Council Tax Freeze

Cllr Giacopazzi no doubt feels obliged to defend his party's positions but he really should refrain from making himself look ridiculous.

In the March Newsletter he wrote that the SNP's Council Tax freeze is a "voluntary arrangement". Well, let him consider this scenario:

My employer tells me that I'm due a pay rise of £1000 this year but that he'll actually reduce my pay by £5000 if I claim the rise. How "voluntary" is my decision to forgo the £1000? Cllr Giacopazzi went on to say how much Perth and Kinross will get in the coming year. He neglected to inform us that the compensation from the SNP government in Edinburgh falls far short of revenue lost to the council because of the freeze, which many financial experts have been telling us for years. He continued by praising the council's "transformation programme" but on the very next page of the Newsletter Cllr Robertson illustrated the reductions in provision which the SNP's cuts actually mean in practice.

Finally, Cllr Giacopazzi hinted that the people of Scotland are unlikely "to support parties promising higher Council Tax bills" in the forthcoming Holyrood elections. How ironic, then, that I read his article on 2 March, the day on which the SNP announced their plans to raise the Council Tax and remove the freeze! Perhaps the councillor will now perform the same volte-face and defend the party proposing a big hike in Council Tax but, as I suggested at the beginning, it's rarely a good idea to make yourself look ridiculous in public.

Road closure requests simplified

At the last Kinross CC meeting, I mentioned a service being offered by Perth and Kinross which is referred to as an "Omnibus Order". What is this? You might ask.

In essence, if someone wants to close a road, suspend parking in an area, or put in a temporary speed limit then they need to apply for a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TTRO). Normally when a TTRO is requested, it costs over a hundred pounds to do this, as PKC have to cover their administration and advertising costs.

The Omnibus Order has been set up to allow community events which are non-profit making (excluding farmers' markets) to put TTROs in place free of charge.

So if you are a community group who is planning to hold an event, do a parade, run a gala or anything else that will require a TTRO, then this applies to you.

There will be three more Omnibus Orders this year and the dates for submissions are as follows:

- 1. submitted on Friday 6 May 2016 Deadline for submission is **30 April 2016**
- 2. submitted on Friday 5 August 2016 Deadline for submission is **31 July 2016**
- 3. submitted on Friday 4 November 2016 Deadline for submission is **31 October 2016**

Sale and development of former High School site

Dear Editor, I read with interest the letter entitled "Bats.... Or What???" from Ken Miles, in the March edition of your excellent publication.

I thought that I should respond with a bit more detail.

I have a huge amount of sympathy with what Mr Miles is saying, and indeed it strongly reflects what I have been saying since 2005 when it was first declared that Kinross was to get a new High School (following campaigning from the then School Board, of which I was the chair).

I and a number of residents pushed hard for the former school site to be considered for a number of alternative uses, including open space, playing fields, parking, affordable housing and so on.

We complained to the council and the Scottish Ombudsman but throughout the process were told that the Council had followed correct procedures and that the investment in learning sites (buildings and land which became redundant due to the investment in new campuses, of which Kinross was one) had to be sold for maximum consideration.

When I was elected to the council, I asked to see the committee papers which related to this matter but was told that they were all private papers and as such could only be seen by members of the committee in order to make decisions.

I was told that they were exempt due to schedule 7a of the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1973, which covers "any terms proposed or to be proposed by or to the authority in the course of negotiations for a contract for the acquisition or disposal of property or the supply of goods or services."

So, basically any contractual term relating to the disposal of property as in this case, is exempt.

I have to say that I find this situation highly unsatisfactory, however, the law is the law.

In terms of where the disposal of the former High School site in Kinross is at, it was decided by the Investment in Learning Project Board on 29 June 2004 that Kinross High School, along with a number of other properties, would be sold in order to maximise receipts. The argument being that the money was required to help fund the Investment in Learning Project, which was a project to build a number of new purpose built community campuses.

This decision was ratified by the School Estates Strategy Board on 3 September 2004, the Strategic Policy and Resources Committee on 16 April 2008 and again on 20 May 2009.

So the decision appears to have been made democratically. In terms of the sale of the site to Persimmon Homes, the decision to make them the preferred bidder for the site was made by the Property sub-committee on 28 March 2012 (before I was elected).

Persimmon Homes submitted a planning application which was validated on 23 December 2013. This application was strongly criticised at the Development Management Committee (DMC) on 14May 2014 and was refused permission unanimously by the Councillors. This is highly unusual and I cannot remember another time when a unanimous refusal has happened on this committee.

Since then, Persimmon were working on a new application, and this was validated by the Council on 11 March 2016. The reference is 16/00255/FLL and you can view this on the Council's planning platform on the web.

I will make no comment on this application.

This planning application will need to be considered by the Council and a decision will need to be made upon it.

Should the Council decide to refuse the application under delegated powers, then Persimmon have the option to request a review by the Local Review Body.

Should the officers recommend approval, then it will go to DMC.

Should DMC decide to grant permission then it will become full permission. Should they decide to refuse the application then Persimmon will have the right to appeal to the Reporter's unit in Edinburgh.

If Persimmon are granted permission for their development on the former High School site, then they will have to relocate the bats which have been identified in the bat survey included with the latest application.

Curiously, the bat survey does not appear to have been included in the first application.

Persimmon will also demolish the buildings to the rear of the Edwardian block at their expense.

They will then develop the site.

In terms of the "special meeting" referred to in the letter from Mr Miles, this was a Property sub-committee meeting (on which I sit). The purpose of the meeting was to extend the longstop date (i.e. the date the contract would become null and void).

The committee was told this was necessary in order to allow the developer time to obtain planning consent and to move the bats prior to working on the site.

The minutes of this meeting will become public in due course and they will show that I resisted the setting of a new longstop date. However, the political groups represented on the committee did not support this.

So, the preferred bidder for the site is Persimmon, and the longstop date has been extended.

In terms of the question raised by Mr Miles as to why the Council has not found another buyer by auction of the property, all I can say is that I don't know.

Persimmon apply for 91 houses at former High School

Persimmon Homes have submitted a planning application to erect 91 houses on the former Kinross High School site. This comes nearly two years after an earlier application by Persimmon to build 102 houses was rejected by Perth & Kinross Council's Development Management Committee.

Following consultation with the public and Historic Environment Scotland, the developer now proposes to retain part of the Edwardian building that fronts the High Street and convert it into four dwellings.

A further 87 houses would be built on the site. These would be a mixture of 2, 3 and 4 bedroom houses, including terraced, semi-detached and detached units.

The 2014 application, which had proposed demolition of all the school buildings, including the Edwardian one, attracted approximately 85 objections.

The 2.95 hectare site lies in the town's Conservation Area, and PKC's Conservation Area Appraisal describes the original school building as a 'key

building of interest'. The Council's Development Plan has the site zoned for housing, with an allocated number of 70 units, and the requirement that "any proposal will be required to preserve or enhance the area".

Curiously, although the planning application was received by PKC on 15 February 2016 and validated on 11 March 2016, at the time of writing

(18 March) there is no accompanying planning application for Conservation Area Consent, which would be required for the demolition of buildings.

The planning application to erect 91 houses is open for public comment, with a deadline of **Friday 8 April**. It can be viewed on PKC's planning portal via the website www.pkc.gov.uk. The planning reference is 16/00255/FLM.

Deadline for voter registration

Apology

Let me start this month with an apology; I said in the February Newsletter that I would report more fully on the **PKC budget**, my intention being to report in the March edition.



However, last month I ran out of time and didn't manage to do an update. I note that Cllrs Barnacle, Giacopazzi and Robertson all wrote about the budget last month, so I won't cover the same ground again.

However, I note that Cllr Giacopazzi wrote somewhat disingenuously saying that the "Council Tax Freeze" was a "voluntary arrangement into which local authorities may enter". In response to this, I would cite Local Government Finance Circular No. 7/2015, in which the Scottish Government wrote to Councils outlining the Local Government Finance Settlement. This stated: "For 2016-17 the Scottish Government will work with local government partners on implementing the budget and the joint priorities in return for the full funding package which includes:

...£70 million is included in the settlement to continue the council tax freeze for a ninth consecutive year."

Their words, not mine. I will let you decide whether there was a Council Tax Freeze or not.

Milnathort Community Council

I was delighted to learn that, following the collection of signatures on a petition to reform Milnathort CC that Cllr Giacopazzi and I organised, an election took place and the first CC meeting was held on 17 March. Unfortunately I already had an appointment for the same time, so was unable to attend. I would encourage residents to come along to future meetings; your opinions matter and I am sure that the CC will do their best to gather these in. [See page 40.]

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration

I noted the article in the last Newsletter concerning the survey by David MacKenzie of Kinross CC and thought I should update you on what is happening.

Following completion of the works late last year, your four local Councillors did a walk around with officers on 4 December. We raised 23 issues with officers. There was then a road safety audit carried out by officers, which also looked at the issues raised by us. The results of this were fed back to your local members last week [mid March].

I will be arranging a meeting with officers as soon as possible to go through the findings.

I should say, though, that it is my intention to request a "formal crossing" on the High Street.

New Kinross Primary School

I was delighted when a new school was announced to replace the existing leaking building and portacabins. This followed some excellent work by the Parent Council who worked hard to present the case for a new school.

