# Kinross's Jo Awarded MBE For Ethiopia Charity Work

KINROSS RESIDENT, Jo Middlemiss, who co-founded a charity to support a medical clinic for women in Ethiopia over a decade ago, has been awarded an MBE in the Queen's New Year's Honours list for her work — which, so far, has helped more than 8000 women.

Jo began the Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP) with her cousin Maureen

Burnett from Glasgow, in the tiny clinic in Buccama, in a remote part of Southern Ethiopia. At the time the centre was inundated with patients suffering with severe uterine prolapse, and staff were struggling to cope, without enough food or medical resources.

The painful condition, often caused by carrying heavy loads or frequent pregnancies with little recovery time, happens when the pelvic muscles are too weak to support the uterus. In some cases the entire womb falls outside the body, where it can develop ulcers and become infected. Many women over the years have reported living in shame and fear, hiding their pain due to the social stigma, where those affected have been seen as 'impure' and ostracised from their families.

After hearing about the experiences of patients and the dedicated staff, Jo launched the first appeal at home in Scotland, planning to raise enough for a few basics such as mattresses. Now the charity aims each year to make a minimum of £25,000 through charity events, and donations from hundreds of people in Kinross, and beyond, as well as organisations such as the Rotary Club of Kinross, St Paul's Church, Kinross and the Common Grounds Charity Cafe in Milnathort. The management of the charity is done on a shoe string, where apart from items

like postage and leaflets all money goes directly to the clinic, and both founders pay all their own expenses when travelling to Africa.

The clinic has expanded to become the Buccama Health Centre with two wards, a laboratory and 22 members of staff, including five qualified nurses. The dedicated staff educates women about their bodies,

explaining that they are not to blame, prepare those who need it for a relatively simple operation, and treat those with less severe cases, using a £3 'pessary' ring, which helps keep the womb in place.

EMP co-founder Jo Middlemiss spoke about some of the women who have been helped over the years. She said: 'There have been women who had the worst cases imaginable, and they literally danced for joy, when they were supported back to health.

'Women can gain back their self-respect, they're no longer banished from their homes, and can go back to their children and families, and contribute to the community. The impact stretches way beyond the individual women

helped. One of the many highlights has been witnessing attitudes around the stigma evolve, as more and more women speak out, and those who need to, get support.'

Jo said on her reaction to receiving the award: 'Opening the letter took me by surprise, it was a shock really, and I just burst into tears! I was jumping up and down and wanted to tell everyone,

but you have to keep it a secret, until it's announced, so I've been bursting to tell my family all Christmas.

'My co-founder Maureen
Burnett, who is also to receive
an MBE, feels we have learned
and gained so much more than
we have given. We feel like we
are going back to family when
we go to Ethiopia, and we're not
just two old grannies – the women there don't care how old we
are, or how grey our hair is, they
know we believe in them, and
that we will do everything we
can to continue to support them.'

Each February, Jo travels to live and work at the clinic for a month at a time, to assess what is required for the coming year, and as the health centre has recently expanded to treat those with the endemic foot disease Podoconiosis, the need for funding continues to grow. The charity aims to raise £5 million to enable the clinic to be self-sustaining in the future. Jo said: 'My wish for the New Year is that through this award, some great benefactor or organisation will discover the

# Windlestrae Controversy

# Empty hotel to form basis for new retirement village

# • Landmark tree gets the axe

**THE WINDLESTRAE HOTEL** will become a retirement village.

Planning permission has been granted for plans by Juniper Residential which will see the now emptv Windlestrae hotel site turned into a retirement village. The properties, which are to be built for residential assisted living, will only be available to residents aged 55 and over. The proposed housing mix is 22 detached and semi-detached houses (14 two-bed and 8 three-bed houses), 11 x 2 bed cottages and 8 x 2-bed affordable apartments. The proposal also includes the formation of parking areas, and landscaping work. Planning officers met at the Perth and Kinross Council Planning & Development Management Committee meeting on Wednesday 15 January 2020. The committee approved the proposal for planning permission by 7 votes to 5.

Some of the objections that Kinross residents had related to the felling of over 50 trees, including the large sycamore tree at the start of the avenue of trees on the Muirs at the Market Park. Objectors think this will have a detrimental effect on the skyline but this tree, something of a Kinross landmark, will now be cut down in order to widen the access road.

Some development is also planned for the Market Park: a strip will be converted to tarmac to create a wider access road, and a pumping station and tanker hardstanding are proposed in order to supply drainage. The drainage will be connected to the appropriate waste water treatment works, which

will be dealing with phosphorus appropriately before any discharge enters the loch, and 'therefore will have no likely significant effect on the SPA'.

Amendments were proposed by various local Councillors to refuse the application because of the density of the development and the encroachment into the Market Park. Hopes were expressed that developers would retain some of the existing hotel garden and trees. Some doubts were also raised about the standard of the ecology report which claimed there are no bat

The Kinross Civic Trust state that 'Council officers made a serious error in the report to councillors recommending approval: they stated that the access road to the Windlestrae is not in the Conservation Area, whereas it is.' For more details see their report on p65.

roosts in the trees, based on a walkover of the site. According to the Report of Handling, 'The dusk survey carried out in August 2019 confirmed that no bats were observed to enter or leave the building.' An Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) was not thought to be required, as the proposal was 'not considered likely to have significant environmental effects'.

Juniper Homes held a Public Exhibition in Kinross Masonic Hall back in September 2019 and feedback was invited from the local community, local councillors and community representative groups. This resulted in changes being made to the original proposal, including more planting to compensate for the removal of the existing trees. The Report of Handling states 'The site is populated with several Lawson cypress cultivars and Norway spruce, which have estimated height of 13-15m, are non-native, and have limited amenity value as part of this ornamental planting.'

Kinross Community Council had raised the following issues:

- overdevelopment of the site
- lack of parking
- loss of trees
- impact on conservation area
- possible strain on GP surgery

The NHS were consulted as part of the planning application process but made no comment within the consultation period. While some think the retirement homes will be detrimental to the community, others hope that the increase in population will generate increased footfall and spending in the local economy.







# First Minister Visits Kinross Food Bank

IT WAS AN amazing start for Broke Not Broken in 2020 to find out that they would be visited by the First Minister Nicola Sturgeon. It was met by exclamations, cleaning, organising, cup-cake making and some more cleaning.

It is a huge testament to the work done by the founding members of Broke Not Broken, and in particular Clare Slight, Chairperson. She has tirelessly worked as a volunteer to make sure that the charity have grown into one that is valued, respected and validated to the point where the First Minister's office picked them out as a model for community-led hunger and poverty support. This kind of thing just doesn't happen overnight. It has taken five years of hard work, but hard work done by people who had never done this before but who were determined

and focused. The combination of food bank, focused projects and the Advice Hub set up by Clare at the Health Centre combined to be a fit for purpose, low cost, high impact network that has grown organically to meet the needs of those clients that the charity engages with.

The visit by the First Minister was a fantastic boost to the volunteers, represented on the day and who were individually thanked by her. They were also glad to be joined by Dr McCracken and Dr Pattison, two of the referral agents who have been staunch supporters from the beginning. Shona Fowler from the NHS spoke wonderfully to the First Minister about the part BNB plays in supporting people in crisis in Kinross-shire. Fr David Mackenzie-Mills represented St Paul's, who have so

kindly let Broke Not Broken rent The Beacon and supported all their endeavours. Michael, the manager of Sainsburys was there too. Sainsburys has supported them for a long time and have always been willing to go the extra mile.

Carrie, the charity's councillor, was also thanked by the First Minister for the important role she plays in the BNB story, helping people regain their mental health. This is a crucially important part of helping people who are often at their lowest ebb.

The First Minister had a cuppa, poured and served by Kathy and Rosemary in one of our BNB mugs. It was a fitting way to end her visit. Having the time and space to sit and have a cuppa and a chat, is a key part of engaging with clients. Nicola Sturgeon also viewed the garden, the location of the last volunteer BBQ. There wasn't one in 2019 due to the weather, but hopefully the First Minister's visit makes up for any disappointment. How can BNB top that?



90kgs is the amount of Kilombero rice that gives hope to the rice farmers of Northern Malawi and provides them with an income to create sustainable livelihoods, allowing them to reinvest in their farms, feed and clothe their families

and send a child to secondary school for a year. It gives them a route to work their way out of poverty with dignity.

I AM SURE you will have heard about the amazing news from MND Scotland last month about their ground-breaking new clinical drug trial, MND-SMART.



This trial is seen as so important

that MND Scotland has committed to bringing more MND trials to Scotland in 2020, and by investing £1.5 million this pivotal research is now taking place. This investment accounts for more than half of the charity's annual turnover, which really does highlight the importance the charity places on these trials as part of their mission to find a cure for what is a dreadful, debilitating disease.

Additional funding for the trial has also been made available from the My Name' 5 Doddie Foundation and the Euan MacDonald Centre for MND Research.

The innovative clinical trial is designed in such a way that multiple treatments can be tested at once, while also allowing the addition of newly discovered treatments on an ongoing basis.

The UK-wide trial is open to everyone in Scotland with the illness. With more than 400 people in the country with MND it is absolutely crucial that as many of them as possible get a chance to contribute to this vital work, whether they live in an urban or rural area.

I know that there will be MND sufferers in Kinross-shire and I want to take the opportunity through this column as I have through other platforms to try and spread the word about this trial as far and wide as possible.

For anyone who is interested in taking part in the trial, there is a link for those with MND to sign-up online at www. MND-SMART.org.

As for the rest of us, we can help to support this ground-breaking and exciting research and donate £5 by texting CUREMND to 70660, or by calling 0141 3323903 to make a donation.

In other news, applications are to be taken in advance for the new Scottish Child Payment to help cope with an anticipated high demand. An estimated 170,000 children will be eligible for the new £10 weekly Scottish Child Payment when it goes live later this year. To help manage demand, families will be invited to apply in advance of the benefit being introduced in the autumn. Parents will be able to apply by post, phone and online. Applications will be assessed for eligibility in the autumn with the first payments made by the end of this year.

In an additional move to assist families, Best Start Grant payments, Best Start Foods and the new Scottish Child Payment will all be available through a single application, making it more straightforward for people to access the money they are entitled to.

**EVERYONE READING** this newsletter knows just how lucky we are to have such excellent farms and rural businesses on our doorstep. There is a wide range of top-class local produce, a good deal of which can be seen in the shops in Kinross and Milnathort



and, of course, in Loch Leven's Larder run so successfully by the Niven family.

