Memories of Kinross Town Hall

Each time I pass the Kinross Town Hall in the bus which takes me to Perth, I remember the times I spent in it.

Soon after moving from Hertfordshire to Kinross-shire 50 years ago, I was invited to join the Kinross RNLI Committee. This proved to be a stroke of genius as it meant I made new friends in a new area.

We put on an annual fundraising event in the Town Hall, usually a concert. I remember the East Fife Male Voice Choir entertained us more than once. On one occasion it was a Clothes Show Through the Ages.

When I became chairperson, I used to practise speaking from the stage to make sure everyone, even at the back of the hall, could hear me!

On one occasion we were invited to an RNLI event at the coast – was it the launching of a new lifeboat?

On another occasion we were invited to the AGM in Edinburgh where some of use were presented with long-service badges

by a relative of the Prime Minister, Sir Alec Douglas-Home. When I retired from the committee I was presented with a beautifully handcrafted RNLI plaque, engraved with a message of thanks for my 25 years' service. This still hangs with pride in my lounge and I still exchange Christmas cards with one member of the committee.

From then on my secretarial skills were used on numerous committees from Perth to Dunfermline. Having been a verbatim reporter before I married in 1954, I usually became secretary and only gave up when my hearing made it difficult for me to follow everything which was going on.

I became involved in badminton – my first love, political committees, hall committees, community councils and three newsletters, two of which I still help to produce.

Being a Scot, speaking with an English accent, it has been quite a journey!

High Street environmental improvements

Monthly update by Ross Fletcher, Perth & Kinross Council

As all residents and businesses in Kinross will be aware, the Environmental Improvement works in the High Street are now well underway. The first phase of the works, which involve the footways between Station Road and Avenue Road, is programmed to be substantially complete by the end of June with the contractor also moving down the High Street and working on the larger areas of footway between Avenue Road and Burns Begg Street in June and July.

In early July the contractor (Rainton Construction) is also programmed to commence works in the carriageway. These works will involve laying a new asphalt surface as well areas of natural stone paving. Road closures will be required to protect road users and site

operatives, ensuring that the works can be carried out safely. The road closures will be implemented sequentially, commencing south of the Burns Begg Street junction and moving up the High Street as required. During any road closures, vehicular access to the High Street will be maintained as much as possible by using local diversion routes. Pedestrian access will be maintained at all times. The diversion for 'through traffic' will be via the Kinross Relief Road.

Rainton Construction will be contacting all businesses in advance of these road closures to discuss logistical requirements and how the traffic management can be planned to best accommodate their needs. All businesses and residents in the High Street and surrounding area are encouraged to attend the drop in sessions that continue

to be held in the Day Centre every Wednesday from 1pm to 3pm to ask any questions they have about the proposed road closures or the works in general. Perth and Kinross Council would like to take this opportunity to thank all local residents and businesses for their patience as these works progress. It is acknowledged that these road closures will cause disruption while works are ongoing in the carriageway, however local residents and businesses should rest assured that Rainton Construction and Perth and Kinross Council will endeavour to ensure that this disruption is minimised as much as possible. If anyone has any concerns or recommendations prior to or during these road closures, then they should use one of the contacts for the site team that have already been provided or attend a weekly drop in session.

Replacement Kinross Primary School

A complaint was raised at Kinross CC this month that the Council had not engaged in consultation with neighbours over the planned new primary school at Station



Road. I responded that, as there were no actual plans as yet, there was little on which to consult. Also, as the responsible officials were experienced in promoting projects of this kind, they would be well aware of the issues which might cause neighbours concern.

I raised the question of the new school with Steven Crawford, Property Services Manager, at a meeting which I attended with Cllr Cuthbert. He confirmed the timetable for the £10 million plus project:

August 2015-May 2016
May 2016-August 2016
August 2016
Design and Planning
Contract finalisation
Construction begins
School handed over

This schedule leaves sufficient time for neighbour consultation. A user reference group of parents, teachers, councillors etc will soon be set up to liaise with council officials and provide local input.

Milnathort Steeple

I took the opportunity of the meeting with Steven Crawford to raise questions over the condition of Milnathort Town Hall steeple. The red sandstone of the façade has eroded to such an extent in some places that it is possible to see daylight through the wall! As the fabric of the town hall and steeple remain a Council responsibility, this will now go on a 'to do' list although Mr Crawford could not inform us of when repairs might be effected.

Proposed Milnathort Conservation Area (CA)

Following two presentations by Alistair Smith of Kinrossshire Civic Trust to Milnathort CC, the CC decided not to support the proposal, as it was felt no justification had been given for the move. Also, it was felt that where householders can currently make a variety of changes under 'permitted development rights' (satellite dishes, solar panels, garden sheds, double glazing, tree cutting, altering paintwork etc), they would have to submit planning applications for these changes in a conservation area. The cost of a minor application is £204 and £402 for a full application; plus architect's fees. Nevertheless, the Civic Trust has asked the Council to include their proposals for a Milnathort CA to be included in the new Local Development Plan. Personally I welcome comments from the community on how it feels about the proposal. To date such comments as I have received have not favoured the creation of a Milnathort CA.

Wester Balgedie Shared Use Path

'Shared use' refers to the fact that the path will be for pedestrian and cycle use. At the Enterprise & Infrastructure Committee meeting of 3 June I, as Vice Convener, introduced a paper relating to 'Cycling, Walking and Safer Streets', a Scottish Government initiative whereby £223,000 was granted to PKC towards the creation of paths and cycle ways. From this sum, the committee agreed to allocate £25,000 in the next financial year for the continuation of a shared use path on the opposite side of the road at Wester Balgedie from Dryside Road towards Toll House. Last year's work at Swansacre, Kinross, which provided a speed table, footway widening and a one-way system, was funded through the same scheme.

Milnathort Issues

I reported the following to the CC. Firstly, Burleigh Road is to be resurfaced at the cost of £43,000 before next April, which is good news given its current patchy state. Secondly, at a meeting with Scottish Water officials, I learned that the upgrade to Milnathort's creaking sewage system is to proceed. There is no timetable yet. This will cause serious disruption at the Cross, where four-way lights will be in operation while a large attenuation tank is sunk into what is currently a flowerbed. The other tank will be placed in my garden off New Road. I have given permission for the work on my premises as it is essential to safeguard against flooding in the centre of the village; a case of short-term pain for longterm gain. Milnathort residents will recall that the most recent localised flooding in the village was due to the inability of the drains to cope with the result of a torrential rainstorm. Several householders suffered from sewage backing up the drains and contaminating their homes.

Local Development Plan

The process of revising the 2014 LDP has begun. Daft, if you ask me, but this is decreed by Big Government. Concerns have been expressed over the possible inclusion of H46, the site in Kinross next to the M90, in the updated plan. In discussion with officers I learned that for any new area of land to be identified for house building in the revised plan, there would have to be a shortage of current viable building land. It does not appear to me that there is any such shortage.

Flats at Wester Loan

An application to build five flats came before the Development Management Committee on Wednesday [10 June]. Following concerns which I raised relating to flooding, lack of parking and the finishings of the proposed block, the application was deferred for further discussion with the applicants.

Diamond award is icing on the cake for Curling Trust

A local voluntary organisation has won a prestigious award in recognition of its success in securing the future of curling in the area.

