Response to J Richardson 19 Sep 2011

I refer to the letter from J Richardson published in the September (issue 389) of the Newsletter in which he claims to "support" Chairman Watson against what he regards as my "campaign" against Kinross CC.

Interestingly he in effect supports my view by stating "Mr Watson maybe should have taken no part in this topic of discussion and passed the chair to the Vice Chairman for this item".

This was exactly my point and for this reason I am suggesting it is time Chairman Watson resigned his position due to, as Mr Richardson puts it, his ongoing "business interests" in various proposed planning issues.

What is even more surprising is that Mr Richardson is rushing to defend Kinross CC at all when in the February 2011 Newsletter (Issue 382) he wrote a scathing letter in criticism of Kinross CC.

He wrote with some authority, being a Kinross CC member for three years: "For far too long Kinross CC has allowed the "old brigade" to steer the CC on a path which suits them and not necessarily for the benefit of Kinross. I fear for the future of Kinross in the next few years with many major developments planned for the area."

I could not put this better myself!

Finally Mr Richardson claims my letter was "part of an ongoing campaign against Kinross CC.... for a number of years" and that he "was aware of this while on Kinross CC". I have only recently resumed attending Kinross CC meetings and prior to this have not attended for several years. To my knowledge I attended none when Mr Richardson was ever present.

Anyway I am glad Mr Richardson chose to write as he has kindly, if unwittingly, helped make my case.

I would rather not have to remind readers of some terrible cases of child fatalities caused by Rottweilers and other similar breeds.

Surely, with acres of open land all around, dogs could be kept on the lead in the small vicinity of a children's play park? Surely, even if there is no legal requirement to keep large dogs on leads in the playpark it is morally right to do so when other mothers and myself felt so uneasy we left the park with our children? Surely it is better to be safe than sorry?

I am not in the habit of writing complaint letters and usually have a live and let live attitude. But I am glad to be writing this warning letter instead of a far more tragic story involving a Rottweiler and small children in Kinross. I hope all dog owners will have a lot more consideration that the one I encountered.

Hedges and Verges

Hedges and verges have been discussed at many community meetings in August. To cut or not to cut? Who owns the hedge? Some presume if it is on a roadside it must be the Council and it should cut it when it looks untidy.

Most hedges are owned and managed by the landowner or farmer and are cut at the appropriate time, which is not when birds are nesting. Most are cut from October onwards. The exception is where a privet hedge is causing an obstruction on a pavement. Council-owned hedges are cut during October and November; frequency depends on the amount of growth.

Residents who are concerned about a hedge that may be causing an obstruction to pedestrians should contact Council on 01738 475000 in the first instance to establish ownership. A safety issue will be dealt with promptly.

I am sure you have all noticed that the weather has not been kind to gardeners and farmers lately as they struggle to get the harvest in. Maybe we need to have a wee bit sympathy for farmers if the hedges are not cut as swiftly as we would want.

Local MP visits Kinross sports event for youngsters

The idea is to create an opportunity to engage with youngsters in a positive way and at the same time create an outlet for their energies. Coaches from St Johnstone FC attended this session.

Speaking after the evening Gordon said:

"I was really happy to be able to attend this event and see just how engaging youngsters in this kind of activity, which on the night was football but could be one from a range of other sports, can deliver a benefit.

"The kids really seemed to enjoy themselves; one young boy said it was so good he would have paid for it!

"Thanks really must go to all involved, especially PC Mitchell and his colleagues, Sands Supermarket and St Johnstone FC for their help on the night."

Kinross markets closure

The long established Kinross Sunday Market and Saturday Car Boot Sales were due to close on the last weekend of September.

Site-owners Scottish Motor Auction group (SMA) distributed leaflets to stallholders on the last weekend of August, giving them four weeks' notice of the closure. Some reasons cited were complaints from neighbours, increased planning and operating requirements needed to comply with various regulations and a downturn in the numbers attending the markets.

Cllr Sandy Miller said, "I have been contacted by residents who assure me that they have made no complaints in recent times and any concerns they raised with the local manager were attended to satisfactorily.

"One of the residents, Mr Paul Cormack, attempted to explain to traders the position and they were so angry and abusive toward him that he had to leave the site.

"I would strongly suggest that if SMA wish to maintain good relations with the local community they should look into this matter and issue a full apology and ensure that the traders are better informed about the reason for closure."

Some of the participants at the car boot sale seemed to be under the impression that it was the Council that was closing down the operation, but Cllr Miller said, "Perth and Kinross Council have not been involved in any action to close the market."

As the last weekend of markets drew near, the SMA group was not returning calls to local press.

Community Council election arrangements

Under the revised Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils in the PKC area, all CC elections will take place on the same date and will be on a four-yearly cycle.

The first election is due in November this year.

Nominations for election closed on 29 September.

If less than 50% of nominations were received for a CC by the Close of Nominations, the returning officer shall extend the period for receipt of nominations by ten days.

If there are more candidates than seats on a CC, postal votes will be issued on 20 October and these need to be returned by Thursday 3 November.

The counting of votes cast will take place on 4 November.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail

Due to steady progress on the construction work, in spite of the gales and the rain, we are now able to set an opening date for the extension of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail LOCH LEVEN which will run from Kinross Pier to the south HERITAGE TRAIL west side of Kinross Mill. The Opening



Ceremony will take place on Monday 31 October at 11.30am at the Todd & Duncan entrance to the Trail. We are delighted to announce that Ian McGrattan, Managing Director of Todd & Duncan Ltd., will open the new trail section.

The remaining work on the project consists of finishing off the erection of the new Bird Hide designed by Icosis, widening the pavement on the B996 between the Old Cleish Road junction and the Mill, installing the necessary signage and generally tidying up by our main contractor SAPCo Services Ltd.

The foundations for the Bird Hide have proved to be a serious engineering challenge in view of the need to prevent the kind of ice damage that damaged the other two hides on the loch over the recent extreme winters. The approach this time has been to use pre-cast concrete piers and, although more expensive, it is hoped that this will provide a much more robust solution. The new hide has a superb position overlooking the bay and should offer excellent viewing of the duck populations.

If the remaining work is completed well ahead of the Opening Ceremony, then it may be possible to allow informal public access to the Trail ahead of that date. In this eventuality the entrance barriers will be removed.

Council prepares for winter

PKC is preparing for winter with changes to its winter maintenance service. A number of actions were agreed at the Enterprise and Infrastructure Committee in September to make best use of resources in responding to this year's winter:

- PKC increased its pre-season salt order by 20%.
- As salt loses its effectiveness in temperatures below around minus 5°C, sand will be added where appropriate to provide traction.
- In severe snowfall events, priority routes will be recategoris ed.
- Based on feedback from CCs, some grit bins will be relocated to better serve communities.
- The Farmers Assistance Scheme, where farmers clear snow on public and their own private roads using ploughs provided by PKC, will be extended to involve farmers earlier and more widely in snow clearing.
- Two additional Ice Early Warning Stations and a camera site will be installed to allow for quicker response times and effective use of manpower resources.
- PKC will trial innovative equipment to help grit streets that are inaccessible to large gritters, and to plough down through snow to the road surface, therefore helping to reduce the need for re-treatment of the route.

Following feedback from communities, PKC will investigate the setting up of a self-help scheme with interested community groups.

Patients who have just become 65, or will be 65 by 31 March 2012, will also be offered the pneumovax vaccin ation.

Clinicians will visit the day centre, and the residential and nursing homes as usual.

Regrettably, there is no definite date for the release of the updated software, but we hope that it will arrive early in the New Year. This will be too late for this year's flu campaign, but it will be possible to book other appointments on line.

Household textiles trial collection

Householders in Kinross will have the chance to take part in a trial Council scheme, enabling them to recycle clothing and household textiles as part of their kerbside recycling service. The pilot scheme is being carried out in conjunction with Clothes Aid on behalf of locally based charity the Children's Hospice Association Scotland (CHAS).

Collection bags and information leaflets were delivered to households in the week beginning Monday 19 September.

Householders can present their bag next to their blue-lidded bin on the first blue-lidded collection day of the month. Clothes Aid will follow the same route as the Council refuse collection vehicle and will collect the bag and deliver a new collection bag through the householder's letterbox.

Textiles that can be collected are all quality men's, women's and children's clothing, shoes (tied together in pairs), accessories such as hats, scarves and belts, and linen including pillow cases, duvet covers, sheets, curtains and table cloths.

Other parts of the local authority area are taking part in the trial in conjunction with the charity Capability Scotland.

The benefits of Kundalini Yoga

We live in interesting times. With 24/7 news and communications, we receive more information in a week than many of our predecessors did in a lifetime. There is a good chance we need to



act on much of the information we receive, at the very least deciding whether or not it is relevant to our lives.