For social, economic and environmental reasons, agriculture has always been integral to Kinross-shire and long may that continue. The challenge however, is to ensure that the ever-changing balance of these factors can be carefully managed so that future generations will also be the guardians of the countryside on which we depend so much. But there is more to it than that.

We want the public to have an increasingly strong relationship with the countryside and to take advantage of all the other amenities such as Vane Farm which make this possible.

A document produced by Scotland's Rural College in 2016, entitled 'The Future of Scottish Agriculture,' contained some encouraging statistics; that half of all outdoor recreation visits by residents in Scotland in 2013 (around 198 million visits in total) were to the countryside for activities like dog walking, hillwalking, birdwatching or cycling and mountain biking and that 11% of outdoor recreation visits (about 44 million visits per year) involved access to farmland.

But the report had some warnings too; that only 48% of outdoor users were aware of the Scottish Outdoor Access Code, suggesting there is a bit of a blank when it comes to many of the visitors to the countryside understanding the rules they should abide by.

The report said that despite high levels of use of the countryside as a place of recreation there is often a disconnect to farming, and that is despite the growth of farmers' markets in Scotland in recent years, including the one in Kinross.

Sadly, we have also seen the growth of rural crime: theft of agricultural machinery, red diesel and, of course, the appalling instances of sheep-worrying that were reported in the Kinross area over the Christmas break.

I am grateful to the rural partnership and the local NFUS who will, alongside the police, be running an event on 30 January to examine the ways of crime prevention.

The Royal Highland Educational Trust is also working hard to find ways, particularly in schools, to help the general public become more aware of and better understand farming and rural issues and I have had the privilege of seeing this at first-hand with some of the school visits which are taking place. The rural community is absolutely essential to the future welfare of Kinross-shire.

It is our responsibility to provide all the assistance we can.

**ELECTIONS ARE** the slowest of processes. And yet, the speediest. During the long weeks of campaigning for this election, days merged seamlessly into weeks as campaign workers braved the icy winds to chap doors and engage with voters. Winter



elections have special challenges: can you ring people's doorbells after dark? Does it seem rude—or thoughtless—if the householder is older, and forced to come stand at an open door with draughts shooting down their hallway?

Choices. But as a journalist who has worked in some nasty dictatorships —Iraq under Saddam Hussein and Belarus to name but two—I'm always struck by how glorious it is that, in Scotland, we have a flourishing multiparty democracy, and are able to come to one another's doors and debate the issues of the day with civility and in safety. We owe our rights to the generations before us who fought and died for our democracy.

Election day passes in a flash. I spent it driving round our huge, beautiful constituency thanking election workers and officials who were monitoring the count. I sensed momentum. Turn out was brisk. People had been queuing for polling stations to open. I didn't think that would be to vote for Boris Johnson.

And so it proved. When polls closed and the stacks of ballot papers were tipped on to counting tables, it became clear we'd won – and with a healthy majority. While the Conservatives had swept to victory south of the border, Scotland did 'send Nicola a message' as requested. Westminster would have to listen.

Candidates learn their fate before anyone else in the room. The Returning Officer summons us into a huddle, hands are shaken, and then it's time for the stage and declaration. As someone who has known both election victory and defeat, I was acutely aware of how personally painful the process would be for my opponent who was losing his seat. I knew too how his staff must be feeling, facing redundancy just before Christmas. Politics is a brutal business.

With little sleep, the new SNP MPs found ourselves meeting the press at the magnificent V&A building in Dundee. There were hugs and shared campaign stories before a dash home and a flight down to London. As a returning Member of Parliament and political journalist, I know Westminster well. But for many of my new colleagues, there are seemingly impenetrable rules. Men can't carry bags into the Chamber, yet women can. Clapping isn't permitted – except when it is. Friends across the political spectrum aren't allowed to sit together in the tea rooms. And while you could read the *Kinross Newsletter* on your iPad, you can't read the print version in the Chamber. That makes Mr Speaker bellow. No one seems to know why.

As I write, I'm back down in London. It's our second week back after the Christmas holidays. But I still have neither an office, nor a desk. I've no phone for private constituency business. But I do have a cloak peg and sword hook. En garde, Westminster.

#### Councillor Richard Watters

AT THE FULL council meeting before Christmas, officers presented an Interim Climate Change Report and Action Plan in response to the motion passed earlier in the year. The report can be found on the council's website.



The UK Met Office has reported that the last 10 years have been the warmest on record since records began in 1850 and NASA has stated that the last five years have been the hottest on record. While we watch, with great sadness, the bush fires that are currently devastating Australia, largely attributed to Climate Change, this clearly underlines the importance of putting climate change at the centre of decisions in the council.

The report was in response to the Motion passed last June, that requested the Chief Executive set out a route map to deliver a low carbon Perth & Kinross. It also highlighted the work that has already been completed to tackle climate change, including the challenges that face the council, and Perth and Kinross as a whole, to meet our Climate Change obligations.

The Interim Report addresses both mitigation (actions to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions) and adaptation (the actions we need to take to adjust to the impacts of climate change). It also importantly includes a commitment to "just transitions", ensuring that climate change actions progress hand in hand with fairness and equality; and that no one in a vulnerable situation is disadvantaged by climate change transformation.

In response to the initial motion (where the Chief Executive was instructed to work with citizens and other stakeholders to provide a route map for the transformational change required to deal with the Climate Emergency), officers are currently working on creating a 'Climate Change Partnership'. This will develop a shared vision, strategy and actions, which will be essential for the entire Perth and Kinross area to achieve a net zero carbon future. This Partnership will bring together key organisations and advocates for change from across the area. These will include local communities, as well as the public, private and third sectors.

#### SNP group statement relating to Climate Change

Within the SNP group, tackling the Climate Emergency has been given the highest priority, and as such, a sub-group including myself, Cllrs Sarwar and McEwan, focusing on environmental matters has been formed. We are focusing on substantial council and area wide changes. Many of us have been making personal changes for decades now, but realistically, in order for there to be the significant reduction in carbon emissions that the planet needs, we must see high-level structural and strategic action. The SNP's focus is policy development in housing, biodiversity, transport infrastructure and the electric fleet amongst others. We must be careful that, as we tackle the climate crisis, we do not isolate those in vulnerable socio-economic positions or increase inequality – again this is why we are focusing on wholesale changes that we as a council can influence.

# Ethiopia in the New Year

Once again, Jo Middlemiss MBE brings us her annual report on the great work carried out by the Ethiopia Medical Project

It's early in the New Year, and once again I find myself in the deep, rural south of Ethiopia for a month: our eleventh year running. By the time you read this, I shall be ensconced in the life of Buccama Health Centre. The people are still eking out a living – buying and selling small amounts at market – if you don't work, you don't eat. Everyone has to be resourceful in order to survive.

Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP) also has to be resourceful, in order to keep the project current, effective, manageable and do-able. Many of you will know that, initially, our main interest was women suffering from uterine prolapse. We have made great inroads into helping with this problem – education, hygiene, pants, exercises, pessaries and in some cases, medical intervention, have all gone a long way to alleviating the problem in our area.

We pay the salaries of the clinic staff: £2250 per month for 23 people. Unfortunately, prices are constantly rising in Ethiopia. When the prices hike, the salaries don't go so far, and then we have delicate negotiations to do, as keeping a stable, happy staff is vital to the smooth running of the clinic.

However, readers will recall that we took on, over two years ago, the education and alleviation of the problem of podoconiosis. This is a form of elephantiasis in the lower leg area, contracted from silicon in the soil and not from worms or mosquitoes. The care and cure is very simple. Simple, but not easy: soaking, soaping, massaging, socks and shoes. Simple if you have access to all those things, impossible if you don't. The Health Centre is now running outdoor clinics for this treatment. You don't need doctors or nurses. You

just need the basics, plus determination and a good deal of courage and empathy. Podoconiosis is not pretty, the affected feet and legs swell badly, it is incredibly debilitating and uncomfortable, and the people are ashamed and disgusted. None of us would, or could, tolerate it for half a day.

The phrase 'You have seen our shame, and you haven't been ashamed of us' was spoken once during a farewell speech, and has become a bit of a mantra for us. That sentence alone keeps us going.

None of what we do would be possible without the help of the good people of Kinross-shire, so this article is really a letter of thanks to all of you who help The Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP), who support us, who give socks, pants, money, love and support. Particular thanks to our local Rotary Club — under Phil Teale's leadership, and Alistair Smith's terrific help with grant applications — Common Grounds, various Ladies' Guilds, St Paul's Episcopal Church, and the many individually generous, local people, who have contributed over the last few years.

Finally – an MBE FOR EMP...

Maureen and I were humbled, surprised and overjoyed to be each awarded an MBE in the New Year's Honours List 'for services to healthcare in Ethiopia'. Wow — who would have thought it? We are truly grateful for this recognition, and for the chance that we have been given to do this work. Lots of people have asked me if the folk at the Health Centre will have any understanding of such an award. We'll soon find out, but they do love a party, and a medal might impress them, who knows. However, they are the real heroes, and we unreservedly dedicate this award by The Queen to them.



# **Police Box**



#### Wildlife Crime

To emphasise our commitment to Scotland's natural environment, in January Police Scotland launched a new wildlife crime investigators course to enhance capability across the country in this complex area of local policing.

Wildlife crime covers a wide range of offending from badger baiting, to raptor persecution, freshwater pearl mussel theft, to hare coursing and salmon poaching.

It includes the illegal disturbance, destruction, theft and sale of animals, birds and plants both in the countryside and urban areas, and includes the destruction of and damage to protected habitats. Wildlife Crime poses significant harm to the species targeted by the criminals, as well as the communities who rely on wildlife for employment and tourism.

While wildlife crime poses significant harm to the species targeted by criminals, it also impacts on the communities who rely on wildlife for employment and tourism.

There are currently six specific Wildlife Crime Priorities in Scotland:

- 1. Bat Persecution
- 2. Badger Persecution
- 3. Bird of Prey Persecution
- 4. Freshwater Pearl Mussels
- 5. Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species issues
- 6. Poaching and coursing

And the penalties for such crimes can be severe. For instance, for every Fresh Water Pearl Mussel killed, taken or injured, a fine not exceeding £5,000 or 6 months in custody may apply. The Crown Office & Procurator Fiscal Service also has a dedicated Wildlife and Environmental Crime Unit; working together we aim to ensure our officers are trained to the highest level to ensure thorough investigation and prosecution of wildlife crime.

