it's great to see how busy it has been. We are lucky to have continued expansion of our superb local shops and I am sure the community will support them as best we can during this difficult time.

Of course, you could always drop one in yourself if you are passing. It might make their day!

The Kinross-shire community, and Glenfarg in particular were saddened to hear about the tragic death of sixteen-year-old Sonny Hoggan in January. The news of his death devastated the wider community who had pulled together to assist police in their search for him. He was well-loved in Glenfarg and beyond, with many friends at Kinross High School. He will be sadly missed. My heart goes out to his family.

Letters

Lay Off The NHS

I RECEIVED A PROMOTIONAL pamphlet, PRI Is One Of Our Most Precious Assets, from Liz Smith, Conservative MSP, towards the end of November. I contacted her to say that I found some of her comments about the NHS to be deeply divisive.

While rightly praising clinical staff, she then raised the trope of the 'unwieldy bureaucracy of the NHS' which the pandemic has apparently highlighted. Since March I have had non-COVID-related reasons to visit my local health centre, Perth Royal Infirmary, and Ninewells; all these experiences have been entirely satisfactory, which is admirable given the challenges to the NHS of coping with the pandemic.

I am not involved with NHS management, but I do have close to four decades of management experience in large organisations around the world and, based on that, what I see is evidence of capable, dedicated, hard-working managers and administrators.

This group of people appear to have coped well with limited budgets and over-stretched staff, while adapting to constantly moving targets during the worst health crisis the world has faced in a century.

I found Ms Smith's casual dismissal of their efforts to be ill-advised; goodness knows what reading this must feel like to those working in NHS services such as logistics, procurement, pharmacy, transport, building management, or finance.

In her response to me Ms Smith merely highlighted that she had received genuine complaints from constituents and did not address my concerns about her attack on NHS Tayside's non-clinical staff. I do not doubt that she has received constituent concerns with NHS experiences: most of us have had negative experiences at one time or another (my father died 3 months into a 9-month cardiac surgery waiting list in 1994).

I am sure there is room for improvement in NHS Tayside; it would be the first large organisation I have come across where that was not the case.

However, before blithely accusing those who run the NHS operations of 'submerging' our frontline staff in bureaucracy that (and I cannot believe she wrote this) 'could be almost as deadly a disease as the virus itself', she might want to pause and have a look at what the UK Government has been doing with our money in securing PPE for the NHS.

According to the BMJ, 'three of the biggest beneficiaries of government contract awards were companies specialising in jewellery (Saiger), pest control (Pestfix) and an opaque 'family office' owned through a tax haven (Ayanda)'.

The Saiger contract reportedly involved payment to a commercial intermediary of over £37 million – for perspective that is a fixer's fee equivalent to over 4% of the annual NHS Tayside budget. This is the type of waste that Ms Smith might want to highlight to colleagues in her party, rather than attacking the efforts of the people who continuously strive to facilitate clinical efficacy and efficiency.

Not Just A Cycle Path

AS A REGULAR USER of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail, I have become increasingly concerned by the behaviour of a minority of cyclists using this facility. The trail is a mixed-use route, with walkers, cyclists, wheelchair users and others shar-

ing what is a relatively narrow path with limited space for passing. Unfortunately, some cyclists appear to believe that they have priority over other users, refusing to slow down when passing walkers and expecting right of way into the bargain. Their attitude, when confronted, seems to confirm this. Some, I suspect, are using the Strava app for timekeeping purposes and this is completely inappropriate for what is intended to be primarily a nature-focused route. I would emphasise that most cyclists are considerate and polite but a certain number are spoiling it for everyone. It would be a pity if we had to have prominent notices reminding users of their responsibilities but ultimately this might be the only solution.

POLITICIANS IN ONGOING FIGHT TO KEEP BoS IN KINROSS

THE BANK OF SCOTLAND in Kinross is to close its doors permanently on 22 March, leaving Kinross without a single bank branch and causing serious concerns for local residents, for whom the nearest branch of the Bank of Scotland will now be in Cowdenbeath.

Councillor Callum Purves and Liz Smith MSP want answers on a range of issues from Bank of Scotland bosses following the decision to shut the Kinross branch.

The politicians are seeking a meeting with senior bank officials to discuss various unresolved matters after being told the branch will close its doors on March 22.

They last spoke to Bank of Scotland officials in September 2020, via a virtual meeting, when they highlighted how closing the Kinross branch would seriously impact local residents.

The Bank of Scotland granted a temporary stay of execution for the branch last year after Covid-19 swept across the country.

Councillor Purves, who represents the Kinross-shire ward, said: 'I am very concerned to hear that the Bank of Scotland is planning to close the Kinross branch when it looks like the lockdown will continue for months.

'The closure of the Kinross branch will have a huge impact on local residents. My colleague, Liz Smith, and I are seeking a further meeting with the Bank of Scotland to address a number of issues.

'These include the fact that we were told that the mobile branch would be operational in Kinross six weeks prior to closure and that existing staff would be on hand to help customers with the transition. However, I believe these mobile branches are not operating under Tier 4 restrictions. So, we want to know how this fits with the now confirmed closure date.

'In addition, we were also offered the opportunity to see the facilities during this transition.

Councillor Purves continued: 'The Co-op is still operating a one in, one out system during peak periods, which

will make it more difficult for people to use the banking facilities at the Post Office located within that shop. There have been a number of reports online over the past few weeks that people in Kinross-shire have been unable to deposit money at the Post Office, which is clearly a concern with the impending closure.'

And Liz Smith MSP added: 'We are seeking a meeting as soon as possible to raise these issues with senior staff at the Bank of Scotland. This branch closure will result in major changes for banking for local residents, with the

Bank of Scotland stating the nearest available branch will be Cowdenbeath once Kinross closes.

'Public transport in parts of rural Kinross-shire is not great and many residents who live in the likes of Powmill, Crook of Devon and Rumbling Bridge could spend hours having to travel on buses to get to a bank; many of them will be reluctant to do so because of the lockdown measures and concerns over the virus.'

Councillor Purves and Liz Smith MSP have been working with Fossoway Community Council on this matter.

New Year's Honours For Kinross Residents


THE KINROSS HONOURS keep on coming – now two Kinross residents have received recognition in the Queen's New Year's Honours List.

For his contribution of over 20 years to the ex-services community in Perth and Kinross, Lt Col Andy Middlemiss has been recognised by Her Majesty The Queen in the New Year's Honours list with the award of a British Empire Medal (BEM). Andy is Chairman of the local branch of SSAFA (The Armed Forces Charity) which helps servicemen and their families in need. He is a Vice President of the Service children's charity (The Royal Caledonian Education Trust) and he runs the Poppy Appeal in Kinross. In 2020, SSAFA carried out over 100 cases in the county, ranging from debt, homelessness, employment, housing, drink and drugs issues, mobility, and increasingly, mental health and loneliness challenges.

Andy said: 'I am honoured, humbled, surprised and very touched to be recognised by the remarkable lady, who I have worked for since I was 18, HM The Queen, for doing something close to my heart, all my life. That is the care for, and support, of my fellow members of HM Forces, and crucially their families. My wife Jo always says 'The men may be the soldiers, but the wives are the warriors' - so true!'

I accept it on behalf of all the terrific SSAFA volunteers, and all the very good friends I have had the pleasure of working with in SSAFA, UK and worldwide, for over 20 years.

serve it. There is no I in team, so this fantastic BEM award is for you - SSA-FA Team.'

The British Empire Medal (BEM) was established in 1922 and is awarded for meritorious civil or military service, worthy of recognition by the Crown. The BEM was awarded to subjects of the United Kingdom until 1992, after which time it lay in abeyance in the United Kingdom. It was specifically re-instated in June 2012, for HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, specifically to reward and honour those who work in the charitable, and voluntary sectors.

MBE FOR FIONA IN HONOURS LIST

FIONA SYMON, THE TIRELESS campaigner for recognition and remembrance of the loss of HMT *Lancastria*, the maritime tragedy that cost the lives of thousands of civilians and service personnel at the onset of World War Two, has been awarded an MBE for 'Services To Maritime Heritage' in the New Year's Honours list.

Fiona, of Kinross, was instrumental in gaining official acknowledgement of the tragedy, and persuading the government to reveal more of the details behind the event.

Her father, Andrew Richardson, was one of the victims of the sinking of the troopship, an ocean-going liner that was sunk by the Luftwaffe in 1940 while rescuing British personnel from France. The total number of dead exceeds that of the *Titanic* and the *Lusitania* combined, although the official death toll has still never been revealed.

Mrs Fiona Symons, MBE told the Newsletter, 'I am greatly honoured and feel extremely humble in receiving this MBE. This honour marks the recognition we all worked to achieve. The families I have met have enriched my life and many have become treasured friends.'

Green Light For Controversial Appeals

DISMAY HAS GREETED THE news that the green light seems to have been given to increase the numbers originally agreed for the controversial housing developments in Kinross and Milnathort.

Kinross Civic Trust expressed their disappointment that 'official confirmation has been published that Springfield's appeal over Pitdownies has been allowed by the Reporter and planning permission has been granted'. The Pitdownies development has been subject to a continued tussle over the number of homes to be built, with many local objections raised over the insufficiency of the planned access, pressure on local health and education services and the detrimental effect on the water quality in Loch Leven.

The same objections were raised when Persimmon Homes appealed the ruling that refused an additional 169 houses in their Lathro Farm development.

Both appeals, despite objections from Community Councils, Perth & Kinross Council and many local people, went before the Scottish Government Reporter, who passed the appeals for both proposals after Perth and Kinross Council had refused to allow the controversial plans.

Kinross-shire councillors from all parties had expressed concerns about over-development in the area and the effect more houses would have on the water quality of Loch Leven. There were more than 170 objections to the plan to extend the development at Lathro Farm.

Commenting on the decision, Councillor Callum Purves, said: "This is a democratic outrage. Local residents are sick to the back teeth of unelected Scottish Government bureaucrats riding roughshod over local democracy and overturning decisions taken by local councillors.

"This latest application for the Lathro

Meadows development tries to cram yet more houses onto a site that is already bursting at the seams and completely throws the Local Development Plan out the window. It fails to have any regard for concerns about Loch Leven, drainage, road safety or pressure on local infrastructure in Kinross and wider Kinross-shire.'

Liz Smith MSP added: 'We are seeing 10 or 15 years' worth of development being built in just a few years in Kinross-shire. This decision to uphold the appeal on Lathro will put further pressure on both the primary and high schools as well as the health centre, which has more patients following the closure of the GP practice at Bridge of Earn.

'When there is development on this scale, we need to see local infrastructure upgraded before the houses are built. This sadly just isn't happening in the case of Lathro Meadows.'

IT'S FISHY IN THE HIGH STREET!

KINROSS HIGH STREET is flourishing with new businesses! Hot on the heels of The Long Spoon Larder deli is a new fish shop, The Fresh Fish Place, which has made its home in the former Kintronics premises. Both businesses have been waiting a long time to get to Kinross, delayed by the Covid-19 restrictions. Kinross is delighted to have them with us and their customers and other local businesses alike have welcomed them with open arms.

The owners, John and Hazel Stephen, (who already

have shops in Alloa, Bathgate, Dunfermline, Falkirk, Grangemouth and Stirling) were delighted to finally open their Kinross shop to customers on Tuesday 12 January. Coming from generations of fishermen, and born in Peterhead, their dads and grandads were fishermen too. John himself was at sea for 15 years, the last five as skipper of his own trawler.

FIGHTING FOR FAST BROADBAND FOR KINROSS-SHIRE

READ MORE ABOUT HOW to claim your Government funded voucher (worth up to £3500) and get involved in this exciting community-led project.

What is Gigabit Kinross-shire?

The December 2020 Ofcom 'Connected Nations' broadband report highlights the digital divide between urban and rural areas. In Edinburgh, 85% of properties enjoy ultrafast broadband (100 mbps or faster) and 40% can get gigabit broadband (1000 mbps or faster). This compares with 7.3% ultrafast and 4.7% gigabit in Kinross-shire – more a digital chasm than a digital divide.

Gigabit Kinross-shire is a community organisation established to secure government funded gigabit broadband upgrades (download speeds of more than 1000 mbps) for homes and businesses throughout Kinross-shire. Gigabit Kinross-shire comprises representatives from local groups and is supported by a range of voluntary organisations and businesses as well as by Perth & Kinross Council.

How Does It Work?

