Several important planning and environmental matters are reaching an interesting stage this month. These are just some of them:

We have the chance to view proposals for **environmental improvements to Kinross High Street** at a Public Exhibition. Proposals like this were put forward in the 'Kinross Strategy' document of 1995, but it was considered necessary to wait until heavy traffic could be taken away from the High Street by a relief road before the improvements were implemented. It has been a long wait. Find out about the Public Exhibition on page 4.

Also at the time of preparing this issue of the Newsletter, it appears that PKC officers intend to send the proposed **Local Development Plan** onto its next stage without changes following the public consultation that took place in early 2012. In Kinross this has caused particular dismay to those who are unhappy with the 'H46' site next to the Davies Park being zoned for potential housing. Read more about this on pages 8, 9, 10, and 29.

The 'Future of Kinross Buildings' section of the Kinross CC report (page 29) is particularly important this month, with the news that the County Buildings are to be placed on the open market.

On a celebratory note, we are pleased to announce that this is our **400th issue!** This is published a little over 35 years since the founding of the Newsletter.

Tillyrie Turbines may not be alone

Following on from the letters of Gillian Galbraith in the July edition ("Save beautiful Kinross-shire") and that of John Bryson in August ("Tillyrie Turbines"), many may not be aware of a larger scheme at Ledlation, just 5 km (about 3½ miles) to the southwest of the Tillyrie site. The Ledlation proposal is for four 87 metre (285 feet) high turbines, which, like those at Tillyrie, will be visible from almost all of Milnathort, Kinross and the Heritage Trail.

Both the Tillyrie and Ledlation proposals come at a time when the Heritage Trail is increasingly popular; the route for its completion is being discussed and a great deal of effort is being made to encourage visitors to Kinross-shire (see, for example, the excellent new website www.visitlochleven.org).

As well as sharing the sentiments expressed in the earlier letters, we are writing as we are very concerned about the damage to tourism that will come as a consequence of the visual impact from these and other likely proposals. It is clear that we have an interest in this as we try to encourage visitors to the area to stay with us!

Consumer research on tourist attitudes to wind farms was commissioned by VisitScotland in 2011 (http://www.visitscotland.org/research_and_statistics/

tourism_topics/wind_farms.aspx). 3,000 people (2,000 from across the UK and a further 1,000 from Scotland) were interviewed. All had taken holidays in the UK and intended to do so in the future.

Some of the relevant findings, for all respondents, were:

- 19% said the presence of a wind farm would affect their decision about where to visit or stay, and that the countryside was spoilt by wind farms
- 18% stated that they would tend to avoid any parts of the countryside with wind farms.

If the proposed developments go ahead and these expressed opinions are acted on, then an almost 20% reduction in British visitors to the area could result. This would be very damaging to the whole local economy.

The novelty appeal of wind farms has largely worn off for the public and an increasingly cynical population, alarmed by recent energy price escalation, and depressed by another summer of dismal weather, is likely to become more negative to this very expensive renewable energy with its damaging effects on beautiful scenery.

The visual impact of these developments on tourism could well negate the efforts being made to encourage visitors.

In addition, for those who have to move house, highly visible wind farms are likely to reduce the pool of interested buyers and, as a consequence, the value of their property.

If both the Tillyrie and Ledlation proposals go ahead then the skyline will be totally changed with the rolling hills dwarfed. As John Bryson noted in his letter, extensions to wind farms are common; having already spoilt the countryside there is less to stop extensions and infilling across the whole view.

Loving Hands Charity Knitters

I am Lou Jaap, founder of Loving Hands. We knit, crochet and sew for charities. Over the last five years we have met every Monday in Kelty Community Centre (next door to primary school on Main Street), from 1pm to 3pm. Our members come from all across the counties arriving from Stirling, Alloa, Saline, Muckhart, Glenrothes, Leven, Dunfermline, Cowdenbeath and Kelty - we even have a couple of ladies from Kinross who sometimes venture along. New members are always welcome to join us to have a knit/crochet/stitch and natter - the members make things for themselves and families as well as for the large variety of charities we support all across the world.

Loving Hands is also a huge online community (www.lovinghands.org.uk) with over 5000 members and lots of local groups springing up all over the UK. We have members dotted about all over the world as well.

The things we produce are donated to charities and individuals who take these items directly to the places they are needed and hand them out themselves. We do not provide items to be sold for peanuts in charity shops or stored for years in warehouses here in the UK. So far, our work has gone as far afield as Peru, Mongolia, Haiti, India, South Africa, Kenya, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Sri Lanka, India, Albania, Croatia, Bulgaria, Algeria, Serbia, Mexico and other places besides. We make everything from Fish and Chip baby jumpers (sent to keep wee babies warm - the term coming from a lady who saw babies being taken off into the jungle from a clinic wrapped in newspaper as the mothers had no access to clothes or blankets for them), to knitted 'boobs' used to teach breast feeding in the UK and sometimes for ladies who have had mastectomies and can't bear to wear the prosthetics provided by the NHS, to burial items for tiny angels who do not survive, to blankets for orphaned baby elephants and coats for battery chickens! There is an extensive wish list on our website and forum and we also have three monthly challenges to keep our ladies motivated and inspired.

We are happy to receive donations of yarn, fabrics, sheets and duvet covers (sheets and duvet covers can be made into bags for teddies for tragedies, washable sanitary wear and our bags of love), towels (flannelette sheets and towels are made into washable sanitary protection for girls who have nothing), wedding and bridesmaids dresses (which are turned into burial gowns and angel pockets).

I am also available to give talks about our work at SWRI, Women's Guild and other groups; these are becoming more popular as we grow and expand.

Looking forward to welcoming some of the Newsletter readers along to our Monday meetings, or to our online community if you can't make it. I could also arrange to pick up work if you can't get along but would still like to contribute.

Kinross High Street environmental improvement proposals Public Exhibition

Monday 17 September – Thursday 20 September

A public exhibition and community consultation regarding environmental improvement proposals for Kinross High Street will take place this month.

The exhibition will be held at Loch Leven Community Library from 17 to 20 September and can be viewed during normal library opening hours. Council officers will also be on hand to explain the proposals, and answer any questions members of the public may have, on the following days: Tuesday 18 and Wednesday 19 September (5pm-7.30pm) and Thursday 20 September (3pm-7.30pm).

The proposals are intended to improve the appearance of the High Street for the benefit of residents, businesses and visitors alike. The proposals include footpath widening where possible, and some traffic calming measures, along with resurfacing of the footpaths and carriageway including some natural stone paving, setts and kerbs. It is also proposed to renew bus shelters, walls and railings; and to introduce more seating and street tree planting.

The aim of the project, funded by the Council, is to make Kinross town centre more attractive to live, work and visit, and to encourage visitors to stop and spend time there.

Additionally, there is potential for grant-aided improvements of building facades within Kinross High Street, through the Townscape Heritage Initiative (THI) from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS) from Historic Scotland. These would run broadly parallel with the improvements of the High Street; and the two projects would complement each other to the benefit of Kinross Town Centre.

If you live, work or own property in the High Street area of Kinross, you can support the Council with their funding applications – and help shape the scheme – by filling in an on-line survey. This takes about five minutes. A link to it can be found on the Council webpage about the environmental improvements (see below).

Report by Councillor Cuthbert

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration

The project to regenerate Kinross Town Centre is progressing and the team is now looking for feedback from the community. (See article on page 4.)

Kinross Road Improvements

Following the May election, many of you have contacted me with ideas for improvements to the Kinross-shire road network. I have been following these up with officers and thought I would give you a quick update on the ones relating to Kinross. (I will update you on other parts of the ward later.)

Entrance to Kinross on Station Road

Many of you have commented on the speed of traffic entering Kinross from the motorway, so I have asked that a variable speed indicator sign is erected to show drivers the speed that they are doing. This is being assessed by the Roads Service to determine the speed of vehicles, and in turn if a sign is justified.

Junction of Springfield Road and Station Road

I have asked that a roundabout be considered at this junction to make it easier to exit Springfield Road at busy periods.

Once the link road is opened, it is my considered opinion that the turning into Junction Road from Station Road is going to become much busier. For this reason I have asked that a roundabout be considered at this junction.

Request for a new Pelican Crossing on Junction Road

A number of constituents have contacted me about the difficulty in crossing Junction Road to get to either the Park and Ride or Sainsbury. This could become even more difficult when the new link road is opened. To this end I have asked that some form of crossing be considered at this location as a matter of priority.

Junction of Springfield Road and Sutherland Drive

Constituents have commented to me on the danger of coming out of Sutherland Drive onto Springfield Road. Apparently at least one accident has occurred at the mini roundabout and I have been told that people are very nervous when exiting Sutherland Drive. To this end I have asked that traffic calming be looked at for vehicles travelling west on Springfield Road approaching the mini roundabout.