Yoga and meditation can help provide a buffer zone for an overload of the stress and tension which can accumulate in our bodies (mental, emotional, and physical) and which can break down body systems opening us to disease and discomfort.

All yoga reintroduces health to the body and mind. Kundalini yoga is said to do this more quickly.

Since starting to practise Kundalini yoga, I have been astonished to find how much tension I was holding in my body. I was unaware of holding it and seemed void of a means of releasing it. Kundalini yoga teaches techniques which enable deep tension release.

A typical Kundalini session is made up of the following segments:

- Warm up: A series of movements used to warm the body in preparation for the Kriya.
- Kriya: Fundamental to Kundalini yoga, this is a sequence or recipe of postures, integrating breathing and mantra, which might act on specific systems in the body. For example there are kriyas for adrenals and kidneys, for healthy bowels, for lungs and circulation and many more. There are also many to act on particular psychological states. It is this recipe that seems to give the specific efficiency that Kundalini yoga acquires a reputation for.
- Mantra: Sequences of sounds which, through their repetition, act in particular ways, releasing debris from our systems.

Many concepts are found in Kundalini yoga which are unfamiliar in the western world and not yet measurable by our current scientific techniques. The awareness of them has come from yogis with acute awareness of their physical and electromagnetic systems and a resulting awareness of what techniques maximise their health and functioning. The energy systems I refer to incorporate chakras, meridians, reflex points and other phenomena you might come across in complementary therapeutic techniques.

As a window to health I have found this yoga intriguing and rewarding. It has supported my own recovery from a chronic condition as well as increasing my wellbeing and fitness.

John Gallacher, a professional ecologist, has never come across this species in the Kinross-shire area before until finding this one in a verge in September. John said, "We did sample the fungus by frying some off in a little butter and finished off with lemon juice – delicious!"

Giant Puffballs, *Calvatia gigantea*, generally grow to be 10 to 70 cm in diameter. When this mushroom is young, the solid white flesh is edible. However, the Giant Puffball can resemble other species which are poisonous. The Giant Puffball itself becomes dangerous to eat once the fruiting body has developed and starts to decompose.

As a professional ecologist John knew what he was doing, but we would warn against picking fungi in the wild.

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Managing the Emotions of Redundancy

Redundancy is an ever-present reality during these difficult economic times. Career and job search advice is readily available, with companies often providing this as part of a redundancy package. Unfortunately, there's very little information available on coping with the actual emotions surrounding redundancy. As a coach specialising in managing emotions, I'd like to share my experience and top tips with you.

1. Recognise that YOU are not redundant, your JOB is.

Separating yourself from your actual job is vital to your emotional well-being. YOU are still the same person, with all the skills, experience, talent and energy that you've always had. Your JOB may be disappearing – YOU will not. There *are* companies out there who *will* value you and your skills.

2. Don't take the redundancy personally.

This can often be the hardest thing to accept, yet the most important thing to learn! Redundancies are usually "just" a numbers game, with businesses doing whatever is necessary to ensure their survival and a financial return to their shareholders. Redundancies are very rarely personal – although it *feels* very personal to you. If you can, separate your feelings from the situation. Consider this: if there had been another person with your skills and experience in your role instead of you, would they have been made redundant? Or: if you were in your boss's shoes, with his team of people, and his instructions, would you make your role redundant?

3. Accept your colleagues may distance themselves.

People whom you had considered close colleagues or even friends at work may start to distance themselves from you. This is especially true when many redundancies are made at once. This is not a rejection of YOU – it is THEIR survival strategy. Team members still left at work feel awkward when communicating with you. They don't know what to say, are embarrassed, even shocked about what has happened. They have to form new alliances and align themselves with the new power structure to ensure their own survival. Give them some time before getting back in touch. You'll soon know who your true "friends" from work are.

4. Take time out.

Many people understandably jump straight into a panic mode of "I must find another job immediately". It is important to take as much time out as possible BEFORE applying for new jobs, both to recover from the stress and to decide what you REALLY want to do next. This is particularly worthwhile if you have been in one job or with one company for a long time. Think about it- when was the last time you took a break and did nothing for a whole month? Taking this time out now for you is invaluable, and is highly recommended. Doing this gives you space to grieve, to recover, and time to think about your career, your life, and what you really want.

5. Talk about your situation – then stop!

It's vital to talk about your feelings, to deal with the shock and other emotions such as anger, grief, and confusion. Some find it very difficult to discuss this with family members or close friends — so if necessary, get help e.g. from a coach or counsellor. It's important to get these emotions out, so they do not take root and cause other

problems later on. It's also important to STOP talking about what happened at some point! You'll know when you reach that stage – it's when you've started to move on, and the well-meaning, sympathetically voiced enquiries of "how are you?" keep pulling you backwards into what happened! Tell people that you are making great progress, that you are totally focussed on creating your positive future and are no longer going to discuss the redundancy. If people insist on discussing it, end the discussion. They'll soon get the message!

6. Turn it into an opportunity.

Redundancy often makes people forget that they were not that happy in their job! So many people stay in jobs they've disliked for a long time for fear of not being able to get another one. Was this true for you? Being made redundant forces you to take action – giving you the proverbial "kick up the backside" to face your fears and to actually *do* something. Now the worst has happened, turn it into an opportunity. What's your dream? What do you want to do for the rest of your life? If you could do anything, what would it be?

What's the first step you can take now to turn that dream into reality? Being honest with yourself about what you liked about your work, what you didn't, and what you would like for the future will truly help you to recognise new opportunities.

7. Get out of the house!

It's easy to become isolated or to feel trapped at home whilst others are out working. Get out and meet other people! Research careers services available locally, and develop your own support network – meet with others in a similar situation and share tips about job hunting, interviewing or setting up a business etc.

8. Believe in yourself.

Having self-belief is one of the best things you can do! If you don't believe in yourself, why would an interviewer? Believe you *will* find a job that is perfect for you. You might not know who it's with, or what you will be doing, but keep that belief strong. Go to every interview believing that you can win the job – your positivity will come across and *will* work in your favour!

Computer age PO at Milnathort

The postmaster at Milnathort Post Office is planning to offer a community eBay facility and a range of other services as part of an effort to make the post office more relevant to modern day living.

For a commission, the staff at the Post Office will arrange to sell items on the internet auction site eBay on behalf of local residents who aren't able, or don't have the time, to do so themselves. Other plans include offering internet access, faxing and photocopying facilities and the printing of digital photographs. There will also be an internal and external refit of the premises.

Postmaster David Hall is able to carry out the improvements following the award of a £25,000 grant from the Scottish Government's Post Office Diversification Fund.

Nominated Neighbour Scheme to combat bogus workmen

On Friday 16 September an incident occurred in Kinross where an elderly person had a sum of money stolen from within their home address after being duped by a male pretending to be from Scottish Water. The bogus workman gained access into the property



under this guise and managed to get away with the money. In an attempt to prevent such crimes, Tayside Police are involved in the Nominated Neighbour initiative which aims to provide residents with added reassurance and help older

to provide residents with added reassurance and help older people and vulnerable members of our community to feel safer in their own homes.

sater in their own homes.

This scheme works by providing the resident with an A4-size card that they can hold up to a window or show through the gap in the door. The card states: 'I do not recognise you! Please go to number XX who is my nominated neighbour. They will check your identity and return with you.'

The Nominated Neighbour will then check the identity of the person and return to the resident's home and remain with the caller until their business is concluded. The aim is to reinforce safe door answering behaviour so that the resident does not open their door to anyone they do not recognise. Cards can be shown in windows/doors. The cards must not be on permanent display and should only be shown when someone you don't recognize calls at your door.

The Nominated Neighbour is chosen freely by the householder and should always be readily available. We are confident that this will greatly reduce the chances of the householder entering into any contract, having unnecessary or overpriced work carried out, or giving cash out unnecess arily.

At the heart of the scheme is the ethos of being a good neighbour. People who feel uncomfortable about opening the door to an unknown caller no longer have to quiz that person on their doorstep and fear becoming a victim of a bogus official or fraudulent tradesman.

Any genuine caller will follow the instructions given on the card and contact the Nominated Neighbour. Unscrupulous callers will be deterred.

Funded by the Community Safety Partnership, the scheme is being co-ordinated by Tayside Police in Perth. It is an initiative that has already proved successful in a number of other police areas throughout the UK.

Tayside Police can offer free impartial physical crime prevention advice, pointing out vulnerabilities in domestic properties.

