#### The Big Street Party

I'm sure I speak on behalf of the majority of the shops, retail units and businesses in Kinross High Street when I say **Thank You KLEO** (Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation).

I feel we must all take the time to say a special thanks to Bouwien Bennet & Melvin Ryzner and Councillor Dave Cuthbert for their time and efforts in ensuring that the shop traders' and local businesses' Street Party was the success that it was.

This small group of people worked around the clock: hundreds of emails, meetings, communications day and night, family lives disrupted and all this because they wanted to help the local shop retailers and businesses. No fees were paid to them – this was all done voluntarily.

Bouwien, Melvin and Dave's drive, passion and enthusiasm drove the planning forward at a very fast pace, overcoming obstacles and huge challenges along the way.

Volunteers were thin on the ground and we all had to pull 'favours' and resources from all areas to help.

Hunters' initial dream of a small party outside the butcher shop to celebrate the opening of the High Street soon turned into the much larger 'Big Street Party' we now know.

Old and young dancing in the street, free funfair rides, Star Wars characters, dancers, Zumba, ukulele band, the smell of barbecue wafting in the air, the elderly and disabled clapping hands and happy faces everywhere.

The whole object of the day was to get people back to their High Street and into the shops and, as they did, all participating outlets' sales targets were being smashed! #### Is it Effective or just Efficient?

I read with interest Councillor Giacopazzi's article on Police Scotland in the last Newsletter.

His closing sentence contained the following: "efficiencies have been created". I am sure they have, but at what human cost? It is one thing to save financial resources, it is quite another to be effective. Effectiveness is what we all want and it exists at a higher level of organisational theory than efficiency.

I support and have every sympathy for police officers; my father served for 30 years in the Highlands so I know what it is like but we have all witnessed mistake after mistake (I do not have to list them) from Police Scotland. At times it has looked shambolic. Why? Because under stress officers and support staff are striving to make these "efficiencies". The Scottish Government pledged to keep officers on the beat but have funded that by slashing senior positions above the rank of Inspector, closed stations, put so much pressure on call staff that absenteeism is at a record high and now a third of officers want to leave. It might be efficient but it certainly is not effective. You do not get the best out of staff by making their working lives intolerable.

I know Councillor Giacopazzi speaks to his constituents so maybe he should engage them on this topic and see how many agree with his satisfaction on the "efficiencies" or my take on the need for an "effective", highly motivated, police force.

#### Dramatic attempt on cash machine with stolen JCB

There was an audacious attempt to steal the automated cash machine at Sainsbury's in Kinross in the early hours of Saturday

Thieves apparently stole a JCB from a nearby building site at Junction Road and, using the JCB's telescopic arm, tried to remove the cash dispenser. Considerable damage was caused to the surrounding wall, but the perpetrators left empty-handed, abandoning the JCB at the scene.

Following discovery of the incident, the supermarket car park and grounds were cordoned off by Police as they searched for evidence and the store

remained closed for the whole day.

Police Scotland say that a vehicle similar to a black pick-up truck was seen with the JCB and they are appealing for information. For more details, see Police Box, page 28.

#### **Nominations for Community Councils**

Nominations for Community Councils in the Perth & Kinross local authority area closed on 5 October following an extension to the nomination period.

The following Community Councils in the Kinross-shire area gained sufficient nominations to be formed:

- Glenfarg (11 nominations for 12 seats)
- Cleish & Blairadam (6 nominations for 8 seats)
- Fossoway & District (6 nominations for 8 seats)
- Portmoak (8 nominations for 8 seats)

The nominated candidates for the above CCs are regarded as being elected unopposed on 5 November 2015 and there will be no vote. The CCs which do not have a full complement of members (Glenfarg, Cleish & Blairadam and Fossoway & District) may co-opt eligible residents to fill the vacancies, but must wait six months after the election date before doing so.

There were 12 nominations for the 11 seats on **Kinross CC**, therefore an election will take place. A trial of internet voting is taking place in Kinross. Residents eligible to vote should have received a Poll Letter by post from PKC in October. Residents may vote by internet at any time after receipt of the letter, up to 7pm on polling day. Follow the instructions on the Poll Letter and then on-screen. Alternatively, voting can be in person at the Polling Station, which is the community campus, on Thursday 5 November (11am-7pm). Voting at the Polling Station will also be electronic. Staff will be on hand to help if required.

There were only two nominations for **Milnathort CC**. As this is fewer than 50% of the seats, a Community Council cannot be formed in Milnathort.

quickly as possible.

I am the Chair of the Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation (KLEO).

We were approached by a couple of traders in August with a request to help put on a

Street Party to celebrate the fact that the roadworks were over and that people could return to the area which now looked nice - the hope being to kick start trade in the town centre as

We agreed to do this, on the basis that we have the team needed to make it happen in a professional way.

From the outset, the task was not simple. There was a lot of negative feelings towards the roadworks as they were causing many businesses real financial hardship and we were given a lot of grief by some of these traders throughout the process. We appeared to be getting the blame for the difficulties the roadworks were causing.

However, our enquiries with all the traders on the High Street indicated that the vast majority were keen on the idea.

We put together a draft proposal for the party which included a headline act to draw in the crowds from outwith the area and came up with a total budget of £15,000, which we put to Perth and Kinross Council as a proposal.

This proposal was somewhat tongue in cheek, however we were delighted when the Council agreed to the full amount. I should say that the money for this came from a ring-fenced

events budget; it could only be used for this purpose and could not be used to reimburse traders' losses due to the roadworks. This proposal included budgeted amounts for a number of items such as £600 for distribution of leaflets through the Royal Mail and £750 for Qualified Security Personnel and many other estimated costs.

The planning of the event has taken a huge amount of time and effort on the part of KLEO and a number of traders. I want to publicly thank some of the team for their hard work. There are too many to name everyone, so I want to pick out three individuals whose contribution was enormous.

Firstly, Pamela Hunter of Hunters the Butchers. She was a driving force throughout the process, organising things like the Star Wars and Frozen characters, the Kennedy Cupcakes, the DJ Ewen Cameron, and many other things.

Next I want to mention the Deputy Event Manager, Bouwien Bennet. She is the Event Co-ordinator of KLEO and is the magic element which made the event happen. She had the job of organising all the other events on the day, the finances, the administrative paperwork, the delivery of the leaflets, the team of volunteers, the press releases and most other things! Finally, I want to mention Melvin Ryznar. Melvin is the Health and Safety expert on KLEO and his task was to complete all the complex paperwork required for an event of this sort (including a complicated 12-page Management Plan). This requires liaising with the council, the police, the fire brigade and all the other Health and Safety teams. Without Melvin, the event would not have happened.

On the day, these team members were on site with me from 6am in the morning until we had completed a final litter pick at 8pm that night. Needless to say, they were all exhausted by the end of it.

I hope that everyone who attended (we estimate there were 6,000 people there) enjoyed themselves and will agree with me that it was a fantastic event.

We are now working out the finances in order to submit a return to the Council. Happily many of the budgeted costs were over estimates or not used (e.g. volunteers delivered the leaflets). This means that we have been able to make donations or increased payments to a lot of local groups, including: Kinross & District Pipe Band, Millbridge Hall, the Church Centre, the Craigclowan Pipe Band, Lochleven Diamonds, Kinross High School Ukulele Orchestra, Nikki Matthew Dance Academy, Garry Simpson, Fitsteps dance routines, Kennedy Cupcakes, Dance Connect, The G-Street Band, Daniel Paris, Characters from Frozen and Lawson's School of Dancing.

I should perhaps finish this piece by saying that we continue to get grief from some of the traders, but hope that now the roadworks are completed they will give us some peace. I would also point out that the Street Party meant that the roadworks had to be substantively completed by Saturday 3 October and this resulted in an accelerated rate of work! [See also Letter, p. 3 and photo feature on pages 12-13.]

#### M90 Roadworks

I thought you might be interested in hearing what work is being done on the M90 at the moment. There are two areas of work, one being the resurfacing of the northbound carriageway and the other the repair of the bridges over the motorway.

The resurfacing of the motorway is actually a trial which, once completed, will help inform the treatment of other concrete motorway sections in Scotland.

This trial will consist of three experimental sections (1km long in total) on the northbound carriageway between Junction 5 and 6 and will involve overlaying the concrete with a bituminous surface; 10mm of existing concrete surface will be

removed and a specialist sub-contractor will undertake concrete repairs to areas of spalled concrete, cracking and failed joints. This will be done at three different sections to varying degrees of existing repair. 30mm of bituminous surfacing will be applied to one section, 50mm of bituminous surfacing to another and finally 50mm bituminous surfacing with an asphalt reinforcement grid to the final section.

The results will be monitored and the optimum solution will be rolled out to other concrete motorways, subject to approval from Transport Scotland.

The bridge repair is a collaborative piece of work between Bear Scotland (responsible for the bridge) and PKC (responsible for the road surface).

In essence, PKC have been repairing the road surface with monotonous regularity – the problem being that the bridge had structural defects which were causing the surface to break up.

I have been pushing for both these pieces of work to be done, mainly because the poor surface of the motorway creates a lot of unnecessary noise for Kinross and the road surface over the bridge has been breaking up on a regular basis.

I am delighted that the two bodies have got together on this and prepared a plan to fix the fundamental problem, the only fly in the ointment being that Bear Scotland only have the funds in this year's budget to repair half the bridge, so they will need to come back next year to do the other half.

#### Re-trunking of the A977

There has been some discussion about asking for the A977 to be made back into a trunk road. Cllr Robertson came up with the idea recently and the matter was raised at Fossoway CC by Cllr Barnacle and at Kinross CC by myself. Both Community Councils supported the idea.

In essence, a trunk road is one which is maintained and improved by central government, rather than the local Council. The A977 carries more Buses, Goods Vehicles and Heavy Goods vehicles than many of the other "A" class roads in

Perth and Kinross, so there is justification for this request.

Cllr Barnacle raises the question of improvements on the A977 at every opportunity and is supported in this by other local members, however the Council is under severe financial constraints and there is a lack of political will within it to make the real improvements which it probably deserves.

Personally, I think the only long-term solution is by-passes for Blairingone, Powmill and Crook of Devon. I think this is unlikely to happen in the short term if the road remains the Council's responsibility, however I would welcome your views on this.

#### Parking at Loch Leven Community Campus

Hopefully the work to change the parking regulations at the campus will have been completed by the time this Newsletter comes out. Your local Councillors have been pushing for changes to the regulations for three years now. The process has been something of a start, stop, start, stop affair.

The new regulations should help clarify who can park where and when and make it easier to use the facilities.