Generally I think the plans are pretty good, however, I have raised issues with officers over the way that the consultation process has been carried out and some aspects of the design. Specifically, I think that we should learn from bitter experience and avoid flat roofs on new school buildings. After all, a principal reason why the current school is being replaced is because of the flat roof, which leaks.

There is to be a meeting between officers and your four local members about this next week [w/c 21 March].

Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland

Cllr Barnacle has been in correspondence with the LGBCS and has established that they will not be carrying out further consultation on the boundary review and expect to submit their final recommendations to Scottish Ministers following the Scottish Government election in May 2016.

My understanding is that the final proposal will need to be agreed to by the Scottish Government.

At this point in time, I do not know whether the LGBCS will persist with the split up of Kinross-shire, however it does strike me that there is an opportunity for voters to ask candidates in the upcoming Scottish Government elections where they stand on this issue. Perhaps if enough people do this, we might still keep Kinross-shire intact.

Powmill in Bloom

It's really good to see local communities pulling together to improve where they live. One group which is working hard at doing this is Powmill in Bloom. Recently they placed a bench at their entrance as a feature. Unfortunately it was stolen. If anyone knows anything about this, please let me know and I will arrange for the police to follow it up.

One of the issues they have been pushing to be addressed is the bridge, which was damaged by a tanker accident on the road. The repair of this was delayed due to the closure of the Forth Road Bridge. I am pleased to report that this work is due to happen in the next few weeks.

Planning

Planning is a big issue in Kinross-shire. We appear to account for roughly one third of the applications which are considered by the Council's Planning Committee and the Council's Local Review Body, both of which I often sit on.

I think this is because we are sort of a home county for much of the Central Belt and there is intense pressure to develop sites in the area.

There have been a number of applications which have raised a significant number of objections locally which have recently been decided and I thought I would mention a few of them here.

Conversion of Glenfarg Hotel to form 12 flats (mentioned last time) was refused under delegated powers.

Crook Moss (an application for 3 more pitches) was refused under delegated powers.

Lambhill chipping plant was refused by the LRB.

Potholes

In fulfilling my duties as a Councillor, I do hundreds of miles every month, both travelling to Perth for meetings and around the Kinross-shire ward to meet with constituents, looking at issues raised with me and attending CC meetings.

In the last year, I have had to replace, on separate occasions, a set of springs and a set of tyres on my car due to damage caused by potholes, of which there appear to be hundreds.

I have had long discussions with officers ranging from the local charge hand all the way up to the Chief Executive about these potholes and, to summarise, it would appear that the huge number of potholes in our roads are mainly due to adverse weather conditions. The Council have doubled the number of men filling them and I am told that they are being filled as fast as possible given the resources available. However I remain unhappy at the number, size and depth of potholes in our area.

Affordable Housing

An issue I have been investigating recently is the demand and supply of Affordable Housing in the ward. My research indicates that there were 21 Common Housing Register lets (i.e. Combined Council and Housing Association lets) in Kinross during 2013-14 and that there were 119 families on the waiting list. This gives Kinross a pressure ratio of 5.7, or 5.7 people waiting for each property let during the year.

During this period, Kinross ranked with the 12th highest pressure ratio of all the letting areas in Perth and Kinross, the highest being Craigie in Perth with a pressure ratio of 20.6. It is my view that Kinross-shire is not getting its fair share of new affordable housing and that this is due to a lack of imagination in how affordable housing is currently delivered.

Needless to say, I am working with officers on this.

Councillor Robertson Citylink

I have been trying to persuade Citylink to restore the bus services to Kinross Park & Ride which were removed at the end of last year, namely the 7.00am bus to Dundee which no longer calls at Kinross, depriving



people who work in Dundee the opportunity to go by bus. Also the 5.15pm service from Edinburgh which, again, no longer calls at Kinross. This was an ideal service for commuters and others who wanted to return to Kinross. This was replaced by an X55 service which takes much, much longer.

Citylink are currently working on their summer timetable so I have written to them asking for these services to be restored. Many other people have also written and this call has been supported by Kinross-shire Community Councils.

I have also asked for the two-hour gap in services to Perth to be addressed. Currently there are no buses from Kinross to Perth from 7.30am until 9.30am in the morning. Again, this makes it impossible for those wishing to use public transport to get to work in Perth for 9.00am to do so.

Crook of Devon to Aldie Road multi use track

Work is well underway on this new track which is being installed by TRACKS. This is the first part in the proposed safe cycling/walking link from Crook of Devon to Kinross.

Milnathort Town Hall

Congratulations to the Milnathort Town Hall committee who have overcome many, many obstacles to give the community a refurbished and modern, multi use hall.

I can clearly remember when the hall committee were trying to get PKC to give them a lease on the building. There were those in Perth who thought 'why does Milnathort need a hall for when it can use the community campus?' Thankfully the committee overcame this shortsighted view and we now have a first class community asset which will be used by local people for generations to come.

Keep Kinross-shire Tidy

Since the last Newsletter, various people have contacted me highlighting untidy areas. Among the places litter picked are the A977 the A91, and the old main road going south from Kinross. If you are aware of areas needing litter picked, please let me know.

The Blair Adam Walled Garden

Not many people know about this huge garden on the Blair Adam estate, near the village of Maryburgh, although a lucky few now have allotments within its protected confines. What a beautiful, peaceful place, filled with birdsong! The great stone wall to the north, eighteen foot high, once contained heating flues to keep the more delicate fruit trees fanned against it safe from winter frosts: together with adjoining walls to the east and west, it continues to give shelter from chilly winds today.

The southern part of the garden was planted out as an arboretum of evergreen trees to form 'a winter walk' for the Adam family who planned to stroll there from their new house which Robert Adam had designed in 1772. Alas, the great Palladian mansion was never built and so these days the garden seems vastly bigger than its location might require, since the family continue to live on the site of William Adam's original factor's house, which is at some distance uphill from the garden, rather than adjacent. Nevertheless, the garden still gives great pleasure as the destination for a walk in all seasons and its history continues to fascinate those who labour for pleasure within its walls. William Adam established a

nursery here shortly after he bought the estate in 1733 because, having drained and limed what was described as a 'wild unsheltered moor', he began to lay out avenues of trees to create a focus for the site of the original laird's house which, no doubt, he intended to replace with a more distinguished building of his own design.

Later, it was his son John Adam, who between 1756 and 1761 planned and supervised the construction and stocking of the walled garden more-or-less as it can be seen today. The three-acre formal part comprised the heated wall to the


north which bore apple, pear and plum trees; a rectangular pattern of paths and walks separated the compartments devoted to vegetables and borders of flowers were laid out. The southern part of the garden, bisected by a burn, was landscaped as a four-acre arboretum of mainly evergreen trees distributed among winding paths. In 1833 a monument was erected there to mark the centenary of the family's landscaping of the estate and garden, which up to that

time had survived in its original form 'without alteration of effect except what growth hath produced'.

This growth took over with a vengeance after 1955 when the Adam family could no longer employ one gardener, let alone the seven who had worked there in 1833. Consequently, by 1971 the garden had been vandalised, was overgrown with weeds and browsed by roe deer.

Nevertheless, the garden structure was Grade 'A' listed and help first arrived in the 1980s when Scottish Conservation Projects Trust established a gardening training programme to clear weeds and re-establish the paths. After funding for the scheme ended, Francis Adam built on what it had achieved by deer-

fencing the lower walls to the south of the arboretum and in 1995 he began to turn over and plant the soil, helped by a team of Tamworth pigs.

However, it was not until 2010, with the help of student volunteers, that restoration of the vegetable compartments began in earnest. Using the 1834 layout map as a guide, eight sizeable allotments were rented out in 2012 and more are now available. The semi-circular flower borders by the gardener's house, which is integral to the north wall, were planted in 2013 and the herbaceous borders on either side of the sundial walk were finally restored in

2014 when the garden was open as part of Scotland's Gardens Scheme. This spring the 1933 rockery by the burn has been uncovered and re-planted by enthusiastic voluntary gardeners.

Although it is a struggle to keep unwanted growth at bay, and William Adam would not find it kept up to the standard he expected of his gardeners in 1833, it looks as though the Adam family may be on course to celebrate the 300th anniversary of their walled garden in 2033.

Milnathort Community Council

Following last year's demise of the CC, Cllr Cuthbert and I invited local residents to join a petition to the Council as a first step in creating a new CC. Following the election of



eight new Community Councillors on 25 February, I called an inaugural meeting of the CC for 17 March and chaired it long enough for a new Chairman to be elected. I warmly welcome the election of David Baudains as Chairman; his previous experience as Minute Secretary of the CC gives him a good knowledge of procedures. I look forward to working with the new CC. The meeting lasted 17 minutes; an excellent precedent! [See also page 40.]

Milnathort Proposed Conservation Area

The proposal was raised previously by the Kinross-shire Civic Trust, but failed to gain the support of Milnathort CC. Unlike a CC, the Civic Trust is an unelected body dedicated to the conservation of the built environment. The Civic Trust justified its proposal on the basis of Milnathort's history and the number of historic buildings in and around the village. The CC did not give its support for the following reasons:

- 1. Lack of support from Milnathort residents themselves;
- 2. While the village is 'historic', most of what remains is enshrined in place names only e.g. 'Auld Mart'. The old mills and markets are long gone;
- 3. A number of the listed buildings cited by the Civic Trust to justify conservation status are not in Milnathort e.g. Hattonburn House;
- 4. Under Planning Law householders enjoy a number of 'permitted development rights' which are not available in a conservation area. If Milnathort were to become a conservation area, planning permission would have to be applied for where a home owner wanted to replace windows, remove railings or hedges, erect a garden shed or conservatory, erect a satellite dish or solar panels, change a letter box or even paint the door a new colour. The list goes on;
- The cost of a planning application is £204 or £402 for larger ones. In addition, an architect or draughtsman would normally have to be engaged and ownership certificates produced.

Such comments as I received at the time of the proposal from local folk were negative. Nevertheless the Civic Trust has asked the Council to designate Milnathort a conservation area in the next Local Development Plan. The Civic Trust's commentary, which can be seen on the Council's web site, is well researched and makes interesting reading despite the odd error e.g. a reference to 'New Street' in Milnathort.

Personally, I'd be more inclined to support a conservation area in Milnathort if there were evidence of enthusiasm from the people who live there. Also, if the purpose of conservation area status is to preserve its character and appearance, I'd need to be convinced that these were at risk. I've lived Milnathort all my days and, honestly, it has hardly changed.

There is a bureaucratic cost to the Council involved in creating and maintaining a conservation area and one wonders whether, at a time of austerity and reductions in spending, this is the best use of resources.

Kinross' New Primary School

On 21 March I and my Ward 8 colleagues will meet with Council officials in Perth to discuss issues surrounding the

design of the new primary school at Kinross. A concern which I raised before Christmas and which also concerns Cllr Cuthbert, relates to the flat roof over the dining area in the new building. Having never been a big fan of flat roofs, my enthusiasm for them sank further last Winter when the one at Milnathort Primary School sprung a leak allowing water into the electrical system. As a result, my granddaughter's classroom was evacuated and remained closed for several days. To prevent a similar event happening at Kinross years in the future, we are asking for the roof to be sloped enough for the water to run off. We shall also be discussing the arrangements for dropping off and picking up pupils.

The school remains on track to be ready for December 2017 with demolition of the old building by May in the next year. This is, however, described as 'an aspirational programme'. One thing struck me as odd; the possibility of 'unisex toilets' in the new school. The decision will be one for the Head Teacher who will, hopefully, exercise common sense in the matter, but I wonder what the feelings of parents are on the subject. I well remember lining up at the start of the day to file into Milnathort Primary (the one in Manse Road) with the boys going in the 'Boys' door and the girls into the 'Girls' side. If you look above the door of the old Kinross High School you will see the same arrangement. Of course, nowadays we don't do segregation of pupils in this way and 'unisex' toilets are maybe just an evolution of the process. I do not know; but then, I'm old enough to remember when a 'joint' was something your mum cooked for Sunday lunch, not something you smoked...

Scottish Water

The work to increase the capacity of the sewers at Milnathort to prevent pluvial (rain) flooding are all but complete and I, for one, am looking forward to a good downpour to see if it all works. Despite the awful disruption to business and to road traffic, the folk of Milnathort have put up with it all without major complaint. I think I can say that Amey, Black & Veatch, the contractors, have been hard working throughout and considerate.

MSPs asked to declare their stance on Kinross-shire boundaries

Local Councillors Mike Barnacle, Dave Cuthbert and Willie Robertson have written a joint letter to all the Members of the Scottish Parliament for this area, asking the MSPs to declare whether or not they support the retention of Kinross-shire's current boundaries.

Last year's review by the Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland (LGBCS) proposed that PKC should lose one Councillor, and that this should happen by reducing the Kinross-shire ward representation from four councillors to three. Under the proposals, a section of the Kinross-shire ward would be placed in the Almond and Earn ward instead. Following publication of the Boundary Commission proposals, a public consultation took place, but the Commission is not planning to publish its final recommendations to Scottish Ministers until the end of May, after the Scottish Parliament elections.

The Councillors' letter was sent to Roseanna Cunningham, MSP for Perthshire South & Kinross-shire, and the Mid Scotland and Fife MSPs, who are: Claire Baker, Dr Richard Simposn, Annabelle Ewing, Jayne Baxter, Murdo Fraser, Elizabeth Smith.

The text of the letter is as follows:

17 March 2016

Dear Colleagues

Boundaries Commission Proposals For Perth & Kinross Council Area

We enclose Councillor Barnacle's letter of 20/10/15 to the Commission and also his article on this subject from September 2015 Kinross CC Newsletter. These background communications major on their proposals to reduce PKC elected members from 41 to 40 by singling out Kinross-shire Ward 8 for division and reducing its Councillors from 4 to 3. You will note the strong reaction to this proposal from PKC and the people of Kinross-shire. In response to an inquiry from Councillor Barnacle as to any update on the Commission's thinking as a result of the many representations made, their Secretary has confirmed the decision not to hold a local inquiry and that its final recommendations will be submitted to Scottish Ministers by the end of May 2016, when the public will be made aware of any changes to the current proposal. We are sceptical that the proposals will be changed and believe this will result in a strong reaction in Kinross-shire.

Our purpose in writing to you centres on the not insignificant matter of the Scottish Parliament elections that will take place between now and the end of May 2016. Can you respond positively in support of PKC and the people of Kinrossshire who wish to see their current democratic electoral representation up at Perth maintained and their historic boundaries and identity respected and retained? We are seeking pledges from candidates and their political parties standing for election to the Scottish Parliament in May to oppose any proposal by the Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland to split Kinross-shire apart and to use any influence they may subsequently have in the new Parliament to reject same.

We look forward to hearing from you.

Copy of a letter by Cllr Barnacle to PKC's Nick Brian (Development Quality Manager) and Peter Marshall (Planning & Sustainable Development), 16/3/16

Ochil Hills Special Landscape Area & Major Renewable Energy Projects - Call for Regional Park Status

I am moved to write to you regarding the above and enclose as background my letter of 18/1/12 to Nick on Windfarm Developments in the Ochil Hills.

At the Development Management Committee on 17/2/16, following a close vote on the denial of opportunity for Friends of the Ochils to comment further and address the Committee on additional information requested at deferral, a major photovoltaic solar farm near Path of Condie and Glenfarg was granted approval. I was disappointed that the further opportunity to address the Committee was denied but even more dismayed at Paragraphs 18 to 20 of the Report on Landscape Supplementary Guidance enclosed. To state that the Ochil Hills have not been substantially affected by windfarms and masts on hill tops is clearly inaccurate and written without adequate knowledge of these hills. There is also clearly no presumption against further wind turbines or other renewable energy developments so one has to ask what does a Special Landscape Area designation give in protection; I would suggest none. You will note my aforementioned enclosed letter referring to the June 2004 capacity study recommending only one windfarm in the Ochils carefully sited. We now have 3 at Burnfoot, Greenknowes (extension currently proposed) and Lochelbank with other wind monitoring masts appearing subsequently in advance of potential further turbine development.

I repeat, more stridently than ever, it is time to call a halt on further industrialisation from windfarm developments in the Ochil Hills and if Special Landscape Areas clearly do not ensure landscape protection, I reiterate my call for Regional Park Status for the Ochil Hills to be explored by PKC with neighbouring authorities, a point I have made in my submission to the Main Issues Report for PKC's LDP2 yesterday.

Councillor Barnacle's response to MIR

Listed below are some of the points made by Cllr Barnacle as part of his submission on the Main Issues Report (MIR), a stage of PKC's second Local Development Plan.

Cllr Barnacle believes that a community masterplan approach for Kinross and Milnathort is long overdue.

He agrees that PKC should introduce new policy RD7, to ensure stalled and non-effective sites are brought forward, saying: "Communities like to see housing site zoning effective rather than dormant for lengthy periods, especially where Developer requirements are identified as needed by the wider community i.e. transport improvements and green space provision."

Regarding an enforceable mechanism to ensure development commences, he suggests, "it should apply to sites of 50 houses or more and be commenced within the timescale of LDP2; it should not be assumed that non-effective sites keep their zoning in a following LDP!"

Cllr Barnacle agrees with the proposal in the MIR that policy PM4 should be renamed 'Settlement Envelopes' and reworded to allow development on the edge of settlements in specific limited circumstances. He submitted: "I think specific limited circumstances needs careful wording so as to avoid creeping settlement development; the envelope should mean something but I am more relaxed about proposals on the edge of settlements where community benefit can be illustrated and the location is not possible within the settlement envelope."

The Councillor gave details of where he thought there should be changes to settlement boundaries for Balado, Blairingone, Crook of Devon, Kinnesswood, Powmill, and Rumbling Bridge.

Cllr Barnacle is in favour of OP15 being removed from its current allocation, but is not in favour of it being zoned as a housing site and is of the view that "this good quality agricultural land should be retained." (OP15 is a site to the east of the Community Campus which was zoned in the first LDP for educational purposes when it was thought that it might provide a site for a replacement Kinross Primary School.)

Cllr Barnacle is in favour of the preferred option for the wider Kinross area shown in Map 32 of the MIR, saying: "Local Members introduced this site for consultation because of its potential to deliver significant community benefits, in particular a sustainable growth project to facilitate much needed expansion of Drum WWTP (currently at capacity). It is essential that the site specific Developer requirements outlined in Table 13 are "all delivered" for me to be content with this zoning, in particular the delivery of a "large" roundabout at junction of A977 and "B9097" with separate exits to Fossoway garage and housing site (which would break up the speed of traffic between Drum and Crook of Devon). Environment (Roads) are working on an OBC for the A977 mitigation measures."

The Councillor is in favour of a community plan for Blairingone.

Ethiopia Medical Project

2016 Visit Report, Part One

Please don't believe anything you read about 'growth' in Ethiopia. Many things are on the 'up' in Ethiopia, and every year we do see advancement in roads, communications and a train system, which now runs through Addis Ababa (the capital) relieving the traffic congestion somewhat. Many things, however, are as dire as ever. Poverty drives people towards the urban environment and it takes an hour to get out of the urban sprawl that is now Addis. The rural areas are still as remote and uncared for as ever, although communications are definitely improving.

Arrival at the airport seemed easier than ever. For once, we sailed through customs and immigration and into the loving and excited arms of Sister Haimanot, for whom we would go through brick walls.

Clinic to Health Centre

One of our challenges this year was to see how the clinic could be converted to a Health Centre. Although the clinic, as it stands, is known to be a place of excellence and better than most Health Centres, it does not have those things that a Health Centre in Ethiopia must have. i.e. two x 10 bed wards, a pharmacy with pharmacist, a card index room and a nurses station. This does involve a new building, with a septic tank and modern sanitation.

This is no small challenge, but not insuperable. Kinross Rotary, who have been very supportive of EMP, are hoping to help us with this in conjunction with a Rotary Club in Addis. We came across Dr Saba Lambert, an Ethiopian doctor who trained in Dundee and who is a wonderful, enthusiastic person. Dr Lambert understood straight away what it was we were trying to do and promised to sell our vision to International Rotary.

Off to Buccama

Our first Sunday, after our long, bumpy journey from Addis, entailed one new baby (who nearly didn't make it) and many, many prolapse mothers. We thought they were on the wane but, alas, the problem seems as big as ever, unless they just ship them in for our benefit!

As before, we were just happy to be there. Our welcome was quite overwhelming. As ever, these dear souls had waited all day to sing, chant and hug the breath out of us. Very humbling indeed, especially when we think of all of you, and the contributions you have made.



First Things First

We visited the crowded market, bargaining and bartering for blankets, sheets, plates and pots and pans, all of which need replacing. We were surrounded by small boys, knocking on the windows, and shouting 'Money, money'.

This is the hot, frustrating part of life there; bartering for sheeting to wrap new babies in! I had to stop myself, when I realised I was arguing about sheeting that cost only 19 pence a metre!

As before, the food was simple, tasty, repetitive and not quite as much as we would eat at home. No bad thing. The simple life of the sisters is an example to us all really.

EMP is not alone now. Added to all our own fundraising activities, we are supported by SCIAF (Scotland), Mothers with a heart for Ethiopia (Canada) and Michael's House (America and Ireland). All these charities are helping in different ways; the first two with the care of the mothers and their operations, and the last with six old and destitute pensioners.

Many, many prolapse mothers arrived throughout our stay, with some wonderful success stories, and some very sad ones. The prolapse mothers (women of all ages), the mother and baby unit (vital for good maternal health), and the staff of the clinic, whose salaries we do pay, are still our primary area of interest.

However, malaria is rife at the moment. We were being very careful to take our pills but, believe me, we are irrelevant in the face of the deluge of malarial patients. They arrive by foot, or on motor bikes, with worried relatives. They are as hot as a boiling kettle, then shivering like a deep freeze. Drips are put up, pain relief is given, medicine administered and every bed and floor space is used up. You would be amazed to see most of them walk home the next day, only to be replaced by a new surge, usually in the evening. What would have happened without the clinic? Sadly, one child died in the clinic early in our stay from malaria, so it is still a real and present danger.

Government Inspection

There was a Government inspection of the prenatal system during our stay. Maureen and I were wheeled out to meet the big cheeses, who told us how high the Buccama standard was. There was even a camera crew interviewing expectant mothers. Home births are virtually outlawed now, which is generally thought to be a good thing.

We have been told countless times that Buccama leads the way in this, and we can see that the care is good, although very different from the UK. It was lucky they were there in their smart ambulance, as an emergency was carried in on a stretcher, and a poor mother-to-be was in a bad way with preeclampsia. She was rushed off to hospital in the Government car, which would get there rather quicker, and safer than ours, which already needs replacing.

April is Bowel Cancer Awareness Month

Scotland fares the worst in the UK for bowel cancer with the highest incidence and highest mortality rate. This means that more people develop and die from bowel cancer in Scotland than elsewhere in the UK. Bowel cancer is the third most common cancer in Scotland after lung and breast cancer. Every year, almost 4,000 people are diagnosed with the disease and 95% of the cases occur in those who are over 50. The Scottish Bowel Cancer Screening programme aims to detect bowel cancer at an early stage when there are potentially more treatment options and a better chance of treatment being effective. People between the ages of 50 and 74 are invited for screening every two years, but only about half of those sent a testing kit actually complete and return it. The home screening test is the best way to find bowel cancer early. The screening test can spot hidden blood which can often be a sign of bowel cancer - blood you and your doctor wouldn't even know was there.

We would like to encourage everyone who is sent the home screening test to complete it. We know it is all a bit embarrassing, but it is well worth just getting on and doing it. It can be completed at home in privacy and then popped in the post. This is perfectly safe and it is free to post the test to the Scottish Bowel Screening Centre laboratory.





PKC has launched a public consultation on a new Local Housing Strategy (LHS) for Perth and Kinross.

The draft LHS sets out the Council's priorities and plans for the delivery of housing and related services for the period 2016-2021.

PKC's strategic housing objectives over the next five years will be:

- Supply of Housing and Place-Making To create more
 affordable homes and manage existing stock to create
 homes in the size, type and location people want to live,
 with access to suitable services and facilities which
 encourage community integration.
- Neighbourhood Services and Homelessness To promote safe and secure communities for residents of Perth & Kinross with access to good quality, affordable accommodation, with the necessary support in place to sustain them in their homes and prevent them from becoming homeless.
- Specialist Provision and Independent Living To support people to live independently at home for as long as possible with help from the community and local support networks.
- House Condition, Fuel Poverty and Climate Change
 -To support residents of Perth and Kinross to live in warm, dry, energy efficient and low carbon homes which they can afford to heat.

The consultation on the draft strategy is now live. Any comments or suggestions will be considered before a final copy of the strategy goes to the Council's Housing and Health Committee for approval in May 2016.


Flight enthusiasts wanted

Community Council News



The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the March Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 2 March 2016 were: CCllrs W Freeman (Chair), D MacKenzie, D Colliar, I Jack, B Davies, D West, E Thomas, T Stewart, J Bryson and M Scott (Secy); P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, W Robertson, J Giacopazzi and D Cuthbert; eight members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCIIr M Blyth.

Declarations of Interest: CCllrs Colliar, Jack, Freeman and Scott in relation to Light Up Kinross and from CCllr Stewart in relation to planning at Gellybank.

Minutes of previous meeting (3 Feb 2016): Corrections:

KCCNL: Reference to the rest of the CC being members is not the case. CCllr Thomas explained that the members are Campbell Watson, David Cuthbert, Margaret Scott and Barry Davies.

MP: CCllr Thomas said there is no such thing as an MP for Clackmannanshire, pointing out that Clackmannanshire is part of the Ochil and South Perthshire Constituency.

Road Junctions: CCIIr MacKenzie clarified that the five junctions mentioned of concern were those in particular outside the Masonic Hall/Muirpark Road, entrance to the Episcopalian Church and Springfield Road.

Following those corrections, the minutes were proposed by CCIIr MacKenzie and seconded by CCIIr Colliar.

Police report: PC Spalding was due to attend the CC meeting if possible. In his absence the Secretary read out a list of recent crimes.

The Police also confirm that having checked with the local Community Policing Team, no significant issues have been noticed in respect of youths in the shared space area in Kinross Town Centre. The police computer records 41 youth related calls for 2015, three of which were in the High Street on the following dates: 1/10, 1/11 and 24/11.

Newsletter Fund Disbursement: An application from Kinross Colts came in before the notice about suspension of the grants was placed on the CC website. It was agreed to consider the application.

Kinross Colts: Requesting assistance to support participation at a tournament in Blackpool. The venture costs £4,800 and they are fundraising towards this. Agreed to award a sum of £500 (proposed by CCIIr Colliar, seconded by CCIIr West).

Light Up Kinross: CCIIr Davies stated that no further information has been received in regard to this application. The CC had asked for a business plan and financial statement. CCIIr Jack answered that he found the process galling and had believed following a recent discussion that the requisite information had been confirmed. It was pointed out that LUK current financial position is not sustainable without the support of the traders and the CC. Following further discussion it was agreed that LUK submit the information requested prior to the April meeting (if necessary to meet before this) and a decision to be taken on that evening. The point was raised that applications should be fully discussed at CC meetings. This was answered by the Chairman who pointed out that this was not Council business - the CC having ownership of the Newsletter.

Kinross Buildings

Former High School site: There was some discussion as to who would be dealing with the situation regarding the bats and to Persimmon demolishing buildings to the rear of the site. It was pointed out that unless Persimmon own the land they should not be carrying out any works. Concerns were also raised that Persimmon would concentrate their efforts on the Lathro site and the High School site would be placed on hold.

Town Hall: CCllr Thomas asked the Councillors who is currently responsible for the Town Hall. Cllr Cuthbert will look into this.

Proposed New Primary School: A public meeting was held recently and was well attended with positive feedback, however some concerns were raised, including the flat roof, open classrooms and use of facilities in the evening.

Hayfield Wildlife Garden: A member of the public, Mr Barnes, asked to address the meeting in relation to the future of the Hayfield Wildlife Garden and access issues. He was generally in favour of the plans for the Primary School, however had reservations about access from Station Road and in particular over the driveway to Hayfield Garden. He outlined the history of the Hayfield Garden and read out an excerpt from the August 2003 Newsletter. CCllr Colliar advised that he was an initial member of the Hayfield Garden Organisation and that the Committee wound up around



2006. The garden ground belongs to the Council and in 2006 the garden was handed over to them and the Council carried out yearly maintenance on the grounds. The access drive does not belong to the school and is used for entry to the Hayfield Garden, parking for the Tennis Club and for accessing the school service entrance. Cllr Robertson added that assurances have been given that the Tennis Club will retain parking. CCllr MacKenzie commented that the staff have been advised to park at the Park and Ride while works are ongoing.

Town Centre Regeneration

A suggestion was received that a 20mph speed limit be introduced at the Church at Station Road and at the Muirs. CCIIr MacKenzie reported that residents at Causeway Court feel unsafe, trapped in their houses and do not want to come up the High Street. A number of these people have physical difficulties. They have raised a plea for an official crossing. CCIIr MacKenzie added that education is required in relation to the shared spaces etc, e.g. who has the right of way. A controlled crossing should be introduced. Cllr Giacopazzi mentioned that it may be possible to obtain one or two zebra crossings, explaining that controlled crossings are more expensive. CCIIr Colliar added that some reflective material is also required on the pillars at the Town Hall. A suggestion was also made that the Auto Market be approached with the request that their car transporters use the link road. It was answered that we cannot dictate who uses the road. Signage regarding weight limits (except for access) were also mentioned. PKC is carrying out a review of the regeneration scheme. Cllr Giacopazzi added that a give way sign was required at Mill Street. It was agreed that the CC should write to PKC with the issues raised for community safety.

Planning applications received

CCIIr Colliar reported on planning applications received. No comments were raised.

15/00884/FLL 2 Green Road, extension: refused.

14/02062/FLL Tillyochie Farm, Balado: renewal of permission (04/00848/FLL) erection of 3 dwelling houses: approved.

Planning letter: PKC advised that Kinross CC's consultation response on the Persimmon Lathro Farm application, and others' responses, were showing as public on their internal system but had not pulled through to the public portal. The issue was rectified.

It was mentioned that SEPA have objected to this application. **Reports from Perth & Kinross Councillors**

Cllr Giacopazzi:

Repairs: Following recent heavy rainfall, repairs are being carried out.

Potholes: Cllr Giacopazzi explained the current pothole repair regime.

Cllr Robertson:

Sinking drain: Cllr Robertson reported a problem on the road from Milnathort to St Andrews.

Cllr Barnacle:

Bus service: Cllr Barnacle has written to MSPs, Andrew Warrington of PKC and Stagecoach. Cllr Robertson has asked Citylink to reinstate services. He asked that the CC support this by writing to Citylink. It was added that the Park and Ride facility should be used to its fullest. It was further suggested that the Service Bus 23 from Stirling to St. Andrews should stop at the Park and Ride.

Inter-City Hub at Perth Station: Cllr Barnacle has written requesting the establishment of an inter-city hub at Perth and a direct rail line to Edinburgh. However, the response received was that a new dual rail track which was being considered between Perth and Inverkeithing as part of the Strategic Transport Projects Review was not progressed as the review found that the cost of constructing a dual track line between Perth and Inverkeithing is relatively high compared to the benefits. In addition there were significant technical and environmental constraints which would have to be overcome. Although the rail link does not feature in the current investment programme, they are committed to ongoing improvements to rail services and are willing to consider proposals under specific criteria.

Main Issues Report: Cllr Barnacle mentioned various points which he thought the CC might wish to consider if making a representation. As the deadline is 16 March, a CC meeting would be held within a week.

Boundaries Commission: The representations are to be placed before the Scottish Ministers by the end of May 2016 and the Report will be made public at that time. Every candidate for the Parliamentary Election should be questioned on their position regarding the Kinross-shire boundary.

Community Council News

Cllr Cuthbert:

A977: It is proposed to move forward in four phases, the first stage being the introduction of 40 mph at Turfhills.

Road closure applications: The deadline is 30 April for Remembrance Parade and LUK.

Council procedure: Cllr Cuthbert advised of a school in Scone which was listed as surplus to requirements, however was not placed on the market for sale. The land has been placed with Housing Revenue Account for Social Housing. He questioned why this was being treated differently from the former Kinross High School.

Correspondence

The Secretary read out correspondence received, including: **Junction Road**: In an effort to encourage greater use of the route, it is proposed to increase the existing 30mph limit to 40mph for part of the length.

Other Business

Gairneybank Bus Service: Councillor Barnacle has raised this matter with the relevant parties.

Yellows lines at Muirs junctions: An article was placed in the Newsletter and on the CC and Newsletter Facebook pages. The responses were read out. CCllr Mackenzie reported that car parking in the area was unbelievable during a recent event at KGV fields, with a vehicle parked right on the corner of Springfield Road. The Rugby Club state their disappointment to read that the club was mentioned in the Newsletter as "exacerbating the situation" of parking problems, adding that they do everything in their power to prevent parking problems by advising all visiting clubs where to park and more importantly where not to park, notifying the Police and public (via Facebook) of large events, arranging for the placing of cones and volunteers to direct traffic at all home matches. After considerable discussion it was agreed that the CC support these yellow lines.

Gallowhill Road/Muirs junction: The CC is of the view that this junction requires to be realigned, with double yellow lines on the left hand side on entering Gallowhill Road from the Muirs. The local Councillors were asked to take this up with Council Officers.

Community Campus: Cllr Giacopazzi has invited Andy Cook to the next CC meeting to discuss the usage of the campus by the community.

Training: CCIIr Thomas stated that she had not been informed at the earliest opportunity about either of the two training events scheduled on 29 February and 1 March and therefore missed them.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the March Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 8 March 2016 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chair), B Calderwood (Treasurer), R Cairncross (Secretary), A Robertson, S Forde, D Morris, T Smith and C Vlasto; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert and W Robertson; PCs R Lorimer and D Stapleton; and six members of the public.

Apologies were received from P&K Cllr J Giacopazzi.

Portmoak Cemetery: A PKC report on cemetery provision across Perth and Kinross was anticipated shortly. A local solution for Portmoak's need for further cemetery provision is likely to be recommended as a preferred option. A site for a new cemetery was being investigated.

Pilot 20mph speed restrictions in Portmoak: A decision was awaited but the CC understood that these would apply to Easter Balgedie as well as to Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood.

Police: PCs R Lorimer and D Stapleton were welcomed. The demise of the monthly Police Report which focused on Portmoak matters was confirmed. The resource to support this was no longer available. The CC felt that, while the weekly Commander Reports were of value, they did not fulfil the function of the local monthly Report. This was particularly the case when, if for operational reasons, police officers were unable to attend CC meetings. The CC would write once more to Police Scotland in support of retention of the local Monthly Police Report.

There had been two recent road accidents on the straight stretch of the A911 between Scotlandwell and Auchmuirbridge. The CC sought assurance that these incidents would be notified to PKC. Aberrant behaviour from a youth in Kinross had been dealt with. The Commander's Bulletins of 11 and 25 February were noted.

Treasurer: General account: £430.44. MBW account: £874.21. Total: £1,304.65. Plans were in hand to manage any end of year surplus.

Planning: new applications

16/00325/CON and 16/00326/FLL Former Lomond Hotel, Kinnesswood. Part demolition and change of use and extension to hotel to form dwelling house and erection of 4 dwelling houses and associated works.

The CC considered this third iteration of proposals for the Lomond Inn site. They were clear and reflected significant progress from the original proposals. That said, there remained concern that cross-section elevations across the



site showing proposed new builds in relation surrounding properties were still omitted and that, after two years, an officer conservation report had yet to be made available. The CC were mindful of the conservation setting and, while welcoming the retention of the original Inn, believed that the proposals "overdeveloped" the site. In particular the row of three houses at the rear of the site and facing the Loch were of a scale too large for the site and together represented a significant "barrier" whether viewed from the village or from the loch. The CC recognised the importance of views of the loch from the village Main Street and that these would be blocked by these houses. It supported the value placed on the retention of these views by the Report "Kinnesswood Village Appraisal and Conservation Area Status." While the CC in principle supports housing on this site, it believes that smaller, fewer and varied housing units of a scale reflective of the surrounding properties and retaining views of the loch would be more appropriate in place of the three large properties proposed. For these reasons it will write objecting to these applications.

16/00172/FLL Vane Farm Nature Centre: Erection of 3 km Predator Fence. Uwe Stoneman, Tayside Reserve Manager RSPB, was welcomed and set out an evidence-based case for the proposed predatory fence. While wildlife on the wetlands is at risk from predators, the risk to the single colony of nesting lapwings is particularly high. The species is in decline, is listed as endangered and, unless protected, would not be sustainable. RSPB had undertaken significant research into the nature of the predation which confirmed that it was primarily nocturnal and came from both foxes and badgers.

The design of the 3km fence proposed (electrified, 1.6m in height and buried to a depth of 30cm) has proved to be effective on a number of RSPB sites across the UK. As a single fox could devastate a colony, it had to be effective. While the wetlands would remain open to Loch Leven the design would aim to preclude entry by predators attempting to swim around the fence where it entered Loch Leven. Part of its course would run alongside the Heritage Trail, where it would be separated from the Trail by the existing stock fence so ensuring the public has no direct access to the fence. Once erected its effect would be closely monitored. It would be removed if the solution was ineffective.

The CC recognised the validity of the evidence presented and, in view of the charitable nature of the applicant and the fact that the application is in a National Nature Reserve supported the planning application, despite the potential constraint of the proposal on access rights. It would write to PKC accordingly.

16/00170/FLL Iona Back Dykes Road, Kinnesswood: Installation of replacement windows. No comment by CC.

Planning: Progress with developments

Lomond Inn: An alternative concept. It was reported that no progress had been made.

Glenlomond 15/01834/FLL erection of 14 4/5 bedroom dwellinghouses. This application had been withdrawn and a further application was anticipated shortly.

Arrangements at Whitecraigs and Stephen's Field consequent on departure of the developer. Following contact with A & J Stephen, the Chairman reported that a meeting to review both the matter of maintenance of redundant plots across the development and the status of Stephen's Field would be arranged.

Community Council News

Roads: CCIIr Calderwood circulated an updated "Roads Report" which would be placed on the CC website. He highlighted: progress with road drainage in Scotlandwell although this was not yet complete; the cypress hedge obstructing the pavement at Wester Balgedie had still to be tackled; and that there remained a risk of flooding with consequent residual mud on the A911 footpath midway between Easter and Wester Balgedie. The CC would write to PKC Roads Department seeking support in resolving what appeared to be faulty drainage system adjacent to the footpath.

The problem of the narrow A911 accommodating large HGVs was reported by Cllr Robertson. He had seen two attempting to pass within Kinnesswood. Both had required to mount pavements. This was a recognised problem. There were three possible solutions: discouraging HGV transit of Portmoak along the A911 through road signage and better Sat Nav software; introduction of "give and take" provisions at certain points; and downgrading the road classification of the A911 and upgrading that of the south Loch Road B9097. The CC would approach PKC Roads Department re the possible introduction of "give and take" provisions.

Potholes: The CC noted the Report of Cllr Giacopazzi.

Kilmagadwood junction: The Chairman and a resident raised the matter of the unimplemented planning condition requiring, for road safety reasons, modification of the Kilmagadwood junction. The planning enforcement officer has approached local residents asking them to explain why enforcement of the condition is desirable. The CC would write to the PKC enforcer supporting the taking of enforcement action for the benefit of all users of the A911.



Paths: CCIIr Smith reported that: a meeting with representatives from "Paths for All" to review the state of the Michael Bruce Way (MBW) and to recommend improvements would be held shortly; two information leaflets dealing with a section of Heritage Trail within Portmoak and with the MBW had been published by the Living Lomonds partnership; and that improvements to the entry to the Moss at Peat Loan could be anticipated.

Draft response: Consultation on Main Issues Report: Comment on the MIR was required by 16 March. A draft response had been circulated for comment. There were no "Main Issues" that applied direct to Portmoak but in contributing to the preparation of the Main Issues Report the CC had been invited to raise a number of more local issues. These would be revisited in its response. CCIIrs were asked to give comments on the draft to the Secretary by 12 March. Dates of Meetings 2016 – 2017: These were noted and, once confirmed by the school, would be forwarded to PKC and circulated widely.

Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr Barnacle reported that: Cats eyes would be installed shortly on the B9097 between Findatie and East Brackley and that the recommendations of The Boundary Commission could be anticipated shortly. He alerted the CC that, in relation to the Main Issues Report, it should give consideration to the Kinnesswood settlement boundaries.

Cllr Robertson reported that following recent flooding, the Heritage Trail had now dried out and damaged parts would shortly be repaired. He noted that it would be timely to press City Link to restore withdrawn services to Edinburgh. The CC agreed to write in that respect.

Cllr D Cuthbert reported that: full brown bin collection across all PKC communities was being pursued; a PKC Scrutiny Review of enforcement practice was underway; and that PKC handling of resources relating to a redundant school in Scone provided a contrast with the equivalent arrangements for the old Kinross High School.

Matters previously notified to the Secretary

CC Insurance: New arrangements had been received.

Other Business

Footpath alongside the A911 from Scotlandwell to the Church Hall and onwards to Kinnesswood. A resident raised the state of this footpath. It was recognised as unsafe for all pedestrians and was clearly unsuitable for children attempting to access the Church or Hall and the school in Kinnesswood. The CC acknowledged that this was a well-known and longstanding problem and was a significant challenge. It had been recognised by both PKC and the CC that the initial step in progressing this problem would be through an options appraisal of possible solutions. It would write once more to PKC seeking such an appraisal.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 12 April at Portmoak Village Hall.

Fossoway & District CC

News from the March Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 1 March 2016 were: CCllrs T Duffy, K Borthwick, G Pye, R Nesbitt and G Kilby; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert, J Giacopazzi and W Robertson; and four Members of the Public (MoP).

Apologies were received from CCIIr Angus Cheape.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: No report received. PC Stapleton was due to attend. The PK Community Watch system reported that there was a break-in at a property between Crook of Devon and Cardenden on 24 February.

Crook Moss travellers' site: The DMC will receive an updated report next month. Scottish Water are currently conducting a flow and load survey to assess the capacity of the Drum processing plant.

Lambhill chipping plant: The hearing agreed at the 8 December meeting of the LRB was held today (1/3/16.) John Anderson reported that the hearing took four hours and after extensive discussion the LRB decided unanimously to uphold the original decision, i.e. to turn down the application.

A977 Defects and Mitigation Measures: With the reopening of the FRB, the HGV traffic on the A977 has now reduced. Local Councillors have held a meeting with PKC Roads department, and a business case will be prepared to implement mitigation measures in a phased way. Example measures in the first phase would include 40mph speed limits, speed indicating signs, more obvious road furniture to indicate village entries and side mounted drains. The CC has received an email from Jim Pritchard of the Fossoway School Parent Council asking whether mitigation measures could be implemented on the A977 in order to improve the safety of children going to and from the school. The CC will write to the Chief Executive to seek a review of the Safer Routes to School programme. Cllr Giacopazzi has had a meeting with the MD of Tayside Contracts (road contractors) who has assured him that potholes are being repaired properly, although there were widely held opinions by those present that this is commonly not the case. Currently there are 6014 potholes being repaired and efforts are being made to catch up on the backlog. Road problems (including potholes) should be reported to CLARENCE (the road report hotline) on 0800 232323.

Emergency Support Centre: CCllr Kilby reports that the Hall Committee has this on the agenda for their next meeting.

LDP2 MIR Consultation: The Main Issues Report (MIR) has recently been published. This document contains proposed variations to the Local Development Plan (LDP) which defines where, and how, development can take place in Perth and Kinross-shire for the next ten years. There was good attendance at the drop-in sessions. Comments on the MIR must be made before 16 March.

Boundary Commission: Awaiting their decision after our comments. The decision will be announced at the end of May, i.e. after the Scottish election, so it is important to ascertain the position of all candidates on this issue as the Scottish Government has the final decision.

CC Grant: Cllr Pye reports that the bank has not yet been able to retrieve the money, but have sent a reminder to the incorrect recipient. Next step is to ask PKC to resolve.

Ivy Cottage, Powmill: Owner has been identified, and they

are due to propose a plan this month. The property is in imminent danger of collapse.

Matters Arising With No Update Since Last Meeting: Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme; Blairingone War Memorial; Safer Route to School – Drum; Station Road Adoption.

Bollards Opposite Crook Village Hall: Awaiting a report from PKC Roads Department on how the safety of this section of road could be improved.

Crook Moss Community Involvement: Ongoing.

Councillors' Reports

Mike Barnacle: PKC Roads are investigating whether the Naemoor Road bridge could get signs indicating that traffic from one direction has priority.


Dave Cuthbert: Is attending a Property sub-committee meeting discussing the disposal of an old school building in Scone, which appears to be being handled in a different way from the old Kinross High school site.

Could Crook of Devon football pitches be developed? Local teams are developing pitches in Milnathort instead.

Powmill in Bloom are doing a great job, are there similar groups for Crook of Devon or Blairingone? If not, why not? Could someone be found to lead them?

Joe Giacopazzi: Has asked Darryl McEwan to look at signposting the bends by Hillside farm on A91 where there have been several accidents.

DMC allowed the development of the bungalow in Vicar's Bridge Road in Blairingone as there were no planning grounds for rejection, however there continues to be local difficulties on this site.

Willie Robertson: Citylink Buses are about to publish their summer timetable. Cllr Robertson has written to Citylink asking them to reverse the changes made to their timetable which reduced the number of stops at Kinross P&R.

PKC's Education budget for the next year includes reduction in "back room staff", which will probably mean that teachers have less time to actually teach.



Topical tax tips on menu at Kinross-shire PARTNERSHIP Business Breakfast



With the advent of the lighter

mornings, the drive to Loch Leven's Larder for the latest Kinross-shire Partnership Business Breakfast on 2 March was certainly well worth the early start. As the sun rose slowly over the loch, the usual full Scottish breakfast was served to the many local entrepreneurs who had assembled at the recently refurbished restaurant for this popular networking event. As ever, the range of Kinross-shire businesses represented was extensive and the vibe lively.

Kinross-shire Partnership Chairman Alisdair Stewart welcomed attendees and mentioned that a conference was to be held on the evening of 30 March, at which the area's rural businesses would have a forum to air their concerns about local issues - such as Broadband speeds and financing - to a panel of experts. He encouraged business owners to attend and to avail themselves of this opportunity to raise any concerns they may have.

Networking facilitator Sid Grant then invited breakfasters not only to introduce their products and services to their fellow entrepreneurs but also to state which alternative profession they would follow if they could ever turn back the clock. This proved a fascinating remit, with Sid himself confessing to a passion for speed that would have seen him happiest behind the wheel of a rally car. Chairman Alisdair Stewart revealed a penchant for piloting planes, while Liberty Business Centre's Linda Mercer divulged that she would have enjoyed being a tennis coach.

Perhaps the most surprising admission came from the speaker for the morning, local accountancy expert Ross McConnell, who shared his aspirations to be the head sound engineer on the main control desk at T in the Park. Fortunately for many local businesses, Ross instead has for the past 20 years devoted his considerable numerical talents to providing small to mediumsized companies - as well as high net worth individuals with tax compliance, planning and accountancy services. In addition, he kindly assists several local organisations with financial matters.

Ross's presentation was enticingly entitled "Topical Tax Tips", and if anyone present thought they would be yawning within the first two minutes, Ross rapidly dispelled the "boring accountant" stereotype. Indeed, his blend of useful, relevant information tempered by a dash of humour kept his audience enthralled (yes, you read that correctly – 'enthralled' by tax law...) as he covered subjects such as the imminent imposition of tax on dividends, changes to tax charged on savings interest, and restricted tax relief on rental income. His apposite advice was interspersed with anecdotes such as excuses submitted by members of the public to the tax office for failure to submit tax returns, a favourite being "My records were stored in a garden shed and the rats ate them..."



Occupation: Retired International Sport Administrator.

How long have you been with the Rotary Club of

Kinross? 37 years (preceded by 2 years in Edinburgh Rotary Club).

Why did you become involved in Rotary? I was interested in an activity not directly related to my occupation at that time. I was also encouraged to join by Edinburgh friend.

What was your first impression? First club, very formal. Meetings kept to strict time schedule within one hour at lunch time. Although made welcome, little time to socialise at weekly meetings. Kinross - much more relaxed atmosphere with smaller numbers, evening meetings and people who all lived close to each other.

What surprised you? The opportunities that membership provided to meet Rotarians from other countries - something that I used to take advantage of by visiting Rotary Clubs while on business trips abroad.

What is the best thing you have done with Rotary since joining? Probably involvement in the first Loch Leven Open Days in 1983 and 1987. Rotary was the first organisation to succeed in persuading all the Agencies involved to permit public access to Loch Leven (in addition to fishing). Along with onshore activities, the Club organised raft races with teams coming from all over Scotland.

If you could change one thing about Rotary, what would it be? Nothing that I feel strongly enough to want to change. It has already changed with the times and is today much less formal and more open than in years gone by.

When friends or family find out you are a member of Rotary, what do they say? Now, it is quite likely to be an enquiry about what they are going to get involved in as many of our activities can also involve friends and family.

What would you say to someone who is thinking of joining? Do not hesitate; you get out of it what you put in and you will never regret it!

What do you wish other people knew about Rotary? That we work hard at trying to do good things, and are not just a group of people whose main purpose is to meet regularly to socialise!

Sum up your Rotary Club in three words. (Or three phrases if you like. Ed.) Good company, interesting speakers, socially responsible.

Did you know... The first Rotary Club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris. Paul was an attorney (or solicitor if you like) who wished to capture, in a professional club, the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The Rotary name derived from the early practice of rotating the meetings around the members' offices.

Kinross & District Probus Club

The Period at the second half of the eighteenth century and first half of the nineteenth century saw much activity in Scotland. Referred to as the 'Enlightenment', it saw people such as



Robert Burns and Adam Smith make huge contributions to the arts and to economics. Scotland also prospered in industry and commerce. It is in this period that the story of Conflict and Change (The Life and Times of Admiral Thomas **Cochrane)**, given to Probus by Christine Short, began.

The 9th Earl of Dundonald lived in Culross Abbey House and was very much involved in industry. Carron Iron Works, coal mining and timber were among the enterprises in his portfolio. His son, Thomas Cochrane, who was eventually to become the 10th Earl, was born in Culross Abbey House and it is his story that we were given by Christine.

However, things were not good as the country had been at war with Holland for many years and the British navy was constantly in battle with the Dutch navy.

Against the wishes of his father, young Dundonald joined the Navy at the age of 18. Meanwhile his father entered some dubious enterprises and eventually lost his money and the Abbey house.

But young Thomas Cochrane rapidly gained promotion, had a remarkable career and became Lord High Admiral. He was involved in many battles before being sent to the Caribbean to keep the peace and to protect British interests. This period of his life included a spell in prison and losing his money.

He soon got back on his feet when he was hired to form a Chilean Navy and then a Brazilian Navy. He also found time to get married and have two daughters.

In retirement he became depressed and unhappy and spent his time and money on various inventions,

Recipe

Juice of half a lemon


Method

The current (P & K) Kinross Foodbank

Perth & Kinross Foodbank (SC044158) has provided food parcels to Kinross people now for two years. This was made possible through the assistance of the manager and staff of Kinross-shire Day Centre, High Street, Kinross. This organisation, which has been operating for over 30 years, agreed to distribute food parcels supplied by Perth & Kinross Foodbank, even though they were already operating a full programme.

In the two years since commencement of the service in February 2014, Nan and her team have provided 214 food parcels, providing three days' food to feed 257 adults and 78 children. This is just over 6.0% of the total food parcels supplied by Perth & Kinross Foodbank throughout the area that it covers.

In addition to the above, a further 50 parcels were provided within the Kinross-shire Ward during the same period from the Perth base, bringing the total provision to 264 parcels, providing three days' food to feed 325 adults and 92 children. Perth & Kinross Foodbank receives food donations from many sources, including several within the Kinross area. The total food donated from sources within the Kinross area totalled 4,054 kg during the period of our operation in the area. The weight of food distributed in the same period was approximately 3,250 kg. So 80% of the food donated within the Kinross area has been returned through food parcels to its residents. The balance is held in stock to ensure that we can continue to meet the need in Kinross.

This service continues to operate and will do so as long as there is a need to be supplied.

The Making of Kinross Museum

At the February meeting, members were delighted to welcome David Munro, who presented a topic entitled "The Making of Kinross Museum".

David traced the history from the early days when David Marshall (1831-1902), who was a fisherman, tour guide to the castle and bookbinder also made barrels in his spare time! Above all, he was a natural collector and on his death bequeathed his collections to the community of Kinross. The big question was where to house the collections for the community to enjoy.

In 1905 a room above the Carnegie Library was secured for the purpose and until the 1970s this is how it continued until Nan Walker began to lobby the Town Council to improve the space needed to show collections and list and document the growing number of collections. In 1978 the Kinross Marshall Museum Trust was formed, but many years were to pass before new accommodation was achieved.

Two rooms at the Community Campus were allocated to the museum and these were opened in February 2010.

David then went on to highlight some of the many artefacts and collections which have been gifted and continue to be given to the museum.

Volunteers carefully evaluate and record the items and assist in putting on displays which are regularly changed in the fine display cabinets situated within the library.

The museum is open on a Thursday and Saturday and open to all members of the community.

David was appropriately thanked for a most enjoyable and fascinating evening, which was rounded off with excellent refreshments.

Our driver will pick you up, take you to your appointment, stay with you and return you to your own home afterwards. For most journeys the cost is for the round trip. However, occasionally, if you are going to need to be at the hospital for several hours, it may be necessary for one driver to take you and another to pick you up; this would result in you needing to pay for both journeys.



Kinross-shire Historical Society





The talk gave an interesting illustrated account with some amusing anecdotes of the Royal Company of Archers since it was founded in 1676 by Charles II. The early records show that it was started as an archery club. Lt Col Richard Callander outlined the history of the Company and the prizes for which they compete.

In 1703 Queen Anne granted a charter allowing them to be called The Royal Company of Archers. A condition of the Charter was that a pair (three not two) of silver barbed arrows be presented to the Queen. The pairs of arrows passed back and forwards between the Archers and the Sovereigns over the years. Some are in Holyrood Palace.

Over the years there have been many famous members, such as Robert Burns and Walter Scott. There are 410 members on the active list and 170 on the inactive list. Over 75s do not play a ceremonial role. There is a seven-year waiting list. There have never been any female members though the rules do not prevent it.

When Walter Scott was involved in organising George IV's visit to Scotland in 1822, he had the Archers act as bodyguards. Queen Victoria often came to Scotland and the Archers were involved as the bodyguard.

The illustrations of some of the bows in Archers' Hall included one from Flodden in 1513. Richard Callander then showed his own bows and explained their construction and capabilities. The target is called a clout and sits at an angle and is straw stuffed. A marker signals with a white flag to show how close an arrow had reached to the clout.

There are various competitions in rotation over a number of years. Prizes are worn on evening dress. One member who won over 100 prizes was given a special badge to mark his achievement.

The uniforms worn depend on the event involved, from informal shooting through to ceremonial occasions and paintings from Archers' Hall show how the uniforms have changed over time.

The Archers moved from Leith to the Meadows, where they have the right to shoot and where, in 1849, Archers' Hall was built. It was extended in 1901. The dining room seats 94. Recently, some of the ground around the Hall was developed with student accommodation, which will provide an income to pay for Archers' Hall. A new indoor archery range has also been created which is used weekly by disabled archers, some of whom hope to take part in the Invictus and the Warrior Games.

2016 is going to be a busy year for the Archers. In addition to the usual events and ceremonies, it is the Queen's 90th birthday.

Lt Col Callander answered some questions from the floor and David Walker, himself an archer, gave the vote of thanks on behalf of the members for a fascinating talk from which we learned a lot.

The challenge will begin at the Kirkgate Park at around 10.30am and it would be good to see a crowd there to cheer the cyclists off and welcome them back again. Spectators might also wish to gather at the various entry points to the trail around the Loch to encourage them along the way.

The forbearance of those who use the path for walking is sought for a couple of hours that day. Disruption will be kept to a minimum, and for that reason the number of cyclists has to be restricted. The moderator of each Presbytery in Scotland is being asked to cycle in support of the Moderators' Cycle Challenge or to nominate a representative to do so. The Moderator of the Presbytery of Perth (the Rev. Alan Reid of Kinross) has agreed to cycle himself.

A Year at Kinross Parish Church

Kinross Parish Church of Scotland held its Annual Stated Meeting on 11 March within the Sunday Morning Service. The year's accounts were presented, elections held to the Congregational Board and there was an opportunity to make comments or question the church's office bearers – a chance taken up enthusiastically by the children. A Review of the Year was shown in photographs and the minister, Rev. Alan Reid, made some comments on the year past.

He said: "It is very hard to encapsulate a year in the life of the congregation in a brief report. I would, however, like to highlight just three areas. "Firstly, I want to mention the Youth Alpha programme which involved almost 20 young teenagers attending on Sunday mornings to explore the foundations of the Christian faith. It also involved a dedicated team of leaders, helpers and a number of people who served up a breakfast each week. By God's grace, there will be fruit from that work.

Secondly, I want to say a word about the repair work on the tower. That the first major work on stonework in nearly 200 years was accomplished without a panic over funds is testimony to the generosity of the congregation. There has been a sustained increase in regular giving over the past few years.

"Finally, and related to that theme of generosity, I wanted to make reference to the offerings for charities beyond the church. The offering at Communion on 6 March for reconstruction work in Nepal following last year's earthquake amounted to a staggering £2,857, a level of generosity that speaks powerfully of what God is doing among us."



Leagues Update


The Otters Premier League team were in superb form at Montrose for the first league match of 2016 on 13 February; they even managed to snatch an unexpected victory.

He also won silver in the 100m Backstroke in a very quick 1.09.71 (fourth in the Scottish rankings) and bronze in the 400m Freestyle in 4.42.24 (sixth in the Scottish rankings).

Cameron McCloskey (17) showed some excellent form to win gold in the 50m Freestyle (25.97) and a bronze in the 100m Backstroke in 1.05.54, shaving 1.05 secs off the oldest Otters club record, set exactly 14 years ago to the day.

Foremost amongst the girls was the ever consistent **Emily Cumming** (10) who won silver medals in the 200m Individual Medley (3.20.12) and the 50m Butterfly (41.45) in the ten year old Girls category. She also claimed bronze medals in the 50m Breaststroke (49.15) and 50m Backstroke (40.97).

There were many other great personal performances, too many to mention, but what was clear for all to see, was that the Otters continue to punch well above their weight and are a force to be reckoned with. Well done to **all** our young swimmers.

Loch Leven NNR

It's great to see that the water level has finally dropped enough for people to get access to the whole of the Heritage Trail again. A recent spell of high pressure brought decidedly spring-like weather to the area, and it was fantastic to see so many people able to get out and enjoy the National Nature reserve in the sunshine. The Walkathon for Chest, Heart and Stroke Scotland was particularly busy with the weather being very kind to them. Over £7000 was raised for the charity on the day, with stock donations going to the CHSS shop in Cowdenbeath. We're delighted to be supporting such an important charity locally, and are also happy that over 200 people are able to enjoy Loch Leven, many of which may never have visited before. This month also saw the launch of our reserve management plan consultation phase. The reserve is certainly alive with Spring birdsong as the "love bug" starts to kick in amongst the multitudes of males singing for all they are worth to attract the ladies. The iconic call of Lapwings can once again be heard from the middle hide as they claim territories and perform spectacular display flights. Pinkfoot geese are starting to return north from southern wintering areas and numbers have been building daily as more skeins fly in for a stop off before heading back to Iceland. The summer migrants will also start to appear soon, with Sand Martin reported over the loch on 18 March; they are usually one of the first to come back. More species will start arriving at regular intervals during April including osprey (reported back already at time of writing), swallow, willow warbler, chiff chaff etc.

Farming



Well it's confession time, I suppose, so I've looked out my pen of shame to admit to my inadequacies and say 'well I certainly got that one wrong'. I wrote in my last article about how only a quarter of the intended batch of early lambing ewes turned out to be in lamb but I wasn't too concerned because I put a tup back in beside them at the same time as the rest of the ewes so that any which weren't pregnant would be covered and lamb with the others. Unfortunately, the unforeseen knock-on effect of so few lambing early was that it left too big a job for "wee mini tup" who was put in among them and just over half of that batch ended up not in lamb at all. The most frustrating thing is that we could have easily put another tup in along with mini tup but I didn't think it was necessary and by the time I realised what was happening it was too late to do anything about it. You live and learn, and I certainly have learned an expensive lesson there.

On a more positive note, the rest of the ewes scanned very well, which was a relief and they will be starting to lamb by the time you are reading this. The lambs that were born in the early batch are fairly bouncing around their pen (small pen due to the small number) and we will put them out to a wee sheltered field in the next few days while the weather is still nice, before the snow which will very probably rain on their parade before long. The dry spell of weather we have been having has been very welcome and lifted spirits considerably. We are busy clearing dung out of the cattle sheds and tipping it in heaps in the fields without making much mess at all, although I am carefully choosing dry areas to tip it, as the wet areas are still wet. As I think I have hinted at before, the wet areas of the fields are almost always wet here at Backward Farm. It is a job that has been put off for a while, so it's a relief to be getting it done at last.

Another job I have been busy with is dusting off my election 'scunnerometer' as it will be busy over the next while with the forthcoming Scottish parliament election and the European in/out referendum. I have beefed it up a bit as it took a fair battering during the Scottish Indyref and it will no doubt have a lot of scunneration to measure in the weeks to come.

We will have an extra bit of help over the next three weeks as our eldest son is home on holiday from university. This period of 'slave leave' as we call it will be fun packed with all the usual unpleasant, student-friendly jobs I have been saving up especially for him! His help will be very useful for the lambing preparations and he should be here for a reasonable part of the lambing itself. Our youngest son will also have his school Easter holidays so he will be roped in to help and Helen will also be off from her job as a school 'dinner lady', so the workforce will be so numerous I might just book myself a minibreak as I won't be needed. I've heard Barcelona is nice at this time of year! Ha ha.

The winners of "The Greats" awards will be revealed on 5 May.





Obituary

Euan Bruce FERGUSON, BSc(Eng), MCI Arb.

Respected local civil engineer and businessman Euan Ferguson (1944–2016) has died peacefully at home in Milnathort following a short illness. Euan's long and active association with Kinross-shire began in 1980 when he moved the headquarters of Hatrick-Bruce Ltd to Station Yard, Milnathort. During the 36 years that followed, he conceived, designed and managed myriad building, civil, mechanical and electrical engineering works throughout Scotland, where his engineering expertise – paired with a firm but fair approach to business – earned him the respect of clients and colleagues alike.

He also completed numerous construction projects closer to home, including Millbridge Scout Hall, the Myre Pavilion, the installation of the two wooden bridges and initial paths at Mary's Gate (now part of the popular Loch Leven Heritage Trail), the expansion of Todd and Duncan Woollen Mill, the full refurbishment of Kinross Parish Church, and the innovative development of Hatrick-Bruce's own yard on the banks of the Queich. His most recent local achievement was supervising the refurbishment of the Kinross Curling Trust Rink at the Green Hotel – a project from which he derived particular pleasure.

Euan was a stalwart supporter of the Perth and Kinrossshire community through his membership of the Rotary Club, his chairmanship and directorship of the Kinrossshire Partnership, and his directorship of Perth Chamber of Commerce. He was also involved with the Perthshire Business Shop and was a member of Edinburgh Merchant Company and the Institute of Arbiters.

Away from his busy professional life, Euan divided his time between motorbikes, steam trains, listening to jazz and enjoying the countryside with his faithful canine companion, Genghis. His local infrastructure legacy lives on after him – a fact that brings great comfort to his family and to the loyal workforce who were so proud to work with him over the years.




