#### What is the cost of a coat of paint?

As I walked down to the village on Saturday 9 July, I took note of my surroundings. Long grass and neglected verges were evident everywhere which is now a traffic hazard at the T-junction because of restricted visibility. This should have been attended to long ago. A wide load, possibly a tractor trailer, had severely damaged the surface of the pavement. How long will it be before this is repaired? To my right, was Tillywhally Wood with an improved pathway and trimmed trees. All excellently done but last time I walked there, the off-cuts had still to be cleared away.

At the main road, I turned right, remembered the Magnus Magnusson plaque has yet to be replaced, passed a hole in the road and paused at the 'Gusset.' I studied the layout. As I stood there, I found difficulty in imaging spaces for six cars. A tree as well, with enclosure? Utterly unreal. A reader in the July issue of the Newsletter cited *three* parked cars as being a hazard but - six? Yes, the area could be smartened up. Hence the heading: What is the cost of a coat of paint?' The 'Hatch' freshly painted, wouldn't that be good value for money? Those with closed minds, will they be persuaded to change and leave 'improvements' alone? But there is more. How the 'Gusset' has grown and grown. Now we have the suggestion of traffic calming as well. Why? Those who use the road to and from the village regularly will know that an unofficial one-way system operates already with traffic having to give way, usually at the bottom of the hill but sometimes at the top as well. Furthermore, there are build-outs at the two access driveways up the hill which restricts width. The restricted width imposes its own speed limit. Meeting wide vehicles such as lorries, tankers or farm traffic is a regular occurrence. Lastly, winter conditions need to be considered where the road uphill needs careful judgement, where one can pause if need be at the 'Gusset' before getting a run at the hill. To restrict the width of the road in any way would

The promised renewing of road markings has yet to materialise. Indeed, such neglect, seen all around the village, should not have been allowed to happen at all. So welcome to the 'improved Gusset' with its six shiny parked cars in their freshly painted allotted spaces and single tree with its individual enclosure. As you try to navigate around the obstacles and avoid the traffic close by, you may yearn for a welcoming seat in the open space before puffing your way up the hill. As you look around you and see neglect everywhere, pause and think: there has to be a better way with environmental maintenance being the priority.

As he made clear, if we don't use it we will sadly lose it, so I would urge everyone to give the Centre a try.

I have been attending the Centre for the past two years and I am so grateful that we have this wonderful facility right in the heart of our community. To be able to get out of the house for a few hours each week and enjoy a superb meal and the companionship of others in a similar position has been a lifeline for me, especially over the winter months.

There are many elderly people living on their own in Kinross-shire, either unable to get out or fiercely guarding their independence. Do not sit alone, whatever your age, your ability or background, the wonderful staff at the Centre will make you feel welcome. During the week, there is a three-course lunch served every day followed by a variety of activities for those who wish to stay. If you need assistance getting there, due to the generosity of the Arthur and Margaret Thompson Trust, two minibuses provide a collection and drop off service.

All who attend cannot speak highly enough of the loving care and attention that we receive from Nan Cook and all her staff, for whom nothing is too much trouble. They will shop for those unable to do so themselves, collect pensions and prescriptions, help you to the hairdressers, dentist or bank and organise a wonderful range of events and activities for us.

In May, a group of us spent five days at the Isles of Glencoe Hotel. It was a wonderful break and we were taken on day trips to Oban, Fort William and the Commando Memorial at Spean Bridge. We even called in at the House of Bruar on the way home so that Jimmy could buy a very posh bonnet. There have been outings to the theatre in Dunfermline to see a panto and *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*, a cinema trip to see *The King's Speech*, and opportunities to join in daytrips to Pitlochry, Tillicoultry, St Andrews, Anstruther, Harry Ramsden's for a fish supper and a lovely afternoon on a barge trip down the Union Canal from Ratho. We have tried line dancing, had several lovely tea dances and concerts and have even started an exercise routine, though we are not yet ready to try Zumba!

Hopefully all concerned will learn from the mistakes made in handling this issue and I would respectfully suggest that any proposals for an alternative site are brought to a public meeting.

#### Kinross Cricket Club Planning Application 18 Jul 2011

On behalf of a number of the residents living near Burleigh Castle who attended a meeting on 24 May 2011, I confirm that we are appalled that you have allowed the Newsletter to be used to air comments from the Kinross Cricket Club without first checking whether the pejorative statements made were in any way a true reflection of the discussions that took place and that you should compound matters by pointedly directing the readers to the article thereby demonstrating a prejudicial bias.

In the interests of brevity, a rebuttal of every single comment is not made below but we consider the club's recollections of the meeting to be so inaccurate of the views expressed by residents that it might well be considered defamatory. As there are generally two sides to every story, we trust you will now give these comments on the meeting equal prominence and give identical editorial direction to its location within the Newsletter. Otherwise the Newsletter risks the possibility of being a direct contributory cause of unnecess ary animosity within Kinross-shire.

Following the statutory neighbour notifications, the residents held an initial meeting at which two major concerns were voiced, these being the flood risk to The Steadings housing should the field be re-graded and/or drained and the traffic impact of a new junction between Balfour Crescent and the chicane caused by the castle's round tower. Objections to the cricket proposal were minor in comparison but because of queries raised on safety, noise intrusion and activity hours it was decided to request a meeting of CC and PKC Councillors to discuss the major issues and a representative of the club to respond on the minor issues. This second meeting was attended by invited councillors and two representatives of the club accompanied by their agent.

It is obvious that in making no reference to the presence of councillors or that the bulk of the time was taken up in discussing the substantive issues of flood and traffic hazards, the club was not prepared to be deflected from an obsession with a recreational interest even when that runs counter to the potential for misery to be caused by flood damage to homes or the injury or death consequences of traffic accidents. Perhaps these are real examples of mean spiritedness?

The quote "if you build here, I guarantee it will be turned to ash" cannot be left unchallenged. This is a seriously disingenuous remark and when read with the later "threat of arson" directs the reader towards the assumption that the residents will burn the building. In fact this is a referral the point being made that timber buildings are vulnerable to arson attack, a fate that befell the SNH bird hide on Loch Leven between Burleigh sands and the Kinross golf course. If planning permission was granted it would obviously be subject to relocating the building off the castle's archaeology and would inevitably put it close to a house in Balfour Crescent. In the event of a fire, the spread of flame to the adjacent house would represent an unacceptable risk. The reluctance of the club representatives to listen to reason on this matter caused one angered resident to comment that vandals would burn the building.

Much time was spent discussing traffic impact. The club's agent stated that the PKC Highways Dept had confirmed that there were no objections to the location of the access road junction even though the adjacent Balfour Crescent junction onto a concave bend is a major current risk. Local

public pressure has succeeded in getting the speed limit relocated eastward beyond the Stackyard but since then this short stretch of road has still been the site of one fatal and two serious road traffic accidents. The residents have serious and ongoing concerns about the road alignment which would only be exacerbated by the proposed development.

Another point worth noting is that the issue of floodlighting was a reference to a discussion at an earlier Milnathort Community Council monthly meeting.

