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Letters

MP John Nicolson

UNLIKE BILL COOPER (Letters, Sept issue), I generally enjoy reading MP John Nicolson's pieces in the Newsletter. Yes, they are 'personal musings', but Mr Nicolson ties in his thoughts, feelings and opinions with matters of wider significance, such as a piece of legislation required, or society's attitudes, or national or world events.

I was particularly moved by his account of the death of his cat, Rojo, who became known to millions through his photobombing of a parliamentary discussion on the internet. I offer Mr Nicolson my condolences via this letter.

I admire the way Mr Nicolson's pieces are constructed and the quality of his writing – testament, perhaps, to his earlier career as a journalist. His columns tend to be on a single subject and in the nature of a contemplative essay, which makes a change from the reporting style of other representatives' columns. There is room for both kinds. Mr Nicolson's writings give quite an indication of his personality and interests, which is interesting to me as a voter who has no particular political affiliation but rather gives strong consideration to the character of a person standing for election, not just their party's policies.

Some MPs are less conscientious, more intent on adding to their income, and treating their constituents only as voter fodder at elections. Jon Nicolson does in my opinion respect his constituents. Writing about his life reveals his humanity, so recognising that we all do have problems; an early step in tackling them.

Community Hero Nan Cook To Meet The Queen

NAN COOK OF THE Kinross Centre has been nominated as a local community hero, and will be presented to The Queen at the opening of the Scottish Parliament.

Every Member of the Scottish Parliament was asked to nominate one of their constituents who have made an extraordinary contribution to the lives of other people living in Scotland locally or nationally during the Covid-19 pandemic. MSP for Mid Scotland and Fife Alex Rowley chose to nominate Nan for the work she does for older Kinross residents through the Kinross Centre.

Nan has been invited to contribute to the Parliament's Opening Ceremony an event which will take place in early October to formally mark the new session of the Parliament. Nan said: 'I had an email saying that Alex Rowley MSP had nominated me as a Local Hero and I would be invited to be part of the Opening Ceremony to mark the sixth session of the Scottish Parliament on 2 October 2021.

'It wasn't until I received another email that I realised Her Majesty The Queen and the Duke and Duchess of Rothesay will also be in attendance. To say the least, I am gobsmacked.

'It is however a great honour that I can represent Kinross Centre in this way, As I've said many times, we have a fantastic team of staff, committee and volunteers and I hope I can represent them well.'

Presiding Officer of the Scottish Parliament, Alison Johnstone MSP said: "As parliamentarians we have all heard di-

rectly of the difficult circumstances that many people in our communities have faced because of this pandemic. But alongside this, we have heard so many uplifting stories of people and communities coming together to protect those most vulnerable.

'As we begin this new session of Par-

liament, we are filled with renewed purpose, hope and determination to make things better for people in Scotland. Therefore, it is fitting that we can use this occasion to tell the story of those across Scotland who have provided that optimism for others.

'As we seek to recover and rebuild our country, I am proud that the Parliament can play it's part in celebrating and honouring those that have made such a positive difference during challenging times.'

Alex Rowley MSP told the Newsletter: 'I have nominated Nan Cook in recognition of the work she leads in Kinross Day Centre and the amazing role Nan and her team have played throughout the Covid period looking out for older people and being at the heart of the community for anyone who needed help.

'Nan's approach of kindness and the desire to help has built one of the best models of older people support that I have come across anywhere and I would replicate the model into every town. The activities within the centre are great but when Covid came along under Nan's leadership the team were able to ensure the support transferred into the community and to people's homes and always with a smile and reassurance. '







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Flood Protection Scheme Update

PERTH & KINROSS COUNCIL are promoting a flood scheme in Kinross. Historically, Kinross has suffered from repeated flooding, with records going back as far as 1852. Significant flood events have occurred more recently in January 1993, December 2006 and February and August 2020. The main flood risk to homes and businesses comes from the South Queich, the Gelly Burn and the Clash Burn.

The Council has engaged consulting

engineers, RPS, to develop proposals for a flood protection scheme in the area. RPS have undertaken detailed modelling work to understand the risk of flooding in South Kinross from the watercourses noted above. They have also considered a wide range of potential options to manage the identified risk of flooding including walls and embankments, dredging, a diversion channel, flood storage and natural flood management. The recommended scheme includes a series of new flood walls and embankments, culvert upgrades and a flood storage area.

MARK RUNS FOR DIABETES

KINROSS'S MARK CATHRO is running the 2021 London Marathon for Diabetes UK on 3 October 2021. Mark has fundraised mostly for Cancer Research UK, cycling 300 miles last September in 14 days and running 5km every day in April, raising £3980. This will be his fifth fundraiser since 2017, and to date he has raised almost £7000 for charities including Macmillan Cancer Support, the Samaritans and Cancer Research UK.

Mark has always wanted to raise money for Diabetes UK: his sister Emma was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes when she was 8 years old. He had always promised her that he'd fundraise for Diabetes UK, but he wanted to save it for something big, like the London Marathon!

Mark is a volleyball player who started playing for Kinross Volleyball Club and went on play for the City of Edinburgh, with one senior international Scotland cap. Mark was

only able to run again from April 2021 following a nasty ankle injury and surgery in September 2020. He has also managed



to lose 26kg in weight after putting on weight during lockdown (who didn't!) With his ankle now fully fit, he is ready for his biggest challenge yet, the London Marathon. Having applied over a year ago, Mark was finally given a space in the marathon due to a cancellation and only had his place confirmed on 30 June, giving him just 95 days to prepare. The longest distance he had run by then was a half marathon. Mark is relishing the opportunity to show what he is made of.

Mark told the Newsletter, 'Knowing that the £7000 I've raised for various charities could have a positive impact on someone I love, or someone you love; that's why I do these challenges and why I'll continue to do them.

I'm taking on my biggest challenge so far, and I can't wait!'

Baby Oaks For Milnathort Golf Club

ON SATURDAY 7 AUGUST, two baby oaks were dug in alongside the 7th and 13th holes of Milnathort Golf Club. What was so special about these little saplings?

In 2017 Andy Middlemiss took a tour of regimental veterans to the battlefields of Passchendaele, in Belgium, in the Centenary year of 2017. Passchendaele was one of the worst battles of WW1 in which thousands died on both sides. On that visit, Jo and Andy collected several acorns from the site of the battlefield, and planted them on returning home to Kinross. Two acorns successfully cultivated as seedlings, after which Milnathort Golf Club member Charlie Hamilton took them to his garden, and raised them to be what can be seen below after 4 years growth; oaks are very slow growers.

After many discussions it was decided to donate the trees to Milnathort Golf Club and that they should be handed over to the Junior Section – as custodians of the Club and the trees – for the benefit of future generations.

who had been on the Somme tour with Andy's colleagues in 2016. Father Kenny was a Club Captain – so the two Captains met up at the ceremony!

The Club are chewing over renaming the 13th hole. The 13th and the 4th are both currently called Hawthorns. The suggestions up for discussion are Passchendaele, The Two Oaks and Twin Oaks. The name will be decided for next season when new cards are printed.





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FLY-IN AT BALADO AIRFIELD

ON THE WEEKEND OF 28 & 29 August, Balado Airfield welcomed the East of Scotland Strut of the Scottish Light Aircraft Association's Annual Fly-In.

There were over 45 aircraft across the weekend, ranging from vintage WW2 training bi-planes to modern fixed and flex wing aircraft.

For almost 80 years, Balado has been synonymous with flight. In 1942, RAF Balado Bridge opened and was used as a training facility

for Spitfire and Hurricane pilots during WW2.



After the war ended, the connection to all things flying continued and this beautiful location has continued to

draw pilots from far and wide.

The Airfield has recently undergone a significant redevelopment. Having hosted the T in the Park music festival for 18 years, the site is re-establishing itself from a globally recognised festival

favourite to one of Scotland's most exciting flying destinations. They currently provide over 1400^{m2} of hangarage, classrooms, a members' lounge, as well as catering and fuel services.

With plans for further facilities to be added in the coming months and the continuation of their scholarship programme, they look forward to hosting more successful events in the future and sharing their passion for all things flight.

Take To The Sky With The Frasers!

GLIDING IS VERY MUCH a family affair at the Scottish Gliding Centre and we've been catching up with our very own inter-generational gliding family!

David, Graham and Ewan make up three generations of the Fraser family, all glider pilots and all passionate about their sport. We talked to them about their gliding journeys and asked them to share some of their most memorable experiences in the air.

Grandad David has been gliding for over 60 years and still gets up in the air with his son Graham on occasion. David started his gliding journey with the Air Training Corp 137 Squadron in Ayr in 1950 and remembers his first glider flight in a Sedberg at RAF Dumfries well. Incidentally, we still have one flying here at the Scottish Gliding Centre.

After marrying and the birth of his son Graham, David found he had little time for gliding. One day when Graham was particularly noisy at feeding time, David made his escape to a nearby gliding club and he was hooked again and eventually went on to be the chief flying instructor. By the time Graham was 2 or 3, he was flying with his Dad and he too became a gliding enthusiast.

At 84, David doesn't fly solo any longer but does go gliding with his son Graham as often as he can. We are in no doubt his enthusiasm for gliding has inspired not only his own family, but many others besides.

His son Graham is Managing Director of Frasertech and has been gliding almost all his life and credits his dad with his love of the sport for bringing him along to glide when he was barely walking. 'My early memories all revolve around the fun and excitement of going flying with my Dad and his easy nature and encouragement over the years, holds a very special place in my heart.'

Graham's home site is the Scottish gliding Centre and he claims it's one of the best places to fly in the UK. Graham learned to fly in a K13, a lovely glider to fly with, a great view out the window and very forgiving and easy to fly. By today's standards, perhaps not a very good performing glider, but a great training aircraft. His early solo flights were in the SGC's K8 which had a plank of wood for a seat. Graham has a view that this was deliberate, so pilots wouldn't want to fly it for too long due to the pain in your

backside after about 30 minutes in the air!

He took to competing in the mid 90's and continues to compete at the Scottish Interclub which he describes as a friendly and great natured competition with a focus on encouraging pilots of all abilities to just have a go, with more emphasis on fun and enjoyment, rather than competition.

Graham tries to visit SGC around 2 or 3 times per month, depending on the weather conditions and is also one of their volunteer tug pilots, taking over those duties once a month or so. So, if you have ever taken one of the Air Experience flights, you may well have met him.

Graham, like many others, missed the club during lockdown. 'Ewan, my son, is now very keen on gliding, which has encouraged me to go to the club more often even if the weather is not so good. I am getting back into just enjoying being at Portmoak which is great. It allows me more time to help out, get involved and get to meet more of the members which is something I had lost and missed.'

Graham believes that gliding is an amazing way to experience flight in its purest forms and a great opportunity to make life-long friends.

Just like his father and grandfather, Ewan Fraser has been bitten by the gliding bug. His first flight was a gift from his Dad Graham on his fourth birthday. Now 15, Ewan went solo earlier in the year at the age of 14 in the club K21, he is now working towards getting cleared to fly the club's single seater and starting work on his Bronze endorsement.

He credits his father and grandfather with inspiring him to take up the sport but wishes he had more time to devote to it. Ewan is one of many younger Cadet members at the Scottish Gliding Centre who get the opportunity to be part of an established and friendly club who inspire and advise younger pilots.

'I love gliding, my first flight felt really surreal. The freedom you feel up in the air is unlike anything else and I would totally recommend it to anyone.'

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Queen's Award For Broke Not Broken

THE VOLUNTEERS OF Broke not Broken have worked hard before and during the Covid-19 pandemic to tackle poverty in Kinross-shire. They have now been honoured with the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service for their efforts – the most prestigious award given to volunteer groups across the UK to recognise exceptional service within their communities.

Broke not Broken Kinross is one of 241 volunteer-led groups UK wide and among 18 in Scotland to receive the award this year. The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service aims to recognise outstanding work by volunteer groups to benefit their local communities. It was created in 2002 to celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee and recipients are announced each year on 2 June, the anniversary of The Queen's Coronation. Award winners this year include diverse volunteer groups from all across the UK.

Broke not Broken Kinross received the award from the Lord Lieutenant Stephen Leckie on Tuesday 7 September in Kinross Community Campus. He presented the group with a certificate, personally signed by HM the Queen, and a large, heavy commemorative crystal. They are the third volunteer group to ever receive the prestigious award in Perth and Kinross and are now entitled to use the Queen's Award emblem.

