

Council puts the brake on dangerous parking in Kinross

A consultation on proposed waiting restrictions in Kinross is to be carried out. Concerns were raised by residents and local Elected Members about general road safety issues caused by vehicles parking on the carriageway at Avenue Road, Talla Park and High Street, Kinross. The Council will consult with local residents regarding the installation of "No Waiting At Any Time restrictions" as detailed in the drawings of the proposed restrictions from the Council which are shown below. These restrictions are considered to be necessary for the safety of all road users.

Completion of Milnathort Guide Hall Refurbishment

The Milnathort Guide Hall has undergone major refurbishment, with the creation of disabled access and a toilet in the section that was known as the "Scout End". Before the rooms were dark and not particularly inviting and did not meet the standards expected of a youth facility in the twenty-first century.

Work started back in 2015 and the proposed layout went through a number of changes before it was finalised. ITC Building Contractors from Rumbling Bridge were selected for the project. The roof in the toilet had to be replaced due to damp, and this was funded by the hall committee roofing fund. Funding for the rest of the refurbishment came from a variety of sources and in the end a total of £37,744 was raised from the following sources: A&M Thomson Trust, £5096. Fife Environmental Trust, £19,148. Tesco, £1000. Tay Charitable Trust, £500. W M Mann Foundation, £500. The Hugh Fraser Foundation, £2000. Bruce Wake Charitable Trust, £2000 Foyle Foundation, £2000. Skipton Building Society, £2000. Kinross CC Newsletter, £1000. Kinross-shire Trust, £1500. The Erskine Cunningham Hill Trust (CoS), £1000. Adding in the cost of the roof work brought the total cost of the project to £41,184.03.

Work started again on 15 January 2018 and despite a few delays due to bad weather, work was completed (bar the snagging) by mid-April 2018 and on budget. Members of the hall committee painted and varnished the new rooms and Common Grounds installed a tiled splashback for the sink. Everyone has been impressed with what has been achieved and Milnathort Guide Hall can now offer facilities for all within the Guide units and those in the larger community who are looking for a venue that meets their needs. 

"He died bravely leading his men" Born at 'Levenbank' in Kinross on 29 November 1894, William Keay Falconer junior was the only son of a prominent local solicitor, William Keay Falconer senior. Between 1907 and 1913 he was schooled at the Edinburgh Academy where he became a member of the Officer Training Corps. On leaving school, Keay, as he was called, successfully applied for a commission in the Territorial Force and was appointed 2nd Lieutenant and platoon commander in G Com-

After training in Bedford, he went to France where his battalion was to take part in the Battle of St Julien, a major action in the Second Battle of Ypres that occurred between 24 and 27 April 1915. In the early morning of Sunday 25 April, the men of the 7th Argylls were engaged in a vigorous offensive during which Keay was killed leading his men. The next day a fellow officer described how Falconer had been "killed instantaneously about three miles north-east of Ypres." He said "I buried him last night under a tree behind the position we now hold, and a little wooden cross marks the place." Six Kinross-shire men died at St Julien on 25-26 April.

William Keay Falconer junior is remembered on memorial plaques in St Paul's Church, Kinross, St John's Church, Edinburgh, the Kinross War Memorial, Seaforth Cemetery, Cheddar Villa, and his family plot in the Kirkgate old churchyard.

Armistice Centenary at Kinross Parish Church

As part of the national and local events to commemorate the centenary of the Armistice which ended the First World War, Kinross Parish Church is hosting some of these special events, pausing to remember with gratitude and grief those who have given their lives in time of war and conflict.

On Remembrance Sunday, 11 November, two members of the congregation will play the pipes early in the morning, marking the time the Armistice was actually signed. The United All-age Remembrance Service will be held in the church at 10am, followed by the Act of Remembrance at the town's war memorial at 10.55am. The church's own Morning Worship service will be at 11.15am. In the evening, a special reflective service at 6pm will include the playing of the Last Post and the ringing of the church bell to coincide with national commemorations.

It is intended that the church grounds will host a Garden of Remembrance and that some of the 10 metal silhouettes of soldiers to be sited around the town, thanks to the Armed Forces Covenant Trust, will be at the church.

Poppy Scotland Need You!

You may already have bought your poppy, the POPPY traditional symbol of remembrance. If you Scotland have, you've probably noticed that this year



the poppy has been given a change to mark the significance of the centenary, marking a hundred years since the First World War ended.

> This special charity poppy was commissioned by The Armed Forces charity and has "1918-2018" embossed on it in gold, which is the first change that has been made to the traditional poppy in decades.

Scottish Veterans Minister (and former Royal Marine) Keith Brown MSP helped to launch the new design at the Lady Haig Poppy Factory in Edinburgh in May 2018. A team of 41 veterans make more than 5 million poppies each year and they are intending to make 2.3 million centenary poppies ready for Remembrance Sunday on 11 November.



PoppyScotland says funds raised from the Scottish Poppy Appeal, along with their year-round fundraising, enables them to deliver support to members of the Armed Forces community in Scotland. You can help support their appeal not only by buying a poppy, but by supporting the various local events and stalls in Kinross-shire up until 11 November.

First World War centenary commemorations in Fossoway

First World War Timeline, November 1918

9th Kaiser Wilhelm II abdicates.


11th Armistice Day; fighting ceases at 11am.

Kinross-shire Roll of Honour November 1918

6th J Blackwood was born at Portmoak. His parents, David Blackwood and Jane Low Blackwood, were living at Weston Cottage, Glenfarg, when Private Blackwood died aged 29 while serving with the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. Pte Blackwood is buried at Aulnoye Communal Cemetery in France.

7th William Blyth served in Gallipoli with the Scottish Horse regiment in 1915. He gained his commission in 1916 with the Machine Gun Corps (Infantry). Lieutenant Blyth was wounded three times: on 6 November 1917, 29 September 1918 and 2 November 1918. He had been back in France for only three days after a period of leave at home when he received his fatal wounds. He died at the 50th Casualty Clearing Station and is buried at Premont British Cemetery. Lieutenant

Blyth was one of four sons of Mr and Mrs Archibald Blyth of Ashgrove, Milnathort. All four served in the war.





21st Angus Fraser Duncan died aged 20 in hospital at Wimereux, France, from pneumonia following an attack of influenza. He had joined the Royal Field Artillery in 1915 at the age of 17 and went to France as a signaller in July 1916. He later transferred to the Field Observation Section of the Royal Engineers. Corporal Duncan had been home on leave a few weeks before his death. A local newspaper of the time wrote: "He left his parents in the assurance that when next he returned the War would be over." The newspaper added: "The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr and Mrs Duncan and family in the loss of one, who, having faced the dangers of the battlefield and dared so much in the service of his country, should succumb to sickness in the day of victory, when they were hoping to have him soon back amongst them." Corporal Duncan was a member of the East Church of Kinross and is listed on the church Roll of Honour. He is buried at Terlincthun British Cemetery, Wimille, France.

Luke Graham MP For Ochil and South Perthshire

This month will be a big one for our constituency. First, the Agriculture Bill comes before Parliament and second, we should see the completion of the Tay Cities Deal, which is set to bring needed investment to our constituency.



The Agriculture Bill has been welcomed by a range of rural stakeholders including the NFU in Scotland, Scottish lands & Estates and the SRUC. The Bill introduces the framework - both financial and legislative - that many farmers I have spoken to have been seeking, while providing opportunities through leaving the Common Agriculture Policy. Alongside the bill, I also welcome the Secretary of State's commitment and action on ensuring the United Kingdom will maintain the highest possible food and livestock welfare standards as we move forward. This is in addition to commitments to public money for public goods and financial assistance for the purpose of 'starting, or improving the productivity of, an agricultural, horticultural or forestry activity'.

I think it is disappointing that SNP MPs and MSPs have asked for Scotland not to be included in the bill and have not included agriculture in their recent 'Programme for Government'. I am concerned because a lack of legislation may lead to real hardship in our community, due to the fact that without new laws there will be no framework to continue farm and rural support payments after we leave the EU. This Bill is about protecting agriculture and rural communities across the whole of the UK and should include Scotland. Wales is included in the bill and has a schedule that protects devolved powers as well as establishing a UK framework. This is what I am arguing for for Scotland. I believe there is still time to rescue the situation, and I will be working with colleagues

(I am happy to work cross-party), both locally and nationally, to try to ensure our community does not lose out.

At the end of October, the Chancellor will announce the eagerly awaited Tay Cities Deal. The Tay Cities Deal has been a large part of my work since being elected as MP last year. I was fortunate enough to be heavily involved in the Stirling & Clackmannanshire City Deal, helping to bring £45m of UK funding to the region, while the experience gave me insight into how best to negotiate funding for Perth & Kinross.

For too long rural communities have been left behind and our villages and towns left with derelict buildings and poor infrastructure. Eight months ago, we were looking at a deal that would have only delivered one investment project for our constituency. It has taken months of negotiation with Perth & Kinross Council, government officials and ministers to renegotiate the deal and create a more balanced set of investments across the Tay region.


Although the final heads of terms are not yet agreed, there have been a number of key projects that I've championed for in our constituency and the county as a whole. This includes a proposal for an aerospace centre in Kinross, which would help put Scotland and especially Kinross-shire, at the forefront of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) development and education. The project would provide a tourist centre designed to engage visitors in air and space travel. It would also provide a hook for further private and public investment to the area, as well as providing a boost for local traders and linking with aviation projects in Perth and Dundee. Furthermore, with the new UK spaceport to be located in Scotland, it is an exciting opportunity to link a local venture with a national project.



Kinross-shire constituents who use wheelchairs and mobility scooters have contacted me to highlight the problems they have getting into shops that only have steps. In response I have asked the Kinross-



shire Action Partnership to back a project that will provide interested shops with a bell and a lightweight portable ramp. The bell will allow staff to know that someone is at the door and the ramp will enable easy access into their premises. As this project clearly fits within the Action Partnership's remit of decreasing inequality within the area, the Partnership agreed unanimously to support it. The project will be hosted by the Centre for Inclusive Living, which is based in Perth and has a wealth of talent and experience with this kind of project. It is good to see Kinross-shire moving closer to becoming a fully accessible community.