The Scottish Government is running a country-wide scheme ('Reaching 100%' / 'R100') to upgrade rural areas where internet speeds are less than 30 Mbps, and private companies are installing full-fibre broadband in cities and larger towns. Both these initiatives miss out larger villages and smaller towns such as Kinross, Milnathort, Crook of Devon, Kinnesswood and Glenfarg – and this is where Gigabit Kinross-shire comes in.

The UK Government has a voucher scheme that fully funds gigabit broad-

band upgrades. Each property (not already covered by 'R100') is eligible for a voucher; £1500 for private residences and £3500 for businesses (Small and Medium Enterprises, including self-employed and sole traders registered at private residences). Through residents and businesses pooling sufficient vouchers to cover installation costs, full-fibre upgrades can be carried out at zero cost to home and business owners in that community/area.

In pledging your voucher, you will commit to a 12-month subscription for a telephone and broadband service from the company installing the full fibre connection. This will be on similar terms and costs as your current service. And, after the first 12 months, you can switch to another broadband supplier.

Why Would I Want A Gigabit Connection?

At a time when more of us have been working from home, we are becoming more reliant upon internet connections. Download and upload speeds are important for conference calls, transferring large files or streaming media, but they are not the only benefits. Full-fibre [to the premises] is far more reliable than traditional copper broadband; speeds do not drop when more people are online at the same time, and full-fibre is not affected by adverse weather as copper lines can be.

How Do I Get Involved?

You can get more information, check your eligibility and register your interest for a free upgrade by visiting our website at *kinross-shire.org* and our Facebook page at *www.facebook.com/gigabitkinross*

The more people that sign up, the more likely upgrades will be possible in your area. We also need 'Community Broadband Champions' (CBC) who will help co-ordinate projects locally and drum up more support. So, if you want to be a CBC, please let us know when you sign up.



IN FEBRUARY 2020 KINROSS experienced 2 solid weeks of rain after storm Ciara and storm Dennis battered the country and the waterways were overwhelmed. The South Queich and the Clash Burn burst their banks and flooded a large area of south Kinross, forcing many residents out of their homes. The area was flooded again just six months later after a single night of thunderstorms and torrential downpour of rain.

One year later, a handful of residents have gathered to form the Kinross Flooding Resilience Group, which aims to deliver a community driven flood response to help minimise the risk and the impact of flooding on residents and businesses in the area.

To ensure that Kinross is prepared for the next flood that hits, they are looking to increase their membership and find volunteers willing to help with delivering a flood action plan to alert residents of an incoming flood, and deploy emergency resilience measures, such as sandbags, to at-risk properties.

FEARS OVER LOCH ICE

Reports of children playing too far out on a frozen Loch Leven have raised spectres of previous tragedies

A POLICE WARNING WAS issued for people to stay off the ice at Loch Leven and other open bodies of water in Kinross-shire, when freezing temperatures hit Kinross-shire in January. The warnings came as the usual winter cold spells tempted people to take to the ice throughout Kinross and in other parts of Scotland. Both children and adults were spotted walking on the frozen loch, a very dangerous activity.

Warning signs were placed at the main access points reminding locals that the ice at Loch Leven was not safe to walk on. A spokesperson from Loch Leven Nature Reserve commented, 'Sadly, when we get this type of weather, it is so easily marred by the tragic loss of life that can result from falling through the ice. Please remember that, yes, you may be confident the ice you are standing on is solid, but think also of the example you are setting to all of the children who are watching and may try the same on another occasion.'

While it may look really solid and therefore safe, ice rarely freezes uniformly. It may be a foot thick at one point and only an inch or two just a few feet away. Large, deep bodies of water take longer to freeze and ice near the shore may be weaker than ice further out. The insulating effect of snow also slows down the freezing process. Ice that is underneath the snow will be thinner and weaker than uncovered ice. When temperatures vary widely, causing the ice to thaw during the day and refreeze at night, the result is weak, unsafe ice.

So, those walking on it could have been in very serious danger of falling through – not only risking their own life but that of anyone else who would have to go to their rescue.

The only way to really know if ice is safe for walking is to drill or cut into it and take measurements of its thickness. It's thought that it should be at least 15 centimetres thick for a person to walk or skate, or 20cm thick for a group of people. The colour of the ice is also very telling. The strongest and safest colour of ice is either blue or black. This is the ice that forms as the surface of the lake or pond directly freezes in cold weather. As a result, it is very dense. If the ice is opaque white, it can appear safe, but that is not necessarily the case. For most of us, who do not have a way of drilling down to see

Any shade of grey means it is likely decaying or melting, and it is probably fairly thin and weak. The source of the grey colour is typically the dark liquid water underneath showing through the ice.

