Response to letter on education by Elizabeth Smith

Scottish education's great strength is its inclusive and flexible system - comprehensive in the best sense - which "keeps doors open" right up to sixth year.

All children attend their local Primary school for seven years and transfer seamlessly to the Secondary with which there are close links. A broad choice of subjects and flexible "setting" by subject ensure that children have an education appropriate to their ability, age and stage throughout their development. This gives the greatest freedom and opportunity to learn.

In England, by contrast, children attend primary for only six years and then have to compete for places in a Secondary school. The stress caused to all pupils by the relentless competition/testing which 'closes doors' - and failure (or fear of it) is damaging to confidence and to the ability to learn.

Schools are an integral part of the community and in a democracy should be overseen by Local Authorities who are elected by the community, to serve the community, and are answerable to the community.

Education within schools is the responsibility of teachers who, in Scotland, are highly educated, well trained and skilled professionals.

In September, along with other MSPs, I was honoured to be named a Scottish Sporting Champion by the Scottish Sports Association. The SSA does a fantastic job in representing



sports across the board with their membership ranging from the Scottish Football Association to the Scottish Aeromodellers Association.

Sport is central to our national psyche. Scotland's collective mood is regularly captured by the fortunes of what happens at Hampden or Murrayfield or, increasingly these days, following Glasgow 2014, many other sports. Therefore, getting it right at an elite and grassroots level is very important.

The benefits of playing sport are well known, but worth restating. Regular activity is not only good for your physical health, helping stave off inactivity related conditions, but also tremendously important for your mental health.

A recent study in the British Journal of Sports Medicine found that men and women who play golf tend to live longer. The ground-breaking research found that the benefits of golf increased as we get older. Helping improve balance and muscular endurance whilst also improving our cardiovascular health, golf covered almost every base. These physical benefits were also matched by psychological gains, with older people using the game to reduce the risk of depression, anxiety and dementia. Mark Twain's oft-quoted "Golf is a good walk spoiled" line has now been officially disproven.

As a result of these massive health and societal benefits, successive Scottish Governments have aimed to increase participation in sport. The legacy of the Commonwealth and Olympic Games has been focussed on driving up the number of those taking part. However, there are conflicting views on its success or lack thereof.

SportScotland statistics have shown that the overall number of people registered to sports clubs has risen from 706,764

to 768,212 since 2013/14. However, the Scottish Health Survey found that fewer children were doing more than the recommended 75 minutes of vigorous exercise per week since the Olympic torch was lit. Explaining these widely diverging results is difficult. One theory is that those who were already casually involved in sport have taken this interest more seriously and joined a club. My experience with cricket would appear to reflect this.

As President of the Scottish Women's Cricket Association, I am heavily involved in the grassroots game. Our role is to take the game to places it has never been. As a result, participation has increased by 17,000 in the past two years. Taking the sport to schools and encouraging youngsters and girls into the game has proven particularly successful. With this model in mind, it is clear that setting out good practice from an early age is important.

However, participation figures can be negatively impacted by parental safety concerns surrounding contact sport. Concussion in rugby is a particularly serious concern and I have raised this on several occasions with Nicola Sturgeon. Just last month I questioned her at FMQs on the creation of a standardised set of concussion guidelines. This is hugely important. Putting parents' minds to rest can help increase the number of youngsters taking part and I have encouraged the government to investigate this further.

Leading healthier lives will depend on our lifestyle choices. Sport is good for mind and body, but unless serious resources are devoted to coaches, playing fields and PE teachers, we will never shed our "sick man of Europe" tag. The challenge to the Scottish Government is clear and I would encourage them not to drop the ball.

Community Woodland, Burleigh

The paths through the community woodland at Burleigh were very overgrown so I asked if they could be cut back by people carrying out community service orders. This has now been



done. The Community Payback team, led by Steve Bontrone of Perth & Kinross Council's Criminal Justice service, carried out the work early in October. They said that local people trying to use the paths thanked them for their efforts. They said they really appreciated these words of support.

If you see things that could be done through the use of this team, please let me know.

Speedwatch

I wrote earlier this year to the new Chief Constable of Police Scotland to ask him to consider relaunching the Community Speedwatch scheme, which was scrapped by his predecessor. He has now replied saying that he is actively looking at this scheme as a way of allowing communities to monitor traffic speeds.

The previous scheme was successfully trialled in Crook of Devon but was scrapped before it could be rolled out to other areas.

Sunnypark Wood

Local residents were very concerned when some mature trees were felled in the Sunnypark Wood earlier this year. When I contacted the Council about this they said that the only way to protect the wood from future felling was to apply for a TPO (Tree Preservation Order) for the wood. This had to be done by the community council. This Kinross CC agreed to do. Perth & Kinross Council's planning department have now confirmed that they are putting a TPO in place to protect this important community asset. It is now illegal to remove or cut back any trees within the Sunnypark Wood without full planning consent.

Junction 7, M90

With the granting of planning consent for 300 houses at Lathro Farm, I asked for a condition to be applied to the application that Persimmon Homes should help to fund the future upgrade of junction 7 on the M90. (When the 300 houses are built at Lathro it will put even more traffic pressure on the north of Kinross and on Springfield Road in particular.)

I was told that this was not possible as Transport Scotland would not support the upgrade of junction 7.

It was agreed, however, that Persimmon be asked to help fund improvements to the local road network and Springfield Road in particular. This has been added as a condition to their planning consent. Although welcome, this is not the best long-term solution for either Milnathort or Kinross.

Church tower and clock restored

The public clock on the tower of Kinross Parish Church has been recently restored to full working order by the congregation, with generous help from the Arthur and Margaret Thomson Charitable Trust. Perth and Kinross Council maintain the day-to-day working of the clock but was not involved in the refurbishment.

Congregational Board member Gordon McFarlane said: "The church decided that the clock, dating from 1929 and in memory of local doctor David Oswald, merited restoration despite a price-tag of around £8,000, because of its importance to the wider community. That wider community benefit must have been recognised by both the Trust, which gave £5,112, and the Presbytery of Perth, which allowed us to retain £2,866 from our normal contribution to national church funds to help meet this special expense."

The clock was repaired by the specialist firm Smith of Derby Ltd.

The church tower is the highest building in Kinross and the four illuminated faces of the clock can be seen from all over the town. The masonry of the tower itself, with its elaborate top based on details from Cambridge's Kings College Chapel, was restored last year at a cost of around £25,000.

Kinross Parish Church dates from 1832 and was modernised internally in 2005. It is a Category B Listed Building.

Kinnesswood & Scotlandwell Traffic Lights

If readers are surprised at the notion of traffic lights in these villages, then let me say, so am I

The ball was set rolling by Portmoak CC's

justified complaint about the problems caused by HGVs meeting head to head in the middle of the villages and the dangers posed by narrow pavements. The Council's Road Safety engineer worked up a scheme involving two-way traffic lights at Kinnesswood and three-way lights at Scotlandwell. Keeping my private misgivings to myself, I agreed that the scheme should go forward to the CC for discussion and public consultation. I feared that in the absence of residents making their voices heard, the scheme would go ahead by default.

I need have had no fears. The Portmoak CC meeting of 11 October was attended by seventy local folk. In my long years as a Community Councillor and now a Councillor, I'd never seen such a well-attended meeting; nor such a constructive one. The meeting was ably chaired by Malcolm Strang-Steel, who set a strict timeframe for questions and comments. Affected residents of Kinnesswood whose houses are on the main street gave accounts of damage to their properties occasioned by HGVs. Others spoke of the difficulties encountered by large vehicle meeting in the village, while some told of the narrowness of the pavements in both settlements.

Following an hour of discussion, the unanimous opinion of the public and of the Community Council was that the traffic light scheme represented a cure which was worse than the ill. Specifically:

- 1. Noise and pollution from vehicles waiting at 'red';
- 2. Incompatibility of traffic lights within a rural environment;
- 3. Increased traffic speeds through the villages;
- 4. Vehicles speeding up to 'beat the lights' on amber;
- Longer journey times for local drivers crossing both villages;
- 6. 'Bunching' of traffic on the A91 when the lights turn green;
- Difficulties for residents entering or exiting their driveways;
- 8. Long delays as the bin lorry collects waste;
- 9. Perceived threat to the future of the village shop and petrol station.

It was felt that, while the problem still needed to be addressed, it should be done in an incremental way with an emphasis on changing signage as far away as Kinross, to encourage drivers to make their journey to Fife using the M90 and the B9097 (lower Loch road). Other measures discussed included vehicle activated 'Slow Down' signs, 'gateway features' and speed limits. I have written to the Director of the Environment Service to convey the feeling of the meeting and to continue to seek more acceptable solutions to the problem.

I have now had a reply from the Director of the Environment Service agreeing that the scheme had 'certain downsides' and agreeing that Councillors should meet with officials to 'consider what might be other more proportionate and cost effective solutions'.

What 'Brexit' means

Well, the politicians further up the tree tell me 'Brexit means Brexit'. It also means, according to the financial pundits, that growth in the UK economy next year will slow. The consequences for the **Council's Medium Financial Plan** were

discussed at the October meeting of the full Council which all Councillors must attend.

Now, what the plan looks at are the demands for extra Council spending brought on by the increase in older people and younger ones; we have an increase in both in Perth and Kinross. It also looks at inflationary pressures and any reduction in its block grant from Holyrood, which is precisely what the public sector expects now. Of course, as it is expected that the Scottish NHS and Police Scotland's budgets will be 'ring fenced', cuts will fall more heavily on Scotland's 32 Councils. By how much? The Council's Head of Finance thinks a 3% cut (£5,570,000) is likely for PKC.

So next month the **Budget Review Group** (BRG), of which I am a member, sits for the first of ten meetings to discuss how to set the budget for 2017/18 in light of the expected reduction in funding. The BRG consists of the Council Leader, the Chief Executive, the Head of Finance, the three Heads of Service and four Administration Councillors. The reason I mention all this is because you, the residents of Kinross-shire, will, in some measure be affected. The Council must maintain spending on mandatory items e.g. teacher numbers, only cutting discretionary spending, such as grant funding to various bodies, the 'Third Sector'. On the one hand we face demands (for example) for increased subsidies on rural bus routes and to build more paths in the countryside while, on the other, our resources are reduced by central Government. Hey, ho, nobody said life was going to be easy.

J7 of the M90 at Milnathort

As I've raised previously, there will be increased traffic through Kinross in future years as the 300 houses at Lathro and the houses at Pace Hill are built. To alleviate this, your Ward 8 Councillors will press for slip roads on the South side of Junction 7 at Milnathort. My letter to the Minister for Transport is shown here. I'm told by officials that it's a big ask but, if you don't ask, you won't get.

Copy of letter to Humza Yousaf MSP, Minister for Transport
Dear Minister

Junction 7, M90 Motorway, Milnathort

In 1970, when the M90 was being constructed, the Scottish Office did not proceed with the planned slip roads on the South side of the interchange, as an economy measure. As a result, drivers wishing to travel south towards Edinburgh from Milnathort, the A91 along the Clackmannanshire hillfoot towns or locations in Fife, must use the busy Junction 6 at Kinross. Equally, those heading north and wishing to travel or return to these destinations must do so again at Junction 6. In the past this was merely an inconvenience. However, as you will be acutely aware, there has been a significant growth in traffic levels since the early 1970's and this, in conjunction with the planned expansion of housing to the south of Milnathort, will greatly increase the volume of traffic from both the Perthshire and Fife geographies using inappropriate routes through Milnathort and Kinross to access the M90 at Junction 6.

I and my fellow Kinross-shire Councillors are united in the view that if we are to prevent the roads infrastructure of Kinross becoming saturated in the coming years, to the detriment of residents and road users, action must be taken to create southbound slip roads at Junction 7, Milnathort. We consider, as a group, this would not only satisfy local aspirations relating to improving journey times, helping to promote economic growth, improving connectivity between major routes and improving safety levels through reducing levels of through traffic on local roads but, also fits firmly with wider strategic transport objectives and national policy.

I look forward to your early reply on this matter.

News from the Health Centre



The final Saturday flu clinic for 2016 is on **Saturday 12 November**. Appointments for any of the vaccinations below can be made for that date. If you or your children are eligible for one or more of these vaccinations please call Reception now on 01577 862112 to make an appointment. You do not need to wait for a letter of invitation.

Influenza Vaccination

We would encourage all patients who are eligible for the flu vaccination to make an appointment if they have not already done so. Those eligible are those over 65 by 31 March 2017, those under 65 in one of the 'At Risk' groups, pregnant women, or carers.

Childhood Flu Programme

GP practices are responsible for vaccinating children aged 2 to 5 years old. This is a nasal vaccine, not an injection. Children at primary school will receive the vaccine at school.

Pneumococcal Vaccination

Patients aged 65 by 31 March 2017 are eligible for the pneumovax vaccination. This vaccination can be given at the same time as the flu vaccination. This is not an annual vaccination so only needs to be given once.

Shingles Vaccination

The Shingles vaccine will be offered to those in the following age groups: those aged 70 on 1 September 2016 i.e. those born between 2 September 1945 and 1 September 1946 and those aged 76, 77 and 78 on 1 September 2016 i.e. those born between 2 September 1937 and 1 September 1940. Those who were eligible in previous years may still receive the vaccination unless they are now aged over 80. This vaccine can be administered at the same time as the flu vaccination so a separate appointment is not required. This vaccination is not an annual vaccination so only needs to be given once. When you book your appointment, please advise the Receptionist that you are eligible for the shingles vaccine as well as the flu vaccine.

Bra recycling will help cancer research

Women in Perth and Kinross can now recycle their unwanted bras to raise vital funds for breast cancer research, while at the same time helping the environment by reducing the amount of material being sent to landfill.

New eye-catching pink bra banks have been installed at various recycling centres in the local authority area, including the Kinross Recycling Centre.

There are 32 Breast Cancer Now bra banks across Scotland. For every tonne of bras donated, £200 will go towards Breast Cancer Now's world-class research.

Through the partnership between councils and recycling specialists Nathan's Wastesavers, bras will either be upcycled into new materials - including carpets, purses and textiles - or start a new life on the other side of the world in developing countries.

Kinross-shire Community Volunteer Awards

Partners from the Kinross-shire Community Learning and Development Group worked together with members of the community to organise the very first Kinross-shire Community Volunteer Awards event, which took place on Wednesday 28 September at Loch Leven Community Campus. Taste of farming for primary school pupils

Over 150 schoolchildren from the Kinross catchment area experienced a taste of farming in September thanks to a Food and Farming day set up by the Royal Highland Education Trust (RHET) Perth & Kinross and sponsored by the Scottish Government.

The Dawes Family kindly opened up the Hilton of Aldie farm gates for the event, which provided an educational experience for pupils by teaching them about elements of local farming and food production. The Dawes family are passionate about the subject and used to opening their farm to the public through Open Farm Sunday.

The day started with an excellent sheep dog demonstration from local farmer Alan Sim. Then pupils took part in six different workshops in line with the Scottish Curriculum for Excellence, from "milking" Daisy (RHET's life-size fibreglass cow) to handling a deer carcass.

The farmers-for-a-day also enjoyed spotting the queen bee in an observation hive, sorting potatoes, putting sheep through a handling system, making butter and playing spin-the-wheel to learn about the health benefits of red meat.

The animals on the farm were also a popular attraction, with Mickey the donkey, the pygmy goats and the five-day-old piglets amongst the favourites! Bron Wright, President of The Scottish Beekeepers' Association, said: "The hands-on approach provided by RHET gave the children a wonderful opportunity to experience close up, not only honey bees, but a variety of farm animals and farming practices too."

Alix Ritchie, RHET Perth and Kinross coordinator, explains: "Food & Farming Days provide an excellent

opportunity for children to learn about food production. I believe it is really important to teach children about where their food comes from and how it reaches their plates. The Food and Farming day wouldn't be possible without all of our volunteers and I am grateful to all of them, especially the Dawes family who hosted the event, for all their continued support in championing this cause."



Local Democracy at Work

I am a huge fan of local people having a say in what happens in their area.

I do my best to attend as many community council meetings as I can and often send



Portmoak CC, whose area includes Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell, raised the issue of pedestrian safety in the two villages with the four local councillors. Site visits were organised and officers were tasked with identifying potential solutions.

When drawings were submitted to us, we asked that they be shared with the community, so we could hear what people thought of them. These drawings came up at the recent Portmoak CC meeting which was attended by approximately 70 members of the public.

The proposal revolved around introducing traffic lights to both villages, thereby allowing the pavements to be widened. I was truly impressed at the debate which ensued; it was civilised, focussed and very well informed.

Whilst the concept of traffic lights was unanimously rejected by the meeting, I did come away with a plethora of ideas of smaller measures which could be implemented to help make the pavements in both Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell safer. They say that two brains are better than one; well in this case, 80 brains are even better.

B9097 Route Action Plan

In this vein, on behalf of the four local members, I also recently circulated an Action Plan relating to the B9097, which runs from Blairingone past Vane Farm and Cleish to Drum. It is recognised as a fast road, with issues along it. Hopefully, this action plan will be discussed at the Community Council meetings in November and I would welcome as much feedback on the proposals as possible, so feel free to come along and give your views.

Kinross and Earn Action Partnership

Finally, on this subject, and as mentioned in my previous articles for this Newsletter, five Action Partnerships have now been formed in Perth and Kinross.

These action partnerships have the task of identifying what the key priorities are in their respective areas for tackling inequalities and to create an Action Plan for dealing with them.

At the first meeting of the Kinross and Earn Action Partnership, we were asked three questions.

These were:

- Commuters time poor for community work
- Adult Education
- Lack of venues and drop-ins for young people
- Campus facilities
- Links with other local authorities to support young people
- Wages for young people
- Low wage economy
- Footpaths linked up
- Safe cycle routes
- Better rural broadband
- Lack of local employment
- Cost of local and national transport
- Mental health provision
- Hospital services and ambulance times
- Home care services
- Timing of buses
- Planning decisions recognising local views

Forward Planning

I and my fellow Ward Councillors met with Officers from Forward Planning in September to discuss the Main Issues Report consultation responses from Kinross-



shire for Local Development Plan 2 (LDP2). The timetable for producing LDP2 has had to be revised. This is because Councillors cannot consider the proposed LDP2 until the next strategic development plan (Tayplan) has been examined by the Directorate for Planning and Environmental Appeals. The proposed LDP2 will not be considered by Elected Members until after the next Local Authority Elections and post the summer recess of 2017. This delay in the process will facilitate opportunity for further community consultations and I would particularly highlight the following:

Parking

Council Officers are working on a draft parking survey for Kinross. If anyone has suggestions for land that could be used for additional parking, these would be welcome; not just in Kinross but other settlements also.

Vision Statements

Local Elected Members would like to have these prepared for Kinross-shire settlements, especially a masterplan for Kinross and Milnathort that is long overdue. Forward planning say this will require significant resources to produce and will hold discussions on budgets etc with the Senior Management Team. In the meantime, the community might find the "Place Standard" tool interesting. (See www.placestandard.scot)

Potential for development in Fossoway

Housing at Blairingone – identifying a wide settlement boundary to include land to the south with a cap on 30 homes over the LDP period would give maximum flexibility for community and landowners.

Housing at Crook of Devon – a new housing development east of the village hall could assist with a roundabout at the A977/B9097 junction, which would be of community benefit, along with footway and crossing improvements, etc.

Rumbling Bridge – local Elected Members would like to see a pathway connection to the gorge alongside the northern edge of the Nursing Home, though to achieve this some roadside housing development may be necessary within an adjusted settlement boundary.

Dear Brian and Daryl

I refer to two matters viz:

1. Pedestrian safety in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell

Re your assessment on the above, presented to local members at our Ward meeting on 29 September; this was discussed at a packed meeting of residents at the Portmoak CC meeting on 11 October 2016. I would summarise from my notes the following:

- Almost universal opposition to traffic lights in either village
- Some scepticism as to whether or not build-outs are the answer, given sightlines
- Support for substantial village gateway entrances, along with consideration of 20mph speed limits along with "smiley" signs
- Consideration as to widening footpaths on one side of the road only, with a possible crossing point
- Changed priorities at Leslie Road junction in Scotlandwell
- Reconsider re-classification of the A911 and introduce signage that the road is unsuitable for HGV's, except for local access
- There was concern expressed that any scheme should not impact on the viability of the garage and shop in Kinnesswood

The presence of one of yourselves at the next CC meeting, when the B9097 action plan will also be discussed, could be helpful, if the CC agree?

2. A977 Speed Limit between Turfhills and Balado crossroads

As you are aware, both this stretch of road and the road between Scotlandwell and Auchmuirbridge receives repeated requests for speed limits, supported by local members, rejected by yourselves. I note your reply to Sandra Caldow's email of the 4th instant re the A977. I wonder if you are aware that there are 3 *current* planning applications covering 26 houses on part of the West Balado site H51 in our LDP, along with 8 houses recently consented at Beaufield in Balado, that will double the size of the settlement, if approved (Case Officer, John Russell) so I suggest now is the right moment to reexamine your department's intransigence on this speed limit issue; in my view there is a strong argument for either a 40 or 50mph speed limit from west of Balado crossroads past the quarry exit and B road junction to the new Turfhills speed sign.

In order to **construct a build-out**, a temporary traffic regulation order will apply to this road for **two weeks**, starting on **11 November 2016**.

The order will temporarily promote the suspension of parking and loading on both sides of the carriageway on the A922 South Street from its junction with Church Street to its junction with The Fairways.

Roadworks: Cleish

B9097 from A977 Crook of Devon to Mawmill Farm

In order to undertake carriageway reconstruction works, a traffic regulation order will affect this road for **four weeks**, starting on **14 November**.

The order will prohibit vehicular traffic on the **B9097** from its junction with the A977 Crook of Devon to its junction with the private access to Mawmill Farm, a distance of 4.23 kilometres or thereby. Pedestrian and Emergency Vehicle access to premises will be maintained.

Cleish high-speed broadband one step closer

Residents in the Cleish area are being encouraged to register their support for a new high-speed broadband system. CleishNET, a small group of volunteers, is looking at the option of installing a closed wireless network which could bring speeds of up to 30Mbs and more to homes and businesses in the area.

CleishNET believes that a wireless solution provided by a specialist operator is the best option, but says that it can only happen if there is enough support from residents.

Neil Freshwater, who lives at Cockairney Feus and is involved with the project, said: "We hope to bring a service to Cleish which enables high-speed internet access. We have already seen the neighbouring exchanges of Kinross and Fossoway being upgraded to fibre while Cleish is left behind. Due to its small size of around 134 properties, and various technical issues, upgrading the Cleish Hills exchange is expensive and it is unlikely that anything will happen soon, despite government and BT targets nationally. So we've looked at what we can do ourselves and working with a local broadband provider to build a bespoke system seems to be the best current option." Community wireless broadband functions by using a very small receiver which is fitted to a property's exterior, creating a closed wireless connection to the nearest high-speed fibre mainline, instead of using cable from an exchange or cabinet. No phone line is needed and users can even operate their current house phone through the system. It is also expected that the monthly cost would be no more, or even less, than is currently being paid to the likes of BT.

Community councillor Fran Gillespie, who is also involved with CleishNET, added: "This is a real opportunity to bring fast broadband to Cleish sooner that people might think, but this is a community-led project which needs support from residents if it is to become a reality. Once we know that there is enough support in principle we can put together the detailed financial and logistic plans to get the ball rolling. This will also enable us to apply for a number of public grants that are available for such projects to help with installation costs." Not only would the new system help those on the Cleish Hills exchange, but CleishNET have said that those connected to nearby fibre exchanges, but still suffer slow speeds due to their rural location, could also benefit.

Until 2018 there is a rolling exhibition at the Kinross (Marshall) Museum on the Great War, telling of some of the events and people of 100 years ago. The museum display is adjacent to the library at the community campus.



First World War Timeline 1916

Bogus workmen warning

PKC Trading Standards Service have had reports of bogus workmen cold calling at the doors of P&K residents offering to carry out various types of maintenance work, including gardening, on their properties.

Trading Standards strongly advise that residents DO NOT enter into contracts with people calling at their door. Often, once paid, the bogus workmen will disappear without doing any work. If they do carry out work it is often of very poor quality and costs the consumer even more to have the poor work rectified.

Often doorstep criminals prey on the most vulnerable people in society, often conning them out of thousands of pounds. To help particularly vulnerable residents, Trading Standards and Police Scotland run a Nominated Neighbour Scheme, where vulnerable residents do not have to interact with doorstep callers but direct them to a neighbour who will verify the callers' identity. Information can be found on the Police Scotland website or by calling 101 or the Councils' call centre on 01738 476476.

Residents can also protect themselves by putting a 'no cold calling' sticker on their door to try to deter the cold callers. Stickers can be obtained from the Council by contacting the call centre on 01738 476476

PKC Trading Standards' aim is to inform local residents about scams and bogus callers operating in the area.

Kinross Community Council News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 5 October 2016 were: CCllrs B Freeman (Chair), E Thomas (Secretary), M Blyth, D Colliar, B Davies, I Jack and T Stewart. CCllr D MacKenzie joined the meeting during Planning. Also in attendance were: P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and M Barnacle and four member of the public.

Apologies: CCllrs MacKenzie (arrived late, see above), J Bryson, M Scott and D West; and P&K Cllrs J Giacopazzi and W Robertson.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police Report: No police present. Sgt Nicolson replied regarding cut out figures. A "Pop Up Bob" costs £190. She is checking data from other areas to see if these make a positive difference. The Area Commander's bulletins were noted.

Hearing Loop: No word back from PKC yet.

Entertainment Licence consultation: Cllr Cuthbert was told that Police, Fire, Planning and Environment Services are consulted and the applicant puts up a site notice for 21 days so any member of the public can object.

Queen's tree: CCllr Colliar reported on contact with PKC's Richard Brough, who offered PKC's services. CCllr Colliar will clarify whether PKC would meet the cost of supplying the trees.

Action Partnership: Cllr Cuthbert reported on a forum of Kinross-shire ward CCs held on 27 September. CCllr MacKenzie was chosen to represent them on the Action Partnership for Kinross-shire and Almond & Earn.

Grass cutting at Burnbank: Cllr Cuthbert thought the difference in cutting regimes between the north and south sides of the road may be due to different bodies carrying out the maintenance (Mitie and PKC).

KHS pupil access to shops/litter: The KHS head teacher had responded to the CC's query, saying: "Pupils at Kinross High School are expected to be on Campus during the school day. The only exception to this is if they are absent or have an appointment and have signed out of school. At break time pupils do not have permission to be off Campus and we have asked local retailers to support these arrangements. Pupils are free to make their own arrangements at lunch time and can freely leave the Campus at this time." Cllr Cuthbert

thought there was more litter in the Lathro area following the opening of the new convenience store. More bins are required. CCllr Davies pointed out that there is currently no bin at the skate park.

Review of campuses: Cllr Cuthbert said at the September CC meeting that PKC is seeking to make savings across the community campuses. An email had been sent to 17 P&K Community Councils on 8 September giving the opportunity to complete a questionnaire by a deadline of 21 September. CCllr Thomas wondered if this was the only public consultation. She had heard before the consultation deadline that the events manager at the campus had already been served notice of redundancy. The CC found this regrettable. It was agreed that the Secretary would write a letter to the Head of Education and Children's Services.

Poppyscotland: An article about the need for a new volunteer was placed in the October Newsletter. A volunteer had already come forward.

Kinross Strategy or Vision: Cllrs Barnacle and Cuthbert reported on a meeting the ward councillors had held with Peter Marshall (PKC Forward Planning). Mr Marshall will consult with PKC's senior management team regarding a budget for a new Kinross Strategy. A paper is due to go before the Enterprise & Infrastructure Committee regarding Kinross town centre. The possibility of inviting someone from PKC to visit the CC to give feedback on the CC's submission to the Main Issues Report was raised again. The CC will discuss this again at the November meeting.

Town Centre Regeneration: The Secretary submitted a detailed letter regarding the failings of the redesigned High Street to the Chief Executive. The Secretary also invited Willie Young to take part in a site visit. Coincidentally, the Scottish Parliament has begun considering a petition to the Petitions Committee requesting a moratorium on all shared space schemes until safety issues have been addressed. The Women and Equalities Committee at Westminster is also looking at this matter.

New Primary School: Site work will take place during the October holidays.

Community Council News

The CC discussed the three planning applications for houses at Balado. The applicant for two of the applications was present. Two Balado residents were present and expressed their concerns regarding the expected increase in vehicular traffic and the effect on safety as there is no pavement from the A977. After discussion it was agreed that the CC would submit comments, requesting that it be made a condition on consent of the three applications that a footpath and lighting from the A977 to Middle Balado House is enabled.

Planning Correspondence and Other Planning Matters

Local Development Plan: Due to delays with TAYplan, PKC's proposed LDP2 will probably not go to a Council meeting until after summer recess 2017. Following that, it will be published for public consultation.

Beaufield, Balado: Cllr Cuthbert informed the meeting that the application for eight houses (ref 16/01996/FLL) was approved at the DMC meeting of 14 September.

Lathro Farm: Cllr Cuthbert informed the meeting that the application for 300 houses (ref 15/01512/FLM) was approved at the DMC meeting of 14 September. He explained that since 40 houses allocated to the Forth Wines site could not be built due to flood risk, 300 dwellings at Lathro Farm was considered acceptable. (The LDP had stated a figure of 260 for the Lathro Farm site, 140 of which could be built up to the year 2024.) There will be affordable social houses for rent, in two or three places on the site. He also said that the new Kinross Primary School is the reason the developer was

given consent for 300 houses now rather than 140 up to the year 2024. CCllr Thomas asked why the Report of Handling states "the development is considered to comply with the current Development Plan". She suggested that it would be more accurate to say that it does not comply, but there are material considerations which make departure appropriate (i.e. the new school). Cllr Cuthbert replied that when the councillors make such points to the officers, they are told that figures in the LDP are merely "indicative".

Miscellaneous Correspondence

A summary of mail received since the last meeting had been circulated to community and ward councillors and was available to view at the meeting. **KCCNL Special Resolution**: Andersons LLP had sent this to be signed by relevant community councillors.

Reports by Perth & Kinross Councillors

Cllr Cuthbert reported the following:

He had been involved in trying to help the dance studio that had recently opened premises at **Kinross west**. PKC has provided a comfort unit until Scottish Water provides a water supply.

The **trees** that PKC had erroneously removed from the side of the **County Buildings** (Liberty Business Centre) will be replaced in the next two to three weeks.

A series of meetings involving relevant organisations has taken place regarding **youth anti-social behaviour** locally. The police will be focussing on preventing such behaviour in the run up to Halloween.

Cllr Barnacle:

Councillors and Planning: Cllr Barnacle praised the efforts of Cllr Cuthbert who had written to Nick Brian (PKC Planning) regarding developer contributions. Cllr Cuthbert suggested that Kinross-shire should have a developer contribution per house towards a general infrastructure fund, similar to a scheme for Auchterarder.

Rural transport: Following the recent reduction in bus services, he hopes the need for initiatives on rural transport can be stressed via the new Area Partnership.

40mph zone: Turfhills now has a 40mph zone.

Milnathort Community Council News from the October Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 13 October 2016 were: CCllrs Baudains (Chair), Heneghan (Sec), Kirkham, Williams, Lawson, Cartwright and Bolland; PKC Cllrs Giacopazzi and Barnacle and police.

Apologies: CCllr Young, PKC Cllrs Robertson and Cuthbert. Police Matters: PCs Karen Judge and Shona McGregor reported the theft of a generator from Meikle Seggie Farm, and asked members of the public to come forward with any information that might help with their enquiries. The Chair reported that vehicles are abusing the one-way system on Victoria Avenue. Lisa Cartwright reported that residents are being disturbed late at night by people knocking on doors, and throwing eggs and other objects at their homes. The police officers advised that they were taking this seriously and asked that residents should call 101 to report incidents. The police are also asking local shops not to sell eggs to youngsters, as they may be using them for this purpose.


Provision of Public Toilets: The Thistle Hotel offers the village "comfort scheme". After a brief discussion about availability of toilets, Mike Barnacle undertook to establish the level of funding provided by PKC. Alternative venues had been informally explored, but it was agreed that, as the only hotel, the Thistle was the most appropriate venue.

Jessie's Park: A gate has been installed.

Speeding: CCllr Kirkham has reported issues of speeding on Back Loan to the Police and Roads Dept, and the matter has now been passed to the local Community Constable.

Storage containers: Members of the public had reported to the CC that four storage containers had been sited at the yard in Stirling Road, despite planning permission for 14 containers having been refused. Cllr Giacopazzi has asked PKC planning officers to investigate.

Milnathort Old Folks Association (MOFA): At September's meeting, Dorothy Thomson advised that the MOFA was facing closure due to the resignation of some long serving volunteers. The MCC published this on its Facebook page, website, in the minutes. As a result, The Boathouse at Loch Leven kindly offered to provide Christmas lunch to the members of the Association and to provide transport to and from the venue free of charge. Elyse Kirkham has advised the MOFA to contact the Kinross-shire Fund about the possibility of funding for their summer outing. Post meeting note: The new MOFA committee has decided not to accept the Boathouse offer but to continue providing Christmas lunch in our Town Hall.



Community Council News

Pace Hill Woodland: Cllr Giacopazzi advised that he had raised the subject of protecting the woodland, and that the Perth Office of the Woodland Trust would be investigating.

Dogs in Donaldson Park: Cllr Giacopazzi advised that he was in discussion with PKC about fencing off the play area in Donaldson Park to prevent dog fouling.

Defibrillator: CCllr Heneghan advised that a defibrillator would cost around £1500. The MCC discussed suitable locations for a device. Kevin agreed to continue to research this.

Best Kept Village: Milnathort won the BKV award and the cup and certificate were on show at the meeting.

Action Partnership: CCllrs Heneghan and Lawson attended a meeting about forming Local Action Partnerships (LAP). David MacKenzie, Kinross CC, agreed to represent the Kinross-shire and Almond & Earn CCs. The LAP met on 6 October and a report is awaited.

Pace Hill Development: No planning application has been submitted yet. Concerns were raised relating to provision of suitable access, road safety, sewage and drainage, and bridge strength at the entrance to Wester Loan. Cllr Barnacle advised that although the Local Plan stated up to 50 houses, the numbers are merely indicative.

Planning applications submitted: none received

Planning applications determined: Alterations to 5 Tillyrie Mains and to Hilton of Burleigh House have been approved by PKC.

Fairtrade: Karena Jarvie, Chair, P&K Fairtrade Steering Group, informed the CC how to develop the principle of Fair Trade in local businesses and asked the CC to support Perth & Kinross becoming a Fairtrade Zone. The CC agreed.

Communications: Lisa Cartwright updated the CC on progress with communications/information provision. This included:

- working with "Broke not Broken"
- the provision of MCC Information Folders in the Community Campus Library and Milnathort Church Office

 these contain information on how to contact us, minutes, agendas, meeting dates and how to access planning information on publicly available computers.
- Residents can keep up to date with MCC progress via Facebook, Twitter or website, by attending monthly CC meetings and Community Notice Boards.

In June 2016 MCC used social media to gauge residents and dog owners requirements. Cllr Robertson and Lisa Cartwright have been working with the local dog warden to investigate whether additional bins and an increased dog warden presence would help improve matters. There were multiple requests from dog owners that a bin should be located at Webster's field. A map of Milnathort showing the location of every bin is being prepared for the MCC Facebook page and website. Local businesses provide free dog-waste bags.

Denis Hearsum, Animal Welfare Officer, PKC, has informed us that there are almost 40 dog-waste bins in Milnathort; he believes that this quantity is ample. Webster's field is private land so PKC cannot install bins there. PKC is gradually changing to dual purpose bins which can be used to deposit both litter and dog waste. He believes that the problem is that dog walkers do not use the bins properly. He asked for any information about offenders.

The Chair thanked Lisa for her major contribution to MCC business.

Roadways: On 7 November improvements to the zebra crossing on South Street will be undertaken. This will include construction of a build-out on the eastern side to increase visibility and shorten crossing distances. The work is expected to take 5-10 working days to complete. Temporary lights and parking/loading restrictions will be required to allow the works to proceed.

Football clubhouse: Brian Kenny presented proposals for Kinross Colts to develop a changing room facility and club building in Donaldson/Orwell Park. He showed plans and the MCC discussed these. There was a strong feeling that the building was too large and should be restricted to changing rooms only. There were also concerns about a proposed leasing application for the park. MCC agreed to ask the public in the MCC area to express their views on the development so that we can present a community view as and when a formal planning application is made. Accordingly, a survey canvassing the community's views will be published on the MCC website, Facebook page and Twitter account. A dedicated page to keep residents up to date with this potential application can be found on the MCC website.

Perth & Kinross Councillors' Comments

Cllr Barnacle advised that further consultations on the Local Development Plan would be delayed until next year.

Cllr Giacopazzi advised that although PKC had made cuts of £7.9 million in its budget for FY17/18, further cuts could be expected.

The Next Meeting of Milnathort CC will take place on Thursday 10 November 2016 at 7.30pm at Milnathort Town Hall.

Portmoak Community Council News from the October Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 11 October 2016 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), R Cairncross (Secretary), B Calderwood (Treasurer), D Morris, A Robertson and T Smith; Ward Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert, and J Giacopazzi; and in excess of 70 members of the public.

Apologies: CCllrs S Forde and C Vlasto; and Ward Cllr W Robertson.

Approval of previous minutes: The draft Minute of the meeting held in August 2016 was approved subject to:

- Item 3.3.8.1 should read, "It was noted that PKC agreed that there was an obstruction and would liaise with the police."
- Item 7.1 Police: should read, "Police Scotland volunteers will be visiting local shops to give advice on the sale of flour and eggs on the lead up to Halloween which can often see a rise in youth anti-social behaviour."

Bus Transport in Portmoak: Concerns about changes in arrangements for the school bus service to and from Scotlandwell together with associated changes to the service 201 bus had been acknowledged by Ward Councillors. A meeting with PKC Officials had been sought.

Police: The following amendments were accepted in respect of the Police report.

- Police Scotland is supportive of community driven speedwatch initiatives and the police involvement in such community initiatives is being formalised in guidance which is currently being drafted. Once the guidance is drafted, if communities are interested in Police Scotland supporting their local community speedwatch initiative, they can contact their local Community Co-ordinator.
- A new local policing model will be implemented in Perth and Kinross before the end of the year.

Pavements within Kinnesswood

Ward Councillors explained that they had asked officers to consider how to ensure pedestrian safety on pavements within both Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell. The proposals circulated subsequently were preliminary, radical and designed to promote discussion. It was important to find out at this stage what the community thought before further work was undertaken. The introduction of 20mph speed limits within the Portmoak settlements was a separate matter and had yet to be determined.

There are approximately 3,500 vehicle movements each weekday on the A911 of which 16 are articulated HGVs, 32 other HGVs and 221 2-axle trucks or buses.

In Kinnesswood there were particular difficulties with HGVs meeting on Main Street where they frequently required to mount the narrow pavements to pass. This meant that they were passing close to the front doors of many homes. Houses were being damaged both from vehicles hitting rain water pipes and from vibration. Listed buildings were at risk. Further, pedestrian safety could not be guaranteed.

In considering the *traffic lights as proposed*. There was a unanimous view that these were not acceptable. This felt like a "heavy urban solution" where the costs outweigh the benefits. There would be significant problems in managing traffic flow over such a long stretch of traffic-light controlled single track. For example: would it be possible to gain ready access to and from some 32 properties; how would bulk

deliveries to these properties be effected. At busy times traffic would queue at either end and pass through in a convoy with as a consequence increased noise and traffic pollution in the vicinity of the lights. There was a real danger that the viability of the shop and garage would be compromised. The specific needs of emergency services and of large agricultural machinery would need to be assessed.

Alternative solutions some of which together could form an acceptable package:

- speed reduction to 20mph through the village, backed up with appropriate warning electronic signs.
- discourage drivers from accelerating to pass certain buildouts particularly at the periphery of villages.
- diverting HGVs as far as practicable from the A911 (this would require appropriate signage).
- build-outs at particular pinch points to safeguard pedestrians.
- escorts for certain large agricultural vehicles.
- possible railings to protect pedestrians.
- look at Fife to see examples of innovative solutions.

Pavements within Scotlandwell

Traffic light proposals. Much of the analysis and the solutions replicated the findings already set out for Kinnesswood and have not been repeated.

However, the proposed traffic light solution being threeway was more complex. Like the Kinnesswood proposal it was unanimously rejected for many of the same reasons. Additionally it would mean: relocating bus halts particularly at the entrance to Well Road; easy entry and exit to the Well Inn could be compromised; and it could lead to traffic, once through the lights, speeding up through the village.

Alternative solutions some of which together could form an acceptable package were also similar to those for Kinnesswood:

- a 20mph speed limit through the village would be welcomed.
- HGVs should be discouraged from transiting the village (this would require a careful evaluation of relevant signage).
- reversal of road priority at the Leslie Road junction to reduce speed should be evaluated.
- villages should have a "gateway" signalling entry to a different area.
- reclassification of the B9097 to an A classification should be explored.
- a mini-roundabout about or a "shared space" arrangement did not find support.

It was noted that prolonging time along a route was likely to be an effective way of discouraging Sat Nav driven transit vehicles.

Arrangements to improve the pavement leading from the village to the Church and beyond. There were no specific proposals to consider at this time. It remains a priority for the CC to make progress with this problem. Ward Councillors had had preliminary discussions with PKC officers on the matter. Further work would now be undertaken by PKC looking at options to provide an improved and safe pedestrian route from the village up to the Church Hall and beyond.

It was recognised that this was a separate matter from the proposal for traffic lights with pavement improvements within the village. It would be helpful to have a coherent solution that addressed both issues.

Car Parking within Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood

The problem of very limited car public parking within both Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood was recognised and had been raised by Ward Councillors at their recent meeting with PKC officers. The CC was invited to make the case for such parking and to suggest possible sites. It was noted that the need for parking is not necessarily governed by the same considerations in the two villages.

It was confirmed that there will be a meeting on 27 October of officials, ward councillors and local representatives to consider specific car parking issues around Portmoak School.

A Strategy and Vision for Portmoak

The CC was working towards a statement setting out a Strategy and Vision for Portmoak on which it would consult. This would be useful in communicating our priorities to PKC and other national bodies. To that end it had gained preliminary and positive experience with a tool for garnering opinion across the community: "Place Standard." It would now approach other Portmoak groups to take their views and from their input work toward a Portmoak Vision and Strategy. Reports

Police: There was no Police Report. The Commander's Bulletins of 15, 22 and 29 September and 6 October were noted

Treasurer: There was minimal in-month change. The General Account at the end of September was £671.40, while the Michael Bruce Way account was £919.51 giving a total of funds on hand of £1,590.91.

Planning:

Roads: CCIIr Calderwood had recently circulated an updated CC Roads Report and key matters from that had already been discussed. PKC had also just circulated proposals for a B9097 Action Plan (South Loch Road). This will be discussed at the November meeting of the CC. The CC had written to support

proposed plans to introduce 20/30mph speed limits on (U243) Dryside Road from Wester Balgedie past Glenlomond to the Fife Border.

Paths: The Paths Group will monitor how their hard work over the summer stands up to the worst of the winter weather. A programme of future work was in preparation which will include improvements to the Dryside Road between Easter Balgedie and where it joins the road to Glenlomond.

Arrangements at Whitecraigs and Stephen's Field consequent on the departure the developer

CC representatives had met with Bishopshire Golf Club to review the extensive and tall mainly cyprus hedge that bordered the core path leading from the A911 up to Stephen's Field. As this may in due course become the responsibility of the CC it was important to know the views of the Golf Club. It was agreed that the way forward was for the CC to secure specialist advice on options for its management.

PKC Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr D Cuthbert: reported on the establishment of the Kinross-shire, Almond and Earn Action Partnership which had recently held its first meeting. The Partnership has a small budget and will address "local inequalities." The Kinross-shire Forum of Community Councils had appointed a community councillor to the new Action Partnership. This will ensure a direct link between community councils and the Partnership. He also reported on work with the police looking at a variety of strategies to moderate speeding.

Cllr M Barnacle: reported that because of delays in the parallel Tayplan Programme the timetable for publishing LDP2 had slipped and it would not now be published until the autumn of 2017. He explained that the four Kinross Ward Councillors had secured a commitment to include a report on the existing Kinross-shire infrastructure capacity and its ability to support planned growth. The result would be included in a report to accompany LDP2.

Cllr J Giacopazzi: explained that PKC had identified how it would sustain finances over the medium term (three years). However, since the Brexit referendum it was now apparent that a number of adverse financial pressures would lead to an estimated short fall of an additional £5.7M. It was not currently clear how this is to be managed.

Other Business

Report of Kinross Forum meeting on **Action Partnerships** and of a first meeting of the Kinross/Almond and Earn Partnership. CC representatives had participated in a meeting of the Forum of Kinross-shire CCs and recommended a representative to the new Action Partnership for Kinross-shire, Almond and Earn. It was anticipated that there would be more frequent meetings of the Forum to ensure effective dialogue between the new Partnership and community councils.

Request sought to support the whole of Perth and Kinross as a **Fair Trade Zone**. The CC agreed to support the proposed Perth and Kinross Fair Trade Zone.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 8 November in Portmoak School.

Fossoway & District CC

News from the October Meeting

CC roles: Now that we have one new member of the CC it is possible, and necessary to avoid some duplication of roles, to identify the responsibilities of each of the current CC members:

Trudy Duffy: Chair and Data Controller;

Graham Pye: Treasurer, Vice-chair and Minutes Secretary Jennifer Donachie: Secretary and Planning (Proposed: CCllr

Duffy; Seconded: CCIIr Pye)

Graham Kilby: Facebook and Community Liaison/Initiatives

Angus Cheape: Kinross-shire Fund **Declarations of interest:** None.

Police report: Unfortunately no officer was able to be present at the meeting. There were two incidents to note, received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch: during the weekend of Friday 9 September, a quantity of red diesel was stolen from a tractor which was parked within the car park belonging to Powmill Milk bar; Sometime between 2pm and 6.30pm Thursday 22 September, approximately 300kg of wheat was stolen from Arndean Farm, Blairhill, Rumbling Bridge.

Minutes of the previous meeting: The minutes were amended to correct the planning reference number for the application at land west of Devonlade, which should have been 16/01313/FLL rather than 16/01352/FLL. This was also corrected in the Declarations of Interest.

Crook Moss travellers' site: Cllr Barnacle received an email from one of the residents asking for a meeting, which was held at the Village Hall, Cllr Cuthbert also attended. The site occupants stated their desire to integrate with the community and raised some concerns about rubbish disposal and water and power connections, which Cllrs agreed to help them with.

A977 defects and mitigation measures: Councillors had a meeting with the Roads department. Currently the department is trying to recruit an engineer to do the planning for the possible mitigation measures. The 40mph speed limit signs between Balado and the M90 have now been erected. Cllr Giacopazzi has been pursuing the problem with the dip in the road by Devonshaw Cottage, Powmill, but this is not yet fixed, and neither are the speed activated signs. It appears that there is some confusion as to whether these types of signs are the responsibility of the highways department or the street lighting department.

Speeding through villages: Speeding traffic is an ongoing problem throughout the area and efforts from this CC and our local councillors do not appear to have achieved any significant results. Perhaps the time has come to create a Community Partnership with the Police and PKC to try and address this issue. Cllr Cuthbert suggests that we try out "Police Cut-outs" at the entrance to villages where speed monitoring is already planned to take place and see if they have any effect. It's also possible that the new head of Police

Scotland may look favourably on Community Speed Watch schemes, and Councillors will be pressing for this.

Rumbling Bridge hydro scheme: The scheme is now operating and generating power, with last minute adjustments being made to optimise output. The official opening is on 28 October. On 29 October there will be an open afternoon centred on the Crook of Devon Village Hall.

The Community Benefit Group is due to hold its next meeting on Friday 7 October. A community engagement exercise will be taking place to determine what sort of grant applications will be received.

Crook and Drum Growing Together: A planting day will be held on the morning of 15 October.

Powmill in Bloom: A recent work party has done some planting and new planters have been created. The next planned activity is to improve the road verge outside the Milk Bar

Dunning Glen: Cllr Cuthbert has spoken to Sgt. Amanda Nicholson. The Police have been collecting car numbers at the site.

Sport Hub: The hub was officially launched on 17 Sept. Consultation has been held to assess local requirements, and this will be reviewed at the next meeting on 27 Oct.

A meeting of various local sports and community groups within Fossoway was held on 21 September, to set up a sub-group to the larger Sports Hub and to look how the sports field in Crook of Devon can be best used. There was a good level of interest from the existing clubs in the area. Cllr Barnacle adds that Sadie Watson of the Parents' Council has suggested a survey in Fossoway to assess demand for sports in this area.

Station Road adoption: Cllr Barnacle reports that PKC issued a notice of intention to adopt the road on 10 August. Two objections have been received. PKC can in fact proceed with the adoption in spite of objections, however this does not change the finance position, and as the objectors are unlikely to be willing to pay their share, the contribution from the other frontagers may have to increase, but VAT will not be payable.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle has received opinions that it would be possible to move the memorial without damage, although it would require a skilled mason to do it. If finance is the issue, then perhaps some funds might be available to help. Cllr Barnacle will contact Profile Projects once more.



Safer Route to School – Drum: A report on addressing the traffic problems with the B9097 will shortly be issued, that might help with this problem.

Ivy Cottage, Powmill: No update.

Bollards Opposite Crook Village Hall: Awaiting a report from PKC Roads Department on how the safety of this section of road could be improved.

Community Council Business

Meetings attended: CCIIr Kilby attended a meeting of the Sports Hub (see above); CCIIr Duffy attended a meeting to determine CC representation on Community Action Partnerships. CIIr Cuthbert explained that the aim of the partnerships is to address inequalities in the area. Inequalities covers a wide range of topics, including bus services, ambulance attendance times, speeding traffic, etc. Issues collected will be fed into the plans for NHS, PKC, Police, etc, across the area.

CC bank account: As previously explained the CC needs to open a new bank account in order to obtain online access. The account will continue to be with the TSB and the signatories will be CCIIr Graham Pye and CCIIr Trudy Duffy. All other attributes of the account will remain the same.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Cuthbert points out that tomorrow's full council meeting will be discussing the financial plan which is likely to contain very bad news.

Cllr Giacopazzi: Nothing not already reported above.

Clir Barnacle notes that progress on the new Local plan has been delayed, due to the late arrival of the Tay Plan, until later next year. This allows more time to organise a coherent local response to the plan.

Lomond Antiques and Collectors Club



Our October meeting was hosted by the speaker, Chris Walsh, who kept us enthralled as he recounted the story of the sinking of HMT Lancastria.

Cunard built the Lancastria on Clydeside and she started life as a passenger liner. However, being in New York in September 1939 on the day WW2 was declared, she was commandeered by the UK government, painted grey, and pressed into service as a troopship. She was bombed during enemy action on 17 June 1940 while over-crowded with services personnel and civilians. Though there were some survivors, the loss of life far exceeded the total losses of Titanic and Lusitania combined.

Chris and our hostess Marjory have been founding members of the Scottish group who have pressed for recognition of this 'forgotten tragedy'. A media blackout was imposed by Winston Churchill due to news the same day that France had capitulated to Hitler's Germany. Survivors were sworn to secrecy and many never spoke of it, even many years later. The families were never told how their relatives died. Due to the efforts of this group, medals were struck and presented, a monument has been erected in Clydebank and a memorial service held in St Nazaire this year. Governments of both political persuasions have consistently ignored this disaster for 75 years until a recent Chancellor of the Exchequer raised the issue in the House of Commons. A sad story but a very thought provoking evening. With thanks to Chris, Marjory and helper Gwyn.

Kinross & District Probus Club From party to party

The talk on Wednesday 21 September was given by Peter Reeve, a club member who was welcomed during the last session. His choice of



talk gave us food for thought but all became clear when he revealed that, for a large part of his career, he had served in the Royal Military Police. He had been posted to different parts of the world, with different skills and responsibilities, hence a party for each posting.

In fact Peter's army career got off to a discouraging start when his first attempt to enlist was turned down by the recruiting sergeant on the grounds that he was too young. However, encouraged by his father who had also served in the army, he was accepted a year later.

The first 'party' was a posting to the training establishment where he trained in the various functions and responsibilities of the Military Police (Provost Marshall) including a period at the military prison. The re-offending rate from the prison was very little, which was a reflection of the harsh regime.

His next posting was to London, where his responsibilities included royal protection. This period also saw the army drafted in to cover emergencies during a shipping strike in 1970.

The next posting was to Germany where the MPs were attached to 20 Armoured Brigade. This was front line soldiering with large tanks deployed along the iron curtain and constant surveillance of Soviet Bloc movements. It was during this posting that Peter had an accident on his motor bike.

Next task was to learn how to ski and, for this, he was deployed to Bavaria before going to Norway where he took part in an unusual exercise to copy the Telemark raid which was carried out during the Second World War. Telemark was the site of a heavy water plant where deuterium was being developed by the Germans for the development of nuclear bombs. The raiding party had to swim 'naked' in the freezing water of the river. This required extreme stamina as one can imagine.

Further postings were made to South Carolina in the United States and to Canada where he visited the silver jade training area in Alberta.

Bill Scott proposed a vote of thanks for a most interesting talk which gave us an insight into a varied military career.

Fife airfields

Our speaker on Wednesday 5 October was Mr Jim Miller, a qualified pilot who, from an early age, has shown an interest in aviation. His career began as an apprentice at the Royal Naval Air Station at Donibristle. Unfortunately, after six months, a

decision was made to close Donibristle. Jim transferred to Rosyth dockyard to complete his apprenticeship and thus missed his opportunity to have a career in the RAF. However, his interest in aviation continued, and his research into the history of aviation formed the basis of his talk.

James Tytler is thought to be a pioneer of flight in Scotland because of his interest in hot-air ballooning in the eighteenth century. He had a very varied career including a number of bankruptcies, at least five children and an addiction to alcohol which led to him drowning while under the influence. Various Scots experimented with non-powered flight using hang gliders and gliders. Preston Albert Watson conceived a method of controlling the lateral movement of a plane which was one of the difficulties encountered by the pioneers. His method involved a second wing fixed above the main wing which could be moved.

Unfortunately this became a trend and many of the early pioneering pilots were killed while test flying.

The turn of the century saw the growth of powered flight. Good landing grounds were needed and both the Army and the Navy became involved. Fighter planes, including sea planes, were developed during the First World War. Fields in Fife included Leuchars, Crail and Dunino. Others close to Fife included HMS Condor, Errol, Scone, Balado, Drem, East Fortune, RAF Turnhouse and Grangemouth. A Sea Base was formed at Woodhaven.

One of the more unusual bases was at Woodhaven on the banks of the Tay. This was on the site of the Mars ship which had served as a training ship for under privileged boys. Thus there was a readymade jetty to provide moorings for the Catalina aircraft which were crewed by a Squadron of Norwegian airmen.

A very interesting talk was well attended and well received.

Fairtrade chocolate on menu at Kinross-shire Partnership Breakfast

Just as the sonorous geese fill the Kinrossshire skies early each October while making

their way resolutely to their lochside winter quarters, so the area's entrepreneurial "larks" head — equally determinedly but overland — to Loch Leven's Larder for the first Kinrossshire Partnership Business Breakfast of the winter series.

So it was that Wednesday 5 October saw Chairman Alisdair Stewart welcoming attendees, including guest speaker Karena Jarvie from the Perth & Kinross Fairtrade Steering Group, to the customary stunning lochside venue for this month's networking event. Although the format had changed slightly (allowing guests to finish breakfast before the introductions began), the full LLL Scottish breakfast was of the usual fulsome quantity and exemplary standard.

After the last plate was cleared, networking facilitator Sid Grant invited the representatives from local businesses and organisations to introduce themselves and their product or service. The selection of services on offer was as eclectic as ever, ranging from the techy wizardry of cyber security to the delicate task of moving giant glass tabletops...

Rather than promoting their own operations, a couple of breakfasters chose to mention issues of importance to the local community, such as the work of *The Loch Leven Library Volunteers* — thanks to whom Kinross Library is the only one in the whole of Perth & Kinross still open on a Saturday afternoon. Also mentioned was the *Visit Loch Leven* steering group, which explores ways of attracting even more visitors to this beautiful part of Scotland.

One first-time breakfaster was the new sales and marketing manager of the Green Hotel Golf and Leisure Resort. The resort is planning a redevelopment programme, and she





invited constructive comments from local businesses and individuals as it embarks on P its rebranding process.

When Karena Jarvie took the floor, she described the valuable work of Fairtrade in supporting producers in developing

countries by ensuring they are paid a fair price for their goods, have safe working conditions and use responsible environmental practices. As both Traidcraft Representative for the Kinross-shire area and Chairperson of the Perth & Kinross Fairtrade Steering Group, Karena explained that while Kinross-shire was the first Fairtrade County in Scotland, and Perth one of the first Fairtrade Cities, Perth & Kinross has not yet achieved Fairtrade Zone status – a situation that Karena and her colleagues are working hard to address.

While many local businesses already stock Fairtrade products, Karena encouraged others to follow suit – whether by stocking chocolate or Traidcraft sugar sticks, buying Bala Sport footballs for local teams, deciding to buy Fairtrade coffee and tea for staff and displaying the Scottish Fair Trade Forum sticker, or simply retweeting and sharing posts on social media. She stressed that every type of support, no matter how small, is appreciated.

Rounding up, Alisdair Stewart mentioned that as Perth & Kinross Council has withdrawn its funding for the Partnership, the 2016/17 networking breakfast series may be the last. However, he stressed that the directors would be doing their utmost to persuade KPC to change their minds so that they may continue the work of the Partnership in supporting economic growth and tourism initiatives in the area. Meanwhile, the November breakfast will take place from 7.30am until 9am on **Wednesday 2 November** at Loch Leven's Larder. Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom Tomato Soup

Ingredients

- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 2 chopped onions
- 300g chopped carrots
- 500g diced potatoes
- 4 bay leaves
- 5 tbsp tomato puree
- 2 tbsp red or white wine vinegar
- 4 x 400g chopped tomatoes (or use your own)
- 500g passata
- 3 vegetable stock cubes
- 400ml whole milk

Method

Put the oil, onions, carrots, potatoes and bay leaves in a large saucepan. Fry gently till the onions are softened.

Stir in the tomato puree, vinegar, chopped tomatoes and passata then crumble in the stock cube. Add one litre of boiling water and simmer for 15 minutes, then remove the bay leaves. Blend it till very smooth. The soup can now be cooled and chilled for a couple of days or frozen.

To serve, reheat, stir in the milk but don't let it boil. This would be lovely to serve at your bonfire party.

Kinross High School



At Kinross High School we have been involved in a number of activities designed to inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers. We have been focusing on STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) and developing curriculum pathways which include opportunities to study beyond traditional subjects and in partnership with industry. These pathways include the Science Baccalaureate (S6), Science Group awards (S4) and an accelerated learning programme DEC! for S2 pupils. We have also hosted a STEM day, which was developed in partnership with Aero Space Kinross (ASK) and have provided taster sessions for local primary pupils. Our first ever STEM day was organised by ASK and funded by the Institute of Physics. Throughout the school day on Thursday 22 September, pupils at Kinross High School were given the opportunity to explore interactive exhibits and displays from Glasgow Caledonian University, Air Service Training, Skills Development Scotland, Met Office, Mission Aviation Fellowship,

Vector Aerospace, British Gliding Association, Scottish Gliding Centre, University of Highlands and Islands, University of St Andrews, Royal Air Force and Glasgow Science Centre. Around 200 S2 pupils were given the whole day to properly explore everything on offer and also take advantage of the careers theming and advice offered by Skills Development Scotland and their invited guest graduate. Other pupils could drop in during breaks and free periods.

During the morning, ASK also created a taster session for 166 pupils from the seven main feeder primary schools. These pupils had time in the University of St Andrews Planetarium and enjoyed bottle rocket experiments with the University of Highlands and Islands.

Kinross High School is pleased to have formed a sustainable partnership with ASK and after the success of STEM Day, we hope to run a yearly event.

In the evening, ASK took the opportunity to undertake a public consultation and project update to a 'full house' in the Campus Lecture Theatre. We were also privileged to hear from Professor Andrew Rae with a very enjoyable and informative talk entitled 'What Goes Up Might Come Down'.

Our science department are always keen to welcome pupils from our local primary schools to help develop enthusiasm within young learners for science activities. In the last year we have organised visits from, or trips to, most of the local primary schools and even a nursery.

On 5 October, P3 pupils from Milnathort Primary came to do some science at Kinross High School. They had been studying George's Marvellous Medicine by Roald Dahl and were keen to look at chemical reactions and dissolving. They came to the science laboratory and made slime, looked at nappy polymer dissolving water and a variety of fizzes, colour changes and pops. At the end of the day there was an explosion and a warning not to make their own medicines at home!



Portmoak Community Woodland

It's been one of the busiest autumns the Portmoak Community Woodland Group can remember - and we're not finished yet.

There was a successful apple identification day in our community orchard on 2 October with around 80 people coming along to have their apples identified by our popular expert Andrew Lear, aka appletreeman, from Bankfoot in Perthshire. Andrew also brought his apple press so we were able to turn bagfuls of apples into fantastic juice.

Pupils from Kinross High School provided delicious teas and managed to raise £195 towards their trip to Madagascar next summer. They are going there with World Challenge, an organisation which sends teams of young people to developing countries to help with community projects or voluntary work. We also had a wonderful batch of toffee apples, made by Florence Thomson of Scotlandwell.

The weather was lovely but it was still nice to have a small marquee, provided by Scotlandwell in Bloom, as a focal point for all the activities. This included an interactive quiz for the children and saw them running up and down the orchard.

Meanwhile, over in Portmoak Moss, there has been a huge amount of work, with contractors 'profiling' the steep sides of the peat dome to prevent them collapsing as the bog becomes increasingly waterlogged. The funding was provided mainly by the Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership, with contributions from PCWG and Woodland Trust Scotland, who helped pay for refurbishment of the main steps. Observant walkers will have noticed that the contractors have managed to block the flow of water from the west end of the peat dome, which should also help the restoration project.

Portmoak Moss will be the venue for a **Bird Walk** at 9.30am on **Saturday 5 November** with Scott Patterson of 'Kinrossecology' and Perthshire bird recorder.

Since we last had Scott guide us round the Moss identifying all the birds we saw (and a few we didn't see), a lot has changed. The Moss has settled down since we took the trees off and mulched the top, which has made the whole thing much wetter. Some of the birds we see now were not in Scott's first survey, Snipe for instance. We definitely have more Green Woodpeckers and Owls. Whether you know the Moss or not, please join us starting at the Scotlandwell entrance. Boots and binoculars are all you need, on top of your outdoor clothing! For everything else, Scott or our Portmoak volunteers will be there to answer your questions. **Book your place** by giving Stuart a phone on 01592 840825.

Kinross-shire Civic Trust held an evening event to celebrate the 2016 awards for the Best Kept Villages and to present an Architectural Award for a new build project completed over the last five years and is pleased to announce the results.

Devon, who the judges were very pleased to have back in the competition. Keltybridge and Maryburgh were the winner in the Best Kept Hamlet competition and drew praise from the judges for the obvious tidiness of the public areas showing a positive

Best Kept Village Awards

2016 was the 50th Anniversary of the Kinross-shire Best Kept Village Competition and the Awards Committee was delighted at the entries received and that the ethos of the competition was being met by the communities of the competing villages. There were seven entries for 2016, three in the larger village category and four in the hamlet category.

For the Best Kept Village a panel of three judges inspected each settlement on the 26 July. They examined closely various aspects of how communities look after their local area, such as: the cleanliness and general maintenance of public areas; signs of community involvement such as flower beds and baskets; the upkeep of private gardens; the condition of play parks; presence of litter; and improvements made since the last inspection in 2015.

Milnathort took the Best Kept Village prize with notable improvements around the village centre and in the play park. A very close second was Kinnesswood, followed by Crook of community involvement. In second place was Cleish, which has featured strongly over the years. Close behind these two came Powmill, returning after many years absence, and Wester Balgeddie, which the judges felt had taken great strides forward and was awarded the cup for the most improved village.

Mrs Fi Skinner, spokesperson for the judges, presented the cups and certificates and said that the judges had much enjoyed looking round villages and that they do go 'around the back' and make sure that it is not just the main streets that are being looked after. She added, "it is clear the very real sense of pride that is being seen in many of our communities for the local environment and the efforts that are being made to make the area attractive. Kinross-shire is an important tourist destination and playing a part in the upkeep of the villages benefits visitors and locals alike."

Architectural Award

The importance of good quality design and construction in all buildings is also important. This was acknowledged in the Kinross-shire Architectural Competition, where three houses and two non-residential buildings were entered. The judges, Mr Tom Littlewood, Ginkgo Projects, and Mr James Troughton, Blair Castle, chose to commend a Bird Hide and Visitor Viewpoint. The structures are situated on the footpath around Loch Leven and had been commissioned by TRACKS (The Rural Access Committee of Kinross-shire). Both structures had been designed by Icosis Architects, Edinburgh, and the judges considered them to be practical, useful and sensitively designed.

Mrs Skinner presented the award on behalf of the judges and noted how good quality design blended into the landscape and enhanced the walking experience on the Loch Leven Trail.



Out & About



Loch Leven NNR

We've had a fresh autumn with winds from the east for a prolonged period of time. The papers are full of stories of it being an Arctic winter. Let's hope winter will be kind and it's not as bad as the winters of 2010 and 2011.

We've been really busy around the reserve in the last few weeks. After being constantly rained off in September, we've finally got round to completing our mowing and lifting of grass around the reserve. We do all our own mowing with a cutter and we lift with a bailer. The better quality bails go to locals who have livestock. We like to get our species rich meadows cut in the autumn so they will be full of life once again next spring.

We've been enjoying the spectacle of the Pink-footed Geese for the month or so. We've been seeing many thousands coming in and out of the loch. Gus led a highly successful goose walk in October. A number of folk braved the chilly morning to see a couple of thousand birds lift from the Kirkgate plus witnessing the other wildlife of the loch waking up.

This was our only event recently. We had the ever-popular Fungi Foray with Richard Smith for the Fife Coast and Countryside trust. A total of 34 species were found.

We will be working out next year's events programme in December. We hope to have as diverse a set of events again next year.

In September Gus and Therese looked after a group of 60 P1 students from Kinross High. They were learning about the Biodiversity around Loch Leven. The activities included a Bug Hunt, Pond-dipping and Birdwatching. It is an important part of our work to engage youngsters about the natural environment and demonstrate why Loch Leven is such a special place. In the next couple of weeks, invitations will be sent to local schools to see who wants to get involved with the highly successful Trout in the Classroom. Gus can't wait to get his teeth into this one.

It's always this time of year we start to see more Red Squirrels. Many people have recently been reporting them from their Kinross and Milnathort gardens. Please report your sightings of Squirrels to the Saving Scotland's Red Squirrel website. Sadly there have been a couple of local road casualties, so be careful around the roads while these animals are dispersing from their natal sites.

Access to water: Anyone wishing to access the water should only go out from the Kirkgate around 200 metres. This is to protect the wintering birds on the site. For further information on why we restrict the access on the loch, please visit the Scotland's National Nature Reserves website.

Gus is filling the blog with wildlife sightings and news. Find this blog by looking up Loch Leven NNR wordpress in your search engine.

Last month I was writing the newsletter from Shetland, this month from my original home in Gloucestershire; the wonder of remote working these days!

Please go out and enjoy the marvellous changing season. TTFN.

Hello, folks! Next Newsletter time again. Ye Gods, it's no lang since a did the last yin! Anyway, doon tae business.

As mentioned last time, the geese have duly arrived and although the first Goose count of the season has still to be done at time of writing, it would appear from reports etc we have circa 10,000 in the vicinity at the moment. That number will probably increase yet, although by the time you read this may have gone down a bit again as family groups go further south for the winter.

Our November **Dawn Goose Watch** event takes place on **Saturday 5 November** at the early start hour of 6.15am till 8.30am. Breakfast and a cuppa in the centre afterwards. Advance booking essential; contact the reserve for more information or to book.

Other birdy type stuff that's been happening? The winter migrants continue to increase as well as the geese (wee bit o' a rhyme there, no even meant!) with ducks and waders around in good numbers and varieties. A Little Egret appeared back on the flood at the third hide for a few days and Water Rail, a very tricky bird to see, has been showing well in the same area. The bird feeders have been getting heavier use once again from the local tit, robin and chaffinch population as well as the now resident Red Squirrels as the weather starts to get a wee bit colder.

Saffron Nicholson is also back working with us in the café. After a spell away doing other stuff her cheery face will also greet you in the shop a day or two a week as she is now working in both places. Confusin or whit? Hope she disnae pit bird seed in the coffee – that could be a new culinary experience! Nah! It'll awe be fine.

Upcoming events other than the above mentioned goose walk are:

On Saturday and Sunday **5 and 6 November** we are holding a **Christmas Market** with crafts, optics, kids events, café seasonal food and shop seasonal stuff to get you in the mood for the upcoming festive season. Nae good fightin it, it's gonnae happen, so go with the flow and enjoy! From 10am until 4pm both days – just turn up and join in.

Wednesday 9th is the super popular Nature Tots from 10am until 12 noon titled "Night time adventure". Huh? It's durin the day! Och weel, I suppose it will make sense when you get here. Booking is essential; £3 members, £6 nons per family.

Farming



Did you help out on a farm at harvest time when you were a teenager or spend the October break from school picking tatties in the fields round Kinross-shire? Maybe you delivered milk on an early morning round with a dairy farmer who also pasteurised and retailed their milk from the farm? Chances are if you are over fifty then you were involved in some way and gained an understanding of the farming way of life but for the majority of younger folk getting past a farm gate isn't very likely and it does mean that farming is often misunderstood and probably not valued as highly as it once was. Thankfully the industry is getting better at communicating and many organisations promote farming and agriculture.

The Royal Highland Education Trust are a brilliant charity and offer school visits to farms and organise opportunities such as the recent Food and Farming Day at Farmer Dawes when 150 local children visited the mixed farm and participated in activities such as weighing lambs. Working with the farmer to work out the average weight and the daily live weight gain from birth is a great way to use maths in a practical setting and appreciate just how fast these lambs grow.

Farmers' Weekly is a popular magazine for UK farmers; it's full of interesting content and masses of classified ads. If I can't find my husband he's usually to be found in a quiet corner, reading from cover to cover. The magazine is passionate about promoting farming and runs an annual awards programme to recognise the best farmers from across the country. The fifteen categories cover every sector, from dairy to sheep to diversification, and the three finalists in each sector are a shortlist that have worked hard to achieve success and develop their business.

The Young Farmer of the Year award has two finalists from Scotland this year. I was fortunate to interview David Cooper, one of the finalists, earlier in the year. David moved to his farm in Cumnock, Ayrshire, at just seventeen years old. He came from a farming family in the south of England but moved up on his own to the farm, which had previously been an open cast coal mine. The farmhouse wasn't in a good state and neither was the land, but that didn't dampen his enthusiasm and he immediately set about a reclamation programme and stocked the hills with hardy Herdwick and Welsh Mountain ewes.

David has been in the farm for twelve years now and recently married. The flock has grown to 3000 ewes. He looks after it all on his own, including lambing singlehanded. The lambs from these wee ewes are ideal for the light lamb market; they are exported to Spain and Italy where smaller chops are a delicacy and highly valued.

Building the business was made more challenging as there were no fences left after the mining so David has laid over 40,000 metres of post and net in 12 years, coming up with a few innovations to make the job easier on his own. Added to that, his business was not eligible for any farm payments until last year, so the development of his farm business is a fascinating story. I really hope he wins and you can read all about his hard work and dedication in the national papers or see a good story about farming on TV!