Link Road

Following my last article, I have again requested that the link road be opened as soon as possible.

Request for a new Pelican Crossing on the Muirs

I have been contacted by a resident with a request for a controlled crossing near the junction of Spring field Road and the Muirs, to allow children to cross on their own when going to the primary school. This has been supported by residents wanting a safer crossing for when their children are going to the KGV playing fields. I have therefore asked that this location be assessed to determine if a controlled crossing would be appropriate. As a point of interest I believe that were the crossing to be put south of the junction, it might make turning into Springfield Road easier when travelling from the north and when turning from Springfield Road to the north onto the Muirs.

A resident has complained to me that the time taken for the lights to change to the 'green man' for pedestrians is too long. I have asked if the timings can be changed so that pedestrians do not have to wait so long.

Wish List

It should be noted that this is a wish list and that some or all of these ideas may not happen or may take a very long time to happen, given budgetary constraints faced by the Council.

Report by Councillor Giacopazzi H46 to stay in Local Development Plan?

July is the month when the Council clears its diary to enable councillors to take a break. Having done just that, I returned to a storm of controversy regarding the Local Development Plan, which, the rumour mill would have it, may very well proceed to the Scottish Government Reporter in a fairly unabridged form. To be blunt, H46, the hated potential site through the Davies Park and adjacent to the M90, may still be included in the Proposed Plan. This would leave it up to the good sense of the Reporter to reject the site. Given the availability of the old High School site for ample housing, he should have no trouble in arriving at this conclusion. Nevertheless, it would be far better that H46 were dropped before the Report stage.

One thing is certain, if H46 does go through to the next stage, the Reporter will have before him all the myriad objections from the local community, its elected representatives, and Community Council. Certainly, if the Reporter does not take on board the concerns of the

community, the whole consultation process to date will look like a mere gesture; an exercise in box ticking

For my part, I am actively bringing the issue to the attention of our administration in Perth. I do stress that I have not had any official notification of what is going on behind the closed doors of the Planning Department. I would say that those of us who were elected for the first time in May have come to the negotiations half way through.

Positive News in Milnathort

On a happier note, upon returning from holiday, I was struck by the welcoming and colourful appearance of Milnathort with its hanging baskets and other floral displays. The Milnathort in Bloom Committee continues to delight and the members deserve praise for their selfless voluntary efforts.

The other positive news relates to the Milnathort Town Hall Committee, as it progresses towards its goal of refurbishing the hall and steeple. The lease has been agreed with PKC and negotiations for listed building consent are proceeding; donations have been received and funding is being sought, again through the actions of volunteers.

Gypsy site at Crook Moss – Councillor Barnacle critical of PKC report

Councillor Mike Barnacle has written to the Convenor of PKC's Development Control Committee expressing concern over the way an application for a traveller site has been handled.

The application was for the "formation of five permanent gypsy/traveller pitches (partly in retrospect), road access improvements and landscaping and tree planting on land at Crook Moss, Crook of Devon, KY13 0PR." The application (PKC ref no 12/00546/FLL) went before the Committee on 1 August, with Council officers recommending approval. Cllr Barnacle and the other three elected members for Kinross-shire had called for refusal of the application under delegated powers in May. The committee on 1 August deferred the application.

The site is owned by the applicant. There were 41 letters of objection.

In his communication to Cllr Tom Gray, Convenor of the Development Control Committee, Cllr Barnacle lists a number of concerns regarding the outcome, process and standard of the planning report and asks for these to be addressed during the deferral period. Some of the points raised by Cllr Barnacle and by Fossoway & District CC are listed below:

The Report refers to a 2007 document 'Planning for Gypsy/Travellers in Perth and Kinross 2007' which recognised a need for 13-15 pitches in the Kinross area. However, the Report gives no current figures on traveller sites in the Kinross area. (There are sites at Gairney Bridge and Greenacres.) Fossoway & District CC say that their own enquiries "indicate that there is a current occupancy of 28 gypsy/traveller households at Greenacres, 15 at Gairney Bridge, with approval for further capacity at Gairney Bridge. The total occupancy in Kinross in summer 2012 is in the order of 40-43 households, exceeding the identified need of 15 for Kinross by more than a factor of two and matching the identified need of 42 for the whole of PKC in its 2007 report."

- The site lies within the Lochleven Catchment Area, which requires strict drainage controls. SEPA objected to the application a fact not mentioned in the Report. Indeed, the Report stated there are "no objections from the main statutory environmental consultees".
- The Report did not contain the most up-to-date information with regard to The Drum Waste Water Treatment Plant being, in effect, at capacity.
- The Report states there is no flood risk in the area. Cllr Barnacle says land on both sides of the site floods and Crook Moss itself is a wetland lowland bog!
- National policy states that traveller sites must not be located on contaminated land. Part of the site is on a PKC former waste disposal site.
- The report states that the site is not within the settlement boundary of Crook of Devon, but fails to state that it is immediately outwith the boundary. Approval is therefore contrary to Policy 48 of the Kinross Area Local Plan; not mentioned in the Report.
- The Report states in one place that the site's proximity to settlements will allow it to take advantage of existing infrastructure yet in another states that there is insufficient capacity at Fossoway Primary School.
- The Report makes no mention of PKC's landscape consultant's study of 2005 that notes significant constraints against development here. During the local plan process there was no indication of a proposed gypsy/traveller site here, in fact Crook Moss was proposed for community access, forestry, open space and recreation.
- There was no mention of local plan policies with regard to residential amenity. Cllr Barnacle feels the Report pays little regard to the large number of community objections.
- The application is stated as 'partly' retrospective, when it is 'wholly' retrospective.

History of the Davies Park

The zoning of a strip of land between the Springfield housing estate and the motorway for potential housing development in the proposed Local Development Plan (LDP) has caused much discussion about the Davies Park. The park is adjacent to the zoned site (known as 'H46' in the LDP), and is at risk in that development of H46 would require access through the Davies Park if the development were to be linked to Springfield Road.

Questions have been asked in recent months about the ownership of the Davies Park and the level of community involvement in creating it. A delve into the Newsletter archives reveals much of the story. Newsletters contain reports of all Kinross CC meetings since the CC was formed, as well as records of community activities over more than three decades.

Letters to the Newsletter in 1977 (its first year of publication) expressed the need for a children's play area, and the redundant station site was suggested. (The last train passed through Kinross in 1970.) The CC asked the local authority (which at the time was Perth & Kinross District Council, part of Tayside Regional Council) to consider purchasing the land from British Rail for this purpose. The District Council was willing, though it noted that the disused railway line itself had been bought by a local farmer.

The process of acquiring the former station site took several years. For a while, British Rail wanted to lease the land rather than sell it.

In the meantime, starting in 1979, the CC began assessing the play park provision for the whole town and in December 1980 set up a parks sub-committee consisting of CCllrs Balnaves, Beath, Dr Davies and Mrs Ramponi, with the following aims:

- 1. To consider what items of equipment might be desirable, and where they should be placed in Kinross;
- 2. To specify and price items of play equipment or similar projects;
- 3. To invite sponsorship from public fundraising bodies or charitable institutions for these projects.

Around this time the District Council informed the CC that it had set aside £1,850 to buy 2.5 acres from British Rail and that the Scottish Development Department would transfer three adjacent plots of ground free of charge to the District Council. Provisional arrangements were made with the Scottish Development Agency to provide certain rehabilitation works.

In early 1981 the CC parks sub-committee launched a public appeal for funds to buy play equipment. (Due to financial cutbacks, the District Council could not afford to provide any new play equipment at any park in the town.) Dr Davies, who had joined the CC in spring 1980, became the fund manager. The aim was to raise at least £5,000.

The residents and organisations of Kinross entered into the spirit of fund-raising. Events included: back-garden sales, a concert, magic show and disco, fun run, dance, raffle, baking sales, Give Us a Clue competition and a sponsored knit. The CC parks sub-committee organised several fund-raising events.

Community groups donating funds included: the Ex-Servicemen's Club, Lodge St Serf, the local Labour party, Lochleven Players, Kinross-shire Round Table and local playgroups. Local businesses also made donations, including: David Sands, Todd and Duncan, Wimpey, Victoria House Hotel, Baynes, the local doctors, Johnson and Smillie Accountants, the Bank of Scotland, the Clydesdale Bank, the Green Hotel, the Windlestrae Hotel, J & G Wilson and MacBeth Currie.

Donations also came from charitable trusts (the King George V Fund, the Thomson Bequest and the Children's Playing Fields Association) and many individuals.

