Kinross High Street design failings leaving pedestrians exposed to danger

The High Street "improvements" have created many safety issues for pedestrians.

I have sent the following letter to Kinross CC to enlist their support in having these serious design failings urgently addressed by Perth and Kinross Council who implemented the scheme and are responsible for public safety.

I would urge readers to make known their own experiences and support action to have the High Street being made safe as a matter of immediate priority.

For the Attention of Kinross Community Council

Following the, mostly, completed Kinross High Street works the following issues have been identified and reported widely in the national and local press.

The removal of the controlled crossing outside the Kinross Day Centre has resulted in a lack of a safe crossing point for young children, the elderly and the disabled, including the blind.

Children from Rosemount Nursery now have to walk to the only controlled crossing at the Police Station/Old High School site to cross the road safely, instead of at the one removed.

The "suggested" crossing areas at the Co-op and elsewhere, which have no legal status and do not safeguard pedestrians, are proving to be a great risk to users.

Traffic is not obliged to stop resulting in daily risk to users, with cars passing in front of and behind pedestrians while they are in mid crossing.

The removal of safety railings at the north side of the High Street/Station Road junction is potentially exposing pedestrians to risk of injury.

The "shared space" areas at the Salutation Hotel give/take and the large area outside the old Town Hall are also putting pedestrians at risk of injury due to lack of defined pavements. Despite the 20 mph speed zone being in place for over ten years, most traffic is exceeding this limit, creating risk of injury or death to pedestrians.

I would be obliged if Kinross Community Council would support the re-instatement of a controlled crossing in the High Street, at or near the position of the former crossing and also ask Perth and Kinross Council to address the many other serious safety issues that this new scheme has produced. See plans for the new Kinross Primary School at drop-in event

A drop-in session to allow the community to find out about plans for the new Kinross Primary School will be held on **Thursday 4 February between 3.30pm and 6.30pm** in the main building of the current primary school. This is an informal consultation event in advance of the formal full planning application.

The Council is planning to replace the existing school by erecting a new building in the school grounds and then demolishing the current school.

Plans for the new school include eighteen classrooms, increased nursery provision, a dining and a gym hall plus associated ancillary spaces.

The current Kinross Primary School will be replaced within two years

Plans and design details will be on display at the drop-in event. Council staff involved in the project, as well as representatives from the architect and construction companies involved, will be on hand to answer questions and discuss any concerns.



New loan fund to help bring empty buildings back into use

Perth & Kinross Council has launched its Empty Property Loan Fund – a new interest-free loan designed to help owners of long-term empty buildings to repair or convert them for use as affordable housing.

Funding can be used for any property from a country cottage or a city centre flat to an office or shop, provided that it has been empty for at least six months. The loans are subject to the owner either letting the property at affordable rental levels for a period of five years or selling it at an affordable level on completion of the works. For individual properties, the loan can range from £5,000 to £15,000. Higher value loans can be considered for larger-scale projects.

Councillor CuthbertPerth and Kinross budget

It is the time of year when the Council is considering its budget for the next three years. As the Leader of the Independent Liaison Group, I am heavily involved in



this process. As I write this, I can report that it looks like it is going to be a very tough budget as there are a number of factors working against the Council.

The first of these is the fact that the current Scottish Government has imposed a freeze on Council Tax increases for the ninth consecutive year. This started in 2007 and means that the income the Council can generate from Council Tax is more or less fixed. At the same time, there has been steady inflation (approximately 33% compound), which basically means that the Council has to make cuts in order to balance its budget.

The second factor is that the Scottish Government has cut the grant payable to the Council. This was partially anticipated by the Council and initial savings were based on a reduction of some £1.3m, however the grant has been cut by a further £8.19m, which has come as something of a shock.

The third factor is that the Scottish Government has imposed a restriction on cutting teacher numbers, which means that savings in this area are not possible. On top of this, many other services are also ring fenced and cannot deliver savings. Examples of these include most Community Care services, the Housing Revenue account (council houses), plus many child protection and other initiatives which were instigated by the Scottish Government.

The effect of this is that the cuts in budgets fall on a small section of the Council budget, so for example the Education and Children's Services budget of £161m has 60% of its services protected. This means that the savings target for this service of £12.9m will have to come out of the remaining £64.4m of expenditure, leading to a reduction of some 20% of these budgets.

As I said, this is going to be a tough budget. I will report more fully on what has been decided next month, after the Council meeting on 11 February.

Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland (LGBCS)

The LGBCS have still not announced their plans for the reorganisation of wards. As reported by me in previous articles, this could have a significant impact on Kinross-shire, which is currently forecast to be reduced in size and to see the number of ward Councillors reduced from four to three. This will mean less representation for Kinross-shire, which I have been strongly opposing.

Closure of Forth Road Bridge and effect on A977

Following the closure of the Forth Road Bridge and the continued ban on HGVs using the bridge, the A977 has become the route of choice for many of these vehicles, thereby creating huge volumes of heavy goods vehicle traffic on the A977.

Cllr Barnacle has been calling for mitigation measures on this road for a number of years and I have tried to support him. However, to date the Council has refused to budge on this. I have recently learned that an outline business case for the creation of two roundabouts on this road has been started, which I welcome, however I note that the officers have said:

"I fear however that in light of the other infrastructure issues facing the Council, and the current budget situation, they are unlikely to achieve sufficient priority to be taken forward at any time in the future."

Work on the roundabout was halted when the Forth Road Bridge was closed as the powers that be decided to halt all works on the A977, as it was being used as an alternative route. Now that the Forth Road Bridge has been opened to smaller vehicles, works can now recommence. These works are expected to take approximately four weeks, so hopefully they will be completed by the middle of February.

Also affected by the ban on works along the A977 were the repairs to the bridge over the Gairney Burn in Powmill. Hopefully these will take place in the near future.

Kinross town centre regeneration

The regeneration works in Kinross have now been completed, however I do not see these as the final solution for the town centre. Your four local members carried out a walkabout tour of these with officers on 4 December and we identified a number of improvements.

Most of these have been fed to the Council's Road Safety Team who are carrying out an audit of the area. We await their findings with interest.

Planning proposals

An application to convert the **Glenfarg Hotel** in Glenfarg into flats has been received by the Council. At a public meeting that I attended the residents of Glenfarg were very concerned about the loss of this facility to their village. I will not comment on the application as I sit on the Council's Planning committee. However, what I will say is that this problem is recurring with monotonous regularity and we have seen a number of country hotels and pubs closing over the last few years. Another example of this trend is the Lomond Hotel in Kinnesswood, for which an application to demolish the building and to erect five houses was received in March last year. I will again not comment on this.

Wester Balgedie: Another building which is up for demolition and replacement with new housing is the former Levenglen Nursing Home in Glenlomond. An application has been received by the Council for 14 houses to replace it. Again I will not comment on the application, however I can say that I attended a meeting of Portmoak CC last week [12 January] where strong views were expressed about this application and the road leading to it through Wester Balgedie. We shall see what happens.

New large developments in Kinross

A major planning application is being processed for **Lathro in Kinross**: this application is for 300 houses and, at the time of writing, I note that only three objections are on the Council's planning website. However, as this is a major application, it will come to the Council's planning committee, so I shall not comment on it.

On top of this, an application is eagerly awaited for the **former High School site** in Kinross. My research indicates that it is imminent. I am very keen to see the newer buildings at the back of the site demolished as they continue to attract vandals and unsavoury attention. The Council is selling the land for this site to the developer and, with a view to keeping an early

development of the site in the minds of the developers, I proposed at a recent Property Sub Committee meeting that the longstop date for the sale of the property should not be extended. Unfortunately the SNP, Tory and Liberal Democrat Councillors did not support me in this, so the date has been extended. The developers have, however, given a commitment to clear the back of the site (retaining the Edwardian block at the front) in the near future, so hopefully we will see an early development of this site.

Main Issues Report

The decisions which will be reached by both officers and the Council's Planning Committee on these and all other planning applications will be based upon the Local Development Plan. The current version of this was adopted in February of 2014 so it is reasonably recent. However the Scottish government have introduced a rolling review of the plan. This means that it is currently being looked at again. The current stage it has reached is the Main Issues Report, which has been produced by the Council. This outlines the suggested changes which have been put to the Council. I would strongly recommend that people look at this document and put in their comments to the Council. It may affect you in the years to come. You can read more about this at: www.pkc.gov.uk/mainissuesldp2 and there is a public consultation event at Loch Leven Community Campus on Tuesday 23 February, 3pm-8pm. [See Notice on page 22.]

Locality Based Community Planning Partnerships

The Council decided at their December meeting to create five locality based Community Planning Partnerships (CPPs). The Kinross-shire ward is to be linked to the Almond and Earn ward for this purpose. This decision was reached due to new legislation incorporated into the Community Empowerment Act. These Locality based Community Planning Partnerships should, I think, be very important to local democracy going forward as they should develop into a bottom up approach, thereby allowing localities to set their own priorities rather than the current somewhat Perth-centric approach. Currently the Council is looking at the governance of these Locality based CPPs. Again, watch this space.

Perth and Kinross Integration Joint Board

Another piece of recent legislation has seen the introduction of the Perth and Kinross Integration Joint Board. This is essentially made up of many of the NHS services and the Council's Social Welfare team. The concept behind this is that by integrating the two teams, services will become more joined up, thereby delivering a better service. I am quite heavily involved in this and welcome the concept. Again, we will need to see how this develops.

Happy New Year! Like most, I returned to work in the New Year after a short Christmas break. While it was good to recharge my batteries for the New Year ahead, I was delighted to get back from Westminster to attend a range of events in Ochil and South Perthshire.

After a week in the confines of the House of Commons, it was particularly beneficial to get out and about my constituency to see and hear first-hand about how I can support constituents over the year ahead.

In particularly I would like to thank Broke not Broken for inviting me along to a meeting at St Paul's Church along with local councillors and representatives from the Webster group to discuss the setting up of a foodbank in Kinross. The fantastic volunteers at Broke not Broken have already laid the groundwork and continue to hold foodbank collections on the last Saturday of every month outside the Cooperative on the High Street. With discussions about having a dedicated premises for the foodbank taking place, this can only be a positive step and help those who need it most. While it's saddening that there's a real need for foodbanks in our modern Scotland, the work that the staff and volunteers do to support others in our communities is truly inspirational.

I gain a lot from visits like this, because it allows me to be able to learn directly from the experience of experts and service users alike. It's one thing to read a report on an issue and quite another to have first-hand experience. I now plan to use the information I gained from this visit to hold the Tory Government to account at Westminster for their handling of our vital social security system.

It's clear to me from my visit last week and other discussions I've had with charities in the constituency that delays in benefits payments and the imposition of benefits sanctions remain two of the main reasons that drive local people to use foodbanks. This is why I've brought forward my own Private Member's Bill to address this issue, so that we can ensure that no one is left destitute as a result of action by the DWP.

Small Business Saturday: I was delighted to have been in Kinross for small Business Saturday in December. It was a privilege to visit, amongst others, Hunters, who provide a wide range of local produce and butchery services, Winski's of Kinross, where I was taken aback by some of the beautiful jewellery on display and A Country Affair, who have a fascinating range of original items and furnishings. Supporting local businesses as much as possible is vitally important as it helps to generate revenue for the local area and keep communities thriving.

Light Up Kinross: Although the weather was not the greatest I was thrilled to see the turnout at the annual Kinross Christmas Light Switch on. Junction Road, Kinross. Following concerns by road users that cars were parking dangerously close to the junction with the High Street, forcing traffic onto the wrong side of the road near the sharp bend, your



Ward 8 representatives referred the matter to roads engineers. They recommended placing restrictions on parking close to the junctions; after due process, double yellow lines have now been painted on the road aiding safer and smoother traffic flow.