Beware the darker evenings

As the evenings become darker earlier, it may be beneficial from a security point of view to leave a light or two on around your home. Should you be out for the evening or just late back from work, then a light left on will give the appearance of someone being at home.

There are devices available which can be plugged into your electricity supply, and can automatically switch lights on and off, at times set by you. These timer devices can also be used for switching a radio on to provide background noise, again making your home appear occupied. Most retail outlets selling household goods should have these timers for sale.

Operation 'Be Safe For Autumn Campaign'

If you have a garage, use it when you park your vehicle at home. If parking in a driveway, close any gates behind you and position your vehicle so that it is illuminated by either your own lighting or street lighting. If you have a movement activated sensor on your external house light, position it, if possible, to activate if someone approaches your vehicle in the drive.

If you do park on the street, at home or elsewhere, choose well-lit areas, preferably where there will be plenty of people walking past. Please remember to tuck in your wing mirrors, as these can often be the subject of vandalism.

Believe it or not, almost 65% of break-ins to cars take place outside the home address, so make sure you remove anything, whether valuable or not, or lock it in the boot. Remember sat navs and the sucker marks on the window – a real give away for thieves.

Remove your wheelie bins from the street where possible to stop people from setting fire or letting off fireworks within them.

If you can afford to, invest in good lighting at the front of your property. Dusk to dawn sensors give you a welcoming appearance for when you return home after dark but also safely illuminate the area and allow you to see who is approaching.

Halloween

Remember that throwing eggs or flour is bullying and could be classed as a criminal. Also, it is illegal to:

- buy fireworks under the age of 18
- set fireworks off irresponsibly in a public place

Above all – be safe, enjoy Halloween and Bonfire Night and act responsibly, considering others.

Community Council News



The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. In addition, Kinross CC minutes are lodged in the community library. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes.

Kinross Community Council News from the September Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 7 September were: CCllrs D Colliar, C Watson, D Mackay, M Blyth, M Scott, W Freeman and B Davies. The meeting was also attended by P&K Cllr K Baird and two members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from CCllr I Jack and P&K Cllrs Barnacle, Miller and Robertson.

Police Report: There was no police representative.

Swansacre/Station Road proposed Traffic Regulation Order: PKC report that several local residents and regular users of Station Road stated their concern about the restricted view on this corner due to the amount of vehicles parked at this location, hence the proposed TRO. The removal of the School Time Waiting Restrictions on the High Street (in addition to the school car park) will create additional all day parking provision in an area within walking distance of the town centre. If approved by committee on 7 Sept, the TRO will form part of a statutory consultation. PKC apologised for overlooking the Drill Hall in the consultation process.

County Buildings: Cllr Miller advised by email that while he wishes to do all he can to support whatever decision the CC arrives at, he has some concerns and questions as follows: Has public support been sought for such a project? Has any work been started on preparing a business case? Do we know of any sources of funding in order to convert and upgrade the building? Are the rental payments a suitable use of Newsletter funds? If the CC does proceed he would suggest we do so on the offer of a much lower rent.

These questions have now been answered following a further meeting with PKC. It was confirmed that there is no funding available in respect of the County Buildings. PKC has included a condition in the proposed Lease that the premises cannot be used for commercial purposes but solely for community based activities. The CC believes that this would not be a viable proposition. One of the other councillors also expressed concern as to the use of the Newsletter funds for this purpose, the expenditure being wasted should the project be unsuccessful. It was suggested that the monthly rent should be renegotiated to a peppercorn amount. Another question raised was whether possible community use of the

building had been determined, bearing in mind the other facilities on offer in the town.

Cllr Baird advised that there was an organisation interested in purchasing the building and they plan to also include community use of the premises. The exterior architecture and war memorial would remain intact. An article inserted in the Newsletter by Cllr Baird only received two responses.

The primary objective of the CC is that this building should be re-opened.

Volunteers have offered to man an information point.

CCllr Colliar commented that the County Buildings remains the only focal point in the town and added that Light Up Kinross have, in past years, received access to the premises on the evening of the Switch On.

It was agreed that the Sub-Committee would meet with the Partnership and discuss this further.

Planning

11/01278/FLL 77 Muirs: Erection of four residential retirement apartments, garaging and associated landscaping. Due to the timescales for comment, the CC decided on this application prior to this meeting. The CC submitted no objection, however concerns in relation to flooding and the access road were passed to PKC.

11/01112/FLL The Cottage, The Stables: Formation of walled garden enclosure along site boundary and erection of a greenhouse.

11/01305/LBC Kinross House: Installation of external lighting.

Answering a query in relation to viewing the plans for Kinross House, CCllr Colliar stated that this was difficult as the plans were no longer available for perusal in Kinross. The only method of checking them was online.

Report from Perth & Kinross Councillors

Community Environment Challenge Fund: Funding of up to £10,000 available for community projects to improve the environment. Bloom Committees would also be considered under this scheme.

Play Equipment: The play equipment behind the Leisure Pool is to be removed and PKC is to investigate the flooding in the area. The play equipment at the Myre is to be withdrawn as well. The apparatus, if reasonable, will be used at some other play park outside Kinross. It was noted that 19 play parks are to be closed. CCllr Colliar commented that the play equipment at the Myre was sourced and paid for by the CC, although maintained by the Council.

Correspondence

Scotlandwell Wash House and Well Area Restoration: Update on funding position and information regarding website (www.wellwashhouse.co.uk). Over £42,000 has been secured for this project.

East Coast 400kV Reinforcement Project: Plans to upgrade the existing East Coast transmission line which runs from Blackhillock near Keith to Blairingone near Dollar from an operating voltage of 275,000 Volts (275kV) to 400,000 Volts (400kV). Scottish Power Transmission Limited intends to carry out similar works on the line south of Blairingone to Kincardine. Subject to the required consents these works are likely to take place between 2013 and 2017.

Kinross Common Good Title Review: Information received from Legal Department of PKC. CCllr Cuthbert has been corresponding with PKC in relation to the procedures followed in presenting this report. As he was absent, this was added to the agenda for the October meeting.

Grit bin locations: a list was provided. The CC will respond to PKC that the bin at 51 (Green Park) was removed some time ago and has never been replaced. The CC will also question why there are no bins at the Muirs, in view of the number of side streets.

Zero Waste Planning Day Training Event, 12 November in Kinross

Perth and Kinross **Draft Local Housing Strategy** 2011-2016 consultation: Comments requested by 17 October.

Flood Group: Communication received from Claire Jack who is conducting a short survey regarding flooding on behalf of the Scottish Flood Forum, a Scottish Government funded initiative. She also enquires if we have established a Flood Group within our CC and offers assistance in this regard.

Former surgery, Lathro: There is a buyer who has agreed missives subject to planning approval.

Speed limit review: Introduce or amend the 40mph speed limit on A977 and A922 Turfhills, Kinross. Introduce or extend the 30mph speed limit on the A922 and B996 Kinross. Comments within three weeks of 29 August.

Ken Miles: The Secretary read out a letter received from Ken Miles in relation to CC procedures. The questions raised by Mr Miles were answered in previous discussions and there was nothing further to add. The CC reiterate their previous statement that Wallace Land (along with other developers) asked to attend a CC meeting to provide a presentation on their proposals for development. In the case of Wallace Land and Persimmon Homes these presentations were in relation to their submission to the Main Issues Report. In both cases the CC presented their submissions to the Main Issues Report prior to these presentations and following the information presented no amendment was put forward by the CC (although this was requested by Wallace Land). All CC

members fully supported the Chairman in this matter. Again, once proposed development (of any type) reaches the planning stage, any person has a right to object to a planning application and at this stage the CC may comment/object.

CC Elections 2011: Arrangements for the elections, which will be administered by PKC, were explained. Twenty-eight days following the election date, an elected Cllr has to convene a meeting. The CC normally meets on the first Wednesday of each month and it was noted that the December meeting will not fall within this timescale. Cllr Baird will check this with PKC.

It was noted that under the new Scheme items of business can be undertaken in private.

Kinross-shire Forum: The proposal to re-establish a Forum was proposed by Cllr Barnacle. The CC previously discussed this and rejected the proposal, however at the request of Cllr Barnacle the CC decided to reconsider. CCllr West also expressed an interest at a previous meeting. Kinross and Glenfarg are the only CCs not to sign up. It was agreed that CCllr West should attend the planned meeting. CCllr Watson will also attend if he is available on the day.

Other Business

Queens Crescent: CCllr Colliar asked if it would be possible to replace the tree in the ground to the front of Queens Crescent. Cllr Baird will enquire at PKC offices.

Car Boot Sale and Sunday Market: CCllr Colliar commented on the proposed closure of these events. As well as employing youths from the town, the market sold items that were not available locally. The CC agreed to write to Scottish Motor Auctions expressing regret at this decision and asking for an explanation as to why it has been deemed necessary to close these markets.

