Just who is running the Council?

PKC is meant to represent the interests of the public by means of Councillors being elected to serve them. In turn, Council Officers (employees of the Council) are tasked with carrying out the wishes of the Council, i.e. the wishes of the public through their elected Councillors.

The Local Development Plan is a Planning process with far reaching implications for everyone in the community due to impact on new housing numbers, roads, schooling etc and is a template for development within the next ten years.

The Plan allocates land for development, which in many cases can result in multi-million pound schemes. Often relatively low value land can be increased massively by designation to development land for housing for instance. It follows that with so much money at stake, the application of the system should be exemplary.

The Plan process is Statutory with an obligation that PKC engage in "satisfactory consultation" with the public.

Recent revelations regarding the flawed processing of the Plan by PKC suggest that democratic procedures have not been upheld by officials within PKC. Their employment of high-handed tactics has resulted in a faulty public consultation process, resulting in a Plan that does not take full account of the aspirations of the public. While making little attempt to take on public concerns, there seems, by contrast, great focus on the wishes of developers.

Meanwhile elected Councillors are being disadvantaged by inaccurate and misleading reports and risk reprimand should they voice public criticism of officer failings. Members of the public who justifiably protest at Council bad practice become tangled in a bureaucratic web whose sole intent seeks to neutralize complaints at any cost.

It seems that core elements amongst Senior Council Officers are content to maintain this unacceptable culture. Although public employees, they seem to have somehow acquired powers beyond their status and are in effect "running the show" with a freedom that is contrary to the public interest.

Green Park

I have been contacted by residents of Green Park who are concerned by the lack of maintenance to fences, and communal areas by the Council in the estate. Since that time I have had two meetings on site with Council officers and residents. Apparently the only funding available is $\pounds 10,000$, which is to be used to resurface the area in front of the lock up garages.

I have raised the matter at the Council's Housing and Health committee and have been assured that residents' concerns will be addressed. I want the Council to draw up a plan to replace the broken fences and repair the paths. I will keep pressing until this work is carried out.

Dog Fouling

This is an ongoing problem throughout Kinross-shire and seems to have been particularly bad over the last few weeks. Most dog owners are very responsible but there are a few who are not. The Council take dog fouling seriously and will take action if they catch offending dog owners.

Let's make a real effort this spring to keep our paths, pavements, parks and play areas free of dog mess.

Planning application for Town Hall

A fresh application concerning Kinross Town Hall has been submitted to PKC. The application is very similar to the one that was rejected by the Council's Development Management Committee in October 2012.

The application is for the "erection of an apartment block (8 units), formation of access, parking and amenity space and change of use of Kinross Town hall and related buildings to Class 1 (shops) and Class 2 (offices) and alterations to buildings (amended submission), 108-114 High Street and land to the rear of 106 High Street, Kinross".

The applicant is 'Town Hall Developments' (director, Simon Wilson) and the proposal involves building a new block of flats on ground owned by Mr Wilson behind the Town Hall. The L-shaped new build block would be $2\frac{1}{2}$ storeys high, and would be partly visible from the High Street, via the gap between "The Dog House" and the Carnegie Library. Detailed plans have been provided for the new-build block.

The Town Hall, Library, former Post Office and clock tower are still owned by Perth & Kinross Council. The Council decided in September 2010 to sell the buildings to Simon Wilson. Missives for the sale have been concluded, but there is a "suspensive condition relating the grant of planning permission", i.e. a satisfactory planning application must be submitted and consent granted.

The planning proposal for the Town Hall buildings is to demolish the billiard hall at the back of the Carnegie Library and reinstate the affected part of the Library building. The applicant proposes to use the ground gained by demolishing the billiard hall to create parking space for the new-build flats.

The applicant does not propose to carry out any internal alterations to the Town Hall buildings at this stage – indeed, there are no detailed drawings. He proposes to make the buildings wind and watertight. A change of use has been requested which would potentially allow the buildings to be used as shops and offices in the future.

The difference over the previous application appears to be that the applicant has provided PKC with further information regarding the external repairs. The 'Planning, Design and Access Statement' says:

"It has been agreed with Perth and Kinross Council that some additional information related to the extent and the related costings of the Listed Building works should be provided as part of the re-submission, this information being provided separately to Perth and Kinross Council and not as part of the submitted planning application for commercial reasons."

Former Kinross High School site

I received notification on 13 March that the Council had received a Pre Application Notification for the former Kinross High School site. This pre-application is from Persimmon Homes, who state that the application will be to build "circa 90 dwellings". Their intention is to consult with local CCs and to advertise in the Fife and Kinross Extra and the Perthshire Advertiser.

In addition they have said that they will hold a **Public** Meeting on Tuesday 21 May between 4pm and 8pm at the Community Campus.

This is perhaps a chance to hear what is being proposed for this very important site in the heart of Kinross.

Kinross Town Hall

A revised planning application for the Town Hall was received by PKC on 8 March, reference 13/00462/FLL.

If you want to see the details of what is being proposed, the best way is to access the Council's planning portal. (See p. 4) **Grounds Maintenance Cuts**

Following the budget meeting last month, the Council has announced cuts on grounds maintenance.

These are listed below.

As stated in last month's Newsletter the budget is in essence the work of the SNP administration with support from the Tory group, so please don't get upset with your Independent or Liberal Democrat Councillors – we are as upset as you are about this.

A letter is going out to CCs which I would summarise as follows:

Due to budget constraints, a review of the Council's grounds maintenance activities across Perth & Kinross has been carried out.

As part of this review, the Council is proposing to reduce maintenance on smaller shrub beds and on sites which are less prominent. In addition they are proposing to remove shrubs from some areas and to reduce grass cutting at selected sites.

Reduced Maintenance: These sites will receive two maintenance visits per annum, once in July and once between November and March at which point all litter will be removed. Any weeds present will be treated with non-selective herbicide during the scheduled visit in July. Pruning will only be performed if shrubs are causing a hazard by encroaching onto footpaths and roadways or are blocking sightlines. No other pruning operations will be carried out.

Remove Shrubs: The letter states that any shrub beds which are in a poor condition, do not provide any aesthetic enhancement to the area or are of little value to wildlife will be removed, and replaced by grass or other lower maintenance surface.

Comments welcome: The letter states that the Council appreciate this will mean changes for some sites and communities, and therefore would be pleased to take on board any comments you may have. The Council need to ensure that they are balancing their maintenance schedules with the resources available, however there may be alternative suggestions which would allow them to do this.

They are particularly keen to hear from individuals or groups who would be interested in taking on the maintenance of the areas the Council have identified. There may be opportunities for communities to use some of the spaces to grow food, plants or manage woodlands, possibly in

association with the Woodland Trust (www.woodlandtrust.org.uk) or develop and maintain the shrub beds to suit the area.

Church dedication for Diamond Jubilee Banner

To celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, Cleish school pupils, assisted by Sherri Conn, a parent at the school, designed and produced a banner commemorating the Queen's reign. The banner was on display in Perth Museum for a time before being returned to Cleish.

In February of this year, the school invited Cleish Church to give the banner a permanent home in the Church. A service of dedication was held at Morning Worship on Sunday 3 March 2013, and was attended by pupils, parents and staff, together with the Church congregation.

The main theme of the banner was events that took place in and around Cleish during the Queen's reign so far.

A picture of the banner is shown on the front cover of this Newsletter. Starting at top left and going clockwise, the pictures depict:

- The Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in June 1953
- The sale of Cleish Castle in 1958
- The 'Best Kept Village' prize won by Cleish village in 1969
- The installation of the organ in the Church in 1992
- The Diamond Jubilee street party held in Cleish village in June 2012
- The construction of the Millennium Way in 2000
- The connection of Cleish village to mains water in 1991
- The installation of the lamps at the Church steps, turned on by Sir Alec Douglas-Home who served as Prime Minister from October 1963 to October 1964

In the centre, the three circles depict (from top to bottom):

- the School badge
- the Queen's initials and crown
- the emblem of Kinross-shire.

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

Community art project

A recent art project brought together local community members of all ages to learn new photography skills.

PKC Arts Development Service brought together a group of local residents, young people and staff in the Loch Leven Community Campus as the steering group for a public art project within the campus. The group selected artist Stephen McCullough, a recent graduate from Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art. Stephen worked with a variety of community groups, on and off campus, to explore how to make pinhole cameras and how to create a 'camera obscura'.

Two prominent local buildings, Kirkgate Tower and Kinross County Buildings, were transformed during the camera obscura workshops, which involved blacking out all light sources to create a darkened room. Using a simple lens positioned in front of an aperture in a window, these interior spaces magically filled with projected 'upside down' images from the world outside.

A small publication of the project was distributed to participants as a memento of the project.

Participants commented that they thoroughly enjoyed being involved in the steering group, learning new skills and having their opinions listened to.

Kinross-shire in 'Green Routes' pilot project

A number of local roads are to be designated 'Green Routes' by Perth and Kinross Council in a bid to make them more attractive to cyclists and walkers.

The Council has looked at a similar successful scheme in Clackmannanshire, where speed limits have been lowered on a number of rural roads linking villages that were already being regularly used by walkers, cyclists and horse riders. Speed limits on these roads were lowered to 40mph or 30mph, and signage was introduced warning motorists that they were likely to encounter cyclists and pedestrians.

It was found that the signing of these routes had a positive impact, and that cycling and walking increased significantly.

At a meeting of the Council's Enterprise and Infrastructure Committee on 30 January, it was agreed that sixteen routes – twelve of them in Kinross-shire – will be used as a 'Green Routes' pilot project. Each route has been assessed and current speed limits recorded. The plan would see speed limits reduced to either 30mph or 40mph. Average speeds used by motorists on most of these routes are already well below the speed limit.

