#### **Conservation Areas**

Kinross-shire Civic Trust is becomingly increasingly concerned about the approach by Perth and Kinross Council towards Conservation Areas. The Scottish Government is very clear in its directive that all Local Authorities must examine their historical areas and determine whether they are worthy of being created as Conservation Areas, the better that they are conserved for present and future generations.

Kinross-shire already has several designated Conservation Areas, namely Kinross, Cleish, Scotlandwell, Kinnesswood and Wester Balgedie. The Kinross-shire Civic Trust has had a considerable involvement in the creation of them. It is therefore all the more surprising that Milnathort, which probably has more historic elements than any of them, has not had marked out and created a Conservation Area. Milnathort CC decided not to support the KCT proposal for a Conservation Area at its meeting in January 2015, but the minutes record that the CC was uneasy about taking that decision. It had taken a decision not to support the proposal at its December 2014 meeting despite agreeing not to do so until the January 2015 meeting on the basis of the response by residents, but there was no record of how many residents actually opposed the proposal, who they were or where they lived. A recent article in the Courier encourages the residents of Milnathort to have their say about a Conservation Area. It is important that people who support this proposal should make their voice heard as well as those opposing it.

Cllr Giacopazzi has made great play about the problems with windows and doors and is now supported by Cllr Cuthbert. However, windows and doors are important elements of the architecture of old buildings and their visual appearance. If the rules are relaxed for them, it is liable to allow their replacement with elements that are totally out of character with the whole building and future generations will only look at the results and wonder how they came to be permitted.

at the results and wonder how they came to be permitted. However, the major concern with Conservation Areas is future development. While development is perfectly permissible, the directives from Historic Environment Scotland make it quite clear that any future development must relate to the existing buildings. There is a suspicion that that is the motivation behind the opposition to the proposal for a Conservation Area. Recently there was an application for a new house in a part of Milnathort that the Trust would like to see as a Conservation Area. Several neighbours objected on the grounds that the house was not compatible with the surrounding houses. If there had been a Conservation Area in place, compatibility with the surroundings would have been more assured.

The Trust is also concerned about the way Planning Applications for large developments are being handled by the planning authority in Conservation Areas. On several occasions the Trust and other local organisations have had to query why no Design Statement has been provided with a major application in a Conservation Area as required by the Local Plan and also why no Report from the Council's Conservation Area Officer was presented on the Council's website, so that the public was able to see what the report said. The Trust understands that 'informal' meetings are being held in the Council between the case Planning officer and the Conservation officer but no records are being taken of the results of the meeting. This is strictly not in accordance with the protocol agreed by the Council.

Before the public submits any comments or objections to such major applications in Conservation Areas, they ought to be able to see what the Conservation officer's opinions are.

The Trust has a membership and an elected committee which includes people with considerable professional experience in the fields of planning, engineering, heritage and architecture. It does not regard itself as a 'pressure group'. The Civic Trust is also one of a community of 150 amenity societies throughout Scotland under the banner of the Scottish Civic Trust which campaigns for, and offers advice on, achieving high standards of building design and conservation for the benefit of the community. Under the Presidency of The Prince of Wales, the Scottish Civic Trust also has a democratically elected board and, through its branches, a wide membership.

The Scottish Government positively encourages community involvement. That includes interested bodies outside elected parties, because it recognises that organisations like Kinross-shire Civic Trust has, within its membership, people who have considerable professional expertise and local knowledge that can add to the discussion on local matters.

Interestingly, the Scottish Government, through Historic Environment Scotland, has announced a new initiative, worth £10 million over the next three years. The funding, which is distributed through Historic Environment Scotland's Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS), encourages local authorities to invest in their historic environment, repairing and restoring the built environment, whilst helping to stimulate economic regeneration.

This is the seventh round of funding bringing the overall contribution to £45 million invested by Historic Environment Scotland since 2007 to the benefit of more than 56 projects across the country.

Kinross-shire Civic Trust's primary objectives are promoting and encouraging a public interest in, and care for the beauty, history and character of, the areas of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg in order to maintain the essential character of the area as well as the preservation, conservation, development and improvement of buildings of general public and historic interest and a high standard of architecture and planning in the area; all very reasonable aims.

#### **Planters in Kinross Town Centre**

Dear Editor.

I am writing to you in order to seek the views of your readers on an issue I have raised with officers.

I attended a meeting on Kinross High Street outside the Town Hall and suggested that planters (100cm long x 40cm wide x 50cm High) should be placed between the stone pillars.

My view on the effect of these would be threefold: to enhance the area with planting; to prevent cars from parking on the pavement which they do with monotonous regularity and to make the pavement feel safer.

The officers have responded by saying that: "With regards to planters I think there needs to be some joined up thinking here. There is always a balance to be struck with these shared spaces with regards to (among other things):

- 1. Minimising clutter in the space (for safety and event planning / flexibility reasons)
- 2. Facilitating and encouraging easy and safe access and flow of pedestrians around the space
- 3. Delineating the vehicle areas sufficiently so that vehicles do not encroach into zones intended for pedestrians
- 4. Not delineating the zones within the space so much that it segregates vehicles and pedestrians in a traditional manner and causes drivers to speed up

The current design has been arrived at by the project team in consideration of all of these things.

My initial thoughts are that, while I am not against planters as a general idea to enhance the space, there are an awful lot of planters on your proposal and they may contradict points 1, 2 and 3 above. I think if it is proposed to have any further planters then it requires some careful consideration and input from various teams in PKC. I think, given that it is a streetscape planting scheme, then Greenspace would need to drive this forward as this is their area of expertise (with input from others such as the Traffic and Network Team, Regeneration and our team)."

A second officer responded as follows: "It is Community Greenspace's opinion that the current number planters provided by Kinross in Bloom is appropriate for the High Street particularly in the context of points 1-4 in the email of 1st June, with which we agree."

#### **Proposed Milnathort Conservation Area**

Much as I have become to understand that, as a politician, Cllr Giacopazzi appears keen to have the last word on most topics, in the matter of a potential for a Conservation Area (CA) in the core and historic part of Milnathort, I feel a response is justified.

Cllr Giacopazzi makes much of, according to him, no evidence of support for the CA, yet to my knowledge there has been no great effort to canvas opinion and he has not produced convincing evidence that a CA is not supported.

In defence of the Giacopazzi (NISA) Supermarket he claims any alteration to the building has been "to the internal layout and to the rear of the building."

The property to the rear, in Back Loan is, in my opinion, not in harmony with the generally traditional buildings in the proposed Milnathort Conservation Area.

The property also includes an old building, which, I understand, has some function in the production of Giacopazzi ice cream. This building appears to be in a state of some considerable disrepair but does have a potential to contribute to a designated CA if restored sympathetically. Some cost would of course be required to make the building harmonise with and complement the immediate surroundings, which include several attractive, including listed, buildings. The effort to do so would I suspect be well appreciated by the local community of Milnathort.

### Main news in brief

### No change to Kinross-shire boundaries

The Kinross-shire electoral ward is expected to remain as it is following the publication of the Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland's reports and recommendations to Scottish Ministers in late May.

As part of its Fifth Statutory Review, the LGBCS had proposed that part of the Kinross-shire ward should be split off and put with the Almond & Earn ward, and that the number of Kinross-shire councillors should be reduced from four to three.

However, following the public consultation period, which saw over 200 people comment on the Kinross-shire ward proposals, the LGBCS now recommends that the Kinross-shire ward boundaries should remain as they are, and that the ward should continue to have four councillors.

The September and October 2015 issues of the Newsletter carried several articles on this subject, including detailed research and analysis by Councillor Cuthbert, which assisted members of the public making representation to the LGBCS. For more on this, see Councillor reports on pages 6 and 23.

### 91 houses to be built at former High School site

Persimmon Homes have been granted planning permission to create 91 houses at the former Kinross High School site. 87 of these will be new-build houses and four dwellings will be created from an existing school building.

An application by Persimmon to demolish all the school buildings and erect 102 houses was refused in spring 2014. With the application that was granted consent on 8 June 2016, the section of the school building fronting Kinross High Street will be retained and converted to four houses. This building dates from 1906 and is described in the Council's Conservation Area appraisal as a key building of interest.

Kinross CC and Kinross-shire Civic Trust objected to the planning application, as the number of houses proposed is higher than the allocation of 70 in the Local Plan. Both organisations also expressed concerns at the lack of information provided by the developer regarding materials, finishes and the lack of detail in the plans for the Edwardian building

# New Kinross Primary School gets planning permission

Planning permission has been granted for the new Kinross Primary School, to be built on the playing field in the grounds of the existing primary school.

Permission was granted by delegated powers, i.e. the application was approved by planning officers rather than going to the Development Management Committee of councillors.

The school lane that runs from Station Road to Bowton Road is expected to be closed for 18 months as from 4 July 2016 while construction work takes place.

# Late-breaking news Good news for Kinross-shire

Kinross-shire is set to benefit from last minute changes to the Perth & Kinross Council budget agreed at a full council meeting on 22 June.

Following lengthy discussions with officers, the other opposition groups and the SNP administration, local independent Councillors Mike Barnacle and Dave Cuthbert managed to get four items added to the budget proposals, which subsequently gained cross-party support.

The first item to be added to the budget was £500,000 for cemetery extensions. The reason behind this is that both Kinross North and Orwell cemeteries are approaching capacity with no expansion space planned. Portmoak has one lair remaining with no expansion space. The councillors felt it would be wrong for Kinross-shire folk to have to be buried in Perth.

Secondly, road safety initiatives to the value of £300,000 were added to the budget. The four local members have a list of 46 outstanding items relating to road safety, some of which date back to 2012. In addition, they are petitioning for a safe crossing in Kinross town centre and have been told it will take at least 2 years to achieve as this year's road safety budget is fully spent already.

The third item is the traffic upgrade, signals and renewal programme. This had been excluded by officers from the budget but Councillors Barnacle and Cuthbert felt it was important to maintain traffic infrastructure and so requested that £300,000 be put back in the budget for this.

All the above funds will be phased over several years.

Finally, and most importantly, after many years of campaigning, Councillor Barnacle has managed, with the help of Councillor Cuthbert, to persuade the administration to budget for mitigation measures on the A977 to help manage traffic flow on 'the forgotten road'. £600,000 will be spent in two phases.

£100,000 will be spent in 2017/18 on speed limits and speed-activated signs for the villages on the A977 along with significant gateway features to the villages to help inform road users that they are entering a village environment.

