Kinross-shire - A Pettier Place to Live?

This column is sometimes used for directing readers to a page they might not normally read, and this is one such occasion. Even if you don't normally read the Sports section, I would urge you to read the Kinross Cricket Club report (pages 72 to 73), especially regarding their recently withdrawn planning application for an additional pavilion and ground.

There are a number of sound reasons why the field next to Burleigh Castle is not a suitable site for cricket facilities, and indeed many of the objectors put these forward in a calm, logical manner, but some of the comments in the letters of objection to PKC were shockingly mean-spirited. A number made petty remarks to the effect that a club bearing the word 'Kinross' in its title had no right applying to create facilities in Milnathort. The gist of others was that Milnathort has all the facilities it needs, thank you very much, and that not very many children in Milnathort play cricket anyway.

Please, do read the Cricket Club report.

Coincidentally, KCC gets a mention in Professor Munro's Buildings of Interest column on p 63.

'Gusset' Plans 5 June 2011

In support of Pearl White's letter in the last issue, we were astounded that a Council could suggest such a dangerous and ugly plan for a busy road junction (for that is JUST what the area in question is). Bowling Club members, probably many churchgoers and visitors to both, constantly use it; in December 2010 a car was abandoned in a solid snowdrift there for around ten days, and since then this hatched area has been used to illegally park cars. The following would define the junction without obscuring drivers' views of traffic, be easily maintained, serve as an enhancement to the area, and direct drivers to their destinations:

A suitably scaled triangular island inlaid with cobbles or modern setts following the lines of the "Gusset", with one small species deciduous tree at its centre. On its southerly point, a "tourist-style" signpost indicating Orwell Church and Bowling Green to the left and to the right Middleton and Tillyrie.

To create a car and cycle park with two trees on this area would not only be at best misplaced, but at worst inviting tragedy. Ms White's suggestion to purchase the workshop at the foot of Wester Loan is a sound one: New Road is chaotic and if the 300 new dwellings envisaged for Milnathort in the future (possibly meaning 600 more cars), chaos would reign on every approach road to Milnathort's centre.

'Gusset' Plans 11 June 2011

I was surprised to read in the June edition of the Kinross Journal the following letter heading:

"'Gusset' plans not an enhancement", dated 14 May 2011. Indeed, I was surprised, as no enhancement is needed at all. 'If it ain't broke, why fix it?'

The letter refers to plans for trees, cycle racks, and parking for five cars at the junction of Manse road, Wester Loan and North Street imposed without agreement or consultation with those who live close by.

It is true, as can be seen from my address, I am not directly affected. However, the following points need to be raised:

- Any scheme which is imposed on the inhabitants is a bad idea.
- 2. Every available open space, however small, should be preserved.
- 3. Any narrowing of the space presents a traffic hazard for the following reason. Cars exiting from Victoria Avenue need to come well out to see if the way is clear. Larger vehicles as well, such as tankers, need extra space, especially if they need somewhere to wait to allow descending traffic to pass.
- 4. During the recent severe winter, the 'Gusset' was the only available short-term parking space because of the build up of snow at the kerb-side lower down.

Like so many schemes, it has all the signs of someone justifying their position by dreaming up an activity to show they are busy. Such a frivolous spending of public money, which we are repeatedly told is in short supply.

Here are some ideas on how it could be better spent:

- 1. There could be a bench seat at the 'Gusset', which would help walkers catch their breath before climbing the hill. This would be far more useful than cycle racks. In any case, which cyclists exactly did the planners have in mind?
- 2. All the road markings in Milnathort need renewing, especially the mini roundabout and the pedestrian crossing. This should be programmed on a regular basis and not because someone agitates for it to be done.
- 3. Cleaning of the burn. Again, it should not need a flood for this to be undertaken regularly.
- 4. A little below the 'Gusset,' the road is badly broken up for the full width of the road. Again, maintenance should be ongoing.

All of these represent better value for money. It should be obvious that, where resources are scarce, better priorities need to be set.

Buildings seem to feature high on the agenda in Kinross and as highlighted in last month's Newsletter, Council Services are now available at Loch Leven Campus, with the exception of Building Control which operates from Pullar House in Perth. Perth & Kinross Council has agreed to defer marketing the County Buildings for one year, to allow Kinross CC to produce a Business Plan. This has to be a viable plan and the community now have the opportunity to have their say and hopefully this building will once again be used and managed by the community.

The High School site will once again be on the market. It is extremely disappointing that a large site in the centre of town is still vacant and will probably be for sometime. This is maybe an opportunity to have something better on the site. I would be interested to know what you think would be suitable and please the majority of residents.

Criticism of Kinross Community

Council Procedures 20 June 2011

As a resident of Kinross for 30 years, I have for a long time been uncomfortable about the way Kinross CC conduct business.

I attended the 1st June meeting of Kinross CC at the Masonic Hall along with other interested parties who were there to hear what was described in the Agenda only as a "presentation by Wallace Land".

I know most attending knew little of the proposals as previous Kinross CC minutes were vague about the intentions of the developers and the nature of their previous presentations.

Representatives of Wallace Land advised that this was their third attendance at a Kinross CC meeting. Their proposals relate to a development on 48 hectares of land on the west of the M90, being the whole south side of the A977 between the Turfhills Council Depot and Balado. Their proposal is to zone this land for industrial and commercial uses.

Such a development would be a massive expansion of Kinross outside the town boundary and into open countryside and contravenes current Local and National planning policy.

A previous Public Inquiry and separate Local Plan Inquiry both concluded that this area was not appropriate for such development.

Despite this fact, Kinross CC have continued to promote development on this site.

I am sure the wider community would like to know why Kinross CC are supporting such an inappropriate development scheme.

Also presented was another proposal by the same developers which relates to the building of 125 houses on land north of Davies Park and alongside the old railway track, currently a walkway.

At the June Kinross CC meeting the Chairman, CCllr Watson, declared an interest being the agent of the owner of both of these sites. However he then continued to chair the meeting and conducted the questioning session with the developers. It is normal in such circumstances for an individual committee member to retire and take no part in proceedings. In this instance, as Chairman, it is even more necessary that he ensure the meeting is conducted properly and that he takes no part. CCllr Watson has regularly found it necessary to declare an interest given that his job as local solicitor entails the representation of land interests of his clients.

I suggest that Kinross CC makes sure in future that their meetings are adequately advertised, that their agendas are clear as to the nature of items for discussion and that their minute includes a full and accurate account of their meetings.

At the moment none of these matters are being adequately addressed. Minutes require being informative, however relatively minor items are currently given expansive reporting while major developments such as those referred to here are given little time and insignificant reporting.

Given that we are in the midst of a PKC review that will involve the zoning of land for development in Kinross-shire over the coming years, I would like to suggest that Chairman Watson might consider it prudent to resign his position.

Curling Academy project resumes

A legal wrangle which put the project to build a curling academy at the Market Park on hold for over a year has come to a conclusion. A burden in the title deeds of a nearby property might have prevented the building of the curling facility in the area of the Kinross Golf Club car park.

A statement on the Kinross Curling Trust website reads:

"Following agreement between the parties, the Lands Tribunal for Scotland issued its formal Order on 19 May the effect of which is to remove all restrictions on building on the Market Park. The Trust was not a party to this process and incurred no costs. The Trust's professional advisers are now engaged with Kinross Estate Company to finalise the terms of the draft lease."

Gateway Geese arrive

During June, the 'Gateway' – a project initiated by Kinross in Bloom – was completed, with the installation of the impressive copper and stainless steel sculpture of a skein of geese, created by public artist, David F Wilson. Our cover photograph shows the Gateway, which is just next to the junction 6 roundabout of the M90 at the entrance to Kinross. 'Gusset' plans

Proposed traffic-calming and landscaping plans by PKC for the junction of Wester Loan, Manse Road and North Road in Milnathort have been of interest to Newsletter readers in recent weeks (Letters in the June and this, the July, issue). There was some criticism by local residents of the original plans, and subsequently Milnathort CC and PKC have been in consultation in an attempt to resolve the issues raised. The revised plan includes the following features:

- A triangle of cropped setts at the 'gusset', but flush with the roadway surface. There will be provision for six designated parking spaces on the triangle.
- At the southerly point of the triangle there will be a single tree, with a kerb and barrier detail around it.
- The pavement between North Street and Manse Road will be extended to ease pedestrian use.
- A small section of pavement on the east side of North Street and a small section on the east side of Wester Loan (in each case close to their junction with Victoria Avenue) will be extended. This is to ease crossing for pedestrians and narrow the road to slow down traffic.

Some of the issues that were under consideration when drawing up the plans were these: Parking was raised as a priority to access the Town Hall; Concern over the speed of traffic coming into North Street; Implications of changing Victoria Avenue to one-way; and the historic nature of the space.

Milnathort CC Chairman Bruce Hamilton has attempted to personally speak about the plans with every household in Wester Loan and North Street as well as parts of Victoria Avenue and Manse Road.

Moto plans get go-ahead

PKC's Development Control Committee has approved plans for a total revamp of the Moto Services area at Turshills. This will involve the demolition of existing facilities, construction of a new petrol station in a different part of the site, the building of a much larger shopping concourse and a new roundabout.

Local resident Ken Miles addressed the committee, citing the adverse effect of the enlarged retail outlet on businesses in Kinross town as a reason to reject the proposal, but the application was approved by nine votes to two.



T in the Park 2011

(To deal with any T in the Park associated matters. Manned from 8am every day of the festival, until midnight on the Thursday, 2am on the Saturday, Sunday and Monday mornings and then 8am to 2pm Monday afternoon.)

PKC (at its Licensing Committee on 21 April 2011) has agreed to allow the festival to finish one hour later on the Saturday night than in previous years. This extends the operating time to 1am on Sunday 10 July. The PKC report says, "The licensee indicates that this would allow the arena entertainment to finish at midnight." The report continues, "The main issue raised by the elected members for that area is the potential for noise over a longer period. Comments were made about noise from previous events occurring later

than these hours. Experience has shown that this noise was from activities within the campsite (both organised and informal entertainment), rather than the arena. If the public make contact at the time they hear the noise, this can be tackled by the event organisers and the Council's Environmental Health team."

The licence provides for campsite entertainment until midnight on the Thursday and to 2am on Saturday, Sunday and Monday mornings.

If noise is unreasonably loud, remember to call 0141 890 1200 or 0141 8990 1247 at the time the noise is taking place.

Service 204 diversion during T in the Park



T in the Park weekend - free link bus

Local bus link to T in the Park from both Kinross and Milnathort


During the weekend of T in the Park a **free** Local Link Bus Service (604) will operate between Kinross (David Sands, Station Road) and the T in the Park site (East Drop Off), with all journeys serving Milnathort. In addition, Service 604 will serve Kinross Park+Ride site and Springfield Road, as well as picking up passengers at other bus stops along the route.

On Thursday Service 604 will start at midday from Kinross (David Sands) and operate at 30 minute intervals finishing at 7.00pm.

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, the service will start at 10.30am and operate at 15 minute intervals until 1.00am the following morning.

Then on Monday, Service 604 will depart the T in the Park site (East Drop Off) at 7.00am and operate at 30 minute intervals until 2.30pm.

PKC's Trading Standards department is warning local residents about the claims of a landscaping business working door to door. A firm going by the name Target Landscapes has been distributing leaflets door to door, advertising their business. The trader claims on the professionally produced leaflet to be a member of the 'better business partnership' and displays the scheme's logo, although without the wording 'Perth & Kinross' on it. PKC would like to stress that Target Landscapes are not, and never have been, a member of this scheme. The Better Business Partnership is intended to give consumers confidence in local firms, knowing that they will be treated fairly and honestly, especially if something goes wrong. Members of the Trading Standards team are working to trace the business in order to take appropriate action.

Cold calling often takes place at this time of year. Community Safety Convener, Cllr Willie Robertson said, "Our advice is, if you don't know the trader, don't engage with them."

Royal Engineers hone their skills at Balado Park airfield

Royal Engineers from Cambridge found an ideal training location recently – Balado Park airfield, near Kinross.

43 Headquarters and Support Squadron from 25 Engineer Regiment (Air Support), who are based at Waterbeach near Cambridge, were looking for a location in Scotland to carry out some low level training as part of their air support role.

A low intensity operational airfield was required so that "Sappers" could gain essential experience in plant operation (graders, excavators, rollers etc) while still needing to be aware of aircraft movements. They completed their training on track profiling and pad repair in a week, prior to moving north for some adventure training in the Cairngorms.

As well as providing a great training opportunity, Balado was ideally located as the Sappers were accommodated at Leuchars and supported by the RAF and 71 Engineer Regiment (V). The Engineers are very grateful to the Balado Park operators, Douglas and Jamie Alexander, for allowing them to train on their land and the assistance and guidance provided by the Scottish Environmental Protection Agency (SEPA).

Sappers have three skills that they continually strive to improve. Firstly, their infantry skills; secondly, their military engineering skills such as road and bridge construction, water supply and demolitions; and thirdly, all Sappers have a civilian or artisan trade which in essence is any trade that can be found in the construction industry, from design draughtsman, surveyor or plant operator to electrician, bricklayer, carpenter or plumber.

The motto of the Royal Engineers is "Ubique" or "everywhere", as not only do they provide support across all areas of the battlefield, they operate worldwide. Some of the personnel at Balado have recently returned from an exercise in the United States.

Kinross-shire Day Centre

The Day Centre has operated in Kinross for over 25 years.
It, at the present time, is largely used as a meeting place for elderly people to meet, have lunch, socialise and enjoy various activities. We operate on the basis of a Grant from Perth & Kinross Council which is reducing and the capital built up over many years of the Day Centre is in fairly rapid decline, because our expenditure inevitably is greater than our income.

Bluntly, unless the use of the Day Centre can be widened considerably in the next couple of years, or unless the Council are able to increase their Grant contribution, the Day Centre will face closure.

Mundell Magic comes to Kinross

Who would have thought it? Famous names in music coming to the small county of Kinross-shire to perform. No, it's not T in the Park I'm talking about, but another music venue, albeit at the other end of the scale in terms of size – Backstage at the Green.

Backstage at the Green is a new venue for gigs promoted by Mundell Music, who specialise in organising intimate performances by some of the most respected musicians of the last four decades.

David Mundell, the man behind Mundell Music, was proprietor of the Bein Inn at Glenfarg from 1999 to 2007. In that time he developed it into a music destination, winning Scottish Music Pub of the Year in 2003 amongst other accolades. The hotel trade was his main occupation for most of his adult life, but David admits, "music has always been my passion," and after selling the Bein Inn in 2007 he has concentrated on music promotion, first at the Inn at Lathones near St Andrews, which was named Best Music Venue in the UK in 2009, and now additionally at Backstage at the Green Hotel and at Ducks in Aberlady, East Lothian.

Some of the famous names who have played for Mundell Music over the years include Fairport Convention, Hugh Cornwell of The Stranglers, Andy Fairweather Low, Hank Wangford, KT Tunstall, Maggie Bell, Nik Kershaw and Martyn Joseph to name just a few.

The Kinross venue has been created out of the Green Hotel's former health suite, which has been transformed into a unique space, full of character and with the ambience of a private club. There is a small bar area and next to that, built over the former swimming pool itself, a performance room with a capacity of just over a hundred. This gives an intimate atmosphere; everyone attending is really close to the performer, who may well be an idol from their youth. Earlier this year the Green Hotel won the Scottish Hotels of the Year Innovation Award for 'Backstage'.

Gigs at 'Backstage' started in October 2010 and have included David Knopfler (ex Dire Straits) and John Otway & Wild Willy Barrett.

Adding to the ambience is David's astonishing and vast collection of music memorabilia, which decorates the walls of 'Backstage' and is worthy of a visit in its own right.

Another feature to quicken the pulse of music enthusiasts of a certain age is the opportunity to buy vinyl records at "After the Goldrush", the in-venue record shop. "We think this is the only music venue to have an integral record store," says David. Also selling CDs, the shop is only open on gig nights, but could open at other times as well if there is enough interest.

David describes most of the acts who play for Mundell Music as "sixties to eighties based but with some young, upcoming talent also, such as Ben Montague who has been played on Radio 2."

Artistes lined up for the coming months at the Green include: American singer/songwriter Dean Friedman; Ian McLagan of the Small Faces (Rod Stewart's band); John Parr, who wrote the song St Elmo's Fire (Man in Motion); Eric Taylor, described as a "sage musician, a lyrical genius and a master of the guitar" and the band Curved Air.

Not content with simply hosting music, Mundell Music also arranges occasional workshops with master guitarists and songwriters and at the time of writing Iain Matthews, formerly of Fairport Convention and Southern Comfort, is due to teach a song-writing workshop.

There are plenty of other plans afoot. Mundell Music will be arranging some concerts as part of the inaugural Kinross-shire Music Festival in November this year, including Jackie Leven, the Scottish singer/songwriter.

Next spring will see the fifth 'Fifestock' Festival, a Mundell initiative which takes place various venues. And we have a Newsletter exclusive! We can reveal that Gallagher & Lyle will be playing Backstage at the Green as part of Fifestock 2012.

Newsletter review of the year

In recent weeks the annual review of the Newsletter has been carried out and a report made to the board of directors of Kinross Newsletter Ltd. (This is a new development – see end of this article for an explanation of this.)

It has been another successful year for the Newsletter.

Circulation is slightly up on the previous year, averaging sales of 2,062 copies per issue.

Income has increased, due mainly to the cap on the number of display adverts being removed. For many years we restricted the number of display adverts to prevent the Newsletter being 'top-heavy' with adverts. However, as the Newsletter content has increased significantly in recent years, it was felt that we could carry more advertising, and so the cap was lifted in July 2009 and greater flexibility in the placing of adverts introduced. A surplus of £15,830 was made this year, and transferred to Kinross CC's charitable company. In the past year the Newsletter averaged 99 pages per issue, compared to 91 the year before, but the proportion of content to advertising has stayed the same at 56% to 44%. We would particularly like to thank our volunteer columnists,

Fiona Turnbull and John Buchanan who write in alternate months, giving us fascinating and amusing insights into the challenges of Farming today, and Malcolm Smith, a remarkably dedicated man who provides us with the facts, figures and summaries of the Weather; also Isabel Gillon who acts as our hand-in point in Milnathort and the Historical Society for the loan of photographs.

We also thank the local businesses who support the Newsletter by advertising, and the shopkeepers who stock it. Thanks also to all the club secretaries and representatives of organisations who supply us with updates of their activities. The continued growth of the Newsletter means more work for all the Newsletter team and an ever-increasing challenge to produce it on schedule each month, so well done to all the team and another plea to clubs to please try to keep your reports brief!

And now for the explanation referred to in the first paragraph: Although the Newsletter has been in existence since 1977, when it was founded by Kinross CC, for most of the next 34 years it had no constitution or legal identity. In the last couple of years efforts to address this have been made. The title is now registered with the British Library and in 2010 a trading company, Kinross Newsletter Ltd (KNL), was formed. The directors of KNL are the treasurer and editor of the Newsletter and three members of Kinross CC. Any surpluses made by KNL are transferred to a charitable company, Kinross Community Council Newsletter Ltd (KCCNL), formed in 2009. The directors of KCCNL are the Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary of Kinross CC.

Fighting Fatigue

By Alisa V Wilson, nutritional consultant Hippocrates wrote about it – and so did Shakespeare. Fatigue has doggedly plagued humankind through the ages. Today TATT ('tired all the time') is one



of the most common non-specific diagnoses in general practice, and Britons consistently rank it as one of their main health concerns.

What is it? Not a true ailment in itself, fatigue is usually a classic symptom of some other problems: poor nutrition; overwork; lack of (or too much exercise); insomnia or poor sleeping habits; or a specific medical disorder, such as premenstrual syndrome or depression. Fatigue is a generalised feeling of exhaustion that is hard to shake off. It is distinct from the more intractable chronic fatigue syndrome, in which fatigue persisting for at least six months is not relieved by sleep or rest and is often accompanied by symptoms such as memory loss, fever and muscular aches. Fatigue can be constant, beginning in the morning after a full night's sleep, or it may build rapidly during the day until nightfall, when the sufferer feels utterly exhausted.

Often there is no evidence of another illness; however, fatigue is a sign that should not be ignored. Symptoms include:

- Persistent, lingering weariness, either intermittent or continuous, that lasts for more than two weeks.
- Personality changes, particularly a tendency to become angry, impatient or depressed because of feeling tired all the time.
- Diminished concentration and work capacity.
- Mental sluggishness.
- Loss of energy, strength or endurance.

In many sufferers, fatigue can be traced to stress, anxiety, poor nutrition, food allergies, depression, anaemia, poor digestion, environmental toxins or lowered immunity and chronic infections. It has been linked to diabetes, to thyroid or adrenal gland imbalance. Deficiency of almost any vitamin or mineral can depress the immune system, causing fatigue. Deficiency of the nutrients involved in red blood cell formation (iron, folic acid, vitamin B12 and B6) can lead to fatigue because these cells transport oxygen used for energy. In women, fatigue can result from fluctuating hormone levels in pregnancy and menopause, or from anaemia caused by heavy menstrual periods.