I am concerned by a resident's comment at the Fossoway Community Council meeting in October, about decreasing access to taxis in West Kinross-shire through the Demand Responsive Transport service. This DRT service helps to mitigate issues that rural residents have with the lack of bus services. Several taxis have withdrawn from the scheme for various reasons, so I have arranged an urgent discussion with Council Officers to find a solution to the problem.

Has the time come for a tourist tax in Perth and Kinross?

Perth & Kinross draws thousands of visitors each year to enjoy our fantastic scenery and

outstanding outdoor activities. This at a time when the Council faces further reductions in government support and is already considering an increase in council tax and cuts to services in next years' budget.


Organisations such as the Perth & Kinross Countryside Trust and TRACKS (The Rural Access Committee of Kinross-shire) have created much used and appreciated path networks and cycleways. However, both these organisations and the Council now struggle to maintain these important facilities. TRACKS built the outstanding Loch Leven Heritage Trail which now attracts 250,000 visitors a year and gives the local economy a significant boost. Yet it is likely to become increasingly difficult to find the money to maintain this important multi use track in good condition. The same applies to path networks throughout Perth & Kinross.

Likewise in tourist hot-spots like Pitlochry and Dunkeld, we need to ensure there are toilets available and that litter bins are regularly emptied and streets are kept clean and free of litter. This all takes extra resources. Surely the time has now come for Perth & Kinross Council to consider a tourist tax to help preserve these important parts of our tourism and leisure infrastructure and ensure a quality experience for our visitors? I don't think we should expect our citizens to pay further increases in council tax for such things. However, facilities do need to be maintained both for the thousands of people who come to Perth & Kinross to use them and for the local population.

Based on a 50% occupancy rate, and a tourist tax of £1 per night, the number of overnight beds available in Perth in Kinross would raise over £1 million per year. This excludes caravan sites and holiday rentals. Almost everywhere else in the world uses some form of tourist tax to maintain and enhance their facilities. I think Perth & Kinross should consider doing the same. I would welcome your views.

Double Yellow Lines

There are a number of outstanding requests for parking restrictions in various parts of Kinross. The orders for the Muirs/Gallowhill Road corner and a small section at the entrance to St Ronan's Drive should come before the Council's Enterprise & Infrastructure Committee in November. It is hoped that the other requests, for the entrance to Talla Park,



20mph Speed Limits

The new Council administration has adopted a more positive attitude towards the introduction of 20mph speed limits and a new policy is currently being drawn up. My view is that any street that could be described as a shared space i.e. where vehicles share the road with pedestrians as there are no or inadequate pavements, should automatically be considered for a 20mph speed limit. I am optimistic the new policy will agree with this.

New Rural Footways

There have been a number of requests for pavements and footways throughout Kinross-shire over the years. £300,000 was allocated to address the backlog of these in this year's Council budget. There are 110 different requests throughout Perth & Kinross. All have been ranked according to a number of criteria which include accident record, importance for vulnerable pedestrians, sustainable transport link and connectivity.

The installation of a pavement between the Turfhills Roundabout is ranked third on the list, so this should be installed this year. The creation of a pavement between Balado house and Balado Crossroads is ranked number 20, the building of a pavement from Gallowhill Road to the Stronachie road over the Ballingall bridge is ranked number 25 and a new pavement along the verge of the B996 north of Gairneybank to Gairneybank is number 33. If the funding continues these should all be done in the next 2 to 3 years.

Road Safety Delays

The Council have substantially increased the road safety budget to allow for more Vehicle Activated Signs and other road safety measures. There is also a substantial programme of road safety improvements being progressed for the A977 between Kinross and Blairingone. Although this is good news it has delayed other road safety projects. Amongst those in the pipeline are the raising of the pedestrian crossing in Springfield Road (to slow traffic) and various requests for double yellow lines, which I mentioned earlier. I have raised these delays with Council officers and have been assured measures will be put in place to get these outstanding projects carried out. The new crossing point in Gallowhill Road is programmed to be done this financial year.

Elizabeth Smith MSP For Mid Scotland and Fife

In early October, it was confirmed that snagging works are set to continue on the Queensferry Crossing until the autumn of 2019 - a full two years after it opened to the public. The snagging works have been



delayed significantly as a result of difficulties in mobilising resources. The current outstanding work includes cable maintenance, bearing remedial work and painting on the super structure - which won't take place until later this year. Snagging work is inevitable with any large infrastructure project but the length and scope of these issues is concerning. Average speeds on the bridge during evening and morning rush hour have barely improved since the bridge opened and there are concerns that these snagging works will result in even longer delays. There is no denying that the bridge is an architectural wonder but it was built to alleviate congestion and I know that a number of readers will want to see this realised, sooner or later.

Back in early autumn, I was pleased to read the results of a survey from the Office for National Statistics which showed that life satisfaction in Perth and Kinross is higher than the UK and Scottish national average.

People in the area ranked higher when it came to life satisfaction and happiness whilst also registering lower for anxiety. This placed Perth and Kinross above neighbouring Dundee, Fife and Stirling. What these statistics confirm, not that we needed them, is that Perth and Kinross is a fantastic place to live and work. However, there are challenges on the horizon. Access to services like top-quality healthcare and education will have a bearing on whether these rankings improve and it is important that admission to NHS treatment remains fast and convenient.

In October, I welcomed new funding arrangements which will mean NHS Tayside no longer has to honour their outstanding brokerage loans to the Scottish Government. This new process means that the cash-strapped health board will have greater financial manoeuvrability. A three-year budget process will allow health boards to run small deficits rather than reconciling budgets in-year. This is welcome news for both patients and healthcare administrators and I would hope that NHS Tayside uses this breathing space to put in place policies that can achieve long-term, sustainable healthcare. It is incredibly important that patients across rural parts of Perth and Kinross, have access to fast and efficient healthcare services and this clean slate should allow NHS Tayside to provide just that.

World Diabetes Day - 14 November


Diabetes mellitus, usually known simply as diabetes, is a common health condition. Diabetes is caused when the amount of glucose (sugar) in the blood is too high because the body is not able to convert glucose into energy properly. Our body creates glucose when we digest starchy foods such as bread, rice or potatoes. We also get glucose from sugar and other sweet foods. Normally, the pancreas (a gland near our stomach) releases a hormone called insulin. Insulin allows the glucose to enter our cells where it is converted into fuel for energy. When you have diabetes, your body does not make insulin, or does not make enough of it, and so the glucose cannot get into your cells to be turned into energy. This makes you feel tired and unwell. The main symptoms of untreated diabetes are increased thirst, going to the toilet all the time (especially at night), extreme tiredness, weight loss, genital itching or regular episodes of thrush, and blurred vision. The two main types of diabetes are:

- Type 1, which develops when the body is unable to produce any insulin.
- Type 2, which develops when the body can still produce insulin but not enough.

Over a long period of time, high levels of glucose can damage the heart, eyes, feet and kidneys. With the right treatment and care, diabetes can be managed and people can lead healthy lives.

Our nursing team includes three nurses who are trained in diabetes management and they run regular clinics for patients, most of whom have Type 2 diabetes. There is also a lot of information available to patients online. Diabetes UK (www.diabetes.org.uk) has information on the types of diabetes, how to prevent it and how to live with it. In addition, NHS Scotland has a website which provides personalised information for those diagnosed with diabetes.

Once registered, test results can be accessed in tables and graphs with explanations of the tests and goals can be set. There is also information on medication prescribed, and lifestyle advice. The service is completely free to use and uses industry-standard security. To register visit the website: www.mydiabetesmyway.scot.nhs.uk.



Cat Therapy

It's unlikely that your GP will prescribe the above. However, it's free and it's on your doorstep!

I want to let you in on one of Kinrossshire's best-kept secrets. In the tiny hamlet of Scotlandwell lies a very special place, a family run business, Causeway Cottage Cattery. Run by Rhonda Dick, the cattery caters for clients requiring holiday accommodation for their cats and also works with the Fife Cat Shelter who help homeless and abandoned cats find shelter, food and of course, a new home!

The cattery provides placements for young people doing their Duke of Edinburgh awards and also has vacancies for people who would like to work with cats. I am one of those volunteers and I take photos of the cats for the Cat Shelter website.

A couple of years ago I tried my hand at feline photography during a cold and wintry February. Against all advice, I had resigned from a job that was less than palatable, and I had no idea what would be on the horizon. I did know that no matter how uncertain things were looking, I wanted to do work that gave me a sense of purpose, whether paid or unpaid. At the cattery I was entranced by the beautiful rural scenery and a stillness that is quite breathtaking. It's a place of calm where you not only

meet cats but can watch horses grazing in the fields and enjoy the peace of the outdoors.

I wasn't sure how easy it was going to be to photograph a cat in an enclosure. However, I did experience the most interesting sense of positive energy. I observed how much the cats appreciate a little company and attention. After getting photos I was happy with, I left with a sense of satisfaction and achievement. Over the months I met



some of the other volunteers and young helpers. One volunteer said to me that he found the act of spending time with the cats just as therapeutic for him as it was for the cats.

This is the 'Moggie Magic' that I was starting to observe. I realised that these rescue cats were good for my wellbeing. By observing them I saw just how resilient they are. Some of them may only have three legs but they still

manage to jump up on your lap and enjoy all the attention you can give them. They don't let losing a limb stop their enjoyment of life!

Some of the cats need more TLC than others. The staff at the cattery are so busy, they are limited in the time that they can spend with the rescue moggies. I spoke with Sandy at the cattery and he said that he would welcome people if they wanted to come and spend a few hours a week with some of the cats. Volunteers need to be good with animals and experience of caring for cats is beneficial but not essential.