Kinross Curling Trust was presented with the Ice Diamond Award by the Royal Caledonian Curling Club (RCCC), the governing body of the sport in Scotland, at the RCCC's 177th Annual General Meeting in Edinburgh on 13 June.

The Ice Diamond Award is given to a volunteer or group of volunteers who have contributed to the development and/or promotion of the sport of curling. Kinross Curling Trust is a charitable company with around 400 members and eight trustees (directors). When the Green Hotel curling rink was at risk of closure due to the need for considerable investment in the facility, Kinross Curling Trust negotiated a long-term lease from the owners and set about raising the £1 million required to bring the curling rink up to standard. Almost half of this sum was from donations and loans from local curlers and community organisations, with the remainder

coming in the form of grants and loans from bodies such as sportscotland and the World Curling Federation.

The Trust directors have been running the curling rink, now known as Kinross Curling, since August 2013 and oversaw the extensive upgrade of the facility

during the summer of 2014. As their nomination statement said, "Kinross now has a bright, legally compliant, energy-efficient hall with excellent ice. The Trustees are successfully running the facility and have helped foster a great community spirit."

Review of the Local Development Plan (LDP) – Pre Main Issues Report (MIR) Submissions

Readers of the Newsletter may recall the abridged copy of my submission to Planning

of 31/03/15 on the above in the May 2015 edition.

At the Member Officer Working Group (Planning Policy & Practice) on 08/06/15 we were provided with an overview of the submissions received to the LDP Call for Sites and Issues Consultation and I thought in this month's report I would provide readers with a brief outline of this.

A total of 272 submissions for the PKC area were made. In relation to Sites, over half of those suggested are not new and resurrect ones submitted for the previous LDP preparation. It is unlikely that the majority of these will be brought forward for consideration in the MIR, unless a shortfall in housing land supply occurred. This does not mean that future LDPs will not reconsider them as such supply reduces.

Of the 56 policies in the LDP, comments were made in relation to 43 of them and the following policies stand out as raising most issues, viz:

- PM4 Settlement boundaries,
- ED1 Employment and Mixed Use Areas,
- RD3 Housing in the Countryside (suggests a need to review Supplementary Guidance and provide clarity on brownfield land, steading conversions and redevelopment of farm buildings),
- RD5 Gypsy travellers' sites (comments all relate to Kinross-shire, where we have a particular problem, including my call for a review and that the policy should not apply in the Lochleven Catchment Area),
- ER1 Renewable and Low-carbon energy generation (policy deficit urgently requires addressing on wind energy with further policy/guidance on solar farms and preventing pollution incidents during construction of river hydro schemes).

As regards the sites submitted to PKC for Kinross-shire, which currently have not been given any support from PKC, the following is a brief summary, viz:

Balado: Three proposals (residential): 2.7 hectares west of Balado Crossroads, 1.8 hectares west of H51 in LDP and 3.4 hectares on E35 in LDP.

Blairingone: A residential proposal of 10.5 hectares (covering H74 in LDP and land to south of A977) with traffic calming. **Cleish**: A residential proposal for six houses on 1.2 hectares at Nivingston Estate.

Crook of Devon: Four proposals (residential): 1.2 hectares of Church glebe land south of West Crook Way, a site east of the Village Hall with A977 traffic calming, a large 36-hectare site south of the current village boundary and a 20-house development on sloping fields to the north of Back Crook.

Greenacres: My request that the traveller site boundary in our current LDP be enclosed to prevent further retrospective expansion by securing landscaping and tree screening.

Keltybridge, Maryburgh & Blairforge: Four proposals for residential development: a small site west of Keltybridge, a small site north of Maryburgh, a 3-hectare site east of the B917 in Keltybridge and a 1.9-hectare brownfield site north west of Blairforge.

Kinnesswood: Two proposals – one for a single house to the east of Bishop's Terrace and the other the inclusion of Stephen's Field (6 hectares) into the Kinnesswood boundary as amenity/open space supported by Portmoak Community Council and myself.

Kinross: Five proposals (four residential and one employment/mixed use). Residential are: H46 (a lot of representations seeking its retention as open space/community woodland, including from myself), a paddock area at the northern end of same, a 5.5-hectare proposal to re-designate OP15 of LDP and a proposal to increase site H47 at Lathro westwards from 260 to 400 homes. The employment site is for 18 hectares of land west of the M90 and south of the A977, which continues to concern me.

Milnathort: A proposal for a new conservation area status. Three proposals for residential development: 0.3 hectares at Moss Road, 2 hectares at Auld Mart Road and 13 hectares across three sites at Perth and Burleigh Roads, redefining the eastern boundary.

Powmill: A proposal for a mixed-use development on a 6-hectare site south of the Aldie Road and east of the A977 to replace the existing LDP zoned sites H53 (Gartwhinzean) and E23 (Powmill Cottage).

Rumbling Bridge: A 1.5-hectare housing allocation proposal between Merryhills and the Nursing Home.

Scotlandwell and Kilmagadwood: Representations seeking to retain their recently established separate settlement boundaries, contrary to what I thought was the community view. Four residential development proposals: 1 hectare on the eastern edge of Scotlandwell, 0.9 hectare north of the current building line settlement boundary at Leslie Road, 1 hectare east of H54 (this may ensure only single-storey housing is permitted on both sites) and 1.5 hectare south of H54 and 1 hectare of community woodland.

Local members will be meeting with Planning Officers in late June/early July to discuss all of the above and the Overview Report in more detail. The document is now available on-line at http://www.pkc.gov.uk/mainissuesldp2 and I understand it is the intention to submit a final Main Issues Report to PKC on 07/10/15 prior to a statutory period of further consultation. I will be considering, along with my colleague Councillor Cuthbert, organising some public meetings/presentations on the above, possibly in co-ordination with Community Council meetings in the late summer/early autumn but hope this Report helps and is informative meantime.

Changes to speed limits agreed

Cllr Mike Barnacle reports that the following speed limits, requested by the community and local elected members, were agreed at PKC's Enterprise & Infrastructure Committee Meeting of 3 June 2015:

- **Hatchbank Road**: Extension to the 30mph speed limit on the U255 Hatchbank Road, Gairneybank.
- Gairneybank and Gairneybridge: Reduction of the current 50mph speed limit to 40mph at Gairneybank and extension of the 40mph limit south to Gairneybridge.


The event raised well over £1500 for local charities, putting the money back into our community around Kinross and also raising awareness for local groups.



Be Sunsmart Looking at ways to enjoy the sunshine safely



Whatever your age, the best way to enjoy the sun safely and protect your skin from sunburn is to use a combination of shade, clothing and sunscreen. Children and teenagers might need a reminder or a helping hand, but setting a good example yourself is a great way to help them learn and get into good habits.

When the sun is strong or you're at risk of burning:

- Spend time in the shade between 11am and 3pm.
- Cover up with a t-shirt, hat and sunglasses.
- Use a sunscreen with a protection level of at least SPF15 and 4 stars. Use it generously and reapply regularly.

Shade

One of the best ways to protect your skin from the harmful effects of the sun's UV rays is to spend some time in the shade.

Covering up

When there's no shade around, the best way to protect your skin from the sun is with loose clothing, a wide-brimmed hat and good quality sunglasses.

Sunscreen

Sunscreens will not protect us completely from sun damage on their own. However, they can be useful for protecting the parts of skin we can't shade or cover. This is why we recommend using sunscreens together with shade or clothing to avoid getting too much UV exposure. needles, zips, buttons and more.