In turning to the editor's remarks, the suggestion for a name change to Kinross-shire Cricket Club, in itself a fairly inoffensive proposal for a more inclusive name and indeed a cricket convention, was actually made by Milnathort Community Council in its response to the planning application; nothing to do with the residents whatsoever (the minutes of the C.C. meeting confirm this as a matter of public record).

Some objectivity in future would be appreciated.

#### From the Editor:

I stated that I thought there were sound reasons why the field next to Burleigh Castle was not a suitable location for cricket facilities – the same view as Mr Brown and other local residents who objected to the planning application.

It would be wrong for an editor to withhold an item submitted for publication simply because it did not coincide with a point of view that he or she might have, and I would never do this. It is extremely rare for us not to use a submission (although it is a challenge keeping the Newsletter to a manageable size now). At the Newsletter we strive to present readers with a range of news and information that we hope will be of interest to them. And providing a forum for debate is one of the purposes of the Newsletter, one that keeps it lively.

I am aware of the comment contained in the minute of the Milnathort CC May meeting, as it was duly published in the June Newsletter. I was not referring to Milnathort CC's comment in my editorial. I said that what saddened me was the attitude displayed in *some* of the **letters of objection to PKC** (Milnathort CC did not actually object). ## Loch Leven Heritage Trail

Following some delays caused by the winter weather earlier in the year, it is good to report that TRACKS is now making excellent progress on the extension of the Loch Leven LOCH LEVEN Heritage Trail which will run from Kinross HERITAGE TR Pier to the south west side of Kinross Mill.



The work of constructing the trail path is now nearly complete and most of the security fencing between the path and the Mill grounds has been finished. The foundations of the new bridge across the South Queich are in place and work has been started on site on the fabrication and installation of the bridge itself. The structure should be in place by the end of July. It has been built to the very high specification demanded by Perth and Kinross Council and will carry pedestrian and cycle traffic with disabled access. A programme of tree planting has been completed along the lochside of the Trail to provide extra screening from the birds on the loch. This was done by a group of hardy SNH volunteers who braved some atrocious spring weather to complete the task. The new bird hide beside the Mill will be installed in August after being delayed by the presence of the young duck broods which are present in the bay over the

At the Mill exit of the Trail, the Mill car park has been modified to allow access through an area that will also be used for extended parking for the Mill shop. The Mill shop now has an attractive cafeteria which will welcome trail users. With the co-operation of Sustrans, a major funder of the project, the National Cycle Route 1 will be diverted from the B996 on to the Heritage Trail at the Mill entrance. Cyclists using this route will then be able to bypass the busy streets of Kinross and Milnathort and emerge from the Heritage Trail at Channel Farm to rejoin the national route. To make the cycle linkage at Kinross Mill, the pavements

on the B996 will be widened from the Old Cleish Road to become shared access for pedestrians and cycles.

As the new route south starts at the Kinross Pier the map at the stone entrance will be modified to show the new route section and a stone marker will be installed pointing south along the side of the Pier. At the Mill exit two new monoliths will be erected, one containing the Trail map and the other containing a panel depicting the work and heritage of the Todd and Duncan cashmere operation.

At this stage it is not possible to set a precise opening date for the new trail section but it is likely to be late August or early September. The Chinese chairman of the Ninkxia Zhongyin Cashmere Company, the owners of Todd and Duncan Ltd, has been invited to come from China to perform the opening ceremony.

#### Repeat Prescriptions

For some years we have had a dedicated answerphone for patients to leave requests for their repeat medication. We have been reviewing the messages left and have found that we are frequently given inadequate information. For example, a patient's date of birth may not be given, making it harder to identify the patient. Details about the medication are often incomplete or inaccurate: the name of the medication is incorrect or the dosage is not stated. Such inaccuracies could lead to mistakes being made in the generation of the prescription and for this reason we have decided to remove the answerphone facility as from 1 September 2011.

Each prescription generated has two parts. The left hand side contains information about the medication required and this part is handed to the pharmacy. The right hand side of the prescription is the Reorder Form and has the patient's details plus details of any medication which the doctor has put on repeat. This Reorder Form will now usually be given to all patients when they collect their medication from either Rowlands in Kinross or Davidsons in Milnathort. Patients should retain the Reorder Form and use it when they order their repeat medication. The items required should be ticked and the form delivered to us. This may be done in any of the following ways:

#### Deliver the Reorder Form to the Health Centre

- Between 8.00am and 6.00pm the prescription request can be put into the red box to the right hand side of the prescription hatch. We would ask patients to put it in the box rather than ring the bell. The box is emptied several times a day by the prescriptions manager.
- After 6.00pm or at weekends prescription requests may be put into the grey letter box to the right hand side of the front door of the Health Centre. This is emptied each morning.

#### Post the Reorder Form to the Health Centre

Please ensure that you allow sufficient time for Royal Mail to deliver the prescription to us.

#### Deliver the Reorder Form to the pharmacy

Both Rowlands in Kinross and Davidsons in Milnathort and will accept the right hand side of your prescription and they will deliver it to us. Again please allow a bit of extra time for this.

#### Order via our Website

Repeat prescriptions can also be ordered on our website. The web address is **www.lochlevenhealthcentre.co.uk**. On the front page of the website is a link to a secure ordering form. By using this form you will be sending information about yourself across the Internet. Whilst every effort is made to keep this information secure, you should be aware that we cannot offer any guarantees of absolute privacy. If this matter concerns you then you should use another method of requesting a repeat prescription. The Reorder Form can be used to enter the details of the medication required. The system will store this information so that it does not have to be re-typed each time medication is required.

We deal with requests for over 2,000 items of medication per week. Every request has to be generated from the computer and they are then divided amongst the GPs for signature. We require **2 working days** to complete this. However, each day we receive many requests for urgent medication. These generally arise because the patient has forgotten to request their medication in advance of it running out. Such requests have to be individually taken to the GPs, thus disrupting their consultations. We also find that about 30% are not collected that day even though they have been requested urgently. We would therefore ask all patients to ensure that whichever method of ordering they use, the prescription is **received by us at least 2 working days prior to the medication running out**.

# Flutterby Therapies and Fitness Pilates with Val

#### **Fitness Pilates in Kinross**

I have recently taken over Pilates classes from Zoe Tod of 'Body Inspirations'. Zoe's classes have been



well established in Kinross for several years and I am delighted that she has asked me to take over the classes in the Masonic Hall. I am trained in Fitness Pilates and I hope the following article will give you an idea of what this particular type of exercise programme is all about.

#### What is Fitness Pilates?

Fitness Pilates is a group exercise programme. It is functional training with its roots in the original matwork exercises and teachings of Joseph Pilates. Fitness Pilates is for the 21st century as it utilises the best of the old Pilates ideology combined with modern techniques/modifications based on research and current knowledge of human movement to bring about a more functional approach. It is training that focuses on the body as a human kinetic chain with a major focus on the 'deep core' (abdominal) muscles of the body. By applying the fundamental Pilates techniques and exercises, Fitness Pilates aims to offset musculoskeletal imbalances. It is a group exercise programme designed to enhance posture, strength, balance and stability in the healthy adult. It is not a clinical, diagnostic or remedial programme, however it is well documented that it is effective in helping maintain good postural alignment of the spine and is often advised by physiotherapists as an excellent form of exercise for those with some types of back problems. I would advise that those with medical issues of any kind first ask their GP/health care professional for permission to participate in Fitness Pilates. Those attending class will be asked to fill in a brief PARQ form (Physical Activity Readiness Questionnaire) to ensure that this type of exercise is suitable for them.

#### What happens in a class?

In a Fitness Pilates class we are training the body to move 'functionally' through all planes of movement — it is effectively exercise in 3D. We are training the body to move in all planes of movement experienced in everyday life — for example, when we twist around in the car to check the toddlers in the back, when we bend to tie a shoelace, when we tee off in golf — we are moving forwards and backwards, side to side and rotationally with the expectation that the body will automatically cope with all of these postural and muscular movements day in day out.

By training in Fitness Pilates we can give ourselves stronger more functional abdominal/core muscles and this will allow us to coordinate motion between the pelvis and the thorax (the trunk area of the body) much more effectively and functionally. You are less likely to experience the 'tweaked back' if the musculoskeletal system is used to performing movements correctly.

A typical Fitness Pilates class consists of the following components whilst incorporating the basics of the original Pilates exercises which involves finding and maintaining the 'neutral spine position' during standing, prone and supine movements and sequences. Exercises can be adapted or modified to meet client needs.

- Warm up/Mental and Physical preparation
- Standing Fitness Pilates Functional Work
- Mat work Fitness Pilates Exercises
- Cool down and relaxation

Equipment is used as clients progress and to add variation and challenge to the mat exercise programme. We use large core stability balls, small weighted toning balls or handheld weights, small soft 'Bender' balls and Pilates fitness circles.



Completed in 1608, Tullibole is a classic example of a Scottish tower house in a parkland setting. Contents include a collection of 18th and 19th century paintings and portraits of past owners of Tullibole Castle and their relations; including some by Raeburn, a collection of silver, and furniture from the 18th and 19th centuries. The castle has recently undergone a facelift, with restoration work to the external finish or harling. In the castle grounds are a historic gravey ard and remnants of a ruined medieval church, a 150 yard 'moat' and doocot. Visit the Witches Maze Memorial for the Crook of Devon Witch Trials, also to be found in the grounds. Tullibole Castle is located on the B9097 one mile east of Crook of Devon.

## Greenacres - 'planning in disrepute'

Cllr Barnacle has written a strongly worded letter to PKC's head of development management, Nick Brian, to complain about the department's failure to control the size of the Travelling People's site at Greenacres, Blairadam.

The Councillor was prompted to write on hearing that the planning officer intends to recommend approval of the formation of a hard-standing and installation of four permanent mobile homes and ancillary work at Greenacres (planning application reference 10/00732/FLL).

In the past, a number of retrospective planning applications have been approved at this site, which Cllr Barnacle describes as "expansion by stealth". Both he and Cleish & Blairadam CC have asked PKC for clarification of the site boundaries. No such clarification has been provided.

Cllr Barnacle provided Mr Brian with a summary of the history of the site between 1993 and March 2011 and highlighted the retrospective nature of nearly all the applications. "This saga brings the planning system into disrepute," he claims.

In May 2006 Mr Brian's department stated that the 'potential of the site has been achieved at 7 units'. Cllr Barnacle points out in his letter that there are at least three times that number of units now.

In his submissions on the Main Issues Report for the PKC Development Plan, Cllr Barnacle stated the need for a development brief to ascertain and contain the parameters of this site. Reminding Mr Brian that the site is within the Lochleven catchment management area, Cllr Barnacle says, "I fail to see why this site is allowed to expand within it, given the need for strict drainage controls that are enforced with smaller proposals in the area."

"How much longer do the community and elected members have to wait before planning address this matter?" he asks.

# Dunning Glen – groups work together to end wild camping mess

Community groups in the area of Dunning Glen are increasing their efforts to find a solution to the disruption and the mess created by irresponsible wild campers. The area has always attracted people who enjoyed being outdoors, but the last few years have seen an increase of instances of vandalism and littering.

Litter is not the only problem. Trees and bushes are cut down for firewood. Several times fences or gates have been used to burn as well, leaving livestock to escape and creating expensive damage. Local landowners and farmers have joined the initiative to curb this behaviour.

Fossoway CC has successfully applied for a grant from PKC to tidy up the area and to erect signs asking people to behave responsibly.

Other bodies involved in this initiative are: Tayside Police, Central Police, Muckhart CC and Friends of the Ochils.

Stuart Dean, Chair of the Friends of the Ochils and Secretary of Muckhart CC says: 'Finding a permanent solution to this problem proves to be difficult. The Scottish Outdoor Access Code promotes responsible behaviour when enjoying the outdoors, but in reality there are few consequences when people behave in an irresponsible manner. Farmers and landowners have little redress and while most of them welcome walkers and campers in the Ochils, there needs to be effective ways to deal with the minority of people who keep littering and vandalising.'

#### Forum for Kinross-shire?

Cllr Barnacle has written to all the CCs in the Kinross-shire ward to suggest a Forum to discuss issues of common interest - examples might be planning policy and procedures and the future of the area Roads depot at Turfhills.

The suggestion is that three representatives from the six CCs plus the four elected members for Kinross-shire meet twice a year. This might enable Kinross-shire "to speak with a strong and united voice on issues of common concern," he said.

The six CCs in the Kinross-shire ward are: Glenfarg, Milnathort, Kinross, Portmoak, Fossoway & District and Cleish & Blairadam.

## Skiing to success

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
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### Feed Your Fertility

Five steps to boosting your chances of successful conception, pregnancy, delivery and baby.

It takes two - never forget that getting pregnant takes two and both the man and woman must make the changes to their diet and lifestyle. Three months is the recommended period of time for preconception care as it takes that time to improve the quality of eggs and the quality and quantity of sperm.

#### STEP ONE: EAT WELL

Although it goes without saying that a healthy diet is crucial to a successful pregnancy and health baby, many people are unaware that diet may affect the ability to conceive. The following are recommended:

- Plenty of fruit and vegetables.
- wholegrains, Complex carbohydrates oats and wholemeal bread.
- Organic foods where possible.
- Oily foods such as fish, nuts, seeds and oils these have a profound effect on every system of the body, including the reproductive system.
- Reduced intake of saturated fats from red meat and dairy products etc.
- Increased intake of fibre.
- Avoid additives, preservatives and chemicals such as artificial sweeteners and sugar.
- Avoid the three main fertility busters: caffeine, alcohol and smoking.
- Drink plenty water aim for six to eight glasses of water a day, more if you are exercising.
- Don't forget the supplements: food may not always contain all the nutrients that you need. Of particular importance are vitamins B6. C. E and folic acid. Vitamin A is crucial for male fertility. According to researchers, a good quality, specially formulated fertility multi-vitamin and mineral supplement may double your chances of getting pregnant and help you to produce better quality eggs.

#### STEP TWO: MANAGE YOUR WEIGHT

Women are most fertile when they are neither too thin nor too heavy. They need at least 18% body fat to ovulate, however, too much fat can disrupt the menstrual cycle. It's important for the man to watch his weight too as there is an increased risk of infertility or poor sperm quality and quantity in men who are overweight or obese.

