Kinross CC Procedures unacceptable 22 Aug 2011

I attended the August meeting of the Kinross Community Council (KCC).

My own letter and that of Dr Jim Alcock relating to conduct of Chairman Watson and his chairing of items in which he had a declared interest were discussed.

This account summarises the events witnessed by myself.

I have spoken with others who attended the meeting. Like me they are concerned that the complaints raised by us were not adequately dealt with by KCC. Yet again the minute of this latest meeting does not adequately record events.

The meeting exposed further, serious matters of concern regarding KCC conduct.

KCC were asked about the lack of planning documents available for scrutiny by the meeting, as views were passed without reference to plans.

The reply was given that planning applications were "filtered" by a "sub-committee" of three members (which in itself breaches the constitutional need for a minimum of four).

The meeting was advised that the sub-committee met privately (contrary to the constitutional requirement that all meetings should be open to the public)

I asked if the sub-committee meetings were minuted and was advised that they were not.

The reason given was that this committee did not make any decisions.

However, the fact they "filtered" the applications was in itself a decision making process.

I was advised that none of the sub-committee had any expertise in planning and indeed that none of the KCC members had planning expertise.

Their defence being that they were all "just amateurs".

In summary, this planning sub-committee meets in private, without a quorum, has no record of their deliberations, has no members with any planning expertise and yet decides which planning applications should be discussed at the public KCC meetings.

This is a very serious mismanagement of KCC business.

Regarding the letters of complaint seeking his resignation, CCllr Watson stated he had sought the opinion of Mr Innes of PKC Legal Dept regarding the criticism against him. He claimed that Mr Innes supported the view that he (CCllr Watson) had acted properly, yet could offer nothing in writing to that effect.

The complaints regarding the failure of KCC to give the required public notice of minutes and agendas of meetings were discussed. Firstly it was claimed by KCC that their process was proper. However the secretary eventually pointed out that I was in fact correct and that the current arrangements were contrary to the constitution which required a minimum of ten days notice. As a result of the complaint KCC assured the meeting these items would in future be properly circulated and published within the correct timescale.

KCC has a history of being silent on important matters that affect our community yet have been vocal in support of large inappropriate planning applications.

The run-down nature of the town centre mirrors the neglect and lack of commitment from the CC "amateurs" in defending the interests of Kinross.

I and a growing group of concerned and informed residents who have taken the trouble to monitor CC affairs lately will not remain silent while such improper conduct remains the practice within the CC.

Support for my views has been expressed to me by many in the community. I remain of the view that Chairman Watson should resign his position.

There is mention of avoiding chemicals but no mention that certain drugs such as hormones and chemotherapy have adverse effects.

I had one patient whose husband simply needed Insulin to recover fertility as his doctor had failed to check for diabetes. Another patient's husband with colitis was taking Salazopyrie, a drug known to reduce sperm viability, and changing treatment resulted in pregnancy.

Any regime should ensure no harm is being caused to any prospective parent.

Summer is almost over and the main topic of conversation has been the weather, which in Scotland either makes or mars an event. It is only a few months ago when events, activities and schools closed because of snow and ice and now we have had the floods.

Congratulations must go to the organisers and all the willing exhibitors who battled against the rising and falling water not to cancel Kinross Show and their efforts paid off. A great day out when country came to town. Visitors were dressed for all weathers, some for the sun, and others with fashionable wellies and some matching the out fits. I had my faithful blue wellies bought whilst at a Guide Camp in Kinross many years ago.

Kinross Show is one of the highlights of Kinross-shire and it was lovely to see all ages exhibiting their prize livestock, WRI members competing against each other and for the farming community it was an opportunity to catch up with old friends and commiserate.

A few days prior to the show I spent a few hours at The Pier in glorious sunshine. TRACKS were carrying out at survey over a four-day period of users of the Heritage Trail. Visitors were flocking into the car park and many were going to the island. Everyone we spoke to was impressed with the Heritage Trail and there was the WOW factor when they saw the Loch.

Tourists are certainly coming to Kinross.

I, too, wish to concur with the article in Newsletter regarding Kinross shire Day centre, I recently visited the centre (not on the open day) and had a most enjoyable lunch and met some interesting people who all spoke highly of the centre and the staff. At long last a planning application for the formation of the distributor road to connect Junction Road with Clashburn Road has been given the go ahead; hopefully work should start soon and this will be the catalyst for other improvements to the town.

I have been contacted by several people regarding lack of verge cutting - this was part of the Council's budget saving, only one cut per year, single width apart from junctions where double width cut to help with visibility. This is quite controversial; some people do not wish verges cut as this encourages biodiversity, others want it all cut. I would encourage residents to contact the Council Helpline by phone or email to report any roads that may be causing them concern.

I am pleased that a Plastic Recycling Trial is taking place at the Recycling centre in Kinross and this will take most plastic, including plastic bags and magazine wrappers.

The Kinross High School former site and the County Building saga rumbles on. Some people would like County Buildings to be sold to a developer for flats for the retired; others would like a community facility. A community facility could be a tremendous asset to the town. The Community Council is working with the Council to agree to a licence for one year to allow time for a business case to be made.

I am sure there will be lots of discussion about uses for this building in the months ahead. I think we are all agreed no one wants the building boarded up.

Presentations to Kinross Community Council


Kinross CC has listened to presentations from various parties in relation to proposed development in the town.

At their request, we (Kinross CCllrs) have met with Wallace Land, Douglas Archibald and Persimmon Homes. Information in relation to Wallace Land and the Castle Island proposals are undernoted. Please note these presentations were informative only and no decision was reached by the Community Council at said meetings. The opinions expressed below are those of the developers, not the Community Council or Newsletter.

Turfhills, Kinross

Wallace Land is promoting an economic development opportunity on 48 ha of land to the western edge of Kinross off Junction 6 on the M90.

The site represents an opportunity to create a visible gateway development adjacent to the existing Kinross services and the T in the Park Festival site. The site, in part, has been identified for a new employment allocation in the Perth and Kinross Main Issues Report stage of the plan. Wallace Land is currently engaging with the Council and the local Community Council to support the allocation of the whole site in conjunction with adjoining land controlled by Perth & Kinross Council. The development of the site will provide for approximately 18 ha of effective employment land connected to the existing strategic transport network and which can be delivered over the period of the Local Development Plan.

Springfield Road, Kinross

Wallace Land has taken under contract 8.6 ha of land to the west of Kinross and are promoting this new housing opportunity to meet the Council's housing land requirements going forward.

As part of the initial promotion work carried out by Wallace Land, the Council have now identified the land as a potential site for housing in the Perth and Kinross, Main Issues Report stage of the plan.

To support the continued identification of the site, Wallace Land has appointed a full promotional team covering masterplanning, planning, transportation, engineering and acoustics to take forward a full technical analysis and evaluation of the site. The work undertaken to date has been formally submitted to the Council in a detailed report to support the allocation of the site as part of the emerging Local Development plan. Based on the appraisals work carried out, it has been demonstrated that the site is effective and can contribute towards meeting the housing land shortfall identified in the Main Issues Report.

The proposed masterplan identifies that the land can accommodate 150 private and affordable homes within a well defined landscape setting.

Jetrigg/Cavelstone, Kinross

A planning application has been submitted to Perth & Kinross Council for an exciting leisure development at Jetrigg, Cavelstone, Kinross. The architects Keppie Design of Perth have created a design using sustainable materials (timber cladding, sedum roofs) complementing the surrounding countryside. The holiday accommodation will consist of nine self catering units (a mix of villas and apartments) and a 41 bed hostel with communal dining and relaxation area. A 40 cover cafe will cater for the residents of the villas/apartments, the Loch Leven Heritage Trail users and to the general public. The development is hoping to act as a key nodal point in completing the final link of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail. The complex will in addition offer a leisure pavilion with sauna, steam room and jacuzzi along with a 9 hole putting/crazy golf area.

Your chance to shape your community

Community Councils are groups of people who give time to, and have a genuine interest in, the wellbeing of their community. Their chief role is representative; to consult the local community and to make known to the local authority and other public bodies the views of local people on all matters affecting them.

The local authority, in return, has a duty to consult community councils on how local services are delivered and other issues affecting their neighbourhoods. Community councils have the right to be consulted on any planning applications in their areas and are also kept informed about licensing applications.

For the first time, Perth & Kinross Council will administer elections for the 53 community councils across the Perth and Kinross area. This follows approval of a new scheme of establishment for community councils. The elections, which will be by postal vote, will take place where the number of valid nominations to stand as a member of a community council exceeds the maximum number of members allowed for that community council. The deadline for voting is 5pm on Thursday 3 November 2011 and the results will be announced the following day, Friday 4 November 2011.

Standing for election to a CC

If you are interested in standing for your local community council, nomination forms will be available from PKC's website, www.pkc.gov.uk, from Thursday 15 September

The deadline for nominations is Thursday 29 September 2011. All nominations must be accompanied by a 50-word statement of support.

Perth & Kinross Council encourages residents to become involved in their local community councils. Community councils are the most local community based tier of elected representation and it is their duty to represent the views of their communities and to act to ensure their wellbeing.

News from the Health Centre

Flu Vaccinations

Each year the flu vaccination is offered to all those over 65 and to those aged under 65 who are in one of the At Risk groups. For some years now we have held Saturday flu clinics in October and November and we will be announcing the dates of this year's Saturday clinics in the next edition of the Newsletter. To make booking appointments easier, we are hoping that a new on-line facility will be working by the end of September. This will enable patients to log onto our website, see the available appointments and book an appointment on-line. Further information on how to use this facility will be in the next Newsletter.

Pneumococcal Vaccinations

The pneumococcal vaccine is recommended for those who are at a higher risk from developing complications from pneumococcal infection. The vaccine is generally administered only once and does not have to be repeated each year. Those aged over 65 have been offered the vaccine for some years now, but this year those aged under 65 who are in one of the At Risk groups are also being offered the vaccine. The At Risk groups include those with diabetes requiring medication, severe kidney disease, serious heart conditions, lowered immunity, chronic lung disease and those with problems with their spleen. We are running special clinics for this and will be contacting those in the At Risk groups over the coming months to offer them the vaccination.

Prescription Ordering

The voice mail service which we have had for ordering repeat medication is ceasing as from 1st September 2011. Inadequate or incomplete information was being left and this could have led to errors in prescriptions. We are therefore asking patients to order their repeat medication by using the Re-order form. This is attached to the right hand side of each prescription. The items required should be clearly indicated on the form and the form delivered to us either in person, or by post. The re-order form can also be left with either Davidsons in Milnathort or Rowlands in Kinross. Medication may also be ordered via our website www.lochlevenhealthcentre.co.uk. We require at least two working days to process requests for repeat medication so all requests must be delivered to us in plenty of time. Further information on ordering repeat medication is available on-line or in a leaflet available from the Health Centre.

The Kinross Show **Saturday 13 August**



The 2011 Kinross Show was a great success, although attendance seemed a little lower than usual, perhaps due to the weather. There were some brief showers on the day, but the loyal crowds at the main arena in the afternoon were rewarded by impressive bike stunts by this year's star attraction, Clan BMX, complete with highly entertaining commentary by one of the Clan team members.

The Flower Show attracted record entries this year, and the Children's Fancy Dress competition also had a good number of charming entries.

