Re Speech on "Better Together"

Dear Madam, In his praise of the "union", Mr Barnacle has disregarded some pertinent facts about the current political relationship between Scotland and Westminster.

The UK government is elected by the least democratic system, "first past the post", which ensures that nearly half of votes cast are wasted. This alone guarantees a democratic deficit. In the House of Commons, 59 MPs from Scotland will always be outvoted 11 to 1, so the UK has *all* the power. For example: in 1999 Westminster removed 6,000 square miles of Scottish seas, with six oil wells and fishing, to English (not UK) jurisdiction. The unreformed, undemocratic House of Lords - the biggest legislative body in the world apart from the Chinese politburo - recently took away Scotland's powers over Green Energy without even going through Parliament.

All the revenue raised from Scotland goes to the Treasury and Westminster decides how much - just over half - is returned to Scotland as a "Direct Grant", and the "strings attached" include paying the entire cost of Trident, Faslane, Coulport and Aldermaston. As Tony Blair boasted, "The Scottish Parliament will have fewer powers than the average English Parish Council."

The present situation resembles an imperial/colonial relationship where one party holds all the powers and makes all the decisions, and the other party none. That it has existed for 300 years, and the powers become even more centralised, makes it worse. Scotland today has less control of the original essentially Scottish powers of the Law, education, burghs etc because of UK legislation breaching the Treaty of Union provisions.

No one in their right mind would enter into such a one-sided and unfair political "union". To suggest that Scotland should remain in this one - for the benefit of London alone - is neither liberal nor democratic.

Dear Editor,

I have noted the concerns of Alan Thomson and Jane Turnbull in the July edition of your excellent publication. I would like to respond to their letters.

The former Kinross High School site

Firstly, with regard to Alan Thomson's letter, I wanted to outline why I opposed the application for this site and update residents on what is happening next.

Before starting, I should say that the four local Councillors have, I think, all expressed their desire to get this site developed as soon as possible as it is already an eyesore and attracting vandals.

However, the application which came forward for this site was, in my view, going to create problems for both existing residents and also potential new residents on the site which could not be ignored.

As Mr Thomson has noted, this application was refused at a planning meeting unanimously by the 13 Councillors on the committee.

Following this meeting, I organised a meeting between the four local Councillors, Persimmon Homes and the planning department, to discuss the way forward and to give the developers guidance on the problems the local Councillors had identified with the last application.

At this meeting, Persimmon explained that they were considering a new application and would welcome our feedback on the ways that the previous application could be improved.

The issues which arose, were numerous, so I will summarise them briefly.

First of all we explained that demolishing the Edwardian block of the former High School might be acceptable to us if it is done in such a way that Historic Scotland, the Council's Conservation team, and residents agree that it was an enhancement to the Conservation Area.

We pointed out that there were 100 objections to the application from residents, and that both Historic Scotland and the Conservation team had stated that the previous plan was NOT an enhancement. This could have led to the application being "called in" by Historic Scotland and a lengthy delay whilst they considered their response (as happened with Perth City Hall).

We pointed out that the green space created at the front of the site was not seen as an enhancement and a suggestion was made that this area might be better utilised as an attractive parking space for St James' Church and the town centre

We informed the meeting that the high density of housing being proposed (35 houses per hectare) had led to a number of potentially serious issues in our view, and that we considered that it was overdevelopment of the site.

We had concerns that the off-street parking provision was inadequate, as it provided only two spaces per household and an effective ten on-street parking spaces. This would have meant that should a couple of residents have held a party or had more than a couple of visitors with cars, this would have led to problems with parking outwith the site, where there was already, in our view, a problem with long-term parking.

The proposed development site would also exacerbate the town's long-term parking problems, as it would remove existing long-term parking from the town.

We were concerned about the lack of adequate landscape framework as we felt this would lead to a loss of amenity for existing residents, including concerns of overlooking and potentially loss of light, specifically for 47a Alexander Drive and 6 High Street. We asked that these be addressed in the next application and that the developers do not rely on minimum standards when they were designing the location of the new houses.

We felt that the design of the streets within the estate was not according to "Designing Street Guidance" and would lead to potentially hazardous conditions for pedestrians, especially at the start of the school day.

We expressed our concerns about the stone walls which surrounded the estate, which appear to be the responsibility of residents adjacent to the site, and suggested that planning for this should be incorporated in any new application.

We all agreed that placing houses immediately adjacent to the listed Parish Church detracted from its setting and suggested that a buffer zone be established, and suggested that this might be used to provide a turning space for the lane adjacent to the Church and parking for visitors.

The meeting lasted over two hours, so this is merely a summary of the key points raised by us.

Persimmon Homes have indicated that they will be redrafting their plans and will meet with the local members prior to submitting a further application.

We also discussed the proposal to develop the land at Lathro Farm, as Persimmon are in the process of applying for consent for this site.

The local development plan has this site listed for 260 houses.

Should you be interested in hearing their proposals, they should be presenting them at the Kinross CC meeting in the near future. The next of these is at the Masonic Hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday 6 August.

Housing proposal exhibition

Persimmon Homes will be holding another public exhibition about their proposed housing development at Lathro Farm. The exhibition takes place in the ICT suite at the community campus on Wednesday 6 August, 2.30pm-7pm. This follows on from a previous exhibition held on 18 June. Comments made on 18 June have been considered and the proposals on display at the August event have been altered since the June consultation. There will be a masterplan on display.

Persimmon representatives will also present their proposals to Kinross CC on the same evening. Kinross CC meets at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross. CC meetings are open to the public.

The Lathro Farm site is zoned for housing (260 units) in the current Local Development Plan.

Following the public consultations on 6 August, Persimmon will submit a planning application to PKC.

Trees at the County Building- An Apology

I received a complaint that four trees including two mature cherry trees had been cut down next to the County Buildings in Kinross.



When investigated, I discovered that Council Officers had done this as the Police had requested that the trees be pruned so as to allow safe access for emergency services during T in the Park.

The Council officers decided that pruning was not a good solution as it would need to be done on a regular basis (money is tight) and cherry trees apparently suffer from dieback when they are pruned. They also decided that the trees were very close to the wall and that therefore they would remove them.