Kirkgate Toilets: CCllr Blyth reported that these were not in operation as sewage was escaping.

Round Table Quiz/Beer Festival: dates given.

Mr Miles' letter: Mr Alexander (a member of the public) commented on the reference in Mr Miles communication as to "intimidating, rude and unhelpful behaviour by some KCC members and this might explain the poor attendance at meetings". He responded that such acts of intimidation, rudeness and unhelpful behaviour are repeatedly undertaken by Mr Miles and that the public should be made aware of this.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the September Meeting

CCllr Hamilton, Chairman, welcomed CCllrs Cottingham, Milne Home, Thomson, Bennet and Smith to the meeting held on 8 September. Also in attendance were minute secretary E Rougvie, P&K Cllr Baird and seven members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllrs Halford and Giacopazzi and P&K Cllr Robertson.

Milnathort FC: It was noted that nothing further had been heard from Milnathort Football Club in relation to their proposal to install changing facilities in Donaldson Park, but the CC confirmed that they supported them in this.

Planning matters

Applications submitted: Alterations to house at Half Acre, Perth Road: noted after brief discussion.

Applications determined: Alterations and extension to 36 Manse Road (approved); erection of conservatory at 2 Perth Road (approved); change of house type at Nether Tillyrie (approved); erection of two houses at Tillyrie Farm (approved in principle).

Engaging with Communities: CCllr Hamilton reported on a training day he had attended on the Engaging with Communities initiative which was designed to help CCs and other community groups communicate more effectively with PKC. Unfortunately only two people attended and while it was useful and the idea was commendable, he felt there had been room for improvement in terms of its content and presentation.

Placecheck: An update was received by e-mail from Diane Cassidy, who advised that the Wester Loan and South Street projects being carried out under the Placecheck scheme were taking longer than anticipated. Cllr Baird said that the roads department had a backlog at present and that the works would be carried out in due course. However, the CC noted with satisfaction that the zebra crossing in New Road had been refurbished.

Grit bins: An e-mail was received advising of the location of grit bins in Milnathort. Cllr Baird agreed to find out whether piles of grit would be sited in rural areas and if so where.

New speed limits: Cllr Baird advised that new speed limits are to be introduced in Milnathort as part of a Scottish Government initiative to improve road safety. They will come into force as soon as the relevant traffic regulations have been implemented. A 20mph limit will be imposed in the main built-up areas, with 40mph on outlying roads. The section between Milnathort and Kinross that is presently 40mph will be reduced to 30mph. The new speed limits were welcomed by the CC.

Members of the public: The following issues were raised by members of the public who were in attendance:

Dislodged road sign: The sign at the bottom of Wester Loan opposite the Town Hall is still facing the wrong way and causing confusion for motorists. Cllr Baird will pursue this.

Dangerous parking: Residents are still contravening the Highway Code by parking too close to the junction of Wester Loan and Victoria Road. They are reminded that the legal distance is 10m.

Neglected gardens: Council tenants are reminded that they are legally required to maintain their gardens as part of their tenancy agreement. This follows a complaint about two houses in Crawford Place, where overgrown lawns and hedges have been causing problems with vermin for the past three years and nothing has been done despite repeated requests. Cllr Baird will pursue this as a matter of urgen cy.

Dangerous tree: A member of the public showed the CC photographs of an old tree in Donaldson Park that she felt was posing a danger to her home in Church Street. It would cause damage to her house if it blew down and had now grown so tall that she and her neighbours were unable to receive Sky TV. Cllr Baird advised that the council were still dealing with trees that were casualties of the storms in May, but will check whether the tree had been reported and whether it was on the list awaiting attention.

Grass cutting in Donaldson Park: Areas of long grass are being left in Donaldson Park in order to encourage biodiversity, but some local residents feel it attracts vermin and encourages dog fouling. Cllr Baird advised that this was the only park in Perth and Kinross that had been cut in this way because the community had requested it. However, because of people's concerns and the fact that there were very few wild flowers, it was agreed to write to PKC to ask that the grass be cut normally next year.

CCIIr Hamilton expressed frustration that many of the issues raised by the public were not new, and he felt that if the CC were to represent the community effectively it was important that they maintained pressure on PKC and did not allow matters to slide. To this end, he undertook to write to the elected members following each meeting and expected a reply by the following month with an update.

Other business

Dog fouling: CCllr Bennet referred to a dog that was apparently being let loose to foul the football pitch in Donaldson Park. Two members of the public knew the owner and will speak to them on the CC's behalf. Dog owners are reminded that they are legally required to clean up after their pet.

Benches: CCllr Bennet advised that there was a small surplus from the donation received from Kinross Road Runners to erect benches in Tillwhally Wood. After discussion, it was agreed that this should go towards installing benches along the old railway track, which is a popular walk. CCllr Bennet will investigate additional funding.

Winter preparations: Cllr Baird gave a brief outline of the measures that were in place to deal with another severe winter, but said that it is important for communities to work together and that householders and business proprietors should take responsibility for clearing the pavement outside their properties as soon as possible after heavy snowfall. She stressed that legal action cannot be taken against them should someone fall.

CC Elections: Cllr Baird gave details of the arrangements that are in place for the CC elections on 3 November.

Lottery funding: CCllr Cottingham reported that he had attended a meeting on the CC's behalf about Lottery funding that was available. However, it applied more to specific projects rather than the CC as a body.

The Next Meeting of Milnathort CC will be held on Thursday 13 October at 7.30pm in Orwell Parish Church Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the September Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 13 September were: CCllrs M Parkin (Chairman), J Bird, R Cairncross, T Smith, S Forde and D Williamson. Also in attendance were P&K Cllr Baird and five residents. Apologies for absence were received from P&K Cllr Robertson and CCllr M Strang Steel. **Police Report**: There had been four cases of housebreaking during September in Scotlandwell and a person had been

Treasurer's Report: Income since the last meeting was £35, expenditure £78, leaving a total of £1505 in the bank made up of £600 in the General account and £905 in the MBW account. Copies of the accounts were made available. The Chairman wished to record his recognition of the funding that Portmoak CC received from PKC.

Stephen's Field: The CC's solicitors are presently in touch with solicitors acting for A & J Stephen Ltd, and the acquisition of the field is proceeding. Under AOCB it was noted that A & J Stephen had agreed to repair the fallen five bar gate at the entrance to the field from Bishop Terrace.

Road signage: Cllr Baird and the Chairman made a survey of road signs within the parish on 26 July and a status report was compiled for action with PKC. Cllr Baird reported that the horse sign on the Mawcarse road had been pointing in the wrong direction but had now been changed. A resident raised the question of the double bend sign leading into Auchmuirbridge that perhaps required renewing.

It was noted that residents can report road problems via 'Clarence'. If this is done via telephone the caller is routed direct to Edinburgh City Council but if reported via email then a reference number can be received and the progress on the problem can be logged. However, CCllr Smith said that he had reported a number of problems via 'Clarence' and was then unable to find out the progress. One of the issues reported had been the hedge between Easter Balgedie and Kinnesswood which had been reported as a safety hazard to pedestrians, forcing them into the road.

CCllr Cairncross asked what the PKC policy was regarding sightlines since the problems with these might increase if hedge cutting is removed from the PKC budget. Cllr Baird would seek answers to these problems. *Post Meeting Note:*

a) The hedge alongside the road between Easter Balgedie and Kinnesswood is privately owned and the owner will be contacted and notified of the concern for users of the path.

b) The double bend road sign at Auchmuirbridge is in place but may require refurbishment.

Kinnesswood bus shelter area: Following his initial approach to PKC in May, the Chairman again contacted Andrew Warrington of the Public Transport Unit, and a meeting between all interested parties and Mr Moray Fraser of PKC will be organised shortly. It is anticipated that PKC will provide a new roof for the shelter, and may assist with other improvements being considered by the CC, and also by Portmoak organisations such as Kinnesswood in Bloom. The nesting birds would soon be moving to a warmer climate.

A resident asked if the ownership of the area had been determined. The Chairman replied that this had not been determined, but as the repair of the roof was the prime consideration, perhaps together with some minor improvements, ownership of the area was not an issue at present.

Build-outs: The defect with these is that each has only one warning sign, to inform oncoming same-side traffic, whereas

there should be two such signs, back to back, so that traffic coming from the opposite direction is also informed. The Chairman had conveyed this information to Cllr Baird for action. Cllr Baird informed the meeting that reflective tape would be placed on the back of the single bollards. The CC accepted this as a solution.

Water level in Loch Leven: A response from Mr Keith Miller, Clerk to the River Leven Trustees, was received on 12 August, to say that the information he needed to respond in full had not yet come to hand, but he had been expecting this within a fortnight and would be in touch again. Nothing received from Mr Miller at 13 September.

Convention of P&K CCs: The Chairman attended a meeting in Perth on 20 July at which there had been considerable discussion on the way forward, and the Convention was proceeding. The next meeting will be on 5 October.

Wall opposite Portmoak Hall: In consultation with the Chairman, local residents had decided that the most acceptable and suitable finish for the wall was grey cement rendering. The options of harling or painting had been rejected in favour of rendering. It was asked that this rendering should also be applied to the top of the wall as well as the sides, to prevent ingress of rain. Prior to this, however, the longer bolts promised to properly secure the handrails would have to be fitted. It was noted that the contractor had been asked to complete the outstanding work and that it would be confirmed if these bolts had been replaced.

Forum of Kinross-shire CCs: Following Cllr Barnacle's presentation at the July CC meeting, the Chairman had subsequently responded to Cllr Barnacle at length, and had also spoken to Cllr Barnacle regarding a modified format for such a Forum. The first meeting of this proposed Forum, to discuss how best it might operate to mutual CC advantage, and to establish the basis of its relationship with PKC, will be held on 27 September 2011. The Chairman and CCllr Dr Robin Cairncross will be attending. An exchange of information between the Kinross-shire CCs would be useful but other issues need to be clarified.

Footpath between Easter and Wester Balgedie: Cllr Robertson had previously asked George Lawrie of TRACKS about the creation of this missing link of the pedestrian pavement on the A911 between Easter and Wester Balgedie, and the Chairman had asked Cllr Robertson if any response from TRACKS had been received. A response from Cllr Robertson is awaited although Cllr Baird reported that the issue was discussed at the last TRACKS meeting.

The possibility of a roadside path has been discussed in the past as residents of Wester Balgedie do not have the facility of safely walking into Kinnesswood via the A911. It was also noted that the absence of a footpath was a danger for people using the Heritage Trail and attempting to return via the A911 to the car park at Loch Leven's Larder. Cllr Baird indicated that it was not likely that such a path could be provided from the latest PKC reduced capital expenditure budget.

Sub Committee Reports

Paths, Pavements and Roads: A culvert on the Michael Bruce Way was being washed away and contact had been made with the Perth and Kinross Countryside Trust to assist in the repair. Signs had been erected by them warning walkers of the problem. The landowner had been informed and it was now necessary to arrange a repair.

It was suggested by Cllr Smith that a list of paths, together with an overview of their condition within the parish would

be useful, and he would undertake to complete this. **Planning**

CCIIr Cairncross reported that matters raised with Mr Nick Brian of PKC Planning and Mr Ian Innes of PKC Legal Services were ongoing. Progress was being made.

The CC recommended that no objection be made to the following applications:

11/01123/FLL 3 Middleburn Cottages, Kirkness: Change of use of garden ground to industrial storage and erection of a steel frame garage with lean-to log store.

11/01173/FLL Land 360 metres north of Kirkness Farm: Erection of a pumping station, formation of access and ancillary development.

The CC recommended that an objection be made to the following application: 11/00922/IPL Colzie House, Easter Balgedie: Erection of a dwelling house (in principle).

Cllr Baird explained that there was a Community Environment Fund whereby communities could apply for up to £10,000 of matched funding.

Two play-parks had been closed in Kinross-shire in an effort to reduce the maintenance budget.

Cuts in the PKC budget are being seen in terms of staff and budgets.

Any Other Competent Business

Scotlandwell bus stops: CCllr Forde expressed concern that the Portmoak Primary School buses are stopping in an area which is short of space for waiting schoolchildren and this is causing concern with parents. The Chairman had made a site visit and suggested that a movement of the bus stop to a position between Jamesfield and Bankfoot Park, where the pavement was wider, would provide more space and solve the problem. Cllr Baird said that this situation should be taken up directly with the school and she would endeavour to obtain the contact name and pass on to Cllr Forde. *Post Meeting Note*: Cllr Baird has forwarded the necessary contact information.

Election of CCs: Arrangements for the forthcoming elections were explained.

Speed limit review: This year a nationwide survey and report has been conducted on all class A and B roads. The report identified three particular areas within Portmoak and the PKC Public Space Management team have written to the CC asking for comments. The three areas for change in Portmoak are as follows:

- 1. Proposed 40mph extension on the A911 between Wester and Easter Balgedie. (No comment from the CC.)
- 2. Proposed 30 mph speed limit extension from Scotlandwell towards Kinnesswood terminating at the North side of the Hall car park. (The CC thought it more appropriate to continue the extension towards Kinnesswood until an adequate distance past the turning to Kilmagadwood.)
- 3. Proposed 40 mph speed limit at Auchmuirbridge from the North side of the entrance to Arnot Mill cottage, continuing towards Leslie and terminating just past the garage to Bridgend Cottages. (No comment from the CC.)

It was not understood why the South side of Scotlandwell was not included in the proposals and Cllr Baird would seek clarification on why this was omitted from the recommendations.

Cleish & Blairadam CC

The CC met on 29 August in Cleish Village Hall. This was a deferred date from the previous week as then there would not have been a quorum. The meeting was attended by four Cleish & Blairadam CCllrs, P&K Cllr M Barnacle and one member of the public. Apologies for absence were received from Parry Fraser and the Cleish & Blairadam Newsletter Editor.

PC Victoria Riches, our new Police Liaison Officer, was due to be present but had to attend an incident - her apologies were noted.

The Chairman welcomed those present, especially Fiona Macgregor who had missed two meetings for the happiest of reasons – the birth of her daughter.

Crime Prevention: PC Riches had prepared a police report for the meeting. This drew attention to a couple of suspicious vehicles in the area but no significant crimes. However it is coming to the time of year when would-be driveway menders and hopeful window repairers could be round and about looking for business and it is well to be aware of this – always ask for a business card and take the number of a vehicle if you are uneasy.

CC engagement with P&KC and the Community: The chairman reported on the closure of the Association of Scottish Community Councils ASCC. This is as a result of funding cuts by the Scottish Government. There is also a threat to the viability of the Convention of P&K CCs. At recent meetings of the Convention attendance has been very low and there has been difficulty in appointing post holders. Correspondence received from various CCs in P&K express common issues and concerns in dealing with PKC but the CCs are too disparate to make the Convention worthwhile. Cleish & Blairadam had supported a motion to dissolve the Committee.

It is however acknowledged that within Kinross-shire there is sufficient merit in the CCs coming together to discuss mutual local topics and for this reason we are supporting Cllr Barnacle's proposal to reconvene the Kinross-shire Forum. He would facilitate the first meeting but thereafter the CCs would take ownership of the agenda and remit of the Forum. It is hoped that the first meeting will be held in September and that our CC would be represented by two CCllrs.

CC Elections: All of the County's CCs are to be re-elected on **3 November**. PKC will be advertising this and coordinating the election.

In recent months attendance by the public at CC meetings has been low; this is thought to be due to a reduction in Planning applications in our area (presumed to be as a result of the economic downturn). It is noted, however, that other CCs serving a larger population meet monthly on the same nominated day of the month. This is something that the Cleish & Blairadam CC will consider. A flier will also be produced with information about the work and important role of the CC within the community, inviting nominations for election.

Planning – new applications:

- 1. Erection of dwelling house and garage land 70m east of The Meadows, Cleish 11/01152/FL. No objections had been received by the CC.
- 2. Wind turbines and mast, Blairadam Forest (Fife 1103602 FLL). This is outside our area but we have been asked by local opposition groups to comment as it is on the boundary. It was agreed that no opposition to the mast was merited and we could not comment on the possibility of an application for

wind farms in the future. It is acknowledged however that there are many reasons to oppose a wind farm at this site given the sensitive ecological nature of the Cleish Hills.

Pending Applications: The majority of applications in our area remain on the pending file.

There was considerable discussion on the letter lodged by Cllr Barnacle to the Planning Department with regard to the Green acres site. This site continues to expand without a clear policy on a settlement boundary. Applications have consistently been made retrospectively. A reply from PKC has, in the CC's opinion, not addressed the concerns raised by Cllr Barnacle (shared by the CC) and it was agreed to write again to the Head of Service in the Planning department.

Roads: A member of the public raised concern about the lack of verge cutting this year due to budget cuts and highlighted the road safety aspect of this and also the impact on damage to road side fixtures and fittings when the cut did take place. This will be brought to the Council's attention.

Ditches in the Cleish Mains road area are in urgent need of cleaning as this is the cause of surface water and icy conditions in the winter.

The Chairman will respond to the Council's request for confirmation of site and the need for grit bins in our area.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned with thanks to the Chairman.

Addendum: In the week following the CC meeting and prior to the newsletter going to print, an application for six wind turbines at Millwood Farm, Cleish has been lodged. The CCllrs are reviewing the application which can be found on the PKC planning website ref. 11/1303/FLL. If anyone has any comments they can make these directly to the planning department or contact Catriona Cully (chair) or any of the other CCllrs.

The next meeting of Cleish & Blairadam CC will take place on Monday 24 October at the Tabernacle Hall, Blairadam, at 7.30pm.

News from the September Meeting

Declarations of Interest: Trudy Duffy-Wigman declared an interest in planning application 11/0181/IPL.

Community Policing: There was no officer available as the new community officer was dealing with an incident; this report was sent after the meeting.

Householders are once again urged to be on their guard against cold callers who phone or email unprompted and offer loans, rebates or rewards. In recent weeks Tayside Police has received a number of reports in relation to people being called or emailed by people claiming to be from banks, financial institutions, government bodies and even lottery operators with promises of ready cash. However, an upfront fee is invariably requested to allow the main transaction to take place. In many instances the householder has been advised to make a payment using Ukash. This involved buying a Ukash voucher and then providing the cold caller with the voucher's serial number. Ukash provide a warning on their website about bogus callers; see www.ukash.com for more information.

Action Fraud provides a great deal of advice in relation to all types of fraud and advice about how to avoid becoming a victim of the fraudster. For further information see www.actionfraud.org.uk

Street Sports 4 All: Community officers arrange these sessions to keep young people active and divert them away from engaging in antisocial behaviour. They are free and open to all school age children in the area. Places do not need to be booked. One will take place on Saturday 8 October in the public park at Crook of Devon.

Blairingone Play Park refurbishment: There was a good turnout on the fun/consultation day. There is money to take this forward although the community will have to raise funds as well. The main problem is the location: the site is owned by Lt Col Stewart, who leases it to PKC. Lt Col Stewart has the intention of developing his land (including the land where the play park currently is) for housing and is awaiting the Main Issues Report to see whether he will be able to put in a formal planning application for his development. If that is the case, the play park would be relocated to a site with other amenities, such as a football pitch, a site including car parking for a village hall etc. If this transpires, it would be unwise to refurbish the play park at the current location. On the other hand, putting it all on hold would mean we would lose the momentum. Thanks to Lt Col Stewart for providing information about the site.

Action: revisit in December, when the MIR is out; Marion to talk to parents in Primary School and see whether a committee could be set up. Trudy to inform Steven Kane.

Blairingone War Memorial: There was a meeting on 30 August on site with three PKC officials, the developers, Cllr Barnacle, Marion Anness and Trudy Duffy-Wigman. The outcome was very positive: the developer will re-site

memorial to preferred site behind the church and built a plinth. It is a nice site for a memorial; PKC may develop surroundings with flowers and a bench. The developer will be granted access to and around the church, although the church grounds cannot be sold. CC will have to apply for planning permission (listed building) but CC has no money for the costs involved. Are we sure all the relatives are happy enough with relocation of memorial? Last living relative in the area is happy enough. We will publicise process in the newsletter, notice boards and on the websites, allowing for a period for comments from relatives before going through the planning application process. Action: Trudy to phone War Memorial Commission. Publicise intentions proceeding with planning application.

Dunning Glen: Full go-ahead to do the clean up, funded by a grant from PKC. Will be end of October, when the vegetation starts to die down. The bunding put in place by PKC does not seem to have made a difference. We will also continue to take part in multi-agency meetings to keep managing the problem, as well as approaching MSPs for more fundamental solutions.

Pollution in the River Devon: These incidents are under investigation and may result in some prosecution of Scottish Water. The CC is unhappy with the actions PKC has taken to warn those affected by the spills. A letter to K Steven (PKC) has been sent to that effect. We will follow this up once the report is finished. With thanks to Angela Heidemann for alerting many neighbours.

Verge cutting: See Cllr Baird's report in the newsletter. Some verges have been cut twice, despite PKC saying only one cut was provided for. CC still unhappy with road-ends cutting.

Biomass plant: CC does not know what is happening or who owns the site at the moment. Gates are closed, prohibiting access to walks. Action: Marion to contact Forestry Commission to clarify.

Church Car Park, Crook of Devon: Technicians have now measured up. PKC will prepare plan to be sent to the Church. The Church then has to mark up the plan and apply for planning permission (change of use). The car park surface would be the same as the existing path. Notices would be erected prohibiting overnight parking. The whole process of obtaining change of use was unlikely to be completed before the end of the year. Church has also put in spaces for disabled people near the entrance of the church and asks the community to respect those spaces.

Hello and welcome to what I hope will be a regular contribution to these columns.

I have been encouraged by members of the Parent Council to write an article for the newsletter on a regular basis. I did suggest that the really exciting news from Kinross High School would be best gleaned from our pupils but until I can organise that, it will have to be me.

August has seen the return of a larger number of pupils than we were expecting. Our new First Year has been swollen during the summer holiday period by new families moving into Kinross-shire and a number of placing requests from parents living close by. Our senior years are also busier as more pupils are looking to add to their qualifications before entering into life beyond school.

Our exam results were excellent this year, the 5th and 6th years doing particularly well. 44 pupils in 5th year gained five Highers; this represents 32% of the year group, some 13 of them achieving all A grades. One of our 5th years managed to squeeze in an extra Higher and therefore recorded six Highers all at A grade – phew! In Year 6 we had the highest ever level of achievement at Advanced Higher, one pupil with four passes and three others with three at A grade. The rest of Year 6 passed more exams at any level than ever before. The 4th year were not far behind and eight of them achieved eight passes at grade 1.

There is much to be pleased with in our pupil attainment. I do realise that our parents work hard in encouraging and supporting their children and I would like to thank them for all of the hard work they put in too. I imagine there were a lot of smiling faces when those envelopes dropped through the door. Now we begin the process all over again.

Our new First Year are settling in well. They have made a very good impression, especially with their uniform. It is a delight to see so many pupils now wearing the school blazer. If any pupils are telling you that 'nobody else wears it' then let me assure you, that is not the case. The Parent Council sold over 200 new blazers and if you add that to the 400+ already sold, then that is a lot of pupils with blazers.

Our new Prefects, led by Head Girl Abigail Lloyd and Head Boy Cameron MacLachlan, have also made a good start in helping those First Year to find their way around and generally helping with the management of our building.

We also have some new staff which I hope you will have the opportunity to meet. We have three new Probationer Teachers with us this year: Fiona Williamson (RME), Gillian Stevenson (Biology) and Carrie Taylor (Drama). In Modern languages we welcome Andrea Jackson, in History we also welcomed Claire Grant (acting PT) and we are happy to see the return of Jim Rankin to CDT and Jeanette Hickman PT Support for Learning.

I am happy to say that we are currently fully staffed, although our larger numbers will hopefully see us with an opportunity to increase that number by one.

I will endeavour on the next occasion to give you more of a pupil flavour to life in Kinross High School.

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

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Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Tomato and Vegetable Frittata

Those who have recently returned from sunnier climes can remind themselves of the taste of the Mediterranean with this quickly prepared omelette. It can also make use of your late crop of tomatoes.

1tbsp olive oil
200g mixed vegetables, (sliced courgettes, peas, broad beans) or use leftover vegetables
8 large eggs, beaten and seasoned
200g cherry tomatoes, halved
1 handful of torn up basil leaves
150g feta cheese (or you can substitute your favourite cheese)

Preheat the grill to medium. Heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan and sauté the courgettes gently for a few minutes Add the other vegetables, including tomatoes, and cook for another 2-3 minutes. Crumble in the feta,



add the basil then pour over the eggs. Cook over a low heat for 5 minutes, stirring till the eggs are half set. Place the pan under the grill and cook till completely set. Turn it out on to a board then serve it cut into slices. A fresh salad will complete this easy meal for four.

Last month started off with members being addressed by two of the District Group Study



Exchange (GSE) team who went to Rhode Island earlier this year under the leadership of one of our members, Barry Davies. The objective of the scheme is to help youngsters in their 20s to develop their own professions by meeting, through Rotary clubs, their opposite numbers in a foreign country. Erin Scott, sponsored by the Kinross club, spoke first and was followed by Wendy Cheung who was sponsored by one of the Dunfermline Rotary clubs. Both were quite positive that they had benefited greatly from the experience and had made contacts which they considered to be well worth maintaining.

The next meeting was an informal club business meeting where past and future club projects were discussed by members.

At the following meeting, once again members met and were addressed by a District 1010 GSE team. This time it was in reverse as we met four young people with a Rotary leader coming from a Rotary District in South Australia to our District for four weeks. Club members met the sleepy team at Edinburgh Airport (they had only a brief stop in London after flying overnight from Sydney!). They were then taken to a reception at the home of one of our members and then taken back to the homes of our members who would be hosting them for two nights before passing them on to a Fife Rotary club. We arranged for Professor David Munro to meet them next morning at the Community Campus and tell them all about the Kinross area and its history. The whole party was then taken over to the island to see the Castle and Loch Leven. In the afternoon, after lunch at the home of one of our members, the group were taken to Falkland Palace to get some more local history. The next day was a vocational day and each visitor was taken by one of our members to meet appropriate contacts in the NFU, STV and Kinross High School.

At our next meeting, we were addressed by the Rev. Bryan Tomlinson from Dunfermline. He gave members a fantastic description of the voyage of the El Gran Griffon, flagship of the Spanish Armada's Supply Squadron, right up to her being wrecked at Fair Isle.

We learned that, after the Armada was defeated, the surviving vessels, including the El Gran Griffin, escaped up the North Sea and were forced by storms to the West of Scotland and down almost to Ireland. Another storm separated three ships, including the El Gran Griffon, from the remaining fleet and she was driven North and eventually sought refuge in Fair Isle. However, the strong tide carried her on to the rocks and she was wrecked. A fantastic story and so well told by Bryan – I suppose that was not surprising from someone with so much experience as a Church of Scotland minister!



Dundee was famous for its jute industry which in its heyday was very profitable. In fact during the various wars of the 19th century the jute industry in Dundee made a lot of money. Armies require a lot of canvas for tents, tarpaulins and even sand bags. What was to be done with this surplus cash? - The answer was, "Invest it". And so special investment banks were established in Dundee. One wanted to buy a large ranch in Texas called the Matador ranch. This company was called "The Matador Land and Cattle Company of Dundee, Scotland". investment company were the Dundee Cowboys. This large ranch is situated in the North West corner of Texas. The sale to the finance company consisted of about 500,000 acres of land and 40,000 head of cattle. The ranch continued to grow and prosper during the 69 years of its Scottish ownership. The finance company invested wisely. The ranch was eventually sold for about 7 billion dollars in today's money to the Chase Manhattan Bank in 1951.

About 40 film fans, including families with children, packed Portmoak Village Hall for the season's September opener: a double bill of animations by the French director Sylvain Chomet, but the two films could hardly have been more different. The first, "Belleville Rendezvous" was a madcap, frenetic and frankly noisy homage to American gangster movies, with the kidnapping of the hope of the Tour de France by the mafia, and his wobbly-eyed grandmother saving the day. After the interval, "The Illusionist" followed - a homage of a completely different kind looking back nostalgically to the end of the music-hall era, with an-out-of -work French magician who leaves France and comes to Scotland in 1959 to find work. It's a beautifully drawn trip which takes him to the Highlands and back to Edinburgh with more than a touch of magic and romance, and clearly the audience agreed, with 84% rating the films as "excellent" on the marble count.

Next up in the programme is the 2010 Cohen brothers' stylish remake of the classic movie "**True Grit**" with Jeff Bridges and Matt Damon, showing on **Saturday 8 October**. Don't be put off if you're not a fan of Westerns – the Cohen hallmark of originality and brilliant cinematography ensures it has a much wider appeal. Old and new members are welcome; doors open at 7 o'clock for a 7.30pm start and we always end with hot drinks and delicious cakes, courtesy of Marion.



I immediately sat my husband down and showed him every single piece of every parcel given, and even he remarked on the beautiful stitching, patterns, colors and workmanship gone in to every item. He is the Chairman of our Humanitarian Trust, and he said to say "thank you very much" to all ladies from Scotland involved in this project. (His ancestors were Scottish, so he was feeling VERY proud of you all!):-)

I also received on top of these parcels, an extra parcel from a lady named Ms N Hogg. She said that she had gotten my address off you, and had sent me a special parcel filled with beautiful babies clothing, blankets, hats etc as well!

Your group's passion, enthusiasm and commitment really means a lot both to me, and to our Trust. So, to all ladies involved - we thank you all very much!

On another subject, Elaine, at this point I would like to 'throw something out there'

Scottish Civic Trust/Planning Aid for Scotland

Scottish Civic Trust (SCT) and Planning Aid will be holding a Seminar on **Thursday 8 December**. The seminar will be in the Loch Leven Community Campus at 4pm until 6pm.

The Scottish Civic Trust is the national body for the civic movement in Scotland. It engages proactively with local civic groups across Scotland and regularly comments and campaigns for the improvement of Scotland's individual buildings and areas of distinction.

How does the Trust interact with the Scottish Planning System?

John Pelan and Gemma Wild will give an overview of the Scottish Civic Trust's role, including casework and the relationship with local authorities and other bodies, and how the Trust can support local groups in influencing planning decisions

A representative from Planning Aid Scotland will then give a summary of the work of the independent and impartial organisation, which aims to help people shape their communities and improve the way people engage with the planning system.

Both theses bodies do tremendous work in considering, helping and advising on planning situations. Planning Aid is manned by planners who voluntarily give their services in helping people where there are planning situations that need expert advice. SCT also give advice in this role.

This will be an excellent opportunity to meet experts who can give professional assistance.

Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire Balado Bridge Satellite Station

Visible for miles around, one of the most prominent buildings in Kinross-shire stands to the north of the A977 trunk road, two miles west of Kinross. Known locally as the 'Golf Ball', the former Balado Bridge Satellite Station was officially opened by Princess Anne in 1985 as a North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) Communications Facility. A product of the last years of the Cold War, Balado Bridge SATCOM ground terminal F17 was one of a wider network of NATO early warning radar detectors in the UK and beyond.

Prior to the building of the NATO station at Balado Bridge, an airfield had been established here during World War II as an operational training unit linked to Grangemouth. Opened on 20 March 1942, it operated until June 1944 as a training centre for Polish pilots flying Spitfire and Hurricane aircraft. After the war McDonnell Aircraft broke up hundreds of surplus aircraft here and the runway was used for a while by small planes and gliders.

The 'Golf Ball' is actually a white fibreglass radome or radar dome housing a large dish antenna that could be rotated and elevated to point in any direction. Radomes, which are transparent to radar and radio waves, are designed to protect dish antennae from wind, rain, ice and ultraviolet rays as well as conceal them from public view. The Balado Bridge radome was connected via a corridor, which was protected by Nuclear Biological Chemical (NBC) protective doors, to the main station building, an accommodation block, a station mess and an emergency power generator room equipped with twin 180 kW generators. Shortly after the building was completed, a double layer security fence was added to the perimeter, incorporating an MoD Police Post.

After 20 years of service, the NATO station was mothballed in 2005 and finally decommissioned and put up for sale a year later by the Ministry of Defence.

Kinross Wheelchair Curling Club

KWCC start the new session by holding a 'Come n Try' event on Saturday 1 October from 12.15pm to 2pm at the Kinross Ice Rink which is located at the rear of the Green Hotel, 2 The Muirs, Kinross.

Wheelchair curling began in Europe in the late 1990s and is now a fast developing sport internationally. The Scottish team won second place and silver medals at the World Championships held in Prague earlier this year. The Kinross Club has a growing membership and welcomes the opportunity to invite people of all ages from teenage years onwards. Prior involvement in curling is not necessary.

Wheelchair curling is an adaptation of curling for people with a mobility impairment. It is played with the same stones and on the same ice as regular curling. The only exception is that no sweeping is involved. Curling is a target sport, where players slide a stone down a sheet of ice and have it stop as near the centre of a set of rings (called the house) as possible. The opposing team will do everything tactically allowed to stop the other team from achieving its goal.

The sport is open to any individual with significant impairment in the lower leg/gait function who usually requires a wheelchair for daily mobility, more specifically those who are non ambulant or can walk only short distances. Each participant is required to bring a manual or power wheelchair along with warm clothing. Extended sticks, which attach to the curling stone for each delivery, are available at the Curling Rink.



Health and Fitness

Sports Conditioning

Perhaps one of the most significant developments in sports at all levels is the increasing physical and mental "fitness" of those taking part. Cast your mind back

just 10 years and, for example, cricketers, golfers, motor racing drivers and rugby players were all far less mentally and physically prepared for their sport than they are now.

One of the misconceptions in the sports world is that a sports person gets in shape simply by playing or taking part in his/her chosen sport. Professional and amateur sportsmen alike still dread the demands of "pre-season" training. Improvements in performance come through participating in all year round physical conditioning programmes.

Sportsmen and women must put their bodies under a certain amount of stress (overload) to increase their physical capabilities. All sport can be considered to be "stressful" to the body from this perspective.

Sports conditioning can be defined as specific training that puts the body under controlled physical stress in order to encourage further improvement in performance.

So what is fitness?

"Health" can be defined as a state of complete mental, physical and social well being, whereas "fitness" is the ability to meet the demands of any given physical task. Basic overall fitness can be classified into four main component parts, namely strength, speed, stamina and flexibility, whilst more detailed scientific study has identified nine components that comprise a definition of fitness:

Strength - the extent to which muscles can exert force by contracting against resistance.

Power - the ability to exert maximum muscular contraction instantly in an explosive burst of movement. The two components of power are strength and speed, as seen in a sprint start.

Agility - the ability to perform a series of explosive power movements in rapid succession in varying directions (e.g. zig zag running).

Balance - the ability to control the body's position when either stationary or whilst moving.

Flexibility - the ability to achieve an extended range of motion without being impeded by excess fat or muscle tissue.

Local muscle endurance - a single muscle's ability to perform sustained work (e.g. rowing or cycling).

Cardiovascular endurance - the heart's ability to deliver blood to working muscles and their ability to use it (e.g. long distance running).

Strength endurance - a muscle's ability to perform a maximum contraction time after time.

Co-ordination - the ability to integrate all of the above into effective body movements.

So any assessment of fitness needs to consider all of these component parts in the context of the demand for that skill in any chosen sport.

How fit is fit?

Physical Fitness - the capacity of an athlete to meet the varied physical demands of their sport, without reducing the athlete to a fatigued state. The components of physical fitness are body composition, endurance, flexibility, strength and speed.

Motor Fitness - the ability of an athlete to perform successfully at their sport. The components of motor fitness are agility, balance, co ordination, power and reaction time.

What does it mean for your sport?

Conditioning training requires you to identify the most important fitness components for success in your sport or event and then design a sports specific training programme that will enhance these fitness components and the associated energy systems.


Programmes can be designed for specific areas of the body or you could adopt a more general approach through a whole body-conditioning programme.

Core stability training is often placed at the centre of training programmes, as it is the bedrock upon which all other sports specific training can be built. Does your training routine include core conditioning?

Perhaps you could take a while to reflect on the demands of your own sport or event and see if your training is missing a key component. A personal fitness trainer or sports conditioning coach would help you get the most out of your workout and help you improve your overall performance.

Note: It is important that anyone considering taking up an exercise regime should consult their GP before doing so, particularly if it has been some time since you last exercised or if you are on any form of medication or suffer from a chronic illness or high blood pressure.

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Out & About



Vane Farm

Autumn is fair creepin, in wi' the first Pinkfeet geese appearin back at Vane oan 12 September - that's aboot a week or so earlier thin last



year. As a write this, we hiv around a couple o' thoosand in the loch area, tho numbers shid continue tae build up tae peak figures durin this month. Brace yersels, winter is on the wey. Noo then, this braw new wetland o' oors! Donny 'n' Stewart, the guys that move the earth about alang wi anither few digger, dump truck, 'n' caterpillar drivers, 'n' Kenny - he's the guy fae the company that designed the whole thing 'n' oversees the project (must be kinda important cos he gets a white hard hat) - hiv done a power o' wark ower the last few weeks tae basically rearrange 'n' regrade the bit o' the reserve oot the front o' the visitor centre, so a big ta tae them fur awe the hard work they hiv done.

This hiz been the biggest project at Vane farm fur umpteen years, in fact, mair likely the biggest ever. Apairt fae the work involved, the cost has been a significant amount tae the RSPB and we also hiv tae thank SNH wha showed their commitment to improvin the habitat on Loch Leven and Biffaward through the landfill tax who hiv also provided funding.

Some folks micht awready ken why we hiv done whit we hiv done? Fur those o' ye wha dinny, it wiz done tae gie us better control ower the water areas oan the land adjacent tae the loch. Historically, Vane land wid o' been floodit hunners o' years ago afore the loch wiz lowered, so tae reinstate habitat which had declined a bit compared tae when Loch Leven got its original conservation designations we hiv carried oot this project tae improve the conditions fur wadin birds mair so than ducks wha are quite weel providit fur oan the loch.

Waders need flat land wi a wet surface tae breed 'n' feed (no easy layin eggs oan watter - they kinda sink or float awa). At Vane we took the decision tae help wader populations even mair by creatin a purpose built wetland which will ideally suit their needs in terms of feedin and breedin. As Uwe oor manager likes tae say, it's been made "Bigger, flatter, wetter, better!"

Pre diggers, the reserve was dry, higher hilly areas wi deep pools o' water, which did provide a certain amount o' suitable areas fur waders but wisnae really ideal. We creatit habitat tae suit lots o' different species, i.e. ducks, geese and waders, which was priority at that time, but as wi' awe things, priorities cheenge. Oor focus noo will be oan wadin birds, even when the diggers were workin, big flocks o' lapwing and ither birds like greenshank, ringed plovers, godwits 'n' dunlins wur drappin in tae munch up grub in the newly exposed mud. So early indications are it's awe been worthwhile. If ye wid like tae see the new wetland fur yersel, please come in and hiv a gawp wi' yer ain een, it's much easier tae see whit we hiv done. Ask as mony questions as ye like and wull dae wur best tae explain it tae ye.

Awfa sorry, no a lot o' space left tae tell ye aboot this month's events (hiv tae keep tae a certain number o' words itherwise the Ed kicks ma bahooky), but we hiv thoosands lined up, well naw no thoosands bit quite a lot, so please check the website tae catch up wi them.

Loch Leven NNR

Autumn is upon us once more and the familiar sight of Pink-footed Geese flying in to roost at Loch Leven marks a welcome return to our globally important wintering population. An early count of up to 160 geese on Tuesday 13 September will be growing through the course of the month, and weekly counts are due to resume in the coming weeks, to monitor the fluctuating population as they stop over and move around the local area.

To celebrate the return of the geese, Scottish Natural Heritage will be leading two guided walks this month in our Pink Sunsets: Saturday 8 October, 5-7pm and Sunday 23 October, 4.30-6.30pm, both meeting at Burleigh Sands. It is widely agreed that the sight of thousands of geese coming in to roost for the evening is one of our country's most exceptional wildlife spectacles, and these walks provide an excellent opportunity for people to see this, and learn more about goose migration and behaviour. Another indication that autumn has arrived is the reappearance of fungi in the woodlands. Whether you enjoy eating mushrooms, or are just curious as to what their role is within their environment, the fascinating world of fungi is always full of surprises. Our fungi forays are back again this year, where we are pleased to welcome Richard Smith from Lochore Meadows Country Park to lead us on an exploration of fungi on display at Loch Leven. The first walk took place in September, with second walk scheduled for Sunday 16 October, 2pm-5pm, meeting at Findatie Car Park. If you'd like to join us on this walk, please call the reserve office to book your place.

Habitat management work is taking place also this month in the form of grass cutting and bailing, in order to maintain good levels of diversity on our wildflower meadow at Burleigh, and to control bracken encroachment at Findatie. This means that we'll have a large number of mini-bails of cut grass on the reserve. If these bails could be of any use to anyone, please contact us and we would be happy to supply you with as many as you need, perhaps for rabbits or horses. That's all for now folks.

It could change your world

This has been a good year to take a fresh look at the Bible—especially through the familiar words of the King James or Authorised Version. Around the UK people have engaged with the Bible in new and imaginative ways. Celebrities, politicians and ordinary folk in the street have shared in the events. Comedian Frank Skinner has said about the Bible 'People used to have it in their homes and read it, and then they had it in their homes and didn't read it and now they don't have it in their homes. So it's about due for a revival.'

Perhaps you have already been part of some of the local events – reading aloud in the June Readathon, writing out verses as part of the People's Bible in July or coming to one of the special 'fresh look at the Bible' series on Sunday evenings in Kinross Parish Church to READscripture, PRAYscripture, SINGscripture or ACTscripture.

The next in this series is LIVEscripture and is at 6.30pm on Sunday 30 October. It will take the form of a chat show with special guests Warren and Stroma Beattie, who work with Overseas Missionary Fellowship in Singapore, Colin McKerracher, Chief Constable of Grampian Police and Tim Sinclair, a young trainee stock-broker from Glasgow.

They will discuss what it means to live out the teaching of the Bible in a secular society with its emphasis on political correctness and at a time of economic stringency and pessimism. Where does Christian hope fit in? Is it possible to live a truly Christian life in the midst of all the daily pressures? Is it practical to follow the words of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount to 'love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you'?