Also on Junction Road, it was felt that the current 30 mph speed limit was needlessly low, resulting in prosecutions of drivers without in any way contributing to road safety. Accordingly, I shall be formally asking the Enterprise and Infrastructure Committee on 20 January to agree to begin the process for raising the limit to 40 mph on Junction Road along much of its length. The 30 mph limit will remain in force on the approach to the mini roundabout to alert drivers that they are re-entering a built up area.

Meanwhile, at **Lathro Farm**, on an area identified for housing in the Development Plan, Persimmon Homes have applied to build 300 new homes over a number of years. The matter was debated at Kinross CC when concerns were raised. As any application for more than 50 houses is considered 'major' in Planning Law, the Development Management Committee on which I sit with Councillors Cuthbert and Barnacle, will decide.

The Council expects to receive a planning application from Persimmon Homes in respect of the former High School site soon. First a satisfactory solution must be found to safeguard the welfare of bats which have taken up residence, uninvited, in one of the old school buildings!

Milnathort Flood Prevention. The necessary, but disruptive, works to increase the capacity of the rainwater drainage in Milnathort are almost done. Subject to weather, the annoying traffic lights at the Cross should be gone by February. Once completed, Scottish Water's £1.7 million scheme will prevent local flooding around the Cross, safeguarding homes from

surcharging sewage. The threat of flooding from the Back Burn (also called the Fochy Burn) remains a possibility although the flood defences completed around 2007 have worked. So far.

Following comments from a concerned resident, I spoke to a Council flood engineer who confirmed that the Back Burn is checked for potential problems biannually and after every high flow event. The burn is on the list of watercourses to be checked again soon. The Council will remove fallen trees and debris. Anything more requires permission from SEPA which will charge upwards of £1,200 for a licence, although in an emergency the Council can act on its own initiative.

Milnathort Town Hall has now undergone refurbishment. In the course of organising a Burns Supper, I have had occasion to inspect the hall and have been delighted by the quality of the work. Better still, the project, which was only made possible with the financial support of the Arthur and Margaret Thomson Trust and the Gannochy Trust, was delivered on time and on budget. The Town Hall Committee deserves full credit for its community-based initiative which will safeguard this village asset for future generations. The hall can be hired for events of all kinds.

Rory. It is with sadness that I report on the passing of Rory the donkey at 34, from liver failure. He was the last remaining resident of the eponymous 'Donkey Field' and was the last of Dr Derek Anderson's donkeys, which at one time numbered over a dozen.

Perth Council Budget. The big current issue is the Council's budget for 2016/17 which we expected was going to be tough. What could not have been anticipated was the Government's cut in the grant to the Council of 3.5% or £7.5 million. The Administration has been working hard with Council officials on a budget to safeguard essential services while making economies necessary to balance the books. This is now the fourth year that I have served on the Budget Review Group. The grant from the Government accounts for around 80% of Councils' income, the balance coming from Council Tax.

Councillor Barnacle Local Development Plan 2 Main Issues Report

This was approved by PKC on 16 December 2015 for public consultation ending on 16 March 2016.



Main points I would like to highlight, viz:

No additional housing supply land required in Kinross-shire. Noted Policy changes – a significant change to Policy PM4 – Settlement boundaries with a rewording to allow development on the edge of settlements in specific limited circumstances (Q7).

A minor change to Policy RD5b on gypsy/traveller sites introduced by your local Councillors to reflect need for an adequate distance from existing buildings where generators are used and connection to the grid is questionable. I had wanted a review of this open-door policy but this was all we could get agreement to.

A new policy RD7 to ensure stalled and non-effective housing sites are brought forward and a delivery strategy produced (Q4 & 5).

Main settlements where changes are proposed are Crook of Devon, Kinross and Milnathort. I note that Q32 is an opportunity to comment on any town or village boundary and suggest changes; I think this may be particularly relevant to Balado, Crook of Devon, Kinnesswood, Powmill and Rumbling Bridge.

In Crook of Devon a housing site for 50 houses has been introduced by your local Councillors for consultation (Map 32), with support from the Fossoway Community Strategy Group, because of its potential to deliver significant community benefits, i.e. a large roundabout at the junction of the A977 and B9097, a growth project to facilitate expansion of Drum WWTP (currently at capacity), improved footpath and pedestrian crossing facilities, etc. (Q35).

In **Kinross**, Opportunity Site 15 at Lethangie in our current LDP is no longer required for a primary school (Map 29) and is suggested now as a housing site (Map 31) for 100 houses; my view is that this good quality agricultural land should be retained (Q34).

In Milnathort, it is proposed to remove Employment Site 19 at Stirling Road in our current LDP (Map 28) (Q33) and to amend the boundary of Opportunity Site 16 at Stirling Road as a result of a Flood Risk assessment (Map30) (Q34).

Questions 36 & 37 seek a response on options for Blairingone, whether to retain the existing LDP Map 33 or develop a community plan to replace this, building on the work of the Fossoway Community Strategy Group referred to in Para 7.1.12 of our LDP; I favour the latter approach.

One amendment introduced successfully on Kinross-shire Infrastructure Capacity by your local Councillors is not included in the MIR but will involve a report being prepared to accompany LDP2 on infrastructure capacity within our county and its ability to support planned growth; issues being cemeteries, drainage, health service, parking, public transport, recreational demand, roads network and schools.

Omissions: I would highlight the following omissions from the MIR that I had made representations on, viz:

- Policy EP7 resists my call for enhanced protection of Loch Leven.
- Policy ER5 resists my call for greater protection for prime agricultural land, in accordance with national planning policy.
- Our current LDP has nine settlements located within the Lochleven catchment area that had their boundaries removed from our previous 2004 Plan, reinstatement is not considered.
- Provision of mains drainage for Carnbo is not mentioned.
- There is no employment site zoning within Crook of Devon or covering our Turfhills Depot.
- The need for Drum to have a local ditch and watercourse management scheme, in the absence of a flood prevention scheme, is not acknowledged.

I strongly urge residents to attend the consultation event on the above on 23 February 2016 at Loch Leven Campus between 3.00 and 8.00pm. [See PKC Notice, p. 22]

Signage and Mitigation Measures for the A977 (The Forgotten Road as regards funding)

Copy of an email sent to Jim Valentine, PKC on 15/1/16:

"I enclose an email from my constituent of 29/12/15 regarding the latest accident on the above road and the need for PKC to address its safety for residents. I also refer to previous background correspondence on this subject, remaining deeply unhappy at the position of both PKC and Transport Scotland on the matter.

"The road has been a diversionary route for HGV's since the beginning of December 2015, a position that is set to continue into February 2016 due to engineering problems with the Forth Road Bridge, it will continue to deteriorate as a result and PKC should be lobbying the Scottish Government for financial assistance.

"I note from the Revenue budget Paper 6 at Full Council of 16/12/15 Para 6 that our Capital Budget is to be updated to 2022/23 for consideration on 22/6/16. I now make a further belated request for an OBC to be prepared for the A977, as previously referred to, noting that we have a meeting planned shortly between yourselves and my fellow Ward Councillors at which I intend to raise this, particularly in light of the recent lengthy diversion and proposals in the MIR for our LDP2." *Copy of the email dated 29/12/15 from the constituent:* Hi Mike,

"I see there was yet another accident today on the A977 in the middle of Crook of Devon village. It involved an HGV and a car, which crashed into a wall/garden of a property on the Main Street. I'm not sure if the driver was seriously hurt although she was taken to hospital in an ambulance. This could have been a really serious accident, only a short time before this [---] and I had been walking our dogs on the

very bit of pavement that the car careered on to. It makes me very concerned for the safety of any pedestrian walking on the Main Street as the volume of traffic passing through the village is the worst that I have ever seen it.

"Is there anything that we can do to put pressure on the council to make the A977 safer? A by-pass would be the most obvious solution. I would be very willing to get involved with any committees or trying to get support from local residents to move the council to take action."

Crook Moss Gypsy/Traveller site in Crook of Devon

Readers may recall my report in the November 2015 edition of the Newsletter. On 13/1/16 a report on the latest position regarding enforcement of conditions came before the Development Management Committee, with both my colleague, Cllr Cuthbert, and myself firing a number of questions to planning officers.

I pointed out that assurances on connection to a mains electricity supply were given in October 2013 and repetition of same does not signify progress.

Concerns remain at the continuing lack of adequate drainage, sewerage and water arrangements since the site was first occupied in March 2012, a clear breach of the protocol on necessary conditions for phosphate mitigation within the Lochleven Catchment which PKC, SEPA and SNH have a statutory duty to protect under Policy EP7. PKC are pressing Scottish Water to complete a flow and load survey of the atcapacity Drum WWTP to see if a short-term connection to the public sewer is possible, an urgency apparently driven by the needs of the gypsy/travellers rather than the other applicants awaiting connection (15 in December 2013). I find this irksome given that both the community and I had lobbied for this environmental improvement scheme and worked on a long-term strategy for the village between 2004 and 2012 to inform our current local development plan, during which there was never any indication of a proposed gypsy/traveller sit at Crook Moss, development at this locus being contrary to PKC's landscape consultancy advice, a fact not presented by the planners to Committee when recommending approval. The Committee were not prepared to leave matters relating to drainage and water until September 2016 as proposed by the planning officers and a further update report was requested and agreed for three months' time.

I took the opportunity to remind planning officers of community concerns regarding site expansion into the so-called 'pony paddock hardcore area' at the time of the original consent (given our experience of the retrospective growth of the Greenacres site), now that a recent application has been lodged for its development, noting that Fossoway CC and SEPA have lodged strong objections; also mentioning the flawed neighbour notification process and asking them to note the relevance of the change to Policy RD5b put forward by local members to the MIR for LDP2 (see my article on this). We await with bated breath the next update in this saga of non-compliance and PKC obfuscation.

Charity sets up flood appeal





Flooding grants

Perth & Kinross Councillors have approved the process of distributing funding from the Scottish Government for properties flooded in severe weather in July and December 2015 and early 2016.

The flat rate grant of £1,500 per property can be used for households, businesses, community groups (such as sports clubs) and charitable organisations to help with the following:

- To reimburse eligible households for not receiving the full benefit of services they pay for through Council Tax while absent from their home due to internal property flooding.
- To enable people to protect their homes and businesses against future floods by installing new flood barriers, or by carrying out flood resilient repairs such as replacing doors and windows with water resistant alternatives, or moving electricity sockets up to a safer level.

Only those properties which were directly affected by flooding, where there was an inundation of water within their premises, on 17 July 2015, 4-6 December 2015, 29-31 December or in early January 2016 will be eligible to apply for the grant and this remains the only qualifying criteria. Properties which suffered inundation of the garden only or of outbuildings, sheds and the like, will not be eligible to apply. In order to ensure that grant money is paid to those who suffered internal property damage, evidence to support the application must be supplied. This can include:

- Photographs/videos of the property flooding
- Independent report from emergency services or local authority attending the property during the flooding event
- Independent report e.g. from an insurance company that visited after the event
- Evidence of a call to the emergency services and/or the local authority advising that property flooding was occurring

Cervical Screening Awareness Week (CSAW)



24 - 30 Jan 2016

Cervical Screening Awareness Week (CSAW) is a UK-wide initiative led by Jo's Cervical Cancer Trust. The week aims to highlight the importance of cervical screening and how attending a screening invitation can help to prevent cervical cancer.

- In the UK, 22% of women still do not attend their cervical screening.
- Cervical screening is NOT a test to find cancer. It is a screening test to detect abnormalities (pre-cancer) at an early stage in the cells in the cervix.
- Around 3,000 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer in the UK each year.
- Regular cervical screening provides a high degree of protection against developing cervical cancer and is offered free on the NHS.
- It is estimated that early detection and treatment through cervical screening saves 5000 lives a year in the UK.
- Having regular cervical screening offers the best protection against developing cervical cancer.
- If you are feeling anxious beforehand, ask a member of your family or friend to accompany you. Your practice nurse or GP will be happy to talk through any anxieties that you have prior to your cervical screening appointment.

Blood Tests and how to obtain your results

Most blood tests have to be done in the morning as they have to go to the laboratory in PRI for analysis and there is only one collection each day at 12.30pm.

For most routine tests, analysis will be complete within a week, though certain tests can take several weeks to analyse. The person who takes the blood test will be able to advise on how long analysis should take. The analysis results are sent electronically by the laboratory and they go straight into the relevant patient's electronic clinical record.

The clinician who ordered the test receives a copy of the results so that they can review them. If the test was done prior to a planned review appointment, e.g. an annual diabetic or heart disease review, the results will be discussed with the patient at that review appointment. For all other results, the clinician will make a comment about the result and ask the Reception Team to take any necessary action e.g. contacting the patient to make an appointment to discuss the results. The Reception Team will be advised whether this is urgent, or whether a routine appointment will be sufficient.

If no action is required, patients will not be contacted. However, patients are welcome to contact the Reception Team to enquire about their test results if they wish. Please wait at least a week before doing so, to ensure that the results have been returned to the practice and been reviewed by your clinician. Please also ensure that we have your up to date address and telephone numbers so that we can contact you if necessary.

Protect your pipes

Scottish Water is reminding householders to follow its simple winter code to protect pipes and keep the water cycle running smoothly. The key advice is:

Heat: Warmth offers the best protection against frozen pipes, so leave your heating on a low setting or set it to come on a couple of times a day. If you are going away, ensure someone can visit regularly to check for any problems. If the property is vacant over winter, turn off the water supply and drain the system

Insulate: Ensure your pipes and water tanks are properly insulated. Pipes don't like the cold, whether they are outdoor or indoor, metal or plastic, new or old. Pipes, tanks or toilet cisterns in unheated outbuildings or exposed places should also be properly insulated. If not in use over winter, have them drained.

Protect: Dripping water increases the risk of freezing, so repair any leaks at taps or valves as soon as possible. Also reduce draughts, which can cause frozen pipework, by fitting draught excluders on doors and windows.

Time to go again – Ethiopia here we come!

February is here once again. For Maureen and I, and the Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP), that means it is time to set off once again to remote Southern Ethiopia, to see how things are going in Buccama, the little clinic we support, and set to and help as best we can. We put our fund raising efforts from the past year to work. So much has happened this year that the clinic has been constantly on our minds.

Firstly, famine has again struck in Ethiopia, and the harvest has failed. Although things are slightly better in the South than in the North, it does mean that focus will not solely be on the simple health issues of our "Mothers".

Secondly, when we left last year, the little bit of subsidy that they had from the local Bishop was withdrawn, due to his own lack of funds. If they could not pay their staff, the clinic would have to close, and if that happened 22,000 people or so would have to trek huge distances for their medical needs. This is over and above the needs of our "Prolapse Mothers", who are our primary interest, but how could we say no and not try to help?

The salary bill for 15 people for one month is £1000. That pays four qualified nurses, and ten others who work here: guards, cleaners, pharmacist and admin staff.

We agreed that we could pay five months of salaries, and a group of Italian Doctors, who were visiting when we there, agreed to pay seven months. Sadly, they were not able to fulfil their promise, so we took up the slack thanks to very generous donations, and frantic fundraising efforts over the year.

This has been our best year so far, with two grants of £6000, one of £5000, and a one-off of £1000 from a friend who just said, "I can do a month of salaries", and he was true to his promise.

Other monies trickle in from "Pants and Pounds" parties, talks to Rotary Clubs locally, Guilds and Rurals. We have been so lucky and we are so grateful for everything. Perthshire, Kinrossshire, Fife and Greater Glasgow people have been fabulous in helping us: a big THANK YOU to all of you!

We set off on 17 February, once again with full bags of essentials and goodies, plus the financial necessity for the clinic's survival in 2016.

We cannot promise forever, so we go, as they do, from day to day, from month to month and from year to year. This is our sixth year and it still goes from strength to strength.

As ever, our gratitude, and their gratitude out there, is without bounds.

Recent crime locally

Fuel was stolen from a vehicle at the **G S Brown site** in **Kinross** over the weekend of 13-14 November 2015.

An attempt was made to break into **Kinross Stamp Shop** overnight on Wednesday 11 November.

Two Land Rovers and a **quad bike** were stolen from **Scotlandwell** overnight from Monday 16 November to Tuesday 17 November. Two of these vehicles have been recovered and enquiry is under way to identify those responsible.

A house in **Crook of Devon** was broken into during the day on Tuesday 17 November.

A generator was stolen from a farm at **Drunzie**, **Glenfarg**, between 2 and 3 December.

There was a **theft** from an insecure vehicle in McWilliam Place, **Kinross**, overnight on Thursday 10 December.

On the same night, a white Ford transit van was stolen from **AJ Spence** Engineers, South Street, Milnathort. It was found the next day in Stirling Road, Milnathort.

Another vehicle, a yellow van, was stolen from **AJ Spence** on Saturday 12 December. The vehicle was found the next night at Brunthill Haulage Yard. There are three male suspects for this crime.

A **cash box** was stolen from commercial premises at Hepburn Motors, **Crook of Devon**, in the early hours of Saturday 12 December.

A silver Ifor Williams **trailer** was stolen from a farm in **Cleish** on the afternoon of Thursday 17 December.

The Scottish Gliding Union premises at Portmoak Airfeld, **Scotlandwell**, were broken into overnight on Thursday 17 December.

Dobbies Garden Centre in **Kinross** was broken into between 1800 on Friday 18 December and 0800 on Saturday 19 December and a large quantity of candles stolen.

Two quad bikes were stolen from farms at **Easter Balgedie** between Tuesday 29 and Thursday 31 December. One is a green Yamaha Bruin YFM 350 quad bike and the other is a dark blue, relatively new, imported quad bike.

Fuel was stolen from a lorry parked at **Brunthill Farm** between Monday 28 December and Thursday 31 December. In **Cleish** an Ifor Williams **trailer** was stolen from a yard between midnight and 7am on Thursday 31 December.

A caterpillar machine parked at Chance Inn Farm had component parts removed and stolen sometime between 4.15pm on Monday 4 January and 8am on 5 January 2016. This crime would take some hours to commit and would require a large good vehicle to remove the parts.

A red Suzuki quad bike was stolen from a property situated on the A91 between **Yetts o' Muckhart** and **Carnbo** overnight on Thursday 14 January. Either a trailer or transit type van would have been required.

Arrest

It was announced on 21 January that a 28-year-old-man has been charged in connection with a series of crimes committed at business premises and farms throughout North East Fife in December and January. A second man, aged 29, has also been reported to the Procurator Fiscal in connection

with these offences. Enquiries continue into any links with similar crimes in Perth and Kinross.

Forensic Security Marking

Following a recent spike in the number of rural dishonesty thefts of quad bikes, trailers and agricultural equipment in Perth and Kinross and surrounding areas, Police Scotland urge those in the more rural areas to be extra vigilant in looking out for suspicious vehicles and persons as well as reviewing existing security measures. One option is to forensically mark equipment vulnerable to theft. These products are available from several companies, including SelectaDNA.

Property can be secured within seconds by simply brushing the solution onto valuable goods. Once applied SelectaDNA dries hard and is virtually impossible to remove. The tamper resistant warning stickers supplied with each kit can then be applied, instantly making all marked property too-hot-to-handle for would be thieves. The code from each batch of SelectaDNA is then recorded on a secure database, creating an instant link between any recovered items and their owners. As well as the DNA identifier, the solution contains 1000s of tiny microdots, each containing the database phone number and unique owner's code. This gives the Police the ability to positively ID a recovered item on the spot. This product can be used on industrial machinery, tools, motor vehicles, quad bikes and much more.

Kinross Community Council News from the EGM

Present at the EGM held on 2 December 2015 were: CCllrs W Freeman, D Colliar, T Stewart, B Davies, D MacKenzie, D West, B Davies, M Scott, M Blyth and J Bryson; P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert and J Giacopazzi and seven members of the public. **Apologies**: CCllr E Thomas and P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and W Robertson.

The start of the meeting was chaired by Cllr Cuthbert. He explained that an election was held recently as 12 nominations were received for 11 vacancies. He read out the names of the 11 candidates who were duly elected. Following this, the **election of Chairman** took place. W Freeman was proposed by CCllr Colliar, seconded by CCllr MacKenzie and unanimously carried. At this point CCllr Freeman took over the Chair.

Other office bearers: Vice Chair: David Mackenzie. Treasurer: Ian Jack. Secretary and Data Controller: Margaret Scott. Planning: David Colliar.

Sub Committees: Agreed to arrange a meeting to arrange sub-committees at the earliest opportunity.

The Code of Conduct, Standing Orders and Constitution were all agreed.

Report on Financial Position: The Treasurer read out a statement of income and expenditure for the current financial year. The Remembrance Wreaths had been paid and the CC awaits repayment from the various groups. Currently the CC can spend up to £700 in each financial year. At the end of the financial year the Council issue a payment to raise the funds held to £700.

CC Meetings will be held in the Masonic Hall on the first Wednesday of each month.

News from the December Meeting

Present: as above.

Declarations of Interest: CCllrs Freeman, Colliar, Scott and Blyth declared an interest in the application for Newsletter funding in relation to Light Up Kinross.

Minutes of Previous Meeting: Mr Alexander asked if the minute could reflect correctly the statement made by him at the last meeting regarding the junction at the Muirs. He asked if consideration could be given to double yellow lines at this locus. It was agreed to accept this amendment to the last minutes.

Police Report: No Police representative was present.

Newsletter Fund Disbursements

Hockey Club: Thank you letter received.

Light Up Kinross (LUK): Four CCllrs declared an interest in this application. LUK requesting £2,000 for maintenance, erection and dismantling of the Christmas lights, payment of insurance, new tree lights etc. Decision deferred until January; more information required.

Kinnesswood in Bloom: Requesting financial support in relation to a £25,000 project involving the landscaping of an area of land. Applications have been submitted to a number of sources. CCllr Freeman suggested an award of £500 and this was carried six for and three against.

Caitlin Duffy, formerly a Kinross High School pupil, now studying in St Andrews, is one of six UK finalists in a Chemistry Competition in London and looking for funding to support travelling costs. As this application does not meet the relevant criteria no payment can be awarded.

Reports from Perth & Kinross Councillors

- Cllr Cuthbert commented on the **budget** in February and the cuts to be made.
- Development Plan: Cllr Giacopazzi updated those present. Several amendments had been suggested and accepted.

Correspondence: Draft Strategic and Joint Commissioning Plan: As part of the ongoing work to integrate Health and Social Care in P&K, the CC has been invited to participate in consultation.

Bus Service/MSP: The Secretary had overlooked contacting the MSP in relation to the bus service. There was a poor attendance at the Stagecoach launch. Suggestion made that we leave this until next month and await further comments. Cllr Giacopazzi advised that the X56 route at 5.15 from Edinburgh takes 80 minutes and is a cheaper fare.

Remembrance Day Parade: CCllr Colliar was disappointed at the low numbers of CC present at this event. He continued that another concern was in relation to the Ex-Servicemen's wreath. It had been agreed at an earlier CC meeting that we continue to purchase and arrange for an Ex-Servicemen's

wreath to be laid. This year a "Veterans" wreath was purchased. The Secretary/Chairman explained that each year we are advised that this should now be a wreath for the "Veterans". CCllr Colliar stated that the wreath was to commemorate the local Ex-Servicemen and should be continued. It was suggested that a meeting be arranged with interested parties early next year to discuss this matter.

Kinross CC Noticeboard: Is this yet in place?

Organisations: Comment was made to the Foodbank and other organisations in Kinross. CCllr Mackenzie added that a network of organisations/groups would be a way forward with a co-ordinator to administer the works. Suggestion made that we discuss this at a future meeting.

Affordable Housing/Social Housing: A question was raised in relation to PKC policy and the relationship with Kinross. Cllr Cuthbert replied that this was still being researched, however reported that there were 117 people on the waiting list and seven top priority in Kinross. The difficulty is in finding viable sites at the right price.

Yellow lines on Muirs: Due to current weather conditions this will not take place until 2016.

Montgomery Way: The pathway to the rear of this development is dangerously slippy with ice. This path is not adopted by PKC and is in the ownership of GS Brown. It was suggested that the CC contact the site agent.

Sutherland Drive, Springfield Road, Wilson Court: These areas were highlighted regarding access for prams, and rainwater lying due to blocked or faulty drains.

Regeneration works: There is a puddle outside Complete Look (in alley). A member of the public mentioned again the parking of cars in the area near the Town Hall and the lack of yellow lines. There is no disabled parking anywhere on the High Street.

Light Up Kinross: M Shepherd complained about the display erected on the wall at her premises. She added that the stonework is warped. CCllr Colliar answered that there have been mounting poles on this wall for many years.

News from the January Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 6 January 2016 were: CCllrs Freeman, MacKenzie, Scott, Blyth, Colliar, Stewart, Davies, Bryson, Jack and Thomas; P&K Cllrs Giacopazzi, Cuthbert and Barnacle and 14 members of the public. **Apologies**: CCllr West and P&K Cllr Robertson

Declarations of Interest: CCllrs Freeman, Colliar, Scott and Jack regarding Light Up Kinross; CCllr MacKenzie who volunteers for Broke Not Broken.



Minutes of Meeting held on 2 December 2015

Under correction of the insertion of CCllr Jack who was present at both meetings, the previous minutes were proposed by CCllr Colliar and seconded by CCllr Blyth.

Police Report: A list of incidents was read out. [See p. 25.] Youth issues in Sandport and Kirkgate continue. The Police and PKC agreed to carry out a door-to-door survey in order to more accurately gauge the extent of the issue. 60 properties were visited in Sandport, Sandport Gait, Sandport Close, Pier Road and Old Causeway. 20 households responded. Six households believed there had been an increase in antisocial behaviour and 14 households believed there had been no increase. All households stated that the main form of antisocial behaviour related to youth issues, under-age drinking, vandalism, verbal abuse and intimidating behaviour. The Community Policing Team will continue to carry out patrols and monitor the situation.

CCllr MacKenzie asked if we could check with the Police for any correlation between youth antisocial behaviour following on the refurbishment of the High Street, particularly in the evenings/weekends in the shared space areas. Do these areas encourage youths to congregate? The Secretary will ask the Police.

MSP/bus service: CCllr Colliar asked if an approach had been made to the MSP. The Secretary believed that this was on hold. Cllr Barnacle has written regarding this matter and stressed that full use should be made of the Park and Ride. He is to copy the CC in to this communication. Cllr Cuthbert added that we should continue to press for a railway station in Kinross. It was agreed that the CC invite the Minister of Transport to attend a CC meeting.

Newsletter Fund Disbursements

Light Up Kinross requesting funding of £2,000 for maintenance and costs for erection of lights. LUK's income is derived through fundraising, traders' contributions and a Rotary donation. The bank balance is around £1,900, which will cover the expense of erecting and dismantling the lights in 2015. There are no funds, as yet, for the switch on in 2016. LUK are also applying for funding to different sources to enhance the existing display by purchasing new lights. CCllr MacKenzie proposed that longer term funding should be considered to allow Light Up Kinross an opportunity to plan ahead for future years. He proposed that £1,500 be awarded for years 2016 and 2017 with a donation of £1,000 in years 2018 and 2019, the total funding for these years to be provided now. CCllr Thomas replied that in terms of the criteria set out for applications, funding does not cover general running costs. CCllr Davies proposed that LUK provide a current financial statement, budget proposals and business strategy for the continuation of LUK and was seconded by CCllr Thomas. A vote was taken with three in favour, one against and two abstaining. Action: LUK to provide further information.

Glenfarg Folk Club asking for funding towards the costs in hosting the Glenfarg Folk Feast in Kinross in April. The budget deficit is £1,300. CCllr MacKenzie said this again would appear to be running costs, CCllr Thomas replied that this was a community event. Mention was made to funding from Glenfarg Newsletter/ Wind Farm and the fact that, although they intend to run the event in Kinross, Glenfarg is outwith our jurisdiction for funding. CCllr MacKenzie proposed that we reject this application and was seconded by CCllr Colliar. CCllr Thomas proposed, as the event is being

held in Kinross, that it should be supported and suggested a contribution of £300. No seconder came forward. Application rejected.

Broke Not Broken Foodbank: Asking for funding [of up to £2018] towards purchase of tables, chairs, office supplies [and upgrading of St Paul's Church premises]. CCllr Thomas suggested that they approach local businesses for donations of items. CCllr Davies suggested a contribution of £500 and was seconded by CCllr Thomas. Action: A payment of £500 to be made.

Old Arngask Graveyard Preservation Group asked about timescale for application. CCllr Davies to reply.

When discussing the applications above, comment was made to "general running costs". CCllr Thomas suggested that a sub-committee could review the guidance wording for donations. The Memorandum and Articles also require amendment.

Kinross Buildings

New Primary School: CCllr MacKenzie reported on a meeting he attended with CCllr Bryson and Cllrs Cuthbert and Giacopazzi. An alteration to the original plans has now been agreed between the architect and members of the senior staff and, although still being discussed, the construction firm have provided information on the process regarding timing/access for heavy vehicle traffic and the play area limitations for the children. One area of concern is that the plans for the sport hall include a flat roof. There are also lighting issues.

Planning Application for 300 houses

15/01512/FLM Land 300 metres northwest of Lathro Farm: erection of 300 dwelling houses, formation of open space, landscaping and associated infrastructure works. This was discussed by the majority of community councillors at a recent meeting. There are some serious concerns over this application,

which the CC will highlight to PKC. These include: density; effect on education and health services; flooding; and access. Mr Lawrie said that Gallowhill Road should be entirely paved and also adapted for cycling. The motorway junction will also require improvement to accommodate this level of traffic. The CC would prefer the old High School site to be developed before Lathro Farm development. (Persimmon are the builders in both applications.) Cllrs Giacopazzi and Cuthbert to enquire about this.

The LDP shows the number of houses for this site as 260 (140 houses up to year 2024).

Mention was made to the process in relation to Neighbour Notification, Environmental Impact Statement and the Planning Application. 21 days were allowed for comment regarding the Environmental Impact Statement but only 14 days in relation to the Planning Application. A member of the public advised that he lived close by this proposed development but did not receive Notification. The distance set for such Neighbour Notification is 20 metres. Cllr Giacopazzi advised that he was attending the Planners Scotland Meeting in Glasgow the following week and would raise these matters. Mr Miles commented on information he had received from the Council in relation to planning and was asked to provide this for CC reference.

Reports from Councillors

Cllr Giacopazzi has reported the issue with the **drains** at Wilson Court and at the zebra crossing in Springfield Road.

Cllr Cuthbert commented on the council **budget** for this coming year.

Cllr Barnacle spoke about the **A977**. The possibility of trunking is well into the future.

Development Plan: The Main Issues Report and associated Environmental Report are now open for consultation. [See p. 22.] Cllr Barnacle advised that the opportunity site at Lethangie planned for the new Primary School has now been zoned for housing. Cllr Barnacle referred to capacity in relation to infrastructure, health service, public transport etc and will forward the CC a copy of documentation.

Correspondence

Citylink Bus Service: Response received. Whilst the number of Citylink journeys between Kinross and Edinburgh has reduced, Citylink along with Parks of Hamilton and Stagecoach East Scotland continue to provide a large number of journeys between Kinross and Edinburgh. Although the Stagecoach East Scotland journeys have longer journey times than the previous Citylink journeys, had the Citylink journeys remained, they would have increased the journey time quite substantially to cater for the worsening traffic congestion when travelling to and from Edinburgh in the peak periods. They will continue to review the changes made and consider the feedback received from customers, community councils and local authorities.

Developer Contributions Supplementary Consultation: Revision available for consultation until 19 February. See PKC website.

Social Prescribing: Communication received regarding a new service in partnership with PKC and the NHS. It is about linking people up to activities in the community that they might benefit from.

Play Area, Lathro Park: Communication received from PKC Community Greenspace advising of proposed refurbishment works to the park in 2016. Consultation is to be carried out early this year to establish the needs of the community with the planned works commencing in Spring 2016. There was confusion regarding the location of this park and the Secretary was asked to clarify this with PKC.

Other Business

Roads: CCllr Stewart advised of a hole in the road opposite the entrance to Chance Inn Farm.

Social Housing: CCllr Davies questioned whether there was a policy strategy for social housing, explaining by this he was referring to rented accommodation. It is proposed that the Lathro site include 25% affordable housing. Our understanding is that Social Housing refers to rented accommodation, whereas Affordable Housing refers to the lower end of the purchase ladder. It was pointed out that Kinross is in dire need of rented accommodation. Cllr Giacopazzi will raise this with PKC.

High Street: CCllr Thomas questioned whether all works are now complete and if a further bus stop was to be added. It was confirmed that no further bus stops are to be placed on the street. Mr Miles had emailed with issues regarding crossing the High Street and CCllr Scott agreed that there had been incidents at the crossing outside the Co-op. Cllr Giacopazzi added that the project manager toured the High Street following the works and these matters were looked at. It was commented that a certain amount of education is required as some people do not understand the concept. Speed of the traffic on the High Street was also raised. Mr Miles asked if the CC would support his comments regarding the High Street and another member of the public questioned whether a Road Safety Ordnance had been carried out. The Secretary is to circulate Mr Miles' letter to CC members.

Sub-Committees: Postponed to the February meeting. Yellow lines: Due to the weather, no works would take place, but these were scheduled for later in the year.



Fountain: A funding application for £20,000 lodged in September has been rejected. TRACKS are still willing to go forward with this project and encouragement has been received from other funders to lodge applications.

TRACKS: Mr Lawrie advised that there are a number of projects ongoing and mentioned Crook of Devon to Kinross railway line; complete cycle way from Crook of Devon to Kinross and a planning application and funding for a walkway from Vane Farm to Lochore Meadows. Also succeeded in the route for the Heritage Trail up to Loch Leven Farm Shop.

Former High School site: CCllr Thomas questioned Cllr Cuthbert in relation to the submission of the planning application as he had mentioned previously that Persimmon intended to lodge all applications at the same time. The Lathro application has now been submitted. He was unable to answer this, but it was noted that at a recent meeting of the Property Sub-Committee, Councillors agreed to extend Persimmon's deadline for obtaining planning consent (or lodging and appeal) to 2017.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 3 February 2016 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

Portmoak Community Council News from the December Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 8 December 2015 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel, B Calderwood, R Cairncross, A Robertson, T Smith and C Vlasto; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and W Robertson; and 10 members of the public. **Apologies** were received from CCllrs D Morris and S Forde; and PC Jim Wilson.

Portmoak Cemetery: A solution to the problem could be found were a suitable plot of land to be identified.

Police Report: The CC noted the monthly police report and recent Commander's bulletins.

Treasurer's Report: General account £527.40. MBW account £874.12. It was agreed that the Treasurer be given access to view the bank statements on-line and to produce them for audit purposes. All other banking transactions would be conducted in the existing manner with two signatures for each cheque.

Planning - New Applications

15/01834/FLL Levenglen Nursing Home, Glenlomond: Demolition of Nursing Home and erection of 14 dwelling houses and associated works. Given the interest in this development and the comparative brevity of the consultation period, the CC had sought and been granted an extension to the period for making comment until after its next meeting due to be held on 12 January. A preliminary discussion at this meeting would be concluded at the January meeting when the views of the CC would be confirmed and soundings in the community taken into account.

15/02009/FLL Well County Inn, Scotlandwell: Installation of biomass boiler and erection of cabin. No comment.

15/01922/FLL Site of former Arnot Lint Auchmuirbridge: Demolition of dwelling house and erection of replacement dwelling house. No comment.

15/02039/FLL Renewal of permission 12/02066/FLL (alteration and replacement of radome), Meteorological Station, Munduff Hill, Auchmuirbridge. No comment.

Planning - Progress with Developments

Arrangements at Whitecraigs consequent on departure of the developer. A resident speaking on behalf of five neighbouring properties expressed concern that the high False Cypress hedge which bordered their properties would not now be cut back. The recent procedure of "raising the crown" was not adequate. There were a number of disadvantages arising from the hedge, not least diminished natural light. As a result of discussion the resident will now explore with PKC whether an intervention under the High Hedge legislation would be relevant and include Ward Councillors, A & J Stephen and the CC in her correspondence. In addition the CC will seek clarity from both PKC and the developer, A & J Stephen, on the ownership and maintenance of residual landscaped and non-landscaped plots across the Whitecraigs development.

Roads Report: CCllr Calderwood reported that: a decision by PKC setting out the arrangements (including speed restrictions) for the proposed "Green Route" from the A911 along the Dryside Road to the county boundary was awaited; and that the hierarchy of gritting arrangements as they affected Portmoak (including pavements) would be clarified. Arrangements for the trial 20mph limits in Easter Balgedie, Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell, if confirmed, were anticipated shortly. Concern that the approach to the new Gullet bridge coming north on the B920 lacked adequate warning signage

on the bridge would be explored. The damaged bollard on the build-out in Kinnesswood, as approached from Easter Balgedie, had been reported and a replacement or repair sought.

Paths Report: CCllr Smith reported on the effect of weather on the upper stretches of the Michael Bruce Way. There would be a number of repairs to make but in general the work undertaken over the summer had held up well.

With the support of TRACKS there had been a successful meeting at Lochend Farm Shop to examine the practicality of commissioning the new path from the Shop through Levenmouth to join the Heritage Trail. A project to take this forward led by TRACKS, working with the respective owners, was now in hand.

P&K Integration Joint Board for Health and Social Care

This is an important matter and these proposals are significant arrangements which could affect all Portmoak residents. The new Joint Board had commissioned a consultation on the arrangements proposed. An aging population and a drive to deliver more care in the community would mean changes to the delivery of both health and social care. Led by CCllr Alison Robertson, the CC would finalise its response before the required date of 25 January.

Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr Cuthbert had sought sight of the report examining the relationship between CC decisions to make a planning objection and decisions taken under delegated powers or by the Development Management Committee for the same applications. He reported that there was work underway to make the PKC website easier to use; and that he had progressed concerns about the siting of the broadband cabinet at Wester Balgedie.

Cllr Barnacle commented that the process to confirm the next PKC budget was underway and that funds would be increasingly squeezed. The Main Issues Report would be published for consultation before the year's end and it would include: a recommendation to look more critically at infrastructure provisions to sustain new developments; the use of generators on travelling folk sites; and arrangements for a new area for development at Crook of Devon.

Cllr Giacopazzi confirmed the pressure on the forthcoming budget.

News from the January Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 12 January 2016 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), B Calderwood, R Cairncross (Secretary), A Robertson, S Forde, D Morris, T Smith and C Vlasto; P&K Cllr D Cuthbert; PC A Spalding and 22 members of the public. **Apologies**: P&K Cllrs W Robertson, M Barnacle and J Giacopazzi.

Police Report: The CC noted the monthly report. There had been further local thefts (2 quad bikes stolen from Easter Balgedie) and an overnight intrusion into a hangar at Portmoak airfield. The Commander's Bulletins of 10, 24, 31 December and of 7 January were noted.

Treasurer's Report: The general account at the month end of December was £473.34 while the MBW account remained unaltered £874.12, giving a total of funds on hand of £1,347.55.

Planning – New Applications

15/01834/FLL Levenglen Nursing Home, Glenlomond: demolition of Nursing Home and erection of 14 detached 4/5 bedroom dwelling houses. The CC's views were informed

by individual objections made to PKC, from correspondence reflecting the opinion of the residents of Wester Balgedie, by comments from PKC Road Safety department following a site visit and by the views expressed by residents from both Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie at a well-attended Council meeting.

If this development is completed there would be some 60 dwellings within Glenlomond village and further four nearby. All would depend on a narrow and twisting mile-long access road which passed through the conservation village of Wester Balgedie where the road is particularly narrow with three bends providing almost no forward visibility.

In principle the CC supported the replacement of the defunct nursing home with a residential development. However, it objected to this application for the following reasons:

- the design of the housing proposed. This was not exceptional and the height of some of the properties at 2.5 storeys was excessive and, in context, disproportionate. The CC would favour properties of no more than 2 storeys.
- the access route to the development within Glenlomond.
 This would be inconvenient to current residents and place them, including children, at unnecessary risk. The CC supported the evaluation of an alternative and more direct route into the development starting near the main entrance to Glenlomond.
- the property on plot 14 would occupy a unique position set apart from the main development. It relied on the use of high amenity value land and a steep and limited direct access onto the narrow Dryside Road. As this is the primary access route to Glenlomond (where sightlines are poor and where there is no provision for roadside parking) as well as providing an attractive entrance to the village, the CC objected to a house on this plot.
- the access route through the conservation village of Wester Balgedie and onwards to Glenlomond. The CC noted the increasing number of large vehicles (HGVs, buses, tractors and trailers, tankers, large commercial vans) which find transit of Wester Balgedie challenging. Residents' properties and cars had been struck and damaged and banking and verges continually eroded. The increase in vehicular traffic put the safety of pedestrians and other non-motorised users within the village at risk as there were no footpaths and high banking made seeking refuge difficult. Opportunities for such vehicles to pass on the road beyond Wester Balgedie were also very restricted. The CC recognised that there is an urgent need to take pressure off this access route by better management of the traffic using it. It objects to work on this development commencing before all improvements identified for the access road are evaluated and, taking account of local priorities, provided. Without such provisions the construction phase will exacerbate an already difficult situation.

In general the CC noted that:

- greater diversity across newly commissioned housing within Portmoak would not be met by this development.
 There is a need for affordable housing and for smaller homes to meet the requirements of those purchasing their first home, for single people and for the elderly who seek to "down-size".
- arising from this application, the longer term planning matter of improvement to the road junction at the Balgedie

Toll linked to options for a short route to Glenlomond bypassing Wester Balgedie should be explored.

Progress with developments

- a) Arrangements at Whitecraigs consequent on departure of the developer. The Chairman had written to A & J Stephen seeking clarity on a number of matters relating to the Company's departure from Whitecraigs.
- b) Lomond Inn (15/00505/FLL & 15/00506/CON). Confirmation that new proposals are being processed by PKC was awaited.

Planning applications which have been the subject of objections from community councils – Report by PKC

The CC noted that this report clarified the fate of CC objections to planning applications over the past year. In general, few applications were granted by PKC's Development Management Committee or by planning officers under delegated provisions when a CC had objected.

Roads Report: CCllr Calderwood reported that: Clarence either knew or would be informed of the deficient state of the build-out bollards in both Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell as approached from the north; and that the blocked drains and potholes at the junction of the Leslie Road and Main Street Scotlandwell would be pursued.

Paths Report: CCllr Smith reported that the Paths Group will meet soon. As the level of Loch Leven had risen, the Heritage Trail had been temporarily flooded. The CC would be interested to learn how the loch levels were regulated.

George Lawrie (TRACKS) reported that:

- work on the path from RSPB (Vane Farm) across Benarty would start soon and that the possibility of upgrading the tunnel under the B9097 to make it disabled-friendly was being evaluated, but provision for a new underpass near the existing tunnel seemed a more likely option; and that
- there had been further progress in commissioning the path from Lochend via Levenmouth to the Heritage Trail with SEPA agreeing to culverting the burn by the old Gullet Bridge. The CC would support the application for planning permission for the required works.

PKC Local Development Plan Developer Contributions Supplementary Guidance Consultation. The CC will give consideration to this before responding.

PKC Local Development Plan Main Issues Report Consultation. The CC will give consideration to this before responding.

Perth and Kinross Integration Joint Board for Health and Social Care. Consultation on Draft Strategic and Joint Commissioning Plan. The CC will respond shortly.

Ward Councillor Report (Councillor Cuthbert)

The Boundary Commission's report could be anticipated soon.

The Council would shortly confirm its budget for next year. There will be a sizeable deficit to accommodate and cuts to some services could be anticipated.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 9 February 2016 at Portmoak School.

News from the EGM held on 1 December 2015

Following the appointment of the new CC members in November, it was necessary to hold an EGM. Cllr Barnacle took the chair, in the absence of Cllr Giacopazzi, to elect the officers of the new CC as follows: Chair: Trudy Duffy. Secretary: Kevin Borthwick. Treasurer: Graham Pye. Data Controller: Kevin Borthwick.

Cllr Barnacle then handed the chair over to Trudy and the normal meeting commenced. After the meeting was over, it was discovered that some EGM items had been omitted. These would be covered in a brief EGM before the start of the next normal CC meeting.

News from the December Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 1 December 2015 were: CCllrs T Duffy, K Borthwick, G Pye, A Cheape, G Kilby and R Nesbitt; P&K Cllr M Barnacle; a police representative and six members of the public. **Apologies:** P&K Cllrs D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and W Robertson.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: The CC had contacted Sgt Nicholson, stating that the police reports that submitted don't always cover local crimes. This was apparently due to the officer being new to the job and not knowing exactly what was required. Sergeant Sam Greshon attended this meeting and a report had been received, covering the two crimes in our area that we knew about from the weekly Commander's reports: Housebreaking in Naemoor Road, Crook of Devon (17 Nov) and Mill Gardens, Powmill (5 Nov). These are under enquiry. The community is concerned that there seems to be an upsurge in rural crimes in this area; hopefully more patrols can be provided. Cllr Barnacle has reported another instance of flytipping at on the Carnbo end of the Gelvan Road. The officer said she would report it.

Crook Moss Travellers' Site: Works are being carried out at the site entrance, hedges planted and other landscaping, in order to comply with one of the planning conditions. Cllrs Cuthbert and Giacopazzi have been trying to arrange a site visit with Jim Valentine. Drum residents are still reporting that there is a noise issue. Cllr Barnacle has received a letter from Scottish Water confirming that a "growth project" is required to trigger an increase in the capacity of the Drum sewage system, and this will not take place for at least two and a half years. Consequently it will be impossible for the residents to meet the planning target of achieving a drainage connection within a year.



92 high street, kinross ky13 8aj 01577 861903 or 07738 514342 audreytelford123@aol.com Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: An agreement has been signed between the developers and this CC to define the Community Benefit that will be made available once the scheme is operational. At that time, the CC will set up another bank account, and a committee consisting of some CC members and members of other local community groups, to decide on how the benefit is to be used. There was a problem signing the agreement as the date for signing was during the period when the CC had not been reinstated after the elections. Lambhill Chipping plant: The Appeal was not heard at the Local Review Body meeting on 10 Nov. It may be heard at the 8 Dec meeting. Meanwhile, twelve of the most affected residents have written to PKC to reiterate their concerns.

A977 Defects and Mitigation Measures: Cllr Barnacle is sceptical about whether the government will agree to the retrunking, but pressure continues.

Station Road Adoption: Cllr Barnacle reported that the funding gap has now been met by the Village Hall, and assuming that all participants meet their agreed commitments, then the adoption will take place, hopefully next spring. Cllr Barnacle will now hand over the continuing responsibility for the project to the Village Hall committee.

Lambhill Forestry Site: There was a Ranger-led walkabout on 21 November, which was well attended and informative.

Signage at Vicar's Bridge Road: Cllr Barnacle reports that it's been ordered.

Potholes in Craigend Road: CCllr Borthwick reported that this work is now taking place, and the fly-tipped asbestos has been removed.

Safer Route to School – **Drum:** Cllr Barnacle and CCllr Borthwick met with Darren McKeown of PKC's Roads Department. They discussed moving/adding the 30/40mph speed limit on the B9097 further out to beyond the road into Drum, and also possibly extending the footpath. There is a new initiative, due in January, to implement 20mph speed limits through the villages of Crook, Powmill and Blairingone. As well as the immediate effect in the villages, this might send a message to road users that the A977 is not a road that provides a quick route across country.

State of Road Through Drum and Missing Grit Bin: Received a response from PKC to say that there is no budget to provide new grit bins, and only existing ones are filled.

Landscape Areas – Kinross-shire: The consultants who did the study for PKC's Landscape areas are currently doing the same exercise for Clacks.

Bollards Opposite Crook Village Hall: Awaiting a report from PKC Roads Department on how the safety of this section of road could be improved.

Crook Moss Community Involvement: Ongoing.

Boundary Commission: Awaiting decision.

Scottish Government Planning Review: This review of the planning process seems to be being hurried through with little, if any, community involvement. Kinross-shire Civic Trust have sent a strongly worded letter to the Scottish Government pointing out that there was hardly any time to respond, especially at this time when all the CCs are being reformed. The review was announced in mid-October with formal evidence required by 1 December. Additionally the review body consists of only three members. This CC supports the views expressed by the trust.

CC Business: Meetings attended: CCllr Kilby attended an inaugural meeting where the creation of a Community Sport Hub was proposed by Kirsteen Ross, PKC's Community

Sport Hub Officer. This would be an opportunity for various sports clubs, or any person or organisation interested in sport, to combine their resources and possibly enable the clubs to get cheaper lets, access facilities, obtain grants, organise community transport, etc., by acting together. It would also help to widen participation in sport by the general public. The attendees were positive about this idea, and so a meeting will be held on 14 January to formalise the setting up of the hub. A £200 grant is available from PKC to cover start-up expenses. CCllr Kilby will attend the next meeting with a view to taking an active part.

CCllr Borthwick attended the meeting about Drum speed limits as described above.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Barnacle has written to Citylink about the cut in intercity services between Perth and Edinburgh. The Scottish Government should be supporting these services which connect the Park and Ride car parks to the cities.

Cllr Barnacle has managed to find the owners of Ivy Cottage, and let them know that the community is concerned about the state of the building.

PKC has discussed the Main Issues Report, and three amendments were passed: The policy on Gypsy Traveller sites has been amended to ensure adequate separation from other developments in the absence of a grid connection, i.e., when generators would be used; There will be a report on infrastructure development in the MIR; There was to be no development in Kinross-shire other than Blairingone, but a development in Crook has been added as an option for community consultation, which would mean changing the settlement boundary.

Planning Matters

15/01982/FLL Change of use of coach house to mixed entertainment use, formation of decking, removal of stone wall and erection of temporary marquee and toilets (in retrospect), Tullibole Castle and 15/01983/LBC listed building consent for same. No CC comment.

EGM: As some agenda items had been omitted from the EGM held on 1 December 2015, another was held before the start of the normal meeting:

Election of Vice Chair: Richard Nesbitt.

The Constitution, Standing Orders and Code of Conduct were adopted.

The Treasurer gave a brief financial statement: The current balance is £148.10.

Dates of the meetings for the rest of the year are as follows: 2 February, 1 March, 5 April, 3 May (AGM), 7 June.

There were no outstanding training issues.

This concluded the EGM, and the normal meeting followed.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: Sgt Hughes and PC Sturgess attended. No report had been received by the time of the meeting, although the officers present had a copy of the report and will email it. Recent crimes in our area include the theft of a money box from Crook of Devon, for which a suspect has been arrested. The CC complimented the Police force for their increased presence, especially on the A977, during the Forth Road Bridge (FRB) closure and for their management of the resulting increased traffic. The increased presence will continue during the restriction of HGVs over the FRB. MoP asked if the Kinross Police station was still open - yes, it is still in use by officers 24/7, although there is no longer a constantly manned public desk. CCllr Borthwick expressed concern about the number of incidents (at least 12) in Kinross-shire in the last few months. PC Sturgess pointed out that the majority of these incidents were not in our immediate area, which continues to be fairly safe. It's not clear why the number of thefts is increasing, but the Police will continue to maintain vigilance, including night patrols, within the limits of their available resources. MoP asked if there had been any increase in accidents during the FRB closure – the three incidents known to the Police all involved drivers who would have been using that route anyway, but possibly the increased traffic resulted in more congestion during the handling of the events which made them more obvious.

Crook Moss Travellers' Site: The review of the compliance with the 2012 permission would be at the DMC meeting the following week. The paper to be presented reports that all generators have now been fitted with acoustic housings, and there are no new noise complaints; SSE are working on an electricity supply and discussions continue with Scottish Water on how to address the drainage issue. Cllr Barnacle reported a conversation with Nick Brian who said that there was currently an enforcement notice in place, but it was not clear which condition this applied to. Cllr Barnacle also pointed out the inconsistency in the current planning application (see Councillors' reports below) in which Neighbour Notifications had been made to six addresses on the site, even though the existing consent only allows five.

Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: Work has started, but is held up by the weather.

Lambhill Chipping plant: At the 8 Dec meeting of the Local Review Body (LRB) it was decided that the Appeal would not be decided until the applicant had attended and made a presentation. The LRB will inform the applicant what they wish to be covered in this presentation. A MoP stated that it seemed only fair that local residents should also have a chance to make such a presentation, and Cllr Barnacle has contacted the LRB convenor with the same request. The LRB are being scrupulous in ensuring that there is no bias in their deliberations by not allowing any local councillors to sit on the LRB, and the Convenor, who has declared an interest in this application, is handing over the chair to another councillor during this appeal's review.

Community Council News

A977 Defects and Mitigation Measures: Cllr Barnacle notes that progress towards re-trunking will be a very long process. Once the FRB is fully reopened, PKC Roads department should check for any damage to the A977 as a result of the increased traffic during the diversion, and apply to the Scottish Government for funding to repair it.

Community Sport Hub: GK will attend the next meeting. **Cuts in Inter-City Bus Services:** Cllr Giacopazzi reports that there is to be a new X56 service leaving Edinburgh about 5pm to carry commuters back to Kinross.

Station Road Adoption: Cllr Barnacle wrote to all the residents on 17 December; he reported that the funding gap of £800 has now been met by the Village Hall Committee, who have set up a sub-committee to take the adoption forward. The first event to raise the funds will be a Burns' Supper on 5 February.

Landscape Areas – Kinross-shire: There is an opportunity to ask for change in a meeting this month.

Emergency Support Centre: During the FRB closure, the CC was asked if they would help set up a centre to receive people stranded as a result of accident or bad weather. Several of the CC members have agreed to be contacts and a request has been made to use the Village Hall, although we have not yet had a response from the Committee.

Waymarking of Core Paths in Blairingone: Consultation documents have been sent out to affected parties. It appears that the proposed signs are acceptable.

Broomhill Cottage to Aldie Road Multi-Use Path: George Lawrie was present and reported that a contractor has been appointed and work on this path will start shortly. The surface will now be tarmac, and the existing railway ballast will be reused for the path founds. Self-closing gates will be installed at each end of the path. Over the next three years, the path will be extended to Kinross. George recommended that the CC should consider setting up a "Paths Group" to help maintain existing paths and champion the creation of new paths – similar groups have been very successful in other CC areas.

LDP2 MIR Consultation: The Main Issues Report (MIR) has recently been published. Comments on the MIR must be made before 16 March. *[See page 22.]* Main items of interest in this area are: Proposals to review infrastructure (roads, sewage provision etc); Additional development site at Crook of Devon (to get community benefit to provide roundabout and to trigger Sewage plant expansion); Development proposals in Blairingone (to elicit community comment).

Councillors' Reports

A constituent has approached Cllr Barnacle to request a traffic direction priority sign on the bridge at Naemoor Road. It's possible that some works to the A977 in Blairingone will be in this year's budget.

Cllr Giacopazzi is due to attend a meeting with the Scottish Government planning department and will raise the issue that the current rules for neighbour notification of 20m radius rather than the old rule of adjacent landowners don't seem to be working.

Planning Matters

15/01971/FLL Erection of stables at Kingswood, Drum. No CC comment.

15/02078/FLL Change of use from paddock to form 3no gypsy/traveller pitches and erection of a fence (in retrospect) at **Crook Moss**, Fossoway. **Object** due to insufficient capacity in sewage system and noise pollution.

15/01997/FLL Erection of a dwelling house at land at Blashieburn, Vicar's Bridge Road, Blairingone. Comments for this application were due by 21 December, but the CC obtained an extension until 8 January. However, the applicant submitted a revised block plan on the 5th, which seems to be a material change to the application. Substantial local objection to this development was voiced at the meeting. Cllr Giacopazzi said he would speak to Nick Brian to clarify whether there would now be a further opportunity for public comment, and indeed whether the application needed to be resubmitted. The CC will decide on its position once these matters have been clarified. Cllr Barnacle pointed out that the proposed changes to the Blairingone settlement boundary in the MIR would have a bearing on this application.

Correspondence was available for viewing. Tracy Ramsay of PKC has sent details of funding opportunities for local groups and news of the next Better Place to Live Fair.

Other Business

When will the Rumbling Bridge car park be ready for use? Cllr Barnacle explained that the responsibility for constructing this has passed from Thomson to another developer, but that the Planning Department are comfortable with this arrangement and expect the work to be completed in due course.

It appears that the work on the Kinross roundabout has been suspended during the FRB diversion.

Some time ago it was suggested that road signs could be cleaned by the Unpaid Work Team, but this was ruled out for H&S reasons. However, the signs are still not getting cleaned and this is becoming a serious problem. Are PKC going to do it? Cllr Giacopazzi explained that this is one of many services that are no longer financed.

Water is coming off the Tom Thumb road in Carnbo presenting a possible road hazard were it to freeze. Cllr Giacopazzi will investigate.

Cllr Barnacle, chairing, welcomed everyone to the meeting. There were six Community Councillors elected to represent Cleish and Blairadam CC: Patty Fraser, Hugh Somerville, Fran Gillespie, Nigel Robertson, Margaret Traylor and Ron Kitchin. There are currently two vacancies, which can be filled by co-opting new members after 6 months (6 May).

Appointment of Chair: Ron Kitchin was proposed by Hugh Somerville and seconded by Patty Fraser. He accepted and the meeting was handed over to the new Chairperson.

Other appointments: Vice Chair: H Somerville. Secretary: P Fraser. Treasurer: F Gillespie. Minute Secy: H Somerville. Data controller: P Fraser.

Adoption of Constitution etc: All CCllrs agreed that they had read the Constitution, Standing Orders and Code of Conduct for CCs, and agreed to "Ascertain, coordinate and express to the local and public authorities, the views of our community, which we represent, in relation to matters for which those authorities are responsible and to take such action in the interest of our community as appears to us to be expedient and practical."

News from the November Meeting

Present: As for EGM above. **Apologies**: P&K Cllr Willie Robertson and CCllr Nigel Robertson.

Matters arising: There has been no reinstatement of the field fence line opposite Nivingstone. Both Cllrs Cuthbert and Barnacle have spoken to Gary McConnell, who advised that he had spoken with the landowner. Nothing has happened yet so this will be followed up again.

Crime: Nothing new to report in Cleish and Blairadam from the attending officer. There have been vehicle thefts (mainly from farms) around Glenfarg and Portmoak. A parked vehicle has been scraped by a passing car in Blairadam. The new smooth road surface has resulted in some faster traffic in Keltybridge & Maryburgh. The 20mph trial period is soon to be started which is hoped to improve this situation. Motorbikes have been reported again entering the woodland from forest road.

The police number '101' has been very slow to answer on some occasions; this has been reportedly due to insufficient staffing levels.

Correspondence: There has been a local petition of the local community in Maryburgh and Keltybridge regarding the current bus service. There were 52 signatures supporting the continued current bus service, without any restrictions. This correlates to approximately 50% of the local community.

Planning: Fiona MacGregor will be co-opted in May as a member of the CC, however in the short term will be consulted on planning issues due to her experience in the planning process. CCllr Traylor will be taking a more active role consulting the community in Blairadam on planning issues. CCllr N Robertson will be seeking local views on matters related to the roads.

Everyone who objected to Plot 27a in Maryburgh has recently received a letter advising of the approval of the application. This delay was thought to be due to the conclusion of a Section 75 Agreement. Cllr Cuthbert will investigate if this is the case.

Citylink: Cllr Barnacle reported on the reduction of the Citylink service between Perth and Edinburgh.

Top-class presentation at the Kinross-shire Partnership Business Breakfast



December 2nd saw several new faces join the many local entrepreneurs who avail themselves regularly of the excellent networking opportunities offered by the Kinross-shire Partnership's winter series of Business Breakfasts. While the customary bacon and eggs were being eagerly ingested, Chairman Alisdair Stewart flagged up a forthcoming tourism seminar which the Kinross-shire Partnership is holding at Tullibole Castle on 20 January. He also mentioned the interactive touchscreens which the Partnership plans to sponsor at the following three locations around the heritage trail: Loch Leven's Larder, the Pier and RSPB.

Next it was 'back to school' for attendees, with an information-packed presentation by Sarah Brown, head teacher and campus leader at Loch Leven Community Campus, and her colleague Jenny Breen. Sarah opened by explaining that she joined Kinross High in August 2015 and emphasised her vision for the campus being a hub of activity at the heart of the Kinross-shire community.

She stressed, also, that the school is keen to establish links with local businesses, especially given the current political eagerness to develop Scotland's young workforce. She referred to the Wood Report, published in 2014, which revealed that 53,000 young people are not in work or education – they wake up every morning wondering if their community actually needs them. Sarah believes that schools can play a part in solving this problem by preparing leavers better for employment.

Jenny Breen subsequently picked up on this theme when she addressed the audience about the way in which Kinross High School is currently being supported by local businesses who give senior pupils valuable insights into the world of work. She cited three examples of recent support from Kinross-shire entrepreneurs: a workplace visit, organised in collaboration with Ian Cormack of Todd and Duncan, for pupils studying Business Studies and Modern Languages; mentoring and work experience provided by Emma Niven of Loch Leven's Larder; and mentoring provided by Mozolowski & Murray Ltd.

Jenny highlighted the importance of tailoring work experience to the needs of the individual pupil to maximise the benefits to be derived from it. She is keen to establish links with any local employers (including rural businesses) who would be prepared to offer mentoring or workplace visits for senior pupils.

She also emphasised that opportunities to become involved with the school were not restricted to providing work experience. She would be equally delighted to hear from anyone interested in assisting with, for example, the forthcoming production of Bugsy Malone or willing to represent their profession at the school's Jobs Fair on 16 February.



Name: Barry Davies, sometimes known as Baz (I do not like it).

Age: 49 but, unfortunately, I was born in 1957 making me 58.

Occupation: Retired Mining Engineer and Health and Safety Practitioner.

How long have you been with the Rotary Club of Kinross?

Barry Davies

I joined Kinross Rotary in 1997. However, I was a Round Tabler for 10 years and before that a founder President of Rotaract in the Rhondda, Wales.

Why did you become involved in Rotary?

I have moved around UK with work and this organisation provides an instant body of colleagues and friends in the community. I totally support the ethos of Rotary and want to help make a difference locally, nationally and internationally. Helping others is very rewarding to the spirit.

What was your first impression?

Originally the club was men only, but we now have women members. Everyone is helpful and genuinely interested in you. Every member gets involved in supporting the club activities to make a difference.

At three out of four of the weekly meetings, we have a guest speaker. The subject areas are huge and interesting. For example, the building of the new aircraft carrier, or the new Forth bridge, to training a blind dog, or understanding the environment, the importance of trees and not forgetting the various charity organisations.

What surprised you?

Kinross Rotary arranges many local activities to help others and raise charitable funds. Rotary provides an opportunity to develop business contacts. On average, Kinross Rotary distributes £10,000 annually to charities.

What's the best thing you've done in Rotary?

In 2010 I led a team of five young professionals (two police officers, a marketing manager, a business manager and a call centre manager) to Arizona USA for a month. We each had separate vocational visits, cultural visits, and met lots of important people in these areas. We now have close friends in Arizona and exchange visits annually.

In March 2015, I also had the opportunity to make a difference in Kenya in an HIV/Aids orphanage where we spent two weeks helping to repair buildings among other things.

If you could change one thing about Rotary, what would it be?

Rotary is a huge organisation raising funds (\$2million per week) making a significant difference to many lives. Rotary must **tell** people of the good being done so they can join and help.

What do you wish other people knew about Rotary?

People are generally ignorant about the organisation of Rotary. They think is an old man's private club. This is far from the truth — we have men and women of all ages, we are non-political and non-religious.

We have 1.2 million members in 180 countries and are the largest voluntary organisation in the world. It is 110 years old. Members all have the same belief "service above self" to make a difference.

Rotary has a seat on the United Nations Council.

Rotary does things undercover and tells no one. For example, did you know that Rotary paid hundreds of millions of pounds over the past 30 years to eradicate Polio in the world? We are almost there with 99% eradication.

Sum up your Rotary Club in three words:

Amazing. Friendly. Worthwhile.

Did you know.... Rotary manages and supplies thousands of shelter boxes all over the world when there are natural disasters or emergencies.

Kinross-shire Historical Society

On Monday 14 December, Kinross-shire Historical Society heard another very interesting talk by

Professor Munro. This year his subject was 'The Naturalist on Loch Leven from 17th Century to the Present Day'.

Professor Munro has now been knighted by Prince Albert of Monaco for his work with the Prince's conservation foundation.

He began the talk by explaining that an exhibition in the Campus Library by Perth Museum had prompted his interest in the topic of naturalists on Loch Leven. Unfortunately, the said display was full of rows of dead birds shot by naturalists in the 19th century for study purposes and was not well received.

Loch Leven has attracted visitors for hundreds of years for its history, scenery, and wildlife. Professor Munro started with the naturalists of 1600s and 1700s and what species they found on their visits to the loch. At the beginning of the 19th century, there were many changes in the ecology of the loch and this affected the species present there.

Different methods of catching fish developed and there were concerns about pollution. Angling, as opposed to netting, developed and a hatchery was set up at the Ury Burn. The hotels in Kinross prospered on the back of the fishing.

In the early 20th century the fishing continued to develop and the pier was built and annual competitions were held. Large numbers of fish were being caught and the hatcheries were further developed. Also in the early part of 20th century, the first Bathymetrical Survey of the loch was carried out by Sir John Murray. Scientists were now studying many aspects of the flora and fauna at Loch Leven.

RSPB came to Loch Leven and opened their nature reserve at Vane Farm in 1971. In the 1970s a report on algal pollution was published after 10 years of research, but in 1992 the launch of Scottish Natural Heritage was blighted by 'Scum Saturday'. This meant that more research was needed into the ecology.

From this, The Rural Access Committee Kinross-shire [TRACKS] was set up. They have now completed a trail round the loch which brings large numbers of people to Loch Leven and which has boosted the local economy. Everyone can now be a naturalist and enjoy or study the ecology.

Catriona McLeod gave the vote of thanks, thanking David Munro for giving Kinross-shire Historical Society yet another great talk on yet another topic. The 'dead bird display' at the campus had been a good thing after all as it had inspired him to give this talk.



'Safe Places for Dooking' by Eric Simpson

On 18 January, Eric Simpson gave an interesting and entertaining illustrated talk on the lido craze in Scotland.

Seaside resorts began with doctors telling patients to go sea bathing as a cure in the 18th century. Scarborough and Brighton became the first medical health resorts.

By the 19th century, the Victorians were keen on swimming, along with many other sports, for men. An Australian woman remodelled women's swimming costumes, which made swimming a possibility for them too. She toured many parts of America and Europe to publicise these costumes and was arrested on an American beach for being indecent. Male and female bathing was kept separate at different times.

The 1930s saw pools being created in many seaside towns. As they were quite expensive to build there was a lot of self-help and fundraising done locally. There was a lot of pride having the pools, and opening galas could be quite elaborate with thousands of people attending the events.

It was also important for the towns to attract visitors and town councils got involved if their ratepayers approved, investing to bring in the tourists. Posters were displayed to attract visitors. Some pools were tidal such as at St Andrews, Cellardyke and St Monan's in Fife, and others had distinctive Art Deco buildings. Portobello was the biggest pool in Scotland. It cost £80,000 in 1936. It could take 2000 bathers and 6000 spectators. Not all pools were on the coast. A pool was built at Letham Glen in Leven and it is now a sunken garden.

As time went on, some pools were improved with attached boating ponds and paddling pools.

In the interwar years, diving became popular. Pools added diving boards and displays of diving were given, drawing large crowds. Bathing beauty competitions were started though not many girls wanted to take part and they were mostly in dresses.

The advent of cheap foreign holidays, enclosed pools being built and high running costs brought the end to these early pools. Many have completely gone but parts of others, such as Cellardyke, can still be seen. Today, the pool built in Macduff is the only Grade A listed pool in Scotland.

David Walker, on behalf of the members, thanked Eric Simpson for his very entertaining and informative talk.



Toad in the Hole

After taking care of your diet in January, you may want a recipe for a nourishing dish in February. This is the favourite of my elder daughter and her family, better even than a well-known fast food outlet.

Ingredients

8 pork sausages 1 tablespoon vegetable oil 225g plain flour 4 eggs 250ml milk Salt and pepper to taste

Method

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, eggs and half of the milk until smooth. Gradually mix in the rest of the milk until a smooth batter is achieved. Season with salt and pepper. Leave to sit for at least half an hour.

Cook the sausages in a frying pan over a medium heat for about 10 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 200°C/400 F. Pour the oil into the bottom of a baking dish and heat until smoking.

Take the dish from the oven and place the sausages in the hot oil. Carefully ladle the batter over them until the sausages are three quarters covered.

Return to the oven and bake for 35 minutes, or until the centre is risen and browned.

November 2015

Gliding was the exciting theme of our meeting on 18 November when Santiago Cervantes gave a talk. In spite of his name, he is very much a



Scotsman. Santiago has an abiding passion for gliding, which he has been doing for 50 years. He first went gliding as a passenger when he was 14 years old. Then he obtained his gliding licence at the age of 16 and describes his hobby as an almost spiritual experience. In this regard he described his experience of gliding in the Antarctic. Apart from the obvious danger, especially in finding an emergency landing place, the scenery is magnificent and, above all, the silence is absolute. Taken together these aspects of gliding in the Antarctic provide the ingredients for a spiritual experience.

Our area (especially Portmoak Airfield) is at the forefront of the gliding world and holds 24 records out of 60 in the UK. The club is very active in trying to bring more records to Scotland using various sizes and sophistication of glider up to a maximum of a 30 metre wing span. The more sophisticated gliders may have an engine for use in an emergency but these engines are of limited size. For instance, a 30 metre machine has an electric motor with power for 20 minutes. Such a glider, based at Portmoak, holds the 1000 kilometre record time which involved gliding to Tongue in Sutherland and back some four times.

Scotland is particularly lucky to have world class conditions for gliding. The technique of gliding uses three methods to allow the aircraft to fly. First there is an Uplift caused by the wind being forced upwards by mountain escarpments such as happens with Bishop Hill. The second is known as Thermals, when air at ground level heats up and then rises upwards, again allowing the glider to lift. The third condition is known as Wave Soaring, where the cloud formations cause the wind to form a standing wave of air as part of a ripple of air passing over the clouds. It is this condition which is particularly found in Scotland and forms the basis of world class gliding conditions.

Mr Cervantes illustrated his talk with images showing views taken from gliders and the various conditions of weather and cloud formations suitable for gliding.

December 2015

The meeting on 2 December was addressed by Pam Cairns, a retired doctor, who had turned her attention to problems further afield. She had worked in South America and was aware of the problems in the Amazon area, especially with young children and young girls.

She had a connection with the Vine Trust and took part in an expedition some 2000 miles up the Amazon where missionaries were working with the local population in nutrition and health care. Another part of the problem was that young people were migrating to the cities where they were preyed upon by criminals. Girls, especially, were the subject of trafficking.

These problems, together with the massive deforestation being carried out both legally and illegally, are destroying the traditional way of life of the local tribal population.

Pam wrote a novel called 'The Dead Don't Hurt Us' based on her adventure and other novels followed.

Pam went on to describe a similar expedition to India and, although this was not to such an inaccessible part of the world, many of the problems were the same, especially in regard to the trafficking of young girls.

Roger Bromley gave the vote of thanks for a thought-provoking talk.

The annual Christmas Lunch was held on 7 December and 62 members and their wives attended.

January 2016

Our first meeting of the New Year, held on 6 January, was addressed by Maureen Young, a professional journalist. Her talk was called 'My Life in a Mess'. This referred to the fact that she had, over the span of her career, spent a substantial amount of time attached to army units in a reporting role.

With the aid of some excellent photographs, Maureen described the various missions. These were mainly attached to the Black Watch and the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards, although she had also carried out an assignment with the Royal Air Force.

The missions covered Berlin (both when it was still divided and then when the wall had been demolished), Northern Ireland, Kenya, Kosovo, The Falkland Islands, Hong Kong and Iraq. These were not active missions in the sense that they were not war zones but they were active in other ways, for example, in Hong Kong where The Black Watch were working alongside the Royal Marines hunting for drug smugglers.

Planning applications

The planning committee of KCT meets regularly to examine Kinross-shire planning applications and comment where appropriate. One recent letter of objection sent by KCT concerned the application by **Persimmon Homes** for 300 houses at **Lathro Farm**, Kinross. The current local development plan states that the maximum number of houses for the site, referred to as H47, is 260, not 300, and that only 140 houses are to be built up to the year 2024.

Kinross High Street

The Trust had concerns about the detail of the new High Street design and raised their concerns on safety etc with PKC consistently through the planning process. PKC did not change their plans to take account of the Trust's concerns.

Now the works are complete, concerns have been expressed by many people about the safe operation of the High Street, particularly for pedestrian safety. It is evident that the view of the Trust was correct and safety has become a serious issue. The Trust is continuing to support attempts to have the adopted scheme improved and have PKC remedy the situation.

Local Development Plan 2 (LDP2): Main Issues Report

Local Development Plans are on a continually renewing cycle. Although the first one was adopted relatively recently (February 2014), the Council is in the process of producing the next one. The current phase is consultation on the Main Issues Report (MIR) for Local Development Plan 2. [See notice on page 22.] Kinross-shire Civic Trust would encourage local residents to attend the drop in consultation at the community campus on **Tuesday 23 February** and/or examine the information on the Council website at www.pkc. gov.uk/mainissuesldp2 and make comments by the deadline of **Wednesday 16 March.**

Caitlin is the first Scottish student to ever be awarded a prize in this competition. During her final year at Kinross High School, Caitlin completed a project during her time in Chemistry, looking at the properties of novel materials. This project was judged to be so good that she was asked down to the national final where she gave a presentation on 'Aerogels' to Oxbridge professors. The quality of this presentation was such that she was awarded second place in the UK, winning £750 for herself and £500 for Kinross High School.



November 2015 with over 80 Otters taking part. At the time of writing, the results are still well under wraps and are due to be announced at the annual awards night at the Windlestrae Hotel on Saturday 23 January 2016. More next time.

Scottish National Short Course Championships 2015, Royal Commonwealth Pool

11 - 13 December 2015

These short course (i.e. 25m pool) championships are the pinnacle of swimming in Scotland and attract the best adult swimmers not only from Scotland, but also from the rest of the UK and beyond.

This year there were even international swimmers from mainland Europe competing for medals and many of the races included Olympic, World, Commonwealth and European medallists.

So it was fair to say that the only two Otters to actually make the starting blocks had their work cut out and had to be very realistic about their chances!

Breaststroke star, **Iona Crawford** (15) qualified in the 50, 100 and her preferred 200m. She did not disappoint as she broke her own club record by over two seconds in 2.50.03 and finished 14 seconds behind the eighth placed swimmer in the "A" final and under 10 seconds behind the same position swimmer in the "B" final. In a world of grown-ups and full-time professionals, this was a very significant achievement. Iona managed her second fastest ever 100m (1.19.52) and completed the 50m in 37.63.

In his first National Short Course Champs, **Cameron McCloskey** (17) broke his own 50m Freestyle club record in 25.56, but on only two training sessions per week due to other pressing commitments, struggled to make an impact in this world of pure power and muscle. It is the fastest of all events after all.

Well done to both swimmers, as even qualifying for these championships is an achievement in itself.

First Meet Bathgate XCite Leisure Centre 9–10 January 2016

Only a small band of four Otters made it to this distant first meet of 2016 as many of the older Otters were heavily involved with prelim exams. However, it was a welcome return to competitive swimming after quite a lay off for Otters star, **Ola Stanton** (12). She continued where she left off last year with a gold medal and a club record in her best event, the 50m Breaststroke (36.45), in which she is National Age Group Champion, despite being only 12 and competing in the 12-13 year category. Not content with just one club record, Ola continued the smashing success with another in the 50m Freestyle (29.26) and won a silver medal in the process. In the 100m Freestyle, she took over two seconds off her personal best to win a bronze medal in 1.05.02. Quite a day!

No medals, but worthy of mention once again, is **Jack Muncey** (12) who took large chunks off his personal bests and is certainly worth watching in the backstroke event.







Out & About



Loch Leven NNR

The New Year got off to a soggy start, with record levels of rainfall in December and the loch level remaining high, resulting in sections of the trail being submerged for over a month. Sections of the path from Levenmouth round to Carsehall were particularly badly affected, making cycling with wellies and waterproofs quite exciting at times! A section toward the north side of Levenmouth Woods is beyond wellie depth, so please take care and beware of extensive flooded areas. The water has presented us with some maintenance challenges as well, particularly around the Factory Bay hide, where reinforcements have been required to prevent the loch from washing the path away and compromising the structural integrity of the hide itself. Our dedicated group of volunteers have been out with Jeremy this week adding sandbags, rocks and postcrete to the hole and the intention is to fill it with gravel next week. Other sections of the path have also been damaged, but a full assessment can't be passed on to Perth

Some interesting bird news this month came as a result of the strong easterly winds which blew large numbers of Little Auks inland. Loch Leven had its fair share, with at least two reported early on in the month. A couple of Great Northern Divers were also spotted by Jeremy on 12 January, with a Rednecked grebe also out there, and an impressive four Shorteared Owls have been observed hawking over Kirkgate Point, hunting for voles and posing for photographs. The Whitetailed Eagle has been intermittent this winter, apparently coming and going rather than remaining here throughout. Occasional sightings out on St Serf's Island and on Reed Bower have been coming in, but not with the regularity of previous years.

The event marks the anniversary of the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands of International Importance, which is one of many designations afforded to Loch Leven on account of its wildfowl assemblage. To learn more about Loch Leven's importance internationally, and to see some of the species that make it so special, call the reserve office on 01577 864439 to book your place. The event is free with easy access, remaining on the Heritage Trail for the duration.

Hello again, folks, and I hope you are havin a guid start to the New Year? However we are getting nearer to Spring every day and with the nights now stretching out a bit, it ain't all bad. Wildlife-wise we have a good wee selection of stuff. The White Tailed Eagles have again been in evidence, although the female seems to have had a divorce from her regular partner, turquoise X, and is now hanging around with a younger toy boy. Winter migrants Redwing and Fieldfare have been around in good numbers, and Smew, both male and female, have been seen on the loch. Roving flocks of those wee fluff balls Long Tailed Tits have also been regularly visiting our feeders along with all the other hoards. We also seem to be getting more sightings of Red Squirrels.

Talking about hoards, **The RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch** is on this weekend **30 and 31 January**, so why not come along to the reserve and get tips on identifying or feeding your garden birds? We will also have a bird ringing demonstration by the BTO on the 30th from 10am until 12 noon. Get really close up to the birds and find out what information can be gleaned about bird movements etc. If you are very lucky, the kids might even get the chance to release the birds once they have been processed!

The shop has a whole host of new products in, ranging from cards (not Christmas ones just yet – wait till July then it all begins again), stationery, mugs, scarves, to the new improved range of our HD binoculars. Viewable at our **Optics Weekend** on **6 and 7 February**, 10am – 5pm both days.

The Nature Tots event held every second Wednesday of the month, 10am - 12 noon, is staff led again, with a journey through the seasons each month. The next one on 10 February is on Ducks. Farming



It seems that the weather doesn't do things by half measures these days, and that has certainly been the case with the amount of rain that has fallen recently. Since early November, the ever-shortening days have been monotonously wet, with the volume of rain increasing until the festive period, when it reached a peak and the media was full of images of streets turned into raging torrents, homes flooded knee-high or deeper and vast swathes of farmland disappearing under the floods. Even stretches of road and centuries old bridges have been completely washed away.

The signs have been plain to see here at Backward Farm. Although we haven't had too many puddles forming in fields because most of our land is on a slope, so the water runs off, the fields are exceptionally wet. A good guide to how much rain there has been is a neighbour's field, which we look down into. When there is a deluge of rain in a short space of time, the burn running next to the field rises and it gets submerged. However, generally once the rain stops and the level of the burn drops, the water drains from the field quickly, generally after a day or two at the most. Interestingly, that field was a least half submerged for about a month during December and into January. That was certainly an unprecedented phenomenon. The debate has been raging about the causes of flooding and what solutions can be found, and the solutions will vary according to local circumstances. Certainly, there will be areas where waterways need to be cleaned out to increase their capacity, especially in lower lying areas which are prone to a build up of material such as silt, sand and gravel carried downstream by the water. Watercourses change over time due to natural erosion and deposition, so if they are required to follow the same course to protect properties then maintenance has to be carried out to keep water flowing freely. There is probably also scope for sacrifice flood areas to be created on farmland, although this would depend on the use of the land. Grassland rather than arable land would be more suitable for this due to the lower risk of soil erosion and grass is more resilient to being flooded than arable crops.

Day to day here at Backward Farm we are well into the winter routine of feeding and bedding the animals in the buildings. I had hoped to get a few outside jobs done when our eldest son was on "holiday" from university and I had an extra pair of hands. Unfortunately it was too wet and miserable to get anything done, so I had to resort to doing some DIY about the house. Things were that desperate. The trickiest thing is knowing where to start, so after a lot of humming and hawing, I invariably don't!

We pregnancy scanned the small batch of ewes we put to the tup to lamb in February but only a quarter of them were in lamb. The scanner reckoned they hadn't been coming in season so perhaps we should have put a "teaser" tup beside them to encourage them to start cycling since it was early in the breeding season for sheep. I'm not too worried, as at least the ones which are in lamb are expecting plenty of lambs and it was a last minute decision for a wee experiment. Hopefully they should all be due to lamb at the same time as the rest of the ewes, but we will find out when the rest are all scanned, which should be done by the time you are reading this. Fingers crossed.