On top of this, £500,000 is budgeted for 2018/19 to provide a large roundabout at the A977/B9097 junction between Crook of Devon and Drum. (27% of the vehicles using this section of the road are HGVs, buses, goods vehicles and vans and the A977 carries the highest number of vehicles of any A class road which is not trunked in Perth & Kinross.)

These projects are to be funded by reducing the budget proposal for Perth City Centre Placemaking (e.g. lighting buildings) by £1.1 million and a reduction in ICT infrastructure of £600,000.

These concessions were agreed with the administration in collaboration with the Labour, Liberal Democrat and Conservative groups who supported the recommendations.

Councillors Barnacle and Cuthbert were delighted that these projects were included in the administration's motion, with Councillor Barnacle commenting, "I returned home from the budget debate with a rare sense of achievement!"

# Councillor Cuthbert Local Government Boundary Commission Scotland (LGBCS)

Following my piece in the last Newsletter, the LGBCS have announced their recommendations for councillor ward boundaries.



These came out at the end of May and the really good news is that the latest proposals leave Kinross-shire intact.

A huge well done and thank you, to the 250+ people who wrote to the Boundary Commission or signed a petition to object to their original proposals.

The bad news is that the LGBCS appear intent on taking one Councillor away from Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) and have proposed in their latest announcement that the North Perth ward should be subdivided and one Councillor removed.

I think this proposal is outrageous, as it has come completely out of the blue, leaving residents in the area with almost no chance to comment and is completely unnecessary.

The next stage in this process is that the proposals being made by the LGBCS will go to Scottish Ministers for them to make a final decision.

#### **Former Kinross High School site**

The proposals to demolish most of the Former High School in Kinross and the building of 91 houses were given approval at a Development Management Committee meeting on 8 June. I managed to get three additional conditions added to the approval, these being:

- Detailed plans and elevations to be submitted showing the retained section of the former High School, clearly indicating the extent of retention of the historic fabric and any additional alterations.
- 2. A demolition methodology to ensure that the historic elements proposed for retention are protected during this process.
- 3. Full details of all proposed new and replacement external doors and windows.

It was also agreed that an informative would be added requesting that the developer approach the owner of 27a Alexander Drive to agree the sale of a 3 metre wide piece of ground to the residents to allow them to protect their amenity.

Unfortunately the motion I put forward for this application to be deferred pending the production of an up to date parking survey for Kinross and for a comment to be submitted by the Council's Conservation Officers was only supported by Councillor Robertson, so did not carry.

I see this as unfortunate, as, in my view and Councillor Robertson's, there will be a problem with parking in Kinross following the loss of the existing off street parking.

The Conservation Officer's comment is also in my view important as I am not a conservation expert and I believe all significant applications in Conservation Areas should have the view of an expert recorded for the sake of transparency. I raised the question of whether the use of concrete roof tiles, UPVC fascia boards, windows and drainage goods was appropriate in a Conservation Area. The committee were advised that this was acceptable, which I find somewhat surprising given the demands on householders to use traditional materials when replacing doors and windows in the same Conservation Area.

I also asked the following question: "PAN 82, which deals with Local Authority Interest Developments, says: "The site selection process must be rigorous and transparent, so that it can be clearly demonstrated that choices have been made solely in the interests of proper planning." Are you content that this has been done?" I was advised that it had been.

I then asked what was being provided on the site by way of affordable housing given that Kinross has a Common Housing Register pressure ratio of 5.7, which is the same as Scone, which has been identified as pressurised.

I was advised that the 25% affordable housing provision would be provided by way of low cost housing for purchase. I don't think this will resolve the problem of the waiting list for social rented housing.

I have written to the Chief Executive to express my disappointment at this situation.

#### **Apology**

In a previous article I mentioned that I had been told that the collection of refuse bins adjacent to the Roxburghe Guest House had been caused by changes made to the back of the Town Hall by Simon Wilson. I have now been told that this was not the case and that the additional bins were the result of new legislation.

I apologise for this incorrect statement, which I understand upset Simon Wilson's family.

#### **Kinross Town Hall**

Talking about the Town Hall, I understand that it is on the market and offers of £175,000 are being sought. I also understand that there are three notes of interest on this property and a closing date has been set for 1 July. So the good news is that something may well be done about the building, which is essentially a shell at the moment, with little of the inside remaining.

The disappointing thing is that I would have liked to have seen the building coming back into community use. I fear that there will not be time to put a community based offer in for the property.

#### **Fossoway Community Council**

At a recent meeting of the Fossoway CC, a plea was made for new members. Two of their existing members are resigning for personal reasons, and this will leave the CC rather light. If you live in the Fossoway area (Blairingone, Powmill, Crook of Devon, Carnbo and most of the area in between), please consider joining the CC. Community Councils are very important as they provide a local voice which I and the other three elected members listen to carefully.

The work involved can be as little as attending one hour and a half meeting per month. If you are interested, give me a ring on 07799 750289.

#### **Capital Budget at Perth and Kinross Council**

As I write this piece, the Council is in the process of deciding what capital projects it will invest in over the next seven years.

The process followed appears to revolve around Council officers coming up with ideas, writing outline business cases, costing them and then giving them a priority scoring.

As far as I can see this is a totally officer-led process, with the only Councillor recommended project (mitigation measures on the A977) being scored below the line and therefore unlikely to get investment. Daft, if you ask me!

#### **Councillor Robertson**

#### Persimmon Homes,

#### former High School site

Planning consent was granted at the June meeting of the Council's Development Management Committee for the application



for 91 houses on the former site of Kinross High School. The Edwardian frontage of the high school building will be preserved and the building converted into four town houses. A parking area will be provided behind Kinross Parish Church to hold 17 cars. The access onto Green Road, which was a major concern for local people, will be a 'secondary access road' and all traffic will be expected to use the Muirs entrance.

#### **Capital Budget**

This is due to be debated at the June meeting of Perth & Kinross Council. As I write this report prior to this meeting I am unsure of what the outcome will be. However there are a couple of spending proposals over the next five years which cause me major concerns. These are:

Perth City Lighting Plan - £7.7 million. It is proposed to use lighting to highlight city features and areas like Broxden and Inveralmond roundabouts. This, we are told, will draw visitors to Perth and revitalise the shops and businesses. I am totally not convinced it will.

Perth Harbour - £870,000 to dredge the River Tay. Perth Harbour has being losing trade steadily over the years despite millions being spent improving the berths and infrastructure of the harbour. It currently runs at an annual loss of over £200,000 per year, which the Council pays. It is anticipated that only 17 ships will visit Perth this year, an average of one every three weeks. To try and encourage more shipping, the Council want to spend £870,000 to dredge the river. This

money is being spent with no guarantee that more ships will use Perth.

#### **Roads Issues**

Over the past month myself and my fellow Kinross-shire councillors have met with roads engineers to discuss various roads issues.

**Kinross High Street** – We have asked for a safe crossing point for the High Street and bollards to be sited opposite the Salutation Hotel to protect pedestrians.

**Kinnesswood Main Street** – The narrowness of the road through Kinnesswood and the lack of proper pavements is a real safety issue. We have asked for a 'give-take' traffic system for the village centre to allow the pavements to be widened. We have been told that because of lack of money it could be two to three years before funding will be available to do these works. Hence my annoyance about large amounts of money being spent on the projects mentioned in the capital budget above.

#### Dog fouling

Milnathort CC has raised this as an issue for the village. They have gathered complaints through their Facebook page and I have now sent all the issues raised on to the Council's Dog Warden service and asked them to respond to the points raised. The main issues are as follows:

- a) Lack of bin by the field next to Websters, Stirling Road, Milnathort. Many residents requested one here.
- b) Constant overflowing bin at edge of golf course at Auld Mart Road.
- c) Lack of bin along paths/cycle paths Arlary to A911 Burleigh Castle and Burleigh Steadings.
- d) Lack of education and lack of seeing a warden.

# Bronze Age Fair a Success

The Bronze Age Fair at Kilmagadwood was a success, with over 150 people attending the pop-up exhibition and archaeology fair held last month in Portmoak Village Hall and on the Green at Scotlandwell.

The Fair was all about the discovery of over 20 cremation urns dating from the Bronze Age on the site of the two new houses on the Kinnesswood side of Kilmagadwood. The urns are between 3,500 and 3,900 years old and were excavated in 2013.

Archaeological scientists and researchers came together with members of the local community with an interest in heritage to present over a dozen stalls to the public, all themed on the amazing discovery or the archaeology of the local area. Osteoarchaeologists from the University of Edinburgh and curators from the National Museums Scotland brought along some of the contents of the urns – cremated bone, bone and

bronze artefacts – as well as a few of the urns themselves. Living history experts in Bronze Age technologies breathed life into ancient techniques of ceramics and bronze smithing.

The research into the urns is only just in its initial phase and is part of a much larger post-excavation programme that requires funding. The Fair certainly demonstrated there is lots of interest locally in the discovery, and it is hoped this interest will help build the funds required to complete the analysis of this unique find for Kinross-shire.

The Fair was funded by Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust as part of Perth and Kinross Archaeology Month and a Let's Celebrate grant from the Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership. Huge thanks are

You may have thought that once TRACKS had completed the Loch Leven Heritage Trail that our work was completed and no new paths were planned for the Kinross-shire and Glenfarg area, but in fact we have been busy over the last six mouth creating two new routes.

funders, The SITA Trust, Heritage Lottery Fund and Sport Scotland through their Active Places Fund for providing the funding to make this project happen.



#### Planning approval for Kinross High School site

At its June meeting, the Development Management Committee (DMC) overwhelmingly approved Persimmon's

latest application to build houses by 10 votes to 2.

You will recall that your four ward councillors unanimously condemned the original Persimmon application for 102 houses on this site when it came before committee in 2014. Upholding our concerns, the DMC refused the application for the following reasons:

- Density of houses; although a town centre site would normally allow for a greater density of homes, 102 was felt to be excessive.
- Demolition of the Edwardian era stone school building; although Historic Scotland refused to list the building, people felt the building was a worthwhile part of the townscape and the Kinross Conservation Area.
- 3. Houses being built too close to the Parish Church, a listed building, and the loss of parking provision for those attending church.
- 4. Concerns that the new housing on the Western boundary would adversely affect the privacy of existing houses.

Accordingly, Persimmon brought forward plans to address all four concerns. Only 87 new houses would be built; the Edwardian school would be retained and converted to four homes; the Parish Church would have a buffer between it and the new houses with the provision of 17 parking spaces; efforts were made to increase the separation between existing and proposed homes.

At the DMC meeting, Cllr Cuthbert took the lead in asking for further safeguards to protect the old school building. Three conditions were agreed by the Head of Planning. A further proposal was tabled to alleviate the remaining issues of overlooking on the South West boundary. This was all agreed. The committee felt that the applicants had done all that had been asked of them. Clearly, as there was no reasonable ground for refusal, the application was approved. I am relieved that this eyesore of a site, a magnet for vandalism and unauthorised 'camping', is finally moving towards a resolution. But I have positive reasons to applaud the DMC decision; 25% of the new homes are, in line with Council policy, to be 'affordable'. 56 of the homes will be of two or three bedroom design; the kind of homes which I consider are needed in Kinross. I continue to share the concern of my councillor colleagues that Kinross-shire would benefit from more social housing, by which I mean housing association accommodation. However, this is an argument for another day.

Parking remains an issue. Since 2010 the school grounds were used for ad hoc parking, which shall now disappear putting pressure onto 'on street' parking in the Muirs. There was nothing the committee or planning department could have done to allocate part of the site for parking, as the site is privately owned. The Council's decision to sell the High School site for maximum value to partly offset the cost of the new Campus was taken years ago by a previous Administration. I understand the view that consideration could have been given to the provision of both public parking and an element of social housing on the site. That said, I am not in possession

of the facts on which the original decision was taken and cannot, therefore, have an informed opinion.

Continuing on parking, your Ward 8 Councillors have been asking the Council's Roads team for a parking survey in Kinross for some time, in part to assess the effect of the loss of spaces at the old High School site and to suggest any required actions. Although such a survey, which is carried out by contractors, comes at a cost, our request has been granted. The work was scheduled for 25 and 30 June.

A recent report commissioned by English Councils says this, 'A well managed parking scheme, where spaces 'turn over' frequently can help to increase the number of visitors coming to a town centre and thereby help business'. As a former shop owner, I can confirm the truth of this statement. The spaces on New Road, Milnathort, for example, are limited to 30 minutes waiting. On a busy day these spaces are used by hundreds of motorists accessing the shops and facilities.

#### **Kinross Hockey**

The artificial pitch at King George V is worn out. The Hockey club, to its credit, raised funds but even with a small contribution from the Council, the cost of a replacement surface seemed unachievable. An application for funding to the Arthur and Margaret Thomson Trust, of which I am a trustee, was made. I made the case in support of the application and the Trust made a grant of £80,000, enabling the Council to look again at its own contribution. Officials are proposing that the Council match the Trust's grant enabling the replacement to go ahead thus safeguarding a precious facility. At £136,000 the proposed grant includes a generous allowance for contingencies should they arise.

#### **Kinross Primary School**

The User Reference Group met on 15 June to receive a progress report from officials and the builders. Also in attendance were representatives of Kinross Community Council and the Parent Teacher council. Work will begin on this exciting project on 4 July with the new building being handed over in December next year. We were shown extensive plans and artist's impressions of both the building and the grounds with considerable care being taken to preserve existing trees and hedges where possible. There will be an extensive pick up/drop off area within the grounds which will help avoid congestion on Station Road. Following several interesting presentations, we asked questions on details of the project. I am delighted with this landmark project to provide the next generation of our community in Kinross with such a cutting edge learning facility. It is a testament of our Administration's commitment to looking after Kinross-shire's youngest residents.

#### Boundaries Commission listen to Kinross-shire's 'Claim of Right' on ward boundary proposals

Readers of the Newsletter may recall my articles for the September and December

2015 editions relating to representations made to the above Commission by PKC, the Kinross-shire ward members, community councils of the ward and a significant number of Kinross-shire's people.

Councillors Cuthbert and Robertson joined me in writing a joint letter to all MSPs for our area in March 2016 asking them to declare whether or not they supported the retention of Kinross-shire's current boundaries, which featured in the April 2016 edition. We were sceptical that the proposals would be changed. However, I am pleased to report that the Commission have made Final Recommendations to Scottish Ministers on 26 May 2016 which include the decision to return to the existing Kinross-shire ward boundary to address the breaking of local ties and to maintain our number of ward councillors at four. This success is in no small measure down to the number of representations the Commission received during the consultation opposing the proposed changes and maintaining that Kinross-shire's historic county boundary should be retained. I am absolutely delighted at this outcome.

The Commission in its fixation on reducing the number of PKC Councillors from 41 to 40 decided to reduce Perth City North Ward from four to three councillors. PKC remain unhappy with this outcome and recommend for the Full Council on 22 June 2016 that the 'status quo' of 41 members should be retained and that members give further consideration to proposed changes to ward boundaries by Almondbank and Perth before writing to Scottish Ministers by 7 July 2016.

#### **PKC Capital Budget**

PKC's capital budget 2016-2023 is to be debated on 22 June 2016. I note it includes £136,000 for King George V Hockey Pitch, £11,767,000 for Kinross Primary School Upgrade Project, £4,941,000 for Flood Prevention Works in Milnathort

& South Kinross, £19,000 for further Kinross Town Centre Improvements and £42,000 for further site servicing at the Western Edge of Kinross. Local members had again requested an Outline Business Case (OBC) be prepared for the A977 mitigation measures in January 2016 (see February edition) and I note this project is not ranked sufficiently by officers as a priority to make the current capital programme for 2020 to 2023. Cllr Cuthbert and I are extremely angered by this and have met with senior officers on the matter; at the time of writing I am trying to negotiate an amendment to the budget to include a phased element of the proposals for the A977, which in the context of a cumulative programme cost for OBC's of £238,841,000 is relatively insignificant.

[Note from Editor: Cllrs Barnacle and Cuthbert were successful with budget negotiations. See late-breaking news, page 5.]

#### **Policy Protection of Lochleven Catchment**

I am of the view that PKC, SEPA and SNH are failing in their statutory duty on the above. PKC's acquiescence to retrospective planning applications calls into question the signed protocol of these three organisations and the effectiveness of Policy EP7. This is particularly the case when dealing with Gypsy Traveller Sites under Policy RD5B, a policy that appears to outweigh environmental considerations. Last month's Newsletter summarised the outcome of the Enforcement Report (or lack of it) on alleged breaches of six planning conditions at the Crook Moss site and I shall be writing to the senior management of the three above organisations calling for a review of the policies and protocol designed to protect Lochleven.

#### Landscape designations

From initial correspondence and discussions with PKC officers I sense a reluctance to revisit the loss of landscape designations for the Cleish Hills and Devon Gorge and also my call for Regional Park status for the Ochil Hills. It will require strong objections to their stance when our proposed LDP2 is published this coming autumn, if we are to change that mindset.

### Planning for the Future: Why everyone should have a Power of Attorney

Most people are aware of the importance of having a Will in place to protect the family and reduce the time and expense involved in dealing with someone's affairs after a death. However, it is equally important, if not more so, to ensure that you have considered who you would like to look after your affairs during your lifetime if you were unable to do so yourself for any reason; that is the role of a Power of Attorney. A Power of Attorney allows you to choose someone you trust to make decision on your behalf if you lost the capacity to make those decisions yourself, for example through old age, illness or accident. You can appoint an Attorney to look after your financial affairs (for example, paying bills, dealing with bank and building society accounts and managing investments) and/or to look after your health and welfare (such as choosing your care arrangements or consenting to medical or dental treatment).

You can choose who to appoint as your Attorney(s); you may wish to appoint more than one person or a 'whom failing' Attorney. Relatives are commonly chosen as Attorneys, but it is also possible to appoint a friend or professional advisor. It is quite possible to appoint one person as your financial Attorney and another as your welfare Attorney. If you appoint more than one person, you can decide how they must make decisions, for example, whether they must act unanimously or whether they are able to act independently of each other. You can also choose what powers to grant to your Attorneys; for example, would you wish them to have the power to make gifts of your assets? This can be a very useful power, especially if you are trying to mitigate the possible impact of Inheritance Tax on your estate, but it is an extensive power and you must be comfortable allowing someone to make such decisions on your behalf.

Before a Power of Attorney can be used, it must be registered with the Office of the Public Guardian (the "OPG"), whose role is to supervise those appointed as Attorneys.

You can specify that the financial powers contained in a Power of Attorney can be used at any time once the document has been registered with the OPG, i.e. it is not necessary for someone to have lost capacity before these powers can be used. This could be useful if, for example, you are planning to be out of the country for a period of time and need someone to manage your affairs in the UK in your absence. Alternatively, you may simply have grown tired of having to deal with banks or utility companies and want someone to be able to speak with them on your behalf.

In contrast, welfare powers can only ever be exercised when you have lost the capacity to make such decisions yourself. This is not an all or nothing test; you may be quite capable of making some decisions and not others.

Before a Power of Attorney can be registered, a solicitor or medical practitioner must sign a Certificate to confirm that the person granting the Power of Attorney understands the nature and extent of the powers being granted to the chosen Attorney(s). Nobody, not even close relatives, can arrange a Power of Attorney on behalf of someone else, so it must be done while you are able to express your own wishes. Many people think Powers of Attorney only need to be considered by the elderly, but that is not the case. In fact, it is often easier to consider these things whilst the prospect of needing help with your affairs is a far away thought.

In the absence of a Power of Attorney, if you lose capacity and someone needs to manage things on your behalf, it may be necessary for someone to make an application to Court to request the necessary powers to deal with things; a Court appointed Attorney is known as a Guardian. It is not automatically the case that your spouse or family members will be able to step in and manage your finances or be able to discuss your treatment with medical staff. A court application is time consuming, intrusive and costly and may lead to difficulties in the interim period whilst access to your bank accounts will be in limbo. In addition, a Guardian is subject to stricter annual reporting requirements, which leads to additional cost. Most importantly, the person appointed by the Court may not be who you would have chosen to take such decisions for you.

There is a common misconception that granting a Power of Attorney means you are relinquishing control of making your own decisions; this is not the case. If you remain capable of managing your own affairs, your Power of Attorney can remain tucked away in the safe. However, if the unexpected happens, it can be put into action straight away; with those people you have personally chosen immediately having the necessary powers to efficiently manage things on your behalf whilst you are unable to do so.

You should be aware that an Attorney cannot make a Will for you. So, if this is not something you have yet done, it should also be put at the top of the priority list!

#### Latest fraud hits students

A new phishing campaign which has hit students of UK universities claims that the student has been awarded an educational grant by the Department for Education. The email purports to have come from the finance department of the student's university and tricks the recipient into clicking on a link contained in the message to provide personal and banking details.

After submitting sensitive information, one victim was taken to a spoofed website which appeared like a genuine website of their bank, where they were asked to type in their online banking login credentials.

Protect yourself:

- Do not click on any links or open attachments contained within unsolicited emails.
- If an email appears to have come from an organisation you know but the message is unexpected or unusual, contact them directly via another method to confirm that they sent you the email.

#### The Battle of the Somme

On 1 July 1916 a major British and French offensive was launched against the Germans on both sides of the River Somme to the north of Paris. It lasted for 141 days until 18 November 1916 and was the largest and bloodiest of the battles fought during the First World War. With over 1,000,000 service men either wounded or killed, it was also one of the bloodiest battles in human history and the source of much controversy.

The Franco-British push on the Somme was one of a series of offensives planned by the Allies to take place in 1916, but when the German Army launched a surprise attack at Verdun on the Meuse on 21 February 1916, many French divisions intended for the Somme were diverted. What was to have been a supporting attack by the British on the Somme became the main offensive. The British Army on the Somme comprised a mixture of the remains of the pre-war regular army, the Territorial Force and the new Kitchener Army, which was composed of 'Pals' battalions recruited from the same places and occupations.

Although the first day of the battle was a serious defeat for the German Second Army, which was forced out of its first line of defence by the French Sixth Army, it was the worst day in the history of the British Army, with 57,470 casualties, during an attack that failed to reach the German front line.

By the end of the battle, British and French forces had penetrated six miles into German-occupied territory but some objectives were not achieved.

#### Recent crime and suspicious behaviour

On Sunday 8 May at 1.30pm, 400 Euros were stolen from Giacopazzi's in Milnathort. The male responsible was of stocky build, wearing blue jeans, grey/blue t-shirt and spoke with a foreign accent.

Between 4 and 6 May, a padlock was cut from a gate leading to a private road in Wester Loan, Milnathort.

Between 7pm on Saturday 7 May and 7am Sunday 8 May, a garden fence was damaged to the rear of a property in **Douglas Crescent, Kinross.** 

At 4pm on Saturday 21 May, an insecure blue BMX bike was stolen from outside Loch Leven Leisure Pool.

A blue Ford Focus Sport TDCI on a 56 plate containing two males was seen near to Briglands House, Crook of Devon, on 19 May. Both males had Irish accents and when confronted within a building, claimed they were looking for scrap. They were not keen to leave the area initially but when informed that they were on CCTV they changed their minds.

Between Thursday 19 and Monday 30 May, a door to Kinross House was damaged.

Fake £50 Bank of England notes are being offered for tender across Perth and Kinross. Shopkeepers are reminded to be vigilant.

Two quad bikes were stolen from a farm near Cupar on 15-16 June.

Between 1900 hrs on 4 June and 0900 hrs on 5 June, two **CCTV** cameras were damaged and stolen from stables near to Cupar. Two males wearing masks were seen approaching the cameras before hitting them with a hammer and removing them. Please remember if you have CCTV, the hard drive or DVR should be stored in a secure cabinet and not easily accessible should someone gain entry to your property. It is not unknown for the hard drive or DVR to be stolen, which means that any footage, unless it is backed up elsewhere, will be lost.

#### **Keep Safe from Doorstep Crime and Bogus Callers**

From bogus callers to rogue traders, doorstep criminals are cunning, creative, and often very convincing. Anyone can be fooled as these people are professional con artists. However, the over 60s are often specifically targeted.

Residents within Perth and Kinross have been targeted over recent weeks by such criminals and it is asked that we all remain vigilant and look out for our elderly and vulnerable neighbours.

#### Air Weapon Surrender Campaign

New rules will make it illegal for anyone to possess an air weapon without a licence under the Air Weapon and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015, which comes into force from 31 December 2016. However, prior to this date, anyone holding an air weapon has six months to either obtain a certificate or to surrender their weapon(s) to the police.

#### **Phone Scams**

Police Scotland is encouraging the public to be vigilant of telephone fraudsters who are targeting people over the phone and trying to con them out of their life savings.

Take steps to avoid becoming a victim:

Be aware that fraudsters often use techniques to hold your phone line open, so that when you try to dial out to verify the caller, they intercept and re-answer the call, claiming to be from the company or organisation that made the original call.

To ensure that your phone has not been compromised, we recommend using a different phone line to verify the caller. Where a second phone line is not available, try calling a family or friend on the line first, as the fraudster will find it difficult to impersonate a voice that is known to you.

Never disclose your PIN or online / telephone banking or log-in information or card reader codes to anyone, even if the caller claims to be from the bank or police. Remember, banks never call and ask you to disclose these security

If you receive a call requesting your PIN, card details or online / telephone banking log-in information, end the call immediately.

If you receive a suspicious or unexpected call, always verify the caller by taking their phone number and getting it checked independently.

Ensure elderly relatives and neighbours are aware of the fraud and crime prevention advice.



This is a free phone number (unless you are using a mobile pone), which any member of the public can contact at any time if you have information relating to a criminal activity of any sort. It is, if you wish, confidential and you cannot be contacted if you choose to remain anonymous.

# Kinross Community Council News from the June Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 1 June 2016 were: CCllrs W Freeman (Chair), E Thomas (Secretary), D Colliar, T Stewart, D MacKenzie and J Bryson; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, D Cuthbert and W Robertson; and six members of the public.

**Apologies** were received from CCIIrs B Davies, I Jack, M Blyth, D West and M Scott.

Declarations of Interest: None.

**Police Report**: No police present. A Community Councillor observed youths drinking alcohol at Kirkgate Park at 7.20pm on 1 June. They were not causing a disturbance but there is a bye-law against drinking alcohol in public in Kinross.

Friends of Loch Leven Library: Richard Scott addressed the meeting. This group of volunteers will man the library 1-4pm on Saturdays. He appealed for the public to come and use the library on a Saturday afternoon. Mr Scott was warmly thanked and congratulated for bringing about this initiative. *[See also p. 46.]* 

**Crumbling façade**: PKC's Housing Dept say the High Street property with crumbling façade is not theirs. Cllr Cuthbert is trying to arrange a site visit with a housing officer.

**Digital learning event**: CCllrs Bryson and Davies and Cllr Cuthbert had attended a demonstration at Kinross Primary School involving iPads purchased partly with a grant from the Kinross CC Newsletter charitable fund. CCllr Davies had sent an email of thanks to the school, congratulating them on the excellent presentation. CCllr Bryson and Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that the children's ability and confidence with the devices had been impressive, and that the school had appreciated the CC and Council being represented.

#### **Planning Correspondence and other Planning Matters**

- Persimmon, former High School site: Application 16/00255/FLM is going to Development Management Committee (DMC) on 8 June with a recommendation of approval. No one from the CC is able to attend the meeting. Ward councillors present encouraged the CC to write to them with any comments to be brought to the attention of the DMC. It was agreed that the Secretary would draft a letter and circulate to CC members for further comment before submitting to the ward councillors.
- Retail unit at former Health Centre, Lathro: CCllr MacKenzie is concerned at the close proximity of a convenience store, due to open in August, to the High School, and the possibility that it may lead to increased consumption of unhealthy food and drink by pupils. He noted that Forfar Academy had recently banned energy drinks from its premises. CCllr MacKenzie wondered if PKC had any policies on this matter. Cllr Robertson said that PKC does not have control over what children buy outside the school. Food in school is healthy. CCllr MacKenzie to draft a letter to the Director of Education.

Kinross Common Good Fund (KCGF): The guiding principle is to give financial assistance where the committee members think this will benefit the locality (the former burgh of Kinross). The anticipated balance of the KCGF is £158,778.72 if no money is distributed this year. The KCGF committee had previously decided to ring-fence £157,000 to keep as capital and give small amounts to organisations that require running cost funding. CCllr Colliar suggested small grants should be given from the capital amount. However, the KCGF committee would like the legacy still to be there in 10 years' time. The ring-fenced money could be used as capital funding if an appropriate project comes along. KCGF documents are available on the PKC website. A query was raised about a grant given to the Kinross-shire Partnership. Cllr Robertson will make enquiries.

**Town Centre Regeneration:** The ward councillors had a walkabout with council staff on 24 May. The following was agreed:

- a controlled crossing should be installed;
- the sign indicating the 20mph zone should be moved north of the roundabout (Station Road and High Street junction);
- more bollards are required at the give-take to prevent drivers driving on pavement.

#### **Community Council News**

A suitable place for the crossing might be the stone strip outside the Co-op. C Haggart (PKC Roads) says there is no money in the current financial year. The work will be costed and a report issued.

The ward councillors asked if the CC was in favour of extending the 20mph zone as far as the Kirklands Hotel. The CC agreed. Give way lines cannot be painted on the stone setts, so there will be no line at the junction with Burns Begg Street.

The quantity of bins on the corner of the High Street and Montgomery Street looks messy; it is due to new regulations for food waste requiring extra bins.

Cllr Cuthbert asked if the CC would be in favour of Kinross in Bloom placing small planters between bollards in the shared space area. The CC agreed.

The ward councillors asked Council officers some time ago for a parking survey but this has not yet taken place.

**The Town Hall** is up for sale at a guide price of £175,000. Cllr Cuthbert suggested that a group could be formed to purchase it for the community.

New Kinross Primary School: A resident, David Scott, asked to address the CC regarding the second pedestrian access at the school lane added to the planning proposal after the public consultation had taken place. Some residents are concerned that this will result in more drivers parking in Douglas Crescent for drop off and pick up. He also queried the safety of children exiting on to Station Road sooner than a gradual stream from lower down the lane. He has tried asking PKC if the safety of the new access has been formally assessed but without success. The CC agreed to contact PKC to ask for a safety assessment. Cllr Robertson has asked for double yellow lines at Emslie Drive and will ask for these also at Douglas Crescent.

**Miscellaneous Correspondence:** A list summarising correspondence received since the last meeting was circulated. Some items discussed were:

Local Community Planning event: The CC was invited to this event held on 24 May at the campus. Several CC members and ward councillors attended. Comments made were: it was not well facilitated; it didn't cover any real topics; the area to be covered is too large (Kinross-shire would be ideal); the principle is good; it is reinventing the wheel.

The Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland has completed its reports and recommendations to Scottish Ministers, which can be viewed on the LGBCS website. LGBCS is no longer recommending that part of Kinross-shire should be split and moved into the Almond & Earn ward and no longer recommending that Kinross-shire councillors should be reduced from four to three. However, LGBCS now recommends that Perth North should be reduced. The ward councillors were congratulated for all their work in arguing the case to maintain Kinross-shire boundaries. Cllr Robertson praised the effort made by residents throughout the ward in submitting comments. However, it is not the end of the matter. There will be a further six-week consultation. There will be a discussion at PKC full Council on 22 June.

#### **Reports from Ward Councillors**

**PKC budget**: Cllr Robertson was aghast at the PKC proposed capital budget. He said Cllr Barnacle has campaigned long and hard for an outline business case for mitigation measures for the A977 but this will not be included in the budget. However, £877,000 will be spent on dredging the Tay; £12 million will be spent on illuminating Perth buildings; and £1.2 million will be spent creating pontoons on the Tay. Cllr

Robertson had proposed an amendment but was defeated by 7 votes to 6. He feels the Council has "lost the plot". It may be three or four years before there is money for a controlled crossing on Kinross High Street.

[However, see late-breaking news, page 5.]

Planning and Loch Leven catchment: Cllr Barnacle referred to the Enforcement Report to the Development Management Committee meeting of 11 May regarding the Crook Moss Gypsy Traveller site. There are breaches concerning drainage contrary to policy EP7 and contrary to a Protocol that PKC has with other organisations. The failure of EP7 and the Protocol to protect Loch Leven will be discussed at a Planning Member Officer Group meeting on 16 June.

**Perth & Kinross Outdoor Access Forum**: Cllr Barnacle is now a community member of this forum and is happy to represent CCs with issues such as paths networks.

**Roads priorities**: Cllr Cuthbert asked for the CC's response to the list of proposed roads repairs sent to the CC last month.

#### **Other Business**

**Toilets at pier**: A member of the public had posted to the CC's Facebook page regarding inadequate toilet provision at the pier. Cllr Cuthbert said that the lessees of the Boathouse had been invited to participate in PKC's Comfort Scheme but had refused. Kinross Estate Company do not want more toilets on their land, so there seems to be little that can be done.

**Double Yellow Lines at Muirs**: the lines near 60 Muirs have not been painted yet.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 6 July at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

# Milnathort Community Council News from the June Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 9 June 2016 were: CCllrs D Baudains (chairman), K Heneghan (secretary), S Young, E Kirkham, C Williams, L Cartwright and C Lawson; P&K Cllrs Robertson, Cuthbert and Giacopazzi; 13 members of the public and two guest speakers. Apologies were received from CCllr B Cook and P&K Cllr Barnacle.

Friends of Loch Leven Library: See p. 46.

**Kinross-shire Time Exchange:** Marg Meade outlined the work of Kinross-shire Time Exchange, set up a year ago by the Compassion Group.

**Dog fouling:** Cllr Robertson will liaise with CCllr Cartwright directly as there have been a number of comments on the CC's Facebook page regarding this. CCllr Young still hadn't discovered who had put up the sign at the field next to Webster's but it had had a very positive effect.

Victoria Avenue: The chairman had raised the matter of vehicles parking too close to the junction with Wester Loan with the police, but it was still a problem. Bin lorries were also reversing up Back Loan. Cllr Robertson advised that it was up to the police to monitor the situation. He had written to PKC's road safety officer about Back Loan and will report back. He said that the council did not favour speed bumps because they can throw vehicles off line and cause damage.

Right of way through primary school: CCIIr Kirkham said she had written to the head teacher to ask whether there had been any concerns about this. The head teacher would be happy to meet with the CC to discuss. It was agreed to follow this up. CIIr Giacopazzi advised that the building of a changing facility in Donaldson Park was being encouraged and cars would be parked in the school car park.

Roads: The CC had been asked to produce a list of roads where they would wish road safety measures to be installed. Bridgefauld Road/Whyte Place: At the previous meeting a member of the public had alleged that damage had been done during a recent upgrade and that tenants had not been compensated. Cllr Robertson has offered to meet with him to discuss the issue but said that the council usually responded quickly if work had not been carried out properly.

**Old Perth Road**: A resident wanted to turn a grass verge into a parking space, but it was not clear whether it was still privately owned or had been passed to PKC. Cllrs Robertson and Giacopazzi will follow up.

**Grass in Donaldson Park**: There was a discussion about the areas of long grass in Donaldson Park, which Cllr Robertson described as 'a mess'. The decision not to cut these areas was taken for cost-cutting reasons but this was thought to be a false economy and they were full of weeds and dog dirt rather than wild flowers. It was agreed that Cllr Robertson and CCllr Young would meet with the appropriate PKC official. **Planning** 

Planning applications would be available on the MCC website and would be updated on a weekly basis.

**Applications determined** since last meeting: Conversion of Tudor House antiques to dwelling house: approved. Siting of 14 containers in Stirling Road: refused.

#### Applications submitted:

- Alterations to Tillyrie House. Noted.
- Extension to house at The Barns, Dalqueich. Noted.
- Alterations to house at 14 Auld Mart Lane. Noted.
- Demolition of workshop and erection of house at 46 New Road. Noted.

**Pace Hill**: This is a major development and therefore the developers would consult with the public on 10 June.

**Hattonburn Road**: A member of the public expressed concerns for the future of the ancient broadleaf woodland should an application to build five houses be approved. Cllrs Robertson and Giacopazzi advised that its destruction would not be permitted under planning regulations.

Elyse Kirkham had contacted PKC to ask about the impact on local schools' capacity in light of proposed new development. Milnathort Primary School currently has a roll of 210 and a capacity of 257, while Kinross High School has a roll of 1006 and a capacity of 1286.

#### New matters and correspondence

PKC **Greenspace** are seeking volunteers and leaflets have been distributed in the village.

The chairman had received an e-mail from a Courier reporter asking about proposals to designate Milnathort as a **conservation area**. He had forwarded the minutes of the previous meeting at which it had been discussed.

The chairman had received an e-mail from a lady concerned that the farmer had locked the **gates at Arlary**. Cllr Robertson explained that he had had to lock it as a spring had broken and people kept leaving it open. The spring had now been replaced.

MCC has now received its certificate of insurance.





#### **Community Council News**

CCIIr Cartwright reported that the MCC **website** was live and was intended to be a 'one stop shop' of information and contact numbers.

A letter had been received from **Victim Support** acknowledging the donation made by the lady who had had her handbag stolen. The collection made by villagers had amounted to more than she had lost, and the balance went to the charity.

**Public toilets:** CCIIr Kirkham stated that a member of the public raised the issue of the lack of public toilets in the village with her at The Feel Good Fair. At the CC meeting, a member of the public stated that she had met a severely disabled woman who was unable to access the publicly available facility in the Thistle Hotel as it was locked and noone answered the bell. A member of the public said that the Church office in South Street was manned between 10am and 2pm and the toilet was available if necessary. It was agreed to take this forward. There was also a discussion about asking local businesses to allow visitors and the public to use their toilet facilities for a donation.

#### Comments from the floor

**Moss Road**: A member of the public said that some residents had clubbed together to repair the potholes.

#### **P&K Councillors' reports**

Cllr Cuthbert reported that the **LCCP** in Kinross-shire would be starting in October. This would involve the Council, Fire Service, Police, NHS and other bodies forming a partnership to address local issues under community empowerment arrangements.

**Boundary Commission**: [See p. 5.]

**Budget review group**: PKC was to discuss its capital budget on 22 June, but there didn't seem to be much in it to benefit Kinross-shire. [However, see page 5.]

**Jessie's Park**: Cllr Robertson reported that PKC is to install a gate at Jessie's Park.

**Potholes** in New Road have been reported.

The **build-out** at the zebra crossing in South Street is due to be installed this year.

Cllr Robertson was critical of some of the plans in the **capital budget**. [See p. 7.]

Cllr Giacopazzi said that a survey was being undertaken with regard to **parking** in Kinross now that the old high school site would be unavailable.

# Portmoak Community Council News from the June Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 14 June 2016 were: CCllrs B Calderwood (Deputy Chair and Treasurer), R Cairncross (Secretary), T Smith, D Morris and C Vlasto; Ward Cllrs M Barnacle and J Giacopazzi; and eight members of the public.

**Apologies:** CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), A Robertson and S Forde; Ward Cllrs D Cuthbert and W Robertson; and Police Scotland.

PKC Public Transport Consultation: Stagecoach Route 201 which links Kinross to Glenrothes via the five Portmoak settlements was subsidised and was part of a current review on Kinross-shire public transport by PKC. At the open consultation forum hosted by PKC, the CC and several residents had reflected views from Portmoak on the value of route 201. Ward Councillors were asked to clarify if the burden of subsidy fell only on PKC or did Fife Council make a contribution.

**Local Boundary Commission**: The recommendation of the Commission to Scottish Ministers to retain the boundaries of the existing Ward 8 and its representation by four ward councillors was warmly welcomed.

Boulders restricting passage of essential agricultural machinery on the Dryside Road at Muirs of Kinnesswood.

The land on both sides of the carriageway was owned by a local resident. PKC did not feel it had a locus in resolving this longstanding matter. It appeared to be an intractable problem which would shortly become acute for the farmer concerned. The CC would give further thought to a solution.

**Overhanging branches at Wester Balgedie**: the property owner had been contacted. Arrangements to undertake a trim were in hand.

**Police**: There was no Police Report. The Commander's Bulletins of 26 May, 2 and 9 June were noted.

**Treasurer's report**: The General Account at the end of May was £140.30, while the Michael Bruce Way account was £694.30 - giving a total of £834.60. The operational grant from PKC for the years 2016 - 2017 was anticipated. An indicative budget for the year had been prepared.

#### Planning: new applications

16/00913/AML Land at Caol IIa, Back Dykes, Kinnesswood. Erection of a new house and garage. No Comment.

16/00817/FLL Carsehall Cottage, Wester Balgedie Replacement windows and doors. No comment.

16/00798/FLL Glenlomond House, Glenlomond. Erection of a garage. No comment.



16/00721/FLL Bankfoot Cottage, Leslie Road, Scotlandwell. Alterations and extension to house. No comment.

16/00795/FLL Rannoch, Main Street, Kinnesswood. Alterations and extension to house. No comment.

16/00800/FLL Pine Cottage, Wester Balgedie. Replacement windows and erection of a balcony. No comment.

16/00751/FLL Former site of Levenglen Nursing Home, Glenlomond. Erection of 13 houses. In anticipation of increased construction traffic, the CC had made two objections. Both were conditional on there being in place prior to building commencing and on the road between Wester Balgedie and Glenlomond: agreed passing places; and appropriate traffic calming signage.

#### Planning: progress with developments

- a) Former Lomond Inn: Proposals for part demolition and erection of 5 dwellinghouses. The CC had made a formal complaint to PKC reflecting concerns about the continuing policy of PKC to withhold reports of conservation officers.
- b) Glenlomond: Proposals to erect 13 dwellinghouses. While a decision was awaited there was apparently permission to proceed with the removal of the existing buildings. This was underway.

**Planning: Note of appeal**: 16/00362/IPL and 16/00363/IPL Local Review Body: Two houses at Lochend Farmhouse, Scotlandwell.

**Roads Report:** The CC received its Roads Report for May. It also heard a report of a CC meeting with PKC Roads Officers on 3 June which had considered:

- Re-siting the 40mph speed limit on the A911 in Wester Balgedie to include the two entrances to Loch Leven's Larder. The matter was in hand.
- b) traffic management of large vehicles (HGVs) in Main Street Kinnesswood. Plans will be developed to ensure that, at the narrowest point large vehicles can pass without encroaching on narrow pavements. The positioning of a strategically placed bollard would also be considered.
- c) reclassification of A911 and B9097. Although there may be a case to upgrade the busier B9097 to an A classification, there was no case to change the classification of the A911.
- d) proposed 20mph pilot speed limits on parts of A911; The principles for this pilot scheme would be considered by PKC in September. It remains uncertain whether these proposals will be introduced in Portmoak.
- e) footpath along A911 from Scotlandwell to Church and at Woodmarch. This remains a significant problem. Both footpath and road were narrow, making passage for large vehicles and pedestrians alike difficult. Progress towards a resolution awaits an option appraisal by PKC.
- f) Flooding consequent on blocked drains in Scotlandwell had been resolved.
- g) A911 junction in Scotlandwell. No change in traffic flows is proposed here.
- h) Signage. Strategically placed signs advising alternative routes for HGVs attempting to pass along the A911 and through Portmoak would be explored.

**Portmoak Primary School**: Introduction of "Park and Stride". The CC was supportive of this project where, on certain days, children would walk from the Church car park to the school. It had some concerns in respect of the narrow section of footpath pavement at Woodmarch and would draw this to the attention of the school.

**Parking immediately after build-outs**. This can cause difficulties if it restricts those passing build-outs from making a timely return to the left hand side of the road.

Paths Report: Volunteers now met every Monday to undertake maintenance work on the Michael Bruce Way and other paths. Much was being achieved with an emphasis being on diverting water from path surfaces. A strimming programme was underway and grass cuts to Peat Loan had been reduced to once a month. Volunteers from Kinross High School had helped with the maintenance programme and a sponsored walk by Portmoak Primary School would contribute some funds to the path programme.

Ward Councillor Report: Cllr Barnacle reported that he was now a member of the PKC Outdoor Access Forum. The Council was now considering its capital budget for the years 2020-2023. He would pursue concerns that the road infrastructure for Kinross-shire was not accorded an appropriate priority.

**Loch Leven Community Library**. Richard Scott described the work of a volunteer group "Friends of Loch Leven Community Library." [See p. 46.]

**Kinnesswood in Bloom** (KIB). CCllr T Smith reported that, despite continuing efforts A & J Stephen, as owner of a plot of land adjacent to the war memorial, had not provided necessary consent to allow KIB to develop the plot. Significant funding would need to be returned were this not forthcoming by September. The nature of the impediment was unclear. Ward Councillors would consider what may be done.

**Potential change of flight paths at Edinburgh airport**. The CC noted that there was a current consultation to address this matter which was open to the public. At present there were no specific proposals.

The Next Meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 12 July at Portmoak Village Hall.

**Police report:** No report received. PC Douglas Stapleton was due to attend, but unfortunately operational requirements prevented that. Suspicious men were seen at Briglands, Rumbling Bridge.

**Future of this CC:** Since the last meeting, two of the members have resigned, leaving us perilously short of members, preventing us attending all the meetings that we need to, and leaving the remaining members with a great amount of work to do. Any proposed new members would be very welcome, especially people to represent Carnbo and Powmill. It would also be good if we could lower our average age and improve our gender balance by recruiting younger and female members.

There also appears to be some confusion about the minutes. CCllr Pye explained that firstly the minutes were not a verbatim transcript, rather a summary, and secondly they are a record of what was said, which may or may not be true statements. Any person who was present at a meeting can request corrections at the following meeting before the minutes are signed off, however, changes can only be made where it is agreed that what was said at the previous meeting was not accurately recorded. Objections to the content of previous statements cannot be included.

Crook Moss Travellers' Site: Cllrs Barnacle and Cuthbert have both written letters to the Newsletter pointing out that as the drainage condition has not been met then the planners should cause the residents to move out until the condition has been met, but this proposal was rejected by the planners. This seems to suggest that policy EP7 (protection of Loch Leven) may need to be re-examined as it is not being enforced. Another report on the compliance with the planning conditions will be submitted to the DMC in twelve months, although local councillors unsuccessfully tried to bring this forward to a shorter period.

**A977 Defects and Mitigation Measures:** Cllr Robertson reports that Police Scotland is still totally opposed to supporting any sort of Community Speedwatch programme on cost grounds.

Cllr Barnacle and the other local members have been talking to PKC Roads department for a long time to get an Outline Business Proposal prepared, but unfortunately it has been deemed to be low priority, which is extremely disappointing. Meanwhile, it seems easy for PKC administration to find money for lighting up Perth city centre buildings, dredging the Tay, etc.

It was noted that the Crook of Devon storm drain works are over-running. Potholes by drains on B9097 and subsidence outside Devonshaw House on A977 have still not been fixed. The CC and local Councillors will write to PKC's Roads department requesting an urgent resolution to these matters. **Emergency Support Centre:** CCllr Kilby reports that the Hall committee has agreed to this, but arrangements for access to keys still needs to be worked out.

**CC Grant:** CCllr Pye reports that PKC have now reissued our grant for last year.

In order to obtain online access to our bank account it will be necessary to open a new one, as the current one is too old to allow this. CCIIr Pye was actioned to open the new account.

Rumbling Bridge Hydro Scheme: Six people have expressed interest in being part of a Community Benefit Group. CCllr Duffy is arranging an initial meeting this week. CCllr Duffy will chair the first meeting, but once the committee has been established she will step down. Cllr Barnacle is seeking clarification from Dave Stubbs about whether the initial developer contribution of £10k, required as part of the planning consent, could also be paid into this fund. MoP notes that the hydro scheme developers are not keeping them adequately informed about the programme for road closures – Cllr Barnacle agreed to take this issue up with Hugh Wallace. Considerable concern was expressed by several MoPs present at the meeting about whether the pipeline can successfully cross the road without the need for a temporary closure, which would be very disruptive, especially if it happened without warning.

**Crook and Drum Growing Together:** This group is now working and the first planting day will happen soon.

Powmill in Bloom have decided to enter the Best Kept Village competition but are concerned about reducing the number of "eyesores" in the village – tidying up the hotel site is currently unlikely as the site is up for sale. Cllr Barnacle has been told by PKC that play areas are inspected every two months and maintenance arranged if budgets allow. This is another area which is likely to move into charitable funding. Dunning Glen: Cllr Robertson has spoken to Police Scotland and in collecting information for them he discovered that the bridge has been severely damaged. The Police need PKC to report the damage as a crime before it can be investigated. The Police will increase patrols to the area and interview campers taking names and car registrations. Hopefully the displaced parapet stones from the bridge can be recovered from the burn and pinned back in place to prevent a recurrence of the vandalism. Cllr Robertson suggested that closing the laybys by the bridge might discourage wild campers as they're unlikely to park at a distance – this idea met with approval by those present, so he will take the idea forward.

**Station Road Adoption:** Cllr Barnacle has had a meeting with the Council's solicitor who suggested a meeting to discuss this, following which the Council's solicitor will write to the dissenting landowner's solicitor stating that the Council are in favour of the adoption and intend to proceed with it.

**Boundary Commission:** The Commission have published their report, in which they have reversed their previous proposal for the local ward, leaving it unchanged. This was in response to a large volume of comments pointing out the historic significance of the Kinross-shire boundary, and also to the enormous amount of work done by Cllr Cuthbert. However it should be remembered that one of the Commission's original goals was to reduce the number of councillors by one, and they have proposed reducing the number of Councillors in the Perth City North Ward — it remains to be seen whether this proposal will meet with the approval of the Council.

**Dog Waste in Drum:** Cllr Robertson had requested a dog waste bin, not yet placed but still due to happen.

Matters Arising With No Update Since Last Meeting: Safer Route to School (Drum), Blairingone War Memorial, Ivy Cottage, Powmill: No update.

Bollards Opposite Crook Village Hall: Awaiting a report from PKC Roads Department on how the safety of this section of road could be improved.

Crook Moss Community Involvement: Ongoing.

Bins at Village Hall: CCllr Kilby received a report of rubbish being left around the bins, possibly from van drivers taking their lunches. The problem seems not to have recurred since. CC Business: Meetings Attended: CCllr Kilby attended a meeting of the Sports Hub on 20 April; a consultation is to be held to decide the group's aims and coverage. Launch of the hub is hoped to take place when the schools return after the summer break.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

Clir Barnacle: The chalet development west of Braehead Farm is now operational, with the chalets being advertised as suitable for permanent occupation. This site was originally approved with 15 chalets by Clackmannanshire Council in 1989, but subsequently boundary changes brought it into P&K, and in 2012 a partial change of use to 13 houses was approved by the DMC in spite of objections by this CC that it should be a new application. Latterly the site has been sold to a new owner. During all of these changes, the original planning file has been lost, and the original planning conditions which would prevent permanent occupation seem to have been overturned without approval of local members or the DMC. Clir Barnacle has raised this issue with PKC Planning department, and his letter has been passed to the legal department.

#### **News from the June Meeting**

As there were only three Community Councillors in attendance, it was not a quorate meeting.

**Coins for Cleish Primary School** commemorating the Queen's 90th Birthday: This could not be funded by the CC.

**Crime prevention:** PC Stapleton was in attendance. There are no specific crimes reported, but the police are aware of the speeding motorbikes along the B9097 in particular. Perth traffic officers will be more of a presence in the area to try and reduce this. An incidence of fly-tipping in Maryburgh has been reported by Cllr Robertson to the police. Cllr Giacopazzi asked if PC Stapleton could investigate this further.

**Correspondence:** Community Greenspace: an opportunity for volunteering. Fliers will be placed in the noticeboards and a link on the website.

**Finance**: There is currently £419.55 in the account. **Planning** 

- Blairforge: The enforcement Officer is investigating one site.
- Boreland: There are significant concerns amongst the community in Cleish regarding this part-retrospective amendment. It was reported that the planning officer instructed the developer not to continue with the overhanging eaves, the developer continued and put in a retrospective application. These are not details that were on the original steading building that was demolished. The  $recent\ application\ was\ only\ granted\ on\ the\ strict\ guidelines$ that the new building was a replica, indistinguishable from the original. This is clearly not the case. There is also concern that window openings have been altered in size. The CC were informed that the Planning Office would strictly enforce the re-submitted application when it was granted. Cllr Giacopazzi confirmed that the Head of Planning is looking into this. It was agreed that the CC would strongly object due to the weight and strength of opinion that has been brought to the CC's attention.

**CC website:** There has been a message on the Facebook site reporting speeding motorbikes on the B9097.

#### **Other Business**

We welcomed the new Chair of Milnathort CC.

P&K Councillors had a meeting with officers regarding development of **Cleish School**. The portacabins are reaching the end of their useable life and so options are being discussed.

Cllr Giacopazzi advised that this year the council is only cutting grass verges once, however could all residents bring to the CC's attention any junctions which are becoming dangerous due to restricted vision with long grass. Cllr Cuthbert offered to pass this information on. Initial feedback raised concerns about Boreland junction, Mawmill junction (on B9097) the M90 Jct 5 and onto the B996, and the North road entrance from Keltybridge and Maryburgh.

**Boundaries:** Cllr Cuthbert advised that Kinross-shire will not be altered in the local government boundaries.

A **locality community planning partnership** meeting was attended by Cllr Cuthbert. A 'joined-up' solution for providing local services and planning future service delivery in areas for new development is the aim.

**Bins**: green bins will be replaced with smaller ones, and blue bins with larger ones to promote more recycling. Households that currently do not have a brown bin collection will also be similarly changed over. Larger households can request to keep the larger bins.






**Projects:** Our project for **June** was 'Excellent Development' which we last supported in 2011. Excellent Development don't give hand-outs, they give people the opportunity to transform their own lives. This is done using sand dams, which are cheap, innovative solutions to water shortages in rural dryland communities. They have the big plus of freeing women from the shackles of arduous journeys to collect the most basic of requirements, namely water. A recently completed dam in Lekurruki, Kenya, stores up to 40 million litres of safe water for people (and elephants!) and will do so for generations to come. The hope is that, with continued support, they will build 18 more sand dams by 2018.

Our project for **July** is The Uphill Trust which supports the Uphill Junior School in rural Western Uganda. The school has grown from a tiny kindergarten for 3–5 year olds in 2011 to a primary school for children up to the age of 12. In 2013 the school buildings consisted of five wooden walled, partially roofed classrooms with dirt floors, a few desks and very little equipment for a school roll of over 100. School equipment, a water tank and plot of land have now been funded as well as regular salary payments to teachers. Any child is accepted irrespective of whether they can afford the £6 a term school fees

The museum is free and open every weekend until Christmas. We have four new exhibitions this year: Robert Burns in Dollar, Old Churches and Old Pewter, A Ship in a Bottle and the History of Football in Dollar.

Bring the footballer in your life to browse the pictures and trophies of the football teams from the 1900s through to today's Dollar Glen FC. There are still a few fathers and grandfathers to be identified.

Our *Ship in a Bottle* exhibit tells the story of a WWI prisoner of war camp in Glendevon. The prisoners worked on the lower Glendevon Reservoir dam. The display explains how the bottle came to be given to a local girl, locates the camp and tells of prisoners escaping and being recaptured.

Swot up for your next Burns Supper! Learn about the poems Burns wrote for the ladies at Harviestoun.

Pewter communion vessels used in Dollar and Muckhart from as early as 1747 are on display. They are accompanied by communion tokens and other old church items, plus images and histories of local churches, including Shelterhall and Andrew's Fold. Simplified diagrams explain the schisms, splits and reunions within the churches in Scotland, both nationally and locally.

Don't forget we have an extensive archive of photos of old Dollar. And remember the recent excitement over the rebuilt *Flying Scotsman*? We, too, have our steam railway history. The permanent exhibition on the Devon Valley Railway includes over 750 photos, including nearly every steam and diesel engine that ever came through Dollar Station and headed on to Alloa or Kinross.

There's plenty to keep the children occupied. Let them play with some old-fashioned toys: not a digital app in sight! This year we are selling locally themed colouring books and crayons in the shop. And there are plenty of exclusive Dollar gifts to buy.



## Recipe

## supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom Lamb Burgers

**Ingredients** 

Burgers: 1kg minced lamb (not extra lean mince as the fat helps

to bind and keeps burgers juicy)

1 medium onion, finely chopped

1-2 tbsp mango chutney

3cm piece of fresh ginger, peeled and grated 1 red chilli, de-seeded and finely chopped

¼ tsp ground turmeric

 ${\bf 1} \ tsp \ coriander \ seeds, \ crushed$ 

1 tsp cumin seeds, crushed

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Oil, for brushing

Flat bread, pitta bread or burger buns to serve

**Relish:** 6 ripe tomatoes, quartered, de-seeded and diced

200g tub of Greek yoghurt

Bunch of fresh coriander, freshly chopped

1 small red onion, finely chopped

Squeeze of lemon juice

**Method:** Place the minced lamb in a large mixing bowl and add the onion, mango chutney, ginger, chopped chilli, turmeric, crushed coriander and cumin. Season well with salt and pepper and mix by hand until combined. Be careful not to over-work the mixture.

Divide and shape the mixture into 8-10 burgers. Place the burgers on a cling film-covered tray and keep them in the fridge to relax for at least 30 minutes. They're ideal made the day before cooking. To prevent the burgers from sticking, brush with a little oil before barbecuing over medium-hot coals for about 5-6 minutes each side. Mix together the tomatoes, yoghurt, coriander, onion and lemon juice and season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve with the burgers, either inside the bun or pitta bread.


Volunteers with new buggy 'Arthur'

We took delivery in May and 'Arthur', as he has been christened, is everything we hoped he would be. A water tank has now been fitted, courtesy of DM Sheet Metal in Milnathort and we're ready to roll.

May also saw us planting up the hanging baskets – all one hundred of them! Fifty were planted up for the village and the other fifty have been sold to locals to help with our funding. It was a very enjoyable couple of days – the weather was lovely and the company and chat was great. By the time you read this article the baskets will be adorning the village, filling out and colouring up for the summer.

The tubs have also been planted with summer bedding. Our current barrel tubs are going to be phased out over The idea is that spare corners of land are turned into vegetable patches and then the produce is given away to locals. We're starting small but hope to grow in future years. The cart at the edge of the village has been planted up with strawberries, golden courgettes and marigolds (marigolds are great

in salads!) and the tubs at Croft Wynd have been planted with a selection of



#### **Portmoak Chapel Visit**

As part of the Perth and Kinross Heritage Trust Archaeological Month, Kinross-shire Civic Trust organised a visit to the Portmoak Chapel site in the middle of Portmoak airfield. The visit was guided by David Munro, who explained the history of the site and the change in the landscape adjacent to the old chapel site due to the lowering of the loch in the 19th century. He also showed the new exciting find following a small archaeological dig in the remains of an old steading close by the site of the old chapel. This has revealed a stone lined channel, which probably dates back to mediaeval times. The visit was well attended by some 20 enthusiasts. The next stage is to prepare a report on the findings with a view to raising funds to extend the examination.

#### Kinross Parish Church



The current issue of the magazine of Kinross Parish Church includes an article by Janet Mullan, a volunteer at Kinross Museum, who has been researching the Revd George Craig Dalziel Buchanan, in part by using records donated to the Museum by the church in 2011.

Revd Buchanan was minister at Kinross for almost 40 years, from 1803 to 1842, including when the current Parish Church was built in 1832. Born as George Craig in Penicuik, he added the Dalziel Buchanan names from his mother's side of the family when he fell heir to maternal estates. Apparently a complex character, over the years he sought and received an enhanced stipend and a bigger Glebe for 'grazing for two cows and a horse' but he also donated to the building of the new church and when he died his 18-page will left money to

a number of local causes, including for a Theology scholarship at St Andrew's University and setting up a 'female school' in Kinross.

Perhaps his biggest long-term impact in Kinross has been his support for the building of the new Parish Church which in scale and design, with its prominent tower, would have "cost far more than the heritors (landowners) were legally obliged to spend" according to the 'Buildings of Scotland'. As his memorial in the church, erected by his sister, says "This edifice itself, erected by his influence and partly by his pecuniary aid, is his monument".

#### **Portmoak Community Woodland**

Palustre, Papillosurn or how about Fimbriatum and Copilifolium? Never heard of that lot? Neither had the Portmoak Community Woodland Group until May, when we had an expert to help us. Debbie Spray, the Lowland Wetland Advisor with Scottish Natural Heritage, led the group on a Sphagnum Identification walk over Portmoak Moss.

As ten of us marched onto the Moss armed with eye glasses and ID charts, we had a suspicion that the different Sphagnum mosses would be difficult to tell apart and have unpronounceable names (see above) and we were right. But Debbie soon had us identifying the different forms and leaves (only seen through quite a strong magnifying glass).

Apart from being a fascinating insight into the beautifully intricate micro world of mosses, there is a serious point here. We needed to know how our bog restoration project was shaping up. Some of the seven Sphagnum mosses we found can indicate a degraded peat bog if they are widespread,

while others, like the Copilifolium, are bog builders that add to the peat base. So it's important for us to know what we're looking at. Debbie's professional opinion and our anything-but-professional opinion is that the Moss is fairly healthy but we'll have to keep working at it and monitoring.

We also had a look at other bog plants as we went round, such as both forms of cotton grass 'Hare's Tail' and 'Common' (with its red leaves), also a good sign of a healthy bog.

So, next time you visit the Moss, take a few steps onto the bog and have a look and see if you can tell the difference. We will aim to leave a few identification charts at the entrance for you to take with you. See if you can find the Dead Kitten Moss and don't worry if doesn't look anything like its name. Who knows what the ancestors were thinking when they named it?



Even when we have dates we find other clubs calling off as they are unable to raise a team. To address this, the club has taken the bold step of joining the Edinburgh Junior League mid-way through the playing season. This will see Kinross-shire players taking teams from most of the national league sides and should provide a very high standard of cricket for our youngsters. Again it is a significant step that we have been accepted into the very top table of Scottish Junior cricket and is a serious endorsement of the commitment and ability of players, coaches and parents.

Monday nights have seen the return of the hugely popular inter-club Wee Stramash junior tournament. Juniors in the U11-U15 age groups have been selected into four teams; Buccaneers, Titans, Lightnings and Ospreys. Every Monday in June and August two teams play a pairs format match of 12 overs per side. Over the two playing months, teams and individuals build up points ahead of a finals at the end of August when the 2016 Wee Stramash winners will be awarded. After two rounds the Buccaneers and Ospreys are leading on 20 points with Lightnings on 19 points and the Titans on 17 points.

#### **Seniors**

The Sunday XI have also had games disrupted by the weather with fixtures against Callander and three mid-week games cancelled. The good news is that the mid-week XI have made it through to the semi-finals stage of the 2 Counties Cup after a great win over Callander in a very rain affected match which was reduced to 10 overs per side and then a twice rearranged match against Broomhall was eventually award to KCC after Broomhall were unable to raise a team. This sees both junior and senior team making through to the final stages of their respective cup competitions. Updates on both next month. The 8-a-side Last Man Stands team had their first 2016 win against Broomhall with 16 year old Lewis McLaren scoring a great 50 not out before his mandatory retirement. Last Man Stands is a global amateur competition with finals. KCC play in the Fife regional league, which forms one of eight leagues in Scotland. Regional winners have a play-off for the Scottish title and that team has the right to travel to the World Finals taking place in Cape Town, South Africa in April 2017. So far we are second in the Fife league with four matches to play.

#### **Schools & Community Events**

Club volunteers have been active supporting School Fairs at Milnathort Primary and Kinross Primary during June. The Larder Cricket ground is being used for a fun cricket day on 2 July as part of the Portmoak Festival week and Sunday 3rd sees the ground host a Portmoak community match.

#### **Pavilion Extension**

The exterior works on the pavilion extension have been slightly disrupted with the bad weather but have now been completed and all activity moved to the interior fit-out. The expected completion of the work is now the end of June.

#### **Calum Watson**

Mid-June saw the end of an era as long-term player Calum Watson left Kinross for a new job in the South of England. Calum was one of the club's very first juniors back in 2005. He played in the first junior match against Edinburgh Carlton and has been a great supporter of the club since that time. He was part of the 2007 U15 Scottish Cup winning side and went one to be a regular 1st XI player. He was one of our first juniors to move into a coaching role, successfully completing his UKCC level 2 award and becoming part of the club management with his appointment as club Vice Captain in 2014.

A fantastic spin bowler, he was justifiably nicknamed "Curious" due to his unnerving ability to leave the batsman, and frequently wicket-keeper and fielders, curious about which direction the ball was about to turn after his delivery. He was our very own "Warney". Calum was regularly in the running for leading wicket taker, winning the annual title on two occasions. He was also one of our regular opening batsmen with his slow but steady approach to run scoring. Few will forget his monumental opening stand with James Ross against St Modan's, when the pair put on 131 before Calum lost his wicket on a personal score of 9.

Calum has been a great and loyal supporter of the club and we all wish him the very best in his new career and look forward to welcoming him back on his visits home to Kinross.

## Kinross Curling Lift Project Fundraising for disabled access

The Trust has made huge improvements to the ice hall and the lounge bar since taking over the curling rink business from the Green Hotel in 2013. The cost of the rebuild and refurbishment of the property has been met from donations, grants and loans. The loans have to be repaid over varying timescales throughout the next five years and these are being serviced from the business income. The repayment of some loans have already been made.

The Kinross Curling experience is acknowledged as having hugely improved in the last two years but some curlers, most particularly wheelchair users, are unable to enjoy the complete social experience because they cannot get upstairs to the lounge and bar area. Events that have been held in Kinross have moved to other venues where wheelchair users have access to the after match social activities and meetings with which Kinross Curling Trust cannot compete.

We are always saying that curling is non-discriminatory. With the right equipment, anyone can do it, at any age and at varying degrees of mobility and physical fitness. Teams can have a mix of members young and old, of beginner and elite, using brooms, crutches and sticks to deliver the stones. What other sport is so inclusive?

We want to have all participating curlers able to access the whole curling experience so we need a lift to bring those who cannot climb the stairs up to the first floor to join in the before and after match camaraderie. There have been discussions about the changes needed and the landlord is content with the plan to build onto the existing structure to create space for a platform lift and increase the available indoor space to improve the office accommodation and an adaptable meeting space on the first floor. We need to meet our earlier financial obligations to those who loaned money at very generous low rates so we have to raise new money for this capital expenditure. Grants are being applied for to local grant awarding authorities but we do not know how supportive they will be.

#### Will you help?

In the 100m Backstroke he was 39th overall in 1.07.90 (Scottish ranking 2nd, British ranking 5th) and in the 50m Backstroke he was 48th overall in 31.59 (Scottish ranking 2nd, British ranking 3rd). He also broke the Otters and Midland District age group records in all three events in the process.

**Amy Broadhurst** (15) broke her own 50m Butterfly club record in 33.39 to come 74th overall.

## **Out & About**



### **Loch Leven NNR**

Scottish Summer strikes again! Everyone was rather enjoying a prolonged period of warm, sunny weather, then we're back into dull skies and showers. There is still a lot of summer left, so maybe I'm complaining prematurely!

There's been a lot going on around the reserve in the last month. There have been some nice birds spotted. The fisheries staff reported a pair of Sandwich Terns over the loch. You are more likely to see these birds at sea. A Marsh harrier has been seen and at least two Reed Warblers have been heard singing around the reserve too. These birds are recent colonists from the south and it's nice to hear them where we have been creating habitat around the path.

From a botanical point of view, it's been an interesting month. We've got quite good at finding Coral-root Orchids. These tiny green orchids with a tiny white flower are very scarce in Scotland and grow in the deepest, darkest parts of the reserve under the willows next to reed beds. Last year we found around a dozen. This year I searched as much available habitat that was accessible and found over 50! It's good to know this tiny orchid is thriving on our reserve.

I've also been spotting lots of Otters on my remote cameras and am beginning to get an idea of how many Otters we have about the reserve. There is no part of the reserve that appears not to be used by this monster Mustelid. On a sadder note, I spotted a Pine Martin dead on the road in the west of Kinross-shire. But on the plus side it shows that these once rare animals are in the area. Hopefully it won't be long before I am spotting these on my cameras.

There are also a lot of Duck broods about. There was a large hatching of Tufted Ducks in the second week of June. Fingers crossed for a bumper season of ducklings!

Many thanks to all who attended the rain sodden Discovery Day at Kirkgate. Unfortunately it was not as well attended as we would have liked, but we have been rather lucky over the last few years with the weather, so fingers crossed for next year!

During the school holidays we have a free **family orientated event** running on every **Friday**, 8 July through to 12 August. We had our first really wild cycles last year so the plan is to have one a week. Tom will be designing exciting activities for the kids and the adults. The plan is to do a lap of the loch. The event runs from 10am-4pm. Please phone the office on 01577 864439 if you are interested in participating.

Our volunteers have been exceptionally busy this month. Their help was gratefully received at Discovery Day. They have also been helping map and count all the breeding birds on St Serf's. They have also been assisting with the fencing required around areas we want to graze.

# Local Attraction Opening Times Lochleven Castle, Castle Island, Kinross

This semi-ruined 14th century castle is set on an island in beautiful Loch Leven, within a National Nature Reserve.

Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned here in 1567. She miscarried twins and was forced to abdicate during the year she spent here before dramatically escaping.

The property is reached by boat, operated by Historic Scotland and departing from the fishery pier, where there is parking and a Historic Scotland shop. There are no public toilets on the pier, only on the island. No water supply for drinking. Hand sanitiser available for hand-washing. The boat is not equipped to carry passengers in wheelchairs. Dogs are not allowed. There are picnic benches on the island.

## **Farming**



Everybody needs good neighbours and I'm very lucky to have people I count as friends who farm nearby. At busy times it's these folk that keep me sane; the wee five-minute chats out of the car window keep me going and it's so great to share a few concerns or worries with someone else who understands exactly what you are going through.

I'm especially proud of my neighbour, Harold Greer from Gelvan Farm, who was recently announced as the producer of the wining entry in Kinross Show's annual clamp silage competition. Harold moved to Kinross-shire from Northern Ireland over 25 years ago and farmed in partnership with his brother until more recently going on his own at the Gelvan. Harold runs a commercial flock of ewes and a herd of suckler cows specialising in producing quality beef cattle, so the making of good silage is at the foundation of his business. Harold always makes time for a chat however busy he is with his duties. He's an exceptional and inspirational man who farms from his wheelchair. He also farms from his quad bike, forklift and tractor to look after his livestock and keep the farm in order.

His award-winning clamp silage refers to grass ensiled in a pit rather than baled silage, which is preserved in a bale wrapped in plastic. To achieve a decent dry matter with good sugar and protein levels there are a number of variables to get right. Firstly, the land requires to be in good heart with the correct balance of soil nutrients and pH. The grass itself must be mowed at the correct stage of growth; too young and the yield will be low, too mature and the grass will be stemmy and poorer quality. Finally, the silage-making team have to be proficient, and I know Harold would attribute this part of the process to good neighbours, as it's his brother that operates the chopper and nephews and friends who cart the trailers with him and roll the pit. The rolling is vital as it squeezes out all the air that could cause mould growth and spoilage.

The competition takes place annually and entries come in from many of the dairy, beef and sheep farms in the area. Each sample is analysed in a laboratory with points awarded for dry matter, energy, protein and palatability. The competition was stiff but the Gelvan silage came out with the top score. Congratulations, Harold! Next time I stop for a wee chat I'll be asking you to share some of your top tips with me!

The winners of the two competitions are as follows:
