Exhibition of Paintings by the Late Rev. David Reid

Dear Editor, I would be very grateful if I could use your pages to let my late husband's friends know of an exhibition of his paintings, as I believe that many of them would be interested to know that it is taking place.

David was called to the linked charge of Cleish with Fossoway in 1985 and immediately before coming to Kinross-shire he was the minister of Helensburgh Old and St Andrews Church (now Helensburgh Parish Church). His private pastime throughout his life was watercolour painting; he had an exceptional natural ability but the talent was not given full scope until his retirement when painting became his chief hobby.

A group of his former parishioners in Helensburgh have decided to mount an exhibition of David's paintings in Helensburgh Parish Church over the third weekend in September. The opening times will be Saturday 23 September from 10am till 5pm and Sunday 24 September from 12.30 till 4pm.

A number of people in Kinross-shire already have paintings by David Reid hanging on their walls and an invitation is now extended to plan a day out on 23 or 24 September to visit "the church in the square" in Helensburgh to enjoy this large collection of 175 paintings – all unframed – which will be for sale by donation (suggested minimum between £25.00 and £45.00). All proceeds will be divided between the Iona Community (of which David was a member) and Helensburgh Parish Church.

A Bad Trade

The August issue of the Newsletter announced an "Early Christmas present from Persimmon" (the Lathro developers) of £1000 toward the provision of lights and a "festive *tree*" for Kinross.

Would that be a felled tree, then?

Felling trees is something Persimmon seem to be particularly handy at, given that thirteen mature (150-plus-year-old) 60ft oak trees have been destroyed, thanks to the instruction from Persimmon to have them felled as part of their so-called "Lathro Meadows" development.

I understand more oak trees within an adjacent group are now under threat from the chainsaw.

Are we now witnessing an attempted charm offensive by Persimmon? (Offensive being the operative word here, I think.)

It seems like a very bad trade; part-finance toward one severed, rootless, i.e. dead, tree for a temporary decoration as a swap for thirteen living trees likely tax deductible, too?

"Why choose Persimmon?", says the developer's website. Good question: why indeed?

As Britain's second largest homebuilders you might think that as a company they would care greatly about their environmental responsibilities and that public perception of their commitment to this aim would be of great importance to Persimmon.

The company Annual Report 2016 certainly claims they consider the environment a priority: "As part of our development approach we aim to minimise the impact we have on the environment." (page 45)

So how come Persimmon have adopted such a contemptuous attitude when dealing with environmental issues associated with the Lathro site?

It seems to me that, as far as the evidence from Lathro is concerned, the wider environment, and trees in particular, have been sacrificed in a hasty and undignified scramble for profit.

Lynne attended one of our evening courses and, after learning CPR and use of defibrillator and hearing what a First Responder does, decided she could help make a difference to her community.

With the encouragement of James Mathie, Kinross-shire's other volunteer First Responder, Lynne's application was accepted by the Scottish Ambulance Service to attend the advanced weekly courses in Penicuik, which have been running throughout the summer. Lynne has now passed her exams and is moving on to the next stage of the process.

Lynne and James are volunteers and will attend, if on duty, life-threatening emergency situations within a 10-mile radius of Kinross, before ambulance crews. That could mean within minutes! They carry an emergency kit bag, defibrillator, oxygen etc and can make the difference between life or death.

Please congratulate Lynne and thank James for the fantastic voluntary work they do. Come and meet them both at Kinross Heart Start Superhero Saturday on 23 September (part of the Farmers' Market). They'll show you and your family how to do CPR and be part of the 'Chain of Survival.'

We have made use of the above facility since moving to Milnathort 21 years ago. We shop at many of the shops in and around South Street – High Street, Perth, so were interested to see the renovations being carried out over a long period during 2016/17.

The finished product is very disappointing. All of the under cover lower level is exclusively for the use of PKC staff to park their vehicles (bless).

The next section is for bicycles and motor bikes – under cover again and quite rightly so.

The last section on the ground floor – **not under cover** – is for drivers with disabilities. I would suggest that perhaps such drivers take longer to get out of their cars and remove their wheelchairs, rollators, elbow crutches or walking stick(s). Perhaps with the rain dripping down the back of the neck? There is a mobility office where motorised wheelchairs can be hired – and yes that is under cover too – **but** a distance from the disabled parking. Incidentally, the men who man the office are very obliging and during the time the car park was closed made heroic efforts to keep their customers mobile. Lastly, I know that some people will say that disabled people get their parking for free but blue badges are paid for by their holders.

National curling festival in Kinross

Persimmon Homes in Kinross

Perth-based Persimmon Homes North Scotland is said to be investing £45 million in the creation of 391 new homes at two sites in Kinross.

The 'Weavers Loan' development on the site of the former Kinross High School will offer a wide selection of 91 two-, three-, four- and five-bedroom homes.

The second development, 'Lathro Meadows,' will feature several different house types in a phased build that will initially create 145 new homes.

Persimmon say that, so far, interest has exceeded all expectations with a high demand being shown for both developments.

A showhome in the 'Ettrick' style opened in mid-August at the Wevers Loan development.

Lorraine Clelland, Sales and Marketing Director at Persimmon Homes North Scotland, said: "It's an exciting time in Kinross with the launch of both of our fabulous developments. DOD Highlights elsewhere in Perth & KinrossA new venue for 2017: The Birth Place of John Buchan

A notable addition to the programme for 2017 is Buchan House, a mid-19th century category C-listed double villa on York Place, Perth. Formerly the manse of the Knox Free Church, Number 20 is most famous as the birthplace of the prolific Scottish novelist John Buchan. For several decades,

the building stood empty and was on the Building at Risk Register for Scotland. Between 2014 and 2015 the building underwent comprehensive repairs and was converted to offices through financial support from the Perth City Heritage Fund. Local charity Mindspace took up residence in January 2016 and will be opening their office doors for the first time to show the public around the childhood home of one of Scotland's most famous authors.

Perthshire Photographic Society Exhibition

Perthshire Photographic Society are celebrating the 150th anniversary of their parent body, the Perthshire Society of Natural Science, by holding a major exhibition in the Civic Hall of Perth & Kinross Council Headquarters at 2 High Street, Perth. The exhibition starts on 16 September and runs for two weeks. The exhibits will range from historical photographs dating back to the earliest days of Scottish photography to modern contemporary fine art digital photographic composite images. Landscape, wildlife, travel, portraiture and street photography will all be featured. It is open every day from 10am to 5pm and entrance is free. There will be Society members on hand to answer questions and handle sales of prints and cards by local artists. You can even join the Society and buy tickets for events hosted by PPS.

Tibbermore Church: Film venue for Outlander

Maintained by the Scottish Redundant Churches Trust, Tibbermore Church is an incredibly atmospheric building of medieval origin set in beautiful surroundings with a fascinating walled graveyard.

Tibbermore Church is now an international TV star, better known to worldwide audiences as Cranesmuir Church, the dramatic setting for the infamous Witch Trial in the Outlander TV drama series.

On Saturday 2 September, view props, hear about filming at the church, and about the hugely popular series.

On the Sunday, explore the church and graveyard with guided tours and hear stories about centuries of local history from Covenanters at the Battle of Tippermuir to the WWI war work of the women of the parish. Hear local tales and Scottish mythological lore from Storyteller Owen Pilgrim from 12pm until 4pm.

Councillor Richard Watters

Since the election in May, I have doing a lot of listening, while learning how the Council actually works. While participating in numerous meetings, I continue to raise questions about the many proposals put in front of us.



The long saga of what will happen to the City Hall in Perth took a major step forward on 16 August, at an emergency Full Council meeting where councillors voted unanimously for the preferred architect and the concept design for the new visual arts attraction for Perth and Kinross. I was disappointed that out of the five concept designs entered, two were deemed to have significant material changes, and four were calculated to be over budget. That left only one option that was close to the 11 million pound construction budget specified in the brief. I think that the process would have been better if we had been offered more designs within budget. The architect chosen to develop the detailed design of the project is firm Mecanoo. As the project moves into the next stage of the design, one element of importance will be ensuring that the civic spaces around the hall are developed in a manner that enhances the attraction and the locality.

I have been approached by a number of Kinross residents with **mobility issues** who depend on wheelchairs and mobility scooters to get around the town. They have raised issues regarding problems with paths, especially the ramps up on to the pavements at junctions. One of the main problem areas is on the Muirs, where individuals are forced to travel down the busy road in their wheelchairs. I have raised this with roads department who have committed to send an officer along with someone from the 'Centre of Inclusive Living' to assess the key issues. The council officers have made a further commitment to doing a full 'Community Street Audit' throughout all of Kinross with all interested parties later in the year.

While preparing this report, I have just learned that **Perth Autism Support** have had to suspend their services for financial reasons. I am greatly concerned about this, so I will be writing to NHS Tayside and Perth & Kinross Council to ensure a sustainable financial package is put in place to ensure we do not lose this valuable resource.

Kinross Show

I was delighted to attend the Kinross Show last month at RSPB Loch Leven. It was great to meet with the myriad community groups and local businesses that were in attendance and



to hear of the great work that they are doing in the county.

Kinross High School

A number of constituents have raised concerns with me about whether there will be enough places at the high school for people who move into new developments during the school year. Given Kinross-shire's location, a significant number of pupils who live in Fife or Clackmannanshire attend the high school. Pupils who reside within Kinross High School's catchment area prior to the start of a new school year get priority and there are more than enough places for all of these children. In addition, a number of places are reserved in each year group to allow for pupils who move to the area during a school year to attend the high school. By law, the council must allocate a place to a pupil outwith the catchment area if there is an available non-reserved place. I shall soon be meeting with the officer who deals with the Council's reserved places policy to ascertain whether or not there will be sufficient spaces for pupils who move to Kinrossshire within the school year.