- C494 between Powmill and B9097
- U241 between A977 Drum and B9097
- U222 between U238 and A977 at Drum
- U238 between Crook of Devon and U222
- U237 between A823 and Crook of Devon
- A823 spur between A823 and A977
- U223 between A997 and Gartwhinzean Feus
- U215 and U216 between Blairingone, Vicars Bridge and A977
- U213 between Blairingone and Easter Muirhead
- U213 Easter Muirhead and Tethyknowe
- C470 South Lochearnhead Road
- C450 South Loch Rannoch Road
- B846 North Loch Rannoch Road
- C484 Templehall to Kingoodie

Some Traffic Regulation Orders will need to be changed to introduce the reduced speed limits.

Committee Vice Convener, Councillor Joe Giacopazzi, said: "This is a very positive move that could bring many benefits to the local communities linked by these Green Routes.

"As well as the health and environmental benefits, and infrastructure improvements, there are economic benefits that can be realised by providing a network of cycle and walker-friendly routes. Clackmannanshire has experienced an increase in visitor number since the introduction of their Green Routes, and we anticipate the same thing will happen in Perth and Kinross.

"A number of the proposed Green Routes will also tie in with our local Core Path Network and other popular walking and cycling routes.

"We will monitor the success of this project, with a view to rolling it out to the whole of Perth and Kinross."

Sir Alan Smith, CBE, DFC, CompTI An appreciation

On Friday 1 March, Sir Alan Smith, in the words of the American aviator poet John Magee, Jr., "slipped the surly bonds of earth" for the last time at the age of 95. A week later, on Thursday 7 March, a celebration of Sir Alan's life was held in a packed Cleish Kirk, with readings and tributes from members of his family and business colleague Roger Rankin. After the service, friends and family gathered at the *Windlestrae*, which had been built by Sir Alan as a private home before it became a hotel.

Tributes in the national press have focused on Sir Alan's distinguished wartime record as a Spitfire pilot and his subsequent career as a prominent businessman, but in Kinross-shire he will also be remembered for his dedication to the local community, which he served in many different capacities.

Born in South Shields on 14 March 1917, Alan Smith came from a family of Tyneside sailors. At the age of 14 his father, captain of a Merchant Navy ship, died at sea, just like his grandfather, great-grandfather and great-great grand father before him. In a rags to riches story, he and his family survived the depression through enterprise and sheer hard work, but with war on the horizon he decided to take up flying as a member of the RAF Volunteer Reserve rather than go to sea. Awarded his wings in time to be called up on the first day of war in September 1939, Alan Smith joined the famous Tangmere Wing as a Spitfire pilot, taking on the role of wingman to flying ace Douglas Bader, protecting him from enemy fire. Awarded a Distinguished Flying Cross in 1941 with a Bar to the Cross added a year later following service in North Africa, Alan Smith retired from the RAF in 1945 with more than 1,500 flying hours on his record.

Sir Alan's long association with Kinross-shire began during the war when he came north to Balado Airfield as a Spitfire instructor. Here he met his first wife, Margaret Todd, who worked for the Women's Voluntary Service in the mobile canteen. She was the daughter of Herbert Todd of the Todd & Duncan wool spinning mill at the foot of the town. They married in July 1943 and at the end of the war Alan Smith joined his father-in-law's business by the side of Loch Leven. Years later he was to wryly comment on this, saying of Herbert Todd, "I suspect he thought I was going to take his daughter down south so he offered me the job!"

Joining the staff of Todd & Duncan, however, proved to be a smart appointment, as Alan Smith turned out to be as much a high flyer in business as he had been in the RAF. Based on the spinning of cashmere, the company was transformed by Sir Alan from a modest local business into Dawson International, one of Britain's top performing enterprises, with 9,000 employees and annual sales that approached £200 million by the time Sir Alan retired as chairman and chief executive in 1982. Appointed Life President of Dawson International and awarded a knighthood in the same year for services to UK industry, he was made a Companion of the Textile Industry (CompTI) a year later in 1983.

Citing 'work' amongst his recreations in *Who's Who in Scotland*, Sir Alan was an energetic man who thrived on keeping busy. In addition to his role as the "Cashmere King", managing first Todd & Duncan as chairman and chief executive (1946-60) and then Dawson International (1960-82), he maintained a string of additional business appointments that stretched well into his seventies. The list is impressive and includes being founder and chairman of the Scottish Cashmere Association (1964-92), chairman of the Edinburgh-based investment bank Quayle Munro (1982-93), a board member of the Scottish Development Agency (1982-87), a board member of the Scottish Tourist Board (1983-86), a director of the Global Recovery Investment Trust (1981-86) and chairman of Gleneagles Hotels (1983-84).

In addition to a seemingly endless catalogue of business interests, Sir Alan Smith devoted much of his time and energy to public service, mainly in support of the town and former county of Kinross. As a member of Kinross Town Council for 14 years from 1949, he served as Housing Convener and Dean of Guild during a significant period of post-war development in which he was able to use his commercial experience to bring prosperity and employment to the town. As Provost of Kinross (1956-62) he played a leading part in receiving The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh on the occasion of their visit to the Burgh in October 1960.

In a 2002 interview, Sir Alan, who always liked to go to bed early, described how as Provost, "I got away for a year or so with having all the street lamps put out at 10o'clock, because I thought everybody should be in bed." He went on to say that "there was an uprising in the town about that!"

The last surviving Provost of Kinross, Sir Alan made much of the fact that politics played little part in Town Council decision-making, the councillors' sole concern being "the welfare of the people of the Burgh and the efficiency and economy of the various services required."

All of that changed with local government reform in 1975. Sir Alan found himself elected to Tayside Regional Council on a Conservative ticket in a 1979 bye-election. He was appointed Finance Convener in 1981, often spending three out of five days in the week fighting for a fair deal for Kinross-shire or doing his best to prevent rates from rising too sharply. He finally stepped down as a regional councillor on 3 May 1990 and in paying tribute to him for his service as a councillor, former Provost Rosamunde Beveridge thanked him for his "dedication to local affairs". But it did not end there. His chairmanship of the Kinrossshire Day Centre, membership of the Kinross-shire Crime Prevention Panel and membership of Kinross Community Council (1992-98) ensured a continuing role in the community that was recognised in April 1998 when he was presented with a Good Citizenship Award.

Sir Alan's first wife Margaret, with whom he had two daughters and three sons, sadly passed away in 1971, but six years later he married Alice Moncur who shared the rest of his life at Ardgairney. Commenting on retirement, he once said that part of it was given over to "thanking God that I've got good health and a good wife who ticks me off!"

As a war time fighter pilot Sir Alan Smith had, as in *The Aviators' Timeless Anthem*, "topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace." That easy grace was an endearing quality that remained with him throughout a long and well filled life as a successful businessman and as an active and much respected member of the community in Kinross.

Loch Leven - Returning to health, but still more work to do

It's been a long time since 'Scum Saturday' in June 1992, when a large algal bloom spread across Loch Leven. Since then a huge amount of work has gone into improving water quality and reducing nutrient inputs into the Loch. Loch Leven's international importance for wildlife means that it has been subject to detailed water quality monitoring since the 1970s. The results of this work show that the phosphate levels in the loch have reduced significantly. Phosphate levels are critical when it comes to algal blooms and artificially enhanced levels of this nutrient can be highly damaging.

Phosphate can come into the loch from a wide range of sources, including sewage and septic tank outflows and run-off from agricultural land. Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) has been funding some work to help farmers do what they can to reduce the risk of nutrient losses. This latest project builds on the work of the late 1990s which focussed on the creation of buffer strips, particularly in the north-east of the catchment.

Wetter summers (and winters!) mean that preventing soil and nutrients getting into burns and ditches is more challenging than ever before. Soil erosion can be a significant source of

nutrients and we've been using a range of techniques to tackle this problem. Erosion prone crops such as potatoes can be a particular issue and cultivating fields after tattie harvesting makes a big difference. We're also looking at more innovative solutions such as silt traps and one farmer is trialling the use of a 'filter fence' to see if this can help.

Buffer strips continue to play an important role, as do soil testing and the careful use of fertilisers and manures. Keeping nutrients in the fields and out of the loch is the aim of the game. The monitoring shows that there is still more work needed to give Loch Leven a clean bill of health, but so far it's a positive story.

Helen said: "We were so thrilled to win this international competition, especially as marmalade originated in Scotland. Our guests love our marmalades and most end up taking some home with them. We enjoy cooking and especially experimenting with different flavours; the apricot and amaretto has been very popular and goes really well with croissants. Guests often leave Dalqueich with copies of our recipes and we love to hear how they work for them."

Helen and Bob have been making a wide variety of marmalades and jams in their traditional rural stone farmhouse for some years. Their favourites are those with fine spirits or their homemade liqueurs that complement the strong Seville orange flavour. The apricot and amaretto winner is described by their daughters as "jamalade", with the sweetness and fruit character of the apricot and amaretto enhancing the characteristic bitterness of Seville oranges.

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Calling all dog owners – get your dog a good name!

As spring approaches, dog owners are being encouraged to pick up after their dog when out and about. Our annual monitoring records at Loch Leven National Nature Reserve have shown that dog owners have been largely adhering to our local access guidance with regards to keeping their dogs under close control. We'd like to thank you all for your continued co-operation in this matter, as it benefits not only the wildlife at Loch Leven, but also other trail users too. However, one issue that has been raised locally has been dog fouling.

The latest national radio campaign from Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) began in March, focussing on the issues surrounding dog waste, as part of ongoing work to publicise access rights and the Scottish Outdoor Access Code.

Kirstin Guthrie, SNH Communications Officer said: "Our radio campaign introduces the character 'Jess' - a wise border collie - who helps dispel some myths, as well as highlight how not cleaning up after your dog can kill livestock and encourage other people to think badly of you and your dog."

Stephen Jenkinson, Kennel Club Access Advisor added: "Most dog owners understandably tend to be very protective of their dogs, treating them as part of the family and so cleaning up after their pet, wherever they are, is second nature.

"But some owners still get their dogs a bad name by not picking up in places ranging from city parks and paths to informal tracks across fields in the countryside. Worse still, some owners leave bagged poo hanging from trees or on the ground. To reduce this problem, we want people to know that if there's no dedicated dog bin, bagged poo can go in any general litter bin.

"We know some people may think it's okay to leave their dog's waste where farm animals graze, but this can spread disease which can kill sheep and make cows lose their unborn calves. Simply bagging it and binning it wherever you are prevents this needless suffering and protects your dog's reputation."

Scotland enjoys some of the most advanced countryside access rights in the world. These access rights apply to anyone walking their dogs provided they're kept under proper control. The Scottish Outdoor Access Code includes practical advice for dog owners on where they can go and what they can do. This advice becomes particularly relevant as spring approaches, when it's important to properly control dogs to protect young farm animals and groundnesting birds. (Over half of Scotland's birds nest on the ground.)

At this time of year, dog owners' main responsibilities are:

- Lambs: Don't take your dog into fields where there are lambs, calves or other young animals. Go into a neighbouring field or on to land next to it.
- Farm Animals: Never let your dog worry or attack farm animals.
- Safety Around Cattle: Cattle can act aggressively.
 Keep yourself and your dog at a safe distance and if necessary let your dog go so that you can both seek safety. Where possible, choose a route that avoids taking your dog into fields with farm animals.
- **Ground Nesting Birds**: During the bird breeding season (usually April to July), keep your dog under close control or on a short lead in moorland, forests, grassland, loch shores and the sea shore.
- **Planted Fields**: Don't take your dog into fruit and vegetable fields unless there is a clear path, and keep your dog to the path.
- Public Places: Keep your dog under close control and avoid causing concern to others, especially those who fear dogs.
- **Dog Waste**: Pick up and dispose of carefully.

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High Fibre Business Breakfast

Early-rising Kinross-shire entrepreneurs were only too happy, on Wednesday 6 March, to leave the grey mist looming over Loch Leven outside and to make their way inside Loch Leven's Larder for a full Scottish break fast plus an hour or more of valuable networking at the latest Kinross-shire Partnership Business Break fast.

In addition to the conventional sausage, bacon and eggs, fibre was very much on the menu at this month's break fast – fibre optics, that is. For Serge Merone, the Senior Projects Officer, Planning & Regeneration at Perth & Kinross Council, spoke to attendees about the current and future availability (or not...) of broadband, especially in the more outlying areas of Kinross-shire.

Serge explained that while it is not the Council's official responsibility to provide broadband to the communities they serve, they nonetheless strive to facilitate each household in Perth & Kinross having access to the baseline target broadband speed of 2 Mbps. In reality, as one of the break fasters pointed out during question time, there are still numerous properties in this area where even a speed of 2 Mbps is but a pipe dream. And for the unlucky few who live in so-called "not spots", there is no broadband at all.

In a digital age, with businesses relying heavily on access to high broadband speeds, this situation is obviously economically undesirable, which is why the government – along with councils around the country – are ploughing resources into improving broadband speeds nationwide. Investment in copper technology is not seen by experts as a long-term measure, whereas investing in fibre optic "highways" (which are considerably more expensive) could deliver ultrafast broadband speeds of up to 100 Mbps.

Serge Merone stressed that even if Kinross were fortunate enough to benefit from the installation of fibre optic technology (at some future, unspecified time), outlying areas might still struggle to achieve comparable speeds. The one glimmer of hope is that by harnessing the increased speed at the Kinross hub via other methods, speeds in current low-speed areas might at least be enhanced.


As ever, funding will be key to the success of any upgrade, and Serge intimated that while the public sector will be investing in digital connectivity improvements, private investment will be essential, with BT and Fujitsu now the only two remaining bidders for the contract to install the new generation fibre optic super highway.

This was the final business breakfast in the 2012/2013 series, and KP Chairman Alisdair Stewart concluded proceedings by thanking administrator Sandra Ralston for all her work organising the breakfasts and Sid Grant for facilitating networking.

The final meeting before the summer break will be an evening reception, with wine, soft drinks and canapés, at Kinross House on 3 April – it is undoubtedly testament to the success of the Partnership's activities that this event sold out rapidly and is already oversubscribed.

Donate your unwanted bikes for reuse

With 2013 well underway, and many people thinking about spring cleaning at home, householders are being encouraged to pass on their unwanted bikes, bike parts and cycling accessories for reuse to Perth Bike Station.

Bikes can be donated at the Recycling Centre at Bridgend in Kinross. Alternatively, residents can take unwanted bikes, of any age or quality, directly to Perth Bike Station at Mid Friarton, just off the Edinburgh Road in Perth.

Donated bicycles are refurbished and repaired by qualified mechanics before they are made available, at affordable prices, for reuse. Bikes in poorer condition are salvaged for parts.

The Bike Station charity, which began in Edinburgh, expanded into Perth & Kinross just over two years ago. Since it opened a base in Perth, over 7,500 bikes have been collected locally, with three staff and around 15 volunteers working hard to encourage cycling and divert waste from land fill.

In addition to these key areas of work, the Perth Bike Station has also developed links with local prisons and community groups.

Mark Sinclair, Manager of Perth Bike Station explained: "A number of the unwanted bikes are refurbished and repaired during the many prison workshops held throughout central Scotland. The people who work on these bikes benefit from learning new skills and training which prepares them for life after prison. We also work with a wide variety of other community groups, who benefit from their participation in our volunteer workshops."

All the bikes refurbished and repaired during these workshops are checked over by The Bike Station's mechanics before being sold on to members of the public.

Perth Bike Station is open for donations of bikes, parts and accessories Mondays to Saturdays 10.30am to 4.30pm, with late opening until 8pm on Wednesdays.

Bike sales are held weekly: on Fridays from 10.30am to 4.30pm for children's bikes, and 10.30am to 12.30pm on Saturdays for adults' bikes.

101

New Non Emergency Telephone Number for the Police

The new non-emergency number to contact the Police is 101. This replaces the old 0300 111 2222 number for Tayside Police

The purpose of the 101 number:

- 101 is now the main number to call your local police, when it is less urgent than 999
- 101 is the number to call to report a crime that does not need an emergency response to report a theft, damage to property, a minor traffic collision, suspected drug dealing or information about a crime in your area
- 101 is also the number to call to talk to a local police officer
- 999 is always the number to call in an emergency when a life is in danger, a crime is in progress or a suspect is nearby
- 101 is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week
- 101 will not change local service delivery you will be connected to a service advisor with local knowledge and it will still be your local officers that respond
- 101 aims to make the police more accessible throughout Scotland, as well as the rest of the UK dial 101 no matter where you are in the country and you will be connected to the nearest police force
- Calls to **101** will be charged at a flat rate of 15p per call no matter how long the call lasts or whether the call is from a landline or mobile. In many cases this is cheaper than the cost to call the police at the moment.

Security Tips for Motorists

Car crime can be distressing and annoying as it can cause a lot of inconvenience waiting for repairs or for your insurer to pay. A lot of vehicle crime results from individuals seeing opportunities and taking them. By taking some simple precautions you can prevent this happening to you.

Don't leave anything on display in the vehicle. The temptation is there even if it is a worthless item – the thief

will steal first then consider value later. If you can't take your belongings with you, lock them in the glove compartment or boot prior to your journey. Always take personal correspondence, cash, credit or debit cards with you. Never leave any documentation pertaining to the vehicle, service record, registration document etc.

Satellite Navigation Systems: Portable satellite navigation equipment is becoming very popular with motorists – but it's also becoming very popular with criminals. If you have a portable system then keep it safe by taking it with you, together with any cradles and suction pads, when leaving the car. Remember to also wipe away any suction pad marks on the windscreen or dashboard – thieves will look out for these. Don't simply put your sat-nav under the seat or in the glove box, these are the first places that a thief will look. You can also help by following these tips:

- Use a UV pen to mark your equipment with your postcode and house number or your vehicle registration number anything that can help the police identify your property if we find it in the possession of someone else.
- Make a note of the make, model and serial number of your equipment and keep that information in a safe place at home – not in the car.

Keep your car keys safe when you leave your car, even for a few seconds. Always remove the keys and lock the doors. At home, keep your keys in a safe place which is out of sight and away from windows and doors.

Parking: If you have a garage, use it. Always lock your car and garage and if you don't have a garage, try to park in a well-lit, open place. When you park away from home, try to avoid places that are unattended, have easy access and are concealed from public view.

Kinross Community Council

News from the March Meeting

Present at the meeting held on Wednesday 6 March 2013 were: CCllrs D Colliar, B Davies, M Wood, I Jack, M Blyth and M Scott; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and M Barnacle; a police representative (part of the meeting) and 15 members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllrs L MacKay, D Mackay, W Freeman, D West and C Watson and P&K Cllrs Giacopazzi and Robertson.

In the absence of CCllr West, CCllr Colliar chaired.

Sir Alan Smith: CCllr Colliar mentioned the sad passing of Sir Alan Smith. The CC will send condolences to Lady Alice and his family. CCllr Colliar would attend the memorial service at Cleish Parish Church.

Police Report

Speeding (Springfield Road-Wilson Court): PC Allan advised by email that an opportunity has not yet risen to carry out a speed check here. She asked for the name and address of the member of public who raised this at the CC meeting and this was provided.

The police representative apologised for her lateness, adding that the front door to the Masonic was locked.

Indecent exposure, High Street, 3 March: a male has been cautioned and charged.

The police representative reported on other incidents including diesel theft, a break in at Balado Fisheries with malicious damage and theft. The Crime Prevention Officer can advise on personal alarms, burglar alarms, cctv etc. Also, the public are reminded not to leave valuables in vehicles.

Balado residents were concerned at speeding along the A977. The Roads Safety Department could find no evidence of excessive speed. The speed cameras are located in the same place each time and drivers are aware of this. It was suggested that these be relocated. Cllr Barnacle asked that the Camera Safety Partnership look at positioning themselves in the lay-by off A977 at Balado, rather than on A977. There was one fatal accident some time ago. Overtaking on the hatched lines at A977 Balado is occurring regularly. The CC will ask the Roads Safety Department for their comments. The Police are also to contact them.

Future of Kinross Buildings

Town Hall: Missives have been concluded. A new planning application should now be lodged by the developer.

County Buildings: A 'For Sale' board has not yet been raised.

Mill Street (former Social Work Dept): There is a difficulty in relation to the title; the Macintosh Memorial Institute was on part of the site. Research is ongoing.

Newsletter Funds: A letter from the Kinross-shire Duke of Edinburgh Awards group was read out. A representative of the group, Mike Spain, provided information. An application is to be completed, then the CC will consider this request.

Reports from CC members: CCllr West suggested new heading to include a short written report to the Secretary prior

to the meeting, i.e. organisation name, who attended, number of meetings in the past year, issues which were dealt with, issues going forward, anything else. Postponed to next meeting.

Planning

13/00381/FLL Chance Inn Farm: Erection of an agricultural storage shed.

13/00335/FLL Gowanlea, Pier Road, Kinross: Alterations and extension to dwelling house.

Wind Development at Oath Muir, near Knockhill: A Community Liaison Group was established to consider the impact and community benefit arising from this proposed development. The wind turbines will have a visual impact on Kinross. Mr Tom Wood, Independent Facilitator for the Community Liaison Group, was present and provided further information on this proposed development. Being members of the Liaison Group does not indicate whether or not you support the proposal. The purpose behind the group is to allow a flow of communication between developers and the community. Open meetings have been arranged and Mr Wood invited a member from the CC to attend. If we prefer, he can keep us in the loop through correspondence and minutes. A planning application has yet to be lodged and it may be some time before a decision is reached. The proposal is for six wind turbines at over 100 metres in height and each turbine is 2.3 megawatts. Mr Wood left paperwork for consideration by the CC. Cllr Barnacle stated that the application would be dealt with by Fife Council, however, Perth and Kinross may wish to be involved as the development is on the boundary with Kinross-shire. The applicant is REG, Architects - National/International Wind Farm Developers, Based in Devon, Cornwall. The land owner is an Investment Trust based in London.

Wind farms: PKC provided a copy of their Supplementary Guidance and Policy for Wind Energy.

Former Kinross High School site: Proposal of Application Notice received from Persimmon Homes for erection of 90 dwellings and associated works. They propose to meet with the CC, hold a public meeting and advertise in the press.

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Planning application refused by PKC: 12/02140/FLL Land 20 metres north west of Balleave Farm Cottage.

Reports from P&K Councillors

Councillor Barnacle

Speed limit issue (referred to at last month's meeting): the alteration to the speed limit has been approved; signage is awaited. A consultation has been held with Bear Scotland in relation to junctions. The programme should be carried out in the beginning of the new financial year, subject to Bear Scotland co-operating.

Grounds maintenance review: Following the budget review, information on this is still awaited.

Hatchbank bus shelter: Cllr Barnacle confirmed that he supports the CC on this matter and has also approached the Council in relation to this issue.

LDP: Cllr Barnacle referred to his article in the March Newsletter. He has written to the Reporters Unit to comment on the process and has included his full submissions since 2008.

On a question from Mr Miles, Cllr Barnacle confirmed that it was open to anyone to query the planning process.

A report was also received from CCllr West: "In the past month I attended a Debrief Meeting on the LDP at which Kinross-shire was well represented and along with others from places away from Perth City the Officers' complacency was challenged on a number of issues. It was interesting to hear the Officers genuinely express satisfaction on how the process had gone and their delight in proudly revealing that the PKC LDP will be one of the first to be submitted - bursting the myth that was being pedalled about the need to rush the Report. Clearly this was not the case. The only concession I was able to extract was a promise to meet with those unhappy with process issues and this should take place in April."

Budget debate: Cllr Barnacle stated that the budgeting process was not satisfactory. Around 45 minutes was allocated to review four different budgets, involving eight papers. It would be more beneficial to allow a couple of weeks to look over the paperwork.

Councillor Cuthbert commented that the budget process is a complete farce, with 45 minutes allotted to study and consider the various proposals. The SNP budget receives the largest share of the pot with a number of smaller amounts allocated to other areas. He added that this process requires to be reviewed.

Hatchbank: Following further discussion, it was agreed that the CC write to Roads Dept requesting a speed limit.

Balado/A977: Cllr Barnacle commented on the meeting held at Fossoway in relation to the speed limits. The public are asking for a 50 speed limit out to Middle Balado past the Crossroads. The Roads Dept say no to this. The local Councillors are to meet with Jim Valentine and senior officials to discuss the whole road.

Regeneration: One of the applications lodged for funding was rejected. Further consultation is proposed. The Council money is still is place.

Councillor Giacopazzi

Bus stop opposite the Green Hotel: The Passenger Transport Unit will provide such bus flags as are needed. The matter is being dealt with. There is no longer a national standard for "Express" stops.

At the last CC meeting, it was pointed out by a resident of Katrine Place that pedestrians crossing at the bollard to the south side of street were in danger from fast vehicles. Cllr

Giacopazzi organised a meeting between the residents and Daryl McKeown, which he also attended. The problem seems to be from traffic coming from the east and mainly due to privately owned hedges which have been allowed to grow to a great size. Mr McKeown will address the hedge issue and consider other solutions.

Correspondence

Gordon Banks MP: Dates of March surgeries given.

Scottish and Southern Energy: Second consultation paper now available online. Consultation meeting to be held on 26 March.

Green Routes: See articles p. 11.

Scotlandwell Washhouse: Invitation to re-opening on 27 March. CCllr Wood accepted this invitation.

T in the Park Forum: Meeting held on 18 February. CCllrs D Colliar, M Blyth and B Davies represented the CC. The festival will follow the same format as in previous years with no alterations to times or schedules. A complaint was received in relation to the noise from one of the campsites but it was determined that this was not an area run by T in the Park. Traffic management schemes etc were discussed at the meeting.

Other Business

CCllr Scott advised that a number of issues had been raised by a resident at Bridgend. The matters addressed were:

- There is no uplift by the town bus at the bottom end of Kinross. The CC will write to Mr Warrington requesting that this service be extended.
- The right of way from Bridgend to the Pier is difficult to negotiate with brambles and overgrown greenery. The same situation arises in the Sandport area. Community Payback Scheme to be asked to clear this.
- The fence is down in the area to the south of Queich Place and the ground there is extremely neglected. It was commented that this is private land.

Car parking: CCllr Jack read out a letter received from a resident in the vicinity of the Masonic Hall. This was as a result of an incident involving CCllrs Colliar, Wood and Scott at last month's meeting. CCllr Colliar emphasised that parking on the pavements should be avoided.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the March Meeting

CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Bennet, Milne-Home, Pettinger, and Thomson to the meeting held on 14 March 2013. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Barnacle and Robertson, and six members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllrs Cottingham, Halford and Smith; P&K Cllrs Cuthbert and Giacopazzi and from the Police.

Police matters: The Police provided a written report.

PC Allan had spoken to the owner of the horse and cart using Donaldson Park and had advised him of legislation and the possible consequence of breaching it.

Recent crimes included two detected instances of shoplifting and thefts of a trailer, tools and diesel fuel.

Noticeboard: PKC will address the issue of the leak in the community noticeboard in South Street.

The pothole in Church Street had been filled.

Planning applications: The following planning applications in Milnathort were discussed:

13/00280/FLL Renewal of consent. Erection of a dwelling house and removal of condition 9 (Occupancy condition) Craiglow, Milnathort.

13/00015/IPL Modification of existing consent. Variation of condition 9 (landscaping), land to north of Kellieside, Milnathort.

11/01537/IPM Modification of existing consent. Variation of condition 1 (to extend time limit), Land at Pitdownies Farm, Manse Road, Milnathort. – Pending consideration.

The CC content with the above.

Application approved by PKC: Erection of two dwelling houses in Wester Loan (13/00462/FLL).

PKC grounds maintenance cuts: Cllr Robertson explained the reductions. Following discussion, MCC agreed to monitor maintenance activity and to report any concerns to PKC. *See also p. 7.*

Gaelic signs: The MCC discussed the issue of PKC's intended budget (£350,000) for The Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005, noting that the CC had not been consulted by PKC. Cllr Robertson agreed to send the paper to the Secretary. MCC agreed to write to PKC objecting to the proposed provision of bilingual road signs, when local roads are in poor condition, and asking PKC to consider reallocating some of the assigned budget to road improvements instead.

Post Meeting Note: A significant proportion of the £350,000 budget is from the Scottish Government. The proposed investment is for a period of 5 years. A copy of the draft GLP and the public consultation survey is available online via the PKC website at: www/pkc.gov.uk/Gaelic

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PKC Community Wood: The Chair advised that George Lawrie, TRACKS, had reported his investigations into the ongoing problems in Kinross Community Wood. George Lawrie advised that up to three horse-owners had been riding in the wood, and that he had received assurances from two of them that they would not use the wood during poor weather conditions. He had also spoken to Dave Stubbs, PKC Access Officer, who has agreed to speak with the third horse-owner informing them that PKC intended to put up notices in the wood which will ask horse-owners not to use the wood for the next two months till the ground dries out. George Lawrie had also reported that Kinross Estate cuts the grass as part of an agreement when the wood was established.

Home composting: PKC intend to offer a home-composting scheme within 5km of Milnathort. CCllr Milne-Home reported that he had attended a meeting on 14 March with the aim of encouraging householders not to use the green bins for compostable waste.

Horse and cart in park: The Chair had not yet received a response from PKC to the MCC concerns about the horse and cart using Donaldson Park, particularly the safety issues. Cllr Robertson advised that Dave Stubbs, Access Officer, had undertaken to speak to the owner of the horse. Dave Stubbs had also advised that PKC were considering legal action. Several members of the public had also contacted MCC with concerns of horse waste being discharged into the drainage along Church Street, as well as the safety issues in the park, particularly near the football pitch.

Paths: The bird box project in Tillywhally Wood had been successful, and endorsed the value of the wood to the local community.

New matters and correspondence

The MCC discussed the following new matters:

Potholes: MCC's concerns about dangerous potholes in the local area, particularly near Middleton and Tillyrie. MCC noted that Stuart D'All, PKC Roads Dept, had advised that some work had been done by PKC to alleviate pothole issues.

Horse in Donaldson Park: The Secretary had received three complaints from members of the public expressing concerns.

LDP: The Secretary had written to the SG Reporter raising issues with the Local Development Plan, but had not received a response. MCC then discussed the LDP; they were concerned that PKC had not listened to representation from the MCC and the public. In particular MCC was not happy with the process adopted by PKC in what appeared to be a rushed-through LDP without due consultation.

AGM: The MCC confirmed that the Annual General Meeting would be held on Thursday 9 May 2013.

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Comments/Questions from the Floor

A member of the public raised concerns about access to provide care to a severely disabled resident living near the Heaven Scent Café. To access the property it was necessary to use a shared private gravel area, which was the joint responsibility of five householders. The gravel surface and vehicles parked there sometimes made carer or wheel-chair access and manoeuvre difficult. Attempts had been made to provide a more suitable surface, but not all householders responsible could agree and an impasse had been reached. Additionally lighting is needed by carers to safely access the house, but complaints about disturbance by the lights at night had been made by residents. The Police were aware of the issues, but thus far the issues had not been resolved. Cllr Robertson advised that PKC offered a mediation service; he offered to provide details. CCllr Thomson advised that the Church Office may be able to offer assistance. The Chair agreed to speak to the Police to find out their intentions and to express MCC's concerns. The Secretary would write to local charities to see if they could provide financial support to provide funding for improvement works which would be to the satisfaction of all five householders.

The CC also discussed reports in the Courier (14 March) of a recent meeting in Perth, held by the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) to set out the latest news on draining and ditches. SEPA explained that it was not necessary for farmers to contact SEPA before starting work on underground drains or man-made watercourses less than one metre wide at the bed of the stream. It was also permissible to clear sediment 10 metres above or below a bridge on a watercourse of any width. Other larger works required registration or for major projects, licences.

Perth & Kinross Councillors' Comments

Dog fouling. Cllr Robertson advised that anyone witnessing dog fouling which is not picked up by the owner should report it to PKC. If two people witness an instance of dog fouling without the owner clearing it up, then it may be possible to take court action.

Trail: Good progress was being made on negotiations to complete the Loch Leven Heritage Trail.

Police: Cllr Barnacle queried the frequency of Police attendance at MCC meetings. The Chair advised that the police aim to attend six meetings each year and submit a report each month. The Police had been meeting this aim.

HGVs: Cllr Barnacle raised concerns about heavy goods vehicles using inappropriate roads; he advised that HGV operators could install a special Sat Nav showing correct routes for their vehicles, but not all had done so. Information was available on the website: www.tactramconnect.com which shows the Scottish Government's agreed routes.

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Fossoway and District CC

News from the March Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 5 March 2013 were: Sandy Morrison, Trudy Wigman-Duffy, Alastair Lavery, Kevin Borthwick, Angus Cheape, Sheila Anderson; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, J Giacopazzi, D Cuthbert, W Robertson and nine members of the public.

Apologies were received from Rod Paterson and Graham Pye. There were no declarations of interest.

Community Policing: PC Sadie Allan reported a rise in rural thefts, mostly quad bikes, farm equipment and fuel oil. There is now an action plan "Operation Purvis" to address the problem. Vigilance is called for and any information should be given to police. The CC asked for feedback on the Community Speed Check operation. Other community groups were interested to pursue it if it had been a success.

Outh Muir Wind Farm: Tom Wood, Community Liaison Officer, gave a talk about the proposed Wind Farm on Outh Muir. An application has not been lodged yet, but he is inviting a member of the CC to join the group in order to feed back information to the community. This will enable them to be aware of local issues, such as noise impact, visual impact, flora, aircraft, birds, and watercourse impact, also the community benefit aspect. The six turbines proposed are 115m tall and will be seen across a large area. Dates of public meetings in March were given.

Crook of Devon Church car park: Church requested support for funding applications. Sandy agreed that the CC would assist if possible.

Signposting core paths and rights of way: Dave Stubbs gave the details of signage proposals in the area. He is consulting with local farmers and land owners in order to get the way-markers in the best position and with the correct information. There was considerable discussion on this item. Farmers are concerned about paths going through land containing vulnerable or dangerous livestock at certain times of the year. Signage to warn dog owners was considered to be important, with particular signage stressing the dangers at calving time, indicating the months that this would apply. There was also concern about the amount of signage on particular routes, and Mr Stubbs said he would consult with the affected landowners. Core Paths in Blairingone and Carnbo are to follow in future years.

Lambhill wood chip plant at Blairingone: Awaiting feedback. Alastair would write again to PKC.

Travellers' site at Crook Moss: A generator has been relocated and the noise from it has abated. Environmental officers from PKC said that there should be a condition that the site was connected to mains electricity. However PKC legal dept had advised that this was not enforceable. The legal basis on this condition had been queried, and a response from PKC legal dept stated that they could not discuss the basis of the advice as it was covered by legal privilege. The CC proposed to challenge this interpretation. There is still no answer as to why the site is needed

There is still no answer as to why the site is needed considering the local, and surrounding, area has the largest concentration of sites in Scotland.

Crook of Devon water supply: No further complaints so the matter is to be dropped.

B9097: Resurfacing work now scheduled for 18 March for two weeks. A977 in Blairingone, re-scheduled to 22 to 29 April.

CC Rusiness

Green Routes: We had been notified that the loop road green route has been extended to the old road leading to the back Crook. At the meeting Cllr Giacopazzi advised that this had been extended to cover the whole of the U222 at the meeting considering green routes. The CC thanked Cllr Giacopazzi for his efforts in having the route extended. It was pointed out by members of the public that the widening of the footpath along the A977 between Powmill and Rumbling Bridge meant that there would be no barrier between the footpath and the A977 (a very busy road), which would increase the danger to children walking and cycling. The CC supported this view and asked the P&K Councillors to take the point up. See article, p. 11.

T in the Park: Kevin and Trudy attended a meeting. There were few points raised as it had all gone well last year. However, there were concerns about amplified music in the campsite being allowed until 2am.

CPKCC: Kevin had attended a convention meeting. There were only three people present so there was no quorum. It was recommended by those present that the CC organised a quorum in order to close the organisation through lack of interest.

LDP stakeholder evaluation: Alastair attended a meeting. The aim was to improve the consultation on the LDP when it comes up for review in five years time, with a new plan in 10 years. PKC were first to submit their plan to the Scottish Government, which would take around six months to process. After much consultation, it is felt that we have ended up with much of what we wanted. There is to be a zoned site for houses in Blairingone.

Reports by Perth & Kinross Councillors

Cllr Robertson reported that budget cuts were inevitable, resulting in less grass cutting etc. PKC is seeking to achieve a surplus to avoid future cuts and to keep money for staff severance pay when reducing the service.

Cllr Cuthbert had a meeting with local residents on the Muirhead Stables road to the Fife border in Blairingone. Progress was being made and two passing places were to be provided by P&K. It was acknowledged that the three passing places already provided were too small.

Cllr Barnacle has asked for a meeting with J Valentine to deal with the A977 mitigation measures. He also commented that 45 minutes given in Council to discuss the budget was insufficient. He also feels that the representations about the Local Plan were ignored.

Other Business

The snack bar at Powmill was discussed and the CC agreed to email Cllr Barnacle and say, as a result of the planning decision, there was now a considerable amount of litter and parking of vehicles causing obstruction. In addition it would appear that this additional temporary facility had precipitated the closure of the village shop, which was the only amenity in the village.

A member of the public raised the matter of signage at **Gartwhinzean Loan**, which he had taken up with the council in 2011, but no action had been taken. The CC would follow this up. Also the state of the hotel site, and redundant signage was an eyesore and the CC was requested to ask Mr K Thompson to take some action.

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Portmoak Community Council

News from the March Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 12 March 2013 were: CCllrs M Parkin (Chair), M Strang Steel, R Cairncross, T Smith, S Forde, J Bird and R Williamson; P&K Cllr M Barnacle and four members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllr B Calderwood and P&K Cllr Giacopazzi.

Matters Arising

Roads: The following matters are still in hand with PKC Roads Dept:

- Refreshing of the surface painted road signage on the A911 from Milnathort to Auchmuir Bridge.
- Improved signage and road markings at the Wester Balgedie junction with the A911.
- Drain covers collapsing on the A911.
- Resurfacing of the B9097 South Loch Road.
- Replacement reflective signs at New Gullet Bridge on the B920.

Flooding on road between Wester Balgedie and Glenlomond: This problem has been resolved for the time being.

Stephen's Field: There was still no reply from A & J Stephen Ltd to matters raised in the CC letter of October 2012, and the follow up letter of 16 January 2013. The Chairman had spoken to the Managing Director's PA on 28 February 2013, and she had promised to expedite matters.

Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership: The open afternoon held by LLLP at Rothes Halls on 20 February to explain their plans for paths in Fife and Portmoak was attended by CCllr Cairncross. The Chairman asked CCllr Tom Smith to contact LLLP with the intention of joining their committee, as previously mentioned.

Wester Balgedie to Easter Balgedie Footpath: In January 2013, TRACKS and PKC had submitted an application to SUSTRANS for part funding (£49,403) of a sealed-surface path costing £98,807, with matched funding to be sought from PKC Community Greenspace (£14,822) and SITA Trust (£34,582). The Chairman had written to all concerned parties, including the PKC Access Officer, to stress the need for this vital piece of missing infrastructure, and had confirmed the CC's support. Mr George Lawrie of TRACKS is to report on the progress of this application at the April 2013 meeting of the CC. The Chairman was still in touch with the Climate Challenge Fund in respect of possible alternative funding for this project.

Opening of the Wash House: After a long period of restoration, Scotlandwell in Bloom will be holding a grand re-opening of the Scotlandwell Wash House on 27 March. The CC will be represented by CCllrs Susan Forde and Malcolm Strang Steel. The CC congratulated all those involved with this project.

HGV traffic: Elizabeth Smith MSP was unable to attend the CC meeting so the Chairman reported on her behalf. Following her attendance at the December 2012 meeting of the CC, Elizabeth had met with Mr Phil Flanders of the Road Haulage Association, and also with other relevant organisations, following receipt of useful information from our four Ward Cllrs. Transport Scotland is due to combine its website freight and traffic sections so that all are aware of others movements. The RHA (a national body) has enquired about pilot studies in England, which indicate that there are moves to improve signage in areas similar to ours at Portmoak, and to develop a purpose-made HGV satellite navigation system for HGVs. Discussions between Transport Scotland, the RHA, and PKC are on-going.

Elizabeth had asked if the CC could provide the names of transport companies who use the A911, as the HGV Association is generally co-operative if told about any problems that their members may cause. She has contacted Portmoak residents who responded to her traffic survey, and some have responded with names that have been passed to the RHA.

There is government interest in the dangers of HGVs in small villages, following the accident and loss of life at Fairlie, in Ayrshire, after a HGV collided with a house.

Elizabeth will again be meeting Phil Flanders of the RHA at Holyrood, and will report further.

Cllr Barnacle said PKC were to shortly hold a meeting to review road classifications throughout the Council area.

Car park at Moss Road, Scotlandwell: The CC is still working on the provision of a car park at Moss Road. This item will be on the agenda for the April CC meeting, to be held in Portmoak Hall. It is hoped that there will be a good representation and input from Scotlandwell residents at that meeting.

Locked gates at Heritage Trail, Levenmouth: It was decided to have a site meeting to determine the facts and review this situation.

TRACKS proposed path at Portmoak Airfield: There was some discussion as to where this path would be situated, and it was decided to leave further discussion until a TRACKS representative was present.

Gritting and snow clearing: The Chairman has asked Mr Stuart D'All, Deputy Manager, PKC Roads Maintenance Partnership, that the Wester Balgedie to Glenlomond road be gritted at weekends, as well as weekdays, and he has also provided the names of private contractors who can be called upon at short notice to assist with snow clearance in Portmoak during a severe snow event.

A911 Access to field north of Woodmarch. An access from the A911, to a field just north of Woodmarch, has been constructed. The purpose of this access is not known. The CC would determine whether planning permission was required for such an access to a highway.

Traffic problems in Wester Balgedie: The CC is considering methods of preventing the damage caused by agricultural and other traffic to walls and verges in Wester Balgedie. There was also the problem of an already damaged wall, which is near collapse and dangerous.

Reports

Police: The Police Report had been sent via e-mail. There were no incidents to report. Speed checks continue within Portmoak. There has been an increase in rural thefts this year, mainly targeting fuel in remote areas. Operation Purvis aims to specifically tackle these thefts, and will continue indefinitely. Anyone seeing anything suspicious is asked to record registration numbers, and inform the police, who would welcome any information.

Treasurer's report: No income or expenditure during the month. Bank balances at 28 February: General account £417.16; MBW account £355.75; total £772.91.

Planning

13/00278/FLL Removal of extension, and erection of sun room, 2 The Crescent, Scotlandwell. No objection. 13/00401/FLL Arnot Tower: Erection of dwelling house. A new application based on a previous application to which the CC had not objected. The CC will consider this application.

It was noted that PKC does not inform Community Councils of planning applications for advertising signs.

There was discussion about the statistics used by PKC when determining future demand for housing. CCllr Forde suggested that PKC could be using information that was out of date and based on the 2001 Census. Cllr Barnacle assured the CC that the latest information from other sources, such as the Office of National Statistics, was used.

Local Development Plan: The CC was considering, and may comment on, those Schedules relevant to Portmoak, which had been submitted by PKC to the Government's Reporters. A letter may also be sent to widen the context of those Schedules.

Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr Barnacle confirmed that following the PKC submission of the proposed LDP, and accompanying Schedules, two Reporters had been appointed. He would be writing to these Reporters to express his view that certain issues raised during the LDP consultation period had not been reflected in the Schedules, and he was concerned that the consultation process had been inappropriately accelerated.

He considered that there had been a lack of dialogue between the political groups involved with confirming the PKC budget.

He understood that the problems of resurfacing the South Loch road (B9097) would be addressed, although the positioning of blind summit signs remained unresolved.

He had attended a meeting about the proposed HS2 rail line which is to terminate at Leeds and Manchester. He had learned from this meeting that train journey times within central Scotland exceeded accepted standard journey times.

Other Business

View of Wellside Park development from Well Green: CCllr Forde said that this view was untidy, and considering the impending opening of the Wash House, she asked if anything could be done to improve the situation, such as by screening the north boundary of the Wellside building site. Cllr Barnacle said that there was a PKC enforcement officer who could instruct individuals and companies to maintain certain standards. It was however decided that initially the Chairman would contact the developer, to discuss and resolve this problem.

Broadband speeds: The Chairman is presently investigating Broadband speeds within Portmoak with a view to improving these. Any residents who have an interest in this subject are asked to contact him.

Ground maintenance reductions by PKC: CCllr Cairncross queried the basis on which PKC had made these decisions. For example, maintenance for Wester Balgedie had been almost completely removed. The CC would contact PKC to discover the reasoning behind these decisions. *See p. 7.*



Speeding on A911 between Scotlandwell and Auchmuir **Bridge**: A resident had asked for a 40 mph speed limit on this part of the A911, because of the danger posed to children crossing the road to board buses. There were now some 22 private houses along this stretch of the A911. Cllr Barnacle said that he would include this problem when he met to consider lorry routes within Portmoak. He had previously asked PKC for a 40 mph limit on this part of the A911, but to no effect. It was noted that Fife Council had reduced the A911 road to 40 mph from Glenrothes to Auchmuir Bridge, whilst PKC had maintained the 60 mph limit thereafter. The effect of this was that the straight stretch of the A911 after Auchmuir Bridge presented the first opportunity for vehicles to resume higher speeds and to overtake, and this had increased the problem of speeding vehicles on this section of the A911.

Reflector plates at New Gullet Bridge on B920: Following an accident, these had not been replaced. Cllr Barnacle said that he had informed PKC Roads. A resident reported that the anti-skid surface on the downhill approach of the A911 at Auchmuir Bridge had not been replaced after speed bands had been laid, and a road sign had not been replaced on the A911 north of Auchmuir Bridge. The CC would report these two items. It was pointed out that residents themselves can report problems via the PKC website, without having to wait for CC meetings.

Water on road: CCllr Cairncross raised the problem of water on the Mawcarse Road, north of Balgedie Toll. This could be a leak from a water main, and would require further investigation.

CCllr Bird informed the meeting that he had previously told the CC that he would be resigning at the AGM in May 2013. However, he might now not be able to attend the April and May meetings, and therefore this might be his last meeting. The Chairman, and all other CCllrs, thanked him for his valuable and appreciated service to the CC over the years.

Leishman, who was minister of the Secession Antiburgher Church in Mill Street for 51 years from 1804 to 1855, was related to Wright, who was The Rev Robert Leishman, one minister of the Chalmers Free Church in Swansacre for 58

years from 1844 to 1902. John Wright lived in the house known as Talla Park in the High Street which had been built as a manse for him in 1848. Some detective work is required to identify the artists who painted these longserving ministers but the return of these paintings and other associated items to Kinross adds to the body of church archival material already held in the Museum.





75ml water

100g dried fruit

Butter and lightly flour an 18cm cake tin.

Soften the butter and beat in the grated orange rind.

Gradually add the sugar and beat until light and fluffy.

Beat in the egg volks one at a time adding a little flour e

Beat in the egg yolks one at a time, adding a little flour each time.

Stir in the marmalade and dried fruit and mix well.

Add the water and lightly stir in the sifted flour.

Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites.

Turn the batter into the prepared tin. Bake in the centre of the oven at 350°F, 180°C for 11/4 to 11/2 hours.

This is a lovely moist cake, which will keep well.

On Wednesday 13 March the speaker, Ian Smith, gave an informed and interesting talk on Mauchline ware. He traced its evolution from the "secret hinge" snuff boxes made in Alyth by James Sandy, copied by Charles Stiven in Laurencekirk and ultimately spread into the Ayrshire villages of Cumnock, Catrine and of course the synonymous Mauchline where the firm W.A. Smith dominated its manufacture from the early 19th century.

Ian showed us a huge variety of items – the "inimitable razor strop" bearing the arms of William IV, cheroot cases and numerous needlework items.

He surprised us by showing the great variety of finishes used by the factories, from the familiar black prints and photographs to finely executed fernware and the traditional tartans to floral decoration, some with "little people" nestling in the foliage and even the most exquisite hand painted snuff box, surely the possession of a fine lady. He triumphantly finished with two pieces he had found showing Kinross. Not bad for someone who had started out 20 years ago to collect "something Scottish".

Seamab School

In my last Newsletter article, I wrote that I planned to write some articles about why Seamab exists, what we do, and the support we would value from others. This article will focus on why Seamab exists – or, perhaps more straightforwardly, what are we here for? The simplest answer to this question is that Seamab exists because children need us, often due to their experiences when they were younger.

Sadly, some children grow up in Scotland without parents that can care for them. Some children are also treated very badly by their parents and carers. Children who have been through difficult and damaging experiences are deeply affected by what has happened to them. They may have learnt not to trust other people, can't form relationships, don't know how to look after themselves and have developed problems with their behaviour. Children growing up with these experiences have also often not had the kind of care and interest from adults that helps develop language, social and thinking skills.

Sometimes these behavioural difficulties will have helped them cope with very difficult and challenging early experiences when they have been frightened or hurt. For example, running away and hiding can help children cope in a family where there are adults who are unpredictable and violent. But this behaviour, which has helped the child cope with traumatic experiences, causes real problems when the child is in school or with a new family.

Many children who have had difficult early lives are looked after very successfully in foster families. They are able to accept the care foster parents provide and learn to behave in different ways, as well as building relationships. However, some children, because of their difficulties, and often very complex needs, cannot live with foster carers, and need to be cared for by a team of adults as well as attending a school which can help them through specific difficulties so that they can learn. These are the children that Seamab exists to look after.

To help us look after the children, we have employed people with specialist skills and experience. As the children have complex needs, we need to have people in Seamab who understand these needs and can work with the children to make a difference. This is why we have care workers, teachers, a psychologist, social workers, a speech and language therapist and an occupational therapist. We also use therapeutic ways of working with the children to help them.

In the next Newsletter, I will write more about how we work with children at Seamab to support them to heal, grow and learn. This will include how we care for the children, teaching in the school and the therapeutic support we provide.

Kinross High School

Easter is a time in the school year when matters become more serious. The days to the holidays tick away, classes reach a crescendo and exam



talk fills the corridors. Fourth year pupils have almost reached the end of the road in relation to Standard Grade and Intermediate courses. The many months of lessons, exercises and homework will be ending soon, to be replaced by the sharp excitement of the exam room. The situation for years 5 and 6 is very similar, although they have the advantage of real experience. They have already tasted the successes and failures of the exam room. More importantly, perhaps, they have realised the improvement from prelim to fin al exam. The message to all pupils in the senior school, but particularly to year 4, is to get organised.

Whilst the number of lessons left may be diminishing, the opportunity to study is now heightened. Our teachers will have given pupils much good advice as well as the techniques and strategies to use this time effectively.

Parents will be sensing a kind of study fever, I hope, and be mindful of the anxieties associated with this activity. We always advise pupils to strike a balance and to build in some time away from the desk and the notes; some physical exercise is also advised. I am firmly of the belief that we have prepared the pupils well and look forward to the results in August when we can measure those successes. My annual wish is that all of our exam candidates give of their best.

For other year groups the excitement arises in other areas. Course choice is a new feature for our S3 pupils, and they now have the opportunity to decide on the subjects they will take forward to the qualification stage at this time next year. Whilst some may find it easy to leave behind a few subjects they have studied this year, others will not. I know that our Guidance team has been working alongside these pupils to help them make these choices. Many will have gained further assistance at our recent Careers Fair when much up to the minute information was available.

S2 pupils are also coming to a point where they are making choices. This is the point in our Broad General phase of the Curriculum for Excellence when pupils are given the opportunity to personalise their learning by choosing within the curricular areas as well as some additional choice opportunities. Again the pupils have been carefully prepared for this important choice point by our Guidance team who remain available to the young people – and their parents – throughout this significant period.

For S1 the crescendo is the thought that pretty soon they will have finished their first year in High School. They will begin their second year classes in late May and very soon thereafter they will cease to become the youngest people in Kinross High School. This is a big moment for many in First Year.

For staff this is a time for looking both back over what has been achieved and forward as evaluations of our current improvement plans are completed and plans for next session are drawn together. We already know we will be delivering for more pupils next year as numbers continue to grow. Happily we are also looking forward to welcoming new staff into our midst. This process will begin immediately after the Easter break when we welcome Mrs C Cairney,

who will be joining us to take over the leadership of our Home Economics department. I should also congratulate Mrs S Morran who was recently appointed PT Guidance as replacement for Mr D Morris who left us at Christmas time. All of this excitement and Easter as well, I trust that you will have a happy one with only a small amount of chocolate.

The fourth meeting of the 2012/13 session was held on 25 February and the KHSPC discussed the following items.

Headteacher's Report: Mr Keatings described current staffing levels and outlined action being taken to cover temporary and permanent vacancies. He noted that school numbers were increasing which may lead to slightly increased staff numbers next school year. While KHS receives a number of requests for placements of pupils from outwith its catchment area, there is as yet no indication these will be capped.

HMIE inspections have identified differences in schools and PKC are encouraging all their schools to move towards allowing S3 pupils to study seven subjects. Currently they do eight. Practice papers for the new exams being presented for the first time this year are being produced by the SQA. Mr Keatings noted that old past papers will still be useful in many cases. Teachers will be guiding pupils.

Partnership off to a flying start...



Planes make an amazing difference *Flying for Life* in countries where roads are dangerous, and/or impassable. MAF is a christian mission organisation which operates over 130 light aircraft in some of the most remote areas of 35 countries around the world. Isolated and vulnerable people are reached with humanitarian relief. Pastors and missionaries are flown in with the gospel. Very many lives are being saved and transformed both physically and spiritually.

Planes need fuel. MAF in Scotland has launched a "Fuel for Life" campaign and Kinross Parish Church has entered into a partnership with them to support this effort through 2013. The partnership was launched in church on Sunday 17 February when Andy Martin, MAF in the Community Scotland Manager sought support from the congregation.

It costs approximately £5 for a gallon of aviation fuel, ie £200 to fill a 40 gallon drum. One such drum was displayed in the church for 4 weeks in February/March during which time members had the opportunity to prime the pumps by "posting" a donation into the drum. The congregation responded enthusiastically, donating over £1400 - enough to buy seven 40 gallon drums of aviation fuel.

Further awareness and fundraising activities are planned for the rest of the year including:

- For those (aged 16 and over) who prefer to burn off calories rather than fuel, there will be an **adrenaline fuelled adventure** in the Scottish Highlands over the weekend of **Fri 21 to Sun 23 June**. This will be an unforgettable journey, hiking, biking and canoeing 73 miles from Fort William to Inverness.

Portmoak Community Woodlands

The big news in our community woodlands is the rapid action being taken by Scottish Natural Heritage and the Woodland Trust to speed up the restoration of Portmoak Moss. The Moss is, of course, not so much woodland as bog - a rare lowland raised peatbog.

Back in November the Portmoak Community Woodlands Steering Group held a 'boginar', a seminar on the future of the Moss, because it looked as though the restoration project might come to an end and the bog be allowed to turn into wet woodland. The Woodland Trust were worried that the restoration was taking much longer and requiring more money and manpower than they had expected.

One of the speakers at the 'boginar' was wetland ecologist Andrew McBride, who had just been put in charge of SNH's peatland restoration programme, with a budget of £1.7 million from the Scottish Government's Green Stimulus fund. Luckily for us, Andrew was looking for projects that could move ahead quickly and where everyone knew what needed to be done. Our gathering of experts in November meant that we had all the information and advice; we simply lacked the money. We don't have the final figures yet, but SNH have committed many £ thousands to the work of removing unwanted tree growth on the peat dome, the removal of old stumps (which created dry areas) and the insertion of extra dams to hold water in the bog and encourage the growth of specialized bog plants. Since mid-February there have been teams of forestry workers busy in the Moss. It looks a bit of a mess, because of the vehicles and equipment that have had to be taken in, but the contractors have been told to leave us with a tidy site and, from previous experience, we know that, come the summer, new undergrowth should soon cover up the mud. And, most importantly, public access is being maintained throughout the works, so you can still walk the dog or go for a run!

Our 'boginar' attracted not only bog restoration experts but many other specialists, such as Duncan Davidson, from Butterfly Conservation, who has already begun recording moths in Portmoak Moss and whose findings we'll be reporting in due course. One exciting footnote: Professor Des Thompson of Scottish Natural Heritage saw a rare goshawk in the Moss in December. Please let us know if you see any unusual wildlife. www.portmoakcw.org.uk

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Kinross-shire Historical Society



Following the AGM on Monday 18 March, Kinross-shire Historical Society was treated to a wonderful hi-tech illustrated journey around Loch Leven with Willie Shand. Using the music of Gaberlunzie to complement the slides, the members were taken to many interesting and beautiful parts of the county in all seasons and lights. They learned about people and places in the county since the last ice age. The slide show started by looking down from Vane Hill and worked its way round the loch through countryside, towns and villages until back again to Vane. Mary Queen of Scots' imprisonment on Castle Island, the tale of William Wallace attacking the English after they took the castle in 1296, Kinross House built by William Bruce, old buildings in Kinross, Kinross an old coaching town with three fairs and an agricultural show each year were some of the interesting pieces of information that Willie Shand included in the talk.

David Walker gave the vote of thanks, saying that Willie had surpassed himself this time with his use of new technology added to the high quality of his images.

Robin Eadie, President, said that this talk had been a stunning way to end the season. Probus Club

The meeting on 20 February concerned the Battle of Loos - pronounced 'loose' rather than 'lose' - which was known as the Unwanted Battle of World War I. The speaker



was Mr Willie Coupar who had recently been elected as President of St Leonard's Probus Club in Perth.

The reason for the title 'unwanted' given to this battle, which took place in September 1915, was that the British and French side was totally unprepared for battle. This was especially so of the British contingent which was almost totally comprised of volunteers. (Conscription was not introduced until 1916.)

At the end of 1914 the Germans occupied part of the north east of France around Loos. This was a mining area and included an area designated as Hill 70. The terrain favoured the Germans who were well dug in to the most advantageous sites. But there was pressure to push the German army out of French territory, especially after the failure of the Gallipoli invasion in Turkey. Earlier attempts had been made but these were on a narrow front, which allowed the enemy to infiltrate the flanks in a pincer movement. This time it was decided to attack on a much broader front, which would include the Hohenzollern Redoubt in the northern half of the six-mile wide front.

Two Scottish Divisions were involved, the 15th in the centre of the northern half, with units from the Black Watch, Gordon Highlanders, Seaforth Highlanders, Cameron Highlanders, Kings Own Scottish Borderers (KOSB) and the Highland Light Infantry (HLI), and the 9th Division in the centre of the southern half, again with units from all the Scottish Regiments. Six divisions were barely capable of covering the whole front but part of the plan was to use gas.

After four days of preliminary bombardment, the 15th Division went forward to take Loos. Gas was released but this blew back, causing casualties. They managed to capture Loos and Hill 70 but with some 6000 casualties. The Germans counter attacked and pushed back the weakened British attackers, despite acts of heroism. The 9th then attempted to take the Hohenzollern Redoubt. Again gas was released but the attack on the left failed after coming up against barbed wire, the HLI lost contact with the KOSB and although the right flank fared better, the German counter attack was successful and another 6000 casualties were sustained. Again great bravery was shown and Victoria Crosses won, but 12000 casualties had been sustained over a 36/48-hour period and no ground had been gained. Reserve troops under Sir John French consisting of new volunteers did not arrive at the front until 26 September, by which time the Germans had regrouped. Although fighting continued until 18 October, the battle was lost with a count of 60000 casualties.

Jim Ferrier proposed the vote of thanks.

The talk on 6 March was given by Mr Ragnar Ingebritson, a member of Raith Probus Club. This time the scene was World War II and concerned the adventures and heroism of his Norwegian father.

Mr Ingebritsen's talk centred on the northern most part of Norway, known as Finnmark, during World War II. This region bordered Russia and Finland and was an area rich in minerals including iron ore, nickel and coal. More coal is found in Spitsbergen, which is an island halfway between the northern tip of Norway and the North Pole and on the edge of the Polar Icecap. This was an area that was not of much interest to the Germans from a military point of view as they were not at war with Russia or Finland - at least not at the start of hostilities. However, it was of importance as a source of minerals and coal. Mining on Spitsbergen was dominated by Russian and German companies. Because the Norwegian coast line was indented and broken, the ports in the north were virtually ice free; shipping could move up and down the coast in the lee of a myriad of islands without enduring the rigours of the open North Sea.

Thus, when the British started showing an interest in taking over the iron ore trade, the Germans invaded Norway in 1940. They occupied the whole of Norway including Finnmark and up to the Russian border, although the actual presence was relatively small until Germany declared war on Russia in what was known as Operation Barbarrossa. The offensive in Finnmark was known as Silver Fox. Fighting continued until the Russian offensive of 1944 with a hundred thousand men when the Germans retreated from the region while evacuating some 43000 people and destroying infrastructure as they went.

However, before the battles later in the war, Mr Ingebritsen's father, who lived near Kirkenes in a small farmhouse with his own father, close to some German camps and with a German officer billeted in the neighbouring farmhouse, decided in 1941 to attempt to escape. He was 22 years old. He set off with a friend to travel to Harsted on the North Sea coast, a journey of some 750 miles. To make the journey easier they borrowed a bicycle from a one legged farmer. The Germans had purloined all bicycles in the area both for their own use and also to limit the mobility of the local population but had not bothered to search the farmer's barn on the assumption that a one legged man would have no need for a bicycle.

They reached Harsted and boarded a steamer for Tromso but were apprehended by the Gestapo. Despite not having proper travel papers, their story of attempting to reach Spitsbergen to seek work in the mines was accepted and they were allowed to carry on. The ship carried some 2500 tons of coal. On reaching Spitsbergen they joined others on board a ship that was hijacked in an attempt to go to Iceland. It was running out of fuel and food and had to return to Spitsbergen where it was intercepted by a British cruiser and escorted to Shetland via the Faroes. The escorting vessel was a Polish ship called Wastwater.

After Shetland, en route to Orkney, two bombs from a German plane hit the steamer when they were some 50 km off Shetland. They managed to reach lifeboats with 62 on board one lifeboat, which was hit by further bomb blasts. Mr Ingebritsen Snr has no recollection until finding himself back on the sinking trawler. He was one of only five who were rescued from the original shipload. The trawler sank next morning and he reached Orkney on the escort ship. It was here that he met his wife to be.

After interrogation by MI9, he was accepted, sent to Canada for training and ended up as part of the Shetland Bus saga. But that is a different story.

With spring right around the corner, times of change have been noticed, particularly with ducks beginning to pair off ahead of the

breeding season, and Great-crested Grebes and Goldeneye displaying in their characteristic ways. A recent Wetland Bird Survey featured a few interesting findings, including a possible record count of 35 Scaup off Carsehall shoreline, at least a couple of Slavonian Grebes, and a 2011 White-tailed Eagle, identified by it's 'Red 2' wing tag.

To help us do this we'll be using the ever-popular Michelin I-Spy Scottish Nature booklets, and we'll see just how many I-Spy points it's possible to gain on a two-hour walk around the loch. Insect Survey Training Day – Saturday 27 April, 11am-2pm. Reserve Office, the Pier, Kinross.

It will soon be time to dig out those butterfly nets and insect field guides, get those hand lenses ready, and call in the troops again as we prepare to embark on the sixth season of insect surveying at Loch Leven NNR. This project has truly taken off over the last couple of years thanks to the dedication of a core group of surveyors, and the commitment of Dick Alderson, who has recently completed the second series of insect survey reports. These reports have been sent to Butterfly Conservation, Bumblebee Conservation Trust and British Dragonfly Society respectively, and are also our website by available on visiting www.nnrscotland.org.uk/loch-leven/publications. This year Dick has also prepared more user-friendly photo identification guides to the dragonflies and bumblebees at Loch Leven, primarily for the benefit of new surveyors interested in participating in the project. The survey training day is free and open to all, and we will aim to cover the efforts from previous years, as well as discussing our approach to surveying through 2013, and introducing new surveyors to the team.

In addition to this, we will also be teaming up with local moth recorder Tim Brain this year to run a series of scheduled moth trapping nights, the first of which will take place on the same evening at the Pier, Kinross, from 8.30pm onwards. For those insect surveyors interested in broadening their horizons and delving into the more complex world of mothing, this will be an excellent opportunity to develop your knowledge and skills.

Fact of the Month

Farming



I always eagerly anticipate the start of lambing and become very annoyed if I miss the arrival of the first lamb because I am at my other job.

Lambing is exciting and also an exceptionally busy time, so it's natural to feel almost anxious before it starts. My friend who has a flock of fifty ewes expected their first lamb to arrive on 16 March. You count five months forward and five days back from the date the tups were introduced to the ewes to get this date, but like eagerly anticipated babies they don't always arrive on their due date. So imagine the surprise when Gaye awoke in the early hours of that morning, sat bolt upright in her bed and proclaimed to her husband of 25 years, 'I can hear a lamb.' Despite the lambing shed being across the yard and the double glazed velux windows being tightly shut, she could hear the cries of the new arrival. Without hesitation, she pulled on her wellies, grabbed the torch and ran to investigate; she wasn't disappointed and met her first Beltex lamb of 2013. It turns out that the ewe needed a bit of help delivering the second lamb so the quick attention saved her a lot of distress and pain.

I think you call this a sixth sense and it can come in very handy when you are dealing with livestock of all shapes and sizes. Farmers who work with their stock daily and truly understand their natural ways do tend to possess a sixth sense regarding their welfare and habits. I have worked with farmers who knew before we opened the gate to a field if a cal f was with the wrong mother; they could tell just from looking over the herd at a distance if a mix up had taken place and therefore could intervene to sort the problem out and reunite the calf with its mum before it became upset, stressed and hungry. This natural ability to pick up on what's happening is what makes a good stockperson; in addition to using their five senses they have a heightened level of perception that will help avert disasters.

Unfortunately my lambing shed is five miles from where I am safely tucked up in bed so we have a rota covering 24 hours to make sure someone is on hand to hear the new night-time arrivals and assist the ewes if required. We've nearly 650 ewes to lamb in April and next year we hope it will be even more. Never mind a sixth sense, says my family: 'When will you come to your senses?'