The work of local crafts people is showcased at Skeins & Bobbins, with original watercolour paintings by Amanda Webster, Scarlet Goose home décor items, 'Betty' bags and jewellery by two local designers.

Running the shop is "a dream come true" for Morag. It came about almost by accident: she had worked in the

previous shop at this location, Little Gems, and was given the opportunity to start her own business when the owner of Little Gems decided to give up. Morag finds that running Skeins & Bobbins has given her a new lease of life, as she has had to cope with considerable health problems.

Lest We Forget Reflections on the Great War

Until 2018, the Kinross (Marshall) Museum will mount exhibitions to reflect what was happening 100 years ago. The

Military aviation

'Per ardua ad astra' - Through adversity to the stars

Military aviation in Britain dates back to 1912 when the Royal Flying Corps (RFC) was created. It had both a military and a naval wing. The military wing comprised three squadrons, each commanded by a major.

In 1915 this military wing was expanded into brigades, each commanded by a brigadier-general.

By the end of the war, the RFC comprised 150 squadrons. Initially used for air reconnaissance on the Western Front, RFC planes, such as the Sopwith Camel, later went into combat action.

The naval wing, which had become the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS), eventually reunited with the RFC on 1 April 1918 to become the Royal Air Force (RAF).

The origin of the RAF tricolour roundel

In order to match the identification markings of French allies and avoid 'friendly fire', the RFC officially adopted in 1915 the French cockade roundel. Applied to wings, fuselage and rudders, these markings were applied to British planes with the colours in reverse order, with blue outermost. This marking was later to be used by the Royal Airforce.

Robbery at Balado

More tools, this time four electric drills, were stolen from a garage in Vicar's Bridge Road, **Blairingone** overnight on Sunday 7 June.

ATM Fraud

In the last issue we mentioned that skimming devices had been discovered at bank machines in the Perth & Kinross area. Good work by the Criminal Investigation Department saw three men appear in custody at Perth Sheriff Court on 11 June for various linked offences.

Don't Spoil Summer

Scottish Government and Road Safety Scotland (part of Transport Scotland) have launched their 2015 Summer Drink Drive campaign in support of Police Scotland's Summer Safety Campaign.

Michael McDonnell, Director of Road Safety Scotland, said: "Summer can be a time for getting together with friends and family, and many people go for a drink with colleagues after work on a sunny evening. Because this drinking is often unplanned, people may not have thought about the journey home.

"And many people don't realise that just one drink can put them over the legal limit.

"Evidence shows that even one alcoholic drink before driving makes you three times more likely to be involved in a fatal accident.

"It is estimated that one in eight deaths on Scottish roads involve drivers who are over the legal limit and, despite what many people think, eating food or a perceived alcohol tolerance don't reduce its effects.

"Even a small amount impairs your judgement and reactions so, the best advice is just don't risk it."

There has been a 17% reduction in drink driving offences in Scotland in the period January to March 2015 compared to the same period last year. This follows the introduction of the lower drink drive limit on 5 December 2014.

Kinross Community Council News from the June Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 3 June 2015 were: CCllrs W Freeman (Chair), D Colliar, I Jack, D West, M Scott and D MacKenzie; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and J Giacoppazi and eleven members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllrs Blyth, Davies and Thomas and P&K Cllrs Robertson and Barnacle.

CC Member: Mr Tom Stewart, having been approved by the Council, was unanimously co-opted on to the CC. His nomination was proposed by CCllr West and seconded by CCllr Colliar.

Declarations of Interest: CCllr Stewart in relation to the Gellybank Farm application and CCllr Davies in relation to Newsletter fund disbursement.

Matters Arising from Previous Meeting

Green Road/Sunnypark: Cllr Cuthbert advised that he had been in contact with the Council regarding bollards but had not yet received a response.

Co-option: Cllr Cuthbert advised that we can co-opt one more person on to the CC. It was confirmed that if a vote is required at the election in November this will be via a postal process.

War Memorial: CCllr Colliar advised that he had met with Michael Morgan and Kinross in Bloom. The Council are to arrange for a row of planters to be placed around the perimeter which will stop cars from driving over or parking in this area. Police Report: No Police present at the meeting. The Secretary mentioned articles from the Commander's Weekly Bulletin.

Disbursement of Newsletter funds

Kinross in Bloom: CCllr Davies declared an interest in this application. The sum now being proposed is £2000. This was agreed.

Aero Space Kinross: Alisdair Stewart reported on this project. They are looking for a grant of £2,000 from the Newsletter Fund. The money will be utilised in publicising and promoting the project. The total cost of the building project is somewhere in the region of 6 million and there is no guarantee that this will proceed to fruition. The proposed building will be similar to a science centre with interactive experiences, simulations and experiments and hopefully will give children a head start in science, engineering and maths. It will also bring employment to the town and increase tourism. An approach has been made to the Council for £2,000 and Kinross-shire Fund invested £4,000. The charity is to be called Aerospace Scientific and they have applied to OSCR for charity status. They plan to build the Centre on Kinross West site. They will approach major donors, funders, trusts, foundations, corporate sponsors etc for funding. An interest in this project has also been expressed by the UK Space Agency and they have NASA development contacts and support from Dynamic Earth and the Glasgow Science Centre. CCllr Colliar proposed the sum of £2,000 be granted. No seconder came forward. A counter proposal was made by CCllr West that once established they agree on a regular contribution to the Newsletter Fund. CCllr MacKenzie added that he would like to see a written report with figures. Mr Stewart replied that a business plan was drawn up and Abertay Dundee Business School were engaged to carry out an independent assessment - they projected 106,000 visitors. All agreed that the big objective was in raising the money for a project of this size. CCllr Jack proposed that the £2,000 be awarded but as a repayment loan. This was seconded by CCllr MacKenzie. All agreed.

Accounts for the financial period to 31 March in relation to Kinross Community Council Newsletter Ltd were produced. The Directors and Secretary are C Watson, B Davies, M Scott, D Cuthbert, D West and the Company Secretary M Scott. C Watson is no longer a member of the CC and should be removed as a Director. Cllr Cuthbert, as an ex officio member of the CC, can continue as a Director. Following the CC election in November a review of Directors can take place. A suggestion was also made that non CC members should be accepted.

CCllr West also mentioned that donations of £11,189 were contributed to the fund by the Newsletter in this financial year and £32.00 interest received. The sum of £6,516 was contributed to local charities: Positive Choices, Kinross Table Tennis Club, KLEO, Kinross-shire Volunteer Group, Rural Access Committee, Loch Leven Diamonds and Orwell Guides.

There is at the present time on the ledger a balance of £32,631.00 but that figure is to be reduced by £2,000 following the recent payment that was approved to Kinross Primary School.

Future of Kinross Buildings

Former High School site: Discussions still taking place in relation to flooding measures at the site in Milnathort. Once resolved a planning application should be resubmitted for all sites. It is believed that this will be amended to retain the old school building to the front of the site.

Primary School: A deadline for spending the money has to be met and the school should be completed by the end of 2017. The Council are consulting with the Parent Council and a trip is planned to look over schools with similar style and design. Test boring and soil sampling have been carried out. Comment was made as to where the children will play during



construction. One suggestion provided was the adjoining Hayfield Garden. Cllr Cuthbert added that a User Group was yet to be formed and agreed that representation from neighbouring properties should be considered. A member of the public suggested that the CC should be included and added that other issues in relation to the construction were of concern; the access road was mentioned and whether this would be from Bowton Road or Station Road.

CC vacancy: There is one vacancy left for a co-opted member should anyone be interested.

Planning applications submitted to PKC:

15/00669/IPL Land 250 metres south of Gellybank Farm: erection of 10 lodges (in principle). Mr John Stevenson asked to comment on this application. He advised the application was submitted on 21 April and that there were 15 objections. The grounds of objection range from the scale and setting of the Development, the visual impact from the south, noise, traffic safety, contravention of the Development Plan. CCllr Colliar stated that he had checked the information online this afternoon and that there were six letters on the website: one was neutral and two were from the same person. Some discussion followed in relation to the traffic use on this road. A survey was carried out some four/five years ago, the result of which was that the roadway was below the level for upgrading. CCllr Colliar added that the objections mentioned the lack of public transport; he pointed out that the DRT service is available in this area. Holiday chalets will also bring in tourists to the area. CCllr Colliar continued that this application was for Outline Planning Permission at this stage. If granted, a Planning Application would require to be submitted which would detail more information on what was proposed (e.g. style and size of chalets). At the moment there is not enough information to make an informative decision. It was commented that if the CC wish to object they have to refer to valid grounds. It was agreed that we should await a full planning application.

Reports from Perth & Kinross Councillors

Cllrs Giacopazzi and Cuthbert advised.

Station Road: Trees have been cut back.

H46: It was very unlikely that the previous decision would be reversed but there was no guarantee.

Planters: Not to be made available for Kinross. Funding could be sourced from other organisations such as the Arthur and Margaret Thomson Trust or the Community Challenge Fund.

Swansacre: Mention was made of the cost of the traffic planning measures carried out in Swansacre.

Tourist chalets: Construction of 16 planned for area at Findatie

Campus parking: Copies of proposed amendments to the existing waiting restrictions on the access road and car park at the campus were circulated.

Brown bins: It was noted that a large number of properties in Kinross-shire do not have a brown bin. Any new builds do not receive this service. Only the green bins are covered under a statutory obligation. This was discussed at a recent Environment Meeting and the situation is being looked at.

Correspondence

CC Team: Brenda Lackie, CC Liaison Officer for PKC, has retired. Christine Grant has been appointed as Senior Elections and CC Officer and will also act as the CC Liaison Officer. Pam Rogalski has been appointed as Elections and CC Officer and it is hoped to have a clerical assistant in post over the summer time. Support to CCs has not changed.

TAYplan: Period of representations closes on Friday 3 July. Cllr West added that there is only one reference to Kinrossshire in the documentation (i.e. the junction). Cllr Cuthbert advised that TAYplan has no relevance to Kinross-shire and that we should look at either Fife or Stirling.



Community Noticeboard: Council confirm that they will ensure a board is included in the specification for the new bus shelter to be located at the site opposite Swansacre. However, if we consider it would be useful to provide a board in the shelter at the Montgomery Street junction we should let them know and they will arrange to include this in the shelter specification for this site too. It was agreed that a notice board be placed at the bus stop opposite Swansacre.

Other Business

Facebook: CCllr Freeman has introduced a Facebook page for the CC. He would welcome any suggestions for material to be placed on the site. The agenda for this meeting was added and future minutes will be uploaded. CCllr Colliar addressed the number of comments that were placed on the Facebook page Milnathort and Kinross Parents Group in relation to shops in the town and reference made therein to the CC. He suggested that two areas that could be investigated are the reintroduction of a rail line from Cowdenbeath to Bridge of Earn and the possibility of water sports on the Loch, such as canoeing, kayaking and windsurfing. Cllr Cuthbert answered that the latter was not feasible - a group he was involved with looked at this topic some time ago. The problem is that the Loch is protected.

Complaints:

- CCIlr Scott raised a number of comments made by local residents in relation to overgrown trees and cracked wall in private land adjacent to Ochil View; parking at the entrance to Green Road and storage of items on the grass verge at Green Road.
- She also mentioned two unrelated and ongoing sagas in the town relating to anti-social behaviour and the method in which they are being addressed by the Council.
- Drains are blocked from Sutherland Drive/Springfield Road to Station Road.
- Bushes are growing wild in the Springfield/Gallowhill area

Travellers are again accessing the old High School site. To move them on there should be another site available to accommodate them.

Gritters on A977: 24-hour cover is to be provided, however this will mean a reduction at some other location. CCllr Colliar asked that the A911 should not be abandoned and it was confirmed that it would be ploughed but not receive 24-hour cover.

News from the June Meeting

Present: CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Cottinham, Halford, Milne-Home, Smith and Thomson to the meeting held on 11 June 2015. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and J Giacopazzi and three members of the public.

Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs Bennet and Pettinger and P&K Cllr Robertson.

Police report: PC Goodison, our community sergeant, presented a brief report. A vehicle obstructing pavement in Stirling Road has been removed and the owner traced. Nothing should obstruct the passage of wheelchairs and prams on pavements, and to do so is against the law.

The Chief Superintendent is positive about Police Scotland, and Perth & Kinross have found a better service of unusual resources, which improves the emergence services and outcomes.

A prescription drug is being invented to eventually produce a roadside kit to test for drugs as we have now for drink driving. A wheelbarrow was stolen in the area.

Matters arising

Best dressed windows: Prizes are being awarded to four outstanding windows reflecting 'yesteryear': Milnathort Agriculture (formerly Robertson's), the MB Salon, Davidson's Chemist and Heaven Scent, reflecting vintage agriculture, the flower show, vintage pharmaceutical and wonderful steam trains.

Mains gas is to be installed in Bridgefauld Road and is scheduled to happen in July 2015.

Proposed CC boundary changes: PKC and the CCs are against this and our Councillors are to keep us up to date.

Dog control: Signs are now up regarding dog control, and the lady frightened by an unruly dog in Donaldson Park has written to thank the Council for the prompt action.

Planning

MCC considered the following applications. No objections were raised.

15/00687/FLL Extension to dwelling house at Bridge House, Dalqueich.

15/00712/FLL Change of use and alterations of steadings to provide additional domestic storage and amenity space at Thomanean House for Alexander Harley Seeds.

The CC also noted the following decisions by PKC:

15/00240/IPM Variation of conditions 1 and 2 of permission to allow additional time for the submission of applications for the approval of matters specified in conditions, and the commencement of development, land at Pitdownies Farm, Manse Road, Milnathort, for The General Trustees of The Church of Scotland: application approved.

15/00472/FLL Installation of roof mounted PV solar panels, Blairfield, Milnathort: application approved.

15/00488/FLL Change of house type, site of Tarhill Farm, Kinross: application approved.

Milnathort to Mawcarse cycleway strimming: PKC have no funding for maintenance and turned down the request to remove the turf on the tarmac (at a cost of £1,000). However MCC have managed to arrange for strimmers and labour from the Unpaid Work Team in return for providing strimmer cord at a cost of £15.90. It was suggested this is extended to Tillywhally Wood where the main path is narrowing. Strumming will help, but some judicial use of weed killer may be necessary.

Parking suspension: 1-3 July in Stirling Road. The work will be repairing sunken drains. Parking will not be allowed between Mill Lade and Wester Loan during the work, and drivers are asked to park in Kays car park to help minimise the disruption to the area.

Community Councillors needed: There will be an election on 5 November 2015. Nominations close on 24 September. We will need several new members, as three of the present members are not putting themselves forward for re-election. If you feel you would like to help the community, please feel free to put a nomination forward for a place on your CC.

Perth and Kinross Councillors' Comments

Councillor Giacopazzi:

The gypsy travellers have had the PKC decision to refuse their application near Mawcarse reversed in an appeal to the Scottish Government. Two pitches are now allowed with conditions on sewage and generator noise. (A pitch is for one semi permanent dwelling and two towing caravans.)

Milnathort sewage upgrade: See page 7.

A dog waste bin is now in place on Ba' Hill. Dog owners are requested to take dog foul in plastic bags to dog waste bins and NOT to leave them in the countryside and pathways.

The Civic Trust has applied for Milnathort to be made a Conservation Village despite the strong rejection of the concept at MCC meetings.

Councillor Barnacle:

An overview of representation on the new Local Development Plan will be online shortly. Most sites are as before, so no new ones in Milnathort. On 7 October the plan will be out for consultation until December.

News from the June Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 9 June 2015 were: CCllrs B Calderwood (Deputy Chairman), R Cairncross (Secretary), R Williamson (Treasurer), S Forde and T Smith; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and J Giacopazzi; PC Jim Wilson and 13 members of the public.

Apologies for absence were received from CCllr M Strang Steel and P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and W Robertson.

New member: By co-option, Dave Morris was welcomed as a new community councillor.

Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

Portmoak Cemetery: PKC have yet to confirm possible alternative plans for the cemetery, which is now approaching capacity. The matter is being taken forward by Cllr Robertson.



Portmoak Cemetery is now approaching capacity.

Police Report

PC Jim Wilson was welcomed to his first meeting and the CC received the monthly Police Report. The only reported crime since the previous meeting had been the overnight theft of a garden swing set from a garden in Scotlandwell. Police Scotland advised that they had launched both their 2015 Summer Drink Drive Campaign and a Road Safety Campaign. Speed monitoring could be anticipated. Residents raised two points:

- Parking immediately after the build-out in central Kinnesswood. This made it difficult for the increasing numbers of cyclists to use the build-out's by-pass provisions for cyclists; and
- The proposed two-year trial of 20mph speed limits within Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell to replace the existing 30mph limits.

There should be an opportunity shortly to explore these matters further with the Road Safety Officer at a future meeting of the Council.

PC Wilson was thanked for his report. The CC noted the Commander's Bulletins of 13, 21 and 28 May and of 4 June.

Treasurer's Report

On the general account there has been no movement in the month leaving a balance at the end of May the same as at end April of £66.96. On the MBW account however we have received £325 in donations towards the upkeep of MBW following our appeal to members of the community. This has moved our balance from £166.92 at the end of April to £491.92 at the end of May.

Planning Report

New planning application: 15/0000752/FLL Former Levenmouth Cottage, Scotlandwell: erection of a replacement dwelling house. No comment or objection.

Progress with developments

- a) Lomond Inn 15/00505FLL & 15/00506/CON. The CC's comments had been submitted.
- b) Glenlomond. The Glenlomond Residents Association would meet shortly. The developer would be present to explain progress with his development plans.
- c) The following have been granted planning consent: 15/00449/AML Erection of 16 holiday lodges and associated works, Findatie; 15/00464/FLL Modification of permission 09/00936/FLL Change of house type at former Causeway Cottage; and 15/00562/FLL Erection of a wind turbine, Greenhead of Arnot.

Roads Report

- Lost build-out illumination: two build-outs: There appeared to be no progress.
- Loose manhole cover and setting on the B920 at its exit from Scotlandwell. This situation was deteriorating.
- Absent road markings on significant parts of south Loch Road (B9097) and at the junction of the B9097 with the B920.

Ward Cllrs Barnacle and Giacopazzi would pursue these points with PKC.

The promised cats eyes along the A911 as it traverses Portmoak were eagerly awaited.

Paths Report

Cllr Tom Smith confirmed that: some £350 had been raised to help support maintenance of the Michael Bruce Way (MBW); the frequency of cuts on the Peat Loan section of the MBW had been reduced; and that the new strimmer/bush cutter had been in action on both the MBW and the Dryside Road Path.

Stephen's Field: progress report on the ballot

The CC had been advised that if the community was to support a planning application for the "retained Plot" (and/or its inclusion within the village settlement boundary/envelope) the application would have a good chance of being approved and transfer of ownership of remainder of the Field to the CC, with consequent ability to control what happens on it, would then proceed. The CC had sought, through a ballot of Portmoak residents, to determine how the community would like it to act in this situation. In the ballot it asked the question: "Would you wish the Community Council to actively support the obtaining of planning permission for one house on the "retained Plot" and/or its inclusion for development in the next Local Development Plan with a view to triggering the transfer of ownership of the field to the Community Council sooner rather than later?" Respondents were asked to indicate Yes or No.

While the CC had developed and agreed the content of the questionnaire, they had received assistance from the PKC Planning and Development Team in compiling it, in copying the ballot paper and in putting the survey on-line. PKC also provided an independent analysis of the results.

Ballot papers were hand delivered to everyone in the Portmoak CC area by volunteers from the CC. Extra copies were available in Kinnesswood Shop. The online ballot was also available from the Portmoak CC webpage. The ballot opened on 16 May and closed at 5pm on 8 June 2015.

Residents could vote by completing a paper ballot paper and putting it in a sealed ballot box in Kinnesswood Shop or complete the ballot online.

Results: A table summarising the results was circulated to Ward and Community Councillors and to the public attending the meeting. It will be placed on the Council's website. 134 people voted:

- 99 (74%) voted Yes; and 35 (26%) voted No.
- 48 (36%) voted online and 86 (64%) on paper. (The voting preferences were virtually identical for both groups.)

Discussion: several of the 13 members of the public present expressed the view that the resume on the ballot paper was not accurate and that accordingly the ballot was not valid and was indeed biased. This view was echoed by CCllr Dave Morris. The CC agreed to minute these concerns.

As was intended the CC would now report the outcome of the Ballot and the comments made on it to PKC and to A&J Stephen.

SSE overhead wires at Wellside

CCllr Susan Forde reported that, in response to a request from the community in respect of the safety of both high voltage lines lying to the north and south of the Wellside development, SSE linesmen had recently assessed the lines and reported them safe and in accordance with national guidelines. As there remained concern the matter would be explored with the Health and Safety Executive.

Election of New Community Council

A new Community Council for Portmoak will be appointed by PKC from November. Enquires from interested residents of Portmoak who might wish to become a community councillor are welcomed. Any member of the CC would be pleased to respond with information. Papers relating to nominations will become available from PKC over the summer. Elections are supervised by PKC and will only happen were there to be more than 8 nominees.

Ward Councillor Reports

The following were raised by Cllrs Barnacle and Giacopazzi: **Boundary Commission Consultation**: PKC had responded strongly to the Boundary Commission confirming its support for the retention of the current Kinross Ward. This in effect reflects the historic boundaries of the old County of Kinross-shire. The Boundary Commission's proposals would significantly shrink Kinross-shire.

LDP: A summary of responses to the recent "call for issues and sites" would be placed on the PKC website shortly. It is important to look at the proposed sites and issues that affect Portmoak. These would be taken into account in the preparation of the Main Issues Report, which is to be published for consultation later this year.

Policy LDP RD52: This policy concerns provisions for new gypsy travellers' sites. PKC was reviewing this policy to determine practical and appropriate ways for ensuring that it would be more effective.

Road and path works for years 2015/16 and 2016/17: A number of projects had been identified for Portmoak including: a new foot and cycle path at Wester Balgedie on the loch side of the A911 extending south from the bus stop to the Balgedie junction; traffic calming within Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell; patching and resurfacing of the A911, the B9097 and B919; and repair to the pavement outside the Shop in Kinnesswood.

Cllr Giacopazzi will review the absence of appropriate signage at both ends of the new Easter to Wester Balgedie pathway. Unfortunately many cyclists had not recognised it as a cycle path.

Other Matters

Bench in The Green, Scotlandwell: To note offer from PKC Greenspace to replace/refurbish picnic tables/benchs in The Green Scotlandwell. The CC would write in support of this offer

Footpath along the A911 from Scotlandwell to the Church and Village Hall: A resident raised difficulties encountered by parents with children attempting to walk this path. The CC were very much aware of this problem, have pressed PKC on several occasions both to recognise it and to support a solution. It would write again shortly to PKC.

News from the June Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 2 June 2015 were: CCllrs S Morrison, K Borthwick and Angus Cheape; Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and W Robertson and ten Members of the Public.

Apologies for absence were received from CCllrs Alastair Lavery, Graham Pye and Trudy Duffy.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: PC Nick Rob Buchannan attended the meeting, and gave a report. There were no reported crimes in our area in the last month. There is a new Drink Driving Campaign running over the summer months. (See page 22.)

Kevin encouraged people to join the Perth and Kinross Community Watch Scheme.

Powmill Bloom Group: Several local residents have set up this group with an aim to improving the appearance of Powmill. They have identified several issues, some of which can addressed by the group (tidying up, planters, planting bulbs etc.), whilst others would require outside help (old hotel site, two recent accident areas, the derelict house, and roadside verges.) The group is also concerned about the speed of traffic through the village and will be looking to see if anything can be done to reduce this. They would like to see the 30mph speed limit extended further up the Knockhill road. They also suggested possibly having a gateway feature as you enter the village to give Powmill more of an identity, and also make drivers aware they were now in a village setting and therefore should be driving accordingly. The CC and the local Councillors welcomed the idea, and offered to help in any way they can. The CC has also suggested several funding possibilities to help with the project. If any local resident wishes to get involved, please contact the CC and we will put you in touch with the group.

Crook Moss travellers' site: Noise from generators continues to be a problem. Cllr Barnacle reports that according to enforcement officers the acoustic barriers are now in place, and landscaping has begun. He has also reported the caravan which has appeared in the paddock area to the enforcement officers. Cllr Giacopazzi will check on the proper procedure for enforcement and will report back to the next meeting.

Glenquey Quarry: The DPEA made a site visit on 7 May prior to ruling on the appeal. Around 25 objectors attended. Details of the appeal can be found at www.dpea.scotland. gov.uk under reference PPA-340-2094. Alastair attended the site visit to represent this CC. The Reporter has now written to PKC asking for further written submissions from both parties in relation to the peat/blanket bog and the need for the proposal. Each party has to respond by 18 June; they then have a further 14 days from receipt of the other party's submission to comment further. It is hoped that PKC officers will support the original DMC decision, and send a robust and comprehensive response.

Lambhill chipping plant: The application will possibly be on the agenda of the upcoming PKC Local Review Body, who will be meeting on 30 June, and then on 28 July. PKC still refuses to place a stop order on works at the plant, even though the planning application was refused.

A977 defects and mitigation measures: Cllr Barnacle has continued to lobby PKC roads for a business case study on the A977 to justify further mitigation measures. PKC say there is no requirement for further spending on the road and

that their evidence suggests the road has not got busier since the opening of the new Clackmannan Bridge. However PKC have agreed that the speed warning signs on the road will be replaced with signs displaying actual vehicle speeds, and the villages will have the roadside drains replaced with the type that fit into the kerb in an effort to reduce road noise. Cllr Barnacle will keep trying for further measures, but there seems to be no political will.

Waulkmill play area: Cllr Robertson had asked Stephen Kane (PKC Landscape Architect) for a report into the injury received to a child on the basket swing. Stephen Kane replied that the swing had been installed incorrectly and this has now been addressed. He had also contacted the family of the injured boy and apologised for this unfortunate incident.

CC membership: The CC once again appealed to members of the local community to put themselves forward as Community Councillors. Several of the current council will be retiring in November and we need more people to fill their places. Anyone living in the area, and listed on the electoral register, can apply. If you are interested and would like more information, please contact a CC member or email Fossoway. cc@gmail.com

Gritting and snow clearance: Cllr Robertson updated the meeting on the local Councillors' request for 24/7 gritting to be carried out on the A977. He had a meeting with Stuart D'All (PKC roads), who said it was possible to offer 24/7 cover but it would have to be offset by removing a gritter from the service. This would mean it may take a bit longer to clear the roads. However in times of severe weather other gritters could be pulled in to aid road clearance. The consensus with the CC and the attending public was to agree with the proposal. Station Road adoption: Cllr Barnacle reported that all funding options had been investigated, and that he had prepared a letter to go out to the local residents involved in the adoption scheme outlining the final cost and what each

Burst water main, Aldie Road: Cllr Robertson contacted Scottish Water and reported the leaking pipe at the A977 end of Aldie Road. Scottish Water said an area engineer would investigate the problem and report back. There has been no response to date.

individual would have to pay.

Boundary Commission: At the full council meeting on 13 May the council proposed that the boundary for the Kinrossshire ward should remain unchanged. Local councillors reported that PKC sent a more substantial report against the proposed changes to the Commission. It may be a couple of months before PKC get a response.

Blairingone War Memorial: Work to be carried out in spring. **Crook Moss Community Involvement:** A sub-committee meeting is to be arranged in due course.

Landscape Areas – Kinross-shire: Opportunity to ask for change in the upcoming MIR.

Bollards Opposite Crook Village Hall: Awaiting a report from PKC Roads Department on how the safety of this section of road could be improved.

Footpath Signage in Fossoway Area: The situation is still ongoing.

New Business

PKC Planning: Cllr Robertson had circulated copies of correspondence that showed that the PKC planners were taking input from CCs more seriously. The CC hopes that this will continue.

Road works, Crook of Devon: BT contractors have recently carried out road works in the centre of Crook of Devon, causing considerable inconvenience to residents and impacting local businesses. No notice of this work was given. Kevin raised this issue with both PKC's roads department and BT. PKC informed us that it was the contractor's responsibility to give notice of the works. BT apologised for the inconvenience and said that it would try to improve its processes so that contractors gave notice of works in future. Councillors will ask PKC to see if any procedures could be put in place to keep local communities informed of upcoming works.

Community Council Business

Meetings attended: Sandy and Kevin attended the Planning Workshop meeting held at Loch Leven Community Campus. Sandy attended the Planning Users Forum in Perth.

Willie Robertson: Reported that litter picking on the A91 and A977 had been carried out. A MoP said it had not been done very well, and there was still a lot of litter lying around.

Planning Matters

15/00720/FLL Change of use from agricultural land to form garden ground and public walkway, land west of Station Road, Crook of Devon. No CC Comment.

15/00658/FLL Modification of permission (13/00289/AML), change of house type, land opposite Devonbank, Crook of Devon. A modification of 13/00289/FLL. Since comments were needed by 30 May, this item was discussed by the CC before this meeting, and it was agreed that the CC would object on the grounds that it is contrary to Policy PM1B(c) of the Local Development Plan 2013 in terms of the design and scale of the building and in its scale relative to the plot size. We note the proximity of the building to the south boundary of the plot in particular. The design is contrary to 7.7.2 in its apparent 2-storey structure in a settlement of largely 1 and 1.5 storey buildings.

15/00570/FLL Erection of 4 dwelling houses, land 70m south east of Merryhills, Rumbling Bridge. A modification to 12/00252/IPL. There was considerable discussion regarding this application, but there were no planning policy issues which the CC could object on. The neighbour was advised to contact the developer regarding his concerns in respect of disturbing tree roots along the boundary and to point out that it would be the developer's responsibility if these were disturbed, and the trees subsequently collapsed. Therefore no CC comment.

Correspondence: All the correspondence was available for viewing.

Brenda Lackie has retired as PKC's CC Liaison Officer and her role has been taken over by Christine Grant. The CC would like to thank Brenda for her work over the years, and to wish her a long and healthy retirement.

News from the June Meeting

Crime prevention: There was no Police Officer in attendance and hadn't been for some time.

Cllr Traylor reported on a meeting with Fife Police, and the greater presence in Blairadam to deter quad bikes etc on the foot paths. They have asked for local residents to report sightings either to 101 or by email to gary.chrystal@scotland.pnn.police.uk

Correspondence

- There are to be CC elections on 5 November 2015. All CCllrs will have to complete nomination forms and submit them by 4pm on 24 September 2015. Our CC needs six CCllrs but can accommodate up to eight.
- We received the review of the LDP (MIR) from Cllr Barnacle.
- Brenda Lackie (CC Liaison Officer) has retired. Her position has been filled by Christine Grant and therefore the CC support will not have been affected or changed.
- Cleish School: CCllr Fraser has agreed to speak to the school following a request from the pupil council.
- PKC Greenspace rangers: There is a link on PKC website.
- Cllr Cuthbert discussed the stile at the end of the millennium walk with PKC. This pathway is not a 'core path' and therefore PKC is not responsible for its upkeep. It is instead classified as an assented right of way.

CC website and newsletter: There are between 190-200 daily sessions (unique visitors). The two most popular pages are the weather and planning. There have also been requests for more printed C&B newsletters recently. It was agreed that a meeting of the various volunteers who distribute the newsletter should take place to confirm the actual number of householders in our area that receive it.

Village updates – Blairadam

There is further road deterioration opposite the Blairforge junction, and the white lines have all but vanished.

The speed limit lights are no longer working.

27a is continuing to frustrate local residents - it is still very much a derelict site, and it is reported that the education contribution hasn't been settled.

The speed limit change and resurfacing work is proposed to start in July.

Village updates – Cleish

Judging for the Best Kept Village is on 28 July.

There was a very successful sale and fete in the village.

The gate for access to the millennium walk for grass cutting has been fitted.



Planning

Proposed House at West Main (15/00375/FLL): Refused. House at Dowhill: no objection by the CC.

Cleish Mains: Three objections have been lodged (including the CC).

House at Burnside, Benarty: CC objected to this application. Stables and Arena at Nivingston: It was asked if the CC could object to this design of this application, in particular the site of the new stable block and arena. There are currently stables close to the existing development that the new stables could directly replace. In addition the new arena is excessive in size (normally arenas would be 20m x 40m unless needed for business use) and again could be sited closer to the existing facilities.

Boreland Farm: The steading building was demolished and all of the stone material taken away off site. PKC were notified and a stop notice was placed on the site by the Enforcement Officer. There was very strong opposition to this development by the community at the time of the application. There has been a blatant breach of the legal conditions imposed by PKC for the application. It was reported that despite the stop notice there had been work on the site that morning. There also has been significant development of several plots (one nearly finished) which haven't had Building Warrant granted yet. Four specific conditions in the Section 75 can't physically be met anymore.

Cllr Barnacle confirmed that in 2008 the Reporter refused the developers' appeal to allow them knock down the steading. He also reported that this developer has also breached planning conditions elsewhere in this area. The Enforcement Powers are somewhat limited by the Scottish Government, however. The Planning Officers would normally look at ways to 'normalise' an application, and therefore a new application is expected to be received from the developer. However there has been a clear breach of a number of strong conditions, including those of the Reporter, and Cllr Barnacle feels there should be a strong statement from PKC that this isn't acceptable.

The CC agreed that this cannot be allowed to be 'normalised' by accepting a retrospective or new application. It would bring the whole planning process into disrepute. It was agreed that the CC would write to PKC to strongly express the unanimous views of our community, in particular that this illegal behaviour by a developer is not acceptable, and in no way would we accept any effort to conveniently 'normalise' the site by accepting the resubmitted application by the developer.

There is a windfarm application outwith our area worthy of note - Greenknowes Windfarm at Glendevon has applied for five new turbines. There is a public exhibition on Wednesday at The Tormaukin.

There is an application for a 'chalet development' at Gellybank. Whilst is not within this CCs boundaries, there would be an impact on our local residents. Mr Smith explained the application from the floor - the initial application for ten lodges was reduced to eight to meet the PO4 mitigation as part of farm diversification. There have been nine objections from local residents and there is to be a Kinross CC meeting later in the week which will also discuss that application. The objections have been based on policies ED3 (rural and business diversification) and ED4C. There are several criteria in both policies that are clearly not met by this application. The local C road that passes through our area to the proposed site would be inadequate for the extra traffic.

Cllr Barnacle reported that he had previously attempted to mediate for a solution in the current access road, between the residents and the landowner. He withdrew from that mediation due to a difficulty achieving any positive communication. The road access is still an issue for the current level of use let alone any increase.

Other business: As for access from the landowner to allow us to fix the stile.

Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Homemade Muesli Bars

These absolutely delicious muesli bars were made by the children of Portmoak Primary School for their recent picnic. **Ingredients**

½ cup (125 ml) honey

½ cup caster sugar

125g butter

3 cups rolled oats

1 cup toasted rice cereal

1 cup sultanas

½ cup chopped apricots, dates or choc chips

½ cup desiccated coconut

½ cup pumpkin seed kernels, sunflower or sesame seeds

Method

Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan). Grease and line a tray (31 cm x 22 cm) with baking paper.

Combine honey, sugar and butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Cook, stirring, for 2-3 minutes until butter melts and sugar dissolves. Bring to the boil and cook for 2 minutes or until syrup thickens slightly. Remove from heat.

Combine remaining ingredients in a large bowl. Pour over the hot syrup and stir to combine.

Spoon into prepared pan and press firmly to make sure the mixture will stick together.

Bake in oven for 15-20 minutes or until golden.

Cool and then refrigerate until well chilled and cut into 24 slices (about 2cm x 6cm).

The planning committee of Kinross-shire Civic Trust meets regularly to examine planning applications for Kinross-shire and to comment where appropriate.

The Perth and Kinross Development Plan is currently under review. This is a very important part of the planning process that has implications for everybody in Kinross-shire as it designates areas for development, e.g. large housing site allocations, land for employment use etc.

The knock-on impact of additional housing, for instance, puts greater demand on school and medical facilities to cope with the expansion in population. New development also increases traffic volumes. In this way new development will impact on the whole community beyond the boundaries of sites chosen.

The process allows for everyone to engage and have their say and the next major step is the preparation of a Main Issues Report (MIR). This, in effect, is a draft plan and again at this point the public can engage and make comment or object to proposals. This document is likely to be published in the autumn.

It is important for members of the community to acquaint themselves with the process and have their say in how Kinross-shire should develop.

Kinross-shire Civic Trust will be following the process closely and making submissions at every available stage.



Scottish climate. And challenging it was in June when sixteen intrepid club members set off to paint in the grounds of Dowhill House near Cleish. 

Out & About



Loch Leven NNR

Summer has not really happened yet: nearly July and the weather still looks like May. Some things, like Yellowflag Iris, are up to three weeks behind! This glorious yellow flower is normally abundant around the reserve but very slow coming out this year. Other things, like Tufted Duck, are bang on time. There are lots of nests out on St Serf's, so fingers crossed for a bumper breeding season. We've already seen a good scattering of Mallard and greylag broods, and Mute Swan Cygnets can be seen in all quarters. Plenty of Starling juveniles are about too. We've also seen our first Shoveler ducklings. There are no signs yet of our Lesser Butterfly Orchids but lots of Northern Marsh. There are good colonies along the path edge at Carsehall.

Vagrant birds have been few and far between but oddities have included Lesser Whitethroat, Arctic Terns, a pair of Garganey and a Marsh Harrier. Walking around the loch, you'll probably notice large flocks of geese around. I'm often asked if these are geese that have not gone back north for the summer. They're actually failed or non breeding Greylags. Some have come up from England. These birds drop their flight feathers and graze on safe accessible grass and aquatic plants around the loch. Once they have regained their flight, they head back to where they came from. We've had ringing recoveries from Yorkshire and south of Edinburgh. Alongside the huge moulting flock of Mute Swans (that can number 600) it is quite a wildfowl spectacular.

Discovery Day was a great success. The weather sat on the fence most of the morning while we were preparing often looking like it would pour down with rain but as noon approached the threat eased and by 2pm the sun was out! All the activities were well received. Particularly popular was the fly-casting with SANA and the bird ringing with the Tay Ringing Group. The bird ringing gave everyone a chance to look at birds up close and some lucky children were many hundreds of thousands passing over it. We decided

to replace it because it was rotting in places. We have also hit that time of year when Himalayan Balsam is growing around the reserve. We'll be busy the next few weeks pulling and treating this invasive plant in order to protect the plant communities around the loch shore.

We're rolling out a brand new event this year. Neil and I have been on a

even given the chance to assist releasing the birds back into the wild. A big thanks to all who attended and everyone who assisted on the day. An estimated 500 people came. Hopefully we'll be doing the same next year. There are lots of pictures on the Loch Leven Blog.

There has been a sterling effort from our volunteers again this month. You may well have noticed that we have rebuilt the boardwalk at Burleigh. It has survived floods and storms and cycle leadership course. We're joining Sustrans in a 'Really Wild Cycle.' This is family orientated event. We have two of these cycle rides, taking place on the Friday 10 July and Tuesday 28 July from 10am until 4pm. Please book your place by phoning the office on 01577 864439.

My potatoes are just poking through now at last. I'm just off to water them. I might manage a crop by November!

Hiya, folks! Another month down the line and summer has shown us a pickle glimpses but no the full-blown thing as yet. Will it happen? Who can tell?

Breeding season is going past now, although the swallows in the toilet tunnel still have chicks in the nest. I guess by the time you read this they will be fledged and sitting around on the wires, screaming for food. Some of the ducks on the loch are now going into moult or eclipse plumage, so will look a bit tatty for the next wee while as they replace old worn feathers for new ones before the autumn comes along. A pair of rarer ducks, Garganey, have been showing frequently on the flood, although the male is now also going into eclipse.

Some of the summer migrants are still singing away in the reserve woodland. A crazy song thrush is also serenading us almost daily from one of the larch trees at the back of the centre; the poor sowel sharely hisnae fund a girlfriend yet. Usually, once they do, they belt up a bit. I sure wish it would hurry up and fund a wummin!

The shop has a few offers on, with Easy Clean Seed Feeders 2, 4and 6 port varieties with 25% off and Buggy Nibbles reduced by the same amount until 14 July. Other new products are expected in during July as well and, yes, the Christmas cards and diaries will be comin in as weel!



inside for longer that hoped.

Well, I was certainly wishing that I hadn't mentioned the weather being so nice in my last



With the exception of cold and the resulting lack of growth, it has been a reasonable spring here at Backward Farm. Lambing went as smoothly as could be expected and the lambs are growing well, considering the low temperature. I think what will have helped is the fact that other than for a few days at a time it hasn't been too wet, so the lambs have been dry most of the time. It is when the weather is cold, wet and windy that wind chill can really take its toll, causing hypothermia in very young lambs but also slowing down growth in bigger lambs and reducing ewes' milk supply as they use up more energy just keeping warm.

The cows are calving away slowly but steadily and there are just a few left to calve. They are mostly outside now and have been enjoying the warm, sunny weather of the past few days, and are no doubt hoping it will continue, as am I.

We have baled our first field of silage, probably about ten days later than I might have expected due to the cold, but it ended up quite a good crop and it gave a cautious start to the season to our Jurassic baler and wrapper. It was a bit of a scrapheap challenge to prepare it for the season's work once again as I started to dismantle various parts to be refurbished or replaced back in February. It was all reassembled about a week before it was needed, so it was just as well grass growth was slow. It seemed to do its job and everything worked as it should, so I must have put everything back on the right way round and in the right place – relief! We replaced our really old baler at the end of last season with a newer model (just as my wife Helen has often threatened to do with me) and its work is about to start, so hopefully it will behave itself. I am unfamiliar with its workings but no doubt I will learn about it as things go wrong (as they always do with round balers) and it is in principle just the same as the old one but with a number of 'improvements'. Time will tell.

Special Days Open in July under SGS

The nearest garden open under SGS in July is **Hollytree Lodge** at Muckhart, Dollar, FK14 7JW. It's a mature garden with unusual trees and shrubs; also herbaceous borders, a small Japanese garden, a wildlife pond, wildflower meadow and cordoned apples and pears. The garden is open on **Sunday 12 July**, 11am-5pm. Full disabled access, dogs on leads welcome, cream teas available, plant sales. Admission is £4 (Coronation Hall, Muckart receives 20% and The Prince's Trust Scotland 20%). Hollytree Lodge is off the A91 down the small lane directly opposite the Inn at Muckhart entrance. Parking available for disabled only, otherwise please park in the village. Hollytree Lodge is also open by arrangement up until 30 October.

Entry fees to Falkland Palace and Garden near Cupar will benefit SGS charities at a special open day on Sunday 26 July, 1pm-5pm. The palace is a superb example of Renaissance architecture and garden enthusiasts will appreciate the work of Percy Cane, who designed the gardens between 1947 and 1952. The open day will be dedicated to the herbs grown in the physic garden, inspired by Mary Queen of Scots and planted with 16th century herbs. Admission: £12.50, concessions £9, family £29.50, NTS members free. Partial disabled access.

The gardens at **Gean House**, Tullibody Road, **Alloa**, are open on **Tuesday 28 July**, 2pm-5pm. The gardens extend to seven acres. Cream teas are available in Gean House, which is an early 20th century Arts & Crafts style mansion. Admission is £4, children free. Scottish Society for Autism receives 40% of entry fees. No disabled access. FK10 2EL.






