Perth and Kinross Sports Council and national body sportscotland will also be present to offer advice to anyone planning their own club's development.



Second walks guide published

Perthshire based Catkin Press has published the second volume of *Experience Big Tree Country – 12 walks around Perthshire* by Felicity Martin. This colourful title complements the first volume with a further selection of care fully researched walks in Perth & Kinross.

The guide includes walks from Perth, Portmoak, Aberfeldy, Auchterarder, Blair Atholl, Blairgowrie, Bridge of Earn, Comrie, Crieff, Dunkeld, Kenmore and Pitlochry.

The cover of volume 2 shows a view over Pitlochry to a snowy Ben Vrackie, which is the most demanding walk in the book. The easiest walk is a 2-mile route through Quarrymill Woodland Park in Perth to the memorial to the great plant hunter David Douglas in Scone.



Outdoor writer and photographer Felicity Martin provides clear descriptions of the walks, each of which is presented on a double page spread with numbered route points and a map. Additional information and photographs highlight the special aspects of Perthshire's natural heritage that make it 'BigTree Country'.

Clare and Sue trek Peru

Two Kinross-shire women are taking up a very special challenge this year, to raise money for the charity Breast Cancer Care.

Clare Abbott and Sue Smith of Scotlandwell will undertake a sponsored trek in Peru in September. Trek Peru 2010 involves trekking for five days for up to eight hours a day in the mountains and valleys of the Lares region, reaching a height of 5682 metres. Clare and Sue have committed to raise £7,000 in sponsorship, and have paid £500 towards the cost of the trip. The women said: "Breast cancer has come into our lives through both family and close friends. Doing this may go some way to helping those who need it now and in the future."

Community Campus North Access safety issues

There was a Travel Group Steering Committee Meeting on 27 January 2010 held in Loch Leven Community Campus. I outlined our basic issues: pupils on a narrow pavement and having to cross, unassisted, in a 40mph.

The following is not the official minutes; it is my understanding of what was presented to the meeting from various people.

Daryl McKeown from the Roads Department said (with a lot of explanations going on in between, I hasten to add):

In the short term:

- He was due to meet with contractors the following day (28 January) to put up barriers between all exits and roadways (Cllr Willie Robertson had put forward a case to P&KC Roads a while ago). This was carried out in early February.
- Erecting "School" warning signs on both approaches to the North Access – more to make road traffic aware of entrance/exit. This was also carried out early February, though I have queried the fact that the northern sign is in tree cover and will be obscured by leaves during spring/ summer months and have requested that this is looked at.
- Dropping the kerb at the North Access to allow cyclists ease of access.
- The current hatching in the middle of the road will be burnt off and the hatching will move next to the east side pavement. (Either as hatching or as a cycle pathway at least road traffic will be moved further away from the pavement, whilst still reminding pedestrian traffic that something may come down that bit!)
- There will be a new "Milnathort" sign and a new "Kinross" sign as a way of reminding drivers that they are in a 30mph zone see long term below. (The reason the 40mph was introduced was to make a definition between the two villages and was then able to be used as a reminder of the 30mph limit. The old signs are not reflective and do not have any "Please drive carefully" messages the new ones will be and will have).

In the long term:

- He will be proposing to Council to reduce the speed limit to 30mph this has to go through a legislative process. Given the nature of where and why, he's hoping to be able to hasten the process a bit. It may still take anything up to about five months (normally the Council do follow Roads dept recommendations not always, but most times).
- Continual monitoring of the campus area, which means surveys once a term, taken on different days, different times and different sites – more if situations change, which would then allow community/school/police requests for more surveys.
- Proposal to widen the footway at least in the immediate area of the North entranceway but just as importantly all the way back through on the East side of South Street through Milnathort.
- A crossing of some kind *may* be introduced in the future (whether this be a School Crossing Patroller or something else will be decided at some later date) at the Fairways/ Bridge aud Road area. This then captures primary school pupils going one way and high school going the other.

I did say that all of these would provide at least some interim increase in safety for our pupils and community. However, until all these were in place (and given the fact that, obviously, safety is our first concern and it has been established that issues need to be addressed), then the North Access should be closed. Police and others disagreed – they think education of the pupils, in terms of self-safety, is the way forward. I did say I had reservations about this; however, I did take on board the continuous long-term usage of the North Access and pupil awareness.

Daryl McKeown also went on to say that as members of the LARSOA (now Road Safety GB), the road traffic was not quite enough to request a School Crossing Patroller (SCP) at the site. There needs to be 240 cars (per hour? per day?), and though we are quite near this, resources would not justify a SCP here just yet. Part of the survey did include the gaps between traffic; this, coupled with the road width, is an indication of whether people have enough time to cross in between cars. There was a huge variety of gap sizes, however enough bigger gaps to cross safely.

A SCP is used at the Gallowhill Road Puffin crossing due to the volume of pupils: there are times when the pupil pedestrian traffic overwhelms the green man sign and the SCP is effective at those times to stop the build up of pupils on one side of the road, eventually overspilling.

Mr McKeown reiterated that pupils seem to be extremely good with their road sense; this was also supported by the police.

All in all, I did feel it was quite positive and moving in the right direction and I'm sure that some of these issues would eventually have been looked at as a matter of course. Whether parent and community intervention have hastened this outcome, who knows! Such a shame, though, that someone didn't do their job properly in the first place to have looked at the bigger pedestrian access picture as the campus was being designed.

There were some other issues also covered at the meeting, such as moving the 20mph signage as it was felt that there are too many things happening in the same place (crossing, bus stop and signs) and there were some internal traffic issues that were going to be addressed outside of the meeting.

The next meeting will be on 22 March. I have been invited and hope to be able to advise even more positive news.

Nothing in Council budget for A977

Cllr Mike Barnacle has criticised Perth & Kinross Council for failing to make any provision in its recent budget for mitigation measures on the A977.

Following the completion of the second Kincardine Bridge, there is increased traffic volume, including more heavy goods vehicles, on the A977 and traffic-calming measures are required at villages along the road to improve the safety of residents.

In a memo to all Councillors, Cllr Barnacle reminds his colleagues that at the time of the Kincardine Bridge Public Inquiry in 2004, P&KC identified a package of measures for the A977 costing in excess of £1m. With Cllr Barnacle having secured a sum of £250,000 for mitigation measures from the former Transport Minister, a P&KC Committee Report in October 2006 instructed council officers to pursue the funding shortfall, but 'nothing has happened.'

The Scottish Government will not provide any further funding for mitigation measures: the parliament's petitions committee dismissed the matter as "a council responsibility", despite a strong community petition from west Kinross-shire.

A public meeting is due to take place in Fossoway on 22 February to discuss a reduced list of priorities for the road, but the estimated cost of even these smaller measures is expected to be £313,000. Cllr Barnacle said: "... there is no indication that the short fall of £63,000 can be met from council budgets. As far as the Council is concerned, it would appear that the A977 is 'a forgotten road' when it comes to funding."

In his memo, Cllr Barnacle also observes "that the involvement of local members in preparing and setting our Council budgets has been reduced considerably since I was elected in 1999. It appears to me that the budget is set by the Corporate Management Team of the Council and the Administration Leaders, with very little recourse to local members' views, who are simply requested to rubber-stamp the reports."

10/00043/FLL Careshare Nursery, 30 Station Road: Change of use from children's nursery to residential house.

10/00038/FLL Land to east of Baltree Farm Plot 4: Erection of dwelling house.

There were no objections to any of the above.

10/00059/IPL Former Balado Mushroom Farm: House, garage and farm store (in principle). This application is for the demolition of the old mushroom factory and the erection of a single house with associated buildings. Some concern was raised as to the surface water drainage which will run to the burn at the rear of this site and which may cause flooding at the bottom of the town. It was agreed that we write to the Council expressing our concerns in this matter.

09/01995/IPL 3 Brewery Lane: Erection of four dwelling houses (in principle). These are to be built in the rear garden of 3 Brewery Lane. The CC is concerned as to overdevelopment on such a compacted part of the old town. A new vehicle access was planned on to Brewery Lane, which is narrow and congested as it is. It was noted that objections have been raised by neighbours who add that the building of double storey houses will obstruct the sunlight to their properties. It was agreed that we write to P&KC raising our objections to this application, in that the site is not suitable for a development of this type and also the inadequate access.

09/01869/FLL Tillyochie Farm, Balado, Alterations and extension to house: Approved.

09/01992/LBC and 09/02005/FLL 8 School Wynd, Alt/extension to dwelling house: Approved.

09/02092/FLL Gellybank Farm, erection of wind turbine and formation of road entrance and driveway: Withdrawn.

Other Planning Matters

09/02060/FLLWind Cluster. A letter was received from P&KC advising that our letter of objection was received after the deadline date and would not be referred to the Council's Development Control Committee or referred to in the "Report of Handling" for this application. However, our letter will be passed to the case officer, provided that the officer has not already prepared the report on this application. The officer will assess whether our comments raise any new issues not previously considered and whether these issues require further investigation.

A member of the public commented that this application was not handled appropriately by the Council and that they did not follow the correct procedure. As this application affects our town, consultation should have been offered and the plans and reports should have been made available.

It was answered that it is not possible to have the plans for every application available for the meeting and that we rely on our Planning Officer, CCllr Colliar, to advise us of any application that is controversial. After discussion, it was agreed that we leave matters as they stand.

Planning Training: CCllr Richardson reported that a training meeting is planned for 6 March at the Loch Leven Campus. He will email the information to the Secretary and she will book places.

Retirement Flats at Green Hotel: A member of the public questioned the CC policy on this application. She explained that P&KC have requested the builders to amend their plans following some inconsistencies. The CC will write to P&KC intimating an interest in this application and requesting sight of the revised plans before any determination is reached. Cllr Miller will also approach the Council on this matter. It was mentioned that the proposed building would be 12 metres high and three storeys.

Report from Perth & Kinross Councillors

Speed limit: Cllr Baird reported that the 20mph [section] at the campus has been extended.

School project: Cllr Baird reported on her attendance at the Primary School in relation to "Growing Up With Loch Leven". This project is to be launched nationwide.

Winter maintenance: A recent press report from Kinross residents praised the service. Cllr Baird stated that only one school in the County was closed at New Year and that ice was the greatest problem.

Cllr Miller stated that Kinross roads and paths were cleared quicker than Perth's during the bad weather. He also mentioned that if the temperature falls below -10 the salt proves ineffective and creates more problems.

Refuse disruptions: It was proposed to inform the public by Newsletter or other means of changes in collection, especially those people who were worst affected.

Campus: CCllr Colliar enquired if the roads signs could be replaced. These were taken down to allow the erection of a temporary fence. Cllr Baird will approach the Council on this matter

Masonic Hall: The charge for the use of the hall for our CC meetings is £20.00 and this has been paid up to date.

Premises Licence, Sands Supermark et: This is in relation to the alterations to the shop. No objections were raised on this matter.

Montague Evans: Hoping to attend our March meeting.

Conference: Voluntary Sector Annual Conference, Crieff Hydro Hotel on 5 March.

Convention survey: Reported that 14 out of 28 CCs completed the survey. The information is available now.

Campus: Council notification that the 20mph speed limit at the campus has been extended.

Gritting and snow clearing: Acknowledgement received from the Council to our recent letter.

CC Election: The nomination form has been inserted in the Newsletter with the deadline being 10 March to meet the publication date for the April issue. The election is to be held on 22 April at Millbridge Hall. Cllr Kathleen Baird has offered to be the Returning Officer. It was agreed that the nomination forms would be forwarded unopened to Cllr Baird. As the information will not be available for publication in the Newsletter we will leave it to the Council to publicise the candidates, if required.

Campus booking: A complaint was received from a local resident who had difficulty booking the facilities at the campus to play football. The group was not affiliated to a

club, did not have public liability insurance or qualified coaches. They just wanted to book a regular slot to play football for exercise. The criterion required was not recorded on the website and various clubs from outside Kinross have been allocated places. The Chairman reported that KLEO also experienced difficulty in booking the campus and had been negotiating since October. CCllr Richardson further mentioned that recently due to a problem at KGV, a football group visited the campus to play basketball and were refused admission as they did not have written authority from the Council. He also stated that during his own let the gate remains locked despite assurances that it would be open. MITIE refused to unlock this. Cllr Baird stated that she requires written evidence from the complainers to follow this up with the Council.

Microlight Flying: A letter was received from a member of the public and was read out this evening. The member of the public in his communication summarised the points raised at earlier meetings regarding CCllr Jack's allegation that a microlight was flying at "100 feet and did a loop". example of microlight "Permit to Fly" was attached to the letter.

Other Business

Scottish Motor Auctions: CCllr Colliar mentioned that difficulty was being experienced in renewing their licence for Saturday and Sunday markets. The CC was not consulted. Cllr Baird stated that objections were received in relation to noise levels from vehicles. It was agreed that we write to the Council enquiring as to why the CC is not consulted on matters such as this.

Gordon Place/Springfield Road: CCllr Colliar reported that cars are driving over the pavement at the end of Gordon Place onto Springfield Road, towards Argyll Road. Two trees were sited at this locus, however one died and was removed and not replaced. It was suggested that we write to P&KC requesting either replacement of the tree or the erection of a barrier.

CCllr Colliar again remarked that this was another case where the CC has no consultation in relation to the Licence. Cllr Baird answered that she addressed the Sunday night at the licence meeting.

The next meeting of Kinross CC is to be held at the Masonic Hall on Wednesday 3 March at 7.30pm.

News from the February Meeting

CCllr Giacopazzi, Chairman, welcomed CCllrs Bennet, Porter, Cottingham and Smith to the meeting held on Thursday 11 February. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Baird and Robertson, Minute Secretary E Rougvie, PC Ishbel Wallace from Tayside Police and seven members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllrs Thomson and Lamont.

Co-option: CCllr Giacopazzi introduced Bruce Hamilton, and it was agreed that he should be co-opted to MCC.

The minutes of the December meeting were proposed by CCllr Smith and seconded by CCllr Porter.

Correspondence:

- Letter from P&KC advising that the civil engineers Atkins have appointed a company to carry out inspections of manholes and drainage systems in Milnathort for two to three weeks beginning on 15 February. Atkins representatives will also be speaking to local residents. After discussion, it was ageed that CCllr Bennet will put up a notice on the new notice board in the South Street bus shelter
- Letter from Planning Aid for Scotland about a training session for CCs to be held on 6 March at Loch Leven Community Campus as part of the Community Engagement Planning Process. CCllr Hamilton will attend and CCllr Giacopazzi will make the necessary arrangements.
- Document regarding the strategic development plan TAYplan. CCllr Cottingham will study this. An official consultation will be held next May and further information can be found at www.tayplan-sdpa.gov.uk or via the P&KC website.
- P&KC notification confirming that the school had been booked for MCC meetings until October, although it will not be available in June. CCllr Bennet, Treasurer, advised that the CC had had its funding increased by £100, which would cover the increased hire costs.
- E-mail from Victor Clements, of Aberfeldy CC, listing the consultation documents that he had received. It was felt that too much information was being circulated round CCs. Some documents extended to 80 pages and were very complex.
- P&KC Minutes. The CC was pleased to note that these are now being circulated electronically. CCllr Cottingham will study them.

Police matters: A vehicle had been stolen from Back Loan and had not been traced as yet. Some diesel had been stolen from a local farm and businesses and farmers are urged to be vigilant. Since the last CC meeting PC Easton had checked the park in Back Loan for broken glass, but none had been found.

There had been a complaint about a collie in the Victoria Road area which had frightened some children, although it didn't bite. The public are asked to contact the police if they have any concerns about dogs and action will be taken.

The police were currently targeting areas around schools to catch drivers speeding, using mobile phones or not wearing seatbelts. There had also been discussions about improving road safety at the entrance to the high school at the Milnathort end, as a result of which barriers had been erected and other steps were to be taken to improve the safety of pupils and other users of the campus. In addition the speed limits and signage were being reviewed.

CCllr Giacopazzi expressed concerns about traffic speeding on the Cupar road, heading eastwards out of the village. PC Wallace said the police were aware of the problem and the area was being targeted.

There had been a runaway horse in the village the previous Wednesday which had become distressed and injured itself, as a result of which it died.

Planning matters: The following item was noted: erection of a house and garage at 30 Linden Park Road. CCllr Cottingham also advised that he had earlier circulated details of an application to erect four wind turbines at Ledlation Farm, but had received no comments.

Other business

Compost: CCllr Bennet said that free compost was no longer available in Kinross and people had to go to Perth to get it. Cllr Robertson will investigate.

Abandoned cars: Four cars were parked on an area of land between Fleming Court and Hays Court and appeared to be abandoned. There were concerns about the safety of children who were playing on them. It was agreed that CCllr Bennet will note the registration numbers and contact P&KC's environmental service.

New notice board: There is a new notice board in a bus shelter in South Road and after discussion it was agreed that it should be available for community use. Cllr Bennet will take responsibility for it.

Dog fouling: It was agreed that this problem had become much worse since the snow and Cllr Robertson has written to the appropriate council official, who is to increase patrols. Anyone caught allowing their dog to foul the pavement or park faces prosecution, which it's hoped will serve as a deterrent for other irresponsible owners. Cllr Robertson will also speak to the head teacher of the school to arrange a suitable time for dog wardens to visit, as there is evidence of dog fouling outside the school gates.

Milnathort in Bloom: CCllr Bennet said there was a vacant plot in South Street that would be suitable for an orchard. After discussion, it was agreed that she should pursue funding opportunities.

Marshall Place: CCllr Robertson will again contact P&KC regarding a problem with flooding around a lamp standard that was raised by CCllr Porter at the last CC meeting. He will also meet CCllr Porter to discuss accessibility for bin lorries

Snow clearing: CCllr Smith said that in his capacity as registrar he had had a complaint from someone who had been unable to register a death because they had not been able to access Church Street during the snow. Cllr Robertson advised that he had compiled a list of people such as doctors, carers and registrars whose premises he felt should have been treated as a priority during snow-clearing operations. He felt that people should also be encouraged to clear the pavement outside their homes as was standard practice throughout Europe, as it was a misconception that they would be held liable should someone fall.

The next meeting of Milnathort CC will be held on Thursday 11 March in Milnathort Primary School.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the February Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 9 February were: CCllrs I McGrattan, J Bird, S Garvie and R Cairncross; P&K Cllr Baird and 18 residents. Apologies were received from C Weedon, J Shepherd, Cllrs Robertson and Miller.

The Chairman informed the meeting that Mike Hally had resigned from the CC. Mike had been responsible for looking at the planning requests within Portmoak and through his diligence, hard work and attention to detail the CC had always been properly prepared for any planning matters. CCllr Robin Cairncross will now take on the planning responsibilities on behalf of the CC.

Police Report (given at the end of the meeting): PC Brian Easton reported there had been two recent incidents within Portmoak. The first was a break-in to a shed at Scotlandwell and the second was a juvenile becoming unconscious following a party at Kinnesswood when the emergency services had to be called.

Following previous discussion re speeding on the Balgedie Toll to Mawcarse road, the Police would take an active interest

Treasurer's report: £305.86 in the bank account. £450.00 in MBW Account. The Chairman noted that no expenses were being claimed by the Cllrs and whilst the amount might be small, the lack of expenses gave the wrong impression of how the CC was managed.