# **Community Council News**

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. #### **Kinross Community Council**

#### **News from the December Meeting**

Present at the meeting held on 17 December 2019 were Community Councillors (CCllrs) Bill Freeman (Chair), Margaret Blyth, David Colliar, Lynne McKay and Thomas Stewart, Minute-taker Caron Aird, Councillors (Cllrs) C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters, a Police Representative and two members of the public.

CCIIr B Freeman welcomed everyone to the December meeting.

Apologies: CCllrs D Cuthbert, S Bathgate, A Thomson and D West, who have all resigned from the Council, CCllr M MacFarlane and Cllr M Barnacle.

#### **Minutes of Last Meeting**

CCIIr D Colliar requested an amendment to the draft minutes of the November 2019 meeting – relating to the Kinross Newsletter Awards. CCIIr Colliar requested that the phrase 'with note that there is a crisis and that this will need to be addressed' be removed. Other than this amendment, the minutes were accepted as an accurate record of the meeting. Proposed by CCIIr T Stewart and seconded by CCIIr D Colliar.

#### **Police Report**

Police Scotland advised the following:

**Theft of motor vehicle** on 15 December 2019. Keys for the vehicle had been obtained via access through a cat flap in the door and residents were reminded to keep keys away from doors.

School holidays – residents were advised that regular patrols would be carried out and that any issues should be reported by phone. In response to a question from CCllr B Freeman, a member of the public advised that the anti-social behaviour in Lathro Park had improved slightly. The member of the public commented that crime seemed to be increasing in the area and asked if the Police had any idea as to why this was. Police Scotland could not comment on the reasons for the increase but did not think that the increase had been consistent over the last few years. He also advised that, although cover was provided 24/7, there was a large area for the 2 officers to cover.

CCIIr L McKay thanked Police Scotland for setting up the community engagement events and commented that these appeared to have been well attended. Members were advised that Police Scotland intended to do these events on a more regular basis. CIIr C Purves advised Police Scotland to speak to the elected members with regard to who to contact in the Community Councils for help in setting up these events. CIIr W Robertson asked if there was anything which could be done in respect of the sales of Buckfast in the area in order to stop the anti-social behaviour by children but was advised that this was not possible.

The recent drink driving campaign had resulted in one person being stopped.

The CC thanked Police Scotland for attending the meeting.

#### **Matters Arising**

Lathro Meadows Road Surface – Mr Davies advised that a response had been received from PKC in respect of the state

of the road into the estate and he was very unhappy with the response, which said PKC were not responsible for the repair of the road - Mr Davies asked when the road would be adopted by PKC and he was advised that this would not happen until all building works were complete. Mr Davies agreed to forward the response from PKC to the CC.

**Stagecoach No 56 Bus Service** – Cllr C Purves advised that he was still to follow this up. A report would be given at the next meeting.

**Community Investment Fund** – Members were advised that CCIIr S Bathgate would not be submitting a bid.

In respect of the Provost's Lamp, it was agreed that a bid would be submitted to CIF for approx. £3000. CCllr D Colliar and Cllr W Robertson to discuss.

Kinross-shire Community Transport Group — CCllr D Colliar advised that he had emailed Cllr M Barnacle re a meeting but had not had a response. In Cllr Barnacle's absence, Cllr W Robertson advised that it was noted to arrange another meeting in January.

#### **Gannochy Trust Funding Roadshows**

CCIIr B Freeman advised that discussions were progressing with The National Lottery Community Fund and The Robertson Trust to co-deliver workshops in the area in January 2020.

The workshops will offer new and existing grant applicants

- a summary of the funding themes currently available;
- an opportunity for them to put their questions directly to funders;
- an insight into the common issues funders face in assessing applications, and;
- guidance in writing funding applications.

After discussion it was agreed that CCIIr D Colliar would attend the Kinross meeting (16 January). He will provide an update at the next meeting.

#### **Local Electricity Bill**

An email request had been received from 'Power to the People' asking the CC join 27 Parish, Town and Community Councils that have already resolved to support the Local Electricity Bill.

The Bill, if made law, would empower local communities to sell locally generated clean energy directly to local customers by establishing a statutory Right to Local Supply. This is currently impossible because of the huge setup and running costs involved in doing so.

After discussion, it was agreed not to sign up to the Bill but that information should be shared when received.

#### **Kinross Town Centre Regeneration**

CCIIr M Blyth advised that residents had raised an issue re parking at the Old Town Hall with her and she had advised them that it was shared spacing, there were no signs to say that people could not park in the area. CIIr W Robertson agreed to speak to the parking attendants and ask what could be done to improve the situation. In response to a question from CCIIr M Blyth, CIIr Robertson advised that the parking attendants worked any hours but mostly late afternoons and evening.

#### Other Planning Matters

It was noted that an email had been received from Jamie Montgomery in respect of funding for a new car park at the pier, which may alleviate some of the parking issues in the town centre.

It was also noted that the Boat House had gone into liquidation and plans were being drawn up to change the use of the building to a brewery and café. Concern was raised with regard to the access route and Cllr Robertson advised that PKC would look to improve and upgraded passing places. CCllr D Colliar advised that he was happy to liaise re the plans.

#### **Reports from Perth & Kinross Councillors**

Cllr R Watters advised a full Council meeting was due to be held the following day.

The next stage of the Climate Change Bill was due to commence and it would be essential to engage with communities and get people involved.

Cllr W Robertson advised that there was an issue in respect of residents having access to a garden waste collection service, even when PKC charge for the service. A meeting is arranged for Thursday 19 December at the Community Campus.



#### **Reports from CC representatives**

CCIIr L McKay commented that the Remembrance Day parade had gone well.

#### Licensing

An application had been received from Avant Garde in respect of the old bank. No concerns were raised in respect of this application.

#### **Any Other Competent Business**

Resignations from CC: CCIIr B Freeman wished to place on record his thanks to CCIIr David Cuthbert and CCIIr Dave West for their service on the Council over the years. He also wished to thank CCIIr Susan Bathgate.

**Sub Committees:** It was agreed that a discussion would take place at the next meeting in respect of Sub Committee membership.

**Entrance to Gellybank Farm:** CCllr T Stewart raised an issue with the state of the road at the entrance to Gellybank Farm (opposite side at the sharp bend) and Cllr W Robertson agreed to report this.

**Potholes at Wilson Court:** CCllr L McKay advised members of a potential at Wilson Court and Cllr W Robertson advised that there were also potholes at Springfield Road and the park and ride.

**Wreaths:** CCIIr L McKay advised that only one wreath had been paid for. The Scouts and Pipe Band were still to pay. CCIIr D Colliar agreed to speak to their representatives on Thursday, and it was noted that KCC NL needed to be repaid f35.

CCIIr D Colliar advised that he had spoken to the Captain of the Boys Bridge who had apologised for the delay in payment, with the reason given as a change to bank account details

CCIIr McKay questioned whether KCC should be providing wreaths for the Remembrance Parade and whether this should be left up to individual organisations. It was noted that there had been no issues up until the last few years and KCC were the only local CC who provided wreaths, and it was agreed that a decision would be made mid-Summer 2020.

**KCC Bank Account:** It was noted that following the resignation of CCIIr I Jack and also CCIIr A Thomson, Members were unsure as to the state of play with the CC bank account. After discussions, CCIIr D Colliar agreed to be treasurer for a one-year period until the new members settle in.

**Royal Garden Party:** CCllr B Freeman advised that the CC had been requested to nominate two local people to attend the



Royal Garden Party on 1 July 2020. Nominations were to be submitted by 31 January 2020.

**CCTV:** CCllr L McKay raised the issue of CCTV in the High Street and advised that for a one-off payment of £20,000, this could be linked into the Council network, giving Police Scotland access as and when required. It was agreed that this could be problematic and would need to be balance up with the need to resolve crime.

In respect of the CCTV at the defib, Mr Davies reminded the CC that the coverage runs out on 13 December 2020 and agreed to forward the details to CCIIr B Freeman.

**Milnathort:** A member of the public raised the issue of flooding at North Street, Milnathort and that it was so bad that residents had to wash cars on a daily basis. Cllr W Robertson agreed to ask the Council to resolve this issue.

#### 2020 Meeting dates

In response to a question from Mr Davies, CCIIr B Freeman confirmed that future CC meetings would be held on the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7.30pm in the Masonic Lodge, The Muirs, Kinross.

# Milnathort And Orwell Community Council

#### News from the January meeting

In attendance at the meeting held on 9 January 2020 were Community Councillors (CCllrs) Craig Williams (chairman); Malcolm Thomson (vice-chairman); Elizabeth Rougvie (secretary); Andrew McCrae, Councillors Willie Robertson and Callum Purves, and eight members of the public. Apologies were received from CClllr Sean Colebourn and Cllr Richard Watters.

#### **Police Matters**

No police were in attendance but members of the public raised issues of concern, namely vehicles parking on the single white line in Church Street, which is illegal; speeding on Wester Loan and North Street, and vehicles parking on double yellow lines. Following discussion, ClIr Robertson agreed to take these concerns up with the police.

#### **Matters Arising**

**Loch Leven water quality:** Cllr Robertson reported that further research is to be undertaken into the causes of the frequent algae blooms on the loch. Algae scum was present in December, which is highly unusual, although tests conducted by Scottish Natural Heritage had confirmed that it was not toxic.

**Football pavilion:** Concerns continue about the state of the football pavilion in Donaldson Park, which remains unfinished. The site is considered to pose a danger to children due to the building materials etc left lying around. After discussion, the following actions were agreed:

Cllr Robertson will contact the council, as the access road into the park is its responsibility.

Cllr Purves will write to the Health and Safety Executive to ask for a site inspection.

The secretary will invite the chairman of Kinross Colts to the February meeting of the community council.

#### Planning

**Application submitted:** Alteration and extension to Devon Cottage, Middleton (19/01888/FLL). Noted.

**Pitdownies:** The CC noted that the deadline for comments on this application had been extended to January 11 as the applicant, Springfield Properties, had submitted revised drawings showing a second entrance to the proposed development. Following discussion, it was agreed that Cllr Robertson would try to find out when the application was likely to be considered at committee and that a delegation would be formed to attend. More than 180 objections to the plans have been received.

#### **New Matters And Correspondence**

**Public phone box:** A letter was received from PKC about a public consultation being carried out by BT regarding the proposed removal of 12 public payphones across Perth and Kinross. Amongst them is the phone box in Milnathort, which statistics show is the most used in the area, with 195 calls in the space of a month. The consultation period closes on February 19, 2020, and comments should be submitted to developmentmanagement@pkc.gov.uk.