Perth and Kinross Lord Lieutenant, Stephen Leckie said: 'I could not be more delighted for the Broke Not Broken Kinross team, and I offer my very sincere congratulations and very warm thanks for all they do. This is truly a wonderful day for the team. I know too our Provost is equally thrilled. It reflects well on the whole of Perth and Kinross that we have such people as these volunteers in our Community, prepared to go the extra mile for clients and their families. The volunteers at the charity are hard working, modest, selfless people, with inspiring leaders, who bring change to many peoples' lives for the better. They have brought joy, hope, contact and happiness to many, many people

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of Kinross-shire. For that, and for their pre Pandemic service to those who are disadvantaged across the Southern Tayside community, Broke not Broken Kinross is very well worthy of Her Majesty's recognition with the award of a QAVS.'

Provost Dennis Melloy said: 'I am delighted to see this fantastic group receive this well-deserved award in recognition of all their hard work, even throughout the difficult times we've all experienced during the pandemic. The difference they continue to make in the lives of people in need and to tackle the effects of poverty is commendable. Well done and congratulations to everyone involved in running this fantastic voluntary service.'

Chairman, Annie McCormack, said: 'Although starting life as principally a food bank, Broke Not Broken Kinross (BNB) have, over five years, evolved and developed a range of linked projects, based on working with service users, including a counselling service, advice hub, sports club funding, family away days, Winter coat schemes, cookery classes, healthy eating initiatives, Recovery café, funding for addiction intervention, gardening and growing produce, as well as hardship funding. In these initiatives, they work closely with many other Community groups, such as The Men's Shed, Kinross Rotary Club, SSAFA – The Armed Forces Charity, Kinross Day Centre, local schools and churches, to raise awareness, fundraise and provide speaking event opportunities.

'We could not be more proud, honoured and thrilled to be recognised by Her Majesty in this way. For our small team of volunteers, this is a very well deserved reward for their hundreds of hours of work with people in our Community. It is very humbling indeed. We love doing what we do, and ask for no reward of course, but to get Royal recognition is amazing. Broke not Broken, Kinross QAVS...it sounds wonderful!'




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YOUTH BRING LIVE MUSIC TO KINROSS

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
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Got Plants To Spare? Or Swap?

LOCAL KINROSS RESIDENTS have been enjoying sharing their plants and seeds with others, and chatting using a Facebook group set up by Anita Mackenzie Mills. Nearly 700 members now use the group to ask gardening questions, share photos and above all to share their plants and seeds.

Anita told the Newsletter how it all began.

'Just over five years ago I was enjoying gardening at a very amateur level, but noticing how much was wasted. If I planted seeds and they all came up, I had too many and they ended up on the compost. I decided to set up a Facebook group to add some friends, to see if I could share some of my excess. Within a few hours it had expanded to people I didn't know – there was definitely demand in the area!



'Although I called it a 'swap' at first, I really wanted generosity to be at its heart, and so changed the name to 'share and swap'.

In past years people posted in the group if they had plants to share, and invited folk to pop over to get them (some still prefer to do this). This year Marion arrived in Kinross, having moved from an area where she had been involved in a plant sharing hub and suggested it might work here. Amanda, a font of gardening know-how from the fantastic Potager Garden in Kinross got involved, and together we set up a sharing hub at St Paul's Episcopal Church.'

The group is all about giving things away, whether it is plants and seeds, or just advice and encouragement. The generous atmosphere makes for a really positive local group. Anyone local is welcome to join. The group simply ask that you keep on topic, avoid advertising, and treat each other with respect.

If you want to take a plant, and have nothing to share yet don't worry. You can pay it forward when you are ready. If you aren't on Facebook just share your excess plants at the hub. It's likely that the physical hub will close shortly for the winter months, but it will be back next spring, and the Facebook group is there all year round.



People are asked to leave their labelled plants in the tray outside the meeting room, and post in the group to tell people what is there. In addition to the plants and seeds, there has been a lot of plant container sharing too which is hopefully saving some plastic from landfill.

Anita has negotiated a discount on seeds from a small UK supplier who gives to charity with each pack bought, and is open to relevant gardening related 'deals' that will benefit the members.

Amanda is now offering some gardening workshops at the Potager to members although spaces have filled up fast.

There will be apple-themed baking, tea and coffee and children's drinks. It's a free event but donations will be very welcome. For more details see p68-69.



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
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
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Kinnesswood In Bloom Take Gold!





Lathro Meadows Playpark

Persimmon recently started building a temporary play park next to the SUDS pond at the new Lathro Meadows development.

This has been a long and drawn out process. Persimmon were originally meant

to built a play park in what is now 'phase 2' of the site, but later determined this would be too dangerous as children would be playing next to building works.

They then applied for and received permission to build a temporary play park instead. This was located next to the SUDS pond. This was to be completed before any houses were occupied, which clearly did not happen.

Earlier this year, I was advised that this temporary play park would not be built as there were 'health and safety... matters that make its delivery in the location agreed undesirable' due to the proximity to 'construction activity and SUDS drainage infrastructure'. Instead development of the permanent play park in phase 2 would be expedited.

A few weeks ago, to the surprise of both local residents and councillors, construction commenced on the temporary play park. When I enquired about this, I was advised that it was now deemed to be too dangerous to expedite the phase 2 play park—the very same reason given for moving to the temporary play park a few years ago.

What I cannot understand, however, is if it was deemed too dangerous to build a play park next to a SUDS pond earlier this year, why is it deemed safe now? There are also concerns that Persimmon may never build the permanent play park and that the temporary location will become permanent.

I have made representation to Council officials on these points and, at the time of writing, have yet to receive a response.

I am keen to see a permanent play park delivered for children living on the Lathro Meadows site, but it is vital that this is built in a location that is safe. I will continue to seek a resolution to this problem.

Balgedie 30mph Limits

The long requested 30 mph limits on Easter and Wester Balgedie have now been installed along the A911. This is something that residents have been asking for for some time.

Unfortunately, the contractors installing the limits did not build to the approved scheme and instead installed a 30 mph speed limit all the way from Loch Leven's Larder to Kinnesswood, which defeats the purpose of having lower limits in residential areas.

I have been assured that this will be rectified in the near future with 30 mph limits restricted to the hamlets themselves and a 40 mph buffer limit in between.

A911 Scotland to Fife Boundary

I am continuing to press for a reduction to the speed limit on the A911 between Scotlandwell and the Fife boundary. This is something that local residents have been requesting for many years, but to date there has been no action.

The Council and the police are not currently supportive of a reduction in the speed limit as they do not feel that the road layout warrants it. This fails to understand the problems caused by the sharp bend in particular and does not take due cognisance of the many accidents that residents have recorded—even if these do not appear on official police records.

It is very disappointing that this issue remains unresolved. Very sadly, there was a fatal motorcycle accident in the summer. We cannot wait for another serious or fatal accident before taking action.

WORK IN PARLIAMENT over the past month has been varied as usual and included an opportunity to speak in a debate on one of my favourite subjects — and one that is of huge importance to the local economy of Kinross-shire — Scotland's Food & Drink.



Whether it is award-winning butchers, farm shops or artisan bakeries, Scottish produce is now recognised, celebrated and – above all – cooked, eaten and enjoyed throughout this country and across the globe.

The link between tourism and food is a relatively new one for us Scots. In the past, tourists would certainly come to Scotland for the scenery, the castles and the history. But they did not come because of our reputation as a nation of gourmet food lovers.

And yet we have always grown, raised, caught, harvested and landed some of the finest produce in the world. And some of the best of it right here on our own doorstep.

As we were talking about the importance of quality food, I didn't miss the opportunity to highlight the issue of frozen food in Perth & Kinross schools. I called for public kitchens to be more locally based and described the current policy of Perth & Kinross Council as going against everything that we were talking about in that debate.

During a session of questions to the Cabinet Secretary for Covid Recovery I was able to highlight the work of local community organisations over the course of the pandemic and I asked what plans there are to sustain and utilise the skills and resource that these community groups offer.

Many groups here in Kinross-shire – as across Scotland – have done a phenomenal amount of work over the last 18 months or so.

These groups mobilised volunteers to help with everything from food shopping to delivering prescriptions and to, quite simply, being someone to talk to. As well as recognising their efforts, I want to ensure that the experience these groups gained and the connections that were developed, continue to benefit their communities.

I wanted to find out what plans the Scottish Government has to sustain and utilise the skills and resources that these community groups have to offer so it was good to hear an assurance that they want to focus on a community-based approach to Covid recovery and to sustain many of the examples of good community initiative that have come forward during the pandemic.

Looking at the longer lasting impacts of the virus on individuals as well as on communities, I have raised issues relating to Long Covid in the Chamber on behalf of constituents, so I really welcome the announcement of a new £10 million Long Covid Support Fund to help health boards respond to the condition.

Long Covid is a condition which is still not fully understood and manifests itself in a variety of ways amongst those it affects. The flexibility that has been built in to the fund, therefore, is really important, allowing its use to be tailored to local needs and circumstances.

As a member of the Covid Recovery Committee, I made a point of attending the inaugural meeting of the Long Covid Cross Party Group to hear concerns and issues raised by sufferers and told them I was listening to what they had say. Clearly, so are the Scottish Government.

capacity will be quickly used up. Please see the information below that I have from the Council's education department.

Milnathort Primary School has an official capacity of 257 over 9 classrooms. The roll for 2021/22 and the following 4 years is shown below.

Kinross PS roll will have sufficient capacity for pupils from housebuilding.

Milnathort PS may be at or close to capacity due to housebuilding, however there is a 10th classroom available which could be considered to accommodate catchment children. Loch Leven Heritage Trail

Many of you, like me will enjoy using our heritage trail. This is the first year I have had no complaints from users about overgrown vegetation on the path. The verges on the majority of the 13 mile route are cut by Nature Scot (formerly SNH) volunteers. The rest of the trail is cut by the Council. I would like to extend my thanks to the Nature Scot volunteers for all the work they do (both seen and unseen) to keep the trail in good order.

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Lathro Park

I have been told about the sunken road drains around the estate and have asked the Council to get them repaired asap. Collapsed road drains are a danger to both drivers and cyclists. If you spot any please let me know.

Green Routes

The side roads west of Milnathort and Glenfarg have now been converted to Green Routes which means the speed limit reduces from 60mph to a maximum of 40mph. Green routes are designated as walking and cycling friendly roads. The addition of these popular cycling/walking roads means that the majority of our rural side roads are now Green Routes.

THE NEW PARLIAMENTARY SESSION is now well underway and I am now in the preliminary stages of bringing forward a Member's Bill on outdoor education. I am very pleased that my Member's Bill has now officially moved to the consultation stage. Over the summer its principles gained widespread support across several



sectors and with families and young people themselves. The bill aims to provide a legislative entitlement for all young people between the ages of 12-16 to experience residential outdoor education.

At present in Scotland, section 6 of the 1980 Education Act empowers local authorities to set up, among other things, outdoor education centres and to assist with the provision of the opportunities afforded by them. However, we know that many young people never get the chance to participate in outdoor education and I believe that situation must be rectified.

There are many reasons why I believe that outdoor education is so crucial for the educational development of young people. It has a proven track-record of success in developing life skills such as leadership and confidence and employers and further and higher education institutions greatly value these skills, in addition, outdoor education articulates with all of the principles of the Curriculum for Excellence.

Unfortunately, many outdoor education centres are threatened with closure because of the financial challenges facing them; losing them would not only mean a loss of bed space but also the very considerable experience of the staff employed in them. My Bill, if passed, will not only deliver enhanced educational opportunities but also ensure sustainability for the outdoor education centre.

My Bill has received some significant and welcome endorsements from people and organisations including; Dave Spence, Chief Executive of Scottish Outdoor Education Centres, Katie Docherty, Chief Executive of Scouts Scotland, Youthlink Scotland, Eileen Prior from the parent group Connect, Keir Bloomer, one of the architects of the Curriculum for Excellence, Martin Davidson of the Outward Bound Trust and Alan Smith, Chairman of Loch Ken Trust.

I was delighted to read that Perth and Kinross Council in conjunction with the Gannochy Trust are continuing their financial partnership approach to funding youth work across Perth and Kinross so young people from Kinross-shire to Blairgowrie and Aberfeldy to Crieff can benefit from the experience and support of youth work. This is really good news and provides much needed support at a time when our young people really need it the most.

Climate Change Commission

In June 2019, the Council approved the motion I presented that committed the council to lead by example in tackling the Climate Emergency. At the end of August, Councillors approved a Report that tasked



officers with setting up the Perth and Kinross Climate Change Commission (PKCCC).

I was humbled to be named as the opposition representative on the commission—along with the leader of the council as the only two elected members. We will be joined by the Council's new Chief Executive, Thomas Glen, who will be in post soon. There are already numerous Climate Change Commissions set up, mostly in cities, including Edinburgh and Leeds.

The commission will consist of

- 6 individuals from the private sector, giving Business and Construction representation
- 6 individuals from the public sector including the council representation mentioned
- 6 individuals from the third sector, including Climate Cafes and local sustainability groups
- 6 Experts from various groups that are key to meeting our Net Zero commitment by 2045.

Young people will be disproportionately affected by the impacts of the climate emergency, so both the independent and SNP groups on the council felt it was important that young people should be as equally represented on the commission as the other groups. So an amendment was tabled to ensure that 25% of the commission should be made up from this group. This proposal was incorporated into the motion by the leader of the council. Individuals can fulfil multiple roles on the commission, e.g., a young person could be an expert and work for a public body and fill three of the criteria for the commission.

It was also proposed to set up a 'Young Person's subgroup' that will represent young people throughout the area.

One of the main roles of the commission will be to scrutinise the initial roadmap to NetZero that is due to come before the council later this year. The council is directly responsible for only 3% of the CO2 emissions for the area, but the council could influence 70% of emissions. The commission will need to engage with the wider business community and with all households to ensure that we meet our carbon reduction goals on our way to 2045.

Frozen meals for our schoolchildren

I have previously written about the production of meals for Kinross-shire schools being moved to a central production unit in Dundee. This unit will produce frozen meals for our children that will then be distributed to our local schools.

Dundee and Angus council currently implement the frozen meals. Kitchen staff and parents there have recently raised questions in the press over the quality of the frozen meals. Those questions raise similar concerns about the quality of food that will soon be served to children within our own schools. Those questions were also raised by SNP councillors in committee — when the Tories and Lib Dems voted for the frozen meals.


FOR THE LAST FEW weeks, the Commons has been in recess. This is the chance for MPs, without the pressure of urgent votes in the lobbies, to return to their constituencies and spend time. It's my favourite part of the parliamentary year. Ochil and South Perthshire is an extraordinarily beautiful constituency



and is home to some truly remarkable people. This summer I've met quite a few of them.

Two of my visits really stood out for me. One was to PADS - the Perthshire Abandoned Dogs Society. I was apprehensive about visiting. Kennels for abandoned animals can be grim places with rows of cruelly treated pets staring dolefully out or barking excitedly, begging visitors for a second chance at a happier life. For the old, the infirm and the ugly, that second chance often doesn't come and their stay ends unhappily.

I needn't have worried. PADS is a joyful place. A community



of carers look after a wee community of dogs with a lifetime of stories. There are rescued dogs; dogs abandoned on the streets of Romania; who dogs have outlived their owners; some whose owners have become too frail to care for them; and yes, sadly, victims of ill-treatment. None are ever put down. All are loved and groomed, fed well and exercised. And make no mistake. if you want to take one home, it's the prospective

companion, not the dog who gets put through his or her paces. PADS are discerning about who they allow to adopt their canine charges.

I fell for a dignified chihuahua with a direct gaze. If it weren't for my lifestyle with endless travelling, I suspect I'd have been researching nutritious dog food recipes by now.

Another memorable trip was to visit a remarkable woman called Kate Sainsbury and her son Louis who hosted me at Louis' new home, the Appletree Community. Louis contracted meningitis as a baby and has lived with a severe mental impairment ever since. His mother is his staunchest advocate and a ferocious champion for the rights of people living with disabilities. Louis's social services care over the years hasn't always been ideal and Kate believes that heavy-handed restraint used on him has left Louis traumatised. Kate's dream has always been to provide him with his own place and as much independence as possible. A financial settlement from the hospital where he was born has allowed her to fulfil her dream.

Appletree is an oasis. Set around a beautifully planted courtyard, it has been adapted from existing old stone farm buildings. Colours are Louis's carefully chosen choice. There are living quarters for a care team. And—as Kate told me when I joined them for birthday cake, jelly and ice cream—she hopes that others will join Louis and come to live in and share this special place. Thanks to his tenacious, fearless Mum, Louis now has a home for the rest of his life. I left with a bit of a lump in my throat.

Wildlife Crime

OPERATION WINGSPAN, a year-long campaign to tackle wildlife crime, working with partners including the Partnership Against Wildlife Crime (PAW) Scotland, has seen considerable success and is now entering its final phase.

This involves officers working on the persecution of fresh water pearl mussels and tackling all aspects of poaching, including hare coursing. As with previous phases, it will involve a combination of enforcement action and education.

Overall, the campaign has involved officers engaging with a number of organisations, including the agricultural community, ranger services, land managers and game keepers with the aim of educating the wider public and encouraging them to report wildlife crime to the police.

Detective Sergeant Billy Telford, Police Scotland's Wildlife Crime Coordinator, said: 'We have many internationally renowned species that attract thousands of nature lovers and tourists every year to Scotland, but many crimes against wildlife are cruel and barbaric.

'From hunting deer, hares or badgers with dogs, to using poisons or snares on protected birds, and protecting the critically endangered freshwater pearl mussel, Operation Wingspan is raising awareness and encouraging people to report this kind of crime.'

Phase One saw officers tackling the trade in endangered species and included visits to over 300 business premises, such as antique dealers, retro shops and pet shops across Scotland to advise owners and provide information about potential contraventions under The Control of Trade in Endangered Species (COTES) 2018 regulations. It resulted in the seizure and recovery of alligator heads from across the country.

Phase Two tackled badger persecution, working with the charity Scottish Badgers, to highlight that badgers and their setts are protected, that it is an offence to harm or interfere with them and that badger baiting is illegal. Where ongoing risks were identified, action was taken to protect the sett and the badgers.

Phase Three saw officers taking part in a construction conference to outline the responsibilities of developers, highlighting that it is an offence to destroy or damage roosts, as well as engaging with bat groups and visiting vulnerable roosts, ultimately leading to people being charged for undertaking development that threatened the welfare of bats.

Phase Four concentrated on raptor persecution. Officers have carried out a number of activities, including patrols of vulnerable nesting sites, warrants executed in relation to wildlife crime and a social media campaign with an educational video that was produced in collaboration with the RSPB.

Detective Chief Superintendent Laura McLuckie said: 'Reports of wildlife crime doubled during lockdown and Police Scotland is dedicated to working closely with a wide range of partner organisations to reduce the harm to species targeted by criminals...

'Tackling wildlife crime is not just about enforcement, it is also about working with partners and raising public awareness. The public has an important role in helping up to investigate reports of wildlife crime and I would urge anyone with concerns to contact us on 101, and if it is an emergency to call 999.














HAPPY 500th TO US!

Jan The *Newsletter* announces that contributions can now be accepted by email for the first time.





WE WERE ALL VOLUNTEERS. Editor, Nan Walker was assisted by Ursula, sitting at the dining table with her Olivetti typewriter brought on her bike from The Old Manse at the 'bottom of the town'. I had very basic bookkeeping skills, and was appointed to the position of

Recollections from Catriona Mcleod

I WAS THE SECOND Business Manager of the newsletter from 1982-87. The editorial side was Nan Walker's responsibility, and I did everything else, which was the books, distribution, a monthly trip to the printer lan Garrie in Auchterarder to collect the *Newsletter* in banana boxes, typed adverts, printed adverts, subscriptions, collecting in the money from the shops. But there was also a bit of proofreading and literal 'cut and paste' at Nan Walker's table.

Back in those early days the *Newsletter* was A5 in size, which meant that the completed issue had to have a number of pages divisible by four as the pages were A4 folded in half. It needed the right number of articles balanced by the right number of adverts to cover the costs. Sometimes this proved a problem. In July 1984 for the first time, the *Newsletter* had an illustrated cover which was quite a landmark.

When I went back to teaching, my Newsletter 'job' was split into several parts each done by a different person.

Recollections from Ursula Stewart

I JOINED THE NEWSLETTER team as Assistant Editor at around its second issue when Nan Walker needed help with the typing.

To be honest, what she really needed was help with the sticky tape. The original *Newsletter* consisted of four A5 pages and we typed out the individual items on scraps of paper and stuck them all together with Sellotape. This rather tatty and much frayed at the edges publication was conveyed to the printers who retyped it all and made it presentable.

Space was at a premium and I learned the art of precis in short order, Each month I puffed my way up to Muirpark Road with my typewriter in the basket of my bicycle to wrestle with the increasing amounts of information we were receiving and how to fit it in. Each month Nan pleaded with Rosemary, in charge of the money, to be allowed more pages. Each month she demurred, as the Community Council was convinced this daft venture was going to fall on its face. Each month Rosemary sold even more copies until that wonderful day when she relented and we were allowed 16 pages. 16 pages! We danced round Nan's dining room table in joy and spilled a cup of coffee all over the floor.

Of course it did not end there and by the time I left a few years later the *Newsletter* was well on the way to what you see now. I still get a small glow of pride when I see it and remember the laughter and chatter we enjoyed as Nan and I stuck bits of paper together, never dreaming it would all be such a huge success. Good luck, everyone. Here's to the next 500 issues!

Hands-On Raingardens Workshop

Collaborative Working Meetings At Kinross Raingardens

COLLECTIVE ARCHITECTURE welcomed the opportunity to leave our office (homes) for an afternoon in Kinross, visiting a range of raingardens sites, both established and with potential. We were joined by community volunteers from Kinross in Bloom and Kinross-shire Civic Trust and gained valuable input and expertise from representatives of Buglife and Tayside Biodiversity Partnership.

Our first stop was the **Park and Ride**, where we discussed existing drainage problems with the soakaway to the centre of the car park and how these issues and those of vehicles crossing the grass area might be mitigated by the introduction of raingardens. The team measured soil depth in three locations to understand what level of excavation might be feasible across the width of the soakaway to establish a raingarden. We also discussed options for edge treatment to discourage vehicles from crossing the landscape, potential planting options and future maintenance.

At Dance Connect, there already exists a willow swale to the rear of the car park. We trimmed willows encroaching on car parking space, adding to an open structure compost heap/biodiversity habitat. Mown grass was also raked and cleared to the compost. Buglife and Tayside Biodiversity Partnership offered suggestions to co-owner Rachel Webb on how to enhance the biodiversity and appearance of the landscaped areas surrounding the building, including identifying a wide range of wildflowers and herbs in a nearby swale, and in rough grassland at the front of the

premises that might help form a wild-flower meadow with some encouragement. Rachel noted that the presence of the novel willow swale serving the car park at Dance Connect had not been something they had been aware of originally, but having been contacted by Kinross-shire Civic Trust and following the raingardens workshop and input from biodiversity experts she is keen to protect and enhance it where possible. Rachel made a generous thank you payment to Buglife, received on their behalf by their Workshop participant Melissa Shaw.

At **Portmoak Primary School** we were able to hear first-hand from the head teacher and principal teacher how successful their retrofit raised bed rain-


garden has been, installed in October 2020 (supplied by Marmax Products as principal sponsors of the school raingarden project). Children and staff have really engaged with how disconnection from a downpipe into a raingarden feature can assist in slowing the flow of water whilst also offering biodiversity and landscape opportunities. We saw evidence of how successful this intervention has been in drawings the children had done, the enthusiasm with which the teachers spoke about the raingarden and the presence of a small toad within the raingarden itself. We also got the opportunity to speak to representatives of Kinnesswood in Bloom about their work in the school grounds including an impressive array of thriving raised bed planters.


Our final site of the afternoon was at **Loch Leven's Larder**, where we briefly met owner Emma Niven. Here, work has been done to establish raingardens





to deal with issues within the car park, where a combination of sloped ground and heavy rainfall would cause the compacted gravel surface to wash away. Trenches had been excavated and Scotia Seeds wildflowers planted to reduce the run-off across the car park and divert it to larger landscaped basins. On inspection, some areas of wildflowers are now well established and other planting is beginning to establish in one of the basins. Buglife and Tayside Biodiversity Partnership remarked on the success of the wildflowers established at the Larder and recommended that the team extract seeds from existing

plants for sowing in parts of the raingardens which had lost seedlings in heavy rain. Additional wildflowers were introduced to the basins and minor regrading work along the mini-infiltration swales was carried out to help distribute water flows.

We were delighted to have the opportunity to build on work carried out to date in transforming Kinross into a raingardens town. We had been approached by Kinross-shire Civic Trust to assist with community engagement and visualisation of options for improvements and retrofits and unfortunately COVID-19 restrictions limited the opportunities for this. The afternoon workshop and the small tasks undertaken hopefully served to demonstrate simple steps that can be taken to achieve mulbenefits of rainwater manage-



ment, increased amenity and biodiversity. The willingness of the local community groups, school and businesses to get involved was refreshing and a very positive experience for all of us.

KINROSS RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

KINROSS RUGBY CLUB WAS founded in 1981, 40 years ago. As a former president of the club, Martin Bell envisaged a modest start to the 40th season celebrations when he asked us to organise an over-35s event. The over-35s who he approached were by then over-65s, so it wasn't going to be a rugby match. Instead, we organised a dinner dance, with a ceilidh band, which was held in the Green Hotel on 31 August.

