The Council is asking for suggestions for land use to go into the Main Issues Report (MIR). The Council will then publish the MIR and hold public consultation on it. After that, the proposed Local Development Plan (LDP) will be produced. As many local residents will remember, by the time something is in the proposed LDP, it is extremely difficult to get it changed. Last time, PKC did not want to modify its proposed Plan as that would have delayed its progress on to the Scottish Ministers for examination and subsequent return to PKC for adoption.

If you have an opinion on how a piece of land should be zoned, the time to get involved is sooner rather than later. Further information on this is on pages 4, 7 and 13.

Backroom budget deal denies flood support to all

Up until Thursday of last week, PKC had a reserve fund of £220,000 to assist those affected by flooding who may not be adequately insured for the losses they suffer.

This is excellent, you may say, given the increasing incidences of flooding throughout Perth & Kinross.

However, in order to get their budget motion passed last Thursday (12 February), a secret pre-budget deal was done by the SNP administration and the Labour group leader, Councillor Archie MacLellan. To guarantee the support of the Labour group, they agreed between them to hand all the £220,000 Flood Fund for Insurance Losses to North Muirton Community Council. This is to be used for 'environmental improvements'. The motion sanctioning this was passed by the block votes of the SNP and Labour groups.

I for one would support any worthwhile environmental initiative in North Muirton (or Letham or Hillyland or Fairfield or any other part of Perth & Kinross for that matter) but not at the cost of removing the safety net that the Flood Fund for Insurance Losses provided for everyone in Perth & Kinross.

Living in Milnathort, I am only too aware of the dreadful effects flooding can have on people and their homes plus the ongoing worry that the threat of being flooded again can bring. It can make getting flood insurance more and more expensive and difficult.

Councillor MacLellan gave no indication that there was any particular environmental scheme identified. All he said was that the money had to be spent in the North Muirton part of his ward and that it was up to North Muirton Community Council to decide how the £220,000 should be spent.

This strikes me as a very odd use of public money and leaves a bad taste. In all my years as a councillor I don't recall anything like it.

Surprise, surprise ... a factor in approving planning applications can be money

Councillor Giacopazzi has provided a candid insight into how he exercises his responsibilities as a member of the Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) Development Management (Planning) Committee.

In the February Newsletter he details his version of Committee proceedings on 14 January relating to "works aiming to transform the (Kinross) town centre."

He was "surprised when Kinross residents appeared at the meeting to object." (Notice was required and given by these residents to submit their case, so I see no reason for his "surprise", unless the Councillor had failed to follow events which had received considerable press coverage.)

He claims that I was representing my "personal views" and that he was "surprised" (again) that I had spent time "arguing against how the application had been handled in terms of process rather than the actual substance of his concerns."

If Councillor Giacopazzi does not think proper process is fundamental to the function of the Council I think he needs to consider his position as a Councillor.

His focus on the day was not directed toward the well publicised and legitimate concerns made not only by me but around 80 other "objectors" (many of these were from High Street town traders) and a further 47 residents of Causeway Court Care Home and from the Kinross-shire Civic Trust.

All were concerned about the detail and impact of these illconceived plans on the safety, functioning, sustainability and ongoing viability of Kinross town centre.

Councillor Giacopazzi states: "we rely on the advice of our officers" and that in agreeing the proposal "the Councillors affirmed their belief that due process had been followed."

Belief is not good enough ... assessment and scrutiny of all

the **facts** is required.

I would like to know why Councillor Giacopazzi chose to meekly accept the flawed report rather than ask for adequate explanation from the Council planning officer employees present who were not thoroughly questioned to explain and justify in detail their plans and dysfunctional procedures.

Instead he and other Councillors engaged in hostile and intimidating questioning directed at myself and two others representing the opposition view.

A key issue here is that normally the Council comes to a view on a proposal put forward by an applicant ... but in this case the Council was the applicant ... and therefore had a conflict of interest, meaning that a particularly transparent and balanced process was required. This was not applied in this case.

I find it extraordinary that Councillor Giacopazzi should admit that he was **not** "convinced" that the "controversial aspect" of positioning of bus stops detailed in the plan were the best site but chose to support that detail regardless and the plans in their entirety without amendment!

He also claimed that the "uncertainty over the £1,000,000 funding for the scheme" (should it be delayed) was what persuaded him to support the plans.

This would seem to me to be an unsound rationale in approving this planning application.

Following this logic, all applications for new houses would be passed without question on the basis that the opportunity could not be missed to gain the resultant council tax generated! Then again ... this might explain the constant pressure for new housing which the Council seem only too happy to sanction. Am I surprised?

Kinross High Street public realm works

Perth & Kinross Council are undertaking public realm improvement works in Kinross High Street. The works are currently programmed to commence in late March. This is part of the Council's ongoing commitment to invest in key settlements within the Council area. It is envisaged that this investment in the public realm, and other improvements to local gateways and listed buildings of local heritage, will encourage further investment in the Town Centre to complement the tourism attractions at the nearby Loch Leven.

The public realm improvement works will involve a complete upgrade of the existing streetscape from 55 High Street to 173 High Street with new, high quality materials and street furniture. The road and footways in the High Street will be re-surfaced with a mixture of new asphalt and high quality natural stone paving. The focal point of the improvements will be the creation of a new, shared space outside the Town Hall building on the High Street from number 104 to 141. This will be constructed entirely with high quality natural stone

paving. The shared space area will also incorporate underground power points to facilitate future events and markets in the town.

The tender process for the contract is nearing completion and a contractor is to be appointed imminently. Consultation with local businesses to help minimise disruption wherever possible will then commence in early March.

Local Development Plan Review: Public Consultation

Perth & Kinross Council is calling for local residents, communities and businesses across Perth and Kinross to contribute to a public consultation for the next edition of the Perth & Kinross Local Development Plan.

The public consultation, which is open now and lasts until Tuesday 31 March 2015, provides an opportunity for people to identify land-use issues within their area, and any other issues that may have arisen as a result of the current Local Development Plan. Suggestions of potential sites for development are also welcomed.

Submission forms can be downloaded from the Council's website and collected from Council libraries. The forms can also be obtained by emailing developmentplan@pkc.gov.uk

The deadline for submissions is 5pm on 31 March 2015. Forms should be returned to the Development Plan Team at PKC by emailing developmentplan@pkc.gov.uk or by posting to Local Development Plan Team, Perth & Kinross Council, Pullar House, 35 Kinnoull Street, Perth, PH1 5GD.

The Local Development Plan guides the development and use of land in the area. It addresses a wide range of policy issues, including housing, shopping, business, industry, transport, recreation, built and natural heritage, and ensures that there is an adequate supply of land for various uses. The Local Development Plan is reviewed every five years to ensure that an up to date plan is in place. The current Perth & Kinross

Local Development Plan was adopted in February 2014 and the next plan is due to be adopted towards the end of 2018. Every submission made during the public consultation will be assessed and considered for inclusion in the Council's Main Issues Report, which will be published in autumn 2015. The report looks at changes that have occurred since the current plan was adopted, and ideas for future development. This period of public consultation and the Main Issues Report form part of the Council's preparations to create the next edition of the Local Development Plan.

Main Issues Report

The Perth and Kinross Local Development Plan (LDP) was adopted in February last year, so is only one year old. However, the process of updating it has already started.



The Council is seeking issues and new sites for the next version of the LDP. There is more information on this on the Council's website along with details on how to submit your comments. Go to:

www.pkc.gov.uk/article/0339/Main-Issues-Report

Please be aware of what this means.

The Local Development Plan is used to determine all planning decisions. If the Local Plan says that a site is zoned for new housing, then any application for housing on this site will be permitted as long as the conditions are met. Should an application come in for an area which is not zoned for the use for which it is being applied for, then it will be refused unless there are strong grounds for its acceptance.

The policies in the plan and Supplementary Guidance will be used to determine each of the applications.

If you think a site should be zoned for something, now is your chance to say it. If you are happy with the status quo, then say it.

So, for example, if you think there should be housing on land between the Wimpey Estate and the Motorway, then say it. If you think there should not be, then say it.

If you think one of the policies in the Local Plan needs changing, then say it. If you think that there is a gap in either the Policies or Supplementary Guidance, then say it.

If you think there is insufficient business land or other infrastructure in Kinross-shire, then say it.

I know I sound like a broken record, but please don't be complacent; this is your last chance for the next five years. Planning is very important to the future development of Kinross-shire.

Perth and Kinross Council Budget

I am not going to say a lot about this matter as I spent a very frustrating three hours yesterday (12 February) listening to the debate over setting the Council's 2015/16 budget.

Suffice to say, in most matters, the Council works in a fairly balanced, apolitical way. Setting the budget is handled differently and is done on party political lines.

There is no attempt made by the administration to garner cross party priorities from Councillors, instead the budget is drafted by a small number of SNP Councillors and is then manoeuvred by the Leader of the Administration through Council by a backroom deal with another political group.

For example, it was quite clear at yesterday's Council meeting that many of the groups supported the rejection of a review of music teaching provision (saving £75,000). This is understandable given that a similar review of library provision agreed last year resulted in Kinross High School not having a manned library service on Mondays, for example.

However, the review of music provision will be happening as it was part of the SNP budget proposal. Personally I would have ranked this higher than the £73,000 being put into the events budget.

There were also a lot of other priorities identified by the other political groups. Because of the way that setting the budget is politicised, many opportunities to tackle local issues are lost. Personally, I don't think party politics belong in Local Authorities. I also don't think this is a good way to set a budget in financially constrained times.

Former Kinross High School Application

I am aware that a new planning application for this site is in the pipeline. It should be coming out fairly soon.

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration

Again I won't say a lot here about this. Permission was granted and work should start in the next month or so. This will take six months or so to complete. There will be disruption and I apologise for this. Your Local councillors have emphasised over and over that this should be kept to a minimum. Hopefully the end result will be worth it and we will see a thriving town centre in Kinross.

Kinross Town Hall Clock

I am delighted to be able to report that the clock in the old steeple attached to Kinross Town Hall has been automated and lit at night. This has been done by Simon Wilson and his team. I would like to thank him for doing this.

Broke Not Broken

A group have set themselves up to try to create an enhanced foodbank in Kinross-shire. They think the current system of collecting food in Kinross and then sending it to Perth for sorting, only to be returned later to Kinross for distribution, is not the best way to offer this service. Currently they are looking for accommodation to operate from. If you have a space you think they could use, please let me know.

Compassion Group and Time Banking

Another group is looking to establish a Time Bank in Kinrossshire. I think this is an excellent concept and I have been working behind the scenes to help them secure funding. I applaud their efforts.

Mill Street Car Park, Kinross

I am pleased to see that work is progressing on the additional car parking in Mill Street, Kinross. This is welcomed by all your local Councillors, who have worked collectively to get it delivered.

Councillor Giacopazzi Playing politics

Recently I have received comments, critical almost, regarding the apolitical nature of my monthly posts in the 'Newsletter'. Indeed, I do try and eschew political comment in my



narrative, as I did at referendum time; there was, in any case, limitless other commentary in which readers could immerse themselves.

I do not apologise for this, taking the view that the 'Newsletter' should be a forum for the objective reporting of news of a local nature; hence, I do not use this column as an opportunity to 'big myself up', to use a current, if inelegant, turn of phrase. If other contributors take an opposite line this will be spotted (eventually) by the readership. I try to write on topics which, in my opinion, the readers of the 'Newsletter' would want to hear about.

Also, being a member of the minority SNP administration on the Council, I have access to the Council Leader and the Committee Conveners all of whom are my colleagues. I use this as a conduit for getting the best deal I can for my community; the new Kinross Primary School, the car park extension at Mill Street, Kinross and the new roundabout at Springfield Road/Station Road and much more besides. Please be clear that I am in no way claiming full credit for these successes as my Ward 8 colleagues were mostly on side, but I was in the unique position of pushing for these improvements from within the Administration.

Opposition Councillors, on the other hand, will feel free on occasion, to criticise the efforts of the Council because that is the function of oppositions. There's nothing wrong with that; it is expected. At any rate, I shall keep doing what I do and writing what I write and, if I stand for a further term, the electorate should judge me on what I have done, rather than what I have said. Talk, after all, is cheap.

Council budget 2015/16

Yesterday (12 February) the full Council passed the SNP Administration's proposed budget for the next financial year of £331,000,000. It is a balanced budget, which it is has to be by law.

With the continuing austerity programme now in its sixth year, the Council was fortunate in recording an underspend of around £5 million from the previous year (lower energy costs, a mild winter, extra Council Tax revenue from new houses, extra Scottish Government funding for teacher numbers etc). Some may think that Council budgets must be used by the end of the year, or lost forever. Not so; the cash is there in the Council's reserves and is allocated to fund general spending in the following year.

Please be aware that some Councils in Scotland ended the year with a deficit. In fact, PKC has good reserves to meet the expected horrors of 2016/17 and beyond. Hence the need for continued prudent financial management in the face of a flatlining Government block grant to Councils.

The budget process consists of the four parties bringing forward a proposed budget, out of which one must be chosen. The only proposed budget which could muster a majority of votes was the SNP group's budget, passed by 22 votes to 12, which is how it is done in a democracy.

The orphan bus stop

I was part of the motion at the Development Management Committee to allow the Kinross town centre regeneration scheme to proceed. While anxious not to lose the £1 million of funding for Kinross, I and my fellow Councillors were aware that the proposed positioning of the bus stops had attracted negative comment.

Accordingly, I approached the Executive Director, The Environment Service, to organise a meeting of your four Councillors and officials to discuss our concerns. This took place on the morning of Friday 6 February. Essentially, a strong body of opinion favours retention of the stop in its current location but this would seems to detract from the Town Hall improvements. On the other hand, other locations may not be favoured by High Street businesses. The words 'rock' and 'hard place' spring to mind!

The officers are tasked to look again at a solution which might command greater public support.

some of the focal points and projects that the respective local bloom groups have helped with. Combine this with the yearly floral displays of baskets the bloom groups would probably want to take these on board. However, bloom groups are voluntary and our resources of manpower and finances

and tubs that enhance the towns and villages we live in and the role of bloom groups becomes apparent. Both residents and visitors are more inclined to linger longer and benefit local businesses in an area that looks attractive and provides a feel good factor.

Most places have a neglected or problem corner in their villages and are limited. We can do more for the communities we live in but we need more help from individuals, groups, and businesses in the area.

Volunteers are needed in all bloom groups and do not need to be television garden presenters, just enthusiastic and willing participants in any of the following activities: tidying, digging, transplanting flowers and watering.



Councillor Robertson Perth & Kinross Council Budget 2015/16

The Council fixed its budget for 2015/16 on 12 February. Unfortunately a few of the areas I would have liked to see extra spending were



not accepted. These were as follows: speed warning signs; money to allow better community access to the sports and leisure facilities at our community campus and extra money for road and pavement repairs. These would have been paid for through cuts to the Council's events budget and savings in other areas.

Unfortunately in their budget the Council administration decided to remove £75,000 from the budget for music provision in schools to pay for tuition, central groups and music camps. I was totally opposed to this cut. I think all young people should have the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument irrespective of their families' income and ability to pay.

I did support the extra spending allocated to early years learning (150K), and more money for community empowerment (150K).

Milnathort Town Hall clock

Over the last month the Council have been working to repair the stairs inside the clock tower. The next job is to fit an electric motor to wind the clock mechanism automatically. The electricians are also hoping to restore the lighting to the clock faces so that the time will be readable in the hours of darkness.

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration

There has been concern expressed by traders and residents alike to the £1,000,000 environmental improvements planning to begin this Spring in the centre of Kinross. I have stressed the need for the contractors carrying out the work to liaise with business owners to minimise the impact on their businesses. I have also asked for the locations of the north bound bus stops to be looked at again, to see if a single bus stop can be used near the Town Hall rather that have two bus stops, one at the junction with Swansacre and one south of the Town Hall.

Real Time Bus Arrival Notice

As I reported previously, I am trying to get a 'real time' bus information screen installed at the Kinross Park & Ride. Currently passengers waiting for buses have no idea exactly when they will arrive. The Council's Public Transport Manager is speaking to the bus operators to see if this is possible. Apparently the problem is that some buses don't have trackers fitted so their exact locations can't be established. Hopefully this can be overcome and a 'real time' screen installed. It would make life much better for passengers using the Park & Ride.

Hedges and trees at footpaths and pavements

If you have a hedge or tree growing close to a public footpath or pavement, now is the time to check them and if they are growing into the footway have them cut back. Overhanging branches and vegetation can be a danger for partially sighted people and can force people with prams off the pavement and onto the road.

Plea by library campaigners

Some of the campaigners who fought against the reduction in opening hours of the library service last year have written to the four Kinross-shire Councillors in the belief that more funds might be available to reverse last year's cost-cutting exercise.

Jennifer Holt Brook and others, previously of the Keep Kinross Library Open campaign, wrote: "Dear Councillors, We have heard that Perth and Kinross Council has around £12million funding still to allocate in the next financial year, 2015-2016. Please will you secure some of this to open Loch Leven Community Campus Library on Mondays, and on Saturday afternoons, when it is currently shut?"

Cllr Robertson replied to say that the LibDem group, of which he is a member, applied for funding in the recent Council budget for "... better access to community facilities in our campuses ..." but "... this was not accepted by the SNP administration. So I'm sorry to say nothing will change."

Cllr Cuthbert also replied, sharing the campaigners' concerns. Although his Independent Group was not successful in having the reductions in service reversed in the recent budget either, he said he will "continue to work on this."

Provost partisan at budget debate, says Councillor

Local Councillor Mike Barnacle has accused PKC's Provost of favouring her own party in her chairing of the Council's recent budget debate.

The Independent Group at the Council, of which Cllr Barnacle is a member, had submitted a motion to the Council budget meeting which was "ruled out" by Provost Grant, although the Independents had been advised that their motion was competent.

In a letter to the Provost, a member of the SNP, Cllr Barnacle writes: "I have no doubt you were following your Party's instruction at the debate as regards our Motion, rather than adopting a non-partisan approach one expects from a Provost, a position I find regrettable."

The Independent Group's motion would have suggested that in future PKC should hold two meetings on the budget: one to present the various political groups' proposals and a second meeting a few days later to debate these and try to reach a consensus. This approach is used by some other local authorities.

Cllr Barnacle believes that, "the time allowed on Budget Day to examine the complexities of various Motions and Amendments is insufficient to arrive at a correct consensus on behalf of the people of Perth and Kinross we seek to represent."

The Councillor goes on say: "Ward members over the years, in my experience, have seen their influence in the budget process reduced and marginalised to corporate control and I regard budget setting day as a highly charged political debate that borders on 'the farcical' with the minority Administration's budget invariably being passed with minor amendment.

"I think it is a deeply flawed process and there has to be a better way of setting a £331,500,000 budget."

Councillor Barnacle

Copy of an email sent by Cllr Barnacle to Ward Community Councils, 12 February 2015

I refer to my email of 27/1/15 enclosed, noting the outcomes from the recent



Kinross-shire Ward Forum/Network of Community Councils (CCs) and enclosing the paper I have asked to be discussed at the next Planning MOWG in March on the Quality and Standard of Planning Reports and relations with CCs along with Cllr Cuthbert's thoughts on improving the Development Management process.

You will recall that PKC have asked communities to let them know by the end of March issues they would like to see raised in the Main Issues Report for their review of our LDP. I thought it might be useful if I outlined some of my thoughts on issues in Kinross-shire for your assistance and possible consideration viz:

Transport

Reinforce the need for major mitigation measures for the A977 (Para 7.1.18 of current LDP) and consider calls for restoration of a rail link in the shire. Is there sufficient recognition of speed control measures on other major roads in the shire, i.e. A911?

Policies

You may recall my letter of 19/1/15, copied to yourselves, on the draft supplementary guidance for special landscape areas and hopefully this will be concluded shortly and include the Cleish Hills and River Devon/gorge along with those proposed for Lochleven, Ochil Hills and Portmoak. I noted in April 2012 that a spatial framework for wind energy developments was to be completed and *it is still awaited*; in January 2012, I called for a moratorium of further major windfarm cluster developments in the Ochils and still feel this is justified, given developments since.

Are we happy with the increased housing density ranges in our LDP and should we be seeking greater protection for prime agricultural land, in accordance with national planning policy?

Policy PM4 currently seeks to prevent development outwith settlement boundaries, should this be expanded upon and clarified more?

Should we call for a review of employment sites zoned in our LDP; I have always been against the development of such west of the M90, whilst existing zoned sites remain undeveloped. However, the status and retention of the Turfhills environment/roads depot should be emphasised.

I strongly suggest a call for a review of our open-door policy RD5 on gypsy/traveller sites and because of the usually retrospective nature of planning applications that result, this policy should surely not apply in the Lochleven Catchment Area; thereby enhancing policy EP7 to protect the Loch.

Should we be lobbying for Crook Moss (a lowland bog area that is re-foresting) to be considered for declaration as a site of special scientific interest? Although Planning are reluctant to propose new conservation areas, should we call for Back Crook, Keltybridge/Maryburgh and Milnathort to be considered?

Settlement Planning and Boundaries

Should we revive calls for masterplans for Kinross Town (including maintaining Site H46 and the Market Park site as open space/community woodland) and the Fossoway villages

of Blairingone (to include consideration of a by-pass line) and Powmill (including re-alignment and improvement of the A823 junction).

12 settlements had boundaries removed in our current LDP at Balado Crossroads, Blairforge, Craigowmill, Cuthill Towers, Easter Balgedie, Gairney Bank, Gairneybridge/Fruix, Lochran Sidings, Mawcarse, Middleton, Netherton and Upper Tillyrie; nine of these were within the Lochleven catchment area and should we argue for their boundaries to be re-instated?

Are we happy with the settlement boundaries for Cleish (divorced), Glenlomond (Care Home site zoning), Greenacres (enclosed to prevent retrospective expansion), Keltybridge (Policy PM4 failed to protect a former village setting area from development), Kinnesswood (Stephen's field implications), Rumbling Bridge (reinstate village setting) and Scotlandwell (divorced from Kilmagadwood and H54 extended eastwards)? The above represents merely ideas and is not exhaustive, purely provided as a snapshot of what we maybe should consider for a plan review to 2024. I trust also it may be helpful in setting the agenda for public CC meetings in March. Kind regards

SEPA commences River Leven survey

The Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) has contracted a specialist team to survey the River Leven catchment over the coming weeks.

The specialist surveyors will be carrying out studies along the main stem of the River Leven, and a number of its tributaries, until the end of March as part of a project which aims to demonstrate the potential for combining improvements to river habitats with reducing flood risk.

The River Leven is one of five pilot catchments in Scotland where SEPA is assessing the physical condition of rivers and identifying where there may be scope for improvements. The improvements are required to help Scotland comply with European legislation on the water environment, known as the Water Framework Directive.

Amber Bush, from SEPA's Galashiels office, said:

"We hope that the surveyors will be able to gather lots of useful information on the state of the rivers within the Leven catchment, which could potentially indicate where improvements could be made.

"If you see the surveyors walking the banks of the rivers, please feel free to stop them and ask them questions about their work."

CC Forum discusses common concerns

A meeting of the Network (or Forum) of Kinross-shire Community Councils took place in January, and was attended by representatives from all six of the ward CCs and all four local elected members.

Subjects discussed were:

Funding: The CCs would like more flexibility in what they can spend and carry forward. They wonder whether the changes in the grant payment arrangements have achieved the savings that PKC envisaged. They query why they should have to pay for hiring Council buildings.

Main Issues Report: CCs need to decide in the following weeks which issues they would like to see raised at this stage of PKC's review of the Local Development Plan.

Gypsy/traveller sites: A call was made to review PKC planning policy RD5.

A977: A meeting should be arranged involving PKC and Portmoak CC.

LED lighting: It was agreed a review of this should take place.

Planning was the area of most concern. The forum unanimously agreed that Cllr Robertson would take forward a motion to PKC that CCs should not be treated as one household when objecting to a planning application. (See article at right for more on this.)

New York Jazz legend returns to his Fife roots

"There is no greater sound on earth than Joe Temperley on a horn" (Wynton Marsalis). A legend on the New York Jazz scene, Scottish saxophonist Joe Temperley is returning to his Lochgelly roots in March to play with Fife Youth Jazz Orchestra (FYJO) and give a masterclass in the Lochgelly Theatre.

From Lochgelly, Joe Temperley travelled to Manhattan in 1965, playing with The Humphrey Lyttelton Band, Duke Ellington's Orchestra and the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra. He has played with Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald and Aretha Franklin among other greats of the jazz world.

Since then jazz has been alive and well in Fife, with award-winning big band FYJO, established in 1976 and led by Musical Director, Richard Michael. FYJO offers players aged 8-24, regardless of initial standard or location, the chance to play, enjoy and develop an interest in music, especially jazz. Many young people from Kinross-shire are members of FYJO and benefit from its unique approach to music education. Players learn to improvise on their instruments (anything from violin, flute and oboe to saxophone, trombone and drums) and to play with a big band. The creative energy during rehearsals on a Thursday evening is electrifying. Over the years, the band has played with many of the greats of the jazz scene, including Tommy Smith, Carol Kidd, Annie Ross, Joe Temperley and Martin Taylor.

Creative Scotland are funding the Temperley Masterclass (**Saturday 7 March**, 2-4pm), along with a Masterclass with flautist Geoff Warren (**Thursday 26 March**, 7pm). Both free events will be held in the Lochgelly Theatre and are open to the public.

CC objections can't carry more weight

Following the January Forum of Kinross CCs (see left), Cllr Robertson wrote to Nick Brian, PKC's Development Quality Manager, to request that more weight be given to a CC's objection than that of an individual resident.

Currently an application would have to attract six objections to trigger referral to the Development Management Committee (DMC), rather than planning officers determining the application under delegated powers.

Cllr Robertson suggested that a CC objection might equal four ordinary objections, thus not triggering automatic referral to the DMC, but requiring only two further objections to do so. Mr Brian replied: "I've been discussing this matter with others, including Legal Services and essentially we are not able to simply give more "weight" to an objection because it comes from a CC. For a CC objection to automatically trigger a referral to DMC would require the Scheme of Delegation (SoD) to be changed through Full Council and in the event that that was done it would then require to be referred to the Scottish Government to be approved.

"What we can do, as an initial measure, is to give very careful consideration to all applications, where there is a CC objection, to consider whether to refer them to DMC, if we think there is a public interest to do so, irrespective of the number of other objections. This would clearly be a discretionary process under the current SoD.

"In terms of the Reports of Handling to DMC, we can ensure that the CC comments are expanded on and where necessary, reproduced in full and correspondingly addressed in the Appraisal section.

"I would be happy to run with this approach for a period of, say, 6 months, to see how it operates in practice, in terms of the number of cases, etc.

"I hope therefore that this approach would provide you with sufficient reassurance."

Cllr Dave Cuthbert has been researching how other local authorities treat CC comments and says that Fife, Angus, Dundee and Aberdeenshire allow automatic referral when a CC objects to an application.

Cllr Barnacle has put forward a paper to PKC for discussion at a Planning Member Officer Working Group in March on the Quality and Standard of Planning Reports and Relations with Community Councils.

Early sensory nurturing

Parents of young babies are invited to an information session in Milnathort on the benefits of 'early sensory nurturing'. The session will be presented by Professor Emeritus Elvidina Adamson-Macedo, a baby psychologist pioneer within the fields of perinatal and neonatal health and development.

The presentation is aimed at parents of premature babies, tiny babies aged 0-7 months and full term babies aged 0-3 months, though all are welcome, including expectant parents.

Formerly with the Universities of Wolverhampton and Stirling, Elvidina, or Didi as she is also known, is the founder of *DidiCareS*. Her



research contribution to humanise *Elvidina Adamson-Macedo* neonatal units in relation to their approach to 'touch' was revolutionary. She systematically created, developed and evaluated the first hospital based programme of 'synchronised touch©' - a major breakthrough for neonatal care in the 1980s. The beneficial effects for relatively healthy premature babies ranged from weight gain, stronger sucking and hand grasp, leaving incubators and going home earlier, better cognitive development at follow-up to a strengthened immune system in ventilated babies during their first week of life.

Later she worked with healthy full term babies during their first three months, looking at how 'synchronised touch©' in the form of a new learning aid could further their cognitive, motor and communication development.

Lest We Forget Reflections on the Great War

Throughout 2014 we told some of the stories of individual Kinross-shire men who died serving in the armed forces during WWI.

The Kinross (Marshall) Museum mounted an exhibition in autumn 1000 and 1000 are to a continuous forces.



2014 to reflect what was happening 100 years earlier. The museum will change its exhibition every few months to tell the story of the war from a Kinross-shire perspective right through to 2018. With kind permission of the museum we will publish parts of their exhibition text in the Newsletter.

Some of the information that we will publish has been drawn from 'The Kinross-shire Roll of Honour', researched and compiled by Sergeant Alastair Gallant Smith of the Royal Logistics Corps and kindly loaned to Kinross (Marshall) Museum for reference and safe keeping.

The Day War Broke Out

The Kinross-shire Advertiser of 8 August 1914, the first to be published after the outbreak of war on 4 August, reveals an uncertainty on how to react. While the Bishopshire Horticultural Society continued as usual with its 15th Annual Flower Show in Scotlandwell on 29 August, the Milnathort Horticultural and Ornithological Society decided to abandon its annual show on 5 September "on account of the uncertainty of railway facilities through the unprecedented position caused by the war."

Kinross-shire Roll of Honour

The first Kinross-shire man to be killed in the Great War was 28-year-old regular army soldier **David Sharp** of the 1st Battalion Cameron Highlanders whose family lived at Bridgend at the south end of Kinross. On Saturday 24 October 1914 he was recorded as "missing" in a battle near the French town of Vendresse close to the Belgian frontier. His death was not officially confirmed until late in 1915. The second Kinross-shire man to die in battle was 37-year-old Lance Corporal **Alexander Gow** of 'B' Company,

old Lance Corporal **Alexander Gow** of 'B' Company, 1st Battalion Black Watch who was killed in action on 16 September 1914. He lived with his wife Rachel at 23 Swansacre.

Private **John Paterson**, eldest son of Robert and Mary Paterson, 75 Gladstone Terrace, Kinross, was killed in action at Ploegstreet Wood in Belgium on 10 November 1914 while serving with the 2nd Battalion Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders. He had survived the Boer War in South Africa where he received the Queen Victoria and King Edward Medals for his gallantry.

In a double blow for the Paterson family, John's younger brother Private **Robert Paterson**, a reservist serving with the 1st Battalion Black Watch, had been killed two weeks earlier on 27 October 1914 in an engagement near Ypres. Robert was a well-known centre forward playing for Kinross Athletic Football Club. Twenty-eight years of age when he was killed, Robert Paterson had previously spent six years in India serving with the Black Watch.

Loch Safety

Rabbit catching is not an offence if the landowner has given permission for the practice.

Internet Safety

We receive a lot of enquiries regarding Internet safety and how to protect against online fraud. Here are some useful tips:

How to protect your PC

- Get anti-virus software, anti-spyware software and a firewall and make sure these are kept up to date.
- Block spam e-mails.
- Use an up to date web browser.
- Make regular back-ups.
- Encrypt your wireless network.
- Your internet provider likely offers parental controls.
 Make use of these.

How to avoid online rip-offs

- When you shop online, look for clear signs that you're buying from a reputable company. The padlock symbol and 'https' in the address bar show that the website you are using is secure.
- Get to know any online auction sites you use and learn how to pick good sellers.
- Use safe ways to pay. Middleperson services like PayPal, where the seller never sees your card or account details, reduce your risk. Link PayPal with a credit card rather

than a debit card or bank account to increase the amount of time you have to appeal any fraud.

• Use common sense to avoid scams. Sounds too good to be true? It probably is.

Take care of your online identity and privacy

- If you don't know who an e-mail is from, delete it without opening it or move it to your spam folder.
- Never open attachments or click on links in unsolicited e-mails
- Reputable companies don't ask for your details or passwords in an e-mail.
- If you receive an e-mail from a bank or other organisation and you are not sure if it is genuine, contact the company directly or log-in to your account as you normally do do not click on a link in the e-mail.
- Avoid identity theft by using an up to date web browser and blocking bogus e-mails with a spam filter.
- Use strong passwords, with a combination of letters and numbers. Try not to use obvious words like names of family members.
- Don't give away too much personal information on blogs and social networking sites.
- Familiarise yourself with the websites your children are using and make sure they understand how to stay safe online. Direct them to:

Community Council News



The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. In addition, Kinross CC minutes are lodged in the community library. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. In particular, where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 4 February 2015 were: CCllrs D Colliar (Chair), W Freeman, I Jack, C Watson, G Thomas, D West, B Davies, M Blyth and M Scott; P& K Cllrs D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and W Robertson; a police representative and four members of the public

Apologies were received from Cllr Barnacle.

Declarations of interest: None.

Forum: CCllrs B Davies and D Colliar attended the recent Kinross-shire Forum. A summary of the meeting was given. (See p.14)

Police Report: The Police representative reported on recent crimes including drunk youths gathering at Millbridge Hall. Community wardens have visited the town. Youths also vandalised boats at the Pier. Shoplifting theft at Sainsbury's and possession of the drug cannabis were both detected. A break in at Bayne's Bakers and an attempt to break into Bowers are under enquiry.

Kinross buildings: The former Social Work Dept building (and before that, Health Centre) in Mill Street has been demolished. Persimmon is working on a revised application and new plan. Work to the Primary School should start in 2016: a consultation period will be arranged.

Kinross CC: Advertised in the Newsletter; no response as yet. CCllr Thomas is to arrange for the advert to be placed in next month's issue of the Newsletter. Also to be placed on the CC website.

Reports from Ward Councillors

Councillor Giacopazzi:

Wilson Court: Hedge encroaching on the carriageway: an approach has been made to the occupier.

High Street properties: Cllr Giacopazzi reiterated the question raised at an earlier CC meeting regarding the upstairs flat at the bookies and a possible drainage problem. This has been checked by environmental services who confirmed that no smell was obvious on the day of their visit. A Habitation Certificate was available for the function suite. Councillor Cuthbert added that a vast improvement was required to tidy up the appearance of this area. Cllr Robertson has written in these terms to the owners and will follow this up. It was also mentioned that the flats next to the florist (Council properties) require to be tidied up. Cllr Robertson will look into this.

Public realm works: Cllr Giacopazzi advised that the streetscape improvements have been approved, adding that we did not want to lose this money as it would be utilised elsewhere. There is still an issue in relation to the proposed bus stops and their positioning and whether shelters should be included. The bus stops at Swansacre are still under discussion. A suggestion was made that we leave the stops at the Town Hall. It was added that currently the bus has on many occasions stopped in the middle of the road to drop off/pick up. Mr Wilson added that a stop at the Town Hall (once work is complete) would be detrimental to the character of the building. It was added that there would not be kerbs in the area once the improvements have been carried out.

Councillor Cuthbert:

Cllr Cuthbert reported that the **Community in Planning Bill** was passed yesterday, adding that the CC might want to read this material.

Restrictions are being placed on roads in Kinross. This was discussed further. The Link Road was addressed; it was noted that the snack bar has moved to a different location. It was suggested that a mini roundabout should be placed here and that double yellow lines should be painted along the road from the High Street junction (on corner). Mention was also made to the fact that the 20 mph should be extended down from Montgomery Street to the link road junction. In relation to double yellow lines on the link road junction, a vote was taken and three CC members were for and two against this proposal, with the others abstaining. We are to write to the Council advising that we would wish double yellow lines at Clashburn Road. Cllr Robertson is to forward a link to the report. The matter of parking by local residents in the area

was also addressed and the fact raised that the governing of yellow lines is now the responsibility of the Council. CCllr Davies raised the subject of double yellow lines in Sandport area. It was felt this was unnecessary. The CC will write to PKC advising them of the same.

Councillor Robertson:

Cllr Robertson reported on the recent work to fences etc at **Green Park**. He has suggested to PKC that a fund be set up to finance such projects and that local residents (both from private and Council owned properties) could apply to this fund for environmental improvements. CCllr Jack mentioned the Community Payback Scheme and reiterated that they were looking for projects in the area.

Persimmon Homes: Mr S Wilson questioned deadlines in relation to the former High School site and the question raised as to whether there would be further public consultation. This and further questions were answered by the Councillors. It was explained that some questions raised in relation to the missives could not be answered due to the subject being of a confidential nature. Mr Wilson stated that this was in the public interest.

The situation with the **lights at the Muirs** was discussed; confirmation received that the lighting is to be improved.

Correspondence

Town Centre Regeneration: Kinross in Bloom advise that they will shortly be meeting with the project leaders for the regeneration and would be very glad to have our backing.

Kinross-shire Ward Forum of CCs: Summary from Councillor Barnacle of recent meeting. *See page 14*.

Proposed 20 mph speed limit: Kinross town centre east - ousing to the east of the High Street.

Perth Crematorium Phase I A9/A85 Bertha Park: Communication received from Tulloch Tenants and Residents Association asking for our support in relation to a campaign against the proposed new road that will go around (and encroach upon) Perth Crematorium. They outlined their objections to this proposal. Cllr Giacopazzi stated that this will not encroach on any sensitive areas. It was mentioned that this could affect local residents. A meeting is planned on site next week.

Local Development Plan 2018-2023: PKC looking for input on next Development Plan. Currently preparing the Main Issues Report and asking for comment by 31 March. Meeting to be held on 19 February at Green Hotel to discuss this and agree on suitable sites.

BIDS: Information received regarding funding for projects within the town. To be placed on a future agenda. Information meeting to be held on 3 March.

Special Landscape Areas, Draft Supplementary Guidance: Copy communication received from Cllr Barnacle.

Planning Training: Arranging workshop dates in May or June.

Other Business

Campus charges to be increased for use after certain hours and at weekend. This was built as a community school; the current charges and restrictions are driving people away. To be added to the agenda for the next meeting and Cllr Cuthbert will speak to the officer concerned. Cllr Cuthbert added that the Council are reviewing school lets. CCllr West raised the subject of extra tuition, with the large number of pupils involved, and asked if statistics were available to explain this requirement. Cllr Cuthbert answered that from the statistics English and Maths are shown as the worst subjects. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to confirm why this extra tuition is required. It was added that the same situation was around twenty years ago.

Community Council News

Milnathort Community Council

News from the February Meeting

CCllr Milne-Home, Vice Chair, chaired the meeting held on 12 February 2015. He welcomed CCllrs Bennet and Thomson. CCllr Cottingham later joined the meeting for agenda item 4 onwards. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Giacopazzi and Robertson, and five members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllrs Hamilton, Pettinger, Halford and Smith, and from P&K Cllrs Barnacle and Cuthbert.

Police matters: PC Dougie Stapleton presented the Police report. Recent local crimes/issues included:

- Youths tapping on residents' windows in South Street.
- Vandalism to the trellises in the War Memorial Garden.
- Shoplifting at Sainsbury's (detected).
- Possession of cannabis in Kinross (detected).
- Break-ins at Bayne's, Kinross, and Buchan's Garage, Kinnesswood, both of which were under enquiry, and
- An attempted break-in at Bower Hair Salon, which was also under enquiry.

Other crimes in the wider area included fly-tipping, thefts from commercial premises and from works vehicles, theft of lead from roofs, and bogus workmen attempting to defraud residents

PC Stapleton also reported that three drivers had been warned about inconsiderate/illegal parking in North Street/Wester Loan.

The Chair advised that Police Scotland were currently reviewing its 'Multi Member Ward Policing Plans' for the PKC area. These plans are reviewed every six months in order to keep local priorities up to date. Police Scotland are seeking feedback on the following issues:

- Main community/safety concerns for each community.
- Improvements to police local communications.
- How to achieve more effective reporting on progress.

PC Stapleton advised that Police Scotland understood that current concerns in the local area were mainly: theft, speeding, anti-social behaviour, nuisance calls and inconsiderate driving. He asked for any other issues to be reported. A member of the public raised concerns about logging lorries driving through North Street and Wester Loan seemingly without regard for safety, both to other vehicles and to pedestrians.

Minutes of last meeting: A member of the public stated his concerns that the draft Minutes of the last meeting did not report that, during discussion of the proposed Conservation

Status for Milnathort, a letter from another member of the public, voicing a range of concerns about the proposal, had not been made public until Cllr Giacopazzi had drawn it to the meeting's attention. After a brief discussion the CC agreed that the draft Minutes should be amended to report this. Subject to this amendment the CC approved the minutes of the meeting of 8 January 2015.

Shire-End Solar Farm: Cllr Giacopazzi reported that this proposal would be taken by PKC Development Management Committee (DMC) at its next meeting; there was a potential for income for the three adjacent communities (Milnathort, Glenfarg and Forgandenny) should the proposal be agreed by PKC

Proposed flats at Wester Loan: CCllr Cottingham reported that he had written to PKC stating MCC's concerns.

Planning applications

The following planning applications in Milnathort were discussed, but no issues were raised:

14/02144/FLL Erection of a dwelling house on land at Redhouse Wood, Tillyrie Farm.

14/02223/FLL Part change of use of car sales yard to domestic garden ground, extension to flat and erection of garage at Milnathort Motor Company, 111 South Street.

15/00018/LBC: Installation of replacement windows at Ballingall House.

15/00173/FLL: Change of use of part of paddock area to form additional garden ground at Quiech Cottage, Dalqueich.

Planning applications determined

The CC noted the following outcomes:

14/02140/FLL Extension to dwelling house, 84 South Street: approved.

14/02128/FLL Erection of outbuildings at Queich Cottage, Dalqueich: withdrawn.

14/01848/FLL Installation of street furniture and hard landscaping, High Street, Kinross for PKC: approved.

Accounts: The Treasurer asked that any outstanding bills should be sent to her by 31 March 2015 so that she could close the accounts for FY 2014/15.

Local footpaths: CCllr Bennet raised concerns about horse riders using the Kinross-shire Community Woodland near Burleigh Castle causing damage to the surfaces of the paths and making them unsafe for walkers and cyclists. Cllr Robertson agreed to raise the issue with Dave Stubbs, PKC Access officer.

- 1. Weighting of Community Councils' concerns about planning applications. An input from a CC is treated as a single objection by PKC. Cllr Robertson has written to Nick Brian, Development Quality Manager, PKC asking that objections from CCs be given more weighting. In response, Mr Brian has suggested that, for a six-month trial, PKC officials scrutinise objections from CCs to determine whether there were sufficient grounds to refer them to the DMC.
- 2. CC Funds. This item was discussed, but no actions were forthcoming.
- 3. Local Development Plan. The LDP is due for review in 2018, and inputs for proposed changes were sought. Following subsequent discussion the MCC believed that there was sufficient available local land zoned for development.

New Matters

Seesaw: CCllr Bennet asked whether the previous seesaw in Donaldson Park would be replaced. Cllr Giacopazzi offered to raise the issue with PKC officials.

WWI: The Chair advised that PKC had drawn up a list of events commemorating the First World War.

Health: The Chair also advised that a public consultation by PKC on its draft Health and Social Care Integration Scheme would close on 27 February.

Training: The Chair advised that PKC would hold planning training events for CCllrs during May/June 2015.

LDP2: CCllr Cottingham advised of LDP2 events to be held for CCllrs on various dates. Further information is available from Brenda Murray of PKC.

Vandalism: The CC recorded its disappointment at recent incidents of vandalism to the War Memorial Garden and flower tubs in the village.

Comments/Questions from the floor

Traveller site: A member of the public asked for an update on the planning application for a travellers' site near Mawcarse; Cllr Giacopazzi advised that the closing date for an appeal was 24 March 2015.

CC Communications: A member of the public raised an issue about access to and recording of MCC's communications. Following a short discussion, during which it emerged that one local CC issues a list of all communications attached to its agenda, the MCC agreed to discuss the issue at a future meeting.

Perth & Kinross Councillors' Comments

Cllr Giacopazzi advised of the following:

M90 footbridge: Work will soon commence on the footbridge crossing the M90 at Glenfarg; for a period of about six weeks one lane of the M90 will be closed.

Footpath, Mawcarse: PKC intend to carry out enforcement action to ensure that the developer complies with the requirement to build a footpath at the B919 Mawcarse junction.

The Town Hall clock was undergoing refurbishment.

PKC Budget: At a meeting held earlier today (12 February 2015) PKC had been able to carry forward some £5 million unallocated savings to FY 2015/16. When asked whether some of this could be used to increase library opening times, he advised that the changes to the library facilities were as a result of initiatives to improve library services across PKC, rather than from a need for savings.

Cllr Robertson advised that:

At the meeting above, PKC had withdrawn some £75,000 from its budget for **music provision** in schools and a previously reserved unused sum of £220,000 for **flood relief action** had been allocated to be spent for the sole benefit of North Muirton; he intended to seek further clarification of this decision by PKC.

Portmoak Community Council News from the February Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 10 February 2015 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), R Cairncross (Secretary), R Williamson (Treasurer), B Calderwood, S Forde and T Smith; Perth & Kinross Cllrs M Barnacle and D Cuthbert; and 10 members of the public.

Apologies: P&K Cllr W Robertson.

Kinnesswood Post Box: Arrangements to remove the old box and to restore the window in the shop had yet to be confirmed by Royal Mail.

Lomond Inn: A revised planning application for this site could be anticipated shortly.

Closure of Levenglen Nursing Home: The site had recently been sold to a property developer. The Glenlomond Residents Association will meet soon with the new owner.

Police report: The CC received the monthly Police Report. On 20 January there had been a break-in around 0045 hours to a commercial property in Main Street Kinnesswood with the theft of batteries and cigarettes. This was under enquiry. The report also highlighted security tips for motorists.

The CC noted the Commander's Bulletins of 22 and 29 January and that a new Community Sergeant for Kinross-shire, Sgt Geoffrey Goodison, had been appointed.

A resident voiced concern about police mishandling of the theft of a number of trailers from his property and at the failure to detect the theft of similar building and farm vehicles in recent months from elsewhere in Portmoak. The CC acknowledged that this theft of trailers had not been reported to it and noted that the resident will pursue the matter with the police as a complaint.

It was unfortunate that since March 2014 a police officer has attended only one meeting of the CC (May 2014). The CC agreed to invite a senior police officer to a future meeting of the CC to explore a number of matters including theft resolution and the reporting of road accidents.

In response to a Community Consultation in support of Multi Member Ward Policing Plans for 2015/16, the CC confirmed that its priorities were: speeding and inconsiderate driving; rural thefts; and housebreaking. The CC also wished to point out that communication could be significantly improved if there were clear and more effective ways to enable the community to pursue and explore matters with the police. Current written Commander and Local Police Reports are invaluable but they are a one-way channel. A stronger focus on reporting local crime detection, particularly to the victims of such crimes, and road accidents would be welcomed.

Treasurer's report: The CC's accounts at the end of January 2015 showed a balance of £407.50 in the General Account and £1,687.15 in the Michael Bruce Way Account (MBW) giving a total of £2,094.65.

Planning – New applications

15/00115/IPL Land 80 metres south of Lochend Farmhouse, Scotlandwell: erection of 2 dwelling houses in principle. The CC did not in principle object to the erection of two houses provided that, in line with other nearby housing and to achieve better integration within the setting adjoining the old farm house, they are restricted to one to one and half storeys. The CC was concerned that a site entrance close to the old Gullet Bridge could constitute a risk to traffic and would encourage the planning department to follow closely the recommendations of the roads department.

It was the unanimous decision of the CC to comment accordingly.

Planning - Progress with applications

14/02099/FLL Site West of Main Street Scotlandwell: Modification of Permission 08/01059/FLL (erection of 16 dwelling houses) change of house type, plot 15. The CC had made no initial comment but, on learning that the path from the development into The Green had been omitted from the submitted site plan, had raised an objection seeking confirmation that this omission would be rectified.

14/01482/FLL Erection of a dwelling house 50 metres SW of Moucom's View, Scotlandwell. An appeal has been made to the Local Review Body.

Improving the planning Development Management process. Local ward councillors have for some time been pressing PKC on behalf of and with CCs to improve the development management process and the quality and standard of its reports. They presented progress at a recent meeting with Kinross-shire CCs and had sought comments in advance of the March meeting of the PKC Member Officer Working Group which will consider this matter further. The CC will respond.

New Local Development Plan (LDP2). As work has now commenced on the next Local Development Plan to be effective 2018-23, PKC has sought information from Portmoak on both key issues and potential development sites that may be relevant. The CC will respond and welcomes the views of residents.

Roads report: The CC received an updated version of the Portmoak Road Report Summary. This will be attached to the Minutes and placed on the CC's website. The CC will seek a meeting with PKC to resolve the matter of inadequate

visibility splays at the West Bowhouse section of the A911 (Scotlandwell to Auchmuir Bridge). It was noted that illumination of the build-out at the north end of Kinnesswood had failed and that the junction road sign approaching Wester Balgedie from the north had been flattened.

Paths report: CCllr Smith reported that as further work had been carried out on the Michael Bruce Way (MBW), it was now possible to "sign-off" on the current contract. Further voluntary work would continue in the spring. Discussion to secure a path access around and above Balneathill and away from cattle was ongoing. In addition to further work on the MBW, the Paths Group priorities included new signage across Portmoak, improvements to the Dryside Road and maintenance of the Peat Loan access to the Moss. An application for funds from Tesco's environment fund had been successful. It was suggested that this be expended on the purchase of a strimmer, which would help maintain many areas including the stretch of the MBW immediately above the Cobbles. The Group would look at the status and condition of the old Right of Way extending directly up from the Toll at Wester Balgedie into the upper village.

Stephen's Field: The key factors affecting the future of the "Field" had been set out in the Minute of the January 2015 meeting. Of note was that in 2006 and 2007 the CC had sought the views of the community on the possible usage of the "Field" and whether the CC should take direct ownership. The vast majority returning questionnaires advocated CC ownership and in October 2008 the CC had concluded a contract with A & J Stephen to assume ownership of the "Field", excluding an area adjoining Bishop Terrace, understood at the time to be a proposed house site. The contract is conditional on A & J Stephen obtaining all necessary consents (essentially planning permission) for their proposed development of 10 dwelling houses. In March 2007, before making the contract with the CC, A & J Stephen sought planning permission for nine dwelling houses (Whitecraigs - phase 2), achieving full consent in June 2010.

While A & J Stephen remain committed to the transfer, including an endowment of £5,000, further progress will not be possible without a grant of planning permission for a tenth house on the retained plot, so fulfilling the contract's conditions for the transfer of ownership to the CC. A late change to the 2014 Local Development Plan (against the recommendation of PKC) to remove the 'zoning' for the retained plot for possible housing came as a surprise to PKC, the CC and A & J Stephen. There is now a strong presumption against planning permission for a house on the retained site as

Recognising that there is a body of opinion in the community that believes that there are no circumstances in which planning permission should be given on the retained plot, the CC decided that it is now timely to return to the community to seek its opinion. It will ask whether the CC should pursue its contract for ownership of the "Field" linked to PKC granting planning permission for a single dwelling house on the retained plot adjacent to Bishop Terrace.

Draft Health and Social Care Integration Scheme Consultation: The arrangements for a new "Integration Joint Board" formed from a partnership between Tayside Health Board and PKC had been set out. Its purpose was to improve the wellbeing of people who use both health and social care services. The new Board will have executive powers from April 2015. The CC will not comment on the proposed arrangements but would consider, if asked, commenting on the Board's Participation and Engagement Strategy, which is to be in place by December 2015.

Ward Councillor Reports: The CC was advised that ward councillors were currently concerned with settling the budget for the forthcoming year.

Street lighting in Kinnesswood. New LED lighting was replacing established lighting across Perth and Kinross. A resident reported that the result was intrusive. The advice was to seek a site visit from the PKC lighting department to see if the lights in question could be better "tuned" to meet the needs of the particular setting.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 10 March 2015 at Portmoak Primary School.

Apologies: Cllrs M Barnacle and W Robertson.

CC Membership: Rod Paterson has unfortunately had to tender his resignation due to relocation of his job. The CC thanks him for all his efforts over the years. Kevin will take over as temporary Treasurer until the AGM.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: The Commander's Bulletin continues to be informative and useful. We have a new Community Sergeant, Geoffrey Goodison and a new Community Co-ordinator, Sergeant Amanda Nicholson.

PC Dougie Stapleton was unable to attend the meeting but sent the following report: Three large storage heaters were stolen from the grounds of a commercial property in Blairingone between 27 and 28 January; enquiries continue. Two males have been arrested in Cumbria for theft of quad bikes and other property, some of which came from this area. Roof lead thefts and break-ins to commercial vehicles have taken place recently; any information should be passed to the Police on non-emergency number 101.

Community consultation 2015-2016 on Multi-Member Ward Policing Plans is currently taking place, with feedback due by 15 February. Cllr Cuthbert reports that with effect from 2 February the local Police have been restructured, including the new Community Officers mentioned above.

Speed checks will be carried out on A977, especially in Blairingone.

Cllr Robertson will be meeting Chief Inspector Mike Whitford later this month to discuss why Community Speed Watch is happening in Highland region even though we were previously told that Police Scotland wasn't in favour of these schemes.

A member of the public reports that dialling 101 from Blairingone routes your call to Stirling who say that they're not responsible for that location and you need to contact Dundee.

Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: Hugh reports that the planning application for the amended pipe route has been submitted (see below). Hugh has prepared a draft proposal about how a Community Benefit scheme might be structured - it would generate at least £5k per annum for at least twenty years, the funds being used to improve the environment in the gorge, but also other local activities. Paul Fair of Energy for All was present and described how the community could be involved in financing the project by joining a local cooperative society that would generate some income for the investors, but would also augment the Community Benefit scheme. There are examples of other schemes on Energy for All's website which would give an idea of how the coop would work. In response to a question, Hugh thought that it might be possible for works to begin this autumn, but it's more likely to be spring 2016. Crook Moss travellers' site: Sandy has spoken to SEPA, and discovered that they had made a site visit which revealed that in the absence of Portaloos the occupants were using buckets for black waste which was reportedly being disposed off-site. The application for a CAR licence covering a whole site processing plant has been withdrawn, to be replaced by five separate applications for a processing plant per unit leading to soakaways. Cllr Cuthbert reports that there has been no change in the enforcement of the planning conditions. Cllrs Cuthbert and Barnacle will bring a motion to the next DMC requesting that the planning application for the site be brought back to the DMC for the enforcement issues to be discussed. Cllr Giacopazzi has been pursuing the issue of generator noise and asked if complaints are still being received. Sandy explained that Public Health are responsive to noise complaints, making site visits which result in the generators being temporarily moved, but there is no permanent solution.

Glenquey Quarry: We await a possible appeal against the refusal of the planning application.

Blairingone Community Workshop: We're still waiting for PKC's strategic plan.

Lambhill chipping plant: No update; the proposed site meeting has still not taken place. Cllr Cuthbert has escalated this to the Chief Executive but still no response from Nick Brian

A977 defects and mitigation measures: There was a meeting of all interested parties on 20 January at which it was agreed that a joint meeting needed to be held to discuss this issue.

Waulkmill Play Area: This is hoped to be open in March, after delays due to poor weather.

Meanwhile, Cllr Barnacle is organising a site meeting with the Roads department and this CC to assess alternative possibilities for the footpath to the school around this junction.

The DTR scheme using local taxis instead of a bus service has been very successful, so an application has been made for a Securing the Future award to make sure the scheme continues.

Cleish and Blairadam CC

News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 2 February 2015 were: CCllrs R Kitchin, P Fraser, R Jeffrey, M Traylor, H Somerville, N Robertson and J Moore; Associate CCllr F Gillespie; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, W Robertson and D Cuthbert; Mr Warrington and Mr Martin (Public Transport Manager and DRT Co-ordinator).

Apologies were received from CCllr Fiona MacGregor.

Crime prevention: PC Stapleton reported nothing new within our specific area, but:

- Remain vigilant and report suspicious vehicles in rural locations.
- The police have been made aware of the quad bikes at Blairadam and, whilst they can't provide constant watch, they will respond if called.
- The police do attend the Hill Road and frequently will questions any occupants in parked vehicles.
- There have been reports of speeding or dangerous overtaking on the B996 between North Road Garage, Blairfordell Steadings and Blairforge.

Demand Responsive Transport: Andrew Warrington (Public Transport Manager) provided an overview of the DRT scheme and how it fits in with the public transport provision in both Kinross-shire and the neighbouring areas of Carnbo, Muckhart and Blairingone. Brian Martin (DRT Co-ordinator) then explained how the scheme works. There has already be over $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the number of passengers using the scheme in 6 months than used the previous bus service in a year. As well as being more convenient to users, it is the same pricing structure as the previous bus, and also more cost effective to run for the Council.

Specific questions were asked about the possibility of extending the service into Keltybridge and Maryburgh to replace the existing bus service. There will always be four buses a day for schools through the villages. Service 56B also will still run the current bus service and so there can't be any direct service replacement which the DRT scheme would need. Therefore there needs to be other avenues explored for the road condition and verge protection.

Cllr Barnacle will pursue this further in his next meeting with the roads department. Cllr Robertson asked about the status of the bridge, which needs more repairs. He will investigate specifically the ownership of the bridge (PKC or Fife) and therefore who is responsible for a Risk Assessment.

PKC Roads department have also replied to the CC, confirming that a 30mph speed limit could be put in place for Maryburgh and Keltybridge, along with some verge markers. The CC will reply with thanks for both of these, and will also suggest a walk round to look at the road surface along with potential passing places.

Correspondence

The CC Forum was attended by CCllrs Fraser and Somerville. The overwhelming feeling was that PKC should improve their Development Management Process - and specifically there is still a huge concern that the CCs are not being listened to. Cllr Robertson agreed to suggest a motion to Council that a letter from a CC should not be viewed as just 1 household. There was also discussion about the next Main Issues Report which requires submissions to be in by end of March.

Neil Kilpatrick chaired a sub-committee that was looking at the possible future use of **the Glebe** by the community. It was agreed that there is currently no requirement due to the use of the playing fields. CCllr Kitchin will reply to the Church of Scotland at 121 George Street, Edinburgh.

Civic Trust: The Local Landscape Designations omitted to include Rumbling Bridge Gorge

Local Develop Plan 2018-2023: PKC has requested initial views and correspondence by end of March 2015. We need to submit views on both the good things as well as poor policies in the current plan. Fiona McGregor is to review the current plan and co-ordinate a CC reply.

Website

There are now 14 C&B newsletter subscribers.

The 150-180 hits per day on the site has recently increased to 210, due largely to the new weather station page.

Fran Gillespie attended the recent workshop for CC across Scotland, regarding websites and communication. There could be more use of a Community Facebook or Twitter page, and the feeling is that it is better for the CC to establish this themselves.

Village update – Blairadam

• The notice boards are nearly finished. The CC made a donation towards the provision of three new notice boards being organised by the Tabernacle Hall for the hamlets of Keltybridge, Maryburgh and Blairforge.

Village update – Cleish

- The Village Hall has requested a contribution towards a community electronic piano that can be used in the hall and by the school. A £500 donation to the community for this project should be supported by the CC.
- A new printer was authorised for use by the Secretary.
- The condition of the Hill Road has deteriorated again, and there is a concern for the safety of the many cyclists who use this road.

Finance: Last year's accounts have been signed off and submitted. There is currently £1000 in the CC account, before paying for the new printer and the above mentioned community donation.

Planning: There are no new applications, and one approved (modification of window types at Boreland Farm).

Traveller sites: CCllr Robertson thanked Cllr Barnacle for his letter to PKC regarding traveller sites, and noted that the PKC reply was unfair and many points still needed clarification. Cllr Cuthbert attended a recent workshop concerning Policy RD5, which he suggests is very vague with little specific guidance. There needs to be more clearly defined sites as well as clearer Policy guidelines.

The Cleish Manse was recently sold, and new fencing has been erected that doesn't take into consideration the Right of Way Access for both disabled access and Council workers for the Millennium Walk. Cliff Culley has already discussed this with the new owner on behalf of the Cleish Fields Association. Cleish cemetery: The damage to the cemetery wall has already been repaired.

The Next Meeting of Cleish & Blairadam CC is on Monday 6 April 2015 at the Tabernacle Hall at 7.30pm.



set against each other for the members to 'knockout' one of two in each round, culminating in a final winner. Good fun was had by all.





Kinross-shire Historical Society



On Monday 16 February, Keith Mason gave a talk on Fife Trams to a large turnout of members.

The first trams in Fife were in Kirkcaldy in 1903, run by the Royal Burgh of Kirkcaldy, when electricity became available from the power station in Victoria Road. There had been plans to use horse-drawn trams. Some places had steam-driven or cable operated trams. A Provisional Order equivalent to a Private Act of Parliament was required. Three routes were set up in Kirkcaldy and by 1906, trams went to Leven.

The trams were brought up from England by train to Sinclairtown Station. When the tracks were laid the Tramways Act entailed compulsory purchase of properties in the way, and in Port Brae Kirkcaldy it involved nearly all the houses, which made hundreds homeless with no compensation. The illustrations showed a Kirkcaldy much different from today, changed streetscapes and no traffic except for an occasional cart.

Dunfermline's trams were started in 1909 but were run by a private company. The tram depot in Dunfermline is still a bus depot today. It took only 10 weeks to build the track from Dunfermline to Cowdenbeath by hand without any heavy machinery. This line ran through Crossgates. There were also trams to Kelty, Townhill, Lochgelly, Rosyth and Ballingry. Lots more slides showed Dunfermline and the surrounding towns as they looked early last century with their streets empty of traffic but with plenty of people out to be in the photograph.

The last tram in Fife ran in 1937 with buses taking over. Glasgow, Edinburgh, Dundee and Aberdeen ran trams till the 1950s.

After questions form the audience on various aspects of trams, Anne Milburn gave the vote of thanks, pointing out how what had seemed quite a narrow topic had given such a wide range of aspects of history. She also said that it was a great pleasure to listen to a speaker who spoke from his interest and knowledge with no notes.

Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Smoked Haddock Fishcakes

Ingredients

500g potatoes

200g frozen peas

300g smoked haddock

300ml milk

Small bunch spring onions, finely chopped

2 tablespoons grated parmesan

Oil for frying

For the coating:

3 tablespoons plain flour

2 eggs, beaten with a little milk

4 tablespoons fine dried breadcrumbs

Method

Boil the potatoes until soft. Drain, cool and mash. Cook the peas for about 5 minutes and mash roughly then add to the potato mash.

Place the haddock in the milk, simmer, then turn the fish over when it comes to the boil. Turn down the heat and cook for a further minute before removing from the heat.

Remove any bones and skin from the fish then flake it into the potato/pea mix along with a little milk. Keep it quite dry so that the fishcakes do not collapse when you fry them.

Add the spring onions and parmesan, then fold together using a spoon. Season well. Shape into fishcakes as big or small as you like. Coat each one in flour, then egg and finally breadcrumbs. Refrigerate till needed. Fry for 3 minutes on each side.

These also freeze well, each layer separated with greaseproof paper.



Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance

Our talk at the last meeting in 2014 was given by Gavin Davey, Chief Executive of Scotland's



Mr Davey, himself a trained helicopter pilot who has served in dangerous theatres throughout the world, stressed the case for the use of helicopters in the transport of patients from the scene to the hospital. The main advantages are firstly the short time in which the air ambulance can reach the scene of an accident and the short, direct route to hospital, especially if a patient's injuries are time-sensitive. Secondly the helicopter can usually reach the scene whereas a conventional ambulance can only operate from the road or track. This is entirely funded by donation – a worthy charity.

Christmas

On 8 December our annual Christmas lunch was held in Portmoak hall. The lunch and the company was enjoyed by 73 members and their wives.

Airship R 34

On 7 January William Pollard, himself the present President of Glenrothes Probus Club, gave a fascinating talk on 'Airship R 34'

This airship was manufactured in Scotland at Inchinnan before being assembled and housed at East Fortune Airfield where it was nicknamed 'Tiny' because of its size: 642 ft long, 230ft wide and 92 ft high.

It travelled to New York and back at an average speed of 33mph. This compares with the much fêted feat by Alcock who crossed the Atlantic single-handedly. He only went one way. The airship travelled the distance in four days west to east and three days east to west.

The Woodland Trust Scotland

On 21 January we heard a talk from Mr James Christie (Jim) who, although retired, still carries out consultancy work for the Woodland Trust in Scotland. The aim of the Woodland Trust is to regenerate broadleaf woodland in Scotland as opposed to commercial, mainly coniferous, forestry which is the responsibility of the Forestry Commission. Broadleaf

trees were largely wiped out about 600 years ago in the interest of deer forest and clearances to make way for sheep. Jim Christie is heavily involved in the Glen Devon scheme, one of a number of schemes to reintroduce the broadleaf trees which were lost all these years ago and which is the reason why the UK is one of the largest importers of timber in the world. Another deserving charity.

The Happiness Business

The speaker at our last, well attended, meeting was Roger Stark who is himself one of our members and he certainly knows how to make people happy. Members went home after the meeting in a very cheerful frame of mind having been informed and entertained by Roger.

Using his knowledge of the workings of the human body from his career as a lecturer in Biochemistry, he explained how the receptors in our brain responded to stimuli from other parts of the body and from external sources such as nerve impulses or hormones. Drugs can play a part. And external factors can contribute to a 'feel good' factor. Roger had opened his talk with a simple demonstration of this by playing some pop music slowly and softly and dancing to the music. He gradually increased the volume and tempo of the music and showed how he reacted to the louder, faster music; an effective way of showing the effects of the stimulus.

Of course, there are many different sources of stimulihormones such as adrenaline, alcohol, addictive drugs, health, prosperity, jokes and food, to name a few. However, such stimuli do not necessarily promote happiness. Wealth does not necessarily make a person happy. An addiction to food can lead to medical complications – anything but happiness. Drugs can promote 'highs' but can lead to addiction and misery.

But generally the telling of jokes can bring laughter and this was demonstrated by our speaker as he told a string of jokes which provoked much laughter from members.

So who is happy and who is not so happy? Surveys show some unexpected results. For instance, the surveys, which awarded points for three criteria - Fairness, Stability and Security - show Denmark in first place with UK in 18th out of a list of twenty mature countries. Iceland was 20th. Of the top ten, eight were from small countries (as compared to Canada) and from high tax countries.

Roger ended by urging us to top up our Happiness chemicals: Fresh Air, Sunshine, Achievement, Excitement, Exercise, Friends and Music.

John Mullen proposed the vote of thanks.



Local businesses hear about Liberty PARTNERS **Business Centre in Kinross**



The shores of Loch Leven may have been iced over at the crack of dawn on Wednesday 4 February, but as ever the warmest of welcomes awaited local entrepreneurs who braved the early morning chill and made their way to Loch Leven's Larder for yet another highly successful Kinross-shire Partnership Business Breakfast.

While the keenly anticipated full Scottish breakfast was being served up, the Larder reverberated to the sound of over forty businesspeople from in and around Kinross-shire happily networking in the relaxed ambiance that characterises these regular winter gatherings.

Chairman Alisdair Stewart welcomed breakfasters, and as bacon and eggs (or bowls of porridge for some) were being downed, each attendee stood up briefly to introduce their business and its products or services to a receptive audience of fellow entrepreneurs.

Next it was the turn of invited guest speaker Jerry Alexander to regale those present with a selection of insights into the refurbishment programme that his company, Liberty Business Centres, has been carrying out in Kinross's former County Buildings. Jerry guided his listeners deftly through the intriguing and multi-faceted history of the buildings, from their opening in 1826 through their subsequent roles as Kinross Sherriff Court, town jail and mortuary and, later, as the base of the local County Council.

He shared some of the discoveries made by the tradesmen who have been hard at work for the past nine months, transforming the interior of the building into serviced offices, which will ultimately house up to nine local businesses. From jailbreaks to dead bodies (fortunately none found so far!) and from signatures on long-hidden walls to providing a modern office space for local enterprises, his story made fascinating listening.

It was no doubt pleasing for Jerry to note that four of the local businesses represented in the audience – Eden Legal, Martin and Co., Thornber Employment Law and clock repair experts Winksi's – are already (or will soon be) tenants in the centre. Jerry explained that refurbishment would continue apace on the co-working space – formerly the courtroom – where it will be possible for sole traders to pay a monthly fee (minimum three months) for the use of a desk and superfast Internet connection. Moreover, the good news for local gourmands is that there will also be a restaurant and café, which will be open both to Liberty Business Centre tenants and to the general public.

After the short presentation, Partnership administrator Karen Grunwell invited attendees to indicate whether they would be interested in a range of workshops which the Partnership is contemplating running in the coming months. We also had a very successful Christmas tree sale and were pleased to see upgrading work on paths and steps by the Woodland Trust Scotland.


Now we have no more excuses to stay inside we'll be donning boots and gardening gloves to carry out some orchard and Christmas tree pruning in time for the new growing season.

January's first speaker was Ninian Crichton Stewart, who gave an interesting illustrated talk on the Falklands Estate, past, present and future. 

The old fashioned idea of high school drama is long gone; no longer do we stand around pretending to be trees! So, what do we do?



There are three drama teachers in the department: Mrs MacPherson, Miss MacNab and Mrs Moss (currently on maternity leave). We also have Mr Airdrie with us for his probationary.

In Drama we offer a full range of courses. In S1, 2 and 3, pupils develop skills in script writing, role play, characterisation, staging, set, sound, lighting, costume, make-up and props design. The new National and Higher courses allow pupils to choose to work within the technical aspects of the course and/or the acting and performance elements. This allows pupils to gain skills and qualifications in their preferred area.

We have fantastic resources here at Kinross and pupils benefit from two drama areas to work in on a daily basis. The drama studio is well equipped with a full lighting rig, sound system, costume store, props cupboard and we stock a wide variety of film and stage make-up.

Mr Rosie recently joined the school as Faculty Head of Music and Drama and we are looking forward to the opportunities this will bring, allowing the Music and Drama departments to collaborate on more performances and assessments.

This year we hope to produce a pupil-led school show. We are currently arranging a script for a musical extravaganza! Performances will be at the end of the summer term and auditions are open to all pupils.

For S1 pupils there will be an opportunity to get involved in the making of a short animated film and we welcome the expertise of Liz Whatmore, who is an award winning short film maker. We will hold a premiere later in the year and parents will be invited to attend. Catherine Wheels Theatre Company are visiting us in March to do a live performance for S2 pupils of their award winning show 'Lifeboat'. This tells the tale of two 15-year-old evacuees who spent 19 terrifying hours in the water on an upturned lifeboat.

Every year we look for opportunities to take pupils to live evening events to enhance their understanding of theatre. So far this academic year we have taken the pupils to see 'Jaquranda', 'Face', 'Passing Places', 'Frankenstein', 'The Crucible' and 'Miracle on 34th Street' and we are in the process of arranging trips to 'Blood Wedding' at Dundee Rep and 'The Caucasian Chalk Circle' at the Lyceum in Edinburgh. The Drama Department is once more supporting Rock Challenge and we are looking forward to the first heat on Sunday 29 March. Go Kinross High School!

There are many of our own live performances from S3 to Advanced Higher and we encourage pupils to let their friends and families know so that they can come along to the evening performances to support them.

We have a professional scriptwriter coming to the department in June to work with the pupils. This will help them greatly when they are writing their short plays over the summer holidays!

There are several schools of thought supporting the reasoning that whatever career you intend to pursue, drama training is an essential skill to support your communication, negotiation and team building skills. After all, there are few jobs where you don't have to work with others and drama develops the tools to work collaboratively. Watch this clip to see what I mean!


The meal went very well and seemed to be enjoyed by all. We don't have our next event planned as yet but as the better weather comes in we'll get something sorted, so watch this space.

Kinross-shire Cricket Club

160th Anniversary

Kinross-shire Cricket Club is celebrating its 160th anniversary in 2015 and we have a series of events planned to mark this very special occasion. Over

the summer we are hosting a number of high profile games, including Scotland's first outdoor disability match, junior tournaments, women's & girls' matches, a senior former players' match and the Kinross-shire Community "6's" cup.

The celebrations tie in with our plans for a major expansion of the club facilities, including two new artificial wickets and an extension to the current pavilion to provide disabled facilities. Part of the extension plans include the creation of a 160th Anniversary Wall outlining the history of the club and some of the key figures and events. The club has some written records, but we have no photographs earlier than 2002. If you know of any pictures of local cricket or the previous grounds we would love to hear from you. A Brief History 1855 - 2006

The earliest records of Kinross Cricket Club can be found in the "Annals of Kinross-shire 406-1871". It is recorded that on "13th December 1855 the members of Kinross Cricket Club presented William Briggs Constable with an elegant and handsome silver tobacco pipe and case." WB Constable was named as the club captain and originator of the club. As there is no mention of the club before this date, it is reasonable to assume that the club was formed at some time during 1855. By 1861 Kinross Cricket Club was listed in the Fife & Kinross Parochial Directory, with WG Constable named as Club Captain and George Bogie as Secretary. Further references appear in 1871 when Kinross played Dollar and again in 1875 when Kinross played Blairadam.

At this time there are few official records of the club's progress between the late 1800s until 1992. It is known that in the post-war years the club was based at a ground that is now the clubhouse and car park for Kinross Golf Club. In the early 1980s the cricket club shared its home with the local rugby club at the King George V playing fields. When highlevel floodlights were installed at the KGV fields in 1991, the cricket club was again moved to another location, at the Myre Park. As this is a public park it was decided to install an artificial wicket between the existing football pitches.



During the 1990s through to 2004 the club continued to play regular friendly fixtures under the guidance of John Stewart, Richard Oldham and Julian Foster. In 2004 a new management team was elected and the decision was taken to establish a junior section for primary and secondary school children. The decision proved to be one of the most important decisions ever made. During the winter of 2004/05, three of the 1st XI players underwent coach-training programmes with Cricket Scotland. By the start of the 2005 season the club had three fully qualified coaches and, through the kindness of the Lords Taverner's charity, the first bag of junior coaching equipment. By working closely with the cricket development officer employed by Perth & Kinross Council and visiting local primary schools, within two years junior membership had grown to over 90 children. The club was able to compete at U10, U11, U12, U13 and U15 levels. At the end of the 2005 season the growth in member numbers and the successes on the field gave the management committee the confidence to start looking for a new long-term home. In early 2006 the club approached the Kinross House Estate with a view to building a wicket within the grounds of the House. By April 2006 an agreement was reached for the construction of a grass wicket on the front lawn. At last the club had a permanent home. In 2006 the club won its first National Championship title when the U13s lifted the MCC "Spirit of Cricket" Scottish Championship. The enthusiasm for junior cricket helped grow

senior numbers and in the same season the 1st XI competed for the first time in the "Dukes" Strathmore & Perthshire Division 3 League, with the team eventually coming runner-up. 2007-2015 will feature in next month's newsletter.

Scottish Schools National Swimming Finals Aberdeen Sports Village, 31 January 2015

The Scottish Schools National Swimming Finals for 2015 took place at the impressive new Aberdeen Sports Village on 31 January. The very best club swimmers were on show representing their individual schools.

Ola Stanton from Kinross Otters, representing Kinross High School, was on sizzling form in the girls' 12-yearold 50m Breaststroke event. She qualified for the final with ease in 37.92 seconds (breaking a five year old Otters record in the process), just a short distance behind the first placed qualifier in 37.39 seconds.

In the final it was a tight, tense affair in what turned out to be a very two-horse race. Ola, affectionately known as "The Pocket Rocket", pulled out all the Schools National Championship stops and as the two touched

seemingly simultaneously the packed crowd could only glance at the giant electronic scoreboard for confirmation of who had won. Ola had won her first National level medal, a

silver, in vet another personal best of 37.19 seconds, just eight hundredths of a second from the Edinburgh based winner and exactly a second ahead of the bronze placed girl. She had also taken a quite enormous 2.6 seconds off the old Otters' record and is now the third quickest Scottish and seventh quickest British girl in this event.

The only other Otter to actually make the blocks was eleven year old Jack Muncey, representing Kinross Primary School. He somehow managed to qualify for these finals in his second best stroke of Butterfly and acquitted himself very well, coming sixteenth in a new personal best of 39.03 seconds. Very well done to both these swimmers, as even making these

finals is an achievement in itself.

Out & About



Loch Leven NNR

In between of the spells of wet weather there have been some sustained periods of ice. We've certainly had more of a 'winter' then the last couple of years. The ice coverage on the loch was over 50% and in some places it was 5cm thick.

Ice normally puts waterfowl off and they'll search for ice-free areas like estuaries, but this year they have stayed with us in dense flocks, keeping some water ice free. There have been several thousand Tufted Ducks deciding to stay put, plus good numbers of Coot and Pochard. We've also seen good numbers of Scaup, Slavonian Grebe and the winter favourite of Smew. The latest goose count produced 5343 Pink-footed and 461 Greylag. A little low given the time of year but I'm sure the numbers will rise into April before they depart back to Iceland. The volunteers have been hard at work as they are every month. The tired looking hurdle fence has been replaced around the factory bay hide. This is a great improvement. We also felled some shoreline willows to create duck brood habitat and improve the view out of the hide. The task of removing tree guards from established trees along the trail continues, as the trail and the trees along its length mature you'll notice fewer and fewer of these.

You'll have seen some more trees have been removed from Mary's Knowe. We've been doing this a step at a time over the last few years to gradually open up the area and improve the species rich grassland. We are thankful to Elmwood College, Scottish and Southern Electricity and our own volunteers for help. This work should help to enhance this area of special grassland. Tree cover shades the area and stops the rare plants like Holy Grass growing up. Cutting and baling the grass from these areas in late summer maintains its nutrient poor status. The prolific growth generated by fresh cut willow has provided us with a great source of this plant which we can then replant to create new shoreline habitat to shelter duck broods.

One drawback of the winter is that the vegetation is all flattened and killed off. When volunteers did a litter pick around by the factory hide, they were disappointed to find 56 discarded bags of dog mess. Most trail users, dog owners or otherwise will agree that this is quite unacceptable. We urge dog users to dispose of dog waste responsibly – bag it and bin it. In this instance there is a bin no more than 300m from where all this waste was found. This selfish behaviour undermines the achievement of building the trail and detracts the experience of other visitors. Birdwise, our breeding migrants have already started arriving. Gadwall, Oystercatchers and Shelduck are scarce in winter around the reserve. But Oystercatchers are paired up, vocally protecting territories already. Herring Gulls are back on territory on St Serf's. We expect our first returning Lesser Black-backed Gulls back on site in the last week of February. One of my colleagues found an active Toad by the South Queich on 11 February. These amphibians can exist on high mountains, so it's maybe not too surprising we see them so early.

Morning, afternoon, evening or whenever you are reading this. So another month nearer to Spring and signs are starting to appear, like trees budding up, the daylight stretching, snowdrops out and the main sign in bird terms is song. The locals are stretchin the vocals tae attract the lassies and proclaim territories.

Ducks are doing courtship displays on the loch, although it did freeze over for a wee while and they were restricted to channels and big holes that didn't freeze. We have a good selection at the moment with lots of pochard, mallard, pintail, teal, goosander goldeneye and several smew, both male and female, and a couple of Slavonian grebes recently. Whooper swans have been a bit intermittent but they are still around and Mutes – well, they are always around.

We have recently started a big project to improve the rear car parking area, which now won't be a car park. It is going to be reconfigured with the shop storage unit, and bin area moving further up and further back. A raised area will be built outside the shop back door. It will include a new optics demonstration section; in the past it blocked the path from the shop if we used it for that. New picnic tables will also be installed to provide an extra seating area for the café and a meeting/seating area will be constructed where the "auld giraffe enclosure" used to be. We will also be able to use it for events as well. New flagpoles and general landscaping will complete the job and "mak it awe fair nackytoosh". It will also provide a far better entrance area to the centre from the rear of the building. (Or is it the front of the building now? Since as many people seem to come from that side as the proper car park side.) It will take around six weeks to do and should be about half way through by the time you are reading this.

In the centre itself, the shop continues to get more new products delivered including household, lots of new kids toys etc as well as educational stuff.

The lengthening daylight hours induce birds to go into courting mode, so please keep feeding them to ensure they are in good condition for breeding time. Now is also a good time to put up new nest boxes, or replace auld ones if they are a bit past their sell by date, so they get a wee whiley to bed in afore breeding starts. Birds are inspecting potential nest sites now, so be ahead of the game and give them a new residence for the Spring.

Judy Paul, our Visitor Experience education manager type wummin is leaving to start a new job in our Scottish Headquarters. (That's the café latte and soup sales takin a drap then.) So good luck to her in her new endeavours, though she will still have an educational finger in the reserve pie, if remotely. Craig, oor ither education type dude, will now be the main contact at the reserve for educationey stuff, along with Miranda on a part -time basis.

On those bright sunny days, or even not so bright sunny days, wrap up, come out and enjoy a walk around the reserve and wider loch area, appreciate nature and enjoy what you have on the doorstep.

Farming



Well, what a glorious spell of weather it's been this past few weeks. The crisp, frosty days have allowed farmers to get on with winter jobs such as hedge cutting and dung spreading without making much mess, although at times the fields were too frozen to be able to plough them. The lengthening of the days has been really noticeable, with the weather being bright and clear, particularly here at Backward Farm when, during the dark days at the end of the year, the sun barely comes into view over the hills behind us.

Things were really wet up until mid January but now the puddles are almost all gone, with the only ones remaining caused by field drains which are needing repaired, of which there are a few. So an up-coming job will be to see if our ageing digger which has been parked (or more accurately, abandoned) forlornly in the corner of a field since last summer might be coaxed into life again. This digger has a special air of nostalgia about it, as I went through to darkest Ayrshire to buy it on the same day our youngest son was born, although I did make it back home in time! It has been a useful machine over the past 15 years although it is getting a bit worn and showing its age now (which my wife says is just like me). Hopefully it's not destined for the scrapyard to be a donor machine just yet!

We have just pregnancy scanned the last batch of ewes and have been very pleased to have our best result to date, following on from our poorest scan last year, so the tups, including the two new mini-tups, have obviously done their job. We don't have too many ewes expecting triplets, which is a relief as they are the ones which need extra TLC and where problems are most likely to arise.

The pregnancy scanning is a really useful tool, as we can divide the ewes according to how many lambs they are expecting and target feeding appropriately. The ewes expecting just one lamb are put to a field with not too much grass and the only extra feed they get is access to special pre-lambing vitamin and mineral tubs. They are a tasty, molasses based treat that the ewes lick like a giant lollipop. The blend of nutrients is designed to cater for the exact needs of a pregnant ewe and ensure that the newborn lambs are healthy and lively and get off to the best start in life. We have used these tubs for a few years now and they seem to do the job they are supposed to. The ewes expecting twins get the pre-lambing tubs plus some concentrate feed. The ones with triplets get extra concentrate feed on top of everything else, so the feed is targeted at the ones which need it.

A few of our cows have calved but it will be a month before I would be expecting any more, and I am hoping they might calve slightly quicker than last year, but we will have to wait and see. It is useful to have them calving over as short a time as possible, both for ease of management and to have the calves as even a size as possible for selling.

We still have some of last year's lambs to sell and they are getting some extra feed to help fatten them up. The price has improved over the last couple of months, which is good news as they are more expensive to rear than the ones sold earlier in the season. Hopefully they should all be sold before too long to make way for the new arrivals.