Matter arising from previous minutes

Post box at Kinnesswood shop: Letter received from Postal Review Panel, 2 February, explaining that Royal Mail did not consider it necessary to renew the box and that there are adequate posting facilities within Kinnesswood. It was agreed that this was not considered satisfactory and the council would reconsider the alternatives.

Maintenance issues:

Cleaning of roads: The B9097 between B996 and B920 and the A911 between Easter Balgedie and Burleigh Sands were reported to 'Clarence' on 23 July 2009. Last contact with the Roads Dept was at the beginning of December 2009 when they reported it was on the list of work to do. No cleaning has taken place. Parts of the road on the Vane Farm road now look as though repairs are warranted. Vane Farm attracts a large number of visitors and it was felt that the state of the road was not a welcoming sight.

Hedge alongside playing field, Bishop Terrace, Kinnesswood: Reported to Clarence 26 October 2009. Hedge has been cut but no response to safety aspect of crossing the road. Contacted P&KC and requested update.

Payment of school lets: P&KC agreed to increase the administrative allowance for this year and also to increase the allowance in future years by the RPI as at 1st April.

Subcommittee reports

Paths Group: Following the MBW sponsorship there was sufficient money to have the grass cut for this year. The sponsors would be receiving their certificates shortly.

There had been progress on the path between the Golf Club and Church. Missives have been exchanged and Deeds of Disposition had now been sent out. It should not be very long before the land in question is Council owned.

Signage for the MBW is complete; the cost of the work is covered by a grant.

Planning Group: The following applications were applicable to the area and were up to date at time of meeting:

10/00145/FLL, Post Office House, Main Street,

Kinnesswood. Erection of conservatory.

10/00044/FLL, Portmoak Airfield, Erection of glider storage shed

10/00042/FLL, 8 Bishop Terrace, Formation of Balcony and access stair.

09/02185/IPL, Land at Newlands Farm, Erection of dwellinghouse.

No comments would be made on the above.

A resident informed the meeting that the winch at Portmoak Airfield will be changed and will now be fuelled by LPG. Storage facilities will require planning approval.

Management Group: Traffic calming; no further news.

Reports from P&K Councillors

Cllr Baird reported that the severe weather had tested the P&KC resources but overall it had been a satisfactory outcome.

Other business

- 1. A resident raised a question on whether the current development at Scotlandwell contained **affordable housing** Plans available showed that there were four affordable housing units agreed for the site. *Post meeting note:* Details of P&KC affordable housing policy can be found on www.pkc.gov.uk
- 2. The condition of the road between Balgedie Toll and Mawcarse was raised again but this time under the safety aspect of **horses** using the road. The surface of the road was not considered appropriate for use by horses and provided very little cohesion for the animals. This together with the icy conditions of late and the speeding traffic produced an unsafe set of circumstances. Cllr Baird agreed to look into all the matters raised.
- 3. A resident raised the issue of **dog fouling** especially in the

vicinity of the school. It was suggested that parents were bringing their dogs with them when collecting their children from school and allowing their dogs to defecate in this area. This problem seemed to be more of an issue when the snow was lying. Cllr Baird suggested that irresponsible dog owners should be named and shamed, however, short term it was agreed to discuss the subject with the Head Teacher. *Post meeting note:* This was discussed with the Head Teacher after the meeting and she agreed to promote a responsible response with dog owners.

4. The meeting was informed that it was planned to remove **gorse and bracken** on Bishop Hill sometime this summer. The gorse would be manually cut and burnt in specified areas and the bracken would be sprayed by helicopter. It was known that bracken was carcinogenic when in full frond.

Mention was also made of similar problems which would have to be addressed by the Management Group of Stephen's field area when this was given over to the community with a particular concern on the ragwort growing in the field.

It was accepted that it was unlikely that the field would be given to the community until planning formalities had been completed on the rest of the Whitecraigs planned building area but contact will be made with regard to interim maintenance of the field.

5. A resident requested that at the next CC meeting, **Policy 49** of the new Development Plan could be discussed, with particular inference on the extension requested by the Scottish Gliding Union and how this affects local landowners.

News from the January Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 12 January were: CCllrs A Morrison, Alistair Lavery, Hugh Wallace, Sheila Anderson, Roderick Paterson, Marion Anness and Trudy Duffy-Wigman; P&K Cllr Barnacle and three members of the public. There were no declarations of interest.

Minutes of the last meeting: One amendment was made to a web site address before signing off.

Community Policing: The community policeman was unable to be at the meeting, but it was noted that a Police Bus would be outside the Inn at Crook of Devon on the third Tuesday of each month to answer any questions from the public.

Matters Arising

Mitigation measures for the A977: Sandy Morrison reported that a very positive meeting had been held on 9 December where council officials listened to the community groups and noted their views. Several bodies were represented, including: Fossoway CC, FORK, KCC, Local Cllrs. and P&KC officials. A number of measures were discussed and various priorities set out. These include flashing warning signs, possibly combined with cameras, a Puffin-style crossing at the Crook of Devon Institute, a footpath on the south side of A977 from Powmill Milk Bar to village crossing, extending 30mph east of Blairingone, and other measures to improve traffic problems at the school at Crook of Devon. P&KC officials will report back to the community and elected members around the end of January on what is feasible.

War Memorial, Blairingone: A meeting was held recently to discuss the council's approach to the proposed removal of the memorial to a new location within the churchyard. After

much discussion it was felt that moving it would detract from both the church and the memorial. Considerable works would be required at the new location and as severe budgetary pressures are now in place this project may be unrealistic. It was decided that Trudy would write to the War Graves Commission to find out who is responsible for Memorials and what involvement they have. The Church is now for sale as a private house and it is felt that a permanent decision should be made as to its final position sooner rather than later.

Seamab: The Bursar was unable to attend the meeting so any discussion will be held over to the next meeting.

CC Business

Model code: Sandy Morrison reported that P&KC had adopted the Model Code but there was still no official confirmation of this.

AGM: The next meeting will be the AGM. A notice concerning elections of CC members will be up by 21 January, nominations will be closed 11 February and elections held by 4 March. Cllr Barnacle has agreed to act as Returning Officer and thanks were recorded to him. Nominations were thought to be particularly welcomed from people in Powmill as a possible development is planned for the area. Existing members were willing to be nominated again. Eight members are allowed on the CC.

Ken Thomson sent his apologies and will be available at the next meeting to answer questions on education and transport arrangements for the proposed development at Powmill.

Wind farm: A copy letter had been received from Sheila Travers of SCATT to FCC. She had been in touch with FCC expressing concern about the length of time it was taking in considering the wind farm development in Saline. Although the development is not in the Fossoway area, it was felt that a letter should be sent in support of this concern, as many PK residents live very close to the proposed wind farm.

Shop lay-by: Concern was expressed about the number of residents using the lay-by outside the shop in Crook of Devon. Trade has dropped off as people find it difficult to park outside. Various comments were made concerning the difficulties during the snowy weather (slippery pavements etc) but it was felt that comments could be made via the P&KC survey later in the year.

P&KC Business - Councillor's Report







Probus Club

Derek Jolly was the speaker for the meeting on 20 January, and his subject the International Rescue Corps. Derek had joined this organisation 12 years ago.



International Rescue Corps aim to put a team of 15 trained people onto the site of a disaster, be it earthquake, flood, or tsunami, and keep them there for at least 15 days. They come fully equipped with rations, tent and equipment, as they do not want to be a burden on local resources. Their main aim is rescue, and once on site their first task is to locate any survivors. They use heat-seeking equipment and gadgets which pick up faint sounds through the rubble. One of the best sources of information are local people who will tell you who lived where and what they were doing at the time of the disaster. So an interpreter is found as soon as possible. Once located, the next task is to dig a safe tunnel through the rubble to the survivors. This requires skill to ensure that the tunnel does not collapse on the rescuers. All this costs money and International Rescue Corps is totally supported by charitable donations. All the members are volunteers. Derek himself is given unpaid leave by his employers when he is away. International Rescue did not send a team to Haiti after the earthquake because they only had £27,000 in the bank and that would only cover a fraction of the cost of sending a team. Derek showed a series of slides showing graphic pictures of rescues where International Rescue had been involved. Ray Young gave the vote of thanks, emphasising the dangers faced by the Corps, the dedication of the team and the dignity they gave to the survivors.

"Music and Travel" was the title of an entertaining talk by Major Peter Rutherford of the Royal Marines on the afternoon of 3 February. He took us through some of the major events of his life and illustrated them with recordings of the music that had been such a passion from his early life

Peter was born in Cambridgeshire into a musical family and began playing the cornet at the age of nine, but he had a longing to travel too and joining the Royal Marines seemed to offer the prospect of fulfilling both his dreams. So at the age of 13 he went to their Recruiting Office and at just over 14 he was accepted into the Royal Marines School of Music at Deal, spending half the day with normal school work and

the other hal f with his musical studies. We listened to some stirring musical excerpts from those days including 'A Li fe on the Ocean Wave' and a march called 'The Captain General', composed for Prince Phillip. But although he was able to extend his repertoire there from band music into concerts, including recordings for EMI, Peter still wanted to travel and after volunteering for the Far East he was eventually posted to the Ark Royal and later to HMS Hermes and then HMS Bristol.

We listened to "Sailing', (though not with Rod Stewart!) and Peter told us that on the Bristol he acted as an instructor to a number of volunteer musicians and was able to develop his skills as a bandmaster by arranging and composing his own music. HMS Bristol was given the freedom of the City of Bristol and he led the band in a ceremonial march through the city at which he commented that the Wrens were better at marching than the Navy!

Peter then returned to the School of Music for a time, training as a conductor, and went on to conduct at such great occasions as the Royal Tournament and later at the Edinburgh Tattoo. He told us that it was a terrifying experience at first to conduct at these occasions, sometimes with massed bands, but he went on to complete the Advanced Bandmaster Course.

He then moved north to Rosyth where the only remaining Royal Marine Band out of southern England was based. There he recorded music by Edward Gregson at Rosyth and in the Carnegie Hall in Dunfermline and a number of other engagements in many parts of the world. Some of the highlights were a performance of 'Highland Cathedral' at the Royal Albert Hall, complete with pipers, and the handover ceremony at Hong Kong and we listened to 'The Last Post' that was played as the Union Flag was lowered for the last time. A great occasion but marred by very heavy rain!

Peter still retains a love of choral music and is a Director of Perth Choral Society and he recalled conducting a performance of The Requiem Mass by Berlioz in Southwark Cathedral with four massed bands, orchestra and singers. He rounded off his fascinating talk with an excerpt from a Gilbert and Sullivan Opera and answered some questions from the audience. Tony Jones proposed a vote of thanks for a very enjoyable afternoon.

Community Campus: Its four months now since we moved to our new home at the Community Campus and real benefits of the great new facilities are starting to become apparent. Inevitably there have been minor teething problems and the recent cold weather was a real test of the new campus. Happily many of the issues raised have or are in process of being addressed by Perth and Kinross Council. Two that remain are the poor positioning of the temporary 20 mph speed limit flashing warning signs activated at school in-muster and out-muster, and the absence of a Pelican Crossing for children walking to and from school from Milnathort. It is hoped these concerns will be addressed in the very near future.

The catering service at the new campus got off to a very poor start in October with excessive queuing times, quality and range of food, and a general lack of space being major areas of concern. Tayside Contracts together with the P&KC catering management team have made sterling efforts to steadily improve the service and it is hoped they will continue to do so. Unfortunately it is becoming more and more apparent that the catering infrastructure as designed and built is far too small to cope with the numbers of pupils at the school. Despite best efforts any improvement to the service will inevitably be hampered by the lack of space. In view of the fact that we are in the first year of a 30 year management contract at the campus, the KHSPC looks to all involved to help ensure there is an early and effective resolution to the space problem.

SQA 2009 Examination Results: At the request of the KHSPC the Head Teacher, Mr Dick Keatings, has kindly prepared a summary of the schools performance at Standard and Higher grade for the Scottish Qualifications Agency 2009 summer examinations. The summary shows a small improvement in performance over the 2008 results and reflects the high standards that continue to be set and achieved by the school. It is hoped that the summary will become a regular year on year review of school performance. It is deliberately kept short and is presented in what we hope will become a readily recognized and understood format. A copy of the SQA results summary is posted on the KHSPC website and is also available at the school office.

KHSPC Website: More and more information regarding the activities of the KHSPC is being added to our new website at www.khspc.org.uk. It is still very much a work in progress and will be developed as we learn from experience. We would welcome comment and advice from the wider KHS Parent Forum on how best to develop and improve the site.

KHS Former Pupils: A KHS Former Pupil Association is in the process of being formed. It is open to any former pupils and teachers of KHS, and the old Kinross Secondary



Prof David Munro MBE thanked Dr Brown on behalf of the members for a fascinating insight into the Fife Coastal Path. See Notices for details of the next meeting.



At the February meeting, speaker, Margaret Brodie, introduced members to the fascinating world of planganology, or doll collecting. With the aid of a small selection from her extensive collection, Margaret demonstrated French Fashion dolls from the mid nineteenth century, beautifully clad in original clothes. These were originally made to demonstrate the work of couturiers. Where clothes need to be replaced, Margaret sources materials from the era and has them made up in the correct style.

This multi-facetted hobby takes collectors into the realms of fashion and social history, furniture, jewellery and accessories, the working conditions of factory workers and the development of materials. In time, French dolls were overtaken by cheaper German ones.

Absolutely beautiful, lifelike wax dolls were made by Italian immigrants to Britain. Modern central heating has done them no favours. During the First World War, German dolls fell out of favour, and were unobtainable, so the Government of the day arranged for Staffordshire potters to produce dolls for the duration of the war. After the war, interest in all things Oriental led to the great popularity of Eastern dolls.

Moving through the twentieth century, we saw a Little Princess doll from the 1950s. Modelled on the young Princess Anne, she wears a dress designed by the Queen's dressmaker, Norman Hartnell.

Having covered a century and a half at breakneck speed, it became obvious to everyone in the room that Margaret would simply have to make a return visit to the club to talk about yet more of her fascinating collection. Her knowledge and enthusiasm combined with the stunning dolls made for a wonderful evening.

Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire Burleigh Castle

Of all the castles of Kinross-shire, Burleigh Castle is the only one you can get up close to without even getting out of your car. Easily accessed right by the A911 just half a mile outside Milnathort, its impressive red sandstone ruins cannot be missed. Dominating the skyline, a large four storey rectangular tower with a turnpike staircase in its north-east corner is joined by a curtain wall to an elegant three storey corner tower by the roadside. Unusually, this smaller tower is round at the base and corbelled out to a square upper storey cap-house. Both towers have gun loops around the base to defend the castle against attackers and the corner tower also has small pistol-holes at cap-house level.

The lands of Burleigh are first mentioned in a grant of land made by King Robert II to Mariote of Cardny in 1371, long before a castle ever appeared here. Nearly a century later in 1456 King James II granted the lands of Burleigh and Tilliery to John Balfour of Balgarvie, Keeper of Falkland Palace, many of that family being employed by the royal household. Thereafter, the Balfours of Burleigh held the lands for over 250 years until 1715 when they were forfeited to the Crown following Robert Balfour's involvement in the first Jacobite uprising.

The original castle, which comprises the present ruined northwest tower, may have been erected as a simple tower house as early as 1434. However, it was nearly 150 years before Sir James Balfour of Pittendreich, a noted statesman implicated in the murder of Lord Darnley, extended the castle into something more like a palace. In 1582 he erected buildings around a quadrangle incorporating the old tower at its northwest corner. The small corner tower that he built bears the date 1582 and the initials SIB and MB, for Sir James Bal four

and his wife Mary Balfour. A third tower and part of the outer wall was blown down during a storm in 1817, much of the rubble being used by the people of Milnathort in the rebuilding of their houses. What now remains is the western part of the former square courtyard comprising the original tower and the corner tower created by Sir James Balfour. Signs of a gable end on the wall of the larger tower indicate that a gatehouse and gallery existed above the curtain wall linking the two western towers. The moulded surround over the gateway must have framed a heraldic panel at one time.

While the lands of Burleigh with the remains of the castle passed to the Irwin and then the Graham families in the 18th century, the title of Lord Balfour of Burleigh, first held by Michael Balfour in 1607, was successfully claimed by the Bruces of Kennet in Clackmannanshire in 1868.

Today the castle is now a Scheduled Ancient Monument in the care of Historic Scotland.

Our first meeting of the year was 8 February at 7pm. A new time for us and a different format for us. They say change is as good as a rest. Our speaker was Irene Hamilton from Haven Trust. It was a very enlightening talk. It was not a very easy talk to listen to. We heard 1 in 4 women suffer domestic violence in one form or another. Domestic violence accounts for 25% of reported violent crimes. In 2009 Women's Aid in Scotland received 41,500 requests for information and support.

Children and young people under 16 in Women's Aid refuges in the same year were 5,000. Homicides of women committed by a partner or ex-partner account for 45%-50%. The percentage of disabled women raped, abused or assaulted at some time in their lives is a very frightening 90%.

There were a lot more details but it makes pretty grim reading in this day and age that we have this dreadful problem. Mothers at the end of their tether, children terrified to be at home. What kind of society do we live in? It is good for us to be taken out of our comfort zone and listen to the harsh realities of life.

Christine MacLure gave the vote of thanks and said we were very grateful to Irene for coming and telling us these statistics but while enlightening it certainly gave us food for thought.

There are vacancies available for full adult membership, while there is a short waiting list at the moment for junior members.



Allied to a healthy eating plan, this will make you feel fitter and more energetic. What are you waiting for?

The club is hoping to obtain coaching qualifications this year to help members develop their cycling skills and to train properly. The Winter Hill Climb (Cleish-Loch Glow) was due to take place on February 21st (while this Newsletter is in print) and the Fife Cycling Association Midweek Time Trial series is due to kick off on the last day of this month. Kinross Otters Scottish Schools National Swimming Finals



Tollcross, Glasgow, 30 January

Kinross Otters continued to punch well above their weight whilst grabbing two medals at the Scottish Schools National Swimming Finals at Tollcross in Glasgow on 30 January.

This superb facility boasted a 50 metre Olympic standard swimming pool complete with ten lanes which had full electronic timing and a giant electronic scoreboard. This set the scene for the capacity crowd to enjoy throughout the day and is to be the venue for the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow in 2012.

Needless to say, the cream of Scottish swimming was there in force and to achieve any modicum of success you had to be good...very, very good.

Laura Manson, representing Dollar Academy, qualified third quickest in Scotland as the Central Schools Champion in the 12 and under Girls 50m Freestyle. She managed to raise her watching fans' blood pressure to bursting point when she stormed to a superb personal best of 31.14 secs in her heat to qualify quickest but then appeared to have been disqualified. After a few nervous minutes of enquiry the officials decided that an error had occurred and Laura had rightfully claimed her place in the final. The final was an intense affair and despite breaking her personal best yet again in 31.11 secs, she had to settle for a wonderful silver medal behind Emma Budge from Thurso who had to break her own personal best to win in 30.94 secs.

Cameron McCloskey, representing Milnathort Primary School, had qualified fourth quickest in Scotland as the Tayside Schools Champion in the 12 and under Boys 50m Backstroke. Despite his dislike of early morning races and the fact he was virtually first on in the morning, he qualified comfortably in third place overall in 37.60 secs but was some way off the fastest two qualifiers. The final was intensely exciting with Cameron rising first in the lead. He maintained this lead until the halfway point when he was passed by the eventual winner, Kieran Brand, who had smashed one of the oldest meet records from 1992 in the heats in 34.22 secs. It was impossible to differentiate between Cameron and Andrew Webb and in a flurry of splashes and spray they both finished and everyone looked to the giant screen for clarification. Cameron had missed out on silver by 0.05 secs in 36.65 secs, but was delighted with

his bronze medal and his first outing at anywhere near this

Both Laura and Cameron deserve congratulations for performing so well despite having less opportunity to train as their "pool time" is restricted compared with that of their competitors as the Kinross pool is a public pool. No one currently associated with the club can remember any other Otter ever gaining a medal at these Championships.

Jamie Mather, representing the High School of Dundee, is the Otters' best breaststroker and qualified for both the 100m and 200m 13-14 year old Boys Breaststroke. In the Tayside Finals he had come first and second respectively. Jamie performed admirably in the 100m leading to the halfway point but eventually and frustratingly being overtaken to end up 4th, some 0.64 secs adrift in 1.21.31 secs. This is an excellent time and is a qualifying time for the national Age Group Championships in April this year. He managed 12th in the 200m.

Ruth Miller, representing Kinross High School, managed 9th in the 17-19 year old 200m Girls Breaststroke whilst Cameron Milne from the same school also managed 9th in the Boys 400m Open event. Cameron Nelson, representing Milnathort Primary School, came 17th in the 12 and under Boys 50m Backstroke. Elidh Gibson, representing Strathallan, came 20th in the 15-16 year old Girls 200m Backstroke.

Milnathort Primary School 12 and under Boys 200m Freestyle Relay team of Cameron Nelson, Gareth Hutchison, Gregor Malcolm and Cameron McCloskey acquitted themselves very well by coming 6th (8th last year) in a best time of 2.30.59 secs (2 secs quicker than last year). Well done to all the Otters for making it this far and performing so well.



Health and Fitness

Cardiovascular Health and Fitness

Heart Facts: A remarkable Muscle!

Your system of blood vessels - arteries, veins and capillaries - is over 60,000 miles long. That's long enough to go

around the world more than twice! The adult heart pumps about 10 pints of blood each minute - approximately 2,000 gallons of blood each day - throughout the body. Blood takes about 20 seconds to circulate throughout the entire vascular system and is 78% water.

When attempting to locate their heart, most people place their hand on their left chest. Actually, your heart is located in the centre of your chest between your lungs. The bottom of the heart is tipped to the left, so you feel more of your heart on your left side of your chest.

Your heart beats about 100,000 times in one day and about 35 million times in a year. During an average lifetime, the human heart will beat more than 2.5 billion times.

Give a tennis ball a good, hard squeeze. You're using about the same amount of force your heart uses to pump blood out to the body. Even at rest, the muscles of the heart work hard – twice as hard as the leg muscles of a person sprinting.

Feel your pulse by placing two fingers at pulse points on your neck or wrists. The pulse you feel is blood stopping and starting as it moves through your arteries. As a child, your resting pulse might range from 90 to 120 beats per minute. As an adult, your pulse rate slows to an average of 72 beats per minute.

The aorta, the largest artery in the body, is almost the diameter of a garden hose. Capillaries, on the other hand, are so small that it takes ten of them to equal the thickness of a human hair. A child's heart is about the size of a clenched fist; an adult's heart is about the size of two fists.

Cardiovascular Fitness and Exercise

Each week I get questions about cardio – why do I need it in the first place? How often should I do it? How hard should I work?

Our Bodies Are Made to Move

If you have a sedentary job, think about how your body feels at end of the day. Do you have tight muscles, an aching back, feel exhausted even though you haven't done anything physical? Maybe your shoulders burn from tension and your head hurts from staring at a computer screen for too long.

Now, think about how your body feels after a good workout. Your muscles are warm and flexible, the blood is pumping through your body, providing oxygen and energy. You feel energized, confident, proud of yourself and ready to take on the world. Our bodies are made to move, not sit around all day, and yet that's exactly what we're doing more of!

Benefits

Weight loss • Stronger heart and lungs • Increased bone density • Reduced stress • Reduced risk of heart disease and some types of cancer • Temporary relief from depression and anxiety • More confidence about how you feel and how you look • Better sleep • More energy.

The Motivation

I passionately believe that you must enjoy your exercise. It can actually make you feel good where you can feel strong, confident and able to tackle anything.

Feeling good, both physically and mentally is as important as looking good. How we feel about ourselves is so important.

Make your workout focused on improving how you feel rather than focused on how you look

Regular cardiovascular exercise enables the heart to become stronger, which in turn allows it to pump a greater volume of blood per contraction. Increased levels of transported oxygen are a direct result as aerobic fitness is improved.

Working at 70-85% of heart rate maximum, three 30-minute high intensity sessions per week, or five if at a lower intensity, are sufficient to improve your fitness. Walking, swimming, running, cycling, dancing, rowing, stepping are all very effective ways of improving your cardiovascular health.

Some Pointers!

The basics. If you're confused about what to do, keep it simple – you need at least 20 minutes for the body to get going, so start there. Get out your diary find 20 minutes of time on three different days and do something – walking, running, going to the gym, vigorous housework – whatever you want! Make it a habit first and work on your time and intensity later.

Be patient. Part of allowing yourself time to make exercise a habit is being patient...you can't start where you want to be (which may be exercising 5 or 6 days a week), you have to start where you are and that means weight loss may be slow in coming as you get your mind and body conditioned for exercise. Make your weight loss goal long-term, then focus on the daily steps you need to take to get there.

Focus on your body. If you exercise regularly, when was the last time you left your iPod at home and spent some time focusing on how your body feels? While music is a great motivator, why not set a goal to do one workout a week with no distractions? Leave your heart rate monitor, TV and iPod at home. Forget about calories, intensity and the rest of it and focus on how your body feels. Try different activities. Go slower or faster and see how your body responds. Take some time to learn about your body and you'll be able to create workouts based on your own rules instead of someone else's.

Get outside and smell the roses. If you never exercise outside, I challenge you to do so. Go out and walk, run or ride your bike. Leave your watch at home and take some time to look around, notice the scenery. If you see an interesting road... take it. Breathe deeply. Sometimes just being outside is a reminder of how wonderful it is to have a healthy, functioning body.

Variety is the spice of life. The simplicity of cardio exercise is that you can choose any activity that raises your heart rate. You don't have to do the same workout every session, nor every week nor risk becoming bored with the same old routine. Changing your cardio is easy, so do it often and you'll discover more activities you enjoy.

It takes time to change how you think about things. Open your mind to different possibilities. Just for a moment, imagine what it would be like to exercise because it feels good – not just because it helps you look good. Imagine how much more motivating it would be to exercise because you want to, not just because you have to. It really is possible to make exercise an enjoyable part of your life – you just have to work at it!

NOTE: It is important that anyone considering taking up an exercise regime should consult their GP before doing so, particularly if it has been some time since you last exercised or if you are on any form of medication or suffer from a chronic illness or high blood pressure.

A happy March to you all! Pleased to say that clumps of snowdrops are currently paving your entrance into the reserve so it must be



spring. Colin's vacationing at the moment, so pardon the slightly more mainstream version this month, apologies!

It's been a busy couple of weeks on the reserve as we've being doing a bit of digging (see below) and our near resident Sea Eagles have been showcasing themselves on an almost daily basis across the reserve to a delighted audience of staff, visitors and volunteers alike. With a wingspan some 20 times that of the average blue tit, you can be sure you're seeing a Sea Eagle through your lens.

Diggers and dumpers have been down doing their thing on the western part of the reserve during January and February. Supported by the Sita Trust, this work has involved filling and shaping ditches to help hold water back and produce lots of lovely muddy edges for wading birds. In addition, we've now got two rather sizeable holes in the bunds lining the wetland trail into which we shall be inserting some crafted viewing screens. We're also making a new wheelchair friendly path into and around the picnic area, supported by the People's Postcode Lottery.

The shop is making it easier for you to get closer to wildlife than you ever thought possible (money-wise, we can't make you invisible) with the arrival of our brand new HD binoculars and a £100 reduction on the old HDs, so get them while it's hot! Old HD 10x42's & 8x42's now selling at £399. There's more 'hot off the press' action in the form of the Second Edition of the Collins Bird Guide, not available on general release until 4 March, yet the shop at Vane Farm have copies in store now! Our Easter promotion (17 March – 13 April) reads as follows 'Free suet balls with our classic suet ball feeder and premium suet ball feeder'; birds all over have been rejoicing at the news. And finally, if you want to make an attempt at being 'Simon King', then purchase one of our new-in seal skin hats or if you can't quite stretch to that, I'm sure a pair of gloves would cut it

As ever our friendly staff are on-hand to offer advice; please try to keep it bird/wildlife-related, no "my wife's run off with my neighbour's dog" chat thank you.

Loch Leven NNR

This month we welcome Alison Couch who has taken over from Craig as Reserve Officer.

Alison was previously employed by SNH at St Cyrus NNR. She will be focusing on education, volunteering and community involvement on the NNR.

As many of you will already have observed, the Boathouse and Kingfisher Hides have had to be removed following structural damage caused by the shifting ice over Christmas and New Year. The hides will be out of action for the foreseeable future. A technical solution is currently being sought to prevent this level of damage reo ccurring. To allow this design process and also to reduce impact as much as possible on the breeding and wintering birds during reconstruction, we are aiming for reopening the hides in August. Unfortunately this means we will have to postpone until further notice the 'Meet the Wardens' events which were usually held in the bird hides. However, SNH staff will still be out and about on the reserve regularly so please feel free to approach us.

The bird feeding station near the ponds at Mary's Gate has almost been completed and will be fully operational shortly. Reserve volunteers have already put up some new nest boxes and will be installing and maintaining a variety of bird feeders to attract woodland bird species into the area. It has been fairly quiet on the wildlife front with the ice only just gone. As a result duck numbers have been generally low. But very high Pink-footed Geese numbers have been noted with up to 14000 sat on the ice at Kirkgate during the day. Also at least two White-tailed sea eagles, present since before Christmas, have taken up residency on Castle Island and Reed Bower. Mary Queen of Scots was a keen falconer,

Farming



Hello, I've been brave enough to write this column for almost four years now, so maybe it's time I included a joke? What do you get if you cross a cow, a sheep and a goat? The Milky Baa Kid!

And a bit about myself...

I'm a farmer's daughter, wife and part-time farmer and write this column to try and inform and comment on farming in Kinross-shire. Our family run an arable farm with a flock of sheep and this means we are fast approaching my favourite (and busiest) time of year. My husband helps out with potato planting after the spring crops are in the ground but we also have 280 ewes due to lamb in April. So it's me and the children who are on holiday from work and school who are left in charge. I'm not a teacher by the way – I did say it's my favourite time of year, so I'm mad enough to take two weeks off for the experience! (Thankfully my Dad has also promised to lend a hand.)

In January each ewe was scanned so we already know what to expect: 66 singles, 194 twins and 21 sets of triplets. Only nine were barren and these were sold the week after we found out. The prices are good just now and these ewes could have fertility problems that would mean they never produced a lamb, so it doesn't make sense to keep them on the farm for another year. Andrew, our scanner man, uses the ultrasound to scan well over 100,000 ewes each season. He learnt his trade in New Zealand and is well known for his accuracy. It costs 50 pence each for the diagnosis as it is very fast; each ewe is caught by the head while the probe is run over her belly to count the number of heartbeats on the screen. 75-80 ewes can be scanned per hour so it doesn't take long to get the results. The information is really valuable, as from mid February all the ewes carrying twins and triplets are fed a special diet to help the multiple foetuses grow and to ensure the udder develops a good supply of milk. Lambing time can be very miserable if the ewes don't have enough milk for their offspring. Lambs get hungry very quickly and become weak and don't then have the energy to keep trying to suck, even if you do offer them a top up from a bottle. Shepherds (I) then get very crabbit and start shouting at kids and then it's no longer a favourite time of year. So planning ahead is vital for everyone; it also means that the single-bearing lambs are kept on a restricted diet and this reduces the risk of oversized lambs causing complicated births - another source of distress for all. "Work life balance" isn't a phrase that can be uttered during lambing time, but I think most sheep farmers enjoy the buzz of a successful lambing (once it's over). Just don't ask my kids till Christmas.

Well it's over to John for next month, let's hope he comes up with a better joke!