Over-35s rugby began at KRFC in 1991, in a desperate attempt to achieve some on-the-field playing success at a time

when the 1st XV had been struggling, and there were not enough players for a 2nd XV. Playing under the new floodlights that season at home, once a month on a Wednesday evening when other clubs often couldn't get their first-choice players to Kinross in time, the Oldies were remarkably successful. Starting with less than a team, by the end of the first season we had 40 names on the books, and the goal of supporting a 2nd XV was achieved, as some of the older guys returned to regular Saturday rugby in an equally successful fathers-&-sons strengthened 2nd XV. Success on the field stimulates more success, which is a magnet for players to want to be involved.

A new generation of over-35s took up the challenge to build on that initial few years of fun, participating in veterans tournaments around Scotland and adding international matches and travels. France has been a popular venue, with tours to Paris, Lyons and Lille. Trips to Rome and Dublin have also featured and the Dublin River Dance has become a favourite club veterans legend (one of many). It took a lot of organising, but with a small group of friends working together it can be fun. Visitors to play in over-35s games at Kinross have included Rugby Roma, the largest of 25 rugby clubs in Rome, and Hamburg. A major highlight

fondly recalled by many at the dinner, was the International Golden Oldies rugby tournament held at Murrayfield in 2008. Kinross was one of the first clubs to sign up for that; thanks to Jimmy Handyside, Ollie Cox and team-mates for making that such a tremendous experience for our little club. Playing on the back-pitches in an international rugby festival against (and sometimes for) clubs from all over the world, from the Cook Islands and New Zealand to Japan and Canada — it was wonderful.

Rugby players often drift away as their 'every Saturday

all season' years finish; the aim of the Reunion Dinner was to try and encourage former players and club members to return. The club reached out locally and much further afield; it was great to see Kerry Barnes, coming up from Essex for a weekend in Kinross with us, and Julian Sykes travelling up to Scotland again from his home in Yorkshire.

There was plenty of banter and laughs from the assembled players and former players at the dinner. They were welcomed to the evening by club President Murray Hunter. The Green Hotel was an excellent venue and the staff and management there were helpful and supportive.

Murray introduced club favourite Jim Handyside as our MC for the evening, and after dinner some entertainment organised by Jimmy and Fraser Thompson had to be seen to be believed... It was great to see one of the younger rugby lads at the dinner (on the threshold of veterans rugby, we hope, as a natural leader) surge from his table and leap through the air like a flying elephant seal to land mouth first (hands behind his back) on some sweets placed on a conveniently available mattress in the centre of the dance floor. Amazing. And no damage.

TIME FOR THE FLU JAB?



2021 Campaign Now Under Way

FLU CAMPAIGN 2021

EVERY YEAR IN SCOTLAND people are hospitalised with flu, and this winter our immunity may be lower than usual. The annual flu vaccine is the safest and most effective way to help protect against the flu.

GP practices have been advised by Tayside Health Board **ONLY** to vaccinate the following groups of patients:

- All patients who are 70 years or older on 1st September 2021 (excluding those in care homes and housebound patients who will be immunised separately)
- All those patients who have previously been asked to shield (Clinically Extremely Vulnerable)

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




What's In Your Bin?

What Is Waste?

IN OUR SOCIETY waste is treated as a linear process. Items are created, consumed and then disposed of. We aim to move to a circular economy where all waste is seen as a resource. Where waste is minimised, valuable resources are not disposed of in landfills, and most waste is sorted, leaving only limited amounts to be treated.

Scotland has set very ambitious targets to reduce waste. Some of them are:

- Recycling 70% by 2025
- Ban on organic waste to landfill by 2025
- No more than 5% waste to landfill by 2025
- Reduce food waste by a third by 2025

In 2019. Perth and Kinross

 Use By: These dates refer to safety. Food can be eaten up to the end of this date but not after, even if it looks and smells fine, eg meat, fish, milk

More information can be found at the website Love Food Hate Waste Scotland.

If food cannot be reduced, please recycle your food in your brown bin. To recycle food waste, you do not require a garden waste permit. Food can be placed in the bin wrapped in newspaper, in a compostable liner or loose. The food needs to be de-packaged and compostable packaging is not accepted in the brown bin.

What Should I Be Putting In The Blue Bin?

- Paper: Newspaper, magazines and junk mail, Office paper, shredded paper and envelopes (including windowed) Directories, catalogues and books, Non-metallic gift wrap
- Cardboard: Cardboard packaging and food sleeves, Toilet and kitchen roll tubes, Greetings cards
- Food and drinks cartons (e.g. Tetra Pak)
- Tins and cans: food and drinks cans, pet food tins, aerosol, biscuit and sweet tins, metal jar lids
- Plastic bottles and containers:
 Tubs, trays and punnets: yoghurt pots, shampoo and detergent bottles, Plastic drinks and sauce bottles, Plastic bottle tops

Since lockdown last March, the contamination found in blue

kerbside recycling bins

has steadily risen to its highest ever level with 2020 averaging at 22.4%. Contamination levels got as high as 29% in November – when we exceed a level of 20%, we incur additional costs to dispose of contamination. This not only has a financial implication for the Council, but it can also ruin the hard work of those who recycle correctly and contributes to climate change by sending valuable resources for disposal.

Reduce and Reuse waste is always the best option, trying to buy products with less packaging, don't buy things if you don't need them, repair broken items and replace single use items for reusable options.

Also pass on your pre-loved items to a friend, sell or donate, utilise web exchanges like gumtree, freecycle or donate to a good cause.

What Is In Our Household Waste Bin?

Council had a 52.7%

recycling rate.


TO BE ABLE TO meet these targets and reduce waste we need to understand what is in the household waste. PKC carry out a Waste Composition Analysis every year. We found that in the average household waste bin:

- The largest single component is food waste, with a third of the bin
- If you only look at avoidable food waste, this makes up 25%
- Around 50% of the content of the household waste bin could be recycled in the other two kerbside bins.

Avoidable food waste represents more than just waste, it is also a loss of money and resources and creates an environmental problem, as it releases methane from the landfill site, a greenhouse gas 20 times more powerful that CO2.

Together with planning meals, writing a shopping list, portioning and storing your food correctly; understanding food labels is one of the best ways to reduce food waste:

Best Before: These foods will be safe to eat after the 'Best Before' date but they may no longer be



Community Council News

Kinross Community Council News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 24 August were CCllrs Lynne Mckay (Chair), David Colliar, Bill Freeman, M McFarlane, M Wood and Hannah Phillips, Nick Riley (PKC), Neil Mitchell (Loch Leven Nature Reserve), Alison Wright, Maria Eugenia, Cllrs Calum Purves, Willie Robertson and Richard Watters and minute taker Caron Aird.

Apologies were received from CCllr T Stewart.

Kinross Town Centre

High Street - Cllr Purves advised that he had received a response from John McCroan, Place Development Manager at PKC who had agreed to take the lead on the work in relation to the High Street but he was not previously aware of this information. Cllr Purves has also asked Mr McCroan to undertake a survey on redesign, especially around the resident's views in respect of road safety issues, parking etc. and suggested that the *Newsletter* be used to facilitate this piece of work.

High Street Fire

CCIIr Mckay asked if there was anything which could be done to reduce the amount of suffering the affected businesses are experiencing following the fire, particularly around the lack of parking spaces and was advised that this was nothing which KCC could help with and lay with the insurance companies involved.

VAS/Road Crossings

Cllr Purves advised that he had no response to his enquiry around the VAS for Springfield Road, and also that the progress with the crossing at Gallowhill Road was slow. There had been mention of making the whole of Gallowhill Road a 'green route' but this may mean that it becomes a signalised junction and he was keen to hear member's thoughts on this.

CCIIr Colliar commented that the KCC needed to be careful as the A91 comes under the jurisdiction of Milnathort CC. CIIr Robertson advised that he had had similar conversations around reducing the speed limit of Gallowhill Road but PKC officers had told him that this area was a used as a circular walkway. CIIr Purves is to raise the issue with Milnathort CC also.

Cllr Watters advised that Section 75 mentions implementing a crossing but that this could be interpreted as using leftover monies for another road safety option – VAS at an appropriate position was suggested. CCllr Colliar advised that it would be disastrous if a crossing was not created but was advised by Cllr Purves that a crossing could be looked at once Phase II of Lathro Meadows had been commenced in order that new residents could be consulted.

A member of the public suggested that pop out pavements could be used instead of VAS or a crossing but Cllr Watters advised that there would only be around £5k left, depending on whether the VAS needed to be connected to an electricity supply, or solar powered. CCllr Colliar was opposed to the suggestion of pop out pavements as the road needs to be accessible by cars, caravans etc. due to its proximity to the caravan park.

Swansacre/Learning Centre Signs

Cllr Watters advised that he had not heard anything about this and will keep chasing. He will also forward emails to Cllr Purves in respect of the VAS for the area.

Davis Park/Outdoor Exercise Equipment for Kirkgate Park

CCIIr Mckay introduced Nick Riley, Landscape Architect, PKC to those present, advising that he had been tasked to look at ways to improve play areas in Scotlandwell, and also Davis Park, Kinross. He advised that he would be creating a You Tube video of the site at the moment and also creating a short questionnaire to garner views as to what the local residents would like to see in the area, and the main reason for his attendance at the meeting was to see if there were any particular people or groups that he should be speaking to. (He had already spoken to Joan Cornwall in regard to the creation of a cycle path or pump path, as well as things not in a brochure).

Members felt this was an excellent idea for the area and agreed that the residents should be canvassed for their views and opinions. After a long discussion, it was agreed that Mr Riley would contact the local schools and that CCllr Phillips would provide him with contact details for groups such as Cubs, Beavers, Scouts, Guides etc. it was also agreed to put an article in the next Newsletter, on the website and on the Facebook page. Mr Riley confirmed that while there was a budget allocated to this work, it could also provide an opportunity for the local community to fundraise.

Mr Riley also commented that he did not want to forget about the adult population and that there could also be an opportunity for outdoor gym equipment to be provided for a local park. Both CCllrs Mckay and Colliar invited Mr Riley to meet with representatives of KCC in Davis Park to discuss this matter further. There were a number of suggestions for Davis Park including climbing walls, slides, wild flower areas, no mow lawn areas, pump track.

Mr Mitchell advised that Loch Leven Nature Trust were currently looking after the green areas in Kinross including pollinators, wildflower meadows and had also taken over the mowing of the maize area.

CCIIr Mckay thanked Mr Riley for attending and commented that it was pleasing to have new ideas being talked about for the area. She also mentioned that a local resident, Maria Eugenio, was keen to be involved.

Kinross Flood Resilience Group

CCIIr McFarlane advised that he had met with the Group as well as PKC reps. There was one major question in respect of the insurance policy and background information for the CC to support the group. The insurance officer from PKC had confirmed that Zurich would only cover the Group if it was a fully integrated part of KCC and CCIIr McFarlane advised that he had forwarded information re governance and KCC managing the group to members.

CCIIr Mckay commented that other flood groups have CC members who lead the work, with the Council providing funding for equipment. The stance of KCC was that while they were undermanned and there was currently no one in the current membership who had the capacity to take this on, KCC were happy for people to join the CC to lead on this particular piece of work. CCIIr McFarlane confirmed that members of the Group would need to stand for election to KCC and they would also be involved in other work of KCC. CCIIr McFarlane reiterated that KCC were keen to help the group but due to the fact there were only 4 or 5 elected members, they did not have

the capacity to do this. CCllr Mckay also advised Mr Wright that it would not be acceptable for Group members to join KCC and then leave once the flood work had been completed. This was understood.

Mr Wright advised that he would take this suggestion back to the group for discussion and in the meantime CCllr McFarlane would send the necessary paperwork to Mr Wright for himself and others to complete in order stand for election.

Hayfield Wildlife Garden

CCIIr Colliar advised that there was no record of the garden being part of the Hayfield Trust and following the closure of the old Regional Council, the garden had been left to the Town Council for residents to use and he therefore felt that the garden should be left as open space for the public to use and if this is refused, then we should ask for an explanation.

Cllr Purves agreed to speak to PKC about the garden and will report back to a future meeting. CCllr Mckay advised that she had put a post up on the Facebook page and there had been a lot of people coming forward to volunteer.

A member of the public (Maria Eugenia) had contacted CCllr Mckay to advise that she was keen to be involved in the work of the garden. While she had not visited the garden recently, Ms Eugenia had a number of good ideas which she was keen to see implemented including bird feeders, creation of an ecogroup, fairy gardens, wild flower meadows, no mow lawns etc. She was also keen to involve the school in this work. CCllr Colliar suggested that checks were made with PKC in respect of which department is responsible for the garden and Cllr Purves commented that he thought he had an action to chase up information on ownership.

Loch Leven Wild Camping/Camper Vans

Mr Mitchell advised members of the position he held at Loch Leven Heritage Trust and advised that there had been unprecedented levels of wild camping in the area and while some people were responsible in terms of removing litter etc., others were not, and while there is no real restriction on camping, Trust staff were taking every opportunity to remind campers of the countryside access code (The Scottish Outdoor Access Code - mygov.scot), especially in respect of toileting.

Every time litter or human waste left, and fires left burning, these issues are reported to Heritage Trust HQ and therefore the Chief Executive is seeing the problems which are arising, and these are eventually escalated to Scottish Government and Nature Heritage and while it was pleasing to see visitors coming to the area, the sheer volume of visitors is something which the area is in fact struggling to cope with and Police have been called on a number of occasions to deal with issues. CCllr McFarlane asked if there was anything KCC could do to promote the message, e.g., an article in the Newsletter or a post on the Facebook page. It was also noted that the wintering birds would soon be in the area – this was also to be included in the Newsletter.

Mr Mitchell also advised that planning permission for the bird hide had been approved and the contract was currently out to tender, with a deadline of the end of September. It is hoped that this can be rebuilt by Spring 2022, although there are high costs in respect of the equipment required. Hide will be built using fire retardant materials.

A member of the public raised the issue of a footpath from Gairneybridge to Loch Leven and explained that having recently moved to the area, she found it very difficult to access Loch Leven (non-driver) and cross the main road when walking her dog.

Cllr Robertson advised that he and Cllr Purves had been involved in PKC's long-term plans for a footpath for that specific area and as a member of TRACKS, they were keen to take this work forward but, unfortunately, it was a slow process. Cllr Purves also advised that, as part of the Westfield development, PKC

are looking to incorporate a walking route along the B9197 to Kelty. A feasibility study has been completed and while Cllrs Purves, Barnacle and Robertson had asked to review this, this had not happened as yet.

Planning Matters

Planning Applications Received

21/01329/FLL Land 110 metres south east of Beaufield House, S42 application to amend condition 4 (access construction) and delete condition 14 (street lighting) of planning permission 16/0996/FLL

21/01404/FLL Extension to dwelling house at 42 Muirs, Kinross.

Reports from Councillors

Cllr Purves advised that PKC were currently looking into providing additional parking spaces at the archway at the bottom of the High Street due to access issues and he had been contacted by a number of residents asking him to seek the views of KCC in this respect.

While KCC were not in favour of additional parking spaces being created, they understood the reason for it.

Cllr Purves gave an update on the Loch water safety advising that he had received a response from PKC who advised that while a risk assessment had been undertaken last year at Kirkgate Park, the land owned does not include the Pier. He agreed to clarify this with PKC.

He went on to confirm that PKC were responsible for the throwlines, and evidence suggests that these are better than the rings. He also reported that PKC were aiming to restrict access to the area, as well as erecting water safety signs.

CCIIr McKay advised that she had spoken to RLSS about providing training but they had advised that this was not something they do and to contact Live Active or RNLI. She has



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92 high street, kinross ky13 8aj 01577 861 903 or 07738 514 342 contacted Live Active but had no response from them, while RNLI confirmed that they would not undertake this as the loch was not open water. Cllr Robertson suggested contacting the Fire and Rescue Service while Cllr Purves wondered if the training could be undertaken through the local schools. He also suggested contacting the local head teachers about this.

Reports from CC Representatives War Memorial

CCIIr Colliar advised that he and CCIIr Mckay had recently met with Kinross in Bloom to discuss damage to the planters near the War Memorial caused by parked cars. It was noted that these planters would need to be removed in order to allow access to the Memorial and also for planting the Christmas Tree. CCIIr Colliar advised that he had contacted the four Ward Councillors to request the name of person to contact at PKC around this but only CIIr Purves had replied to ask if anyone had responded to the request. CCIIr Colliar confirmed he had had no response and CIIr Purves agreed to forward a contact name to CCIIr Colliar.

AOB

AGM/Accounts

Members were advised that the accounts required to be audited and submitted prior to the AGM which was due to be held in October. CCllr McFarlane advised that there was approximately £330 in the account and that any planned expenditure for this financial year should be made ahead of the end of year account closure date of 31/08/21.

After discussion, it was agreed to purchase a gazebo which was to be used at public events with CCllr Mckay advising CCllr McFarlane of the total amount to be paid.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be held on Tuesday 26 October at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall.

Portmoak Community Council

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 10 August were Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson, and R Watters; CCllrs A Davidson (Treasurer & Acting Chair), S McGregor (Secretary), D Morris, K Donaldson, A Millar, and D Paterson; M Craig Police liaison and 10 members of the public

Apologies were received from Cllr S Forde

Matters Arising

Road Safety Action in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell

The Chair commenced the meeting with a personal note on behalf of PCC to send our condolences to the family of the motorcyclist who was killed on the A911 on night of 15 July 21. Cllr C Purves was able to give a road safety update on a number of items:

Easter Balgedie: a resident of Easter Balgedie had kindly helped to canvas opinion from other residents and farmers on speed mitigation through the hamlet. There was support for a speed table along a longer stretch of road. From PKC roads there was support for some types of speed mitigation, and the effectiveness of speeding tables, and Daryl McKeown will assess and respond with the best solutions.

Kinnesswood: the 20mph speed trial has come to an end, and this has recommended retaining the 20mph speed limit. The trial will help with policy on the future approaches to the introduction of 20mph speed limits across Perth & Kinross. The vast majority of the feedback in response to the 20mph limit trial was positive.

Scotlandwell – Auchmuir Bridge: following the fatality on 15/07/21 the road safety team are assessing it in terms of policy including a 40mph speed limit requested by locals. The Police and council will have a joint site inspection to look at

the causes in order to advise on future speed mitigation limits. There is some resistance to the 40mph reductions based on current policy. Cllr C Purves and some residents will meet with PKC Councillor Angus Forbes in August to make the case for a change in policy that will enable a 40mph limit to be introduced. Cllr W Robertson and PCC requested to attend this meeting and Cllr C Purves agreed to ask if Cllr Forbes was agreeable to this.

A911 Route Action Plan: this project is still in progress with no drafts made available yet.

Agricultural vehicles: members of the CC voiced concerns regarding agricultural vehicles speeding through Scotlandwell, while PCC understands that Portmoak is an agricultural area, often farm vehicles are heavily laden and travelling well in excess of 20mph.

Contradictory signage along the A911: roundels with conflicting information. It needs correction and more repeaters between Church Hall and Scotlandwell were required. These are known and an outstanding issue.

Hedges: PCC were pleased to note that the hedge along the pavement between Kinnesswood and Easter Balgedie has been cut back by the local farmer. Along the path between Scotlandwell and the Church, the undergrowth has grown to the extent that in places pedestrians have to step onto the road to get past. A resident reported they had been hit by a car wing mirror whilst walking along the path and having to step into the road. Police Liaison confirmed that in such an instance the driver should stop and should ideally be reported to Police to aid statistics. Callum Purves confirmed he has raised a request with PKC to have this stretch of hedge cut back.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie

Cllr A Davidson reported Glenlomond water had not been cut off recently. Problem with sewage works: a specialist company has quoted £20k+VAT to complete repairs which is unaffordable to the villagers. The village is currently researching possible sources of grant funding, while still pursuing Scottish Water to adopt the system. Cllr C Purves suggested this was difficult as grant sources aren't available for what the council would consider private issues, but it is a topic Cllrs can raise with the council.

Portmoak Primary parking issues: Cllr DMorris will write to D McKeown at PKC about the outstanding issues

Friar Place, Scotlandwell; hedge height reducing visibility: Cllr S Forde had been due to follow up but was not in attendance. Cllr A Miller had made enquiries with Friar Place residents at Friar Place and reported that they are not experiencing an issue with the hedge encroaching visibility on exiting Friar Place. PKC have sent planning officers to site multiple times and have not highlighted a sight line issue. Cllr A Miller raised a motion to remove this item from the agenda. Cllr D Paterson seconded this. Two other CC members agreed with this motion.

New Matters

Portmoak Community Council By-Election, new PCC members: the recent by-election had resulted in 3 additional full members of PCC. The Chair welcomed Cllrs A Miller and D Paterson to the CC. Cllr Davidson had also become a full member having previously been co-opted.

Grahamston Road signage for no vehicle access to LLHT and speed limit: W Robertson suggested that the CC may be able to help residents with funding for formal signage and ask local people about the scale of the issue. D Morris did not think this was a task for the CC as all signage on private land was primarily a responsibility of landowners.

Reports

Police Reports: Mark Craig, Police Liaison, was in attendance and gave a summary. Local policing plan included enforcing

speed limits along A911. Daily encouragement for patrols to do speed checks. Police reports: several speeding drivers have been stopped, including one charged with dangerous driving. There had been a road traffic collision outside Old School Cottage in Scotlandwell. A break-in had occurred at Portmoak Primary School. Regular patrols had been attending at the Sluice House and Burleigh Sands speaking to campers, reminding them of their responsibility to leave their campsites tidy. Mountain Rescue had been called to John Knox's Pulpit. Joint effort between MR, Fire &Rescue and Ambulance services: a teenager had fallen from a height, but fortunately they are safe and well.

Planning

New Applications:

21/01122/FLL P Kinrossshire Extension to dwellinghouse at 32 Whitecraigs Kinnesswood. Comments by 20-Aug-21: no CC comment.

Existing Applications:

21/00997/FLL Erection of 22 dwellinghouses, 3 garages and a garage with ancillary accommodation, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works (LDP site H54), land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens Scotlandwell. The date has passed for public comments. The CC noted that at the time of consideration of the planning application by the CC there was outstanding information, as indicated by PKC consultees. There are 25 comments, 22 in objection and 3 in support. The number of valid objections will push the application to review by the Planning and Development Management Committee. The CC have submitted a letter including a complaint that a time extension was not granted for PCC to discuss the application with residents and a special meeting had to be organised. There was opinion that designating H54 as building ground is questionable now that recent knowledge is available as to the high value of carbon sequestration in peat lands. Cllr D Morris felt the next action should be to take the objection to the Scottish Government.

At the Special Meeting on 27/07/21 the developers had admitted that they had submitted the application in order to pressurise SEPA. This questionable approach should be raised with the Scottish Government. PCC feels there is a fundamental question about whether H54 should remain in the local development plan as a site for development. All the zoning was done in a time prior to current knowledge and concerns about peat conservation and climate change. There was comment that it seemed conflicting to be planning to remove peat from H54 while 100m away at Portmoak Moss the raised bog and peatlands are being conserved. There is speculation that there could be as much as 3-4m of peat in the site that requiring removal and each plot could need to be investigated. Both environmental and physical impact of excavation and back fill are potentially huge and impactful

to local communities by way of extremely large numbers of construction vehicles travelling the A911.

PCC also noted concerns that these 22 houses are proposed to be built when there is still no safe walking route from Scotlandwell along to Portmoak Hall. All four Clirs were very keen that this off-road path should be created during their period of office which ends in Mar 2022. Cllr W Robertson agreed the land had been zoned without the appropriate path infrastructure in place. A resident expressed concern about large urban style developments in rural locations being disproportionate in size to the existing villages. Cllr W Robertson explained that in previous years policy was not to expand villages more than a certain percentage and by incremental growth, but this is policy is no longer in place. Cllr C Purves suggested that the main issue was directives from the Scottish Government with allocations of housing need required to be built in each area while building density is often in excess of the LDP guidance. In such instances the council and councillors are often operating with one hand tied behind their back.

There were concerns voiced by Cllrs and PCC that while housing was required, PKC Planning Officers need to assess what they need from the developer e.g. it was important to ensure the quality of the entire carbon footprint was assessed thoroughly and that new housing should be of a high environmental standard. Also that the size of the houses should be in alignment with the locale, and that there should be affordable housing created in every site, and correct application of housing policy followed. It was not acceptable for a commuted sum fee to be paid to PKC – according to PKC policy this is a final option, after on and off site affordable housing has been considered as the first option but PKC planning officers are ignoring the policy and making the commuted sum route the first option.

This means that the commuted sum usually is not routed back to create affordable housing in the same community.

Progress with Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Cllr K Donaldson reported no update. Next liaison meeting on Tue 21 September 2021.

Paths Group: The Paths Group has been busy this month with a focus on keeping the following paths clear of vegetation:

- Peat Loan from Grahamstone track to Portmoak Moss
- Dryside Road path from Easter Balgedie to Springfield Farm
- Michael Bruce Way (MBW) around the water tank to Esme's Gate and on up the steps
- MBW from Kilmagadwood Gate back along above the golf course
- MBW from The Napix to the hill gate
- Main routes across Stephens Field.

The Paths Group extended their thanks to Alistair from PKC Community Greenspace for bringing the flail machine along at the end of July to help make light work of the Peat Loan and Dryside Road paths.

Cllr CPurves voiced concerns that this will erode local control or influence over services. Cllr Dave Morris: At the PKC planning and development management committee meeting which considered the plot 5 housing application for the Lomond Inn site he raised the significance of the flooding issue. In Aug 20 the whole of the Main Street in Kinnesswood became a river as water flowed off Bishop Hill. Such flood water needs to escape from the Main Street before flooding houses and the best escape route

is the Lomond Inn site. This has potential implications for Plot 5 of Lomond Inn site and much larger implications for the proposed houses at the lower end of the site. The planning committee approved the application and ignored this flooding issue. Both the CC and PKC need to give this some further consideration.

Fossoway and District Community Council

News from the September Meeting

As it is still not possible to hold physical meetings of the CC we are continuing to publish this description of what was discussed in our Virtual meeting, including any updates that we are aware of. Members of the Public are encouraged to comment on and question the items below, by email to fossoway.cc@gmail.com or via the CC's Facebook page, which we will answer in our next meeting, be it virtual or physical, on Tuesday 5 October 2021.

Present at the meeting on 7 September were CCIIrs S Bruce-Jones, T Duffy, C Farquhar, C (Arwen) Haigh, M Haigh and N Marchant; CIIr C Purves, 3 members of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllrs Angus Cheape and Graham Pye; PC Ashley Mitchinson; Cllrs M Barnacle, W Robertson and R Watters.

Police Report

There were no incidents to note in our area since the last CC Meeting from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch. CCllr Duffy had specifically asked for more information in relation to the RTA near West Crook Way on 23 August but none was received.

Matters Arising

Bank of Scotland Closure: Cllr Purves and CCllr Marchant continue to make representations and reported that the Cambuslang Hub project was to be extended until 2023.

Community Development Trust: CCllr Marchant reported that the information displayed at the Gathering received a lot of attention and questions from public with good feedback. Fossoway Primary school have offered to promote information and additional engagement with Blairingone. Ideally the CDT would have 100 members but an initial minimum of 20 is needed. Next meeting is 29 September to analyse feedback.

Fossoway Gathering: CCIIr Duffy said that the Fossoway Gathering on 4 September was very successful, with in excess of 900 attending. All stalls reported good turn-out and sales and it was good to see so many members of the local and wider community attending. The CC congratulates the organising Committee for all their efforts. It was highlighted however that the Gathering needs more volunteers in particular for set up and break down of the event.

CCllrs Marchant and Bruce-Jones 'manned' the CC stall in conjunction with Cllrs Barnacle and Purves and reported good engagement with the public.

Fossoway and District Community Council Benefit Fund (a.k.a. Hydro Scheme Fund): CCIIr Duffy reminded everyone that the fund is open for applications, but stressed that potential applicants must read all the conditions fully before applying.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: The next meeting of the Transport Group will be in late September. An extensive questionnaire has been received from Scottish Govt on consultation on Public Transport, closing date 6 October. It was agreed that CCllrs M Haigh and Farquhar in conjunction with Cllr Barnacle prepare responses to the questionnaire on behalf of the CC.

Drummond Park Fire Hydrant: CCllr C Haigh has received information from the Dundee Fire Service regarding the Fire Hydrants in Crook of Devon. All Fire Hydrants have recently been assessed and refurbished as required.

4 Mowbray / 2 Naemoor Road / 17 Main Road / 2 St.Serfs Road / 1 West Crook / 1 Waulkmill / 1 Drum / 1 Kingfisher

The Hydrants are digitised and were updated five years ago, so when there is a fire in the area the Fire Service gets a GPS allocation to know exactly which is the best hydrant, if needed, and which has the best pressure for the fire. Scottish Water records how much water is running through the hydrant at any time. A Fire Hydrant Inspector visited all the Fire Hydrants and checked them all two days after our telephone call. The village is divided in two and the most appropriate fire fighting equipment is sent from Perth/Kinross/Fife or Clackmannan and Fife and perhaps Stirling.

In response to a question from a MoP it was advised that other villages should contact the Fire Service at Dundee which covers P&K as well as Dundee for details of number and location of hydrants.

A977 Mitigation Measures: Cllr Purves shared responses from Brian Cargill of PKC on updates to Mitigation Measures as follows:

School Road Junction — It is hoped to have the project passed to our preferred contractor (Tayside Contracts) in the next few weeks for programming. If Tayside Contracts are able to accommodate this project in their programme of works then we would hope to have this project ordered and ultimately delivered this calendar year. However, if Tayside Contracts cannot undertake the works in a reasonable timescale then we will then have to consider using alternative contractors to deliver the works. Either way we intend to have this project designed, ordered and delivered this financial year (before 31 March 2022).

Drum Signalisation – In the process of appointing a consultant to design the works and we hope to have procured a consultant's services in the coming weeks. Once the design work is complete the works will then be ordered and programmed for delivery. It is intended that the works will be carried out between Christmas 2021 and the end of the financial year (before 31 March 2022).

B9097 Realignment – In the process of appointing a consultant to design the works. Once the design work is complete the works will then be programmed and ordered. Given the road safety team's current workload and the volume of works currently in the Tayside Contracts programme of works it is intended that the works will be carried out early in the new financial year (1 April 2022 onwards).

Still no update on when the 20mph signage is to be installed.

CCIIr Duffy has contacted the Police to establish what is required and what implications are for placing the PC Bob Speed Check Cut-outs at various locations. Until that is received no action to be taken. The CC cannot fund these so the Community needs to do so but must have a designated person to facilitate.

Cllr Purves will make an application to request speed lines to the west of Crook of Devon and east of Powmill.


Return to Physical CC Meetings: The CC has been advised by PKC that as proceedings have been taken of all virtual meetings that it would be sufficient to submit a report of any significant decisions made during the virtual meetings to be signed off at the first physical meeting. CCllr Bruce-Jones will compile the report.

CCIIr Bruce-Jones has contacted the various Community Halls which are now taking bookings and confirmed the meeting in October at Crook of Devon Hall. Covid guidelines for indoor meetings will have to be followed including physical distancing and a QR poster for Check in Scotland.

New Business

Speeding in Carnbo: Representation received from MoPs on behalf of Carnbo regarding speeding on A91 and mitigation measures. Reported that 99% of residents had responded positively to the planned introduction of a 30mph limit for Carnbo but had questions regarding when it would happen, what enforcement measures would be included, what other factors were required such as street lighting, would the speed limit be extended to include the stretch outside the Village Hall and to the west past the Gelvan Road. Was this an issue for PKC or Scottish Office? Major issue that they wished highlighted was the speeds at which traffic approached on the straight stretches both east and west of Carnbo.

Cllr Purves responded that reference to Scottish Office was due to the application through Spaces for People. Ward Councillors did not agree with Council's view that it did not meet the Spaces for People Criteria and had continued to make representations. Reduction in limit to 30mph will go ahead and suggested that this will be completed by end March 2022. Street lighting was not a prerequisite of getting the limit in place nor would it be a consequence. The proposal to include the Village Hall in a 30mph limit was not included but he would put in an application to extend 40mph to before Hall. Flooding in Drum: CCIIr Bruce-Jones reported that she had received questions and concerns relating to the ongoing issue of flooding in Drum, in particular in light of recent planning applications. This included what were the implications for Drum being designated flood vulnerable, and was it feasible to suggest that a flood report should be included in all future planning applications for the Drum area. In the absence of Cllr Barnacle it was not possible to get a clear view and it was agreed to obtain further information for the next meeting.






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
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Community Council Business

Minutes Secretary: CCllr Duffy has written to PKC with a budget request, but there is no funding available, they suggested that we might approach local schools to see if one of the pupils might be interested. An advert has been placed through PKAVS on volunteer websites. CCllr Marchant has agreed to produce a 'job description' for a volunteer to be advertised at schools and social media channels. In the meantime it was agreed that CCllrs would take turns to take minutes.

CCIIr Cheape attended the Kinross Fund quarterly meeting. Six applications were considered and five grants totalling £10,000 were approved. A summary was provided by Catherine Francis, the new representative from Foundation Scotland:

Broke Not Broken: To contribute to the cost of establishing a school clothing bank to alleviate financial stress in disadvantaged families and reduce the amount of clothing going to landfill. £2000.00

Broke Not Broken: To cover the cost of day trips for disadvantaged families and enhance health and welfare. £2000.00

Friends of Wallace Park: To fund the building of three fitness stations as part of a wider programme to redevelop Wallace Park in Glenfarg. £2000.00

Friends of Portmoak School Parent Council: To fund playground equipment for Portmoak Primary School. £2,000.00

Kinnesswood in Bloom: To fund the installation of a shed to store tools and purchase new garden machinery. £2000.00 No applications were received from the Fossoway area.

CCIIr Nicola Marchant attended the Kinross-shire and Glenfarg Stronger Communities meeting where they were reminded that the new fire alarm standards are due to come into force in February 2022, when all homes will require one smoke alarm in the most frequently used room, one in every circulation space on each floor and a heat alarm in the kitchen. Alarms will need to be mounted on the ceiling and interlinked. Where there is a carbon-fuelled appliance, such as a boiler, fire or flue, in a room - a carbon monoxide detector will also be required. The Kinross Advice HUB is now operating again and the programme for September is available.

CCIIr Nicola Marchant shared the Fossoway and District Community Development Trust flyer with the group to help raise awareness.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Callum Purves: The Community investment Fund has closed for this month. As with previous years, the ward panel for Kinross-shire to determine which applications should receive funding comprises ward councillors, local action partnership members and a representative from each of the six local community councils. The funding determination meeting will take place virtually at 6 p.m. on Monday, 27th September. The applications will be available to view on-line in advance of the meeting via an on-line system.

The Kinross local committee held a good meeting with Council and hope to have formal submission to Council in October. CC representation will be required on the Committee.





In Syria, it is supplying hygiene kits, food baskets, teachers and school materials for children displaced by the hostilities.


In India, in addition to medicine and hygiene kits, they are providing oxygen cylinders for children affected by the Covid-19 crisis.

Thai Pumpkin Soup

This Thai pumpkin soup is an easy autumn warmer. It's a great way to use up the flesh from carved pumpkins around Halloween. You can go as spicy as you like by changing the amount of Thai red curry paste you use. Use the toasted pumpkin seeds to garnish and make it extra special.

Ingredients (serves 4)

1 small to medium pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and chopped

1 onion sliced

200ml coconut milk

500 ml vegetable stock

1 tblsp grated ginger

2-3 tblsp Thai red curry paste

lime juice for seasoning (optional)

2 tblsp vegetable oil

Sea salt (or soy sauce) and black pepper to season

Pumpkin seeds toasted

Method

Heat oven to 200°C. Toss the pumpkin or squash in a roasting tin with 1 tablespoon of oil then roast for 30 minutes until golden and tender.

Put the remaining oil in a saucepan with the onion and ginger. Cook on a medium heat for a few minutes till softened.

Stir in the curry paste for 1 minute, followed by the roasted pumpkin and all but 3 tablespoons of the coconut milk and stock. Bring to a simmer and cook for 5 minutes then blend till smooth.

Return to the pan to heat through, seasoning with pepper and optional lime juice. Serve drizzled with the remaining coconut milk and toasted pumpkin seeds if you have them.

October, in the orchard opposite Portmoak parish church (the field abin the kirk). We will be thoroughly Covid-19 safety conscious, so we're looking forward to what has become one of the favourite events in the woodland calendar. We're very pleased to have Andrew Lear, aka appletreeman, back with us, to help everyone identify the apples growing in their gardens. You need to bring an apple or two, as well as a twig and leaves from your tree.

If you have lots of apples (and the picture is quite a patchy one this year) bring them along to be turned into juice. It's best to rinse your apples and bring some containers for the juice.

Our apple-themed baking is always very popular. There will also be tea and coffee and children's drinks. It's a free event but donations will be very welcome, to cover our costs.

We're trying to be more eco-friendly so, if you can remember, do bring your own cup. Lots of people carry them these days.

Portmoak Woodland Community Group (PWCG). Jeff Gunnell led the walk round the restored wetland and the surrounding woodland. Along the way we learnt the story of peatland which goes back 6000 years, with a rich specialised habitat of sphagnum moss and heather that attracts bees. In summer months this area attracts different species of dragonflies and damselflies that take advantage of ditches and pools. We also learnt about the huge PWCG conservation efforts to preserve the habitat from invasive birch. Jeff told us about a major conservation project organised by PWCG that took place a few years ago to block the draining ditches and improve the moss microclimate. Those efforts restored the carbon storage capacity of this habitat, which was estimated to equate to a carbon footprint of 40,000 people. We all enjoyed the guided walk and would recommend the visit to this beautiful nature spot on Loch Leven by Scotlandwell.

In the preparation for COP26, we had two Climate Fringe Week events. Climate Fringe Week started on 18 September and our first event was called 'Voices from Loch Leven'; a multimedia online documentary production based on reflections of local people on climate change. The series of four short films is part of Climate Fringe Week and the first part was released on 20 September at 7pm via a link posted on our Facebook page, with successive parts following daily. If you are interested in watching but have no access to Facebook, please contact Gosia Stanton (details below).

The second event was a fundraising climate café stall at the next Kinross Farmer's Market in September. There were small up-cycled objects to buy, a raffle of homemade and zero-waste produce, seeds for sale and 'make an upcycled lampion' kids activity. Lockdown has highlighted the value to our mental health and general wellbeing of our weekly bridge sessions in Kinross and Milnathort. Although some of our members have been playing online, this is not a substitute for face-to-face bridge. The social aspect, the company of like-minded people and the spirit of friendly competition has been missed by us all.

Both clubs are currently working together, in conjunction with the Scottish Bridge Union, to establish a sound and safe policy for return to play. The SBU has issued a in-depth risk assessment document laying out how clubs across Scotland could operate.

The Milnathort and Kinross clubs, working with their venue managers, have adapted this to facilitate the safe return to club meetings for their members. The plans will be continually updated as circumstances change.

It is envisaged that a phased return will take place when the respective club committees feel it is safe to do so. Every member will be kept informed and additional help will be needed to carry out the extra work involved.

Kinross-shire Duke of Edinburgh (Open) Group

Our group is run wholly by parent volunteers and seeks to ensure that as many of our young people as possible get the opportunity to undertake the DofE Award, alongside those taking part through Kinross High School.

Over late spring and summer we have been busy supporting our current gold, silver and bronze cohorts through their respective awards. Expeditions with a difference (no overnight camping) were completed and our young people have been brilliant in conducting themselves whilst working towards such an amazing achievement.

Thanks go to all the volunteer parents and supporters who helping us succeed, despite the challenging conditions and restrictions presented by Covid-19. This shows that, with good planning and preparation, we can all achieve success.

A short description of their experience is given by two of our young people, Luke Volland and Lisa Robertson. Luke explained:

'I did my Silver DofE expedition with the Kinross-shire group in the Ochils. Most of the people in my group I had not spoken to that much in school before the expedition. The walks took place in my local area so I found the navigation to be fairly easy, it also helped that we managed to walk on three nice weather days.

My group got on really well together from the start of the first walk. We helped each other out with carrying the heavier loads and we also walked together as a group even if a couple of us thought we made a wrong turn. The walks were all around 15km long and we were set around 8 hours each day to complete them. I found this very good because it allowed us time to chill out and also to complete our aim as a group which was to investigate the different flora and fauna in our local area. Prior to the walks my group organised our own three course meal plan for each day of the expedition, which in theory would have been nice, but our cooking was slightly questionable! With lunch came the task that all the group were dreading: 'the food review'. After about 50 painfully embarrassing tries we managed to film something semi presentable. Overall, I found the expedition walks



much better than anticipated and have been encouraged to continue on to do my Gold DofE Award.'

Lisa describes her experience as follows:

I decided to do the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme because I had seen my older sister taking part in the expeditions and I wanted to have that experience too. For my bronze award, I developed my music skills by taking Grade 4 piano. For the physical part of the award, I had ballet lessons and passed Grade 5. Then I volunteered in the community selling fair trade. Our hikes gave us the opportunity to learn to work together as a team, cook on a trangia stove and put up tents. We enjoyed walking around the local area including Loch Leven and Benarty Hill.

The good thing about the Duke of Edinburgh award is that it is so varied. It has helped me think of ways to develop my own skills as well as encouraging me to find a way to help and volunteer locally. I would recommend it to other young people who are interested in gaining skills in navigation, map reading and team building. I would also recommend it to those who want to take themselves out of their comfort zone and try something new.'

Luke and Lisa highlight how they worked together to achieve their aim whilst also the importance of meeting new people and working as a team, as well as building respect, self-confidence and personal resilience. One of the key elements of DofE is also encouraging young people to make their own decisions and understand the results, and sometimes consequences, of these.

Our 2021-22 gold and direct silver groups are now started. By the time this Newsletter is out we will also have advertised for our new bronze (S3) cohort. Broke Not Broken

When you think things can't get busier, and then they do!

It has been a busy 18 months and we are

keeping up momentum making plans for the coming months. We are preparing for the food bank usage to increase, due to the combination of furlough stopping, fuel prices increasing, and the removal of the Universal Credit uplift. We have also had some issues buying in food where supplies are low. Our suppliers are having difficulty down the supply line, due to several factors including Covid-19 and Brexit. We have applied for funding to buy in more supermarket vouchers to ensure people can access the food that they need.

Over the school holidays we ran a School Uniform Bank. This was a huge amount of work, and we couldn't have done it without our volunteers really putting in a herculean effort. A total of 95 children accessed the service receiving a mix of

new and preloved items, as well as a voucher to put towards shoes or underwear and a new school bag.

We also ran the Tuesday Trips. This involved hiring a coach each Tuesday and taking households to a different location each week. Destinations included Aberdour beach, St Andrews, Tentsmuir Beach, The Scottish Deer Centre, Active Kids near Stanley, Kelpies and Camperdown Park. We included a packed lunch for each day and it was a huge success. The families all have difficulty accessing transport for many different reasons and the coach took them to places it can be tricky to access using public transport. We ensured we picked people up from all the outlying villages enabling great access to the project. We are planning to replicate these over the October holidays and one over Christmas as well.

Upcoming projects we are planning include:

Winter Clothing: £25 voucher per child to help with purchasing winter clothing and footwear.

Winter Warmer: Bundle including a slow cooker, vegetable bag and voucher for Hunter's butchers.

Christmas Helpers: Last year we gave out Argos vouchers to families to help mitigate debt over the Christmas period. We may do that again but offer a choice of vouchers, as well as set up an Amazon wishlist, to allow people to buy items for families as well.

Christmas Hampers: We are hopeful we can make this more of a community event this year. We are receiving guidance on that, and we are making smaller hampers again but, this time, adding vouchers for local food retailers including Baynes, Hunters, Sainsburys and so on.

Dental Support: Working with the community link worker, we are funding electric toothbrushes to help local children who have been struggling with accessing dentist services in Perth to maintain their dental hygiene. We continue to supply fresh fruit, vegetables and dairy products in food parcels, and have funding to keep doing so.

Meanwhile, the counselling service is active, and can work with up to 15 people. We have secured funding for this service for the next two years. The Advice Hub is getting more active now too with more groups attending the Health Centre on a monthly or weekly basis. The Recovery Café has been taken over by Hillcrest Futures who have funding to restart this much needed service.

We also co-ordinated two collections for Afghan Refugees, both emotional events. The amount of donations on both dates was staggering, and a real tribute to how welcoming and caring our community is; not just caring about our own community but the plight of others.

Finally, as a proud moment for us as volunteers, we were awarded our lovely Queen's Award for Voluntary Service crystal and certificate signed by The Queen in a ceremony officiated by both the Deputy Lord Lieutenant Andy Middlemiss, Lord Lieutenant Stephen Leckie and Dennis Melooy Provost of Perth and Kinross. It was a lovely event with trustees past and present, as well as a great showing from current volunteers, referral agents and council workers who helped us right back at the start when we were a constituted group. It was lovely to see these faces we haven't seen in so long still supporting us and being our cheerleaders. We are hoping to put the award on display at the Community Campus to share with everyone. See page 15 for more details of the evening.

We are so grateful to everyone who has been supporting us. Without you we really couldn't do any of this. And it is important to give these opportunities and services to people in our community. So this is a big thank you to all of you.

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

Annual General Meeting

The Trust held its AGM via email and online in late August. Here are brief summaries of some of the reports. More information is available on our website.

In his Chairman's report, Alistair Smith expressed sadness at the passing of Karol Swanson in May. Karol was a very active member of both the KCT Planning Committee and the Raingardens Challenge and will be much missed.

This year is the 30th anniversary of the foundation of the Kinross-shire Civic Trust. It was established with the objects of promoting and encouraging a public interest in, and care for, the beauty, history and character of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg. These aims are designed to help maintain the essential character of the area through the preservation, conservation, development and improvement of buildings in general.

The Trust is excited at the creation of the Raingardens Challenge as part of its commitment to improving the environment.

The Trust encourages good architecture with its Architectural Awards for new build, renovation and restoration of old buildings. Unfortunately we have not been able to identify any candidates for the awards this year.

The Awards committee also runs the Well Kept County Competition which has been running now for 55 years since its inception by Sir Robert Stewart in 1966. (Results of this year's competition were announced in last month's Newsletter.)

The Chairman thanked the KCT Planning Committee, Awards Committee, Executive Committee and members for their support over the past year.

Planning Report: In the Trust's year 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021, there were 180 Kinross-shire planning applications. The Trust submitted 15 objections and five letters of general comment.

Of the 15 applications we objected to, PKC approved seven, refused four and a decision is awaited for one. Three of the applications we objected to were withdrawn.

Of the five applications on which we made general comments, four were approved and one withdrawn.

What is heartening is that even where an application that we had objected to has been approved, in a number of cases – probably around a third – we can see that our concerns have

been taken into account. This might be in the form of the applicant being required to submit additional information, or a condition being attached to the planning consent.

Office bearers: Alistair Smith, Eileen Thomas and Ken Miles were returned as Chair, Secretary and Treasurer respectively.

Lathro Phase 2 and Play Area Provision

In January, the Scottish Government Reporter indicated he was minded to allow Persimmon's appeal against PKC's refusal of the developer's application for increased numbers of houses on phase 2 of the Lathro Farm development. The Reporter's decision was conditional on the developer and the Council registering a section 75 agreement within 13 weeks. There have been various delays to this but an email on the DPEA website indicates that the S75 agreement has now been signed. We can therefore expect the Reporter to issue the final grant of appeal very soon.

In September, contractors for Persimmon were preparing to erect play equipment next to the SUDS pond in phase 1 of Lathro Meadows. Persimmon were supposed to build a temporary play area here before the occupation of the first dwelling in phase 1! The permanent play area is to be in phase 2.

When the Trust raised Persimmon's failure to provide a play area with PKC earlier this year, we were told that the Council saw little merit on insisting upon play provision at the temporary location and would instead seek to bring forward the permanent play area early in the phase 2 development. (Under the conditions listed by the Reporter, the permanent play area need not be provided until occupation of the 100th house in phase 2.)

We were also told that the Council had health and safety concerns due to the proximity of the SUDS pond. Why, then, in 2017 did planning officers recommend approval of the application for the temporary play area in this location?

Raingardens Update

Several exciting developments since the last update. At last the wildflowers sown in the sandy soil infiltration trenches at Loch Leven's Larder are in bloom and looking good, bringing colour into the greyness of the car park, and stabilising the soil.

Experts from Buglife and Tayside Biodiversity Partnership, visiting (and working) as part of a Hands-on Workshop

looking at four of the raingarden sites in Kinross, remarked on the variety of wildflowers and their value as pollinators (see article elsewhere in this issue).

We have enjoyed working with Kinross in Bloom looking at raingarden opportunities, notably at Springfield Road and the Park and Ride. Plans for improvements to the Park and Ride, as outlined in earlier *Newsletter* articles, are well advanced now. We are getting quotes for a simple barrier fence to run along the far side of each of the three grass strips there, to stop cars being driven directly across when they leave. The damaged compacted grass is to be stripped and soil level lowered – hopefully sufficiently to allow the rainfall runoff from the car park to enter the new raingarden features to be created there.

Hopefully the new raingardens will help improve the appearance of the site where visitors to Kinross by bus arrive and get their first perception of the town.

Elsewhere we have been looking at opportunities to extend the work with local schools, following the success at Portmoak Primary school (helped by volunteers from Kinnesswood in Bloom). It would be great to have some raingarden projects in Milnathort and we'd welcome contact from anyone who might be able to help find opportunities there.

The same applies regarding the High School. Across from the community campus is an area of grass managed by conventional (expensive) frequent mowing. It is bounded by roads on three sides so not a safe area for ball games etc. But it has an eroded edge alongside the access road into the Loch Leven Health Centre which could be made into a wildflower swale and little wetland, and the grass area itself could be managed as a wildflower meadow, with involvement and teaching opportunities for the school? Again, anyone interested please contact us.

For the monthly round up of race results, club members attended various park runs all over the UK. The runners were



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



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

NatureScot Loch Leven NNR



JUST SWANNING AROUND

WE ARE NOW IN the heart of autumn, pink-footed goose numbers are building and they can be seen feeding in the fields around Kinross & Milnathort. The leaves are starting to change colour; look out for the yellow leaves of the aspen and the dark-red leaves of the gean (wild cherry).

The early morning, crisp sunrises are now accompanied by the honking calls of the wintering whooper swan. October will see the peak arrival of our whooper swans. These majestic swans can be told apart from their familiar, resident cousins by the colour of their bill and the noises that they make. Whooper swans have a bright yellow bill, unlike our usual mute swans with their orange bill. Whooper swans also have a noisy, 'honking' call

compared to the aptly named mute swans which only hiss and grunt. the whooper swans that winter in the UK come from Iceland. These birds fly over the Atlantic Ocean to our shores to escape the cold, harsh arctic winters. They provide an atmospheric soundscape to Loch Leven NNR!

Numbers of wildfowl on the loch is now at its peak. We can get counts of 5000 coot, 1500 greylag geese, 1200 mallard, 800 mute swan, 15,000 pink-footed geese, 400 pintail, 500 pochard, 4000 teal, 6000 tufted duck, 800 whoopers and so much more in October! The loch can see up to 60,000 birds on it. A truly important, international migration and wintering station!

As well as the honking of the 'whoopers', large numbers of teal and wigeon also add to the soundscape of the loch. Most of these birds have migrated from the Baltic/Scandinavia and Siberia. We can get over 200,000 teal and 400,000 wigeon wintering in the UK. In recent years, the highest count of wigeon on the loch was 3299 and the highest count of teal was 9324. The calls of these fabulous ducks can provide a wonderful atmosphere as you walk around the Loch. The call of the wigeon is a wonderful whistle and teal make a lovely high-pitched 'pleep-pleep' call. The sound of winter at Loch Leven NNR!

The woodlands are coming alive with autumn wildlife! Levenmouth woods are full of big winter flocks of siskin, blue-tit,



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coal tit, long-tailed tit and great tit. The birch that dominates Levenmouth Wood is turning into a lovely golden colour. Fungi is littering the floor at the moment! Ian our seasonal member of staff found a lovely mushroom called an amethyst deceiver. This deep violet mushroom is found in woodlands across the UK, especially in ones with beech. Worth keeping an eye out for this small, purple treasure!

Latest wildlife highlights from the loch include; 3 ruff, 29 black-tailed godwit, 13 dunlin, slavonian grebe, amethyst deceiver, whooper swan, 34 pintail, 38 shoveler and red squirrels feeding on the beech mast!

STEPS TO IMPROVEMENT

AS THE LEAVES BEGIN to change colour and the nights draw in, a familiar feeling of autumn creeps into the reserve at RSPB Loch Leven. We have had some excellent bird of prey action this month, including five ospreys, marsh harrier, kestrel, and buzzard. Migrant waders have begun to arrive now too, with a mixture of black tailed godwit, greenshank, and dunlin along the edge of the strip. Teal, wigeon, shoveler and mallard have been

seen out on the loch, and little grebe, great crested grebe, moorhen, and water rail have been spotted around the flood. We have also had a visit from a shorteared owl seen around the bog, just left of the flood from the Carden hide!

The reserve team have been hard at work dealing with summer management. This includes drawing down the water levels of the wetlands to further expose areas of land and provide lots

of muddy habitat for migrant waders. Other work that has been underincludes taken the re-seeding of areas of the new car park with wildflower, strimming along the predator fence, invertebrate surveys, and the cutting back of vegetation over the paths. We have also been working on the new pond dipping decking in the secret garden to provide a great

place for kids to go looking for newts and other creatures of the deep!

We have our annual Halloween treasure trail starting again this month too from 11-31 October. Carlin Maggie the old witch of Bishop Hill is back, and she's left some items lying around Loch Leven! Can you help find them in our spooky Halloween treasure hunt? Pick up your treasure pack at the visitor centre and see how many objects you can find! Drop in anytime between 10am-4pm, no booking required, £3.50 per pack.

We are pleased to say the project to renovate our visitor centre is still on track to be completed for mid-October. A wider part of the project also includes the painting of a mural on the steps leading up to the visitor centre from the underpass by artist Chris Rutherford. This is due to be finished soon, so please stop by our coffee cabin to have a look at the final masterpiece. You can see regular updates of this via our social media pages. In the meantime, please continue to visit our pop-up shop located in the car park and follow our diversion to the coffee cabin to visit our wetlands and hides.

Gardening

WINDING DOWN TO WINTER

THE NIGHTS ARE FAIR drawin' in, aren't they? As I write this, the trees are starting to turn and there's a distinct chill in the air. It'll soon be time to turn the heating on and look out the cosy jammies to see myself through the winter.

Until then... there's still lots to do before the ground gets too cold and everything gets locked up for the winter.

You've still got plenty of time to plant up spring-flowering bulbs, which is probably just as well as I haven't done mine yet. Tulip bulbs will be going into pots as soon as I've taken out my

summer bedding plants. As a general rule, tulips are usually rubbish after the first year (two at the most), unless they're a variety that naturalises (spreads). I usually buy fresh bulbs each year and plant the old bulbs in a corner of the garden to be used as cut flowers come the spring - if they decide to bloom a second time. Replacing bulbs every year probably isn't the most envi-



ronmentally friendly approach so next year I'll be looking for bulbs which naturalise – we each need to do our bit.

Over the next few weeks, I'll be planting out my polyanthus – the plug plants were bigger than expected and they've bulked up enough to be planted now – I went for a really bright, colourful mix so they should look great – and they'll come back every year.

October's also a good time to carry on lifting/dividing and pruning back your perennial plants and shrubs. If you have



late flowering perennials such as Rudbeckia, you generally need to wait until spring to lift. But others can be done now, like Lupins and Hostas. Of course, you don't have to cut back any of your perennial plants until the spring you can leave the foliage in place to shelter wildlife over the winter. After tidying your borders for the winter it's usually a good idea to

mulch with bark chips, spent mushroom compost or manure – this insulates the plant roots for the winter and keeps weeds in check – that's always a good thing!

You can also carry on collecting seeds from your annual flowers for use next year – just remember to label them or come spring, you'll have lots of 'mystery' trays of seedlings –



yep, been there, done that!

If you have any roses, you can probably give them a prune back about now, especially climbing roses. This will encourage more side growth next year and produce many more stems to flower from. If you also add some well-rotted manure to the base, you'll get a stunning display next year. Shrub roses can also be given a bit of a trim – this removes the unseemly dead heads and will also reduce the likelihood of 'wind rock' over the winter, which can damage the roots.

Tender perennials will also be making their way indoors this month – Fuchsias and Begonias – the Fuchsias will stay in their pots in the greenhouse (with all foliage trimmed off), the Begonias will be dried out slightly and foliage removed, wrapped in paper and overwintered in a cool, dry place.

So, October in short – pruning, mulching, dividing, composting and overwintering.

It's that time of year when we're winding down to winter that I wrap this column in fleece and shove it into the back of the shed—ready to be dusted off and the cobwebs removed in the spring. So, enjoy your time in the garden and I look forward to seeing you all again next year, ready to start all over again.

I'll leave you with some photos of my favourite flowers this year – Begonias, Hydrangeas and Dahlias.

Farming

A CHANGE IS AS GOOD AS A REST



EVER HEARD THE SAYING 'Get off the farm once a day, get out of the parish once a week and out of the county once a month'? A farm adviser shared it with me one day and I think it's a marvellous mantra for farmers and a good recipe for balancing out the demands of farm life.

My own Dad farmed on his own for many years and devoted long hours to build up his farming business, both he and Mum, in her own career, worked very hard without much time off. Bankhead isn't remote, but like many farms it could be easy to work away and go for days without seeing anyone.

However, Dad set me a great example and broke up his long hours by getting off the farm. He always popped to the village to pick up the daily papers and half a dozen fresh rolls for lunch and before he retired (semi-retired) he sold lambs most weeks at the Cally Mart in Stirling.

Some farmers drop the lambs and head home but many others, including Dad, make a point of seeing the lambs weighed and grabbing a bite to eat at the mart cafe, before going through to the ringside to view the sale. Dad knew all the buyers and developed a good understanding of what kind of lambs they liked and what was selling best. He also en-

joyed a regular catch up with the other sellers, making a lot of friends who he looked forward to seeing each week.

As for the 'out of the county once a month' part of the saying, I think many of the trips further afield were associated with picking up spare parts to fix machinery break-downs rather than a monthly theatre outing. Whatever the reason, the trips into Fife or over the Forth Bridge were a good opportunity to see what was happening in the rest of the country before returning refreshed to the farm.

Nowadays many jobs on farms are mechanised and as such more farmers work alone than ever before. When you combine lone working with the impact of Covid restrictions that have kept us all at home and farmers away from auction markets and agricultural events, it's not surprising that the helpline run by the Royal Scottish Agricultural Benevolent Institute (RSABI), a farming support charity, has been busier than ever taking calls from farm and rural folks who are struggling to cope with isolation and loneliness.

With this in mind, I jumped at the chance to join my friend Tricia who was looking for a challenge to raise funds for the charity. We hatched a plan that

would see us burst the boundary of Kinross-shire and venture west to pick up her teaching colleague, Sharon, before travelling on to the Trossachs to embark on our adventure. With a packed lunch safely in our rucksacks, a set of walking poles and a pair of sunglasses each we left the car park at Strathyre by 9.45am to embark on our climb of Ben Ledi.

The fundraiser is an annual event usually taking place in the Great Glen but this year it did not have a set format, so we chose hill walking and worked our way up the west side of Ben Ledi slowly and steadily, climbing through the clouds and on through a never ending set of carefully laid stone steps before reaching the summit about 12.45. It was certainly worth the climb, the clouds cleared to let the sun out revealing wow factor 360 degree views; we felt on top of the world in so many ways.

The saying recognises the importance of getting away for a wee while, giving yourself a chance to clear your head and recharge your emotional battery before the next farming shift begins. Thanks Tricia for challenging me and I'm pleased our efforts will help to keep the rural helpline going. 

- For anyone under 18 to possess fireworks in a public place.
- For anyone other than a fireworks professional to possess display category fireworks.
- To cause unnecessary suffering to any domestic or captive animals.

DISPOSAL OF FIREWORKS

Used fireworks should be soaked for a few hours in water before placing in a plastic bag in the general refuse bin.


It was with great excitement that we travelled by coach to Edinburgh to witness the opening of the General Assembly in 2015, and Angus installed as Moderator

If you have any fireworks which did not work, do not return to them. At the end of the display faulty fireworks should be soaked, bagged and binned.

FIRE & ALCOHOL DON'T MIX! DON'T go near bonfires or fireworks whilst under the influence of alcohol.

BONFIRES & THE LAW

It is an offence to lay or light a fire in a public place so as to endanger any other person or give them reasonable cause for alarm or annoyance or so as to endanger any property. If you know anything about fires that have been started deliberately, call Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Fly tipping is a major cause of fire. If you see fly tipping contact your local authority. Visit www.dumb-dumpers.org for more info.

KEEP A SAFE DISTANCE

There are two categories of fireworks you can legally buy, CAT F2 and CAT F3.

CAT F2: Stand at least 8 metres away for safety. CAT F3 fireworks have a minimum distance of 25 metres, or about 82 feet. CAT F4 fireworks are NOT for private use. Make everyone aware of safe distances.

BONFIRE SAFETY ADVICE

If you have a bonfire at home make sure it is well away from anything flammable. Ensure smoke does not cause a nuisance.

FIREWORKS CODE

Only adults should set up firework displays, light and dispose of fireworks. Children should be supervised, and watch at a safe distance.

SPARKLERS

Sparklers burn at 1000°C-1600°C, over 10 times hotter than boiling water.

- Supervise children and never give sparklers to a child under five.
- · Light sparklers one at a time and

wear gloves.

- Put used sparklers hot end down into a bucket of sand or water.
- 1 Plan your firework display to make it safe and finish by 11pm.
- 2 Only buy fireworks with the CE mark, keep them in a closed metal box take them out one at a time.
- 3 Follow the instructions on each firework – read them in daylight or by torchlight, never by naked flame.
- 4 Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 5 Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- 6 Never return to a firework once it has been lit even if it hasn't gone off it could still explode.
- 7 Don't put fireworks in pockets and **NEVER** throw them.
- 8 Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- **9 NEVER** use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.

Make sure the fire is out and surroundings are safe before leaving.

- Never drink alcohol near fire or fireworks. NB it is an offence to consume alcohol in a public place.
- To reduce the emission of harm-

ful smoke and combustion bonfires should comprise of untreated wood and paper based materials only.

- There is a danger of explosion from pressurised containers or sealed vessels.
- **NEVER** throw fireworks on bonfires.
- **NEVER** use flammable liquids to ignite bonfires
- Smoke must not pose a public nuisance, affect visibility on roads or inconvenience traffic.
- Sparks, flying embers or burning debris must not endanger property.
- **NEVER** leave a smouldering bonfire unsupervised make sure it is completely extinguished.
