#### **Queensferry Crossing**

The Queensferry Crossing is a fine piece of engineering, a thing of beauty and a credit to Scotland. As someone who has spent over £1,000 over the years on tolls for the old road bridge, and over three full weeks of my life queueing on it, I welcome the new bridge.

Four motorway lanes and two side roads feed onto the twolane Queensferry Crossing from the north, and nearly as much from the south, so it might well become congested in the rush hours, since the public transport supplied by privatised bus and train services is wholly inadequate. And when the flow is good there are often following jams at the Barnton entrance to Edinburgh where traffic lights act as a valve. Politically motivated carping about the new bridge should avoid reference to "average" speeds which are as useless data as "average incomes".

I am able to travel off-peak and find my journey times to Edinburgh much improved, and I can live with the occasional 20-minute delay when completion works are involved. All big engineering works require continuing attention: the huge Clyde-built liners took many workmen on their maiden voyages.

#### Scottish Minister visits local businesses

Lord Duncan of Springbank, Scottish Office Minister, visited Kinross-shire on 8 August as part of a tour of Perth & Kinross. As well as taking in the sights of Loch Leven, Lord Duncan called in on several local businesses, accompanied by constituency MP Luke Graham.

In particular Lord Duncan wanted to visit Hunters of Kinross to hear more about the 'Butchers at the Heart of the Community' campaign. This aims to have a defibrillator located at every butcher's shop in Scotland, providing a vital resource at the heart of each community. The campaign arose following a successful local initiative by Pamela Hunter to fundraise and install defibrillators and encourage increased awareness of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

Lord Duncan also visited Unorthodox Roasters, a coffee roasting business and vibrant coffee shop in Kinross High Street which is now open two evenings per week as a wine and sherry bar. While there he discussed the importance of the High Street in rural Scotland with local business representatives.

A spokesperson for Luke Graham said: "The High Street is rising up the agenda of central government, with the launch of the new 'Great British High Street' campaign."

#### **Councillor Purves**

#### **Kinross-shire Forum**

A few weeks ago, ward councillors and representatives from each of the six community councils in Kinross-shire met to discuss a number of the issues facing the



local area. We received a presentation from Systra who have designed a new traffic model for Perth & Kinross Council, which will be used to inform the planning and roads departments. In particular, we looked at the impact of new developments at the former high school site, at Lathro Meadows and at Pace Hill on traffic in Kinross and Milnathort. The model was also able to show what impact introducing roundabouts or realigning junctions at key pinch points would have on traffic flows. My ward councillor colleagues and I shall be working with Kinross and Milnathort Community Councils to see if improvements can be made.

We also discussed ways to improve local democracy in Kinross-shire. My ward councillor colleagues and I are keen to see more decisions about Kinross-shire taken by Kinross-shire representatives rather than by those in Perth. There are a number of ways of doing this, including the introduction of a devolved Kinross-shire area committee. We have asked community councils to discuss this topic and come back to us with their thoughts. I shall provide updates in future editions of the *Newsletter*.

#### **Local Development Plan 2**

Last year, the Council approved its final draft of Local Development Plan, which will set out the proposals for development across Perth & Kinross until 2028. The four Kinross-shire ward councillors made a number of amendments to the plan at this stage, regarding Balado, Crook of Devon and Rumbling Bridge.

Since then, there has been a period of public consultation where individual members of the public, statutory consultees such as SEPA and SNH, local organisations and groups, and developers have been able to indicate whether they support or oppose the plan. Objections may come in the form of requests for changes to policies or requests to include or exclude development sites in the plan.

The Scottish Government's Reporter may consider and change anything in the plan that has been subject to an objection. The Council therefore has to give a view on each of those objections to indicate whether or not we support it. While the meeting to determine the Council's position has yet to take place at the time of writing, Kinross-shire councillors would not like to see any further development sites included in this plan.

#### 20mph Signs, Kinross

The decision to extend the area covered by the 20mph limit from the shared space on the High Street to include the mini roundabout beside the Co-op was taken in September last year. It is now almost a year, and we still only have temporary signs, or rather, what is left of the temporary signs. This is extremely disappointing and people from outside the local area would be forgiven for not knowing that the 20mph limit starts where it does. My ward councillor colleagues and I have been chasing this for some time. I recently managed to get a proposed timeframe for the works from the Council's roads department. They indicate that the permanent signs will be installed during a two-week period from 3 September. This should only take a couple of days with minimum disruption.

#### Millbridge Hall Car Park

Parking in Kinross town centre remains a concern for local residents and businesses, particularly given the loss of parking spaces directly outside shops on the High Street following the introduction of the shared space. Earlier this year, my ward councillor colleagues and I managed to secure funding for the expansion of the Millbridge Hall car park in Kinross. While designs had been prepared, work has yet to begin but I can now confirm that it is planned to get underway from 3 September. This should see the number of car-parking spaces increase by 25%.

#### **Care-at-Home Charges**

During the Council's budget-setting process in 2016, it was agreed to adopt new guidelines issued by COSLA for charges for providing care at home, which would have generated a £300,000 saving for the Council. It would seem, however, that the implications on the individuals affected were not fully considered at the time with some people being up to £70 worse off each week. Recent and forthcoming changes to legislation with the new Carers' Act and the upcoming Frank's Law meant that such changes might soon be superseded by new requirements on local authorities. At the time of writing, the Leader of the Council has called a special Council meeting and is recommending that proposed changes be deferred for the time being. This will mean that no one will be worse off than they are now.

#### **Surgeries**

From September, I intend to hold a surgery in Loch Leven Community Campus between 6.30pm and 7.30pm on the third Thursday of each month. Any Kinross-shire residents are welcome to attend and raise with me any local issues or concerns.

### Luke Graham MP for Ochil and South Perthshire

Last week marked the end of the Summer Surgery Tour. Thanks to all those who made the time to complete surveys and discuss issues with me in community centres and on doorsteps across our constituency.



People often ask what surgeries are (genuinely believing I moonlight as a GP) and what types of issues people raise, and the answer is anything and everything. Since being elected, my team and I have taken on and solved cases ranging from potholes to immigration, welfare payments to school placements. Many issues overlap with MSP and Council colleagues, and we work together to try and help as much as we can. Case work is easily the most rewarding part of my job.

In addition to the case work of the past few months, I have also been continuing to push campaigns around the constituency, including the provision of broadband in Kinross-shire. Targets to reach 95% superfast broadband coverage are often aimed at population, not geography, and therefore often leaves our constituency behind. I campaigned on improving connectivity in our constituency and have been working with individuals, community groups, BT Openreach and the UK Government to connect families and communities that have been left behind. If you have not already done so, you should be receiving my 'Broadband Progress Report' outlining my work done to date and identifying the latest government funding schemes to connect you to superfast broadband. Broadband is no longer a luxury, but a necessity. Our rural economy depends on strong internet connections and I am currently arguing for additional broadband funding to be included in the Tay Cities deal.

Earlier this month I also joined David Lawrie on his family farm in Kinross-shire. I spent the day seeing first-hand the challenges and opportunity family farms face and the complex commercial arrangements that are required for a modern day dairy to function. It was great to roll up my sleeves, mucking out the cow shed and seeing through a full milk (one of three that happen daily). Young farmers are key to the future of our rural economy and lessons learnt on Cuthill Towers Farm will help inform my discussions with DEFRA and other MPs as we discuss the forthcoming agricultural bills that will shape policy post-Brexit.

### LDP2 Briefing at PKC and Kinross-shire Forum on 13 August

Dear colleagues

In advance of the above briefing, I had a meeting last Monday with forward planning, mainly to discuss policy issues. It was made clear to me that officers do not wish to change anything in the published proposed plan, even minor tweaking. All we will be doing at the Forum and Full Council later this month is sanctioning the contents of responses to the consultation for the Government Reporters Unit.

