I should like to respond to the comments made by Dr McCracken in last month's edition of the Newsletter. Personally, I believe that anyone has the fundamental right to express his views on any topic he chooses and Cllr Cuthbert, a person democratically elected by the people of Kinross-shire, is no exception. In fact, the experience councillors have in dealing with local issues and delivering services affords them a unique perspective; such contributions to the debate on separation, from whichever side, should have been welcomed.

Dr McCracken's suggestion that national matters are "clearly not within his remit" ignores the fact that nations are made up of local communities. Final Reflections on Referendum Result of 18 September 2014

I have noted the view expressed in some quarters that local councillors should not get involved in national issues, like the recent referendum, and write to refute that. I was at the launch of the Better Together Campaign in Kinross-shire on 27 May and spoke in support of it.

My fellow opposition councillors Cuthbert and Robertson, along with myself, campaigned hard recently in support of a "NO" vote and our opposition to the break up of Britain. My constituents know that I have been opposed to the SNP's separatist agenda all my political life and this will continue. What happens nationally in government has a direct effect on local authorities and I think people expect their councillors to have a view on such matters and to show leadership, where necessary. The fact remains that by the end of its current term, the SNP Government will have frozen Council Tax for an unprecedented nine-year period, with consequential effect on public services locally, cuts that they of course blame Westminster Government for, as with most things.

I was heartened and relieved by the outcome of the referendum in Scotland in delivering a clear majority in support of us remaining part of the UK. In PKC, the NO vote at 62,714 far exceeded the YES vote at 41,475 on a very healthy 87% turnout. The highest ward turnout was Kinross-shire at 90% and I also understand that our ward had the highest percentage NO vote and lowest percentage YES vote in our council area, a fitting tribute to the many folk who campaigned locally.

I voted NO because I don't believe it is necessary to break up Britain in order to tackle Scotland's problems. I still had unanswered questions on citizenship/nationality, currency/financial services, the economy, land ownership reform and pensions/welfare after a seemingly interminable referendum debate bordering on a national self-obsession with little regards for the rest of the UK watching from the sidelines. I was completely against the division of Britain's armed forces in a very uncertain world, opposed to the

SNP's proposed open borders for significant immigration and wanted a say in a promised referendum in the UK on reform of the EU.

The NO campaign won despite the flawed Edinburgh agreement negotiated by Cameron since the question put invited negativity from the unionist side. If the questions had been: Should Scotland remain part of the UK? Do you support a Devo Max/Federal solution for Scotland within the UK?, positive debate could have ensued. There should have been a threshold percentage for such an important vote rather than a simple majority. Whilst I support the lowering of the voting age, it should be for all elections.

The referendum bitterly divided communities, families and organisations; the campaign being full of enmity and intimidation, all caused by nationalism.

I have always supported the Liberal Federal Model for Britain with home rule parliaments for England (preferably outwith London), Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales, with full tax raising powers to fund their domestic programmes whilst a reformed Westminster retains control over currency matters, financial services, foreign affairs and macro-economic policy. I very much hope that the Smith Commission charged with agreeing more powers for Scotland can keep to its tight timescale and get an agreement from the parties involved that takes us closer to this model. I do not think that this timetable should be linked to answering the "West Lothian" question on English votes for English laws that Cameron suggested.

It is now time for the SNP Government under Sturgeon to get on with their mandate by using the extensive powers they already possess to make a difference in running Scotland, rather than continually advocating and campaigning that only independence (rejected by the majority of Scots) is a cure-all.

For my part, I continue to work behind the scenes up at Perth on a number of local environmental, planning and road issues of concern to my constituents for future reporting.

Road works misery in High Street

Kinross High Street shopkeepers already feeling the effects of reduced customer parking had a further blow in October when unannounced gas works took place, involving fourway temporary traffic lights and the removal of all parking spaces between Hunters of Kinross and the Kilt Shop for a period of three days, and disruption for about ten days.

For the first three days of the gas works, the only parking on the High Street was from the Dog House pet shop southwards. (There has been no parking outside the Town Hall since 23 July, due to renovation and building works.) In addition to loss of parking, the gas engineering works sometimes caused traffic to back up to the roundabout at the junction with Station Road.

The gas works were not an emergency, but planned work. However, an administrative failure by Scottish Gas Network meant that High Street premises were given no warning and residents were left wondering where the temporary bus stop was. (The former Town Hall stop was relocated to outside the Kilt shop in July.)

Pamela Hunter of the butcher's shop said she spent "hours" on the telephone in the week beginning 6 October trying to get information and assistance from PKC officers, without success.

Cllr Robertson got involved, emailing one council officer to say: "There was no notice given by Scottish Gas that they were about to begin work in this section of the High Street, so no scheme has been put in place to allow shops to continue to trade. The last thing we want as a Council is to drive businesses and customers away from our High Streets."

After three days of no parking outside their shop, Pamela Hunter managed to persuade Scottish Gas Network to move their van and some bollards to release three spaces. Hunters estimate that they lost £650 in sales on just one day when there was no parking (7 October), and sales are down throughout the period of reduced parking compared to the same time last year. A spokeswoman for Scottish Gas Network said: "We do have a compensation scheme in place for any traders who suffer a genuine loss of business."

Public realm improvements

Last month the Newsletter reported the concerns that some of the High Street shopkeepers have over parking provision

when public realm works to improve the appearance of the town centre take place in spring 2015.

Some business owners were concerned that the number of spaces on the High Street between Hunters and the junction with Swansacre would be reduced. However, Ross Fletcher, a senior roads engineer with PKC who is now managing the public realm project, told the Newsletter: "After our project there will be space for seven cars there."

Cllr Cuthbert explains more about the expected parking provision on page 17.

A public exhibition of the final plans for improvements to Kinross town centre is due to take place on 18 and 19 November at the Loch Leven Community Campus. (See notice from Perth & Kinross Council on this page.)

The proposals include: widening of the pavement at the Salutation Hotel for pedestrian safety, and narrowing of the road to single carriageway at that point; northbound bus stop with shelter at the junction of High Street and Swansacre; southbound bus stop with shelter at 103 High Street (Baillie solicitor) and landscaping works and benches outside Baillie solicitor, Baynes and Bower and the Co-operative.

Exhibitions of earlier versions of the proposals took place in September 2012 and December 2013.

- Improve the appearance of the High Street and create a new square, providing a focal point for the town centre and a sense of arrival/place.
- Improve the attraction of the town centre to the 200,000 visitors to Loch Leven every year.
- Increase the car parking provision in Kinross Town Centre.
- Increase visitor/consumer dwell time, by improving the pedestrian environment, allowing safer movement along the High Street.
- Provide an infrastructure for the town to increase its offering and portfolio of events, by attracting farmers markets etc. to the square.
- Stimulate further private sector investment along the High Street.

PKC staff will be in attendance from 5pm on both nights and invitations will be sent to key stakeholders.

School funding announcement is 'fantastic news'

Parents and local Councillors have welcomed the announcement that a replacement Kinross Primary School is to be built, with occupation expected before the end of 2017.

Perth & Kinross Council announced on 10 October that it had been successful in bidding for funding of £14.5m from a Scottish Government programme to improve the school estate.

PKC recently carried out an options appraisal on two of its schools, Kinross and Tulloch Primaries, with the recommendation that the best solution for both would be replacement, principally due to their high maintenance costs. The Council had allocated £8.5m of capital funding, but this would have been enough to replace only one of the schools. The Scottish Government funding means that both schools can be replaced.

The current Kinross Primary School building opened in 1969. Like Tulloch and another Perth school, Oakbank Primary, it was built using a pre-fabricated concrete construction method under the Consortium of Local Authorities Special Programme (CLASP). These buildings have not lasted well. A project to replace Oakbank Primary School is already underway.

The Newsletter understands that it is a condition of the funding that the building is complete and occupied during the financial year 2017-18. PKC proposes to construct the new building on Kinross Primary School's existing playing field, with the old school being demolished after the new school is occupied. A new playing field can then be created on the site of the demolished building.

A report will be submitted to PKC's Executive Sub Committee of the Strategic Policy and Resources Committee to seek approval for acceptance of the funding and allow the replacements to go ahead.

The Kinross Primary School Parent Council (KPPC) has campaigned for a replacement school for some time. The April 2014 issue of the Kinross Newsletter carried a report of the condition of the school produced by the Parent Council and gave Newsletter readers the opportunity to add their names to KPPC's petition.

Jonathan Bryson, Chair of KPPC, said:

"Kinross Primary being rebuilt is fantastic news. It is particularly pleasing that the new facility will be built in a relatively short timescale and not be at the expense of the Tulloch primary community. I wish them well too.

"Thanks to all those who signed the petition and lobbied on behalf of the children. Thanks to all the council staff involved, who listened to community concerns and then made the strong case to government for extra funding. The parent council look forward to working with them to put in place the best facility that will benefit Kinross-shire children for decades to come."


Kinross-shire remembers

Copy of an email dated 17 October 2014 from Councillor Barnacle to Jim Valentine, PKC's Head of Environment Service

A977 Mitigation Measures, Lack of PKC Funding for Forgotten Road, Underspend on Road Repairs

I refer to my e-mail of 10th instant and my letter of 18/7/14 re the above, noting your further disappointing e-mail response of 13th instant and our subsequent phone conversation about same dismissing my call for a round table meeting of those circulated.

As stated, I do not intend to let things rest and will be discussing with my fellow ward councillors the next approach.

My mood was further darkened by the Courier headline of 15th instant reporting on the £21.8 million underspend from the Council's infrastructure budget for road repairs over the last seven years, despite paying out more than £80,000 in compensation for damage from poorly maintained roads. This underspend contrasts sharply with the overspend by Fife & Dundee Councils. The article also highlighted a two-year unsuccessful battle of one constituent with PKC over compensation.

I am furious on two counts, viz:

My letter of 18/7/14 stated it was incumbent upon PKC to make the necess ary budget provision for the A977 measures they acknowledge are needed, estimated in 2009 at £1.5 million. I also noted that PKC increased local road repairs in 2014 by use of the loan charges budget and reducing recurring headroom, also borrowing recently £10 million for 'favoured investment projects' at very favourable interest rates. In this context, my request for mitigation monies for the A977 appears paltry and yet even that is rejected out of hand. I don't know how you can justify your stance on this matter!

Secondly, I have also been involved in making protracted representations to PKC on behalf of a road user for compensation where there was clear proof of damage due to poorly maintained roads in Kinross-shire. I got nowhere and "wrote to express to officers, in the strongest terms, my disgust & dissatisfaction with their ruling, suggesting PKC's insurers remit appears protection of PKC's financial position and pays no regard to the safety of road users who should be able to expect a reasonably maintained road network or recompense if things occur through no fault of their own".

It is increasingly clear to me that the corporate management team and minority SNP administration at Perth appear fix ated on their grand vision of a greater Perth City, in competition with Aberdeen, Dundee & Stirling, for which money must be found; whilst paying lip service to their wider constituency that expect a reasonable level of service for the few facilities that their frozen council tax can provide. Perhaps you can enlighten me? Kind regards,

New Kinross Primary School

In last month's Newsletter, I made reference to the possibility of a new £100 million of funding coming forward from the Scottish Government for new public sector



infrastructure projects. Since then the Finance Secretary, John Swinney, has announced that the tranche of money is available. Following a bid by Perth and Kinross Council officials, £14.5 million has been awarded to our Council, thus enabling the replacement of both Tulloch and Kinross primary schools.

It gets better. Not only is the money available, but a condition of accessing it is that the schools must be occupied no later than 2017. This accelerated timescale is beyond what I had dared to hope for and is excellent news for the parents of young children in Kinross. It seems the money has been found, not by increasing demands on hard-pressed council tax-payers, but by dint of prudent budgeting by the Scottish Government.

Given that the recently approved Local Development Plan envisaged the creation of hundreds of new homes in Kinross, many of them in the category of 'affordable' housing, there was some anxiety over the ability of the current primary school to accommodate the anticipated increase in the number of children. This concern has now been laid to rest. A User Reference Group will be set up at the design stage, including staff, local councillors and a parent council representative to impart local knowledge to the process.

The plan is to build the new school near the current building, then to demolish the old one. I am aware of the opinions of a few who would like to build the new school either next to the Loch Leven Campus or on the site of the old Kinross High School. Neither is a realistic option. The old High School site has been sold to a developer subject to planning permission being granted, while the site at Lethangie identified in the LDP for a new primary school does not belong to the Council. Moreover, the funding for the new school is totally dependent on the project being completed within 2017, a timescale which would not allow for statutory consultation necessary where a school is being relocated.

In conclusion I would like to thank Councillor Ian Miller, Leader of Perth and Kinross Council whom I know, from many conversations which we have had on the subject, has worked tirelessly to obtain the funding necessary for the new schools.

Planning applications in Conservation Areas

Many people were unhappy with the way the Council handled the Persimmon application for the old High School site.



One of the main causes of concern was that prior to the application coming to committee, the Council's Conservation Officer had placed her recommendations on the application on the Council's planning portal. It was highly critical of the application for numerous reasons and strongly recommended refusal. However this report was removed from the Council's website and was not made available to councillors on the Development Management Committee when the application was put before them. The recommendation from the planners for the application was for approval, which was contrary to the advice of the conservation officer.

When the application came before the Development Management Committee, I moved for refusal. Thankfully the committee agreed with the reasons for refusal and the application was unanimously refused. However the fact that the Conservation Officer's report was "disappeared" and that it was never shown to councillors on the DMC gave me great cause for concern.

To try and stop this happening in the future I have lodged a motion to the Council's Enterprise and Infrastructure committee which meets on 5 November, asking that in future all applications for important listed buildings or for planning applications falling within conservation areas should have a separate, publicly available report from the Council's Conservation Officer. I am hopeful that my motion will be passed and we will never again have a repeat of what happened with the Kinross High school site.

Kinross Town Centre

The Council work will begin in the spring of 2015 to renovate Kinross town centre. I am really keen to see this work carried out. However, the building, which was formerly the Victoria Bar and now houses the Scotbet office, is a dreadful eyesore. I have written to Waugh Taverns who own the building and asked that they take steps to tidy the building up.

Waugh Taverns have responded saying that they will get quotes for repainting the building and the upgrading of the facades. Hopefully they will sanction this work being done. This building occupies a prominent situation and in its present condition makes the whole area look bad.

Kinross Primary School

I am delighted that the money has been found to replace both Kinross Primary School and Tulloch Primary School in Perth. Until the recent announcement that extra funding would be made available it looked likely that only one of these schools would be replaced. Our congratulations should go to the Kinross Primary School Parent Council who have been campaigning for the last nine months to raise awareness amongst parents, councillors, Council officers and MSPs of the need to replace our primary school. It is hoped that the new school, which will be built next to the current school, will be ready by 2017.

Parking worries for High Street shops – I don't think it will be as bad as you think.

I read with interest the article in last month's Newsletter outlining the concerns

of shops in the High Street area of Kinross regarding the Town Centre Regeneration.

During a walkabout in Kinross to look at the proposals being made for the town centre, your local Councillors calculated that the regeneration work, which is to start next spring, will lead to an overall loss of two short-term onstreet parking spaces.

However with the introduction of an additional 16 long-term parking spaces in Mill Street, there will actually be an overall increase of 14 parking spaces in the centre of Kinross.

The spaces which will be lost are mainly in the area outside the Town Hall. This will be turned into a paved area, with no parking allowed, although loading and unloading will be permitted, thereby allowing lorries to make deliveries.

This area is currently unavailable for parking due to the barriers outside the Town Hall (to allow pedestrians to walk on the West side of the High Street).

There will be three new short-term on-street parking spaces on Avenue Road and one additional space is to be created at the end of Brewery Lane, which is currently double yellow lines.

Your local Councillors are acutely aware of the need for parking in the centre of Kinross and will continue to look at ways of increasing what is available.

It is my view that footfall is essential for the success of our local shops.

PKC planners under fire from Kinross-shire groups

I also read with interest the article about Portmoak CC and the Kinross-shire Civic Trust complaining to the Council about planning matters in October's newsletter.

I don't intend to comment on the specifics of the complaints, as that could lead me into breaching the Councillors' Code of Conduct. However, what I will say is that I raised 15 issues with the Director of Environment following the unanimous rejection by Perth and Kinross Councillors of the Kinross High School planning application in May this year.

Many of these issues are getting resolved as time goes by. So for example, I raised concerns with the Pre Application consultation and requested that as part of this, Councillors be given the chance to feed into Pre Application Discussions between the Council and the developer in order to allow them to input their local knowledge at the beginning of the planning process.

This has recently resulted in all Major applications now coming to the Development Management Committee for pre application discussions.

I am still pursuing the question of Conservation officer comments, which I believe must be made visible and have recently received the following comment from the Executive Director of Environment Services at PKC on this issue:

"We are currently reviewing how all internal Council comments and consultations are to be dealt with in the future, but it is likely that in future all comments and consultations will be published. However, by necessity in terms of volume, they cannot all be put into every report produced."

Former East United Presbyterian Church - Mill Street, Kinross

The Former Church at the end of Mill Street has been sitting empty for a while now, attracting vandals and getting progressively more run down.

I am delighted to report that this building has now been acquired by a developer who intends to complete the work on it.

When I met the developer on site, he asked me to arrange for the ground at the back of the church to be cleared as it was Council owned. This surprised me, as I had always understood this ground to belong to the former church. On investigation with officers at the Council, we established that it was indeed owned by the Council and the ground has now been cleared. A vast improvement, I think.

Kilmagadwood Urns

I attended a meeting of the Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust last week and was informed that they are in discussions with academics who have agreed to excavate the urns for research purposes (investigate the contents and clean them up). Once the urns have been excavated they can then be submitted to Treasure Trove, which will then allow museums to bid for them. They will then be available for display.

Kinross is to get a New Primary School!

On 9 October, the Scottish Government announced a further phase of funding for infrastructure projects across the public sector. This included schools projects through Scotland's Schools for the Future Programme Phase 4. This is good news as Perth and Kinross Council were successful in bidding for £14.5m, which they needed to build new primary schools for both Tulloch and Kinross.

So Kinross will get a new Primary school. Which is excellent news.

The terms of the grant from Scotland's Schools for the future means that the building work will need to start quickly so the plan is to build the new building on the current playing fields and to then demolish the existing building.

The aim being to have a new Kinross Primary School built by the end of 2017!

Kinross-shire's Winter Festival

I am also delighted to say that Light Up Kinross will be joining us at this year's Festive Market, with a visit by a "special person" from 6.30pm followed by turning on the lights at the County Building at 7pm.

Mobile Library service improved

Changes and improvements to the Mobile Library service run by Perth & Kinross Council came into effect from mid October. The new service includes:

- Extended services to older people in residential, care homes and sheltered housing;



News from the Health Centre

Influenza Vaccination

We would encourage all patients who are eligible for the flu vaccination to make an appointment if they have not already done so. Those eligible are those over 65 by 31 March 2015, those under 65 in one of the 'At Risk' groups, pregnant women and carers. There are clinics on **Saturday 15 November** and **Saturday 29 November**, so please call Reception and make an appointment.

Childhood Flu Programme

GP practices are responsible for vaccinating children aged 2 to 5 years old. This is a nasal vaccine not an injection. Please contact Reception now to make an appointment for your child. Children at primary school will receive the vaccine at school.

Pneumococcal Vaccination

Patients aged 65 by 31 March 2015 are eligible for the pneumovax vaccination. This vaccination can be given at the same time as the flu vaccination.

Shingles Vaccination

The Shingles vaccine will be offered to those in the following age groups: those aged 70 on 1 September 2014 (i.e. those born between 2 September 1943 and 1 September 1944), and those aged 78 or 79 on 1 September 2014 (i.e. those born between 2 September 1934 and 1 September 1936). This vaccine can be administered at the same time as the flu vaccination so a separate appointment is not required.

'Clip for a Cure' campaign

Two Kinross-shire women have launched a campaign to raise money for the Equine Grass Sickness Fund.

Natalie Young and Rachel Mangto came up with the idea of 'Clip for a Cure' following the loss of three horses – Jasper, Storm and Spencer – to Equine Grass Sickness from one field

Horse owners can shown support by clipping a triangle on to their horse's quarters and donating £3 by texting JSSF60 £3 to 70070.

Grass Sickness damages parts of the nervous system of horses, ponies and donkeys. The cause is unknown but it occurs almost exclusively in horses with access to grass, and it is thought that a type of toxin is involved. The Equine Grass Sickness Fund is a charity raising funds for research into the condition.

Vets from Loch Leven Equine Practice who treated Jasper, Storm and Spencer are actively promoting the Clip for a Cure campaign. Director Liz Burton said:

"This is such a fantastic way of promoting awareness for EGS and the idea of clipping a triangle is such a simple one. Our clients are showing their support and we have already been asked to clip a few triangles at the clinic. The disease itself is devastating and as a practice we feel very strongly about supporting the fund to find a vaccination."

Electoral registration system change

Over the autumn, all residents will receive a letter through the post telling them about a change to the electoral registration system.

Individual Electoral Registration (IER), which came into effect on 19 September, replaces the household registration system that has existed for almost a century with a requirement to register individually.

Many electors will automatically move onto the new electoral register. However, some will need to take action to join or remain on it, which they will now be able to do online for the first time.

Alastair Kirkwood, Electoral Registration Officer for Angus Council and Perth & Kinross Council, said:

"All electors will receive a letter at the end of October 2014 that will explain the change to the electoral registration system. Look out for the letter as it will tell you if you have been automatically transferred to the new register or not. If you have not been transferred, you will need to provide some additional information and the letter will tell you exactly what you need to do."

Andy O'Neill, Head of Scotland Office at the Electoral Commission, said:

"No one will come off the current electoral register because of this change until after next year's UK Parliamentary General Election at the earliest. We will run further campaigns next year to help inform people across Scotland of the change to the registration system."

"One hundred years on, we are all connected to the First World War, either through our own family history, the heritage of our local communities or because of its long-term impact on society and the world we live in today."

(Imperial War Museum, First World War Centenary website.)

Throughout 2014, the Newsletter is featuring brief histories of some of the local men who died in WWI and whose names appear on war memorials in Kinross-shire.

Readers may be interested to know that there is a comprehensive history of Kinross-shire WWI servicemen, researched by Sgt Alastair G Smith, in the Kinross (Marshall) Museum at the Loch Leven Community Campus. This can be consulted during Museum Study opening hours (Thursdays, 10am-8pm and Saturdays, 10am-1pm).



2nd Lieutenant Herbert Norman Scott Anderson

Unusually in this sequence, 2nd Lieutenant Herbert Norman Scott Anderson of the Royal Flying Corps was not killed in action. He was an Officer in the RFC. Most air fighting during the First World War took place near the trench lines, the responsibility of the Air Force being reconnaissance and spotting for Artillery, locating the exact position for Artillery targets. Only balloon observers were issued with parachutes during the First World War so pilots and observers of single-seater and two-seater aircraft had little chance of survival if they were hit or their planes suffered structural damage in air combat. The casualty lists were grim.

2nd Lieutenant H N S Anderson was the son of Murdoch Christie Anderson, the Provost of Kinross, and of Josephine Lydia Anderson, who lived at The Hollies. He had been at School at Merchiston in Edinburgh.

Herbert died on 24 December 1917, not at the front but on a training exercise. It was 8.30am and he was flying in Yorkshire where the plane was observed from the local village simply falling out of the sky and crashing on to a golf course. He was treated for his wounds at the local Cottage Hospital but he died shortly thereafter. His body was brought back to Kinross and he was buried at the Kinross East Burying Ground, 18 years of age. A large group of local people were in attendance.

There was an inquest in Yorkshire into his death and the evidence was that he was doing "stunts", which were defined as anything out of the normal to acquaint the pilot with the plane and how it operated. He was doing spins from 1500 feet down to 400 feet, had completed several that morning but on the last one he lost control and crashed.

Twelve years later Murdoch and Josephine Anderson suffered the loss of their only daughter, Kathleen, who was Captain of the 1st Kinross-shire Girl Guides. She drowned while endeavouring to save the life of a guide at St Andrews Bay on 2 August 1929, aged 26.

Community Policing – a multi agency approach

Some residents may have seen some new faces amongst the community during weekend evenings recently.

These are the Community Safety Wardens based in Perth who are currently working along with a number of other agencies, including Police Scotland, to tackle anti-social behaviour in the Kinross area.

Police Scotland have recently received a number of complaints from local residents regarding vandalism and anti-social behaviour and the arrival of the Community Wardens is part of an action plan agreed following a multi-agency meeting held at Kinross Police Office at the beginning of October which was attended by representatives from the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, Perth and Kinross Community Safety Team and Youth Development. The Wardens, who have been very successful in Perth and Blairgowrie, will be based in Kinross for a number of weeks. Their role is one which includes:

- Engaging with all members of the local community and developing strong links with local groups, partner agencies and voluntary organisations.
- Developing a proactive approach in supporting community members to create a positive, strong, safe and attractive community.
- Acting as local contact point for residents' enquiries.
- Regularly liaising with local area housing agencies, Police Scotland, local schools, educational establishments and other internal and external agencies and voluntary groups.
- Assisting in the identification of community safety priorities in communities.

Whilst there is engagement with a number of agencies, it is really important that the community become involved. It is only by reporting your concerns and providing information to the police and other agencies that they can begin to make a difference.


House break-ins

There have been recent break-ins to houses in the Kinross area and residents are reminded to make their homes as secure and safe as possible.

Jewellery appears to be the main items stolen in the recent thefts and residents should consider the safest place to store these items.

We repeat security information from last month:

Beware the opportunist thief, as they will take every opportunity to exploit poor security at and around people's homes. Very often it is the simplest security measures that can make the difference and stop crime from happening in the first place. First and foremost, lock front and back doors, as well as windows, even when at home and especially overnight.



Nowadays, it is common for people to store expensive goods and equipment in their sheds, garages and outbuildings — which is precisely why householders should take steps to ensure their belongings are safe and make life as hard as possible for the opportunist thief. Tools and ladders and even garden furniture should also be put away and never left out for thieves to steal, or use to commit crime.

Be a good neighbour and look out for any suspicious activity within your community. Look out for other people living around you, particularly older or vulnerable neighbours.

Tell the police immediately if you have any reason to be suspicious about any persons or vehicles. Along with community safety wardens, our officers regularly carry out high visibility patrols across the area. They will respond to ongoing incidents and react to information passed to them by the public. We would urge residents to report crime when they see it happening, or where they have suspicions that something is going on.

Some points to consider:

- Ensure that keys are not left within door locks.
- Consider getting a house alarm fitted.
- Mark all valuables with a UV pen with the relevant postcode and house number. If stolen items are recovered by the police, it is much easier to return them to the owner if this has been done.
- Make it more difficult for criminals to simply unscrew locks or hinges of shed doors by fitting carriage bolts, or clutch head security screws. Another method of stopping screws being removed is to fill the heads with epoxy resin.
- Fit a curtain to a shed window.
- Sensor-operated lighting is a convenient and an effective deterrent.
- Thread steel cable through removable property and secure it to a building.
- Consider the use of an intruder alarm for sheds, garages, or outbuildings.
- NEVER leave the shed, garage, or outbuilding unlocked when unattended.

Kinross Community Council

News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 1 October 2014 were: CCllrs D Colliar (Chair), C Watson, M Scott (Secy), B Davies, G Thomas, I Jack and W Freeman; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and W Robertson and eight members of the public.

Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs D Mackay, M Blyth and D West and P&K Cllr Barnacle. A letter of **resignation** was received from Malcolm Wood due to work commitments. The Vice-Chair has spoken to him and hopes to persuade him to remain on the committee but to take a few months off. There may be a vacancy for a casual member.

Declarations of interest: none.

Police report: none.

Persimmon Homes cancelled as they have not completed the information to be presented. They asked and the CC agreed that they could attend the November meeting and provide the presentation on the High School site.

Minutes of Meeting of 3 September: CCllr Thomas suggested that the reference to 90% in relation to Persimmon Homes be deleted as some people were still unhappy about this proposal. Also with reference to Perth and Kinross Credit Union the sentence should be amended to read "educate and help people to budget". With these amendments, the minutes were adopted.

Newsletter charity accounts: The Treasurer, Ross McConnell, advised that the accounts are not yet complete.

Newsletter fund disbursements: Nothing to report.

High Street Regeneration: CCllr Freeman took part in a recent walk over the site and reported on this meeting and the works to be undertaken. This information can be found on the Council website. It was noted that the road [pavement] widening at the Salutation does not include the area at the opticians and that the give-take single lane will be wide enough for a bus. A member of the public stated that he still has grave concerns regarding the traffic flow and the lack of pedestrian crossings and suggested that a trial should be undertaken. Mill Street surgery [most recently PKC Social Work Dept] is to be demolished and will provide 19 car parking spaces. Mention was made to the fact that many drivers park outside the shop they are visiting. Once the works have been carried out it was hoped that more traffic would use the link road and avoid the centre of the town unless they had business to conduct. Mention was made to the emergency services and their progress through the High Street in light of the proposed works. Following further discussion it was agreed that the Councillors would approach the Council with a view to setting up a trial over a few months. The question of whether traffic wardens would monitor the restricted parking was also raised.

Scotbet premises: Cllr Robertson stated that he had written to the owners in relation to the state of their building. It was agreed that the CC should also write in this connection.

Primary School: Report due this month from PKC.

Oath Appeal: Notification that the appeal has been dismissed and that this may go to Committee in October.

North Hill Wind Farm: Scoping Report received from PNE Wind UK in relation to North Hill Wind Farm, south east of Dunning.

Reports from Perth & Kinross Councillors

Cllr Robertson: Nothing to add.

Cllr Cuthbert: Hall [former church] in **Mill Street**: Cllr Cuthbert is pursuing the owner of the ground at the rear to request that this be tidied up. The developer has advised that the ground in question is in the possession of the Council.

Cllr Cuthbert is also pursuing the matter of the **white vans** at the bottom of the High Street and has asked Council Officers to check this out.

Sainsbury's junction: Cllr Giacopazzi has raised this with the Council. If the trees were cut back visibility would improve. Cllr Giacopazzi will monitor this and pursue if no response within the next few weeks.

Speed Limit: Suggested that the road from the roundabout at the end of Hopefield down to the Industrial Estate should be 40 mph. CCllr Colliar also questioned the fact that 20 mph limit run along the centre of the town, along the side streets to the east but nothing to the west. A suggestion was made that Bowton Road and part of Montgomery Street should have a 20 mph limit. Cllr Giacopazzi will look into this.

Correspondence

T in the Park 2015: Copy of PAN received. As it is in Strathallan, Kinross CC will make no comment.

Former High School site: Copy of communication from Civic Trust received.

War memorial: Following Listed Building Consent and appointment of the contractor, works will start on site by 6 October and will take 4 weeks with the anticipated

completion date being 31 October. The contractor is aware of the objective to have the works completed and site available for 9 November.

Other Competent Business

977/Tillyochie: CCllr Jack mentioned that there was what appeared to be a camera on the top of the mast. It was mentioned that this was probably in relation to the Ryder Cup. CCllr Freeman commented that there was something similar in Milnathort.

Street Lights: CCllr Davies commented on the lighting in the High Street/Muirs and asked if the shadows created between each set of lights meet the standard lighting requirements and asked if these could be clarified. Again no consultation was provided and we were not aware of any decision to change the bulbs. The CC will to write to the Council on this matter.

Agenda procedure: CCllr Thomas questioned a procedural issue in relation to Persimmon appearing on the agenda before the previous Minutes were approved. In terms of the Standing Orders any variation should be decided by the CC at a meeting and approval sought from the Council. CCllr Colliar will request clarification from the CC Liaison Officer. **Shop windows**: Mention was made to the recent spate of vandalism and broken windows in Kinross.

Skips at Bridgend: No assistance is offered for infirm or disabled people. This may be due to the Health and Safety Act. Cllr Robertson will check this out.

Hedges: Cllr Giacopazzi advised that the property was vacated. No one appears to be responsible for the corner of Wilson Court. When the properties were built part of the planning conditions was that the hedging be planted as a screen. One resident removed this and erected a fence – they have been asked to replace the plant. Cllr Giacopazzi will look into this.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the October Meeting

CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Cottingham, Halford, Milne-Home, Pettinger and Smith to the meeting held on 9 October 2014. Also in attendance were P&K Cllr Giacopazzi and four members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllrs Bennet and Thomson, from P&K Cllrs Barnacle, Robertson and Cuthbert, and from the Police.

Police matters: The Chair read out extracts from the report provided by Police Scotland:

- Recent incidents of youths knocking on doors and then running away: Community Wardens have been deployed in the area on Friday and Saturday evenings for the forthcoming weeks.
- Reports of the fts from MB Cars, Butterwell, and trailers from K-Trailers at Mawcarse.
- Warnings of bogus workmen, fraudulent letters asking for bank details, and individuals attempting to sell counterfeit goods.

The Chair reported that he had received a letter from Police Scotland, responding to MCC's request for a more comprehensive monthly report covering Kinross-shire, rather than just the CC's area. Police Scotland refused the request, because such a report would create multiplicity of crime reporting, leading to distorted statistics.

Following a brief discussion, Cllr Giacopazzi advised that he had attended the Kinross CC meeting where this item was discussed, and no objections were raised; he understood that the flats would be made up of 'affordable housing'.

Kinross-shire Civic Trust Complaint to PKC: The Chair explained that the Kinross-shire Civic Trust had submitted a formal complaint about planning procedures at PKC and specifically the "quality and standard of report of handling 13/02314/CON" - Conservation Officer's report which was initially displayed on and subsequently withdrawn from the PKC Planning portal. The MCC discussed the complaint at length, and members were concerned that in future CCs and members of the public would not have access to such reports. Cllr Giacopazzi explained that, previously the Conservation Officer's reports were "external to the Planning Department" although from within PKC, and were therefore displayed on the planning portal. But a subsequent reorganisation within PKC had drawn the Conservation expertise into the Planning Department, and therefore release of conservation reports was now at the discretion of the Planning Officer.

Scottish Water Sewage Works: Cllr Giacopazzi informed the CC that Scottish Water had cancelled its current plans for sewage works in the village. The CC expressed satisfaction that residents and businesses would no longer suffer the disruptions envisaged early in 2015.

Ochil Hills Hospital Water Appeal: The Chair attended the appeal hearing held on 7 October, together with CCllr Thomson. He briefed the MCC as follows: The crux of the issue is that approximately 35 homes draw water from the ground nearby and almost all have had supply issues in extended dry periods in the past. The general consensus amongst local residents is that 35 extra homes drawing on potentially the same source of water could be disastrous.

SEPA gave detailed explanations of why the new boreholes would probably not affect the other properties and the Council confirmed that if any new private supply failed it would be up to the new owners to solve the problem. Neither PKC nor the developer would be liable.

The developer admitted that the only reason the 2007 application was amended to include mains water was to obtain planning permission. Since then mains water has been brought half way to Upper Tillyrie, and yet the developer remains resolutely against it.

Following a lengthy discussion, including members of the public, the MCC noted that the Reporter's decision would be issued by Christmas 2014.

New Matters and Correspondence: The MCC discussed the following:

CCllr Milne-Home advised that the Kinross-shire Civic Trust had been conducting a **historical survey** of central Milnathort; he proposed that a member of the Trust be invited to the next meeting of MCC to brief the CC and members of the public on their findings. The CC supported the proposal, and CCllr Milne-Home agreed to invite the Trust to be represented at the next meeting of MCC on 13 November.

CCllr Milne-Home also proposed that the CC in future sits sideways on to the projector screen, so that all present could read the information presented there; the CC agreed.

The Secretary advised that a new park bench had been installed in Donaldson Park, at no expense to MCC. The Chair recorded MCC's gratitude to PKC.

CCllr Smith asked that **congratulations** be recorded on behalf of the CC to **Milnathort in Bloom** on receiving a Take a Pride in Perthshire Gold Award in the large Village Category 2014, and to **Graeme Stewart** for an Outstanding Contribution Award in recognition of his role in the restoration of Orwell War Memorial.

The Chair requested that PKC provide a **wreath** for MCC to lay at the War Memorial on the 9 November **Remembrance service**; Cllr Giacopazzi agreed to pass the request to PKC.

Comments/Questions from the floor: A member of the public advised that the Fochy/Back Burn, in the vicinity of the Cross, had become overgrown with weeds and would slow down the flow. Cllr Giacopazzi agreed to raise the issue with PKC.

Comments by P&K Cllr Giacopazzi

Build-out of the pedestrian crossing in South Street was in PKC's plan for 2015/16, but if funding became available sooner, the project may be brought forward.

PKC finance: During a full meeting of PKC, where the audited statements for FY 2013/14 were presented, it was shown that PKC's revenue budget (running costs) expenditure came in at £304 million against a projected budget of £315 million.

At the same meeting, information from the UK Office of Budget Responsibility warned that it was forecasting a reduction in funding from 2018/19 to devolved governments, because of a reduction in projected GDP. Noting that 50% of the Holyrood Parliament's budget is ring-fenced for NHS Scotland, PKC's financial staff have predicted that cumulative savings over a five year period could amount to about £13.1 million at best case, through £52.8 million in the medium pain case, to up to £91.7 million at worst case. Cllr Giacopazzi explained that PKC has been setting aside savings to build resources for use in future years. He believed that PKC was therefore better placed to deal with reduced funding in future years that some other Councils.

The Next Meeting of Milnathort CC will take place on Thursday 13 November 2014 in Orwell Church Hall, commencing at 7.30pm.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 14 October 2014 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), B Calderwood (Deputy Chairman) and T Smith; Ward Cllrs W Robertson and D Cuthbert and three members of the public.

Apologies: CCllrs R Cairncross, R Williamson and S Forde and Ward Cllrs M Barnacle and J Giacopazzi.

Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

Stephen's Field: The Chairman has written to A&J Stephen seeking to reactivate the proposed transfer of the field and seeking a meeting to make progress. The last two houses in the Whitecraigs development are likely to be completed and sold in the early part of next year.

Dog litter bins: Cllrs reported that PKC will be putting a bin, which they will empty, in the carpark at Loch Leven's Larder, rendering the private one redundant.

Police: A report from the police was received highlighting: the hazards of driving in Autumn weather; flytipping of hazardous articles with a request for reports from witnesses; fraud letters seeking bank details to secure substantial winnings from lotteries; and the possibility that certain charity collectors may not be genuine.

The Chairman had taken up with the police the failure to mention in the report the break-in and theft at Wester Balgedie farmhouse. The police had no record of this crime having been reported to them. It is essential that crimes are reported to the police in the public interest.

Treasurer: The CC's accounts at the end of September 2014 recorded: a balance of £615.97 in the General Account and £571.19 in the Michael Bruce Way Account giving a total of £1,187.16. However, 75% of the Paths for All grant for work on the Michael Bruce Way had been subsequently received and credited to the MBW account, which now stood at £1696.19.

Planning: The CC considered the following new applications:

14/01535/FLL Site West of Main Street, Scotlandwell: Erection of dwelling house (change of house type on plot 5 approved under 08/01509/FLL). No comment.

14/01482/FLL Land 50 metres SE of Moucums View, Scotlandwell: Erection of a dwelling house. The CC had agreed to comment on the height of the proposed house and the need for a landscape plan.

14/01620/IPL Erection of a dwelling house 200m south east of Springfield Farm, Wester Balgedie (in principle). The Chairman's attention had been drawn to this application that day. Although lodged on 17 September it had not appeared in the weekly list or been notified otherwise to the CC. The consultation period had therefore not yet started but on advice of the ward councillors the CC gave preliminary consideration to the application. The application stated that the house was for a farm worker but there was no further information. The CC would write to PKC asking why they had not yet been formally notified of the application and drawing attention to the fact that more information would be required to justify the business need for the house in the face of PKC's policy for Housing in the Countryside.

These were the unanimous decisions of the CC.

Progress with applications

14/00707/FLL. The Lomond Inn, erection of 5 houses. The CC noted that no reply had been received to its **complaint** within the period specified by PKC and the Chairman had

written again about this. He had received apologies and assurances that the matter would be dealt with.

Cllr Robertson reported that he had lodged a motion with PKC that **conservation reports** in relation to application affecting conservation areas should be published. This would be debated at the beginning of November.

Roads: The CC noted:

West Bowhouse. The report of the planning enforcement officer was still awaited. If he confirms that the effective sight line to the west is short, the roads department may have to reconsider its current view that there is no justification for a speed limit at this location.

School. There is to be an experimental 20mph speed limit from Main Street up to the area around the school; this will be monitored. As a separate exercise, the school and road safety officers will monitor parking in the streets around the school.

Gritting and snow preparation. CCllr Calderwood was due to meet with Mr Sloan of Springfield to find out what he would wish to see in a contract for snow clearing. His concerns appeared to be the extent of the responsibility and the timing of payment.

CCllr Calderwood reported that most of the items on his 'wish list' prepared a year ago had been carried out and he was preparing a new one. Two items will be repair to the pavement outside the Kinnesswood shop and chasing up the provision of a grit bin for Bishop Terrace.

Cllr Cuthbert would obtain clarification as to how far the new cats eyes would extend down the A911.

Paths: CCllr Tom Smith reported that:

Michael Bruce Way: The PKC grant had been approved, subject to a structure and flooding survey, which would be carried out the next day. That grant and the balance of the Paths for All grant would be paid when work was completed. The contractors were due to start work at the end of the month.

The paths group would meet before the end of the month to decide on priority works. The letter from the Glenlomond residents requesting a path to Wester Balgedie would be one of those considered. It was suggested that signage should also be considered as a priority as the signage in Portmoak suffered in comparison with that in other parts of Perthshire.

Ward Councillor Reports: Cllr Cuthbert reported that a postgraduate was going to clean up the Kilmagadwood urns at the developer's expense to put them into an acceptable state for treasure trove. Thereafter they would be available for distribution to interested museums.

Other Business

The CC's **congratulations** to Kinnesswood in Bloom and Scotlandwell in Bloom for winning their respective trophies were expressed; the secretary would write to this effect to the two organisations.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 11 November 2014 at Portmoak School.

News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 7 October 2014 were: CCllrs S Morrison, T Duffy, K Borthwick, A Lavery, A Cheape and G Pye; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert and W Robertson; and eight members of the public.

Apologies: CCllr R Paterson and P&K Cllr J Giacopazzi.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: No Community Police officer was present, and no Police report was received. Note that future attendance will depend on shift patterns and incidents.

Sergeant Williams notified us that the email address to be used to contact our local community officer is: Taysidekinross-shireCPT@scotland.pnn.police.uk This mailbox is also monitored by Sgt Williams ensuring any messages sent to it will be actioned. Cllr Barnacle has spoken to Inspector Sangster about the reduced attendance at CC meetings, and was told that the above mailbox should be used to raise issues.

A member of the public observes that speeding through Blairingone is a continuing problem that seems not to be being addressed by the Police. The CC will take this up with the Police.

Ryder Cup Traffic Plan: General view was that it worked very well for attendees, although it was considered that the road closures and changes seemed a little excessive. Communication to residents could have been more extensive. An Auchterarder resident contacted the CC complaining about the money spent on the road and rail improvement totalling £7M.

Criminal Justice Unpaid Work Team: No response as yet from Carnbo and Crook of Devon Village Halls to request for work proposals. See also Dunning Glen item below.

Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: Awaiting update.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle reports that the new wall is complete, and a new location has been proposed. Concern about nearby trees damaging the wall has been addressed. However in view of the closeness of the First World War remembrance events, it has been agreed that the move of the memorial will now be postponed until next spring.

Crook Moss Travellers' site: The deadline to comply with the conditions imposed by PKC is the end of October. Cllr Robertson has received a revised set of conditions dated 3 September. Some of the conditions, including water supply, have now been pushed out to January next year. Some vehicles were seen in the paddock area, but have now been removed again.

Blairingone Community Workshop: Kevin reported on the results of a meeting between the consultants of the landowners (Mr Stewart and Mr Manclark) together with representatives of PKC's planning department: A strategic plan will be developed and brought to the residents for discussion.

Lambhill Chipping plant: It's reported that Malcolm and Callum Snowie are happy to meet members of the community at any time to explain what's going on, how they are operating within their consent, etc. Cllr Barnacle will pass this on to Nick Brian tomorrow with the hope that the long-proposed site meeting with the planners, Councillors and Community Councillors can finally be arranged.

Crook Moss community acquisition: No further action until the position about future developments in this area is clarified with the landowner.

Dunning Glen: Thanks to Sergeant Williams of Police Scotland who organised a clean-up using the Unpaid Work Team, and they are prepared to do it again. However this is only a short-term solution.

Fossoway Primary School: The community is extremely pleased with the improvement in all aspects of the education experience; however they wish to be assured that PKC will actively monitor the school, providing any necessary assistance to maintain and develop this welcome improvement.

Landscape areas in Kinross-shire: This CC is in support of this report based on Cllr Barnacle's review. Cllr Barnacle notes that the full report will be available to this CC later this month, and once it has been reviewed the CC will add its own comments.

A977 defects: There have been several letters from local residents complaining about the surfacing of the road through Crook of Devon. Our councillors have also followed this up. A response has been received from Stuart D'All agreeing to carry out some repairs immediately and to schedule repositioning of road gullies next year – the latter should help to reduce noise from large vehicles.

Members of the public raised several issues about the quality of resurfacing work and repairs, several of which are already breaking up. Are the contractors carrying out this work being adequately supervised?

In spite of numerous attempts by our Councillors to raise this issue, there is no sign of any long-term plan being created to address the A977.

Waulkmill Play Area: Is currently under refurbishment.

Community Empowerment Bill: The CC has responded to this proposal, and generally welcomes the tone and thrust of the proposal. Community Planning only mentions representatives from public service providers, not the community. How is the community going to be involved? Community organisations, the principle of involvement is welcomed, but there has to be a means by which the service provider is judged on their involvement. The CC is in agreement regarding the taking over of public building.

Community Council Business

Sandy attended the Scottish Rural Parliament inaugural regional event, which follows a model of similar bodies in Europe. The general consensus at the meeting was that if the new body did not have elected representatives and decision-making powers, it would just become another talking shop.

Reports by Councillors

Cllr Robertson: There's a problem that Reports of Handling are not including the **Conservation Officer's Report**, or any of its contents, which Cllr Robertson raised at the discussion of the recent Kinross High School site application. In order to address this issue, Cllr Robertson has tabled a motion in the relevant committee to prevent this happening in future.

There are still £1.6M arrears from the historical **Community Charge**, and the increased number of people now on the Electoral Roll might have allowed some of this to be recouped; however there is now proposed legislation from the Scottish Government to no longer pursue these historic debts.

Cllr Barnacle: There are a whole set of problems present in the **Planning Process** (as this CC knows only too well) and Cllr Barnacle is raising this through the Member Officer Working Group.

The appeal against the decision to turn down the Outh Muir Wind Farm has been dismissed.

Cleish and Blairadam CC

News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 6 October 2014 were: CCllrs R Kitchin, P Fraser, H Somerville, N Robertson, J Moore and F MacGregor; Associate CCllr F Gillespie; P&K Cllr Barnacle and five members of the community.

Presentation on Biodiversity

Catherine Lloyd, Biodiversity Co-ordinator (Tayside) gave an informal and informative presentation on the need for biodiversity in our area. Having spent time before the meeting in Cleish, it was encouraging to hear how well our community is currently doing, in particular being on the way to achieving the status of a 'Biodiversity Village'. It was agreed to spend some more time with the various active groups within both villages to further explore the possibility of working towards achieving this title.

Crime prevention: No Police report had been received prior to the meeting.

- There was an incident on the Hill Road, whereby a driver sounded their horn behind a horse, which fell with the rider. Both were fortunately unharmed but the driver left the scene.
- There are more unsavoury activities taking place along the Hill Road, as reported by a local resident.
- At the last meeting, the presence of horse muck and verge damage within Cleish was discussed in particular how the plastic grass covering was being broken. It was agreed to 'spread the word' to try and stop this.

Outh Muir: This application was dismissed by the Reporter; a Final Decision that means this will now be taken off the agenda. It is expected that the Blairadam is likely to go the same way.

Website: There are now eight residents subscribed to the Newsletter! The planning pages remain the most visited pages. It was proposed by the CC that Fran Gillespie should become a Non-Voting Associate member. The motion was passed.

Village updates – Blairadam

Nigel Robertson (NR) reported that there now appears to be little community support for needing new noticeboards.

There has been more fly tipping and litter.

Some of the potholes have been filled with cold tar – the community are not particularly optimistic how long this temporary repair will last for.

There had been an offer from the Roads Officer for the placement of permanent bollards. NR is to reply to an earlier e-mail

Village updates - Cleish

The Trustees of the Church of Scotland have replied that they are willing to look at a 'long term lease' for the remainder of the Glebe (after the sale of the triangle behind the Manse). The Chair (RK) suggested a Sub-Committee be formed, which should include representative of the Village Hall, the School, the Cleish Field, and the CC, with the working statement to 'Consider the wishes of Cleish Community and if appropriate prepare a financially sustainable and acceptable proposal to present to the Church for consideration.'

It was also suggested by RK that Neil Kilpatrick would be an excellent Chair for this Sub Committee.

We shall write to PKC regarding the Ryder Cup preparations; it was agreed that the traffic imposition during the event was minimal, and had been superbly organised. However there was some feedback that the drastic 'trimming' of the trees whilst the verges were being cut was a little unnecessary.

Village Biodiversity was discussed again, and it was agreed that both villages are interested in looking into this further. It was suggested that there could be a public meeting to discuss this further will all working groups that are active in the villages. Fiona MacGregor agreed to look into this, and to help bring ideas together which could also include any local expertise of residents.

Financial update: £1900 within the account. Planning

There is one new application – a retrospective application for 2 stables and storage room at Craigton (14/01372/FLL).

There have been several approved applications:

Erection of stables at Beauford Paddock (14/00628/FLL).

Removal of Condition 3 (Occupancy) of a previous application at Millwood (14/00791/FLL).

Active treescapes – removal of time and reinstatement conditions (14/00773 & 774/FLL).

In addition to this, a local resident has approached several members of both the CC and local potential neighbours regarding a proposal for a new house opposite the existing houses West of Cleish, within a field which he claims has an old cement footing present. As an application is yet to be submitted this cannot really be discussed in full, however it was felt that the site could be contentious.

Cllr Barnacle advised that the Enforcement Officer has written to the landowners regarding the new building within the woodland opposite Greenacres.

Other Business

The T-junction at the east end of the B9097, just past the M90, is prone to **flooding**, causing safety concerns. Could any resident forward photographs of this to Cllr Barnacle.

Cllr Barnacle reported that the **Landscape Review Designation Consultation** should have been circulated for comment – The CC hasn't received this yet.

The Workshop by the Planning Dept in May 2014 resulted in somewhat contentious discussions both at the meeting and afterwards. Cllr Barnacle met with both Nick Brian and the Council Solicitor, and it was acknowledged that things could currently be done better. There is to be a member officer working group set up to see what improvements could be made.

The proposal to build a **cycle track** via Sunnyside was discussed at the last meeting. A local resident asked for some clarity and confirmation about this proposal as he hadn't been made aware of anything. Cllr Barnacle explained that it was just a preliminary proposal at present, involving TRACKS and the Green Route Initiative and he would discuss this further in person.

The Next Meeting of Cleish and Blairadam CC will take place on Monday 1 December 2014 at the Tabernacle Hall at 7.30pm.



Lomond Antiques and Collectors Club



The 21st season got off to a lively start with a presentation by Angus Grant, chairman of the Fife Pottery Society. He explained that the society's main interest was research. Some members had published works on pottery finds and the historic presence of nine potteries in Kirkcaldy alone gives them much material for study and identification. There was much besides the famous Wemyss ware to interest collectors.

Several club members had brought items, which Angus was able to identify after examining the marks, glazes and mode of manufacture. Some were from Kirkcaldy, other from further afield like Dunmore and Bo'ness.

We were shown some of his own collection, which was mainly of Studio pottery. He pointed out that it was more reasonably priced for collectors than the famous names of the past and was equally interesting to identify.

On 8 October we listened with great interest and fascination to Helen MacDonald, a designer of Paperweights for Caithness Glass, describe the processes which made the beautiful and much collected objects. Originally founded in post-war Caithness, the company specialised in clear glass for domestic use. They hoped to create employment opportunities for local people. Then they recruited vastly talented Paul Ysart from Monart Glass to teach. He introduced the element of colour and soon transformed their output.

Caithness Glass moved to Inveralmond and Helen came too. She experimented with incorporating colour in her designs for decorative glass. Influenced by glass makers from Italy, she was soon creating beautiful intricate designs in paperweights which became both an artistic and commercial success.

She displayed samples of her work. We saw fragile dragonflies hover over flowers embedded in green foliage and could hardly believe this was all created from molten glass and slim rods of colour. We all had our favourites: a cat, Elvis Presley and desert scenes for the ruler of Brunei were among the wonders we handled.

The skill and expertise of the craftsmen was superb. Their products attracted buyers and collectors from all over the world.



Recipe

Apple Chutney

If you like chutney and you have access to apples and onions from your garden, allotment or local shop, why not make your own? A jar of chutney, with a homemade label, will make a lovely Christmas present.

Ingredients

1 kg apples ½ kg sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ kg onions 1 x 15 ml ground cinnamon

2 cloves garlic (optional) 1 x 15 ml mustard 1 x 15 ml salt ½ teaspoon cayenne 250 g sultanas ½ litre vinegar

Method

Peel and core the apples, add the peeled onion and garlic then mince or chop. Place in a saucepan with the salt, sultanas, cinnamon, mustard, cayenne and half the vinegar and cook slowly, stirring occasionally until soft and pulpy, about an hour and a half. Add the sugar and remaining vinegar and cook until thick. Pot and cover while still hot. This makes about three jars of chutney.

Compassion Corner

Is there a slippery slope between gossip and hate speech, unkind words and unkind acts?

Buddhists would seem to think so and talk about practising right speech or skilful speech. Components of this skilfulness involve kindliness and harmony. In my experience, Buddhists are not just softies who don't want to upset the apple cart, they usually have a pretty good and pretty healthy reason for doing or not doing something.

"Sometimes you have to offer an opinion contrary to someone else's, or point something out to them, even criticise an aspect of their behaviour. The real skill is to find a way of expressing your argument, even your strong argument without resorting to harshness."*

I think there is an assumption here that we are likely to want and need to live, work and be in community alongside the people we disagree with. This would seem to be a fairly sensible approach locally, nationally and internationally. So what is achieved through kindliness rather than harshness? Well, it is likely more listening might happen, more actual communicating, more trust and more co-operation. It may also be that it is more possible to progress as a whole rather than 'sides' of an argument casting clever jibes or an awful lot worse on their 'opponent'. Those holding the opposite views in an argument may be more attached to being 'right' than finding commonalities and solving issues that affect all concerned.

"If we feel animosity towards someone, rather than admit that and take responsibility for it, we create the story that person is so full of fault that we're justified in our ill-will"*. We perhaps decide not to look at them clearly, in a detached way or imagine the full possibilities of who they are or what may be happening in their lives. How different would it be to take pleasure in creating harmony rather than enjoying the taste of another's misfortune?

Perhaps it would be compassionate and healthy to move from debate which means we insist our own views are taken on by the 'opposition' and vice versa (bullying essentially), towards one where we seek to truly listen and collaborate. Perhaps that would be skilful. Not easy and certainly not something I personally am near mastering, but something worth striving towards.

We are lucky enough not to be at war within these islands. We have a chance to be civilised without overwhelming fear around the corner. Perhaps this starts with being mindful of the words and tone we are using.

MP Gordon Banks joins Kinross-shire entrepreneurs at business breakfast

Question: What do you get if you gather a group of savvy financial, business and construction consultants intersperse them with an eclectic mix of legal eagles, web gurus, hairdressers, lifestyle advisors, professional cleaners (houses, ovens and chimneys), automobile and motorhome maestros – not to mention an aerospace exhibition promoter and a politician – first thing on a Wednesday morning at a stunning rural venue on the shores of Loch Leven?

Answer: A highly successful Kinross-shire Partnership Business Breakfast – without doubt one of the most enjoyable networking events in Central Scotland.

On Wednesday 1 October, at the usual meeting time of 7.30am, over 30 local entrepreneurs sat down to a full cooked break fast at Loch Leven's Larder. This was the first in the latest series of winter breakfast events which the Partnership hold on the first Wednesday of each month from October through to March, providing a welcome forum for many Kinross-shire business owners.

Kinross-shire Partnership Chairman Alisdair Stewart took the opportunity to introduce new administrator Karen Grunwell, who took up her position in April of this year. Business break fast stalwart Sid Grant, of BNI, then invited each attendee to introduce his or her business briefly before the invited guest speaker took to the floor.

On this occasion we were honoured to welcome local Labour MP Gordon Banks, representative for Ochil and South Perthshire, whose specific interests include the environment, Europe, the economy and foreign affairs.

In addition to his political activities, Mr Banks is himself a successful businessman. In 1986, he founded Lochgellybased Cartmore Building Supply Company - of which he is still a director. In his address, he emphasised the inextricable link that exists between business and politics. Businesses, he explained, are the wealth creators of this country and without successful businesses, politicians can do nothing.

Alluding to the various challenges faced by small to medium enterprises in the 21st century, some specifically sectoral and others – such as insufficient Broadband speeds – affecting the whole business community, Mr Banks outlined how his party would tackle both these issues and others.

Portmoak Community Woodland

As with gardening, so with community woodlands. This has been a time to enjoy the fruits of our labours. Many of the apple trees in the community orchard in Kilmagad Wood have been covered with fruit and our third harvest has been the best yet. We've seen a wonderful increase from just one apple on the young trees in the first year, to several hundred this time. It's great that the hard work of planting and pruning is producing results.

We filled a basket with apples and put it in Kinnesswood Shop and we're grateful to them for making space for it and allowing people to help themselves. Of course, being a community orchard, the idea is that people should pick their own and if we get a good crop next year we'll make sure everyone knows that they can do that.

There's a huge range of fruit trees in the orchard, bearing eaters and cookers in every colour shape and size. We're still learning about their different ripening times and some take ages. If you walk up through the orchard you may yet find some apples there, as well as hazelnuts on the bushes. Portmoak Moss is also a rewarding place to walk at this time of the year. Red squirrels have been spotted regularly and there's a huge array of mushrooms and toadstools. The Portmoak Community Woodland Steering Group have no wish for the fine autumn days to end but we are waiting for a spell of wet weather to give us the right conditions to

replant the sphagnum moss which we rescued before the mulching work in August. The exact method hasn't been decided but one or two of the committee are rather keen on firing it across the bog through water pistols, so watch out for strange antics in the weeks ahead.

Kinross-shire Day Centre

This month the day centre had a hilarious afternoon when we had our own version of the Commonwealth Games! Medals were handed out at the end of an afternoon of fierce but friendly competition. The hilarity was matched a week later when 25 service users went to see "The Full Monty" at the Alhambra in Dunfermline!

Although our activities are important, our "core business" is provision of lunch to our service-users. A three course lunch with tea or coffee is served at 12 noon, Monday to Friday at a cost of £5 to service-users. We can cater for special diets such as diabetic, gluten-free or vegetarian and there is always a second option if you don't like the menu of the day. The price includes transport to and from the day centre in our own minibuses but many of our service-users walk to the day centre if they can or come with a family member. The buses and drivers can cope with wheelchairs if required. Service-users are normally picked up from home between 10.00 and 11.30am and many of them just stay for lunch, returning home soon after 1 o'clock. Those who wish to stay for afternoon activities or to do shopping or visit the hairdressers in town, normally return home in the minibus at around 3 o'clock. On average, our service-users come two days a week but some come

five days and others only once. The one word we like to describe ourselves with is "flexible" as we try to meet the needs of our service-users. We are aware that there will be days when our service-users have other commitments and all we ask is that you give us a quick phone call to let us know not to cater for you.



At the last Parent Council meeting, Mr Keatings answered a question about what the procedure is if you want to communicate with a teacher outwith the Parents' Evening setting. He pointed out that teachers may have 20 or more pupils per class which makes a lot of parents who could potentially contact that teacher. Contractually, teachers are only obliged to meet with parents a total of six times per year and this obligation is mostly met by participation in Parents' Evenings. KHS therefore has a system where Guidance teachers are the first point of contact for parents and act as a conduit for any request to contact a teacher. This can lead to communication between parents and teachers but it is preferred if this is by email to minimise disruption to teaching time.

Further Parent Council meetings are planned for 10 November, 12 January, 9 March, 20 April (to be confirmed) and 25 May, with the AGM on 15 June. Meetings are held at the school. Any parent or guardian of a KHS pupil is welcome to come along. Parents are important and make a real difference to children's learning. This decision culminates 18 months of engagement between

They listened to community concerns, and we are pleased that they were then able to make a strong enough case to the Scottish Government to gain extra funding for both schools.

The KPPC understand that a condition of the funding is that the school is opened by 2017. This is a tight timescale, and we look forward to working with the council to make this development as smooth as possible for the council and the school community and to get the new school opened on time. We will report back to the parent body when we know more about the next stages.

This deadline means that many of the current pupils will be educated in the new school, and of course the new building will benefit many generations to come thereafter. We look forward to the day it opens, which isn't really all that far away!

Probus Club

A Career in Law

Janice Webster, wife of the Probus Club Vice President, was speaker at the meeting on 17 September. Both Janice and Robin are



lawyers by profession and had interesting and varied careers. Janice studied Law at Edinburgh University then served an apprenticeship in Glasgow where she met Robin. Their partnership extended through work and family.

A position with Falkirk Town Council followed but she found this frustrating and not very well paid. When she was expecting her second child, she was asked to work for the Law Society. The law did not permit individual lawyers to advertise their services, a position which has completely changed today. Janice became involved in the first tentative moves to advertise the services of the legal profession.

Robin was seconded to the Seychelles to work as a Magistrate and Janice accompanied him. The population of the Seychelles consisted, to a large extent, of the ancestors of titled French who had fled the Revolution on the one hand and freed slaves on the other. This had led to the situation where the law was a mixture of English Law, French Law and a native law, which involved 'spells'. Janice, who had also been appointed a Magistrate, had to deal with some bizarre cases in which a person was accused of putting a spell on someone. It was difficult to find witnesses to corroborate such accusations.

After the Seychelles posting, Janice returned to work for the Law Society before being seconded to become Secretary to the European Counsel in Brussels. Her final job after a very successful, interesting and varied career was as Secretary to the Law Agents Society.

Stewart Forbes gave the vote of thanks.

Burke and Hare's Edinburgh

The speaker on 1 October was Professor Gordon Findlater, Professor of Translational Anatomy at Edinburgh University. His subject was "Burke and Hare's Edinburgh" but, as he explained, it was not just a tale of the lives of Burke and Hare but of the part they played, with others, in the development of the knowledge of the Human Body through the dissection and teaching of the anatomy of the body. In this science, Scotland led the world.

In 1505 James IV received a petition to grant a 'seal of cause' to use the bodies of hanged criminals for dissection, which he duly granted for one criminal per year. This was clearly not sufficient as medicine became more sophisticated and when James Bolton became Professor and the first person to teach Anatomy in Britain in 1650, the problem became more acute. The first case of body snatching occurred in 1648 when four gypsies were convicted and hanged. But the demand increased. Dr Robert Knox required 520 bodies in the 1820s, and this was to a large extent met by the practice of body snatching. Graveyards were guarded to prevent this and sometimes a grille of iron bars known as a mortsafe was erected over a tomb.

It was with this background that Burke and Hare plied their trade. The two Irishmen had come to Edinburgh to work on the construction of the Union Canal and met in a pub in the Grassmark et. They managed to acquire a lodging house, from common law wives, and enticed their victims to stay before murdering them by suffocation. Burke and Hare did not carry out body snatching from graves. Their method of killing their victims became known as 'Burking'.

Eventually caught, Hare turned King's Evidence and Burke

was hanged and his body used for dissection. His skeleton hangs in the Medical Museum to this day.

Ruary MacLeod gave the vote of thanks for a most entertaining talk.

God in the Detail

The talk on 15 October, "God in the Detail", was given by the Reverend Thomas Brauer, Minister for Central Fife for the Episcopalian Church of Scotland. Although born and brought up in Canada, he has worked in South Africa as well as Scotland and in addition to his pastoral duties he is studying part-time for a PhD at St Andrews University.

The theme of his PhD research is photography. By using photography to uncover the 'detail' in our surroundings, he hopes to be able to uncover the detail in our God-created World. This gives rise to the sub-title of his talk: 'Photography, Ministry, Vocation'.

His interest in the detail stems from the knowledge that his paternal grand father, whom he never knew, was a member of the Nazi party in Hitler's Germany. In his mind his grand father was evil. However, he later discovered that his grand father had written a letter to Hitler denouncing the setting up of concentration camps. For this, his family were shadowed day and night by the SS and his grandfather died when he threw himself on top of live grenades in order to save his children.

This experience and knowledge taught the Rev Brauer that it was important to go into the detail to learn the truth about people and the World.

He carries this into his ministry by looking for the detail in any problems he and his congregation may face.

Duncan Stenhouse eloquently proposed the vote of thanks for a thought provoking address.





Hi again, everyone! The year marches on, and autumn is now in full swing, if indeed it does? The leaves are certainly drappin aff the trees and it's a sign that nature is beginning to shut down for the forthcoming winter. Although things go a lot quieter it disnae shut doon completely and the fallen leaves will be carried underground by earthworms to produce nourishment for the coming spring. Above ground the main attraction on the loch and reserve at the moment is geese.

Pinkfeet numbers continue to grow, and at the last count, at time of writing, was circa 13,000. Large numbers of pinkies seem to be in the north east at the moment at one of our other reserves, Loch of Strathbeg, probably due to the mild weather we have been having, although they will eventually work south as the year goes on. More than likely our numbers will increase as they do. Duck numbers will also build as the winter progresses. We have already seen pochard increasing; pintail, teal and goldeneye are also in evidence. Others like field fare have been seen flying over and lapwing numbers are also on the increase.

In the centre, the shop has an offer on big sacks of bird food with all varieties except peanuts (awfa sorry about that) reduced by 20% per bag until 4 November, so you should just have time to stock up. If you spend £50 or over you can also give your gairden pals a wee extra boost and purchase a suet treat box for the princely sum of one new pound. Normal price £8.99, bargain!

OK then, events stuff. On **Saturday 15 November** we are running a **Dawn Goose Watch**, starting at 6.15am – aye folks you did read that correctly, early o' clock in the morning to see the spectacle of the loch's roosting geese leaving at dawn to go out and feed for the day. On **Wednesday 19th** we dae things in reverse with a **Dusk Goose Watch** to... you got it, watch them coming back in to roost in the evening. Breakfast will be provided after the dawn watch in the cafe and tea, coffee and biscuits will be provided on the dusk yin. Both these events are advance booking.

We will also be holding a few tree related events during **National Tree Week**, commencing 29 November. Look out for details on our website. Moving in to early December, on **Tuesday 2 December** Scott Paterson, our local county bird recorder, will be running a one-day "**Introduction to Birdwatching Course**" from 10am to 4pm, lunch and refreshments included in the price. Scott will give participants new to birdwatching (or even people who know a bit but would like to know more) expert tips on how to recognise the characteristics and behaviours to help you identify the different species you may come across. Places are limited and advance booking is required.

Farming

John mentioned his desire to improve the performance of his flock in last month's farming column. I share his passion; my own desire to see the business produce a worthwhile profit for our efforts is what makes me stick at sheep farming. I think all sheep farmers are a bit of a Del Boy, so next year, John, we'll be millionaires.

The tweaking started with the paternal side of the flock. It makes up 50% of the lamb genetics, of course, and whilst we already have some very good tups at home, I was looking for a new tup whose offspring will finish even quicker off summer grass. In August we travelled north to a farm just outside Inverurie called Logie Durno. The Ingram family are long established breeders of popular breeds such as Texel, Charolais and Suffolk but in recent years they have produced two hybrid breeds, produced exclusively on their farm. We bought a Durno Hybrid which is half Charolais and half Texel to help boost the growth rates and we also bought two Logie Hybrids to put to a group of our older mules to breed ewe lambs to keep on the farm.

We're also using teaser tups for the first time in 11 years. A month ago, our vet vasectomised three big male lambs and this weekend they will be turned in with 160 ewes. As their name suggests, their presence teases the ewes and the overall effect is that they all come into season in a much more compact time. After 17 days we remove the teasers and turn the real tups in with the ewes. We expect most of this group will then be served very quickly and will in turn deliver their lambs during the first week of April. We're using our best tups (one is the Durno Hybrid) with this group and it's these ewes and lambs who will be turned out onto the lushest grass next spring with the hope of selling the lambs early while prices are at their highest.

I listened to Brian Soutar of Stagecoach talk recently about the path to his phenomenal business success. As you'd expect, he's incredibly driven and a natural innovator but he stressed not all the good ideas in the business were his own. Watching the market place and other industry leaders is often where a fresh approach will originate and no one should be ashamed to adopt these quickly into their own enterprise.

Scottish sheep farmers like the Ingrams of Logie Durno are our innovators and I hope I can increase productivity with the help of their breeding programmes. New Zealand is also the home of innovation for sheep production so maybe one day (if I'm not already a millionaire), a trip there would be worthwhile.

Loch Leven NNR

The autumn migrant assemblage has been building up nicely over the last month, with good numbers of Pintail, Teal, Coot, Wigeon and Gadwall being watched with the familiar seasonal soundtrack of Whooper Swans calling away incessantly to one another. The latest count of Pink-footed Geese returned a respectable 13,285, with a further 625 Greylag Geese and 39 Canada Geese also present. The image below was one of several hundred captured using a remote camera trap at one of the popular evening roost locations for geese, giving us a unique opportunity to get in amongst them as they flock together to roost for the evening.

An astonishing early count of over 65,000 Pinkies was recorded from Loch of Strathbeg early in October, suggesting that the recent trend of growth in this population is set to continue. Thanks to those that attended both of our goose events this month, as well as all our other events during the course of the year. Next year's events programme is to be drawn up soon, so look out for events from Loch Leven NNR in 2015 in the next issue of the Kinross Newsletter.



Male and female Bearded Reedlings - a first for Loch Leven NNR!

In other news, we were delighted to report the second new species of the year for Loch Leven NNR in October, with Bearded Reedlings (Tits) being found and ringed in a reedbed on the loch shore. Not quite as unusual as the long-staying Glossy Ibis from February, there has been an irruption of these beautiful wee song birds this year from their usual breeding grounds in the Tay reedbeds. Ian Malzer is currently doing a PhD on Bearded Reedlings at the Tay reedbed and is working closely with the Tay Ringing Group. They are particularly interested in local movements of these reedbed specialists, so if any further sightings are encountered, they can be reported to Ian by email: i.malzer.1@rese arch.gla.ac.uk.



Obituary

DR J DONALD KINLOCH, Manse Road, Milnathort, and late of Hadley Wood, Barnet, Herts, died aged 84 years on Sunday 10 August 2014 in Rumbling Bridge Care Home after a long and valiant fight against the twelve-year disablement of a severe stroke and heart failure.

He moved back to Scotland some five years ago after a forty year stint in Enfield as a Consultant General Physician and Gastroenterologist at Chase Farm Hospital. There he had the task of setting up one of the first such specialties in a District General Hospital and found himself giving a round the clock service in gastroscopy and endoscopy at a stage when this procedure often precluded actual surgery or at least assisted his surgical colleagues in determining the need or urgency for surgical intervention. He had previously trained at the Western General Hospital in Edinburgh and before that worked at The Radcliffe Infirm ary in Oxford. He originally graduated from Glasgow University and worked in both the Royal and Western Infirmaries. He often joked that he only slipped under the rad ar into Edinburgh because he had come via Oxford!

Alongside his medical career, he had a great enjoyment of the outdoors; climbing, skiing, tennis and bird-watching were his main relaxations but music in all its forms was also a great diversion. His return to life in Scotland was a great consolation in his final years and to his delight he found that the sport of wheelchair curling was on offer at the Kinross curling rink. He also enjoyed a regular game of chess with several like-minded friends and so his final years back in Scotland were coloured by new interests and regular attendance at Kinross Parish Church on Sundays and at the concerts and society lectures that are often on offer.

Sadly his final months were blighted by prostate cancer and bone secondaries, which he bore with great courage.