#### **Comments And Questions From The Floor**

**Litter:** A member of the public expressed concern about the amount of litter on the motorway and surrounding roads. Cllr Robertson advised that the motorway was the responsibility of BEAR Scotland, who will send out a litter-picking team if required, while A-roads are the council's responsibility. Anyone concerned about rubbish on main roads can contact Cllr Robertson, who will arrange a litter pick.

**CCTV:** A member of the public asked if any progress had been made with regard to the installation of CCTV in the centre of the village. The chairman advised that the idea had been abandoned by the CC because it had proved to be too expensive and too complicated in legal terms. Following discussion, it was agreed that the CC would liaise with the Town Hall Committee on the matter.

**Toilets:** A member of the public noted that the only publicly available toilets in the village, at the Thistle Hotel, had been closed when needed by a visitor. Cllr Purves explained that the comfort scheme was a voluntary one and therefore there was little that could be done.

**Police surgeries:** A member of the public commented that the police 'surgeries' held recently in Heaven Scent had been a great success and the public are encouraged to support the initiative.

**Dog fouling:** Concerns were raised about the increase in dog fouling on the village's streets, particularly Bridgefauld Road and South Street. Irresponsible owners were even allowing their dogs to foul in the school playground. Anyone failing to pick up after their pet should be aware that PKC dog wardens are to patrol the streets in plain clothes and can impose hefty fines.

#### **Councillor Reports**

**Councillor Purves:** PKC officers are preparing their savings proposals ahead of the Council setting its budget. However, he stressed that the proposed cuts will not necessarily be approved.

**Councillor Robertson:** A number of people have come forward who are interested in forming a paths group, with the aim of keeping local paths open and preventing them from becoming overgrown. PKC will provide machinery and training where necessary. It was agreed to add this item to the next CC agenda.

The next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council will be held at 7.30pm on Thursday, 13 February, 2020, in Milnathort Town Hall. Members of the public are invited to attend.



## **Portmoak Community Council**

#### **News from the January Meeting**

Present at the meeting held on 14 January 2020 were Community Councillors (CCllrs) Graham Cox, (Chairman); Susan McGregor (Secretary); Anne Cragoe (Treasurer); Susan Forde; and Dave Morris; and Councillors (Cllrs): Richard Watters and Callum Purves; and; 11 members of the public.

Apologies: Mike Barnacle, Willie Robertson

Approval of previous minutes: The minutes of the meeting held on 12 November were amended as followed and approved. Amendment 1: move an amendment to the minutes of the CC meeting held on 12 November under the heading of the treasurer's report so that it names Malcolm Strang Steel, Bruce Calderwood & Robin Cairncross as the signatories to be removed from all 3 of the A/Cs. Additionally to list by name the 3 new signatories.

#### **Matters Arising**

School Access: The CC has responded to the consultation in respect of restricted parking on Buchan Avenue. It noted that at the same location PKC had commented that proposals to revise and improve child safety including marked crossings will be presented separately. The revised school bus service from Scotlandwell to Portmoak Primary has alleviated congestion and parking issues to some extent. The plan from PKC is to put double yellow lines around the corners and scope future changes people might want. Chairman put question to floor for any comments:

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church, Hall and beyond: The CC agreed to meet as a small group discussion to decide two or three proposals to take to PKC. Cllr G Cox outlined the situation: there are five options on improving the path way, the discussions are ongoing for 15yrs or more; there appear to be no easy solutions and there are known sensitivities with the five options, some of which are expensive, others lower cost. Compulsory purchase is a potential requirement, but would rather be avoided, if possible. Depending on the option selected funding may come from PKC, or in part from Sustrans who would order a feasilbility study once an option was selected. The Chairman invited comments from the floor: again, there was public feeling that this was an essential improvement to the paths network and that the existing path was very dangerous.

**Portmoak Cemetery:** With securing an additional site to extend Portmoak cemetery, the Chariman explained there are sensitivites on options available, while topographical issues with some options where the land is deemed too steep for access. The Chairman invited ideas/comments from the CC and from the public. There have been recent burials where those people would have liked to be buried at Portmoak but this had not been possible due to the lack of space, so this is a pressing local Community issue.

Rural Transport (Kinross-shire Community Transport Group)
Previous meetings of the Transport Group have been poorly
attended, however Cllr M Barnacle, and Cllrs S Forde and A
Cragoe will attend a forthcoming meeting and then have a
working group to discuss progress. Community transport
have drawn up a proposal. A decision on the route will have
to be made dependant on what the community wants. Will
require subsidy.

Hedges: 1) Woodmarch 2) Bruce Road/A911 junction: initial trimming had been effected. 3) Footpath from Easter Balgedie to Kinnesswood: a preliminary cut had been undertaken. 4) Impeded sight-lines to the left at the junction of the road from Wester Balgedie/Glenlomond with the A911.

Woodmarch: The CC had received an email from the new occupants of Woodmarch Hall requesting clarity around

which property, (previously minuted only as 'Woodmarch'), was actually being referred to. The CC thanked the new Woodmarch Hall occupants for choosing to attend the CC meeting and advise about what action had been taken at their property. The CC members agreed that the hedge did now appear to be in order. There were general discussions about path improvements at Woodmarch where the footpath becomes very narrow. The options of a build out of the narrow path into the roadway or widening of the path into the garden area were raised. The CC would undertake further discussion with the Woodmarch Hall residents.

Footpath from Easter Balgedie to Kinnesswood: A member of the public commented that the previous clipping had left thorny branches all over the pavement which were hazardous for dogs' paws when people were walking along the footpath, as well as bicycle tyres.

Impeded sight lines to left at the junction of the road from Wester Balgedie/Glenlomond with the A911.

The CC commented that nothing has been done yet at this location. It is possible for the council to complete the trimming and then charge the owner

Wester Balgedie VAS: The CC noted that the issue had been raised to PKC and confirmation had been received in turn that the Wester Balgedie VAS request had been added to the budget for 2020 and would be considered accordingly. Consulation with the Community Council would be sought from PKC about the exact locations of the VAS.

Kinnesswood Shop relocation to garage and increased pedestrian traffic crossing road at corner: This item had also been raised at Kinnesswood Development Trust meeting on 13/01/20; now the shop is relocating to the garage the public will have to cross when using impeded sightlines, especially when crossing from west to east. Members of the CC felt it was now necessary to look, once again, at the options to build permanent traffic calming measures or site a temporary traffic light. A 20mph speed limit trial through Kinnesswood is due to commence (date tbc). It was noted that a 20mph speed limit would not alleviate the issues of the narrow pavement outside the shop, or the impeded sight lines when crossing the road. The CC agreed to take this up with RKC Roads Dept as a matter of urgency, with a view to new measures being in place by the day that the new shop arrangements came active.

#### **Police Report**

CCIIrs noted that police have started to hold local meetings, e.g. one held at the Court House, discussed anti-social behaviours. One was also held in Scotlandwell. This does not seem to have been widely advertised and CC were not aware. CCIIrs have requested that they be notified for similar local meetings in future and will inform CC. This was seen as

a good initiative as the Police are not always able to attend CC meetings. The Chairman invited comment from the floor on this item: no comments.

#### **PLANNING**

#### **New applications:**

**19/01901/FLL P8-** Kinross-shire Erection of a dwelling-house at Land 30 Metres North East Of Arkle Cottage

The CC discussed both this application and 19/01902/FLL Erection of a dwelling-house at Land 20 Metres West Of Applerigg in tandem as they are on the same site. The CC noted that both applications fit very well in principle with LDP2 as both are infill sites within an existing settlement. However, the style and siting of the dwellings did not seem to be in keeping with the Scotlandwell conservation area, though the designs may be acceptable in their own right. The proportionality and height of the houses seems excessive in the location they are in, and the location set back from the road is not in keeping with other houses withing the conservation area. The CC had requested to PKC on 11/12/19 an extension to the consultation date, but had not received any response. The CC agreed that they would register an objection to both application 19/01901/FLL and 19/01902/FLL. Cllr G Cox and Cllr S McGregor to prepare and register an objection.

**19/01902/FLL P8-** Kinross-shire Erection of a dwelling-house at Land 20 Metres West of Applerigg. Cllr G Cox and Cllr S McGregor to prepare and register an objection.

19/01984/FLL Findatie (Loch Leven cafe) Extension to cafe. Comments by 17 January. The CC agreed that the increase in parking and extra toilet facilities were generally an improvement to the area. It was agreed that no objection would be raised.

**19/02053/FLL** Shores of Loch Leven (by the Trail) Erection of three Viewing Screens – comments by 24 January: The CC agreed that no objection would be raised.

**19/02068** Siting of 2 camping (glamping) pods (note not cabins) formation of vehicular access and associated works. At land 40 metres NE of Leven View, Wester Balgedie.

The CC discussed the application noting several points: the pods are sited close to the settlement which may or may not be in accordance with the Local development Plan (LDP), they also appear to be outside the Settlement Boundary, and may not have appropriately mitigated for effluent treatment. The CC can't comment on the commercial aspects but it was felt that more glamping pods were not required in the area. Residents from Leven View attended the meeting: they had concerns about the siting of the pods behind their house, about noise, and that the planning application was registered against their property. Additionally, an access into the field had been widened and may have undermined a large tree near their property. They had concerns about legalities of the application being linked to their house. The Chairman noted other adverse comment from members of the public present. CC to arrange a meeting with the applicant, and to make comment to PKC, if necessary.

# Progress with Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Report on 27 Nov 2019 meeting

A meeting on 21/11/19 was attended by Cllr D Morris, with most of the discussion being about site security. In addition, it was recognised that the circular path around the site was incomplete and further discussion with Fife Council and an adjacent landowner was needed to resolve this. The issue of smell was raised but assurances had been given by the developers that modern techniques would mitigate this type of waste incineration problem. The project is proceeding and the developers hope to start construction in 2020, with 36 months to complete. The possibility was raised issue re: an off-road route for walking and cycling between site and M90

as had been discussed during the planning application phase. Hargreaves, the developers, indicated that a meeting to discuss this further would be useful. A member of the public raised concerns about lack of knowledge of what is happening at the site as there are three adjacent houses that are affected to some extent by ongoing work The Chairman offered to enquire as to why minutes of meetings do not appear to be readily available to members of the public. WCllr C Purves confirmed minutes should be public and that concerned parties can make complaints via Ward Councillors or via a CC representative. Cllr Morris also indicated that he had convened a further meeting with Hargreaves and others on 17/12/19 to discuss the potential off-road route. This may lead to a feasibility study probably costing in the order of £15K to £20K. Cllr G Cox to enquire as to why minutes of the main Westfield Liaison Group meetings are not being made public.

**Roads:** The CC noted: To consider progress with current developments.

**Potholes:** A911 between Wester Balgedie to fork for Kinross/ Milnathort

It was agreed that there are a number of potholes on the road. Request to CCllrs to move this on. There is a facility for notifying of potholes via the MyPKC and identify where they are and fixing will be done. A member of public pointed out that heavy traffic on the roads causes the problem around the drains - the drains need to be off the road. Cllr Watters agreed potholes are an ongoing issue in bad weather. No info from PKC on expenditure on potholes.

High Street – Kinross: The CC noted that in order to permit Openreach works on the above section of road a temporary traffic regulation order be prepared. It is to be effective from the 11 February 2020 for a period of two days. The order will temporarily prohibit all vehicles from parking and loading (both sides) of High Street, Kinross from its junction with Clashburn Road (311822, 701706) to its junction with Number 188 High Street (311848, 701782), a distance of 79.3 metres or thereby.

**Paths Group:** to note progress. At this time of year, no onground action is taking place but work is proceeding to establish a paths map and associated information in the school car park in Kinnesswood later this year. The CC noted reports of damage to the Michael Bruce Way – the path is a muddy mess – due to cattle being present on the hill all winter. DM to discuss with George Lawrie what action could be taken.

**Treasurers report:** The balance at the end of the month ending 31/12/19 was £582.50. There is £2021.48 in the Michael Bruce Way account. This gives a total of £2603.98.

#### **AOCB**

Planning Performance and Fees Consultation – until 14 Feb 2020

The Chairman outlined this consultation is regarding fees going up, more robust policy about planning.

Consultation on Licensing of Sexual Entertainment Venues – response by Monday 6 April 2020

#### Planning query

A member of public enquired if there was opportunity for CC to get involved at an early stage of planning a new build to discuss any concerns at an early stage when neighbours are being notified? The CC will comment as part of general policy, but it was felt that if they can get involved at an earlier stage, it is helpful to avoid dispute, cost and delay, and this was an ideal approach, if possible, to consult informally earlier.

The next meeting of Portmoak Community Council will be held at 7.30pm on Tuesday 11 February 2020 at Portmoak Village Hall.





## Fossoway and District CC

## **News from the January Meeting**

In attendance at the meeting held on 7 January were Community Cllrs (CCllrs) Sarah Bruce-Jones, Angus Cheape, Trudy Duffy, Carol Farquhar, Carole Haigh, Michael Haigh, Graham Pye and Rob Young; Councillors (Cllrs) Mike Barnacle and Callum Purves; and seven Members of the Public (MoP). *Apologies:* Cllrs Willie Robertson and Richard Watters.

Declarations of Interest: CCllr Young declared an interest in planning application 19/01826.

#### **Police Report**

There was one incident to note in our area since the last CC Meeting: between 12.30pm and 1.10pm, Saturday 7 December, a wallet and fleece were stolen from a Kia Sorento parked in Vicars Bridge Road, Blairingone.

A MoP reported excessive speed of vehicles through Powmill. There was general agreement that installing 100 metre countdown markers leading up to the 30mph limit from the Crook of Devon direction would help. Cllr Barnacle will investigate if this could be done.

Cllr Barnacle has asked Inspector Kat Thompson of Police Scotland for a meeting to discuss local issues.

#### **Matters Arising**

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: George Lawrie and other members of the TRACKS group have conducted a detailed site visit to assess water levels and produced a design that should ensure the bridge is safe from any future flooding. SEPA's requirement is for there to be least 600mm clearance above their 1 in 200 flood level, and this design comfortably exceeds that. The bridge would have one span of 24 metres and one of 6 to 9 metres. The North landing point of the bridge would be in line with the gate. Copies of the proposed plan were circulated amongst those present.

Representatives of the Army Reserves have visited the site and they have subsequently expressed an interest in being involved in the project, but without committing to a timescale at this stage, although it would probably be a year away. This would approximately halve the construction costs.

SEPA believe that the proximity to the old site would remove the need to submit a planning application, although this is not the view of the TRACKS team. It would also be necessary to do a tree survey upstream of the bridge to check for any potential fallers.

Full costs (if the Army were not involved) would be £75-80k. TRACKS propose to construct a three car parking area which would be used for site office during construction.

The next step is to organise a meeting with the CC and other interested parties to agree the proposed site, followed by release of funds to fund structural engineer's calculations of foundations, creation of drawings, submission of planning application, etc. Additionally, the landowners need to be consulted and their agreement obtained.

In response to a question, George answered that disabled access would be OK from the North side, and across bridge but it would of necessity be difficult on the Crook of Devon bank as there are steps. Cllr Barnacle suggested that an approach should be made to PKC's Community Greenspace group to see if they can do something about the steps, hence making the bridge and paths generally accessible.

**Powmill in Bloom:** In November the group reported that PKC were not cutting the verges in Powmill. Cllr Watters investigated this, but was told that the verges are too narrow to be cut safely. CCllr Farquhar reported that the group has recently planted ten and half thousand bulbs!

Powmill Play Park: CCllr Farquhar reported that there is new

equipment installed, and the site looks very promising as work continues.

Crook & Drum Growing Together: In November, Amanda James, chair of the group had contacted the CC requesting assistance with progressing planned work at the corner of West Crook Way. Cllr Watters took an action to look into this and as a result PKC's Greenspace team met the Bloom group on 22 November and the work has now been done.

**Fossoway Area Transport/DRT:** Cllr Barnacle reported that there have been two meetings to discuss this, but both were very poorly attended. There is a PKC wide transport forum on 16 January at LLCC. Cllr Barnacle aims to set up another local meeting in February.

**A977 Mitigation:** Cllr Barnacle noted that there's still over £200k of identified projects to be executed, including B9097 realignment in February, School Road junction in March, and Gateway Features and Drum Signalisation in July. CCllr Duffy asked the Councillors how potholes were supposed to be fixed – Cllr Purves replied that the process is that they should be done properly by cutting out and filling, but urgent ones might be fixed temporarily.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: Cllr Barnacle, CCllr Farquhar and Mr and Mrs McGregor from the Traveller's Site, had an informal meeting before Xmas – They decided that it would be useful to have an official meeting, which will be held at 10am on 14 January at 2 High Street, Perth, including Cllr Barnacle, CCllr Farquhar and the McGregors along with representatives from the police, PKC's planning department and SEPA. The intention is to discuss outstanding planning issues and to try to address some aspects of the site's appearance. It may be possible to explore the potential conversion of the site from a traveller's site into an affordable housing site.

**Blairingone War Memorial:** An LBC application (19/01944/LBC) has been made by Profile Projects. See below.

#### **New Business**

**Bartholomew McLaughlin:** The CC was contacted by a member of the Shetland Community Trust, who is researching the history of Bartholomew McLaughlin, also known as Bert McLaughlin, who was the minister of Blairingone Church from 1939 to 1958. The Trust would be interested to hear from anyone who knows anything about Mr McLaughlin. MoPs suggested several locals who might know of him, and they will be contacted.

Proposed 40mph Speed Limits on A977: PKC intend to create two new sections of 40mph limit: (1) East of bend after Blairingone, where 30mph limit ends, to just past Craigend junction. (2) West of Crook of Devon, from end of existing 30mph limit to just past Briglands Farm access. Comments were needed by 6th December, however as the CC was not constituted at that time it was not possible for us to comment. However, it was thought very likely that this would meet with general approval, and hence the previous CC members did not think it necessary to ask for an extension to the comment period.

#### **Community Council Business**

CCIIr Cheape attended a meeting of the Kinross-shire fund on 2 December – two grants were made to other areas, but CCIIr Cheape pointed out that the fund has a healthy balance available for applications. CCIIr Duffy reminded the meeting that other sources of funding are available.

CCIIr Farquhar said there was to be a meeting of the Sports Hub on 9 January but she was unable to attend.

**CC Political Impartiality:** During the run-up to the last General election the CC posted an announcement of a public meeting by one of the candidates on our Facebook page. We were advised by PKC's Community Planning Policy Team

Leader that this could be considered to be an endorsement of that party and it should be removed. On seeking further clarification from PKC it was agreed that events such as hustings open to all parties could be advertised by the CC, and after an election notification of surgeries of sitting Members would also be acceptable.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

**Callum Purves:** Cllr Purves noted that annual budget process has started, although the current difficulties with the timing of the Westminster budget may cause some problems.

**Mike Barnacle:** Cllr Barnacle has been discussing with other members a proposal to review the budget in two stages, firstly to hear proposals from the Officers, and then a week later vote on them, which would allow time for sensible discussion. He believes that there may be a fairly wide degree of support for this idea.

The Local Councillors wrote to the Scottish Minister about the conduct of the Local Plan review by the Reporter. Unfortunately, the response failed to address any of the stated issues.

Cllr Barnacle distributed letters to 100 residents of Blairingone to see if there was any enthusiasm for acquiring the school for the community. Regrettably there were only three replies. Consequently, it appears there is no local interest in retaining the building, so PKC can choose to dispose of it.

#### **Planning Matters**

**19/01760/FLL** Erection of a dwelling house and garage at land 50 metres south-west of Mitchell House, Main Street, Crook of Devon, no CC comment.

**19/01826/FLL** Demolition of agricultural buildings, erection of a dwelling house and extension to stable at land 20 metres north-west of Coach House, Tullibole Mill Farm, Crook of Devon, no CC comment.

19/01881/IPL Residential development (in principle) at Land 80 metres north-east of Powmill Milk Bar. The CC will object on grounds of being outside LDP2, flood risk and road capacity. Several MoPs present at the meeting had also objected to this proposal. Cllr Barnacle had spoken to the planners and they are intending to refuse the application under their delegated powers, although there is still the possibility of the applicant appealing to the LRB. A MoP asked how they can prevent the applicant continuing to make applications to develop this land. Cllr Barnacle suggested that creating a Community Development Trust would definitively record the views of residents, and possibly enable the land to be acquired for the Community's benefit.

**19/01921/FLL** Alteration and extension to dwelling house and formation of raised decking area (in part retrospect) 3 Riverside Lodges, Main Street, Crook of Devon, no CC comment.

**19/01944/LBC** Relocation of war memorial and associated works at Blairingone Church, Blairingone. The CC will write in support of this application.

**19/02066/FLL** Erection of a dwelling house (plot 1) at Land 30 metres south of Crook of Devon House, Main Street, Crook of Devon. This application only arrived on the afternoon of the meeting so will be discussed by email.

#### **Decided Applications**

**19/01512/FLL** Alterations and extension to dwelling house and erection of replacement garage Smiddy, Main Street, Blairingone, approved, no CC comment.

#### **Appeals**

**19/00473/IPL / TCP/11/16(615)** Residential development (in principle) at land 110 metres south-east of 3 Birkfield Park, Rumbling Bridge. Dismissed at 12th November LRB - The CC had objected to this application.

A MoP suggested that as we no can longer hold meetings at Blairingone School that we are perhaps restricting our locations too much and we should consider holding meetings elsewhere. The CC welcomed proposals from anyone as to how we should best geographically distribute the eleven meetings each year, with the only restriction being that school premises are only available during term times.

The next meeting of Fossoway and District Community Council will be held on Tuesday 4 February at 7.30pm in Carnbo Village Hall. All welcome.



# From Jummock's Deep to the Thrapple Hole

Dr Munro has been giving the Christmas talk to Kinross-shire Historical Society for well over 40 years. This year's talk was centred on the names found in and around Loch Leven. He said that now with our own museum in Kinross, researching local subjects can be done from the archive of documents, maps and photographs held there rather than having to travel to libraries and archives around the country.

Starting with Loch Leven itself, it was first shown on Blaeu's map of 1654 as Loch Levin and the name was taken from the River Leven, meaning smooth and flowing. The first reference Dr Munro could find to the river was from 11<sup>th</sup> century in a quote about River Levine. Andrew Wynton in around 1400 said that he had been 'made Prior of the Inch within Loch Leven', a reference to the loch and an island within it. A map drawn in 1808 by John Bell, needed for the lowering of the loch, names more islands including Paddock Bower which no longer exists because of the lower level of the water. A bathymetric survey done in 1900 named more islands but there is little idea of the derivations of the names. Each map produced as time moved on introduced new names or changed names.

Because of the importance of fishing in the loch, maps were made to show the 'sets' where the nets were set up for fishing. There were many sets around the loch, by St serfs Island or the Inch, by Castle Island and by the shores on the different sides of the loch. The sets were well known and even appeared in legal documents.

David Marshall was Tacksman on the Loch. The museum now has his diaries from 1847-58. They are full of information relating to the fishing. He gives the catches of the different kinds of fish and the sets, the weather of the day. Some entries have as many as twelve set names given.

The fishing on the loch changed in 1873 when the new regime of angling took over from netting. This kind of fishing was affected by different things such as the drift caused by the wind on the loch. The names now given were points of reference on the loch rather the position of a set. New maps showed the new names that came into use instead of the sets. Most maps continued to show position of the shallow water and the deep holes but there is a continual change bringing in new names while some of the old ones fall from use.

Dr Munro answered a few questions from the members and then Ian Smith gave the vote of thanks. He said it had been a treat to hear the talk, shedding a different light on the loch, and entertaining everyone with fine stories and illustrations.

#### World War One; The Aftermath

On Monday 20 January, Lieutenant Colonel Andy Middlemiss spoke on the topic of 'World War One; The Aftermath'. The talk covered many aspects of life after the war for the servicemen who returned home. It incorporated words written by returned soldiers which were read out by audience members.

After stretching from 1914-18, the armistice for World War One only stopped the fighting. The Treaty of Versailles was drawn up in June 1919 but was not ratified until June 1920; nearly two years later. Then the war had finally ended.

The Jocks suffered wounds, terrible conditions and deprivation during the war. Their expectations of coming home to a country for heroes were not met. They found that the country had changed and that there was nothing for them; no work and no money.

Over three million were killed, injured or missing from the British forces. Some who returned felt survivor guilt and sadness as well as relief and pride. There was also the flu pandemic which affected the country badly.

The fields of battle had to be cleared and returned to farmland. The bodies had to be buried and, by the battle sites in France and Belgium, graveyards were put in place. Some have huge arches listing the names of those who lost their lives.

Meanwhile, at home, towns and villages erected their own war memorials. Some villages in England and Wales were lucky to lose no one in the war and they were known as 'Thankful Villages'. However, there were no such places in Scotland as all lost members of their communities

People started to visit the battle sites but this was dangerous because of the amount of unexploded bombs remaining. About twenty people each year were killed by World War One ordnance and remains from the war are still being found to this day. Lieutenant Colonel Middlemiss showed a slide of a KOSB badge on fabric that was found on a Belgian building site last year, over 100 later.

There was no employment for the returning soldiers. Their service for their country did not count as far as getting a job was concerned. Children didn't know their fathers and poverty was rife. Injured and limbless soldiers had to be looked after. The Erskine charity for Limbless Sailors and Soldiers was set up. Earl Haig set up poppy factories.

The role of women had changed during the war as they had to do all sorts of jobs previously carried out by the men who were away in the army. Women's football became a big thing; ladies' football leagues were set up and huge crowds attended the matches. However, when the war ended, their football stopped too.

# Changing Lives Through Sport and Activity

Presentation by Kirsteen Ross (December)



When the 2014 Commonwealth Games were held in Glasgow, one of the main aims of the Scottish Government was to ensure there was a clear 'Games Legacy' and that sport would be at the forefront of much of the Government's future plans.

Kirsteen gave us an insight into the work she has been involved in, and specifically the development of Community Sports Hubs. These have been set up to get more people involved, understand community needs, provide leadership, offer a range of sporting options and most importantly get organisations to work together.

A shining example of how a Hub works was demonstrated by Kirsteen as she told us about her work in North Perth. Working with Perth College and the local community it was a very difficult start trying to get people from a deprived area to become active and participate in sport. The breakthrough eventually came and the Hub has been used as a template for other areas, setting an example for all.

In Kinross the Community Sports Hub is very active, and Kirsteen highlighted a number of its initiatives. Park runs are now a regular feature for many local residents with a 2k kids run on a Sunday and All Age 5k on a Saturday. Cycling without Age has been set up and provides Tricycles which take mainly older residents out for a run, a fantastic way of getting folk out and about and helping to tackle social isolation. Plans for a new all-purpose skate park are being developed which will encourage more usage by a wider age group.

So 2014 may seem a long time ago, but the vision of Scotland benefiting from the Commonwealth Games remains alive and well. A vote of thanks was given by John Pleass.

#### Probus Club (cont.) Retail in the Rural Economy

Presentation by Robin Niven (8 January meeting)

Robin and his wife Emma took on Channel Farm in 2002. They noticed that there were a lack of Scottish restaurants, only pub grub, and no local destinations selling their vegetables. There was a convoluted supply chain and farmers were at the bottom of it. The farm was originally farmed by Robin's maternal grandparents. The company now has three family farms; Tarhill, Burleigh and Channel.

Loch Leven's Larder was born from the frustration of retailing vegetables but never seeing them in their stores and struggling to find family destinations with seasonal produce. It started with a small cafe and a farm shop to act as a shop window to sell the vegetables. Now they have a food hall and deli, offer outside catering, gift shop, cafe/restaurant, outside Lodge house for private dining, two pods and are home to Kinross-shire County Cricket Club and Loch Leven Park Run.

They established the business on the ethos of traceability, provenance, seasonality and sustainability. Recognising the importance of these values to their customers, they were buzzwords a decade ago with the onset of the TV chef, who has done a remarkable job in raising the profile of rural diversifiers and artisan foods. Delivering the highest standards of customer service has been a key component of the Larder's success and Robin was keen to explain how he and Emma are continually training and developing their workforce. They put a great deal of emphasis on supporting the community, creating working relationships with Heriot-Watt University, Kinross High School and Portmoak Primary.

Loch Leven's Larder is a local business that has grown out of a traditional agricultural background and developed into a thriving enterprise. It has not forgotten its roots, and is clearly a valuable local destination, which strongly supports the economy, employment and helps put Kinross-shire on the map.

## Winnie's Toy Appeal, Milnathort Church

Winnie Muvunyi's pre-Christmas Toy Appeal was a great success! Thanks to the generosity of Kinross-shire folk the Alpha Academy in Kigali Rwanda will once again be gifted with educational toys, books, musical instruments and playground equipment. These will be replacing what Winnie received from her friends in Scotland 14 years ago when the nursery was first established. There are still no affordable educational toys in Rwanda.

The establishment of a nursery has done far more than providing the children with a safe educational place to play. During Winnie's visit in October we learned that the devastating effects of the 1994 genocide still ripple through to today. Many in her community are suspicious of one another and avoid communication. The creation of a preschool nursery like the one her children attended in Scotland has brought mothers together with positive results. They have begun to trust each other, socialise and work together sharing what they produce to raise money for their families.

The task now is to help Tina and Norman, Winnie's amazing hosts and 'toy keepers' to fundraise enough to cover the cost of shipping what has been collected. The current estimate is £2000 for a pallet of large boxes that are packed and ready to go.

Tina has already received over £700 in donations from generous individuals and groups and a fundraising event 'Family Fun for Rwanda' has been planned for 23 February (see notice on p97.) Three of us are doing our bit with a sponsored slim. The aim is to each lose up to a stone (14lbs) by 23 February. Here's your chance to support 3 good causes:

## **Crook & Drum Growing Together**

During the wind and rain of mid-January, we are looking forward to the spring and a new growing season. Snowdrops are already showing their shoots; look out for the hundreds of snowdrops which we planted in the grass area in the middle of Drum last year. These will be followed by crocuses in the bed on the Green and Naemoor Road, and daffodils on verges and in Penny's Wood.

Judging for the Well Kept Village competition will be in March this year, when all the spring flowers will hopefully be at their best.

We have ordered summer bedding plants for our planters, and will be asking residents along the main street in Crook of Devon if they would like us to provide a hanging basket for them to tend over the summer. We would welcome any other help from local residents who could 'adopt' a barrel or planter near them. This involves watering and taking off dead flower heads, to keep them at their best. We now have over twenty planters and a very small group of volunteers! We will also be extending planting of wild flowers in the villages.

In December we held a fundraising Christmas wreath workshop once again. It was attended by 22 ladies and two youngsters. We all enjoyed the event and everyone went home with a unique and beautiful natural creation. Thank you to everyone who came along and helped with this event.

