Rail Link between Kinross and Cowdenbeath

Dear Editor, I note Sheila Marshall's letter in your May 2018 edition asking if there is support for reinstatement of a rail link between Kinross and Cowdenbeath. I have always supported this and note that the line was protected in the Kinross 2004 Local Plan from inappropriate development. Local members introduced a new policy in our current Perth & Kinross Development Plan that protected old railway lines generally.

I have noted in my submission on the Proposed Plan 2017, for LDP2 that there is no reference to the lack of a rail service in Kinross-shire, despite administrative support.

I agree with Sheila that pursuing, as a first step to an improved rail direct link between Edinburgh and Perth, reinstatement of the link between Kinross and the Fife Circle is well worth it. Yours sincerely

Work starts on new accessible underpass at RSPB Loch Leven

Building work has begun on a new underpass that will transform public access at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven, and help everyone to get safely across a busy road.

The new underpass will create an accessible link between the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and the Fife Path Network. It will replace an old tunnel under the B9097 that has steep steps at each end. Although the diggers are now on site, a small funding gap remains, and RSPB Scotland has launched a crowdfunding campaign with the hope of raising £19,000 towards the cost of the project. RSPB Scotland Loch Leven reserve manager, Uwe Stoneman, said: "The new underpass at Loch Leven is a partnership project that has taken years to develop, so it's very exciting to be at this final stage of the process. It's going to make a huge difference to many of our visitors, and will put the whole area at the forefront of disabled access in Scotland

"Work on the underpass is already underway, but despite very generous funding from Sustrans, Scottish Natural Heritage, Perth & Kinross Council and others, we still have a shortfall of £19,000. We're very much hoping that the public will get behind this project and help us raise the final amount, and we've got some great rewards on offer in return for pledges."

The Loch Leven Heritage Trail, completed in 2014, provides a 13-mile, barrier-free route around the loch and welcomes more than 200,000 visitors a year. It is wheelchair accessible and has a mobility scooter hire scheme that is free for anyone to use.

The RSPB Scotland reserve at Loch Leven hosts part of the trail, and its visitor centre and car park are key facilities for trail users. But the steep steps in the underpass make it difficult for cyclists and families with pushchairs to access, and create a barrier for wheelchair and mobility scooter users.

The new underpass will also create an accessible link between the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and the so-called 'Sleeping Giant' path, which was created in 2016. This joins on to the Fife Path Network and provides access to the natural riches of the whole Loch Leven National Nature Reserve for communities in West Fife.

Dave Morris, a Portmoak Community Councillor and former director of Ramblers Scotland, said: "Connecting path networks and communities together is the way forward. Today a facility is being put in place which will enable everyone, of whatever age and ability, to access a famous natural world. Nowhere else in the UK is there such a facility, connecting together two extensive path networks, through magnificent landscapes and wildlife habitats, where access rights apply to everyone.

"Mile upon mile is available, whether you are on foot, bicycle or horse or simply taking your buggy or wheelchair out for some exercise. Let us dig a bit more for victory and hopefully see the RSPB crowdfunding target of £19,000 pass by with a few weeks to spare!"

Fife Youth Jazz Orchestra Summer Concert, Cupar, Friday 8 June

FYJO is an award-winning big band, established in 1976 and led by Richard Michael. It offers young people the chance to play, enjoy and develop an interest in music, especially jazz. Members from all over Fife and Kinross-shire benefit from Richard's unique approach to music education. Players learn to improvise on their instruments (anything from violin, flute and oboe to saxophone, trombone and drums) and to play with a big band. The creative energy during rehearsals in Lochgelly on a Thursday evening is thrilling. Over the years, the band has played with many of the greats of the jazz scene, including Tommy Smith, Carol Kidd, Annie Ross, Martin Taylor and Joe Temperley.

There will be an opportunity to come and hear FYJO in full swing at their Summer Concert in Cupar Baptist Church on Friday 8 June. Musical Director Richard Michael believes that this year's edition of the young jazz warriors from Fife is one of the best.

Reserved Places

I have written before about the number of reserved places at Kinross High School. Parents have a legal right to send their children to whichever state school they



choose so long as there are non-reserved places available. Given the fact that we border two other counties, we have a relatively high number of placing requests from outside Perth & Kinross. Reserved places try to ensure that pupils who move into the catchment area during the school year are able to attend their catchment school. The high level of development in Kinross-shire has raised concerns that families moving here might not be able to get a place at the high school. Last year, I met with council officers to discuss this matter and asked them to look at increasing the number of reserved places at Kinross High School to reflect house building in the area. I am pleased to report that at a recent meeting of the Lifelong Learning Committee, we approved an increase in the number of reserved places at Kinross High School from 12 to 20 for the current academic year as well as an increase from 14 to 22 for Kinross Primary School.

Vehicle-Activated Signs

Over the past few months, a significant number of vehicle-activated signs have been installed and are now in operation across Kinross-shire. These signs are one of the best ways of encouraging drivers to keep to the speed limit by giving them real-time feedback on how fast they are driving. As I wrote about a couple of months ago, the Council administration has committed a further £150,000 to fund more of these signs in this financial year. At a recent meeting of Environment & Infrastructure Committee, councillors approved a programme of works for this money, which includes new signs for: Blairingone; Rumbling Bridge; Carnbo; Duncrievie; Easter Balgedie; Stirling Road in Milnathort; south of the High Street in Kinross; and Turfhills. The exact locations of the signs will be determined through consultation with Community Councils.

Planning Scrutiny

Planning forms part of many of the concerns that councillors receive. These concerns vary widely from infrastructure to enforcement. Many issues that are brought to the attention of my colleagues and me come up time and again – not just here, but also in other parts of Perth & Kinross. To that end, the Convener of the Scrutiny Committee, Councillor Grant Laing, has set up a cross-party subcommittee, including two other colleagues and me, to collate and investigate these issues. This is a welcome initiative. The group will then progress the key issues it identifies to a full review at the Scrutiny Committee itself with a view to bringing forward a set of recommendations to improve the planning process. I shall provide an update on how this progresses in future columns.

Closing Blairingone School

At the Lifelong Learning Committee meeting on Wednesday 16 May, I was disappointed with the decision to start the Statutory process for closing Blairingone School.



The Schools Consultation Act (2010) clearly states that the presumption for rural schools should be to keep them open. The act also gives clear guidance that the 'likely effect on the local community (assessed in accordance with section 12(4)) in consequence of such implementation' should be taken into account.

The effect that closing Blairingone School will have on the community is huge. Blairingone is on the edge of the Perth & Kinross boundary, but its community should not be sacrificed because of the current austerity agenda. Blairingone has already lost its pub, its Village Hall, its Church, and its shop. Now the final public building is one step closer to being shut. Closing the school will not only put at risk the building as a valuable asset for a rural community, but closing the school itself will also put at risk the proposed new housing development in the village.

How it happened

A major concern about this whole process of starting to close the school is how the current administration managed to load the thirteen-member Committee with eight councillors (62%) leaving the opposition parties with only five councillors (38%). This happened in an unannounced move at Full Council meeting at the end of April, when the administration voted to remove an Independent councillor from the committee and then replaced him with a Conservative Councillor. In protest, the Independent group removed themselves from the Council administration.

To be fair and democratic and in line with Standing Orders, Council committees should represent the proportion of councillors that each group has on the council. Currently, the Administration has 53% and the opposition parties combined have 47%, meaning the Administration should only have seven committee members and the opposition should have six.

Dog Fouling

Following on from the issue of dog mess, as highlighted in last month's Newsletter, I was also notified of a concerning issue at Portmoak Moss. The problem was that dog faeces were being bagged but then just left in the wooded area in large numbers. In response to this concern, I arranged to inspect the area with one of Perth & Kinross Council's Dog Wardens. The problem was clear to see and the two of us cleared up most of the bags that had been left in the woods. A few days later, the Dog Warden returned and issued Fixed Penalty Notices of £80 to two dog walkers caught in the act. The hope is that news of this will encourage dog walkers to dispose of their poo bags in the bin provided. To put this in perspective, only five of these Fixed Penalty Notices have been issued in Kinross-shire in the last year; this shows how vital it is to get local information so that we can deal with this issue.

I am also in discussion with council officers about providing a dog bin nearer to the car park area instead of at the end of the lane. This would be a more convenient location for dog walkers to dispose of their dog poo bags, especially if they have driven to the Moss.

This month has been a busy one, with much work being done in and around Kinross-shire. One prominent issue that I know will be on the minds of many residents is the closure of Kinross' **Royal Bank of Scotland** (RBS) branch. I have been fighting, both in the constituency and in Westminster, to overturn this decision which I know will have serious ramifications for residents across Kinross-shire.

The decision to close the branch is very shortsighted for reasons that I have outlined in a letter to the Chief Executive of RBS, Ross McEwan. Kinross-shire is experiencing fairly rapid population growth, and consequently the implications of the branch closure are

extensive and far-reaching for current and prospective residents alike. Additionally, access to online banking is poor across Kinross-shire, where only 78.5% of the population have access to superfast broadband – 15% less than the UK average. There is also an outstanding concern that residents may be limited to just 20 minutes of mobile banking service every week, which I believe is completely unacceptable.

I strongly believe that implications of closing the RBS branch in Kinross-shire will have the biggest impact on vulnerable residents, such as the elderly population. It is also unacceptable that some vulnerable individuals have not been pre-emptively contacted about the branch closure. Such communication is mandated by the Access to Banking Standard in order to provide assistance and help should it be required.

Given the economic opportunities provided to the area on the back of the multi-million pound Tay Cities Deal, I strongly believe that RBS will have ample opportunity to profit from keeping the Kinross branch open. The Tay Cities Deal will elevate business opportunities across Tayside, which will heighten the demand for banking services.

In light of the above information, I fully intend to continue advocating for the Kinross RBS branch to remain open. I remain hopeful that the opposition provided by myself and other colleagues will engender RBS to rethink the decision to close the branch. Bishop Robson spoke of Sid's involvement in the life of the Church, with previous parish pastoral councils, organising of parish retreats and visits, of his help in diocesan fundraising initiatives, work with Catechists and the RCIA, his involvement in Kinross-shire Churches Together (a local ecumenical body), his support to parish priests past and present, and the way in

which Sid has always encouraged other parishioners to be more involved in the life of the parish.

The Mass was celebrated on the 28th anniversary of a life-saving kidney transplant that Sid had received. This was acknowledged with gratitude and recognised as something which has spurred Sid on to give more of himself, to others, in service. of dialysis and transplant patients for some time. He has also been involved over the years in a Polish-Scottish twinning project in the nearby city of Perth with the Polish city of Bydgoszcz, as Sid's father was himself Polish.

The joyful Mass was followed by a celebration afterwards in the hall, when Sid expressed his gratitude and the sense of being completely overwhelmed at receiving such an honour from the Holy Father.

Highest French honour awarded in Kinross

A D-Day veteran received France's highest honour in a charming and heartfelt ceremony held in Kinross last month.

Duncan Foster, aged 95, served with the Cameron Highlanders in World War II. He received the medal of the National Order of the Legion d'honneur from Monsieur Emmanuel Cocher, Consul General of France from the Edinburgh Consulate.

The event had been organised by retired Lt Colonel Andy Middlemiss, representing the Queen. Lt Colonel Middlemiss began the ceremony by giving a brief summary of Mr Foster's life and described him as a truly remarkable man in many, many ways.

Major George Givens of the Queen's Own Highlanders Association read an extract from the Cameron Highlanders history from 1944. (See panel, right.)

The Consul General explained that on the 70th anniversary of D-Day in 2014, the President of France announced that all British veterans who had fought for the liberation France between 1944 and 1945 should be awarded the Légion d'honneur. Founded by Napoleon in 1802, this is the highest order of chivalry in France — the equivalent of a British knighthood.

M Cocher gave an interesting and lively speech. He said that the events and memories of what happened in France are not simply historical; they have a continuing significance. He finds it very moving to meet the veterans and the next generations of their families. He spoke of his people's gratitude for those who liberated France from tyranny and said that friendship between nations is

probably one of the best chances we have to keep peace. Pinning the badge on to Mr Foster's lapel, he said (in French): "Duncan Foster, in the name of the President of the French Republic I make you a knight in the Order of the Legion d'honneur."

Duncan Foster was born in Glasgow in 1925 and moved to Perth when his father became station master at Perth railway station.

Shortly after his 17th birthday, he joined the Railway Home Guard. Later he enlisted into the Territorial Army and trained at Fort George near Inverness with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders. After basic training he was sent to the south of England to prepare for D-Day, 6 June 1944.

Mr Foster landed in Normandy and saw

service from St Honorine, Eindhoven, the Rhine crossing and the charge across Germany, finishing at Cuxaven and the victory parade at Bremerhaven. He was wounded twice.

Mr Foster served in the British Army of the Rhine from 1945 to 1947.

After leaving the army, he trained as an optician in Dundee. He moved to Enniskillen in Northern Ireland, then Donegal in Southern Ireland, where he had a number of practices.

After retiring he came back to Scotland in 1989, first to Gateside and then to Kinross, where he continued to work as a locum optician into his eighties.

Proud family members who looked on as Mr Foster received his honour included his wife of 62 years, Sally, three of their five children – Catriona, Trevor and Roderick – and grandsons Liam and Ryan. Another son, Iain, formerly of the Irish army, was abroad and regrettably could not attend. Daughter Aileen from Donegal was also unable to attend but followed the ceremony via a mobile connection. Two members of staff from Ashley House, where Mr Foster lives, were present. The assembly also included several serving soldiers and some fellow veterans, including another Legion d'honneur awardee who lives locally, Mr James Stanley Dudley. Mr Dudley served with the Royal Artillery and received his award in Edinburgh last year.

Mr Foster's award ceremony took place at the Kirklands Hotel, Kinross, on Wednesday 2 May 2018.

Extract from the Cameron Highlanders History

The 5th Battalion of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders were part of the 51st Highland Division that landed in Normandy in June 1944, the day after D-Day.

They were to spend some very unpleasant months in the Ornemouth area of France and were to experience some quite nasty knocks, for it was in that area that the German army were to resist most determinedly, and were to counter-attack very strongly. Shortly after landing on the Normandy beaches, the 5th Camerons were given the task of capturing the village of St Honorine, whilst the 2nd Battalion The Seaforth Highlanders were to take Demouville. The initial attack by the Camerons on the 13th June 1944 did not wholly succeed, because of very heavy artillery fire and a counter attack by enemy troops, supported by tanks. The tremendous concentration of German artillery fire at the time also made it impossible for the 2nd Seaforth to advance south to Demouville. The 5th Camerons were therefore put into a defensive position at Longueval, with the 5th Seaforths filling the gap between them and the 2nd Seaforth.

On the 22nd June 1944, the 5th Camerons were sent back to have another crack at St Honorine. This time there was no artillery support, but tanks were made available to assist in the attack. By half past eight in the morning, the Camerons were well and truly into the village, and by ten o'clock, the mopping up operation was practically completed. The Camerons, however, had to withstand several very vicious counter-attacks, but held their positions until relieved that night, when they went back to Herouvillette.

Two months later in August 1944, the 5th Camerons were to take part in the breakout, and the Battle of the Falaise Gap. On the 1st September they relieved St Valery where the Division had had to surrender in 1940. Christmas 1944 was spent fighting in the Ardennes in sub-zero conditions to counter the German offensive known as the Battle of the Bulge. The 5th Camerons were then to be part of the 51st Highland Division that spearheaded the crossing of the Rhine in March 1945. They continued to be involved in fighting right up to the German surrender on the 5th May 1945.

Blairingone Primary School

Dear Caroline,

Lifelong Learning Committee Options Appraisal – Blairingone Primary School, 16 May 2018

I could not let the proceedings at the above committee on the decision to commence statutory consultation on the closure of the school pass without comment. It will be interesting to see what the Scottish Government's view may be going forward because I intend to contact them.

As you know, I addressed the committee and enclose my statement; being then subjected to an inordinate barrage of questions, in particular from Councillor Wilson, who seems to delight in such occasions when I am defending issues in Kinross-shire affecting my constituents. I remind you that I was simply calling for a deferral of the process until clarity on LDP2 and a proposed master plan for Blairingone was available.

It was clear from the outset that the committee members from the Liberal/Tory administration and their "clear majority position" had closed minds on the subject and were not really interested in what I had to say, otherwise some of their comments in the subsequent debate may have been different. As an exercise in thwarting community aspirations, it was "a classic". To deprive Blairingone of its only community facility, focus narrowly on the level of recent development in Blairingone and its catchment (rather than Fossoway), whilst accepting the planning service total negativity to expressed developer interest there was to do a great dis-service to that community.

I am wondering why Councillor Cuthbert and I bothered to hold an open day for consultation on proposed zoning in LDP2 in February 2017 and why I bothered to have a meeting with the land owners and developer representatives in relation to MU74 last week when your administration have so summarily dismissed the outcomes and the planners failed to give due cognisance to our development plan statements. Tayplan appears the driver here, a document so remote to Kinross-shire we scarcely get a mention and which neither I nor the community feel engaged with. Its approach to tiered settlement development means that small rural settlements are denied sustainable plans and adequate levels of affordable housing. The sum total of the administration's current approach is "rural deprivation" rather than "reinvigoration" and I am utterly opposed to its trajectory.

Slightly abridged copy of a letter by Cllrs Barnacle & Brock to Cllr Lyle, Leader of the Council, 27 April 2018

Dear Councillor Lyle,

Status of Independent Group and Labour Councillor

The Independent councillors hereby give notice, following our joint meeting on Thursday 26th April 2018, with Councillor Bailey, of our intention to withdraw immediately from the Partnership Administration of Perth and Kinross Council. Following Councillor McDade's withdrawal of his

confidence and supply agreement in January (for reasons we have some empathy with) and the meetings on Wednesday with Councillors Barnacle and Brock before full Council, given the outcome of that latter meeting in relation to the vote to replace Councillor McDade with a Conservative councillor, rather than an Independent one (a subject which was not discussed at the Partnership meeting on 23/4/18) we feel we have no option but to take this decision.

We the three Independent councillors and Labour councillor hereby state our intention to be regarded as a group on the Council, which has been the Independents' stated position since the election in May 2017, a position reaffirmed to the Chief Executive in June and September last year. We expect Democratic Services to regard us as such and that as a group of four we should be entitled to our proportional share of committee places as per the Councils Standing Orders i.e. as far as possible equating to 1/10th of committee places. Should this not be addressed, we shall be taking independent legal advice to secure it.

We do not regard ourselves as being in opposition to your administration and are not forming an alliance with the SNP group, but rather intend to sit as cross-benchers, considering issues on a case-by-case basis. We would hope to work constructively with your Conservative/Liberal Democrat administration and not make life difficult for you, unless you make life difficult for us.

In our view, it is unfortunate how the Partnership approach set out after the election by our late colleague Ian Campbell has not been sustained and that this letter is necessary. We are agreed that no other course of action is possible.

Crook Moss Gypsy/Traveller site

Cllr Barnacle has written to Barbara Renton, PKC Environment Director, asking her to ensure that concerns regarding landscaping and general appearance of the Crook Moss gypsy/traveller site near Crook of Devon are acted upon. This follows a Planning & Development Management committee meeting on 9 May when councillors considered an enforcement report by planning officials.

The partly retrospective application for five permanent travellers pitches was approved in 2013, but some conditions attached to the planning consent have not been fully complied with. Councillors received updates relating to noise, drainage, water supply and landscaping. Cllr Barnacle proposed that a site visit take place, but was told this was not possible for legal reasons.

Cllr Barnacle said to Ms Renton: "I enclose what I had circulated to the members of the Planning & Development Management Committee today. Apologies for the strong criticism of the planning department but I assure you I am mirroring local opinion. I also enclose the update from Scottish Water on the drainage position which effectively deals with my concerns on that issue.

"The outstanding concern emphasised at committee related to the adequacy of the landscaping and the general site appearance (particularly the paddock area), given its location on the edge of our village.

"My reason for writing is to try and ensure this aspect is addressed by the Environment and Planning Service because that would go a long way to improving community relations. The status quo is not an option for me and the community I continue to try and represent."

Spring is officially here, or at least it should be, and people are making their way out into the countryside to enjoy the great outdoors. In Scotland, we are fortunate to be able



roam the countryside unhindered, but we should not forget our responsibilities, especially when walking your dog. In recent weeks there has been a spate of dog attacks on newborn lambs and in-lamb ewes. In Argyll, 12 sheep were put down as a result of horrific injuries sustained in an attack. Figures have shown that farmers are reporting more cases than ever before.

Despite this huge increase in reported cases, only 10% have resulted in conviction. Across Scotland, in 2016/17, there were 175 reported cases of sheep worrying, with only 19 convictions. In Perth and Kinross, the Police were called out on 14 occasions but none of these cases even made it to court. Farmers are rightfully frustrated and feel dog walkers have carte blanche to do what they want.

However, many dog walkers are unaware of the consequences of their pet's behaviour. Even if your dog does not attack, the simple presence of it in a field can cause in-lamb ewes to miscarry. Following one of the toughest winters on record, farmers are experiencing serious financial pressure and could do without dog attacks that cost the industry £1.7 million last year. Backing this up are figures from NFU Mutual which show insurance claims have quadrupled in the past two years as a result of livestock worrying. Clearly, more needs to be done to prevent this type of crime.

This view is shared by the National Farming Union who recently launched their "take the lead" campaign, which I was happy to support. The NFUS are calling on dog owners to keep their animals on the lead whilst in fields with sheep or newborn lambs.

Regardless of this campaign's effectiveness, farmers need more than public awareness to tackle sheep worrying. Ultimately, the police must take these crimes seriously, and that means more investigations and prosecutions. They could start by beefing up and enforcing the access code regulations under the Land Reform (Scotland) Act. However, the police can't do this on their own and need support from the Scottish Government.

Last week, police officer strength statistics revealed that there are 25 fewer officers patrolling the beat in Tayside since the single force came into operation in 2014. It's tough to point at exactly where these cuts have been made, but you can bet rural areas have been hit the hardest. After all, it was only last year when Police Scotland released a crime prevention strategy that made no mention of rural crime. Added to this was the centralisation of call centres and the removal of public counters from rural towns and villages.

Whether it is sheep worrying or quad bike theft, more needs to be done to protect rural communities. A good place to start would be cracking down on livestock crime and I would encourage the Scottish Government to make improving safety in rural communities a priority.

Alexander R Kean

Alexander Kean had been a postman between Kinross and Carnbo and, according to the Kinross-shire Advertiser, had "made many friends in our district owing to his amiable disposition and courteous manners".

The newspaper's edition dated 27 July 1918 said: "At the outbreak of hostilities in 1914 he joined up as a National Reserve man with the Royal Scots Fusiliers, and was drafted to France in July, 1915. After the battle of Loos he was invalided home having contracted frost-bite. Transferred to the Gordon Highlanders, he sailed for India in January, 1917, and a year afterwards was appointed to the Army Post Office in Mesopotamia."

Alexander Kean was a Sergeant in the Gordon Highlanders when he died on 30 June 1918 from malaria. He is buried at Basra War Cemetery. Aged 37, he left a widow and seven children.

Old High School renovation "moving forward slower than expected"

Kinross CC has asked the Council for a review of the Freedom of Information response PKC provided in relation to the former Kinross High School site.

The CC had asked for confirmation of both the bidding price offered by Persimmon for the site and the end price. The Council provided those facts, which showed that the end price was £2.4million less than the original bid price. However, PKC had not provided copies of two relevant committee reports requested. One had been provided, but with much of the information 'redacted' or blanked out.

In the meantime, work on the retained building appears to have ground to a halt. The building fronting the High Street, which dates from Edwardian times, was supposed to have been converted to four dwellings by Persimmon before any of the new-build houses on site were sold. After Persimmon ignored this condition, the developer had to enter into a bond with PKC, promising to pay PKC a sum of money (up to £305,000) if the building is not renovated by a certain date.

The Newsletter asked the Council why work had stopped. A spokesperson said: "Perth & Kinross Council is aware that works on the former Kinross High School site are moving forward slower than expected. The contractors have advised additional work was needed to support the retained elements

of the existing High School building. We will continue to monitor the situation."

The Newsletter also asked the Council for confirmation of the date by which the building is supposed to be completed, but no confirmation was given.

At Persimmon's recent AGM, a significant number of shareholders objected to the pay policy that would see senior managers receive huge bonuses. However, due to the number of abstentions, the policy was passed. Jeff Fairburn, Persimmon's Chief Executive, was due to receive bonus shares worth £110million but agreed to reduce this to £75million.

Persimmon sells many of its houses to purchasers using 'Help to Buy'. This Government scheme uses public funds to provide equity loans to some buyers. Earlier this year, James Moore of the Independent wrote: "The scheme is supposed to help people faced with the difficulty of saving for a deposit and obtaining a mortgage of sufficient loan to value to get on to the housing ladder, amid an overheated housing market.

"What it actually does is help housebuilders like Persimmon by increasing the number of people chasing a limited number of properties, and juicing the price of them as a result."

He described Persimmon as "a state-subsidised business, with profits all but guaranteed and bonuses all but guaranteed".

Police Report: The community police officers had sent a report by email. 20mph signs: Cllr Purves has emailed Mr Haggart regarding the 20mph signs for the roundabout area at the town centre. **War memorial**: CCllr Colliar awaits a reply from PKC regarding a meeting.

Website meeting: CCllr Cuthbert reported that three community councillors met with representatives of Kinrossshire Partnership to discuss the management of the jointly owned kinross.cc website. A joint sub committee is to be reinstated. It was agreed at a recent KCCNL charitable fund meeting to award a sum of £778 to Kinross-shire Partnership towards the running costs of the website, with conditions attached. CCllr Colliar is preparing a letter.

Recycling information: Cllr Purves had sent the CC an email with details of the quantity of PKC recycling waste that is exported. CCllr West wondered, however, if PKC actually knows what happens to the exported waste.

M90 electronic sign: CCllr West reported the missing sign via Twitter. He will pursue this via Twitter.

Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS): Cllr Barnacle had received a response from council officers which he will forward.

Action Partnership: The Secretary has now written to Mr McNamara about the Participatory Budget.

Path gritting route: Cllr Watters advised that this is available to view on the PKC website.

Green Park developer contribution: Cllr Purves confirmed that Persimmon did make a contribution of £45,000 towards the upgrade of the Green Park play area as part of their planning consent for the former High School site.

Bus stop signs: Cllr Purves had reported the lack of signs to the Public Transport Unit. Cllr Colliar said the signs are not missing, just faded. In any case, the PTU will be checking.

Wreaths: CCllr Freeman has not yet informed the cadets that they will need to pay for their 2018 wreath in advance.

Kinross Town Centre Regeneration: Still no reply to email suggesting single-lane traffic at the former Town Hall during the redevelopment works. Cllr Barnacle has not received a reply regarding a review of the regeneration project. The Secretary will send a reminder to Mr Haggart.

A car transporter travelled down the High Street on 28 April while part of the street was closed for the Farmers' Market. The driver spent a considerable amount of time turning

round at Burns Begg Street. It was agreed that a letter should be sent to BCA to emphasise that car transporters should use the Junction Road-Clashburn Way by-pass. Cllr Barnacle volunteered to do this.

New Planning Applications to be Considered: The CC made no comment on the applications below except application 18/00540/FLL.

18/00616/FLL Erection of a community broadband hub (in part retrospect), 5 Newton of Classlochie, Kinross.

18/00599/FLL Siting of 24no. additional storage containers, Alligan House, 2 Clashburn Close, Bridgend Industrial Estate. 18/00539/FLL Installation of replacement windows, first floor, 127 High Street, Kinross.

18/00508/FLL Alterations and extension to dwelling house, 34 Argyll Road, Kinross.

18/00503/FLL Extension to dwelling house, 30 Springfield Park, Kinross.

18/00540/FLL Formation of access road, turning head, soakaway, installation of LPG tanks and associated works, land 110m SE of Beaufield, Balado. Permission has already been granted for this site but it was thought that the proposals which currently have consent are undeliverable, hence this application. The members of the public present were from Balado. The residents informed the CC of their concerns in respect of the application. It was agreed that the CC would object to the planning proposal for the following reasons: it is contrary to policy on water environment and drainage, due to the inadequate distance of the proposed sewage soakaway from private water supplies; the site will not be within the settlement envelope in LDP2 (a material consideration); the access road will not be suitable to allow removal of refuse; and the settlement is unsuitable for several more houses as the main road has no pavements or lighting.

Former Kinross High School site: The FOI response regarding sale price etc was received. Questions had been answered but only one committee report had been provided, and it was redacted. Two reports should have been provided. It was agreed that the Secretary should ask for a formal review, asking for both committee reports (unredacted), minutes of meetings and confirmation that Persimmon has paid for the site.

Disputed levels: A resident has had the levels of the Persimmon development professionally measured to support his contention that the development is higher than allowed by planning consent. Ward councillors have asked for a meeting with Nick Brian, PKC Interim Head of Planning to discuss the matter. Cllr Watters has a degree in Surveying and Mapping and would be happy to meet with the constituent's surveyor to ensure he is fully updated with the survey work prior to any meeting with Mr Brian.

Renovation work on the Edwardian building appears to have stopped. Cllr Purves will try to find out why.

Lochside House: A letter and drawings had been received

concerning revisions to plans for a vehicle hardstanding, relocation of core path and revised fencing proposals for BCA car auctions, Lochside House, Bridgend. The CC was invited to comment. The CC has no comment to make at this time.

Petition: Email from a steering group in Bishopbriggs objecting to a housing development. They have drawn up a general Scotland-wide petition called 'Reform of Scotland's Unjust Planning Laws' and invite the CC to sign. It was agreed this could be signed as individuals if desired but not as a CC.

Scrutiny Committee: Cllr Purves reported that a subcommittee is to be set up to identify planning issues to be brought to the committee. (See page 7.)

Street Naming: A name is required for a new street south of the GS Brown development at Levenfields. The streets in the GS Brown development have railway-themed names so it was suggested the same theme should continue and a railway word chosen. An alternative suggestion was to use the name of one of the local burns Myre, Queich and Clash, though several streets have these already. He has reported them via the PKC website but hopes that PKC will be held to account over the standard of repairs. Cllr Robertson has replied. Proper repairs at Sutherland Drive appear to have been carried out.

Tillyochie Road: Email from member of the public who had originally emailed the CC in 2012 with concerns regarding dangerous traffic. The 2012 email had been passed by D Cuthbert to council officers. At the time a speed limit could not be justified. It was agreed the recent email be sent on to PKC's Mr Haggart for comment.

Pavements: A member of the public had telephoned the Secretary to ask if anything can be done about the poor state of pavements. She uses a mobility scooter and finds the uneven and damaged pavements difficult to negotiate. The Secretary had checked that the member of the public was happy for her details to be passed to one of the ward councillors to get in touch with her. These were passed to Cllr Watters, as he had organised an accessibility audit recently. He said the Centre for Inclusive Living has produced its report.

Reports from P&K Councillors

Crossing: Cllr Purves reported that residents of Levenbridge Place would like a crossing on Junction Road to allow safer access to Sainsbury's. He has consulted with council officer Mr McKeown who indicated the request could be put on a secondary list. CCllr Cuthbert thought this had been on the roads list when he was a councillor.

Reserved Places: Cllr Purves reported that the number of reserved places at KHS has been increased. (See page 7.)

Traffic Survey: Cllr Watters reported that an internal evaluation of the survey will take place then another meeting will follow.

Potholes: Cllr Barnacle reported that PKC has over 2,000 potholes to deal with, at a cost of £100 per pothole. There is a significant contribution from the Scottish Government to assist with repairs.

A977 Mitigation Measures: Cllr Barnacle reported that the consultation has concluded. One proposal is traffic counters at Balado.

LDP2: Cllr Barnacle reported that this will go to full Council at the end of August.

CC Information: Cllr Barnacle recommended a leaflet that Portmoak CC had produced to inform the public of the work of Portmoak CC.

Changes at PKC: Cllr Barnacle reported that, at the last full Council, there was a move to remove an Independent councillor from two committees. This had not been notified in advance to the Independent group. He moved for deferral but this was refused. As a consequence, the three Independent councillors have left the administration group and have formed a group with the one Labour councillor. Cllr Barnacle has lost the convenorship of the Environment Committee. A meeting is due to take place with committee services on 3 May. The Independent councillors want a fair share of committee places based on the number of councillors elected. (See Councillors' columns, p. 10 and p.16.)

Other Business

Foul water at golf course: CCllr Davies raised this on behalf of a resident. There is a foul boggy area near the path along the golf course close to the Windlestrae Hotel. The resident had been told by PKC that it was not a health risk. Cllr Robertson is contacting SEPA.

Dog mess: CCllr McKay again raised the idea of highlighting dog mess with special paint. It was agreed to have a formal proposal to buy paint at the next meeting.

Kinross-shire Decides: CCllr Bryson reported that the Primary School Parent Council has still not received an update from Tracey Ramsay as to why their project was not shortlisted for the participatory budget event. He stressed the need for transparency in respect of the shortlisting process.

School Fair: CCllr Bryson reported that the School Fair will now take place in August. The Parent Council will have a presence at the BPTLF and will be holding a raffle.

Better Place to Live Fair: The Chair will confirm the stall booking.

Muirs: CCllr Blyth reported that ponding is bad on the east side of the Muirs. Cllr Purves will look into it.

Premises for community: CCllr Cuthbert notes that several community groups require premises. Unfortunately PKC seems to have sold off most spare land or premises. He suggested that ward councillors look for a budget to buy land or premises. CCllr Colliar pointed out that there is a PKC-owned lock-up in Mill Street not being used.

Action Partnership: CCIIr Freeman also raised this subject. Three vacancies were advertised a few months ago. Shona Fowler and Dr McCracken were appointed. CCIIr Cuthbert applied but was rejected. Minutes of meetings are not made publicly available as regularly or promptly as they could be. CCIIr Cuthbert has made a FOI request relating to the Action Partnership activities. In CIIr Barnacle's view, the officer-led Action Partnerships are undermining CCs. He reiterated his preference for an area committee for Kinross-shire to involve CCs and with significant funding. CIIr Watters believes it is appropriate to have different forums for different issues. All were agreed, however, that Action Partnerships need to be more democratically accountable. It was agreed to wait until the CC receives a reply from Mr McNamara before taking further action. CCIIr Cuthbert's FOI response is also due soon.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 6 June 2018 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall, Muirs, Kinross.

Milnathort Community Council News from the AGM and May Meeting

In attendance at the meetings held on 10 May 2018 were: CCllrs C Williams (chair), C Flory (vice-chair), E Kirkham (treasurer), S McHardy, M Leach and C Lawson; P&K Cllrs C Purves, R Watters and W Robertson; minute-taker Elizabeth Rougvie and nine members of the public.

Chairman's remarks: The last year has seen Kevin Heneghan our Secretary leaving us which has left a big hole to fill. I also welcome Caroline Flory, Matthew Leach and Stuart McHardy, who by virtue of the recent election process, controlled by PKC, are duly elected to Milnathort CC as members. That of course in reality does not change the fact that we are short on numbers and I encourage those in the community who can enhance the CC with their skills – two new members would make a big difference.

Main planning issues of the year:

Pace Hill: This development despite much opposition from the public will go ahead.

Football Pavilion, Donaldson Park: This development again, with many differing views in the community, will go ahead.

The Holiday Park at Burleigh Sands has been put on the back burner and a close eye will be kept on this.

In general, most issues raised with PKC through our local P&K Councillors have been resolved successfully. We thank them for their efforts in these matters.

Our efforts in requesting Vehicle Activated Signage to a number of locations in Milnathort have been well received and will be monitored.

The defibrillator has been successfully installed at Stewart & Smart garage forecourt.

A Tree Preservation Order was successfully obtained for the woods to the east of The Pace Hill development.

I'm encouraged by the enthusiasm of the regular "weel kent" faces in their steadfast attendance at our monthly meetings. More attendees are always welcome. I must however emphasise that the community must raise issues with planning matters as early in the process as possible, in order that action can be taken.

News from the May Meeting

Police matters: No police were in attendance but the following incidents were raised:

An elderly lady driver was stopped in Kinross and asked for a lift to the health centre by a woman who appeared to have a bad leg. She obliged but en route the woman stole her handbag and purse and ran off. There has since been a second similar incident and the culprit has yet to be identified.

A house near Jessie's Park was broken into and the perpetrators have since been apprehended.

A trellis has been stolen from a garden and flowerpots overturned.

A drugs transaction was seen taking place in South Street and the police later attended.

There had been a near-miss involving a high school pupil crossing the road from Giacopazzi's to the campus. The P&K Cllrs will find out whether the traffic lights there are in fact operational.

Minutes of the last meeting: The minutes of the April meeting were proposed by CCllr Kirkham and seconded by CCllr Flory with the following amendment: 'Two out of the four vehicle-activated signs in the village still had not been activated.'

Zero Waste Challenge: PKCllr Purves confirmed that Sainsbury's had paid for the entire project, including the printing and distribution of leaflets.

Vehicle-activated signs: All four signs are now in operation. Cllr Purves advised that a report on the planned programme of works to be carried out throughout Perth & Kinross was to be presented to the Infrastructure, Enterprise and Environment Committee this month. A vehicle-activated sign in Stirling Road, which had been suggested by MCC, was included on the list but a sign in North Street was not. It was to be hoped this would be considered during the next round of funding. CCllr Leach would appreciate any feedback from the public as to the effectiveness, or otherwise, of the signs.

Green routes: Cllr Robertson has suggested to PKC that the green route from Milnathort to Glenfarg via Netherton be extended to alleviate the problem of speeding following the introduction of a national speed limit at Tillywhally. He will report back.





Following concerns raised at the previous meeting about the impact on traffic in North Street by the Pace Hill development, Cllr Purves advised that he will raise the possibility of alternative access, either via Stirling Road or Hattonburn Road.

LDP2: Developers have submitted sites they believe should be included in the Local Development Plan. Councillors are to comment on the proposals before they are sent to the Scottish Government Reporter. Once councillors have had time to digest the information, they will report to MCC.

Core path at Burleigh: Cllr Purves has reported the flooding issue but awaits a response.

Road safety: CCIIr Leach has asked for a meeting with PKC officials with regard to Stirling Road and the speed bumps in Bridgefauld Road, which are in a poor state. CIIr Purves will take this up also. After discussion, it was agreed to ask for a review of a speed bumps as it was felt that the safety of schoolchildren could be compromised due to the volume of traffic at certain times of the day.

Planning applications submitted:

Erection of a storage building and security fencing on land 40 metres north of Kingfisher House. Noted.

Erection of a house on land 30 metres south east of 30 Viewfar Road. Noted.

Planning applications approved:

Formation of vehicle access at Carleith Hill Wood.

Alterations to a house at 27 Old Perth Road.

Pace Hill: CCIIr Lawson advised that he had written to PKC expressing his concerns about the apparent lack of traffic monitoring in relation to the development at Pace Hill.

New matters and correspondence:

There was no correspondence of note.

Meetings: CCllr Williams flagged up the idea of changing the frequency of MCC meetings to every two months. After discussion, the idea was rejected.

Church Street gate: CCllr McHardy reported that the gate into Donaldson Park from Church Street had been lifted off again, allowing vehicles to access the park. CCllr Robertson will ask PKC to repair the gate and ensure it cannot be opened again. Football pitch: CCllr McHardy was concerned that two new trees planted in Donaldson Park were too close to the football pitch. Cllr Robertson will investigate.

Junction 7: There has been no progress on improvements to Junction 7 of the M90.

Potholes: The pothole in New Road has been repaired but there is still a huge backlog of repairs throughout Perth



& Kinross following the extreme weather in March. The Scottish Government has provided extra funding. Cllr Purves advised that a cross-party group had been set up to look at the methods and materials used in other areas.

Councillors' reports

Cllr Robertson:

MCC members are encouraged to claim **expenses** where appropriate.

With the help of two **litter pickers**, 10 bags of rubbish were collected from the water works at Burleigh.

The CC is encouraged to consider marking the 100th anniversary of the end of the **First World War** in November to honour those local people who lost their lives. This was agreed. The CC will also lay a wreath at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday.

Cllr Watters (see also page 10):

Local residents are encouraged to report incidents of **dog fouling and dumping of bags**. In the last year only five fixed penalties were issued in Kinross-shire, two of them recently at Portmoak Moss as a result of a visit by the dog warden. *Cllr Purves (see also page 7):*

The number of **reserved places** at Kinross High School has been increased significantly in the light of the many new developments taking place. At present, 21% of pupils are either from Fife or Clackmannanshire. Cllr Purves will find out the exact number of places allocated to each year.

PKC's Scrutiny Committee has set up a sub-committee to look at issues raised frequently in terms fo planning.

Portmoak Community Council News from the AGM and May Meeting

In attendance at the meetings held on 8 May 2018 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), B Calderwood (Deputy Chairman and Treasurer), R Cairncross (Secretary), D Morris, A Muszynski and T Smith; and WCllrs C Purves, and R Watters; and PC A Spalding, Police Scotland; and seven members of the public.

Apologies: CCIIr S Forde; and P&K CIIrs M Barnacle and W Robertson.

News from the AGM

Chairman's Annual Report [edited]: There have been three events this year of more than usual significance to the parish. The first is the change in administration PKC. Last year I expressed the hope that the new councillors could have some effect in changing the culture in PKC in dealing with the communities it is supposed to serve. There is some indication that there is a greater willingness on the part of the new administration to tackle this issue. The policy of the administration to focus more on the landward areas of PKC and less on Perth City is to be welcomed. We are dependent on our four ward councillor members for presenting our case to PKC officials and they have been diligent in doing so, with success in arranging meetings for us in particular in relation to roads. We are grateful to them for all their help and advice. Second is "the Beast from the East" and its successor. The Beast brought out the very best in the community with neighbours looking after each other, those who had the equipment doing their best to make sure everybody had access and the three shops going to special efforts to have basic supplies available for everybody. In that they were considerably more successful than the supermarkets, whose distant supply chains could not cope with the weather. I would like to thank all those involved again for everything they did. The episode showed us how important the shops are to us when the chips are down and I do hope that they will all be able to keep going; but that is dependent on us.

There were other lessons too. Your CC had already started to think of the preparation of a "resilience plan" for the parish to cope with emergencies and the Beast gave us a practical example to build on. All communities are being encouraged to have such a plan. An Emergency Resilience Centre and an address book of those able and willing to help are the essentials and we shall be working on these in the coming months. We shall be looking for volunteers!

The third event was the lodging of a planning application by A & J Stephen for the construction of a house on the north west side of Stephen's field, and for the rest of the field to be designated as public open space. Stephens were offering to transfer ownership of the rest of the field to your CC if they received permission for the house. Your CC decided that it did not need to hold a ballot of the whole community to ascertain its view of this proposition as the 65 objections lodged to the building of the house were a sufficient indication of the community's view, and they should therefore lodge their own objection. PKC subsequently refused the application. What will happen next we shall have to wait and see, but it is the policy of your CC to see the field transferred into community ownership.

The Stephen's application was one of the 26 we had to consider in the year. This is a significant reduction on the 40 we had to consider in 2016/7 and is perhaps a reflection

of the real state of consumer confidence. The fact that no buyer has emerged for the building site on the south side of Scotlandwell also says something about demand for housing. We objected to four of these applications, including Stephen's and the Westfield applications. We anticipate a further application from the owner of the Lomond Inn, where development has not yet started.

I referred last year to the in principle application for a development covering the whole of the Westfield site to which both we and PKC objected. The application has now been approved and although there are conditions relating to traffic and other matters of concern to us they are not as robust as we would have liked. So far there has been no full application for any part of the development but there has been an application for ten gas turbines for the generation of electricity on the part of the Westfield site nearest to our boundary. This was not something envisaged in the in principle application and gave rise to a number of objections from Fife. We have lodged one too. A decision on the application has been postponed on several occasions by Fife Council.

It would appear that the proposal for holiday chalets between Burleigh Castle and Loch Leven is not going to proceed, or at least has gone back to the drawing board.

Planning is not just about applications, and we have been active in making representations on the Local Development Plan, which should receive ministerial approval later in the year. It will be the foundation for planning decisions over the next ten years.

One of the effects of the new PKC policy is that there is more money available for roads. The flashing signs on the roads into Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell are one result of this. They are already having a beneficial effect. It is to be hoped that these new funds may also allow improvements, perhaps traffic lights, at the Wester Balgedie junction to be put on the PKC agenda, as lack of funds was the reason given by officials for not taking action. We are also aware that the state of our road surfaces after the Beast is at least as bad as that in the rest of the UK. The roads department is well aware of our concerns but we have to take our turn when other parts of PKC have the same issues. We understand that the resurfacing of the A911 between the golf club and Scotlandwell will take place later this year. We still await the promised action plan for the A911.

The other major roads issue is related to the school. There are two aspects to this. First is the question of cars being parked in such a way that access for school buses and large

vehicles which may be needed in the case of an emergency is impeded. The PKC roads officials are looking again at how this problem might be resolved. Secondly there is the question of safe access for pupils on foot. The crossing point on Bruce Road/Bishop Terrace has no legal status and PKC officials are looking at the possibility of warning signs for motorists of children crossing. Of course a zebra crossing is the best answer. The crossing at Buchan Avenue is not ideal and the Headteacher is considering alternatives.

Progress on the acquisition of the car park site at Moss Road, Scotlandwell has been stymied by title problems but a possible solution is being considered.

A priority for your CC for some time has been the provision of a safe route for pedestrians and particularly schoolchildren linking Scotlandwell with the hall, whence it can link to the path from Kinnesswood. A meeting has been held on site with PKC officials and by the end of this year I hope that at least a route will have been decided upon and budgeted for. The paths group has carried out its usual, essential task of keeping clear existing paths and maintaining the Michael Bruce Way. Many thanks to Tom Smith for coordinating this, and to the Woodland Trust who assume responsibility for the part of the MBW on their ground. Loch Leven's Larder have recently obtained planning permission for a new circular path down to the Heritage Trail and back to the Larder.

At last a site has been found for a glass recycling point in Kinnesswood to replace the one lost at the Lomond Inn. So successful has it been that PKC are now looking at providing a further site with possible sites under discussion.

The possible site for an extension to the graveyard mentioned last year is not a possibility. Please let me know of any suggestions.

I am disappointed that the follow up I anticipated last year to meetings with the River Leven Trustees and SNH has not occurred. I shall be contacting both again.

Finally, broadband. Despite having fibre optic cable running along the A911 right through the parish, many of us have a very unsatisfactory service. I understand that Kinnesswood is in the process of being wired up for a proper service but many of us have little prospect of that from BT. Thanks to the initiative of Andrew Mitchell, a resident at Classlochie, there is an alternative. Broadband can be obtained via either radio or white space TV. This will take a bit of time to roll out, but there have been successful pilots in the area, and there is scope for it to help many parts of Portmoak when relay stations have been set up.

My fellow councillors have put in a power of work this year as we have had a number of extra meetings on particular issues and I thank them for that and for their help and support. I hope they will forgive me if I single out Robin Cairncross again for his crucial work as secretary in coordinating us and keeping the paperwork right. I regret that Alison Robertson has decided to retire at the end of this meeting; she has been full of stimulating ideas and her experience of the ways of councils and the NHS has been valuable. We shall miss the regular bulletins from the metropolis of Stornoway! That leaves a vacancy on the council and if anybody knows someone who would be interested in filling it they should contact the secretary.

In discussion, Ward Cllrs confirmed that any changes to the Kinnesswood settlement boundary which might be included in the forthcoming Local Development Plan were thought unlikely. The CC would be consulted were they to be considered.

News from the May Meeting

School Access. At a site visit on 16 April CCllrs Morris and Cairncross met with Daryl McKeown (PKC Road Safety) to review: progress with arrangements to resolve problems of access to the school for large vehicles including emergency vehicles; and the safe passage for children approaching the school on foot and using the "red strip" crossings. Subject to discussion with the School, a Report would be shared with the CC before submission to PKC's Environment and Infrastructure Committee. Cllr Purves would monitor progress.

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church, Hall and beyond.

At a site visit on 16 April CC members met PKC officers representing strategic planning, road safety and path access together with Cllrs Barnacle, Purves, Robertson and Watters for an initial examination of options for a 24/7 lit path. The CC would now undertake preliminary work on an option appraisal before further discussion with PKC on how to take the work forward.

RSPB Loch Leven: Underpass commissioning arrangements. Work had now commenced.

Resilience - being better prepared for risks. Community Emergency Plan. On 30 April CC members had had a preliminary and comprehensive discussion with John Handling (PKC Lead on Resilience) and Simon Byford (Chair of the Hall Committee) to explore what would be required to commission and sustain a Portmoak Resilience Plan. There was a wealth of information to assimilate and support available from a number of agencies. A practical plan tailored to local needs would be required. Led by CCllr Musynski, the CC would build its Resilience Plan over the coming months. The community would be consulted and involved as the Plan developed. In a preliminary step the CC would shortly apply for funding to SSE to provide a "hook-up" facility at the Hall and other basic material. This would support an emergency generator supply for what may become a "Resilience Hub" for the community.

Revised CC website. Members of the CC had reviewed the new website for the CC and approved its immediate introduction. They expressed their thanks to the webmaster, Gordon Vance. It was now easier to access both on PC and mobile platforms.

General Data Protection Regulations effective 25 May. Guidance for CCs was expected from PKC shortly. The CC would review its practice in respect of that Guidance.

Comfort Scheme. PKC offers a number of free to use public toilets through partnerships with local service providers such as hotels, pubs and public buildings. This service is known as the "Comfort Scheme." These facilities are available for public use at no cost, regardless of whether or not they are a customer. With increasing visitors to the Heritage Trail and to many businesses across Portmoak providing for tourism there was interest in participating in the scheme. Ward Cllrs undertook to find out if Portmoak businesses were eligible, what the advantages were and if indeed there were any already part of the Scheme.

Glass Recycling, Kinnesswood. The CC noted the popularity of the glass recycling facility behind the bus shelter and the request from PKC to consider an additional site either midway up Gamekeepers or at the school car park. A site at the school car park site was judged unsuitable. It could add to concerns about parking and child safety which were already the subject of a review. The Gamekeepers site was thought remote and may not be used. The CC advised that the existing site behind the bus shelter be evaluated to see if an expanded facility could be accommodated there. The CC would advise Kinnesswood in Bloom of their view and would write to PKC accordingly.

Police report: PC Spalding reported on two recent local crimes: theft of a rear light cluster form a white Ford Ranger in Scotlandwell; and the theft of a £4,000 trailer from RSPB Loch Leven. He reminded all of us to consider shed security where valuable equipment is often stored. Speeding remained a matter of concern and further checks can be anticipated. PC Spalding undertook to pursue whether accident records were duly relayed to PKC as such information was taken into account by PKC in setting priorities for road improvements. He would also raise the matter of accident reports being included in the Commander's Bulletin. The Area Commander's Bulletins of 11, 18 and 25 April and of 2 May were noted.


New planning applications:

18/00397/FLL East Brackley Lodge, Kinross. Alterations and extensions to dwelling house. No comment.

18/00526/FLL Benarty, Wester Balgedie, Kinross. Alterations and extension to dwelling house. No comment.

Progress with Developments:

16/03661/CON. Former Lomond Inn: proposals for part demolition and erection of 5 dwelling houses. A further application was expected shortly.



17/02227/FLL Levenmouth Scotlandwell: Erection of two houses. On 12 April the Chairman had written to Cllr Roz McCall, Convenor of the Planning and Development Management Committee, drawing to her attention that PKC did not process this application appropriately. The decision to grant consent was made by the planning officer. The Council's "Scheme of Delegation" for planning application decisions, approved by Scottish Ministers in October 2016, in Para 2 (d) states that "the Development Management Committee will determine all applications for local developments where - d) a similar application at the same site was previously determined by the Committee and the recommendation is contrary to the previous Committee decision." In the CC's view this decision should have been dealt with under that paragraph. To date there had been no acknowledgement of the letter.

Roads: CCllr Calderwood reported that limited progress had been made on outstanding road matters.

Paths: CCllr Smith presented an Action Plan setting out the Path Group's work for the year ahead. He thanked Path Group members Anne McIntyre and Andrew Wilson for their contribution to the Action Plan. There were three priority areas for action: 1. The Michael Bruce Way (MBW); 2. Dryside Way - the Core Path from Easter Balgedie to Glenlomond Road; and 3. Improvement of General Signposting of Paths throughout Portmoak. There was a detailed plan for each area. This year the intention was to take path work forward through targeted work groups. The CC noted that the Woodland Trust had assumed responsibility for maintaining the MBW when it crossed its land and thanked the Trust for the recent repairs to the steps opposite the Church. The Group planned to use a motorised flail mower to maintain the path at Peat Loan as it leaves the Moss. Cattle and weather contributed to the relatively high maintenance of the MBW where it passed above Stephen's Field and the golf course.

Perth & Kinross Council Ward Councillor Reports

Cllr Purves reported that: the new Vehicle Activated Speeding signs had been appreciated and that a further one would be erected at Easter Balgedie; and that the Council's Scrutiny Committee is likely to consider a review of planning services. It appeared likely that the Council's "Scheme of Delegation" could be included in the review. A Report on Child Protection provision across Scotland had identified Perth and Kinross as "Best in Scotland".

Clir R Watters reported on a visit he had made with the Dog Warden to Portmoak Moss. [See page 10.]

Other Matters

Review of Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils in Perth and Kinross. Not much was known about this

in Perth and Kinross. Not much was known about this Review but it had the potential to be significant. The CC would participate in the meetings PKC proposed. It also supported the suggestion of Ward Cllrs that a meeting of the Kinross Forum, with representatives from all Kinross-shire CCs, along with PKC representatives could be an effective way to proceed. Cllr Purves would try to set up such a meeting.

Fossoway and District CC News from the AGM and May Meeting

News from the AGM

Chair's Report

The elected members of the CC are: Cameron Brown, Angus Cheape, Jennifer Donachie, Trudy Duffy, Carol Farquhar and Graham Pye. I would like to thank all for their support, and I would also like to thank the members of the public for their support and for keeping us on our toes.

The CC has had another very busy year with eleven scheduled meetings, additional meetings and a large volume of correspondence.

Police Service: Unfortunately visits from the community officers are rare. We get most of the relevant information from the Commander's Bulletin and from Perth and Kinross Community Watch.

Main Issues Report: We have consulted on the LDP2, in particular on the re-zoning of three sites, in Blairingone, Rumbling Bridge and Crook of Devon. The public consultation on the Main Issues Report of LDP2 finished March 2017.

Fossoway and District Community Benefit Fund: After extensive community consultation and hard work behind the scenes, for which I would like to thank John Wheatley and Jim Duffy, this fund is now operational and has in the past two weeks processed its first grant. There is a website (still a work in progress: www.fossowayfund.org.uk) where all the information can be found. We will also receive a large sum which originates from the unspent contingency fund of the Hydro Scheme that will be used to reinstate the bridge over the River Devon. We are currently in discussion with TRACKS about this.

A977 Mitigation Measures: The traffic, in particular the speed of the traffic, is an ongoing concern for our villages on the A977, but also on the A91 through Carnbo and the A823 through Rumbling Bridge. There have been two consultation events with PKC, in addition to a presentation during the January CC meeting and another presentation scheduled for this evening. This was to involve the community in deciding how to spend the money earmarked for the mitigation measures on the A977. The work is scheduled for 2018.

CC Members: There is an urgent requirement for more Community Councillors, especially from Rumbling Bridge, which has currently no representation in the CC. Our work relies on members of the community who have their ears to the ground.

Community Initiatives: The CC is taking part in a number of community initiatives: Kinross Sports Hub, Powmill in Bloom, Crook and Drum Growing Together. In the last few weeks plans have been hatched to resurrect the Fossoway Gathering. The nature of such a project makes it necessary for community organisations in our area to communicate with each other. Please consider becoming involved.

Blairingone Primary School: Although a final decision is still to be made, it is clear that the Primary School in Blairingone is under threat. Should it close, it would mean that Blairingone loses its only community asset. We have to try to prevent this loss. Blairingone has also been beleaguered by a series of planning applications, appeals, planning enforcement issues and Local Review Body appeals at the Lambhill site. John Anderson in particular needs to be commended for his eagle eye, while Frazer Barnes has worked on the communication side of the village's response.

Public Transport: We remain unhappy with the level of public transport service in our area; no regular bus service exists to connect commuters to the Park and Ride in Kinross.

Planning: There have again been slightly less planning applications in the past year.

Facebook and other communication: We try to keep Facebook up-to-date to inform people in the villages of events and developments. I still hear people complaining that they are not informed of one thing or another, but I would like to remind everybody it is also their own responsibility to keep informed: notice boards, Facebook and the Kinross Newsletter are the main sources of information.

Thank you to my fellow councillors for their support and for the very significant efforts they have made in dealing with their portfolios and attending external meetings. Many thanks also to our local Councillors Barnacle, Purves, Robertson and Watters for their significant support and assistance to the CC on numerous matters. As a CC we like to think that we can make a positive contribution to our community; but we can't do this without the help of the community and the elected members.

As I am a European citizen, there is some uncertainty about whether I will be able to continue being a Community Councillor after Brexit. If I lose the right to vote in local



council elections, I would not be able to remain in the CC. However, the earliest that could come to pass is March 2019 so I will put myself forward for another term.

Treasurer's report

This year started well, receiving the Administrative Grant from PKC without any problems, topping the CC's funds back up to the maximum £700.00 allowed. Also, the online access to the CC's bank account has made paying the CC's bills much easier, with almost every transaction being paperless, most creditors sending us their invoices electronically as well.

The largest item of the CC expenditure is for rentals of Fossoway and Blairingone primary schools, Carnbo Village Hall and Moubray Hall in Powmill to hold our monthly meetings. A total of £278.40 was spent on hall rentals, slightly up from last year's £227, partly because I discovered that we hadn't paid for a couple of rentals to Moubray Hall in earlier years!

All Community Councillors are allowed to claim for any expenses they incur over the year for travelling to meetings, other than normal CC meetings, and any other incidentals — postage, stationery, etc. This year £157.64 has been claimed in expenses, a slight improvement over last year's total of just under £140. CC members attend a lot of meetings over the year, and should claim for all expenses incurred — I encourage them to do so.

The CC banks with the TSB, and the much publicised problems this bank has had recently coincided with the end of the CC's financial year making finalising the accounts a rather challenging task this year.

After all the transactions over the year have been tallied the CC has a closing balance at year end of £263.96 and I will be applying for this year's grant once this meeting has approved the accounts.

Office Bearers: The Office Bearers all resigned from their current posts and new holders are as follows: Trudy Duffy, Chair. Cameron Brown, Secretary. Graham Pye, Treasurer. Trudy Duffy, Data Controller. Graham Pye, Vice Chair.

The following posts are not formal offices, so were not covered at the AGM: J Donachie, Planning and Deputy Secretary. G Pye, Minutes Secretary. C Brown, Deputy Minutes Secretary. Date of Next AGM: 7 May 2019.

News from the May Meeting

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police report: Unfortunately no officer was able to be present. There were no incidents to note in our area in the last month from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch.

There was a recent RTA in Blairingone; a car travelling at speed hit a parked car and demolished bollards, narrowly avoiding crashing into a house. The owner of the house informed the meeting that the driver claimed that his brakes had failed while he was travelling at 60mph in a 30mph area. When later contacted, the local Police officer was unaware of the incident, possibly because it was reported to an officer in a different area. Cllr Robertson took an action to contact PKC to get the scene of the accident tidied up.

Cllr Barnacle observed that he has had previous experience where there was a problem with contacting the local officer by the normal channels, and he will follow this up.

A977 Mitigation: Lachlan MacLean from PKC presented the results of the Community Consultation. Overall, there was strong support for junction improvements, so the plan is to initially carry out the following works:

- A977 / School Road in Crook of Devon Signalisation
- A977 / B9097 by Shell Garage Realignment
- A977 / Saline Road in Blairingone Signalisation

If there are sufficient funds available, then signalisation of the A977 / Drum Crossroads will also be done.

Some Vehicle Activated Speed signs (VAS) have already been upgraded to show current speed. Vehicle Activated Junction Warning Signs will be upgraded this financial year at Balado and Rumbling Bridge. Mr MacLean confirmed that the signs will all include a three year maintenance contract with the supplier. There were a number of comments from the floor requesting further VAS, for example on the Kinross side of Blairingone, so this will be investigated.

Existing road signs will be upgraded with ones having better reflectivity.

If funds permit, village entrance/exit gateway features will be constructed, with the co-operation of the local bloom groups. It is planned that school visits will be arranged to the works in progress, with the intention that this will be informative for both the children and the engineers!

Unfortunately there will be some temporary delays while the work is done, but this will be kept to a minimum.

A MoP asked if "solar studs" (flashing solar cell powered lighting devices used instead of cats-eyes) are planned to be installed. Mr MacLean answered that they may be used at major junctions if funds allow. John Anderson pointed out the contradiction between these measures to dissuade HGVs from using the A977, whilst PKC's planners are simultaneously allowing a large number of additional HGVs to service the Lambhill site. Cllr Robertson answered that the roads are all theoretically not at capacity, since that would

Doors • Windows Kitchens Fencing • Glazing Cementwork mean a continuous stream of traffic 24 hours a day, but that doesn't mean that it's acceptable for HGVs to rumble through villages.

Conversely another MoP noted that everything that we consume is moved by HGVs and we shouldn't be conducting a campaign against them. Cllr Barnacle replied that although it's true that the A977 is an essential route for some journeys, other vehicles could be using the motorways instead.

A MoP asked if the A977 could be returned to trunk road status, but the Scottish Government has continued to refuse this

Automatic traffic and pedestrian counters have been installed along the route, one between Powmill and Rumbling Bridge and the other between B918 and Turfhills, with a further vehicle counter on Balado straight. In response to comments from MoPs about the position of some of the counters, Mr MacLean said that they will be adjusted shortly.

Finally Mr MacLean concluded his presentation by offering to take further comments and questions via email to LMacLean@pkc.gov.uk. The CC thanked Mr MacLean for his efforts in this project.

Blairingone School Estate Transformation: The updated options appraisal will be presented to the Lifelong Learning Committee meeting on 16 May. The appraisal recommends that the school be closed; the current pupil numbers (four) are not sustainable and if the development for Blairingone proposed to be included in LDP2 happened it would still only produce two to three more pupils. Cllr Barnacle challenges this conclusion and intends to make that point to the Convenor of the meeting. Even if the committee decides on closure there must then be further public consultation over a long period.

Lambhill: Application 17/02015/FLL for the static caravan having been refused by the planners has now been appealed by the applicant and sent to the LRB for review. The CC wrote to the LRB confirming our previous objections.

Hydro Scheme Fund: CCllr Duffy notes that the first grant will shortly be made. Cllr Robertson reported that the TRACKS Committee agreed that they were prepared to be involved in the replacement of the Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge. Consequently a site visit was held on 28 April attended by five TRACKS Committee members, a TRACKS Project Officer and TRACKS bridge expert Alastair Smith. It was suggested that a similar design to the existing bridge west of the Scout Field would be appropriate, and a site about 75m west of the old bridge location was proposed as a possible location, requiring a span of approximately 18 metres. Full details and

costings will be produced in time for the next meeting of this CC to review. A representative of the CC will temporarily join the TRACKS committee for the duration of the project to share the decision making. CCllr Brown asked if it would save money to use the base of the old bridge, but Cllr Robertson said that funders will want to be sure that it's not going to be washed away again from the old location.

MoP added that there are still some outstanding issues from the hydro scheme construction that need to be addressed.

Crook and Drum Growing Together: CCllr Duffy told the meeting that their Spring Fair held on 28 April made £300. The group are also acquiring two very large planters from Edinburgh that were surplus to requirements.

Powmill in Bloom: CCIIr Farquhar reported on the group's activities: They anticipate a problem with the large amount of verges to be maintained in their area, so they have decided to buy a mower to do interim cuts themselves between the ones that are done by PKC twice a year.

LDP2: Cllr Barnacle has received a briefing on responses to LDP2; the proposed plans for our villages will go ahead as they are. There will be a full council meeting on 29 August to review whether LDP2 goes to the Reporter as it is or with changes. The plan will likely not be completed until early 2019.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: Cllr Barnacle notes that the latest Enforcement Report will be delivered to the Planning and Development Committee meeting on 9 May. Cllr Barnacle will be presenting photographs to show what enforcement action is needed. A MoP asked what's happening about the site's proposed sewage connection; Cllr Barnacle replied that the residents have applied to Scottish Water, but works must be done at the site before a connection can be made, but the residents can't afford to pay for them. Cllr Robertson said that PKC's Housing department has a budget to help with this sort of issue; however Cllr Barnacle remarked that it seems unfair that a private site should be helped with public money.

Matters Arising With No Update Since Last Meeting: Ivy Cottage Powmill, Blairingone War Memorial and Fossoway Area Transport.

Fossoway Gathering: There will be a meeting on 10 May to try and get this going for 2019. A lot of people are needed both on the day and to do the planning in advance. The first question to be answered is where to hold the Gathering.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Clir Robertson: Local Councillors will be meeting with PKC's Roads Department on 11 May to look at spending plans for Kinross-shire over the next 12 months and give their input.





There appear to be some promising plans for our area. Cllr Barnacle adds that there are 2,000 potholes in Perth and Kinross costing £100 each to fix, and there is a programme in place to fix them using some money from the Scottish Government.

Clir Barnacle: Two more road adoptions are being considered: Drummond Park and The Old Station in Rumbling Bridge.

Cllr Barnacle has always been in favour of devolving power to the community, but he does not believe that Action Partnerships are the way forward.

Three Independent and one Labour Councillor have left the administration, although they have not joined the opposition, as a protest against changes to committees, which they found undemocratic. (See pages 10 and 16.)

November 2018 is (of course) the anniversary of the end of WW1. A local resident has carried out extensive research into the history of some of the names on the Crook of Devon War memorial. There will be a meeting on 9 May to discuss the details of November's commemoration.

Correspondence: All the correspondence was available for viewing. PKC have asked for comments on the performance of Winter Services (gritting and snow clearance.) MoPs observed that Arndean Road (and other minor roads) were not cleared until after the latest snowfall had melted. Cllrs Robertson and Barnacle encouraged local farmers to apply for the Farmer's Assistance Scheme whereby PKC supplies snow ploughs to be used with their own vehicles to clear their own roads and specified public roads. Stuart D'All would be the contact point. Cllr Barnacle noted that there was a lack of clearing and gritting on village footpaths, but Cllr Robertson said that routes to school should be cleared.

Other Business

Muckhart CC have kindly passed on the information that Scottish Water were planning works on A823 that would have resulted in the road being closed for a week. However this work has now been postponed pending consultation with local residents to reduce the impact of the closure. CCIIr Duffy has contacted Gavin Steel of Scottish Water to be added to the information list.

SEPA have opened a consultation on Potentially Vulnerable Areas for flooding. Comments are welcome until 31 July, via the website: https://consultation.sepa.org.uk/evidence-and-flooding/pvas2018/

A MoP asked for the road between Crook of Devon and Powmill to be litter picked. Cllr Robertson undertook to arrange this. Another MoP noted that litter caught on fences does not seem to be included when other litter is cleared.

Recent speakers

We were delighted to be treated to an enthusiastic, informative and entertaining talk by **Sam Dick** about **Kinross-shire FM**. This project aims to start a community radio service for Kinross.

Although it only launched in February, already the radio is set up and it will be providing a 24/7 service by the summer. The project is aimed at providing social benefits to our community. Thirty-five volunteers are already signed up to help! The service is using the sound technology department in the High School and this provides pupils there with the opportunity to get practical experience in broadcasting. Working relationships are being established with local businesses and sponsorship and advertising is being sought to financially support the station.

Sam is also keen to talk to people who would like to be involved with programme and content creation. Although the name is Kinross-shire FM, the decision is still to be made whether to provide it as a digital service.

Malcolm Crawford of **Taylor Wimpey** spoke to us about the housebuilding industry in the east of Scotland. Malcolm works from the Dunfermline office where 150 colleagues are also based.

Taylor Wimpey is a very large company with £3.96 billion in revenue in 2017, generating profits of £550 million, most of which was returned to its shareholders.

Malcolm's talk was wide-ranging with a host of topics and statistics. He spoke about the challenges of meeting the Scottish Government's affordable housing target of 25% of all new house builds; a challenge shared by all in the building trade. He spoke of the reduction in housebuilding and the reasons behind it. He gave fascinating insights into the complex socio-economic analysis that companies like his do, before deciding what and where to build. Then, when they have made the decision to build in an area, how they acquire and use the land.

Particularly insightful was an explanation that the key to successful housebuilding today is standardisation. His own company builds just 30 different house types and only four types of apartments. These properties must also be sold no later than 30 days after completion; there's no concept of 'on-the-shelf stocking' in this business. It was an intellectually stimulating talk by someone who really knew his business.

Kinross Colts AFC (Saturday Amateur football team): The team was formed last season and consists of Portmoak Amateurs and Kinross Colts under 19s, with the majority of the team coming from Kinross or surrounding areas.

As the team was newly formed, it had to start in the bottom tier of the Fife Saturday Amateur League. The first season saw the lads build a great togetherness and enjoyed many good social events after the games as well as great work ethic on the pitch. There were some fantastic results throughout the season and they managed a respectable fifth place finish in the league.

In the second season we have seen the team improve, with some good runs in the cup competitions and a fantastic third place finish in the league. This actually might be enough to see the guys promoted to the Championship league!

The team home games are at Kinross Campus on Saturdays, with kick off at 2pm. We have seen an increase in crowds over the last two years and would always like to see more people there to cheer on the Colts.



First Grant from New Fossoway and District Community Benefit Fund

The Fossoway and District Community Benefit Fund is a small grant-giving fund, managed by Fossoway and District Community Council. The money, to be applied to community benefit within the Community Council area, is derived as a direct benefit from the Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Scheme.

The Fund has recently awarded its first grant to support Penney's Wood, a community woodland scheme in Drum / Back Crook. The grant is a contribution to a £2,500 project to enhance the woodland infrastructure, adding a pond area, bridges and seating, improving signage and access to his young woodland amenity.

A community survey was undertaken prior to the launch of the Fund. Responses were received from 22% of all households across the villages and hinterlands of Blairingone, Carnbo, Crook of Devon, Drum, Powmill and Rumbling Bridge and have helped determine grant terms and priorities. The survey also identified a strong desire for a number of key amenity and environmental improvements and actions to strengthen community cohesion. The Community Council is seeking to respond positively. Watch this space!





Build-A-Plane Project

The dynamic young Build-A-Plane team at Kinross High School, led by a team of aviation experts, is getting closer to take-off this summer as they work on the final stages of the Eurofox kit plane bought by Aero Space Scientific Educational Trust (ASSET).

The kit plane was delivered last November following a fund-raising campaign. The project is giving local Kinross High School pupils an exciting after-school opportunity to help assemble a real aeroplane from a full-size kit and encourage their interest in pursuing STEM subjects and forming strong and vitally important community links.

The plane will also be on show for the first time at the East Fortune Air Show on Saturday 28 July where visitors will


be able to see the plane first hand.

Kinross & District Probus Club

The Eyemouth Fishing Disaster by Robert Oliver

Bert's presentation was the tragic story of the Eyemouth Fishing Disaster, which happened on

14 October 1881, still called 'Black Friday' to this day by many locals.

Fishing was an essential part of the local economy in Eyemouth; the men went fishing and the women supported them by baiting the lines and repairing nets.

The sudden windstorm in October 1881 blew up while the fishing boats were out at sea and caused the deaths of 189 fishermen, of whom 129 were from Eyemouth itself.

The day began with the barometer at its lowest level ever recorded and an eerie feeling fell over the village. The fleet left the safety of the harbour and, with no wind, they had to row for miles heading out to the fishing grounds.

The storm, when it hit, came with such force and speed it caught everyone off guard. Boats capsized and disappeared under huge waves and others were wrecked on the rocky coastline of Hurkar Rocks. Forty-one boats were lost that day. There was an occasional miraculous story of survival against all the odds: the fishing boat, the Ariel Gazelle, arrived back in Eyemouth harbour two days after the storm, having survived, but largely the stories were of death, destruction and loss.

After the event, with every family in the village having suffered loss, there were calls for the orphaned children to be taken away and given new homes. However, the village community resisted on the basis that the children were the future and must remain. A support fund was set up to help the stricken families and quickly £50,000 was raised; equivalent to almost £4.5 million in today's money.

It's hard to imagine the scale of this disaster and the impact it must have had on this small community. However, Eyemouth did recover and, although the fishing fleets of old have long gone, 14 October 1881 will never be forgotten.

Strawberry Ice Cream

Ice cream is a bit time-consuming to make but, if you have a glut of strawberries, it's worth the effort to make this creamy dessert.

Ingredients

- 450g ripe strawberries
- 3 egg yolks
- 150g caster sugar
- 150ml milk
- 150ml double cream

Method

Put the egg yolks and sugar into a bowl and whisk together until the mixture becomes light and pale.

Heat the milk and cream to just below boiling point. Then pour in a thin stream into the egg and sugar mixture, beating all the time

Transfer to a double boiler or bowl on top of a pan of hot water and thicken on a gentle heat. Stir from time to time until you have a thick custard that smoothly coats the back of a spoon. Stand until it becomes cool.

Puree the hulled strawberries in a food processor then fold into the cool custard. Transfer to an ice cream mixture or freezer tray and freeze. Blend once or twice as it sets to prevent large ice crystals.

You may substitute the same amount of raspberries for raspberry ice cream.



The eager local entrepreneurs who landed at Loch Leven's Larder at 7.15am on 2 May for the Kinross-shire Partnership's Networking Breakfast may have been one day late for washing their faces in the early morning dew, but at least instead they enjoyed a full Scottish breakfast – not to mention having ample opportunity to network with other like-minded business people. Richard Scott. of the Cleaning Intelligence Agency, welcomed the gallant band of breakfasters to the Larder's lovely new café area, and invited each of them to make a 60-second 'elevator pitch' to introduce themselves and their business to evervone present.

The products and services described ranged from state-of-the art hair colouring to counselling to put the bounce back into your life, and from professional carpet cleaning to video production services or innovative software that helps companies recruit staff more effectively. The breadth of offerings from businesses in and around Kinross-shire is as impressive as it is diverse

Regular attendee Uwe Stoneman from the RSPB was delighted to reveal that

It would be impossible not to have been moved by the stories that Andy told about the plight of children and adults in South Sudan, Ethiopia, Tanzania and other troubled, sensitive areas of the world. He described how MAF's brave pilots regularly land planes in seemingly



impossible places, often on hillsides or in small forest clearings, in order to get assistance – in the form of food and medicines – to people in desperate need.

Video footage of these missions including interviews with one of MAF's pilots - and with Cathy Groenendijk, executive director of the organisation "Confident Children out of Conflict", with whom MAF have worked on several missions - was truly inspiring. Andy's passion for his work with MAF radiated from him during his entire presentation, and the entire MAF team is to be commended for the impressive results they have achieved during their 75-year existence. 

Annual General Meeting

The Trust held a very successful AGM at Cleish Hall on 23 April, attended by some 30 members.

The Chairman gave his report and started by saying that the Trust's principal activity was to do with planning matters. The Trust receives the weekly list of Planning Application from PKC and holds monthly meetings to discuss the applications in Kinross-shire and, if it feels necessary, responding to them. The Trust always responds on planning grounds which reflect the policy statements contained in the current Local Development Plan.

The Trust's main concerns in the past year have been involved with the Persimmon developments at the old High School site and Lathro Farm. Of special concern had been the lack of progress with the restoration of the old building into four houses and the design of the new houses, especially those in the Kinross Conservation Area. The Trust attempted to prevent the felling of 13 mature oak trees at Lathro Farm, sadly without success, and queries PKC's handling of that development.

The Trust has responded to the Draft LDP2, their main concerns being with the definition of Special Local Areas, the amendment to the Settlement Boundary Policy and the promotion of Milnathort as a Conservation Area.

The Awards Committee had a

successful year, with the Best Kept Village Competition again being well supported. The Chairman thanked Patrick Milne Home, who is retiring this year as the Awards Chairman, for his success in the past five years as chairman and welcomed David Hill as the new chairman.

For the future, the Trust is looking to visits to Cowden Japanese Gardens and the possibility of Kinross House.

The Treasurer presented the annual accounts which were accepted by the Trust and David Hill gave a presentation on the new proposals for the coming year's Best Kept Village Competition.

After the AGM the meeting was given an excellent talk by Brian Cunningham, head gardener of Scone Palace.

Brian began by giving a brief history of the site. There is evidence of a Roman encampment north of the palace. The Picts had a capital at the site and later Moot Hill in the palace grounds became the crowning place of Kings of Scotland. The grounds are visited by around 10,000 people between April and October. The palace has been in the Murray family for 400 years.

Brian showed photographs of some of the buildings in the palace grounds, including an old parish church. This dates from the time when the village of Scone was located here. The whole village was moved two miles away to allow for landscaping of the grounds after the medieval house was rebuilt as a palace in 1803.

Brian showed several historic photographs and modern equivalents to show different approaches to planting and design. A large kitchen garden has been reinstated to grow vegetables to use in the palace café. Maintenance regimes have changed due to the lower numbers of staff now compared to, say, 100 years ago.

Brian described various plants and explained why they were suited to the location. He also explained the important links between the famous plantsman David Douglas and Scone Palace

There are five full-time gardeners at the palace and lots of volunteers. The volunteers are essential to the continued maintenance of and improvement to the gardens.

Brian answered lots of questions.

His talk was greatly enjoyed by the members present.

The Chairman thanked Mr Cunningham for his excellent talk which he was sure would encourage members to visit the gardens.

Out & About

Loch Leven NNR

At last we've enjoyed a spell of better weather. Fingers crossed it remains like this because we've not had a good summer in a long time.

Unfortunately we did not win the Natura 2000 award but it was a privilege to be nominated. We shall continue to maintain the reserve to high standard and a quality place for wildlife to thrive while being enjoyed by the public.

Pretty much all of our migrant spring birds have returned to breed. There are lots of duck nests out on St Serf's and we've started to see lots of Mallard broods too. There have been many flies hatching for these hungry mouths to feed on.

In the last week of May we counted the gull colony out on St Serf's. We do this every other year. This year our data is part of a wider survey throughout the UK counting all of the seabirds. At Loch Leven we don't count every single nest, we map the colony tightly and split it into 25 metre quadrats and will count 10 to 15% of the colony. We take out a gang of our volunteers to help give us a hand.

We have a record count of 31 Heron nests out on Castle Island. This is good news because many other colonies are declining. The herons are very late hatching young this year because of the winter storms.

We have also started to cut the verges of the path. We don't just cut everything down. I like to leave areas where there are interesting plants and leave clumps of clover for the bees. Some parts of the path we'll only cut half the path. Our new machine that mulches up the cuttings is working very well.

The improvements to Mary's Knowe are continuing. Now the trees have been removed, we have already started planting. We have now put up a deer fence and will be planting more trees in here in the winter. We have already planted Hazel and Alder in the area with a hedge planted along the front.

As part of the Scottish Government programme of themed years, 2018 is the Year of Young People. Due to the nature of the site, the Loch Leven Heritage Trail is a perfect location for young people to explore and connect with nature. As part of the Young Scot rewards scheme, we have arranged a guided wildlife walk where the young person can gain reward points that can equate into money vouchers which will hopefully result in them getting outdoors and being active. The first guided walk was on 19 May but there will be another event for Young Scot card holders on Saturday 9 June where you can sign up via rewards.youngscot.org/rewards

Many thanks to everybody who made it to Discovery Day at Kirkgate Park. It was the first of a few events this year. We have **Botany Walks** on **20 and 21 June** at Findatie and Burleigh respectively from 6pm until 8pm. Liz and Steve are helping out with this again.

The blog is regularly updated. Please keep an eye on it with lots of photographs of wildlife we are seeing.

The territorial fights and flights are in full swing at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven as the breeding season advances apace. Twenty-seven lapwing nests have been counted on the reserve so far and the chicks are already out and about in the Bumblebee Meadow. Venture too close and you may be startled by the parents rising suddenly to the sky, piercing the air with their cries and trying to distract you from the chicks with their aerobatics. And so begins their annual battle with the crows, gulls and anything else that threatens their eggs and chicks – including humans!

From the Carden Hide there is a great cacophony of black-headed gulls to be seen on the floating island this month. On high alert for predators, these small gulls are able to fend off adult mute swans approaching too close to their nests. The gulls are quick to dive-bomb any perceived threats and persistent enough to drive them away. Appropriately named Chroicocephalus ridibundus (laughing colour head), the black-headed gulls are the noisiest of the wetlands birds on the reserve and can be observed bringing additional nesting materials to the island - dried grasses and such like – to enhance their

the Carden Hide. Two pairs of shoveler have been spotted vigorously harassing a persistent lone male, eventually seeing him off – with a great kerfuffle – first across the water and then into the air. The paired males are leaving nothing to chance!

If the black-headed gulls were to win the prize for noisiest wetland bird, then equally noisy, but more melodious, are the willow warblers to be heard on the Woodland Walk, where the leaves of the rowan and silver birch have just opened. With leaves to hide behind, this tiny warbler is almost impossible to spot but not impossible to hear. Perhaps the nightingale of the north?

And, of course, always a joy to see, the swallows are back and nesting in the courtyard, which means that summer has finally arrived.

Work has now started on our new underpass which will create an accessible link between the RSPB Scotland Loch Leven reserve and the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and Fife Core Path Network. The underpass will make a huge difference to many visitors and will put the whole area at the front of disabled access in Scotland. During the works the reserve will be open as usual for business.

The Crowdfunder project to help raise £19,000 for our new underpass project is now underway. [See article on page 5.] There are some fantastic rewards for donations. Farming

There has been a very welcome improvement in the weather in recent weeks, so the sodden wet land has been drying out nicely and the temperature has been rising.

The ewes have a good supply of grass so they should be producing plenty of milk for the lambs. I have cut back on the supplementary feed the ewes are getting and they won't be getting any more by the time you are reading this. They have eaten quite a lot this spring as I was being more generous than usual to help balance out the effects of the bad weather during the late winter period. We had a few more problems than usual with lambs in their first week of life and some tests suggested that the most likely cause was the ewes' colostrum (milk in the first day or two) not being as nutritious as it could be. This was surprising as our ewes have free access to specially formulated mineral feed tubs in the weeks prior to lambing to help boost their milk quality. However, such was the stress they were under with the weather so late in their pregnancy, the extra feed wasn't enough to do its usual job. Undoubtedly

if they hadn't been getting the extra supplement, the situation would have been much worse.

On the cereal front, things might not be quite as backward as usual here at Backward Farm this year. We got our barley drilled in just as good conditions as I have seen (although, things being as they are, conditions are sometimes not all that great on this particular farm) and the sowing date would certainly be latest ever, but relative to the proper arable farms of the district, we actually weren't that far behind. It is usually the case that a lot of spring cereals are sown a good month before we eventually manage to get the job done. This year, however, it was too cold and wet for the early farms to get started so instead of being perhaps a month behind, this year it's only about a couple of weeks. The later sowing dates for the earlier farms could well impact on the yields at harvest time and it could make harvest slightly later, but the weather in July and August will have a greater effect on the harvest date that the sowing date. Most of our cattle have gone out to grass at last so they should get off to a

good start for the summer. We didn't need to push them out too quickly as we had enough silage to keep them going. Our spring calving cows have got off to a slow start but we have a few calves now and hopefully they will mostly calf soon. The number of pigs on the farm has risen again after lan's sow, Sophie, had a litter of piglets recently. She and her brood are doing well and I think piglets grow even faster than lambs. It is amazing how the pig paddocks have dried out over the past few weeks going from wall to wall 'glaur' to almost complete 'stoor'. We are even having to make water filled wallows for them to cool down in - something that seemed unlikely just a week or so ago.

It will soon be time to start making silage for next winter, starting off the yearly cycle of events. The grass was slow to grow earlier in the spring, but it usually evens out over the course of a season. For many farmers, a good growing season will be vital to help recover from the harsh winter just passed.



Obituary

Gavin Verden-Anderson Award-winning photographer Born: 17 December 17 1964.

Died: 11 April 2018.

Gavin Verden-Anderson, of Gavin Anderson Photography in Milnathort, has died aged 53 as the result of a tragic accident while diving on a shipwreck in the Firth of Clyde. He was a talented freelance photographer and photojournalist with a passion for nature and adventure.

Born into a family that for five generations has owned Smith Anderson, a world leader in the manufacture of paper and paper bags in Fife, Gavin was educated at Cargilfield near Edinburgh and Strathallan in Perthshire. While at Strathallan he showed a special aptitude for skiing and was a member of the school team that won the British Schools Skiing Championship.

On leaving school in 1986 he set out to explore the world, spending time in Zimbabwe working on the tobacco farm of his uncle, Simon Faed, who was descended from a family of distinguished Scottish artists. This episode, which afforded him the chance to explore national parks in Africa, stimulated his desire to become a wildlife photographer and on returning to Scotland he developed a particular interest in marine biology while setting up fish tanks for an adventure farm being established at Silverburn on the Fife coast near Leven.

In 1987 Gavin was persuaded to join the family firm in Leslie as a management trainee responsible for purchasing raw materials to make paper and for setting up a waste collection system. This not only provided him with a regular income and good management experience, it gave him a chance to develop his diving



and photographic skills during vacation time.

It was during one of these vacations in 1988 that he made the first of many expeditions to explore the waters of the Red Sea. These visits would ultimately lead him to help develop an image library for the Lonely Planet guides, one of which, *Diving and Snorkelling Red Sea*, he co-authored.

After ten years with the family firm, Gavin decided to break loose in 1997 to follow his passion for underwater photography. As a freelance photojournalist he undertook many commissions to write and take photographs for a wide range of newspapers and travel and dive magazines.

Additional contract work came his way in providing content for Tourist Board travel brochures promoting exotic maritime locations including The Bahamas and Trinidad and Tobago.

A master of underwater photography, Gavin captured images of wildlife such as Great White Sharks, Leafy Sea Dragons and Fur Seals with an artistry that combined technical skill with a keen eye for his subject.

His easy style of writing, combining geography, history, wildlife and a wealth of photographic experience, endeared

him to aspiring armchair travellers as well as to professional divers with interests ranging from conservation to underwater archaeology.

In just over 30 years he notched up an impressive 5,000 hours creating unique underwater images taken in over 40 countries.

Keen to develop his photographic skills and expand his business, Gavin decided in 1999 to set up a top-of-the-range photographic studio at his home in Milnathort. Operating as Gavin Anderson Photography, he widened his enterprise to include portrait and commercial product work with a view to establishing a sustainable customer base beyond his underwater photojournalism interests.

In addition to photographic work for top companies such as PWC, Wood Mackenzie, Barrs and Stagecoach, Gavin was the official photographer for the Royal Scottish Geographical Society. His skill in taking photographs at royal events was in working the room to capture the best of images without being intrusive, a facility he had developed as a nature photographer. It was skills like this that earned him some of the top photographic awards, including the best UK Underwater Newcomer Trophy in 1993 and the MPA Master of Excellence Award in March 2012

While Gavin Verden-Anderson was a highly motivated person, enjoying travel and living life to the full, he was also a caring family man with many friends. He was a committed Christian, always adopting a warm, relaxed and friendly approach when working with adults, children and animals. He is survived by his wife Jenny and his son Josh by his first wife Eileen.