#### Roadworks everywhere!

It feels like everywhere I go, I get caught by roadworks: complex diversions, traffic control, bollards - you name it. Some, like the repair of the bridge at junction 6 on the M90, the cats' eyes that are due to be put back on the A911 and the relining of the roads were requested by your Councillors. Some are essential repairs.

I apologise for any inconvenience caused by the works that I have requested; I just hope the delays will be worth it in the long run.

#### Milnathort plea

One final thing: Milnathort is going through new sewerage works to ensure it doesn't flood again. Could I ask you please to keep using the shops - they are suffering!

#### Give your glass for CHAS

# Loch Leven on BBC's Countryfile

The beauty of Loch Leven will be showcased on BBC1's flagship countryside programme, Countryfile.

A small film crew came to the Loch Leven Heritage Trail on 10 October, a rather misty day, to film a sponsored ramble raising funds for the BBC charity Children in Need. A new venture for Countryfile, the ramble was one of six held around Britain, each led by one of the programme's presenters, and joined by viewers and inspirational youngsters who have been helped by Children in Need. The Loch Leven ramble was led by John Craven, who had never been to the loch before, but said it was "a beautiful spot". Leading the way with John was 13-year-old Cameron, who has brittle bone disease.

1000 viewers applied to take part in the ramble, and 100 were selected by ballot. The route began at The Boathouse Restaurant and followed the trail to Loch Leven's Larder. Although this is only a distance of around four miles, it took around three hours, as there were stops for filming. Some of the participants also did the return route.

Neil Mitchell, the Loch Leven National Nature Reserve manager was on hand to point out interesting features and wildlife.

The Loch Leven ramble will be broadcast as part of a special extended edition of Countryfile, due to be broadcast on Sunday 1 November.



#### Celebrating the new look of Kinross High Street

Kinross High Street was buzzing with music, dancing and fun on 3 October as an estimated 6,000 people took part in The Big Street Party.

The event was held to celebrate the new look High Street following months of road works, including weeks of complete closure, which had caused a considerable downturn in business for many High Street traders.

The idea of the party was to encourage residents and visitors back to the High Street and to mark the beginning of a positive era for the town centre.

The event was blessed with unseasonably good weather and began with the Kinross & District Pipe Band leading a parade from the former High School down to the Town Hall.

Two stages, a mini one outside the Co-op and the main stage opposite the Town Hall provided the principal venues for a vast array of entertainment, including ceilidh music, dance displays, singers and bands of all types.

Free fun fair rides kept youngsters amused and other entertainment included African drumming workshops and face painting.

The headline act, the Red Hot Chilli Pipers, provided a rousing end to the afternoon with a highly energetic and skilful performance, including a session with members from the Kinross & District Pipe Band and enthusiastic audience participation.

The afternoon ended with a symbolic ribbon-cutting performed by Provost Liz Grant and Mrs Betty McBain, widow of the late Tom McBain, the last Provost of Kinross.

To organise an event of this scale in just five weeks was a remarkable achievement by those involved. The party was the idea of Pamela Hunter and organised by local traders and KLEO, the Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation. The event was funded by Perth & Kinross Council.



#### **Design Assignments**

Through the auspices of Interface, a Scottish Governemnt backed conduit between industry and academia, the design of Aero Space Kinross is being advanced.

Fourteen final-year BSC (Hons) Architectural Technonolgy students at the University of the Highlands and Islands have been assigned the task of designing a venue for Aero Space Kinross. Their work on this live project will span the entire academic year and will 100% determine their fnal qualification in Advanced Architectural Practice. The students (who are based at Inverness College) were given an initial briefing at the Scottish Gliding Centre in September and have enthusiastically embraced and researched the concept. Their first design ideas will be presented to the board of trustees by the end of the year. Following feedback, the students will subsequently refine the design into a formal planning submission.

Meanwhile, at Heriot Watt University, 18 students undertaking their 3rd year of study towards a BA (Hons) in Interior Design are working up ideas about how the inside of the venue might be "imagineered". This 8-week project requires the Heriot Watt students to initially conduct a large scale spatial planning exercise and then select a single "experience" element on which to focus their detailed design studies.

Both of these initiatives will produce eye catching visuals which will be of great assistance to our fundraising.

# Councillor Giacopazzi Milnathort Community Council

Nominations for candidates standing in Community Councils elections in Perth and Kinross closed recently, with only two being received for Milnathort CC. As a minimum



of four are needed for a quorum, there will be no election and Milnathort CC ceases to exist.

It is, of course, open to any community to request the Council that a CC be set up. Only 20 signatures are needed. However, I am told by our Democratic Services department that the earliest time a new CC could be set up in Milnathort would be next year. I am hopeful that some Milnathort residents with time on their hands might read this and decide to be part of a new CC in 2016.

Meanwhile, if any Milnathort residents have any issues that they wish to raise, relating to Council service, they are welcome to phone me on 01577 864025 to discuss the matter or arrange to see me.

#### **Scottish Water works in Milnathort**

Phases one and two of the project have been completed and we are now into phase three. New Road is expected to reopen by 23 October. Phase four will involve installing temporary four-way lights at the Cross. Having seen a preview of a Scottish Water postcard which is shortly to go to every house in the village, advising of 'Temporary traffic lights at the Cross from 26th October for 7 weeks', I asked for an emergency meeting with Amey, Black & Veatch and Scottish Water. This took place on 16 October, when I emphasised that last year the operation of four-way lights at the Cross had proved inconvenient and unpopular. Following a discussion, the contractors agreed to try to limit the time that the fourway lights would be in operation, to two weeks only. To a certain extent, the progress of the works will be dictated by what the contractors find as they excavate further. There is a considerable element of unpredictability.

I would, however, commend the excellent and industrious work force who are taking this project forward. The workmen regularly begin at 7.30am and I have seen them working late into the evening. Saturday work appears to be the norm, which, of course, shortens the length of time taken to complete the job.

I also note the care which Scottish Water have taken in keeping Milnathort residents informed as to the progress of the work.

# Local allotments group wins charity clean-up

Milnathort & Kinross Allotments Association (MKAA), which aims to promote the benefits and joys of nature and gardening to everyone in the community, has won the first ever Binn Group Charity Clean-Up Competition.

The Binn Group, an independent recycling and waste management company based in Glenfarg, had pledged a manpower and services package worth £2000 to clean up for a worthy cause. The competition attracted entries from across Tayside and Fife, with judges finally selecting MKAA as the worthy winner.

The prize will allow vegetation and rubble to be removed from MKAA's three-acre site near Dobbies Garden Centre at Turfhills, making way for an extended community garden featuring a new sensory garden, a forest garden, community orchard and bee hives.

MKAA formed in 2013. In a remarkably short time the group managed to create 30 allotments and a community garden at the Turfhills site. The prize will allow them to press ahead with the next phase of the community scheme.

Association treasurer Rory Stewart said: "The site is so contaminated by old concrete, building materials, rubble and weeds that we were taking one step forward and two back in our efforts to clear it. The Binn Group prize will re-energise everyone and leave us with a much more manageable site on which to dig, landscape and plant.

"Everyone involved is absolutely delighted to win this generous prize and we can't thank Binn Group enough for choosing our charity. We look forward to pressing ahead with them as soon as possible."

Binn Group Chief Executive Allan MacGregor said: "The project touches all parts of the Milnathort and Kinross community – people who have never gardened before through to the dedicated green-fingered experts. It's also a place where those with special needs can work alongside the young and the elderly and enjoy the beautiful space created by everyone. "We at Binn Group are delighted to help drive the project onto its next phase. Clearing sites and removing waste can be a daunting task for a charity or community group but this is all in a day's work for Binn Group and we're happy to supply men and resources to tackle this problem for such a worthwhile cause."

The prize package includes five operatives for a day as well as skips and removal of all waste from the site.

#### **Councillor Barnacle** A977 Mitigation Measures

Copies of recent correspondence:

Copy of an email to Cllr J Kellas (Chair, Enterprise & Infrastructure Cttee) and Jim Valentine (PKC Environment Service), 26 June 2015:



I refer to my meeting of 15th inst with John and Cllr Giacopazzi, during which we discussed my letter of 18/7/14 and 16/3/15 to Jim and his reply of 8/4/15 re the above. I was tasked to investigate previous requests for measures, ascertain what might be considered and supported with local ward members, before responding with details for further discussion.

I have examined PKC's Statement of Case at the Public Local Inquiry (PLI) of November 2004 into the new Upper Forth Crossing at Kincardine and the Summary of Proposed Mitigation Measures for the A977 produced, if funding could be secured viz:

Of the measures proposed and still not implemented by PKC, I would highlight:

- a) Large Roundabout at junction of A977/B913 in Blairingone
- b) Large Roundabout at junction of A977/B9097 in Drum.

Both of these above locuses would break up a stretch of road with speeding vehicles, unless other measures can be suggested. Both could possibly be delivered through development proposals to our LDP review (MIR).

c) Large roundabout at MOTO Service Station/Turfhills Roads Depot junctions with A977 – to be delivered through a planning permission of 22/6/11?

NB At the last LDP preparation, a large roundabout in Powmill at junction of A977/A823 was suggested as part of a Masterplan for the village, rejected by the Reporter (who did support mitigation, however).


d) Improved access for cyclists and pedestrians across M90 interchange – I endorsed a proposal that this area should be subject of special study by Scottish Executive and PKC.

I personally proposed at the PLI the following, **still not provided** viz:

- a) Speed Cameras between Blairingone and Kinross (we await a timescale from Chic Haggart for variable message signing).
- b) Crossing Point (signs/studs) for millennium footpath at western end of Crook of Devon.
- Enhanced measures at bend opposite village hall in Crook of Devon (currently with Daryl McKeown).
- d) Improve anti-skid surfacing on A977.
- e) At Balado, improve signage for Balado/Crossroads, provide safe crossing facilities for cyclists/pedestrians, introduce a 50mph speed limit from west of crossroads to new 40mph limit at Turfhills (still not implemented despite PKC agreement).

I would be obliged for road officer comment/research into funding of the above, prior to a further meeting.

Copy of a letter to Transport Scotland, 24 August 2015

#### Dear Sir, A977 Signage and Mitigation Measures

I feel I must respond to the letter of 24/4/15 you wrote to Jim Valentine at Perth and Kinross Council, copied to me by your colleague Gemma Montrose on 31/7/15.

As the local ward Councillor who attended the Public Inquiry in November 2004 into the new Clackmannanshire Bridge when the above issues were raised, I am dismayed that both PKC & Transport Scotland appear to have changed their position on these matters.

Local concerns about the speed and volume of HGV's on the A977 are well documented and relate to Blairgingone, Powmill and Balado, as well as Crook of Devon; we are well aware of the attractiveness of this route to HGV's as being a shorter link between the central belt and M90 - hence the demand for alternative signage and mitigation measures

The request for a review of signage at Gartarry roundabout failed to mention the need for earlier signage on the motorway network at junction 5 (where the M80 leaves the M876) where only Perth is signed for the M9 (when clearly it should also mention Aberdeen, Dundee and Inverness).

The A907 has never been suggested, only the A985 and A9 as per Transport Scotland's previous position. I realise that use of satellite navigation devices by HGV drivers complicates the effectiveness of signage, often negating it and causing significant problems on inappropriate routes; I have raised this matter at the regional transport partnership without success.

It is also clear that you regard the views of Clackmannan and Fife Council's as paramount over PKC in the protection afforded to their residential amenity. PKC regrettably have changed their position recently on major mitigation measures for the A977 (supported by the Reporter's Unit and included in our Local Development Plan) rejecting the need for large roundabouts they had argued for at the afore-mentioned public inquiry. Neither the Scottish Government nor PKC appear to have any sympathy or preparedness to address these matters despite numerous representations over the years from the community, including a petition to Parliament. I enclose background correspondence that shows in full light the change in their positions.

These communications elicited a disappointing and negative response from both PKC and Transport Scotland. I had written in July 2014 giving a full history of the situation since 1996 and got nowhere with my request for an outline business case to fund mitigation measures, stated as required in our Local Development Plan. There is clearly no political will from the SNP administration at Perth to address this issue and I am reluctantly forced to conclude that local members should now lobby for the road to be re-trunked as part of a current review of the strategic road network; I had previously thought that such a course would send the 'wrong message' about the suitability of Heavy Goods Vehicles' increased usage of the road but I now conclude, after consultation with Fossoway and Kinross Community Councils, it is the more likely option to secure funding for the measures needed. I remain sceptical, however, that the Government will re-trunk the road, preferring to pass the buck to PKC who won't fund the measures needed either.

Copy of an email sent on my behalf to all members of the Development Management Committee, 10 Sept 2015:

I am away on annual vacation from 10th instant and cannot therefore attend the above Committee, although I did ask Nick Brian if he could have put back the Report for a month, which given the Report, would not have made a material difference but this was not agreed. It is probably just as well I am not attending because I am furious with the lack of progress.

I feel it is necessary to send to you the following background information viz:

- 1. My email to Committee colleagues of 14/13/15 and enclosures
- 2. My email of 11/8/15 to Nick Brian
- 3. Brian Stanford's reply of 12/8/15
- 4. Briefing note from Eddie Jordan re Conditions on 18/8/15 (Note that Cllr Robertson had a recent site meeting to discuss noise issues but I don't know the outcome).

IN SUMMARY, The intervening 6 months have achieved absolutely nothing. In fact site development into the 'paddock area' is a clear intention. No monitoring of the site occurs unless the community report activity.

Graeme Drummond, Asset Planner of Scottish Water advised me today that there is no current capacity at the Drum WWTP and no more connections will be allowed into the system in the foreseeable future. A number of properties in the settled community still await connection to what was an environmental improvement scheme both I and the community lobbied for; I do not wish to see gypsy/ travellers given priority above others when they have so singularly failed to deliver on the conditions they promised to adhere to. In my view it is totally unreasonable to allow them another 12 months to connect to mains drainage that I and the CC have been assured is not likely to be available. A growth project is needed to stimulate further investment into the WWTP, a proposal from the settled community gaining credence with forward planning. The applicants have been on site, within the Lochleven catchment, since March 2012 without any drainage, sewerage and water arrangements, the protocol with SNH and SEPA is totally breached and I shall be writing on my return to the most senior officials at PKC, SNH and SEPA regarding their collective failure of the statutory duty to protect Lochleven (Policy EP7). Our 'open-door' policy RD5 requires immediate revision to protect the amenity of the settled community.

At the subsequent Committee, my colleague Cllr Cuthbert successfully moved an amendment that a report be brought back to the Committee on 13 January 2016 regarding enforcement of conditions. Unfortunately, the applicants were given another year to secure connection to the Drum WWTP and meet conditions relating to water supply. In my view, this continues to represent a complete failure by the planning authority in their statutory duty to protect Loch Leven under Policy EP7 and I shall be writing further on this. At the Member Officer Working Group on Planning Meeting of 28 September 2015 when Policy RD5(b) on new gypsy/traveller sites was stated as effective in current form, I requested it to be minuted that I did not agree that it was 'fit for purpose' in that it did not include reference to sites not having a detrimental effect on the residential amenity of the settled community and did not secure a reasonable distance of sites from settlement boundaries. I still feel this policy needs re-examining during the review of our Local Development Plan.

#### Influenza Vaccination

We would encourage all patients who are eligible for the flu vaccination to make an appointment if they have not already done so. Those eligible are those over 65 by 31st March 2016, those under 65 in one of the 'At Risk' groups, pregnant women, carers. There is a special flu clinic on Saturday 14 November. Please call Reception and make an appointment. You do not need to wait for a letter of invitation.

#### Childhood Flu Programme

GP practices are responsible for vaccinating children aged 2 to 5 years old. This is a nasal vaccine, not an injection. Please contact Reception now to make an appointment for your child. Children at primary school will receive the vaccine at school.

#### **Pneumococcal Vaccination**

Patients aged 65 by 31 March 2016, are eligible for the pneumovax vaccination. This vaccination can be given at the same time as the flu vaccination.

#### **Shingles Vaccination**

The Shingles vaccine will be offered to those in the following age groups: those aged 70 on 1 September 2015, i.e. those born between 2 September 1944 and 1 September 1945 and those aged 78 on 1 September 2015, i.e. those born between 2 September 1936 and 1 September 1937. This vaccine can be administered at the same time as the flu vaccination so a separate appointment is not required. When you book your appointment, please advise the Receptionist that you are eligible for the shingles vaccine as well as the flu vaccine.



#### Bogus caller warning

Scottish Water has issued a warning about bogus callers.

Scottish Water Chief Operating Officer, Peter Farrer, said: "All of our employees carry identity cards, which they are more than happy to show when requested to do so. Householders shouldn't let anyone into their home until they are sure of their identity."

Follow Scottish Water's Three Cs advice:

**Card** – ask callers to pass their ID card or letter through the letterbox in order to verify their identity.

Check – Check the identity card carefully: Is the photo on the card the same as the person at the door? Does the card contain the Scottish Water Customer Helpline number? Has the card been tampered with in any way?

If householders are not confident that they are a genuine caller, then send them away!

Call – anyone in doubt about a caller's identity should call the Customer Helpline on 0800 0778778. Customers should contact utility companies by using phone numbers found in telephone directories or the internet, but never from ID cards or letters presented, because these could be false. Anyone still suspicious should contact a neighbour or call the police.

#### Citylink cuts commuter bus service

Local politicians have expressed their concern at Citylink timetable changes affecting buses between Kinross and Edinburgh.

Speaking on 19 October, Roseanna Cunningham MSP said:

"I have received a number of complaints from constituents expressing concern about the changes to bus timetables which will seriously impact on commuters travelling between Edinburgh and Kinross.

"At present there is a pretty good service with several different options for buses from Edinburgh that get to Kinross between 6.30 and 6.45. Under the new winter timetable, there will be no services for Kinross leaving Edinburgh between 4.30pm and 7.00pm. That is utterly useless for the vast majority of commuter passengers."

Liz Smith MSP has also spoken out against the change and the matter has been raised with Perth & Kinross Council and the Scottish Government.

The current Citylink timetable offers Kinross commuters buses leaving Edinburgh at 1630, 1715, 1725, 1800 and 1815 hours under the M90, M91, M92 and G92 services. However, as from 23 November, there will be Citylink buses at only 1630 and 1910.

A statement from Citylink says: "From Monday 23rd November 2015 Scottish Citylink is making some changes to some of our routes and journeys. This is being done to ensure we are delivering services that better reflect the travel habits of our customers and to allow us to continue operating a strong and stable coach network."

With regard to the G92 service, a Citylink statement says: "Our customer research shows that passengers using our Gold services prefer more direct journeys with less stops. As a result, all Gold journeys on this route will now call only at Edinburgh Bus Station, Dundee bus Station and Aberdeen Bus Station."

There may be some solace for commuters, however, as Stagecoach East Scotland is extending its X55 and X56 services, which currently operates between Edinburgh and Dunfermline, to operate into Perth and Kinross. (See further article on this page.)

# New Stagecoach Express route for Kinross

#### Freecycle and items for sale scam

Beware of potential scammers who target people selling items, auctioning items or even offering items free via online platforms.

Be suspicious of emails containing the following:

- A vague way of addressing you, such as "Hello Seller"
- A question asking the price of the item, even though it is already stated in your online advert

If you respond to the email, you are likely to receive a reply informing you that the buyer will send you a cheque, and asking you for the address it should be sent to, and a phone number. The "buyer" may say that the pick up will be after the cheque has cleared.

Be very wary. This is likely to be a variant of the Overpayment Scam. The "buyer" sends a cheque for too much money then asks you to refund them the accidental overpayment by Money Transfer (such as Western Union) or e-money products. You do this, perhaps also sending on the item they have "bought". Only then your bank tells you that the original cheque from the "buyer" has bounced, leaving you out of pocket.

#### The Gallipoli Campaign

In order to secure the approaches to the Black Sea and the southern frontier of the Russian Empire, Russia's First World War allies Britain and France launched a naval attack followed by an amphibious landing on the Gallipoli Peninsula, the aim being to capture Constantinople (now Istanbul), capital of the Ottoman Empire. Launched on 25 April 1915, the Gallipoli Campaign lasted eight months, with heavy casualties on both sides.

The Gallipoli Peninsula forms the northern bank of the Dardanelles, a strait that provides a sea route to the Black Sea from the Aegean. The Allied landings took place at Cape Helles on the tip of the peninsula.

The Ottomans held the high ground, preventing the Allies from reaching Constantinople and in early January 1916 the invading force finally withdrew to Egypt.

#### **Battle of Gulley Ravine**

By June 1915, after less than two months fighting on the Gallipoli Peninsula, the Allies had given up all thoughts of a swift and decisive victory. With the limited aim of advancing the flanks by capturing a small number of redoubts, Allied troops launched an attack along the Gully Ravine, Gully Spur and Fir Tree Spur on the north side of the peninsula. After two days of heavy bombardment, the assault began at 11am on 28 June 1915. Gully Ravine became the scene of vicious and bloody fighting as the Ottomans commenced a series of counter-attacks but the Allies achieved a modest success in forcing the Ottoman 2nd Division to pull back. The War Diary for that day reported the deaths of eight officers and 57 other ranks of the Royal Scots, one of whom was Kinross-shire man Private George P Westwater. A further six officers and 147 other ranks were reported as missing.