The presentation of a Royal Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland long-service award took place at the Show; this was for a remarkable fifty years' work with one family. David of Colliar Thomanean Lodge, Milnathort, started work just one hour after leaving school, and has served four generations of the Alexander family.

The heavy rain that fell for several days before the event gave the Show committee quite a dilemma: they decided to go ahead, but cancelled the light horse classes due to ground

Balvaird Castle, Glenfarg

A fine late 15th-century towerhouse that underwent a luxurious makeover in the 16th century to become a courtyard palace. Built by the Murrays of Balvaird, who became the Earls of Mansfield, it was their principle seat until 1658 when they moved to Scone. The L-shaped towerhouse had deteriorated into a ruinous state by the 19th century and in 1974 was taken into care by Historic Scotland's predecessor. Historic Scotland staff will be on site with more information about the castle's main features. *Sunday 25 September, 10:30–15:00*

Access for Assisted Wheelchairs. Displays. Located off the A913 between Gateside (A91) and Bridge of Earn. Car park at bottom of hill signed off the A913. Half mile walk uphill to castle.



Michael Bruce Museum, Kinnesswood

Situated on The Cobbles in Kinnesswood is the weaver's cottage where Michael Bruce, the 'Gentle Poet of Loch Leven', was born in March 1746. Exhibits explain the history of the village, parchment-making and weaving industries and the works of Michael Bruce whose Ode to the Cuckoo was described by Edmund Burke as "the most beautiful lyric in our language".

Tullibole Castle, Crook of Devon

Tullibole Castle is a classic example of a 17th-century tower house. The castle has recently undergone a facelift with restoration work to the external finish or harling. In the castle grounds are a historic graveyard and remnants of a ruined medieval church, a 150-yard 'moat' and doocot. Visit the Witches Maze Memorial for the Crook of Devon Witch Trials, also to be found in the grounds.

New trial recycling scheme in Kinross

Recycling facilities for residents of Kinross-shire were expanded on 15 August, with the introduction of a new trial scheme. Two containers have been installed at the Kinross Recycling Centre at Bridgend in order to collect a wide range of plastics for recycling. The materials that can be accepted in the new containers include:

- All plastic bottles
- Plastic food containers, including yoghurt cartons, margarine tubs, ice cream tubs and fruit punnets
- Plastic carrier bags and plastic film, including cling film and plastic wrapping
- Polystyrene, including takeaway containers

Residents should be aware that other plastic, such as toys, CDs, cassettes, kitchenware, plant pots and toothbrushes will not be accepted in the containers.

Plastic bottles and food containers can already be sent for recycling via the blue-lidded bins. However, the expanded facility at Bridgend gives another option regarding where to recycle and will be helpful to those residents who do not have a blue-lidded bin.

Plastic carrier bags, plastic film and polystyrene are **NOT** acceptable in the blue-lidded bins, so the new trial facility at Bridgend is the only way locally to dispose of these products for recycling.

Maintaining a high local recycling rate

Perth and Kinross already has one of the highest recycling rates in Scotland, at nearly 47%. The Council is continuing its efforts to push this rate still higher, by making recycling as easy as possible for residents. The trial at Kinross Recycling Centre is being run in conjunction with Wyllie Recycling Ltd.

Environment Convener, Councillor Alan Grant, said: "Plastic packaging and bags make up a large proportion of the waste that we all produce. I am confident that the residents of Kinross will help to make this trial a success so that it can be rolled out in the future to benefit all householders in Perth and Kinross."

Look After our Children -They are the Future

The importance of optimal nutrition in young children

By Alisa V Wilson, nutritional consultant

There are many factors affecting your child's health, such as genetics, the mother's diet and health status before and during pregnancy and childhood environmental and physical factors, all of which will determine the different sensitivities children will have to foods and their environment, as well as their individual nutritional requirem ents.

Nutrition in the first few years of a child's life will have a direct impact not only on the child's growth, but also on energy levels, mood, resistance to disease and the ability to concentrate and do well at school. It is of paramount importance, then, that children receive the best possible nutrition in these early years, to sow the early seeds of good health.

As if this wasn't daunting and complex enough for parents, they also have to contend with the constant conflicting good food advice and barrage of junk food promotions, corrupting dietary choices. Meanwhile, an increasing body of research, such as that on vitamin D, is telling us that despite having more food choices than ever before, our children may still be nutrient deficient. Indeed it would appear that cases of rickets in children are increasing, which is a direct result of vitamin D deficiency.

So how can we ensure we are providing proper nourishment for our children and laying down the essential foundations for later life? It is reassuring to know that by simply providing a sensible wholefood diet and supporting our with essential, good-quality nutritional supplements, we are able to encourage and maintain the best possible growth and development.

Simple rules to remember:

- Make every meal and snack count towards nourishing your child. Choose fresh, whole foods every time.
- Balance blood sugar levels avoid all forms of sugar, caffeine drinks and refined carbohydrates (such as white bread, white rice and refined cereals) as they result in a rapid increase in blood sugar levels and a corresponding surge in energy, which you will have seen if you have ever picked your child up from a birthday party and opened the door on a roomful of kids bouncing off the
- Choose wholefoods wholegrains, lentils, beans, nuts, seeds, fresh fruit and vegetables. With fruit and vegetables, go for dark green, leafy and root vegetables, such as watercress, carrots, sweet potatoes, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, spinach, green beans or peppers, raw or lightly cooked.

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- Provide at least five or more servings of fruit and vegetables each day.
- Avoid overly processed foods.
- Combine protein foods with carbohydrate foods for good blood sugar balance. Give cereals and fruit with nuts or seeds, and ensure your child eats carbohydrate-rich foods, such as potatoes, bread, pasta or rice, with proteinrich foods, such as chicken, lentils, beans or eggs.
- To ensure your child gets the right kinds of fats, provide plenty of seeds, nuts and coldwater fish such as mackerel, herring, kipper or salmon two or three times a
- Choose good vegetable protein sources including beans, lentils, quinoa, tofu and 'seed' vegetables such as broccoli. If your child eats animal protein, choose freerange eggs, fish or lean meat and go for organic whenever possible.
- Regular, healthy snacks are important for children.
- Ensure your child drinks plenty of water at least 4-5 cups of filtered tap water every day.

If this seems impossible, remember, for most children, the 80:20 rule can be applied. This means that provided they eat healthily for 80% of the time, you can relax for the other 20%. Try to stick to healthy food at home so you can relax when on holiday, visiting friends or going to parties. If their basic diet is the best it can be, the occasional packet of crisps or bowl of chocolate ice-cream is fine!



Aaaargh! Phobias!

I'm sure that, like me, you've heard people talking about their phobias, about how horrible and intense their experiences can be. Strangely though, we don't hear much about how people get rid of their phobias, I think mostly because people are completely unaware of just how quickly and easily they can be eliminated! Intrigued? Read on...

Phobia sufferers are often ridiculed by friends and family members who supply completely unhelpful comments such as "oh, for goodness sake, it's only a spider, pull yourself together", or "stop



being so irrational, it's just a wee needle" and even "stop behaving like a child, everyone has to visit the dentist" and so on. Having a phobia is not simply being "a little afraid of" or "not liking" a particular situation or object. It's a deep, intense and uncontrollable reaction that leaves sufferers in an emotional, traumatised state after the event. Until you've actually seen someone in the middle of a severe phobic reaction, it's hard to comprehend just how harmful and unpleasant a phobia can be, both to the sufferer, and also to the lives of friends and family.

Simply put, a phobia is a one-time learning experience: an incident happened in the sufferers past, during which they experienced a reaction. Their unconscious mind then developed a strategy to avoid exposure to a similar situation, and this strategy then becomes their phobic reaction to all future events of the same nature.

Living with a phobia is not so simple. Phobia sufferers can experience any one of a long list of symptoms, including panic, nausea, difficulties in breathing and a racing heart, and they can also feel a combination of these symptoms at the same time. Their phobic reactions can occur at any time, without warning, whenever and wherever the phobic object happens to appear. Just imagine how inconvenient that could be - one minute you're enjoying an event with friends or family, and the next moment - BANG! - you feel like your life could end, right there and then! Some sufferers need to get away from the situation as quickly as possible; some are simply rooted to the spot, unable to do anything until someone removes the object for them. Others go to great lengths to avoid possible exposure to the problem - for example, driving all the way around a loch to avoid going over a bridge, or never having holidays abroad, to avoid having to fly.

So how can you get rid of a phobia? Self help books can help sufferers to develop willpower and coping strategies when facing the phobic object, but typically this only works on milder phobic reactions. Some therapy techniques can be quite uncomfortable for the sufferer, such as exposure therapy, where the sufferer is gradually, repeatedly and increasingly exposed to their fears, until the sufferer learns to reduce their phobic reactions, learning that they can cope in the previously phobic situation. Other techniques such as CBT (Cognitive Behaviour Therapy) help sufferers to develop new "coping" mechanisms or behaviours which they can use to deal with a phobic event each time it happens, but these techniques do not eliminate the actual phobia.

One extremely rapid technique which helps sufferers to completely eliminate the phobia, often in just one session, without exposure to the actual phobic object or event, uses NLP (Neuro Linguistic Programming) and TLT (Time Line TherapyTM). NLP and TLT coaches can help sufferers to quickly identify the very first experience of their phobic behaviour - even though sufferers are typically unaware of when and what this was – and then help sufferers to remove or "unlearn" the connection to the phobic reaction, so that they then simply no longer have the phobic behaviour. With NLP and TLT, the phobia release is pretty much instantaneous, with impressive results - ex-sufferers are often immediately able to handle the phobic object or event! So next time you hear someone mention their phobia, instead of poking gentle fun at them, you'll now be able to help them by pointing them in the right direction to quickly and effectively eliminate their phobia!

The core task the children were given by their tutor Nikki-Jo McCormack was to devise a show from scratch within the week and to perform it in front of their friends and family on the Saturday morning. NJM Studios firmly believes on focusing on the educational skills that drama can provide for children. By asking the children to devise their own show, rather than give them a script, it creates a new set of challenges. From a performance point of view, they must show courage, confidence, and discipline. It is not easy to stand in front of your loved ones and perform with conviction. However, the performance is not the most important part of the children's overall experience. They were challenged to choose a theme, title, characters, plot, and decide if they required movement, dance, music, or props. This gave them freedom of choice and independence. They began to take their work very seriously and have pride in what they were doing. They were nudged into becoming more independent and having to work together as a team and being able to reach a consensus.

The show was called *The Magical Board Game*: the children were sucked into the board, finding themselves on a desert island and having to find a way to return to their normal lives, which they did with success, only to discover that they had been gone for just two minutes, despite it feeling like hours.

Nikki-Jo was incredibly proud of the work they achieved in such a small amount of time.

The children thoroughly enjoyed their experience with NJM Studios, so much so that many are returning to the weekly classes, which are on Wednesdays, 3.45pm-4.45pm (5-7yrs) and 5pm-6pm (8-12yrs) at the Millbridge Hall.

Street Sports for All

During the school holidays, local Community Officers based in Bridge of Earn and Kinross regularly organised, set up and ran the 'Street Sports 4 All' scheme in a bid to keep young people occupied, active, and divert them away from engaging in antisocial behaviour. Events were held in Abernethy, Bridge of Earn, Glenfarg, Kinross and Milnathort and, although the Milnathort date was pretty much a washout due to the weather, most were well attended – always room for a few more, though.