Help to fight fatigue with:

- Balanced blood sugar levels: never skip breakfast, avoid large meals and eat little and often instead. Avoid insulin stimulants such as caffeine, sugar, alcohol and tobacco, hydrogenated fats, excessive stress and lack of exercise.
- Do not expect an energy boost from sugary foods so avoid refined carbohydrates and simple sugars (found in confectionery, white bread, white pasta, biscuits, cakes etc). Instead eat complex carbohydrates (wholemeal pasta, rice and bread, wholegrains, beans etc) and lots of fresh fruits and veg etables to optimise health. Five a day is an absolute minimum, ideally aim for seven or eight.
- Make up fresh fruit or vegetable juices, which are packed with free-radical quenching antioxidant nutrients.
- Drink plenty of filtered water (1½-2 litres per day).
- Clear detox pathways: when our system gets overwhelmed with environmental factors (our environment unfortunately offers a multitude of opportunities for clogging up our metabolic pathways) that rob the body of much needed nutrients for energy, it is time to clear the system and detox.
- Take time out from a busy schedule for quality rest and relaxation. Go to bed and get up at the same time every day. Get at least eight hours of sleep at night.
- A good multi-vitamin and mineral formula may help.
 Further supplements may also be helpful (only when an underlying fatigue-causing medical condition has been ruled out and under the supervision of a qualified nutritionist).
- Keep active. Moderate exercise is a prescription for feeling less tired.

How to look AND feel better

Have you ever gone shopping with a friend, tried on a new outfit, looked really good in it, heard your friend say you were "amazing" in it, and felt so excited about your new style that you simply couldn't wait to go out wearing it? Yet when you got home, you just didn't get that feeling anymore, and ended up wearing a different outfit altogether? Or perhaps you've had a "style makeover", believing that this time, you really WILL feel better about yourself, full of confidence, knowing that you're looking your best... only to have the self-confidence wither away over time, until you feel just like you've always felt?

When we're unhappy and want to feel better about ourselves, most of us start with the outside, changing our hairstyle, our make-up, or our clothes. Maybe we'll go to a spa for a pamper day, perhaps have a manicure or facial, or even a relaxing massage. We feel great, having had a bit of pampering and "me time", and if we're lucky we've also received some lovely compliments! Treats like these are fabulous and work really well as a morale boost, but when we're using them to mask our unhappiness, typically it doesn't take long before that good feeling fades, and we need another "feel better" fix. Sound familiar?

So why doesn't that good feeling last? The reason is that we're starting in the wrong place - the outside- when we really need to pay attention to what's going on **inside**, ie to our thoughts and emotions. Look at it this way: if you had a book that was full of stories with lots of horrible emotions going on – eg fear, anger, hate, sadness, guilt, hurt – and the book had a really angry, dark, forbidding cover picture with a nasty description, would you buy the book? Yet wrap that same book up with a new cover with a happy, sunny picture on it, and a gentle, romantic description, then you probably would buy it, wouldn't you? But it still has the same content... the only thing that's different is the cover. That's exactly what's going on when we give ourselves that little "feel better" fix: we've put on a happy, sunny cover, but unfortunately it doesn't really hide the negative content inside, and as soon as we look inside, we feel bad again.

What if there was a different way? What if you could apply a "feel better" fix that will change your content? What if you could get rid of those horrible emotions, learn to change your thoughts into positive ones? How would you feel then? How would you look on the outside,



when inside all is sunny and happy? Don't you think you'd look so much better? The amazing thing is we can all change our "content", and we can make the changes pretty quickly.

Negative thoughts are a bad habit that we've learned over time. When we were born, we were perfect, happy to be us, believing everybody loved us, and loving everyone who we came into contact with. So what changed? What changed is that we were handed a "script" – like the script to a movie of our own life – which was full of everyone's expectations, especially those of our family... Remember hearing "oh you can't do that, what will the neighbours say?" Worse still are the media expectations... "to be happy and successful, you

have to be a size zero and have model looks". Gradually these scripts wear us down, often our thoughts become negative, and in many cases, we learn to reject ourselves, rather than loving and accepting ourselves, just as we are.

The good news is that everyone – absolutely everyone – can tear up the script they were given and can write their own scripts for their future. No matter what has gone before, no matter how bad the situation, you can now choose how to react for the rest of your life. You always have a choice. Try it now – the next time a negative thought pops into your head, choose to push it away, choose to not listen, choose to turn down the volume, choose a positive thought to listen to instead. If what you're thinking doesn't feel good – it's from a script. So change it! Write your own!

It takes some practise to turn this into a new habit. After all, you've been doing it the "old way" for all of your life! Be patient, practise daily, don't beat yourself up if you still have negative thoughts – as beating yourself up is a script too! – instead, celebrate each success positively and you'll soon notice the progress. Even when you're saying to yourself, "oh but I'm different, my problems are too big, that wouldn't work for me..." - it **can** work for you. All you have to do is believe it is possible, want it to happen, and practise – it can and will happen. And if you want any help with writing your new script, we'd love to help!

Parking in Swansacre

Following complaints from local residents regarding parking in Swansacre, we would like to highlight to you the local bylaw covering this road.

Perth & Kinross Council (Kinross Traffic Management) Order 1999 (NO 11/99)

"Part 2, PROHIBITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS, Driving Article 3(b) Save as provided in Article 9 of this Order no person shall drive or cause or permit to be driven any vehicle in or upon that length of road specified in Part 2 of the Schedule.

LENGTHS OF ROAD IN THE TOWN OR BURGH OF KINROSS

PART 2 – PROHIBITION OF DRIVING EXCEPT FOR ACCESS

SWANSACRE - Between its junction with Station Road and its junction with School Wynd.

EXEMPTIONS From Driving Prohibition Article 9. Nothing in **Article 3(b)** of this Order shall apply so as to prevent any person from causing or permitting any vehicle to be driven in that length of road specified in Part 2 of the Schedule if the vehicle is:- (a) public service bus, (b) emergency vehicles, local authority vehicles, (c) vehicles in connection with building operations ..."

This would clearly indicate that vehicles should only be in Swansacre if they are there for a specific purpose related to the adjacent premises etc. Driving through or parking and walking to the town is clearly not permitted. Officers will be patrolling this area and will take action against motorists who break the law.

There you will find a registration form to fill in and this will automatically send to us when you have completed and saved it. The details you provide will then be added to our database.

The form applies as much to those without an alarm installed as much as it does those with one so everyone is encouraged to fill it in. This way we can deal with any alarm activations or incidents quickly and efficiently giving you added piece of mind. It is also advisable to make arrangements for relatives, friends or neighbours to regularly check your property whilst you are away.

School Holidays

During the forthcoming holidays, officers will be paying particular attention to the schools in our area with a view to preventing acts of vandalism and other forms of anti-social behaviour from occurring. To assist us in this plan we would ask members of the public, particularly those living adjacent to our schools, to be diligent and report any incidents of vandalism, anti-social behaviour or other suspicious acts. Community Council News

Kinross Community Council

News from the June Meeting

C Watson (Chair) welcomed CCIIrs B Davies, D Colliar, D Cuthbert, M Blyth, D Mackay, W Freeman, M Scott, B Freeman and L MacKay to the meeting held on 1 June. Also in attendance were: P&K CIIrs K Baird, W Robertson, S Miller and M Barnacle; Sgt Williams (briefly); a deputation from Wallace Land and thirteen members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from CCIIr Jack.

The minutes of the May meeting were nominated by CCllr Blyth and seconded by CCllr Colliar under correction of the reference to the bushes at Springfield Park to read Springfield Road.

Police Report: There being no police representative present at this point, Wallace Land were asked to take the floor. Sgt Williams arrived during the presentation. However, due to other commitments she had to leave before presenting her report. See end for information received by email after the meeting.

Report from Wallace Land

Prior to the representatives taking the floor, CCllr Watson indicated that he had an interest in this matter as he acts for the owner of the land in question.

The area proposed for development lies to the east and west of the M90.

Alex Orr thanked the CC for allowing them to again address the meeting and introduced his two colleagues.

Mr Orr stated that the Main Issues Report identifies viable options for areas of development and continued that the CC did not make any comments on the proposed sites in our representations to the Council. Mr Orr again repeated their proposals for development of these areas, explaining that on the land to the east the proposal was to build 125 units (maximum 127). The land to the west would be developed for industrial/commercial purposes. Mr Orr explained that this was the start of a long period of consultation involving PKC and other bodies to develop a viable plan for the development of these areas. This could take up to 12 months and should this stage prove successful then a planning application would require to be submitted by Wallace Land. As these proposals come under "major development" consultation with the public would also be a requirement.

One of the CC concerns was in relation to access to the residential site. This matter and any other issues raised in relation to the whole development will be taken into account. Various specific assessments will be undertaken, e.g. traffic (including along the A977). Flooding was also commented on, again this will be addressed.

Cllr Barnacle commented on this proposal, and in particular the employment potential for Kinross west of the Motorway/Balado and added that he held concerns regarding this. He emphasised that one important factor in this proposal is the Council Depot. Cllr Barnacle had no issues in relation to the residential site. It was also mentioned that there were legal issues in relation to the allocated green space within this proposed development.

It was commented that Wallace Land are also in discussion with Moto in relation to access.

CCllr Watson opened up questions from the floor and Wallace Land representatives answered a number of queries. CCllr Watson explained that a number of developers have approached the CC and asked if they could present their proposals. It was agreed that the infrastructure is something that requires to be addressed. The CC, as is their practice, will discuss any planning applications submitted by developers as and when these should arise.

Wallace Land are to provide the CC with copies of their submissions and should a planning application be submitted at a later date they will return to a CC meeting to answer any further queries.

Mr Miles stated that there was not enough publicity given by the CC in relation to such matters. He suggested that we include in our agenda the topic of each presentation and added that this information should also feature on the CC website, as should the minutes.

Matters Arising

Pier Road build-outs and signage: CCllrs Watson and Colliar met with Brian Cargill on site and reported that they were happy to go ahead with the Council proposals.

Newsletter Accounts: Two sets of accounts were tabled for approval, i.e. Kinross Newsletter Limited (the trading account) and Kinross Community Council Newsletter Limited (Limited by Guarantee).

CCllr Cuthbert provided some details on both sets of accounts. It was noted that circulation has increased. The sum of £15,830 has been transferred from the Limited Company to the Charitable Company. There were no figures recorded for last year, as these are both newly established companies.

The funds held at credit of the Charitable Company are to be retained pending the outcome of the CC proposals for the County Buildings.

A query regarding accountancy fees was answered by CCllr Cuthbert.

Future of Kinross Buildings

County Buildings: CCllr Watson advised that the Council have agreed (in principle) to the issue of a licence for the occupation of this building for one year. CCllrs Watson and Cuthbert are to meet with Jim Low on 2 June to receive the terms of the Licence, which may be restrictive. CCllr

Watson commented that he inspected the property recently with the Partnership. It was noted that that the building appears sound with no major defects.