Speeding

Several issues around speeding have been raised with me in recent months, particularly in Carnbo and in Easter Balgedie. Council roads officers have agreed to undertake new traffic surveys on the roads through these two communities in order to inform a decision on whether any remedial action is necessary. The Council are actively considering a 30mph speed limit through Easter Balgedie but Carnbo would not meet the criteria for such a speed limit under the Council's current speed-limit policy.

A977

The Council's roads team recently appointed a new officer who will be specifically responsible for designing the traffic calming measures on the A977. At the budget earlier this year, ClIr Barnacle and former councillor Dave Cuthbert secured £650,000 for improving this stretch of road. By the time this edition of the Newsletter has been published, the four ward councillors will have had our initial meeting with this new officer and we have been assured that he will fully engage with the Community Council and local residents throughout this process.

Perth City Hall

At the most recent meeting of the Full Council, councillors unanimously backed proposals to appoint an architect for the City Hall project, which will see it reopened as a modern art gallery and museum. I have been a strong critic of what I see as Perth vanity projects that have been dreamt up by Perth & Kinross Council over the years. The new administration is currently evaluating other plans put up by our predecessors but I was happy to support the approval of this project for a number of reasons. While many have argued in favour of knocking down the City Hall in the past, Historic Environment Scotland simply will not allow it; hence, I think that—regardless of one's view on the architectural merits of the building itself—it is far better to have something in it rather than for it to remain closed to the public. Moreover, the design for the building that we have chosen has the lowest

estimated construction cost of the five options that were presented to councillors. I have also been appointed to the board that will oversee the project and I shall stress the need for it to be completed within the allocated budget.


Full Council

Kinross development main focus of formal complaint to European Commission

The bitter dispute over Perth and Kinross Council's handling of planning applications for three developments in the local authority area has taken a significant new turn following the submission of a formal complaint to the European Commission by a Kinross resident.

The events leading up to this began in mid-March, when contractors working for Persimmon Homes started work on the Lathro Farm site before planning approval had been issued. Although PKC did issue a Temporary Stop Notice, halting work at that time, Ken Whitcombe, whose Lathro Park home overlooks the site and who had spotted the unauthorised work, began to check the background to the proposed development when a number of written questions he had submitted to planning officers were not answered satisfactorily.

Kinross CC also submitted a number of questions to the planners, along with a request that Persimmon should not be allowed to resume work on the site until a number of important issues had been clarified. However, PKC approved planning permission on 31 March, and many of the issues which had been raised with PKC remained unresolved.

In the meantime, Mr Whitcombe had continued to check the documentation submitted by Persimmon and contact some of the consultees who had submitted reports and questions on the application to the council. His checks revealed what he described as "a surprising number of inaccuracies,

inconsistencies and obvious omissions in some of the reports that planning officers seemed to have accepted without question, while sound advice from authoritative sources in others appeared to have been completely ignored."

He also noted that official Scottish Government planning guidelines, which seemed relevant to some of the more questionable aspects of the application, did not appear to have been adequately considered before it was approved.

Handling the Report of approval recommending of planning the application, PKC's **Development Quality Manager stated** that "the development is considered to comply with the current Local Development Plan" despite the fact that both the total number of homes and the planned annual build rate were significantly higher than the numbers specified in the Local Development Plan.

Scottish Natural Heritage and the RSPB both raised questions with planning officers on this issue, in view of the site's close proximity to Loch Leven and the fact that surface run-off from the development was planned to discharge into the North Queich.

They explained that, as the Queich was recognised as an important fish spawning area and wildlife corridor, it was therefore functionally connected to the Loch Leven SPA, SSSI, RAMSAR and National Nature Reserve, but their questions did not even merit a reply from the planners.

What Mr Whitcombe found even more alarming, however, was that the council's decision to approve the Lathro development failed to comply with flagship European Environmental Directives that all member states are bound to follow by law.

For example, EC Directive 92/43, more commonly known as the the Habitats Directive, states that "a detailed survey of a proposed development site must be carried out to determine whether a European Protected Species (EPS) is present on site and to inform planning officers and others involved in the decision making of the likely effect of such a species being present on a site prior to determination of the planning application".

The importance of this EC Directive had been recognised by the Scottish Government, which sent a letter to Heads of Planning reminding them to consider its binding implications before making planning decisions, and emphasising that case law had shown the EC was willing to take action against member states when the Directive was not followed. The question why PKC's Development Manager recommended Quality approval of Persimmon's application, when the required surveys clearly had not been carried out, still remains to be answered.

Mr Whitcombe also raises queries about the performance of EnviroCentre, the environmental consultants used by Persimmon to carry out the Environmental Impact Assessment required as part of their planning application.

EnviroCentre's report of August 2015 stated that bats (a specified EPS) "were scoped out of" [i.e. excluded froml "the assessment as residential development is only proposed in a small portion of the site." They also stated that nesting birds were also scoped out, claiming that crop growing and livestock rearing on the farmland was intensive, implying that there was too much disturbance for nesting birds, and that "the mature oak trees, which offer the most suitable bird nesting habitat on the site, are outwith the residential development zone."

Yet Lathro residents who had lodged formal objections to the development had referred to the abundant and varied wildlife on the farmland, and Mr Whitcombe's own records, which

were regularly sent to the RSPB, included a surprising number and variety of birds, some of which are notably in decline due to habitat loss. In another report, EnviroCentre advised that Persimmon should not carry out activities which might disturb birds during the nesting season, which ran from March until August. This indicates EnviroCentre's awareness of the recognised nesting season. However, EnviroCentre also claimed to have found no sign of nesting birds in a survey, but this was carried out on 8 February - well before the start of the nesting season. "It is therefore no surprise that the validity of EnviroCentre's conclusions in reports Persimmon submitted to support their application have been gueried by the RSPB in particular," said Mr Whitcombe, "but the planning officers seem to have accepted these reports without question."

When Mr Whitcombe tried to contact relevant staff at EnviroCentre on a number of occasions, he was simply advised they were not available and referred to PKC or Persimmon to discuss the results of their surveys.

Mr Whitcombe therefore asked one of the planners who had worked on the Lathro application to explain why Persimmon had advised him in writing that a stand of ancient oaks was scheduled to be felled in four weeks' time, despite a statement by EnviroCentre that the oaks were "the most suitable bird nesting habitat on the site" but were "outwith the residential development zone."

"Alarm bells really began to ring when I was informed that PKC could not be expected to check the details of every environmental report," said Mr Whitcombe, "as these are the very reports the local authority certainly has the responsibility to check in order to ensure they have been carried out to the specifications required by the relevant EC Directives prior to determination of the planning application."

By that time, Mr Whitcombe had received replies to letters he had sent to Kevin Stewart, Scottish Minister for Local Government and Housing, and Roseanna Cunningham, Cabinet Secretary for the Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform. Both made it clear that the Scottish Government had decided not to "commence" the relevant "Assessment" sections of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2006, which were obviously intended to give them the power to monitor, investigate and, if necessary, police the planning activities of local authorities, and that, furthermore, they had no intention of bringing this section of the Act into

This has since been confirmed in replies received by Kinross CC and Kinross-shire Civic Trust to letters they also sent to the Scottish Government. Having already discussed the Lathro situation with the appropriate bodies in the UK, Mr Whitcombe then contacted the relevant section of the European Commission directly, and was surprised by their much more positive response to environmental issues.

Within a few minutes he had received an email directing him to all the information he had requested and a link to exactly the right form required to make a formal complaint to the EC, if he so wished. After liaising with residents in the Scone and Bankfoot areas, who had experienced similar problems with planning issues, Mr Whitcombe then lodged a formal complaint with the European Commission detailing the council's apparent breaches of relevant EC Directives in all three locations.

Significant groundworks are still under way on the Lathro site, however, and other problems are now emerging. Several of the consultees and nearby residents had referred to the frequent flooding which covers the fields along the North Queich before Persimmon's planning application was approved. A number of neighbouring residents even included photographs of the flooding along with their objections to Persimmon's planning application. PKC are officially recognised as the lead body responsible for flood control in the local authority area, but "their flood control team seemed remarkably unconcerned by these reports," says Mr Whitcombe. A member of the team who met with him and Cllr Purves on 31 July to discuss potential flooding issues admitted he had not seen any of the photographs of flooding, either before, or more than a week after, his visit. His considered conclusions are still awaited.

This is not the only potential flooding issue that needs to be addressed, however. Mason Evans, the respected geoscientists, carried out detailed surveys of the Lathro site before planning permission was granted. They reported that groundwater levels were less than 1.5m below the surface across 75% of the site, and considerably less in some areas.

Mr Whitcombe explains: "SEPA has specified the SUDS drainage systems that must be used on all greenfield sites. However, widely accepted expert opinion has concluded that these drainage systems do not perform adequately when the base of the lowest SUDS pond is not more than 1m above groundwater levels. This does not bode well for future residents on this site, or existing residents around it, especially as the gardens of some properties on the neighbouring Lathro Park estate already suffer from waterlogging."

Finally, he warned: "Residents should be advised that the vast majority of home insurance policies no longer cover property damage caused by rising groundwater levels."

Andersons scale the peaks for Rock Challenge!

Staff from local law firm Andersons scaled Britain's highest mountain in July, raising funds for a local good cause.

Departing from Ben Nevis "base camp" around 9am, the team dragged their aching limbs to the finish line just after 6pm. The pain, however, merely added to the great sense of achievement enjoyed by the whole team. 
To date, Andersons have exceeded their fund-raising target for the High School's Rock Challenge group. The total now stands at over £1600 against an initial aim of £1000.



Councillor Robertson

Mill Street

For some unknown reason, the amenity areas at the eastern end of Mill Street seem to have been missed off the Council's grounds maintenance rota. The area was very untidy



when I visited it and I have asked for this to be attended to. Hopefully the area will have been tidied up by the time you read this.

I have also requested that the whole area around Mill Street, Coventry Place and Burns Begg Street be considered for a revamp. The Council operate a scheme called the Estate Based Initiative, which was originally suggested by the Council LibDem group. This is a fund for upgrading public spaces in social housing areas. It has already been used in various parts of Kinross and Milnathort. It has now been agreed that the fund will be used for the public areas around Mill Street, Coventry Place and Burns Begg Street.

I have met with the Council's Roads Safety Officer to discuss various issues which have been raised with me concerning Gallowhill Road and Springfield Road.

Gallowhill Road

Pavement widths: All the hedges have been trimmed but the pavement on the north side is still only wide enough for a pram, which isn't ideal. Because of the carriageway widths, little can be done to widen the pavements here. It is essential that householders continue to keep hedges bordering the pavement trimmed back to keep the pavement as wide as possible.

Crossing point: Anyone standing on the north side of the crossing point on the bend in Gallowhill Road can't see vehicles coming from their right. It was agreed to move the crossing point further north on to the bend. This gives pedestrians much better sight lines. New dropped kerbs will be installed on both sides of the road and the barriers on the south side (which are very unsightly) will be moved and the area where the barriers sit currently tidied up. This should be done this financial year.

Dangerous parking at Muirs/Gallowhill Road junction: It was agreed that the Council will begin the consultation process required prior to installing double yellow lines on the south side of Gallowhill Road around the corner with the Muirs.

Springfield Road

Speeding traffic: According to speed monitoring carried out, excess speeds are uncommon on Springfield Road. On the latest Police speed checks, the highest recorded speed was 35mph. However, this is not the experience of local residents. It was agreed that if the crossing point at the Zebra crossing was raised, this would act as an additional speed reduction measure. This work will be added to the works for financial year 2018/19.

Pavement at Wilson Court: The pavement width here can be substantially reduced because of the laurel hedges that border the pavement, which makes life difficult for pedestrians. The hedge owners are aware of the problem and many try to restrict the width of their hedges. The Council will continue to contact householders who fail to keep their hedges cut back.

Other road safety measures: The roads department are currently working on additional measures for Springfield Road. The pavements are needing widened in certain areas and this will be considered as part of this process.

Milnathort

Path from Auld Mart Road to Burleigh: The western end of this important and well used path was badly puddled. I couldn't find funding to address this problem so asked if it could be done by offenders carrying out community service orders. This was agreed to, and the Council supplied five tonnes of materials and the offenders did the rest. Hopefully, this will improve the surface for all who use this popular path.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail

Scottish Natural Heritage have taken over responsibility this year for cutting the verges of the LLHT in the land they manage. I think everyone who uses the trail will agree they have done a really good job! The rest of the path, in the land owned by the RSPB, is still maintained by Perth & Kinross Council.

Community Councils discuss LDP2

A meeting of the "Kinross-shire Forum" took place on Tuesday 15 August. The Forum consists of representatives of all the Kinross-shire Ward Community Councils, plus the four ward councillors. It meets occasionally to discuss issues that affect, or could potentially affect, the whole ward.

On this occasion, the Forum met to discuss Cllr Mike Barnacle's recent letter to Peter Marshall and Brenda Murray of PKC's Planning & Sustainable Development. Cllr Barnacle's letter raised numerous "ongoing issues of concern" that Cllr Barnacle believes the community would expect to see addressed in PKC's Local Development Plan 2, which is due to be published this autumn. An abbreviated version of Cllr Barnacle's letter appeared in the August issue of the Newsletter.

At the Forum, there was a broad measure of agreement on most, though not all, issues. Cllr Barnacle will circulate notes from the Forum meeting to CCs by early September.

The meeting on 15 August replaced one previously scheduled for 27 July, which was cancelled due to Cllr Barnacle's bereavement.

Annual Flu Campaign

We would encourage all those in the **groups listed below** to come for a flu injection. Please note that patients who do not fall into these categories or who have no other clinical reason for receiving the flu vaccination will not be given the vaccination.

Shingles

If you are eligible for both vaccinations, please advise our receptionist of this on booking your appointment.

Council and NHS Tayside to offer funds to Perth Autism Support

Perth & Kinross Council and NHS Tayside confirmed on 22 August that they are seeking a meeting with the Chair of Perth Autism Support to offer one-off funding of £30,000 (£15,000 from each organisation) to help the charity continue to deliver planned services to young people, and their families, in Perth and Kinross.

Senior officers within Perth & Kinross Council first became aware on 17 August that Perth Autism Support was suspending services. Since then the Council and NHS Tayside have been working together to determine what support it may be appropriate to provide to the organisation in the current circumstances.

A statement from PKC said: "Both the Council and NHS Tayside's absolute priority is to ensure that appropriate and reliable services are provided to support young people and their families in Perth and Kinross. We recognise the role Perth Autism Support has played over the years in supporting local people and welcome their announcement that planned services will re-start."

Councillor Ian Campbell, Leader of Perth & Kinross Council, said: "I was pleased to hear that Perth Autism Support will be re-starting planned services, which I am sure will be a great relief to the families they work with.

"I hope that the offer of funding from the Council and NHS Tayside, matching that provided by the Scottish Government, will be accepted, and that Perth Autism Support will engage positively in discussions about how a similar situation can be avoided in the future." As is normal with funding from the Council and NHS Tayside this money is conditional upon receiving certain reassurances from the Perth Autism Support Board. This includes receiving copies of up-to-date accounts for the organisation.

Councillor Campbell added: "Ensuring the future of reliable and accessible services for children and young people in Perth and Kinross is about more than just providing funding to organisations. Any funding application should be expected to also provide details about the quality and type of services being provided, and the business plan in place to manage and sustain the services in the longer term.

"I appreciate that Perth Autism Support did not take the decision to suspend services lightly, but it is disappointing that there was no attempt to contact either myself as Leader of this Council, or any other senior members of the administration to discuss the situation before the decision to suspend services was made. I have also been advised by senior officers within the Council, and this has been confirmed to me by the Chief Executive of Perth Autism Support, that there were no formal requests to Senior Officers of Perth & Kinross Council for financial support in the period before the decision to close was made. It may well be that this is due to a lack of understanding about the way funding applications to the Council are normally made, and this is an issue officers will be seeking to address with the Board.

"It is vitally important that children and young people living in Perth and Kinross get access to appropriate services to support them and their families. Perth & Kinross Council will continue to work with NHS Tayside and our other partners in the private and voluntary sector to ensure that this continues to happen now and into the future."

Zero Day – The Battle of Passchendaele

'Zero Day', 31 July 1917, was the first day of the Battle of Passchendaele, also known as The Third Battle of Ypres. The War Diary for the day records reveille at 2.30am, breakfast at 3.00am and "march out from camp" at 4-7.00am. At the foot of the page is recorded a list of officer casualties for this day's fighting, including 2nd Lieut. D Robertson.

David Robertson, whose family lived in Montgomery Street, Kinross, had served his apprenticeship as a solicitor with J & G Wilson before enlisting with the 6th and later the 13th Battalion of the Royal Scots. At a "very critical moment in the engagement" on 'Zero Day,' Robertson was "killed instantaneously, probably by rifle or machine gun fire." Aged 27 years, he was described by his senior officers as "a fearless leader of men." He is remembered on the Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial.

The Battle of Passchendaele, which lasted three months, one week and three days, resulted in 325,000 allied casualties and 260,000 German casualties. Over the course of the battle, one tonne of explosives was fired for every square metre of battlefield.

Community Council News



The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 2 August 2017 were: CCllrs Bill Freeman (Chair), Eileen Thomas (Secretary), Jonathan Bryson, David Colliar, Dave Cuthbert, Barry Davies and Thomas Stewart; P&K Cllrs C Purves, R Watters and W Robertson; and PCs D Stapleton and A Spalding. There were no members of the public in attendance.

Apologies were received from CCllrs M Blyth, I Jack, D MacKenzie and D West; and Cllr M Barnacle.

Police Report: PCs Stapleton and Spalding referred to the current Police Scotland summer campaigns. There was an incident involving young people entering the compound of Kinross Primary School, but no vandalism took place. Some scaffolding has been stolen from the Persimmon site at the former Kinross High School (under enquiry).

When schools return, the PCs will check on parking behaviour at Douglas Crescent.

They carried out speed checks on Springfield Road recently. 35mph was the highest speed recorded. They plan to check Sutherland Drive and asked for other suggestions. The Chair suggested the Muirs in the evening. The Chair wondered if any further thought had been given to cut-out figures to deter speeding. These are being used in Fife again.

Sgt Forrester had responded to the item in the minutes of the July meeting about a Community Youth Team by contacting the local youth worker. Sgt Forrester is happy to progress this idea in some form, although incidents involving youths are down since the return to emphasis on local policing at the start of the year.

Forum: A meeting of the Kinross-shire Forum to discuss LDP2, scheduled between the July and August meetings, has been postponed. [Post-meeting note: re-arranged for 15 August.] **Health & Social Care PB**: Cllr Purves reported that there will be a participatory budget exercise for Kinross-shire. £90,000 has been allocated to three localities. These are different to the five Area Partnership localities. If the Area Partnership holds a participatory budget event, then it would be combined with the health and social care one.

Gallowhill Road junction: Cllr Robertson reported that he has written twice to PKC's Daryl McKeown asking for a site meeting. He awaits a reply.



Grounds maintenance programme: Cllr Purves contacted Environment Services. They had not changed their schedule this year. A two-week window to cut the grass at Springfield Road was missed; cutting was a month later than planned. There is no plan to change the schedule for next year.

Grass at Leisure Centre: Cllr Robertson said this was cut within 24 hours or so of his reporting it.

Employment opportunities: Cllr Purves reported that various options are being looked into. He will report back on a future occasion.

Muirpark Road: Cllr Purves reported on technical problems with resurfacing of Muirpark Road. PKC will observe how the new surface on Muir Grove performs over the winter. Muirpark Road is part of the rolling programme for resurfacing works. (This does not mean that resurfacing is guaranteed.) CCllr Cuthbert asked if the CC could have a copy of the roads maintenance schedule. Cllr Purves will ask Stuart D'All for this.

New Planning Applications: The CC considered the following applications and decided not to make comments on any of them:

17/01168/FLL Extension to dwelling house at 9 Douglas Crescent, Kinross.

17/01239/FLL Siting of 30no. storage containers and erection of a screen fence (in part retrospect), 2 Clashburn Close, Bridgend Industrial Estate for Webster Storage. Cllr Colliar explained that the location is in the older part of the Bridgend Industrial Estate.

17/01253/FLL Erection of an agricultural building at land 500m NE of Leepark, Coldrain. (Later withdrawn.)

17/01273/ADV Display of signs at 121 High Street, Kinross, KY13 8AQ for Mr J Mair.

17/01281/FLL Erection of ancillary accommodation at Braeside House, Hatchbank Road, Gairney Bank, Kinross.

Planning Applications Determined by PKC:

17/00649/FLL Alterations and installation of replacement windows, 23 Curate Wynd. Approved.

17/00816/FLL Extension to dwelling house, 14 Burnbank Meadows. Approved.

Planning Correspondence and Other Planning Matters

Social housing query: The Secretary had asked as part of the CC's consultation comment on application 17/00893/ FLL whether this application would affect the social housing provision already agreed for the larger Lathro application. However, PKC does not answer questions raised in comments on planning applications so she has also emailed the case officer separately. No reply received as yet.

Letter to Minister for Local Government: As agreed at the July meeting, the Secretary drafted this, circulated for comment, then sent it. The letter detailed various concerns with PKC planning, including the handling of the Persimmon application at Lathro Farm which has resulted in oak trees being felled recently, and asks for an inquiry into PKC planning. Lathro Farm update: Contractors for Persimmon felled 13 mature oak trees at Lathro Farm over the dates 14, 17 and 18 July (in relation to its planning consent for 300 houses), despite efforts by the CC Secretary and local Councillors to have this stopped or postponed. Cllrs Robertson, Purves and

Watters met with PKC officers Steve Callan, Geoff Fogg and Jamie Scott on 21 July to express their concern at officers' handling of this, as well as other matters. At the meeting, the Councillors asked the officers to comment on the assertion that there was a legislative requirement for full ecological surveys to be carried out before such a planning application was determined, rather than conditions relating to checking for wildlife being added to the planning consent. The Councillors reported to the CC what had been said, but asked for it not to be minuted.

There was some discussion about the competency of officers and what, if anything, could be done. It was noted that the Scottish Government has chosen not to enact part 12a of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2006 and therefore cannot conduct an assessment of a planning authority's performance.

Cllr Purves reported that he and Cllr Barnacle, as Vice Chairs of the EE&I Committee, had met with senior PKC staff [Nick Brian, Barbara Renton and Jim Valentine]. Cllrs Purves and Barnacle made various suggestions to tighten planning, e.g. they asked that PKC consider commissioning independent surveys and then charge the developer, rather than the developer commissioning their own; and they suggested that neighbour notification could be wider than the minimum requirement. Reference was made to a recent application (17/00893/FLL, erection of 6no. dwelling houses, formation of open space, landscaping and associated infrastructure works for plots 1-6. relocation of SUDS basin, pump station and erection of substation (revised layout and design) (in part retrospect), land 300m NW of Lathro Farm). Because this application to move the SUDS basin was attached to an application for six houses, only a few properties had to be be notified, even though the application actually has potential repercussions for the whole Lathro site as it involves changes to drainage arrangements, and therefore could affect the residents of Lathro Park. Similarly, this application did not require to be notified to SEPA. The Councillors asked the officers to consider consulting SEPA even when an application is not classed as a 'major' one.

Also on the subject of improvements to the service, Cllr Robertson said that perhaps in future 3D images of proposed developments should be made available; that would have been helpful in trying to envisage the development on the former Kinross High School site. There have been queries about the heights of some of the new-build houses and/or the extent of ground levelling that was supposed to take place before building began.


Flooding at Lathro: Cllr Purves reported on a meeting with Lathro Park resident Ken Whitcombe and David Linn, PKC officer with responsibility for flooding. Cllr Purves has asked Mr Linn to find out why he, Mr Linn, was not told about this site being prone to flooding. Cllr Watters said that Lathro Farm does not come up as a flood site on the national database. CCllr Cuthbert said the national database only shows fluvial flood risk, and not areas at risk due to groundwater. Cllr Purves reported that PKC disagrees with Mr Whitcombe's assertion that the local authority would be liable in the event of Lathro Park properties flooding as a result of the development on Lathro Farm. Cllr Purves is trying to find out more.

Radon: It was mentioned that the Lathro Farm development site is in a radon area.

Tree Preservation Order: The Secretary again raised the point that Nick Brian, in his response to the CC's letter of 10 April, had not addressed the CC's request for a Tree Preservation Order on the trees at Lathro Farm. The CC agreed that she should pursue this via further correspondence. Although one group of oaks had been felled, there is still another group of oaks at Lathro Farm.

SPSO: Complaints to the Scottish Public Service Ombudsman (SPSO) are taking 8-10 weeks just to be allocated for attention. Residents of Tullybelton near Bankfoot have complained to the SPSO about PKC's handling of a planning application.

Embargo on housing: The Secretary had emailed Peter Marshall to support Cllr Robertson's call for an embargo on new, large-scale housing in Milnathort area until junction 7 of the M90 is upgraded. The reply (31 July) said each application beyond those identified in the LDP will be assessed on their merits. Major applications are likely to require a transport assessment. PKC will arrange a demonstration of the traffic model to some CC representatives. Lathro resident Bob Mitchell had asked if he could attend that as a representative of the CC as he has a relevant professional background. This was agreed. No dates for the demonstration have been put forward yet. CCIIr Bryson has been doing some independent research into the possible expansion of junction 7. He was told a detailed site assessment would be required but challenged this; a desk assessment could be carried out using GPS. CCllr Bryson suggested there should be a strategic transport assessment to gauge economic benefit. He had made a Freedom of Information request to Transport Scotland and ascertained that no economic appraisal of transport in Kinross-shire has been carried out. The CC should request one. CCllr Bryson will draft a letter to circulate

to other CCs. This was agreed. It was also suggested that we should support reinstatement of a train link to Edinburgh. [Post-meeting note: Cllr Purves suggested that the CC could put its proposals to Transport Scotland's national transport strategy review.]

CCIIr Davies predicts that traffic lights will be required at the Muirs/Springfield Road junction within a few years. CCIIr Bryson said PKC are not looking far enough ahead. There will probably be major problems at Gallowhill Road as well.

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration: Cllr Robertson reported that the additional bollards have been ordered and should be in place within two months. There is no news regarding a crossing at the south end of the regenerated area; a further meeting is required. Electric sockets had to be replaced recently. They are checked every three months. There was a foul water upsurge on the High Street near its junction with Burns Begg Street. This appears to have been resolved.

New Primary School: An update, including photographs, was received on 6 July. At that time, the roof was nearly finished and photovoltaic panels installed. Brick facings were progressing well and partitions installed to first and ground floor areas. Completion is scheduled for 11 December 2017. Tier 2 demolition and external works are due to finish by 27 April 2018. CCllr Bryson said that the photovoltaic panels are in addition to the biomass boiler, to improve on renewables targets. More information on progress of the build can be found on the school Twitter feed.

Community Engagement: Cllr Purves reported that PKC intends to hold some of its meetings outwith Perth to improve community engagement. [See page 8.]

Westfield: Cllr Robertson reported that a meeting involving Fife and PKC planners will take place to discuss Westfield. This is a planning application for the restoration and development of a former opencast site in the Fife local authority area. If granted, it will seriously impact on the B9097, as an estimated 1,000 extra HGV journeys per day will be generated. The B9097 is partly in the Portmoak CC area and partly the Kinross CC area. Cllr Robertson invited representation from the CC to the meeting with planners. CCllrs Colliar and Cuthbert will attend on 23 August.

Rural Transport: Cllr Robertson has had a meeting with Andrew Warrington to discuss possible improvements.

Wheelchair access: Cllr Watters described the difficulty of a wheelchair-using resident in getting around Kinross. Difficulties include hedges partially obstructing pavements (e.g. on Gallowhill Road) and a lack of dropped kerbs in key places. He has had a meeting with Chief Executive Bernadette Malone about this. It was agreed that Cllr Watters should ask PKC to carry out an audit of pavements in Kinross and Milnathort with a view to making these places as disability-friendly as possible.

Toilets at Pier: CCllr Davies reported. He has represented the CC at meetings with PKC, SNH, HES, Kinross Estate Company and TRACKS with regard to securing public toilet facilities at the pier. A site and funds have been identified. The group is now ready to apply for planning permission. It is envisaged that work will start in February 2018 with a view to being open for the start of April 2018. The plan is for the facility to be open April-October and managed by SNH. It is expected that the facility will have a 5- to 10-year lifespan. CCllr Davies thanked and congratulated Cllr Robertson for his work in organising the meetings and achieving this result. Cllr Robertson stressed that the stakeholders see this as a

short-term measure, with a proper visitor centre being the ultimate goal.

Mary Queen of Scots Great Escape Boat Race: CCllr Davies encouraged the CC to attend and/or enter this event, to be held on 3 September.

Survey: CCllr Bryson will progress the survey agreed at a previous meeting.

High School capacity: It has been rumoured that there is only one space in S1 due to the large number of placements from outwith the KHS catchment area. There was some discussion. CCIIr Stewart queried the fairness of a house-builder having to pay thousands of pounds to PKC in education contributions when places are being taken by children from outwith the Perth & Kinross local authority area. CCIIr Cuthbert said Scottish Government legislation requires a place to be offered if there is space available. CIIr Purves explained that various criteria come into play. He will find out if the number of reserved spaces can be increased in view of the large number of new houses due to come on stream locally.

CC Grant: The Treasurer had notified the Secretary that the grant from PKC (£697.81) is now in the CC account. The CC could now pay for the plaque obtained for the Queen's trees (now in situ).

Remembrance Sunday: It was agreed that a planning meeting should take place in the first week of October.

Kirkgate Park Play Equipment: CCllr Freeman notes that there is not very much play equipment at Kirkgate Park for children under 8 years of age. It was thought that some equipment may have been removed due to damage. Cllr Robertson will make enquiries.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 6 September 2017 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

Milnathort Community Council

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 10 August 2017 were: CCllrs K Heneghan, C Lawson, C Williams, M Leach and S McHardy; P&K Cllrs W Robertson, C Purves and R Watters; and two members of the public.

Apologies: CCllrs Elyse Kirkham and Caroline Flory.

Police Matters: No police in attendance.

Road Safety: Further to a very constructive site meeting with Daryl McKeown (Project Officer for Traffic and Network for PKC), attended by Campbell Lawson and Matthew Leach from MCC, the following matters to improve road safety in Milnathort were agreed to be taken forward:

Vehicle-activated signs (VAS): The location of vehicle-activated signs on Burleigh Road and Perth Road had previously been agreed by the CC and elected members during the Milnathort Placecheck project. At that time, a funding source was not available. The sites on Burleigh Road included facing the eastbound traffic approaching Mayfield Gardens and facing the westbound traffic approaching Balfour Crescent. The sites on Perth Road include facing the westbound traffic within the 30mph speed limit and facing the westbound traffic within the 40mph speed limit east of the Hattonburn Road junction. There is now a budget for this work as part of the Council-wide VAS programme. Works is scheduled for later this calendar year.

The site meeting indicated alternative sites on the Burleigh Road in the vicinity of Burleigh Castle. The final preferred locations agreed at the MCC meeting were eastbound approaching Mayfield Gardens prior to the bend, in the proximity of 19 and 21 Burleigh Road and Westbound near the track next to the Stackyard. In addition, Perth Road VAS to be progressed in accordance with the PKC proposal.

Since the announcement of funding directly for the VAS Programme, a number of additional sites have been requested. These are being assessed and prioritised so they can be installed if a funding source is identified. A site on North Street facing southbound traffic has been proposed by the CC.

Pace Hill Development: The Transport Statement for the Planning Application is available online through the Council's website in the "View and comment on planning applications" option.

Traffic surveys are scheduled for the C499 as part of the Green Route monitoring within the 30mph speed limit on North Street and on the new 40mph section leading to Middleton. This is linked to a possible Green Route extension to Tillywhally and Tillyrie.



Church Street: Concern was expressed about the potential obstruction of emergency vehicles by on-street parking. A parking review will be conducted with the aim of establishing demand and access. This may result in the recommendation of parking restrictions, for which details will be requested by the MCC.

Church Street/Stirling Street junction: The width of the junction from Church Street onto Stirling Road makes pedestrian movement to and from the primary school difficult. A design will be prepared showing the junction realigned, the footways widened on both sides and dropped kerbs installed. A funding source will have to be identified before the project is included in a programme of works. This will include the unsurfaced section of footway along Stirling Road to the east of the junction.

Victoria Avenue – One-way system: The additional No Entry sign has been installed following consultation about the sign location with the property owner. The misleading "Playground" sign has been removed.

To maximise visibility for pedestrians from Jessie's Park on to Victoria Avenue, discussion will take place with Community Greenspace about relocated the position of the gate. This had originally been raised during the Milnathort Placecheck project but was not identified as a community priority.

South Street – unauthorised parking on footway build-out: A bollard is proposed in the build-out at No 5 South Street to discourage unauthorised parking.

South Street – parking restrictions: Consultation has been sought regarding the re-introduction of the road markings to support the parking restrictions between The Cross and the bus stop. No formal response has been received from any party although three verbal objections, including the CC, have been lodged.

Back Loan – vehicle restriction: A sign advising drivers of larger vehicles that the road is unsuitable for commercial traffic will be erected west of the hotel car park. Public consultation will commence shortly regarding the possible introduction of a weight restriction.

Regarding the one-way system at the west of Back Loan, vehicles from a private access are permitted to reverse against the direction of flow for the purpose of executing their turning manoeuvre only.

On the south of Jessie's Park, Traffic & Network has no objection to the alteration of the path or the introduction of a section of pedestrian guardrail. Discussion will take place with Community Greenspace about this matter.



Zebra crossings

- South Street: Concerns were expressed about the lack of compliance by some drivers of the Zebra crossing on South Street. It had been hoped that the introduction of the build-out on the east side of South Street and the relocation of the Belisha beacon would have made the crossing point more prominent. Vehicular and pedestrian surveys will be conducted after the start of the new school term to identify travel patterns and measure compliance rates. A flat-topped ramp will be considered as a possible speed-reduction measure, as has worked well in other locations.
- New Road: Similar to South Street, vehicular and pedestrian surveys will be conducted after the start of the new school term to identify travel patterns and measure compliance rates. A flat-topped ramp will be considered as a possible speed-reduction measure, where the current zebra crossing is located.
- Stirling Road: Linked to the School Travel Planning programme, vehicular and pedestrian surveys will be conducted in the vicinity of Milnathort Primary School after the start of the new school term to identify travel patterns. This will determine whether a flat topped Zebra crossing is appropriate. Concern was raised during the MCC meeting regarding the impact on vehicles and fuel consumption should flat topped Zebra crossings be introduced widely. Opportunity to look at the Pelican crossing option was requested during the MCC meeting, especially if it further enhances the safety of school children.

There will be **further consultation** between MCC and Daryl McKeown to oversee the progress of these potential works. Matthew also reported that in a transport statement regarding **Pace Hill**, PKC hadn't used the existing **traffic-modelling software** but had used cameras. Stuart McHardy asked if the traffic survey carried out at Lathro would affect junction 7. Cllr Robertson stated he has been promised a view of the impact of the traffic-modelling data. The Lathro data doesn't take Milnathort into account. It was felt that PKC should use the model to assess the Pace Hill impact. Matthew will go back to D McKeown regarding use of the model.

New Matters and Correspondence

Campbell Lawson reported: incidences of **car speeding** on Back Loan; and a **fence** on the wall at Jessie's Park is becoming unsafe with spars breaking off. A young boy was injured by one of these spars.

Stuart McHardy reported that the **Guide Hall** is to have a ramp built to improve access. He asked about the placement of a **bottle bank** and a cardboard bank near the mini-roundabout on Bridgefaulds Road. He also asked if two **fences** would be built in the vicinity of the planned football pavilion to protect the gardens of the properties in Whyte Place and also asked for the path with broken-up tarmac opposite junction 7 to be looked at. Cllr Robertson agreed to take on the action regarding the path.

Kevin Heneghan reported that he has now taken delivery of the **defibrillator** bought with funds from Kinross Colts 2009s. George Shiels of Stewart and Smart garage has very kindly agreed to have the defibrillator installed at the garage and signage will be placed at Davidson the chemist indicating the location of the defibrillator. Kevin is also arranging for training in the use of the defibrillator to be offered to staff at businesses near the site of the defibrillator.

Kevin agreed to update the **information** about Milnathort CC held at various locations.

A member of the public had emailed MCC asking if the **vegetation** at the path at Burleigh Woods could be cut back as the path was becoming very overgrown. Cllr Robertson said he would action this.

It was reported by a member of the public that traffic turning right out of the car park at **Burleigh Sands** has very poor visibility as the vegetation is obscuring the line of sight. Willie Robertson agreed to look into this.

Comments/Questions from the floor

A member of the public asked for the latest version of the lease pertaining to the football pavilion in the park to be

made available. Willie Robertson agreed to provide this to the member of the public.

PKC Councillors' Comments

Planning: Cllr Purves reported that in their roles as Vice-Conveners of the Environment, Enterprise and Infrastructure Committee, Cllr Barnacle and Cllr Purves have asked the planning officers to look at a number of ways of addressing some of the issues that members of the public have with the planning system in an effort to improve transparency. Examples of some of the suggestions they have made include a more flexible neighbour notification policy and independently commissioned surveys.

Maintenance: At the last meeting of the full council, it was agreed by councillors to allocate £750,000 of uncommitted reserves to a number of the new partnership administration's priorities. This comprised £500,000 for road improvements (including the reinstated potholes policy and more verge cutting, particularly at sight lines) and £250,000 for community greenspace and tree maintenance.

Mobility: Cllr Watters reported concerns expressed to him that mobility scooters were having difficulty with access in some areas, particularly going from The Muirs on to the main road. He asked that any such issues in Milnathort should be reported to him.

PKC Engagement: As part of the new administration's drive to get the council out of the city of Perth and engage more with communities across the PKC area, each year one meeting of each committee will be held outside outside Perth. The first such meeting will be full council, which will be held on Wednesday 4 October at 2pm in Loch Leven Community Campus.

Old Mart Road: Cllr Robertson reported that the path at Old Mart Road is to be improved by the laying of an additional surface on it. This will improve access and render it less muddy. The Community Payback team will undertake this work. He also reported that public toilets will be built at The Pier at Loch Leven, with the work being carried out over the winter.

The Next Meeting of Milnathort CC will take place on Thursday 14 September 2017 at 7.30pm in Milnathort Town Hall.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the August Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 8 August 2017 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), B Calderwood (Deputy Chair and Treasurer), R Cairncross (Secretary), A Muszynski, D Morris, A Robertson, and T Smith; Ward Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters; PCs D Stapleton and A Spalding and 13 members of the public.

Apologies: Cllr S Forde and Ward Cllr M Barnacle.

Members of the CC expressed their condolences for Ward Councillor Michael Barnacle at this time of his bereavement.

Approval of previous minutes: The Minutes CC meeting held on 13 June 2017 were approved subject to the following amendment: 2. Westfield Opencast site: Key points raised in discussion; bullet point 5; final sentence "It intended to prepare....." This sentence to be presented as a separate bullet point.

Matters Arising from Previous Minutes:

Recycling provisions, Kinnesswood. The new bins had been installed and were being emptied weekly. The site remained tidy. A new sign to indicate their positon would help. The school would be approached to suggest a design.

Planning. 17/00658/FLL Land 100m north of 3 Middleburn Cottage: Change of use from agricultural land to equestrian centre. PKC had confirmed that, because they had been long established, the existing buildings/stables did not require planning permission.

Westfield Opencast Site - Restoration and Regeneration Project (Fife 16/03661/EIA)

The CC would shortly submit a revised letter of objection to Fife Council. Since its letter of objection of January there was now greater clarity on a number of critical points and a pressing need to make the case for mitigation plain were planning consent to be granted in the near future. This the CC would do. The CC would shortly meet with the Fife lead planner in advance of submitting its objection. It was important to understand what role PKC would now take. The CC had so far been unable to meet with PKC planners but a meeting with both Fife and PKC planners, Ward Councillors and representatives of the CC had been arranged for 23 August. Ward Cllrs confirmed that PKC officials had determined that PKC would not require the application to be called in by Scottish Ministers. It was unclear whether or not PKC would pursue any mitigation measures.



Community Council News

Key matters identified were that:

- the vehicle management policies to support the Westfield site should be underwritten by a three way agreement between: the Applicant, Fife Council and Perth and Kinross Council. Enforcement would be a particular challenge.
- 2. the operational impact of the significant increase in traffic on agriculture and the tourism and leisure industries would be considerable.
- part of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail already provided a safe off-road experience for walkers and cyclists alike. This should be extended to include the whole of the B9097 between its junction with the B920 and the B996.
- 4. any vehicular management plan to support the site must be complemented by a construction management plan.
- 5. there were good reasons to require that there should be flexibility in the hours that the B9097 could be used by HGVs. For example, such traffic should be precluded on agreed statutory holidays, and for particular events (The Kinross Show, The Loch Leven Half Marathon and certain cycling events).

The CC's letter of objection would be copied to the adjoining Kinross-shire CCs - a broader circulation list was under consideration.

Community Council Meetings. PKC had recently terminated the provision for hiring the school hall to the CC. As a result, all CC meetings from September onwards will be held in Portmoak Village Hall at 7.30pm. A revised calendar of events had been circulated and is available on the CC website. Meeting are ordinarily held on the second Tuesday of each month. Clir Purves would explore why PKC had taken this action.

School access – policy on parking. The CC had followed up on the proposals to restrict parking on the access to Portmoak School, Kinnesswood. It had learned that, despite its support, PKC would take no action in taking forward the proposals. The access problem remained. Clear access to the school for emergency vehicles is essential. Ward Cllrs will pursue what action was now appropriate. The matter was linked to difficulties in achieving safe drop-off and pick-up arrangements for children at the school.

Arrangements for the maintenance of residual plots across Whitecraigs. The CC welcomed news that A & J Stephen and PKC were in discussion to achieve transfer of ownership and maintenance of a number of residual plots across the Whitecraigs estate. The CC had an interest in specific plots and in seeing that all plots were transferred. It had contacted PKC to seek clarity on the identity of all plots concerned before negotiations were concluded. Cllr Robertson would pursue the matter with PKC.

Reports

Police: PCs D Stapleton and A Spalding were welcomed. They reported that: there had been no crime in the Portmoak area although there had been an accident at the C50 junction with the Westfield access; the "Farm Watch" scheme was being reintroduced; and speed checks would be likely on the A911 as is passes through Portmoak. The Police will have an information facility at the Kinross Show. The Area Commander's Bulletins issued between 14 June and 2 August were noted.

Treasurer: Report for the months of April and May 2017. The balance at the month ending 31 May: was £584.40 in the General Account; and £639.18 in the Michael Bruce Way Account giving a total of £1,223.58.

Planning: Progress with Developments:

Former Lomond Inn: proposals for part demolition and erection of 5 dwelling houses (16/03661/CON). No Progress. Development at Glenlomond: proposals to build 13 houses (16/00751/FLL). Final down-takings were in progress. It appeared likely that the site may be sold-on with planning permission.

Stephen's Field, Kinnesswood. Matters rested with A & J Stephen. It seemed possible that the recent planning application may be withdrawn and new proposals made. Details are awaited.

Roads: CCllr Bruce Calderwood presented an updated Roads Report. There were a number of matters on which to make progress. The narrow footpath alongside the A911 between Scotlandwell and onwards to the Church and Hall remains a serious problem. Cllr W Robertson would raise the matter with PKC Roads deportment. Road surfacing from Easter Balgedie through Kinnesswood was noted. Cllrs were reminded that cats eyes should be replaced. Cllrs C Purves reported that a request to reduce the speed limit through Easter Balgedie was being considered while PKC would be reviewing its policy on 20mph limits.

Paths: CCIIr Tom Smith reported that due to holidays the work parties had had fewer volunteers than usual. It was anticipated that this would correct soon. There was a considerable challenge as the weather had ensured a prodigious growth along all paths. The strimmer had required repair on three occasions. New arrangements for the maintenance of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail between PKC, SNH and RSPB were noted.

Consultations: The CC were currently considering 7 requests on a disparate range of topics.

PKC Ward Councillor Reports:

Cllr Robertson reported that in addition to the new Kinross Brewery there would soon be a Kinross micro distillery.

Cllr Purves reported that PKC had released £750,000 from reserves to enable improved road maintenance (including removing excess growth from verges at junctions) and support for Greenspace projects. The full Council would move from Perth to hold an open meeting on Wednesday 4 October in Kinross at the campus.

Matters previously notified to the Secretary plus matters raised from the floor: There had been an informal contact from Kinross CC. In view of the projected increase in housing in both Kinross and Milnathort support was sought for the "completion" of junction 7 on the M90 to have four slip roads. The CC has consistently supported this development and, once the Kinross CC request is received, would write in support.

Fossoway and District CC

News from the August Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 1 August 2017 were: CCCllrs Cameron Brown, Angus Cheape, Jennifer Donachie, Carol Farquhar and Graham Pye (Chair); P&K Cllrs Callum Purves and Richard Watters; and six Members of the Public (MoP).

Apologies: CCllr T Duffy; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and W Robertson.

Welcome: Cllr Barnacle is unable to be with us as his wife sadly passed away last week. The CC extends its sympathies to Mike and his family.

The CC welcomed Cllr Watters to the meeting.

Declarations of Interest: CCllr Brown declared an interest in planning application 17/01200/FLL.

Police report: Unfortunately, no officer was able to be present at the meeting. There were no incidents to note in our area in the last two months from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch.

Minutes of the previous meeting: In Cllr Purves report, change pothole depth from 6mm/4mm to 60mm/40mm. The minutes were signed off without other amendment.

A977 Defects and Mitigation Measures: There was a road traffic accident in Crook of Devon on 25 July, which resulted in damage to a wall and lamp post. Fortunately, no pedestrians were injured as a result; however this is yet another example of vehicles travelling along the A977 at excessive speed. Cllr Robertson has written to Chic Haggart of PKC's Roads Department to urgently request the long promised meeting with the officer appointed to look into issues with the A977. One MoP queried if speed was known to be the cause of the accident.

Crook of Devon and Drum Growing Together: CCllr Duffy sent a report that they did not win the Best Kept Village award; however, there are many plans for the future; a new Wildlife Friendly flower bed is being created on the Crook Village Green [see p. 70].

Powmill in Bloom Group: CCllr Farquhar reported that they did not win Best Kept Village either but were commended on the lack of litter and good level of maintenance of the grass verges within the village. CCllr Farquhar felt there was a lack of feedback from the judges which could have benefited the group in where to focus their energy over the coming year.

Hydro Scheme: The fund has received a small grant that will enable the community consultation to start in the middle of August.

Glen Devon Bridge: CCllr Brown notes that the bridge has been repaired and restored along with some additional landscaping, however littering is still an ongoing issue. One MoP informed the meeting that there are missing coping stones on the Crook of Devon Bridge towards Naemoor Rd. CCllr Brown reported that Cllr Barnacle was aware of this.

Station Road Adoption: Works seem to be nearing completion. One MoP brought the CC a copy of a letter he had sent to PKC's Roads Department regarding the adoption. Rural Broadband: Cllr Purves has looked into the issue of broadband provision and has made contact with the 'Smart Perth project'; there is an aim for the area around Rumbling Bridge to have broadband by 2018 and Cllr Purves will forward further details on this to the CC.

Matters Arising With No Update Since Last Meeting: Crook Moss Travellers Site, Ivy Cottage, Powmill and Blairingone War Memorial.

Community Council Business

Meetings Attended: CCIIr Brown attended the Planning Users' Forum, renewables engagement exercise on Tuesday 9 August. A Planning glossary has been put together by PKC which is available to view at: http://tinyurl.com/PlanningGlossary

Treasurer's Report: The CC has received its annual grant from PKC. The old bank account has been closed.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Cllr Purves: There has been cross party support for further release of funding to go toward verge cutting, hedge cutting, improving junctions, improving green space, etc. Cllrs and some members of the public have been calling for the PKC planning department to improve its performance particularly questioning how specific conditions are enforced or met within planning applications. This has partly come out of community response to recent development and tree felling by Persimmon Homes at Lathro. Cllr Purves met with Cllr Barnacle, Colin Stewart and the Environment Committee to discuss LDP2 and planning issues.

Clir Watters commented that the council are trying to enforce conditions at the start of the planning application process to avoid scenarios like that seen at the Persimmon Homes development at Lathro.

Cllr Waters noted the importance of maintaining some reserves of funding for situations such as heavy snows, etc., however he fully supported the releasing of funds to improve roads in this instance.

Cleish and Blairadam CC News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 7 August 2017 were: CCllrs R Kitchin, P Fraser, H Somerville, F Principe-Gillespie, R Cairney, M Traylor), P&K Cllr C Purves; G Lawrie of TRACKS; and six members of the community.

Apologies from CCIIr F Whalley; and P&K CIIrs W Robertson, R Watters and M Barnacle. The CC has offered condolences to Mike, and again acknowledged his ongoing support for our community.

Crime Prevention: The Police were not present tonight, which was disappointing after the more positive discussion at the last meeting.

There have been some complaints recently that the Cleish Hill Road is being used again as a 'meeting site'. It is noticeably busier, and with parked cars in the passing places making it difficult to allow oncoming vehicles to pass.

Correspondence: There has been Facebook correspondence regarding speeding on the A996. Local residents explained how the speed and volume of traffic makes it dangerous at times, in particular for the school children waiting for both primary and secondary school buses. There is no waiting area or bus shelter for the children, surface water is also pooling on the road adjacent to the pick-up spot and speeding vehicles. A recent survey identified 4000 cars passing per day, with an average speed of 50 mph.

This Lochran building group was already named as a Settlement Area in a previous LDP, but was subsequently removed. If reinstated, then the protection of the HICP no longer remains. It was agreed to support the communities' wishes for a H&S Risk Assessment for this area, in particular for the safety of the school children waiting for and getting on and off the buses on a fast stretch of road.

Financial Update: £700 is in the account due to the PKC funds being received. Bank of Scotland reported that there were still previous signatories on the account from many years ago. Hopefully this matter is finally being sorted.

Newsletter: The new newsletter was sent out after our last meeting and has been well received. There were two comments received relating to the small font size. There is space for more local information, activities, clubs, societies and hall events. Feedback is always useful. It was agreed that this newsletter is an excellent way and promoting more discussion in the community.



Planning

Two applications submitted, which are alterations of previous granted applications. Riding Arena at the Paphle: new proposal for it to be moved out of the garden to the field. This is a better proposal with better access, outwith the Conservation Area and fewer trees needing to be removed.

New house in Nivingston: this is an improved application.

The CC will write to both applicants supporting the applications.

There is a fifth house being built at Benarty Road with ground works already underway for a sixth.

Village updates – Blairadam

The pot holes have been repaired down from Jn 5.

Congratulations to Keltybridge and Maryburgh for the Best Kept Hamlet.

The demand taxi service is not free for school children needing to be taken to their bus from Kinross to schools outwith the catchment area (e.g. Dollar). It was agreed with the P&K Cllrs that PKC shouldn't be expected to fund this transport for these cases.

The village hall had its licence changed from 1am to midnight. It was confirmed that this hasn't been linked to any antisocial behavior or noise.

Village updates - Cleish

On 19 August there is an event at the playing fields.

On 3 September there is a community treasure hunt.

There have been more discussions in the village about a possible broadband upgrade, however we have to wait for Community Broadband Scotland to either confirm more projects or alternatively that is disbanding, and then we could look at other private ventures.

There is more dog mess around – could it be picked up and flicked using the shovels provided.

Tracks and Trails

There is some grant money available from PKC, who want to offload some of the local maintenance responsibilities onto local Path Groups. There are set-up grants of £1500. Paths for All are doing a similar thing.

There is a Community Challenge Fund to upgrade facilities within an area. The CCs can apply for this, as well as assistance from Tracks if for new links.

The Green Routes in Cleish are now completed and signed. The local Councillors were instrumental in supporting this.

Two paths were discussed. It was unclear if they were rights of way or historic paths: firstly, along from Dowhill up through Sunnyside into Blairadam; secondly, from Flockhouse up past Ryebog into Blairadam.

The Next Meeting of Cleish & Blairadam CC takes place on Monday 2 October at 7.30pm at Cleish Village Hall.

Club & Community Group News



Our Portmoak Summer Highlights and Autumn Programme



"Summer" has seen the majority of Our Portmoak's outdoor events take place including our three archaeological digs. Our photos show that the weather often lived up to expectations – wet – but that didn't deter the many people who came along to join in.

Just some of our Summer highlights were:

Dig at Old Portmoak Chapel

The sterling efforts of our volunteers were rewarded by the discovery of what we think is a medieval ditch round the settlement at the old Portmoak Chapel site. Soil, charcoal and pottery samples will be analysed to provide specific dates. Watch this space for news.

Old Portmoak Churchyard Survey

Using the latest in GPS technology, a small team of volunteers created a map of the location and the size of all the

visible gravestones. The resulting data has been used to create a digital map of the site to create a comprehensive record of the gravestones and burial monuments in the old graveyard. Some of these date back to the 1700s.

Portmoak Moss Time Travelling: Tales of the Peatbog

We celebrated National Bog Day on 23 July with the Portmoak Woodland Group and Scottish Natural Heritage. Andrew McBride, Peatland Action Manager for SNH, took a five metre long core sample from the peatbog to bring to light some of the flora and fauna that were deposited in the bog during its evolution over thousands of years.

David Munro told the story of how the bog has been used by the inhabitants of Portmoak through the ages.

Dig at Dunmore Fort

Many of the residents of Portmoak and over to Ballingry and Lochgelly will walk, see or pass Dunmore on a regular, if not daily, basis. Although prominent, it's a fairly unassuming looking hill but Dunmore (meaning Big Hill) is the site of one of many hillforts scattered across the Lomonds.

We dug a 3m x 2m trench at the edge of the hill and down to the cliff at a point where the remains of the fort's wall were clearly visible; not a job for anyone with a fear of heights.

Over our two days digging, we uncovered a very large wall, enough to show that the fort on Dunmore would have been a substantial one and of some importance.



Recent talks

The speaker at the breakfast meeting on 17 July was our own associate member, John Ross, who gave a very interesting talk on the history of **Kinross-shire Cricket Club**. John, who is the current Club Captain, told us how the club had been formed as far back as 1855 by William Briggs Constable. Despite setbacks caused by the World Wars, the sale of Kinross House and the subsequent loss of the ground and facilities, the club has grown to become of the major players in Scotland in all sectors of the game. He talked of his time living under canvas and of the difficulties of patrolling some of the most inhospitable parts of the country. He also revealed how he obtained a leopard skin which he subsequently had made into a handbag for his mother!

Julian Reeves, a trustee of **Seamab**, was our speaker on 31 July. Seamab care for and educate vulnerable children aged between five and thirteen who have complex needs. They provide a unique service in Scotland and are nationally recognised for their specialist work with children. The talk was gripping and Julian gave several moving insights into the challenges that the children have to overcome, and the dedication the job demands of the staff.

Alistair Smith spoke about the **Kinross-shire Civic Trust** on 14 August. Alistair spoke about the aims of the society in helping to continue to enhance the beauty of the area and make it a great place to live and visit, by considering both the 'built' and the 'natural' environments.



In the next few weeks we will be welcoming back the school children, now in P6, for their harvesting and tasting session with some vegetables to take home and recipes to try.


In mid-August, we had an outing to three interesting gardens in Perth for the volunteer group.

Bogs and Apples

Portmoak Moss hosted an event to mark International Bog Day (23 July). It was the first peat bog in Scotland to do so and the idea was initiated by Our Portmoak, who are running a huge programme of activities to mark Scotland's Year of History, Heritage and Archaeology.

By using a number of connected poles, bog expert Andrew McBride was able to drill down to a depth of 5½ metres and expose plant and insect remains which hadn't seen the light for 5,500 years. His deepest peat core sample clearly showed parts of a tree which may have been rowan or alder, as well as the bright blue wing case of a beetle. This was spotted by one of the eight children who came to the event, along with 20 adults.

Portmoak Community Woodland Group were delighted to join forces with Our Portmoak in hosting 'Tales of the Peat Bog'. Professor David Munro, from Our Portmoak, explained the history of the bog and how generations of local people had cut a lot of the peat for fuel. Andrew McBride, Peatland Action Project manager with Scottish Natural Heritage, explained how the bog had been formed, since the last Ice Age, by rotting plant matter.

Peatland Action have generously funded parts of the peat bog restoration project and reminded everyone why it is vital to look after the few remaining lowland raised peat bogs, like Portmoak. "Bogs are important not only for their biodiversity, which is very specialised, but also for the very important aspect of climate change and the ability of bogs to hold on to carbon," said Andrew McBride. Scotland's peat bogs hold so much carbon that, if we didn't preserve them, it's been calculated that 47,000 people would have to make radical changes to their lifestyles and become carbon neutral in order to tackle climate change. The Woodland Trust Scotland, who own Portmoak Moss, have been making a huge effort to restore the peat dome in the centre of the site and we're now seeing the spread of species like the sphagnum mosses, which turned into peat all that time ago.

Jeff Gunnell, Chair of PCWG, likened Andrew McBride to Dr Who, a Time Lord with a Time Machine, who had taken us back thousands of years and, unlike the Tardis, successfully returned us to the present.

Speaking of which, PCWG are grateful to a member of the public who reported and attempted to extinguish a small fire started by a BBQ in the depths of Portmoak Moss. Once fire takes a hold in the drier areas of peat, it's incredibly difficult to put out and tends to spread beneath the surface. It took trug-loads of water, wheelbarrowed some distance, to eventually extinguish it.

On a cheerier note, the community orchard in Kilmagad Wood has a good crop of apples this year and we are holding another **Apple Day** at 2pm on **Sunday 1 October**, when anyone can come and have apples from their gardens identified (bring two or three apples and a twig with leaves on it from the same tree). If you bring enough apples we can turn them into delicious juice. We'll also provide homebaking and games for children. The event is free but we'd appreciate a donation for the refreshments. Recipe

supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Rich Cheese Biscuits

Janette made these biscuits for the Bishopshire SWI Community competition. They are delicious, especially with a dip. This recipe makes about 32 biscuits.

Ingredients

175g plain flour

¾ tsp salt

¾ teasp dry mustard powder

75g butter

175g grated cheddar

2 large eggs

Sesame or poppy seeds for sprinkling

Method

Heat the oven to 200 degrees celsius. Lightly grease three baking trays. Sieve the flour, salt and mustard powder into a bowl and rub in the butter until fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the grated cheese. Beat the eggs, then stir just enough egg into the flour mix to form a soft dough. Wrap the dough in clingfilm and chill for about 15 minutes.

Roll the dough out to a thickness of about 5 mm and cut into 5 cm rounds. Place on baking trays and brush with remaining egg. Sprinkle lightly with sesame or poppy seeds (optional). Bake in the oven for 15-20 minutes or until crisp and golden. They can be reheated before serving.



Kinross High School

SQA Results

It has been another very good year for pupils at Kinross High School, with over 2000 SQA awards being achieved across S4-S6. With continued hard work from staff and pupils, the majority (82%) of pupils have achieved awards at A-C in graded courses. In new courses such as the Baccalaureate (Science and Languages), more than half of the pupils achieved a distinction. The number of pupils achieving five National 5 awards in S4 increased to 65% and pass rates for pupils were approximately 10% above the national average.

There are many personal triumphs within the results and many pupils will now achieve their first choice of post-school destination. Around 60 pupils achieved all of their qualifications at the top grade possible for the courses undertaken.

A full review of all results will be undertaken once the National Benchmarking tool "Insight" is updated. This provides an opportunity for comparison with similar schools.

Many thanks to everyone who came to see us on our stand at the Kinross Show. We had decked our tent out in a scene that looked like a miniature Loch Leven. It even had a water feature. We got out our badge maker. This proved very popular with the kids. We could see a wild Peregrine Falcon up on the crags at Benarty through the telescope we had set up on the stand. It was a great day all round.

On 20 August, we took folk out from Our Portmoak to St Serf's to look at the priory with historians David Munro and Oliver O'Grady. Military style planning couldn't stop the weather being terrible on the Saturday and we had to cancel, but Sunday was the polar opposite with pleasant sunshine and a light breeze. Nearly 40 people visited St Serf's for the first time and we heard stories about the long history of the site.

Autumn is beginning to kick in at Loch Leven. Around the middle of the month, duck numbers started to grow. From now on between Carsehall in the north and St Serf's will be full of ducks. There's also been a few oddities about. A Sanderling was on St Serf's, a Hobby was terrorising Sand Martins at the Kirkgate and the Little Egret is regularly roosting with the Grey Herons near to the pier. There are still a few Ospreys around the loch. I expect to see them until about the middle of September, when they are replaced by the returning Pink-footed Geese. The geese that folk are seeing now on the fields are the summering Greylags.

A couple of dates for your diary. We are running the annual **Fungi Foray** on **Sunday 1 October** from 2pm to 4pm at Findatie. Learn about this fascinating species with Richard Smith. He is very knowledgeable and has great enthusiasm for the subject. I'll be doing the **Dawn Goosewatch** at the Kirkgate on **Saturday 14 October** from 6.45am; one for the early risers there. Please phone the office for details and to book a place.

Sadly, we have to report more vandalism. An attempt was made to burn down the hide at Burleigh. There has been a lot of antisocial behaviour around the reserve this summer and we're not keen for it to continue. If you see vandalism or people acting in an antisocial manner, please don't hesitate to let us or the police know. Loch Leven is for everyone and we don't want it spoilt.

We are still blogging, using Facebook, tweeting and Instagram. Keep an eye on these for constant updates.

As our 50th anniversary year comes into autumn, I thought I'd share some thoughts from a former information warden, Gareth Morgan, which we came across in our archives:

"As I write this, rain is streaming down the windows and leaves are falling by the dozen, but even so I can't be the only person who likes autumn, the best of all seasons. The swifts have gone, the swallows are restless, despite desperately racing against time to raise a third brood. But although summer birds are leaving, the winter arrivals are already moving in from the north. The geese are expected any day and there seem to be more ducks every time we look at the loch. The second reason I like autumn is because it's so unpredictable. It is the season of the chance sighting. At this time of year birds stream into Britain from Canada, Greenland, Iceland and Russia, and the birds from northern Scotland move south too. Some of these stay the winter around Loch Leven – like the geese – but many more just stop over as they make for warmer climes."

It reminds me of all the wild treasures we have to come. Right now, it's the migrating osprey passing through. Last year we had up to twelve on one day (14 September) and expect regular sightings along the shore, often sitting on fence posts or fishing the loch. Another thing to celebrate is that it's Organic September wildlife loves organic food and so do we! Visit the reserve in September with the wee ones and take part in our Nature Bingo and learn more about the connections between food

and wildlife then stop off at our cafe where there are plenty of organic treats for you to enjoy.

On **Friday 8 September**, we have our *Wild Night: Bat Walk* from 8pm until 9.30pm. Come along to try out bat detecting equipment and find out about these fascinating creatures. Five different bats have been recorded here on the reserve and you'll learn tips on how to identify them and where best to find them.

Also in the world of events, we have our monthly *Nature Tots* on **Wednesday 13 September** from 10am until 12pm, where we'll be getting excited about trees and leaves. It's definitely worth booking if you plan to come along; we are jam-packed full every month at the moment.

Farming



It has been a very frustrating summer weather-wise since my last update on the goings on at Backward Farm. When making our silage for feeding the cattle and sheep over the winter, I like to have at least three consecutive dry days to get the job done; I cut the grass on the first day, scatter it on the second day to dry it out a bit and then rake it up into rows, or "bouts" as we call them, ready to bale and wrap on the third. However, finding three dry days together as June progressed and into July proved pretty elusive, so it has been a case of doing a smash and grab to get through it all – just going ahead, cutting the grass down even when the weather forecast maybe wasn't looking too inspiring and keeping our fingers crossed it would turn out OK.

As a result of our efforts, we have a pile of what should be quite respectable silage bales and (hopefully) very nice haylage bales for horses. The very changeable weather was all the more annoying when you think back to April and May when there were about six weeks with hardly a drop of rain. Ah, the old nugget about farmers never being happy with the weather! What does make the task of getting our silage done easier is the fact that my brother has some large, high-capacity grass machinery for cutting and preparing the grass which I use (for an appropriate fee!), so I can get done in just a few hours what would otherwise take most of the day with standard machines.

Away from the silage-making, we got our winter barley combined a couple of weeks ago and if ever the term smash and grab was appropriate, then it was for that job. Basically, it was dry with us when it was pouring with rain just four miles away, where Andrew was waiting with bated breath for the call to head along to the bad lands of Backward Farm for his first day's work of the year with one of his pair of classic combine harvesters. It would also be a test of how successful his meticulous programme of pre-season maintenance had been. The 'Dominator' worked faultlessly and just avoided getting stuck in an unexpectedly wet patch in the field, thanks to some well-practised driving techniques. So, we ended up with a very respectable (at least by our standards) heap of grain in shed and, as is was dry for almost 24 hours, I even got the straw baled.

We eventually got the sheep clipped by near neighbour and champion shearer Calum and his team. It was a job I put off for fear of it clashing with silage, but I think the ewes were quite happy to be left with their jackets on slightly longer, as it wasn't exactly tropical through July. Since we had the ewes all gathered, I decided we would just wean the lambs and divide them into batches according to their weight. We normally wean them later but I think the ewes will benefit from a longer rest between weaning and tupping time.

Our son's other sow had her litter of piglets just after I wrote my last article and they are all growing well. The first sow to farrow was a good-natured, relaxed mother but the second one was very protective of her piglets so we had to be very careful around her for the first couple of weeks, but she has settled down now. If the saying "as happy as a pig in muck" is true, then these pigs should be ecstatic as, thanks to all the rain, there is certainly plenty of muck for them to wallow in!