The Royal Scots were immediately congratulated by General De Lisle, commander of the 29th Division who sent a message - "Well done Royal Scots" at the end of the first day's action. Sadly, George Westwater was wounded in action and, although able to speak to the stretcher-bearer, a bandsman, he died before nightfall.

#### Recent crime locally

**Registration plates** were stolen from a vehicle in **Kinross** between Tuesday 6 and Wednesday 7 October.

**Eggs** were thrown at properties in **Kinross-shire** in the second week of October. Following attendance by officers at one incident, a 26-year-old male is to be reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

Fuel lines and fuel tanks were stolen from **the boathouse**, Pier Road, **Kinross**, between 4pm on Sunday 11th and 8am on Monday 12th October. Some fuel tanks were recovered near to the boathouse. Crime ref: CR/027833/15.

A rural property in the **Powmill** area was broken into on Friday 16 October, sometime between 8.50am and 23.45pm. No items were stolen. The perpetrators gained access by smashing a window. Crime ref: CR/28235/15.

An attempt was made to steal the **cash machine** at Sainsbury's, Kinross, on Saturday 17 October between 3.30am and 3.40am. Shortly before, the perpetrators stole a JCB from a nearby building site at Junction Road in Kinross and, using its telescopic arm, damaged the wall surrounding the machine. A second vehicle described as being similar to a black pick-up truck was also seen with the JCB and may have been used for the perpetrators to escape in, leaving the JCB behind at the scene of the crime. The culprits were not successful in their attempt to steal anything on this occasion. Police Scotland are appealing for witnesses or information from the local community which could assist with the investigation to detect the offenders. Crime ref: CR/028258/15. (See also p. 4.)

#### **Talk Talk Scam**

This scam involves scammers posing as Talk Talk advisers cold calling people saying there is a technical issue with their computer and requesting remote access to the computer. They then run what appears to be a scan on your computer when in fact they are extracting confidential and personal data from the computer, which may include bank details and other digital assets which may be of financial value or used to commit identity theft, and my result in you being a victim of fraud.

The scammer can appear very plausible as though they are calling from a call centre. This is NOT the case.

If you are unsure of the authenticity of the call, terminate it and use a trusted number to contact the company you believe may have contacted you; this can be obtained from a paper bill etc.

Do not provide anyone cold calling any personal information, and do not use any telephone numbers they provide you in an attempt to authenticate their scam.

Do not provide anyone with bank, credit or debit card details. Do note the telephone number they have used to call you and hang up.

If you suspect that you have been called by a scammer you can report this to ACTION FRAUD online or by telephone 0300 123 2040.

#### **Car Crime**

Across Tayside this year there has been a slight increase in thefts from vehicles and vehicles themselves being stolen. Here is some advice to help combat this type of crime:

- Don't give a thief access to your personal information: remove all personal correspondence from your vehicle.
- Fit a car alarm.
- Use an immobiliser.
- Never leave your car unattended to defrost windows with the keys in the ignition.
- If you have a sat-nay, remove the cradle and wipe suction marks from the window when leaving your vehicle.
- At the petrol station, always remove your key from the ignition.
- When parking your vehicle at home try to park off the street if possible in a garage or driveway.
- Don't park your vehicle in isolated or remote areas. If possible park in well lit, busy, CCTV covered areas.
- In car parks try to park close to the entrance or exit, increasing the volume of traffic passing your vehicle.
- When leaving your vehicle, lock all items out of sight.
   Take valuables with you. Don't leave anything on display.

# Kinross Community Council News from the October Meeting

**Present** at the meeting held on 7 October 2015 were: CCllrs W Freeman (Chair), B Davies, D West, I Jack, I G Thomas, D MacKenzie, D Colliar, M Blyth and M Scott; P&K Cllrs Cuthbert and Giacopazzi; a police representative and seven members of the public.

**Apologies** were received from CCllr T Stewart and Cllrs Robertson and Barnacle.

**Declarations of Interest**: None.

**Police Report**: The Police representative reported on traffic problems in Swansacre.

CCllr MacKenzie asked if there was any evidence of increased anti social behaviour as a result of the school closing earlier on Fridays and asked for statistics.

Cllr Giacopazzi commented on the continuing issue of people parking on pavements in Milnathort, which was reported by him to the Police some months ago.

A member of the public reported that vehicles were being parked dangerously in the area outside the Town Hall and that people were driving with excessive speed through the town centre. Cllr Giacopazzi will follow up the parking signage in this area and the Police agreed to monitor speeds.

Operation Quest is D Division's (Tayside) response to violence and anti social behaviour. Attention is to be given to areas and times when this kind of behaviour has been taking place.

Annual Police Plan 2016/2017: Consultation Event on 1 September. One of the key messages from the day was the perceived benefit of a more traditional "community cop" who is visible and proactive in local communities and this was a strong recurring theme throughout the event.

Monthly Police Report: The Secretary will request reports from the local Police to cover for any absences.

#### **Matters arising from September minutes**

**Springfield Road planning application**: Cllr Cuthbert advised that the Council were not involved in the transfer of this land. This was a private sale; the company who owned the land went out of business and the home-owner purchased the ground. The application has been refused.

Website: CCllr Colliar queried the amount paid over, adding that it had been agreed some years ago to make an annual payment of £500 and, therefore, he questioned the figure of £1,500. It was explained that this was a one-off payment which has now been settled. CCllr Thomas added that a reestablishment of the Website Sub-Committee should now be put in place. The CC have not been invited to any meetings for some time, however the Chairman attended a recent meeting and it was understood that a second was to be arranged.

#### **Newsletter Fund disbursement**

**CC Website/Kinross-shire Partnership**: Thank you letter received from Pauline Watson as Administrator of the website for the donation of £1,500. Pauline would be happy to attend a CC meeting to report on the website at any time.

**Powmill Bloom Group**: Thank you letter received in acknowledgement of recent funding.

Kinross Hockey Club requests funding of up to £2,000 towards the estimated cost of £180,000 to replace the pitch. £6,000 has already been raised and applications are to be processed to other sources for funding. As this is a recent application, with further information only being provided today, it was agreed that it be held over to the next meeting.

#### **Future of Kinross Buildings**

Kinross Primary School: CCllr MacKenzie attended a recent meeting and advised that work is scheduled to commence in October 2016 and to be completed by December 2017. Stage 2 demolition would be undertaken around April/May 2018. The new school is to be constructed to the northwest end of the playground, will be an "H" shape with the gable end on to Station Road and the main building running parallel to its current location. Capacity is for 566 children compared to the current 530. The total cost is approximately 11 million. The architect has considered the style of housing on Station Road and how best the plans for the school can blend with the Victorian properties. The fencing will be similar to the green fences around the campus. There will be limited evening use by the community as it is envisaged that such bookings will remain with the campus. The next meeting will focus more on the progress of construction, movement of traffic, safety of children, the playground area etc and the logistical problems that arise with erecting a newbuild on the same site. A date for this meeting is still to be fixed. Staff have had access to the plans. The pupil figures provided for the school were of concern to both CCllrs MacKenzie and Colliar and it was stated that we should be pushing for as high a figure as possible so as to avoid the necessity of having to again accommodate children in portacabins. The current school roll

Town Hall: No plans currently for this building.

**Former High School**: Cllr Cuthbert has asked for an update report from the Property Sub-Committee.

**Former Health Centre, Lathro**: Planning approval has been granted.

#### **CC Election**

There are more valid nominations than required to fill the 11 vacancies, therefore an election will be held. Polling letters will be sent to each registered voter around 16 October 2015 explaining the process. The nominations were all current CC members plus Eileen Thomas and Jonathan Bryson. The election date is 5 November. Cllr Cuthbert advised that should any of the parties wish to withdraw this would require the agreement of the National Returning Officer. It was noted that this is a Scottish Government Policy not a Council Policy.

A member of the public advised that the party created a major problem to her on the Saturday as plans for the siting of the stage were changed on that day. People placed chairs around the outside of her premises and this proved difficult for access/exit for her customers on the day and for safety reasons she had to close her shop.

#### Correspondence

**Junction 6 Roundabout**: Bear is planning refurbishment works to the north and south bridge decks. In collaboration with PKC, the scheme will see the existing waterproofing, road surface and bridge parapets replaced. Lane closures will be in place on the carriageway of the roundabout. The scheme is likely to last nine weeks with an anticipated date of 12 October. Bear is also due to undertake trial repairs to the M90 concrete carriageway between 8 and 17 October.

**Hedges/Fences**: A resident provided photographic evidence of overgrown hedges and repair required to fences in Green Road/Junction Road, Sutherland Drive/Station Road, fence at Sainsbury's, pathway on to Junction Road. A photo related to dog excrement at Green Road/Springfield Road paths.

**Restricted roads variation**: Confirmation of Order covering Gairneybank/Hatchbank Road. Extend existing 30mph speed limit.

**50 mph Speed Limit**: Confirmation of Order covering Gairneybank, Kelty, Kinross, Glenfarg Road. Remove existing 50mph speed limit on B996 at Gairneybank and install a new extended length of 40mph speed limit. Lines are to be added during the half term.

**Kinross Traffic Management Order Variation**: To cover No Waiting at Any Time at campus and No Waiting 8am to 5pm, Monday to Friday at campus.

**Speeding in Junction Road**: Letter received from local resident raising concerns regarding speeding and the lack of signage to remind people of the speed restriction. Also pointed out that despite a decision made that signage in this area would take a few years to erect, four signs advising of "No Overnight Parking" have been erected within 100 yards of each other. It was also stated that very few drivers adhere to the 30mph restriction. Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that further



signage is to be erected. Cllr Giacopazzi is to take this up with the Roads Department. Signage is also to be placed on the High Street.

#### **Other Business**

**Hedges**: Springfield Road/Wilson Court hedges not cut back yet. Councillors asked to follow this up. The area at Davies Park/Gallowhill Road is also is need of attention.

**Regeneration works**: Mandy of Mandy's Hairdresser informed the meeting that following the town centre regeneration works her customers now had to climb two steps from street level to enter her shop. She also reported damage to her paintwork and a damaged window caused by the works. Cllr Cuthbert agreed to raise this with officers and Rainton Construction.

**Broke Not Broken**: Joan Cornwell gave an update on this group, which has now achieved charitable status. Information on the Foodbank has been sent to Councillors.

#### **News from the October Meeting**

**Present** at the meeting held on 5 October 2015 were: CCllrs R Kitchin, P Fraser, M Traylor, R Jeffrey, H Somerville, N Robertson, J Moore and F MacGregor; Associate CCllr F Gillespie, P&K Cllr M Barnacle and three members of the community.

**Apologies** were received from P&K Cllrs W Robertson and D Cuthbert.

**Matters Arising**: There was a meeting on 7 September at the Village Hall regarding the Boundaries Commission. A full summary has been circulated including details and suggestions for objections to the proposal.

CC Applications: CCllr MacGregor reported that she had not yet submitted her form, and hopes that they will accept it despite the revised deadline having passed earlier in the day. CCllr Moore has not applied to remain on the CC, and is looking for someone from Blairadam to replace him. CCllr Jeffrey is also stepping down, therefore someone else will take over his financial duties.

**Crime prevention**: There was no Police Officer in attendance, and no new crimes reported in this area.

#### Correspondence

**Boundaries Commission**: ACCIIr Gillespie drafted a letter summarising the points discussed at the excellent meeting in September. It was agreed that this summary will be sent out with the C&B CC Newsletter.

**Tayside Biodiversity Action Plan**: The 1st edition was published in 2002, the 2nd edition is currently being prepared and there is a website that is being used for consultation purposes.

**Cllr Cuthbert** summarised his recent work, with respect to the Kinross High Street work, the Milnathort sewage work, the Boundaries Commission, as well as concluding that the Planning Enforcement still isn't functioning at all satisfactorily and will be contacting MSPs.

Full planning has been granted for the residential application at Cleish Mains.

**The Street Party** in Kinross was excellent, both in organisation and attendance, with a superb atmosphere. We would like to pass on our congratulations and thanks to the organisers.

#### Financial update

There is just under £900 in the account. Last year's accounts have been filed with the Council.



**Planning:** There are four live applications:

- 1. Change of house type at Benview, Benarty Road. There have been three local objections lodged; no one has contacted the CC to ask for this to be discussed. It is a modification to an existing application rather than a new one.
- 2. Greenacres: another retrospective application for amenity block and formation of new access road. The CC have objected many times already (to no avail) to these repeated retrospective applications and lack of any clear boundaries or policy at this site.
- 3. Conversion of sawmill to form a dwelling house at Phoenix Mill: There has been local support for this application, and the CC will submit a letter of support.
- 4. Nivingstone Plot 1: A new application associated with a now expired 2009 approved consent for 3 dwelling houses. The CC had originally objected to the 2009 application. A local resident commented that a new road access that was previously granted for access to Woodlands has never been completed, is in the wrong place, and has been reported to PKC several times. Woodlands has since been sold without any rights of access on this access road. This should be raised by the CC at the same time as discussing this application. Cllr Barnacle suggested that we should be asking for a review of the site as a whole, due to several new applications as well as submissions in the new development plan. It was also discussed that both Nivingstone and Watergate Farm (with landowners' support) should have tree preservation orders to prevent any wholesale removal of large trees from both sites as well as the Nivingstone Hill Road.

**CC website**: There was an increase in traffic from 200 to 900 hits per day associated with the Facebook page (which has 42 followers).

#### Village Updates - Blairadam

There have been three plumbing repairs after the resurfacing works

CCllr N Robertson asked again for information on the number of bus pick-ups and drop-offs, with a view of hopefully restricting the service and number of buses. Other local residents reportedly didn't want any change in the current service; it was suggested that the local community could discuss this further to reach a consensus. In the meantime, Cllr Barnacle agreed to try and obtain the figures.

CCllr N Robertson reported that there has been some complaints associated with both parking and noise outside the Village Hall, which is being used fairly extensively in the evenings at present. It was felt that this is a matter for the Hall Committee rather than the CC.



#### Village Updates – Cleish

The field opposite Nivingstone has been ploughed, causing loss of, and damage to, the verge. Tractors have also been driving over any parts of the verge to access and leave the field rather than use the old gateways - this resulted in a near miss with a resident's car. Both the verge and the removed fence line need to be replaced. Cllr Barnacle to follow this up. The Best Kept Village Award was presented to Cleish in the village hall.

The white lines have been (mostly) painted, but signs not yet repaired or refitted.

Local residents have been strimming some of the verges themselves due to poor attention by the Council's contractors. A resident asked if the contractors are still being paid for verge cutting if they haven't actually done the work.

#### **Other Business**

Cllr Barnacle reported that **Maryburgh** is being considered for the 20mph trial speed limit later this year. In the meantime the agreed 30mph limit and associated signs will still be going ahead. The signs (Blairforge settlement) and chevrons at the bad bend are due to be attended to at the same time as the road surface is retextured at the same bend. However, the roads officer is currently away and so Cllr Barnacle will follow this up again on his return.

**The MIR** is due to go in front of full Council on 18 November, followed by further consultation in December and February. Cllr Barnacle reported that PKC currently proposes that the Gypsy Traveller Site Policy "is fine and working well", which is contrary to MB's submission.

On 20 November in Cleish Village Hall 'An evening with World Record holder Mark Beaumont' when he will share his Solo adventure experiences from around the World.

**Thanks** to both CCllrs R Jeffrey and J Moore for their hard work and service over the past years.

The Next Meeting of Cleish and Blairadam CC will take place on Monday 7 December 2015 at 7.30pm in the Tabernacle Hall.

#### Milnathort Community Council **News from the October Meeting**

Attendance: CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Halford, Pettinger, Smith and Thomson to the meeting held on 8 October 2015. Also in attendance were P&K Councillors Barnacle, Cuthbert and Giacopazzi, and seven members of the public. PC James Wilson and PC Rhiannon Lorimer attended for Police matters.

Apologies were received from CCllrs Milne-Home, Cottingham and Bennet and from P&K Cllr Robertson.

Police matters: PC Wilson presented the Police Report. He cautioned householders to make their homes secure as the darker evenings draw in, and perhaps to use devices such as timers to deter potential intruders. He advised that there had been several instances of people attempting to sell expensive portable items, such as chainsaws, particularly in rural areas; he asked members of the public to note vehicle registrations and to report them to the Police where there were suspicious circumstances. He also outlined recent crimes, which had included vandalism in Stirling Road, and also in South Street where, on 2 October, windows and a gate had been drawn upon with a permanent marker. A male had been arrested following a sneak-in theft in New Road.

CCllrs and members of the public raised issues about drivers ignoring the recently introduced permanent one-way traffic system - eastbound flow - in Victoria Avenue; and about drivers exiting Back Loan into Wester Loan at inappropriate speeds, whilst diversions were in place for the Sewage Works in New Road. PC Lorimer reported that there had been a Police presence in the vicinity of Victoria Avenue/ Back Loan/ Wester Loan, and several drivers had been cautioned. Further patrols would be carried out. The CC noted that the one-way road signs at the eastern end of Victoria Avenue were not sufficiently clear and that better signage would be needed. Cllr Giacopazzi agreed to raise the road signs issue within PKC.

A member of the public also raised concerns about vehicles speeding in Burleigh Road, and enquired about progress to install shared temporary speed warning devices, advising that none had been installed thus far. Cllr Giacopazzi agreed to check on the matter within PKC.

Cllr Barnacle raised concerns about a large, and currently blank, advertising board on the edge of a field along the A977 out of Kinross towards Balado, which was obstructing drivers' view of on-coming traffic. PC Lorimer advised that the landowner had been approached by Police Scotland and had agreed to move the board, but no action had been taken yet; she agreed to discuss the issue further with the landowner. Matters arising: The Chair advised that, following notification and discussion of impending changes to Post Office services in the village, a flippant letter from a member of the public, which dealt with redundancy issues insensitively, had been published in the October edition of the Newsletter. He asked that the minute record MCC's dismay that the Editor should agree to publish such inappropriate material.

Planning applications: The following planning applications in Milnathort were discussed, but no objections were raised: 15/01502/FLL: Erection of 14 dwelling houses and erection of garage at Mawcarse Farm.

15/01581/FLL: Extension to dwelling house at 4 The Fairways.

15/01457/FLL: Change of use of antique showroom to form extension to dwelling house at Tudor House Antiques, 11 South Street.

15/01609/FLL: Alterations and extension to dwelling house at Hattonburn House.

15/01634/LBC: Alterations at Thomanean House.

Planning applications determined: The CC advised that the following application had been approved, but expressed dismay that PKC had not acted on MCC objections to the planning application in Wester Loan:

15/00503/FLL: Erection of 5 flats and ancillary works at 2-12 Wester Loan for Waverco Ltd.

Cllr Giacopazzi advised that he had raised MCC's concerns, particularly about parking and potential flooding issues with the Development Management Committee, PKC, but his advice had been overruled by the DMC.

The MCC also noted the following approval:

15/00687/FLL: Extension to dwelling house at Bridge House, Dalqueich.

Sewage Works/Victoria Avenue: The Chair advised that, following a large number of recent emails to PKC, the one-way system (eastbound) in Victoria Avenue had been implemented several years later than initially advised by PKC. Cllr Giacopazzi advised that he had written to an official in PKC asking that a temporary 20 mph restriction be implemented for the duration of the sewage works, but had not received a reply. Following discussion it emerged that such a restriction may not be implementable in the timescale of the works.

Cllr Giacopazzi updated the MCC on progress with the sewage works. Scottish Water had modified its planned activity because of the routing of several service pipelines in New Road; a chamber would now be built in his driveway, not under the road as originally planned, and a pipeline would run under existing services to connect with the chamber. He advised that such chambers were pre-cast and the changes to plan may cause some delay.

The MCC recorded its thanks to Scottish Water and to its contractor for carrying out the works in South Street in such a timely, accurate and courteous manner, and commended both on the work ethic shown.

**Boundary Commission:** The Chair drew attention to the article in the October Newsletter and urged members of the public to contact the Commission giving their grounds for objection, if they disagreed with proposals. Cllr Cuthbert reinforced this advice and advised that more support was needed from the public if the Commission's recommendation to split the Kinross-shire Ward was to be overturned. Advice is provided in the Newsletter and Petition forms are available in the Post Office. Cllr Barnacle advised that the issue had been debated again within PKC on 7 October and he had taken opportunity to express the views of the four P&K Councillors most strongly.

CC Elections: The Chair advised that insufficient applications had been received by PKC to serve on MCC from November 2015, and as most current members were withdrawing, the MCC would be wound up. Following discussion, during which P&K Councillors expressed their support for CCs, Cllr Cuthbert advised that a petition or request should be raised by at least 20 residents to PKC asking that a MCC should be formed; he strongly urged residents to sign up and would be canvassing support in the area. The MCC agreed to use existing funds to install a new noticeboard in a more visible place in New Road (instead of the board under a bus shelter in South Street), and thanked Cllr Giacopazzi for his agreement to place the noticeboard on the wall of his premises between Robertson's farm supply shop and his shop.

**New Matters and Correspondence:** CCllr Smith noted that the grass in Donaldson Park had been neatly strimmed recently, and commended PKC on the work carried out thus far. The Chair advised that a further cut of the wild flower section would be made later in the year and the cuttings would be removed. He also advised that work would be carried out on Junction 6 of the M90 from 8 October for repairs to the bridge and road surface.

CCllr Thomson advised that the Orwell and Portmoak Church Office had been informed that PKC was planning to receive five refugee families from Syria, and there had been a good number of people offering help, which the Minor Communities Hub was intending to co-ordinate. The UK Government would be providing some funding. Further information would follow.

CCllr Halford raised concerns about the state of the fence on the west side of the road over the bridge between Milnathort and Kinross and the potential danger to pedestrians. Cllr Giacopazzi agreed to raise the issue within PKC.

**P&K Councillors' Comments:** Cllr Cuthbert advised that the recent street party in Kinross to celebrate the completion of the roadway improvements on the High Street had been well attended and the event was a success, particularly as the promulgation of the event had encouraged the contractor to complete the work in a timely fashion. The MCC agreed that the High Street had been much enhanced by the work. Cllr Cuthbert also advised that 'Cats' Eyes' would be fitted on the A911 towards Portmoak.

Cllr Giacopazzi expressed his regret that insufficient volunteers had been forthcoming to continue MCC without a break.

Cllr Barnacle advised that during a recent meeting of a working group of PKC Councillors and officials several issues had been discussed, including the Council's policy for Travellers'/Gypsy sites. He understood that a report would be formulated for discussion by PKC in due course.

Comments/Questions from the floor: A member of the public raised concerns about the volume of weed in local burns, which restricted water flow. The Chair advised that, owing to SEPA controls of ditching causing phosphate flow into Loch Leven, little could be done to alleviate the problem. Another member of the public advised that he had been in discussion with TRACKS and PKC seeking to create a pathway to Burnside from Cuthill to link with existing paths at Burnside, but he had been informed that MCC's support was required before any funding/action would be forthcoming. After a short discussion the Chair asked that he forward details to both Cllr Giacopazzi and himself so that the matter could be progressed.

Date of Next Meeting: No date could be set at this stage, because of the imminent and hopefully temporary demise of the MCC.

# Portmoak Community Council News from the October Meeting

**In attendance** at the meeting held on 13 October 2015 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), B Calderwood, R Cairncross (Secretary), S Forde and T Smith; Ward Cllrs M Barnacle and D Cuthbert; and 11 members of the public.

**Apologies** were received from: CCllrs D Morris and R Williamson; Ward Cllrs W Robertson and J Giacopazzi; and the Police.

#### **Matters Arising from Previous Minutes**

Roads: "Green route" from Wester Balgedie along the Dryside Road. Further information is being sought from PKC on potential speed limits along this route.

**Portmoak cemetery**: PKC has yet to respond to the CC's request to retain long established burial provision within the parish and to liaise with the CC re positioning of a bench gifted to the community.

Scottish Gliding Centre (SGC) - Presentation on operations and use of aerotow: Colin Hamilton, tug pilot at SGC, explained the recent change to the operation of the aerotow had been introduced to allay public concerns. Safety was paramount in SGC operations. There were approximately 10,000 winch tows and 900 aerotows per year. The SGC had recently commissioned a new tug aircraft which, when following the established route for tows to the west, had meant that the point of release of the glider was in the vicinity of the golf course. The public noted a drop in engine noise and the aircraft tilting towards the ground. Although this was normal practice, it had caused alarm. A new route had been commissioned where the aircraft, after take-off, turned north and then circled to the left over Loch Leven while still gaining height. Glider release would now occur at a greater altitude than before and in the vicinity of Grahamstone Farm. There were no issues when taking off to the east. Separately the SGC explained policy for runway utilisation and how the point at which gliders aimed to land was governed by a "point of reference" that allowed for optimum runway space. Mr Hamilton was thanked for his presentation.

**Police report**: The CC noted the monthly police report and that the Police had raised a concern about traffic calming measures in Kinnesswood. Drivers were making poor judgements when to progress through the single carriageway in the face of oncoming traffic. This concern had been shared with PKC Roads Department and situation would now be monitored. The CC noted that there had been a further

accident on the A911 at West Bowhouse. The Commander's Bulletins of 11, 17, 25 September and of 2 and 8 October were noted.

**Treasurer's report**: There was no income to the general account in the month, but £20 of expenditure for hall hire. The bank balance at 30 September is therefore £527.40. Within the MBW account there was income of £0.07 in bank interest, and expenditure on drainage material of £28.80. The bank balance at 30 September is therefore £874.12.

#### Planning – new applications

15/01482/FLL Vane Farm Nature Centre: Formation of path, seating, borrow pit and associated drainage works. No comment.

15/01500/FLL 28 Gamekeepers Road: extension to dwellinghouse. No comment.

15/00978/FLL Land 50 metres south of the Old School House, Main Street, Scotlandwell: erection of a new dwelling house. No comment.

#### Planning – progress with developments

Lomond Inn 15/00505FLL & 15/00506/CON. Progress awaited.

Glenlomond. No further progress to note.

Levenmouth 14/00607/FLL. SNH have confirmed that the necessary licences re bat preservation have been obtained.

**Roads report**: CCllr Bruce Calderwood presented the report which, subject to amendment and updating, would be placed on the CC website. Of note were:

Traffic on A911: The CC heard from a resident that HGV passage though Kinnesswood was causing difficulties with significant vibration felt in residences and vehicles having to mount pavements. These were long-standing problems. The Chairman would welcome supporting evidence if that were available. It was regrettable that there was no mechanism for informing all satnav providers that the A911 through Portmoak was "inadvisable" for HGVs. Representatives of the CC will meet shortly with PKC Roads Department to review a number of issues affecting the A911 including the introduction of 20mph speed restrictions. HGV transit through Portmoak would be explored.

The Old Gullet Bridge: PKC would shortly complete repairs which had been delayed for several months because of the presence of wildlife and the consequent need to acquire the relevant SNH licence.

Moss Road Car Park, Scotlandwell: Subject to acquiring the necessary funding, plans were in hand to refurbish the car





park (expanding its capacity to around 6 cars) and for the CC to take ownership of it.

Cats' Eyes: These would be replaced along the A911 from Burleigh Road Milnathort to Auchmuirbridge over 5 days commencing 2/11/15. The CC thanked PKC and ward councillors for making this long overdue improvement possible.

*Grit Bins*: The CC remained concerned that PKC would not provide and service two grit bins needed in the hillier part of Portmoak.

South Loch Road: Ward Councillors would pursue a review of the signage and road markings for the second blind summit going west on this road.

Snow clearing winter 2014/15: The CC noted that the PKC scheme had failed to attract participation from local farmers. Warning signage at West Bowhouse: In view of a recent accident there, the CC sought information on progress with PKC's commitment to install improved warning signs on this stretch of the A911.

**Paths report**: CCllr Tom Smith reported that, as part of its final work on the Whitecraigs site, A & J Stephen was undertaking landscaping; had installed new drainage along the existing path leading down from Stephen's field to the golf clubhouse on the A911; and was substantially rebuilding the path for part of that route. The CC would review planning requirements in respect of landscaping and related matters in advance of A & J Stephen's departure from the site.

The Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership (LLLP) had approached the CC advising of their potential support of £500 for a limited range of community activities. The CC would consider this. It noted that LLLP will shortly publish two leaflets for walkers. These were "self-guided place-name walks" which aimed to reconnect people with the hills, and covered the Michael Bruce Way and a section of the Heritage Trail from Carsehall to Findatie. While these were welcome, it was disappointing that the CC had had limited opportunity to comment on the leaflets during their preparation. The Chairman would raise the matter with LLLP.

**Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland** - **Consultation:** The CC would shortly submit is comments on the consultation to the Commission. The Commission proposed that the number of ward councillors for Perth and Kinross would fall from 41 to 40, new boundaries would reduce the size of the existing Kinross-shire Ward and that the number of ward councillors representing Kinross-shire Ward would fall from 4 to 3. The CC opposed these proposals and will make the case for retaining the number of ward councillors for PKC at 41, the number of ward councillors

for the Kinross-shire ward at 4 and for retaining, at least, the current boundaries of the Kinross-shire ward.

**Election of a New Council:** A new CC for Portmoak will be authorised by PKC from November 5th. Eight members had been appointed: six from the existing Council and two new members. As the member establishment of eight had not been exceeded there would be no election. PKC were currently contacting all CC members. It was anticipated that the new CC will be commissioned formally at the next planned CC meeting on Tuesday 10 November (7pm in Portmoak School). Further details of the new CC will be published thereafter.

#### **Ward Councillor Reports:**

Cllr Cuthbert reported that the celebrations for the opening of the new refurbished Kinross town centre had been a great success. More than 6,000 had attended. The work was now substantially completed. Plans were now being taken forward for the Kinross-shire Winter Festival. The Local Government Boundary Commissions plans for Kinross-shire were being considered by both ward councillors and PKC. He had approached PKC to include in their response to the Commission the option of alternative ward arrangements.

*Cllr Barnacle* advised that on 18 November PKC should approve the new Local Plan "Main Issues Report" for consultation. During consultation there would be opportunities for the public to comment at local "drop-in" centres.

Matters previously notified to the Secretary plus matters raised from the floor: *Spring Tree Packs*. These were now available from the Woodland Trust.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will take place on on Tuesday 10 November at 7pm at Portmoak School.

#### **News from the October Meeting**

**In attendance** at the meeting held on 6 October 2015 were: CCllrs S Morrison, K Borthwick, T Duffy, and A Lavery; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert and J Giacopazzi; 14 members of the public.

**Apologies**: CCllrs G Pye and A Cheape P&K Cllr W Robertson.

**Declarations of Interest:** None.

**Police report:** No officer was able to attend. There were no reports of any crime in our area.

**Minutes of the previous meeting:** Minutes were amended: Mike Barnacle is not creating a car park in Drummond Park but is looking at wider parking issues and the impact of parking on the Main Street. After this amendment the minutes were signed off.

#### **Matters Arising**

Crook Moss Travellers' Site: Sandy reported that there are still problems with noise from some of the generators although some are now screened and put down the embankment. The travellers have complied with PKC's request to put the generators down the bank. It is hoped that the site can sign up to mains electricity, which would address the noise issue. At the recent DMC meeting the following conditions were set: to complete the access road, address the noise and the landscaping/fencing within the next two months, and address the waste water within twelve months. One problem is that there seems to be conflicting information: the CC are told that the Drum waste water treatment has no spare capacity, while the travellers are being promised they can connect to it soon. Lambhill chipping plant: Cllr Cuthbert explained that last month the review board had deferred a decision pending a site visit and further information being provided by the developer. A site visit is still not organised (despite requests dating back a year); the plant has stopped and the timber is being moved. A977 Defects and mitigation measures: Cllr Barnacle reports that investigations are being made into whether the A977 should be re-trunked. Transport Scotland now says that the signage will not be amended, the A985/A9 are not the preferred routes north anymore. That, added to the fact that sat-navs send the traffic up the A977, makes the A977 the busiest route for HGVs in Perth and Kinross. Re-trunking the road may result in some money from the Scottish Government for the upkeep and mitigation measures, as PKC is not going to spend any money on this road.



CC Membership: A total of six nominations for the CC were received by the closing date for applications. Since there were fewer nominations than the maximum number of members allowed, the six nominees will become the members of the CC as per November. Sandy explained that in the absence of nominations being received by the closure date, it is possible to co-opt other people on to the CC from May onwards.

**Station Road adoption:** Cllr Barnacle reported that of the 15 residents, 13 are agreed to contribute and two will not contribute. The next step is to organise a residents' meeting with road officers to determine whether this can move forward with 13 people agreed.

**Boundary Commission:** Cllr Cuthbert, who has done of lot of work on this, explained the implications of the proposal, and the flaws in the Boundary Commission's analysis. The CC has submitted an objection.

**Powmill Bloom Group** is continuing to thrive and has recently received a grant of £1500 from the Kinross-shire Fund

**Crook Moss Community Involvement:** Sandy reports that the Moss has now been acquired by a group who are sympathetic to the community's concerns and involvement. In the future we may look at ways of making the Moss more accessible; through walks, access for children etc.

Lambhill Forestry site: Lynn Daley from the Forestry Commission attended the meeting and updated the community on the access situation with an available map. There are four access points. The Forestry Commission hopes to link the paths to the Core Path network. There were some questions from the public regarding access for horses and access close to the chipping plant. There is a distinction between industrial use (when the owner can deny access on health and safety grounds) and agricultural use, when access falls under the access legislation. Lynn proposed to set a day for a walkabout. This will be announced on Facebook.

**A977 Roadside Drains:** At the last meeting Cllr Robertson took an action to request clearing of these drains, since they are no longer cleaned on a routine basis. Kevin passed on Cllr Robertson's report that they have now been cleaned.

**Signage at Vicar's Bridge Road:** Last month a MoP noted that this road was only signed from one end. PKC has now requested a replacement.

**Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme:** Hugh Wallace gave an update. The work is to start very soon; there is a meeting on Thursday 15 October in Crook of Devon Village Hall for people interested in taking out shares in the Hydro Scheme. See Facebook for latest news.



#### Matters Arising With No Update Since Last Meeting

**Landscape Areas – Kinross-shire:** Opportunity to ask for change in the upcoming MIR.

**Bollards Opposite Crook Village Hall:** Awaiting a report from PKC Roads Department on how the safety of this section of road could be improved.

#### **New Business**

**Farm Snow Ploughs:** Kevin passed on Cllr Robertson's report that this winter a farmer will not be able to use his snow plough, but PKC is going to deal with this problem.

**Potholes in Craigend Road:** Cllrs Giacopazzi / Cuthbert: from 26 October this road will be closed for two weeks to carry out maintenance.

Safer Route to School – Drum: A member of the public contacted the CC who would like a safer route for children to walk to school along the B9097. A request was made for a 40mph speed limit on the B9097 at the sewage works to slow the traffic and make it safer for children, for dog walkers, for walkers and cyclists to use the road and access Drum and the walk to the kennels. Cllr Barnacle reported that he would look into it; there may be a little budget for Safer Routes to School, and it could tie in with possible development proposals in Crook of Devon.

**State of Road Through Drum and Missing Grit Bin:** Kevin passed on Cllr Robertson's report that he had contacted Stuart D'All about the condition of the road, and that the grit bin there was missing. No update yet.

Noise Problem from Solsgirth House Hotel: A MoP has contacted the CC about noise from evening events at Solsgirth House Hotel. Although they live in Clacks, the hotel is in P&K. PKC's Environmental Health department are investigating. The residents and the owner/manager have met and the latter promised to take action, but has failed to do so. The managers do not seem to have a lot of control about the noise the wedding party makes. The marquee is not a licensed premise, but they get an occasional licence for functions. Cllr Giocapazzi is on the Licensing Board and will investigate. See also Planning below.

#### **CC Business**

**Meetings attended:** Trudy attended the meeting on the Boundary Commission's proposals for Kinross-shire.

#### Councillors' Reports

**Dave Cuthbert:** Street party in Kinross on 3 October was well attended. Feedback on the party of those at the meeting who attended was very positive.

Mike Barnacle: All the proposals for the Local Development Plan Report of Handling are submitted. We will need to see how well the comments after local consultations will be incorporated; many of the development sites put forward will not be needed at present. Also, at the next DMC the Shiehallion site near the Scout camp will come up. Possibly a proposal for a less densely developed site will find favour. However, there is the question of wastewater and drainage: the Drum plant is full and connecting in the Crook of Devon plant (over the river) is less likely. Anything attached to the Drum plant is also deemed to be in the Loch leven catchment area. The report fails to address these issues.

**15/01530/FLL.** Erection of a dwelling house, land 90m South West of Craiglaw, Poultry Farm Cottage, Powmill. Object, as contrary to Housing in the Countryside policy.

**15/01526/FLL.** Alterations and extension to dwelling house. Fairview, Drum. No CC comment.

**15/01461/IPL.** Erection of dwelling house (in principle), land 30m West of Drumgarland, Crook of Devon. Due to the need for comments by 26 September, this proposal was discussed by email. An objection was lodged as contrary to Policy PM1B(c), due to the scale of the building in relation to the plot, and concerns about flooding.

15/01206/FLL Erection of a dwelling house, Newhall Farm, Solsgirth, Dollar. Date for comment (30 Sept) is past.

The Kinross Company's first meeting was on Friday 18 November 1940 and the Company was formally enrolled by the Brigade Executive on 10 January 1941, which was followed by an installation service on 2 March 1941. The Company Roll book lists 90 boys divided into six squads, staffed by Captain Roddy Beaton, Lieutenants John Russell, George Horne and Lawson Scott and Staff Sergeants Alex Philp and Alex Simpson.

# Kinnesswood in Bloom

At the AGM on 1 October in the Well Inn, the Committee

were unanimously re-elected. Finances were very healthy over the year but it was decided to discuss a fund raising event at the next meeting. There had been a great feeling of pride and achievement by those representing Kinnesswood in Bloom when receiving the awards at the Take A Pride in Perthshire award evening.

There are plans for art projects for next year and it's hoped to approach the Living Lomonds for support.

Work parties continue in this lovely autumn weather and most of the areas have been given an autumn clear up. The wild flower meadow has been cut back by John and Rory. There have been problems with the rowan trees at the golf course and various experts have been consulted about the best way to try to save them.

Our oat growing project at last reached a conclusion. Google had been consulted as to how to proceed. Stalks were stripped, the oats placed in a pillowcase and the grain beaten with a plastic baseball bat to help the grain separate. On a windy day, the oats were thrown in the air and the chaff blew away, finally leaving the oats ready for the next stage. The children tried the old method of rubbing the grain between two flat stones but this was not very successful. At last an electric grinder was found and the class learned how oats turned into oat flour. Everyone had a go at pressing the button – a much easier process than rubbing two stones together.

At last we had flour to make biscuits.

Much sieving of the flour followed and the baking attempt at school was very successful. How much flour did we produce? I would say about 200g, so the recipe was bolstered by oatmeal and flour. Did the children learn anything? I would say they definitely did and have a much better appreciation of producing food in the old days. Mrs Mossom is Australian and said our recipe was like Anzac Biscuits, so the recipe follows.

# Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

### **Anzac Biscuits**

### Ingredients

150g plain flour (or mix of plain and oat flour) 90g rolled oats

1 cup desiccated coconut

100g brown sugar

125g butter

2 tablespoons golden syrup

2 tablespoons water

½ teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

#### Method

Preheat oven to 160°C.

Combine flour, oats, coconut and sugars in a large bowl. Stir the butter, golden syrup and water in a saucepan until the butter melts and the mixture is smooth. Stir in the bicarbonate of soda. Add to the oat mixture and stir till well combined. Roll into 24 balls and place 5cms apart on two baking trays lined with baking paper. Flatten till about 1cm thick.

Bake for 15 minutes or until light brown in colour.

**Newsletter note:** Anzac biscuits are so called because of their association with the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) established in World War I. The biscuits were suitable for sending to soldiers abroad because the ingredients did not spoil easily and the biscuits kept well during transportation.



# Portmoak Community Woodland

Our apple identification afternoon in the Portmoak Community Orchard on Sunday 13 September went extremely well. The weather held and we had very good attendance with 70 people and four dogs.

The Bishopshire Institute of the Scottish Women's Institutes, 'the Rural', laid on a splendid tea with apple-themed cakes and tray bakes. We were also very grateful to Florence Thomson from Scotlandwell for donating a fantastic batch of toffee apples.

We had a queue of people clutching apple varieties, both ancient and modern, for identification by 'appletreeman', Andrew Lear from Bankfoot, in Perthshire. He also brought a large apple press so that, with lots of help from the children who came along, we were able

to convert many bagfuls of apples into delicious juice.

Alongside these activities, members of the Portmoak Community Woodlands Steering Group were scurrying up and down the orchard attaching labels to most of our trees so that, in future, we'll know what's what. There was a good crop of eaters and cookers and it's good to see that, since the event, people have been helping themselves, which is the whole point of a community orchard. Where possible, we have added information to the labels about which month is best for picking each variety and, as we have nearly 100 trees, there should always be apples ready from late summer till the end of the autumn. Everything was made easier on the day thanks to the newly cut grass, strimmed by Dave Carruthers.

The event was sponsored by the Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership with matched funding from the community woodland group. We were also very grateful to Scotlandwell in Bloom for lending us their marquee.

Kinross High School has a long-standing tradition of language exchanges, which provide rich learning and cultural experiences. During




these exchanges pupils, parents, visitors and our community partners work together to have fun, share experiences and develop friendships. For this edition of the Kinross Newsletter, I have chosen to focus on the recent French Exchange and provide readers with perspectives from pupils, teachers and our Town Twinning Association.

### **Stage 1: The trip to France**

On 2 June 2015, a group of thirty-two Kinross HS pupils left for Gacé on the annual French Exchange trip. We were all hugely excited although a little nervous about meeting our exchange



partners and their families for the first time but, without exception, our hosts were at all times extremely welcoming. During the week we were there we experienced the day-to-day activities of French family life. With our partners and their families, we ate together, spoke French and discovered that their daily routine was, in many ways, very different to ours. Getting up for school, which starts at 8.30 and does not finish until 4.45, took a bit of adjusting to, but we enjoyed going to lessons and not having to wear school uniform! We went on several excursions, one to a local "fromagerie" where we saw how some of the better-known Normandy cheeses such as Camembert are made, and also got the chance to visit a "chocolaterie" where we learned how to make chocolates, and even got to sample some!

With our French partners, we had a day out in Caen and a very interesting and moving visit to the gun battery at Merville-Franceville where British paratroopers carried out a heroic mission on the dawn before D-Day (June, 1944). We also got the chance to visit Paris, which, for most of us, was the highlight of the trip, as we got to climb the Eiffel Tower and visit other famous monuments with the sun shining on us all day

At the weekend, a "soirée" was organised by the school where a seemingly endless supply of food was served and where we mingled and chatted and danced with our partners whose families also came along.

I would recommend that any pupil studying French at the school considers taking part in the French Exchange when they get the chance to do so. Our visit to France was an amazing experience and one which has provided us all with wonderful friends, with whom we will undoubtedly remain in touch in the years to come.

Afterwards we all walked up the Royal Mile to the Castle for a view of Edinburgh and to admire the Castle from the Esplanade. We then all walked together to Princes Street for an afternoon of exploring everything that the New Town has to offer. Thus it was that we spent most of the afternoon with our partners and their friends traipsing in and out of the many souvenir shops!

The next morning we had to get up early to bid goodbye to our partners. It was very emotional and many of us cried as this may be the last time we see them for some time.

In 1990, over 100 pupils from the music department at Kinross High School, led by Graham Norris, visited Gacé, where they performed at a number of concerts. The next year

the accordion band from Gacé travelled to Kinross where they performed locally a few times.

Marie-France Brodin, the wife of the president of the Jumelage committee, Michel, is an accordion player and music teacher. They have accompanied the school exchange on a number of occasions. The exchanges with the language department followed, and regular exchanges have taken place since. The current Mayor of Gacé, Francoise Dreux, was a school exchange pupil.

The Town Twinning Association has always supported this exchange with regular help at ceilidhs and gifts such as the banners for the school music stands. During the 1990s there was work experience for some of the pupils in shops in Gacé and Kinross and senior pupils from both places took advantage of this. We in the Twinning Association see the benefits of this after years of exchanges, with participants returning singly rather than in family groups. Social media links are a modern dimension which keep youngsters in touch and they get to know a little about each other before they meet.

I joined the group in France last year and spent time with this year's exchange group. The happy chatter when they meet to share the events of the previous evening is lovely to hear. I find it difficult to decide who is French and who is Scottish! In 2016 it will be 40 years since the first visit from Gacé to Kinross. If you have enjoyed having young people visiting for the school exchange, why not invite them and their families back for next year's celebrations? Perhaps you were involved in a school exchange in the past and would like to invite your partner to visit next year and renew old friendships. It is a wonderful and enriching way of making friends and sharing our cultures and ways of life and can thoroughly recommend it.



### Loch Leven NNR

It's been nearly a month since I returned from my summer contract up on Noss NNR in Shetland, and although I do miss the seabirds and the peaceful tranquillity of island life, there's never a better time to return to Loch Leven than October. As well as the familiar autumnal sight of Pinkfooted Geese returning to their evening roost on the loch, the place is positively teeming with wildfowl and other birdlife! My return at the end of September coincided with a large influx of Pinkfeet, and by 16 October numbers had reached a respectable 11530. At the time of writing, we are looking forward to hosting our annual Dawn Goose Walk, which has 17 people booked on it, and with plenty of geese about they're sure to have a cracking morning with Jeremy.

But they're not the only migrants to have returned in numbers -Whooper Swans were first spotted on 20 September and are now back in good numbers, and thousands of Teal, Wigeon, Coot, Pochard and Tufted Duck are

now forming huge congregations, particularly on the eastern side of the loch. With patience, smaller numbers of Pintail, Shoveler, Gadwall and Great-crested Grebe may be seen, and if you're really lucky there may also be a glimpse of a Blacktailed Godwit, Greenshank or Ruff, all of which are passage

white head, and one is completely white. Geese, and wildfowl generally, are able to hybridise with closely related species, and the results can often lead to confusion with identification in the field. Snow Geese have been known to turn up at Loch Leven in the past, but these particular individuals mustn't be mistaken!

October has seen some settled weather with good periods of high pressure, bringing some fantastic autumnal sunshine and spectacular sunrises and sunsets. We were also treated to a rare glimpse around these parts of the Aurora Borealis, as it was visible as far south as Northern England for a couple of evenings. I managed to catch a picture of a green hue in the skyline with the Bishop glowing by the lights of Kinnesswood. Hopes are high for another chance to see them soon, but keep up to date by following @aurorawatchuk or a similar link on social media.

The last Osprey was seen locally on 16 September, but there have been several recent sightings of Hen Harrier in the area, including one that flew over Milnathort on 29 September and on several occasions at RSPB. SNH and RSPB staff are teaming up this month to dedicate several evenings over the course of the winter to try and establish the extent of this declining raptor's presence around Loch Leven. We hope that we'll have positive results to report back in the new year.

Hello, readers. That's a new opening! So here we go again for another month. The last month has seen some reasonable weather for the time of year and it has allowed us to do a lot of outside jobs: sprucing up signage, painting stuff and generally tidying things up for the winter.

Pinkfeet geese have returned from northern breeding grounds and the loch is once more echoing with their calls. The first goose count took place in mid October, a joint effort between SNH and RSPB staff, to count favoured roosts around the whole loch area. The number was around 11,500 so probably a few more will arrive yet. The recent milder weather has maybe kept a few up in Northern Scotland that may still come down? We shall see on the next count.

Other winter species are arriving now as well with Fieldfare and Redwing, both Scandinavian migrants, being seen on the reserve. The wildfowl flocks continue to build up. Whooper Swans, another winter migrant from Iceland, are also in evidence although not in huge numbers as yet. A few late summer migrant waders have also been scootin aboot in Vane Bay due to the low water levels. They have been feeding on the nutritious mud and building up strength for the onward journey. Kingfishers have also been showing well lately from our first and third hides on the wetland trail.

# ... in which records are broken at Backward Farm

It has come as a great relief that a settled spell of weather came along to allow most of the harvest to be done in pretty good conditions. It's strange how things turn out sometimes in farming because although it has been a really dreich summer, cereal crops (wheat, barley, oats) seem to be yielding well. There is even talk of a record harvest, or very close to it, here in Scotland. Since the crops have taken longer than usual to ripen, they were longer in their growing stages, which has possibly given the grains more time to develop, resulting in good yields, against expectations.

I have just watched some of the three 'Harvest 2015' programmes on BBC and I thought it was a well presented, interesting show showcasing cutting edge technologies and husbandry methods. From apple tree shakers to paddock grazing, to protecting berry plants from frost with ice, it showed the innovation needed to get food to the shelves, all combined with the infectious enthusiasm of Gregg Wallace. I hadn't realised the harvest was so exciting! It must have been the sight of all the shiny "big boys' toys" that made him as excited as a child in a toy shop.

Things are slightly less exciting here at Backward Farm, but things are getting done all the same (eventually). I've even set a few records of my own along the way which fill me more with embarrassment than pride, but here they are anyway.

First, I have never baled hay as late as August before, although it wasn't an unusual event this year.

Second, I have never baled hay as late as September before.

Yes, that's right, two records with the one crop and just a small amount, but September all the same!

Third, I have never combined barley in October before. Oats, yes, but not barley. The general opinion is that cereals were a couple of weeks later than 'normal' but our field of barley, which was the same variety grown in the same field and sown a few days earlier than in 2014, was one month and two days later in being combined. It was the last job of the year for the 'dinosaur' and its yield was about average, so I was quite pleased. The grain has been treated with acid to stop it going mouldy which is just like pickling things in vinegar, and the animals love the tangy taste which I suppose will be a bit like salt and vinegar crisps.

Fourth, and finally, I have never gone a full season with our silage baler and wrapper without having to take it to the local baler magician to fix some problem or other. This means one of three things: 1 – that its pre-season service was very effective, 2 – that I am getting better at sorting it myself or 3 – that I have been very lucky this year and that I had better sell it now because next year will be a nightmare!

So, it has been an interesting summer season here at Backward Farm and I am now helping the local grain and tattie baron harvest his potatoes. So far, this has been an episode of 'scrapheap challenge' but I am enjoying the change from baler scrapheap challenge that I am more accustomed to. At least the weather has been good. Now, where did I put that welder?

### Obituary

**ISABEL GILLON** of Milnathort died at Glenrothes Hospital on Thursday 8 October 2015, aged 85.

Isabel was born Isabel Hay in Inverkeithing on 7 June 1930. Her mother, also Isabel, was a nurse, and her father William was a master butcher. When war broke out, Isabel's mother was sent to Scapa Flow and Isabel went to live with her grandmother in William Street, Dunfermline. She could remember watching a German air raid over the Forth Rail Bridge.

With a child's perspective she was enthralled rather than terrified.

Isabel attended Dunfermline High, and after a spell working for Shanks in East Kilbride she settled in Glenrothes, then a new town, working for Cessna. She was detailed to take an American visitor to the opening of the new Forth Road Bridge in 1964. Initially the bridge was completely swathed in fog, but during the ceremony the mist burned off and she was able to see the brand new bridge and the tiny figure of the Queen below.

In the mid 1960s Isabel spread her wings and went to work for the malaria eradication programme at the World Health Organisation in Geneva. Weekends were spent exploring the local area and travelling further afield. With her near fluent German, her next job took her to Dortmund from where she loved travelling to Italy and France.

Isabel always felt her home was in Scotland, and she eventually came back as her own mother was growing older. Her last job was as office manager for the schools inspectorate in Dunfermline. From there she was able to drive to her new home in North Queensferry via her mother's house in Inverkeithing. When her mother passed away, she needed to move on from the memories that the Inverkeithing area held for her, and found her cottage in Milnathort. Here she found a lasting home.

Isabel had only lived in her new cottage for a few days before the lady next door, Mrs Gillon, invited her for tea. The table was beautifully set in the traditional style with tablecloth and matching china. As Isabel and her new neighbour chatted, Jessie's son Dougie passed through on his way out. The next day, Dougie arrived at Isabel's door and offered to show her the local area, starting with a drink at the Village Inn. Isabel always suspected that Dougie was operating under instruction from his mother, but the pair hit it off and were married in 1983.

In retirement, Isabel involved herself with various local organisations, such as the Historical Society. In 1992 she joined the Kinross Newsletter's band of volunteers as an editorial assistant. When founder editor Nan Walker retired in 1997, Isabel become Joint Editor with Ian Thomson, a role she carried out until 2005.

In recent years Isabel continued her love of travel, taking coach trips with friends to places such as Chester.

Isabel was predeceased by husband Dougie in 2008 and is survived by niece Anne and nephew Bill.