On a query raised by CCllr Colliar, CCllr Watson answered that the meeting was only arranged today (1 June). He stated that there was no intention to keep this information from CCllrs Colliar, Blyth and Mackay. Meetings with the Partnership were one to one, and David Littlejohn requested one representative from each organisation.

Former High School site: It was reported that the offer received for this site has now been withdrawn and that proceedings will have to start afresh with the site being remarketed. The CC has grave concerns that this building will lie vacant and deteriorating for some years and the Councillors will try to ensure that this does not happen. It was commented that there was a delay in marketing the property with no timescale stipulated. It was proposed to demolish some of the buildings to the rear.

It was questioned whether this site could be used by the Curling Academy. However, it was mentioned that they are trying to resolve the issues in relation to the Market Park.

Mill Street: The CC will write to PKC to enquire if they would consider clearing this site to provide additional car parking for the centre of the town.

The CC had no objections to any of the above.

11/00270/FLL Police Station: Installation of solar voltaic panels.

11/00390/FLL Plots 1-84 Station Road: Modification of existing consent (change of house types) (Plots 27-29 and 34-37).

11/00441/FLL Rachel House: Alterations and formation of patio area, walls and canopy.

11/00444/FLL New Mains House, Balado: Alt and ext to house.

CC Planning objections (Convention): Seven replied to their communication, six in favour and one against. They ask that all CCs give their views on this proposal and also if we have any examples of objections from the CC where the application has not gone to the Development Control Committee.

Reports from P& K Councillors

Cllr Barnacle reported that in the Autumn he was hoping to reconvene the Kinross-shire Forum. Previously, both

Minathort and Kinross CCs rejected this idea. Kinross CC would be happy to be included in this proposal but only if elected members of the various CCs were invited. It was noted that Kinross CC has met with other CCs in the past on major issues.

Correspondence

Core Paths Plan Inquiry: Mr Stubbs from the Council replied that he would be happy to attend a CC meeting, however needed a response before 1 June. He recalls they consulted us about the section of the trail which has been built and the completion of it and about the right of way at Cockairney. He added that the completion of the trail is a complicated proposition and he has a range of responses from the owners down there already. Following on this PKC acknowledged our submission and advised that this has been sent on to the Department for Planning and Environmental Appeals to assist the Reporters in completing the inquiry. PKC has no further opportunity to comment with regard to this issue. When the DPEA have completed their inquiry they will prepare a Report and recommendations for the Scottish Ministers who will have the final decision. In due course the Scottish Government will then direct PKC to adopt the finalised Core Paths Plan with or without modifications.

Armed Forces Day: Fly A Flag - to be held on Monday 20 June (for a week). PKC will purchase a flag on our behalf, however we will require someone to raise this.

CLD Meetings: The last was on 23 May. The next is on 29 June.

Community Campus Partnership: Initiated in April 2010 with six members representing Sport, Youth, Parent Council, Arts & Culture, CC. This group have agreed their Memorandum of Agreement and are in the process of establishing effective communication with local communities, campus users and the Campus Management Group. They are currently looking to recruit new members. We are to invite Tracey Ramsay to our next meeting. The next Partnership meeting is scheduled for 16 June. It was noted that one person represents each individual group and that the CC representative is CCllr Cooper from Fossoway CC

Kinross House: A query was received by email requesting any information on the new owners of this property.

TAYplan: The period for making representations on the Proposed Strategic Development Plan (2011), the Proposed Action Programme (2011) and the Equalities and Human Rights Impact Assessment (2011) will commence on Monday 6 June and close on Monday 1 August 2011. This matter is to be added to the Agenda for July.



Other Business

High School: It was reported that the gates at the rear of the High School have been opened and that cars are driving in to this area at certain times.

Red Lion: This building is in a state of disrepair. The CC will write to the Conservation Officer pointing this out.

Campus: CCllr Cuthbert reported that Mitie refused to open the gates for an ambulance that had been called to the campus.

Roads/Transport: CCllr Scott was approached in relation to the parking of vehicles at the Primary School in the area of Bowton Road/Ross Street. A member of the public also raised the issue of the poor bus service to the bottom of the town. Cllr Barnacle responded that a solution to this latter problem is being sought. In relation to the condition of the pavements and the numerous potholes on the roads, Cllr Scott said that in a number of places people walking along the pavements are showered with water when cars pass.

Drains: CCllr Freeman asked if there was any response to his enquiry last month.

Police Report (received by email): There have been a number of thefts including break-ins to properties for scrap metal such as piping, copper cabling etc, in the Kinross area. The police were kept very busy following the recent high winds and thank members of the public for their assistance in helping to clear up fallen trees and their patience with the road closures.

Operation Homesafe was launched on 1/7/11, running parallel with Operation Dorado, a national anti-violence campaign. Both operations are aimed at reducing violent crime and disorder, anti-social behaviour, alcohol related crime, weapon carrying, knife and hate crime which will increase community confidence. These operations will run through to 31/8/11.

The Next Meeting is scheduled to take place at the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross on Wednesday 6 July 2011 at 7.30pm.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the June Meeting

M Parkin (Chairman) welcomed CCllrs J Bird, R Cairncross, T Smith, M Strang Steel, S Forde, D Williamson, P&K Cllr Baird and seven residents to the meeting held on 14 June 2011. Apologies for absence were received from P&K Cllrs Robertson and Miller.

Previous minutes were approved and signed after a change was made under the Police Report heading.

Police Report: None tendered, although communications with the Police during the previous week indicated that there had been break-ins and fly tipping at the allotment site at Scotlandwell.

Treasurer's report: Zero activity since the last CC meeting; £555.64 in the two accounts.

Stephen's Field, Kinnesswood: The Chairman explained that the CC had decided not to wait for further developments between PKC and the builders and the CC solicitors had been asked to complete the acquisition of the land on behalf of the community.

Balgedie Toll to Mawcarse Road: Cllr Baird informed the meeting that the 'horse' signs and Wester Balgedie signs were still to be completed and she understood that the Kilmagadwood sign had been erected facing the hill and not towards the houses.

A resident raised the question whether the cattle sign was still required at Orwell. It was agreed the CC would make a survey of signs in Portmoak.

Kinnesswood bus shelter area: The Chairman had written to PKC to say that the shelter roof would probably need replacing before next winter. PKC had agreed to examine the roof and had also suggested that they would be pleased to liaise with the CC to carry out other agreed works to upgrade the shelter. However, no work could be carried out until the nesting migratory birds depart in September.

Build-outs: Cllr Baird reported on the progress she had made with the roads dept and although they had been constructed under a standard design there was still the problem with lack of visibility on the 'reverse' side of the bollards. It was thought that a simple reflective strip could prove beneficial.

Water level in loch: Awaiting a response from the Loch Leven Trustees following a letter to the Trustees in May 2011.

Convention of P&K CCs: There was a previous suggestion to dissolve the convention through lack of interest shown by the membership, although new ideas had been brought forward to continue the Convention in some way. The Chairman would be attending the July meeting.

Wall opposite Portmoak Hall: There were many problems with the wall and after much discussion there were as many answers as problems. There has been some first aid repairs carried out but these are not considered satisfactory. Cllr Baird would meet with the roads dept to discuss the issues.

Sub Committee Reports

Paths, Pavements and Roads: There was presently a fund-raising scheme in operation to provide money for this year's maintenance of the MBW and a lot of discussion took place on how and why the CC had been involved in the project from the start. Callum Robertson, owner of the land carrying part of the MBW, said that no agreement with PKC about maintenance etc had been completed with him although one had been proposed. This means that no one has any obligation to maintain his part of the MBW, nor can carry out

any work voluntarily without the landowner's agreement, although PKC will be able to do so when the MBW becomes a core path.

The Michael Bruce Trust had been contacted and would not provide any funding for the maintenance of the walk. However, the walk was considered to be an asset for the community and therefore the CC would continue to provide some form of management for the walk. The Chairman would look at the question of responsibility.

Planning: Cllr Cairncross explained that there had only been one planning application during the last month, solar panels on a property in Scotlandwell, and the CC would not be making any comment.

The number of planning applications between Jan to June 2011 compared with the same period last year is considerably lower

Certain long term issues/problems re the planning system are now part of a review system being conducted by PKC Legal Services together with PKC Planning services. CCllrs Cairncross and Strang Steel would be meeting with both depts to discuss relevant planning issues especially in relation to the new development at Scotlandwell. CCllr Cairncross would keep Cllr Baird informed of any future meetings with PKC to enable her attendance.

With regard to specific issues at the Scotlandwell development, CCllr Forde stated that what had been agreed on the planning approval notice had not in reality been carried out. CCllr Strang Steel confirmed that what had been agreed on the plans should in fact be what is carried out.

The Vane Farm application, discussed at a previous CC, was still being considered by PKC.

Other Business

'Tayplan' would be organising public meetings to explain the long term planning for the area. There was more information on the Tayplan website.

Herbicide spraying This had caused considerable comment and problems throughout Portmoak. Residents' property had been destroyed and the law had been disregarded on the SSSI sites.

There had been a number of reasons put forward by PKC why this spraying had occurred but none was considered to be looking at the basic cause of the problem, which was the contract between PKC and the contractors.

Information was given to the meeting by Cllr Baird that PKC were meeting with a number of residents of Portmoak on 15 June although this information had not been given to the CC prior to the meeting.

Cllr Baird agreed to try and receive a copy of the contract between PKC and the contractors responsible for the herbicide spraying.

Cllr Baird informed the meeting that road verge grass cutting would only be carried out once this year.

Gorse cutting on the hill: It had earlier been reported by the owner of the hill that gorse would be cut and burnt (because the SNH approved method was not practical). However, some gorse had been left where it had been cut and not burnt. It was thought that this could create two problems, a future fire hazard from the continual drying out of the gorse and the blocking of the burn.

(It had been reported previously that the main burn running through Kinnesswood had been blocked with fallen gorse and this had caused the burn to overflow into the sheep field and then flooded properties in Whitecraigs. This was cleared by local residents who reacted immediately to the problem.)

However the owner of the hill suggested that the gorse which was lying in this area would disintegrate through time and be dispersed by the animals using the hill. He agreed that it was his responsibility to make sure that the burn did not overflow and create problems to villagers in Kinnesswood and therefore a regular inspection and maintenance programme was required.

There was evidence of certain works carried out on the hill e.g. steps being cut into the steep part of the land behind the water tank at Kinnesswood, which did not have the permission of the landowner. It was agreed that it was not just common decency but obligatory to speak to the landowner before any consideration of such works was contemplated.

Barn at Wester Balgedie: A resident emailed the CC with information on problems with a barn at Wester Balgedie and the possible problems of falling timbers and flying tin sheets during states of inclement weather.

The day after the e-mail had been received by the CC, CCllr Cairncross reported that a JCB had arrived on site and it was thought that the JCB would rectify the above problems. However, it now transpired that the two instances were not connected and the original problem still existed.

Although PKC had requested the owner of the barns to sort out the problem within a specified timescale it had not been possible to contact the responsible PKC office to confirm the present situation, possibly due to the relocation of offices from the County Buildings in Kinross.

Recycling point Scotlandwell: The CC had been notified by PKC that the recycling point at Scotlandwell would cease with immediate effect. The CC had not originally supported the idea of this recycling point.

Causeway: A resident raised the issue of the state of the Causeway in Scotlandwell, especially in light of the number of accidents which had occurred on this stretch of road with specific regard to the apparent collapse of the road in certain stretches which seemed to attract vehicles into the verge. This had been reported to the police by the Chairman. Cllr Baird agreed to discuss the issues with PKC roads dept.

Speed signs: A resident raised the issue of when the 40 mph signs were going to be in place and whether consideration should be given to introducing a further speed limit of 20 mph in certain areas.

Cllr Baird agreed to investigate these issues.

Communications since last meeting: a list of all can be found in the full minutes on the Portmoak website.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the June Meeting

CCllr Hamilton, Chairman, welcomed CCllrs Cottingham, Smith, Halford, Milne Home, Bennet and Giacopazzi to the meeting held on 9 June. Also in attendance were Minute Secretary E Rougvie; P&K Cllrs Baird, Robertson and Miller; Inspector Iain Ward and PC Euan Mitchell of Tayside Police; Murray McEwan of the Scottish Ambulance Service and 28 members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllr Thomson.

Police matters

Incidents: PC Mitchell reported four incidents in Milnathort, three of which had resulted in arrests. There had been vandalism to a stone pillar in South Street in the form of graffiti; theft from an insecure van in Wester Loan; the attempted theft of a vehicle in Whyte Place and a break-in to a car outside Stewart and Smart, as a result of which a rear window had been smashed. This was the only incident for which no-one had been detected as yet.

PC Mitchell also highlighted the summer drink drive safety campaign, which ran from 6 to 20 June, and the Street **Sports 4 All** initiative which is run in conjunction with P&K Community Safety Partnership and St Johnstone Football Club. It is hoped to bring this to Milnathort during the summer and the police in Kinross would be pleased to hear from anyone running a community event such as a fete or a gala as it could be used as an additional attraction.

T in the Park: Inspector Ward introduced himself as the new senior officer for South Perthshire and was available to answer any questions regarding T in the Park. He hoped that the problems with vehicles being parked in Stirling Road and Bridgefauld Road would be alleviated this year as a parking ban was to be introduced at least on one side of Stirling Road. Any issues relating to dangerous parking can be dealt with by the police. As far as noise was concerned, improvements have been made to the site this year and DF Concerts have invested heavily in noise monitoring equipment. Any concerns about the music being too loud should be addressed to PKC.

Jessie's Park: Cllr Robertson said that there were already problems with broken glass in Jessie's Park in Back Loan, which has recently been re-opened. Inspector Ward advised that the police would keep an eye on the situation while they were out patrolling.



Victoria Avenue/Wester Loan junction: A member of the public raised concerns about three cars that were continually parked close to this junction, causing a hazard for drivers. This is an ongoing problem and informal approaches to the owners of the vehicles had had no effect. CCllr Hamilton said that Victoria Avenue was to be made a one-way street under the Placecheck scheme, but this would not happen for over a year. Inspector Ward advised that according to the Highway Code, vehicles must not be parked within 10m of a junction, but police can only remove a vehicle if it is causing serious and immediate danger. However, he will would take up the matter.

Scottish Ambulance Service presentation: McEwan, community resuscitation development officer with the Scottish Ambulance Service, gave a presentation on the Community First Responders scheme, which was set up in 2002 to assist the Ambulance Service in certain emergency situations. It involves volunteers being trained in life-saving techniques while patients await the arrival of an ambulance. Participants are required to undertake an initial weekend's training followed by monthly two-hour training sessions. They are not required to deal with patients under 16; those who are under the influence of alcohol or drugs or anyone who is violent. At present there are three Community First Responders in Kinross and Milnathort but the ideal number would be 15-20. Minutes: The minutes of the May meeting were proposed by CCllr Bennet, who asked for it to be recorded that at the last meeting she had personally objected to a planning application by Kinross Cricket Club. That done, the minutes were seconded by CCllr Smith.

Planning Matters

Application submitted: Modification of existing consent to change turbine type and specification at Mawcarse Farm.

Application determined: Change of use from vehicle repair workshop to used car sales forecourt at Mitchell's Electrical Services, 101 South Street (Approved). Noted.

Matters Arising

Kinross Cricket Club: CCllr Hamilton advised that this application had been withdrawn, but since a sizeable delegation had attended the meeting it was considered to be appropriate to hear their objections should the application be re-submitted at a later date. CCllr Bennet also raised concerns about the application process. The application had been posted on the PKC website on 13 May, but a notice did not appear in the vicinity of the proposed site at Burleigh Castle until 1 June. Since there were only 21 days in which to lodge an objection, those who hadn't seen it online would have been at a disadvantage. Planning applications are also only published in two newspapers, the Courier and Perthshire Advertiser, so again people may not have seen it. After discussion, Cllrs Robertson and Baird agreed to seek clarification on planning procedures and report back to the next meeting. It was also agreed that if the application was resubmitted the CC would contact the objectors as it was possible to submit a holding request for submissions.

Tillywhally Wood: Milnathort Primary School have now been given chippings and logs. The benches have been constructed and are now awaiting installation. A £300 donation had been received from Kinross Road Runners and it was agreed that if there was any surplus it would go towards installing benches along the old railway line walk.

Jessie's Park: It was confirmed that the small park in Back Loan had now been re-named Jessie's Park in memory of Jessie Porter and that her family had been contacted. Following discussion, it was agreed that CCllrs Giacopazzi and Bennet will meet to discuss ideas about an appropriate permanent memorial in the park and will report their proposals to the August CC meeting.

Placecheck: An e-mail was received from Diane Cassidy of Placecheck expressing her thanks to everyone who turned up at the reopening of the park in Back Loan and to Cllr Roberston for cutting the ribbon.

Zebra crossing in New Road: Cllr Robertson reported that major repair works will be carried out shortly at this crossing, which is considered to be dangerous.

Wester Loan: CCllr Hamilton advised that the CC had been in negotiations with PKC about the proposed changes in Wester Loan, which had not met with the approval of residents. They had reached a compromise that was acceptable to most and he had delivered copies of the new plans to 25 people in the area. The traffic calming measures will be implemented this summer but the one-way system in Victoria Avenue will not be introduced until next year.

Snow ploughs: CCllr Milne Home expressed concerns that the snow ploughs that had been promised to local farms had not materialised. Cllr Robertson will investigate.

Verge cutting: CCllr Milne Home advised that grass verges in rural areas were now only being cut once a year due to budget constraints but potential private contractors were discouraged by PKC's tendering process, which was excessively bureaucratic. Cllr Robertson explained that the council had to adhere to European guidelines to ensure that it was seen to be spending taxpayers' money wisely. After discussion, it was agreed that Cllr Baird will follow up the matter as some verges were considered to be dangerous.

Members of the public

The following issues were raised:

Dog fouling It was noted with regret that there was already evidence of dog fouling in Jessie's Park. Dog owners are reminded that they are required to clean up after their pets by law.

Feeder pillar: It was considered that Scottish Water's feeder pillar in Burleigh Road was inappropriately sited as it was unsightly and was causing an obstruction. CCllr Bennet will follow this up and suggested that residents contact Scottish Water.

Drainage issues: Cllr Robertson agreed to contact Clarence about drainage problems at Burleigh Castle and will investigate issues of ineffective drainage in Balfour Crescent. Safety mirror: Cllr Robertson advised that PKC would not be prepared to fund a mirror at the foot of Bal four Road.

The mini-roundabout at the Town Hall was thought to be dangerous as motorists tended to approach from South Road without looking. Cllr Robertson said that in fact there had been very few accidents at this location but it was soon to be resurfaced and repainted, which should improve the situation. Wall in Burleigh Road: This is in a state of disrepair and is the landowner's responsibility but Cllr Robertson will once again investigate the possibility of having it repaired by people carrying out community service.

Other business

Crash barriers: Cllr Baird is still pursuing the issue of the missing crash barriers on Hattonburn Road as there was some debate about whether BEAR Scotland or PKC were responsible for the stretch concerned.

Cemetery wall: CCllr Giacopazzi reported that this is to be repaired with mortar.

Accounts: CCllr Bennet, treasurer, advised that the accounts had now been audited and the CC will receive funding from PKC. It was agreed that she and CCllr Giacopazzi will purchase a gift for the auditor, who gave his services free of charge.

Next meeting: There will be no CC meeting in July, but the next meeting will be held in Orwell Parish Church Hall on Thursday 11 August at 7.30pm. This venue and time are now permanent and members of the public are welcome.

Fossoway and District CC

News from the May Meeting

The meeting on 3 May was attended by T Duffy-Wigman, A Lavery (Chair), M Anness (Minutes), A Cheape, K Borthwick, R Cooper, P&K Cllr M Barnacle and 13 members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from: S Anderson, A Morrison and P&K Cllr W Robertson. There were no declarations of interest.

Community Policing: Sgt Williams reported that it had been a quiet month except for wandering animals in the streets.

Details for T in the Park public meetings were given.

Comments were made by the public about gates being left open and vandalised and farmers not being allowed to padlock their gates.

A complaint was made about horses in crop fields.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle is awaiting response from P&K Council and will send a reminder.

Dunning Glen: The CC has applied for a grant for cleaning up and sign. Multi-agency meeting will be held soon.

Core Path Network Inquiry: Maps showing Core Paths had been received from the Access Office and were displayed during the meeting. Reactions to these were to be in by 13 May. It was felt by the CC that this was short notice and a complaint has been sent. A discussion was held about some of the decisions that had been made with regard to the paths and some members of the public felt that relevant people including Cllr Barnacle had not been informed.

Kinross-shire Fund: Angus reported that the next meeting was 6 June and welcomed applications for projects.

Convention of P&K CCs: Kevin reported that only eight members of the possible 18 turned up to decide the future. Four voted for it to be wound up, two for it to remain and two abstained. However as there was insufficient attendance no action could be taken. The CC agreed not to resign from the convention until their next meeting as they may need support to vote themselves out of existence.

Report from P&K Councillor: Cllr Barnacle reported that Scottish Water had suggested a further meeting regarding control of the Devon.

At the AGM of the Civic Trust, M Travers gave a talk on Renewable Energy and Cllr Barnacle has passed information to Secretary.

A letter has been sent to Cllr Baird re Convener of the Development Control having the casting vote which is used against local opinion. This will be pursued after elections.

Planning Matters: 11/00600/IPL, Land South of Craigton Farm Road, Rumbling Bridge: renewal of planning consent 08/00267/OUT, for the erection of four dwelling houses with associated business use. No CC comment.

Alastair also reported that the service from the Council has improved as the CC planning officer is now sent a list of planning decisions. This means we can see whether CC recommendations are being followed up or ignored.

General Correspondence: A report on the CC incoming and outgoing correspondence was distributed.

Thompson Homes gave a presentation and distributed handouts with their new proposals for Powmill; available on website, www.fossoway.org

The gate at the New Bridge in Crook of Devon has now been fortified following the escaped cattle incident at the beginning of May. Comments were made about the amount of time it took the Police to attend the incident. Concern was expressed from the floor about who takes responsibility for damage when such incidents occur as the law is very unclear

in these matters and the implications this has for Core Paths and increased access through farmland. Comments were made about posts being removed from the kissing gate during the construction of the new bridge. Cllr Barnacle will seek redress about maintenance of Core Path routes.

Core paths: Comments were made from the floor that discussion about Core Paths had not been reflected fully in the CC minutes. It was noted that the minutes were only a record of the meeting and the CC would welcome volunteers for minute secretary.

Roads: Concerns were raised about the loop road in the Crook of Devon between A977 and A91. This road is being increasingly used by a lot of traffic, especially HGVs, and this road is not suitable for such traffic. A request was made for the CC to write to PKC for a sign. Concerns were also raised about Vicar's Bridge road on both sides of the A977. It was noted that Clackmannanshire Council had much better signage.

Display board: Apologies were made about the lack of display board in Blairingone as the doors on the Notice Board have fallen off. Marion to look for volunteers to help.

Newsletter: CC agreed to give £10 so that the Kinross Newsletter can be sold at Blairingone Primary School as the newsletter has to be paid for up front. Marion and Trudy to liaise.

Car Park, Crook of Devon Church: No further development. Another meeting is to be convened.

News from the June Meeting

The meeting on 7 June was attended by CCllrs S Morrison, T Wigman-Duffy, A Lavery, S Anderson, M Anness, K Bothwick and R Cooper. Also in attendance were P&K Cllr M Barnacle, and 13 members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from A Cheape and P&K Cllr W Robertson.

Declarations of interest: There was a declaration of interest from Ramsey regarding a planning application for Coup Steps, Powmill.

Community Policing: No police available. (Post-meeting note: apologies were received from Tayside Police for their absence.)

Minutes of the last meeting: Comments about the posts being removed from the kissing gate were incorrect. It was noted that the request for the CC to write to PKC for a sign on the A977 was not necessary at the moment as Cllr Robertson had already emailed the council. With these amendments noted, the minutes were signed off.

Presentation by Hugh Wallace: With the aid of a map showing a plan for a Hydro Scheme on the River Devon, Hugh gave an outline proposal for the development. It covered the main issues, the time frame and the Community benefit.

Main Issues: Visual impact, the position of the turbine house, the long-term impact and reduced river flow.

Time Frame: Landowners agreements to be established, loan schemes from the government to be investigated and overall planning to be applied for.

Community Benefit: A Community Fund to be set up, the recipients of the fund to be arranged (CC possibly), and considerations as to the distribution of funds to be agreed.

A discussion was opened to the floor and various issues were raised. How many landowners were involved? Had SEPA been involved? Were there any safeguards for wildlife? Was Scottish Water involved? Where would the distribution connection to the grid be sited? What would the

environmental impact be? All these questions would be answered by Hugh and he agreed to put all these proposals on the CC website.

Presentation on Burnside Wind Farm: Sarah Dooley outlined the plan for an extension to the Burnhill Wind Farm comprising a maximum of 22 turbines. The site straddles both Clackmannanshire and Perth & Kinross Councils. Nine turbines would be in the Perth & Kinross area. There is potential for expansion on the site with the final turbine layout to be decided by next month and planning submissions would follow. There would be considerable benefits to the community in the form of a trust fund. This particular wind farm was 85% productive as the wind was blowing most of the time. Cllr Barnacle commented that the Main Issues Report was concerned with the visual impact of the wind farm and that no one had benefited financially in the Fossoway CC area, although they were directly affected by the site. Comments from the floor noted the huge profits derived from these developments and wondered how more funds could be made available for the community. The proposals would be put on the CC website.

Matters Arising

Blairingone Biomass Plant: Nothing to report as the site has been sold and so far no one has put in any applications.

War Memorial, Blairingone: Cllr Barnacle has finally heard from Historic Scotland which has no objections to the memorial being moved. A further meeting will be arranged by Mike at the beginning of July, with Council officials, the developers and the Blairingone sub-group, to find a solution to this problem. It was noted that this has taken place before and that the last meeting was inconclusive as the council officials never turned up.

Dunning Glen: Multi-agency meetings have been useful with all the landowners now on board. Applications for funds to clear the site have been put forward for approval with various ideas to improve the site; signs to discourage camping, limited parking access, fencing and more police involvement. Members of the public are encouraged to report unsocial activity in the area to the police so that they can act more robustly.

Tay Plan Consultation: There will be a consultation period from 6 June to 1 August. There will be a Public Information Event at the Loch Leven Campus on 15 June. There are no significant changes from the draft report.

Report by P&K Councillor

Cllr Barnacle has a proposal that the Kinross Forum should be reinstated. It might be more beneficial for the Forum to stay local, particularly on planning matters. He will put the suggestion to the Kinross CC.

There has been tree damage on the River Devon during the latest storm. Ken O'Lone is the tree officer for the area.

Cow dispute: The dispute mentioned at the last meeting on cows escaping on the core path has been resolved.


Meetings: A schedule of future meetings was tabled.

Cleish & Blairadam CC

News from the May Meeting

The CC met on Monday 16 May in Cleish Village Hall. It was also attended by five CCllrs and five members of the public. The Cleish & Blairadam Newsletter Editor was also present. Apologies for absence were received from Fiona Macgregor and P&K Cllr M Barnacle. From Perth & Kinross Police we were fortunate to have Sergeant Sandra Williams – she has a huge area to cover and we welcomed her attendance.

Crime Prevention: Following on from the previous meeting and the comments from residents of Keltybridge (with Fife 01383 numbers) not being able to access the Tayside Police, Sgt Williams said this had been due to a lack of communication and in future calls to 0300 111 2222 would be answered in the normal fashion.

Calls had been received regarding possible hare coursing and poaching: however, whilst nothing suspicious had been uncovered, it was important to keep calls coming when suspicions are aroused. Unusual sightings of vans or flatbeds should be reported at once – the sooner the police are made aware, the sooner they can investigate. There has been dumping of garden rubbish at Chance Inn Farm – this would be looked into.

Nivingston Hill Road: this is a popular cycle route and is often used for organised cycle events and races. While this is a recognised cycle route, the hill itself, with a proliferation of potholes, can be dangerous and extreme caution should be observed, both from cyclists and motorists.

T in the Park – beginning 7 July: In previous years the Police had attended CC meetings around the county, but it was thought that a special meeting in Cleish might not be necessary. It was agreed by the CC that as we are on the periphery of this event we had no particular concerns; however anyone with special concerns could contact Sgt Williams directly.

Sgt Williams concluded by letting us know that PC Nicky Ward was leaving; The CC expressed their regret and asked that she should be thanked for all she had done for our area. We wish her well in the future.

Fiona Barnfather, the Neighbourhood Watch coordinator for Ardgairney, attended the meeting. Unfortunately the CC is unaware of the coordinator for Keltybridge and Blairadam and will investigate this further.

Sgt Williams was thanked for her attendance and she then left the meeting.

Community Councils: The Chairman said that there was a need for greater engagement between Community Councils and Perth & Kinross Council.

The Convention of Community Councils of Perth & Kinross which has a remit to provide a stronger unified voice has had little support over recent years and a proposal has been made to dissolve it. The CC discussed this and agreed that it would be more appropriate for the Kinross Forum to be resuscitated, addressing more local issues. Kinross and Milnathort CCs have in the past been reluctant for this, but the rural CCs would probably be in favour of such a proposal. Cllr Barnacle will be taking this forward.

The question was raised regarding the engagement of Cleish and Blairadam CC with the community.

How do we get more people to attend meetings?

How do we raise awareness of what we do, and what more can we do?

How do we get people to stand for membership of the CC?

All these are important issues and there is no doubt people will come along if there is a matter directly concerning them. It was proposed to consider the issuing of a really good flier. Urgent matters could be the issues of the AGLV; Conservation status; Development – which should be appropriate; What can Community Councils do for us? We need more people to put their names forward for election

this will take place sometime during the autumn.Tayplan: This is heading our way with implications for

roads, transport, education. **Planning:** There were no new applications.

Pending:

Erection of dwelling house at Blairadam – approved. Erection of dwelling house at Moreland Farm – pending. Change of house type at Plot 1, Sunnyside – pending. Gairneybridge Caravan Site – pending.

Green acres – the enforcement Officer has been contacted regarding work already being undertaken but not approved. The question was raised as to whether SEPA and SNH know about this – has the due process been followed?

It was agreed the CC need take no action at this stage as we have called for clarification in the MIR and Cllr Barnacle is also liaising with the planning dept.

Erection of wind turbine at Nivingston – full permission granted.

Extension to Cleish Church – pending.

Roads: A letter had been written to the Roads Department regarding the state of the road between Mawmill crossroads and Coldrain.

The lines at Cleish Mill Bends had now worn out – this would be reported to the Roads Department.

The next meeting of Cleish & Blairadam CC was due to take place on Monday 27 June.

By the time the July Newsletter appears, Anne Anderson, as she told you last month, will have retired as Principal of Seamab School. This marks the end of an era.

Anne has worked in Seamab for 22 years and has been Principal for the last 16 of them. These figures, however, tell only a little bit of the story. For those 16 years, Anne has lived in Seamab and the school has grown up around her and has developed very much in her image. What characterises Seamab is that staff develop real love for and attachment to their children. For Anne this is the natural, indeed the only, way to work because she only deals in real feelings - going way beyond a skilled, professional approach. This determines the ethos of Seamab and creates an atmosphere in which the children feel safe, loved and respected.

Anne has attracted to Seamab a first rate group of professional colleagues who have contributed, under her charismatic leadership, to establishing Seamab in the forefront of residential provision for young children with the most severe emotional difficulties.

When Anne took over as Principal, Seamab operated in one building which had to accommodate both living accommodation and educational provision. She has presided over the development of the school to its present state where the children live in three bungalows and travel to school - a pleasant, modern building which is superbly equipped and resourced. She has also developed therapeutic services including psychotherapy, speech & language therapy and occupational therapy. Importantly, she has left Seamab with a five year Development Plan which will guide it into the future.

The Board of Governors are very conscious of the debt Seamab owes to Anne and wish her a long and happy retirement. We know that she will be able to take pleasure in looking back on the enormous help she has given to so many very vulnerable children, improving the quality of their lives and equipping them to face their futures.

We have been fortunate in being able to recruit Joanna McCreadie as our new Principal. Joanna has experience of working in both Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Education and the Social Work Inspectorate Agency and was, latterly, Assistant Chief Executive of C are Visions, a major provider of residential child care. We look forward to working with her to build on the successes of Seamab and to continue its development.





Kinross High School litter pick


Kinross High School pupils took part in an afternoon litter pick to help clean up their local environment. The idea came from pupils after



Despite the inclement weather during June or possibly due to the rain, the weeds have continued to flourish and work parties have been scheduled for Saturday and Sunday for the next few weeks. In addition some members have been working during the week to collect bedding plants, prepare and plant different areas and generally keep on top of maintenance. This is also the time of year when the portfolio has to be prepared which involves a lot of hard work collecting suitable photographs and making sure that all gardening efforts over the year are highlighted.

Our annual appeal will go through the doors of Kinnesswood residents soon and we hope you will support our efforts. Although we still receive some financial help we do rely on our fundraising efforts and support of local residents to keep up the good work.

Portmoak Primary School were preparing for their first eco flag. At the beginning of June they were visited by three members of Kinnesswood in Bloom to take part in a morning of creativity using recycled materials. Primary 1 and 2 were doing a topic about castles and were able to make shields out of cereal packets and packaging. Primary 2 and 3 filled old wellies with compost and planted marigolds. They then made plant labels out of margarine tubs and decorated them. Primary 4 and Primary 5 and 6 both made bags out of old newspapers and learned to make twisted cord out of wool to make the handles. Primary 7 made very attractive small boxes out of old cards. These required some careful measurement but produced very attractive and useful gift boxes.

There have been regular work parties at the school all year, particularly with the Primary Four class, weeding areas, creating a new wildlife hedge and planting out areas to enhance the school environment.

The school was visited recently by the eco assessors and received their first eco flag. This was a great achievement by pupils, staff and the new head teacher, so well done Portmoak Primary School.

Under the able leadership of Shelagh, the trenches were prepared for the tattie planting. Potatoes were planted and earthed up and several rows are now growing below the wildlife area. We hope to have a good crop later in the year. Talking about vegetables, we will be offering a seasonable recipe every month in the Kinross Newsletter, tried and tested by our members. Recipe

Courgette and Carrot Bake

There are plenty of courgettes around in July, whether you are buying them from a local shop or growing them yourselves. This easy recipe makes a very tasty dish, good as a main course with a salad or as part of a buffet. You can add chopped ham or any left over veg etables to this dish.

Ingredients

225g courgettes grated 225g carrots grated 1 onion finely chopped 3 eggs 50g breadcrumbs 110g cheddar cheese 1 tablespoon vegetable oil

Method

Preheat oven to 350F/180C/gas mark 4

Heat oil in a large pan or wok and gently fiv onion for five minutes till soft. Stir in courgettes and carrots and cook for 2-3 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in the bread crumbs, the eggs and most of the cheese. Season well then spoon into a lightly greased ovenproof dish and sprinkle over the rest of the cheese. Bake for 20-30 minutes until set and golden.

Mid-summer Walk to Tullibole Castle

35 members and friends of the Trust had a very successful visit on Sunday 19 June to Tullibole Castle, courtesy of Lord and Lady Moncrieff. The day turned out to be perfect weather following days of torrential rain.

It was very significant for the Trust to have the visit to Tullibole, as the very first event that the Civic Trust held 20 years ago was to the Castle. This time, however, instead of visiting the Castle, Rhoderick Moncrieff treated us to a fascinating tour of the grounds of the estate. As well as describing the elements of the grounds, we had a detailed

insight to the history, starting 4000 years ago, through Roman times to the history of the development of the castle site and ending up with modern times with the Polish Camp from the 2nd World War and the latest treasure trail hobby using Global Positioning Systems.

Starting with the 'stew ponds' where the laird did his fishing, with the wash house adjacent, on to the Doo'cot and then round to the steading, we had a description of self sufficiency. We then proceeded down the drive to the site of the lodge gate and the position of three bases of the old Polish soldiers camp, then back up the road to the old cemetery, where we were told tales of the past, of witches etc. The tour then ended with attempts to walk through the Witches Maze that Rhoderick started creating in 2003 and which is growing apace.

We ended a very fascinating afternoon with wine and cheese in the wonderful grand hall of the Castle. All in all, a very satisfactory day.

The Castle is open to the public during parts of August and September. The Cemetery and the Witches Maze are open to the public all the year round and can be accessed by parking on the public road adjacent to the cemetery.

Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire The Salutation Hotel

On 26 May 1860, a coach arrived in Kinross bearing Prince Henri, Duc D'Aumale, son of the former French King Louis-Philippe. After making a visit to Lochleven Castle and Kinross House, he returned down the avenue leading to the centre of the town where a lunch had been prepared for him by James Rennie, owner of the Salutation Hotel. For centuries the hostelries of Kinross have welcomed royalty and passing celebrities and the Salutation has been no exception.

Situated near the centre of the old burgh of Kinross where Avenue Road meets the High Street, the three-storey, slateroofed Salutation Hotel stands out as a notable landmark with its white harled walls and black painted window margins. Forming an L-plan on the corner of Avenue Road, its front elevation presents an elegant facade of three bays with what was once the main door at the centre. Now blocked up as a window, the former doorway is flanked by pilasters and capped with an architrave cornice stone on which is carved the initials WW/ED and the date 1721. The side elevation shows an asymmetrical jumble of different sized windows and various lumps and bumps from the original inn, which was almost certainly heightened and remodelled in the early 19th century, as well as being restored and extended at least twice in later years. Additional points of interest include a stair-tower and, in the courtyard, a lintel stone with the initials DM/MS and the date 1729. This stone is all that survives of the building that once stood next door to the Salutation Hotel at 97 High Street.

Described by the Rev. George Buchanan in his 1839 account of the Parish of Kinross as "an inferior, but respectable inn," the Salutation was one of five inns in Kinross dating from the coaching era. Despite limited space for stabling, James Rennie was able in 1849 to boast of having a coach called *The Fair Maid* which travelled between Kinross and Burntisland where passengers could get a ferry to Granton and then a train or coach to the centre of Edinburgh. Ten years later, with the demise of long distance coach journeys in favour of travel by rail, the Salutation offered three horses

and a gig for getting about locally, a horse and gig being available for hire in 1859 at a cost of 10 shillings (50p) per day. In 1865 the hotel was sold to Alice Morton of Colinsburgh for £430 and by 1877 it was in the hands of James Thompson, who profited from the development of tourism following the arrival of the railway and the popularity of trout fishing on Loch Leven.

Ebenezer Henderson's 'Annals of Kinross-shire', published in the *Kinross-shire Advertiser* in the 1870s, records a number of gatherings held in the Salutation Hotel to honour local worthies. Members of the Kinross Cricket Club met here on 13 December 1855 to present William Briggs, Constable of Benarty, with an elegant silver pipe as captain and founder of their club and three years later the banker J W Williamson was entertained at a dinner here by 120 gentlemen who gathered to acknowledge his public service. After nearly three centuries, the Salutation Hotel continues to welcome visitors and maintain an important presence in the heart of old Kinross.

Dunfermline Junior Sprint Gala Glenrothes Institute Pool, 28 May

This event took place this year in Glenrothes due to major ongoing refurbishments at the

Carnegie pool in Dunfermline. It was very much for the wee ones from 8 to 11 yrs old and Kinross Otters sent a large team of 21 swimmers.

Foremost among the Otters was golden girl **Niamh Moloney** (8), who won three gold medals in the 8 yr old Girls 25m Breaststroke, Freestyle and Backstroke, winning all three by a *clear 1.5 secs*, which is virtually unheard of at this distance. She also won a silver medal in the Butterfly and two more silvers in the relays. Not a bad day's work and yet another marvellous find in this rich seam of young uns that the Otters have at present.

Alastair Cormack (9) is another one of these finds and had a silver sort of day. He won an amazing 5 individual silver medals and 3 silver relay medals. Had he not come up against probably the finest swimmer in Scotland of his age (Harris Bruce from Incas), his medal colour would have been very different.

Keir Men zies-Smith (11) produced some good times to claim silver and three bronze individual medals in addition to a relay silver.

Rounding off the individual Otter's success was **Duncan Crawford** (9), **Amy Broadhurst** (10), **Jack Watson** (10), **Finlay Cormack** (8) and **Amy Hardie** (10) who all won a bronze medal each. The most exciting of these races was **Amy Hardie's** 50m Freestyle where she proved what a tough little competitor she is to claim third spot in a blanket finish where 0.31 secs covered positions 3 to 6.

The Otters also won three silver medals in the relays involving the above swimmers and Libby Broadhurst, Claire Shanks and Ruth Ritchie.

Midland District Distance Championships Olympia Pool, Dundee, 27 – 29 May

The annual Midland District (Tayside) Distance Championships took place at Dundee's Olympia Pool over the last weekend in May. The minimum distance was 200m and the Otters sent a large team of 20 swimmers who returned with 6 medallists and 11 medals in total.

Gold medals are a very rare commodity these days, but **Euan Boyle** (11) didn't let that bother him as he clinched just that in the 10-11 yr old Boys 200m Freestyle in 2.43.12. He reinforced his position as top Otter at these championships with a further two silver medals in the 200m Backstroke (3.02.45) and 400m Freestyle (5.49.17).

Much improved Aaron Gillon (12) claimed three bronze

medals in the 200m Backstroke (2.52.09), 400m Freestyle (5.37.95) and 200m Breaststroke (3.27.17) whilst **Claire Moloney** (12) confirmed what others had seen in training by winning a silver and bronze in the 200m (2.37.77) and 800m (11.37.90) Freestyle respectively.

Niamh Mullen (12) won an excellent silver medal in the 400m Freestyle in 5.37.55 and confirmed that she is now one of the foremost swimmers at the club.

Mairi Mulhern (14) claimed yet another medal (bronze) in the 200m of her best event, the Breaststroke in 3.03.97, some 9 seconds quicker than she had swum at the National Championships in April and points to her potential at this event!!

Rounding off the medals table was **Rachel Miller** (15) who claimed a bronze in the 15-16 yr old Girls 200m Freestyle in 2.37.78.

