High Street Roadworks

Councillor Giacopazzi [July Newsletter] claims my June letter was a political attack on him. Untrue; unlike him I am not a member of any political party. He claims I was "opposed to the principle of improvement". Also untrue. I support the principle of High Street improvement but the method of implementation and timing of the works required a rethink.

My letter included criticism of his failure to listen to the body of local businesses who had objected to the roadworks. My letter did point out his key role in endorsing the roadworks and his particularly aggressive interrogation of myself and the others who had taken the time and trouble to attend the PKC Committee meeting in Perth in January.

Councillor Giacopazzi addressed none of the points in my letter. What would the impact of the roadworks and **three-month** High Street closure be on the access to Loch Leven? How would the 250,000 anticipated tourist visitors negotiate a route to visit the lochside attractions and facilities? What would be the damage to local businesses?

The fall-out has now arrived with crisis talks being held with local businesses reporting a massive downturn in trade as a result of the works, with some claiming the escalating roadwork schedule and street closures could destroy their business completely.

Up to a 50% reduction in trade or more has been reported by most. The Historic Scotland pier operation has been affected as has the new Boathouse Restaurant. Both these operations report that their numbers of visitors has halved. Future investment and jobs are at risk. They further advise that despite being key local attractions, astonishingly they had never been consulted about the detail of the works or advised of the extent of the road closures by Perth and Kinross Council representatives tasked with implementing the roads scheme.

Councillor Giacopazzi has vociferously supported and sanctioned the works. Some accountability, apology and answers from him seems to me to be appropriate, surely.

If the upheaval of the works could result in a safe and genuine improvement it would be welcomed, but questions remain.

How are the elderly, sight disabled and young children expected to cope when the "shared surface" i.e. no kerbs at all in an area that pedestrians and traffic will share outside the Town Hall?

How can the removal of established safety features in place to protect pedestrians i.e. kerbs, crossings, railings (at Station Road/High Street junction) be safe and to the advantage of pedestrians?

How can the PKC planners and roads "experts" be seen as credible when the justification for the works is based on flawed statistical data and assumptions of the need and value of the project (as set out in my June letter)?

Why was the project not delayed or phased to avoid the peak tourist months of July/August?

How was the £1.5 million funding at risk if the project was delayed?

Kinross Developments

I write in response to the letter from Alan Thomson in last month's edition of the Newsletter.

First of all I have to agree with Mr Thomson that things are moving the right way in Kinross and that we need to keep the pressure up on the remaining vacant properties and indeed the regeneration work that is taking place at the moment.

I thought that it might be useful to give an update on these and to fill in some of the gaps in the information publically available.

Taking these in the order they were raised by Mr Thomson: Firstly, the former High School site. My understanding is that the preferred bidder for this site remains Persimmon Homes and that they are working up three planning applications simultaneously, being for the former High School site, a site to the north of Lathro and a site in Milnathort. The latest information I have is that these applications have been stalled by the Milnathort site: SEPA has declared that it floods, although SEPA did not comment on the site prior to the development of the Local Plan. I understand that the end date on the missives for the High School site is the end of March, by which time there should either be planning consent or an appeal lodged with the Scottish Government. I have reminded officers of this and have asked that the High School site be moved on as quickly as possible, as it remains an eyesore and is attracting vandals.

Secondly, the public toilet building opposite the Green. My understanding of this is that when the toilet was taken out of use, it was handed back to the former owners, who also own the Green Hotel, so is no longer in the Council's ownership. Finally, the Health Centre. My understanding is that an application was withdrawn in March this year as Mr Thomson said. However, I believe that a new one was submitted in the same month. Having contacted the officers concerned, I have been told that a decision on this is pending a section 75 legal agreement between the developer and the Council over payment of developer conditions. Once this is signed, the officers will be issuing consent, so hopefully we should see this area tidied up in the near future.

What are Community Councils?

Community Councils are voluntary organisations that have a role in law to represent the views of the local community to Perth & Kinross Council and other public bodies.

If there's a hot topic which gets your neighbours talking - a proposed housing development, maintenance of local footpaths or improving local facilities - then this is something the Community Council could get involved in.

2015 Elections

Elections for Community Councils are held every four years. The next elections in Perth and Kinross will take place on 5 November 2015, so this is a great time to get involved!

Getting involved

Community Councils need people from a range of backgrounds to get involved. While many Community Council members bring their experience from work, education and other volunteering to support the organisation, elected Community Councillors will also get the opportunity to receive training and support in managing meetings and the legal processes around areas such as commenting on planning applications.

Who can join a Community Council?

To stand for your local Community Council you need to be:

- aged 16 or over;
- living in the area the Community Council covers;
- be named on the electoral register.

Standing for your local Community Council

If you care about the area you live in and want to get involved in making a difference, then get involved by standing for your local Community Council. You will need to submit a nomination form by 4pm on 24 September 2015.

You will also need to get a proposer and seconder to support your application and ask them to sign the nomination form. These should also be people who live in the Community Council area and who are named on the electoral register.

Voting

If there are more people nominated to your local Community Council than there are vacancies, then nominees will go forward to a local vote. Voting will take place by postal vote. All residents aged 16 and over who are named on the electoral register and who live in that Community Council area will be entitled to vote.

Bus services during Kinross High Street closure

Due to the environmental improvement works, Kinross High Street has been closed to vehicular traffic since 8 July. The closure is in phases but will continue until 21 September. During this time, the following local bus services are unable to serve Kinross High Street and will operate to the following diversions:

Stagecoach Fife Services 56/56A/56B

North and Southbound journeys will divert between High Street/Clashburn Road and Station Road via Junction Road. During the closure, passengers from the vicinity of the closure can board and alight their bus at the bus stops located on Station Road or The Muirs, Kinross.

Stagecoach Fife Service 201

Journeys will divert between Montgomery Street and Sainsbury's car park via Junction Road. Unfortunately, Service 201 will be unable to serve Station Road, Ochil View, Green Road and Emslie Road during the road closure. This is due to the fact that the bus will require more time to operate the diversion from Montgomery Street. Passengers from

these streets should board and alight their bus at Sainsbury's car park bus stop. Passengers wishing to access the High Street will be able to board and alight their bus at a temporary bus stop, which will be situated at Montgomery Street road end for access to the High Street via School Wynd.

Hamish Gordon Coaches Service 622 (School Day Only Service)

North and Southbound journeys will divert from Station Road to Clashburn Road via Junction Road. During the closure, passengers can board and alight their bus at the bus stops located on Station Road or The Muirs, Kinross.

Councillor Robertson Boundary Commission Proposals

As many of you will know, the Boundary Commission is wanting to remove a large part of North Kinross-shire and the parish of Arngask from the current Kinross-shire Ward and place them in Perth & Kinross Council



Ward 9. This ward serves communities such as Methven, Madderty, Abernethy and Bridge of Earn, which in my opinion have very little in common with Glenfarg, Middleton, Tillyrie, Cuthill Towers, Drunzie or Duncrievie. All these communities look to Kinross for most of their services, higher education, library, primary health provision and museum, not to mention the numerous sporting, cultural and social activities.

Following representations from the four local Perth & Kinross Council members and the Council themselves, the Boundary Commission has changed its mind slightly on its original plans and have added back land in Fossoway parish north of the A91 into the proposed new Kinross-shire Ward but this is not going nearly far enough. I want to see the existing Kinross-shire Ward retained plus the whole of Arngask parish. Currently the small part of Arngask east of the M90 is included in Ward 8 and people living here have to travel all the way to Bridge of Earn to vote even though they live within a mile of the Glenfarg polling station.

The Boundary Commission also seeks to reduce the representation of Kinross-shire councillors on Perth & Kinross Council from four to three. This would have an adverse effect on the amount of influence the Kinross-shire Ward councillors can have. Currently Kinross-shire Ward councillors hold seats in nearly all the main committees and in some committees, such as the important Development Management Committee, hold a total of three positions.

I have always fought hard to preserve the identity of our historic and unique county and was instrumental in having the Kinross-shire boundary signs erected at the county borders. I will be campaigning as hard as I can to keep the Kinross-shire county as a unit and hope that all who share my thoughts will make their views known to the Boundary Commission. The consultation period has now begun and will end on Thursday 22 October.

Helpful Advice?

The unauthorised demolition of a fine sandstone steading at Cleish recently caused a great deal of dismay. Both Cleish & Blairadam CC and many local residents were outraged by what had happened and quite rightly asked us, their ward councillors, to make their views known to the planning authority in Perth and asked for action to be taken. This the ward councillors duly did and made the views of the community, which were shared by the ward councillors, clear to the Council's Head of Development Management. This was done both through emails and face-to-face meetings.

Thankfully the developer concerned subsequently applied for planning consent to rebuild the sandstone steading. However, the Council's Head of Legal Services advised my three fellow councillors who are members of the Development Management Committee that, because of the correspondence that had been sent by us at the time of the unauthorised demolition of the steading, it could be construed that they could not view the planning application to rebuild the steading impartially and that they should consider whether they should sit on the committee when the application was being debated. They were told by sitting on the committee they could be contravening the Councillors' Code of Conduct. Only Cllr Barnacle ignored this advice and took his place on the Development Management Committee.

You elect us as councillors to represent your views and we should be able to do this without undue influence or advice from well meaning Council officers. I am concerned about anything which interferes with our ability to represent you and I personally see this advice from the Council's Head of Legal Services as such an interference. The Councillors' Code of Conduct should not be used to stop councillors doing what they have been elected to do.

Kinross Town Centre Improvements

Hopefully the end is in sight for the works in Kinross High Street. It has been a very difficult time for all the traders and local residents. Many businesses have seen big drops in turnover and local streets have been clogged by diverted traffic.

A leaflet has been distributed recently advising how to access the businesses on the High Street and at The Pier, which I hope has helped. However I would ask everyone to make a special effort to use our local businesses and support them through what has been a difficult time.

When the works are complete towards the end of September Kinross town centre will be a much better environment to shop and do business in.

Councillor Giacopazzi Milnathort Scottish Water Flood Alleviation

While Kinross continues to be in a state of upheaval with the town centre improvements progressing on schedule, Milnathort is in



a period of calm before the storm. Well, mostly. Half the Donkey Field between the Golf Course and New Road has been converted to a depot for the engineers, Amey, Black & Veatch. The other half continues to be inhabited and grazed by Rory the donkey, now in his thirty-fourth year! When the outfall to the burn is complete, the huge pipe connecting the main New Road sewer to it will be laid. The new system will allow flood water to reach the burn quickly.

A second outfall is being constructed to the rear of the new barber's shop on New Road. The purpose of this project, which is costing in excess of £1.6 million, is twofold. Firstly, sewage will no longer back up into houses near the Cross. Secondly, in the event of a flash flood, the overflows will be able to cope, thus safeguarding the numerous houses in the centre which previously were being flooded.

From what I have seen, the engineers on the project are working long and consistent hours and have shown themselves to be most courteous in their dealings with local residents. I trust that when the project progresses to South Street and New Road in September, they shall be treated with understanding by our community.

When asked, I expressed my opinion that, if possible, work should proceed on a seven day basis in order to minimise the timescale of the disruption. I asked the opinion of the other Ward 8 Councillors and they are in agreement, as is Milnathort CC. A couple of weeks ago I asked for a meeting with the Director of the Environment Service, Jim Valentine and his Head of Roads in order to discuss options for keeping traffic disruption to a minimum in Milnathort once the work starts. I impressed on those attending, the importance of minimising the use of temporary traffic lights at the Cross, if at all possible.

Kinross Town Centre Improvements

I have now attended three meetings at the Boathouse Restaurant with a cross section of the Kinross business community. There is little to be joyful about. Business continues to be badly down, primarily because of the High Street closure despite the alterations which we asked the Council's officers to make to the diversion signage. The Council has also issued publicity material to the effect that the High Street is still there and trading.

While the record breaking miserable Summer weather has caused a significant drop in business throughout Perth and Kinross, the loss of 'T in the Park' had impacted heavily on our hospitality and retail sector locally.

At the request of the businesses affected, I approached officials of PKC and Edinburgh City Council to ask what compensation might be available, only to learn that there is no mechanism for compensating business where losses are incurred through utility works. (I had contacted Edinburgh Council to find out how it dealt with losses to business arising from the tram fiasco).

There may be some limited scope for relief from business rates. This continues to be explored.

Cleish - Boreland Steading

On a Saturday afternoon in May, a steading close to Cleish, which had planning consent for conversion to three dwellings, vanished. The developer demolished it without permission and took away the stone. In so doing he automatically lost the existing planning permission for the three new houses he had already built! He has, therefore, applied to rebuild the steading exactly as it stood prior to the demolition.

At the meeting of the Development Management Committee on 12 August, I addressed the councillors, asking them to ensure that the robust conditions attaching to the new planning consent be obeyed to the letter. Specifically, I asked that conditions relating to the use of natural stone, lime mortar, clay pan tiles and wooden windows and doors, should be strictly observed. Permission was given, subject to the implementation of these strict conditions.

The Boundaries Commission Recommendations

The Commission, which is tasked with reviewing electoral boundaries to ensure an appropriate level of representation, has proposed that Ward 8, our Ward, be reduced to three councillors from four. This goes against the opinion of PKC and of the Ward 8 councillors.

For practical purposes, those parts of historic Kinross-shire north of the M90 will become part of Almond and Earn, Ward 9; so residents of, say, Netherton, Middleton, Newhill or Path of Condie, will have to go to Bridge of Earn to vote at election time for Council. Glenfarg would also become part of Ward 9. What a number of people may find upsetting, is that the historic boundaries of Kinross-shire will be ignored for the first time in centuries. The public can have a say between now and 22 October. I know Cllr Cuthbert is writing a more comprehensive report on this subject in this edition of the Newsletter. (See also comments by Cllrs Robertson and Barnacle and article by Cllr Cuthbert on this subject.)

Review of the Local Development Plan

According to Planning Law, councils must keep their development plan under review; so the Council has begun the process of revision of the 2014 plan. Landowners bring forward sites which they would like to include in the plan as part of the 'effective land supply', as it is called. To cut a long story short, with only an average of 70 homes a year being built in Kinross-shire, there seems to be a good current supply of building land.

Members of the public will have the opportunity to comment on the evolving plan later in the process.

Kinross regeneration works

Work on the regeneration of Kinross High Street is progressing as I write and should be completed by the end of September, barring unexpected hold ups.



The process has been long and painful for many Kinross residents and businesses. For this, I apologise on behalf of the Council.

I have to say that I have always been in favour of improving Kinross town centre and have supported this initiative. However I think there are lessons to be learned from the current works and the processes followed in delivering them. Needless to say, I will be passing my thoughts on these back to officers.

The aim of the work was to make the centre of Kinross a more attractive place to visit and to encourage people to use the businesses who operate there.

With this in mind the Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation is planning to hold its Annual Winter Festival Street Market in the town centre on Saturday 28 November. We are also hoping to hold Farmers' Markets on the following dates in 2016: 30 January, 30 April, 30 July, 29 October and 26 November. More information on these will follow.

Before any of those events take place, however, High Street traders, with the assistance of KLEO, are organising a street party to celebrate the end of the roadworks and to encourage everyone into the town centre. The current plan is to hold this on Saturday 3 October. See elsewhere in this Newsletter for details (page 29).

I think it is now time to start thinking about what comes next and what Kinross needs to make it a better place to live. I would welcome your comments on this.

Milnathort sewer works

As if we haven't suffered enough with road works and road closures, what with the regeneration works in Kinross, plus the Gas and BT Broadband works in many of the side streets, it appears that it is now Milnathort's turn to be brought to a halt with road works being done by Scottish Water.

Councillor Giacopazzi is writing a piece on this (p. 8), so I won't comment apart from saying that all your local councillors are keen to see the diversion signage working from the start. See also Scottish Water article, right.

Planning enforcement

I mentioned my frustration at the law surrounding planning enforcement in last month's article. I continue to come across anomalies in this area and it strikes me that the law needs to be changed in a number of ways. I will be passing my thoughts on these to the local MSPs and hopefully get something done about them.

Milnathort waste water works September update

Scottish Water has started work on a project to reduce the risk of sewer flooding in parts of Milnathort. Phase one involves the construction of two new storm water overflow pipes to the Fochy Burn and is currently underway.

Phase two will start soon. The first of the road closures is due to be put in place to progress work in South Street.

Andy Ducat, Project Manager, Scottish Water, said: "During phase two of the works South Street will be closed to traffic near the Cross Roundabout from 7 September for three weeks. "Pedestrian access to South Street will not be affected and all local businesses will remain open as usual while we are working.

"Diversions will be in place during this work so drivers are advised to allow extra time for journeys. We will be sending out information via postcards regarding the road closures. Local residents should refer to this postcard for details of the diversion route.

"We apologise for any inconvenience this essential work may cause.

"We will continue to provide information as work progresses and will issue further information before the road closure in New Road (Phase 3) and section of work at the Cross Roundabout (Phase 4)."

An information event was held on 28 July and over 50 local people attended. The scheme was welcomed at the event. Key project staff were on hand to answer questions from residents and businesses.

Boundaries Commission

Readers should note my representation to PKC on 11 May 2015 reproduced here from the June edition of the Newsletter:

It is my understanding that the Commission's

proposals include the outrageous option of dividing the current Kinross-shire Ward and reducing its number of Councillors from 4 to 3. This appears to be proposed in the interest of voter parity on ward numbers and a projected reduction in voter numbers, rather than any interest in maintaining local identities.

As you should be aware, Kinross-shire has been a county since 1685 and merged with Perthshire in government reorganisation during the 1970s. The current Ward reflects the shire's historic boundaries with the addition of Glenfarg, whose services and school catchment lie in Kinross-shire. There is a strong sense of local identity that will be broken by this proposal.

I understand that the other boundary changes proposed are minimal for PKC with the exception of the Kinross-shire Ward. I also fail to understand the voter projections given the level of proposed and ongoing development taking place resulting from our Local Development Plan and Tayplan.

I would argue that there is a strong case for maintaining PKC numbers at 41 (good to have an odd number in the unlikely event of a close political vote), retaining the current Kinross-shire Ward boundary and 4 Councillors. I sincerely hope you will adopt this position in your response to the proposals and support my local Ward member colleagues who I understand share my concerns about this proposed change. I will be interested to learn of the period for public consultation thereon, being certain of a strong community objection from Kinross-shire folk to this latest attempt to ignore their historic boundaries and identity.

At Full Council on 13 May 2015 it was unanimously decided to support all the Kinross-shire members in opposing the Commission's proposals and write to maintain PKC's position that there should be no reduction in councillors and Kinross-shire's Ward boundary to the north, along the ridge of the Ochil Hills, should be preserved, along with the incorporation of the parish of Arngask.

The faceless bureaucrats that run Britain, of which the Commission are clearly a part, have effectively ignored PKC's representatives in their latest proposal, subject to a public consultation that runs until 22 October 2015 (see display at Loch Leven Community Campus library).

It is still proposed to reduce our councillors from four to three and the northern boundary of the ward has been moved slightly north of the A91 to reflect the Milnathort Polling District.

This is a blatant, but not unsurprising, disregard of the elected view of PKC and I call upon the people of Kinross-shire to oppose the Commission's proposals vigorously and support your elected members.

When one considers Kinross-shire was a county in its own right until the 1970s, why should there be a reduction in our representation up at Perth when our population has not only grown since then but is forecast to grow significantly in the future?

My colleague, Councillor Cuthbert, is working on a detailed analysis of the flawed methodology the Commission have employed in reaching this extraordinary and illogical boundary proposal. A summary of this and suggested arguments to counter what's proposed will be made available to assist folk who feel strongly about Kinross-shire's historic boundaries and identity in writing their objections to the Commission.

I very much hope that our voice will be heard and that the Commission reconsider their rejection of the Council's position. I suspect, if not, that this could lead to Scotland's 'Rutland' moment. The smallest county in England, which has a landscape dominated by the large expanse of Rutland Water, had been incorporated with Leicestershire, but effectively won its county back after a hard fought campaign. Kinross-shire's landscape, dominated by Loch Leven, has a "claim of right" that may be heard again.

Food for thought and action, folks.

In 2010, another unaccountable body in the form of the Royal Mail unveiled plans to delete county names from its database by 2016, inspiring representations that "We are not a postcode" and a specially written poem by our laureate Carol Ann Duffy, The Counties:

The Counties

But I want to write to an Essex girl,

greeting her warmly.

But I want to write to a Shropshire lad,

brave boy, home from the army,

and I want to write to the Lincolnshire Poacher

to hear of his hare

and to an aunt in Bedfordshire

who makes a wooden hill of her stair.

But I want to post a rose to a Lancashire lass,

red, I'll pick it,

and I want to write to a Middlesex mate

for tickets for cricket.

But I want to write to the Ayrshire cheesemaker

and his good cow

and it is my duty to write to the Queen at Berkshire in praise of Slough.

But I want to write to the National Poet of Wales at Ceredigion

in celebration

and I want to write to the Dorset Giant

in admiration

and I want to write to a widow in Rutland

in commiseration

and to the Inland Revenue in Yorkshire

in desperation.

But I want to write to my uncle in Clackmannanshire

in his kilt

and to my scrumptious cousin in Somerset

with her cidery lilt.

But I want to write to two ladies in Denbighshire,

near Llangollen

and I want to write to a laddie in Lanarkshire,

Dear Lachlan ...

But I want to write to the Cheshire Cat,

returning its smile.

But I want to write the names of the Counties down

for my own child

and may they never be lost to her ...

all the birds of Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire...

Crook Moss Gypsy Traveller Site

I sent the following communication to Nick Brian, PKC's Development Quality Manager, on 11 August 2015:

"During the course of the last week a significant amount of new fencing has been erected around the so-called 'paddock area' of the above site and I asked David Rennie to examine same in Eddie's absence. [David Rennie and Eddie Jordan, PKC Enforcement Officers.]

"I understand that this part of the site has changed ownership and fully expect a 'retrospective' application for pitches to be made once established, as is current practice in PKC area by gypsy travellers, with Council support.

"You may recall, at the time of the original application, that I expressed fears of site expansion into this hard-cored area, which I suggest were well founded.

"I would like the Council to put a 'stop' notice on current developments, otherwise we will probably end up in the same situation as we are in with the current application.

"I understand a report is to be brought to the September committee of DMC on the current breaches of conditions following that of 18/3/15. It is also my understanding that CAR licences have been refused by SEPA and currently no drainage/sewerage arrangements exist on this site within the Lochleven catchment where the applicants have been since March 2012. I also understand that conditions relating to noise have not been met.

"Can I please have an update on the meeting of conditions (last revised 5/5/15) in advance of September's committee (especially since I may be away then) and in light of current developments.

"It remains in my view that this site is not appropriate for development in planning terms (a view shared by PKC's landscape consultant during the preparation of our LDP but omitted from planning reports relating to this site).

"I am in the process of writing to the most senior officials at PKC, SEPA, SNH and MSPs concerning the current expansion of gypsy traveller sites retrospectively within the Lochleven catchment and shall be alleging a failure of the statutory duty to protect the loch."

A response from Brian Stanford, PKC Planning's Team Leader (Householder Applications, Enforcement & Technical Support) on 12 August 2015 informed me that, ".... Eddie Jordan has yesterday served a Temporary Stop Notice requiring any further development at the 'paddock' site to cease and also a Notice under s.272 to obtain the information necessary to serve a competent Enforcement Notice to remove the unauthorised development."

I was also promised a more detailed briefing note.

Boundaries Commission proposal:

County of Kinross-shire to be dismantled

Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland

The Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland (LGBCS) are carrying out a review of local ward boundaries throughout Scotland.

These ward boundaries define administrative areas and the number of Councillors who will be elected in them.

The current proposal is to take a large chunk out of Kinross-shire, placing it in Ward 9, which is entitled Almond and Earn, and to reduce the number of Councillors representing Kinross-shire from four down to three.

You might ask if this matters.

I think it does and it should be vigorously resisted by Kinrossshire folk.

History of the review

The LGBCS started their review by calculating a suggested number of Councillors in each Local Authority Area.

This was done using a new formula driven by the Scottish Government, with more Councillors being allocated to areas with high proportions of zones of multiple deprivation on the basis that this would allow Councillors to focus on reversing the disadvantages of these areas.

Which, on the face of it, sounds like a sound policy.

However, the methods used in identifying zones of multiple deprivation favour urban areas and significantly underplay rural deprivation. So over 90% of zones of multiple deprivation are in large urban areas.

The result of this, plus the fact that the LGBCS used projected data for population levels rather than actuals, ensured that the proposal would reduce Perth and Kinross from 41 Councillors to 40.

Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) have been resisting this proposal from the beginning.

In May the LGBCS came up with more detailed proposals, which included reducing Kinross-shire in size and reducing the number of Councillors from four to three. Cllr Barnacle and I put a motion forward to request a strong rebuttal of this suggestion and with Cllr Giacopazzi's assistance we got this adopted as the Council's unanimous position.

Unfortunately the LGBCS ignored this and have come back with a slightly smaller reduction in the size of Kinross-shire and maintained their position of reducing the number of Councillors in Kinross-shire from four to three.

This proposal is now being consulted on with the public and I would urge you to make representation to them to ask that they keep Kinross-shire intact and the number of Councillors at four.

The proposals can be viewed at the library at Loch Leven Community Campus, although you may have to ask where they have been put. Or you can view them on the web at http://www.lgbc-scotland.gov.uk/reviews/5th_electoral/perth_and_kinross/

I have been doing a great deal of research into how the LGBCS do their calculations and what might be competent objections. The conclusion I have reached is that the LGBCS have focussed on what they call 'voter parity' above all the other

criteria they are supposed to look at when defining new boundaries.

Voter Parity can be defined as the number of voters to each Councillor in an area.

The LGBCS is required to look at five criteria when determining boundaries. These are:

- 1. Effective and Convenient Local Government
- 2. Voter Parity
- 3. Local ties which would be broken by making a particular boundary
- 4. The desirability of fixing boundaries that are easily identifiable
- Special geographical considerations that may need different treatment

Looking at these individually, I would comment as follows:

1. Effective and Convenient Local Government

The Local Authority administration in Kinross-shire runs from the hub at the Loch Leven Community Campus. This delivers all the Council services for Kinross-shire and is a discrete administrative unit.

All the Primary Schools in the Kinross-shire Ward feed into Kinross High School, including Arngask Primary School in Glenfarg.

Milnathort Community Council area will be split into two wards, with up to six Councillors attending their meetings.

Ward 9 Councillors (Almond and Earn) will have to cover nine Community Councils.

Communities on either side of the new ward boundary will be in different wards, including Tillywhally, Meikle Seggie, and Craigow.

2. Voter Parity

This appears to be the only criterion to have been given any weight by the LGBCS.

The ward boundary appears to have been selected in order to achieve a 10% variance in the number of voters per councillor from the PKC average. This is the maximum the LGBCS aim to achieve.

The projected increase in voters in Kinross-shire is half what it should be as the LGBCS do not include Windfall Sites in their calculations. These are applications for new houses outwith identified development opportunities in the Local Plan. Half of the new houses built in Kinross-shire are windfall sites, so the projections of new voters is half of what it should be.

Projections do not take into account the variance in voters per household. Kinross-shire has the highest proportion in Perth and Kinross at 1.83 voters per household, compared to 1.63 on average and only 1.39 in the Highland Ward. This means that new houses built in Kinross-shire have more voters in them than the average.

3. Local ties that would be broken by making a particular boundary

This is perhaps the key point about these proposals from the LGBCS

Kinross-shire will be split apart by the proposed new boundaries.

It is an ancient County, with a real sense of local identity.

I would liken these proposals to the acts of the imperial powers in dividing up continental Africa with straight lines of convenience rather than reflecting the communities on the ground.

In addition, communities on the south side of the Ochils take services from Kinross and Milnathort, including administrative, financial and community based. The proposals will confuse this working system.

4. The desirability of fixing boundaries that are easily identifiable

The proposed Ward boundary might be described as: "The M90 north of the northbound slip road at Milnathort and the zc413 from its junction with zc499 then northward along the zu214 to its junction with the former County Boundary of Kinross-shire, just south of Stronachie."

These roads are unmarked and therefore not easily identifiable, with residents on either side of the road being in different wards.

This is not an easily identifiable boundary.

The current Ward Boundary runs along the ridge of the Ochils, which is more easily identifiable and does not divide communities.

5. Special geographical considerations that may need different treatment

The existing Kinross-shire Ward is in a bowl of hills delimited by the Ochils, the Lomond Hills, Benarty and the Cleish Hills. It is, in effect, a single geographic area.

Kinross-shire is orientated towards the Central Belt, unlike many other areas of Perth and Kinross.

It is unlike any other part of Perth and Kinross and should be treated differently.





Jack Moffat, retired art teacher

A retired Principal Teacher of Art who designed the 'Learning the Key' shield used by Kinross Primary and High Schools has died aged 89. Jack Moffat taught in Kinross for 38 years until his retirement in 1989.

Annual Flu Campaign

Last year, we held the first of our annual flu clinics on the first Monday in October. We will be doing the same this year, and the clinic will be on **Monday 5 October**. Dates for the Saturday flu clinics will be announced in next month's Newsletter.

Appointments may now be booked with reception. Please do not wait for a letter to be sent to you inviting you to make an appointment. If you are eligible you may make your appointment now.

We would encourage all those in the groups listed below to come for a flu injection:

Please note that patients who do not fall into these categories or who have no other clinical reason for receiving the flu vaccination will not be given the vaccination.

Clinicians will visit the residential and nursing homes as usual to administer the vaccination.

Children's Nasal Flu

We will again be offering the nasal flu vaccination to all pre-school children aged 2-5. Dates for these clinics will be announced in the next edition of the Newsletter.

Shingles

The shingles vaccine is available to those patients in the following age groups:

- 70 year olds (born between 2 September 1944 and 1 September 1945 inclusive)
- 78 year olds (born between 2 September 1936 and 1 September 1937 inclusive)

This vaccine can be administered at the same time as the flu vaccination. There is a special clinic on **Monday 5 October** for this. Please telephone Reception now to make your appointment.



"Many important local events, such as the Kinross-shire Agricultural Society's Show and various flower shows in the district were cancelled owing to the War, but it is gratifying to know that as a rule business in rural districts has been favourably affected by the War, especially so is it the case with our local mills. In a county so essentially agricultural as Kinross-shire the view is encouraging. Agriculturalists are doing very well just now. It has been a splendid year for crops. Prices continue good from the stand point of the producer, and agriculture is one of the industries which is not, as a rule, adversely affected by the War."

"Drunk while in charge of a horse – At a JP Court held on Wednesday forenoon, David Michie, farmer, Scotlandwell, pled guilty to a charge of being drunk while in charge of a horse, in Kinnesswood on Monday, December 21st. A fine of 10s. 6d. (52.5p) was imposed with the alternative of 7 days' imprisonment."

Recent crime locally

War memorial plaques case in court

A Kinross man has been found guilty of stealing bronze plaques from Milnathort War Memorial. The crime happened in July 2013, just after the memorial had been refurbished by Milnathort in Bloom at a cost of £2,500.

Joseph Miller of High Street, Kinross, denied being responsible but was found guilty at Perth Sheriff Court in early August. Miller and his friend Wayne Slaven, of Sandport, Kinross, took three plaques, weighing around 60kg, to a scrap metal merchant in Fife, hoping to sell them for cash. The merchant, Mark Stewart, confiscated the plaques and called the police. Graeme Stewart, who was secretary of Milnathort in Bloom at the time of the memorial's refurbishment, gave evidence in court.

In addition to the three stolen plaques, a further one was damaged in an attempt to remove it. The plaques honoured the dead of two world wars from Orwell parish. The war memorial required a further £8,000 to be spent on restoration after the theft.

Slaven and Miller, both in their forties, had been co-accused but the Crown accepted Slaven's not guilty plea and produced him as a prosecution witness.

Sheriff Valerie Johnston deferred sentence on Miller while reports are obtained.

Swansacre traffic

On 5 August, Perth & Kinross Council revoked the traffic management order that prohibited driving except for access at Swansacre, Kinross, from its junction with Station Road to its junction with School Wynd.

This means that anyone is allowed to drive down Swansacre. This action was taken to help drivers reach streets and car parks in the centre of Kinross while the High Street is closed due to the regeneration project. However, drivers **must take care to obey all road traffic directions and signage**. Police have charged several drivers for disobeying the one-way sign at Swansacre.

Swansacre is one-way for part of its length, from its junction with Piper Row to close to its junction with School Wynd. Traffic may only travel in a southerly direction on this section.

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. In addition, Kinross CC minutes are lodged in the community library. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. In particular, where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 5 August 2015 were: CCllrs W Freeman, D Colliar, B Davies, G Thomas, I Jack, T Stewart, D MacKenzie and M Scott; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and M Barnacle; a police representative and 13 members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllrs Blyth and West and Cllr Robertson.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police Report: The police representative reported on recent crimes including theft, vandalism and nuisance calls/drinking involving youths. Again they stress that residents secure both property and vehicles. A question was raised regarding staffing levels overnight and at weekends. It was noted that there are four officers until 3am. This is sometimes reduced to two during the later hours.

Cllr Cuthbert reported that access through Swansacre was to be permitted during the High Street works. It was further mentioned that cars have been illegally driving down Piper Row. The Police were asked to be vigilant regarding the road closures and access for the emergency vehicles. A local resident read from a communication received from the Council which contradicts the position regarding restrictions on the road at Piper Row through to School Wynd and confirms that this is a public road.

The siting of a vehicle in private ground at the junction at Middle Balado was raised. Local residents advise that this interferes visually with the sidelines. The police representative noted the position.

Parking in the Sandport area was mentioned. Bollards are to be relocated.

Kinross-shire Time Exchange Presentation: Susan Bathgate explained how the Time Exchange operates. Insurance is now in place and there has been a fair interest in joining with a register of members drawn up. The system works by banking hours utilised voluntarily in helping others and which can be used in exchange for a service to you. The operation, while offering support, also allows the sharing of skills, assistance with tasks, meeting new people etc. Examples are weeding, dog walking, help with the weekly shop - the list is endless.

Matters Arising from Minutes of Previous Meeting

Town Hall: CCllr Thomas was surprised that the CC would support the installation of inappropriate windows at the Town Hall Development - undertaken without Planning Consent - adding that this could jeopardize future applications. The Council believe that an application for Retrospective Consent for their retention is to be submitted. (The CC wrote to the Council stating that in its opinion the completed building works are satisfactory and a vast improvement to this site and that the windows enhance the building and do not detract visually in relation to the surrounding site.)

Station Road speed: [The previous minutes reported a suggestion from a member of the public that there should be a 20mph limit between the roundabout and Swansacre.] Cllr Barnacle addressed this with a member of the Council and

suggested that it might be prudent to leave this matter for the meantime.

Scotbet Building: CCllr Thomas questioned whether it was not the responsibility of the owner to undertake this work, adding that it was wrong to reward a business who failed to maintain their premises while others in the area undertook any necessary works. It was explained that despite communications to [the owners] they have not responded. This was one suggestion aired in relation to the proposal by Rainton (High Street Contractors) to include some community benefit while carrying out the works on the High Street. If anyone has any suggestions, such as tidying up an area of land in the town etc, then please let the CC know.

Newsletter Fund Disbursements

Powmill Bloom Group are seeking £3000 for planters, bulbs and paint for bridge railings after repair work. Representatives explained what the money was required for. It was noted that the funds were required to purchase basic equipment. Both Cllrs Cuthbert and Barnacle endorsed this application. It was believed that the sum of £3,000 was excessive in light of our budget and a figure of £1,500 was proposed by CCllr Colliar and was seconded by CCllr Davies. A counter proposal for £3.000 was proposed by CCllr Thomas. There was no seconder. The sum of £1,500 was agreed.

Old Arngask Preservation Group (in association with Kinross Marshall Museum and Glenfarg CC) are asking for £642 to engage professional stone conservators to assess the condition and recommend preservation of two items in the Old Arngask Cemetery by Glenfarg. A discussion was held on whether this application met the criteria in relation to location. Following discussion it was proposed by CCllr Colliar that this application be rejected, seconded by CCllr MacKenzie. This was agreed.

Kinross Buildings

Primary School: It was questioned when the engagement with the community would commence in relation to the Primary School. It was believed that this was imminent. CCllr MacKenzie is to follow this up.

Former Health Centre, Lathro: A planning application was submitted.

Town Centre Regeneration: Representatives from the Council were to be invited to the CC meeting. Due to holiday commitments this was not possible. A local trader convened meetings recently to discuss the works and the impact on the local businesses. Local Councillors and representatives from the Council were present and met with various traders. Questions were raised regarding the roadworks, the closures, signage and the road being blocked. Some positive measures have taken place following these meetings including introduction of an information booklet and a review of signage. The second meeting focused on loss of trade and compensation for local traders. Rates Relief was also raised but it was noted that many of the businesses fall under the threshold for rates. Another issue raised was the impact on deliveries. Safety concerns were raised at tonight's meeting in relation to the north side of the junction. The Council do

not plan to erect railings (or bollards) - through experience and knowledge the Council advise that they encourage accidents. The possibility of working overtime would involve an amendment to the contract and an increased expenditure. Another point raised was that criticism of the works have been directed to the workers who would not be willing to work overtime for this reason. Despite delays the planned works are on schedule with the road closure to be in place until September. A suggestion was made that we again invite Mr Morgan to another CC meeting. It has also been suggested that the road from the area at the Central Cafe to Bridgend be resurfaced. Money has been allocated for this purpose. The CC agree that it would be beneficial for this work to be undertaken but to wait until the road closures currently in place are ended. We understand that this would involve four days work. Cllr Barnacle added that he would like to see the formation of a group with the CC and traders and a plan built following the road improvements to create a longer term thriving town centre.

Milnathort Community Council News from the August Meeting

Attendance: CCllr Hamilton, Chair, welcomed CCllrs Bennet, Halford, Milne-Home, Smith and Thomson to the meeting held on 13 August 2015. Also in attendance were P&K Cllrs Barnacle, Giacopazzi, Robertson and Cuthbert, and eight members of the public.

Apologies: CCIIrs Cottingham, Pettinger, and minute taker D. Baudains.

Local Plan: Cllr Barnacle gave a resume of the new Local Plan, a draft of which will be published in the Autumn.

There have been 272 submissions made but it is unlikely they will all be accepted. There will be a potential need for 890 houses in Kinross-shire. However, Milnathort has approximately 150 undeveloped sites with planning permission and PKC is keen to keep all development within the registered boundaries. Now the UK is coming out of the dip of recession, developers will hopefully develop these sites in our area (Pitdownies, Hattonburn, Athronhill and Drunzie). Where there is no longer a settlement boundary in country areas, they are bound by the Housing in the Countryside Policy.

With a projected population increase in the shire of 22% by 2031, there would be a shortfall of approximately 50 houses in the Plan. Developers have asked for a further 13 Ha to the east of Milnathort village, but councillors thought it unlikely they would be added to the Local Plan. However we must await the publishing of the new Local Plan, when consultation with the local public will happen.

Gypsy traveller sites: retrospective planning has proven to not be effective, especially drainage arrangements.

Renewable energy: Cllr Barnacle would like to see guidance on the need for further wind farms. He noted that the Westminster Government withdrawing subsidies will make this less of an issue.

Transport: Parking in settlements and HGVs on unsuitable routes are concerns.

A request has been made for the removal of the permission for industrial use, and undeveloped, on the strip of land to the east of Milnathort.

CCllrs and members of the public had the opportunity to ask questions.

To stop all Retrospect Planning Applications would be unlikely to be legal.

Reviews have to be done dictated by the Scottish Government every 5 years.

It was suggested if employment in the area was not increased then all the extra housing and burden to the infrastructure was not needed.

Cllr Barnacle was thanked for his detailed presentation.

Presentation by Scottish Water: Mr Scott from Scottish Water gave a presentation on the works about to start in Milnathort. This work will involve tanks being built and large diameter pipes to the burn south of New Road and at the Cross, where the flower bed is currently. This will take the pressure off any floodwater and stop sewage flooding back into five properties.

The work has already started, and the £1.6 million works will be completed in five phases.

- 1) At the Cross in a private garden, an emergency outfall to the burn at the foot of the garden.
- 2) South Street will be closed on 7 September for three weeks. This closure will be from The Cross to the Tudor Antique shop. Diversion is via Bridgefauld Rd and Stirling Rd. It would appear Church Street will remain open.
- 3) New Road will be closed from 3 October for three weeks, as new manholes are constructed.

Cllr Giacopazzi noted that Scottish Water have offered for the work to progress seven days a week to reduce the time of disruption. This offer was welcomed.

It was asked if weekend work was not to go ahead that a single file traffic system can be set up in New Road at weekends.

Diversions will be set up when roads are closed, but the New Road one will be very long as it will be via Lethangie.

Victoria Avenue should be one-way by this time, and Burleigh Road will be open.

PKC Roads Dept are invited to attend our next MCC Meeting. Cllr Giacopazzi to arrange this.

Police Report: a brief report was read by the Chairman. Crimes in the area include youths setting fires in the Park area of Beech Park. Theft on Old Perth Road of number plates stolen from a parked vehicle is under enquiry. Vandalism over a few months at Milnathort Golf Club. Greens have been damaged and bunker rakes snapped in half. This is still under enquiry.

Planning: MCC considered the following application and no objections were raised: 15/01342/MPO N8 Modification of planning obligation (08/01124FLL) relating to section 6 (phosphate mitigation measures) of section 75 agreement. Land East of Tillyrie Farm, Milnathort.





Mountain Bike Track and Donaldson Park: Rumours regarding the making of a Mountain Bike Track in Donaldson Park are just that and unsubstantiated.

Mains Gas: This is being installed in Bridgefauld Road. Householders who own their houses were not all told of the disruption and some had their access blocked without warning.

Proposed Ward Boundary Changes: All the homes north of the M90 would no longer be in the Kinross-shire MCC ward, but sent to Earn, miles away. These changes would divide the present MCC area and destroy MCC. There would have to be Community Councillors from Earn and Kinross-shire at meetings should MCC survive, i.e. eight not four Community Councillors. Milnathort and the P&K Councillors are against this proposed change. We have spent years protecting the Kinross-shire boundary and this must not be allowed to destroy the centuries old boundary of our County. Glenfarg also wish to be in the Kinross-shire Ward.

PKC are also against the proposed changes. Our Councillors are to keep us up to date.

NEW COMMUNITY COUNCILLORS NEEDED: There will be an election for Community Council members on 5 November 2015. Any person aged 16 or over and on the electoral register are eligible to stand and vote in this election. If there are eight or less nominations there will not be an election for the seats. Nominations close by 4pm on Thursday 24 September. We need new members on MCC, as four of the present Community Councillors are not up for re election. *See page 6 for more on the CC elections*.

Comments/ Questions from the Floor:

Verges: There was a request for country verges to be cut twice a year instead of once. Junctions are dangerous with over grown vegetation restricting vision. P&K Councillors said they would bring this up at the next budget meeting to see if there were funds for a second cut.

Burleigh Road resurfacing was efficiently and well carried out

The pothole in Wester Loan has been repaired.

Perth & Kinross Councillors' Comments:

The zebra crossing in New Road is now painted.

Donaldson Park: Weeds in Donaldson Park have been strimmed a last. (It only took two men forty minutes.)

Kinross-shire CCs: A joint meeting was proposed of the Kinross-shire CCs and ward councillors to combat the Local Boundary Commission Scotland's proposed Ward Changes. It was agreed MCC would support such a meeting.

Conservation Area: The Kinross Civic Trust has applied for Milnathort to be a Conservation Area despite Milnathort being almost entirely against this. PKC are trying to reduce the cost of Conservation Areas and are unlikely to approve more in Perth and Kinross.

The Next Meeting of Milnathort CC will take place on Thursday 10 September 2015 at 7.30pm in Orwell Church Hall.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the August Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on Tuesday 11 August 2015 were: CCllrs Strang Steel (Chairman), Calderwood, Williamson, Forde, Smith and Morris; Ward Cllrs Barnacle, Giacopazzi and Cuthbert; PC Lorimer (police report only) and about 15 members of the public.

Apologies: CCllr Cairncross and Cllr Robertson.

Matters Arising

SSE overhead wires at Wellside: CCllr Forde had taken the matter up with the Health & Safety Executive. It is satisfied that the wires comply with safety regulations. The raising of the matter has been recorded.

Local Development Plan: Responses are now on the website. The Main Issues Report has yet to be put out for consultation and so there is no time limit for lodging further representations at present.

Bench on The Green, Scotlandwell is now in place.

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church and Hall: In reply to the Chairman's letter, PKC said that they had discussed the path but there was no easy solution. They would continue to look at the options but could not guarantee a full solution.

Presentation by Uwe Stoneman of the RSPB's new fiveyear plan for their Loch Leven Reserve

Mr Stoneman gave an interesting presentation stressing the RSPB's long connection with the loch. They regard the reserve as an important place for interaction with the public. They have 55000 visitors a year and have 13 full time equivalent employees. They will continue to manage the area between the B9097 and the loch as wetland for waders and largely leave the hill to nature. They hope to improve the passage under the B9097 and have commissioned a feasibility study. The cost is estimated at £500,000, partly because it involves the diversion of a water main. The opening of the Heritage Trail and the prospective completion of the Living Lomonds path to Lochore Meadows, both developments welcomed by RSPB, have increased, and will further increase, pressure on car parking space.

The Chairman thanked Mr Stoneman for his thoughtful presentation.

Reports

Police: PC Lorimer spoke to the report which had been circulated. She attributed the number of incidents reported to improved reporting by the public rather than an increase in

criminal activity. She drew attention to cold callers offering to do inadequate work for inflated sums of money. The Chairman thanked PC Lorimer for her report and attendance.

Treasurer: The PKC admin grant had been received in the general account in June and the printing costs and rent paid. The balance on that account stands at £547.40. The MBW account had been enhanced by donations and stood at the end of the month at £652.85. Since then a further donation of £250 had been received, making a total response to the appeal for funds of £750.

Planning Report New applications

15/01070/FLL Erection of wind turbine at Findatie Farm. Decided no comment or objection.

15/01067/FLL and 15/01068/FLL Alteration to extension at Millhouse, The Cobbles, Kinnesswood. Decided no comment or objection.

15/00975/FLL Extension to garage, 3 Gamekeepers Walk, Kinnesswood. Decided no comment or objection.

Since these decisions were made, the applications for Millhouse and Gamekeepers Walk have been approved by PKC.

Progress with developments: There was no news of any change in relation to the Lomond Inn application. CCllr Calderwood reported that the developer had been on site at Glenlomond on the previous day and the removal of 'soft down takings' (i.e. internal fitments) had commenced. Demolition was planned to take place this year, although no planning application for this had yet been lodged. An indicative plan showing 12 detached houses had been seen.

Infrastructure Report

Stephen's field: The Chairman reported that he had told the planners and Stephens of the results of the public consultation. The former had replied to the effect that they were pleased to see public consultation taking place, and the latter that they would now discuss the matter with the planners.

Moss Road Scotlandwell car park: The Chairman reported that he and the secretary had met with Mr Moore, the developer of Wellfield and owner of the car park. He is committed to the area being used as a car park, but does not want it over formalised. Mr Moore was prepared to see title transferred provided that he could be assured as to how the site would be developed and his costs were covered. It was left that the CC would investigate a suitable specification for the site, how title should be taken and funding.



Roads Report: CCllr Calderwood reported that the illumination of the build outs had been restored. He hoped that the work included making them watertight, as water ingress was what caused the problem. Road marking was still required on the B9097, but potholes had been filled and verge cutting had been very well carried out.

Cllr Barnacle had been discussing the status of the Dryside road. It is a good candidate to be designated as a green route. There would be difficulties in signing it as unsuitable for HGVs.

Attempts to get Mr Cargill, the new head of the roads department, to come to a meeting to advise about the experimental 20 mph limits in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell had failed. The public needed to be given advance warning of the experiment. CCllr Morris made the suggestion that the centre of Kinnesswood be made one way, with the use of lights, as part of the experiment. The Ward Councillors advice was to take one step at a time and gauge the success of the 20mph limit first. Agreed.

Paths Report: CCllr Smith reported that all work that required to be done to complete grant-funded work had been done, and so the paths group was able to look at fresh projects. The Woodland Trust is doing work at the Grahamstone entrance to the Moss and there may be work to do on the Grahamstone side. The grass on the peat Loan was being cut less often, and this would be assessed.

Cattle on the hill had made the surface of part of the MBW difficult to negotiate. CCllr Smith and the Chairman had met with Calum Robertson. The cattle were now on the top of the hill and would be until October. The intention was to put them up the hill next year from the beginning. That gave CCllr Smith the confidence to proceed with the maintenance work. The work done in the last year had held up well. Nobody wanted to have to fence the livestock out from the vulnerable part of the MBW.

Local Government Boundary Commission

The Chairman reported that the Commission's proposals to reduce the number of Ward Councillors from four to three and to transfer the part of the old county north of Milnathort to Strathearn are now out for consultation. Comments have to be lodged by 22 October. Portmoak is not affected by the proposed boundary change but we still need to consider whether to object. Cllr Cuthbert said that PKC had unanimously objected to the change to the ward boundary and he was analysing the basis on which this proposal had been made. There would be an article in the Newsletter. See p. 14. Apart from the statistical objections, there were good grounds for opposing from the historical and geographical points of view. There should be a full discussion at the next meeting when Cllr Cuthbert's analysis would be available.

Portmoak Cemetery

The cemetery is almost full. Cllr Robertson has established that there is a PKC wide review of cemeteries including Portmoak. There is a deep suspicion that (a) 'bereavement services' as cemeteries are apparently called will be centralised and (b) there will be little or no local consultation. Agreed that the Chairman should write to Allan Grant, convenor of the relevant PKC committee, to try to ensure that a cemetery will continue to be available in Portmoak and that there will be local consultation on the issue.

Community Council Insurance

The Chairman had been asked by one of the organisers of the Gala if they were covered by the CC's insurance. The answer

was in the negative as the insurance provided for the CC by PKC only covers activities and events for which the CC is responsible e.g. the paths group. If this is of concern to other groups, they might want to consider coming under the CC's umbrella.

Election of New Community Council

The CC is to receive nomination forms and these can be obtained from the secretary, the Chairman, or Christine Grant of PKC. (See page 6 for more on this.)

PKC Councillor's reports

Cllr Cuthbert warned of a charge being introduced for applications for closure of a public road for events such as the Remembrance Day parade. Any organisation that wishes a road closure order within the next year should apply before 31 August to avoid the charge.

Matters notified to Secretary

Heritage Trail: A plea for help had been received from the occupiers of a house situated beside the trail. There were four issues: abuse and obstruction when driving down the road to and from the house, invasion of the privacy zone around the house, bagged dog excrement not being properly disposed of and human excrement in the wood adjoining the house. The Chairman had met the complainers and referred the matter to Cllr Robertson, as Chairman of TRACKS and Sgt. Nicolson of the police. Both were taking action.

Kilmagadwood Urns: Cllr Cuthbert reported that there is a lot of work to be done before the urns can be offered to any museum. When that happens they will be offered in a strict pecking order and the Kinross Museum (assuming it has the capability to store properly such delicate items) will not be high up that order. All that can be done is to put in a plea for at least some of the urns to be displayed reasonably locally.

Other business

Mrs Hey presented a petition with 30 signatures on it requesting a reduction in the speed limit at Easter Balgedie from 40mph to 30mph. The Chairman undertook to pass it on to Mr Cargill of PKC. Particular causes of danger at this point are the fact that all three farms in the hamlet have ground on both sides of the A911 and have regular need to cross it with tractors and machinery. When the school bus stops, cars regularly overtake it although the visibility is inadequate. There is no warning signage.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC is at 7pm on Tuesday 8 September in Portmoak School, when there will be a presentation on the Local Development Plan.

Village Updates - Blairadam

The road has been repaired and resurfaced. Thanks to all involved in getting this done, however, there has been a broken water pipe, suspected to be as a result of a road roller catching a kerb stone and pushing it down onto a lead pipe. After discussion with PKC, the Council is not accepting responsibility for this as it is a private supply. Cllr Barnacle is aware and will pursue this further.

CCIIr Robertson reported that the road engineers informed him that the current new surface has been placed onto an old, poor quality base that isn't suitable for heavy vehicles, and at some stage remedial works will be required.

Due to the nice, new smooth road, it was asked what the current status of the approved 20mph speed limit was, as traffic speed has now increased.

There are several road junctions with verges that are overgrown leading to inadequate and dangerous site lines. Cllr Giacopazzi reported that this is known and is hand.

The road surface has been renewed.

Planning

There are still five pending application which have been discussed at previous meetings.

15/01241/FLL Erection of dwelling house and garage, Nivingston. An application for a smaller house and a new access road than has already been approved. No objections.

15/01108/FLL Modification (in retrospect) to include new vehicular access and amenity block. This is yet another retrospective application at this site. Cllr Barnacle has met with Nick Brian to ask him to check with the Local Plan to confirm how development on this site compares with the Settlement Boundary that has been included in the Local Plan. 15/01181/FLL Renewal of existing permission. Multiple renewals at this site regarding three houses.

15/01184/IPL Erection of dwelling house. There is a concern about vehicular access on the bend. Local Councillors are to seek opinions from local residents about the feelings on this application before reporting back.

Cllr Giacopazzi reported that the Chance Inn application is to be considered at the next DMC.

Boreland Farm: Cllrs Cuthbert and Giacopazzi met with the planners to discuss this site. There were several matters discussed, including checking the size of the application in relation to the now demolished steading. More details have been requested from the developer relating to the finishes, the roof and drainage, and any reference of 'existing' to be removed from drawings that must be resubmitted. Nick Brian has recommended that this application is approved at the next DMC with several conditions that were discussed: Prior approval of engineering and detailed drawings before starting work, including specifications of actual finishing materials (especially the stonework); Lime mortar must be used; A small section of external must be built (including lintels) to confirm quality of finish before rest of stonework is completed; Inspections at foundations, wall head height; Clay pantiles for the roof material (including a sample prior to roofing); Wooden windows and frames, in keeping with the original building; No new work can be commenced on plots 1 and 5 until the steading is completed.

Other business

The Boundary Commission is pressing ahead with their plans to alter that Kinross-shire boundary, cutting it in half along the A91, and reducing the number of members from four to three. This is against the unanimous view of the Council. This matter is now entering a 12-week public consultation, which only entails putting material up in the Community Campus library for display. (See page 14.) All ward members are against this proposal, and will discuss this further at the meeting on 7 September.

B996: the Blairforge road sign was knocked down at a RTA 18 months ago and hasn't been re-erected. Cllr Barnacle to follow up.

A new sign is to be erected for Flockhouse Farm.

The Boreland junction sign has similarly been requiring repair for 18 months.

The LDP presentation is on 7 September at 7.30pm, Cleish Village Hall.

The Next Meeting of Cleish & Blairadam CC is on Monday 5 October at Cleish Village Hall.

Fossoway & District CC

News from the August Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 4 August 2015 were: CCllrs S Morrison, T Duffy, A Cheape and G Pye; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and J Giacopazzi and 12 Members of the Public (MoP).

Apologies: CCllrs K Borthwick and A Lavery; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and W Robertson.

Declarations of Interest: Angus declared an interest in planning application 15/01110/IPL.

Police report: Sgt Sam Greshon attended the meeting, and gave a report. Power tools were stolen from garage at Blairingone. Garden machinery was stolen from a house in Crook of Devon. MoPs report that the long straight stretch of the B9097 from Fossoway Garage has frequent speeders. Also, after any event at Knockhill people are speeding along the surrounding roads, especially the A823 towards Powmill.

Matters Arising

Powmill Bloom Group: The group has met several times and applied for funding from various sources. It is extending its remit to address untidy items, including cleaning road signs etc. They have got PKC to cut verges around overgrown footpaths, and some extra work on this has been done by members. A Facebook page has been set up. A concern is the state of the derelict Ivy Cottage; Cllr Barnacle says that there might be a case for compulsory purchase, since the owner is not in the country and doesn't respond to correspondence. If the community is in favour of this idea, they should write to Isobel Butt, PKC's Vacant Property Development Officer, at Pullar House, Perth, expressing their support.

Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: Hugh reports that the landowners are signing leases. Tenders are being sent out to three contractors with the aim of getting prices and timetables by the end of August, allowing work to commence later this year. Assuming that the tenders are favourable, then community meetings will be held to invite investment in the scheme, with a minimum of £350.

Crook Moss travellers' site: SEPA have refused to grant the CAR licences, leaving the occupants with no valid disposal method for grey or black water, and no prospect of connecting to mains drainage in the foreseeable future. After ten weeks of reasonable peace, generator noise became a problem again in July. Approaches to PKC's Environment Department from both Cllr Giacopazzi and Roseanna Cunningham MSP have not received satisfactory responses. Cllrs Giacopazzi and Cuthbert will be meeting with Environment Services this week. It also appears that the site is currently being extended, with new fences being erected, in direct contradiction of planning conditions. It was stressed that the community was not opposed to the travelling community in principle, but the community expected both SEPA and PKC to enforce the regulations and planning conditions uniformly on all sections of the community. The site has now been in operation for three and a half years and the major conditions relating to drainage and noise have still not been satisfactorily addressed. It was unanimously agreed by those present that the CC should, in addition to continually raising their concerns with SEPA and PKC, also contact the newspapers to express those concerns.

Glenquey Quarry: The appeal against the refusal of planning permission was turned down by the Reporter on 27 July.

Lambhill Chipping plant: The DPEA made a site visit in July prior to ruling on the appeal against the enforcement notice.

Subsequently, the appeal has been dismissed. The appeal to the LRB of the planning application is yet to be held.

A977 Defects and Mitigation Measures: PKC's roads department have declined to do a business plan for roundabouts, so Cllr Barnacle has assembled a list of other measures to be considered, with the intention to have another meeting with all interested parties to discuss them.

CC Membership: The CC once again appealed to members of the local community to put themselves forward as Community Councillors. Several members of the current council will be retiring in November and we need more people to fill their places. Anyone living in the area, and listed on the electoral register can apply. If you are interested and would like more information please contact any CC member or email the secretary on Fossoway.cc@gmail.com. (See also page 6.)

Station Road adoption: Residents are being canvassed by Cllr Barnacle to contribute to the adoption. One has refused, eleven have already agreed, and a very small number are yet to respond. Consequently this should go ahead shortly.

Burst water main, Aldie Road: Cllr Robertson was not present to report on this.

Boundary Commission: The Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland have rejected PKC's unanimous objection to the Commission's proposal to reduce the size of historical Kinross-shire and hence the number of our local Councillors in Ward 8 from four to three. The proposal is now out for public consultation until 22 October, and comments can be lodged by letter or directly on the LGBC's website at https://www.consultation.lgbc-scotland.gov.uk/node/31 (See also page 14.)

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle had written to the developer asking for an update. The developer's stonemason has now decided that it will not be possible to move the memorial without damaging it, contrary to previous opinions. Cllr Barnacle is seeking a report to get further details of what has changed.

Joe Giacopazzi: TRACKS have now secured funding for the first part of the Crook of Devon to Kinross Multi-Use Track, which will be a 2km section running from Broomhill Cottage to the Aldie Road. It is hoped that work can begin in late autumn this year. It was pointed out that this road/track was currently used extensively by dog walkers and horse riders and had been to the Chair's personal knowledge for at least 67 years. The track was also used by householders on the route and farmers to access fields with their equipment and to move stock. In addition, there was occasional use by through traffic particularly when there were roadworks on the A977 in Crook of Devon, so it was essential that if the route were to be used by cyclists there would need to be effective segregation to ensure the safety of the current users.

Have you ever wondered what kind of apple tree you have in the garden? It may be an old variety producing unusual fruit or you may have a comparatively young tree but can no longer read the label? Join us for an **apple identification afternoon** in the Portmoak Community Orchard!

Members of the Portmoak Community Woodland Steering Group are struggling to identify some of the trees in the orchard. We carefully labelled our young apple trees when we planted them in the Field Abin the Kirk in Scotlandwell. But the rain has washed off the writing on many of the labels and we are no longer sure which tree is which. Luckily we have an expert to help us out. Andrew Lear, aka appletreeman, from Bankfoot in Perthshire, runs popular apple identification sessions and he is doing one for us on **Sunday 13 September**, 2-5pm. Everyone is welcome to come along. You do not have to live in the parish to get involved. The event is free, thanks to a grant from the Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership, and their 'Let's Celebrate' programme, along with matched funding from the Portmoak Community Woodland Group.



Boys Brigade

This November marks 40 years since Kinross BB was officially registered by Kinross B schoolteacher Roddy Beaton. An email received from an officer of the 94th Glasgow (1st Shettleston) Company gives an interesting



view on how the Kinross Company re-started after falling into abeyance in 1912 from its original start date of 1892: "I recently received a call from an ex-Member of your Company who now lives in Shettleston, Mr. Jim Clarke, who told me about a connection between our Companies of which we had not been aware. Mr. Clarke explained that three Boys from our Company (Bill and Ian Merrie and Grant Auchincloss) were evacuated to Kinross in 1940. They discovered that one of the teachers at their new school was a BB Officer, and between them the idea was floated of starting a Company in Kinross."

It was with the assistance of these BB boys evacuated from Glasgow that Roddy Beaton started Kinross BB. The Kinross Company would like to gather information, stories and anecdotes from each of the decades from 1940 till the present day. Former boys, officers and parents are asked to jot down their memories of the Company so that a potted history can be assembled. Old photographs would also be welcome.

The Company resumes for the new session on Friday 4 September in the Church Centre. The Anchor Section (6-7.15pm) caters for boys and girls in primaries one to three. The Junior Section (7-9pm) caters for boys and girls from primary four to six. The Company Section (7-10pm) caters for boys and girls from primary 7 to S2 and the Senior Section (7-10pm) caters for boys and girls from S3 to S6. 

Somerset Apple Cake

115g sugar 225g chopped apples

1 teaspoon baking powder

Method

Mix the first four ingredients with one egg and milk until quite soft. Add chopped apples. Divide between two sandwich tins (lined). Bake at 350°F or 180°C for approximately 30 minutes. Sprinkle with Demerara sugar.


Loch Leven Community Campus, Kinross





It's good to see a few Red Squirrels around too. They appear to have had a successful breeding season. There are also lots of Deer around the Golf Course.

We've put in a big shift but we are nearly there with our Himalayan Balsam. We've been pulling, slashing and spraying. It is occurring all around the reserve. It threatens to take over the whole site so we have to deal with it. It is an attractive pink flower and the bees enjoy it, but we have to get rid of it as we'll lose our herb rich loch meadows.

One of the sheep from St Serf's was in the Kinross Show but unfortunately wasn't placed. That is three years in a row a sheep has been in the show. The sheep on the island are doing a great job keep the grass short for the visiting geese this winter. We expect the geese back sometime in September. I often get told that the geese are back early but it's not our Icelandic Pink-footed Geese, it's the local Greylag Geese feeding on the spilt grain on the fields.

On **Sunday 20 September**, Neil is leading a **Fungi Foray** at Finadatie from 2pm until 4pm with the help of expect mycologist Richard Smith. There are lots of fungi about now. I've been tentatively identifying Sulphar Tufts and Scarlet Elfcaps around the reserve. You get impressive fungi shows if the weather is warm and damp.

Apart from the Balsam, the volunteers have been busy with grass cutting and painting the hide at Levenmouth. We've also been cleaning the boardwalk up to the hide. The insect volunteers have been out a lot but their efforts have been somewhat hampered by the weather. They are seeing a few dragonflies and bees and recent highlights include the second generation of Small Copper butterflies along the new section of the railway.

I'm off to have a look at what wildlife is around the reserve. I'm hoping a nice American wading bird lands at Loch Leven this autumn. It's been a few years since our last North American visitor. Otherwise I hope to be harvesting my potatoes soon. TTFN,

Farming



Just for a bit of variety, and since neither Fiona nor I mention it very often in this section of the Newsletter(!), I thought I'd mention the weather as I think it warrants some special attention: the coldest June for forty years, July something similar. 'Summer' is almost behind us and it's been a bit of a non-event, and we are running out of time for it to redeem itself

Here in Newsletter country, we have been relatively fortunate compared to other parts of Scotland, as it was only around mid July the really heavy rain started, making the fields soft. Further west has been wetter, and Orkney has been particularly badly affected. There was even a special sale of livestock organised to get stock off the island as farmers there didn't have sufficient feedstocks for all the animals and the fields were too wet to let them graze. The situation still hasn't improved and they are struggling to make hay and silage for the coming winter. The Orcadians are a resilient breed but this is testing them to the limit.

In this area 'frustrating' is probably a more appropriate word to use, as it tended to be a case of it being a light shower of rain nearly every day, making harvesting silage tricky and making hay impossible. August has brought improvement, to the extent that in this past week, we had three days with no rainfall – luxury!

Here at Backward Farm we have just baled a small field of hay and have mowed the rest of our 'first cut' grass, hopefully for some more hay and some haylage. Our second cut of grass could be done anytime but I won't cut it until I can see us getting finished with the last of the first cut. It should hopefully be all tidied up by the time you are reading this. The contract baling I do for other farmers has also been frustratingly delayed, as the weather windows have been so small to get these jobs done. In general, there should be a good quantity of silage for this winter, but the quality will be below average.

To give you a running report on the ongoing scrapheap challenge of keeping our balers in working order, they haven't been too bad. The old faithful has been pretty good by its own standards, although it developed a hydraulic problem last night, which it has had before and should be straightforward to remedy. The new-to-us baler has gone very well apart from one day when it wouldn't work when I got to the field. It must have been the effect of the low oxygen levels baling at altitude at the top of the Ochil hills!

One event that was very fortunate with the weather was Kinross Show, which was a great relief to everyone involved with running it. So many agricultural (and other) shows have suffered from poor weather this 'Summer' which is a pity because a year's efforts in organising can be undone by the weather on the day. Kinross Show relies on a good turnout of the general public to make it financially viable and also to ensure the wide variety of organisations who have stands have a successful day. The committee aims to provide an event which has a wide variety of attractions for the local community to enjoy, whether a visitor or an exhibitor, and is one which people want to support.

Here's hoping the weather settles down to make the fast approaching harvest period relatively straight forward.



JACK MOFFAT 1925-2015

Retired Principal Teacher of Art, **Kinross High School**

Jack was born John Moffat near Lesmahagow, but his father's job transferred to Brechin Employment Agency and the family moved to Friockheim. Jack found employment in an accountant's firm as a clerk.



Accountancy wasn't for him and he soon joined an architect's office as a draughtsman, which was much more to his liking. He took art evening classes at Brechin High School, painting the Angus landscape he loved, and was accepted by Dundee College of Art, where he met Marjory Young. He trained in painting and calligraphy, she in textile design.

In his third year at Art College one of his tutors was the renowned artist McIntosh Patrick, who was so impressed with Jack's talent, his mastery of colour and composition, that he persuaded him to do an extra postgraduate year in which Jack produced many scenes of the Dundee of the late 1940s. He received permission to go onto the roof of the Caird Hall in order to get the views he needed for some of these works. Very little of this old Dundee remains today, so these paintings bring back memories of the pre Tay Bridge and waterfront development days.

Jack graduated in 1949 and after teacher training and teaching briefly in Perth, he took up the post of art teacher in Kinross Junior Secondary School in 1951. Over the years the single classroom with few facilities became a whole department dedicated to Art and Crafts, with Jack as Principal Teacher and two assistants. The range of skills expanded to include pottery, photography, lapidary and calligraphy. Jack took evening classes at the school and also taught at the local art club. In fact the family hardly saw him during the week, as he was so busy and dedicated to his work; firing pottery at night and setting up for the next day's classes.

Over the years he kept in touch with many of his ex-pupils and followed their exploits with great interest. Jack had taught for so long his family were amused to find he kept a file of newspaper clippings of his pupils' obituaries. The number of Christmas cards he received and sent was amazing.

He painted when he had the time. Family memories are still very vivid of accompanying him on his painting trips, where

he would point out the wonders of the natural world while they were scrambling up waterfalls, through gorse and pine trees and over stiles to find the perfect viewing point where he would start painting.

Both he and Marjory were much in demand to produce posters for upcoming events, coffee mornings, plays etc. Jack designed the original shield for the school after consulting the Lord Lyon about its heraldry. The shield is still above the door of the old Kinross High School. Jack also designed the 'Learning the Key' mosaic which can be seen in the Loch Leven Community Campus. There is an annual art award for good performance in art in their memory, introduced after Marjory's death in 1991.

Jack was also a very keen gardener; his garden winning 'Kinross in Bloom' was a very proud moment for him. He pottered there most days and indeed, he was trimming his hedge the day he became ill.

Jack contributed much to the local community but he was also a family man.

Jack and Marjory married in October 1953 and they had four children: Lilian, Enid, Isabel and John. In the course of time he became grandpa to twelve grandchildren and greatgrandpa to three, with another due the day before what would have been Jack's 90th and Marjory's 88th birthday.

Jack was very proud of his large family and how the clan had spread throughout Scotland.

He had his own way of doing things and his own way of seeing the world but Jack taught his family to be creative and questioning, to work hard, be modest and just get on with it. Although it was quite frustrating when offers of help were often refused, they are proud that he remained so active and independent until nearly 90. He passed away after a short illness on 29 July 2015.

Over the years Jack produced a large number of paintings, many of which he retained. He also painted a number of commissions. He had a joint exhibition in St Pons in France, home of colleague Peter's He enjoyed the trip and came back with ideas for more paintings. He considered bringing the exhibition Scotland but it was always put on the back burner. He took part in the first Angus Open Studios with daughter Issy, and all were

amazed by the selection of his works.

Jack Moffat was an inspiration to us all, and will be sorely missed by all who knew him, in Kinross and beyond.