On further investigation, I established that the procedures to be followed in preparing a tree work order do not include consultation with anyone but the owner of the land, and in this case officers did not realise that ownership was no longer with the Council.

These procedures also had no provision for trees in Conservation Areas, where trees are protected as if they have a Tree Preservation Order. I have asked that the procedures be changed in order to reflect the special nature of trees in Conservation Areas and that consultation with Councillors be carried out before trees are removed.

I have agreed with officers that the land adjacent to the County Building will be made good so that the grass can be cut by the owner and the trees will be replaced with ones of his selection.

I asked that an apology be given by officers for this mistake, however they have said that they "view this as a private matter between the Council and the land owner and therefore it would not be the norm to make a public apology."

So, I apologise to you on behalf of the Council as an elected member of it.

Sorry, it was a mistake, the Council will try to do better in the future.

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration

Unfortunately the start to this project has been postponed to early March 2015. It was decided that trying to do the work over the winter would lead to delays and problems caused by cold temperatures. It is anticipated that the work will be finished by the end of August 2015.

Kinross Town Hall Works

The High Street will have a temporary suspension of loading and parking between property numbers 104 and 118 (83.14 metres) to allow work to be done on the Town Hall for 32 weeks from 23 July. *Please keep shopping at the premises affected or we could lose them.*

Kilmagadwood Urns

When planning consent was given for two houses at Kilmagadwood, near Scotlandwell, a condition was set that an archaeological dig be first carried out on the site to investigate whether historic remains were present.

This dig discovered 23 Bronze Age urns, which may be of national importance.

Unfortunately the condition was discharged before the urns were made museum-ready and the developer indicated that they were not in a position to fund the post-excavation requirements, by then estimated to be in the region of £25,000. Residents were concerned that the urns would remain locked away for the foreseeable future.

It now transpires that following intervention by the Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust (on which I sit) and the Council, Treasure Trove have agreed to accept the urns in their current state.

My understanding is that the urns will be offered to museums in their current state and that, hopefully, they will appear soon in one or more museums in Scotland.

The Lomond Hotel, Glenfarg and the Lomond Country Inn, Kinnesswood

I am delighted to see that the former Lomond Hotel on Glenfarg Main Street has now been demolished and the site cleared. This is excellent news, as the building was an eyesore and was getting more and more dilapidated, with a danger that bits might fall off onto neighbouring properties.

There is now a threat over another hotel, this time in Kinnesswood. This has been closed for some time and was recently bought by a property developer. The developer submitted a planning application in April of this year, but problems with the design statement mean that the application has now been withdrawn.

I am keen to prevent a situation arising where there is another boarded-up, dilapidating building in one of Kinrossshire's Conservation Areas and so have written to the developer to see whether I can facilitate a meeting between planning officers, local Councillors and the developer to decide on a way forward.

T in the Park

T in the Park have announced that they are to move to Strathallan next year. This is, I think, sad for Kinross-shire when looking at the big picture. I appreciate that the event brought difficulties for some of the local community, however I think there were benefits as well. We had got used to it to some extent and I think many will miss the buzz the event brought.

This move was forced on the organisers by the perceived dangers of the BP pipeline which goes near the site.

The move to Strathallan is dependent on the event being given a licence and there is a group locally challenging whether planning consent will be required for the new site.

Whatever comes of this, I would like to wish the organisers well and good luck for the future of this event, which put Kinross-shire on the map.

Kinross Pavements

I have heard that there is disquiet about the resurfacing of the pavements in Kinross.

Personally I am delighted to see some work getting done in Kinross. I see it as a bit of focus on the town after decades of nothing happening.

If you let me know what you don't like about the new surface, I will follow it up.

Copy of a letter dated 18 July 2014, sent to Jim Valentine, Executive Director (Environment), Perth & Kinross Council Need for 'major' mitigation measures and lack of PKC funding for A977 (the forgotten road)



I am moved to write to you on the above subject, which you will be familiar with over a long period, following a recent meeting of Kinross-shire ward councillors and the failure of two recent budget proposals that would have addressed the issue; I enclose a recent letter from a constituent in Crook of Devon that mirrors concerns over the years from residents in the villages of West Kinross-shire that straddle this busy strategic road.

As you are aware, the A977 was de-trunked against Council advice in 1996 and it would appear there is absolutely no chance that the transport authorities will reconsider this In any event, re-trunking may send the wrong status. message that it is a suitable road for HGV traffic (notwithstanding their increasing useage of Sat Nav). You will also be aware that PKC have argued, in support of the community, for major mitigation measures to be put in place; this was done at the Public Inquiry in November 2004 into the new Kincardine (now Clackmann anshire) Bridge, in 2009 at a petition to the Scottish Government signed by over 1100 residents and is now reinforced by Para 7.1.18 of our adopted Local Development Plan (LDP) of 3rd February 2014 (Introduced by the Reporters Unit following local member The Transport Authorities originally representation). suggested the paltry sum of £87,000, later increased to £150,000, for minor mitigation measures for the A977 in relation to a bridge costing £120 million.

When the Reporter to the Public Inquiry ruled that this level of funding was wo efully inadequate and should be increased, I took the case to the former Transport Minister, Tavish Scott MSP with the assistance of the community and our former MSP George Reid, securing an offer of £250,000 to cover 'minor' measures. In October 2006, PKC's Enterprise & Infrastructure Committee accepted the Minister's offer (not implemented until after 2009 following disagreements within the community on how best to use this inadequate sum) and instructed PKC officers to pursue the funding short fall for the major measures evaluated at £750,000 for three large roundabouts at Blairingone, Drum and Turshills.

Since the failed petition, I have seen no evidence of this funding short fall being pursued with the Scottish Executive; it is well down TACTRAN's list of priorities and doesn't feature in the Council's capital budget. As far as I'm concerned this is a totally unacceptable situation.

There have been a number of serious accidents involving HGVs on this road, one a lorry crashing into a house in Crook of Devon, another lorry ending up in a field opposite the village hall where local children walk to school and two accidents involving fuel tankers in Drum that had major repercussions for residents, let alone the drivers (fuel tankers from Grangemouth refinery regularly use this road to access the M90).

It is clear that the Government will not fund the major measures required and I cannot even get Transport Scotland to review their signage (the M90 at Clackmann an Bridge is signed to be accessed via the A977 when the authorities have stated that the preferred route for traffic from the west central belt to the M90 should be the A9 or A985).

Local perception, which I share, is that there is an increasing speed and volume of HGVs using the road and I would like a survey done on this. It is also perceived that there is a saving of time and hence fuel costs from so doing, hence the need for major measures to slow such traffic.

As you know, the roundabout at Turshills can now be provided by developer contribution through planning gain. During discussions prior to adoption of our LDP (both the Main Issues Report & Proposed Plan had ignored the A977) a proposal to improve the junction of the A977 with the A823 in Powmill by introducing a large roundabout carried community support but the Reporter rejected a Masterplan for the village, which local members had supported.

I therefore state the continuing case for three large roundabouts on the A977 at Blaringone, Drum and Powmill to slow and potentially reduce traffic. It is incumbent upon the Council to make the necessary budgetary provision which was estimated in 2009 at £1.5 million.

There have been several attempts over the years to get PKC to make some budget provision for the road and all have failed. I was particularly dismayed when Charles Haggart was instructed to cease work on an outline business case in November 2013, which local members had requested be prepared. In the last two budget discussions, proposals to find additional resources from uncommitted reserves or the use of recurring loan charges (during an unprecedented era of low minimal interest rates that continues) have been rejected. I note, however, that PKC did increase local road repairs in 2014 by use of the loan charges budget and reducing recurring headroom, also borrowing recently £10million for favoured investment projects from the Public Works Loan Body and a London Borough Authority at very favourable interest rates.

I suggest that all that is lacking here is the political will to address, as a priority, the funding shortfall that has been evident since 2004 and which, whilst excluded from the capital project matrix of submissions for 2017/18 to 2019/20 because it has been forgotten, is very much seen as a priority by the people of the villages in West Kinross-shire that I represent.

I request that a meeting of all those circulated be convened after the summer recess to try and agree how to address satisfactorily these forgotten issues outlined above.

T in the Park

The last T in the Park to take place in Kinross-shire is now over and it will move next year to Strathallan near Auchterarder. T in the Park certainly put Kinross-shire on



the map and many local companies, hotels and bed & break fast businesses benefited from the event, as did local charities like the Kinross-shire Fund who were given a donation every year to disburse to local organisations.

There was disruption, noise and some inconvenience for local people over the T in the Park weekend but most people accepted this for the common good of the area. I am not sure, given the limited road network around Strathallan, how it can be accommodated there but DF Concerts seem confident it is the next best site to Balado. Let's hope they do well there and that many of the Kinross-shire people and companies who were involved at Balado will be involved in the new site.

Milnathort Town Hall clock

Many residents of Milnathort will have noticed that the clock in the town hall tower has stopped. The Council have decided that it is no longer safe for people to try and access the clock chamber to wind the mechanism. The plan is to install an electric motor to wind the clock. Before this can be done, however, the access to the clock tower must be made safe. It is hoped this will be done as soon as possible.

Kinross High School site

Although the application from Persimmon Homes for 102 houses on the former site of Kinross High school was refused unanimously by the Council's Development Management Committee, it is likely that Persimmon will reapply with an amended application. It is important that any new application addresses the concerns expressed by local people when the previous application was lodged.

Planning applications

As a ward councillor, I get notified each week by email of all the planning applications lodged in Perth & Kinross during that week. I currently forward this list to anyone who would like to be kept informed of developments in our area. This avoids the possibilty of residents missing applications which may be of interest to them. Police liaison officer Sgt Sandra Williams said, "There were very few issues raised by members of the community to either the dedicated residents' hotline or to Police Scotland this year. We carried out our usual high visibility patrols in the areas which have caused problems in the past and the general feedback was that it was an enjoyable event all round. We will miss this annual festival in Kinross but have a great template on which to base our community engagement when it moves to the proposed location at Strathallan Castle. As this is still part of the same police section, local officers have plenty of experience in dealing with this type of event."

End of an era as 'T' says "bye bye, Balado"

As the BBC presenters interviewed Tinie Tempah in the TV studio perched high over Balado, the backdrop was the thing that drew the eye: the hills around Kinross-shire against a bright blue sky looked magnificent. And the rapper thought so too, enthusing over the beautiful scenery and weather, and wishing he hadn't worn a warm jumper for his set on the Sunday of the 21stT in the Park.

Eighteen years of Scotland's biggest musical festival at Balado has certainly put Kinross-shire on the map.

There will be no more T in the Park at Balado, though. The government's Health and Safety Executive (HSE) is worried about the pressurised pipeline that runs under the site, taking crude oil from the North Sea's Forties field to a processing plant near Grangemouth. The HSE only accepted the festival taking place at Balado in recent years on condition that the layout of the site was changed to reduce risk and that an alternative venue was actively sought. A recent HSE statement said: "The likelihood of any major accident at the pipeline is low but if one were to occur, the consequences would be catastrophic."

DF Concerts, organisers of the festival, didn't want to move, and Perth & Kinross Council didn't want the festival

to leave Balado either, but HSE's stance appeared to leave no choice. Ian Miller, Leader of PKC, said that HSE had made it clear that if the council was to go against

HSE's objections in future, HSE would, if necessary, take the matter to judicial review.

On 25 June it was announced that the 2015 T in the Park would take place at Strathallan Castle, near Auchterarder, so the event will still take place in the Perth & Kinross local authority area.

It may not be plain sailing at Strathallan, though PKC is taking the view that planning permission is not required because of the temporary nature of the event and that it does not require to have an Environmental Impact Assessment carried out. However, a legal firm representing neighbours to the site has written to Scottish Ministers requesting a 'screening direction' that the event *is* EIA development. If this happens, DF Concerts would have to formally apply for planning permission.

T in the Park was founded by Stuart Clumpas in 1994 and held for the first three years in Strathclyde Park before moving to Balado in 1997.

Interview with Geoff Ellis

After the last ever T in the Park festival at Balado, Geoff Ellis, Chief Executive of organisers DF Concerts, gave this interview to the Kinross Newsletter.

So, how was the last festival at Balado?

"One of the best. It was really enjoyable – a great event with great performances. It was a lovely crowd in terms of behaviour and atmosphere, which was fantastic. It was tinged with sadness, though. We've had such warmth from the local residents. We had a break fast for some of the local landowners and there were grown men in tears. It has been part of people's lives for 18 years. It's like a child leaving home, except it is not to go to university, it's because of HSE!"



On moving from Balado to the new T in the Park site at Strathallan Castle:

"We are sad to be going but we relish the new challenge. It's a great site [at Strathallan Castle]. There will be less restrictions. We have not had the site the way we wanted it the last few years [because of the pipeline restrictions]. The traffic worked well. It is with a heavy heart that we go because we've made a lot of friends. Some people have gone

to the same accommodation year after year – workers and people going to the festival."

Some neighbours to the Strathallan site are putting forward a legal challenge. Do you think that this will cause delays in getting the festival put on at Strathallan next year?

"No, I don't think so. People have the right to make a legal challenge but I will leave that to the legal experts at the Council. We invited some residents from the Strathallan area to Balado to see the organisation but people probably won't have their fears allayed until after the first festival has taken place there."

What are your standout memories over the last 18 years?

"There are lots. I remember the first time we saw the site. Colin Rodger and I had been up at Inverness when Stuart Clumpas said, 'take a look at this site at Kinross'. At that point we were thinking of Lanark Racecourse and were quite far on with that, but when I saw all the hardstanding at Balado, I thought it was perfect for a festival. And George Lawrie, who was Chair of the Community Council at the time, was very welcoming, as was Douglas Alexander. We have rented land from neighbouring landowners over the years: Robert Alexander, the Russells, Jim and May Paterson, and they have all been so welcoming. Then we've had help from Stuart Skinner, and from Melvin Ryznar who organised accommodation. There are many more people I could mention but I know I will forget to say some names and then I'll feel terrible! I just want to say that we are very privileged to have had such lovely people helping with the event.'

Reflecting again on the last festival:

"It was very emotional when the fireworks were going off. We had Douglas Alexander and family up on the stage looking over their land."

T in the Park has really helped put Kinross-shire on the map, though, hasn't it?

"Yes, I think so!"

Portmoak gliders in mid-air collision

Two gliders from the Scottish Gliding Centre at Portmoak collided above Bishop Hill at around 3pm on Tuesday 15 July.

It appears that the two aircraft were flying at approximately 200 feet when their wings touched. Fortunately both pilots escaped serious injury, one making an emergency landing near Grahamstone whilst the other flew his glider upside down in order to bail out and land safely by parachute. The pilotless glider then crashed into a field near Easter Balgedie. The incident was attended by police, ambulance and several fire appliances, the pilot who landed by parachute being taken to hospital in Kirkcaldy for the treatment of minor injuries. The other pilot was unharmed.

The accident will now be the subject of an enquiry by the British Gliding Association, who will try to ascertain what caused the collision.

Lifelong support for our Forces and their families

World War One Who helped the families?

This year's commemorations to mark the outbreak of World War One gives us all a chance to look back and see what happened locally to our present day set ups. Throughout the war, SSAFA was the only national military charity providing care for families on the home front, and the work was vital to the war effort. The commemorations offer us, as a charity of nearly 130 years standing, not only a reflective look back, but also a chance to reinforce our position as established experts, in providing welfare support for Forces personnel and their families.

(The charity was SSFA as there was no Air Force until 1918.)

SSAFA nursing division

SSAFA provided nurses in garrison towns and at ports across the nation and overseas. These nurses would provide healthcare to families while the men were away. When WWI broke out, many of the nurses joined Voluntary Aid Detachments. Many brave young women went abroad with their detachments and served on or near the front lines. Others worked in hospitals and convalescent homes in the UK.

With the onset of the Gallipoli campaign, and the unexpectedly large numbers of wounded British and Commonwealth troops arriving in Egypt, straight from the battlefield, SSAFA nurses cared for the casualties, releasing Royal Army Medical Corps staff to work on the hospital ships. The use of SSAFA nurses in the area became vital after the HMT Royal Edward was torpedoed on her way to Gallipoli and nearly 1000 lives, mainly medical staff, were lost.

SSAFA clothing branches

Local clothing branches collected or made clothes for the poorest families. Some of these clothes were used for military families, who were returning to the UK from the outposts of the British Empire. Many of these families

returning from hot climates did not have appropriate clothing for the much colder British climate.

Move towards the Welfare State

SSAFA was one of the first organisations to call for benefits that would be distributed universally regardless of circumstance. The statistics above show how the Government gradually started to step in and help in 1917. The introduction of the Separation Allowance, distributed by SSAFA, was the first government payment made to families as a matter of course.

Homelessness

The men going off to war left a problem for many women and their children. Those families known as "on the strength", (meaning that their marriages were approved by the regiments and were able to live within the garrison) were suddenly forced to move out, as the need for accommodation for the men took precedence. Other families were the victims of unscrupulous landlords, who attempted to make those living in tied accommodation homeless.

Mrs X from Perthshire was typical of the sort of cases which SSAFA assisted with. Since her husband had enlisted, she had no lodgings and no food, and she was "so dirty that three lodging houses in Perth refused to take her."

Accommodation was provided for Mrs X by SSAFA, and she was given 1s 6d (15p today!) for her food, to ensure that she did not have to walk the streets, with her children.

Christmas 1914

For those on the home front in 1914, the austerity continued, but SSAFA was there to provide some relief. A ship had been sent from America, itself not involved in the conflict at the time until 1917, packed with toys and goodies for the children of the British troops, and SSAFA distributed thousands of these gifts to children across the UK.

Then, as now, a key feature of SSAFA was the strength of the volunteer network. Local committees were full of volunteers, led by the Countess of Mansfield, giving of their time and energies to make a difference. How little has changed in that respect. We are confident that the vital work we do to provide lifelong support for our Forces and their families today, in SSAFA, is as relevant to today's military community as it was in 1914.

Thank you very much indeed for your interest and support.

Throughout 2014, the Newsletter is featuring brief histories of some of the local men who died in WWI and whose names appear on war memorials in Kinross-shire.

Readers may be interested to know that there is a comprehensive history of Kinross-shire WWI servicemen, researched by Sgt Alastair G Smith, in the Kinross (Marshall) Museum at the Loch Leven Community Campus. This can be consulted during Museum Study opening hours (Thursdays, 10am-8pm and Saturdays, 10am-1pm).



Lance Corporal David Richardson

David Richardson's family lived at Cockairney Feus in Kinross-shire at the time of the outbreak of World War I. He himself was a ploughman at Leuchars prior to the outbreak of war.

He was a machine gunner with the Black Watch (Royal Highlanders) and received a Distinguished Conduct Medal for his actions at Loos on 25 September 1915. Six times wounded, he continued to work his machine gun until it was blown to pieces by a shell. He was seriously wounded and returned to the UK to have his injuries treated when he came home briefly to Kinross.

His respite was temporary, however. He was back in action early in 1916, being despatched to Mesopotamia on 8 January 1916. He was wounded in an action against the Turks on 22 April and died on 25 April 1916.

The Kinross-shire Advertiser ran a report on 23 June 1917 reporting on the presentation of the Distinguished Conduct Medal to David Richardson's father, the presentation being by Brigadier General Atkins who noted that David Richardson's father had a great fighting record behind him, and had another son and three brothers still fighting in France.

The Brigadier also paid immense tribute to the Black Watch and observed that the men of that Regiment had acted, as it is said in "Marmion".

"Groom fought like yeoman Squire like knight As fearlessly and well Each stepping where his neighbour stood The instant that he fell"

Marmion would have resonated with Scots and Scottish Regiments, given that it was an epic poem written by Sir Walter Scott about the Battle of Flodden.

Lance Corporal David Richardson is buried in the British War Cemetery at Amara, near the River Tigris in Iraq. It had been a lost graveyard, found by The Royal Irish Regiment at Easter 2003. The site had apparently been protected by its Iraqi keeper in the face of death threats from Baath Officials. The keeper continued to maintain the cemetery without pay since the first Gulf War, retained all the documents relating to the graveyard and was delighted when the British eventually returned to resume control of it. The cemetery contained the remains of two winners of the Victoria Cross.

Feedback on WWI profiles Thomas Gould Walker

Milnathort resident Pat Ramsay contacted the Newsletter after reading last month's WWI column about Corporal Thomas Gould Walker.

Mrs Ramsay had a photograph of Corporal Walker, which was found some years ago amongst the possessions of her mother, Annie Miller. Wondering if he might be a relative, Mrs Ramsay had some family history research carried out, but this showed that Corporal Walker was not related to her family. It is thought that Corporal Walker may have been a friend of Mrs Ramsay's grandfather.

The photograph, which is actually a post card, has, written in pencil, on the back:

"Corporal T.G.W. Walker 1/9 Highland Light Infantry Killed in action 1st Novr 1916"

The family history research on Corporal Walker, which was carried out by genealogist Sheila Hay, goes back three generations before Thomas Walker's birth. Mrs Ramsay has donated the family history documentation and photograph to the Kinross (Marshall) Museum.

Police Box

Enjoy the Outdoors

With the summer nights and holidays now in full swing, many people will head for the countryside. Some points to think about are as follows:

Consideration for other people

Respect the needs of local people, for example, don't block gateways, driveways or other paths with your vehicle.

Co-operate with people at work in the countryside. For example, keep out of the way when farm animals are being gathered or moved and follow directions from the farmer.

Busy traffic on small country roads can be unpleasant and dangerous to local people, visitors and wildlife – so slow down and where possible, leave your vehicle at home, or consider sharing lifts and use alternatives such as public transport or cycling. The police do receive a number of calls about inconsiderate parking near to or at beauty spots.

When riding a bike or driving a vehicle, slow down for horses, walkers and livestock and give them plenty of room. Keep your dog under proper control so that it doesn't disturb or scare farm animals or wildlife.

Protect plants and animals and take your litter home

Litter and leftover food spoils the beauty of the countryside as well as being potentially dangerous to wildlife – dispose of it with care or take it home.

Don't damage, destroy or remove features such as rocks, plants and trees.

Be careful not to drop matches or smouldering cigarettes. Leave machinery and farm animals alone – don't interfere with animals even if you think they're in distress. Try to alert the farmer instead.

Use gates, stiles or gaps in field boundaries if you can – climbing over walls, hedges and fences can damage them and increase the risk of farm animals escaping.

The majority of visitors will enjoy their break; however there's always a minority who spoil it through antisocial behaviour, excessive alcohol consumption or not adhering to the advice as aforesaid. Police Scotland do have campaigns running in an attempt to stop such behaviour, however please contact them on non emergency number 101 or 999 (emergencies) should you wish to report such incidents.

Kinross Community Council

News from the July Meeting

Present at the meeting held on Wednesday 2 July were: CCllrs D Colliar, C Watson, D Mackay, I Jack, M Wood, M Blyth, G Thomas, W Freeman, B Davies, D West and M Scott; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and J Giacopazzi and nine members of the public. There were no apologies and no declarations of interest.

DRT1: Leaflets about the Demand Responsive Transport Service discussed at the previous meeting were circulated.

Day Centre: A meeting will be held in August with Council and Day Centre officials.

Newsletter grants: No applications received. CCllr Davies mentioned that Kinross in Bloom are now using their new vehicle.

Lathro Farm: Mention was made of the Persimmon Homes presentation and to the proposed woodland area to be developed on the site.

Former High School site: The refused Persimmon application is to be discussed in Perth on 4 July. The CC would like to see the frontage of the building retained and incorporated in the design or alternatively demolished and the stonework used to construct new properties to the front of the site. These properties should be a short distance from the street to allow communal parking in front and the houses should tone in with the streetscape in this area. The Primary School could also be accommodated on this site. Another suggestion was that the Primary could be rebuilt on its present site.

War memorial: Final proposal received for works on new civic space around memorial at County Buildings. Works should be complete by the end of September.

Other Business

T in the Park: Moving from Kinross next year. They have been forced into this situation. The Secretary is to write to DF Concerts to convey thanks for their 18 years in Kinross and for all the financial support gifted to the community.

Burns Begg Street and Mill Street: Rubbish is collecting in the area of the partially developed building (former antiques business and former church), particularly to the rear of the premises. Cllr Cuthbert will look into this. The CC will write to PKC requesting that the Council board this area up.

Bushes (Muirs, at phone box) need to be cut back. Cllr Giacopazzi to check this out.

Station Road: Trees are blocking the signage in places.

Motorway slipway: The grass in this area is the responsibility of BEAR Scotland.

Hatchbank Road as Green Route: CCllr Wood enquiries if any progress had been made here. Cllr Cuthbert answered this.

CC grant: The Treasurer reported on the current position in relation to the CC finances, in particular with regard to the new measures which are in place.

Motorway fences: The CC will write again to BEAR about the condition of the fences at the motorway and ask if one of their representatives could attend a CC meeting.

Road signs: Any repairs required should be notified to Cllr Giacopazzi.

Grass cutting: CCllr Davies mentioned that the grass was cut at the campus. Some discussion was held on the subject of grass cutting and the condition left following the works.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the July Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 8 July 2014 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), R Cairncross (Secretary), Susan Forde and Tom Smith; Ward Councillors D Cuthbert and M Barnacle and two members of the public. Apologies were received from: CCllrs R Williamson and B Calderwood; Ward Cllrs J Giacopazzi and W Robertson and PC D Stapleton.

Stephen's Field: As work on the Whitecraigs site, Kinnesswood, was nearing completion, the CC would pursue its interest in assuming ownership of the field with the owner, A & J Stephen Ltd.

Post Box: Royal Mail had confirmed that a new post box would be installed at Kinnesswood within the next month.

Reports

Police: In the absence of a police representative the CC received the Police Report. It noted that there had been no crimes or incidents in the past month as well as advice in respect of fly tipping, theft of heavy plant machinery and securing valuables left in cars. The CC thought that these reports could be more helpful if they could include from time to time a Kinross-wide report on crimes resolved and of reported accidents. Cllr Barnacle would explore the matter.

Treasurer: The Council's accounts at the end of May 2014 recorded no change from April: a balance of £43.15 in the General Account and £771.05 in the Michael Bruce Way Account giving a total of £814.20. A grant from PKC of £656.85 is expected shortly.

Planning: The CC considered the following new applications and agreed not to object to, nor to make comment on:

14/00955/LBC (conservation area) Shalom, Main Street, Kinnesswood, replacement of existing sash windows and front door;

14/01020/FLL (conservation area) Strathview, Leslie Road, Scotlandwell, extension to rear of dwelling.

These were the unanimous decisions of the CC.

Progress with applications:

14/00707/FLL The Lomond Inn, erection of 5 houses. The CC noted that there remained outstanding issues in respect of this application: failure to provide a Design Statement or to place the independent report of the conservation officer on the website and deficiencies in PKC's handling of the CC's

letter of objection. The latter had been remedied and an apology made. Cllr Cuthbert reported that, in light of a missing design statement, PKC would shortly review the application. He expressed the general view that what mattered was an outcome acceptable to all parties. The CC welcomed his offer to facilitate a dialogue between the developer and the planning officers.

14/000153/FLL Footpath Easter to Wester Balgedie. The CC with the residents of Easter and Wester Balgedie hosted an opening ceremony on 14 June. The CC will write to thank Alistair Smith and Bridget Lindsay for organising refreshments provided by the residents of Easter and Wester Balgedie.

Developments at Causeway Cottage, Scotlandwell. The CC noted that applications: 09/00936/FLL Erection of a dwelling house; 12/01935/FLL Alterations to stable block and 13/01312/FLL Extension to cattery and office, would be considered shortly by PKC Development Management Committee. The CC had objected to the application for erection of a house on the grounds that the proposal conflicted with the policy for Housing in the Countryside, the case for business need having already been met by the erection of the applicant's house at Wellburn. The CC considered whether it should attend the Committee meeting to make representations in support of its objection and decided that it should not do so.

Developer contributions: The CC will comment in due course on the information supplied.

Roads: The CC noted:

- that its letter of 24 April in respect of the series of accidents on the Scotlandwell to Bowhouse section of the A911 had not been acknowledged. This will be pursued.
- arrangements to install a mini roundabout at the junction with the Wellside development in Scotlandwell were now in hand.
- no progress as yet with an approach from Portmoak Primary School Parent Council seeking support in resolving several traffic matters in the immediate environs of the School. The CC is pursuing this with the Parent Council.
- An encouraging reply had been received from the Transport Minister to the effect that his officials would discuss with the CC the possibility of signage on the M90 to discourage through HGV traffic from using the A911.





Paths: CCllr Tom Smith reported that:

- in respect of necessary work on the upper reaches of the Michael Bruce Way to be carried out by contractors, grant applications had been submitted. Pending confirmation of funding certain voluntary work was being pursued supported by a donation of materials.
- the intra-village path between Gamekeepers and the top of The Cobbles, much used as a route to and from school, had become overgrown with the path itself damaged by flood water. Recent strimming had improved matters and, in light of that, an assessment of what might be needed to repair the path will be undertaken. Tom Smith will report.
- A resident drew attention to damage to the wall on the path above the Woodland Trust Field at Kilmagadwood. Before pursuing repairs, Tom Smith would review the matter with George Lawrie of TRACKS.
- The CC will write to Cllr Robertson with its views on improved paths and access links in and around Scotlandwell.

Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr Dave Cuthbert: explained that while the contribution by the developer to provide funding to pursue off-site archaeological work on the 23 urns found at Kilmagadwood had failed, there was now a possibility of alternative funding to allow this work to proceed. It is possible that this may in part be supported by the Living Lomonds Partnership Project. Cllr Mike Barnacle reported progress with the development of new arrangements for landscape designation. This will form new Supplementary Guidance to the 2014 Local Development Plan. There will in due course be full consultation on the proposals. He also reported that PKC will "refresh" the Member Officer Working Group (MOWG) concerned with planning policy and practice. This would convene shortly and may provide a means of resolving difficulties with the planning service.

The next meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 9 September 2014 at Portmoak Primary School.

Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Spiced Mackerel

Enjoy mackerel either hot or cold in season. This recipe is cold and can be prepared ahead for a summer picnic.

Ingredients

6 mackerel 3 tablespoons cider 1 teaspn black peppercorns 425 ml vinegar

3 bay leaves 3 tblspns sultanas (optional)

2 teaspoons salt 2 teaspoons sugar 3 medium onions Pinch of cayenne

25g butter

Method

Clean the mackerel and lay in a pan with the peppercorns and bay leaves. Pour over enough salted water just to cover. Simmer gently for about 10 minutes. Drain well, reserving the liquid and lay in a shallow dish.

Cut the onions into thin slices, cook till soft in the butter, drain then spread over the mackerel. Boil up the cider with the vinegar and 300 ml of the liquid in which the fish were poached. Add the peppercorns, bay leaves, sultanas, sugar and pinch of cay enne.

Pour over the mackerel, cover and keep for at least a day before serving. Serve with salad and hot or cold new potatoes.

Portmoak Community Woodlands

We had excellent attendance at two special events during the Portmoak Festival. A 'damsels and dragons' walk in Portmoak Moss, on 25 June, led by George Guthrie of Butterfly Conservation, attracted 15 adults and two children. The group walked either side of the main drainage ditch across the peat dome and, equipped with nets and jars, hunted damsel flies and dragon flies. Thanks to George's expertise we saw all three damsel flies present in midsummer. Seen close-up, they are beautiful insects, very brightly coloured. We caught the large red as well as blue-tailed and azure damsel flies.

A few days later, on Saturday 28 June, Duncan Davidson, the butterfly recorder for the East of Scotland and moth recorder for Fife and Kinross, gave a hugely entertaining and informative talk in the festival marquee, attended by 18 adults and eight children. He pointed out that learning how to identify butterflies was easier than learning the alphabet as there are only 22 species of butterfly in Fife and Kinross.

After the talk we headed up onto the hill above the Bishopshire golf course to put our new-found knowledge to the test. Of course, it wasn't quite as easy as it sounded, to identify butterflies flitting through the undergrowth, but we saw plenty, including a number of pretty 'ringlets', meadow brown and the lovely common blue.

Duncan had also set up a moth trap in Kilmagadwood, on the previous evening, and caught some weird and wonderful specimens, including the Poplar Hawk-moth and the brightly coloured Garden Tiger Moth.

We are now involved in the next big project in Portmoak Moss, with the surface of the peat dome being mulched and flattened to provide better, boggier conditions for sphagnum moss and all the creatures that thrive in this rare habitat.



Ice rink refurbishment

The refurbishment work continues on schedule; the completion date remains 18 August.

A great deal of work has been carried out on the floor since the last report. A heater mat was laid to prevent the ground below from freezing and then expanding and causing the old 'frost heave' problem that used to distort the playing surface sometimes. Concrete was poured on the heater mat. Next, insulation boards of 75mm depth were put down. On top of that went steel reinforced mesh for attaching the refrigeration pipes. It was a lot of work laying the refrigeration pipes as they arrived in big rolls and then had to be rolled out and fitted by hand to ensure that the space between each pipe is the same from end to end. After that, concrete was poured over the refrigeration pipes. The concrete pouring took a whole day, from 8am until midnight on 9 July.

The new refrigeration plant has been delivered. Electricity supply works in Green Road will take place in the first week of August.

The asbestos ceiling tiles in the corridor at the changing room end of the ice are to be removed. When this is done, all asbestos will have been cleared from the building. The new ceiling in the corridor will be moisture resistant plasterboard and there will be new lights.

The installation of a gas supply to the kitchen (also providing hot water for the radiators in the lounge) will end the ice rink's dependence on the Green Hotel's fuel supply. There will be new external doors and a ramp with railings to improve access.



International Cricket at The Larder

Kinross-shire U15's at ECB National

Club Championship finals day

Edinburgh's Merchiston Castle School was the venue for the 2014 ECB U15 National Club Championship finals between Kinross-shire, Grange, Carlton and Glasgow Clydesdale on Sunday 22 June.

Kinross-shire were drawn in their semi-final against 2012 winners and 2014 Championship favourites Carlton. Darwin Douglas, Kinross-shire captain, won the toss and elected to field on a flat looking wicket. 13-year-old Jack McCreanor opened the bowling, and his 4 over spell brought the first Carlton wicket. The Kinross-shire players let a number of catches go down and allowed runs to leak through the field. By the 9th over Carlton were 48 for 1 and looking set for a very solid batting innings. Lewis McLaren was brought on and took a wicket with his first delivery. Toby Douglas came into the bowling attack and also took a wicket in his first over. Carlton found themselves on 109 for 9 with Toby adding a fast thinking run-out off his own bowling. Stuart McCreanor came in for his last over and took the final wicket

leaving Carlton all out for 111. Toby finished with 4 for 22 and Lewis 3 for 24.

This was an excellent opportunity for Kinross-shire youngsters to book a place in the final as they had accumulated 180 runs in their quarter final game against Aberdeen's Stoneywood Dyce. However after 5 overs the score was only 7 when Darwin Douglas was caught at midwicket. This triggered a procession of Kinross-hire batsman as they collapsed to 63 all out. Only Lachlan Peterson (17) and Lewis McLaren (11) reached double figures. This meant Kinross-shire were to face five times winners Clydesdale in the 3rd/4th playoff.

On winning the toss for the second time, Darwin put Clydesdale into bat. This time the Kinross-shire fielding was much tighter with six catches being held with an excellent stumping from Lachlan Peterson standing in as wicketkeeper after Darwin Douglas swapped gloves to take on a bowling role. Clydesdale also reached 111 at the end of their innings but this time the Kinross-shire top order had no reservations about chasing the total down. Lachlan Peterson was the star batsman, hitting 42 not out off 35 deliveries with able support from Darwin Douglas (16) and Jack McCreanor (13 not out). Kinross-shire reached 112 in the 18th over.

In the final, Carlton bowled Grange out for 58 and had reached the winning total before the Clydesdale innings was completed. The Kinross-shire players learnt a lot about the pressure of finals day and rued the lost chance of beating Carlton. Eight of the Kinross-shire players are eligible to play in the championship again next year and the experience gained will no doubt put them in a strong position.

Hello again, another month gone! We are past the longest day – half the summer's gone!

This coming month, with birds finished breeding, is the time we start to consider vegetation control on the reserve. We will be cutting soft rush and altering water levels to allow us to get as much cut as we can without sinking machinery in the really wet, soggy bits. This will help to create the right conditions for visiting autumn and winter birds when they start to migrate to the reserve and loch from summer breeding grounds abroad. It will also make the reserve look a lot tidier, although wildlife prefers the rough and ready look most of the time for cover from predators etc. It should also make a lot of stuff easier to see on the land areas. At the time of writing, the Glossy Ibis is still being seen regularly, sometimes almost daily, mostly from our last hide at the flood. Most birds are now in moult, or 'eclipse plumage' as it's called when they cast old worn out feathers for new ones after the exertions of the breeding season.

In the shop, Christmas has arrived again; well not as such, thank God, but the cards, calendars and some other assorted festive things are back on the shelves. It's not that long since we removed them and here we go again! Other things will no doubt gradually appear as we get nearer the time. I believe we have a new Cracker Racing game with robins (very festive) instead of penguins this year.

The café team have been experimenting again; well, Dougie has, and he has come up with a recipe for the popular Raspberry and Coconut slice we used to sell but stopped because of its palm oil content. It's a long story, but in a relatively brief form: rainforests are cut down to grow palm plants, to produce palm oil. That then goes into hundreds of products we the consumer buys, foodstuffs included. The problem is (as you may well and probably do know?) that chopping down rainforests accelerates climate change, which is having major effects on weather and wildlife worldwide, including humans. The RSPB policy is that our catering and retail outlets do not use palm oil products for the above reasons and that is why we had to stop using that particular variety of cake. The new recipe contains no palm oil, is totally organic and, according to one impressed customer who has sampled it, rivals the cafe's own recipe scones! Praise indeed, since they are very popular.

You have probably noticed by now that this month's column is not in my usual Scottish style. That's because one or two lady visitors who have been in lately have commented they have difficulty understanding it. Being the kind of guy I am I have listened to these concerns and decided to give them a wee treat by writing it all in a hopefully readable form on this occasion. It may continue or it "micht no". Loch Leven NNR



Well, July was another busy month on the reserve for both us and the wildlife. Our 50th anniversary Bioblitz on 5 & 6 July was a great success. We had experts in many different fields of ecology out on the reserve recording species but even better than that was the input from the public who kept their sightings piling in to the hubs at Kinross Pier and RSPB Loch Leven. In the end we recorded over 450 different species in just 24 hours! With almost 800 different records received from experts and amateurs alike, it was a busy time for Alexa from the Fife Wildlife records centre inputting all our data.

The highlight for me was the bat walk on Saturday night, at which, with the aid of special bat detectors, we were able to hear four different species of bat, including the rare Nathusius Pipistrelle, a species which even our leader Ann Youngman from the Bat Conservation Trust had only heard once before - a real treat for all the visitors who came along.

We also had a team from the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology who were out sampling aquatic plants and insects. They found a sample of a species which until recently had not been recorded at Loch Leven for over a hundred years. For the boffins amongst you it's called Potamogeton praelongus. As well as not having been recorded for so long, it is also of note as it specialises in growing at great depth. To do so it requires clear water to allow it to photosynthesise. It may well be that its return to the loch is due to recent improvements in water quality and clarity.

The Forth District Fishery Board also carried out some electrofishing in the South Queich and found a healthy population of young trout. There was a ringing demonstration at which we were fortunate enough to catch not one but two young kingfishers - another sign of how many small fish there are in the loch's feeder burns. We also had walks and drop in sessions from the Fife Amphibian & Reptile Group, local botanical and invertebrate experts and Tayside Biodiversity Partnership. So a big thank you to all those experts and public alike who came along to lend a hand.

Farming



Silage and hay making are two of the most important jobs in the summer calendar for livestock farmers, since the quantity and quality of these vital winter feeds affect the health and performance of livestock for a large portion of the year and also the costs involved in keeping the livestock. However, it isn't a case of 'one size fits all' as far as silage goes, as grass is cut at varying stages in its growth cycle depending on what type of stock it is to be feed to. Dairy farmers cut the grass when it is shorter and lusher for feeding to their milking cows since they need the feed to be high in energy and protein. In contrast, beef farmers need the grass to be more mature and lower in feed value for feeding to cows in the months before calving to help stop the cows getting too fat and the unborn calves growing too big, leading to calving difficulties. Most other animals are fine with something in between.

In reality, it is finding a balance between quantity and quality because, as quantity increases, the quality decreases, and there is little point in having very high quality 'super silage' if you don't have enough to last all winter. mixer wagons are becoming more popular in Scottish farms and they are excellent at helping to balance out the basic onfarm forage into a feed that is just right for a particular group of animals. They work a bit like a giant Kenwood (other mixers are available) and you fill it up with your silage then you can add cereal such as barley to increase the energy, or soyabean meal to increase the protein, or straw to reduce the potency of the diet. You then let it mix for a while until all the ingredients are evenly mixed and feed it The downside is that they are expensive to buy and

Our own silage making has gone fairly well so far. We have plenty quantity but the quality won't be quite as good as I would like since an unsettled spell of weather delayed getting started, so the grass got a bit more mature, although we got it all baled in really good condition, which is my top priority.

I liken our silage making to an episode of 'scrapheap challenge', as I try to coax our ever-ageing baler/wrapper and tractors to get the job done without too many mechanical disasters. I even gave the baler a major refurbishment to eliminate the main problems we had last year and reduce the risk of a repeat of the fire which it suffered near the end of last season. I am glad to report that the work we carried out has been successful but I have needed a couple of visits to a well know local machinery workshop to fix some other problems. On my last visit just the other day, I suggested they should bring out a loyalty card and I would be first to have one, as I seemed to be a

Meanwhile, the stock are all grazing plenty of grass and have been enjoying a decent amount of sun on their backs, so they are looking well.

The sheep had their winter jackets removed a couple of weeks ago and are quite happy to be in their summer attire. The lambs are growing very well and we already have a trailerful ready to be sold, which is our earliest ever. Even our field of winter barley has staged a remarkable recovery and, while it won't exactly break any records, should yield a