I saw this as a golden opportunity for those who may be experiencing stress or anxiety and would like to consider trying a little Cat Therapy to improve their wellbeing. The amazing thing about Cat Therapy is that the positive effects can be instantaneous, and this goes for working with nature, plants and all of the animal kingdom. If you are living in Kinross-shire, you are in the right place, because it's a natural place of healing. Just take a look around and you'll see it in the Standing Stones of Orwell farm, the Healing Well at Scotlandwell, the beautiful waterside walks, and the amazing views from the farm shops around the loch.

BLAIRINGONE PRIMARY SCHOOL CONSULTATION ON CLOSURE & CATCHMENT CHANGES


I write as one of the four elected members for the Kinrossshire Ward, having served my community continuously since 1999. During that time I have always campaigned for Blairingone School to be kept open and possibly its facilities enhanced. I remain opposed to closure at this time, believing the proposal to be premature and also wish to put forward an alternative option for consideration.


The proposal paper continually refers to static projections for pupil numbers at both Blairingone and Fossoway schools, although as we know such projections are not an exact science. Housebuilding proposed for the Fossoway Parish & Community Council area has been disregarded, seemingly based on past trends. This is not borne out by the facts as I know them.

Developer interest in Blairingone, Crook of Devon and Powmill is significant and our Local Development Plan 2, recently unanimously approved by PKC, contains phased zoning for up to 133 houses in these settlements, including an enhanced affordable housing element in Crook of Devon at 50%. Although Tayplan policy concentrates development to tiered settlements rather than rural villages, I believe it goes too far and results in a lack of sustainable development in smaller villages, particularly in relation to affordable houses. This is why local members in Kinross-shire have supported the above zonings and in the case of Blairingone would like to see more development within the phased period than that stated. This is also the view of the community in Blairingone following a public consultation exercise in February 2017 that I was heavily involved with, resulting in support for a masterplan approach in Blairingone that includes provision of sports facilities adjacent to the current school. I am aware that developers are in discussion with PKC's planning department regarding such, noting that the zoned site of 5.5 hectares has a median capacity range of up to 95 houses that there is definite developer interest in.

I made reference to this developer interest in my representations to the Education Committee but administration members had closed minds on the subject

and seemed intent on delivering a budgetary saving as a priority. Our planning department have singularly failed to state the correct position on developer interest, although they knew about it.

It is important to note that Blairingone School is the only community facility remaining in the village and I am totally opposed to its closure. The village has lost a number of facilities over the years and now requires regeneration, not regression. The local community council use the school building and other public meetings can be held there. The proposal suggests that most residents of Blairingone travel outwith the village for services and therefore closure of the school would not make that much difference; I disagree strongly with this statement and believe that PKC should be promoting the sustainability of rural communities; not the reverse.

I believe school closure is predicated on budgetary pressures to realise a capital receipt for the buildings on the open market

I note that the Schools Consultation Scotland Act 2010 clearly states a presumption to keep rural schools open and this proposal runs counter to government policy.

I note that 4 out of 5 children in Blairingone walk to school, which is excellent. I am not in support of transporting primary school children to their place of education, if it can be avoided. This proposal does not do that and instead proposes transport along the A977 to Fossoway School. It should be borne in mind that this road carries the highest number of heavy goods vehicles of any within the PKC area that we are responsible for and they are increasing, not forgetting to mention the state of this road in wintry conditions west of Rumbling Bridge, acknowledged by our roads superintendent. I note that the catchment area of Cleish Primary School does not seem to have been taken into account, when it is as close as the Fossoway catchment; why not?

The Independent Group of Councillors at PKC would like to see nursery provision at all rural schools, which would assist in bolstering primary school rolls with continuity and I believe this is supported by Scottish Government policy on improving provision. A recent closure of a private nursery in Powmill, for reasons I am unaware of, supports the need for enhanced provision and Blairingone School could accommodate same. I cannot comment on the educational benefits advocated in the proposal but I have received a number of emails from Blairingone parents and residents praising their school.

For all the above reasons, I oppose closure at this time and would like to see the outcome of the planning consultation locally on the masterplan for the village concluded before such a decision is made.

In my opening remarks, reference was made to an alternative option for consideration. I had not mentioned this prior to the statutory consultation because I have only recently been appraised of it through council colleagues and the media. I suggest the option of 'a shared headship' for Blairingone and Fossoway that would keep the school buildings used and also provide potential for enhancement, once the masterplan has been produced. I understand this model operates elsewhere in both PKC and Britain as a whole; it should be explored here.

Hare Coursing

Hare coursing has been illegal since 2004. Hare coursing tends to increase at this time of year after harvest when large areas of land have been cleared of crops. It usually occurs at dawn or dusk. By being aware of the potential for hare coursing you can assist police in fighting it by looking out for the following activity:

- Vehicles parked in rural areas at gateways to farmland, on farm tracks or bridleways.
- Vehicles are usually estate cars, four-wheel drive vehicles or small vans. They are often old tatty looking vehicles.
- Hare coursers usually walk along the edge or harvested fields to frighten the hares into the open space for the dogs to chase.

If you see hare coursing taking place, or suspect it is happening contact the police immediately. If you can, take a note of the vehicles and registration numbers, also how many people are present and a description of them. If the opportunity arises then continue to monitor any persons from a safe distance rather than challenging them of your own accord.

Kinross Community Council News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 3 October were: (CCllrs) B Freeman (Chair), D Colliar, D Cuthbert (Acting Secretary), B Davies, L McKay, T Stewart and D West, P&K Councillors (Cllrs) C Purves, R Watters and three members of the public. **Apologies** were received from: CCllrs M Blyth. J Bryson. I

Police Report: A report had been sent by email to the Community Council in advance of the meeting. Reported items included a break-in at Baynes the Bakers and a glass pane smashed at the bus stop outside Kinross High School. It was also noted that, anyone wishing to raise any policing issues, should email PC Stapleton or PC Spalding.

Resignation of Secretary: Eileen Thomas wrote to the Community Council on 26 September, resigning as a Member of the Community Council and as Secretary. The matter was discussed and members expressed regret at Eileen's resignation. It was agreed that a letter would be written to her thanking her for her service and wishing her well in her retirement.

The Chair indicated that a member of the public had approached him with a view to becoming the Community Council's Minute Secretary. This came from the Community Council's advert in the Newsletter. CCllr McKay said that she had asked one member of the public whose dog had made a mess if they would like to pick it up, to save her having to spray it. Apparently, the dog mess was cleaned up.

Provost Lamp: Discussion on this matter was postponed to the next meeting as Cllr Robertson was not present.

CC Boundaries: Cllr Watters indicated that a new Scheme of Administration for Community Councils had been debated at a P&K Council meeting held earlier in the day. This incorporated the possibility of Community Council Boundary Changes, though it was unclear when this would be implemented.

Community Investment Fund: CCIIr Cuthbert asked for clarification on the deadline for applications for funding from this £50,000 fund. Cllr Watters informed the meeting that the deadline had been moved from the middle of November to the middle of February, by the Action Partnership. CCllr Colliar expressed disappointment on hearing this, as he had submitted an application on behalf of Light up Kinross, which he had hoped would be made available prior to Christmas. Cllr Watters advised that the guidance which had been issued was unclear and the Action Partnership felt they needed clarification prior to accepting applications. Cllr Purves indicated that the guidance needed tightening up and cited several examples where it could be better worded. Cllr Purves went on to say that the Guidance which had been issued did not reflect the spirit of the fund which was set up by the Council, he had been informed that the guidance was an operational matter which Councillors should not be involved in. It was felt by several people present that the fund had been hijacked by officers. Further concerns were raised over the Action Partnership being involved in screening applications for this fund, given the problems with the last Participatory Budgeting event. Cllr Purves agreed to find out how the screening would be taking place. CCIIr Cuthbert asked for a copy of the guidance on the fund. Cllr Watters agreed to send this to the Community Council.

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration

Review of Project: Cllr Barnacle was not present at the meeting, so this matter will be carried forward to the next meeting.

20mph Signs: Cllr Purves noted that half the work had been done on the signs at the junction of Station Road and High Street (the poles and lights being up, but the signs being absent). He agreed to raise this with the Council and revert back with an update.

Old Causeway Car Park: This work is ongoing.

Electrics: CCllr Freeman advised that the catches to the cabinet doors were still not fixed. Cllr Purves agreed to follow this up.

Avenue Road and Talla Park: A Member of the Public indicated that the Roads Department had agreed to changes to the yellow lines in the Avenue Road/Tall Park area and consultation on the proposals was due to commence imminently.

Former Kinross High School: A brief discussion took place on the speed of development of the former High School building. Cllr Watters agreed to find out if the Bond was still held by the Council.

Reports from P&K Councillors

Priorities at the junction of Springfield Road and Muirs: Cllr Watters reported that this was being considered by the roads department and they would be reverting back to the Community Council soon.

Funding for CC's: Cllr Watters advised that funding for Community Councils had been raised at the full P&K Council earlier in the day by Cllr Robertson and Cllr Anderson (of Almond and Earn) and that a review had been acceded to by officers.

EU Nationals: Cllr Watters reported that the matter of EU Nationals being able to stand on Community Councils had been discussed at the earlier Council meeting. It was noted that the Scottish Government were carrying out an electoral review in the matter.

Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils: Cllr Purves reported on the debate concerning Community Councils at the Council meeting earlier in the day. He advised that P&K pay one of the lowest per capita amounts to Community Councils in the country.

Davies Park: Cllr Purves reported that improvements to the park are scheduled for 2019/20. There will be a consultation exercise prior to any work and the Council would welcome the formation of a Friends of Davies Park Group. CCllr Colliar pointed out that Dr Davies from Kinross Community Council had raised the funds to equip the park originally, which is why it was called the Davies Park. He also informed the meeting that the land for the park had been gifted to Kinross. A question was raised as to whether the park is included in the Common Good Register for Kinross. As this was not known, CCllr Cuthbert agreed to write to P&K Council to ask if this is the case.

Benches at the Myre: Cllr Purves reported that he had spoken to officers and they hoped to be able to progress with the benches at the Myre.