#### STEP THREE: BE FIT AND WELL

Becoming as fit and well as possible involves both partners exercising regularly, for at least thirty minutes per day, because regular exercise encourages hormonal balance, which in turn boosts your fertility.

#### STEP FOUR: DE-STRESS

Stress can cause irregular ovulation and lower sperm count. To minimise stress, balance blood sugar levels, exercise regularly and get at least eight hours sleep a night. Yoga or meditation can also be helpful.

#### STEP FIVE: DETOX YOUR LIFESTYLE

In today's society we are constantly exposed to all sorts of petrochemicals, heavy metals and other toxins that can act as hormone mimics or disrupters and affect the quality and quantity of sperm. Detox through:

- Quitting smoking
- Drinking less alcohol
- Avoiding environmental toxins. (Choose organic when possible, avoid aluminium pans, store foods in glass or china rather that using cling-film, use a water filter, look for 'natural' household cleaners and keep plants in your home because they help to absorb toxins from the environment).

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## What's Wrong?

We all know someone with a hypochondriac personality.... they sneeze once, and must have flu, or they stand up, feel a twinge in their back, and believe they're crippled, when in reality they've just sat down for too long! Their focus is "what's wrong", always searching for more things to go wrong. To me, the curse of our society is our focus on "what's wrong". How much happier would we all feel if we changed our focus to "what's right"?

Although I'm not a Doctor, I give my clients a "prescription" to alleviate their fears and "wrongs": every night, before going to sleep, find 5 GOOD things that have happened today. That's it - just 5 GOOD things! It doesn't sound hard, yet clients often struggle to find just one good thing. It doesn't have to be a big thing: perhaps, the sun shone for a while today, or, my child smiled at me today, or, my friend called me, or, I enjoyed watching the birds in the garden ... anything can be a good thing!

Take this prescription at bedtime every night, and it'll soon become automatic. You'll find yourself relaxing more easily and sleeping better. Soon you'll notice good things happening throughout the day. Then you're ready to move to the next "prescription", which is to START each day by setting an expectation of 3 good things that you're going to do today... I'm going to bake a cake today, or meet my friends for coffee, or make a presentation at work, or go for a run.... The more you expect good things to happen, the more they DO happen. You actually get what you're looking for!

You might be in a really bad situation - yet there's still good to be found in bad situations. Having your child ill in hospital is terrible – but you also get to spend time with your child, looking after them, caring for them and showing them how much you love them, when normally you'd be too busy at work. Having your house on the market for 11 months without selling can be extremely frustrating – yet you get to spend time really researching where you'd like to live, and get all of your plans in place so you're ready when it does sell. Think about YOUR bad situation - what do you "get to do" because of it? What good can you find? REALLY look-there will be at least one good thing.

The bad thing about focusing on what's wrong in our lives is we automatically look for more bad things. When we want to make a change or do something new, we think about all the reasons why we can't do that, or how we might fail. Many of us are afraid of failure, often so afraid that we won't try anything new. Yet, if we do what we've always done, we get what we've always got. Think about that for a moment!

Did you know, there's no such thing as failure, just feedback? When we do something that doesn't work, we haven't failed, we've just got feedback on how to "not do" that thing, feedback which helps us to learn how "to do" it! When Thomas Edison was creating the light bulb, he went through 1,000 iterations to find the right design. When asked, "how did it feel to fail 1,000 times?" Edison replied, "I didn't fail 1,000 times. The light bulb was an invention with 1,000 steps."

Picture a farmer driving a tractor along the same narrow track every day to get to his field, until he forms such deep ruts that the tractor steers itself. Then one day the farmer

wants to go into a different field. Breaking out of the ruts to get to the new field is hard, he has to drive with one wheel high up on the edge and the other wheel in the middle of the track, and it feels very uncomfortable and bumpy. Often the tractor will get pulled down into the old ruts, and the farmer has to work really hard to pull the tractor out of the ruts, back onto the new track. Over the days and weeks, the tractor flattens out the route until the old ruts disappear and a new track forms.

This is what happens when we change a habit. Your habit is the same as the farmer's ruts. It's difficult to break out of, because you've used the same habit for a long time. Sometimes you slip back into the old habit this isn't failure, it's feedback, and the good thing



is you noticed the slip! Instead of focusing on what "went wrong", berating yourself for slipping into the old habit, praise yourself for noticing the slip and then make the necessary corrections to re-establish the new behaviour. Pretty soon, you'll have a new habit. And what's wrong with that? Absolutely nothing!!

#### T in the Park 2011

There were a total of 53 arrests between mid-afternoon on Thursday 7 July and 10am on Monday 11 July for offences including theft, breach of the peace, minor assault and misuse of drugs.

Tayside Police reported 64 arrests at the same time last year for T in the Park 2010 and 59 over the 2009 event.

Proactive policing resulted in an increase in drug seizures from individuals this year and the Force is please to report that incidents of petty assault were down on 2010 and crimes of dishonesty reduced by about half.

Chief Superintendent Suttie, the event commander, said:

"The first class crowds have been the stars of the show. They make the difference and we have all enjoyed an outstanding T in the Park this year. From our perspective, the success of the weekend can be attributed to the excellent planning that went into delivering this festival by the event organisers, ourselves and other agencies. From a policing point of view we, as ever, undertook a great deal of planning for the event and this work was enhanced by the work of our intelligence cell. These also married up perfectly with the community style of policing carried out by all our officers and the stewards, who were all superb. Thanks to everyone who played a part in T in the Park 2011. We now look ahead to T in the Park 2012, with planning due to begin shortly."

With regards to outside of the event, thank fully there were few incidents of note for us to deal with during the weekend. #### **Community Officer Restructuring**

Also as of 10 August, Constable Sadie Allan will be the new Community Officer with responsibility for the towns of Kinross and Milnathort.

Sadie has seven years Police service, whilst Victoria has been with us for two years. Both are new to the Kinross area, having previously worked in other stations. Both are taking on their first Community Officer posting and are looking forward to getting to know their new areas and dealing with those issues causing concern locally.

# **Community Council News**



The Community Council News is produced from edited draft CC minutes. Most CCs have full minutes on their websites. Full Kinross CC minutes are lodged in the local Library. All Community Council meetings are open to the general public.

## **Kinross Community Council**

#### **News from the July Meeting**

CCllrs D Colliar, D Cuthbert, C Watson (Chair), W Freeman, L MacKay, M Blyth and M Scott were present at the meeting held on 6 July 2011. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs K Baird and W Robertson and three members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs B Davies, I Jack, D Mackay, D West and P&K Cllrs S Miller and M Barnacle.

**June minutes**: Following on the meeting last month, Wallace Land informed the CC that the actual number in relation to the housing numbers is 150, not 125. The additional 25 relates to another option on ground to the north. They apologise for this error. With the inclusion of this reference, the minutes were approved by CCllr Colliar and seconded by CCllr Freeman.

**Police Report**: No police present.

Tracey Ramsay is the Senior Community Capacity Building Worker for Kinross-shire, Bridge of Earn, Glenfarg, Abernethy & surrounding areas, based in the Loch Leven Community Campus. One of the groups established following the opening of the Campus is the "Campus Partnership". Queries/complaints are raised at every CC meeting in relation to the campus and we invited Tracey to provide information on the remit of the Partnership and advice on who we should contact to answer the questions raised. Tracey explained that the "Campus Partnership" includes campus users and community members. Ramsay Cooper from Fossoway CC represents all CCs in the Kinross-shire area. The group is not fully established as yet, however a Memorandum of Agreement is in place. They meet every three months. From the outset minutes of meetings have been forwarded to the CC. The group has six members representing Sport, Youth, Parent Council, Arts & Culture and Community Council and their remit is to promote the campus and to provide information through the networks. They are looking to increase their membership to 12. Dealing with complaints is not within their remit, but they would be happy to pass these on to the relevant bodies. She added that a supervisor is always on call at the campus and any problems should be directed to him/her through reception.

It was noted that Dick Keatings is the Campus Leader and Elizabeth Cargill, Manager and contact for the Community Campus Management Group. The latter is made up of managers from various bodies responsible for the management of the campus.

In relation to pricing, Live Action Leisure are responsible for this. It was suggested that we write to them in relation to the pricing levels.

MITIE - It was commented that the unfortunate incident involving the ambulance was addressed and resolved fairly quickly. This should not occur again as emergency vehicles will be allowed entry.

Tracey was thanked for attending and providing this information. She advised of the following meetings: Partnership Meeting, 6 September; Lottery Funding, 16 September.

#### Future of Kinross Buildings

County Buildings: CCllr Watson advised that we await the "Heads of Terms" and that he has sent a reminder to Jim Lowe in relation to this. Cllr Robertson advised that he understood that Jim Cairney was to meet with the Partnership/CC next week to discuss the "Heads of Terms". The Chairman responded that a minute of the meeting held with the Council representatives was forwarded to them and that this covered all the information required. Cllr Robertson will follow this up. We have received queries from various bodies: (i) a query was raised in relation to a children's nursery; (ii) a resident suggested that a Visitor Centre be housed here; (iii) a gentleman is looking for a space to run a youth project - either a small office space or ideally (if possible) space for an art studio to teach young people art and exhibition skills. If anyone can offer this accommodation, please advise.

Former High School site: This property is back on the market for sale.

**Town Hall:** Contracts have been exchanged subject to planning.

**Mill Street**: The CC have asked that this area be utilised for car parking. Cllr Baird will check this out.

#### **TAYplan**

Representations are invited with the deadline on 1 August. There were no comments from the CC in relation to this matter. However, CCllr Watson stated that there was a pressure on this area for development and housing going forward and CCllr Colliar added that due to various factors/circumstances the direction can change over the years. It was noted that previously the Councillors have resisted the housing numbers.

**Balado query**: CCllr Colliar questioned whether there was an application for a runway at Balado Airfield. He added that this was included in the newspaper on Friday. We have no information on this as yet.

#### **Scottish Government Appeal Decision**

Land 60 metres north of Green Hotel, **Retirement Flats**: Notification from The Scottish Government in relation to this Appeal. The Reporter has decided that conditional planning permission will be granted provided an agreement under Section 75 of the Act is negotiated between the planning authority and the owners of the land comprised in the planning application. The planning permission will not be issued until that agreement is made and registered.

#### Report from P&K Councillors

Cllr Baird advised that the bollard in **Gordon Place** should be installed this month.

The play equipment in Myre Park and behind the Leisure Pool is to be removed and placed at other sites in Perth & Kinross. This is due to Council cutbacks. CCllr Colliar responded that the apparatus at the Myre was paid for by the CC. Following discussion, it was agreed that we should ask the Council when removing this equipment to carry out remedial work to the soakaway. Cllr Baird is to follow this up. It was noted that the damaged equipment at Davis Park has been replaced.

**Roads**: Cllr Baird advised that the potholes have been reported.

**Heritage Trail**: Cllr Robertson advised that the path at the Mill should be open mid August. Negotiations with landowners are still ongoing in relation to the track around the loch.

**Grounds maintenance**: The Council are leaving some areas uncut due to budget cuts.

Cllr Barnacle: The Chairman received an email from Cllr Barnacle in relation to his proposed reconvening of the "Forum". The Kinross-shire Community Council Forum would be a group with membership taken solely from the six CCs in the Ward. It was suggested that representation from each CC be limited to 3 members and that meetings be held twice a year, September and March (unless a specific topic requires attention). This was discussed. It was agreed that should the need arise, as previously, we can invite other CCs to a meeting to discuss any issue which affects a wider area. The Chairman is to advise Cllr Barnacle that Kinross CC have agreed not to be included in the Forum.

#### Correspondence

The Scottish Association of CCs is now being wound up. Convention of P&K CCs: Meeting to be held on 20 July. They also request that we complete an online survey. In response to this, a number of CCs have replied to the Convention in the negative, withdrawing support.

Review of CCs: Election and Finance: A cheque has been received in relation to the Council grant. The Treasurer advised that a common election date has been agreed. The financial year for all CCs has also been harmonised. Our financial year is the same as what is proposed, however the Council specify that the AGM should be held in May. The Secretary received various papers yesterday from PKC and advised that the date for this year's election is 3 November and that there is a postal vote facility. The Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils, Standing Orders, Code of Conduct and Constitution have been received and should be adopted at the first meeting following the election.

Better Business Partnership Scheme: Public consultation exercise on the potential development of the Better Business Partnership Scheme. The BBP was introduced in 2003 by the Trading Standards Practice, in partnership with Tayside Police, as a way of providing consumers with a list of traders that have agreed to abide by a code of practice in regard to their trading activities. Currently the scheme has 225 members with each member being included in sector specific listings within the PKC website. Members pay a £10 joining fee with no ongoing subscription charges and consequently there is no additional revenue for marketing or promotion purposes. A questionnaire can be completed online.

#### Other Business

Myre Park: A complaint was received from a resident in Montgomery Street in relation to football matches held at week ends. Volumes of litter (e.g. plastic bottles) are left along the sides of the pitch. It was agreed that we should write to KGV in relation to this matter. Cllr Robertson is also to follow this up. It was suggested that a visit from the Litter Rangers might help in this situation.

**Microlight:** Mr Alexander raised an issue in relation to a complaint received from CCllr West. He asked if the complaint was from the CC or from Mr West as an individual. If the latter was the case he stated that Mr West should not have included (Community Council) after his name on the complaint as he did not have the authority to speak for the CC.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 3 August 2011 at 7.30pm at the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

## Portmoak Community Council

#### **News from the July Meeting**

In attendance at the meeting held on 12 July 2011 were: CCllrs M Parkin (Chair), D Williamson, R Cairncross, T Smith and M Strang Steel. Also in attendance were P& K Cllrs W Robertson, S Miller, M Barnacle and six residents. Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs J Bird, S Forde and P&K Cllr K Baird.

**Police Report**: In the absence of a representative, a written report was provided.

The police are running "Operation Homesafe" until the end of July, aimed at reducing violent crime, antisocial behaviour, alcohol related crime and disorder, weapon carrying, and knife and hate crime. They are concentrating on the time between 10pm and 2am each Thursday, Friday and Saturday. T in the Park caused few traffic or crime issues. There were complaints about excessive noise from the main stage, which will be examined by the promoters.

There was an attempted housebreaking in the Kinnesswood area on 28 June.

Action is being taken to address a spate of thefts of satellite navigation systems from unattended vehicles. The public is asked to remove or hide these items when leaving their vehicles.

**Treasurer's report**: The annual PKC CC grant had been received. There was no expenditure on the CC account. Donations of £670 in response to a fundraising effort for the Michael Bruce Way had been received, and maintenance costs of £170 had been paid out. Total funds in hand within the two CC bank accounts at 12 July 2011 were £1,549.17.

#### **Matters Arising From Previous Meetings**

**Stephens Field, Kinnesswood**: The CC's solicitors had written to solicitors acting for A & J Stephen Ltd on 2 June 2011, to start proceedings for the acquisition of the field by the CC. As there had been no response, apart from an acknowledgement, a reminder has been sent.

Road signage: As suggested by a resident at the June meeting, a survey of road signs throughout Portmoak was completed, and this showed that signage is inconsistent, sometimes inappropriate, sometimes missing, sometimes damaged, and on three occasions redundant. Rather than consume the time of the meeting with details, the Chairman undertook to work with Cllr Baird to consider any appropriate action, and this was agreed. The errors with the sign to Kilmagadwood have been corrected.

**Kinnesswood bus shelter area**: As previously reported, CC action to replace the roof, and possibly make other improvements in conjunction with local groups and with PKC, will be considered in September 2011.

**Build-outs**: No progress to report.

Water level in loch: The Chairman had received no response to his letter to the River Leven Trustees in May, and had therefore written again on 5 July.

**Convention of P&K CCs**: The Chairman would be attending a meeting of the Convention on 20 July.

Wall opposite Portmoak Hall: See Ward Councillor reports

#### **Sub-committee Reports**

**Paths, pavements and roads**: As previously reported, fundraising by the CC for maintenance of the Michael Bruce Way had so far realised £670 from local organisations, residents, and businesses.

The Chairman had received a letter from a Glenrothes walker with various suggestions for improvements to the Michael

Bruce Way which were being considered. As there are now funds in hand, CCllr T Smith agreed to investigate the cost of repairing of the path above the golf course, where drainage pipes have become exposed.

The Chairman reported that the Michael Bruce Way would eventually become a Core Path, but that PKC had indicated to him that they would probably not be taking responsibility for its maintenance due to budget constraints. This would leave the CC to raise funds for that purpose.

Planning: CCllr Cairncross reported on a meeting with Mr Nick Brian of PKC planning. A number of procedural deficiencies in dealing with planning applications within Portmoak were pointed out to Mr Brian, who undertook to investigate them. CCllr Cairncross, together with CCllr Strang Steel, had also met with Mr Ian Innes of PKC Legal Services to discuss issues arising from the Wellside development, and Mr Innes promised to consider these issues with the appropriate PKC officials. Both meetings were held in a constructive and co-operative atmosphere, and there would be further discussions on all the issues raised.

The CC considered the following planning applications:

 $11/00817/FLL\ Installation$  of roof lights at Stewart Place, Kinnesswood. No objection.

11/00878/FLL Erection of a garden studio at Townhead Cottage, Kinnesswood. No objection.

11/00738/FLL Installation of solar panels at Kingsbank, Scotlandwell. No objection.

11/01032/LBC Installation of replacement windows and doors at Dunhoy Kinnesswood. No objection. It was noted that Dunhoy was within a Conservation Area and was a Listed Building.

The CC had objected to an application for a dwelling house and garage at Sandy Lane, Scotlandwell (11/00685/FLL).

#### Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr Barnacle had previously written to the CC to propose a Kinross-shire CC Forum whose membership would consist of representatives from the six Community Councils in the Kinross-shire (Ward 8) area of Perth and Kinross (Cleish; Fossoway; Glenfarg; Kinross; Milnathort; and Portmoak) plus the four elected Councillors for Kinross-shire, and he was invited to make a presentation on this proposal to the meeting. He suggested that each CC would send no more than three of its members to meetings proposed to take place twice yearly, in September and May. With this combination, the maximum number of attendees at each meeting would be twenty-two. The purpose would be to discuss mutual issues and present a united voice. Kinross CC had already decided not to support a formal arrangement, but was open to an informal liaison with other Kinross-shire CCs.

The CC replied that Cllr Barnacle's proposal had been considered, and it was felt that any forum would have limited impact unless recognised by PKC, and that it would be inappropriate to create such a forum without PKC agreement and recognition, and that the Convention of Perth & Kinross CCs was presently the recognised means of communicating matters of mutual CC interest to PKC, and that CCs and the Convention were both funded by PKC.

The CC did not therefore think it appropriate for another body to be placed in the line of communication between it, the Convention, and PKC. However, Portmoak CC was very willing to collaborate with other Kinross-shire CCs on an informal but organised basis, provided that this was CC led and managed, probably with a rotating CC Chairmanship, with Ward Councillors in attendance, and provided that the

existence of such a body was conveyed to PKC as a matter of courtesy.

Cllr Barnacle also reported that he had referred the **Kilmagadwood planning decision** to Cllr Baird's scrutiny committee, and was due to have a meeting with her.

Cllr Barnacle drew attention to the consultation on **Tayplan**. The CC was already aware of this and might make a submission. Cllr Barnacle also drew attention to the possibility of an appeal to the Local Review Body against a refusal of a planning application using delegated powers.

He had had a meeting with Mr Nick Brian, who had confirmed that no consent had been granted which might compromise the possibility of the Levenmouth road being recognised as a **core path**.

He also considered that the PKC **developer contribution** required for a single two-bedroom house, built for use by an agricultural worker, was inappropriate, and he was working to have the developer contribution abolished in such a case.

Cllr Baird submitted a written report in her absence, as follows:

**Spraving of Herbicide**: A PKC officer had met with some Portmoak residents the day after the June CC meeting. PKC has now written to all who made a complaint about this spraying. A landowner had also received a letter regarding spraying on the part of his land that is a SSSI. The PKC spraying contractor confirmed that his operatives applied the chemical throughout the village, and accepted that some of the overspray was carried out by one of his employees. The chemical used will not inhibit new growth and is not a residual herbicide. PKC has asked the contractor that this operative be removed from future spraying duties. It has been agreed with residents that soft landscape areas will be removed from future work schedules and site plans, and only hard surfaces / pathways will be sprayed in future. The PKC Environment web page gives information regarding ground maintenance and a list of FAQs.

**Verge cutting**: There will only be one cut this year by PKC, and this had started at the beginning of July.

The wall at Portmoak Hall: The contractor remains responsible for the wall for a year after completion. The inadequate short bolts will be replaced by long bolts. At the moment, the short bolts are tightened as required. With regard to the finishing of the brick work it was stated by PKC that harling would last much longer than paint. P&KC would only paint once, and the community would have to re-paint thereafter. This was considered unreasonable as maintenance of PKC property should not be passed on to residents. The CC made the point that if the harling were to require

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maintenance, would this also be passed to the residents. A decision on either paint or harling is required in any event.

Condition of B920 (The Causeway): A PKC engineer had inspected the road in response to the concern of some residents about its condition, and a number of recent accidents caused by vehicles running off the road. The engineer had reported that no remedial work was required.

The camber on the road was correct, and is needed for water to run off. In his opinion, accidents have been due to driver error, and the carriageway is wide enough for two vehicles to safely pass. Cllr Baird had considered the option of Soft Verge signs, but was aware of the CC's view on excessive signage.

**Revised speed limits on A911**: These were approved by Committee in May 2010. Traffic Regulations Orders are being processed and should be in place early next year.

Cllr Robertson reported that he had asked George Lawrie of TRACKS to consider making a safe pedestrian route between Easter and Wester Balgedie as part of the circular route including the Lochside track and Loch Leven Larder. Land would have to be acquired to do this. Funding for this is a difficulty.

Cllr Robertson had also asked for Police **speed checks** at the entry to Scotlandwell from the South, in response to complaints about speeding.

#### Other business

The Chairman reported that Scottish Government funding had been partially withdrawn from the Association of CCs, and the Association was going to be wound up as a result.

PKC Environmental Services had been in touch with the CC to advise that their regular tests on water from the Well, at Scotlandwell, had revealed the presence of bacteria. Accordingly they were going to erect the following notice at the Well: "Cautionary Notice - As this water is not treated, the quality cannot be assured for human consumption purposes."

#### Communications

A list of communications since the last meeting can be found in the full draft minutes.

Next Meeting: Due to the absence of several Community Councillors there will be no meeting in August. The September Meeting will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 13 September in Portmoak Primary School.

#### **News from the June Meeting**

The CC met in the Tabernacle Hall, Blairadam on 20 June. The meeting was attended by four CCllrs, P&K Cllr M Barnacle, PC Euan Mitchell and one member of the public. The Cleish & Blairadam Newsletter Editor was also in attendance. Apologies for absence were received from Sandy Morton and Fiona Macgregor.

Crime Prevention: PC Mitchell said there was little to report locally; however the editor had received an email from the Wildlife and Rural Crime officer in Central Scotland reporting the theft of two Ifor Williams trailers from the Clackmannan Area and the marking of a horse in the Amprior area. He asks that this information should be circulated to our members with a request to be aware of our security.

Concern was also expressed as to the activity on the Nivingston Hill road. There had been two calls to the Police and a complaint that girl riders were being harassed by the "parkers". The car park at the road to Loch Glow has been closed and verges and passing places were now being used.

PC Mitchell said that they were trying to liaise with Fife Police – the long summer evenings were an encouragement to people to stop and park even though it is not legal to stop in passing places. This is an ongoing situation and we are grateful to the Police and our neighbours who do their best to keep an eye on the problem.

**Engagement of Community with CC:** It is proposed to circulate a flyer in early September with emphasis on the election of CCllrs in November. It cannot be said often enough that this is your Community Council and your input is really valuable. For further information do not hesitate to ask any of the present CCllrs. (In no particular order they are: Catriona Culley, Richard Jeffrey, Patty Fraser, Sandy Morton, Fiona Macgregor and Hugh Somerville.)

**Dissolution of P&K Convention of CCs:** The proposal to carry this out could not be passed as not enough people were present at the relevant meeting.

**Rural Forum:** There has been favourable reaction to resurrect the Kinross Forum. This would hopefully include all the Kinross-shire CCs but would exclude the Civic Trust. Cllr Barnacle said there could possibly be a meeting at the end of October. The voice of Kinross-shire is badly needed. Cllr Barnacle will chair the initial meeting.

The Cemetery road in Cleish presents a different problem as it is not designated; Patty will contact the cemetery authorities.

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

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## Forth and Tay Disabled Ramblers

#### Outing to Loch Leven on 29 June

Loch Leven, Scotland's biggest lowland loch, was the most recent venue for the Forth and Tay Disabled Ramblers. While gathering at Findatie Car Park on the south side of Loch Leven, some 'early birds' had an exciting start to the outing as they viewed a glider from the nearby Scottish Gliding Union at Portmoak doing the aerobatic loop the loop, not once, but twice! The elevated position adjacent to the holiday chalets provides a panoramic view of the loch looking in a westerly direction.

The group of 32, including 18 members using battery operated scooters, set off on an anti-clockwise direction along the 8½ mile stretch of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail toward the fishermen's pier at Kinross. The surface of the route is ideal for walkers and joggers, although for cyclists and wheelchair users the first part of the journey involves a descent which should be handled with care. There is an access problem for larger scooters in negotiating a barrier gate. Contact can be made with the keeper at the adjacent sluice house who will have a key to open the padlocked gate. Each of the five sluice gates is manually controlled by the keeper, the spillway having been built to reduce the risk of flooding on the farmland around the loch.

The sighting of two parent swans and their cygnets on the bank of the spillway was quickly followed by trying to avoid countless minuscule frogs along the pathway through the birch wood. Along the various stages of the route attractive wooden seats are engraved with words encouraging travellers to sit and take in beauty and wonder of the scenery, including views of the Lomond Hills, Benarty Hill, and the more distant Cleish Hills and Ochil Hills.

Burleigh Sands was the stopping place for a welcome lunch break. The overcast sky along with the still calm of the loch gave a rather ethereal effect of several fishing boats on the water and castle island with the background of hills. The next part of the route led through the Kinross Estate toward the rear view of Kinross House, which was once described as 'the most beautiful piece of architecture in Scotland'. Nearby, a raised seating area provides a relaxed view of Loch Leven Castle. Its historic association with the imprisonment of Mary Queen of Scots is another reminder of how interesting the Heritage Trail is from beginning to end.


As the ramblers made their way along the loch side at the Kirkgate Park with its extensive grass area and well designed play area for children, they were within view of their destination – the fishermen's pier. It is from this location that boat trips are made to Castle Island.

#### Method


Sweat all ingredients in the butter then add stock made with water and stock cubes. Boil till soft and liquidize. Garnish with mint or chives.

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

## **Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire Orwell Parish Kirk**

When the Rev Thomas Mair was ordained minister of Orwell Parish in 1725, he began to hear complaints from members of the congregation who were tired of walking every Sunday all the way down to the church which then stood at Bell's Brae, close to the shore of Loch Leven. Being a shrewd man, he began to carry subscription papers in his pocket so that when someone approached him to complain about the location of the church, he would hand them a form and ask them how much they would give to get the church moved nearer to the centre of the parish. This strategy worked and by 1729 he had collected almost £2,225 from 223 subscribers. In that year the church was moved stone by stone to its present location on the Ba' Hill overlooking Milnathort. High on the south facing wall, above a sundial, the date 1729 is a reminder of the building of this church by Thomas Mair, whose gravestone bears a verse in the form of an acrostic, each line beginning with letters that spell out the name 'MASTER THOMAS MAIR'.

A popular man in the parish, the Rev Thomas Mair decided in 1737 to follow the Secession movement initiated by the Rev Ebenezer Erskine four years earlier, taking most of the the parish minister noted in his survey of Orwell for Sir John Sinclair's Old Statistical Account of Scotland that Mair "preached up the erroneous doctrine of universal redemption, and was in consequence of this dismissed from his charge." Despite this, Thomas Mair and his followers continued to worship in the church for another three years until they were forcibly removed under a Sheriff's warrant in 1740.

Built of random rubble, with a slated roof, the parish church of Orwell was referred to by the author of the statistical account of the parish who commented that "it has, outwardly, a pretty decent appearance for a country kirk, and is tolerably well finished inwardly." More recently, the architectural historian Nick Haynes, in his illustrated

architectural guide to Perth and Kinross, described the design of the building as "very Presbyterian in symmetry" with respect to its long south facing elevation and T-plan but noted a "residue of Episcopalian form" in the 17th-century bellcote or belfry with its baluster columns which had been brought from the old kirk by the lochside.

The original building was a rectangular structure with a low parishioners with him. Over half a century later in the 1790s, thatched roof, an earthen floor and six small windows, but over the years, a number of improvements and alterations have been made. A telltale building line can be seen running below the level of the roundels on the south facing wall indicating that the roof of the church has been raised in height. Windows have been enlarged, a floor laid and the interior completely recast to include galleries and a pulpit. In addition to this, a north wing was added. Known as the Forfar Wing, this was the gift of the Forfars of Netherhall and Seggie Bank.

> The end result has been the creation of a church building looking over the rooftops of Milnathort that, in a simple but pleasing way, is attractive both inside and out.



Here is a snapshot of some recent races:

The 'Black Rock 5' is a really fun, quirky race which takes place in Kinghorn. Proof of its popularity is the number of competitors – nearly 700 took part on 1 July. The event involves running along the beach and wading knee-high in the sea around the Black Rocks! On a pleasant summer's evening, the sound of the bagpipes and the cheering of crowds lining the streets added to the fantastic atmosphere. With the finish line at the top of a steep hill, the free bottle of beer was also very welcome! Those taking part, and still shaking the sand out of their shoes were: Andy Laycock (1st KRR, 25th overall), Alistair Black, Michael Cooper, Ronnie Ritchie, Maureen Hill (1st KRR lady, 18th overall), Judith Dobson, Pippa Coutts, Steve Hopton, Julie Rose, Isabella Carmichael, Gillian Agnew and Sarah Eaton.

Our club organises the **Milnathort Dash**, which this year was on 23 June. Over 120 competitors took part this hilly, 5½ mile race. First male KRR and third overall was the seemingly unstoppable Andy Laycock in time of 31.25.

First female KRR was the equally unstoppable Jillian Gordon, who completed the course in 36.35. Fourteen other club members competed, as well as being involved in the behind-the-scenes work that it takes to host this kind of event.

Heavy showers cleared just in time for the start of the **Brig Bash** on 6July. This is a flat 5-mile race in Bridge of Earn, organised by Perth Road Runners. Out of nearly 300 competitors, Peter Edgerton was 36th overall and first male KRR in 43 mins 39 secs. Judith Dobson was first female KRR and came first in her age category in a time of 46 mins 32. 

# **Loch Leven NNR**

With duck nesting activity winding down for another year, there are habitat management tasks taking place at various corners of the reserve during the course of the next month. Some areas of long grass and bracken are to be mowed and bailed, so you may see us out and about with our machinery as we work away at Burleigh, Orwell and Findatie. An archaeological dig is due to take place on St Serf's Island this month in partnership with Historic Scotland to learn more about the lives of monks that occupied the Priory there from 843 A.D. We await their findings with eager anticipation.

The first of two SNH events this month is called International Travellers and takes place on **Tuesday 2 August** between 6 and 8pm at Kirkgate Point. Loch Leven is a hotbed for migratory birds all year round, and as autumn approaches, large numbers of ducks and swans gather here as they moult their plumage in preparation for their long flights back to their wintering grounds. As well as an assortment of wild fowl, some smaller migrants are also prevalent over the water, with thousands of Swift, Swallow and Martins swooping over the water as they feast on the abundant invertebrate population before their flights south to Africa.

The second guided walk is in search of the Osprey and will take place on Tuesday 9 August between 6.30 and 7.30pm at Burleigh Sands. Another species famed for its long migration and well celebrated throughout the country, the Ospreys patrol the skies over Loch Leven in search of a fish supper. Females are the first to fly south, leaving the male with juveniles to remain here for another month as they practise fishing and flying. With a little luck we'll see them as they dive to the surface to scoop out their evening meal. Please call the reserve office on 01577 864439 if you'd like to book a place on either of this month's two guided walks. We are also looking forward to participating in this year's Kinross Show on Saturday 13 August in Kinross House Gardens. Many organisations will be in attendance, and there will be plenty to see and do while there. # **Farming**



### Dinosaurs and negotiation

Previously referred to in this column as our beloved two green dinosaurs, both Claas combine harvesters have recently been replaced by younger models for harvest 2011. Last season's fire left one the subject of a lengthy insurance claim, but it was eventually winched on a lorry to make its way to the breaker's yard. With a few thousand acres of life left, the other member of the family wasn't ready for a place in the Natural History Museum so we needed to find it a new home. Fortunately the classified section of The Courier is a reliable way to sell agricultural machinery, and last Saturday we inserted an advert in the agricultural column. By lunchtime my husband was a bit disappointed that no-one had phoned to enquire about his Claas Dominator 96 (1984) that was ready for work. Turns out that the telesales lady must have known about their reputation and we eventually found the advert in the antiques rather than the agricultural section! So fingers crossed the ad makes its way to the right place next week and we can wave off dino soon!

Buying and selling is a large part of the business of farming; it's vital to secure inputs such as seed, feed and fertiliser at competitive rates and be confident that you are achieving the best possible price for finished products such as lambs, beef cattle and arable crops. However, most farmers produce commodities and are price takers, forced to accept the price offered by the processors. Of course some entrepreneurial producers have chosen to add value and turn their milk into ice cream or cheese, beef into burgers or rape seed into cooking oil and they are then able to set the price for these products – it takes a lot of investment and skill but it must be a good feeling to sell your produce at a farmers' market and I have to say I admire these enterprising individuals. Maybe one day I can tell you I am doing the same.

In the meantime, negotiation is a key skill that can help increase the margins. I'm working on mine; most days I get a lesson from our youngest son who has a natural ability to get his own way or at least win a concession of some kind in each negotiation we enter. There's likely to be some wrangling over the price of that combine too — let's hope there are lots of phone calls next weekend!

Famously where Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned in 1567 and forced to abdicate before dramatically escaping, this semi-ruined castle is set on an island in beautiful Loch Leven. Parts of the



castle date from the late 14th or early 15th century. There are lawns and benches on the island. The property is reached by boat, operated by Historic Scotland and departing from the fishery pier, where there is a café, shop and parking nearby. Opening times for 2011:

1 April to 30 September: Daily, 9.30am to 5.30pm

(last outward sailing 4.30pm) Daily, 9.30am to 4.30pm

(last outward sailing 3.30pm)

Admission prices: Adult £4.70, Child £2.80, (includes boat trip) Conc £3.80, HS members free.

The ferry is not equipped to carry passengers in wheelchairs, though access to the interpretation boards, the castle forecourt, courtyard, gardens and grounds is over grass and suitable for visitors using wheelchairs or with limited mobility.

### Burleigh Castle, Milnathort

A fascinating tower house dating from around 1500. The grounds are open during daylight hours. The keep can be opened on request. Please follow signs on site for key.

### **Balvaird Castle**

1 to 31 October:


