

Trials of the Trail

There is, happily, not a lot of litter on the Loch Leven Heritage Trail. What there is, is accidental flotsam, escaped on the gentle Scottish zephyrs. There is no deliberate jetsam, thoughtlessly thrown, or wilfully abandoned. You can stride out, head held high, without a care, down the Trail. Except, watch where you place your feet. At any point on the Trail you may need to avoid dog mess, so, you are better advised to shuffle hesitantly forward with downcast eves.

In my wanderings on the Trail I have seen how this execrable excrement may be left. There are some "social" dog walkers who, once on the Trail free their dogs to stravaig about whilst they get on with the serious gossip. Their dogs roam unchecked, and, sometimes, out of sight, leaving their waste where they will, and, being unsupervised, it is not bagged and binned.

I have encountered a jogger pounding down the Trail, leaving his dog to snuffle and sniff as it follows in his wake. This dog is also not supervised, and any leavings remain left, neither bagged nor binned.

Back in the early days of the Trail I would take my daughter, in her buggy, on a regular pilgrimage to Pooh Sticks bridge, more prosaically called the North Queich Bridge. Lifting the buggy through St Mary's Gate, before it was bypassed by the Trail, following a field edge path, restrictively trammelled by stark, naked, wire fences, which, latterly, through clever hedge planting, have merged into the landscape, feeling far less restrictive. We would cast sticks into the water, and, somehow, mine never won.

My daughter remembers Pooh Sticks, I remember Pooh Sticks, please will you remember pooh sticks.

It sticks to buggy wheels, pushchair wheels, bicycle wheels, wheelchair wheels, toppled toddlers, baby shoes, sensible shoes, totally inappropriate shoes, walking boots, yes, even running shoes.

The official advice in the Scottish Outdoor Access Code is that dogs should be on a lead, or kept under control within a few metres. The Code also states that dog waste should always be bagged and binned.

Kinross (Marshall) Museum

Loch Leven Community Campus, Kinross

When the antiquarian and collector David Marshall of Kinross died in 1902 he left his historical books, manuscript collections in Natural History and antiquities to the inhabitants of Kinross. The collection has been added to over the years, and is now housed in a museum within the community campus. Currently there are exhibitions on the Great War and 'When we were at the Schule'.

Saturday, 1000 –1300 [WA, WC, D, FA]

Kirkgate Watchtower

Kirkgate Park, Kinross

At the east end of Kirkgate Park, adjacent to the old burying ground of Kinross, this watchtower may have served to guard against the 'Resurrection Men'. It was constructed on the site of an earlier building in 1852. The watchtower affords fine views across Loch Leven.

Sunday, 1030 - 1530.

Tullibole Castle (see cover photo)

Tullibole Castle is a classic 17th century tower house. Explore the castle grounds and discover a historic gravey ard, remnants of a ruined medieval church and a doo'cot. Visit the Witches Maze, a memorial to the Crook of Devon Witch Trials.

Guided Tours take 40 minutes.

Saturday and Sunday, 1030 – 1600. [WC, GT] On the B9097, one mile east of Crook of Devon.

Museum of Abernethy

School Wynd, Abernethy

The museum is housed in an impressive renovated 18th-century farm steading, built on the lands of an ancient Culdee monastery. It specialises in the social history of the Burgh of Abernethy and its surrounding parish.

Saturday and Sunday, 1400–1700. [WC, FA, D]

The Round Tower, Abernethy

Combine your visit to Abernethy Museum with a climb up the ancient Round Tower, built in the 11th century. Can you spot the Pictish symbol stone at the foot of the tower? Fantastic views of the Tay and the Carse of Gowrie from the top!

Ask at the museum for the key to the tower.

Michael Bruce Museum

The Cobbles, Kinnesswood

The museum is housed in the weaver's cottage where Michael Bruce, the 'Gentle Poet of Loch Leven', was born in 1746. View a special exhibition entitled "The Skin Men; Parchment and vellum making in Kinnesswood."

Sunday, 1030 – 1600. [AWA, D]

Whether you are a Yes voter, or a No voter, the higher the turnout the better. This is a really important vote which will determine Scotland's future.

Personally, I have thought long and hard about which way to vote and have decided that there is really no point in so called "Independence" as we are effectively as independent now as we would be should we vote yes and the costs and disruption which would result would set Scotland a long way back economically.

I say this as, should we vote yes, we will have to have a currency which is tied to Sterling, the Euro or be independent. This currency will be subject to macroeconomic forces which will dictate our financial policies. This was illustrated by what happened in Greece, where they overspent and were forced into real austerity in order to keep the Euro, cutting benefits and government spending hugely.

The fact is that the world economy is getting smaller with bigger power blocks forming. We would have to be with one of these power blocks to survive and thrive economically. This power block would dictate what we could actually do.

Secondly, the cost of Independence will be huge. It's not just the cost of forming an independent country, there will be an inevitable drop in business and tax revenues in Scotland. I understand that most financial companies who currently operate out of Scotland have contingency plans to move their operations to England in the event of a yes vote. These are major employers and the finance industry is a big contributor to tax revenues.

Likewise the so called 'border' effect will, in my view, have a major effect, as people trade more with people in their own country and it has been estimated that Scottish GDP would fall by 5.5% due just to the border effect.

It is a real world we live in and should we decide to vote for independence, England, Wales and Northern Ireland would probably turn their backs on Scotland.

It is for these reasons and many others that I will be voting NO at the referendum.

Whatever your view on this, please vote on Thursday 18 September; it is important.

Referendum Prayers

Kinross Parish Church has organised this evening, and hosted a referendum debate in August, to follow up on the decision of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2012 that 'while as an institution it should remain impartial, this is not the same as saying or doing nothing.' The Assembly agreed that the Church should 'engage at civic, political and local level with the questions related to the constitutional future of Scotland,' and particularly how independence might impact on the poorest and most vulnerable people.

Councillor Robertson Is this a case of double standards?

We are all aware of developers' wish to build more housing in Kinross-shire. Planning applications have been received for



the former site of Kinross High School and another application is expected soon for the land around Lathro Farm. This could amount to 400 houses.

