## Council threatens Persimmon with Stop Notice

Perth & Kinross Council has threatened Persimmon Homes with enforcement action if the housebuilder does not make significant progress in renovating the retained school building at its 'Weaver's Loan' development on the former Kinross High School site.

PKC is threatening to put a Temporary Stop Notice on the site, which would mean that Persimmon would have to stop construction of the new-build properties there.

As part of planning permission for the site, Persimmon was supposed to convert the retained high school building, which dates from Edwardian times, into four dwellings before any of the 87 new-build houses on the site were occupied.

However, residents started moving into the new-build homes in Autumn 2017 while the Edwardian building remained a shell. The rear section and interior of the building were demolished and the roof removed over a year ago.

PKC and Persimmon signed a legal agreement (a bond) in January 2018, which states that the housebuilder will pay over a sum of money to the Council if it does not stick to a newly agreed schedule of works.

Under the 2018 schedule, Persimmon was supposed to have finished all the exterior renovation of the Edwardian building and most of the interior by mid June (at the time this article is being written), with just minor finishing works to be carried out. However, the developer is only at the stage of erecting timber frames for interior walls, something that should have been done in March.

Eddie Jordan, PKC Enforcement Officer, wrote to Persimmon on 25 May, saying: "The legal agreement required the substantive completion on 31 May, however the bond is secured until 31 August. The legal agreement has been breached and as such we are within our right to call upon the bond now. In our view, having the comfort of 6 weeks prior to the expiry of the bond would be sufficient for safeguarding the Planning position. Therefore, the Council as Planning Authority will exercise discretion relating to the breach of the legal agreement as the bond still has scope to be called upon if sufficient progress is still not being made.

If there is any doubt that the historic building will not be substantively complete within 6 weeks of the bond expiration so as to align with the terms of the legal agreement, we will commence enforcement proceedings and call in the bond."

The correspondence goes on to give a timetable of possible enforcement action. If progress is not "sufficient" by Friday 6 July 2018, PKC will put a Temporary Stop Notice on the site to "enable the developer to concentrate all effort on the substantive completion of the historic building."

The Kinross Newsletter was told by the Council last month that the renovation was "moving forward slower than expected" because "the contractors

have advised additional work was needed to support the retained elements of the existing High School building."

However, local councillors Callum Purves and Willie Robertson gave a different explanation to the June meeting of Kinross CC. The councillors reported on a meeting they'd had with PKC officers. At that meeting, the Enforcement Officer said that Persimmon's site manager had told him that workers had been pulled off the Edwardian building to work on the newbuilds instead, as purchasers were due to move in.

Meanwhile, Kinross CC is pursuing a Freedom of Information request relating to Council reports on the disposal of the site to Persimmon. The CC would like to see the full justification for PKC accepting a reduction of approximately £2.5million in the price paid by Persimmon. The CC may appeal to the Information Commissioner and is also considering reporting the matter to Audit Scotland.

#### Funding boost for Cleish Village Hall

Cleish Village Hall Association is celebrating a £11,000 funding boost from SUEZ Communities Trust for the Cleish Sports Field Access project.

This project will create a multi use path that will connect the village of Cleish to the sports field, giving emergency and supply vehicle access for the first time. At present the use of the sports field is limited to pedestrian access only.

Cliff Culley, Chair of Cleish Field Association Committee said: "We have struggled for years to enable any kind of access to our field but this additional funding from SUEZ Communities Trust will allow us to fund and now lay a hard core path providing safe access for all, thus enabling the consideration of more ambitious events to staged safely for the enjoyment of all."

Marek Gordon, chairman of SUEZ Communities Trust added: "SUEZ Communities Trust provides funding awards through the Scottish Landfill Communities Fund – an important source of funding which came into effect in April 2015. The scheme is linked to the Scottish Landfill Tax and encourages landfill site operators to provide contributions to approved bodies, who can then pass the funds on to community and environmental projects. We were delighted to be able to offer funding to Cleish village Hall Association."

#### Small move is big step for Glendale

#### **Community Investment Fund**

As I wrote about in the April edition of the Newsletter, one of the major new initiatives in the partnership administration's budget was the Community Investment Fund. The



idea was to set aside £50,000 per year for each council ward to let local communities set their own priorities and decide how this money should be spent. At a recent meeting of the Council's Strategic Policy and Resources Committee, we agreed how this fund would be delivered. A grants panel for each Council ward will be set up to assess applications from community groups and organisations. This panel will include ward councillors, representatives from each of the community councils and community representatives from the Local Action Partnerships. We shall be looking for applications to this fund after the Summer.

#### **Capital Budget**

The Council recently approved a revised capital budget for the years 2018/19 to 2027/28, which amounts to £585 million of investment. One of the most pressing issues has been the need to replace Perth High School, which is in a very poor condition. The total cost of doing so is £50 million. Disappointingly, however, the Scottish Futures Trust (an arm of the Scottish Government) have indicated that they will not support the project with funding. This has meant the administration has had to make some tough decisions to find the capital resources, including, for the time being, removing funding for new primary schools at Oudenarde and Pitlochry, reducing the funding for the proposed new Blairgowrie Recreation Centre and no longer pledging to support Live Active Leisure's plans to redevelop Perth Leisure Pool financially.

We have, however, been able to make a significant investment in roads maintenance with an additional £35 million committed over the lifetime of this budget. This will help to tackle the significant backlog of potholes and repairs that have built up, particularly in light of the severe weather earlier this year. The capital budget will be reviewed again in February once we know the outcome of the Tay Cities Deal, which could provide Perth & Kinross with millions of pounds of funding from both the UK and Scottish Governments for a variety of projects.



#### **Local Action Partnership**

While I am personally supportive of a Council area committee for Kinross-shire, comprising ward and community councillors, the Community Empowerment Act requires us to have locality groups to tackle inequalities. It is therefore incumbent on us to make local action partnerships work as best they can for the time being. At our most recent meeting of the Kinross-shire and Almond & Earn Partnership, I suggested that we ask the Community Planning Partnership Board to split us into two partnerships, giving Kinross-shire its own local action partnership. This was unanimously agreed and I believe it is a small but important step in the right direction.

#### **Lathro Meadows**

I have been contacted by a number of local residents who live in the new Lathro Meadows development. At present, they must leave their bins at the end of the road as the Council is not prepared to do kerbside collections. A number of reasons have been given for this, including the current poor condition of the road surface, exposed drainage, and Heras fencing making it difficult for bin lorries to manoeuvre. I have asked Council officers to liaise closely with the developers in an effort to get kerbside collection as soon as possible. This may require a phased approach as different parts of the development are at different stages. The Council will write out to residents when it is in a position to commence with kerbside collections.

#### **Kinross Common Good Fund**

In December last year, the Council took the decision to give common good funds the option to appoint a community councillor as a non-voting advisory member of the fund. Common good funds administer monies that have accrued from land and property owned by the Council that forms part of the common good of the former burghs of Perth & Kinross. The fund has traditionally made awards to allow individuals and community groups to carry out a wide range of community activities. Having a representative from Kinross CC on the Common Good Fund will therefore be a great opportunity for a local resident to represent the views of Kinross on the fund and I am glad that we were able to agree to this appointment.

#### **Kinross-shire Forum**

My Kinross-shire ward councillor colleagues and I have agreed to re-establish the Kinross-shire Forum. For those of you not familiar with the concept, it is a body made up of representatives from each of the six community councils in the Kinross-shire ward along with the four ward councillors. The aim is to discuss and debate council policies and wider issues that affect Kinross-shire and, wherever possible, to come to a common view that my colleagues and I can take up to Perth. The meetings will be held quarterly and the first one in August will discuss the forthcoming Local Development Plan 2, traffic modelling for Kinross and Milnathort, and local democracy. We plan to publish the minutes in the Newsletter.

#### Luke Graham MP for Ochil and South Perthshire

This past week I celebrated my first year as an MP since being elected last June. During the campaign I stood on a platform of delivering local action with a national voice. It has been a busy, but exciting year and I wanted to share some of the highlights & successes below:



#### **Local Action**

Since being elected I have held over 160 surgeries, right across Ochil and South Perthshire, dealing with thousands of enquiries from individuals and community groups, whilst addressing over 1,300 pieces of casework for constituents. It has been a pleasure to be able to help people with the problems they face, assisting with issues as diverse as welfare assessments, visas, community funding and antisocial behaviour. For me, one of the most rewarding aspects of the job has been the life changing impact resolving these problems can have, and is certainly the part of my job I hold in the highest regard.

Although our campaign to prevent the RBS branch closures across our constituency was unsuccessful in Kinross, it has been successful in extending the life of the branches in Comrie and Alloa. I have already contacted RBS and asked to engage with them in bringing the Kinross building into community use.

Recently, we signed the heads of terms on the Stirling and Clackmannanshire City Deal, bringing £90m investment into the region and £45m directly from Westminster to a part of Ochil & South Perthshire. Having helped to get several projects included in the final deal, bringing millions of pounds worth of investment to Clackmannanshire, I will now be focusing on the upcoming Tay Cities Deal that will take in Perth & Kinross. I have been working with colleagues (including cross-party) in Perth & Kinross and Dundee councils and with several local community groups in order develop projects that we can put forward for funding. Investment in Perthshire and Kinrossshire is long overdue, and I will be pushing our government in London to maximise its investment. I hope to see the same from Holyrood.

#### **National Voice**

Brexit is, of course, the major issue of the day in Westminster, in Ochil and South Perthshire and across the United Kingdom, and I have worked hard to push the government to balance our constituency view. As someone who voted remain, in a

majority remain seat, but elected on a Brexit manifesto, I have tried to ensure I respect the country's vote and not obstruct Brexit, whilst challenging government and supporting several amendments and initiatives. I have supported amendments on the rights of EU citizens in the UK, ensuring there is stronger scrutiny of new laws in Parliament and argued to ensure we have a form of "customs arrangement" as part of our final deal with the EU. I am pleased to have helped secure the government's support on these amendments and with their stance on customs.

In addition, I have also been fighting for our rural communities, speaking up in the House of Commons on CAP payment delays, investment and arguing for their place in the new post-Brexit arrangement as well as bringing Michael Gove, the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, to South Perthshire. During that visit, I held a roundtable at Gloagburn Farm, where local farmers had the chance to scrutinise the minister directly for three hours. It was a hugely productive session with issues such as environmental protection and seasonal migrant workers all being discussed in depth, all of which has helped inform and direct my actions in the House on these issues.

Therefore, as we move ahead, I will be working to try to secure the best possible deal which includes fair immigration, clear customs arrangements, supporting local businesses large and small, while focusing upon making sure I work with local government colleagues to deliver local action with a national voice.

#### **Portmoak Community Woodland Group**

Finally, I recently had the pleasure of visiting the Portmoak Community Woodland Group to look at the work carried out by the group of volunteers. I was particularly interested to hear about the restoring of the ancient raised bog at Portmoak Moss, which had been drained and made into a commercial conifer woodland. The aim is to raise the water table, controlling invasive regrowth and encouraging the regeneration of sphagnum mosses. Furthermore, at Kilmagad Wood, the hillside is being replanted with native species and they have created a community orchard, which will be fantastic once it reaches maturity.

## Lathro Meadows will break assurances on light and overlooking

A Lathro Park resident has written to the four local Councillors and to Perth & Kinross Council planning staff to ask what action they propose to take in relation to an alleged breach of planning regulations at the new Lathro Meadows site.

Ken Whitcombe claims that a resident of Lathro Lane will end up having a 5ft - 6ft high fence built less than two metres from her lounge window, which looks over the Lathro Meadows site. A two-storey building will "tower" above that fence if Persimmon are allowed to continue with their current works.

The recommendations in the planning officer's report approved by the Development Management Committee in September 2016 had given the

reassurance: "Taking cognisance of the BRE document the distances between new and existing properties and site levels at the southern end of the site, I consider an acceptable level of daylight and sunlight will be provided to each neighbouring property."

The BRE document is the Building Research Establishment's 'Site Layout Planning for Daylight and Sunlight - a guide to good practice 1991'.

The approved report had also said: ".... none of the proposed residential units will result in overlooking of neighbouring properties due to acceptable separation distances between proposed and existing dwellings and proposed buffer planting along the southern perimeter of the

site. Every proposed dwelling directly facing onto an existing dwelling will be over 18 metres from the exterior wall of a neighbouring property."

There has been no 'buffer planting' between the new development and the existing Lathro Park estate.

Mr Whitcombe said: "The situation has arisen as the responsible PKC officer's written recommendations to the Development Control Committee to approve Persimmon's Lathro Meadows development have always been at variance with Persimmon's published plans for the site in a number of significant areas. I have personally pointed this out to PKC on a number of occasions but planning officers have chosen to ignore this fact."



## Elizabeth Smith MSP for Mid Scotland and Fife

When the Queensferry Crossing opened last year to great fanfare, commuters were told that the new bridge would substantially reduce journey times and help spur economic growth. So far this has not happened.



Less than a year later and official statistics from Transport Scotland have shown that the average speed during rush hour ranges between 21 and 24mph, despite the speed limit on the bridge being 70mph.

This is obviously hugely disappointing, not to mention frustrating for commuters. Everyone expects rush hour to be slower than off-peak times, but for speeds over the bridge not to have improved is concerning. There are many residents in Kinross who commute to Edinburgh and are now having to leave even earlier just to make it to work on time.

Clearly, if a £1.6 billion bridge doesn't alleviate congestion then we need to start approaching transport differently. What we need is for public transport links to compete more closely with road. I have been calling for more train carriages through Fife and thankfully additional capacity will be added over the next couple of months. In addition to this I have been a long-time supporter and advocate of a direct rail link between Edinburgh and Perth which would stop in Kinross. I would hope that these congestion statistics can now convince the Scottish Government to green light a feasibility study into this direct link. I believe this plan not only has tremendous public support but also makes good financial sense and can provide a substantial return on infrastructure funding.

However, it's not just rail travel that needs to improve in order to reduce congestion, bus travel also has to change to meet new challenges. For years we have seen falling passenger numbers and a recent survey from Citizens Advice Scotland revealed that most residents were unhappy with the service and punctuality of bus travel.

In response to these trends the Scottish Government has proposed major changes to the way local bus services are organised. Under these plans Ministers want to give local authorities more power to fill gaps in the network and in some instances will offer up the ability to run their own services. These plans are obviously in their infancy and will require closer scrutiny over the coming months. However, if passed, there are potential pitfalls including the possibility of companies ditching unprofitable routes which would leave councils open to financial pressure. Nonetheless, it's important that we continue to have these debates in order to reduce the pressure on the road network and improve public transport.

## Place names of Kinross-shire

## **Queich or Keich?**

The long-awaited 'Place-names of Kinross-shire' was published at the back-end of 2017 and is available to buy at the Kinross Museum. Forby the obvious delight in looking up the meaning behind our local settlement, farm and landscape names, the book covers an enormous amount of history about our county through the ages.

Our earliest place names are 'British' such as the river *Devon*, which is mentioned in 1173 and probably means 'deep one'. (Modern Welsh is one of the descendants of 'British'.) At the other end are recent names in English first recorded as late as 1866 by the Ordnance Survey, such as *Powmill Bridge* where, although the '*Powmill*' is older ('pow' in Scots is a sluggish burn), the 'bridge' part is English rather than the Scots 'brig' – or at least that is how the surveyor chose to write it down. Between these two languages the inhabitants of Kinrossshire have spoken Pictish, Gaelic and Scots in that order and they have all left their mark on our place names. There is even a Norse name in *Kirkness*, which is first mentioned around 1050. Today, around 30% of the population of Kinross-shire consider themselves to be Scots speakers according to the 2011 census.

The book also gives us guidance on pronunciation. This was gathered from long-term residents of the county such as Colin Robertson and the late Mary Muirhead and Maria Russell. Interestingly, when asked directly how a name was pronounced people would often give the Scottish Standard English version, for example, 'Broadhead'. It was only as they chatted informally that they would use 'Braidheid'. These traditional Scots pronunciations are often backed up by earlier written sources from before the Ordnance Survey's version in the Victorian era. The authors point out that 'Scottish Standard English is the dominant language of the Ordnance Survey and is thus the mould in which all place names, whether coined in Scots or Scottish Standard English, are cast'. We now have the odd situation whereby the older 'correct' pronunciation used by Scots speakers is considered 'wrong' and the 'wrong' pronunciation given on our maps is considered 'correct'!

Listed right are some of the traditional pronunciations collected by the authors, who give accurate phonetic transcriptions in the book.

Perhaps the 'official' names of these places should be changed to reflect the original pronunciation rather than the later anglicised names given by the Ordnance Survey?

Knowing the local pronunciation can be important. At the public planning inquiry in to the proposed Levenfields Factory Outlet Centre a few year syne, the applicants' drainage consultants persisted in calling the river alongside the site 'the South Keich', despite ripples of amusement from the public benches. It may be polluted, but no as bad as that, surely?

'The Place Names of Kinross-shire' by Simon Taylor with Peter McNiven and Eila Williamson costs £35 from the Kinross Museum at the community campus. **Aldie**: pronounced Awdy and written that way in 1506.

Arlary: pronounced Airlerie and written Airlarie in 1653.

**Balado**: pronounced Balawdy and written that way in 1883 and as *Balladyis* in 1527.

**Ballingall**: pronounced Benigall and written *Benygaw* in 1753.

**Bowton**: locally this is often pronounced Booton but some correspondents used an 'ow' sound and the definite article. 'The Bowton' is indeed how it appears in 1544. These early spellings and the probable derivation from 'bow' – Scots for a herd of cattle and pronounced like English 'bough'— suggests the 'ow' is more likely to be the original pronunciation. Saying 'Boton' is a recent innovation.

**Cavelstone**: pronounced 'Kelson' and written *Kelston* in 1753. There is a modern '*Kelson Lodge'*.

**Drunzie**: pronounced 'Drungie' and written that way in 1671.

**Gartwhinzean**: pronounced Gartwhinyin and written *Gartquhynanis* in 1542. 'Quh' was the old Scots way of writing that stronger 'wh' sound which still exists in Scots speech compared to English.

**Dalqueich**: pronounced Dequeich and written *Dequiech* in 1753.

**Dowhill**: pronounced Doohill. Although no written sources spell it that way, in 1775 it is called *Dovehill*. Perhaps this was a 'correction' for Scots *doo* for dove?

**Findatie**: pronounced Finity and written that way in 1775. **Kinnesswood**: locally this often gets 'kineskit', which was written as *Kynnescote* in 1515. There was probably both a Kinness cot (cottage) and a Kinness wood in this area.

**Milnathort**: Still sometimes pronounced Mill o forth (written *Miln of Quorthe* in 1346) or Mills o forth (written as *Mills of Forth* in 1775).

**Rumbling Bridge**: pronounced Rummlin Brig and written *Rumbling Brig* in 1769.



The Place Names of Kinross-shire in front of the farm in Kinross parish first recorded under its current name of 'Burnbrae' in 1856. Prior to that it was recorded, from 1390 onwards, as 'Easter Tillyochie.'

# Lest We Forget Reflections on the Great War

There is a rolling exhibition at the Kinross (Marshall) Museum on the Great War, telling of some of the events and people of 100 years ago. The museum display is adjacent to the library within Loch Leven Community Campus. The information displayed below is courtesy of the Museum.

#### First World War Timeline, July 1918

15th Germany launches the final offensive at

the 2nd Battle of the Marne.

16th-17th Tsar Nicholas II of Russia and his family are

murdered by the Bolsheviks.

#### Kinross-shire Roll of Honour, July 1918

**Robert Taylor** was a Gunner with the Royal Garrison Artillery when he died aged 25 on 9 July 1918. He is buried at the Terlincthun British Cemetery, Wimille, near Boulogne. He was the husband of Helen Taylor of Kirkness House, Fifeshire.

James Fraser was a miner before joining the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders in 1915, later transferring to the Black Watch. His parents lived at Backloan, Milnathort, and received a letter from their son's Commanding Officer saying: "I regret that I have to inform you that your son Pte. James Fraser, was killed by a bullet on the 19th July while displaying great courage and coolness in assisting to keep his Lewis gun in Action under heavy fire at close range ...".

A local newspaper of the time reported: ".... he has been in France two years and has served and suffered in the gallant deeds of his regiment being previously twice wounded in March and December 1917. The action in which he fell was the subject of a graphic narrative in the "Scotsman" of July 22nd, where the writer describes the brilliant part played by the Black Watch in the Scottish success at Meteren."

Alex McCubbin was a Private with the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. He died on 23 July 1918 and is buried at St Imoges Churchyard, France.



#### Henry M Macintosh was a Captain

in the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders when he died on 26 July 1918 of wounds received in action. He was 26. Born at Kelso, he was the son of the Rev. William Macintosh and Anne Smith Macintosh, sometime of St Paul's Rectory, Kinross.

Captain Macintosh made a will five days before he died. It said: "In the event of my death I desire £20 to be given to the son of Robert Lighting at Briarcourt Lindley, Huddersfield.

And £20 to be given to A.W.M. Horn 8th Walpole Terrace Brighton as a small recognition of the kindness shewn to me by his father and mother.

Any other balance I may have at Cox's or P.O.S.B. to go to my sister, Vina Macintosh.

All other effects to my brother Caer Macintosh.

I leave to my father and mother the sincere thanks of a grateful son for the careful and helpful upbringing I have had. Few sons have had such kindness and patience showered upon them, with, I am afraid, so little return."

**Robert P King** was a Private in the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders when he died on 29 July 1918, aged 22. Born in Galashiels, he was the son of Robert and Joan King of 12 Smith Street, Kinross.

Robert King is buried at Oulchy-le-Chateau Churchyard, France. His was a member of the East Church of Kinross and is listed on the church's Roll of Honour.

#### **Community Choices Fund**

**Swansacre, Kinross**: Again, there have been complaints of 'local' vehicles not obeying the traffic restrictions that are in place at either end of the street. Drivers are reminded not to use the street unless for local access and not to routinely use the street as a short cut or 'rat run'.

**School Talk**: Dougie and Atholl recently gave a talk to the Kinross Primary 7 classes about the dangers of internet use and social media. Below are a few tips to keep everyone safe.

#### Social Media

Sites like Twitter and Facebook are part of an internet phenomenon known



as 'social networking'. They can be great fun to use and are an important part of many people's social lives. Online dating is also a form of social networking. Like any internet tool, though, social networking can be used for harmful or criminal purposes. Take some sensible precautions.

#### What are the benefits and risks of Social Media?

Social networking sites create a feeling of community. This can be positive or negative depending on the nature of the community created. Since users access these sites from their own homes, they can sometimes forget that the internet is really a public space. This means they can be tempted to share more information than is sensible or safe, or to act in ways they may not do normally.

#### What basic steps should I take?

You can help protect yourself and/or your children by learning how these sites work and talking them through some basic advice:

- Pick a user name that doesn't include your real name or hint at your date of birth or where you live.
- Make your profile private by changing the 'privacy settings' or 'account settings'. This means only your friends will be able to see what's on your profile. You'll still be able to get friend requests, but are less likely to be pestered by strangers.

 Limit the amount of personal information you make available online such as your address and date of birth, even more so if it may provide a hint as to your password - even to friends.

## What precautions should I take when sharing information on Social Networking sites?

Think carefully about:

- Who you want to chat to.
- What you want to say.
- Which pictures you upload.

Remember, even if it feels private, the internet is really a public space. Once you put a message or an image online, it will be there in some form forever, even if you delete it.

- If it isn't something you'd be happy for someone close to you or a total stranger to see, then don't share it.
- Don't post personal details like last name, school or email address. You may not know who your friends' friends are. Remember that there is always a chance someone else will see their information and not everyone online is honest.
- Don't feel pressured into posting something you're not comfortable with, such as personal phone numbers or photographs.
- Think before you 'check in' at a location or say you're going on holiday. Could someone unknown to you see it and establish where you live and that your home may be empty?
- Respect friends and the online community. Don't communicate any potentially damaging messages and don't get drawn into any online arguments or conflict.
- Something you think is funny might not seem funny to others. What seems like a harmless joke in private may embarrass or humiliate someone in public.
- Remember, the click of a button makes your information publicly known worldwide and only you can control who sees this. Think before you post and, if in doubt, don't click!

## Kinross Community Council News from the June Meeting

**Present** at the meeting held on Wednesday 6 June 2018 were: CCllrs B Freeman (Chair), E Thomas (Secretary), M Blyth, D Colliar, D Cuthbert, I Jack, L McKay, T Stewart and D West; P&K Cllrs C Purves and W Robertson and one member of the public.

**Apologies**: CCllrs B Davies and J Bryson; P&K Cllr R Watters & M Barnacle; and Community Police Officers.

**Police Report**: The community police officers had sent a report by email. Recent incidents included break-ins [see Police Box] and vandalism to a car.

The CC had asked for further details regarding a road traffic accident which had occurred some weeks earlier on Station Road. The police confirmed that a man on a mobility scooter was crossing on his scooter at the zebra crossing heading for the top of the school lane when he was struck by a car driven by a woman. Following this, Cllr Purves had consulted with PKC officer Daryl McKeown. PKC is going to carry out traffic surveys in early and late August to identify differences in traffic between term and non-term time. Officers will report to Councillors with possible suggestions.

CCIIr McKay raised issues relating to the roadway into the school car park and drop-off area: (i) Due to the positioning of the zebra crossing, there is barely room for one car to stop, with queuing resulting on Station Road; and (ii) the substation obscures the driver's view of children approaching the zebra crossing. CIIr Robertson will raise these points with PKC.

**CC** bank account: Treasurer CCllr Jack advised that there are two signatories to the bank account: himself and CCllr Colliar. Two signatures are required on cheques. Only one authority is required for internet banking and that is CCllr Jack. The CC Liaison Office had asked for the original signed version of the examined accounts. CCllr Jack confirmed this has been submitted.

**Swansacre**: Letter received from local resident regarding the CC's suggestion of a sign for drivers exiting the Learning Centre (April minutes), saying he saw no need for this. It appears that the minutes did not reflect the suggestion made at the April meeting (although they were approved at the May meeting). The CC agrees with the resident that no action is required and will contact PKC accordingly.

**20mph signs**: Cllr Purves reported that PKC aims to get permanent 20mph speed signs erected around the mini roundabout beside the Co-op as soon as possible.

**War memorial rail**: Cllr Purves had received a response from the PKC officer. A meeting needs to take place.

Action Partnership: The Secretary had emailed Mr McNamara to ask for more information about the Participatory Budget event. An acknowledgement had been received but no actual information yet. CCllr Cuthbert had had a request for information refused due to the volume of documents concerned. He reduced his request but was still refused. CCllr West has received a FOI response on this matter. CCllr Bryson said the Primary School Parent Council has now received

feedback from Tracey Ramsay. Feedback does not appear to have been given to all unsuccessful applicants, however. Cllr Purves will follow this up. Cllr Purves reported that the Action Partnership is now looking to fill its community rep vacancy from the wider county.

**Dog Mess**: CCllr McKay circulated posters. Cllr Robertson offered to obtain some for the CC. It was agreed that CCllr McKay could purchase the luminous eco-friendly paint for highlighting dog mess.

Matters Arising Without Any Update: Ponding on Muirs: As the weather has been dry, there is nothing to report. M90 sign: CCllr West has tweeted again but still no response. Foul water near golf course: Cllr Robertson has not heard anything back from SEPA. He will follow this up. Tillyochie Road: The Secretary forwarded the resident's email to Mr Haggart and asked for comment but no reply received yet. The wee bridge has been hit.

**Kinross Town Centre Regeneration**: The Secretary has emailed Mr Haggart again about **single-lane traffic** past the Town Hall works but no reply. However, there are traffic lights in place now. This might be because the Town Hall works boundary has moved further into the street. Cllr Barnacle has twice asked for a **review** of the regeneration project but no response has been received.

The Secretary will submit comments to PKC to ensure clarity. 18/00766/IPL Residential development (in principle), land 120 metres east of Twin Pines, Tillyochie, Balado. A member of the public was present and concerns regarding this proposal were discussed. CCllr Jack declared that he had submitted an objection as an individual. It was agreed that the CC would object to this application on the grounds that the land is not zoned for housing and the proposal does not comply with Housing in the Countryside policy.

The relevant part of the minutes said: "Resolved: (i) The Head of Planning and Regeneration and the Head of Legal Services be instructed to finalise terms to their satisfaction and conclude a bargain for the sale of the former Kinross High School on the basis of the preferred bidder as detailed in Report 12/139. (ii) The Executive Director (Environment) be instructed to undertake a review of parking provision within Kinross and report back to a future Committee."

The CC may consider writing to Audit Scotland regarding PKC's approval of the huge deductions in price requested by Persimmon.

As Editor of the Newsletter, CCIIr Thomas had asked PKC for a statement as to why work had stopped on the Edwardian building. The statement said: "Perth & Kinross Council is aware that works on the former Kinross High School site are moving forward slower than expected. The contractors have advised additional work was needed to support the retained elements of the existing High School building. We will continue to monitor the situation."

Ward Councillors Purves and Robertson reported on the meeting they'd had with Council officers. They said that Eddie Jordan, Enforcement Officer, had been told by the site agent that Persimmon had instructed workers to be removed from the Edwardian building to speed up work on the newbuilds as purchasers were due to move in. PKC has issued an ultimatum to Persimmon. Ward Councillors have asked PKC's Nick Brian to write to the CC with an update. Councillors also informed the CC of the discussion that had been held with the officers regarding the height levels of the new-builds. A neighbour had claimed the new-builds were higher than proposed, and commissioned his own professional survey. PKC officers are of the opinion that the resident is not overlooked in legal terms.

Cllr Purves reported on progress with the new **Scrutiny Committee sub-committee**. This will ask community groups to give an account of their experiences with regard to planning.

**Licensing**: Application for licence for gift shop at 153 High Street, Kinross. No comment.

**CC Sub Committees and Representation on Other Bodies**: The appointments listed below were agreed. It was also agreed that reps should give regular reports back to the CC.

- Planning sub-committee: CCllrs Colliar, Freeman and Cuthbert.
- Kinross-shire Partnership Representative: CCllr Freeman, with CCllr West as his substitute.
- Remembrance Parade committee: CCllrs Freeman, McKay, Colliar and Blyth.
- Kinross-shire Fund Representative: CCllr Colliar.
- Kinross-shire Forum: CCllrs Cuthbert and West.
- Joint Website sub-committee: CCllrs Colliar, West and Bryson.

**Website**: CCIIr Colliar had forwarded an email from Alisdair Stewart of the Kinross-shire Partnership acknowledging receipt of £763 from the CC towards the running cost of the website from the KCCNL charitable fund. However, the amount should have been £778. Conditions that were to be attached were not included. The Website sub-committee will meet as soon as possible.

**Remembrance**: CCllr Freeman has spoken to the army cadets about their wreath. A meeting will take place on the second Tuesday in October. CCllr Thomas pointed out that any notice of arrangements for the Newsletter will be required by the second Friday in October.

Review of Establishment of CCs in Perth & Kinross: CC Liaison has asked CCs to review the standard documents governing CCs and to make comment. A meeting is to be held on 7 June to which two representatives are invited. CCllrs Thomas and Colliar volunteered. [Post-meeting note: CCllr Colliar was substituted by CCllr Bryson.]

The main message from Kinross CC is that CCs need to be properly funded and listened to. Council controlled properties should be made available free of charge to CCs. PKC doesn't give enough time to CCs to comment on

consultations or make decisions, given that CCs only meet monthly. CCIIr Cuthbert proposed stronger wording in the documentation regarding CCs being consulted on planning applications. He also proposed that an objection from a CC should trigger an application going to the Planning & Development Management Committee regardless of the number of other objections. These suggestions would be taken to the meeting. CCIIr Cuthbert does not agree with the limit on the proportion of a CC that may be made of co-opted members, but others thought this was a sensible safeguard. CCIIr Thomas feels that four years is too long a term for a voluntary post like this, particularly if it is the same person as secretary for most or all of that time. She said she would not stay for a further 18 months if no-one else would share the minute-taking. It was suggested that the CC advertise for a minute-taker to whom an honorarium from the CC grant would be paid.

Cllr Purves advised that Cleish & Blairadam CC is considering proposing a change to their CC boundary, which would affect Kinross CC. He also advised that a discussion on Action Partnerships would be likely at the meeting on 7 June.

**Provision of Gritting and Snow Clearing**: The CC decided not to make any comment.

**Correspondence:** Ward Councillors propose resuming the **Kinross-shire Forum** and invite two representatives from each CC to a meeting on 13 August.

#### **Report from Perth & Kinross Councillor Purves**

**Vehicle Activated Signs** will be installed this year at Balado, on B966 and Turfhills.

The Kinross-shire Forum welcomes agenda topics.

**Community Investment Fund:** Cllr Purves told the CC about a report to be discussed at the Strategic Policy and Resources Committee on 13 June. This relates to distributing the new Community Investment Fund and the role of Local Action Partnerships. [See also page 7.]

#### Other Business

**Minute Secretary**: CCllr Thomas asked how much the CC would pay a minute secretary. It was suggested the post simply be advertised to see if anyone is interested at this stage.

**Springfield Road**: CCllr McKay mentioned the problem with hedges at **Wilson Court**, also the problem with speeding on Springfield road. Cllr Purves will contact PKC regarding the hedges.

**Argyll Road**: CCllr McKay mentioned a problem with a low hanging branch on a tree on Springfield Road obscuring the vision of drivers exiting Argyll Road. Cllr Purves noted this.

**Parks**: CCllr McKay reports receiving comments from residents that Kirkgate Park is a mess; it looks like a building site and is covered with glass. The need for Davies Park to be upgraded was also mentioned.

**Grass areas on Springfield Road**: CCllrs McKay and Thomas both stated the public grass areas bordering Springfield Road are a mess.

Pavements: Messy pavements were also noted.

**Kinross-shire Fund**: CCllr Colliar reported on a recent meeting. Two grants were approved: one for the Sport Hub Cycling Without Age project and one for Kinross First Responders.

The Next Meeting of Kinross CC will take place on Wednesday 4 July 2018 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall, Kinross.

## Milnathort Community Council News from the June Meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 14 June 2018 were: CCIIrs C Williams (chair), C Flory (vice-chair), E Kirkham (treasurer), C Lawson, M Leach and S McHardy; P&K CIIrs W Robertson and C Purves; PCs Atholl Spalding and Dougie Stapleton; minute-taker Elizabeth Rougvie and 22 members of the public. **Apologies** were received from P&K CIIrs M Barnacle and R Watters.

**Election of office-bearers:** Cllr Robertson conducted the election of office-bearers, which resulted as follows: chairman: Craig Williams; treasurer: Elyse Kirkham; secretary: Caroline Flory.

**Police matters:** The police had been asked to attend the meeting in the light of recent incidents of vandalism in the village and other issues of concern. Their presence was greatly appreciated.

A party had taken place in Burleigh Road the previous weekend involving around 30 young people who created a disturbance in the early hours of the morning. Two road signs were also damaged. PC Stapleton advised members of the public to report such matters immediately rather than after the event in order to maximise the chance of catching the perpetrators, but the police were following a couple of lines of enquiry.

One male has been identified following a review of CCTV footage in connection with the vandalism of Milnathort in Bloom's displays at The Cross, having been caught on camera overturning planters. Graeme Stewart of Milnathort in Bloom told the meeting that around £200 worth of plants had been destroyed along with a young tree worth £65. He agreed to co-operate with a restorative justice arrangement whereby the perpetrator would either pay for the damage or give of his time to help the bloom group.

Following further discussion, during which it was suggested that there was a lack of recreational facilities for young people in the village, the police left the meeting.

#### **Matters arising**

**Education**: Cllr Purves has distributed information about reserved places at Kinross High School to CC members and via the June Newsletter.

**Core path at Burleigh**: An official from PKC will investigate the flooding issue. CCllr Kirkham will forward photos to Cllr Purves.

**Roads maintenance**: Cllr Purves has requested updates of a number of outstanding works and the issue of replacing the

speed bumps in Bridgefauld Road has been added to the list. Linden Park and Old Perth Road will be resurfaced next year. Cllr Purves will forward a list of works to be done to all CC members.

#### Planning matters

#### **Applications submitted**

- Erection of a house on land 100 metres east of Whistlebrae. Noted.
- Alterations and extension to Beechwood Park, Old Perth Road. Noted.
- Extension to Blairhead Farmhouse. Noted.

#### Planning applications approved

- Erection of a storage building and security fencing, land 40m north of Kingfisher House, Auld Mart Road.
- Extension to a house at The Stackyard.

Lathro Farm: Two separate applications have been received for this site, one for 47 houses and the other for a further 12. The applications will have to be treated separately, which was seen as a tactic by the developer in order to avoid possible issues with infrastructure. This prompted a lengthy discussion about LDP2, the development plan for Perth and Kinross, details of which are available at www. pkc.gov.uk/ProposedLDP2. PKC has until the end of August to submit its comments to the Scottish Government. Cllr Robertson said that if there were concerns about the number of houses proposed for Kinross-shire, the time to object was when the land was earmarked for development, not when outline planning permission had been granted as it was then invariably too late. He disagreed with the view that communities had no say in developments; it was a question of them being better organised and more proactive. All planning applications are available on the PKC website for anyone to access and comment on. Cllr Purves advised that a new planning initiative, Local Place Plans, was in the early stages of being set up at Holyrood. It would give CCs much more influence over local developments. In addition, the Kinross-shire Forum was being re-formed and the CC will send two representatives to the next meeting on 13 August. Pitdownies: Concerns were once again expressed about the impact of the extra traffic that would be generated by the proposed development at the Pitdownies. Following discussion, it was agreed that CCIIr Lawson would write to

**Static caravan**: A letter was received from a local resident complaining about CCllr McHardy's attempt to site a static caravan on the community orchard. The letter called for his resignation from the CC. In response, CCllr McHardy said that he and his wife were being evicted from their local authority home and had done nothing wrong. He said he still intended to site the caravan there and claimed the police were happy with his plan. Following further discussion, CCllr McHardy agreed to resign from the CC.

#### Issues raised by members of the public

**Parking**: A number of cars were parking on the zig-zag lines in South Street. Cllr Robertson will follow this up and advises taking a photo or noting the registration of the vehicles and passing the evidence on to either a local councillor or the police. In Church Street, vehicles parking on the single white line have been causing problems for drivers due to the narrowness of the road. A single white line indicates that it must be kept clear.

**Road safety**: It was agreed that CCIIr Leach will liaise with councillors to arrange a meeting with Daryl McKeown of PKC roads department to discuss various road safety issues in the village.

**Local area partnerships**: Cllr Robertson reported that £50,000 had now been made available for Kinross-shire and nominations for suitable beneficiaries were being sought from CCs.

**Legacy**: CCllr Kirkham advised that a number of applications had been received regarding the £5000 legacy left to the community by Mr David Drysdale and any further suggestions should be submitted by the next CC meeting. The legacy must be used for something physical, such as a bench.

Date of Next Meeting: Milnathort CC does not meet in July so the next meeting will be held on Thursday 9 August 2018 at 7.30pm in Milnathort Town Hall. Members of the public are invited to attend.

School Access - policy on parking and safe access routes for children. Cllr C Purves reported that it was anticipated that a Report addressing the matter would be submitted to Environment and Infrastructure Committee for its September meeting.

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church, Hall and beyond. The Chairman reported that a first stage draft option appraisal identifying possible routes would be concluded shortly and forwarded to PKC to progress.

Loch Leven Underpass. Work was proceeding apace and should be concluded by mid-September. The road works should be completed before the end of August.

Resilience - being better prepared for risks. Community Emergency Plan. The draft Emergency Plan was in preparation. Application to SSE for funding to support an emergency generator "hook-up" at the Hall had been made. Communication Strategy and General Data Protection Regulations. The CC approved a "Personal Data Policy." This will be placed on the CC website. The CC had sought registration with the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO). A process to rationalise how data is held between the Webmaster, the Chairman and the Secretary was underway. Comfort Scheme. This scheme offered a number of free to use public toilets through partnerships with local service providers such as hotels, pubs and public buildings. These facilities were available for public use at no cost, regardless of whether or not they were customers. Cllr Purves reported that with a reduction in budget the scheme had been restricted. There was no provision for it anywhere in Portmoak but it was available at a number of venues across Kinross and Milnathort. Currently new venues were only authorised when a current venue ceased to participate: and then only in the same area. The scheme would be reviewed by PKC in the autumn.

Glass Recycling Kinnesswood. The CC had submitted its views to PKC and waited to hear the outcome. It might be that a single "appropriate" bin could be accommodated behind the bus shelter and might alleviate the pressure.

Review of Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils. The Chairman and Secretary had participated recently in a meeting hosted by PKC to review the matter. A number of points had been identified and will be fed back to participating CCs in due course. The matter will also be considered at the next meeting of the Kinross Forum.

Westfield Update: Presentation by Hargreaves Land and Brockwell Energy. The Chairman welcomed Philip Rayson (Hargreaves Land) and Robert Watson (Brockwell Energy) who had come to update the CC on developments at the Westfield site. The following points emerged from their presentation and answers to questions:

Hargreaves Land was a large and diverse company and that Brockwell Energy had been established in 2017 as a wholly owned subsidiary to focus on a range of energy related developments including: energy from waste plants; solar farms; peak supply energy generation and wind farms.

An intention to grant letter had been issued in response to the planning application in principle for the development of the site in October 2017. It was anticipated that a section 75 agreement and section 76 agreement (relating to the contribution to PKC for road maintenance) would be signed very shortly to allow a formal decision notice to be issued within the next two months.

The application for the installation of up to 10 gas engines to generate electricity was the responsibility of Brockwell Energy. Subject to the decision of Fife Council planning consent was anticipated within the next two months.

Comprehensive survey work was being undertaken to inform further developments. It was anticipated that before the year end the site master plan would be revised and that there would be an application for an energy from waste plant (EfWP). Build completion would be before the end of 2019.

There was an active interest in securing independent businesses to develop on site. An inducement was cheaper electricity supported by long term supply contracts from the EWP which could also supply the national grid. Electricity from the 10 gas engines could either supply the grid or back up the supply for local businesses.

There was a commitment to establish a Community Liaison Group. The Chairman agreed to follow up separately the arrangements for establishing such a Group.

Infinis had discharged the planning permission they had for a waste plant. Traffic from that had been included in the traffic analysis presented with the Hargreaves planning application. Thus the impact of transport along the B9097 was likely to be reduced from that set out in the original EIA planning applications. That said there was no way of estimating the additional impact of transport generated from independent businesses established on the site.

There was no prospect of using rail to transport waste but new businesses may be interested in participating in commissioning the rail link that supplies the site. Use of that option was encouraged.

Waste was likely to be of local origin and trucked in. Whether it would arrive "sorted" or whether that "sort" would occur on site with waste unsuitable for the EfWP being trucked out was unclear.

Energy from waste plants were not at risk of becoming redundant in Scotland – there was shortage of capacity.

Provision of an off-road walking and cycling route alongside the B9097 could be a matter to raise through the Community Liaison Group. It was emphasised that that forum must be two way with the developer listening to what the community had to say.

Rigorous environmental checks by SEPA should ensure that the EfWP is compliant with environmental regulations. It was unclear whether such checks extended to the impact of transport along the B9097.

The impact on the 42 residences along the B9097 had not so far been properly assessed particularly the impact on health. The interests of two large farms which straddle the B9097 had still to be properly assessed.

Site security was a significant and current problem. There had been: regular fires and police call-outs; and an increasing invasion of motor bike and 4x4 scramblers.

Current water pollution on-site is being addressed.

Speculation in the press that Brockwell Energy might be subject to a change of ownership was acknowledged as correct. Were that to happen it was not thought that plans would be disrupted. Leases and options were in place between Hargreaves and Brockwell at the moment and Hargreaves would remain overall owner of the site.

Mr Ryson and Mr Rayson were thanked for their update.

**Conclusion:** Significant activity can be anticipated over the next year. The ability to monitor and review carefully what is happening would be important. The establishment of the Community Liaison Group would be an important first step.

**Police Report**: No local police report. The Area Commander's Bulletins of 9, 16, 23 and 30 May and of 6 June were noted.

**Treasurer's Report**: The balance at the month ending 30 April was £284.80 in the General Account; and £1,192.48 in the Michael Bruce Way Account giving a total of £1,477.28 The new "Holding Account" No. 3 held £1,500.00.

4 dwelling houses and associated works (16/00326/FLL). The purpose of the modification was to seek the complete demolition of the Inn on Plot 1 and its replacement with a new dwelling house with a different footprint and set back from Main Street.

The CC **objected** to these proposals. The primary reasons for doing so were:

Conservation. The CC was mindful that this development lay at the heart of the Kinnesswood Conservation Area. This was an historic building and formed a significant part of the development making a critical contribution in both its design and setting to the Conservation Area. The building was specifically mentioned in the PKC appraisal of the conservation status of the village as forming "the focus of the approach to the village from the south." In 2016 the CC had welcomed the proposal to retain the original Inn by building a new property around its shell. Its position on that matter remained unchanged. It would wish to see the applications to retain the old Inn, for which there is already planning consent, taken forward. It believed that this development should enhance and not despoil that Area. It noted that the applicant has not made out a case overcoming the presumption applicable to unlisted buildings in conservation areas for retention of the remainder of the building.

Revised cost appraisal. The CC agreed with and supported the views expressed by Historic Environment Scotland which succinctly stated: "The information provided in the revised cost appraisal does not, in our view, demonstrate the non-viability of retaining the existing structure. The costs of repair are not balanced against end value. There is no information to demonstrate that these costs couldn't be supported by the proposed new development elsewhere on the site, or that a different project couldn't be achieved by the engagement of a restoring purchaser for this structure."

If the application for demolition were to be refused, it would follow that the application 18/00667/FLL for building a house on the site must be refused too.

In the event that the Council grants planning consent for the demolition, the CC would nevertheless object to the house proposed in application 18/00667/FLL on grounds of scale. It would look more favourably on a reduced scale and footprint of any new build on Plot1 and on including within it smaller housing units for example, flats or apartments. It will write to PKC planning accordingly.

Separately the CC would seek a meeting with the developer to explore options for the site.

**18/00881/FLL** The Cobbles, Kinnesswood. Change of use -garage to dwelling house. No comment.

**18/00827/LAW** Balneathal Farm, Easter Balgedie. Formation of a silage pit. No comment.

**Progress with Developments:** 17/02227/FLL Levenmouth Scotlandwell: Erection of two houses. There had been no response from the Chair of the PKC Development Management Committee to the letter from the Chairman. The matter would be pursued.

Roads Report: CCIIr Bruce Calderwood reported that limited progress had been made on outstanding road matters. A full Report would be made to the forthcoming July meeting. Plans to close the A911 from the Golf Club as far as the centre of Scotlandwell for resurfacing between the hours of 9.30 and 4.30 and from 23 July to 10 August were considered. The more imminent closure of the B920 between its junction with the A911 Main Street, Scotlandwell to its junction with the C50 Righead to Auchmuirbridge from 18 June for 20 days to permit carriageway patching works was also considered. This would occur at the same time as the B9097 has traffic regulation to accommodate the new underpass at RSPB Loch Leven. CCllr Calderwood would explore whether delaying the A911 closure to the October holidays could be a possibility. Given the wider community impact of these closures, CCIIr Calderwood and Ward Cllrs will explore whether CCs should be told directly by PKC of such plans for road closures.

A resident explained that the traffic risk around the Wester Balgedie Toll junction remained serious. Vehicle Activated Speed signs were not the solution. The installation of traffic lights to control the junction is required. Despite goodwill to take this forward it had not been possible to find the required funding. CCIIr Calderwood would write to PKC to seek that the matter is reviewed. The matter of funding sources would be considered further by Ward Councillors.

#### **PKC Ward Councillor Reports**

*Cllr C Purves*. Arrangements to finalise a PKC scheme for participatory budgeting for communities including CC were in hand. This was separate from the not dissimilar and recently launched scheme by the Scottish Government.

Matters previously notified to the Secretary plus matters raised from the floor: Democracy Matters Convention: People to have their say on Scotland's public services. This was a listening exercise conducted by the Scottish Government. Anyone or organisation with points to make should use the internet to communicate their views. #### Fossoway and District CC News from the June Meeting

**In attendance** at the meeting held on 5 June 2018 were: CCllrs Jennifer Donachie, Trudy Duffy, Carol Farquhar and Angus Cheape; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters; and four Members of the Public (MoP).

Apologies: CCllrs Cameron Brown and Graham Pye.

**Police report:** Unfortunately, no officer was able to be present at the meeting. There were no incidents to note in our area in the last month from the Commander's Reports. Operation Monardo was launched in May which targets bogus callers/rogue traders on the doorstep. An incident on 28 May saw an increased police presence in the Fossoway area that evening. Cllr Robertson reported that the mess left by the Road Traffic Accident in Blairingone last month has been cleared up by PKC.

A977 Mitigation: Cllr Barnacle reported that a few members of the public had contacted him because they were opposed to the reorientation of the junction adjacent to Fossoway Petrol Station, where the B9097 meets the A977. Cllr Barnacle was interested to know the community councillors' opinion regarding this. CCllr Duffy pointed out that the extensive consultation had been clear about what the community wanted, a plan had been formulated and that the plan should be adhered to. Cllr Robertson stated that there was never going to be a scheme to suit everyone and reiterated that we should go with the original plan. It was agreed to stay with the status quo. It was also reported that an Independent Safety Audit would be carried out on the A977.

Blairingone School Estate Transformation: A decision was taken at the meeting of the Lifelong Learning Committee to approve the recommendation made within the options appraisal for Blairingone Primary School to undertake a statutory consultation on a proposal to close the school. It is proposed pupils would be transferred to Fossoway Primary School. The catchment area of Fossoway Primary School would be extended to include the whole catchment area of Blairingone Primary School. Cllr Barnacle recently met with this committee to try to have the decision overturned however this was not successful. Cllr Purves stated that there was a process that would have to be adhered to regarding closing the school and a statutory consultation would be required to take place. January is possibly the earliest date that meetings and consultation could take place.

Lambhill: Application 17/01227/FLL Change of use of agricultural shed to general storage and distribution was refused and the applicant has made an appeal against this decision. As a result, a reporter has been appointed to consider the case and will carry out a site inspection on 11 June. The purpose of the visit is to allow the reporter to become familiar with all the physical features of the site and surrounding area, then make a decision based on the information.

**Crook Moss Travellers Site**: At a recent Council Committee meeting Cllr Barnacle mooted that there be a site visit as the site needs to be tidied up. Scottish Water confirmed Drum & Crook Treatment Works have a limited capacity and applications to join are considered on a case by case basis.

**Hydro Scheme Fund:** TRACKS are looking into the resurrection of the Devon footbridge and CCllr Pye will be the representative of the CC, temporarily joining the TRACKS

committee for the duration of the project. CCllr Pye will also take over as Treasurer for the Hydro Scheme Fund.

Crook and Drum Growing Together: CCIIr Duffy reported that the group had entered into three competitions; more information to follow. The giant, three-tier planters gifted from Edinburgh are due to be put in place this weekend. Other news is that a few tubs will be planted with herbs and the public invited to pick and use what they want from the tubs.

**Powmill in Bloom:** CCIIr Farquhar reported an enthusiastic meeting of the Powmill in Bloom Group. Watering plants is a problem as it is time consuming and labour intensive using wheel barrows and watering cans; a more efficient solution would be welcome. A new mower has been purchased and Powmill has been given a good tidy up. The group members attended the 'Take a Pride in Perthshire Garden Party' at Scone Racecourse which was very enjoyable and good to network with other Bloom Groups in Perth and Kinross. The Notice Board in Powmill is in need of refurbishment and plans are afoot to fix this.

Fossoway Gathering: CCllr Duffy announced that the meeting on 10 May was successful and a good turnout of people attended to support The Gathering. The next meeting is 14 June. Cllr Barnacle will find out if Waulkmill can be used as the venue for the event.





#### **Recent speakers**

#### **Ethiopia Medical Project**

Our very own club Rotarian Jo Middlemiss gave us a lively update on





her latest annual trip to the Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP). Once a year, usually during February, Jo and her cousin Maureen Burnett set off for a little clinic in the south of Ethiopia. All year they collect clothes (mostly pants), medical supplies and money to help this brave little clinic do its valuable work. They support the salaries of trained staff, provide new infrastructure and medical tools. To do this they rely on the help and enthusiastic support of so many caring people, including our club and other Rotary clubs in Scotland.

Jo and Maureen have now spent nine years fundraising for the Buccama Clinic, which is in Southern Ethiopia. It is one of many rural clinics in Ethiopia, seeing to the ongoing problems of childhood diseases, inoculations, malaria and some antenatal care. It also deals with the more common cuts and bruises, TB, and malnutrition. In particular the clinic has also taken on the care of a rolling programme of mothers, all of whom suffer from severe uterine prolapse.



These women suffer hugely, not only from the discomfort of the prolapse, but from shame, rejection and disability, as they are unable to fulfil their role in society due to their condition, which can be simply remedied. The women come willingly knowing that a stay at the clinic offers them the opportunity to return to a normal family and village life.

Through health education at Buccama, other ills are also investigated and helped.

One of the reasons EMP is so successful is because Jo and Maureen go out there and witness for themselves the issues, immersing themselves in the life of the clinic and convent. They roll up their sleeves, learn and do the job.

Over the years they have funded building extensions of the clinic, medical equipment and transportation for the patients so they don't have to walk miles for treatment.

**Socks Appeal!** Through this yearly immersion they are now starting to support another clinic initiative; to address elephantiasis of the feet and legs. In this area it happens by infection of bare feet walking on the local soil. All that is needed to prevent this terrible condition is a barrier; a pair of socks or shoes. Their appeal is for any socks with stretch in them. Used ones are fine! They'll get them out to the clinic. 

To join in with the July Broccoli Festival, I thought I'd find a broccoli recipe.

#### **Ingredients**

150g rigatoni or other pasta

1 head of broccoli florets (keep stalk for soup) or use leftover broccoli

Olive oil

1 clove of finely chopped garlic

1 tablespoon pine nuts

50g parmesan

#### Method

Cook the pasta. Boil the broccoli for one to two minutes then drain well and finely chop by hand or in a food processor. Heat two tablespoons of olive oil in a pan and cook the garlic and pine nuts for a few minutes. Tip in the broccoli and warm through, then add the drained pasta and a splash of water. Toss, add the parmesan and toss again.

#### Portmoak Community Woodland Group

We know that Portmoak Moss is popular with visitors. But these past few weeks have seen an exceptional number of people coming to the Moss, to carry out work and learn about peat bogs. We've had teachers and pupils discovering why we should preserve peat and how it can support all kinds of bog-loving plants and volunteers removing unwanted trees.

In a very exciting development, Portmoak Moss has become the model for a new education project, helping primary schools understand the importance of peat bogs and that they can also be lovely places to visit.

On 9 May teachers from primary schools from around Loch Leven gathered in Portmoak Moss for a fieldwork professional development training session. Whilst walking around the Moss the teachers learned about this unique and important habitat and enjoyed the beautiful flora and fauna. After the visit the group went to Loch End Farm Shop, where they were treated to afternoon

tea. This was followed by further training; experiments to do back in their classrooms and a discussion activity, 'Let's Talk Bogs'.

'Let's Talk Bogs' is supported by beautifully illustrated materials designed to prompt teachers and pupils into looking at all the reasons why bogs are important. The resources, which the teachers and children are using, form part of an established programme of support for Scottish teachers developed by SSERC (Scottish Schools Education Research Centre) based in Dunfermline. Three weeks later P1/2 and P2/3 from Portmoak Primary School visited the Moss. They spent a lovely, sunny (midgey!) afternoon learning about the trees surrounding the bog and the creatures found in the Moss. And they used their imaginations to create possible homes for those creatures. There'll be more visits like this in future. Meanwhile, two groups of volunteers have been helping to remove young trees from the centre of the bog, to

prevent it reverting to woodland. Portmoak Community Woodland Group have bought some tree poppers, which make it much easier to pull the birch and pine saplings out of the peat. We were very pleased to welcome volunteers from the Scottish Environment Protection Agency and from a specialist team called the Bog Squad, to put some serious effort into dealing with this unwanted tree regeneration.

Finally, Luke Graham MP visited the Moss, to see for himself all the work that was going on and to find out as much as possible about the history. Members of PCWG gave him a guided tour

The June breakfast might justifiably have been entitled 'meat the butcher', given that the main speakers at the event were lain and Pamela Hunter, the stellar husband and wife team who run multi-award-winning local butchers 'Hunters of Kinross'.

New faces and old tucked into the usual fabulous Scottish breakfast before presenting their eclectic mix of products and services, which ranged from chimney-sweeping to professional photography, and from vegan skin products to HR

services and employment law advice. For anyone interested, Robbie at RDK Chimney and Firewood Services is hoping to retire in a few years and is currently seeking an apprentice. Jim Paterson intimated that to mark the 350th birthday of Kinross Curling Club, the club is holding a celebratory bonspiel in September and has invited seven countries to send their oldest team.

Kinross-shire Partnership Chairman Alisdair Stewart reminded everyone of various upcoming events.

Pauline Watson reminded the businesses to avail themselves of the opportunity to be listed on the local community website – kinross.cc – and to use it to advertise vacancies.

George Lawrie, new chair of the Tourism Group, told breakfasters that the Heritage Trail has over 200,000 visitors a year, but that they need to attract still more people to Kinrossshire. He mentioned that the Group intends to revitalise the website www.visitlochleven.org and that he would shortly be encouraging local businesses to become involved.

First-time attendee Tamsin Ferrier, from Seamab School, intimated that the school is holding a charity Golf Day at Muckhart Golf Club on 21 September, with the entry fee £160 for a team of four.

While business networking is the primary aim of the event, there are light-hearted moments as well. One regular attendee decided to share a few 'things people might not know' about himself – such as that he had previously worked as a bouncer and shares a birthday with Bilbo Baggins!

Next, Pamela and Iain Hunter took to the floor and gave a slide show charting the company's history. They began with Iain's apprenticeship in Edinburgh and continued with him making and selling haggis and black pudding in Melbourne, Australia. Back in Scotland in the early 90s, he opened a

shop while also becoming known as a singer. A trip to sing in Las Vegas

followed, but home beckoned and he returned to Edinburgh, sold the shop and bought premises in Kinross in 2008. They began with four staff but now have 15, and the business has received numerous awards, with recent successes including the East of Scotland Black Pudding Champions and Best Independent Retailer (Scotland).

Hailing from a retail background originally, Pamela is an active partner in the business; she is also heavily involved in Heart Start. After raising money to install a defibrillator outside the shop in conjunction with Heart Start, she has facilitated training for 540 people to do CPR and use the defibrillator. Currently, she's encouraging all butchers in Scotland to install a defibrillator outside their shops.

Both Pamela and Iain's dynamism shone through in their presentation, and it was fascinating to hear about such a successful local business.

The Networking Breakfast is taking a short summer break and will be back in action again on **Wednesday 5 September**. We have a great line-up of speakers planned to inspire us as we network our way into working Wednesdays from September to the end of 2018 and beyond. #### **Biological Research Talk**

#### The Vienna Tour

The much-anticipated tour to Austria took place at the end of May when 13 players flew to Vienna for a four match series against Vienna CC and Budapest CC.

# **Loch Leven NNR**



This month the weather has been fantastic. We've not been hampered by the weather until mid-June. Just as we were finishing our duck surveys on St Serf's, the weather changed and the strong winds came. We had to clear trees from the trail. It's not often that happens in the summer. Fortunately we were able to complete the survey the following week.

During the surveys we found over 200 duck nests. Mostly Tufted duck with many Gadwall and a few late Mallards. It's good to find so many nests out there. We're now hoping the weather is kind and many of the ducklings are reared.

We'll be at **Kinross Show** again on 11 August. We'll have lots of activities for the kids again. We'll be trying to spot Peregrines on the crags above, making nature plates and we'll also have the badge maker. Please drop by for a chat and see our tent.

We are conducting three of the ever popular **Osprey Walks** this August. They will take place on **18, 22 and 31 August**. Meet at Burleigh Sands Car Park and we'll walk down to the loch edge and view from there. The walks start at 6pm. Please phone the office on 01577 864439 to book your place.

Neil and Amee completed the last phase of Trout in the Classroom during the month. This phase includes a trip to the burns to where the trout were released to try some electro fishing with the Tay District Salmon Fisheries staff. Mike Brown came down to help and many trout were caught. We are looking forward to doing this project again with the schools next year. Amee has also been pond dipping with the Rosemount Nursery. It's been a busy couple of months with our outdoor learning here.

Amee completed another Young Scot award walk around Loch Leven. The highlights were Red Squirrel and a Woodpecker at the nest. Amee is now a fully trained cycle leader and is leading a **Young Scot guided cycle** around the heritage trail. She will be leaving the office at 11am on **Saturday 4 August**. Please book through the Young Scot website.

During the duck surveys we welcomed the relatively new Nature.Scot chief executive Francesca Osowska to the office. A keen triathlete, Francesca is cycling to all the SNH offices on the mainland and the islands and is raising money for charity. Keep an eye on her progress by searching for #CycleForNature. We had a very enjoyable if slightly damp BBQ down at the pier.

We'll be busy removing Himalayan Balsam from the lochside this month. Though we have made a dent in it the last few years, there is still much of this non-native plant around the loch. If you see any don't be frightened to pull it up!

With spring on its way out and summer rolling in, we have had some excellent weather at Loch Leven this month. The wildlife have been enjoying the sun too, busying themselves with the feeding and rearing of their young. Newly hatched blue tit chicks have been spotted around the feeders, as well as little grebe chicks down on the wetlands. The black headed gull colony have been particularly successful this year with plenty of chick sightings being reported from visitors. These noisy birds are a highly useful alarm system against predators, making them very useful neighbours for other nesting birds. Osprey have also been spotted passing through the reserve, with one sighting at Findatie and another spotted gliding over the visitor centre heading south.

The reserve team have been hard at work monitoring lapwing again this month with a successful count of 34

nests so far! The bumble bee meadow is now in flower with lots of insects beginning to emerge, including orange tip butterfly, small copper, red tailed bumblebee, and scorpion fly. Once the lapwing have left the meadow, the reserve team will begin cutting a path for visitors to walk through.

The education team have also been busy this month with a massive 1200 school children having passed through our doors already. This work would not be possible without the dedication of our wonderful staff and volunteers, so a massive thank you and well done to them! It's really important children are given the opportunity to interact with nature if we want wildlife to be a priority for the future.

We have some exciting events this July, too, with a very special guest visiting the reserve on **Saturday 14 July. Chris Packham** will be visiting Loch Leven

on his way round 48 different nature sites across the country as part of his TV series **Bioblitz**. The purpose of this campaign is to highlight the extent to which the nation's species are under threat. Chris will have an estimated time of arrival from **12pm** to **1pm** and we will be welcoming the public to join us on the day from **10am** to **1pm**.

Festival Players will also be making a return to Loch Leven this month on Thursday 26 July at 7pm. The theatre company will be joining us for an evening of outdoor entertainment performing Shakespeare's The Winter's Tale. Bring your own chairs, dress for the weather, and sit back, relax, and enjoying a wonderful evening's entertainment.

Big Wild Sleepout will be running again this year on Saturday 28 July at 10am for a full 24 hours of fun-filled adventure. This outdoor campout is a great way for the whole family to get stuck in to exploring nature, with bat walks, moth trapping, campfires and marshmallows. It's fabulous fun for all the family. Simply pitch a tent, grab a torch, and get stuck in!

The underpass project is now well under way and we are pleased to say we have received a massive £7,000 from our Crowdfunder page. Huge thanks to all the people who donated towards the project. The new underpass will make a massive difference to the community and provide open access for all, no matter what their ability.

# **Farming**

Oat milk. I'd never really heard of it until a couple of months ago and never thought I'd even taste it until I found myself in a vegan café in London on a wee trip with our 21-year-old daughter. I ordered a well-needed cup of tea, and of course it was served with a plant-based milk. As it turns out, it wasn't too dreadful, and I greatly enjoyed my cuppa and the accompanying banana bread. With this revelation, I also discovered that there is a growing trend of young people turning to milk alternatives, such as oat, almond or coconut milk, as they look to increase the amount of plant protein in their diet, while at the same time reducing their intake of animal protein. This growth in popularity is in part due to promotion by some very high-profile healthy eating bloggers who publish recipes and social-media posts across the internet.

I continued to ask questions and learnt that oat milk is made through a process of soaking, blending and straining the oats, resulting in a 'milk' which boasts high fibre and a similar protein content to the traditional dairy product, but significantly less calcium. It retails at a higher price and neither of the market leaders are based in Britain. Upon discovering this, we discussed the potential of creating our own, using local, Scottish oats but the prospect of building a brand is daunting before we could even contemplate all that sieving.

Given that I'm not only a milk lover, a farmer and my Dad also built a successful milk round back in the seventies, this rejection of cow's milk sparked quite a conversation over our afternoon tea.


I recalled memories of my sister and I being allowed to help collect the milk money on a Friday evening and I vividly remember thinking my Dad was a local hero. His customers really appreciated the fresh milk being delivered by the farmer; they valued his commitment to delivering their daily pint and viewed it as a vital healthy ingredient, not just in tea or poured over cereal, but in so many of their homemade meals and, of course, the popular milk puddings such as semolina, tapioca and rice pudding. Times have changed and consumers now pick up their milk from a supermarket located miles away from the farm on which it was produced. My Dad and milkmen like him were the original milk ambassadors in towns and villages across Scotland. Dad was a reliable milkman and a good farmer. Everyone knew and respected him and could trust that the milk he delivered was a healthy choice and part of a balanced diet. Who does that job now? Who promotes milk? Is enough being done to promote the benefits of the food we produce? Probably not, as farmers are too busy actually producing it. I'm not a blogger; I don't know where to find the time to devote to making videos to build a brand of lamb (or oat milk), but maybe that's not good enough in these competitive times? I can, however, write more in this column about the amazing beef, lamb, pork, milk and cereals produced on our farms and encourage you to buy directly from the farm if possible and reap the benefits of including great Scottish produce in your diet. Watch this space.