Street Sports has its own set of rules which centre on minimal contact, respect and fair play. During breaks in play, local Community Officers, Special Constables as well as youth workers, sports professionals from St Johnstone FC and other partner agencies, use the opportunity to introduce themselves to the young people in an informal setting and continue to build strong community relationships amongst each other. The sessions are free and open to all school age children in the area. Places do not need to be booked.

To expand on the success of these initial events, further dates are in the process of being organised for September and October and we are also looking to arrange for the scheme to visit Crook of Devon and Kinnesswood this time round.

Details of all these upcoming events will be available soon (unfortunately not at time of submitting this edition's Police Box) and will be advertised in the local press, on the Kinross.cc website, through posters in prominent locations within the towns and villages and also with the help of local schools.

Cycling on Pavements

We have received some complaints regarding the problem of cyclists using pavements. This may seem a petty complaint at first, but in fact this behaviour can be the cause of serious accidents. It is accepted that small children are best kept on the pavements, for obvious safety reasons. Younger children are generally too small and do not go fast enough to pose a hazard to pedestrians. However, older children and adults should only be cycling on the roadways. Cyclists should bear in mind that pedestrians do not expect fast moving bikes to be on the pavements and often they cannot hear them approaching in time to react or get out of the way.

We would also like to remind motorists to treat cyclists with consideration and patience. When passing a bicycle on the road, motorists should give them plenty of room and not just squeeze past, this can be very intimidating for the cyclist and may cause them to swerve or become unstable. If there is no room to pull out past the cyclist, or there are oncoming vehicles, then the motorist should slow down and wait until it is safe to pass. Overtaking a cyclist should be dealt with in the same way as overtaking any other vehicle.

Parking Outside Schools

Now that a new academic year is with us, we would like to remind those people who take children to and from school in vehicles to be considerate about how and where they park when doing so.

We understand that parents want to see their children, particularly the younger ones, safely on to school premises and on wet days ensure that the youngsters are as dry as possible when they arrive. However, in doing so, many people park their vehicles in a manner that compromises the safety of others. We have encountered, among other things, cars parked on the zig zag markings, obstructing the school crossing patroller, and on pavements whereby pedestrians are forced to walk on to the road to get past. Regretfully we have found that the attitude of a small number of parents appears to be that they don't care what happens to anyone else as long as their child arrives at and returns home from school safely. We all have a duty to ensure that everyone, particularly the children, are safe at all times.

We intend to monitor the situation at all our schools and where there is evidence that offences are being committed, drivers will be issued with Fixed Penalty tickets or reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

We would also ask that parents who are walking to school with their children cross at and when directed to do so by the school crossing patroller. After all, it is their function to ensure that the children cross safely and allowing the youngsters to think they can cross where and when they want, is not a good example to set.

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Police Box Special

Inspector Iain Ward

In this Police Box Special, recently appointed Inspector Iain Ward introduces himself and explains his duties and of the structure of the police in this area.

I was posted to South Perthshire Section in April 2011. This is a fairly new section following the reorganisation of Western Division in 2010, effectively when Crieff and Kinross Sections were merged, making the new South Perthshire area.

I now have overall responsibility for the whole of the South Section of Tayside Police's Western Division. This encompasses everything from attending incidents and events to dealing with community and staffing issues. This is a demanding role, not just due to the geographical area I have to cover.



I have twenty years' experience to draw upon, starting my career in the Hampshire area before transferring to Tayside in 1995. Much of my career has been city-based, such as Perth and Dundee, where I was previously part of the Operational Support Team and an authorised firearms officer. As a trained search officer, I have been involved in a number of high profile cases over the years, including the Law Hill murder in 2001. I also spent six months in Holland during the Lockerbie Trial as an armed officer.

In 2003, I was promoted to Sergeant and took up a role at the Scottish Police College in Tulliallan, where I was responsible for training probationary officers. I was also seconded from that role at Tulliallan to develop the contingency planning arrangements for the College during the G8 summit in Gleneagles in 2005. I returned to operational duties in 2007 with a stint in Kinross. In 2008, I was moved back to Perth.

Since moving back to the section it has been my intention to be out there in the community as much as I can, and to be as visible as possible.

The section is quite fortunate in that serious and violent crime is not a major factor. The issues that we need to tackle are predominately low-level crimes such as vandalism and anti-social behaviour, all of which have an impact on the communities in which they occur.

Since moving to the section, I have been very impressed with the level of Community spirit and many forms of engagement my officers have with the local community groups. This joint approach, in my view, is paramount to us getting the balance right.

I am a firm believer in the benefits that successful community policing can bring to an area, and getting community policing right in the section is one of my main objectives; this has resulted in some minor changes to my team, with the appointment of two new Community Officers, Constable Sadie Allan for Kinross and Milnathort and Constable Victoria Riches covering the Kinross villages. Both these officers will complement the tireless work carried out by Constable Euan Mitchell, who can now concentrate on the Glenfarg and Bridge of Earn area. Collectively these officers have a very good knowledge and understanding of the area and bring a high level of skills and experience to the communities they serve.

Community policing and local knowledge is absolutely vital in areas like this. The time invested in policing in this way is worth its weight in gold.

As a public agency we are very much accountable and we have targets, but at a local level we have to do what is right for the community. With major decisions being taken at a national level over the future of policing across Scotland, protecting the concerns of the community at a local level is even more important during a period of unprecedented change.

I am responsible for managing the local policing of big events in the area such as T in the Park and the Ryder Cup in 2014. I fortunately inherited a template for community engagement for these sorts of events based on several years of policing T in the Park, and am mindful of the impact such big events have on the communities in which they occur. I will certainly be replicating this in the lead up to next year's event.

Community Council News



The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. In addition, Kinross CC minutes are lodged in the community library. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes.

Kinross Community Council

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 3 August were: CCllrs C Watson, D West, D Cuthbert, W Freeman, M Blyth, D Mackay, L MacKay and M Scott. Also in attendance were: P&K Cllrs S Miller, K Baird, M Barnacle and W Robertson; Sgt Williams and 16 members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs D Colliar and I Jack.

Police report: The CC is to receive a report prior to each meeting in case the Police are unable to attend due to an emergency.

There have been a few thefts of diesel and tools. There have been numerous cases of theft of scrap metal from the High School, surgery at Lathro and churches. A number of these have been detected.

Traffic issues in Swansacre are to be addressed.

The Police are working closely with Community Learning and Development and a number of projects are planned. Street Football is to take place at Sands car park and Donaldson Park (Milnathort) in August.

Complaints were received in relation to the noise at T in the Park. CCllr Davies commented that there was a congestion of traffic around 12.10 on Saturday and Sunday at Moto. Vehicles were pulling out and turning right, while cars were trying to turn in. There was no police presence at both these times. A member of the public suggested that the noise levels might have increased due to the relocation of the site this year. Comment was also made as to motorway barriers and publicising road restrictions. The Police are always interested in feedback following T in the Park.

Review of CCs: Paperwork received re. the new procedures to be put in place in November had been circulated to the CCllrs. An election will take place in November and new Constitution, Standing Orders etc adopted thereafter.

Future of Kinross Buildings

County Buildings: The Heads of Terms have now been received and there are a number of issues referred to therein which require further discussion with the Council, in particular to sub-letting. The Chairman circulated an email from PKC. The issue of sub-letting and how to utilise the building to generate an income are main criteria. We have returned to PKC requesting that they remove the condition in relation to sub-letting and with other issues requiring clarification and await their response. Cllr Robertson requested that a copy of the communication from the Council be forwarded to each of the Councillors and they would jointly approach PKC on this matter. CCllr Scott advised that following on her comment last month, she had again been approached by the member of public who, along with other volunteers, were willing to manage a Visitor Centre. It was commented that the system in practice within Kinross would appear to have broken down and Mr Miles confirmed that there was very little information being provided on Kinross. Comment was also made as to the dilapidated condition of

the town centre. Cllr Robertson advised that a planning application has been lodged for the relief road. This will reduce the amount of traffic on the High Street.

Town Hall: This sale is still ongoing, subject to planning. The bid was for mixed residential and commercial use.

The former High School site has been placed back on the market. It was understood that Sainsbury's withdrew their offer as their existing site was part of their bid and they requested a condition that no other supermarket chain would be able to offer for this site. PKC would not agree to this.

There were no objections to any of the above.

11/00997/FLL Jetrigg, Kinross: Erection of nine holiday units, hostel, cafe and leisure facilities. This application is for nine self-catering units (a mix of villas and apartments) and a 41-bed hostel with communal dining and relaxation area. A 40-cover cafe will cater for the residents of the villas/ apartments, Heritage Trail users and the public. The complex will in addition offer a leisure pavilion with sauna, steam room and Jacuzzi along with a nine-hole putting/crazy golf area. We had no objection to this proposal, however agreed that we request a condition on planning that the Heritage Trail should be linked into this site. It was commented that it would be necessary to secure a link from the development to Kinross sewer and this would create an excellent opportunity to extend the trail when reinstating the ground.

Planning and the CC: Mr Miles questioned if all the members of the CC inspect every application. It was explained that this is too time consuming and that a subcommittee was formed to undertake this and report to the committee any applications that require discussion or decision. The sub-committee members are CCllrs William Freeman, David Colliar and David Cuthbert. None of the CCllrs has any qualification in this regard. It was noted by the CC that CCllr Colliar has significant experience in relation to planning. Mr Miles advised that the plans are no

longer available at the campus and can only be inspected at Perth or online. Cllr Robertson will take this up with PKC and stress that plans should be accessible from the Council Office in Kinross [now at campus]. Cllr Robertson confirmed that all CCs work in this way with sub-committees formed to discuss certain topics and then report back to the full committee.

Planning: Comments by members of the public

Moto: In answer to a question raised by a member of the public, it was commented that a number of the CC had visited the exhibition arranged by Moto and that no objections were raised by the CC to this matter. Mr Miles commented that the planned retail development within this site was the size of Sainsbury's and would impact on the High Street.

Green Hotel: 47 Retirement Flats: A member of the public commented on this application explaining that it was now in the hands of the Scottish Government. He queried whether we had any further comment to make. We were advised recently of the position and that a Section 75 Agreement was to be drawn up. It was explained that it is not permitted to add any further comment to this matter.

Reports from Perth & Kinross Councillors Councillor Barnacle

TAYplan Development Plan: A copy of a report prepared by Cllr Barnacle and forwarded to TAYplan Strategic Development Planning Authority was presented to the CC.

T in the Park/Verge cutting: A number of representations were received in relation to verge cuttings. The CC received a copy of a letter forwarded to Cllr Barnacle in relation to this matter. The sheer height of vegetation at roadsides can be obstructive. The verges are now cut once a year, double width at junctions. It was suggested that the cut should be restricted to junctions. Cllr Barnacle suggested that the width of the cut be reduced. Cllr Robertson commented that on a very narrow lane this becomes a hazard and should be cut back. This work is carried out as a measure towards traffic and road safety issues. Cllr Miller has asked PKC to cut back the edges to a width that allows the road junction to be made safe. The edges of the slip roads into Kinross have not been cut and obstruct the visual outlook at the roundabout - Bear Scotland are responsible for this.

TRACKS: the trail should be cut back this week. A query was raised in relation to containers for dog mess; this service was not being offered. It was to be hoped that dog owners would ensure that the pathway is kept clear of mess.