As an aside and an indication of how difficult it is to get a medal these days, there were three Kinross Otters who actually broke the club records in their respective events. They were **– Rachel Brisbane** (13) 200m Butterfly 3.05.06, **Cameron Nelson** (13) 400m Individual Medley 5.27.33 and **Iona Elder** (13) 200m Freestyle 2.24.06 who came 4th, 6th and 6th respectively. Bearing in mind their ages, these were tremendous achievements.

Planning Application

As many people may have read in the national press, the club withdrew its planning application to build a new junior academy ground in the field beside Burleigh Castle in Milnathort. The application brought a number of planning issues concerning siting a pavilion near the castle and the club was in the process of adapting our plans to meet the requirements of Scottish Natural Heritage and the P&K Heritage Trust. What we did not expect was the hostile response of the people living near Burleigh. The Chairman and Club Secretary were invited to speak to the residents and explain the plans. As it turned out, there was no real chance to outline the ideas as the residents immediately became aggressive and very hostile, making a number of

claims which were unfounded and inaccurate. These included: the pavilion is going to be bigger than the castle, we are installing floodlights, there will be anti-social behaviour, children will be maimed or killed by cricket balls and an array of other comments. Although the club attempted to explain that the ground would be used by children from age 6 to 15, women and people with disabilities with the main men's cricket being played at Kinross House, the meeting ended with one resident stating "if you build here I guarantee it will be turned to ash!" The club committee were utterly shocked at the response at the meeting and the level of complaints made to P&K Council. Kinross Cricket Club is internationally recognised for the work we do providing sport and recreation to children, women and girls, people with disabilities and senior men. We have always worked closely with the local community and have a great relationship with church groups, schools and a wide array of other local community groups. To be portrayed as some form of anti-social, child-harming bunch of thugs is very distressing for all those who give up their time to coach at all seven of the Kinross-shire primary schools, the High School and at the club. Given the nature of the complaints and the threat of arson, it was felt that Milnathort was not a place to base the proposed new children's ground and the application was withdrawn.

I am delighted to say that within days of the decision being featured in the Scotsman and other papers, the club received four offers of land for a second ground within Kinrossshire. We have also received a massive amount of support from the cricket clubs and supporters from Edinburgh to Perth, Western Australia. The club took on "minor celebrity" status for a short while when our plight became featured on a number of internet blog sites and we would like to say a big thank you to everyone who took the time to offer their support. The club's management committee are currently reviewing the various offers and plan to make a formal announcement about the academy ground in early July.

Sadly the men's senior league has been continually hit by rain and so far only 6 out of 17 fixtures have been played across both the 1st and 2nd XI's. Hopefully the weather will improve and we can start to get some wins under our belt.







Health and Fitness

Teen Fitness Background

In a recent survey, doctors classed 17% of boys and 16% of girls aged between 12 and 15 as either overweight or obese.



There are over one million obese children in the UK under the age of 16. All of these run a significant risk of healthrelated issues in later life and this, together with the associated problem of lower self esteem, is becoming a major concern.

Over 50% of 12-21 year olds do not live an active lifestyle, and only 19% of all high school students are physically active for 20 minutes or more every day.

The government recommends that children and young people get one hour of physical activity every day. This activity should be of a moderate intensity; you should work up a bit of a sweat and get slightly out of breath.

At least twice a week you should include activities to improve bone health, muscle strength and flexibility. Weight bearing activities help to build strong bones but not necessarily big muscles – a particularly important consideration for girls!

Why the issue?

There is a simple, direct relationship between energy output and energy intake. Obesity can result from simply eating too much and exercising too little.

Today children walk and cycle far less than they used to; they are transported much more by car, the school run being a classic example. They are engaged in more sedentary entertainments such as television, computers and video. A Health Education Authority survey in 2007 found that an astonishing 75% of 11-16 year old children watched two hours of TV per day and the remainder watched in excess of four per day! Children are simply not getting enough physical activity in relation to their diet, which has tended to become more fattening.


A two-pronged approach for children is needed, just like any other exercise group. Review and modify their eating habits, in particular reducing the consumption of saturated fats, sugars and alcohol, whilst increasing their overall level of physical activity.

The Benefits of Activity

Physical activity in childhood has many benefits in later life:

- Weight control
- Improves well being
- Decreases the rate of heart disease
- Increase the likelihood of being active in adulthood
- Increased bone mass
- Lower blood pressure
- Reduced osteoarthritis and osteoporosis
- Increased life expectancy

It is difficult to be anything more than generally prescriptive in terms of the levels and types of activity that children



However, teachers, coaches, parents and peer groups all have an important role to play in encouraging children to increase their levels of physical activity. Organised fitness classes specifically geared to teens, high-energy dance classes such as Zumba or team games are ideal mechanisms for improving participation and results.

Teen "Fitness" is a term I like to use to encompass a range of components which collectively contribute to a rounded training programme. Physical fitness consists of cardiovascular endurance, muscular strength and endurance, motor skills and flexibility. Any balanced exercise programme should be able to challenge children in all of these areas.

The exercise programme needs to be balanced and developed to ensure that the right levels of Volume, Intensity and Frequency are followed to ensure maximum gain and minimum risk of overtraining.

This is where the professional help and guidance of a qualified sports coach and or Personal Trainer can be invaluable. They can help teen agers overcome the many perceived barriers to adopting more exercise in their daily lives and ensuring that they work out safely. They can also avoid the boredom factor that some gym routines engender, although most gyms now have the ability to allow you to multi-task and listen to your favourite tracks or watch your favourite TV programmes whilst working out.

Teen fitness is not just for those interested in team sports but should be fun and accessible for everyone. Whether you prefer to work out alone, with your best friend(s) or collectively in a group exercise class, the benefits of regular physical exercise will soon become apparent and will improve your health and well being into adulthood.

Remember, too, that your exercise programme is built specifically for you and is not readily transferable to others or is necessarily comparable. Don't think you are in competition with your friends when you exercise but rather that you are members of the same club, working towards improving your fitness, feeling great and lengthening your life!

Note: It is important that anyone considering taking up an exercise regime should consult their GP before doing so, particularly if it has been some time since you last exercised or if you are on any form of medication or suffer from a chronic illness or high blood pressure.

A very enjoyable day in Kirkgate Park was had by all in attendance, helped in no small part by the sunshine, variety of stalls on display, and friendliness of staff and volunteers on the day. Willow-weaving proved to be particularly popular as an adult activity, and 19 happy people were seen leaving the park with their newly crafted pea-growers in hand! Thanks to all our volunteers for keeping things ticking over smoothly, and thanks also to staff at the Boathouse Bistro for providing the splendid catering facilities.

This month has been one for constructive destruction, with the removal of boardwalks from the old bird hides, and the structural renovation work in the Levenmouth Hide. Visitors to this hide will certainly notice the improvement in terms of accessibility to this facility. Ongoing monitoring work with duck broods, the gull colony, insect surveying and Lesser Butterfly Orchid counts have also kept us busy over the last month and during one trip to St Serf's Island we were lucky enough to see two Turnstone in summer plumage, and an Arctic Tern elegantly swooping over the loch.

Our next event will be **Dragons and Damsels**, taking place on **Sunday 24 July** from 2 – 4pm, meeting at Burleigh Sands Car Park. Join us for an exploration into the fascinating world of these dynamic four-winged aviators. We'll visit a couple of dragonfly hotspots around the north shore of the loch, and investigate their curious life cycles, most of which occurs underwater. There will be some challenging terrain to cover in order to access a couple of these spots, so be prepared with suitable footwear (wellies are recommended) and waterproofs. Work is already well underway with the next stage of the Heritage Trail being installed by TRACKS. The extension will see the trail continue past the Pier, over the South Queich with a new footbridge and in front of Factory Bay, where a new bird hide will provide an excellent new viewpoint over a busy corner of the loch. Due to open in August, we're sure this will be a welcome extension and we very much look forward to its completion this summer.

That's all for now folks.

Farming



Well, that's our lambing all finished and the question you will be wanting to ask is whether we got our grazing strategy right.

The answer is nearly; but then again, the captain of the Titanic would probably have claimed that he nearly got his iceberg avoidance strategy right!! On balance, though, we weren't too bad. Quite a few ewes needed a bit of assistance due to lambs not being properly presented for birth, but we didn't have too many disasters. The most frustrating point was the weather because after April being a glorious month it turned cold and wet just as our lambing started – typical. I was certainly glad to have brought the ewes into the shed to lamb. I will give you all plenty warning when we will be lambing next year so you can arrange time off work to come skiing on our fields.

Some of you may be familiar with the books written by Henry Brewis, which give an imaginative, humorous take on farming life. In particular there is one titled Clarts and Calamities which is a fictional (but, at times, uncomfortably close to the truth) diary of a year in the life of a farmer called Sep. I think most farmers feel a bit like Sep from time to time and can identify with the trials and tribulations he faces getting through day-to-day life. Although it was written in the late nineteen eighties, and some of the political references and other bits and pieces make it slightly dated, the general style of the way the book is written makes it ring as true today as it did over twenty years ago. For anyone who hasn't read it, I would recommend it as it is quite simply hilarious, although nonfarmers may not get the full effect of its humour and wit. I was certainly feeling like Sep at lambing time.

To help with handling the sheep, we recently got a collie pup from a local (in)famous sheepdog handler. This is my first experience of having a working dog so I have no doubt that there will be plenty of "Sep" moments to come. I am amazed at the instinct he shows, even at just about three months old. He rounds up the pet lambs (or tries to) and also our Labrador, much to her disgust! No doubt I will keep you updated on his progress.

In general here at Backward Farm we are really needing the weather to settle down and warm up. The grazing fields, which aren't too heavily stocked, are struggling to keep up with the animals appetites, although they are improving. We are currently trying to harvest our first cut of silage, which is proving tricky since there has hardly been a day without some sort of rain and I like to get the grass dry before baling it. Hopefully we will finish tomorrow (20 June). There was a lot of rain yesterday, but it is drying up today.

Hopefully our new baler (which is actually about three years older than our old baler – don't ask) will have got over its teething problems and let us finish the job. Fingers crossed.

Famously where Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned in 1567 and forced to abdicate before dramatically escaping, this semi-ruined castle is set on an island in beautiful Loch Leven. Parts of the



castle date from the late 14th or early 15th century. There are lawns and benches on the island. The property is reached by boat, operated by Historic Scotland and departing from the fishery pier, where there is a café, shop and parking nearby. Opening times for 2011:

1 April to 30 September: Daily, 9.30am to 5.30pm

(last outward sailing 4.30pm) Daily, 9.30am to 4.30pm (last outward sailing 3.30pm)



It could change your world

This summer The People's Bible takes the Bible out to high streets and city centres all over Britain as part of the 400th anniversary celebrations of the publication of the King James Bible. Since 1611 it has been one of the world's most influential books, now more freely available than ever but, sadly, not so widely read as in previous generations. 