People ask if there are places in our schools for the children coming from these new houses to be educated. Currently there is capacity at our new high school but what about primary provision?

Kinross Primary School was built over 45 years ago and is now struggling to remain wind and watertight. Many of the classrooms are portacabins which were installed as 'temporary accommodation' nearly 40 years ago.

Perth & Kinross Council recognises that Kinross Primary School badly needs to be replaced. The estimated cost is around £12 million pounds. However, another primary school, Tulloch, in Perth, also is considered in need of replacement. PKC can only get enough Scottish Government funding to replace one of the two.

Consultants have been employed to assess both schools in order that a decision can be made on which will be selected.

What happens if Kinross is not chosen? It could mean that no replacement school will be built for our children until the early 2020s. If Kinross is chosen, and I will be doing my best to make this happen, the children of Tulloch will have to put up with a school which is in a poor state for the next 10 years. This is a most unsatisfactory situation and reminds me how the Council paid for the Loch Leven Community Campus and all the other schools that were provided under the Investment

in Learning programme. The then Council administration, of which I was a member, took the decision to raise Council Tax by 1% per year over a three-year period to raise the monies needed to fund our new schools.

This allowed the Council to build much needed new community campuses in Perth, Kinross, Crieff, Aberfeldy and Blairgowrie. This created for Kinross-shire a modern high school, library, museum and sports facilities.

If we in Perth & Kinross agreed today to increase the Council Tax we pay by 1% over 2 years to pay for new primary schools for Kinross and Tulloch, we could not be allowed to do it. This is because of our present Holyrood government's firm instruction that Councils keep their Council Tax frozen. Indeed, if we ignored this command and raised our tax anyway, the Council's grant from Holyrood would be slashed.


So Councils are in a powerless situation. We may have local priorities which need to be addressed, but are now so tightly controlled by Holyrood that our hands are tied. The government in Holyrood also instructs the Council on the number of new housing sites we must allow for. We must do as they say.

It is interesting to note that the SNP Government in the introduction of their huge booklet on their proposals for independence says that if the Scottish people reject separating from the rest of the UK "Decisions about Scotland would remain in the hands of others."

In the case of Perth & Kinross Council and the citizens we serve, and our ability to ensure that our children are educated in modern fit for purpose buildings, "decisions about Perth & Kinross remain in the hands of others," namely the government in Holyrood. Surely this is a classic case of double standards.

services lay beneath the road surface. There was a secondary purpose; to observe the workings of the traffic management scheme (using the term 'management' loosely). The general consensus was that the traffic flow was poor, resulting in huge inconvenience to local people and visitors alike.

It was with considerable apprehension that I learned, almost by coincidence, that Scottish Water had decided to proceed with an upgrade to the main sewer at a cost of £1 million and taking an estimated 16 weeks. Mindful of the recent disruption, I contacted the Leader of the Council, who wasted no time in calling a meeting between the Director of the Environment Service and Scottish Water executives. At that meeting I asked if it was absolutely necessary to perform the works. It seems that this is the only way to increase the capacity of the main sewer to deal with excess rainwater falling on the village.

The proposal envisages the creation of two large water-holding tanks, one in the garden of 38a New Road, the other under the flowerbed at the Cross. From the holding tanks, the rainwater will be piped to the Back Burn, so safeguarding the centre of the village from flooding and preventing sewage from backing up into houses.

Having established that the works are inevitable, I pointed to the unsatisfactory nature of the previously employed traffic management scheme and sought assurances that improvements would be made. For example, the phasing of the lights gave equal consideration to traffic from Wester Loan, which, as we know, is less frequented than New Road. I also pointed to the suspension of parking on New Road and South Street, parking being the very lifeblood of local businesses. I obtained an assurance that the section of New Road from the Thistle Hotel to the Post Office would remain available for temporary waiting. Consideration would, I was told, be given to waiting on South Street.

On asking why the traffic light on New Road was located so far to the east i.e. in line with the supermarket, I was told that it was to safeguard the safety of pedestrians using the zebra crossing, despite the fact that a member of the traffic management team was on the crossing at all times. I have asked our officials whether it might be possible to suspend the use of the zebra crossing for the duration of the works, so that the traffic light can be located where the road narrows. This would allow for parking on the south side of New Road, while speeding traffic flows. As zebra crossings are brought into being by a Traffic Management Order, a similar order would be required to suspend a crossing, and time is running out as the works are to begin by October.

So there you have it: short-term disruption to fix a long-term problem. Scottish Water have undertaken to engage the community in a consultation exercise sometime soon, whether in the Town Hall or the Thistle Hotel.

There was a lovely community atmosphere at the official opening of the Milnathort and Kinross Allotments on Saturday 16 August.

Activities included face painting and a scarecrow competition and there was lots of delicious home baking to be enjoyed.

The event was officially opened by journalist Lesley Riddoch, who described the people behind the project to provide allotments as "inspirational" and planted a tree to mark the occasion.

The allotments are on land leased from Dobbies and are accessed via the Dobbies car park at Turfhills.

Police recruiting

Police Scotland are due to hold information sessions in Dundee, Aberdeen and Inverness to assist people thinking of becoming a police officer or special constable. The candidate briefing sessions will detail the recruitment process and give advice on submitting a strong application. The sessions are open to anyone interested in applying to become a police officer or special constable, but who haven't yet started completing their application form.

Police Scotland are still recruiting both police officers and special constables and have a number of vacancies in the Tayside, Aberdeen City, Aberdeenshire and Moray, and Highlands and Islands areas.

Candidate briefing sessions will be held at Baluniefield Police Office, Baluniefield Drive in Dundee from 6.30pm until 7.45pm on Thursday 4 September, Wednesday 8 October and Thursday 6 November and on other dates in Aberdeen and Inverness.



Councillor Barnacle Proposed Local Landscape Areas (LLAs) for Kinross-shire

Ochils, Rural Scotland (APRS), Councillors Cuthbert, Giacopazzi and Robertson.

Dear Colleagues

You may recall the enclosed article I wrote for Rural Scotland's Spring 2014 Newsletter (Page 4) that also appeared in the May 2014 edition of Kinross CC's Newsletter. This charted the Kinross-shire experience on landscape designation since 2000; in particular the hard-fought successful campaign to extend the Areas of Great Landscape Value (AGLV's) to the shire's hill and river borders in the Local Plan 2004, the loss of them in PKC's Local Development Plan (LDP) adopted 3 February 2014, due to a change in Scottish Government Planning Policy and the 'policy gap' before supplementary guidance is produced on what is to replace them.

I noted that a Review of Local Landscape Designations at PKC was to be undertaken, with consultants having been appointed and sought participation.

I have since attended three meetings of the Review Panel, comprising PKC councillors (I represented APRS and Kinross-shire), community councils (Cleish, Fossoway and Glenfarg from Kinross-shire ward), environmental organisations (Friends of the Ochils, John Muir Trust, etc.)

On 14 August 2014, I attended the evening workshop for PKC councillors (4 only present) at which the consultants final report was produced and at which it was decided to circulate all councillors with this prior to a final public consultation this autumn.

The LLA's proposed for Kinross-shire are Lochleven, Ochil Hills and Portmoak (the boundaries of which should be checked). Despite strong representation from myself, Cleish and Fossoway CC's within the Review Panel, the consultants have excluded from designation the former AGLV's of the Cleish Hills and the River Devon and its gorge. I believe this is *a major omission* and it will be necessary to lobby PKC through the final public consultation to change the proposals and include these omitted areas. To achieve this, an examination of the ten evaluation criteria used by the consultants for designating LLA's is necessary to see what landscape characteristics these excluded areas possess that justify designation. The criteria are landscapes which:

- make a positive contribution to the wider identity, image and sense of place of Perth and Kinross
- 2. are rare or unique landscapes
- 3. are well managed and in a good state of repair
- 4. feel wild or remote
- 5. have strong scenic qualities
- 6. are important for recreation and tourism
- 7. have a strong **historic character** or important cultural or spiritual associations
- 8. have important natural features and habitats
- 9. form part of the setting of towns and villages
- 10. have important views, viewpoints or land marks

I suggest that Cleish Hills meet at least six of the above and it is worth noting that Fife Council's LLA's border the PKC boundary here and cross boundary designations were raised in the Review Panel but have been ignored here.

As regards the River Devon and its gorge, it should be remembered that the Reporter to the Local Plan public inquiry in 2003 regarded this area as of outstanding quality that merited inclusion as an AGLV, especially as the river flows out of the Ochil Hills designated area. I suggest that the river and its gorge meet at least eight of the above and I note the strong historic character and important cultural association of the Devon with Robert Burns' song 'The Banks of the Devon'; conversely, in supporting an LLA in the Aberfeldy area, the consultants quote Burns' song 'The Birks of Aberfeldy'.

In summary, I am extremely disappointed that the final consultant's report has ignored review panel representation on the Cleish Hills and the River Devon/Gorge when selecting their proposed LLA's and I urge local organisations and people to make representation on the consultation in order to ensure that PKC and its elected members change these proposals and include these areas as LLA's within the supplementary guidance for our recently adopted LDP. Influenza Vaccination

Saturday Flu Clinics

The autumn seems to have come round quickly again and we have therefore made plans for the annual flu campaign. As in previous years, the flu clinics will be on Saturday mornings. The dates are:

Saturday 4 October 9am to 1pm Saturday 1 November 9am to 1pm Saturday 15 November 9am to 1pm Saturday 29 November 9am to 1pm

Appointments may now be booked with reception. Please do not wait for a letter to be sent to you inviting you to make an appointment. If you are eligible, you may make your appointment now. Clinicians will visit the residential and nursing homes as usual to administer the vaccination.

We would encourage all those in the following groups to come for a flu injection:

Please note that patients who do not fall into these categories or who have no other clinical reason for receiving the flu vaccination will not be given the vaccination.

Childhood Flu Programme

The childhood flu vaccination programme is being extended to include all children aged between 2 and 11 years old. GP practices are responsible for vaccinating children aged 2 to 5 years old and we will be running clinics during the week to administer the nasal flu vaccine. Please contact Reception to make an appointment. Children at primary school will receive the vaccine at school.

Pneumococcal Vaccination

Patients who have just become 65, or will be 65 by 31 March 2015, will also be offered the pneumovax vaccination. This vaccination is generally only required once.

Shingles Vaccination

This vaccine will be offered to those in the following age groups: those aged 70 on 1 September 2014 (i.e. born between 2 September 1943 and 1 September 1944), and those aged 78 or 79 on 1 September 2014 (i.e. born between 2 September 1934 and 1 September 1936). This vaccine can be administered at the same time as the flu vaccination so a separate appointment is not required. Appointments can be made at the Saturday Flu Clinics.



Historic Scotlandwell



This is an extract from 'Historic Scotlandwell' by Iain W D Forde, written in both Standard English and Scots to provide an insight into the Scots language as well as the history of Scotlandwell.

Other extracts were previously published in the July and August 2013 and July 2014 issues of the Newsletter.

The Old School

South of the Peat Hill (the old name for Scotlandwell village green) was the School. Built in the mid 1830s by the principal landowners it is a building of considerable character which included a house for the schoolteacher and two classrooms, one of them with a partition wall in the middle of it. The playground to the south was also divided, in this case into boys' and girls' areas.

The cottage on the other side of the Main Street was built at the same time and and was used as a teaching kitchen for the school.

The present Primary School for Portmoak is in Kinnesswood.

At the end of the old playground is a new house called 'Causewayend' where the long raised roadway from Lochgelly terminates against the higher ground at the Old School House.

The Crooked Rigs

The cultivated ridges were formed by ploughing in long strips always throwing the soil up to the centre. In these were planted barley, oats and peas. The plough was a massive timber construction pulled by several oxen which required the co-operation of the villagers. Ridges were exchanged each year to ensure fairness. This was all controlled by tradition, with disputes being settled in a local parliament.

Access to the ploughed land was by way of the Sandy Lane which cuts deep into the hill after generations of traffic. The sides are now overhung by attractive bushes and trees.

Later systems of agriculture gradually led to the ridges

being amalgamated into fields with new crops, such as potatoes and turnips, being used in rotation instead of leaving land fallow to rest.

These changes came very late to Scotlandwell and the 'Crooked Rigs' can still be easily seen from the upper part of the Sandy Lane or from the Causeway.

The Auld Skuil

At the en o the auld pleygrun is a nyow house cryed 'Causewayend' whaur the lang rased causie frae Lochgellie feinisis agin the heicher grun at the Auld Skuil House.

The Cruikit Riggs

The tillit riggs wes furmed bi plewin in lang skreids aye kestin the syle uplins inti the mids. In thur wes plauntit bere, aits an peis. The plew wes a mukkil timmer structur poued bi severals o ousen at med it necessar fur the cottars to complouther.



Pte John Brown

John Brown was an Argyll and Sutherland Highlander who was killed in action on 30 September 1918.

He was the son of Thomas and Margaret Turpie of 38 High Street, Kinross. John, in civil life, had been employed as a miner at the Aitken Colliery, Kelty, and had joined the army as a result of the miners' ballot in 1917. Prior to enlisting, he had been an enthusiastic member of the Kinross Volunteers. His cheery disposition and natural aptitude for soldiering, which was even then apparent, made him a great favourite with all ranks.

He received his army training in Ireland and was then drafted to France. It is poignant that he was killed after so short a service on the battlefield. In a letter to his bereaved parents his Lieutenant wrote, "It is with a heavy heart that I write on behalf of my men to offer you sincere sympathy in the death of your son, 27545 Pte. J. Brown. He was killed on the 30th of last month when we were doing an attack and is buried beside his companions who fell on the same day. I am having a cross erected over his grave. He was a very good and brave soldier."

John's three older brothers all served and survived the war. The eldest, David, served with the Royal Scots and Highland Light Infantry. Thomas served in the Royal Navy and Robert served in the Fife and Forfar Yeomanry.

A member of the West Church of Kinross, John Brown's name is listed on the Church Roll of Honour. His grave is at Joncourt British Cemetery, Aisne. The majority of the burials within the cemetery are men of the 10th Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. All the graves date from the period 30 September to 4 October 1918.

Purchases from small ads - Advice

Using the small ads and intemet for items that you need or would like is something that almost everyone does. However, if the transaction is with a seller/buyer you do not know, consider these measures and do some research.

What details do you put in the initial advert?

Limit the amount of personal information in the ad – even a postcode will give an area that criminals can focus on if the itemis valuable. Any information posted can be used by others for ulterior motives or to establish where you live or the items for sale are likely to be stored.

Think carefully about whether you should provide a telephone number. There are pros and cons: you retain your privacy by not posting it, but you can have a better feel for a potential buyer by speaking to the person.

Stage photos to obscure identifying information. People taking photos of cars for sale in their driveway often unknowingly give away the house number and licence plate number.

What details has the seller/buyer given you?

Name, address, email address, mobile telephone number and landline number (that relates to the address given) once a transaction has been agreed. If these details do not match up with any internet or other search that you conduct, or you feel uneasy about the details given, then walk away from the deal. Advise the buyer that you will require identification from them such as passport ordriving licence when you meet up.

If you are selling a vehicle, get the details of the driving licence. If possible, get these details emailed to you with the counterpane. Are there points on it for speeding or other offences? Do you have concems that the driver may be banned? If the driving licence looks fake, or the details are not corresponding with other information, you may want to walk away from the deal.

Where is the transaction going to occur?

Bringing a buyer to your home as a seller to complete the transaction means that they know where you live, they may then say that the item is not what they are 'looking for'.

Do not meet in a car park, lay-by or at the address of someone you do not know unless you are going with at least one other person. Ideally you should meet in a well-populated environment, possibly a venue with CCTV cameras. Again, if someone is not confident meeting in a 'safe' environment, then walk away.

During the meeting

When the potential buyer arrives, take the make, model and registration mark of any car or motorcycle used if you don't already know this and you can text message this information to a friend or family member who knows about the meeting.

Although you have been sent identification documents, ask to see the original and take a copy. It will act as a bit of a deterrent for people; someone will be less likely to attempt to steal from you if you can provide police with a positive identification if the buyer does not conclude the deal.

Keep a mobile phone tumed on and within reach.

Know your route. If you are taking someone out for a test drive, make sure a friend or family member knows the planned route, estimated return time and your mobile phone number.

Keep buyers in sight. If a buyer arrives with an entourage, do not let the people separate, especially at your home. If you are wary of the buyers, do not allow access, or limit where in your home they are

If it is a postal or courier transaction

If you are sending goods, then make sure that the items have to be signed for with identification, address and any other relevant details. It costs more to do this but gives an audit trail, especially if it is a high value item.

Is the deal too good?

Is the item far too cheap? Then there is a possibility it is a fake,

stolen or does not work and will not come with any form of warranty – it is buyer beware.

If it is a cash transaction, then some buyers use counterfeit currency; some of it will pass a brief inspection, but using an ultraviolet torch will show you quickly that there is a problem with the money.

Are you shown an item in a bag?

A genuine item can be shown to a buyer in a carrier bag, the bag is closed and swapped for one that is roughly the same weight and the amount agreed paid buy the unsuspecting buyer. Take the item for sale out of the bag, so you see what is being bought, bring your own bag to put it in – the more unique the better – and place it where both parties can see it.

Payment

There are different ways you can pay for goods: cash, cheque, banker's draft, bank transfer or ESCROW. Each method of payment has potential dangers; be careful. Cash, cheques and banker's drafts can be forged or counterfeited. DO NOT pay using a money transfer company such as Westem Union or Moneygram; it is for transferring money between people who already know each other well. CHAPS payment has a fee attached and is irrevocable. If you are paying on a website, then make sure that it has encrypted payment facilities.

The only time that your PIN will be requested is when you use an ATM – never divulge this information otherwise.

Fraudulent schemes

Police again wam of becoming a victim of scams involving alleged lottery winnings.

In the last month, an elderly woman received a number of telephone calls claiming she had won hundreds of thousands of pounds in a USA lottery and was instructed to send cash and cheques to different addresses in the UK to pay for various taxes, before she could receive any money.

Schemes such as these can perpetrated by people cold calling by telephone, attending at their home address, via unsolicited letters, emails or sending texts. Fraudsters can claim to represent various organisations, including banks, financial institutions, government bodies and even lottery operators, as well as masquerading as seemingly reputable businesses.

While it is common practice to carry out transactions over the phone or the internet, take nothing for granted. Never give out any personal information, including bank details, to any unknown agency. If you are unsure, take details of the company and check out their credentials. Personal information should not be shared until you are entirely satisfied that the person you are doing business with is legitimate and reputable.

If something appears too good to be true, then it usually is. If you have any concerns or information regarding fraudulent activity, contact Police Scotland on 101.

Kinross Community Council

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 6 August 2014 were: CCllrs D Colliar (Chair), C Watson, D Mackay, W Freeman, D West, M Wood, G Thomas and M Scott (Secy); P&K Cllrs W Robertson and M Barnacle; representatives from the Police; representatives from Persimmon Homes and a large number of local residents. Apologies for absence were received from: CCllrs M Blyth, I Jack and B Davies and P&K Cllrs J Giacopazzi and D Cuthbert.

Declarations of Interest: CCllr Watson declared an interest in the Newsletter disbursements at this meeting.

Police Report: Crimes reported were: theft of a bike from the High Street and a car from Lathro Park (both under enquiry). There have been issues with youths congregating at the bottom of Swansacre, at the Day Centre and in Kirkgate Park. The Police are jointly working with local youth workers to try to encourage youths to engage in alternative activities. The representatives stated that they were sad to see T in the Park They were thanked for their attendance and for presenting this report.

Persimmon Homes Development at Lathro Farm: The Chairman advised that there was to be no discussion on the High School site. The planning application had been refused and we would have to wait to see what develops next.

David Jinks from Persimmon Homes introduced his colleagues and explained that a pre-application notice had been submitted in relation to the Lathro site. Those present could examine display boards.

It was proposed to construct 300 units on this farmland, incorporating 25% affordable properties. As part of the public consultation process, two public meetings had taken place and meetings arranged with both Kinross and Milnathort CCs. The meeting earlier that day was well attended; the public inspected the plans and discussed the proposals. The site is 38 hectares overall. Environmental and traffic assessments are being carried out and it was planned to commence work on the site around winter 2015 with work complete in 2015/2016. The proposed properties are all twostorey, ranging from two-bedroom mid terraced to detached, using similar materials to those in Lathro Park.

Concerns were raised at the added number of pupils for both the primary and secondary schools. The Local Development Plan records this site (H47) as 13 ha with 260 units (140 up to 2024). A buffer is to be incorporated between Kinross and Milnathort with parkland and landscaped areas. Further questions raised were answered by Persimmon Homes.

Matters arising from meeting of 2 July

Parking: no response yet from the Council.

Newsletter Charity accounts: The Chairman has still to approach Ross McConnell.

Credit Union presentation will take place at September meeting.

Springfield Road: Cllr Robertson advised that, once again, a number of residents raised concerns in relation to traffic along this road. Speed checks are planned.

Kinross Newsletter Disbursements

CCllr Thomas reported on two new applications received:

Kinross-shire Volunteer Group & Rural Outreach Scheme ask for funding towards replacing their outdated computer, printing and telephone system. The cost is £1239.94. This was discussed. It was suggested further research would be advisable and CCllr West agreed to speak to the organisation and report back next month.

Colin Hogg, who is undertaking a fundraising bike ride towards the cost of a light wheel chair for Graeme Paterson who suffers from MND is looking for a contribution from the Newsletter Fund. The gentleman, formerly of Kinross, now resides in Pitlochry. After discussion, the application was regret fully rejected as not meeting KCCNL criteria.

There may be an application next month from Positive Choices. They have requested an application form but it has not yet been submitted.

Kinross Buildings

Former High School site: PKC expect a reapplication from Persimmon Homes. The four local Councillors have confirmed what they would find acceptable on this site.

Town Hall: Work has commenced and is progressing.

Mill Street: The proposal to convert the former PKC offices to a car park has been agreed and budgeted for, but the start date is unknown.

Town Hall: Cllr Robertson has written to PKC asking if the clock can be repaired and put back in order.

Park and Ride: A suggestion was received that it would be helpful if a shelter were made available at the Park and Ride to secure disability scooters. PKC are looking into this. Some of the bicycle containers are damaged and an estimate is to be obtained for repair.

High Street: A request was made for a zebra crossing to be constructed south of the Town Hall as part of the High Street Regeneration. Money was not included in the Regeneration for this but it would be considered.

TRACKS: Their funding has been stopped and this will impact dramatically on their operations.

Grass cut: A meeting has been arranged with the deputy manager. Comment was made to both Kirkgate Park and the Heritage Trail. It was suggested that someone should be engaged to supervise and have overall responsibility for this. Comment was made of voluntary organisations such as Duke of Edinburgh, Scouts etc. The problem arises through budget cuts.

Correspondence

Local Development Plan: Draft supplementary guidance has been prepared to support LDP Policy NE4: Green In frastructure; comments are now being sought.

Town Hall works: Notification of parking and loading ban for 32 weeks from 23 July.

Regeneration: Following talks with internal and external third parties and concerns around a winter programme, as well as the risks associated with undertaking work during freezing temperatures, PKC has taken the decision to delay the start of the construction works until the beginning of March 2015.

Other business

Bus stop: CCllr Mackay said that due to parked cars, some buses were not stopping at the temporary High Street bus stop (outside Kilt Shop). She suggested that this be removed to the fountain area. Cllr Robertson will look into this.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the August Meeting

CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Bennet, Halford, Milne-Home, Pettinger, Smith and Thomson to the meeting held on 14 August 2014. Also in attendance were P&K Cllr Robertson, two representatives from Persimmon Homes and four members of the public. Apologies were received from CCllr Cottingham; P&K Cllrs Barnacle, Cuthbert and Giacopazzi and from the Police.

Police matters: The Chair summarised the report provided by the Police as follows:

Following speed checks at Mawcarse and Burleigh Road, five warnings have been given, and two tickets issued.

There have been incidents of fly tipping reported, particularly in the countryside; not only is it dangerous to passing traffic, but also a health hazard. Members of the public are asked to report any incidents they witness.

There have been a few incidents of heavy plant machinery being stolen; it is likely that large transporters have been used, and members of the public are asked to report such vehicles parked in suspicious circumstances.

Members of the public have reported receipt of fraudulent letters, which claim that the recipient has won a large sum of money, and ask for bank account details; do not divulge bank details unless you are sure any such requests are genuine.

There are charity collectors canvassing in the area; the majority are genuine, but please make sure you are aware of the facts before handing over money or bank details.

Matters arising: The Chair advised that, since the last meeting, the **churchyard paths** had been resurfaced.

CCllr Thomson reported her early concerns about the resurfacing work carried on **Ba'** Hill, but following consultation with Cllr Robertson, she noted that the surface had bedded down and was less slippery.

Planning applications: The following planning applications in Milnathort were considered, but no comments were made: 14/01109/IPL Residential development (in principle) at land 70 metres south east of Hattonburn Lodge.

14/01128/IPL Erection of dwelling house (in principle) at land 70 metres west of Blairnathort Farm.

14/01163/LBC Installation of replacement windows at Flat 4, Church Buildings.

Planning applications determined: The CC noted that the following applications had been **approved**:

14/00856/FLL Alterations and extension to dwelling house and erection of outbuilding with photographic studio at Westhall Farmhouse.

08/00805/AML Erection of 5 dwelling houses and garages, formation of access road and associated site works (reserved matters) on land at Old Perth Road.

14/00848/FLL Alterations and extension to dwelling house, The Coppice, Mawcarse Farm.

14/00474/FLL Removal of condition 3 (occupancy) from planning permission 08/01141/FLL: Erection of a dwelling house, straw shed and stable block, Wester Tillyrie Steadings. 14/00940/FLL Extension to house, 4 Mill Lade.

14/00987/FLL: Extension to house, 50 Church Street.

14/01170/FLL: Erection of agricultural building at land at Ledlanet Estate.

The CC also noted that the following application had been **refused**: 13/00680/FLL Erection of a wind turbine, Temple Hill Wind Farm, Glenfarg.

Lathro Development: Mr Stephen Kelso, Senior Architect, and Mr David Jinks, Development Planner, represented Persimmon Homes. Mr Kelso outlined Persimmon's plans for the development, as follows:

PKC's Local Development Plan (LDP) shows a development of about 260 '3-4 bedroom' houses on the site, however Persimmon Homes intends to build 300 smaller houses.

Persimmon Homes have conducted two consultation exercises; the first was attended by 12 people, but 70 people had attended the more recent consultation on 6 August 2014. Concerns had been voiced about the back-to-back development with the existing Lathro Park Estate, but of the 38 hectares on site, only 9 hectares would be developed and a buffer zone would be provided. He noted that the current Forth Wines site was also zoned for mixed-use development.

A country park, an open-space area with pockets of trees, would also be provided in the vicinity of the Queich on the flood plain.

More detailed planning would now be carried out including an Environmental Impact Assessment (including a drainage assessment), and a Traffic Impact Assessment, once the school term had begun.

The development would be carried out in two phases; the first phase would be for 140 houses, for which planning applications would be sent to PKC in October 2014, with the intention to start building works in August 2015.

Members of the public were given the opportunity to study planning illustrations of the site and make comments. The following concerns were raised:

- Insufficient parking available: Mr Kelso explained that the parking requirements were set by PKC, and included 2 spaces per house plus a percentage of visitor parking.
- Access to the new site, particularly about dangers to children using the skate park (who are apt to run out from the park towards the main road into Milnathort). Mr Kelso stated that the access road would be halfway between the Lodge and the skate park, furthermore a pathway towards Milnathort would be provided from the skate park. He also noted that the Traffic Impact Assessment would address such issues, but the current assessment by Persimmon Homes was that a new traffic roundabout would not be required.

Path maintenance: The Chair advised that the pathways at Tillywhally and in the vicinity of Burleigh Castle had become dangerously overgrown in recent weeks; he noted that Carrs Billington had provided a quantity of 'Round Up' weedkiller. Following discussion, the MCC agreed to provide up to £200 next year to maintain the paths. Cllr Robertson offered to investigate whether the Youth Justice System might wish to assist with maintenance of the paths.

Reduced opening hours for campus gym: The Chair advised that he had received an email from a member of the public passing his concerns about the possible reduction of the gymnasium opening hours to the public from October 2014, in order to save money for PKC. During a lengthy discussion it emerged that PKC wished to save about £50,000 from the exercise, but the loss in revenue would be about £25,000 over a year, thus reducing the overall saving. The MCC agreed that, coupled with recent cuts to library availability, this further reduction in gymnasium hours would hurt the local community badly; it was disappointed with PKC's approach to savings, as again it would be the community that would suffer. The Secretary agreed to write to the Convener of the Lifelong Learning Committee, PKC, copying the letter to the local Cllrs, to report MCC's concerns.

Traffic disruption: The Chair had received an email from Cllr Giacopazzi, advising that Scottish Water (SW) were proposing to carry out traffic-light controlled work over a 16 week period from October. A lively discussion ensued which focused on the severe traffic disruption during earlier SW

works in June 2014, and the negative effect on local business over a protracted period. Cllr Robertson stated that every local business had noted a downturn during that period; he also advised that SW were intending to call a public meeting in October, so it was likely that work would be delayed until 2015. Cllr Robertson stated that he would expect SW to inform the CC of its intentions for the work which would protect 4-5 houses from flooding at a cost of about £1 million, but the CC might care to invite SW to attend a CC meeting in due course. Community Resilience - Where do We Fit on? CCllr Milne -Home introduced the item by informing the meeting that several campaigners have formed a Group called 'The Referendum and Communities in Scotland', which has developed proposals for enhancing the role of community councils in Scotland to ensure that CC voices are heard by local authorities and government, and have greater impact than at present. The group have put their proposals on a Facebook page for public access and consultation - see below. Following a discussion, CCllr Milne-Home agreed to write to the group giving the CC's support for their efforts to ensure that CCs have a greater impact and enhanced role in the community.

Cleish and Blairadam CC

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 4 August 2014 were: CCllrs R Kitchin, P Fraser, H Somerville, N Robertson, J Moore and M Traylor; P&K Cllr M Barnacle and four members of the community. Apologies were received from CCllr R Jeffrey, Police and P&K Cllr Cuthbert.

Crime prevention

There was no police officer in attendance. The submitted report said there were no new crimes in the area. It was reported by CCllr Fraser that the horsebox stolen from Wester Cleish had been found in Campbeltown and returned. There was mention of some fly tipping; keep reporting suspicious vehicles to 101. There has not been any further report or action regarding the stolen baskets taken from Blairadam.

Correspondence

CCIIr Kitchin wrote to the Church Trustees regarding possible community purchase of The Glebe, and received a reply stating that the request has been passed on to Mr Balfour.

Outhmuir application for the Wind Farm was refused, but there has now been an appeal to the Scottish Government. Cllr Barnacle reported that he contacted the Reporter to provide background information regarding the Landscape Review that PKC is currently undertaking as to the replacement for the current AGLV status of the land bordering this application.

C&B Website

During T in the Park there was a significant increase in website use, up to 158 visitors per day. Traffic is now back to 70-80 per day. There are now more hits on the home page, not just the planning pages. There are now seven subscriptions for the newsletter.

Village updates - Blairadam

CCllr Robertson is still to finalise a report summarising the work required on the road/verges. Perhaps a village meeting may be able to provide a consensus of opinion as to what should be put forward to PKC, with particular emphasis on safety due to the speed, type and volume of inappropriate traffic. There have been reports of someone falling off a bike due to road conditions. Cllr Barnacle reported that we still need a more proactive approach with Gary McConnell to try to finalise a visit to the village.

A Red Squirrel has been seen on the road – perhaps another indication for speed reductions?

A quote from a local joiner has been received for the three notice boards. It was agreed that the CC would be willing to contribute towards these but suggested that there should be some Community or Hall Committee fund raising to match funds to help pay for them.

It was requested that people should consider their neighbours before lighting bonfires.

Village updates – Cleish

The Manse has been sold, as has the corner of the Glebe. There have been no discussions on the Right of Way access. Congratulations to Keltybridge and Maryburgh on winning

Congratulations to Keltybridge and Maryburgh on win the best kept Hamlet competition.

There have been several incidents of horse muck on the road through the centre of Cleish, along with damage to the verges. Much effort and expense goes into keeping the verges in good condition so it was requested that this exercising on the verges perhaps could stop. A shovel could be placed behind the village hall wall for cleaning up the horse muck.

Planning

Fiona MacGregor was not in attendance to provide updates. It was reported that the application In Principle for a dwelling house at Cleish Mains Steading has been approved. An application at Gruinard for two dwelling houses (In Principle) was not brought to the attention of the CCllrs, however this application has already been refused.

There has been some development within the woods opposite Green acres. It is thought that this land is not associated with the Treescape business. There is now a wooden building being built around portacabins; CCllr Fraser to write to the Planning Officer to question this.

There has been further extension to the fencing at Green acres. MB has suggested to PKC the possibility of erecting a permanent fence around this site as per the LDP to confine this settlement boundary.

Other business

A request has been made to the CC to ask PKC about cleaning the **streetlamps** in Cleish.

It has been reported to the CC that a **motorway sign** is in a poor position for tractors, obscuring sight lines.

A member of the community asked that instead of multiple cutting of verges, it was just as important to clean up the **grit** and debris that accumulates at the sides of the road itself.

Cllr Barnacle reported that George Lawrie (TRACKS) and Brian Cargill (Green Routes) had a meeting, looking at possible **new routes** to link up Benarty, Ballingry, Paranwell Bridge, Blairforge and then possibly into Cleish via Sunnyside. The CC were in support of this idea, and suggested that if they were happy investigating possible funding for this project, then a full proposal could be put to the CC for agreement and support.

There are reports of **dangerous driving** along the main road between Blairforge and Kelty.

The next meeting of Cleish and Blairadam CC will take place on Monday 6 October 2014 at the Cleish Village Hall, 7.30pm.

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 5 August 2014 were: CCllrs S Morrison, K Borthwick, T Duffy-Wigman and G Pye; P&K Cllr M Barnacle and ten members of the public. Apologies for absence were received from: CCllrs A Cheape, A Lavery and R Paterson; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert, J Giacapazzi and W Robertson and the Community Police Officer.

Declarations of interest: None.

Community policing Report received. The only recent crime in the area is the theft of a motor home from Crook of Devon which is under enquiry. Incidence of fly-tipping seems to be increasing; anyone spotting this in progress should report any details of registration numbers etc to the police.

A member of the public asked about process for handling runaways from Seamab School, as reports of a recent incident revealed that the control centre (contacted using the 101 number) didn't know anything about the school. Kevin will raise this with the Police.

Perth and Kinross Credit Union: Details will be put on the Fossoway website.

Unpaid work team: Arek Nowrotek of the Criminal Justice Service has asked for suggestions. Previously we have suggested using the team to clear offlets in various roads in Fossoway or perhaps do some additional verge cutting. See also AOCB.

Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: Hugh Wallace attended to provide an update: SSE have withdrawn their requirement for a large sum to upgrade the power network, which returns the project to a sound economic footing. Energy for All have been helping with arrangements to raise community funding. One of the landowners is currently refusing to sign an agreement for the pipeline to pass his land pending the sale of his house – alternatives routes are possible, but difficult. A member of the public asks if there is any risk of asbestos being found in the ground that was previously a rubbish tip. Hugh says that sampling hasn't revealed any, but obviously it will be handled appropriately were it to be found.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle reports that some work is taking place, although it appears to be behind schedule. He has reminded the builders of the importance of completing this before November.

Crook Moss Travellers' site: There is no information about progress in enforcing the planning conditions, particularly with regard to noise. This CC and Cllrs will continue to press the issue.

Landscape Review: Alastair attended.

Planning Users Forum: Kevin attended this meeting, during which it was announced that input for the next local plan is already being sought.

Councillors' reports

CIIr Barnacle: Request for mitigation measures on A977 has been made to PKC; some minor works to anti-skid surface will be done, and a survey of HGV traffic will be made. It's now necessary to persuade the Council to instruct the Roads Department to resume work on preparing the business plan for the major mitigation measures – support of this CC will help. Dunning Bridge has been addressed.

A previously reported problem with a bad smell at Crook of Devon has now abated.

Carnbo Post Box: Previous correspondence from the Post Office in London stated that letters could be handed to delivery staff in the absence of a local post box. General opinion amongst those present was that this was not being allowed by local staff. Cllr Barnacle will forward the letter from the London Office to the Kinross office to elicit their comments.

Over the past few weeks the UK organisation 'Friends of the Elderly' have been running a campaign that is calling on everyone to BEA FRIEND and help change the future of loneliness in our neighbourhoods. It's a problem that is seriously on the rise and one that is a major cause of chronic depression in our ever growing elderly population, Studies show that it is affecting as many as 5 million elderly people across the UK, many of whom claim they can go for weeks without speaking to anyone!

To help us identify who these people are, the organisation has outlined 'The Spotting Signs of Loneliness.' It suggests that loneliness can affect anyone but bereavement, physical disability, poor health, and lack of money can all be triggers. By being more neighbourly, we can become more aware of who is in need of some support. So we are being encouraged to think about the simple everyday ways we can connect. For example, offer a smile and a hello to an elderly neighbour and, if welcomed, take five minutes to have a chat. This could be in the supermarket, at a bus station or just walking along the road.

These informal chats can soon establish what offers of help might be appreciated e.g. helping to carry their shopping or loading it in their car, offering to put their bins out or bring them in, walking their dog when needed, be a key holder, taking them some homemade soup or baking or extending an occasional invitation for a meal.

Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Carrot and Courgette Soup

Ingredients

50 g butter

225 g carrots, washed, trimmed and sliced 225 g courgettes, washed, trimmed and sliced

600 ml of chicken or vegetable stock

1 bay leaf

1 tablespoon tomato purée

1 tablespoon caster sugar

Salt and pepper to taste

Method

Melt the butter in a pan and add the carrots and courgettes. Cover and cook gently for 10 minutes till softened.

Add the stock, bay leaf, tomato purée and caster sugar. Bring the pan to the boil, cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Remove the bay leaf and leave to cool slightly.

Purée till smooth and season to taste. Reheat gently.

This soup freezes well.







Hello again, folks. It looks like summer has deserted us for the moment (well at least as I write, cos the rain is beltin down) – still, we have had quite a guid summer so far.

Since the last article, we have done a lot of work out on the wetland and the place is looking a bit tidier as we have cut a lot of the vegetation growth back to provide ideal habitat for the wintering migrants that will soon be winging towards our shores. Pinkfeet geese should start to appear back in this area around the third week of the month, possibly before if the Icelandic weather turns bad and winds are favourable to blow them down.

The Glossy Ibis is still putting in regular appearances on the flood and passage migrants like greenshank have been seen as well. The last few days have seen hundreds of swallows and sand martins flying low over the centre and courtyard, catching low flying insects before they go on their long migration.

Now then, a bit of a coup for Dougie and the café team: they have been awarded a Food for Life Gold Catering Mark from the Soil Association! The accreditation means that RSPB Loch Leven Café is the first visitor attraction in Scotland to be awarded the gold, and think of how many of them we have throughout the land including some real biggies. It is also the first one in the whole of Britain for all RSPB tearooms and cafés. The Soil Association inspector commented that the team shows a real commitment to serving freshly prepared, sustainable food, with nearly half of our overall spend going on organic ingredients. It went on to say the café offers a choice of fresh, healthy and super tasty food that is good for our visitors as well as the planet! Chefy boy said he was passionate! 

Once again it's been a very busy month. Maybe we're feeling a little squeezed because Craig is away!

On 26 July we held an event focusing on Dragonflies and Damselflies. Danielle from the British Dragonfly society joined us as we focused on these species at Loch Leven and Portmoak Moss. The most important thing about a dragonfly event is that the weather is good. The weather was perfect for dragonflies and nine species were seen. The highlight for the group was watching a Common Hawker (one of the big ones) laying eggs at Portmoak.

July is normally a quiet month for birdwatching, but there has been no shortage of birds to look at on the loch. The Glossy Ibis continues its stay at the RSPB centre. It's been here for nearly 100 days now! The family party of six Crossbills were still at Burleigh. Vagrant American ducks were well represented with American widgeon and Lesser Scaup seen about the loch. Over 3600 Greylag Geese and

800 Mute Swans were using the relative safety of Loch Leven to moult. A surprise on 30 July was an Adult Gannet near the Pier. We see juvenile gannets almost annually on the loch. It was nice to watch this powerful seabird assuming its arrow shape diving into the loch for fish. There have also been lots of broods of ducklings around the margins of the loch. Gadwall and Mallard look to have done particularly well. Greater Scaup appear to have nested on the loch for the first time, with the appearance of an adult and a duckling. These ducks normally nest much further

An event for your diary is the Fungi Foray on Sunday **28 September** from 2pm until 4pm from Findatie Car Park. It will be Craig's first event after he returns from Noss. He will be joined by a mycologist looking at the fungi around Levenmouth woods. This event is our most popular, so please book early to avoid disappointment.

We've been poor at updating the blog recently, but we should be back up and running with that shortly. Please keep an eye out on www.lochlevennnr.wordpress.com. Updates will be more frequent when we are back to the full quota of staff in the office.

Remember that now is the best time of year to be looking for Ospreys. They feed on the loch at any time of the day, but dawn and dusk are best. With up to 20 seen in a night, it's a fantastic wildlife spectacle right on your doorstep. **TTFN**



The next day she won bronze as part of the 4 x 400m British relay team in another exciting race.

Speaking after winning the gold medal, Eilidh said: "Obviously the Commonwealths meant a lot because it was at home but to actually have my own title now and be European champion is the best feeling ever."