I find this unsatisfactory and I am convinced the public do not understand the process. For my part, I am particularly unhappy regarding the following:

- There will be no mention of the need for parking areas, mitigation measures on the A977, A911 and B9097 or the restoration of a rail link
- 2. Affordable housing and housing in the countryside policies will be reviewed under supplementary guidance, in due course!
- 3. No review of our "open door Gypsy Traveller policy or the Loch Leven catchment policies"
- 4. No prospect of any initiative on conservation areas, contrary to national planning policy
- 5. Local landscape areas will continue to exclude the Cleish Hills and Devon Gorge with PKC having to agree a full review of all local landscape areas before this can be addressed. Local landscape areas however, will have some protection from wind farms. No willingness by officers to explore with other authorities, a regional park for the Ochils and extending the Lomond regional park to Loch Leven.
- No acknowledgement that tree protection in "Big Tree County" is inadequate and limited to tree preservation orders
- No acknowledgment that we are building on limited prime agricultural land, contrary to national planning policy
- 8. Officers agree that the independence of reports and surveys commissioned cannot be guaranteed
- 9. We touched on the settlement issues for Balado, Blairingone and Powmill. Residents of Balado want to discuss Beaufield in a meeting with local members that I advised, please let me know your availability before the end of August asap? I remain concerned that LDP2 comment on developer interests in Blairingone is inaccurate and also that the Powmill site doesn't specify a contribution to A977 mitigation, especially since our current A977 update has no significant measures for Powmill

- 1. A community transport initiative for the Shire
- The relationship between our stand-alone action partnership and Community Councils, plus their membership thereof. I note Richard has written to Cleish and Fossoway CC
- 3. How we campaign together for a stand-alone devolved area committee for Kinross-shire that can, at the very least, influence democratic planning issues?
- 4. Cleish CC's request for a boundary change to encompass small areas of Fossoway and Kinross; I understand the former are happy but Kinross are split on this matter.

P.S. At the briefing, officers confirmed there is no proposal to modify the Published Plan 2017 as far as Kinross-shire Ward is concerned. Local members were broadly accepting of this unless the Community Councils briefed at the Forum come back to us before the Full Council on LDP2 on 29/08/18. This also relates to policy issues, although the list of schedule 4 responses to be agreed with the Government Reporters Unit is comprehensive and I am assured that Reporters do refer to representations made by Community Councils, councillors, developers and the public. I shall be making sure that my representations are covered.

### NHS Scotland's Approach on Preventative Health Screening

Cllr Barnacle has written to the Scottish Government to ask why NHS Scotland does not carry out routine blood tests to detect various medical conditions at an early stage.

In his letter to Jeane Freeman, Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport, Cllr Barnacle reports that a friend of his in England has six annual blood tests provided by the local NHS practice as a matter of course for people of retirement age. As a result of one of these tests, prostate cancer has been diagnosed. Cllr Barnacle writes, "I believe preventative measures can save the NHS a lot of money and early diagnosis is the key. It seems to me that the approach in England is much more likely to pick things up earlier and I query why the Scottish Government do not instruct NHS Scotland to do likewise?"

Coventry Place: At long last the steps and broken walling in Coventry Place have been repaired. It has taken nearly 36 months to get this done, even though I have been constantly chasing it. The Council's Housing Department



have been unable to explain why this relatively simple repair has taken so long and are carrying out a review of their working practices to try and find out what went wrong, to stop a repeat of this very poor performance in the future. The finished works are a big improvement. I am just very disappointed local residents have had to wait so long to get these repairs carried out.

Avenue Road: The south side of Avenue Road, the main access point to both Kinross Children's Hospice and Kinross House is looking rather tired and in need of attention. I am convinced that with a bit of careful design we could increase the amount of car parking here and also make this street easier to keep clean and tidy. I have asked the Council to look at this with a view to making some improvements. Even painting the utility boxes which line the pavement and weeding the flowerbeds would make a big difference to the appearance of this important town centre street.

Burleigh Community Woodland Path: The much-used path through the Burleigh Community Woodland connecting the castle to the old railway line was impassable due to overgrown vegetation and local walkers asked if it could be cut back. I asked the Criminal Justice Service to provide a squad of offenders carrying out their community services to cut the undergrowth back. This has now been done, and the path is now useable once more.

**Does This Ring A Bell?** I said in a previous *Newsletter* report that Kinross-shire is now one of Scotland's (if not the UK's) most cycling-friendly counties. This is very good news, but more people enjoy walking our tracks and Green Routes than perhaps cycle. Many walkers report that they have been startled by cyclists approaching them from behind and giving no warning. If you are going to cycle, and I would really encourage you to do so, then please, please fit a bell to your bike. They are very cheap to buy, and make cycling safer by allowing cyclists to warn other track users of their approach. Vane Farm Underpass: Those who have used the south loch road or visited RSPB Vane Farm recently will have noticed the new underpass being constructed linking the visitor centre to the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and the bird hides. When complete, people with disabilities will be able to access both using this new underpass. Currently the only access available is through another tunnel and involves many steps which makes it unusable for those in wheelchairs or mobility scooters. The underpass should open later this autumn.

Orwell Cemetery Wall: The eastern wall of Orwell cemetery partially collapsed recently and fell over graves within the cemetery. Work has now begun to rebuild the wall and remove all the debris.

### Kinross-shire Best Kept Village and Hamlet Awards 2018

**Report on Judging** by the Kinross-shire Civic Trust Awards Group

The hamlets were judged on Tuesday 17 July and the villages on Thursday 19 July. The weather on both days was warm and sunny, so the judges saw all areas at their best.

Mr Frederick Maitland Dougall (second year) from East Lothian and Mrs Jane Thorburn from Dollar judged the hamlets, while Lady Catherine Erskine (third year) from Cambo in Fife and Ms Lisa Edwards, BID Manager of Dunfermline Delivers, judged the villages. The Civic Trust is very grateful to all judges for their time and encouragement. The judges hope to attend the Presentation Ceremony on 22 August.

Kinross-shire Civic Trust had made several changes to the format and rubrics of the competitions. The first was to hold the competitions for hamlets and villages on separate days and the judges found this very

helpful. The days were less arduous and gave more time to observe and consider each settlement.

The second was to use a marking sheet that differentiated between the categories of environment (private areas, public areas, commercial areas and community amenities) and gave different weighting to each. The judges welcomed being able to concentrate on either hamlets or villages rather than move between the two. They thought that the marking sheet for the villages worked well but preferred to form an overall impression of the hamlets.

A third change was to provide the judges with a complete list of all the streets and special areas in the order in which they were visited. The categories were indicated by a coloured square. The judges found this very helpful in recording their verdicts as they went round, comparing scores at the end and coming to an overall judgement.

A fourth change was to provide positive feedback to accompany the verdict and this is provided in the following paragraphs. On 17 July the judges went to Easter & Wester Balgedie in the morning and to first Maryburgh & Keltybridge in the afternoon and then to Cleish. On 19 July the judges went to Kinnesswood in the morning and to Crook of Devon & Drum in the afternoon. They all enjoyed the experience and were most appreciative of the good results of community effort. Although they understood that this competition differed

from the various In Bloom competitions in covering the whole village or hamlet rather than just the main streets and in taking account of general tidiness and the look of being loved rather than just the floral displays, they found it impossible to ignore the contribution that colour made to the whole effect. By and large they were greatly impressed by the total absence of litter and the cared-for appearance of everywhere they went, so it was often the amount of colour that made the crucial difference.

#### **Hamlets**

**Easter & Wester Balgedie**. Special praise for the verges, the seating area, the new bus shelter and the colourful planters in front of the farm at Easter Balgedie.

**Maryburgh & Keltybridge**. Special praise for the gardens on Maryburgh Road, the grounds around the village hall, Middleton Park and Abbot's Wynd.

**Cleish.** Special praise for the new gate and walkway (with shovels for dog poo!), good mowing and more colour than last year.

#### **Villages**

**Kinnesswood**. Private land: some exceptional gardens and great use of recycled objects for planting. Common or public land: main road well cared for with lovely window boxes and use of space for flowers. Public resources or amenities: museum with garden and bus shelter with garden wonderful assets. Fantastic school with Year Of Young People interaction and vegetable garden. Commercial properties: lovely to see such engagement from shop and garage.

**Crook of Devon & Drum**. Private land: many very well-kept gardens, all tidy and litter free. Common or public land: well-kept verges especially in main street. Public resources or amenities: much improved school area. Commercial properties: the inn is the standout feature of the village.

#### Result

The judges congratulated all entrants on their achievements and declared that the winners were **Kinnesswood** (villages) and **Maryburgh & Keltybridge** (hamlets). They look forward to there being more entrants next year.

#### **Annual Flu Campaign**

We will again be holding the first of the season's flu clinics on **Monday 1 October**.

Saturday morning clinics will be held on:

Appointments may now be booked with reception. Please do not wait for a letter to be sent to you inviting you to make an appointment. If you are eligible you may make your appointment now.

We would encourage all those in the **groups listed below** to come for a flu injection. Please note that patients who do not fall into these categories or who have no other clinical reason for receiving the flu vaccination will not be given the vaccination.

Clinicians will visit the residential and nursing homes as usual to administer the vaccination.

#### Over 65s:

Those aged 65 and over on 31 March 2019 (Born on or before 31 March 1954).

#### Those aged 6 months or over in clinical 'At Risk' groups:

Chronic respiratory disease and asthma that requires continuous or repeated use of inhaled or systemic steroids or with previous hospital admissions. COPD including chronic bronchitis and emphysema.

Chronic heart disease.

Chronic kidney disease: kidney failure or transplant, nephritic syndrome.

Chronic liver disease: cirrhosis, chronic hepatitis.

Chronic neurological disease: stroke, TIA.

Diabetes.

Immunosuppression.

Asplenia or dysfunction of the spleen.

#### **Shingles**

The shingles vaccination is available to all those aged 70 to 79. Those aged 80 or over are not eligible. The shingles vaccination is only administered once and it can be given at the same time as the influenza vaccine. If you are eligible for both vaccinations, please advise our receptionist of this on booking your appointment.

#### Children's Nasal Flu

We will again be offering the nasal flu vaccination to all pre-school children aged 2-5. Dates for these clinics will be announced in the next edition of the *Newsletter*.

#### Monday 1 October

Please note that the only patients who will be seen on Monday 1 October are those with pre-booked appointments for flu or shingles vaccinations. Patients who have a medical problem which requires attention on that day should contact NHS24 and the Fife Primary Care Emergency Service on 111.

#### Pregnant women:

Pregnant women at any stage of pregnancy.

#### Long stay residential:

Those living in long stay residential care homes or other long stay care facilities.

#### Unpaid carers and young carers:

Those who, without payment, provide help and support to a partner, child, relative, friend or neighbour who could not manage without this help. This could be due to age, physical or mental illness, addiction or disability.

Young carers are those under 18 who carry out significant caring tasks and assume a level of responsibility for another person which would normally be taken by an adult.

### Doorstep crime and bogus callers

Doorstep crime is principally committed against the elderly and vulnerable in their own homes by individuals or organised groups. These criminals systematically target their victims and adapt their criminal method to exploit their victim's individual vulnerabilities. The impact of this type of crime has devastating effects on victims and our communities. Against the background of an increasingly ageing and diverse population, the threat from doorstep crime is set to continue. Perpetration of the crime may involve distraction, deceit, threats and violence.

Some offenders will alter their method of perpetration to gain the confidence of the victim and share this information with other criminals engaged in doorstep crimes. Many offenders are organised, well networked and will travel significant distances to commit crime, and view their criminal activity as a lifetime occupation. This is supported by the level of repeat victimisation experienced throughout the country.

Offenders may often appear extremely professional and have professionally presented business cards, flyers and advertising materials that are well designed and give the impression of a legitimate business.

#### What is doorstep crime?

For clarification purposes, doorstep crimes can be divided into four distinct categories:

**Bogus Worker or Rogue Trader**: Individuals who carry out work, often unnecessarily, which is of a substandard quality, charging an excessive fee. This includes individuals who obtain a deposit for material for work they do not thereafter undertake. These individuals are often referred to as Rogue Traders.

**Bogus Official**: Individuals who purport to be from a utility company, such as Water, Gas or Electricity companies etc, or use any other false story, designed to gain access to the property and **distract** the victim in order to steal from within. Often referred to as distraction thefts.

**Bogus Representative**: Individuals who falsely claim to represent an organisation, such as insurance companies, local companies, charities or banks etc, and induce the victim to give money or supply their bank details. This is more often conducted over the phone and is commonly described as vishing.

**Bogus Impersonator**: Individuals who claim to be employed as a recognised professional, such as a Social Worker, Nurse, Doctor or Police Officer, in order to gain access to the property for other gain. Again, often referred to as distraction thefts.

#### What can you do?

Be on guard if someone turns up unexpectedly. Genuine caller make appointments first.

#### Use a door chain or bar

- Always put the chain on before opening the door.
- Keep it on while talking to callers.
- Don't feel embarrassed genuine callers expect you to be careful.
- If you don't have a door chain, get one fitted.

#### **Check ID**

- Ask for ID from anyone who comes to your door, whether you expect them or not.
- Genuine callers will carry company photo ID and show it when you ask.
- Keep the door chained while you inspect their ID.
- If the caller is unexpected, ring their office to confirm their identity. Don't use the number on their ID card; look it up in the telephone directory or a recent bill. Genuine callers won't mind waiting.
- Don't assume a caller is genuine because they are wearing a uniform.

#### If in doubt, shut them out!

- If you have any doubts, tell the caller to come back when someone else is home. Genuine callers won't mind rearranging.
- You can tell callers to contact you by letter to arrange a more convenient time.
- Only let callers in if they have an appointment, and you are absolutely sure they are genuine.

#### Who should I call...

... if I feel threatened, unsafe, or suspicious of a caller?

• Contact the police immediately on 999.

### ... if I see something suspicious in my area, or want more advice about bogus callers?

- Contact the police on 101.
- Try to take a note of vehicle details or registration numbers, and descriptions of anyone suspicious.

You may have been for a walk around Loch Leven recently and spotted some brightly coloured stones or painted pebbles. While they are not actually precious stones, they certainly cheer up those who find them, young or old!



Members of Loch Rocks may have spent a long time decorating their stones with comforting messages, colourful cartoons, or stunning artwork and are hoping that they will raise a smile for whoever finds them. The ethos of the group is simply about enjoying creating the decorative rocks and hoping that someone else will enjoy finding them. It is thought that the idea originated in the US with the Kindness Rocks Project. Not only is the creation of the rocks fun and relaxing, its also a great feeling to see the joy on a little one's face on uncovering one of these hidden treasures, as well as a great way to spend time outdoors as a family.

Kinross and District Men's Shed in need of new premises

Roseanna Cunningham and Councillor Richard Watters recently met with Glen

Douglas, Chairman of Kinross and District Men's Shed, and Shona Fowler, Project Support Worker, to discuss the future of the Men's Shed in Kinross and to see first-hand the work being undertaken by the 'Shedders'.

Speaking following the visit, Ms Cunningham said: "I really enjoyed meeting with Glen and Shona and seeing the various projects going on down at the Men's Shed in Kinross.

"There were members restoring a large wooden boat, others repairing bicycles that have been donated, some refurbishing furniture and other items, as well as other members preparing hot filled rolls and tea and coffee. Some of the members also attend local farmers' markets to sell their wares such as wooden chopping boards and mobile phone rests – in fact I picked up one of those myself.

"In addition to the various projects they also have dart boards, table football and a 1970s train set. The group are also working with one member who is a retired IT technician to set up PCs which will be passed on to other men's shed groups to help them get up and running.

"Many men find themselves a bit isolated in retirement and these groups are a fantastic way for local men to get involved and socialise whilst also passing on their skills to others.

"There are now 120 Men's Shed groups across Scotland and they have really taken off. The Kinross branch has grown to 65 members and continues to grow. However, the current premises are not entirely suitable and though the group are making the best of the space available they will struggle to continue using the space into the winter because it is so hard to heat.

"Unusually for an organisation of this nature, the problem they have is that their current premises are really too big. It would be great to see the 'Shedders' find a new home locally where they can flourish and I would ask that anyone who knows of a space that might be suitable get in touch – either with Glen at the Shed or with my office."

I understand that the UK Government is very supportive of her initiative and there are plans to roll this out across the country with over 75 other butchers already signed up to the initiative.

When asked what she would say to other people worried about their hearing, Ellen says: "Get your hearing tested as you would with your eyes and teeth – it should be normal practice. Don't be ashamed of hearing loss; it's normal and a sign of ageing."

# Lest We Forget Reflections on the Great War

#### First World War Timeline 1918

19 Sep
 27 Sep-17 Oct
 Allied forces break through the Hindenburg Line in various places.

#### Kinross-shire Roll of Honour September 1918

Harry Black of Bishopshire, a Private in the Black Watch (Royal Highlanders) died on 14 September 1918. Private Black is buried at the Philosophe British Cemetery, Mazingarbe, France.

William R Sheret of Powmill, a Private in the Army Service Corps, died on 19 September 1918 aged 33. He is buried at Ramleh War Cemetery in Israel and Palestine.

Peter Tyrie Duff, was born in Caithness but moved to Milnathort when his father became schoolmaster there. He was educated at Orwell Parish School and Perth Academy. In February 1917, aged 18, he enlisted with the King's Own Scottish Borderers whilst an apprentice law clerk with J&G Wilson, solicitors in Kinross. He joined No 10 Officer Cadet Battalion at Gailes in September 1917 and was commissioned on 20 February 1918. He was a Second Lieutenant with the 5th South Lancashire Regiment when he was killed on 20 September 1918. He is buried in Houchin British Cemetery in France and is also commemorated on the Orwell Parish War Memorial.

As a former pupil of Perth Academy, there is a detailed listing about Peter Duff in the excellent online Perth Academy War Memorial, which can be accessed via the Perth Academy website.

**Thomas Wilson Collier** of Bishopshire, a Private with the Royal Scots, was killed on 22 September 1918. He was the son of William and Mary Collier of Drums Farm, Freuchie, and the husband of Isabella M Anderson Collier of Auchtermuchty. He is buried at the Pernes British Cemetery in France.

**Robert Douglas** was a Gunner with the Royal Garrison Artillery when he was killed on 26 September 1918. He is commemorated on the Vis-en-Artois memorial and also on the roll of honour at Orwell United Free Church, of which he was a member.

John N T Brown, youngest son of Mr and Mrs Thomas Brown of High Street, Kinross, was a miner in Kelty before joining the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. Aged just 20, he died on 30 September 1918, less than a month after being drafted to France. His three brothers also served in the war and survived. Private Brown is buried at Joncourt British Cemetery and is also listed on the roll of honour at Kinross Parish Church.







**Police report**: Police had emailed to say that there were no recent incidents of note in Kinross. They published a warning about the dangers of swimming in disused quarries in the August Newsletter. Cllr Robertson has notified the police of vandalism of a bench on the Heritage Trail.

#### **Matters Arising**

**War Memorial rail**: A meeting is still to be arranged. Matter to be carried forward to next meeting.

**Dog mess**: The paint has arrived.

M90 sign: Check for update with CCIIr West at next meeting. Minute Secretary: CCllr Jack (Treasurer) was unhappy that this decision was made without him. (CC July meeting: decision to offer a minute secretary £30 per meeting). It was clarified that any payment would be for a minute secretary who was not a community councillor. Cllr Robertson said that more and more CCs are employing a minute secretary and it assists with smooth running. He also said that all community councillors are entitled to expenses such as travel yet few apply for them. PKC gets very good value out of Kinross, which is a large CC. Others noted the recent CC review meeting had mentioned the possibility of extra categories of expenditure – and this needs explored. The discussion noted that decisions affecting the CC finances need to be fully understood prior to final approval. It was agreed that, in future, where any such topics exist, final decisions should only be taken once the treasurer has assessed and communicated the full impact on CC finances. It was also agreed that: CCIIr Jack would send CCIIr Bryson a copy of his analysis of the figures; and CIIr Bryson will write to CC Liaison to enquire about categories of additional expenditure.

**Provost's lamp**: This has been removed by PKC and placed in storage until a decision is made about where it should be placed. It was agreed that an item about this should be placed in the September Newsletter and on Facebook to gauge public opinion.

**Community Choices Fund**: CCllr Cuthbert submitted an application for £31,000 on behalf of Kinross-shire CCs. The probability of receiving an award is low. A decision is expected in August. If successful, there would be participatory budget events throughout Kinross-shire, probably one in each of the participating CC areas. The fund is to address rural inequalities. Representatives from the CC areas would have to go on a training day.

#### **Kinross Town Centre Regeneration and Roads Matters**

Cllr Barnacle had asked PKC officers for a review of the

regeneration project. As far as the CC is aware, he has not received a response yet.

CCIIr Thomas had circulated a link to an article about the Department of Transport recently recommending that local authorities pause the development of **shared space schemes**, 'while we review and update the Department's guidance'. CIIr Robertson confirmed that DoT guidance is applicable in Scotland.

Requests for works on **Talla Park and Avenue Road** are still outstanding. Expected repairs at **Coventry Place** have not taken place yet. Cllr Robertson is exasperated with the ineffectiveness of the relevant PKC department; the repairs at Coventry Place have been on request for over three years and are a matter of safety. He has written to the director of service.

The CC notes that the **missing 20mph signs** by the roundabout at Station Road/High Street have not been replaced. The unsightly temporary posts remain.

Following email correspondence with the CC, CClIrs Cuthbert and Thomas met with roads technician Blair Watt to agree a location for a **Vehicle Activated Sign** (VAS) on High Street. They had hoped it might be placed in a position to slow down traffic in the 20mph zone, but Mr Watt advised that this would cause delay, because the architects of the regeneration project would have to be consulted. Mr Watt advised writing to request VAS for the 20mph zone at the next allocation of VAS. The CClIrs agreed to Mr Watt's recommended positioning of the allocated High Street sign (near the junction with Smith Street). A VAS is also being installed near Turfhills. It was agreed that the secretary should follow up with an email requesting VAS for the 20mph zone plus repeating the requests for VAS decided at the March CC meeting.

#### **Planning Matters**

#### **New Planning Applications**

**18/01179/IPL** Erection of a dwelling house (in principle), land 200m NE of Monega House, Hatchbank. CCllr Cuthbert's view is that this application probably does not comply with the Housing in the Countryside policy. Similar applications had been rejected in the past. A request for an extension to the period of comment (deadline 31 July) was rejected.

**18/01189/FLL** Erection of a dwelling house, land 30m NE of 43 High Street, St Ronan's Drive. There was brief discussion. It was agreed to submit a comment (not an objection) pointing out that this proposal would result in the loss of off-street parking for the house at No 43 High Street.

**18/01117/FLL** Erection of 47no. dwelling houses and associated works (change of house type to include sun rooms), land 300m NW of Lathro Farm. No CC comment.

**18/01118/FLL** Erection of 12no. dwelling houses and associated works (change of house type to include sunrooms), land 300m NW of Lathro Farm. No CC comment.

**18/00840/FLL** Erection of 2no. flats (in part retrospect), site of 192 High Street. No CC comment.

**18/01281/FLL** Application under Section 42 of the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 to amend precommencement conditions 14 and 15 (drainage infrastructure) of planning permission 09/00491/FLL

(demolition of steading and erection of 10 dwelling houses and garages with associated roads), Chance Inn Farm. No CC comment.

**18/01292/ADV** Display of signs, 4 MacDuff Place, Kinross. No CC comment on the application. However, there was some discussion about **street-naming**. This is a street in the industrial estate south of the G S Brown houses. The street-naming procedure is that PKC officers ask Ward Councillors to suggest names. In turn, the councillors consult with the CC. The CC had suggested a railway-themed name to continue the theme of other street names in this development. However, it appears that this was not communicated to the PKC officers.

Planning Application Determined PKC: by 18/00959/FLL Demolition of dwelling house, change of use of land to form vehicle hardstanding, erection of a fence and re-routing of core path (in part retrospect), Lochside House, Kinross. This has been approved by PKC. CCllr Cuthbert had put a lot of effort into writing the CC's letter of objection and was disappointed at the approval. He had hoped that potential vehicular access to the pier could be protected. PKC Environmental Health and Community Greenspace had recommended conditions, but it was not known if these had been incorporated into the consent, as there was no Decision Notice or Report of Handling on the Public Access planning website. Cllr Watters offered to find out about the conditions. [Post meeting note: The emailed letter informing the CC of the approval was received on 30 July. On that date no Decision Notice or Report of Handling were visible on Public Access. They were subsequently made visible, though dated 27 July.1

Former Kinross High School site: CCllr Thomas had asked Cllr Robertson to follow up with PKC Enforcement, as little or no work appeared to have been carried out on the retained High School building for a couple of weeks. An update from PKC's Jamie Scott received by email that day indicates that PKC are content with progress. A need for amended roof trusses for the two projections at the front of the building caused a slight delay. The CC asked Cllr Robertson to ask officers what the expected completion date is.

**Lathro Meadows**: A query was raised about the pace of this development. Cllr Watters said more detailed plans will come forward before phase 2 begins. Cllr Bryson said that PKC will be tracking how many houses are built in a certain period; this information should be available in December.

**Beaufield, Balado**: CCllr Cuthbert had been copied into an email by a Balado resident to the ward councillors about the installation of a septic tank at Beaufield. The Balado resident said that she and other neighbours had not been notified and were concerned about possible effects on their water

supplies. She wondered why planning consent had not been required. Cllr Robertson said he would reply to the resident.

**Kirkland's Garage**: The developer wondered if the CC could do anything to support the application, which will be going to the Development Management Committee. The CC did not object to the most recent application. It was agreed not to take any further action.

Cllr Robertson reminded the CC that a meeting of the Kinrossshire Forum will take place on 13 August. CCllrs Cuthbert and West will represent Kinross CC.

#### **Reports from CC Representatives**

A meeting of the website sub-committee is yet to take place due to holidays.

**Miscellaneous Correspondence**: Most emails had been circulated to CCllrs on email as they came in, and a summary of mail provided. Some items mentioned were:

**Review of CCs**: A summary of the meeting with CC reps had been received along with a schedule of the next stages of the review.

**Gallowhill Road**: A copy of the proposed letter to residents and a drawing showing proposed double yellow lines was received.

**Licensing application** for Loch Leven Brewery to extend terminal hour to 10pm, add recorded music and increase sales capacity. No CC comment.

#### **Other Business**

**KCCNL charity**: CCIIr Davies said there had been no applications yet prior to the next deadline of 30 September. Although there is a permanent notice about the fund in the Newsletter, CCIIr Thomas offered to publish an article in the September issue to attract more attention.

### Milnathort Community Council

#### **News from the August Meeting**

In attendance at the meeting held on 9 August 2018 were: CCllrs C Williams (chairman), C Flory (secretary & vice-chairman), M Leach and C Lawson; P&K Cllrs W Robertson and C Purves; minute-taker Elizabeth Rougvie and approximately 39 members of the public. Also in attendance were PCs Victoria Sievert and Jim Pentley from Perth. Apologies were received from CCllr E Kirkham (treasurer) and P&K Cllrs M Barnacle and R Watters.

**Matters arising:** The person responsible for vandalism to Milnathort in Bloom displays had been identified via CCTV. The damage has now been paid for and the person has undertaken some voluntary work for the group. Cllr Robertson has reported the sign at Mayfield Gardens that was broken during a disturbance in June and it is to be repaired at a cost of £180. Following discussion, it was agreed that both matters had been dealt with effectively by the police.

**Core path at The Stackyard:** Cllr Purves said that flooding officers had met with residents and given them advice on how to protect their properties.

**Roads maintenance:** Cllr Purves has forwarded a list of roadworks to be completed in Milnathort.

Wester Loan flats: A site visit is planned to investigate the bright exterior lights on the new development, which may constitute an environmental health issue for neighbouring residents.

Roads: CCllr Leach thanked the P&K councillors for advising him of forthcoming roadworks in the village. Linden Park Road is due to be resurfaced in the 2019/20 programme. Drainage works are planned at Mawcarse and Arlary in October of this year. Traffic and pedestrian surveys will start at the end of next month. A vehicle-activated speed sign is due to be installed in Stirling Road in October, which will be the fifth in the village, and there are plans to install another one in South Street. A member of the public expressed concerns that the vehicle-activated sign in Burleigh Road was not always having the desired effect. Cllr Robertson will ask for speed checks to be carried out both in Burleigh Road and Stirling Road and will report back to the next meeting.

**Church Street:** PKCllr Robertson advised that the only effective solution to the problem of parking on the single white line was to introduce double yellow lines. At present, police can move vehicles if they are causing an obstruction but traffic wardens cannot book vehicles parked on the white line. He will ask for the measure to be included in PKC's programme of works.

**Back Loan:** CCIIr Lawson reported that he had received a reply from PKC regarding parking next to the Town Hall. The transport department does not envisage any road safety issues or a need to extend waiting restrictions but will monitor Back Loan for any parking or road safety issues that may arise.

**Bridgefauld Road:** Cllr Robertson advised that the council was investigating possible alternatives to the speed bumps in Bridgefauld Road. He had also reported the large pothole near the entrance to the nursery and expected it to be fixed soon.

**Zebra crossings:** Cllr Purves will follow up the possibility of raised zebra crossings being installed in Stirling Road, South Street and New Road.

#### Planning applications submitted:

Siting of three storage containers in yard in Stirling Road.

Alterations to house at 26 Linden Park Road.

Extension to house at 80 South Street.

#### Planning applications approved:

Erection of a house on land 30m south east of 40 Viewfar Road.

Develop land without complying with Conditions 1 and 2 of previous planning permission at Pitdownies Farm, Manse Road.

#### Questions from the floor

**Road safety:** A member of the public expressed concerns about parked cars at the crossroads where Old Perth Road meets Victoria Road. Following discussion, it was agreed that Cllr Robertson would request double yellow lines. He will also request that the council asks the householder to cut back a hedge that is compromising drivers' visibility.

**Health and well-being:** A member of the public expressed concerns about what she felt was a lack of support for people in the community with mental health issues. Following a lengthy discussion, it was agreed that the Councillors will meet with her personally.

**Static caravan:** CCIIr Williams confirmed that steps had been taken to prevent a static caravan being sited in the community orchard, which had been created at a cost of £6500 thanks to fundraising efforts. He defended his action in posting an email from the caravan's owner on Facebook, saying he felt it was his duty to let the community know what was going on.

**Pitdownies plan:** Cllr Robertson said that he had raised concerns about the volume of traffic in Wester Loan that would result from a housing development at the Pitdownies. The matter would also be discussed at a meeting of the newly reformed Kinross-shire Forum on 13 August.

**Burleigh Castle path:** Cllr Robertson advised that the first phase of work to clear the path had been carried out by a community service team, with the second phase to be completed shortly.

#### Councillors' reports

**Clir Purves**: Clir Watters has asked the council to look at a number of 'pinch points' in Milnathort and Kinross that are likely to arise as a result of new developments. PKC has until the end of August to comment on LDP2, the development plan for Perth and Kinross, and will consult all CCs in Kinross-shire.

A separate Kinross-shire committee on PKC was being considered amid concerns that the council was too 'Perthcentric'.

**Clir Robertson** expressed his gratitude to the large number of people who had attended the meeting.

The next meeting of Milnathort CC will be held on Thursday 13 September 2018 at 7.30pm in Milnathort Town Hall. Members of the public are invited to attend. There are currently three vacancies on the CC should anyone wish to apply.

### Portmoak Community Council

#### **News from the August Meeting**

In attendance at the meeting held on 14 August 2018 were: CCllrs M Strang Steel (Chairman), B Calderwood (Deputy Chairman and Treasurer), R Cairncross (Secretary), A Muszynski and T Smith; P&K Cllrs M Barnacle, C Purves, and R Watters; and two members of the public.

**Apologies**: CCllrs S Forde and D Morris; P&K Cllr W Robertson; and PC D Stapleton, Police Scotland.

#### **Matters Arising from Previous Minutes:**

School Access – policy on parking and safe access routes for children. Cllr Purves reported that progress was still required on the Officer Report following the site visit of 16 April before it could be submitted to the Environment and Infrastructure Committee. The Committee Convenor was aware that the Report was pending. Responsibility for the Council owned gap site on Buchan Avenue had now been determined as being in the Housing Revenue account and its role in contributing to the Report could now be assessed. The CC would welcome an opportunity to comment on the draft Report before it is presented to the Committee. It took the view that this was a matter concerning child safety and that it should be accorded an appropriate priority.

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church, Hall and beyond. The Chairman reported that he had had no acknowledgment of the preliminary Option Appraisal that he had submitted to PKC following the site visit in April. Ward councillors would pursue the matter. The Chairman will forward copies of his preliminary option appraisal to both ward and community councillors.

Resilience – being better prepared for risks. Community Emergency Plan. The result of the bid for funding from SSE to support a "Hall Hook-up" was awaited and in light of that commissioning the local programme would go forward.

**Glass Recycling, Kinnesswood**. There had been no further communication from PKC re a second bin site and no recent evidence of bins overflowing.

Review of Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils. The Chairman and the Secretary had participated in a PKC workshop. The Chairman summarised the key points of discussions on this matter as fed back by PKC. It appeared likely that changes to the Scheme could be settled in the autumn. Cllr Purves agreed to take forward a request from the CC that its border, which stopped at the margins of Loch Leven and extended to more than half of the loch's perimeter, should be extended to include part of the loch. The CC had

a significant interest in the loch. Such an arrangement would facilitate its work in supporting the loch and enable better contact with bodies such as the River Leven Trust and SNH. The Chairman also reported that at the Kinross Forum advance notice of comments made by objectors to the draft Local Development Plan had been circulated. These would be reviewed by the CC.

**Moss Road Car Park**. The Chairman reported that this matter would be taken forward over the next two months.

#### **Grant Funding**

The Community Choices Fund. The CC agreed to support a bid by Kinross CC which, if successful, could mean it sharing in a grant of some £20,000 which would focus on meeting rural inequalities. (N.B. subsequently learnt that the application was unsuccessful.)

Transport – Funding new Transport Initiatives (closes 26 Oct). This was of interest to the CC but would require further consideration before proceeding. CCIIr Calderwood would consult residents on the matter and the matter would be reviewed before October.

Paths For all – grants. All grants were now closed for the current year.

#### Reports

**Police**: The local police report was noted: fly tipping at Arnot; a caravan fire; theft of a stone planter from Scotlandwell; and the theft of a new trailer from Lochend Farm. The Area Commander's Bulletins of 13, 20, 27 June, 4, 11, 18, 25 July and 2 August were noted.

**Treasurer**: The balance at the month ending 30 April was £344.20 in the General Account; and £1,192.63 in the Michael Bruce Way Account giving a total of £1,536.83. The new "Holding Account" No. 3 held £1,500.00.

Pending further inquiry it may contact PKC in respect of this matter.

**18/00974/FLL** West Brackly Farm. Erection of replacement house. No comment.

#### **Progress with Developments:**

**16/03661/FUL, 17/03377/FUL, 07/00170/CEIA.** Westfield. Following their presentation to the CC in June, the Chairman had written to Hargreaves/Brockwell pursuing a meeting with residents of the B9097 and the arrangements for establishing a Liaison Group. A meeting of representatives from Hargreaves/Brockwell with B9097 residents together with representatives of the CC is planned for late September. Cllr Barnacle would participate and will invite relevant PKC officials to the meeting.

**17/02227/FLL** Levenmouth, Scotlandwell. Erection of two houses. There had been no response from Chair of the Planning and Development Management Committee to Chairman's letter. The matter would be pursued by Clir Purves

**18/00667/FLL Former Lomond Inn, Kinnesswood**. Erection of a dwelling house. The Chairman reported that he and CCllrs Calderwood and Muszynski will meet with the Developer on 18 August.

**Roads:** CCllr Bruce Calderwood reported that limited progress had been made on outstanding road matters and that the Roads Report for 2018 would be updated shortly. Summer resurfacing of the A911 and B920 had been successful and PKC had written to thank the many folk of Portmoak who had supported those undertaking the work in the very hot weather. It had not been possible to reschedule this work to a more convenient time for the community and the arrangements had not always been what had been expected. The spray and gravel dressing to the road through Wester Balgedie to Glenlomond was much appreciated but had come as a great surprise to residents. With the encouragement of all ward councillors the work required to introduce traffic lights at the Balgedie Toll Junction should be pursued. CCllr Calderwood would write to the relevant convenor drawing attention to the need to progress this matter. Progress with the RSPB Loch Leven underpass on the B9097 appeared on schedule.



Paths: CCllr Tom Smith. With limited resources the Paths Group had focused on clearing bracken from the upper section of the Michael Bruce Way as it crossed above Stephen's Field and the Golf Course. Rain and cattle are taking a further toll on that section of the path. There had been one "clearance" of the Dryside Road and the Paths Group would investigate whether an electric fence was now blocking this right of way and core path. The installation of new gates on the hill was in hand. The Action Plan dealing with signage would be taken forward in the autumn. The Paths Group were looking for new members and anyone interested should contact CCllr Tom Smith. In the meantime he will explore the possibility of securing further support through the Community Pay Back Scheme.

#### **Perth & Kinross Council Ward Councillor Reports**

Cllr Barnacle detailed a number of points where his intervention re the proposed **LDP** had either been accepted or rejected. Cllr Watters reported that, in light of the potential fall-out from Brexit, PKC were in principle supportive of working in parallel with the Scottish Government towards an arrangement whereby, in the event of Brexit, **EEA nationals** could still function as members of a community council.

#### Other matters

The CC noted forthcoming PKC workshops 1) "Placemaking" on Sat 27 October and 2) "Why do we need more housing?" on Sat 24 November. Scottish Water had advised a short delay in completing the new pumped supply to the Kinnesswood storage tank.

#### **Next Meeting**

The meeting of Portmoak CC planned for Tuesday 11 September 2018 is CANCELLED.

#### **News from the August Meeting**

In attendance at the meeting held on 7 August 2018 were: Cllrs C Brown, J Donachie, T Duffy, C Farquhar and G Pye; P&K Cllr M Barnacle and twelve members of the Public (MoP).

Apologies: CCllr A Cheape; Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters.

**Declarations of Interest:** None.

CCIIr Duffy's Situation Post Brexit: As previously noted, CCIIr Duffy, being a citizen of the EU, will currently lose the right to vote in local council elections, and hence the right to be a Community Councillor, after Britain leaves the EU. Cllr Watters with the support of Cllr Barnacle raised a motion with PKC to address this issue, and the motion was unanimously passed. Both CCIIr Duffy and this CC are grateful for this action.

Police Report: Unfortunately, no officer was able to be present at the meeting. There was one incident to note in our area since the last CC Meeting from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch: A patio table went missing from a garden on Station Road, Crook of Devon between Wednesday 13 and Friday 15 June, however according to a MoP present at this meeting it was later discovered that the wind had blown it away.

A977 Mitigation: Lachlan MacLean, PKC's Project Officer sent an update. The signalisation of the School Road junction in Crook of Devon is provisionally scheduled for 15 October. The work at the Saline Road, Blairingone junction will follow, probably around November. The A977/B9097 junction realignment has attracted some concerns from MoPs, and hence a safety audit of the proposed works will take place first. Finally, the work at the Drum crossroads should take place early next year. Meanwhile, works to upgrade the directional signage along the A977 are taking place now. The CC had previously requested a VAS on the A91 as well, but there is no information about this at the moment.

Blairingone School Estate Transformation: Cllr Barnacle informed the meeting that the next step after the decision to close the school is to hold a statutory consultation. Cllr Barnacle is also concerned that the decision should not be finalised until after the Reporter has approved LDP2.

Lambhill: Application 17/01227/FLL Change of use of agricultural shed to general storage and distribution, was refused and the applicant has made an appeal against this decision. The reporter carried out a site inspection on 11 June. Subsequently the reporter has requested further information from the applicant, and it is expected that a decision will be made shortly. 17/00737/FLL, Siting of static caravan for

use as staff accommodation, was refused on 14 June 2017, however PKC have decided not to enforce the breach of this rejected application until the application described above has completed its passage through the appeal process.

Hydro Scheme Fund: TRACKS have investigated the resurrection of the Devon footbridge. CCllr Pye attended the TRACKS Committee meeting on 20 June to hear about the progress. The previous location of the bridge could not be reused for various reasons: Concern that funders would think it unsafe; need to obtain CARS licence to permit works in the river bed; closeness to 200-year flood level. Consequently, a new location has been selected for further design.

The TRACKS committee members pointed out that it was important to establish who would be responsible for ongoing maintenance of the bridge, and it may be necessary for the Hydro Scheme fund to commit to this expense if no other body can be found to maintain it. CCIIr Pye reminded the TRACKS committee that the CC felt that it was important to allow as easy an access as possible to the new bridge, and hence creation of access paths needed to be included in the design and pricing. This was agreed. The CC hopes that George Lawrie will be able to attend the next meeting of this CC to update us with the plans for the new bridge.

Powmill in Bloom: CCllr Farquhar reported that a mower has been purchased and is being used to mow verges. A disused trailer has been acquired and will be refurbished as a large planter. A solution needs to be developed to ease the problem of watering plants remote from any houses. The village hope to enter the Best Kept Village competition next year.

Crook and Drum Growing Together: CCllr Duffy reported that Crook and Drum Growing Together have entered three competitions this year. Update on results will follow.

Fossoway Gathering: CCllr Duffy reported that at the meeting on 14 June it was decided to hold the gathering on 25 May 2019 as the previously considered date of 22 June would clash with the Royal Highland Show. The proposed location is Waulkmill Park, but this is not yet confirmed. PKC have agreed that the site could be used, although a formal application to them will need to be made. Consideration of parking, etc., also needs to be resolved. There are a number of enthusiastic people involved, but more are always welcome, and it's important that all areas of Fossoway are represented.

LDP2: Cllr Barnacle wants Landscape Designations of Rumbling Bridge Gorge and Devon Gorge to be reintroduced, but thought that will probably not happen. The Reporter's final decision is expected by the end of year.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: Cllr Barnacle wanted a review of PKC's Gypsy Travellers' policy, but this doesn't seem to be likely. Cllr Barnacle has reported the presence of two caravans in the paddock area at Crook Moss to the planners. The Crook Moss residents previously obtained financial assistance from a PKC fund to make their connections to mains services -Some settled residents have recently asked Cllr Barnacle if they can get similar assistance to replace their septic tanks with a mains drainage connection.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle reported that the owner's recent planning application (18/00704/FLL) to realign the vehicle entrance was rejected because it didn't also include Listed Building Consent. Approval of this application is necessary to unlock the developer's contribution to moving the memorial. There will be a meeting on 9 August between the applicant, highway department, planners and Cllr Barnacle to try and find a compromise planning application that could be approved.

Matters Arising with no update since last meeting: Ivy Cottage Powmill - No information at present.

#### **New Business:**

**Roadworks:** The planned two week closure of Rumbling Bridge from 20 August for resurfacing work will cause difficulties for local farmers at this time of year – MoP asked if there was any sort of compensation scheme. Cllr Barnacle will investigate.

**Powmill Play Park**: CCllr Farquhar notes that the park is to be refurbished during the next Financial Year, is there anything else that could be done at the same time? All suggestions are welcomed. CCllr Duffy suggested that the Hydro Scheme Fund might be able to help.

#### **Community Council Business - Meetings Attended**

Crook of Devon Commemoration Committee: CCllr Cheape attended a meeting of this committee on 13 June at which it was decided to hold the main anniversary event on 10 November with the usual Remembrance Day service on the following day. The anniversary event will include an exhibition in the Crook of Devon Village Hall. There was a further meeting on 18 July, details to follow. Cllr Barnacle attended a meeting of Cleish CC and their village will take part in the Commemoration event too. Anybody who has information about anyone included on any of the memorials should let the committee know so it can be included in the exhibition.

**Sports Hub**: CCllr Farquhar reported that there has been no face-to-face meeting in the last two months; however email communication included news that the 5k run is up and running, and that there are plans to upgrade the existing Skate Park in Kinross along with raising its profile in the community.

AOCB: MoP reported that the quarry at Powmill is full of litter, remnants of fires, etc. It was suggested that this might be as a result of new restrictions displacing visitors from Loch Lomond. Cllr Barnacle said that is an Environmental Health issue, and he'll get PKC's department to investigate. There was some doubt amongst those present about who owns the land, does it need to be fenced? Another MoP noted that visitor's cars parked nearby are also causing problems. CCllr Duffy asked Cllr Barnacle about the bump in the road outside the pub in Crook of Devon. Cllr Barnacle replied that it was left over from BT work, but it is now too late to get their contractor to return and fix it. Consequently it will now need to be fixed by PKC's Highway Department, but unfortunately not until the budget is available in the next Financial Year.





#### **Recent Speakers**

The club was very pleased to welcome Jan Kerr who told us about the Homelands Trust (www.homelands-fife.co.uk). Homelands is the name of an estate located in Lundin Links. It was owned by Robert Paxton, a Scot who made good in America, and he purchased the estate for his family in 1908. His daughter Isabel lived there all her life and, on her death, she bequeathed it to charity for the benefit of people with disabling conditions. It was to be used by them and their family, friends and carers to have properly equipped holidays. Following a legal battle in 1998, a trust was set up to make this happen. A significant amount of planning, design and building followed to make sure that Miss Paxton's wishes were carried out properly.

In 2014 the present four luxury self-catering lodges opened, accommodating up to 20 people at a time.

Phase two is about to start, adding another five lodges. Jan explained that the café in the Paxton centre at Homelands is open to all so come and enjoy a lunch with lovely views across the Forth. The club presented Jan with a donation to the trust.

We enjoyed a great talk from **Alan Lockhart** from RBS Information Technology. The subject of Alan's talk was 'Open Banking', which Alan described as the biggest change in banking since cheque books were introduced!

The UK regulator has mandated that the big UK banks must provide programmatic access (API's) to their customers and product data to any authorised financial application provider who wants it.

What this means is that we'll see a wave of new and innovative apps for financial services provided by nimble start-up companies (it will, of course, be up to the customers whether they permit any particular app to access their data). This sea-change means that the big banks will now have to start to focus on internal innovation; making their internal culture lean, agile and low cost as they cannot charge a fee for this data access. They are going to be changing what they do, how they do it and the pace at which they deliver it. Exciting times for the major banks with huge benefits for customers!

'Lock, Stock and Barrel' was a talk given by **Bryden Ritchie**. He covered the history of military small arms and the effect the development of the weapons has had on contemporary society.

Bryden has had a military career and an academic one. He drew on both to give us an absorbing talk which was illustrated by a dozen weapons from his collection.



Bryden began by explaining what has driven the development of portable weapons. They must be easy to use, reliable, controllable, able to be used *en masse*, accurate, rugged and affordable. The list goes on! He then went on to explain why archery muskets failed several of these criteria, how muskets started to address them but not enough, and how this drove gun evolution right through to the breech-loading, smokeless cartridge box magazine weapons of modern times. Showing us the actual weapons and also the cartridges for them made the evolution tale so real. He is one of the few people in the UK with such an encyclopaedic knowledge of the topic, and we relished it! Thanks Bryden.

Our speaker on 13 August, **Stephen Kirkham**, gave a fascinating and inspirational talk about his experience in requiring a heart transplant.

Having led a full life in the army (during which he was awarded the Military Cross), on retirement he felt the call to the ministry and became vicar to North Leigh church in the Oxfordshire Cotswolds.

However, his health deteriorated and he was obliged to take early retirement from this post. In 2014, he and his wife decided to sell up and move to Kinross-shire. The strain of buying and selling houses, together with the stress of moving, added to Stephen's health problems and he was diagnosed as suffering from severe heart failure. From having been a very fit man, he slowly began to fade away and, in January 2015, Stephen was admitted to the Golden Jubilee National Hospital in Glasgow and put on the transplant list.

In time, after a frightening cardiac arrest, a suitable donor was found and the operation went ahead. Eight months after the operation, sheer determination to regain fitness saw

him conquer Benarty and he continues to walk 20,000 steps every day! Stephen is eternally grateful to the donor family and at every opportunity encourages everyone to sign up to becoming a donor and to inform family members of this decision. A truly remarkable man and an inspirational talk.

# Recipe

### Chocolate Courgette and Spice Muffins

I have made chocolate courgette cakes before but these are a little different with the addition of spices. This is one way to use up your courgette glut.

#### **Ingredients**

3 eggs

400g caster sugar

250ml vegetable oil

5 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa

11/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

250g grated courgette

375g plain flour

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

½ teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon mixed spice

#### Method

Preheat oven to 180°C. Prepare 24 paper cases in muffin tins. In a large bowl beat the eggs, then beat in the sugar and oil. Add the cocoa, vanilla, courgette and stir well. Stir in the flour, bicarbonate, baking powder, salt and mixed spice and mix well.


Pour batter into prepared cases, filling two thirds of the way full. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes. When cool, you can top with your favourite chocolate icing.


Sadly, two of our members have passed

### Portmoak Community Woodland

For the second year running, Portmoak Moss was chosen by Scottish Natural Heritage for an event celebrating National Bog Day. The government agency and Portmoak Community Woodland Group organised a guided walk and 'pond dipping' to highlight the wide variety of plants and animals which live there.

The weather for the event on 22 July was perfect. Perfect for humans, that is! We soon discovered that it hadn't been so good for the dragonflies and damselflies that like to breed in the ditches.

Most of the ditches dried out during the long, hot spell but, where there was water, there was also a good range of species. These included the magnificent common hawker dragonfly with its blue and yellow colouring, and a large red damselfly. How can you tell the difference between damsels and dragons? We learned that the damsels are the size of matchsticks and the dragons are the size of a cigarettes.

Our guide was Daniele Muir from Perthshire Wildlife. In a pool of water behind one of the dams, we fished out a great

diving beetle; the kind of insect you'd never suspect was there without the help of an expert. Daniele explained how important it is to keep water in the bog for these species.

Susan Webster of SNH, said, 'We chose Portmoak Moss because it's a pretty amazing place and it's not as if you have to go to the Outer Hebrides to find it. It's really close to where people live and we appreciate the community involvement'. The walk was rounded off with a display of live moths, trapped the previous night by specialist, George Guthrie. As ever, he had some wonderful moths with beautiful names, like True Lovers Knot and July High Flyer. The bog day was attended by around twenty people.

Of course, the weather broke a few days later, no doubt to the relief of the insects, not to mention Portmoak Community Woodland Group. Thanks to a generous donation of grass seed from local company Turffit, we had sown the new play area in Portmoak Community Orchard in Kilmagad Wood. All we needed was some regular rainfall, to get it off to a good start. It is growing nicely and, as long as we don't get another prolonged dry spell, it should do well.

We still don't know if the grass will be ready for our Apple Day on Sunday 30 September from 2pm. If it isn't, we'll be across the road in Portmoak Village Hall, where we'll be offering expert apple identification, apple-themed baking and freshly pressed apple juice. All you have to do is bring your apples, a twig and some leaves if you want to know what varieties you've got. Also bring containers to take away the juice and a little bit of money to donate for refreshments. The event itself is free.

It's a busy time for us and the woods' owners, Woodland Trust Scotland, who carry out the routine maintenance. This year volunteers have had the additional job of trying to remove highly intrusive Himalayan Balsam from the ditches close to Portmoak Moss. We don't want this weed in the Moss as it tends to take over and push out many other plants.

For progress reports on this, and many other aspects of the community woodland management, please come to our regular meetings on the third Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm in the Well Country Inn.



# **Loch Leven NNR**

Is autumn on its way? For weeks Loch Leven has basked in sunshine but the weather appears to have turned, with the temperatures down by ten degrees and much less sun. A spot or two of rain has greened the fields up after being like a desert for many weeks.

Many thanks to all the folk who came to see us at the Kinross Show. We had great fun setting up the stand and there were plenty of craft things created with the adults and the children. We've got a couple of autumn events coming up at Loch Leven. On **Sunday 30 September** there is a **Fungi Foray** at Levenmouth, meeting at the Findatie Car Park. The walk starts at 2pm. Sarah will be assisting Richard Smith from Fife Council searching for fungi in the woods. I'll be doing a **Dawn Goose Walk** at Burleigh Sands on **Sunday 4 November** starting at 6.45am. We'll stand on the loch shore waiting for the geese to leave their roost.

The toilets down at the pier are expected to be delivered on Tuesday 11 September. Ground work is underway. Well done to all the partners who helped to deliver this including PKC, HES, TRACKS and Kinross estate, after two years of planning. If anyone is having any trouble contacting us, our e-mails have changed from @gov.uk to @nature.scot. Please update your contacts accordingly.

There have been a few interesting bird visitors to Loch Leven recently. A Long-eared owl has been on St Serf's, Little Egrets seem to be resident on the loch now, a Little Ringed Plover was also on St Serf's and over 20 Ospreys have been seen at once.

I am still updating the blog regularly. There are lots of plant, birds and scenery photos. Search for Loch Leven Wordpress. Also news is reported via the Scotland's National Nature Reserve page on Facebook, @Stevethecappercaillie on Instagram and @SNHnortheast.

The warning signs are still up regarding public health around the loch. Please exercise caution around the loch until the signs come down. With the obvious drop in temperature the conditions are improving and there is little evidence of algae now. At this time of year vegetation from the loch bed gets washed up along the shoreline. This rots down and can smell a little. Even though we've seen these algae events, the water quality has improved a lot over the last 20 years. The local environment is much healthier then the days of 'Scum Sunday' in the nineties.

Please note that open water access is discouraged on Loch Leven NNR between 1 September and 1 April. This is to protect the wintering birds on the site. For further information about the avoidance of disturbance to the wild birds and access guidance to the site please visit our website **www.nnr.scot**. Many of the birds we see at Loch Leven are turning up from now on. Please enjoy the wildlife spectacle that happens on your doorstep.

# RSPB Loch Leven

As we move away from the breeding season and summer turns to autumn, the wildlife are once again at peace with one another. A dull, wet September afternoon sees a lone grey heron huddled in the rain sitting in quiet companionship with an adult lapwing, a union that mere months ago would have been impossible.

Sightings of osprey have been particularly good throughout August. These beautiful birds have been spotted in numbers as high as six throughout the reserve, their long flight back to their wintering grounds signalling the oncoming change in season.

The warden team have been hard at work this month removing scrub and brambles from the reserve, as well as ensuring the wetland vegetation is cut appropriately. This is done in order to prevent it becoming overgrown, and allow the habitat to remain as it is – a wet grassland. Wading birds such as lapwing need the grass levels to be low at the start of the breeding season to allow them to dig out the ground and make their nests. However, once they have laid their eggs they need the grass to grow around them to hide them from potential predators.

We have some excellent events this month including a Wild Night Bat Walk on Friday 7 September from 7.30pm to 9pm. Here you can explore the reserve after dark to see and hear the different types of bats found. Up to five species of these fascinating nocturnal creatures can be spotted, including the rare Nathusius' Pipistrelle bat. Booking is essential (RSPB members £8, child members £3, non-members £10, child £5). Another of our seasonal Wildlife Writing Workshops is being held at Loch Leven on Saturday 22 September from 10am until 2pm. Come with paper and pen and a readiness to be inspired by the birdlife, wildlife and landscape of Loch Leven. Author and poet Anita John will lead you through a range of exercises designed to get you writing. You will take a tour of the reserve and then return indoors to capture your images in words. Booking is essential and can be done via our Eventbrite page at rspblochleven.eventbrite.com (RSPB members £10, non-members £15).

# **Farming**

#### Teenagers and Lamb

You might think I've lost the plot... A better column would be about harvest as the fields around our loch are turning golden. Maybe I could write about how the livestock and crops coped in the drought of July or about the success of Kinross Show, but no. This month, I'm inspired to join these two words together to create a more daring title and look at how we can encourage our young people to eat more lamb.

I was given a head start as our own teenager let me know that the High School were offering free samples of cooked lamb on The Street at Wednesday lunchtime. Its "Love Lamb" week and our industry body, Quality Meat Scotland, organises this in conjunction with the school kitchen to promote Scottish lamb.

Taste is the main driver of food choices for all ages so if your teenagers haven't tried lamb before I'm pleased they can have a wee taste with their peers. If they want to try more, autumn is the time to pop it in the trolley when it is in season and tastes at its best.

Two of our kids love lamb. The boys like chops as they are juicy, tender and you

don't need a knife and fork (despite the fact that they are 19 and 15, cutlery remains optional.) They also prefer lamb mince so we swapped to this a few years ago for our 'mince and tatties' nights. It's also their first choice on the BBQ on a burger with cheese or with peppers on a skewer.

Our daughter is no longer a teenager and in common with many girls her age she chooses to eat only a little good quality meat each week. However, a highlight of her trip to Skye in the summer was dinner at The Ferry Inn, Uig where she selected loin of Highland lamb with Mediterranean vegetables and baby spinach. It was naturally reared, so an ethical choice as well as being delicious, I believe.

I do feel that red meat protein produced from a grass-based diet has nutritional benefits. This year we had 1300 lambs turned out into the fields and I can tell you about their life on our farm and why I think this helps the meat that we produce to be so good for you.

It's a perpetual cycle really, but commences early on during pregnancy when we feed the ewes on turnips grown on our farm, homemade silage and a concentrate feed that is made with Scottish cereals blended with protein and minerals. The ewes rely on this for lamb development and to produce a good milk supply once the lambs arrive. As the grass grows the concentrate is reduced and the lambs are reared in the fields on their mother's milk and grass alone.

We've sold 30% of our lambs already. I admit some of our early lambs get a bit of extra feeding to supplement the shortage of spring grass, but the majority are finished only on forage. It's the year round attention to nutrition that means the final product is a fantastic protein source with good levels of healthy fat and full of vitamin B3 and B12, phosphorus and zinc.

I don't expect many teenagers read this column so I'm relying on you to make it a talking point over dinner one night this week.