For some time, we have been discussing with PKC Green space team about an untidy corner on the A977, beside West Crook Way, where shrubs had become overgrown and weedy. We held a site meeting with PKC officers, two Councillors and a local resident and agreed a plan of action. The Unpaid Work Team (Community Service) from Perth brought several teams of workers over one weekend and they have completely removed all shrubs and visible weeds, leaving 2 attractive trees. We are very grateful to them for their help with this.

Some of the weeds will re-sprout in the spring from roots left in the ground, but PKC will weed kill these as required. This will leave us with a blank canvas for new planting.

It is proposed to seed the front area with grass, to be mown with the existing grass, and the back with a wild flower mix which would only be cut each autumn. We may also plant some new interesting shrubs, which our volunteers will maintain. We hope that this will be attractive for residents, and visitors at this 'gateway' to the village from the west. It will also encourage bio-diversity and be easy to maintain. We have circulated residents of West Crook Way with information about our plans and would welcome any comments from them, or other local residents.

Projects: Our project for February is KidsOR, an Edinburgh based charity founded in January 2018, although it had been doing similar work under a different name prior to that. Their goal is to create a world where every child has equal access to safe surgery. The charity now works in 16 countries where they support local surgeons with the correct equipment to allow them to care for their patients. They have provided the capacity for nearly 13,000 operations, installing the first and only paediatric operating room in Rwanda, a country with a population of over 5.1m children. An installation in Tanzania helped to wipe out a three year waiting list for elective surgery in less than three months. They also work in countries such as Sierra Leone, Ethiopia and Malawi.

December was a busy month for us and featured a diverse range of activities, events and speakers. We had no scheduled meetings for the first couple of weeks of the year as we have been 'scattering' to visit other clubs in Falkirk, Anstruther, St Andrews, Cupar and Tayport. It is interesting and useful to explore other clubs and enjoy the renowned fellowship of the Rotary organisation.

#### Recent Speakers

On a cold and frosty December breakfast meeting, Rotarian Jo Middlemiss transported us to warmer days and positive outlooks as she described her experiences of the Camino de Santiago — a network of pilgrims' ways leading to the shrine of the apostle St James in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela in Galicia, north western Spain.

Tradition has it that the remains of the saint are buried here. Its origins are in the middle ages (when pilgrimage was a way of cleansing sin) and has seen a revival since the 1980s.

It is now seen to have various benefits including spiritual, religious, gratitude, to be still, to slow down, to achieve something, to make connections. Each pilgrim carries a scallop shell (St James' boat was covered with shells) and the route way markers are embossed with shells. At one point there is even a wine fountain!

Jo and her husband Andy had recently suffered the loss of their beloved son, Oliver, and found some solace and peace on their walk. They also enjoyed the camaraderie and mutual support. Walkers greet one another with 'Bon Camino' and help each other along the way, enjoying spectacular views, good food and wine. Jo inspired listeners to start planning that trip.

Our next speaker was Rotarian George Lawrie. Last summer, George embarked on a tractor tour to mark the 20th anniversary of the Royal Highland Educational Trust which aims to 'bring the countryside to the classroom, and the classroom to the countryside'. As Chairman of RHET, George set himself a challenging agenda of visiting 12 schools (two each day) travelling by tractor, mostly at night. He was lent a tractor which was decorated as a

Highland Cow. Kevin Paxton of Artfe created a stunning sculpture of 'Curly Soo the Highland Coo'. It was made out of discarded plough metal which George collected prior to the event and travelled in the trailer, attracting great attention.

George spent two hours at each school, meeting 1400 pupils in total! Each school was given the chance to name the tractor; the winning school was Crawford Primary with their name 'Moooosy Ferguson'.

Despite the long distances between schools and his method of travel, George was never once late and there was only one puncture. The trip ended at the Royal Highland Show. George covered a total of 705 miles and raised £12.850.

Moreover, he raised awareness of RHET's important work in providing free educational opportunities for children about where their food comes from and making them more aware of the environment around them. Great work, George!

President Phil Teale provided us with an enthusiastic description of Istria, the peninsula located at the head of the Adriatic, which he described enticingly as 'the Med as it used to be'. It provides a variety of experiences; coastal, historical, hill towns, wine growing. It is known for the highest quality of truffles and pure olive oil. There are Roman and Venetian influences in this area and the long coast means a strong fishing culture. Phil supported his talk with some

stunning photographs. Sounds like a wonderful holiday destination!

# **Kinross High School**



#### **V&A Design Competition**

The V&A in Dundee are running a competition open to S1 and S2 pupils across Scotland. Teams compete to create a design which tackles loneliness and isolation in schools. Our S1 team meet in CDT at lunchtime once a week and are rising to the challenge!

Pupils began by observing their peers in social areas at break and lunchtime and then created a mind map of all the barriers to inclusion and socialising. The team put their heads together and started generating ideas. It was really encouraging to see pupils adopt an open mindset; no idea was too 'out there'!

After a lot of lively discussion and healthy debate, the team whittled down their options and settled on a concept; an architectural response called 'Social Hive'. The concept behind Social Hive is to utilise larger open areas to create flexible social spaces which would encourage users to shape their own environment by working as a team to assemble and dismantle foldable furniture. The hope is that these safe, comfortable spaces will facilitate social interactions between peers.

The team were delighted to receive

notification that their competition entry was selected to go on to the next phase. This involves taking part in a 'Design Jam' at the V&A in Dundee where they will have the opportunity to prototype their idea with professional help from staff there. Best of luck to the team.

#### **Kettle Produce Visit**

At the end of term, the Higher Health and Food Technology class were fortunate to have a visit from Jane Leonard from Kettle Produce who spoke on the theme of 'Developing New Food Products from Market Trends'. She gave a unique insight into the multiple stages a food product goes through before it's finally released onto supermarket shelves.

Jane also explained how the company gets their ideas for new products. Inspiration can be found anywhere from social media platforms such as Pintrest/Instagram, celebrities and even world events such as the Olympics. This came as a bit of a surprise to the class who were interested to learn that Jane is predicting a global growth in Japanese foods due to the sporting event.

She spoke in detail about the war on

plastics and the conflict that arises for 'time poor' consumers who have created a demand in pre-prepared vegetables. This visit provided the pupils with a huge amount of research which will support them in completing their SQA assignments (worth 50% of their final mark). This year, pupils are being asked to develop a potato-based product or a savoury dish that is low in salt.

In Home Economics we are always keen to have visiting speakers who can bring real life experiences to our subject areas. Despite being such a large employer in our local area, the food industry (which is worth around £15 billion) is often overlooked as a career choice so we are keen to promote jobs in this field. # Recipe





#### **Creamed Leek Tart**

If you grow your own you may still have leeks in your garden. They will certainly be available and hopefully locally grown in the shops.

#### **Ingredients**

500g block of shortcrust pastry or make your own 85g unsalted butter

800g leeks, sliced lengthways then into 2.5 cm pieces

 $\frac{1}{2}$  tbsp plain flour

300ml milk

200ml double cream or crème fraiche

2 medium eggs

4 medium egg yolks, beaten with the other eggs

100g cheese, grated

1 tsp mustard

#### Method

Heat the butter in a pan then add the leeks, cooking over a low heat till soft, stirring frequently. Stir in the flour, cook for three to four minutes then add the milk and cream. Once smooth, simmer for 15 minutes, season well then cool. Stir the eggs into the mix along with the grated cheese and mustard.

Heat oven to 190C/170C fan. Roll out the pastry on a floured surface to about 5mm thick and line a 23cm loose bottomed tart tin. Line with baking paper, fill with baking beans then bake for 15 minutes. Remove the beans and bake 10 minutes more. Cool and turn oven down to 180C/160C fan.

Spoon the mix into the tart and smooth the top. Bake for 30 minutes till set. Rest for 15 minutes before you slice it.

## **Lomond Antique and Collectors Club**



It was very appropriate that the first meeting of LACC in the new decade should focus on discovering facts from the past. Notable Edinburgh-based genealogist, Ken Nisbet,

gave the members a fascinating insight into the detective skills needed to investigate family history.

Family history, he told us, is not just about collecting names in a spreading family tree, but more about discovering the lives and loves of the people. Ken had been studying his subject for over 40 years; long before the advent of computer search engines and digital records. He used many examples from his own research to show us the various avenues worthy of exploration besides the now more familiar 'Ancestry' and other websites.

Register House in Edinburgh is a most valuable source of information, but there are many more areas of study beyond the statutory 'Births, Marriages and Deaths.' Government Census may provide the skeleton but local newspapers, often well archived, can provide huge amounts of detail. Weddings, family events, valedictory articles, obituaries and much more. School and university rolls and magazines can give details of sporting achievements and career paths and most Scottish universities produced a roll of honour for their alumni engaged in military service, particularly during the First World War. Professional work directories offer details of employment and in particular the London and Edinburgh Gazettes' where all Civil Service appointments were printed. The Register of Nursing or Electoral Rolls (which until 1918, when women gained the right to vote, included details of male employment) may also add to the picture of family members now departed.

Postcards exchanged between family members are valuable for both the cover picture and the written detail included. Family photographs should be inscribed with detail. 'Granny on holiday' simply won't do for the next generation of family historians.

An interesting topic, enthusiastically presented, so much more than simply trudging around churchyards studying gravestones.

# Kinross-shire Partnership Networking Breakfast



#### From Pensions To Pilgrimages

Our networking breakfasts, held at Loch Leven's Larder on the first Wednesday of every month (September to June inclusive), have become a popular feature of the local calendar, with over 30 local businesses regularly represented.

There have been two breakfasts since the previous issue of the newsletter. The speakers in December and January addressed topics which are very different and yet which affect most of us in one way or another; pensions and personal journeys.

On 4 December, Lindsay Ballantyne, formerly Head of Risk and Compliance with Embark Services Limited, and now a pension guidance consultant, kindly stepped in at short notice to talk about pensions. With the help of several soft toy 'assistants' including Ricky the Regulator, Francis the

Financial Advisor and Jo Public, Lindsay succeeded in making his presentation on what could be a rather challenging subject, both engaging and informative for his audience.

During his talk, he touched on the issues of perceived unaffordability of pensions, the lack of trust in the financial services sector (post-PPI and other scandals) and the lack of education nationwide about pensions, which he referred to as 'appalling'. Local entrepreneurs in attendance were certainly given plenty of food for thought in addition to the customary full Scottish breakfast!

At the first breakfast of 2020, the postprandial speaker was dynamic local fundraiser Jo Middlemiss, who has recently been awarded an MBE in the Queen's New Year's Honours. This honour was bestowed in recognition of her work with Ethiopia Medical Project, the charity that she and her cousin founded. However, on this occasion, Jo was speaking not about EMP but about her experiences over the past decade walking sections of the 'Camino de Santiago'. This is a pilgrims' route that starts at Saint Jean Pied de Port in France and extends 500 miles through Spain until it reaches the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela in Galicia.

Jo's accounts of the 'extraordinary people' whom she and husband Andy encountered along the way were often moving, with each walker having their own personal motivations for undertaking such a long journey on foot. Some have spiritual or religious reasons, others go to express gratitude or simply to have time to think and plan. Jo described how they would stop each day to have a picnic for lunch; this was planned the evening before and consumed in settings as diverse as a bus shelter and a rock. Her presentation was truly inspirational and it may well have encouraged members of the audience to contemplate a similar undertaking.

## **Planning Matters**

#### Windlestrae retirement village gets permission

Perth & Kinross Council has approved the application by Juniper Homes for 41 dwellings (33 houses and eight flats) plus a community lounge and guest suite on the site of the former Windlestrae Hotel.

Two representatives of Kinross-shire Civic Trust attended the PKC Planning Committee on 15 January to raise concerns. The Trust is not opposed to the concept of retirement dwellings here, but objected to what it regards as overdevelopment of the site, the felling of 51 trees, an inadequate ecological survey and the encroachment of development into the Market Park, which is designated Open Space in the Local Development Plan.

Council officers made a serious error in the report to councillors recommending approval: they stated that the access road to the Windlestrae is not in the Conservation Area, whereas it is. After the Trust had pointed this out, a statement of correction was made at the start of the meeting, but in the Trust's view this error had contributed to a flawed assessment of the effect of the planning proposal on the Conservation Area by planning officers recommending approval.

The parts of the development that will encroach into the Market Park are a pumping station for foul drainage, a concrete hardstanding and an underground soakaway system for surface water drainage. A strip of the north edge of the park will also be lost to make way for widening of the access road.

The development also involves felling the mature Sycamore tree at the head of the avenue of trees in the Market Park.

Councillors had the chance to vote for a deferral to allow for investigations to take place as to whether it would be possible to reduce the extent of the road widening and keep the tree. The deferral was proposed by Cllr Richard Watters and supported by the other two Kinross-shire councillors on the committee, Mike Barnacle and Callum Purves. However, the committee voted by seven votes to five to approve the application without any further delay. An earlier amendment – to refuse the application – was unsuccessful.

#### **Pitdownies**

The application for 67 dwellings (59 houses and eight flats) submitted in spring 2019 for Pitdownies in Milnathort has

undergone various revisions in recent months. The latest site drawing appears to indicate two access roads into the proposed housing estate instead of just the one access from Curlers Crescent as originally proposed. See PKC's e-planning system, Public Access, for more information under planning reference 19/00522/ FLM. The Trust understands that it is likely this application will be considered by the Council's Planning and Development Management Committee at its meeting on 12 February 2020.

#### Lathro Farm Phase 2

The Lathro Farm planning application that was granted permission in 2016 was for 300 dwellings; 187 of these were to be in phase 1 (though this was actually increased to 191 via sub-applications) and 113 houses to be built in phase 2.

In summer 2019 Persimmon applied to change its plans for phase 2, increasing the proposed number of dwellings from 113 to 195. Kinross-shire Civic Trust understands that planning officers have advised Persimmon that this proposal would not be recommended for approval in its current form. Persimmon are therefore revising their plans for phase 2 to around 170 dwellings and a fresh application is expected.

Such a revised proposal would take the total number of dwellings on Lathro Farm to around 360. It should be borne in mind that the original allocation for this site in Local Development Plan 1 was 260 dwellings, with a maximum of 140 to be built up to the year 2024. There is no further allocation for this site in LDP2.

PKC officers have admitted that they failed to follow the correct procedures when recommending approval of the original application (ref 15/01512/FLM) in that they did not require the developer to carry out detailed surveys of European Protected Species before determining the planning application. This should have been done to comply with Directive EC92/43 (the 'Habitats Directive').

#### Raingardens

The Trust has submitted a funding application to Sustrans for its Raingardens Trail project.

Members of the Trust's Raingardens sub committee met with representatives of Scottish Water in December to explain the project and seek support.





The Lancaster crash landed in Holland and George Thompson later died of his injuries in hospital.

The Museum will be holding a special celebration on Saturday 29 February, 1-3pm, to mark the tenth anniversary of the official opening of Kinross (Marshall) Museum in February 2010. All welcome.

The club teams compete in the Perth District League at Bell's Sports Centre on Sunday evenings. The premier league team is in transition this season and has a mix of youngsters and older adults.


Recreational teams include the mixed mongrels team along with a girls team from Kinross High School and a team from Kinross Boys' Brigade.





February is often the coldest, wettest and frostiest month of the year. Most of the berries have disappeared from the bushes and food available for wildlife may be in short supply, encouraging large numbers of birds to come into our gardens to feed at the bird feeders. Indeed, many of you may have taken part in the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch during the last weekend of January, counting the different species of birds which you have seen. The RSPB will now analyse all the data submitted, with the results being issued later in the year.

Our bird feeders have been very busy with greenfinches, goldfinches, chaffinches, long tailed tits, great tits, blue tits, coal tits and of course tree sparrows. The tree sparrow is one of many species of birds which have been struggling in the UK. They are generally

found in rural areas rather than in towns and cities. However, their numbers have dropped considerably in the last few decades due to loss of habitat and suitable places to nest. Our volunteers have put up several groups of nest boxes around the reserve (since tree sparrows like to nest in colonies). Amazingly, last year, the tree sparrows nested in 15 of the special nest boxes, resulting in their numbers greatly increasing on the reserve. Hopefully the birds will nest in the boxes once again this spring.

There have been large numbers of ducks on the wetland including wigeons, teals, goldeneyes, pintails, tufted ducks and mallards. The ducks are beginning to pair up now after much displaying and head bobbing by the males. Male pintails are particularly elegant birds and have a beautiful white stripe curving down the

length of their long necks. Pintails are dabbling ducks rather than diving ducks, and when they 'upend' in the water to feed, their feathers form a sharp pin shape sticking out of the water.

Other sightings include five little egrets which have been seen regularly on the wetland. Large flocks of over 100 curlews have also been seen. Red squirrels continue to delight our visitors with their scampering around the leafy loop trail.

# Life On The Loch



A very happy new year to all the *Newsletter's* readers. Christmas seems a dim and distant memory now.

Despite all of the rain we've had in recent weeks, the loch level is well short of the record levels of winter 2006/7. The trail has remained open and passable throughout and fortunately there have been no huge trees down for us to worry about.

This year's theme is Scotland's Coast and Waters. Every year there is a different theme. Scotland's coasts and waters will be showcased in 2020 with a themed year designed to inspire both visitors and locals to explore and experience our unrivalled shores, rivers, lochs and waterways.

Led by VisitScotland, the Year of Coasts and Waters 2020 (YCW2020) aims to build on the momentum of previous themed years to celebrate and promote opportunities to enjoy Scotland's fantastic coasts and waters, encouraging responsible engagement and participation. We've been tidying up Mary's Knowe, removing wood and regrowth from the trees we have coppiced. We have also been clearing trees from around the ponds at Burleigh to let light into the ponds. During February we'll start removing vegetation, with the help of our new plastic boat that we can drop into the ponds for easy access to the water. The volunteers have been busy with these tasks. We have also had help from the National Certificate group from Elmwood College.

# Looking forward to the future

Wow, it's January 2020 and I'm about to write my first farming column of the year and the decade. Coming up with an interesting piece is a bi-monthly mighty challenge for me so given the new decade, I'm thinking this is an appropriate point to reflect on the period in farming since 2010, and I might be permitted a bit of crystal-ball gazing to 2030.

Ten years ago, I ran a flock of 183 ewes grazing on Hatchbank. I had also bought 248 store lambs to fatten and sell in the spring. There was a long, cold, dry spell early on and I recall that was quite good for the hoggs (that's the name for the lambs after Christmas). They finished easily on a field of fodder rape supplemented by barley and taking a look back to my accounts they made 195 pence per kilo when I sold them in March - a price that remains a good trade today.

I also worked four days per week helping people start up in business, it was a different kind of shepherding but equally as rewarding. We were always busy, but we juggled family, farm and work with running the storage quite well. I found routine helped me to cope and the kids remember we had mince and tatties every Monday, lentil soup and sandwiches on Tuesday, and so it went on... a little plain and predictable they tell me now but I found it easy to cook and healthy. It was in that year that Mum and Dad retired and I started to look after their farm, leading to me eventually becoming a full-time farmer in 2017.

Looking ahead to 2030, I'm going to leave you with just a few random thoughts of mine with a couple of ambitions mixed in. First, I hope I'm a granny (sorry kids, I just can't help it). Secondly, I believe I will also still be a sheep farmer, we will be producing prime lambs and the breeding policy we introduced in 2014 will be bearing fruit. The 1200 finished lambs will produce grass fed lean lamb of very consistent quality. As I move to granny status, it's my children's, the Gen Z generation, who will be the foremost Scottish consumers, and this group will be even more discerning about their food once they are parents. If I'm honest, I don't think my grandchildren will be eating mince and tattles every Monday but I hope it's a lamb stir-fry or warm beef salad instead so proving the credentials of the red meat sector will be the challenge for the decade. I am confident that my grass-based system, which is typical of so many Scottish farms, will have been proved to be sustainable and while I will have made a



few tweaks to improve the ecological balance it will be a very similar operation.

The predicted milder, wetter weather will bring changes, so controlling liver fluke will be much more challenging and this may also have an impact on stocking density.

Finally, I think there will be a female farmer in the top team at Scottish National Farmers Union but I think it will take longer than 10 years to see a female president of the organisation. I'm afraid it won't be me though as I'll be too busy knitting and pushing the pram.





# Hedges, bushes or trees causing obstruction

Property owners are reminded that it is their responsibility to cut back hedges, branches, bushes etc to ensure that pavements and public footpaths are not obstructed.

Property owners may be liable if injury is caused to others and may be charged costs if Perth & Kinross Council is forced to take action.

When undertaking work on hedges, check that there are no birds nesting. It is an offence under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981 to damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built. The bird nesting season is usually considered to run from March to August.