Kinross-shire Forum: Cllr Barnacle updated those present on the position. He noted that Kinross CC had indicated non-interest in this proposal. Portmoak have come back to him that they have no issues in meeting with the other CCs and Fossoway are strongly in favour of the Forum. In view that the Convention has been struggling for some time, a Forum would be a sound table to address common issues, such as

Identity in Kinross-shire re. Branding and the broader issues of planning. He asked that the CC reconsider this concept of meeting twice a year with other CCs to try and bring together common interest or issues that we can discuss of importance. It was noted that the first meeting has been delayed. We will add this to the agenda next month. It was noted that CCllr West thinks this could be helpful.

Councillor Miller

Town centre: Cllr Miller commented on the regeneration of the town centre, adding that there was no point at this time expending money on the High Street. The link road hopefully should be in place by 2012. There will be money in the budget for 2014 for regeneration of the town centre (1.14 million). Cllr Baird is to speak to John McCrone to request an update on the current position in this matter and to invite him to a meeting towards the end of this year. The CC would like to be consulted on this and be allowed to provide input for consideration.

Councillor Baird

Survey: Cllr Baird reported on a survey being carried out at the Heritage Trail; 250 people were there this morning. Cllr Robertson added that there are more visitors to the town.

Councillor Robertson

Link Road: The Planning Application for the Link Road is to go to Committee. SEPA kept putting in objections re. this and flood risk assessments were required. Their objection has now been rescinded. The figure at the outset was £1,000,000; this has now risen to 2.25 million.

Kirkgate toilets: It was commented that these were not working recently. Cllr Baird will check this with the PKC.

Correspondence

Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation: An evening talk to take place at Perth Museum on 7 September (6 -7.30pm). Depending on interest and numbers, Tracey Ramsay may be able to organise transport for up to 15 people.

Carr-Gomm Scotland: A voluntary sector organisation who have been asked by the Council to provide Home Care to people in Perth & Kinross. They are recruiting across the area and asked if we could publicise this. Action: To display poster on the website.

SNH Loch Leven NNR annual report received.

Display board: It has been agreed that this will be erected at the bus stop at the Kirklands and will be fully funded by PKC. The shelters at the Town Hall are owned by Adshel.

Live Active Leisure: Their response was read, which included the following information: Live Active Leisure is a 'not for profit' independent organisation. Governance is provided by a Board of Directors. Reference was made to the



uncertain economic future faced by many organisations. Difficult decisions have been made to ensure the continued sustainability of the facilities and services LAL provide whilst still recognising the need to provide opportunities for people to enjoy the benefits of an active lifestyle. Information on charges for activities, membership etc can be found on the LAL website. Whilst some activity charges have increased, others have either stayed the same (e.g. swimming) or, in the case of sports hall activities, the charge has actually been reduced this year. The Sports hall/squash charge is £4.00 standard and £3.00 for adult members.

TRO, Swansacre: Notification of a Traffic Regulation Order. Detailed plans were provided showing the "No Waiting at Any Time" restrictions. The residents at Swansacre have long complained about parking in this area and welcome this decision. However, the CC agreed to write to PKC objecting to the withdrawal of some parking spaces in Station Road, and to add that a complete consultation was not exercised. (The Drill Hall was not included.)

High Street and Old Cleish Road: Proposed amendments to Waiting Restrictions: PKC state that as a result of the opening of the new Community Campus and reduced traffic movements with relation to Kinross Market, it proposes to promote a TRO to remove the school time waiting restrictions on the High Street and Old Cleish Road. It was also noted that the lines indicating "No Waiting at Any Time" restrictions in High Street conflict with the current TRO. It is proposed to amend the TRO to bring this in line with the present situation. Again, drawings were provided.

Kinross Newsletter: Complaint received against editorial decision made in connection with an article on the Cricket Club. It was noted that the Editor has given [in the August edition] her reasons for publicising the article and that the issue has been resolved. There have been occasions in the past when similar incidents have arisen and veiled threats made. It was agreed that emphasis should be made when lodging articles that clubs etc should give careful attention to the accuracy of the material.

T in the Park/Verges: Copy of letter to Cllr Barnacle re. T in the Park - No road safety for local residents. Route from Carnbo to join the M90 at Milnathort to go north is via the Westfield Road to Dalquei ch then either the Findarlie road to Ballingal Bridge on the A91 to the north M90 slip road at the Hilton. Both these roads are virtually single track with no passing places. Every year during T in the Park we have to make this detour while the A91 is closed. More than ever this year travelling on either of these side roads was very dangerous as no attempt has been made by PKC to cut the road edges so that any hidden hazards could be seen as cars tried to pass each other. At the briefing meeting on 14 June it was pointed out that the cutting of these edges had not been done and this was noted but PKC chose to ignore our concerns.

Dr J Alcock and Mr K Miles, complaints against CC: At this point in the meeting CCllr Watson withdrew from the Chair and was replaced by the Vice-Chairman, CCllr Davies. He explained that two letters of complaint were received directed to the CC as a whole but in particular against CCllr Watson requesting his resignation. CCllr Davies read out these two letters and questioned if Dr Alcock had been present at the meeting in relation to the matters he was writing about and Dr Alcock admitted that he had not. Following on this both parties were invited to speak to their complaints and answers were given to each individual question raised.

Dr Alcock questioned the legalities of CCllr Watson chairing the meeting, continuing to chair the meeting when he had declared an interest and asked if that was consistent with the requirement not to use his position on the CC for financial gain, for himself, family or friends. In his opinion, the Chairman should, on having declared an interest, left the meeting and preferably waited outside. It was answered that CCllr Watson was not an Agent for Wallace Land but for the land owner and that this was an "informative presentation" at Wallace Land's request with no decision/vote proposed or indeed having taken place. If a decision/vote were required CCllr Watson would have withdrawn. Cllr Miller added that he had suggested to Wallace Land that they approach the CC for consultation on this matter. Cllr Barnacle stated that it is part of the duty of the CC to facilitate these presentations. He continued that the Chairman had two alternatives, he could have given up the Chair at the meeting when the Wallace Land discussion arose, but he did not need to. He had dealt with the meeting neutrally and courteously, and had given the subject matter a generous allocation of time. Dr Alcock had sought advice from the Council, as had CCllr Watson. In both cases no written evidence of the outcome of their contact with the Council was available. The Council advised Dr Alcock that our Standing Orders would outline the procedures for a CC Meeting and that CCllr Watson should have withdrawn. Mr Innes (Head of Legal) from PKC advised CCllr Watson that there was no need for this and that he had not breached protocol. We currently have no Standing Orders, however, the CC procedures are under review, with Standing Orders etc to come into effect in November. The relevant wording now reads: If you have any private and/or personal interest in a matter to be considered by the CC, you have a duty to declare this and if deemed necessary by other members, withdraw from discussions and the decision making process with regard to that matter. It is also to be noted that Wallace Land, following on their first meeting in January, asked us to amend our submissions to the Council (which were lodged in August 2009) to take account of their discussions with the CC - the deadline being 11 February 2011. We rejected this as we were happy with the content of our submissions. It was also explained to Mr Miles that the zoning in the Main Issues Report at contention in this case was promoted by the Council and that the CC was not a party to this.

Mr Miles contended that CCllr Watson had stated, at the June meeting, that he was satisfied with the plans of Wallace Land. CCllr Watson denied that he had said any such thing, in fact could not have made any comment because there were then, and still are, no plans from Wallace Land. What CCllr Watson had said was that he was content with our submission on the Main Issues Report. Mr Miles also stated that this was a massive development with 1,500 jobs and CCllr Watson did not give enough time to the discussion. It was explained that we had other matters to attend to and we gave a fair time to this subject. A member of the public pointed out that Mr Miles himself had monopolised the best part of the time allocated to this matter in questioning both the CC and Wallace Land. Cllr Barnacle and CCllr Davies both stressed that the Chairman, CCllr Watson, had given adequate time and displayed complete fairness during the discussions. Drop in Sessions were arranged by the Council with an Exhibition at the campus in relation to the Local Development Plan Main Issues Report Consultation. A Questionnaire was also prepared by the CC and handed over to the Council; this was circulated around the majority of houses in the area. It was

commented that the Local Development Plan will be available for consultation around December 2011 and it was reiterated that the time for objection/comment would be if and when a planning application was lodged. In response to one of the issues raised referring to the CC meeting not being "inviting and friendly", CCllr Davies asked the meeting for feedback as we aim to improve.

In relation to the publicising of the agenda and minutes, the points raised were taken on board. It was agreed that the minutes should be publicised on the website and a fuller description of any presentation provided. Dr Alcock suggested that we invite the parties who will be presenting the presentation to provide a brief summary of the topic to be discussed. The agenda will also appear in the display case at the Kirklands once the board is in place. The Secretary offered to send these gentlemen the agenda by email should there be any added business at meetings.

Mr Miles challenged Douglas Alexander, one of the public present, in relation to his attendance at the meeting and his right to speak, stating he did not reside within the Kinross CC area. Mr Alexander explained that he attends the meetings of all CCs and also that he owned land within the Kinross area. Mr Alexander was allowed to speak and made the comment that this discussion was a culmination of a 20-year vendetta against the Chairman that had now widened apparently to include him.

Finally, Mr Miles asked that it be minuted that he is not happy with this CC.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC is to be held on Wednesday 7 September at 7.30pm at the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

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Milnathort Community Council

News from the August Meeting

CCIlr Hamilton, Chairman, welcomed CCIlrs Smith, Bennet, Milne Home and Thomson to the meeting held on 11 August in Orwell Parish Church Hall. Also in attendance were Minute Secretary E Rougvie, P&K CIlrs Robertson, Baird and Barnacle, and five members of the public Apologies were received from CCIlrs Giacopazzi and Cottingham.

This was the first meeting in the CC's new permanent venue and CCllr Hamilton hoped that as time went on more members of the public would attend.

Matters Arising

Kinross Cricket Club planning application: CCllr Bennet referred to a 'rather unfortunate' article in the Kinross Newsletter [July issue] which she felt was biased and did not accurately reflect the views of objectors. She said that objections to the application had been based on flooding concerns, proximity to ancient monument and, in particular, road safety issues. A discussion followed during which it was emphasised that the CC had not objected in principle, but it was felt that had a public meeting been held prior to the application being lodged, misunderstandings would not have arisen. It was to be hoped that such a meeting would be arranged should a future application be submitted. It was also noted that since the proposed site exceeded two hectares a 12week consultation period should have been arranged. In this case, planners presumably had not thought this necessary as the application did not involve housing, but it was felt to be a significant development for a community of the size of Milnathort. The CC hoped that lessons had been learned both by Kinross Cricket Club and local residents and CCllr Hamilton wished the Cricket Club well in their search for a new site.

Planning Applications Lodged with PKC

Erection of 67m wind turbine at East Netherton: The applicant was in attendance to provide more information about the proposed turbine, which would be for farm use and to generate income. It would use direct-drive technology to optimise efficiency and minimise noise and would not require an environmental assessment as it would stand alone. Following discussion, the CC agreed not to lodge an objection.

Erection of a conservatory at 2 Perth Road: noted.

Extension to 23 Burleigh Road: noted.

Installation of disabled access at 8 Viewfar Road: noted.

Royal Hotel, change of use to dwelling house: noted after brief discussion.

Extension to 36 Manse Road: noted.

15kw wind turbine at Cuthill Towers: noted.

Residential development at Milnathort Golf Club: noted after brief discussion.

Stable block at Hattonburn Farm: noted.

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Applications Determined by PKC since the last meeting

61m wind turbine at Blairfield Farm: refused.

Agricultural building at East Nethertown: approved.

New Constitution

CCllr Hamilton advised that a new constitution has been introduced for CCs across Scotland by the Scottish Government in order to standardise procedure. One of the effects is that elections will now be organised by local councils, in this case PKC. All CCs are required to have an election on the first Thursday of November and there will be an election every four years after that. After discussion it was agreed that the new constitution was a positive development. CCllr Hamilton will circulate copies to all CCllrs.

Flood prevention

CCIIr Hamilton raised the issue of flood prevention and was keen to pursue the introduction of 'soff' flood prevention measures involving landowners preferentially flooding their land. A discussion followed in which it was acknowledged that existing hard defences in Milnathort had been effective during the severe winter weather, but it was considered that soft flooding measures should be explored. A Scotland-wide flooding risk consultation is currently being conducted by SEPA and, after further discussion, it was agreed that the CC would carry out local research and pursue the matter further once SEPA's conclusions were available. In the meantime, any issues concerning blocked drains should be reported to PKC.

Other business

Brownies: CCllr Bennet advised that Milnathort Brownies had asked if they could trap moths in Tillywhally Wood. The CC welcomed their request.

Placecheck update: Diane Cassidy of PKC updated the CC on progress via e-mail. The greenspace projects are now complete, with the upgrading of Donaldson Park, including a youth shelter; the refurbishment of Jessie's park; tree planting at Auld Mart and new seating at Ba'hill. It is hoped that all road improvements will be completed this financial year. A member of the public expressed concerns about the hard surface at the youth shelter but it was stressed that the equipment is not a piece of play equipment for small children. The same member of the public raised the issue of a cracked tree in the park. Cllr Robertson advised that this had already been reported but he would take it up again with the appropriate council official. The member of the public also asked why areas of grass were being left uncut as he was concerned about dogs fouling in the long grass. He was advised that this was to encourage biodiversity.

Pitdownies: It was noted that a second consultation event was to be held in Milnathort Town Hall on 17 August at which members of the public could see plans for proposed redevelopment of the land at the Pitdownies.

CC meetings: CCllr Hamilton proposed that the CC meet twelve times a year instead of eleven. Agreed.

CC funds: CCllr Bennet, treasurer, advised that the CC had received its annual payment from PKC.

Subjects include Historic Kinross-shire, Loch Leven, Fauna and Flora, Countryside, Villages, Local Projects and Events. Milnathort Football Club: A member of the public was in attendance to seek support from the CC on behalf of Milnathort FC, who wish to install changing facilities at Donaldson Park. He was advised that PKC should be approached directly but that the CC would lend its support.

Kinross-shire Forum: Cllr Barnacle referred to a letter he had circulated among Kinross-shire CCs proposing that the Kinross-shire Forum be reconvened in a different format. He felt that the Forum had folded because its members were unelected, whereas the new body would comprise CCllrs only, with a rotating chair. The Forum would meet twice yearly to discuss issues affecting all CCs. Kinross CC were still considering the idea; Fossoway were in favour and Portmoak had reservations. Following discussion, the CC agreed they were broadly in favour of the idea as it would provide a balance of views and provide an opportunity to meet with PKC officials, but it was important that no specific planning applications were discussed and no decisions taken. Motorway barriers: Cllr Baird advised that discussions were

Motorway barriers: Cllr Baird advised that discussions were still ongoing between PKC and BEAR Scotland on the issue of the missing motorway barriers.

Zebra crossing: It was noted that the zebra crossing in New Road was currently being refurbished.

Grass verges: CCllr Milne Home commended PKC for their work in cutting grass verges.

The next meeting of Milnathort CC will be held in Orwell Parish Church Hall on Thursday 8 September 2011 at 7.30pm. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

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Fossoway and District CC

News from the August Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 2 August were: CCllrs S Morrison, T Wigman-Duffy, A Lavery, S Anderson and K Bothwick. Also in attendance were: P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and K Baird; Sgt Williams and nine members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from A Cheape, M Anness and R Cooper. There were no declarations of interest. **Community Policing**: A report has been sent in advance in

Community Policing: A report has been sent in advance in case police presence at this meeting can't happen for operational reasons. New Community Officer is Victoria Riches. Issues mentioned:

Between 11/7 & 13/7: Theft of construction and plant equipment from Lambhill farm, Rumbling Bridge – under enquiry.

Between 27/06 & 30/06: Theft of construction and plant equipment from a plot of land formally known as Craigend farm, Powmill– under enquiry.

20/6: Theft of construction and plant equipment from building plot at Back Crook, Crook of Devon – under enquiry.

Also, be aware of bogus callers: over the past few weeks Tayside Police has received a large number of complaints, or intelligence reports in relation to people – sometimes elderly and vulnerable residents – being called by people claiming to be from banks, financial institutions, government bodies and even lottery operators with promises of ready cash. This also includes one local resident.

Minutes of the last meeting: Burnside Wind Farm: Cllr Barnacle said that he had said "The Council had made a landscape assessment and decided that only one farm was appropriate", but he had not made any comment about financial issues. With this amendment noted, the minutes were signed off.

T-in-the-Park debrief: Police thought that it went reasonably well. Seemed to be more traffic than before so more areas were policed to control it. A member of the public commented that the security guards at the junctions were very helpful in helping local people to get out.

Some back roads weren't grass cut so made it very difficult to pass oncoming traffic. Cllr Baird explained that the contract for grass cutting has changed this year (starting 1st July) and there were some issues so things got behind. There is only going to be one cut per year for budget reasons. Sandy comments that even if there is not enough budget to do all verges, then road ends/junctions need to be done more extensively for road safety reasons. Kevin wonders if T-i-t-P couldn't do some of this prior to the festival?

Member of the public commented that on consulting a member of PKC to get advice about directions, they were given bad advice to use a road that was actually closed.

Alastair felt that there was a problem with traffic (especially heavy goods) during set-up (using new entrances) being a bit arrog ant — needs to be brought up with Committee. Member of the public observes that this caused a few problems during morning rush-hour prior to start of festival.

Some junctions weren't properly controlled Thursday night, security not always stopping non-residents. Police observed that there were a lot more residents' passes handed out than before – it appears that Sands give them out fairly freely – this needs addressing. Member of the public thinks that more people are using Rumbling Bridge to avoid some of the queues. Perhaps it would make sense to have lights/police officer at A977/Rumbling Bridge junction.

Cllr Barnacle observes that issues should be brought up at forum – especially verge cutting. Noise louder this year because site re-oriented to avoid pipeline.

Sandy had complaint that the published Police T-i-t-P hotline just went to Tayside police. A car parked on pavement at Fossoway garage was alleged to be working on behalf of Police, and caused pedestrians difficulty in passing it.

Spill and Pollution of the River Devon: Trudy had received email from A Heidemann about dead fish in river, and contacted K Stevens from PKC Environment Department who said that there were ongoing investigations into three unrelated incidents: Castle Hill reservoir turn-over; Acid spill; High amount of Aluminium Sulphate. Trudy asked why people hadn't been notified, e.g. Scouts from nearby camp swimming in River. Clacks Council has given out a warning but PKC hasn't PKC could have given warning via CC.

Kevin reported that his angling association contacted SEPA who, as a result, had put up a notice for the attention of the Scouts. It's not just a question of the dead fish but the long-term effects. Member of the public observed the report in the Courier was very vague about the location, so next to useless. Sandy spoke to Scottish Water and told them we expected someone to come to the CC and explain – this can't happen until the investigation is complete because of legal position, but they have agreed to do this later on.

Cllr Barnacle commented that his first notification was when a reporter asked him about it! Cllr Barnacle got in touch with Scottish Water, SEPA and Tom Brighton at PKC. He asked Tom why he hadn't heard about it from PKC.

Blairingone Biomass Plant: No planning applications received; rumour that it has been sold back to Oran.

War Memorial, Blairingone: Cllr Barnacle reports that John McCrone from PKC emailed him so Cllr Barnacle phoned him – situation is that PKC won't provide land nor sell land at front of Church to developer because Historic Scotland want to retain control of what's in front of the listed building. Planner says that developer and council are happy for memorial to stay where it is. This CC, reflecting the community view, wants it moved. Planners say that someone from the community should make a listed building application to get consent to move the memorial, then apply for funds. Cllr Barnacle is still trying to arrange meeting with Council officials, the developers and the Blairingone subgroup, preferably on site to find a solution to this problem. Developer is considering legal action to obtain land to get access to the house. Planners are saying that there isn't enough community support.

Dunning Glen: Trudy reports that the CC's press release, including photos, had been published in some local papers. PR also sent to MSPs. Some measures have been taken to prevent parking, but they're not working.

Accessibility path around Crook of Devon: Cllr Barnacle mailed Dave Stubbs (Access Officer) and planners about core path between Old Railway Institute and Church. Path is secured by existing planning conditions and hence the current signs are in breach of that. Cllr Barnacle has proposed signs to dissuade horse users by explaining that it's a footpath and a safe route to school. PKC would agree to self-closing gate but not kissing gate, even though the former would not prevent horses.

Church car park: Malcolm Hill has been most helpful and is progressing this. It should be completed soon. Note that this will be available to all members of the community not just church users.

CC Business - Meetings Attended

Kevin reports that the Association of Scottish CCs is going to be disbanded because funding has been reduced such that they can't continue. Will take about a year to wind up and arrange alternative insurance currently provided to members. Convention of Perth and Kinross CCs: Kevin and Sandy attended; nine attendees out of forty CCs in PKC. Not much happening, no chair, secretary proposes disbandment.

PKC have issued CCs with new code of conduct, alignment of financial year, etc. CC Elections to be in November. PKC will now run elections – members are elected for four years. Sandy encourages people to come forward, especially from Blairingone, which has a lot of issues at the moment. Cllr Barnacle points out that it's important that people understand CCs are the first stage in the democratic process, especially for planning matters.

PKC Business, Report by Cllr Barnacle:

Verge cutting: contacted Lesley Anne Cassidy, and asked if road safety aspect had been considered. Replies that verge cutting must be tendered, delayed until 5 July. Service provision is the same everywhere; PKC's standards are being met by the contractor. T-i-t-P area requested too late to do properly.

Environment Committee Report in June proposed that one of the Crook of Devon **play areas** in Fossoway Glebe be closed; Cllr Barnacle thinks this is acceptable because there is a main play area nearby. Equipment will be removed and reused if appropriate, then area grassed over and maintained. Member of public suggests that barriers be erected near main play area to prevent children rushing on to road.

The Blairingone notice board is now refurbished; thanks to John Anderson for doing that.

Burnfoot Hill wind farm: no planning application yet. Cllr Barnacle will write to Ian Dogood, planning officer at Clacks, suggesting review of wind farms in Ochils as a whole

It seems unreasonable for applications for essential (farm) workers' developments to have to pay planning levy.

Forum: Cllr Barnacle thinks that the Kinross CCs should be talking to each other, at least twice a year, and is happy to facilitate getting a meeting going. What does the CC think? Sandy and Trudy agree that it would be useful, probably previous forum didn't work because it was trying to cover too large an area.

Planning Applications

Alastair notes that whoever is doing his job after the elections needs to work out a plan to cover planning applications received in June when there is no CC meeting – it is difficult to obtain quorum via email in order for the CC to make a valid comment.

Other Business

Megs Farm: Dogs in silage fields. We don't want to stop people walking in the countryside but they need to stop their dogs fouling the silage field, which will potentially harm the cattle later eating the silage. Member of the public suggests a press release like the Dunning Glen one.

Kinross Fund: Member of the public observes that the Kinross Fund will now only give money to "projects" rather than things like normal running costs. Note that T-i-t-P money goes to this fund and they think that they are benefiting the community. Trudy thinks that this has always been the case, although it's possible that previously the fund was less robust about the definition of a project.

Carnbo bus shelter: School bus pick-up point at Carnbo has a new shelter and untrimmed grass surrounding it. Whose responsibility is this? Cllr Barnacle will look into this.

Trees overhanging road near school are scratching cars.

A91/A977 Loop Road could get special designation for walkers, cyclists, and other non-vehicular use, which would prevent automatic rights of access for HGVs, etc. If community members support this, they should contact the CC. Member of the public suggests that it might be better to get weight limits put on the roads instead.

On 16 June Portmoak was visited by the accreditation team to externally assess our submission for the Health Promoting School Award. We received word in the last week of term that our bid for Health



Kinross Museum

This August volunteers at Kinross Museum had a chance to take part in a two-week archaeological survey on St Serf's Island on



Loch Leven where a priory once existed. The first to be carried out since 1877, this survey forms part of a wider programme of field research at early medieval monastic sites in east Scotland under the direction of Dr Oliver O'Grady of the Culdee Archaeology Project. Items in Kinross Museum, including maps, photographs, documents and artefacts, have helped provide some useful background to this project which will hopefully yield interesting results on the past occupation of the island.

On Monday 1 August the Heritage Lottery Fund announced support for an exciting new project — *The Living Landscapes of the Lomonds*. Designed to promote the conservation, understanding and enjoyment of an area of Fife and Kinross including the Lomond Hills, Benarty Hill and Loch Leven, this project is now being moved forward in a development phase by a wide range of organisations working in partnership. Kinross Museum, as one of the partners, offers a wide range of resources that will be used to help interpret the historic landscape.

Metal detectorists Jim Crombie and Brian Kenny visited Kinross Museum to present two recent finds following fieldwork to the east of Loch Leven – a Portmoak Parish Church communion token from the early 18th century and a gold fob inscribed to the Rev. A Brown of the Limerigg Mission near Slamannan in 1891. Both of these items add to a significant collection of finds from around Loch Leven now held by the Museum.

Three medals belonging to Colonel Robert Burns-Begg (1872-1918) came up for auction at Spinks in London in late July. A descendent of Isabella Begg, the youngest sister of Robert Burns, Robert Burn-Begg was the Resident Commissioner in Rhodesia before taking part in the Boer War as a leading member of Kitchiner's Horse and a member of Lord Kitchener's Intelligence Staff. Sadly, the Museum was unable to obtain the medals, which included a rare Queen's Medal with five clasps and King's medal with two clasps.



There is still time to find some summer fruits to make this lovely cake.

Janette's Summer Fruit Cake

175g soft margarine
175g golden caster sugar
250g self raising flour
2 large eggs
1teaspoon vanilla extract
200g raspberries and blackberries (halved if large)
140g granulated sugar
1½ tbs lemon juice

- 1. Heat oven to 180C/160C Fan. Grease a 2lb loaf tin and line with greaseproof paper. Put marg, caster sugar, flour, eggs and vanilla into bowl and beat with electric hand mixer until pale and creamy.
- 2. Spread a third of the mixture into tin and scatter over 60g of fruit. Repeat this and finish with remaining cake mix and bake for 1 hour.
- 3. Remove from oven and pierce cake with a skewer. Put remaining fruit in a bowl with granulated sugar and lemon juice mash this and spread over the top of the cake. Leave cake in tin until cool.

The ladies appreciated the organising that had gone into planning the programme for the 'Outing' by Linda Hegarty and regretted that she was unable to join us.



500 Greyhounds Re-homed

Local dog sanctuary Greyhound Rescue Fife based at Baltree Country Centre recently celebrated rehoming their 500th dog. The lucky greyhound, Madam, will join the other eight dogs at the home of Celia and Jimmy Fernie, the owners and founders of the rescue centre. This lucky houndess, a nine-year-old former racer and record holder, ran an incredible 430 metres in just 25.71 seconds, and is now happily retired in her forever home.

Greyhound Rescue Fife was established in 2005 after the Fernies become aware of the plight of the huge over supply of dogs classed as unwanted as they are past their best for racing. They first crossed paths with a greyhound eleven years ago, adopting a homeless three-year-old called Tiggy. "I looked into the eyes of this brindle-coloured greyhound, so underweight and very ill, and fell in love with him. We adored Tiggy; sadly he died of bone cancer at the age of eight," said Celia.

There is estimated to be 30,000 greyhounds in the UK alone that if not rescued, face the fate of a one way trip to the vet or worse. There is always a waiting list of dogs awaiting a vacated spot at GRF. Jimmy stated: "When we re-homed our first dog six years ago, we never dreamed we'd reach 500, but now that we have, our new target is to find a home for 1000 Greyhounds!" GRF have never put down even one dog and have the help of a small army of volunteers at the kennels who happily come along on a regular basis to carry out cleaning, feeding and walkies duties.

Many of the rehomed greyhounds now live happily with different kinds of dogs and even cats. For some reason potential adopters consider greyhounds as being big and question their temperament because they often see them muzzled when racing. Greyhounds make perfect house pets and require only 20 minutes walking twice a day. 

Once again, our Club has had another interesting month, starting with a visit from our

East of Scotland District Governor Iain MacDonald and his wife. D.G. Iain gave us a brief talk on his objectives for District clubs in his year of office. In particular, he encouraged us to try to obtain new members across the full age range. We also heard of the project being promoted by his wife, Winnie for funds for Rachel House. Like his predecessors, D.G. Iain has made a fast start to Rotary year when he plans to visit all 88 clubs in our District within his first few months of office.

On 25 July, the club was addressed by Catriona, daughter of club member, Ken Paterson. Qualified in Marine Biology and Environmental Impact Assessment, Catriona works in Asia for DfID and the International Finance Corporation of the World Bank ensuring that major projects which these organisations are asked to fund, will meet all the Kyoto requirements in terms of their effects on the environment. In particular, she has reviewed major wind-farm proposals for China and Mongolia and was able to compare them with some of those being developed in Scotland.

The first two meetings in August were set to give members a chance to tell colleagues of unusual, even embarrassing events in their lives. The District Governor elect, Robin Rippin was present at the second of these and he contributed one or two memories as did John Perrypacker, a Rotarian visiting from Arizona. John was first contacted by one of our members, Barry Davies who had led a team of young people on a Rotary-funded Group Study Exchange visit to Arizona earlier this year.

The next big event for the club was the Kinross Show on 13 August. Members manned the gates to take entrance and car parking monies for the Agricultural Society. As before, they were ably assisted by a team of local Army Cadets who organised the actual parking of cars in the Kirkgate. Club members also manned a Rotary stand to publicise the work of the club and to raise funds for the starving and homeless people in the Horn of Africa region. A ShelterBox and its contents to accommodate up to ten people was, once again, on show. Members demonstrated the contents and capabilities of the Boxes, which are purchased by clubs for £590 and are available to send off as soon as needed in a disaster area. 1600 boxes have been sent recently to Ethiopia and 2000 tents only have been sent to North Kenya.

Finally, mention must be made of the three girls who assisted Rotarians to run the Left Luggage facility at 'T in the Park'. (See photo.) Karen, Clare and Julie did a great job and, without them, we would not have been able to provide this popular service so effectively. Nor would we have been able to raise in excess of £1600 towards the total of over £5000 from 'T in the Park' for distribution to Rotary-supported charities. Incidentally, Karen and Clare were funded by our club to take part in the Group Study Exchange team to visit Arizona, referred to above.

125 Years of Boys' Brigade Camps

by David Munro, Company Captain It was July 1886 and William Alexander Smith,

founder of the Boys' Brigade, led the first Glasgow Company to their first camp at Tighnabruaich.

As was tradition, the Boys marched in full uniform to the Broomielaw to catch the paddle steamer "Columba" and sail down the River Clyde to Tighnabruaich. The camp was run with the same strict discipline as on parade nights and the uniform was worn at all times, unlike later years when there was a more relaxed in form all atmosphere

To celebrate 125 years of BB Camps, the 1st Kinross Company of the Boys' Brigade and Girls' Association, along with the 1st Kinross-shire Scouts, held a summer camp under canvas at the North of England BB headquarters, Broomley Grange. A total of 45 adult leaders and youngsters travelled from Kinross to their Northumbria base, arriving mid-afternoon to set up the marquee and 12 ridge tents which would be their home for a week. Unfortunately the weather was rather damp which meant that the outdoor activities planned on the Saturday evening had to be postponed and indoor activities organised in their place. After supper and evening prayers, which focused on the Genesis story "in the beginning", it was time to wash up and head for bed.

Sunday morning brought more rain, so inspection in full uniform had to be carried out in the marquee rather than by the youngsters' tents. It was then off to Stocksfield Baptist Church where minister Paul Revill led a lively service in which he asked members Katy Bell and Andrew Dawson where they had come from, why they were here and what God meant to them. Mid way through the service the youngsters left to join up with Stocksfield youngsters for discussions focusing on facts about God.

At the conclusion of the service, the group headed back to the campsite for lunch before heading for Newcastle to see the impressive Discovery Museum. It was still very wet so it was ideal that everyone was indoors on the Sunday afternoon. After the evening meal it was still wet so the chess competition was brought to a conclusion with Andrew Jack finishing as champion.

Monday was supposed to be a canoeing activity but with the volume of water still falling, it was decided that it would not be safe as the River Tyne was in full flow. An alternative visit to historic Hexham was arranged instead and as the weather improved it was possible to hold the inter tent cricket competition after the evening meal, with Team Delta coming out on top.

Tuesday was much better weather wise with sunshine meaning the group could travel to enjoy the beach at South Shields. In mid afternoon the group then travelled to North Shields to savour the delights of the "Wet and Wild" series of flumes and pools. After evening meal the inter tent football competition was held and Team Delta again finished triumphant.

Wednesday brought back the rain so it was off to Newcastle's Metro Centre to see the north of England's shopping extravaganza. Inter tent baseball followed after evening meal, with Team Delta proving too strong for everyone else.

Thursday morning dawned with sun splitting the sky, which was just as well as the group headed to the Lightwater Valley theme park for the day, taking in a range of fun, fast rides. The inter tent volleyball competition after evening meal again saw Team Delta triumph.

Friday was an on-site day with a range of all day activities including tunnels, zip wire, high ropes and climbing wall. After evening meal the traditional camp concert was held and various awards presented.





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Milnathort Explorer Scouts

Eight explorer scouts and two leaders from the Milnathort Unit arrived at Kinlochbervie after 6 hours to be greeted by the local John Muir Wildland Ranger and his two Labradors. The explorers quickly pitched the new tents (a grant from Cash Back for Communities) on the machair, unloaded the minibus and were away fishing on the rocks or exploring the beach.

Sunday morning the cockerel started as soon as the sun got up and kept going every few minutes. The kit for the expedition was packed into the ranger's van and transported as far as the dirt track went towards Sandwood bay and left in a heap for us.

On reaching Sandwood bay beach, the group split up with a couple walking the length of the beach on the sea side of the marram grass covered sand dunes. The rest of us walked across the dried out north bowl of Sandwood loch to the mouth of the river where we found the remains of a spit fire. We climbed up the track at the end of the bay and headed across the moorland to the bothy at Strathcailleach, rapidly learning that standing on bright green patches left you sinking into the bog.

Monday morning we returned the 3km across the moor to Sandwood bay to clear some of the rubbish lying on the shore, thrown overboard from ships and washed into the bay in storms. We took three drums of old engine oil and seven sacks of plastic bits off the beach.

Back at the bothy some of the explorers cut peats to replace the ones we had burnt, leaving them to dry on the moorland. Tuesday morning we crossed the cailleach and headed north. We discovered that the sundew and the butterwort catch flies and digest them to increase their nutrient intake, and how plants with the word wort in them were used for medicinal properties. We saw lizards, a mountain hare,

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stags and hinds and otter tracks. At Kervaig, a well maintained bothy on the north coast, we set up the tents before the explorers went for a dip in the sea.

Wednesday morning it started to rain and the group divided in two, one walking to Strachcailleach via Cape Wrath and the others went straight back. Crossing the cailleach to the bothy was challenging; the shallow river was now a raging torrent. Three steps in with the water well above knee height, an alternative route had to be found. We trudged back up the glen looking for a place to cross and eventually found a convenient animal barrier to slide across the river on

Thursday morning we cleared up more rubbish as we walked along the Sandwood bay in the sunshine. The north bowl of the loch, dry two days earlier, was full of water. Once on the track from Sandwood bay, the walking became much easier and we met the conservation group who were improving the footpath.

Friday morning a local crofter asked for help to herd the goats. Afterwards we piled onto the minibus and headed to the nature reserve - Handa Island, where Kieran was invested on the highest point.

We achieved our John Muir Award by discovering the beauty, solitude and biodiversity of the area as we explored it by journeying through the tree-free boggy moorland to the north coast across and conserved it by cleaning the beach and practised minimum impact camping. The explorers have asked to return and help to improve the footpath to Sandwood bay.

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The Kinross-shire Civic Trust



TAYplan - Proposed Strategic Development Plan

The Civic Trust made a comprehensive response to the Proposed Strategic Development Plan (PSDP) for TAYplan. The Trust supported the basic principles of the Plan but it had a number of major issues that it felt needed to be commented on. These included the following:

The plan focuses on Dundee and Perth and sees the whole area, which includes Perth and Kinross, Angus, the City of Dundee and North East Fife being targeted inwards towards these two principal areas. The Trust pointed out that the major focus for Kinross was not north but south, principally towards Edinburgh, but towards Glasgow and the southwest as well.

With regard to the proposed major Transport Links, the PSDP ignores the A977, which is a vital link for Kinross to the southwest. The re-introduction of a rail link between Perth and Edinburgh, via Kinross, would also provide essential betterment for Kinross.

PSDP has revised the housing demand figures for Kinross-shire, by recognising the 10% reduction for the numbers due its landscape importance, but these are still far too high. At present there are planning consents for 240 houses in the Landward Area alone of Kinross-shire which have not been built. As well as that, there are numerous numbers of 4/5

bedroom executive suburban houses in inappropriate rural settings which have been newly built, yet standing empty unsold. The figures do not take nearly enough cognisance of the current economic downturn, when it will recover and the fact there may be a market sea change due to bank strategies and the cost of long distance commuting where the great majority of the market is aimed at.

The Trust strongly supported the need to retain high quality agricultural land, Grades, 1, 2 and 3+ or even further down the scale. This country needs to return to being self sufficient in foodstuffs. In the last 10 years we have increased the amount of food we import to 40%, which will have to be reduced, or it may be reduced for this country by world competition.

Kinross-shire is, and always has been, a county of outstanding landscape value. The Scottish Government wants to remove the designation of Area of Great Landscape Value. This is not happening in England and Wales and Kinross-shire needs to have a policy that will protect its landscape from development deprivation.

Finally, the PSDP concentrates on Perth and St Andrews as having the need for development plans. Kinross produced a development plan for itself in 1993 and 1994. This has never been implemented and must be incorporated in the TAYplan.

Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire Kirkland's Hotel

In the Kirkgate cemetery overlooking Loch Leven, not far from the Bruce Mausoleum, there is a stone marking the grave of William Kirkland "late inn-keeper Kinross" who died in July 1836, aged 69. His name has survived to the present day in the Kirkland's Hotel, the inn he founded at 20 High Street only a few years before his death.

In that brief period between the building of new turnpike roads in the early 1800s and the arrival of the railway in 1847, business was brisk. The population of the burgh was rising rapidly and post coaches brought increasing numbers of passengers as well as letters to the inns of Kinross. William Kirkland's daughter and son-in-law, Mary and James Stocks, continued to build up a business that was quickly to rival the long-established Green Inn to the north. The writer of the New Statistical Account of the Parish of Kinross reported that in 1839 the Kirkland's Inn kept three post-chaises, a landau, a hearse and 34 horses and employed four post-boys, six strappers, an hostler, a head waiter, an under waiter and four female servants.

Set back from the High Street to enable coaches to draw up at the door without blocking the road, William Kirkland's Inn, built about 1835, presents an elegant frontage in the form of a two-storey villa with three bays built of dressed sandstone that has been stugged, or roughly worked over, with the point of a chisel. An extension has been added to the north and the whole is painted in white with black trimming round the windows and doors. At the south end of the building, the east corner has been chamfered to allow easy access for coaches to the stable yard at the back of the inn. Looking upwards, the slated roof is topped by chimneys that are surrounded with distinctive sawtooth slabs.

Mrs Stocks maintained a twice-daily coach service to Cowdenbeath on the 'Loch Leven Castle' until 1859, by which time the days of coaching had been superseded by the railway age. When the hotel was sold to Robert Harris in 1867, a barouche, dog cart, waggonette, gig and hearse were the only horse-drawn vehicles recorded in an inventory now located in the archive of Kinross (Marshall) Museum. However, by then tradesmen, fishermen and holiday-makers ensured that the hotel continued to flourish.

In its early days Kirkland's Hotel hosted many notable local events, ranging from the annual County Ball to a celebration dinner on 17 July 1844 to mark the coming-of-age of Sir Graham Graham Montgomery. Amongst its most prestigious guests was Prince Napoleon of France, who stayed overnight after visiting Loch Leven Castle on 17 August 1864. In that year a dinner would have cost the prince 2 shillings and sixpence (12½p).

In the 8 year old category, Sarah Coutts was third, in her first competitive triathlon. Duncan Crawford and Lucy Telfer each gained top ten finishes in the 9-10 years category. Sophie Telfer, Gregor Malcom and Euan Boyle competed in the 11-12 years category, with Gregor and Euan taking 2nd and 4th respectively. Fergus and Jamie Ingledew competed in the 13-14 years category, Fergus achieving 3rd. In the 15-16 years category Mairi Mulhern was 3rd.

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
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Kinross Tennis Club

That there was curling on Lochleven long before that need not be doubted, and that the Kinross Club deserves highest honour for the careful preservation of the traditional mysteries of the game will be apparent when these come to be considered.....'

Season Summary

As the "summer" comes to an end, the club reflects on the wettest summer we have known. The 1st XI managed to play 11 of their



25 fixtures and the 2nd XI only completed eight of their scheduled 23 games. Insult was added to injury as the 1st XI missed out on the main games they would expect to win and found that the rain held off for the fixtures to the four teams regarded as the toughest in the league: Stoneywood Dyce (2011 champions), Mannofield (2010 champions), Huntley (2007 champions) and Strathmore (2008 champions). It has been a tough season for the 1st XI as injuries and poor form saw them finish second from last in the premier division. Given the three-year run of league championships the team has won, it has been a harsh learning curve. There have been some good individual performances and three of the matches that did get finished came down to the last ball. No doubt the team will work hard over the winter and get back to their winning ways for next season.

The Ladies teams have suffered equally with poor weather. As of the middle of August, the Senior Ladies still have four rain postponed Scottish Cup fixtures to play. Whilst the games are scheduled in to the diary there has to be some doubt as to these games being completed by the official season end of mid-September.

The Ladies can take considerable credit for two of the team being selected for the Scotland U17 team that toured the North of England in July. Deanna Green and Claire Jackson made their debuts this season and the club has high hopes that they will both become regular Scotland players in 2012. The club's other Internationalist was Peter Ross who travelled to Ireland with the Scotland U19 team to play in the 2012 World Cup Qualifying competition. This is the highest level competition for the non-test nations, with the top six moving on to play against the ten test nations in Australia in 2012. Peter batted in the pivotal number 4 slot and shared many great partnerships with former Penicuik and now Warwickshire batsman, Freddie Coleman. The press quickly picked up on the Coleman/Ross batting dominance and Peter was named Man of the Match against competition favourites Ireland. His 60 not out saw Scotland home to a great win and they then went on to win the entire competition and finish as the highest ranked non-test nation in the world. Peter finished as Scotland's second top batsman just behind Coleman. Peter has been a great asset to Kinross-shire cricket as both a player and coach and he will be sorely missed as he leaves Scotland in September to take up a place at the MCC Cricket Academy in conjunction with a Sports degree at Leeds Metropolitan University. The entire club wish him well as he moves on to his next ambition of a full professional playing career.

The Junior teams had another success ful year. The highlight was undoubtedly the U15s coming runners-up in the Scottish Cup. Several players stand out for their individual performances. U13 player Fred Culley scored his maiden 100 for Perth & Kinross against Dundee in the area festival. Fred followed this up with an excellent maiden senior 50 for the 2nd XI against West Lothian. Fraser Gosse continued his fine batting performances with his first senior 50 this season. Lachlan Peterson dominated the U13 bowling and took a stunning 5 for 14 for Perth & Kinross against Angus. The club's links with local primary schools and Kinross HS paid dividends as Portmoak PS won the P&K area primary

schools competition and came fourth overall in the National championships. Kinross HS went on to win the Scottish Emerging Schools championship. As the season comes to a close, the club now has over 100 children playing regular fun and competitive cricket at ages from 8 to 15 supported by a coaching staff of 25 qualified coaches.

The club has a pro-active coach development programme which allows juniors to attain the entry level coaching certificate when they reach 16. This policy has been in place for three years and many juniors have moved from players to coaches under the scheme. This season saw two recent juniors move on to the UKCC level 2 coaching awards. Lauren Megginson and Calum Watson first joined the club as junior players and recently qualified with their level 2 certificates.

2012 and Beyond

The most talked about aspect of the club's development has been the proposed creation of a new Academy ground to provide enhanced junior training and playing facilities. This has been a rollercoaster ride for the club in recent months but we can now announce that a suitable ground has been found. The club was approached by Robin Niven of Loch Leven's Larder with the fant astic offer of developing one of his fields for the new ground. Discussions took place during August and an agreement was reached which, hopefully, will see a new ground, training facilities and pavilion being built behind the existing Loch Leven's Larder facility, subject to planning permission. A more detailed article about the plans will be in next month's Newsletter.

In order to reflect the wide reach of the club and our work in schools across the area, it is proposed to change the club's name to Kinross-shire County Cricket Club at the annual general meeting in December. Looking forward, the club has a great future and will see many more children and adults getting fun and exercise from cricket.

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Training Goals

"Rowing harder doesn't help if the boat is headed in the wrong direction"

The importance of establishing training goals is encapsulated in the above quotation. Effort is often confused with results.

I work in different gym and exercise environments and I am surprised at the number of people who come into them with no clearly defined goals, or idea of what they are trying to achieve from their training.

Having invested both money and time in going to the gym or taking up an exercise class, one of the most important things to do is to establish a personal goal for that investment. Establishing training goals is important as:

- If you don't establish where you are now, how can you say objectively what has changed when you start your programme?
- Most people like to see a result from their effort and be able to measure it.
- Goals can be highly motivational
- They keep you on track when the temptation may be to change tack.

"SMART" goals are: SPECIFIC: They are detailed enough to be able to measure. Losing weight is a goal but losing 6kg is a "SMART" goal.

MEASURABLE: They can be measured in some way, such as improvements in speed, endurance, strength, etc.

ACHIEVABLE: They should stretch your ability but not be impossible to achieve.

REALISTIC: Your goals should be directly related both to the amount of time and effort you have to achieve them and, of course, your natural ability. Unrealistic, unattainable goals are very demotivating.


TIME SPECIFIC: All goals should have some element of deadline associated with them. Goals should be set for the short, medium and long term.

For example if weight loss is a goal, a "SMART" goal would be to aim to achieve a 6kg reduction in body weight in the next six weeks, through a regular exercise programme which combines cardio and resistance exercises.

I would encourage all exercisers to set daily, weekly and monthly fitness goals that are realistic and measurable. These are your personal goals and do not need to be related to others in the gym, even if they are doing the same exercise and using the same equipment. We are all different and our bodies respond differently to exercise. There is no one best

It's important that you "stretch" yourself in your exercise programme every time you exercise. These may only be small improvements, such as burning another 50 calories or running 10 minutes longer or at higher level. Pushing yourself is part of a successful exercise programme.

Try to establish what it is you want out of your exercise regime and train specifically for that. Look closely at your current position and habits. When starting out, it's extremely important to put some markers in the ground regarding your current ability. Progress can then be measured against these benchmarks. It's easy to lose sight of where you have come from, particularly when you start.



Monitor your progress. A training log is a good idea but why not take a photo and see your body shape change? Regardless of whether your training goal is to lose fat, gain muscle, sports conditioning or improve your overall health, strong self-discipline is the bridge between goals and accomplishment.

You will need to persist, particularly when the going gets tough and the motivation wanes, which it will! Keep those goals in mind and you will reap the rewards of your efforts. So, next time you are in the gym or at a class, ask yourself some questions. What am I trying to achieve today? This week? This month? Avoid meandering, treading water or going around in circles! Focus your effort on clear goals and celebrate success and reap the rewards when you achieve them!

Note: It is important that anyone considering taking up an exercise regime should consult their GP before doing so, particularly if it has been some time since you last exercised or if you are on any form of medication or suffer from a chronic illness or high blood pressure.



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

Because we hiv hid tae drain awthin' doon, the flood is noo a sea o' muddy glawr cos the rain is howfin' doon at the minute which is makin' things a bit weet 'n' a bit skitey, 'n' a bit mair glawry. The local herons are fair lovin' it, mind, cos they noo hiv access tae whit wid hae been the boattom o' the flood and we hiv a baker's dozen – that's thirteen birds, if ye didnae ken. They hiv strange coontin' methods, them bakers! An' there's me thinkin' twelve wiz a dozen! Must be some explanation fur it? Whit wiz ah sayin? Aye, herons: they are fair probin' awa, swallyin' up whitever is in the mud, puddicks mibbees? We hiv also seen otter tracks everywhere; think they hiv been efter the sooster swan mussels that will be doon in the glawr as weel, Ho, ho! Tea's up! Dae otters gan "ho, ho?" Mibee no, but hey mibbees aye in otter lingo. Wha kin tell, unless yer Doc Doolittle ah suppose.

Loads o' Ospreys passin' ower as weel, daen' a bit o' fishin' oan the wey. So, sorry folks, it means Autumn is jist roond the corner cos that's the bird migration startit. Peregrines hiv been beltin' aroond takin' advantage as weel, since ducks dinny hae deep watter tae dive intae noo.

Kid be a guid thing, awe this mud though: shid be a bit o' a magnet fur passin' migrant waders, so, though the access tae the furthest twa hides is cut aff at the minute, ye micht see some rarer birds through the scopes fae the café windaes or the first hide.

Wance the work is done we will re-sow the area wi sterile ryegress which will bind the soil thigither until the natural regeneration comes back in.

The kids' summer events programme will be finished when ye are readin' this, but we still hiv things oan the go tae keep ye entertained n gie ye yer fix o' things outdoorsy. Please check wur website or ask at Vane tae see whit ye kin get up tae. Vix in the shop is also daen a Facebook page fur Vane as weel noo – dinny ask me, no a clue whit tae dae wi that! Long as she kens tho, that's hunky-dory.

A couple o' the things comin' up this month:

Oan **Saturday 3 September**, fae 10am-4.15pm, it's **Digital Photography for Beginners**, the popular coorse tae help ye get the best oot yer camera. Drinkypoos, grub etc providit oan the day, so jist bring yersel n yer camera alang. This course suits only digital type cameras. Costs £32.50 for members, £40 non-members. Advance bookin' essential since we only hiv eight places per course.

Oan the weekend o' 10 and 11 September the shop will be getting ye up tae speed wi' optical assistance n improvement aids – that's things binoculary 'n' telescopey when we hoad an **Optics Weekend.** Runnin' fae 10 am-5pm baith days, if yer needin' tae fund oot aboot binoculars or telescopes come in and see us fur some expert advice. It of coorse is free, weel unless ye buy sumthin' then it's no, strangely enough.

Loch Leven NNR

Despite the far from ideal weather, we are busy with ongoing habitat management, cutting bracken and mowing the wildflower meadows at Burleigh, Orwell and Findatie. Whilst bracken is good for some species of insect, it is also invasive, so we are cutting it at Findatie to allow other wildflower species to get a toehold. Also we are removing the remnants of the Boathouse hide boardwalk; much of the timber will be recycled for elsewhere on the reserve. Unfortunately because of the damage caused by two successive winters, the Boathouse hide will not be replaced but we are awaiting planning permission to re-site the Burleigh hide on the shoreline so it is safe from the ice this time!

Wildfowl numbers are increasing on the reserve: they come to Loch Leven not just for 'loch'al' cuisine but as a safe place to moult their plumage (change their feathers) away from predators and disturbance. During some of their moult, wildfowl are unable to fly so Loch Leven provides a safe haven away from predators and disturbance for them. Some of these birds will stay with us for the winter, however many will disperse again to surrounding areas, making way for the arrival of our real winter visitors whose return is not all that far away now.

To give an indication of how our numbers are swollen by these 'moult flocks', during the last fortnightly bird count there were 2270 tufted duck on the loch and we also counted 665 mute swan; in each case, almost ten times the numbers that breed here.

The archaeological dig out on St Serf's island has now finished; shards of mediaeval pottery were found and more detail relating to the layout of the earlier settlement was obtained through the course of the two-week project.

Farming



Well, the days are really shortening now and still we are waiting for a reasonable spell of seemingly elusive settled weather for making hay, silage or getting the cereal harvest done. The past couple of months have generally been quite unsettled which has made it tricky to gather in the coming winter's feed stocks in good conditions. It hasn't been particularly warm, either, which has been particularly noticeable with the sheep, here at Backward Farm. The ewes weren't clipped until the beginning of August but there were very few days in July where you could see them peching in blazing sunshine, wondering when their barbers were coming. Certainly, since being clipped, they have often looked miserable and you could almost hear them asking if they could have their jackets back.

This is the first year I haven't clipped the ewes myself since I felt that our numbers had reached such a level (about 140) that it would have taken me forever and a day to get the job done due to my lack of skill and experience of the task. I enlisted the talents of local shearing magnates Calum and Alister (who are also champion competition shearers) and it almost left me feeling embarrassed when I thought how long it would have taken me. Our flock was little more than a slight warm-up for them as they can easily get through two or three hundred a day each, all clipped to perfection. It was a bit of a 'Sep' experience for me.

Throughout the catchy weather we managed to get our winter barley combined and straw baled. The yield was disappointing, which was probably due partly to the severe winter weather and also partly because the conditions in which it was sown were far from ideal last autumn. As a teacher's report card might say — 'could do better'. The rest of the harvest looks like it will be relatively late with the lack of sunshine slowing down ripening of cereals.

Still, it's an ill wind that doesn't blow any good and the damp conditions have meant that recently sown grass seed and a winter fodder mixture of stubble turnips, fodder rape and Italian ryegrass have germinated well, although there have been puddles of water on one of the fields at times which doesn't do young plants any favours.

The extreme rain of the past couple of weeks has also slowed down growth on the grazing fields and has resulted in some poaching of the land. I bought some extra fertilizer to spread on some fields to help boost grass growth in the coming month to hopefully keep up with the appetites of the cattle and sheep. I have also started giving our calves some supplementary feeding to help keep them growing while their mothers' milk supply will be now reducing. This will help prepare the calves for when they are weaned in a couple of months' time.

Keep the wellies handy.

Lochleven Castle, Castle Island, Kinross

Famously where Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned in 1567 and forced to abdicate before dramatically escaping, this semi-ruined castle is set on an island in beautiful Loch Leven. Parts of the



castle date from the late 14th or early 15th century. There are lawns and benches on the island. The property is reached by boat, operated by Historic Scotland and departing from the fishery pier, where there is a café, shop and parking nearby. Opening times for 2011:

It could change your world

The Biblefresh initiative is raising funds for Bible translation in Burkina Faso, where seventy distinct languages are spoken and only five have adequate Scriptures. It's hard to imagine what it would be like if we could not read the Bible in English, but hear the voices of some who long to have the Bible in their mother tongue.

Francois L Sare, aged 51, is a subsistence farmer with two children. His language is Bissa Barka. He lives in an unspoilt area where travel is by bicycle or donkey. 'I became a Christian in 1989. During all those years I haven't been able to read the Bible in my own language. I've got a French Bible and, recently, the New Testament in Bissa Lebir. I now understand much more than in the French version, but if the Bible was in Bissa Barka it would be much easier for us. I think about how long it will be until we have the New Testament. I'm in a hurry! I would say to people in Britain, I hope that the Lord will help them and give them the strength to support this project.'

Jacob Tarnagda is 45. He became a Christian 20 years ago 'I have no translation experience so it's difficult to reach people with what I know. They reject what I say. My faith is trapped inside me. So I will be happy to have the Bible in Bissa Barka, because in the churches we use the Bissa Lebir Bible and we don't understand it. It is hard. If we have the Bissa Barka Bible it will make it easier to teach people at church and spread the gospel to those who are outside the church.'

What happens when the Bible is translated and available? 'The Bible has changed my life,' says **Philomene Compaore**, a subsistence farmer from Niaoghou. 'It's made me really happy. What I' ve learned from the Bible has been incredible. There's everything in the Bible concerning taking care of others and even about your own thoughts. The Bible is concerned with every aspect of life. Without the Bible, life is dark. If you haven't got a Bible when times of trouble come, then it's difficult really. If you have got a Bible, you can read it and it can give you comfort. So, the first time I read the Bible I was very happy.'