The District Council and Regional Council contributed several hundred pounds each.

By January 1982 the sub-committee was confident of reaching its target and proposed the following distribution: 60% (£3,000) to be spent on equipment for the station site: 20% (£1,000) at The Myre or Montgomery Street; and the remaining 20% (£500 each) at Kirkgate Park and Green Road.

Reports in late 1982 refer to delays in the work starting. It is not clear whether work began in late 1982 or early 1983, but the first thing to happen was landscaping of the site by The Scottish Development Agency before any equipment could be installed.

At the February 1983 meeting of Kinross CC, the secretary read correspondence confirming that "Mr John B Wood, Chance Inn, had made a donation of that part of the railway land adjoining the existing Wimpey development and the former railway station area to the D.C. free of charge and that arrangements had been made for the Scottish Development Agency and the D.C. to have this area landscaped and incorporated with the improvements in the former railway station area. The Sec. was instructed to write to Mr Wood thanking him for his generous gift to the community."

The park was ready for use in spring 1984 and the May 1984 Newsletter gives this account of the opening:

"The Park was officially opened on Friday, April 13, by Provost John M Mathieson, Convener of Perth and Kinross DC. In attendance were representatives of the Scottish Development Agency, who had given the project a grant of £64,000. Also present were Dist. Cllr G Coia, and a goodly number of Community Cllrs and ex-Cllrs who had raised large sums of money locally.

"The Provost emphasised the fact that without strong local pressure and initiative, the park would not have existed. He thanked Mrs Bayne Wood whose gift of land had enlarged the play area; and Dr J D Davies, whose organising efforts were acknowledged in the naming of the Park.

"In his turn, Dr Davies thanked the Provost for opening the Park and for his kindly remarks. He hoped the children would make good and proper use of the facilities provided, and that parents and others would do their best to prevent the ravages of vandalism."

So the park is owned by Perth & Kinross Council, as heritors to Perth & Kinross District Council, but came about by community effort.

Dr Davies died in April 1995. He was born in Cardiganshire in 1910 and was a surgeon by profession. He had moved to Kinross after his retirement to be near family. He worked very hard on behalf of the community, not only through the CC but also the Day Centre and the Millbridge Hall. His obituary in the June 1995 Newsletter states that he "will always be remembered for his quiet, yet determined efforts on behalf of the young people and the elderly in this community."

Kinross Action Group against H46

You may recall the next stage for the Local Development Plan was for the results of the consultation to go to PKC for consideration before it moves on to the penultimate stage of going to the Reporter in Edinburgh (an independent lawyer whose job it is to review all the Local Development Plans). We were disappointed to hear about the Council Officers' intention to send the LDP to the Reporter without P & K Councillors having the opportunity to amend it (see CC minutes) and we have written to PKC asking for an urgent meeting to protest against this. We are pleased to report that this is being organised and we will update everyone on its outcome.



Please note that patients who do not fall into the categories below or who have no other clinical reason for receiving the flu vaccination will not be given the vaccination.

The doctors would encourage all those in the following groups to come for a flu injection:

Over 65s	Those over 65 by 31 March 2013
Those aged 6 months or over in a clinical 'At Risk' Groups	Chronic respiratory disease and asthma that requires continuous or repeated use of inhaled or systemic steroids or with previous hospital admissions Chronic heart disease Chronic kidney disease Chronic liver disease Chronic neurological disease Diabetes Immunosuppression
Pregnant women	Pregnant women at any stage of pregnancy
Long stay residential	Those living in long stay residential care homes or other long stay care facilities
Unpaid Carers and young carers	Those who, without payment, provide help and support to a partner, child, relative, friend or neighbour who could not manage without this help. This could be due to age, physical or mental illness, addiction or disability. Young carers are those under 18 who carry out significant caring tasks and assume a level of responsibility for another person which would normally be taken by an adult.

Patients who have just become 65, or will be 65 by 31 March 2013, will also be offered the pneumovax vaccination. This vaccination is generally only required once.

Clinicians will visit the residential and nursing homes as usual.

Blair Adam House

Blair Adam, the home of the Adam architectural dynasty, was built by William Adam 'upon the plan of an ordinary manse' in 1736. Descendants added to the house and extended it in a rambling, hotchpotch of buildings arranged around a central courtyard. Sir Walter Scott was a frequent visitor and the interesting collection of objects within the house reflects several periods in Scottish history.

Kinross (Marshall) Museum

Loch Leven Community Campus, Kinross

When the antiquarian and collector David Marshall of Kinross died in 1902 he left his historical books, manuscript collections in Natural History and antiquities to the inhabitants of Kinross. The Museum is now housed at the community campus and has current exhibits on Kinross, Kinross-shire witches and, in celebration of the Jubilee, the visit of the Queen to Kinross in October 1960 – see the archive film!

Open on Saturday 22 September 10am – 3pm Facilities: WC, wheelchair access and displays.

Balvaird Castle, Glenfarg

A fine late 15th-century tower-house that underwent a luxurious makeover in the 16th century to become a courtyard palace. Built by the Murrays of Balvaird, who became the Earls of Mansfield, it was their principle seat until 1658 when they moved to Scone. The L-shaped tower-house had deteriorated into a ruinous state by the 19th century and in 1974 was taken into care by Historic

Scotland's predecessor. Historic Scotland staff will be opening the castle especially for Doors Open Day!

Open on Sunday 23 September 11am – 3pm

Located off the A913 between Gateside (A91) and Bridge of Earn. Car park at bottom of hill signed off the A913. Half mile walk uphill to castle. Facility: Display.

Kirkgate Watchtower

The old burying ground at the west end of Kirkgate Park was also the location for the Parish Church until 1743 when a replacement was built on the High Street. This was one of four early places of worship around the loch which were associated with St Serf's Priory on one of the islands in the middle of the loch. The earliest surviving headstone in the gravey ard is dated 1690. The Watchtower was constructed on the site of an earlier building in 1852 at the same time that the original oval medieval burying ground was extended in a rectangular shape towards the west. Formerly it probably served as a lookout to guard against the 'Resurrection Men'. It has fine views across the loch but a very steep and twisty access stair.

Tullibole Castle

Tullibole Castle is a classic example of a 17th century tower house. The castle has recently undergone a faceliff with restoration work to the external finish or harling. In the castle grounds are a historic graveyard and remnants of a ruined medieval church, a 150-yard 'moat' and doo'cot. Visit the Witches Maze Memorial for the Crook of Devon Witch Trials, also to be found in the grounds.

Located on the B9097 one mile east of Crook of Devon.
Unrestricted access to gravey and maze all year from Gelvan Road, ½ mile to the NW of the Castle.

High cost of court hire killing indoor sport

Now that the Olympic Games are just a memory, with the best ever coverage of the widest range of sports ever televised, it is time to take a reality check on where we are in sport at local and national levels, especially with indoor sports like badminton, table tennis, basketball, volleyball and handball.

Kinross Volleyball Club returned in mid August from spending four days at De Haan in Belgium taking part in their 39th International Volleyball Tournament, open to a range of teams competing from recreational level to semi-professional. The Kinross Club has travelled to this tournament for a number of years, initially using the ferry crossing from Rosyth to Zeebrugge but with the withdrawal of this service and no sign of any other company willing to resume this service, has travelled the 300 miles to Hull for the overnight crossing to Belgium.

The Kinross Club took two teams across to Belgium with the first team playing six games of three sets and the recreational side playing eight games of two sets. The cost per player to attend the tournament including travel, accommodation (free camping) and tournament entry worked out at £100, with the bulk of the cost being the P & O Ferries overnight crossings in four-berth cabins with shower and toilet.

If the Kinross Club had played the same number of sets and games at their home venue, Kinross High School, it would have cost them much, much more. To play the equivalent time indoors at Loch Leven Community Campus would have cost each player close on £200 in hall hire costs at current Perth & Kinross Council prices.

It is all very well spouting "sporting legacy" from the Olympic Games and the 2014 Commonwealth Games, but unless hall hire costs for indoor sports are designed to encourage participation rather than income for local authorities, then we will have little chance of seeing indoor sport thrive at grass roots, local and regional levels.

The De Haan Volleyball Club has a three volleyball court hall with the hourly cost for hiring a court being 7 euro. Next year they will have a four-court volleyball hall, currently being built next to their existing facilities, and the hourly cost per volleyball court will increase to 8 euro.

It is all very well saying that schools have a key role to play in sports development but where is that in head teachers' targets publicised alongside exam results and performances? Head teachers and schools have enough on their plate and yes, Curriculum for Excellence can provide an opportunity for the development of sport but will it ever take the same prominence as exam performance?

If we, as a nation, want to see indoor sport thrive and encourage youngsters to try new sports they have seen at the Olympics, then national government needs to look at ways of reducing hall hire costs by grants or some other method to support local authorities.

Although not coming anywhere near taking any medals home due to the strength of Belgian volleyball compared to the UK, the Kinross Club members continued to be good ambassadors for their community in their own limited way. Help Hannah Feed

'Help Hannah Feed' is an effort to raise funds in conjunction with Cash for Kids for Hannah Gould. Hannah is one year old and was born with an extremely rare eating disorder, which prevents her from being able to consume any food or fluid orally. Since birth Hannah has suffered from severe reflux, causing her extreme pain and suffering. She has to be drip-fed via a gastric tube, which has greatly hampered her growth and development.

Hannah has received excellent care from specialists at The Royal Hospital for Sick Kids in Edinburgh; however, they are currently unable to find a cure for this rare condition.

Hannah's parents would like Hannah to obtain treatment from Markus Wilken, a developmental psychologist who specialises in treating babies and children with feeding disorders. Markus is based in Germany but visits families all over the world. He has assessed Hannah as suitable for this specialist treatment, the cost of which is anticipated to be in excess of £20,000.

"I have had about five calls from mums in a similar boat to us since we went public with the story and it has been really useful for both them and me to chat about our experiences" said Lesley, Hannah's mum. "I am really hoping that any extra money raised might be able to be used for other families to get help."

Recent thefts

In recent months there has been an increase in thefts in the Kinross-shire area from farm and business premises. These have included the theft of plant machinery and tools, quad bikes, horseboxes and other equestrian equipment as well as diesel.

The rural locations of some of the farms, businesses, building sites and houses under construction in the Kinross-shire area make them more susceptible to crime than in urban areas. Potential thieves are taking advantage of these opportunities to steal items such as those mentioned above. If suspicious persons or vehicles are seen in or around these

If suspicious persons or vehicles are seen in or around these places, the Police should be informed. If also appropriate, inform any local Neighbourhood or Farm Watch schemes of any suspicious activity. Farmhouses, steadings and other outbuildings should, where possible, be alarmed and secured with suitable locks. Lighting should be considered for buildings that are under evening or night-time surveillance opportunities.

Plant machinery is particularly attractive to thieves and is routinely reported stolen from farms, building sites and other rural locations. It is therefore recommended that where possible such machinery is kept out of view and locked away when not in use. Consideration should also be given to property marking and ensure that all keys are kept in a separate location. It is advisable to register plant machinery on the UK National Plant and Equipment Register (TER). See the website www.ter-europe.org

It is advisable to keep vehicles such as quad bikes, motor bikes and other 4WD vehicles locked away when not in use. These vehicles should be kept as close to occupied farm buildings as possible, where practical.

A great majority of tools used routinely on farms can be lifted and placed within a vehicle, and may not be missed for some time after a crime has taken place. Try to property-mark all tools and ensure that they are not left lying about, and lock them away when not in use. Keep an inventory of tools which can be used for insurance purposes.

Fuel tanks should always be kept locked, especially where located in remote position.

Advice on Cold Callers

Due to recent incidents, we are again reminding householders to be on their guard as reports of people receiving cold calls designed to dupe them into handing over their banking details persist.

Police regularly receive complaints and reports in relation to people – sometimes elderly and vulnerable residents – being called by those claiming to be from banks, financial institutions, government bodies and even lottery operators, with promises of ready cash and sometimes offering loans, rebates or rewards.

Others have requested their victims to send cash in advance, whether by voucher, cheque or cash transfer in exchange for greater riches. Do not fall for their false promises.

People should always be extremely cautious about providing

personal and financial details over the phone, particularly in instances where they have been cold-called. Details that have been requested can include the cardholder's name, card numbers, passwords and card expiry dates. Personal information that should not be shared includes simple information such as when you may or may not be at home. Cold callers may be very convincing, but householders must keep in mind the fact that the person at the other end of the line has put time and effort into rehearsing their lines with

While it is common practice by some institutions to carry out transactions over the phone, we would advise people not to share any financial information with someone who phones unexpectedly. Be suspicious of all such calls and always make every effort to ensure that the person at the end of the line is who they claim to be, represent who they claim to represent and are legitimate and reputable.

If you are unsure, take details of their company so you can check their credentials. You can even take a number with a view to checking out their details and calling the company they say they are from at a later time, using a number you have obtained independently.

Above all else, if you have concerns or suspicions, hang up the phone and contact the police on 0300 111 2222.

Cllr Cuthbert added that the District Valuer would place a value on the property. £200,000 was mentioned and CCllr West added that the figure was stated as £165,000 last month, however this was to be reassessed (downward). It was agreed that CCllr West and CCllr Watson would be delighted to liaise with the RCCC in relation to this matter and offer any assistance to facilitate this project going forward. It was suggested that one option could be the CC taking occupation of a room for the Newsletter Office and pay a rent to the RCCC or offer them some monetary

Former High School: PKC is progressing with the bidding on this building.

Town Hall: Planners are considering the application lodged in relation to this building, with a recommendation to refuse the application. It was also noted that the Partnership has

made an approach to offer its services to facilitate this project. This would be in similar terms to their previous plans. A deadline of 28 December 2012 has been set by the Council for the planning application to be decided by that date.

Mill Street: A plan is being looked at by Garden Services to demolish the empty Mill Street building (latterly Social Work Dept offices) to create parking spaces.

Report from P&K Councillors

Cllr Barnacle commented on newspaper articles in relation to travellers' sites, and the issues that have arisen at Gairneybridge, Kinross and Crook of Devon. He added that currently there was no Council policy in place regarding the development of these sites, however this has been addressed in the proposed Local Development Plan which was referred to in reaching a decision on the site at Crook of Devon. Cllr Barnacle stated that reading this reference in the proposed plan was the first he knew of this matter. Under Policy RD5, sites on unallocated land will be supported if they meet certain criteria. The three local members asked that a decision on this be deferred for further clarification and this was refused with no adequate reasons given for the rejection. He continued that there is no respect for the local members' view. The quality of the reports received from Planning to Committee are another issue of discontent, with misleading

Another matter of concern is the Proposed Local The Planning Department are happy Development Plan. with the plan as it stands and do not wish to make any changes. The Councillors are fighting this. The Council offered a consultation in line with the process required by the Scottish Government. There were over 1500 responses, e.g. H46 in Kinross, and the Councillors are of the view that these should all be taken into account. A member of the public commented that she had attended the presentation at the campus and was assured that this was a "proposed" plan and following on the consultation period the Council would alert the public to any amendments. Cllr Cuthbert added that the local Councillors will work together in an attempt to gain the support of the other Councillors. The CC will write to the Chief Executive to ask for clarification on the process and to request that all representations from the public are taking into account and acted on accordingly. This letter to be copied to the local party leaders. It was noted that the economic site west of Kinross is still referred to in the plan.

Kinross Show, Vane Farm: Cllr Barnacle commented on the parking at this venue adding that he had concerns over this issue.

Green Road: Cllr Barnacle has written to the Roads Department in relation to this matter.

Station Road: Cllr Barnacle will take this matter up with Cllr Giacopazzi.

Balado/A977: The activation signs have been reported on a number of occasions.

Junction/verge cutting: This is an ongoing issue, still unresolved.

Balado Crossroads/Turfhills: A 50mph has been requested on this route.

Balado Quarry: A number of issues regarding this site are still to be addressed.

Cllr Cuthbert reported on the **Town Centre Regeneration**, **potholes** and **Lathro drainage** which were mentioned in his recent Newsletter article. He has asked for **signs** in Station Road, crossings outside Sainsbury's, the Junction and Springfield Road/Muirs.

The Link Road has been delayed due to negotiations over land at the Junction. The High Street work will be carried out at the same time.

A member of the public mentioned that the **30mph sign** at the entrance to Kinross is obliterated by trees.

CCllr Davies asked if there was any information on the debriefing in relation to **T** in the Park. CCllr Colliar will approach Ashley Miles in relation to this matter. To be added to the agenda for the next meeting. It was commented that at peak times there were insufficient buses available to ferry people to T in the Park. It was also stated that the staff should be fully briefed at their posts.

Drains: It was commented that a number of drains are choked with surface water lying on top. CCllr Mackay added that this was also a problem in the High Street and Burns Begg Street. She added that there is a large hole requiring attention at the Town Hall bus stop. It was noted that the state of the drains has been reported.

Cemetery: A complaint was received from the floor in relation to the disgraceful condition of the cemetery. The grass has been cut and left lying.

Davies Park up to Gallowhill Road: A query was raised in relation to the cutting of hedges along this path.

Grass cutting: It was commented that the problem has been the inclement weather conditions.

Green Park: CCllr Mackay asked if there was any progress in having the road to the rear of Green Park adopted. There are potholes in the area at the garages requiring attention.

Myre Park Fun Day: CCllr Scott stated that she attended this event. There is a limited budget available for upgrade of the play equipment. Community involvement in this project is welcome.

Davies Park: A member of the public enquired if the swings had been returned to the Park. This was discussed further. CCllr Cuthbert will be approached.

Correspondence

Perthshire Positive Action Award: Nomination Form received by CC. Deadline 28 August 2012. Mention was made as to the "Branding". The Chairman is to write requesting more appropriate branding.

Primary School outing: The travel arrangements were not arranged by the High School Headmaster.

No Entry marking: A small lining programme is to take place in the Primary School (Bowton Road) area shortly,

however the signs are clearly visible and should still be obeyed. Road marking is completely weather dependent and the recent wet spell has delayed PKC's programme.

School run (Ross Street): Cllr Giacopazzi has asked that the first day of the new school term would be an excellent time for the Police, or PKC parking attendants, to speak to the drivers in order to bring the practice to an end.

Council house refurbishment: The Secretary read out an email received from the Council in relation to the house stock. It was noted that the contractors use the tenants' electricity to charge up their tools. CCllr Mackay recommended that the tenants approach the Tenants' Association should they have any grievances in relation to this matter.

TAYplan: Communication received advising that the Action Programme has now been adopted. This sets out the actions necessary to deliver the Strategic Development Plan (2012-32) approved by Scottish Ministers on 8 June. This Action Plan takes into account the modifications made by the Scottish Ministers. The CC received two CD copies of the Action Plan which can be viewed on

CCllr West commented that two Associate Members can be approved. (Associate Members hold no voting powers.) All three nominees are to be invited to the next CC meeting. They are to be asked to produce a brief summary with some details about themselves for presentation at the next meeting.

Finance: The Treasurer, Ian Jack, advised that the annual Council Grant has been received in the sum of £658.00.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the August Meeting

CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Milne-Home, Cottingham, Thomson, Halford, Smith and Pettinger to the meeting held on 9 August 2012. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Cuthbert and Robertson, Min Secy E Rougvie, Sgt Sandra Williams of Tayside Police and 16 members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllr Bennet.

Police matters

T in the Park: Sgt Williams reported that T in the Park had generally been a success, with no significant negative feedback, although there were reports of a car stopping in Stirling Road and its occupants using the road as a toilet. A member of the public said he had observed the same thing happening outside Robertson's shop in New Road on a regular basis and not just during T in the Park. Sgt Williams noted this. There had also been a problem of tailbacks on the Friday night due to an accident between a bus and a pedestrian near Yetts o' Muckhart.

Incidents: On 12 July a speeding car was stopped in South Street and an ASBO issued to both the driver and the vehicle. On 13 July a vehicle was stolen from Whyte Place and two people were arrested. Between 1 and 3 August a horsebox and trailer were stolen from Middleton Farm Cottage. This is still under inquiry. Overnight on 2 August a quad bike was stolen from Tannerhill Farm. This is also still under inquiry and may be linked with the previous incident. Sgt Williams said there had been a spate of thefts of items such as power tools throughout central Scotland and the public are reminded to keep their possessions under lock and key.

20mph speed limit: A member of the public asked if the police could do more to enforce the new 20mph limit in New Road, as drivers were largely ignoring it, especially late at night. Sgt Williams noted the situation and advised that Tayside Police would be running a campaign from 11 to 23 September to target irresponsible drivers in Perth & Kinross. The average speed of motorists in New Road is also to be monitored. Erecting large signs advising motorists of their speed is a matter for the Council.

Police attendance at CC meetings: Sgt Williams said that the police remained committed to maintaining a link with the community and would endeavour to attend every other CC meeting. It would be the community officer who would attend, who in the case of Milnathort is PC Sadie Allan. Sgt Williams was thanked for her attendance.

Road works: CCllr Hamilton advised that PKC is in the process of scheduling repairs to the 15 sites identified at the meeting he and CCllr Thomson had had with roads officers. The work is expected to be complete or virtually complete by the end of September. It was noted that work appeared to have already begun on the corner at Tillywhally where puddles form.

Planning Applications Submitted to PKC

Partial demolition of agricultural warehouse and erection of mixed use building at Arlary Farmhouse. Noted.

Formation of new vehicular access and private access track at Hillside House. Noted.

Planning Applications Decided by PKC

Installation of air source heat pump at 40 Marshall Place. Approved.

Modification of existing consent (change of house type) at 1 Cuthill Towers. Approved.

Placecheck: An e-mail update was provided by Di ane Cassidy. The tree is Wester Loan had died and would be replaced in the autumn. Bedding had been planted in the meantime.

Co-option: PKC have approved the co-option of CCllr Pettinger and he is now officially a CC member.

Milnathort Futures Trust: Mr David Sands was in attendance to outline the vision of Milnathort Futures Trust, of which he is an unpaid director. As he is no longer involved in the retail business he wanted to become involved in what is an altruistic venture but whose success depends on an application for three wind turbines at Tillyrie being approved. MFT is not involved in the planning application itself. Should the application be successful, the community would have a share in the profits amounting to around £24,000 a year, which would be distributed in grant form for energy efficiency improvements or flood prevention measures. The trust would be accessible to residents of Area 49 only. Mr Sands hoped that a local lawyer could be engaged to process applications from members of the community. MFT also plan to apply for charitable status if the application for three wind turbines is successful. Mr Sands advised that MFT was established by Joseph Giacopazzi but Mr Giacopazzi had resigned upon being elected as a councillor due to a potential conflict of interest. MFT currently has five directors: David Sands, Sandy Smith, Colin McAlpine, Alastair McCracken and Grant Simpson. David Sands noted that there are currently no ordinary trust members who can apply to join to be shareholders for £1. Mr Sands said that a public meeting



was being arranged for the end of September and he hoped as many people as possible would attend with a view to becoming Trust members. Following his presentation, Mr Sands answered questions from the CC and members of the public as follows:

Q1. Has MFT considered other forms of renewable energy? A1: No, MFT has been set up solely for the purposes of the Tillyrie Wind Cluster application. In the event the wind cluster is unsuccessful, it is more than likely that MFT will be dissolved.

Q2. How would grant applications be approved? A2: Mr Sands noted that it was proposed that this was discussed and agreed with the directors and members and at present there is no agreed mechanism for processing grant applications.

Q3. Do MFT support the wind farm application? A3. Mr Sands stated that MFT are independent of the planning application and have no view on the fors and against of onshore wind farms. MFT has only been established to administer the usage of community profit of circa £24,000 per annum should the application be successful.

Q4. How does the whole community benefit as it would appear only a small number of grant recipients would benefit? A4: One example could be improvements to Milnathort Town Hall, which would be beneficial to all.

Donaldson Park: CCllr Hamilton advised that a number of CCllrs were to meet with PKC officials on 13 August to try to persuade them to start cutting the grass on a regular basis and with immediate effect. Efforts to create wildflower areas had been disastrous because the ground had not been properly prepared and the park was now over-run with weeds, including ragwort, which is notifiable. Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that local elected members were fully in support of the CC on this issue.

New matters and correspondence

Consultation: CCllr Milne-Home advised that the Scottish Government has launched a consultation on the Community Empowerment and Renewal Bill, which is aimed directly at local communities. The consultation can be found at www.scotland.gov.uk/publications. CCllr Milne-Home said he would not be consulting further with the CC before he responds as there would not be time. However, he felt it was worth putting in a response in on behalf of the CC.

Horse in Donaldson Park: CCllr Hamilton had received a number of e-mails regarding a horse being exercised in Donaldson Park. Cllr Robertson will check if this was legal, but it was noted that the horse had not been seen since a number of complaints were made to the police and PKC.

Overgrown hedges and trees were a problem and he reminded householders that they have a responsibility for cutting them back.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that the issues he wanted to raise had already been covered.

Other business

Mini-roundabout: CCllr Halford reported on an incident in which a cyclist had skidded on the manhole cover at the miniroundabout, and come off his bike. He said that in other areas a special coating had been applied. Cllrs Robertson and Cuthbert will pursue this.

Potholes in Church Street: These have been reported to PKC.

Members of the public

The following issues were raised:

Ice at Tillywhally: Concern was again expressed about ice on the Tillywhally road during the winter months. Following discussion, it was agreed that Cllr Robertson would formally ask PKC to consider erecting signs indicating that this was an accident blackspot.

Access laws: A series of gates had been left open in local fields in what appeared to be a deliberate act. This is not only costly and inconvenient for the landowner, but can be dangerous both for livestock and the community at large. The public are reminded that 'right to roam' legislation also brings with it responsibilities and it is unfortunate that a minority of irresponsible people are spoiling the enjoyment of the countryside for others.

The next meeting of Milnathort CC will be held on Thursday 13 September 2012 at 7.30pm in Orwell Parish Church Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

News from the August Meeting

Apologies were received from: Sheila, Angus, Kevin, Joe and Graham. Fifteen members of the public attended the meeting held on 7 August 2012.

Declarations of interest: Trudy: 12/01198/IPL Entire CC declares interest in 12/01120/FLL (Church Car park Crook of Devon).

Community policing: No community police officer available. Short report sent does not contain anything specific to our area.

Community Speed Watch: the pilot has now ended. We await the evaluation of Tayside Police.

Olympic Flame: the passing through of the flame in Crook of Devon was very successful by all accounts. Many thanks to Hayley Richard, the Powmill Milk Bar, Caroline Watson and all others for providing funding, balloons, pipers and for turning out. A day to remember.

Crook of Devon Church Car Park: the CC has put in a planning application for this.

Core Paths and right of way sign posting: MB has contacted Dave Stubbs to ensure that landowners and others will be consulted when signage is considered. A short discussion followed in which several members of the public from the farming community stressed their discontent about the process of deciding on core paths. Members of the general public do not realise how dangerous cattle can be when spooked. When farmers are displaying warning signs they get rapped on the knuckles but they feel strongly that there are issues with warning the general public at certain times of the year. WR stresses that it is important to keep writing to MSPs to keep this issue in the awareness.

CC business: meetings attended: Special meeting travellers' site, meeting with Gordon Banks, Alastair presented at the development Committee.

T-in-the-Park: Local people are still not happy with the way the verges are cut just prior to T-in-the-Park. There was a promise that back roads would be cleared for reasons of safety but that has not happened everywhere.

There has been at least one incident, possibly more, where a young person was found lost. There does not seem to be an agreed procedure what to do. T-in-the-Park stewards handed this over to the police who were helpful but inefficient. This problem is exacerbated by the existence of external campsites. Perhaps a dedicated phone line for missing persons could be set up?

The Sunday the week after T-in-the-Park, tents were flying across the motorway. Police were trying to catch them and it was a dangerous situation.

Reports from P&K Councillors

Councillor Barnacle:

- Investigating Drum traffic calming and access only road; all would have to agree on this.
- Loop road perhaps under the Green Roads initiative?
- Carnbo Post box: no real progress yet.
- Passing places on the road to the Blairingone Equestrian centre: no progress, officer in charge ill.
- Gelvan Bridge has damaged parapet, will be dealt with.
- Is there any representation regarding the Brown Bin collection?

Councillor Robertson:

- Is worried about visibility and road safety: verge cutting is not optimal and drains are getting silted up. Urges everyone to cut overhanging hedges.
- Is worried that conditions set on the planning for the travellers' site in Crook Moss cannot be enforced. Will try to address Development Committee next time they convene.

Councillor Cuthbert:

• Has asked convener to meet to go through the report.

Travellers' site: There followed a short discussion on the travellers' site. There is general discontent amongst the elected members of this area that their objections and representations are largely ignored. The report presented to the development committee was full of mistakes and omissions. AL reported that planning did not mention that they could not connect to sewage system; did not prove need; reluctantly agreed site was adjacent to village boundary; did not accept flood risk, agreed that normally they would only accept port-a-loos for a few weeks while the convenor pointed out they had been there for about five months; it was at the discretion of the Planning department. It was, in his view, a very poor report riddled with inaccuracies. After the meeting the person responsible for determining need was in deep conversation with the travellers' representative in the council building for at least 10 minutes.

Councillors on the Committee were not informed that Scottish Water stated that there was no capacity to connect this site to the sewer. Figures to prove that there was an established need for another site were not forthcoming and there was worry about procedural aspects of the process. Gordon Banks has been very helpful. The only way open is to organise a meeting at top level to express our discontent with the way all this has been handled. Cllr Robertson stated that he had not yet come to a definite conclusion on the matter and he required further clarification on a number of points. Sandy thanked the elected members for their hard work.

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 6 August 2012 were: CCllrs P Fraser, H Somerville, R Kitchin and F MacGregor; Associate Members Catriona Culley and James Moore, P&K Cllr M Barnacle and four members of the community. There were no apologies.

Matters arising from previous meeting

There had been no further progress about seeking further possible funding for the notice boards.

There has been no further information received about the bus service in Keltybridge and Maryburgh; Cllr Barnacle agreed to follow this up.

Crime Prevention

Catherine Erskine reported that there have been two separate cases of cold callers offering to tarmac the driveway.

Diesel has been stolen from Cleish Mill Farm.

Building equipment has been stolen from Moreland Farm.

'Operation Tupelo', 11 to 23 September, will target irresponsible driving. (See Police Box.)

Correspondence

The Community Empowerment and Renewal Bill has been sent out to CCs, requesting a response by 26September. It is a fairly long consultation document, with many questions—some of which appear to be more relevant to our community than other questions. It was agreed to spend time formulating our response to the more relevant questions rather than the document as a whole.

Community Council Website

Fran Gillespie reported on the updated website. The website has been amended further and is live. There are more links on the front page, with scrolling functions on the pages containing more information (such as the planning page). The website statistics are currently showing an average of 29 unique visitors per day. CCllr MacGregor will keep sending planning information to Fran to update the site.

Roads

No new maintenance has occurred around Cleish and Blairadam. We are all aware that PKC is under financial constraints – but it has been suggested that rather than complaining about individual issues repeatedly, we should ask instead what is currently on their agenda to repair and improve. There could then be some discussion on prioritising what is on their agenda.

CCllr MacGregor reported that drains running parallel to the road are often the responsibility of the land owner rather than the council.

Contact Eric or Fiona McNeil 01577 863000 For free advice Cllr Barnacle reported that the request for the Green Road Initiative would likely include some HGV restrictions, but that PKC has prioritised another road for a pilot study.

The lack of verge cutting has been a safety issue around many of our junctions. These junctions should be reported to the roads department as a safety issue.

Cllr Barnacle reported that he hasn't had any further reply from PKC following CCllr Kitchin's e-mail to Rob Bryce (who has been on holiday) about the Cemetery Road. There has been a lack of reply over three weeks of attempted phone calls and e-mails. MB reported that there is a potential discrepancy over the legal responsibility of the road, which is currently being looking into by PKC lawyers.

Planning

Two applications have been approved: the poultry breeding facility, Gairneybridge and change of use of field to garden ground, The Paphle, Cleish.

The following are new applications:

Greenacres – Two separate applications for a new access track (12/00935/FLL) and a new chalet with parking space (12/01035/FLL). SNH have objected based on phosphate mitigation. We should reply to the Planning Dept about our same consistent concerns and lack of clear policy for this site.

Erection of a stable block at Kedlock House (12/01327/FLL) – no objections received.

Erection of an agricultural shed, Shepherds Neuk, Cleish (12/01329/PN) – belonging to F MacGregor.

Cllr Barnacle then reported on the issue of the travellers' sites at Crook Moss, Crook of Devon. He addressed the Development Control Committee on 1 August, and along with two other councillors requested the application be refused. The DCC deferred the decision seeking further information on drainage and land contamination. Cllr Barnacle has issues with the decision – there seems to be little consistency in the Planning Dept regarding phosphate mitigation in all traveller site applications compared to all other planning applications. SEPA and SNH have both been contacted and have agreed to tighten up this issue. Crook Moss cannot at present connect to the mains and so PO4 mitigation is an issue.

The new Gypsy Traveller Policy (RD5b) of the proposed Local Plan will override all other policies that would otherwise lead to refusing these planning applications. There is also a lack of enforcement to stop any development prior to both applications being submitted and also bring granted.

There is also some question as to the legal classification of 'mobile' vs 'static' traveller sites.

Cllr Barnacle and the other members appear to be very frustrated that despite strong representations to PKC senior planners and the Committee, there is no acknowledgement of their concerns.

These matters could be discussed further at the next KCCN. **Invitation to developers and objectors re windmills**

This is currently in hand, and we are waiting to hear back from the developers about a possible date that they could attend so that we could also invite local objectors (SPOT).

This has all been covered as above.

There have been two new proposals in Fife that have been reported in the local papers, both saying that all local communities have been consulted. Neither have contacted Cleish and Blairadam CC.

Kinross-shire Community Councils Network

CCllrs Fraser and Kitchin both attended the last meeting, and reported that it was much more productive with plenty of topics on the agenda that could be continued in future meetings. It may not necessarily be accomplishing exactly what it set out to do but is certainly more constructive and worth attending.

A discussion on the proposed LDP: is there any way to find out any feedback following the submitted representations during the consultation process? It appears that planning officers do not want to make any changes unless the council officers are put under pressure to make changes to the proposed LDP that was released for consultation.

We don't actually know what has happened in the consultation process following our representations to PKC. The matter of the number of representations from a household is currently considered, rather than the actual number of people in that household who appear on the electoral role who write to PKC. Is this constitutional?

Other Business

There appear to be two new access roads into Green acres. Do these correlate to the new applications, and in which case, are they again retrospective? This is a 60mph section of road now with five or six entrances onto it. We have been asked to write to the PKC enforcement officer and Roads Dept to examine the safety issues with these multiple access roads on a fast road. Who is responsible if there are accidents? Cllr Barnacle agreed to follow this up.

There was also a reply received by the same member of our community from Stuart D'All (Roads Dept) in respect to lack of progress on the roads west of Cleish – still awaiting an improvement in the weather?



Kinross & District Rotary Club



Our first meeting after 'T in the Park' was addressed by Carol McKinlay, the Whiz Kids Scotland Regional Fundraiser. What an inspiring talk! This is a charity which helps disabled children, partly by providing equipment to help them to be as independent as 'normal', fit kids. It also campaigns for help for them from others and runs Ambassadori al Clubs to help them reduce dependency on their parents and to meet other children. One great example of this was the small team of volunteers who helped some children get more out of their visit to 'T in the Park' recently!

On 23 July, Bob Docherty, originally from Burntisland and latterly retired Assistant Rector of Kirk caldy High School, and a promoter of Schools football, came along to tell us so much about the Scots language. I think we were all surprised at the origins of many of our common words which owed their existence to past contacts with Gaelic, Norse, German and Dutch people. Bob listed so many words which were familiar to us but we were not aware of their origins. We also learned that, in effect, we used to have different languages in different parts of the country -Shetland, Orkney, Inverness, Dundee etc. In closing, Bob read us some poems in broad Scots which we were just able to follow!

On 30 July, our club Secretary, Neil Maclure gave a fascinating, illustrated talk on his recent seven-day Scottish cruise. Starting from Leith and ending in Donegal, it included Orkney, St. Kilda, Skye, Canna, Staffa, Fingal's Cave and the Coirebhreacain whirlpool. On Hirta, he saw some of the 60,000 pairs of gannets and the 68,000 pairs of fulmars! Evening entertainment on board was provided by ceilidhs featuring a local accordionist.

After the normal monthly Club business meeting on 6 August, our next meeting, on 13 August, was addressed by David Taylor on the History of Hypnosis. David was able to develop his interest in the subject when he was made redundant and so could attend a course at Glasgow University without loss of earnings! He started his talk, which was not without humour, by introducing Franz Anton Mesmer, the German physician from whom has come the word 'mesmerising'. Mesmer developed what was latterly named 'hypnotism' by the Scottish physician James Braid in 1843. Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Apple Scone Round

We are coming into the apple season and this recipe makes delicious scones with an apple flavour.

Ingredients 200g plain flour

½ teaspoon salt

2 x 5ml spoons baking powder

50g margarine 50g caster sugar

1 medium sized cooking apple, peeled, cored

and coarsely grated 3 x 15ml spoons milk

1 x 15ml spoon Demerara sugar

Oven: 200°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6

Method

Sieve together the flour, salt and baking powder. Rub in the margarine. Add the caster sugar, then the grated apple and add enough milk to give a soft, but not sticky, dough.

Turn the mixture on to a floured surface and knead lightly. Roll out to a 20cm circle and place on a greased and floured baking sheet. Score it to make eight pieces. Brush the top with a little milk and sprinkle with the caster sugar. Bake in oven for 20-25 minutes or until well-risen and golden brown.



Well done to everyone who took part and a great big thank you to all the leaders and helpers who made it such a successful day.



Milnathort Explorers

Iceland Practice camp

The Barr Wood, Forth Valley Scouts' district campsite, was the explorer scouts' destination for our pre-Icel and camp to check out the new tents and equipment. It was another damp Friday night but at least the rain had stopped when we arrived at the 90-acre woodland campsite. The explorers plastered on the midge repellent and pulled on their new midge nets prior to pitching the tents. They were impressed by the amount of space in the three-man tents, with huge porch areas for them to keep their gear for the two weeks in Iceland.

Forth Valley explorers were camping en masse and had organised various activities for the Saturday. Milnathort Explorers tried out the archery and bungee running.

In the afternoon we walked to the Bannockburn heritage centre, only a couple of miles from the site. It was the 698th anniversary of the battle and the explorer scouts entered into the spirit of the event with enthusiasm.

On the Sunday the explorers completed a giant pioneering project – a gateway to our campsite. Struan was given the task of climbing the structure to lash the two halves together. The gateway was left standing until we had struck camp and packed the trailer. Struan and Calum were invested into the Milnathort explorer unit before we left the Barr Wood.

Iceland Jamboree

The Jamboree celebrating 100 years of scouting in Iceland was titled "The Magic Continues" and for the 14 members of the Milnathort explorer unit who attended the week camp in July, it certainly described the event and the seven-day tour of Iceland afterwards.

Our bus breaking down on the way to the jamboree wasn't a great start - at least the driver managed to get us to the depot and we swapped buses. The explorers and Perth guides weren't bothered by this or pitching tents on water covered ground in the pouring rain while wearing kilts.

By 4am the sun was out and once we'd built the gate to our site, the spars provided an ideal location to dry kilts. During our time in Iceland there were only two occasions that we couldn't eat outside due to the weather.

Jamboree activities – water-based, land-based, creative and craft – ran every afternoon. Participants were divided into four age groups, identified by the colour of their jamboree neckie and wristband, each age group rotated through the activities over the week. Evening activities included sports, scouting challenges, campfires and discos. Kilt clad explorers with a piper always attracted other nationalities to our site.

Nine of the explorers opted to go on the 24-hour hike walking across alpine meadows, lava fields and snow patches to a mountain hut. The event was very popular with the explorers ending up two to a bunk. The main attraction of the hike was bathing in the hot springs beside the huts, better than the Blue Lagoon.

Friday was an activity free day. We spent the morning putting to use the explorers' cycle maintenance skills to fix 14 of the jamboree bikes and the afternoon cycling with some Icelandic friends round the lake, visiting an enormous cave accessible via a route similar to the Ellie chain walk. We also visited the exhibition celebrating 100 years of scouting in Iceland, finding a photo taken of a leader on their last visit to the jamboree.

Visitors' day brought 7,000 additional people to the camp to participate in the cultural exchange. Joining up with Perth Guides and Rangers and the Glasgow scouts camped opposite us, we danced the Dashing White Sergeant and invited the audience to join in. The explorers found teaching five others the dance challenging. Music was provided by one of the explorers on his pipes.

Post-jamboree we visited geysers, boiling mud and waterfalls, saw black lava deserts and white ice deserts, had a boat trip round icebergs, walked on a glacier tongue from Europe's largest icecap, and found farmhouses on the national park that inspired Tolkien's hobbit homes.

Returning to Reyjavik, our Icelandic friends invited us to a tea party – Turkish tea, cakes and hot dogs served in the garden till the midnight twilight. Even getting up before 4am for the return flight wasn't a problem for the explorers who are keen to return for the next Jamboree.

Kinross High School

I am writing this at the end of our first week back from the summer holiday.

This is a very exciting time in the life of our school. Pupils returning after finding out their exam results and making some course changes as a result. Pupils returning to begin the year in which they will sit their first national exams. Pupils attending our school for the first time, most of them into the new first year.

Exam results are an important aspect for every school. This year in Kinross High School we have had another very successful set of results. For the vast majority of our pupils the many hours of hard work in class and at home have been rewarded with good results.

In 4th year 100% of pupils have a qualification in English and Mathematics, 97% of pupils have passed in at least five subjects. 50% of 4th year pupils have gained at least five awards at the Credit level. Of these, eleven have gained the very highest awards in all eight subjects.

In 5th year we have seen a rise in the levels of attainment in all areas. The majority of pupils are performing at Higher level. 44 pupils gained five Highers, and of these, ten achieved five A grades. One pupil gained six Highers, all at grade A.

In 6th year, almost all of our pupils have gained the qualifications they may have needed for the next stage in their journey. One pupil passed four Advanced Highers all at grade A, a further three pupils passed three Advanced Highers. In total, 51 pupils, or 50% of the year group, passed at least one Advanced Higher.

We have a first year with 175 pupils, which is our largest group for some time. It was very pleasing to meet with them on the first morning and to see how well turned out they were, a credit to all, particularly the number of pupils in blazers. I think we can now say that our signature purple blazer has been re-established as a prominent part of school wear. Can I take this opportunity to remind parents that school ties are now available from the school and that recommended PE kit is available on the internet at schoolwearmadeeasy.com.

The matter of uniform is very important to us as it constitutes the first of our security measures. Can I thank parents for helping us by ensuring that pupils are sent to school wearing appropriate uniform. Of course we still have some of our ladies who are adjusting this on arrival and I would continue to ask you to consider this when making any uniform purch ases.

We said farewell to a number of staff at the end of last term but we were all surprised when Mrs Donnachie, our Principal Teacher of Home Economics, announced her retirement at the beginning of the term. We thank her for all of her work in KHS and wish her well in her new venture.

We also welcome a number of new staff: Miss Paterson in RME, Miss Risk in Geography, Miss McNab in Drama, Mr Hodgson in Maths, Mr Martin in Biology. We wish them well as they begin their journey with us.



The open days will be followed by Faith in Action Sunday on 16 September and the final event will be the Harvest Thanksgiving services at 10.30am and 6.30pm on 30 September when there will be an Offering of Talents and Re-dedication.

Writing in the church's magazine of the Open Days, Session Clerk Jaffrey Weir says: "This is an opportunity for us all to meet each other in fellowship and gain a better understanding of the roles of organisations and groups in the church. I hope that it gives us the opportunity as individuals to reflect and become more aware of how we might use our talents to spread the gospel through our membership of Kinross Parish Church'.

Sports Theme for Church

This summer at Kinross Parish Church has seen a lively sports theme in honour of the Olympics and Paralympics. In June the church, with St. Paul's Episcopal church, provided refreshments when the Olympic Torch came through the town and, on the same night, hosted an Olympic Film Night which, as well as being great fun, raised money for the charities supported by local torch bearer Hannah

'On Your Marks...' was the games-themed Family Week held in and around the parish church in the first week in August for children and their families with the help of almost 50 volunteers. The week started with its own opening ceremony on Friday 27 July- before that other one, which was OK but you couldn't march behind a real Olympic Torch as you could in Kinross (thanks again to Hannah Clarke).

Now the church has decided, as part of its outreach to the wider community, to provide funds to two local charities which allow the disabled to enjoy sports in our own area. The church always has a 'retiring collection' for charity at its formal Communions, which are held four times a year. At the next Communions on Sunday, 2nd September (10.30am and 6.30pm) this retiring collection is to be taken for two local groups for the disabled, Kinross Wheelchair Curling Club and Riding for the Disabled, Glenfarg, and divided between them.

Buildings of Interest in Kinross-shire The Bield, High Street, Kinross

In the archive collection in Kinross Museum there is a small building plan titled *Plan No. 11 of Cottage for R B Begg, Esq, Kinross.* The drawings made by Henry Robertson and John Kinloch in 1864 are for a building that looks more like a mansion house than a cottage and refer to the elegant house at 1 High Street, Kinross, that stands opposite the Bank of Scotland.

Robert Burns Begg, junior, was a well-known figure in Kinross. He had built up a successful business as a solicitor and played a leading role in civic affairs in addition to writing about the history of the county. His father, who came to Kinross in 1823 and was the schoolmaster for over 50 years, was a nephew of the poet Robert Burns.

The 'cottage' at No 1 High Street was designed for Burns Begg by Henry Robertson, a Perthshire architect whose work is largely to be found in Perth and Kinross, for example at Blackford where he designed the parish church. The elegant building in Kinross, with its carved bargebo ards and ornamental finials, was completed in 1867 and in 1896 a conical-roofed tower was added to the southwest corner, giving it the air of a mock baronial-style mansion. In its day it would have been styled a 'cottage ornée' and it would have stood in glorious isolation at the top of the High Street.

On the Robert Burns Begg monument, erected to his memory in the Kirkgate Churchyard overlooking Loch Leven, is carved the motto of the Burns family – "Better a wee bush than nae bield". The word 'bield', an old Scots term for a shelter, provided Robert Burns Begg, junior, with the perfect name for his 'cottage' in the High Street which he christened 'The Bield'.


Absolutely no experience is necessary as coaching and training is given on the ice by helpers.

One-day Ladies competition was played, the E. Ford Trophy, and was won by Sheila Rennie with runner-up Jean Cousar.





Out & About



RSPB Loch Leven

Colin Shaw is awa on his holidays this month, so I'm officially renaming this Caroline's column in his absence! Apologies in advance for the lack of Scots speak...



Ospreys have been delighting visitors with their regular appearances in Vane Bay, with up to three at a time seen hunting in Vane Bay tearing into their lunch time fish on the reserve. September is a great time to spot them, as birds that have spent the summer further north make a pit stop here on their way back to Africa. What better way to see them than sitting upstairs in our cafe, cup of tea in hand, with one of Lynne's freshly baked scones?!

As the ospreys head south, so too do our other summer visitors. Swifts haven't been seen here since mid August, the latest bird to arrive and the first to leave! Swallows and martins too will start their long journey south, along with tiny warblers. An amazing feat that such small birds, weighing only a few grams, can undertake a migration over thousands of miles, with some of the young only having just learned to fly!

Of course, as they leave us, new birds will arrive. The end of September usually brings the first of thousands of pink footed geese and whooper swans, arriving here in their family groups from Iceland. The sight of the first skeins flying overhead, the birds calling to each other as they go, always heralds the real start of autumn for me.

Waders too, are on the move. Large flocks of calling curlew are already arriving, and we've seen black tailed godwits, whimbrel and greenshank stop off for a rest and refuel on their migration.

Birds aside, our dedicated team of volunteers have been hard at work on the reserve as ever. Their most recent project has been to revamp the ponds beside the Gilman Hide. School groups regularly use these for pond dipping during term time, so the team have cut down the encroaching vegetation around the ponds, improving access to the ponds and the views to the loch and Bishop's Hill.

In the shop, we have some good offers to keep your garden birds happy this month: 2.25kg bags of feeder mix and ground mix are now just £2.99 (from £6.49), and bags of 'peck & mix' are buy one get one free (£3.49). Don't forget to pick up your new RSPB Nature Rewards loyalty card when you're here.

Finally, if you've been to see 'Brave' then you won't want to miss our family event on **Saturday 8 September**. We're honing our bushcraft skills to make bows and arrows. Call the visitor centre to book your place!

Farming



I've always loved Kinross Show but I didn't expect to love it even more at this year's new venue – it turns out, I did. Congratulations to everyone involved; the show field at RSPB Loch Leven is brilliant, all my favourite elements of the day were retained and there was space for new events like dog scurrying too - thank you. I just had to use this space to tell everyone!

All this nostalgia has me considering how the farming community interacts throughout the year after the show is over. I know once folk find out I'm a sheep farmer, I end up answering all manner of questions as people probe such things as "Why are lambs only born in spring and why do tractors drive so slowly?" It seems many people have a genuine interest in farming and it's the reason I started writing this column in 2006. Some farmers take it further and blog or tweet the latest developments – a quick online search uncovers quite a few farmers from the USA with thousands of followers. Mike Hayley from Ohio states he loves raising Simmental cows and crops. Mike has 17,455 followers who find out when he sows the barley and how wet the fields are. Sound familiar? One of his most popular retweets was about cows in Kentucky being fed candy due to the shortage of corn. I couldn't find many Scottish farming tweets so maybe there is a gap for the farmer with a good sense of humour at Backward Farm, by Kinross to take to Twitter? I think I'd be one of many to sign up to hear how his day is unfolding.

A fantastic initiative with the sole aim of connecting children to farming and the countryside is the Royal Highland Education Trust (RHET). Farm visits, classroom speakers, projects and curriculum-linked resources are on offer free to all schools. The successful 'Count and Grow' project takes place in many P2, 3 & 4 classes where pupils plant potato tubers at the start of the year, look after them and harvest in early summer. The project has many curriculum links that include health and wellbeing, literacy and numeracy but above all it is fun way to learn. In this area about 30 farm visits and 25 classroom talks take place each year, organised by the local co-ordinator who will take the teacher through the risk assessment prior to the visit. Health and Safety concerns can be a barrier to farm visits so this support means they can take place safely and pupils can get up close to livestock and farm machines to see for themselves where their food comes from.

Of course if farming is not this year's topic for your offspring, you can always get them interested in other ways. Why not send them round the supermarket to find out where the potatoes, carrots or strawberries come from? Often it's Fife or Angus. Or pop into the local farmers market and talk to the farmer who produced the mince for your spag bol or get the date in your diary for next year's Kinross Show – Saturday 10 August 2013. I'll be there!



Gargunnock House in Stirlingshire has five acres of mature gardens, woodland walks and a walled garden.