Reports from CC Representatives

Kinross Community Council Newsletter Fund: CCllr Davies reported that 10 applications had been received for funding from the profits made by the Kinross Community Council Newsletter.

Loch Leven Community Campus: CCllr Davies asked what was being done about the very poor utilisation of the Campus. Cllr Purves indicated that the charging policy had become more flexible. He advised that there would be a meeting of the Kinross-shire Forum of Community Councils to discuss who should take a seat on the Campus Management Group representing all six Kinross-shire Community Councils. This seat to be held for one year (four meetings) and to then revert to another Community Council (this mechanism having been arrived at by the four Campus Leaders). Finally, he advised that another review of campuses was being undertaken.

Hayfield Garden: CCllr McKay reported on the destruction of the wildlife garden. She had reported it to the police as a wildlife crime, but unfortunately, they were not going to take it forward due to a lack of resources.

Wilson Court: CCllr McKay raised the issue of cars parking in the turning circle at Wilson Court.

Remembrance Parade: CCllr McKay asked if there was a fund available for the centenary celebration of Armistice Day. Apparently, there isn't.

P&K School Holidays: CCllr Colliar asked that Councillors make representation to officers following a request that P&K school holiday dates should be brought into alignment with Angus school holiday dates. He asked that they ensure that the dates chosen should not cause the dates to vary with Fife any more than they currently do.

Town Clock: It was noted that the town clock had been an issue on Facebook and that the clock had restarted, but no longer lit up. Cllr Purves had asked an officer to report on the ownership of the Clock Tower. Once this has been established, the owner of the clock will be asked to make it work satisfactorily.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council takes place on Wednesday 7 November 2018, at 7.30pm, in the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

Police matters: No police were in attendance.

Matters arising

Wester Loan flats: The bright exterior lights on the new flats are still to be checked to see if they cause an environmental health issue for neighbouring residents. Cllr Purves has raised the matter of a survey for flooding at the Stackyard but no action yet.

Milnathort in Bloom contacted MCC on the state of **Tillywhally woods** but could not offer any help in rectifying the issues raised. Cllr Robertson suggested contacting the council's unpaid works team.

David Drysdale bequest: Cllr Kirkham advised that several local groups had applied for funding from the £5000 legacy left by David Drysdale to benefit the local community. Following discussion and feedback from members of the

public, it was decided that CCTV at the Cross, sound panels in the Town Hall, improvements to Tillywhally Wood and Christmas lights were all projects worthy of a contribution. Cllr Robertson suggested setting up a local paths group with funding paying for equipment. The fate of the legacy of £5000 will be decided at the November meeting. Anyone with an opinion on this matter should come to the next meeting.

CCIIr Lawson proposed that we put together a bid for an **innovative event** with money from the Community Investment Fund or Rural Events Fund to create a unique spectacle with moving images (using historical photos of the town) projected onto key buildings, perhaps the Town Hall, in conjunction with a street market and ceilidh.

Cllr Leach asked for **speed checks** to be carried out in Burleigh Road and raised the issue of the vehicle-activated sign in South Street still not being activated. Cllr Purves replied that the roads department do not have the capacity, and this has led to the delay. Cllr Robertson suggested taking a photo of the car's registration plate if you feel they have been speeding and send it to him.

Apologies: H Somerville, Cllr Barnacle, R Cairney and P&K Cllr Purves.

Crime Prevention: There was nothing in the Cleish and Blairadam CC area that had been reported but there had been a quad bike stolen from near Knockhill. The CC get sent the Commanders Bulletin and Fran would like to link this to our website so that all can get the benefit.

The **World War 1 Committee** discussed at the last meeting are still looking for a representative from the CC and Fran has volunteered to go to next meeting on 8 October.

Financial Update: Our new treasurer is still waiting to get correct access to the accounts but has reported that we received our top up grant from Perth and Kinross Council and to date we have £700 in the bank.

Newsletter: There was discussion regarding the printing and folding of the newsletters and it was suggested that perhaps the CC buy a colour printer to help with this.

The subject of the **proposed change of boundaries** was raised and there is a meeting at PKC in Perth regarding the process of consultation. This matter to be kept on the agenda.

Blairadam: There is only one pavement in Keltybridge and it is in a very poor state. Cllr Robertson to action this.

Cleish: The pop-up pub night was very successful. Parking issues associated with the school are ongoing. It was suggested that a trial exclusion zone may be considered but due to the fact that the school is on a through road this would not be possible. Fran will go and talk to the school assembly regarding this issue. This matter to be kept on the agenda.

AOCB

The school are registered with the Community heartbeat trust and are responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the defibrillator machine. The machine is also registered with the ambulance service so if we ever need to use it the ambulance will know where it is.

There seems to be an increase in the lights and number of caravans at Templeton cottages, this will be monitored.

The Maryburgh road is to be closed for work by British Telecom. Further details were unavailable at this time.

As part of the Perth and Kinross Council School Transformation Programme Cleish PS will be due a review in late 2018, early 2019. There is generally a presumption to keep rural schools open.

The next meeting of Cleish and Blairadam CC will take place on 26 November 2018 at 7.30pm in the Tabernacle Hall.

Portmoak Community Council News from the October Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 9 October 2018 were: CCllrs: M Strang Steel (Chairman), R Cairncross (Secretary), S Ford, D Morris, A Muszynski and T Smith and Cllr W Robertson and six members of the public.

Apologies: CCllrs B Calderwood, Cllrs M Barnacle, C Purves & R Watters and PC D Stapleton, Police Scotland.

Matters Arising

School Access - policy on parking and safe access routes for children. Following the site meeting on 16 April, where matters had again been reviewed, there had been no progress. The CC had welcomed the opportunity to comment on a Report to be made to the Environment and Infrastructure Committee but to date there had been no Report on which to comment. The matters of both children's safety and improved access to the school along Buchan Avenue remained unaddressed. The problem appeared to reflect lack of capacity within the PKC Road's Department to take this work forward. Limited resource meant that this matter was a low priority for PKC. The CC will write to the Chair of the Committee alerting him to the CC's concern.

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church, Hall and beyond.

PKC has referred the initial steps back to the CC to do preliminary work on an option appraisal of possible routes. Any further progress would be reported in due course.

Resilience - being better prepared for risks. Community Emergency Plan. CCllr Muszynski reported that the Plan was evolving: identifying a core group to take matters forward; development of a draft Plan for comment; and, working with the Resilience Unit at PKC, identifying necessary resources and how to secure them. He noted that a service level agreement to have a generator to allow the Hall to function as a Resilience Hub would involve a consequential requirement to keep roads open. The CC noted the helpful input of the PKC Resilience Officer into this process.

Review of Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils.

- 1) **Consultation** PKC has recently circulated proposed amendments to the Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils for consultation. The CC will respond before the closing date of 3 December.
- 2) **Proposed changes to CC boundaries** Portmoak proposal to include part of Loch Leven within the CC's boundary: Following discussions with Kinross and Milnathort CCs, Cllr Purves is exploring the matter further with PKC.

Moss Road Car Park. The Chairman reported that this matter would be taken forward over the next two months.

New CC member. The Chairman reported that a proposed co-optee, Graham Cox of Scotlandwell, had been approved by PKC as a suitable member of the CC by PKC. He therefore proposed that Graham Cox be co-opted to fill the vacancy on the CC. This was unanimously approved. Mr Cox would join the CC at its next meeting. The CC warmly welcomed Graham.

Police Report: The local police report was noted. The Area Commander's Bulletins of 15, 22, 29 August, 5, 12, 19, 26 September and 3 October were also noted.

Treasurer Report: The balance at the month ending 30 September was £655 in the General Account; and £1,523.96 in the Michael Bruce Way Account giving a total of £2,178.96. The new "Holding Account" No. 3 held £1500.

Planning

New applications:

FIFE 18/02342/ARC Westfield, Energy Recover Facility: Report of meeting with developer and residents of B9097 - plus progress with: **16/03661/FUL** (overall site development); **17/03377/FUL** (10 gas engines); and **18/02027/FUL** (Biomass plant variation of conditions).

The Chairman reported on a meeting between the Developers and residents of the B9097 hosted by RSPB Loch Leven. The Developers could not but recognise the considerable concerns expressed regarding road safety and the need for resource to mitigate these risks. The developers had been urged to review the report supporting the in-principle planning application into the effect of pollution from vehicle emissions, including particulates, in light of changed standards in the two years since the report had been prepared.

In discussion the following were acknowledged in respect of this Energy from Waste (EfW) application:

- The Developers had as yet not published a Phasing Plan for the overall site development. Whilst the planning permission allowed for matters specified in conditions to be approved in phases, those phases had to be as defined in the overall Phasing Plan. (Condition 2, Planning Permission In Principle). No such Plan has yet been submitted.
- There was a need for improvements to be made to the B9097 by PKC before work on the site commenced.
- There was concern that there was potentially considerable over-capacity of such incinerators in Scotland; and that, although EfW replaces energy generated from other fossil fuels, it is not of itself a renewable energy source. Given recent pressure to increase targets from energy derived from renewable energy there was a need for the Scottish Government to review its guidance on EfW.
- The need to establish the Community Liaison Group soon.
- Planning Advice Note 63 encourages developers to identify the origins of the waste to be processed but this is left unclear by the applicants.

The CC will comment accordingly to Fife Council and write to Scottish Minsters seeking that they review current Guidance on EfW capacity and also consider whether the Westfield proposed developments complied with Planning Advice Note

18/01723/LBC, **18/01722/FLL**. Barley Riggs, Easter Balgedie, Alterations, and an extension. No comment.

18/01594/FLL. Bishopton, Wester Balgedie, Formation of vehicular access. No comment.



18/01704/FLL. Loch Glow, Kinnesswood, Alterations to dwellinghouse. The CC had no objection in principle to the plans to alter the garage but felt that the size and type of windows for the remainder of the renovations merited review. It would comment accordingly.

18/01643/LAW. Balneathal Farm Easter Balgedie, Formation of silage pit. No comment.

18/01520/FLL. Tighnuilt, The Cobbles, Kinnesswood. Alterations and extension. No comment.

18/01477/FLL. Land 100 metres SW of Liathach, Leslie. Erection of 2 camping pods. The CC noted that this venture into glamping was new to Portmoak. The application had been refused.

18/01446/FLL. The Grange, Leslie Road Scotlandwell. Extension to Garage. Consent had been granted subject to approval of cladding to the new build.

18/01438/ADV. Land 30 metres NW of Bishopshire Golf Club. Display of a sign. Consent had been granted. No comment.

Progress with Developments:

17/0227/FLL. Levenmouth, Scotlandwell. The lack of a response from the Chairwoman of the Development Management Committee to the letter from the CC Chair on this matter was disappointing. Cllr Robertson will pursue the matter with her.

18/00667/FL 18/00666/CON. Former Lomond Inn, Kinnesswood. The Chair and Deputy Chair had met with the developer. Following the withdrawal of his recent application to demolish the old inn and to replace it with a new dwellinghouse, a revised application was pending. It was possible that, whatever the outcome to this outstanding application, the development would be marketed as serviced plots for individual development. The CC remained concerned at the time taken to secure a resolution to the planning process for this development and the resultant deterioration of the old inn. The CC will write to PKC signalling concern for the long term development of the site were delay to continue.

Friar Place junction with B920. CCllr Forde reported that the Leylandii hedge planted alongside the now lowered fence was impacting on the visibility splays for that junction. This had been reported to the PKC. A similar problem was noted in Kinnesswood where an overgrowing hedge was obscuring views southwards along the A911 when exiting Bruce Road.

Roads

The Road's Report was deferred to the November Meeting. A sign on the B920 approaching Scotlandwell advising of a "traffic calmed area" had been reported to PKC as damaged and requiring replacement.



Paths

CCIIr Tom Smith reported that the new gate now installed above the water tank on the MBW had been funded by the Morris McIntyres in memory of their daughter, Esme; TRACKS will provide assistance with the installation of a further gate on Balneathal hill land; and that a flailing machine supplied by PKC had made the cuts of the Peat Loan much easier only two being required this year. Dryside Road remained to be maintained but there was passage through albeit across a closed gate and along a route bordered by an electric fence. CCIIr Smith would explore how grass cutting along the route from the Cobbles to the School could be reinstated.

CCIIr Morris reported that tree felling around the radar dome at the top of Munduff Hill had left a path blocked and increased the visual impact of the radar mast. After consultation with the Forestry Commission and the timber management company, Tilhill, the path had been cleared. In the future there would be improved contact with the community before commencing such work and Tilhill had agreed to set up a meeting to discuss this.

PKC Ward Cllr Reports

Cllr Robertson reported that a new CEO for PKC, Karen Reid, had taken up post. He reported that: preliminary assessment for the budget for 2019 onwards could be tighter than before; and that the current administration was considering the introduction of 20mph limits on a trial basis.

Questions from the floor

Community Investment Fund (£50,000 annually for two years) for Kinross. The CC learned that the closing date had been extended and would consider making an application. WCllr W Robertson noted that CCllr Forde would be willing to represent the CC on the committee assessing applications. Kinross Civic Trust Awards. The CC would draw the matter of competing in the Best Kept Hamlet competition to the attention of the Residents' Group at Glenlomond.

AOCB

The CC offered its warm congratulations to Kinnesswood in Bloom for their spectacular wins in both the Scottish national (Beautiful Scotland) and the Take a Pride in Perthshire competitions. Silver Gilt best village awards are impressive and all the more so as they have repeated this achievement in successive years.

The next meeting of Portmoak CC will be held at 7.30pm on Tuesday 13 November in Portmoak Village Hall, Scotlandwell.

Fossoway and District CC

News from the October Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 2 October 2018 were: Community Cllrs A Cheape, J Donachie, C Farquhar, G Pye (chair) and associate member T Carroll; P&K Cllrs, C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters and ten members of the public. Apologies: CCllr T Duffy and CCllr C Brown; P&K Cllr M Barnacle.

Police report: Unfortunately, no officer was able to be present. There were two incidents to note in our area since the last CC Meeting from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch. Between Wednesday 5 September and Saturday 8 September, a wire fence around a field containing horses was damaged near to Whistlemount, Powmill. As a result of the damage a number of horses escaped from the field. Between 8am, Monday 17 September and 8am the following morning, a chain and padlock which were securing a field gate at Blairingone were cut off and removed.

Chief Superintendent Paul Anderson has moved from the Division to a new post. From Monday 3 September, Chief Superintendent Andrew Todd has taken on the role of Divisional Commander for Tayside Division.

Matters Arising

Blairingone School Estate Transformation: Statutory consultation meetings were held on Thursday 6 September at Fossoway Primary School and Tuesday 18 September at Blairingone Primary School. Tam Carroll, associate member of this CC and CCIIr Farquhar attended the Blairingone meeting. Associate member Carroll stated that in his view the meeting was fruitless and PKC representatives were not interested in local opinion. CCIIr Farquhar reported that the purpose of the meeting was to set out the procedures for closure of the school and accordingly, to move pupils to Fossoway Primary School. Also, the purpose of the meeting was to provide an opportunity for interested parties to make their views known and these views would be accounted for. CCIIr Farquhar stressed that the meeting was about closing the school and that PKC representatives were not there to respond to arguments about retaining the school. Cllr Watters emphasised that the recommendation from PKC is to close the school. The statutory consultation period is to enable comments to be registered, noted and taken forward. Cllr Watters stated that comments could be made via the PKC website and the closing day for the consultation is Friday 5 October. The next step in the process would be Education



Scotland looking at the proposals, alongside the outcome of the Statutory Consultation and recommendations would be made to PKC. Ultimately PKC will have the final say regarding the closure of Blairingone school.

Lambhill: Planning application 17/02015/FLL to place a static caravan on the site was refused on 11 January. The applicant appealed to the LRB who upheld the decision, and this was made public on 12 September.

Powmill in Bloom: CCllr Farquhar reported that the group had not met since the last CC meeting, however a get-together to tidy up is planned for Sunday 7 October. A meeting is also planned for November to decide how the Bloom Groups can support one another regarding the Best Kept Village Competition.

Crook and Drum Growing Together: CCllr Farquhar reported that Amanda James, from Crook and Drum Growing Together, had informed her that the group were pleased to receive a bronze award on their first entry in the Beautiful Scotland Competition and a silver award for the Take a Pride in Perth & Kinross Competition. The group are concerned about an area of shrubs near West Crook Way and will consult with PKC to see how this area can be tidied up and maintained.

Hydro Scheme Fund: The CC has been notified that the Hydro Scheme's AGM will be on 27 October; there will also be a tour of the site, probably starting at 2pm from the Village Hall. More information will be forthcoming.

Powmill Play Park: CCllr Farquhar reported that there has been no movement on this item.

Fossoway Gathering: CCllr Duffy passed on the information that this CC will be the lead organisation for the Gathering.

Blairingone War Memorial: A new planning application for the realignment of the vehicular access at Blairingone church has been submitted and if successful may assist in moving this forward.

Ivy Cottage - A MoP asked if a freedom of information request could be made to PKC to find out if council tax is paid on this property. Discussion ensued however there is no clear-cut way of dealing with the cottage as the owners live outwith the UK.

Matters Arising with no update since last meeting:

Crook Moss Travellers Site, A977 Mitigation, and LDP2: No information at present.

New Business

Blairingone Parking: A MoP reported to this CC that vehicles are frequently parked on the pavement in the village, both obscuring the view of other drivers of pedestrians on the crossing and requiring pedestrians to walk in the road instead of using the pavement. The problem is worst early in the morning (before 7am) and in the evening (after 5pm.) Cllr Watters has contacted the police about speeding cars in the village and they are committed to making Blairingone a priority. Cllr Watters will also contact the police regarding the issue of vehicles parked on the pavement. Cllr Robertson mentioned that a way of dealing with this would be for the CC to write back to the MoP, who should then take photos of the cars and email the photos to Cllr Robertson, who would then contact the police.

Carnbo Speeding: A MoP has contacted this CC to report on the increase in number of speeding vehicles passing through the village. Although it is proposed to install Vehicle Actuated Speed signs in Carnbo, they are not scheduled until next year. CCllr Pye asked if there was any way this could be brought

forward. Cllr Robertson stated that there is a budget for this, however the money has been used up for this year. Cllr Robertson agreed to look into this.

Crook of Devon Village Hall: CCllr Donachie noted that the bottle banks in the recycling area in the hall car park are surrounded by broken glass, extending to parts of the car park itself. Cllr Robertson undertook to look into this.

Community Council Business - Meetings Attended

Sports Hub: CCIIr Farquhar reported that all the activities previously reported were moving forward successfully and that she was encouraged by what is happening in the Kinrossshire area.

Community Investment Fund: A meeting of the Community Investment Fund will be held in January 2019 and CCIIr Cheape will represent the CC at this.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Willie Robertson: Cllr Robertson reported that at a recent TRACKS meeting the costing of the new bridge over the River Devon was discussed and this was not as expensive as was first anticipated. The bridge will need to be higher than the previous bridge to avoid flood damage. A meeting is to be organised to decide on the definitive location of the bridge which CCllr Duffy and CCllr Pye will attend.

Richard Watters: Cllr Watters reported that there will be a full council meeting on 3 October and a motion was to be considered regarding EU nationals and nominations to enable them to sit on Community Councils. This will mean changing the current rules. Mechanisms will also need to be put into place to allow EU nationals to be able to vote in elections.

B9097 & U241: A MoP asked why the speed restriction on the B9097 has not yet been changed to 40mph. The MoP also enquired as to why the U241 has not had the speed restriction changed to 20mph. The MoP has corresponded with PKC regarding this, but nothing has been done. Cllr Robertson will act on this.

Community Transport initiative: A MoP stated that two local taxis organisations have now withdrawn from this scheme. Cllr Robertson said that rural transport has issues, but this was a definite concern. Cllr Watters will look into this.

A977: A MoP asked about looking into the signage on the A977. Signs directed traffic along this route and yet the plan by PKC was to make the A977 a less desirable route to travel on. No action was agreed for this.

VAS: A MoP stated that the vehicle activated signs were not slowing the traffic down on some occasions. Cllr Robertson advised the MoP to take a photo of the car, with the VAS speed limit sign in clear view and email this to him. Cllr Robertson said he will alert the police to this.



Breakfasters told "when other people fail you, the hill road never fails"





The weather may have been cold on Wednesday 3 October, but at the Kinross-shire Partnership networking breakfasts, a bright, warm welcome awaited the 20 plus local businesses who attended.

Networkers were greeted by local businessmen Richard Scott and Archie Hipwell, before enjoying a hearty breakfast. Over 20 local companies and organisations seized the opportunity to make contacts with other local professionals, with each breakfaster introducing their products or services in turn.

The wealth of entrepreneurial talent residing in Kinross-shire never ceases to amaze at these events, and this month's

post-prandial speaker, Drew Drummond of Drummond International, proved no exception. A specialist in leadership and conflict resolution, accredited mediator and Patron of the Scottish Centre for Conflict Resolution, Drew split his presentation into three parts.

First he outlined the services provided by Drummond International. After joining the company in 2009, initially on a part-time basis, Drew quickly found himself designing, creating and delivering executive coaching courses to middle management—a job which he found he enjoyed and was good at. His skillset expanded rapidly to include conflict resolution, and he also focused on an area which particularly interested him: the science behind adverse childhood experiences and their effect on mental health and wellbeing.

In the second part of his presentation, Drew shared several challenges that he has faced, including finding a balance between paid and *pro bono* work; working in a family business; and recognising that when pitching to someone, that person may not pass your message on effectively to the decision-maker.

The third part of Drew's impressive presentation focused on the failure of many humans to practise sufficient selfmonitoring in life as well as at work. He stressed the importance of taking time for self-care, and advised the audience to ensure they had a 'hill road' - a practice advocated by former Labour PM Ramsay MacDonald. By 'hill road' MacDonald meant somewhere familiar you can go to be alone, in silence, to think. The other important advice proffered by Drew was to find a 'trusted other - someone to whom you can go at any time, who won't laugh at your dreams or mock your failings – and to ensure you remember to tell them they are your trusted other and to thank them for their support. Drew highlighted his own personal experience of having someone in his life who played such a role, and the difference it made to his progress. Kinross-shire Partnership Chairman Alisdair Stewart summed it up perfectly when he referred to Drew's presentation as "superbly and sincerely delivered".





Kinross Museum

Continuing its survey of memorial stones in the churchyards of Kinross-shire, our volunteers have completed this summer's



study in the small Old Orwell Kirkyard. Of the 23 memorial stones, mostly dating from the 17th century, the two most interesting stones remember the Milnathort Covenanter Robert Stirk and John Henderson, farmer at Middleton, who was murdered by Robert, the Master of Burleigh. The story that the murder weapon, a pitchfork, was carved on the gravestone but hidden below ground was verified as true.

The Museum continues to provide information to various Kinross-shire parish groups organising events to mark 100 years since the signing of the Armistice that brought hostilities to an end in 1918. The Kinross-shire Roll of Honour, compiled by Sgt Alastair G Smith, continues to provide valuable information on those men of the county who were killed in action during the Great War. On display in the Museum, our exhibition ('Lest we Forget') continues.

At our October meeting, we welcomed back Graeme Cruickshank who talked about 'A Kaleidoscope of Scottish Ceramics'. Graeme's slide show certainly included a mixed bag of Scottish pottery. He told us how the main Scottish potteries (which generally started in the mid nineteenth century), were all located within the concentrated band of the central belt stretching across from the Forth to the Clyde. Local clay was used and, as is generally presumed, the potteries were sited near the clay pits. Later on, coal was an important factor in pottery locations.

We were treated to such a variety of ceramics from the first basic designs for domestic use, through fairly common blue and white, to some more ornately patterned objects. Items ranged from pots, jugs, snuff and tobacco jars, to a 'piggy bank' in the shape of a cottage. Some of the pottery names were familiar to us, such as Wemyss and Dunmore. Graeme even had a picture of a very original ceramic tombstone. It was made for a gamekeeper in the shape of a tree. The last slide showed a Glasgow

pottery plate stamped on the reverse Kapal Basar. This was unusual as the print was applied in two colours. Graeme is always such an informative speaker and knowshis subjects well. Our next meeting will be on **Wednesday 14 November** at Fossoway Church Hall from 7.30pm.

Recent Speakers

Barry Dougall talked to us about Kinross Youth Enterprise (KYTHE). This local project has been running for two years, in conjunction with the Scripture Union Scotland. Barry joined it in January 2017. He is a professional Christian youth worker, having trained at university in London two days a week, while still living in Kinross!

The aim is to provide youth support through innovative projects which focus mainly on music activities at present. This can involve band camps, music groups, holidays with scripture unions, one-to-one counselling with youths and other activities. Barry works with Kinross High School students and increasing numbers of primary schools. Right now he is looking for funding for a social space for young people to use in Kinross. Check the project out on Facebook. Bela Simandi of the Cupar club gave a most moving talk called 'Hungary: My Early Years'. This was a first person narrative about his experiences as a child in Hungary. In 1944 he was living with his parents in Buda (the west part of Budapest) when it was occupied by Germans under attack by the Soviets. He recalled details such as having to spend nights in the cellar of their apartment building due to shelling. One morning he came out to see that the front of the building had been destroyed by the shelling and he could see into all the rooms "like a giant doll's house" as he put it. Despite this the children of the area all still played outside and explored the city quite freely. Also, as an amazing insight, the family had first German, then later Soviet, tanks quartered near them. Despite the ferocious military reputation of these troops, outside the fighting environment they were kind to the children and played with them.

Then in 1956, when Hungary had a relaxed communist regime, he was caught up in the Hungarian Uprising against Soviet control. At first this seemed to be successful but the Soviet regime poured in more troops and defeated the revolt. By this time his parents had decided to leave Hungary and move to England where they had relatives. To do this they had to first cross into Austria by train and then walk across the border. Although they were caught and held for a while, the Hungarian border police released them and even gave them advice on how best to get across the border! When they got to Vienna the British Embassy was more than happy to help refugees such as them. The Embassy even flew them to England, put them up in a hotel and then put them on to a train to Yorkshire where their relatives lived. And his family has lived here ever since!

It's been a bumper year for fruit in Kinross-shire. By the end of September many people in the area felt they couldn't move for apples. A record harvest meant that most people with apple trees were beginning to struggle to store all the fruit. We were very happy to direct their feet towards Portmoak Village Hall where we held our Apple Day on 30 September. Well over one hundred people came along.

Portmoak Community Woodland Group manage the community orchard in Kilmagad Wood and collected hundreds of apples for turning into juice and home baking. We had everything from apple frangipane tart to apple flap jacks, apple brownies and apple cup cakes. Florence Thomson made a lovely shiny batch of toffee apples and we were especially grateful to her as, sadly, she had very recently lost her husband.

People came from miles around bringing bags of their own apples. With the help of Andrew Lear's big apple press they were all turned into beautiful, fresh juice. Andrew, aka 'appletreeman', from Bankfoot in Perthshire, spent nearly three hours identifying apples brought by people who had long since forgotten what they had planted in their gardens, or had inherited a variety they couldn't name.

The grass in the new play area, across the road in the orchard, wasn't quite ready for a public event but the children had plenty to distract them in the hall where, apart from all the baking, there were lots of apple-themed games.

Now our attention turns to Portmoak Moss. We're looking forward to our annual **Christmas Tree event** which will take place on **Sunday 16 December** from 11am to 1.30pm. This has become a tradition for many people, especially families, who enjoy coming and choosing a tree, which we cut down for them. For newcomers, all you have to do is come to the Scotlandwell entrance to the Moss, follow the arrows to our Christmas tree site and take the tree away with you in return for a donation to woodland funds. There will be hot drinks and festive baking.

As well as getting into the Christmas spirit, you are helping to do your bit for our peat bog restoration project. The self-seeded conifers are not wanted on the bog as they take too much water and dry it out.

Kinross & District Probus Club

The club met on 19 September and enjoyed a presentation by Roger Stark entitled: 'It's not my fault, it's my epi-genetics.' When the club has a presentation from Roger we know we are in for something different; he never disappoints. He is always interesting, full of facts, often humorous and never dull.

Roger gave the club a talk on Epigenetics and explained how we develop our unique DNA. He then went on to describe how and what makes us develop traits that appear to have come from one parent or another, maybe even skipping a generation. We inherit two copies of each of our genes - one from each parent. In most cases both of the genes in a pair are active. But about 60 of our genes are selectively expressed. This means that only one of the pair of genes, from one of your parents, is active. Somehow the cells in your body 'know' which parent these genes came from. This 'genetic imprinting' seems to involve adding chemical tags - called methyl groups - to the DNA chain. Scientists are still uncovering why certain genes are imprinted in this way and others are not.

So it's not just genes that make us. In its modern sense, epigenetics is the

term used to describe inheritance by mechanisms other than through the DNA sequence of genes. It works through chemical tags added to chromosomes that in effect switch genes on or off.

Roger presented this subject in a highly engaging way and although it is a very complex subject, we all left feeling we knew a little bit more about why we are who we are, and perhaps where some of our strange habits and behaviours come from.

The vote of thanks was given by Harry McLennan.

On 3 October father and daughter duo Paul and Eleanor Baughan gave us a fascinating insight into their journey to Malawi, which was inspired by a talk given by Tearfund to "Crossfire", the Kinross Parish Church youth group of which Eleanor is a member. Tearfund had been working in Malawi for a number of years and Eleanor and her fellow youth group friends decided that a trip to Malawi would give them a better understanding of how overseas aid could make a lasting difference in this highly populated and poor country. After a series of fundraising activities a group from Crossfire headed off for what was to be a life-changing experience. Eleanor and Paul described large communities with very basic healthcare facilities, rural villages with no electricity or water supplies, high levels of corruption and low wages. These are



challenging conditions which we would not tolerate or be able to cope with, but in Malawi it's normal and Paul and Eleanor found that people just get on with life.

Tearfund Projects were trying to improve the situation and leave a legacy of support. There is little point in supplying machinery unless there is back-up if and when it goes wrong, or in supplying medicines that are almost out of date by the time they arrive.

Eleanor and Paul travelled to various locations, even staying overnight in the rural village of Kanyazuka, a desperately poor part of Africa.

Back home they reflected on their trip and Eleanor confirmed it was life-changing and that Crossfire would be working with renewed vigour to support organisations like Tearfund. Paul, a GP in Dollar, would certainly be less critical of the resources he has in comparison to the young doctor he met in Ekwendeni Hospital who had a community of 75,000 to support.

It was a trip of a lifetime and one which will influence them for years to come. The vote of thanks was given by Duncan Stenhouse.

The Hundred Days Campaign was the final period of the First World War during which the Allies launched a huge counter offensive against the Central Powers on the Western Front from 8 August to 11 November 1918, beginning with the Battle of Amiens.

In some of the most bitter fighting of the entire war, the Germans were pushed out of France to retreat beyond the Hindenberg Line. This would bring the Great War to a close with the Armistice being signed at 11am on the eleventh month in 1918. We will also hear the story of how how a young 23-year-old from Wigtown won the Victoria Cross, but never lived to hear that news.

Andy was in the Kings Own Scottish Borderers for 33 years, serving all over the world, including three Far East tours in Malaysia and Borneo. He was an instructor at the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst, CO in Edinburgh, and did several Ireland operational tours, a six months operational tour in Belize, and three tours in Germany during the Cold War.

450g floury potatoes, peeled and cooked ½ teaspoon salt 50g butter 100g self-raising flour


Method

Kinross-shire Historical Society

Mr James Lawson from Queensferry Heritage Trust gave the first talk of the winter season, "Rooted in Royalty at the Queensferry Crossing". The talk was illustrated with video pictures and audio sections and built up a picture of North Queensferry over the centuries.

He began by showing illustrations of the Light Tower, a small lighthouse in North Queensferry, which they open to the public. It was designed and built by Robert Stevenson prior to him building the "Bell Rock Lighthouse". The Heritage Trust have had a replica of the original lighting system installed. Mr Lawson showed illustrations of the old wooden station building which the Trust now runs as a meeting room and exhibition space.

In the eleventh century, Queen Margaret gave money to provide free passage for pilgrims across the Forth on their way to Dunfermline Abbey. There was at that time St James Chapel in North Queensferry, built on land given by Robert The Bruce. Pilgrims were to go to the chapel to pray and donate money for a good crossing on their way south and to give thanks for a good crossing on the way north. It was taken over in 1752 by the Sailors' Society. Now only ruins remain of this chapel.

It is documented that the escape of Mary Queen of Scots from Loch Leven Castle in 1568 took her across the Forth at North Queensferry.

The next big event for the area was the Battle of Inverkeithing in 1651. Scotland lost the battle which gave Cromwell control of Scotland. He brought his men and horses across on boats from Leith. The Scottish army was in Stirling - a long ride across land. The Royalists returned to Stirling then went south on the west while Cromwell went south on the east. They met in battle in England and the Royalists were defeated again.


In the eighteenth century, John Paul Jones came up the east coast to try to take Leith but the weather was against him and he did not succeed. He went on to become famous in America.

In the early nineteenth-century a ferry system was set up with rowing and sailing boats. Trustees were appointed in 1810 and they had a design drawn up for a pier and road system which was partially completed. In 1821 steam boats started to do the crossing and Thomas Telford came to lengthen the pier for them. A contract with the Royal Mail funded the work. Stagecoaches had a route which crossed the river at North Queensferry. The coaches ran from Edinburgh to Aberdeen via Cowdenbeath stopping at Kinross at the Kirklands Hotel. There is still a sign in North Queensferry from that time, but it is now too worn to read.

The first bridge was opened in 1890. The Prince of Wales came to the opening ceremony and crossed the bridge on a train but there was no station in North Queensferry. It was decided that a station was needed beside the bridge and it only took 114 days to build it. Special golfers' train tickets were sold in Edinburgh for the North Queensferry golf course. Locals would earn money carrying the clubs.

Before the First World War, underwater mines were developed at North Queensferry. The system was exported around the world to defend harbours until the torpedo was invented. The first Royal Naval Air Station was opened in 1912 at Port Laing. It didn't last long as the Royal Flying Corps then took over.

In 1914 there were various defences in the river to guard the Battle Cruiser



system, kite balloons, were stored in tents at North Queensferry. These kites allowed naval crews to see a bit further over the horizon. In 1917 the US 6th Battle Squadron arrived with six ships. They took part in exercises but took no action as the German fleet were pinned down in their harbours. American Naval Officers played golf at North Queensferry and donated The Grand Fleet Cup, which is still played for today. Flu struck in 1918 and had a huge effect on manning the boats and morale. On 19 November 1918, George V addressed the Naval troops. On 20 November, the King and Queen reviewed the Grand Fleet. All the German ships arrived. On 21 November (Surrender Day) both sides of the Forth were lined by thousands of people to see the sight of the German and Allied

In 1939, the Forth Bridge was attacked by German Heinkels and some naval personnel were killed.

In 1964, the Forth Road Bridge opened and the ferries stopped. The Cold War brought submarines to Rosyth. In recent years, the Battery Quarry was taken over by Deep Sea World. Memorials to those who died building the Forth Bridge have been erected at both South and North Queensferry. Cruise ships are a growing market.

Mr Lawson ended his talk with information about the events to take place from November to mark the end of the First World War including a radio broadcast from a hut next to the lighthouse. More information can be found at www.nght.org.


Urgent Appeal from Light Up Kinross (SC047534)

Light Up Kinross are a small local charity with a remit to create a Christmas Lights display for Kinross. The local authority charges for the 2017 display were £2790 for erection. This does not include storage, repairs or insurance.



We have been advised that the 2018 display will cost £4800, an increase of approximately 42%. At present we have funds of £2274 and a pledge of £500, leaving a deficit of approximately £2000. We had anticipated an annual increase of around 20%. We appeal for your support to help raise the total amount so that this year's display can be complete. Extension of operations to RSPB Scotland Loch Leven

We are delighted to advise that we plan to extend our free mobility scooter hire scheme to the RSPB Scotland Loch Leven visitor centre and nature reserve. We are also pleased to be able to replace scooters, at two other loch-side locations, which have reached the end of their life.




The new underpass below the main road will be opening soon. The road has hitherto separated the loch side trail from the visitor centre, café, shop and toilets. The underpass will, for the first time, make the whole nature reserve accessible for wheelchair and trail scooter users visiting RSPB Scotland Loch Leven, and enable those using scooters from other locations on the trail to access the visitor centre, café, shop and toilets.

Being in nature is important to both health and wellbeing. Removing the barriers and challenges to those with mobility issues will ensure trail scooter users can now also enjoy the beautiful countryside at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven, thus bringing currently disadvantaged people closer to nature.

For the past ten years, the Kinross-shire Partnership has sponsored free use of trail scooters seven days per week, for use by locals and visitors alike, from Loch Leven's Larder and Kinross Pier. The addition of a third hire point at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven will significantly extend accessibility and help everyone to enjoy the benefits this brings.

Kinross High School

It is hard to believe that the first term of the school year has been and gone already. Although it has felt like a short eight weeks, we have crammed in a lot of learning and a lot of fun! This month, we are turning our focus to more 'indoorsy' pursuits. As the colder weather creeps in, our Modern Languages department has even resorted to Scottish country dancing to keep warm!

Modern Languages Update

The Modern Languages Department has been very busy this term. They've already had visits from pupils and staff from three different countries!

On Monday 10 September, 66 pupils from Brick Towers College in Buenos Aires returned to Kinross High School as part of their two week tour of the UK. Having previously been warmly welcomed in 2016 they were eager to spend the day in school. They also joined our own pupils in a celebration of Argentine and Scottish culture. This involved pupils from both schools performing songs accompanied by guitar, sword dancing, bagpipe tunes and country dancing lessons as well as an interesting presentation about Argentina by the pupils from Brick Towers. Pupils chatted in Spanish and English at break and lunch time and contact details were exchanged so we'll all have somewhere to stay when we visit Argentina!

At the same time, the school played host once again to our German exchange partners from Traunstein, Bavaria. The German pupils spent time with their exchange partners and experienced the Scottish way of life. Their time was split between attending lessons and a night time ceilidh. There were also trips to Stirling Castle and the Glasgow Transport Museum.

Just one week later, 30 French pupils from the Collège Jean Moulin from Gacé, our twin town in Normandy, were reunited with their Scottish partners. Among the organised activities were days in school and visits to St Andrews and Edinburgh. We also held a very successful ceilidh which was attended by over 130 people including parents and members of the Kinross and District Town Twinning Association.

European Languages Day was celebrated with a series of presentations at school assemblies. A specially created video was shown in which almost a third of school staff showcased their knowledge of at least one other European Language. Senior pupils organised lunchtime events for younger pupils and a poster competition for S2 produced some eye-catching works of art!

We are delighted to announce the appointment of Mr J Chen as a new Mandarin teacher. Mr Chen will be working alongside Ms L Bai, our Hanban teacher, who is already halfway through her stay with us.

We have also been joined by Miss Y He, a Chinese volunteer teacher from Hunan province in South China. She will be assisting with the delivery of Mandarin lessons in Kinross, as well as other schools in Perth and Kinross, between now and next June. Miss He is a graduate majoring in Teaching Chinese as a Foreign Language at East China Normal University, Shanghai. She has previously taught Chinese in Ubon Ratchatani, Thailand, and then worked at the Council on International Educational Exchange, Shanghai. She is really looking forward to living and working in Scotland over the next nine months and we feel very lucky to have her with us.

All in all, we are delighted with how the term has gone so far and with the continued enthusiasm and commitment shown by our pupils. We look forward to a yet another successful year in Modern Languages.

Eilidh Doyle's Year

Now that another Athletics season has come and gone I would like to thank everyone again for their continued support and to emphasise how much it is appreciated.

My season started in February with preparation and qualification for the World Indoor Championships which took place in Birmingham at the beginning of March, where in the 400m Individual Event I was delighted to win a bronze medal. Next up was the Commonwealth Games at the Gold Coast in Australia where I won my 3rd consecutive 400m hurdles silver in a very competitive race and was in the Scottish 4 x 400m relay team that came 5th in a new Scottish record time. However, the biggest moment for me at The Commonwealth Games, if not the greatest moment in my athletics career was being chosen to carry the flag and lead out the team at the Opening Ceremony. Given that I was voted to do so by the members of Team Scotland from all the participating sports and that Scotland led the parade because it was the most recent host nation made it particularly special. It was truly a great honour and a memory I will always cherish.

Unfortunately during this part of the season I picked up a calf injury that meant I was unable to compete until just before the European Championships held in Berlin in August.

In Berlin I was 8th in the final of the 400m hurdles and picked up a bronze medal in the 4×400 m relay.

Looking back it was a long and up-and-down season, but to come away with three major championship medals and the honour of leading the Scottish team out of Australia made it unforgettable for me.

Training for the 2019 season, which begins with the European Indoor Championship in Glasgow and ends with the world championships in Doha has begun and I'm looking forward to another good year of competition.





Taster Day Updates

In August we held two fun and successful junior taster sessions to allow potential new equestrian vaulters to try out the sport. There was a good mix of ages and abilities amongst the children. Some had done a lot of riding before and were very confident around horses, some were competent and talented gymnasts, and some had never actually been on a horse before and were just curious to try out a new sport.

After a rigorous warm-up and stretching session with the KVG coaches, the children were introduced to vaulting on static barrels. These are used by vaulters to learn new routines and perfect tricky moves before attempting them on a horse.

Next, the children were 'bunked' on to a horse in walk, to let them get used to the sensation of movement and height of the horse as they were lunged around the arena. By the end of their sessions, each child was able to perform a few basic moves in canter and, judging by the happy faces, it's fair to say that everyone enjoyed their time in the arena.

Loch Leven has come alight this month with the sight and sound of our beloved pink-footed geese as they arrive to winter on the loch in their thousands. Five juvenile gannets and a guillemot have also been spotted and the gannets have been practising their plunge dives in the shallows of the loch. It's a lovely treat to see these birds, as their usual habitat is along the edges of cliffs out at sea. We suspect their visit may have been encouraged by the delicious range of scones we have in the café, or perhaps it's a result of the recent high winds?

The red squirrels have been particularly active this month too, and have been spotted scurrying busily around our peanut feeders looking for food. They are often seen on an almost daily basis now on the leafy loop trail, right next to the visitor centre.

Our wonderful team of reserve volunteers have been hard at work replanting and planting a range of new tree species around the reserve. A total of 840 trees have been planted, including a mixture of silver birch, rowan, scots pine and oak. Lots of new homes for nature!

As the geese arrive so does the start of our winter goose counts as we begin to monitor the influx of pink footed geese onto the reserve. The data gained from these surveys helps to identify any changes in population growth and distribution over time, which we can use to make management decisions for the future.

We have some exciting events coming up at Loch Leven this month with an "introduction to stargazing" evening on Tuesday 20 November 7-9pm. Turn



your sights to the skies over Loch Leven for an unmissable space discovery evening. Experts from Dalgety Bay Astronomy Club host this special event, bringing with them top kit and tips. Booking is essential; RSPB members £10. (child members £4), non-members £12 (child £6).

Join us for "A trip back in time: Mary Queen of Scots" on Saturday 8 December 1-3pm. Local writer David Munro tells the story of Mary Queen of Scots' dramatic escape from Loch Leven Castle 450 years ago. Hear about her 11-month imprisonment on Castle Island and her frequent earlier visits to this corner of Scotland which included a near capture at the foot of Benarty Hill and an encounter in Kinross with the Protestant reformer, John Knox. Booking is essential; RSPB members £8, nonmembers £10 (child member £3, child non-member £5). Booking for all our events can be done via our Eventbrite page at rspblochleven.eventbrite.com. The underpass project is now almost completed and is estimated to open at the end of the month. Our wonderful reserve volunteers have been hard at work finalising some of the finishing touches, including spreading wildflower mix and planting trees along the edge of the path. We would like to thank the community for their support and patience during this time. The project has been a long time in the making and will make a real difference for all, allowing access to the countryside no matter what your ability.

Loch Leven NNR



It's been quite a stormy month at Loch Leven. Persistent rain and winds from the south west of storms named after someone or other!

Many thanks to all that phoned in about the damaged trees. We work hard here to make sure the trail is free of fallen trees and safe to use for everyone. Some quite large trees needed removing. We will be planting more this winter. We prefer it when the storms come when there are no leaves on the trees because the leaves act as a sail bringing the trees down.

With the bad weather came a few unusual migrant birds. A ferruginous duck from Southern Europe was in Vane Bay and the Kirkgate. This is a very rare duck in Scotland and was enjoyed by birdwatchers from throughout Scotland. With the huge flock of diving ducks was also a North American lesser scaup. The storms blew in seabirds too. There were up to four gannets flying around the middle of the loch doing their characteristic diving for fish. Some of them remained for over a fortnight. They appeared to be carving out a reasonable living in the loch though the local ducks didn't know what to make of the flexible winged visitors! A single adult guillemot was also seen.

There have been an outstanding number of pink-footed geese around Loch Leven already this autumn. I was standing at the pier and estimated over 20,000 coming in from the west between 4pm and 5.30pm. The next day I took a drive to the north and east and found over 10,000 using the fields

feeding on the spilt grain. We don't do our first synchronised count until late October but hopefully these birds will remain in the area before moving on to more southern haunts like Lancashire or Norfolk.

We still have a few places left on our **Dawn Goosewalk** on **4 November** at Burleigh Sands starting at 6.45am. This year I'm trying something different. Hopefully we can get closer to the geese leaving the roost and get them flying over our heads as they leave. What I've been finding in the last few years is that the shooting pressure is quite heavy off the reserve and the geese are reluctant to leave their roost and swim to the middle of the loch where they are joined by other birds. They swim towards Burleigh before leaving in broad daylight. Hopefully we'll get them flying overhead. Please phone the office to book a place on 01738 458609.

Please keep an eye on the blog. We've been really successful recently at updating it every week. If you put "Loch Leven Wordpress" into your search engine you will find it.

The volunteers have been busy this month. Not only with tree clearance but we have also completed our mowing and grass collection and we've revamped the shed and compound. If anyone has any spare time and wishes to give volunteering with us a go please give the office a ring.

Are we going to have a warm wet winter or a cold crisp one? Time will tell.

Farming

What do you do if you want to be a farmer but don't have a farm?

Here's the story of Douglas Bennie, a Kinross-shire lad who has followed his dream of becoming a farmer with a grit and determination that is inspirational. Many readers will know Dougie. He's the son of Annette and Jimmy from Mawcarse, was a pupil at Kinross High School and a very active member of Young Farmers, serving as Chairman of the Kinross club in 2005.

I know Dougie as he came to help my Dad at Bankhead as a teenager. He also worked on many other farms in Fossoway and was always chatty, cheerful and eager to learn. After studying at both Elmwood and Auchincruive, Dougie concentrated on his career in poultry, eventually becoming a manager at a local poultry farm.

However, his strong farming roots coupled with bags of enthusiasm and energy meant it wasn't long before he started rearing calves in rented sheds, rising early to feed them before work and returning after his day job was finished to feed them again. From there he started taking on grazing, often wee fields and even though they were scattered across Kinross and Fife he was able to build a rearing enterprise around his job.

United Auctions, the Stirling-based livestock market, noticed this budding stockman and following the bad winter of 2012 offered him the chance to take on more cattle. Dougie says, "In the summer of 2013, I increased the store cattle numbers from 15 to 60. It was a leap of faith but when the horse meat scandal broke in the autumn, demand for good quality beef soared and I sold them all into a good market. I invested the profits into a tractor and some equipment to help with the business and it was then I started to think I could maybe take on the tenancy of a farm." Dreaming big eventually paid off when after five attempts, Dougie, his wife Grace-Ann and their young family were given the opportunity to farm at Balrobert Farm, just outside Inverness. The couple now farm together and are four years into a 10-year farm tenancy. When I caught up with Dougie he was busy fixing the hydraulic pipe on his loader tractor, which had worn through during the last day of silage-making. He tells me there is never a dull moment nowadays. He's established a herd of 75 suckler cows and flock of 200 Texel cross and Mule ewes. The 300 acres of land at Balrobert is free-draining and the farm is all in grass. He says the rainfall

is a wee bit lower than Kinross-shire so the cows are out-wintered and calve in April and May, and the ewes lamb a bit earlier to spread the workload.

Dougie points out that he has had to manage his cashflow very carefully. He works off the farm for three days each week for a neighbour. He's also had to learn how to plan and always tries to look ahead to the target market when he is producing stock. Whilst half of the calves are sold to store back in Stirling, the remainder and a proportion of the lambs are sold to Dingwall Abattoir, the main supplier to butcher's shops across the Highlands and the Balrobert stock is also included in the Castle of May Selections range as the farm is within 100 miles of the famous fortress.

The Scottish Government made the farm available for a starter farmer so it's only in Dougie's hands for another six years before it will be offered to another new entrant to agriculture. In the meantime it seems that the family are doing all they can to build the foundations of a good farming business and I'd like to wish Dougie, Grace-Ann and their children, Alexander (7), Molly (6), John (5) and Robert (2 months) all the best for their future in farming.