Of course, safety concerns did not put off our ancestors from going out on a frozen Loch Leven. Curling was probably played on and around Loch Leven from the early part of the fifteenth century. It's thought that the monks living on St Serf's Island curled on Loch Leven in hard winters. In 1912, a bonspiel with teams from Perthshire against those from Fife and Kinross was held on the loch. The last Grand Match was played on the Loch in 1959.

In 2010 when Scotland had an exceptionally cold winter, believed to be the most intense in Scotland for 50 years, it was thought that the ice at both Piper Dam and at Loch Leven would be the necessary seven inches thick, allowing curling to go ahead. However, the surface of Loch Leven was deemed to be too rough and unstable. The Royal Caledonian Curling Club's chief executive Colin Grahamslaw had explained, 'It's the wrong kind of ice. It's effectively ice, then snow, then ice.' The club said that the objections of the emergency services and Stirling council made it impossible for them to get event insurance.

The Kinross Marshall museum published a sad story from 1870 that should remind us all to heed the dangers of walking on a frozen loch.

'Perhaps the most distressing accident that ever occurred in our district happened on Lochleven on Saturday 22 January. For on that day three sisters, Jane, Bathia and Margaret Steedman, whose ages were respectively 24, 22 and 20, all extremely well known in the social life of our town, perished together. The circumstances under which the sad event occurred are so pathetic, and form so dramatic a tragedy, that after the lapse of years they might be recalled.

Since the opening of the year, frost had been intermittent, and Loch Leven was only partially frozen. A fringe of firm ice, however, formed skating facilities, and the three young ladies had arranged for a few hours enjoyment in the afternoon in the company of one or two friends.

Similar expeditions were usually planned from the 'Jingle Dyke' a well-known landmark on the northern side of the loch, adjacent to the boathouse and pier. A favourite retriever accompanied them to the rendezvous, and just as they reached it, the dogs attention was attracted by the waterfowl who at this season keep the water open by congregating in large numbers. Reaching the edge of the ice it plunged into the water, and when the ladies looked up they saw the animal struggling to secure a footing on the ice.

In an indescribably short space of time a terrible calamity was completed, and only a few minutes had elapsed before a boat reached the spot from the pier. By that time the dog was found sitting on the ice with a glove in its mouth, and looking with intense eagerness for the appearance of its owner. In their anxiety to save their canine favourite, the

ladies one after the other rushed to the spot, only to find the ice sink beneath their weight, and all efforts to restore life proved unavailing.

Within a little more than an hour from the time they had left home 'buoyant with life and hope, they were borne back to it lifeless.' The inscription on their tombstone in the West churchyard expressively memorises the sad tragedy in the words of the text 'They were lovely and pleasant in their lives, and in their deaths were not divided.' In these later days a system of life ladders and kindred appliances has been established, and these are placed along the shore during the winter season. It is doubtful if these would have proved of material aid even although such means of rendering assis-

tance had been available, owing to the startling suddenness of the catastrophe.'

Tayside Police issued a statement in January 2021 which said, 'We would like to remind the public to avoid venturing out onto the ice. Stretches of frozen water are unsafe and we would urge people to take great care and resist the temptation to use them as areas of play.

'We would urge everyone, to take great care and resist the temptation to use the loch as an area of play. If you see anyone in difficulty on the ice, please contact 999.'

In January the SSPCA received more than 70 calls from concerned members of the public regarding swans they mistakenly feared were stuck in ice on frozen lochs or ponds.



NEW HANGAR FOR BALADO AIRFIELD

THE OWNERS OF BALADO AIRFIELD are hoping that more pilots will soon be able to use the site to store their aeroplanes and helicopters for private charter flights.

The Balado site has been used for various outdoor events in the recent past, including motorsports and the famous 'T In The Park' musical festival. T in the Park was held at Balado from 1997 to 2014. It was moved to Strathallan Castle in 2015 after concerns about an underground gas pipeline. The event was later cancelled after two people died at it in 2016.

Hilton Estates have submitted an application to PKC Council for permission to create a new hangar at the airfield. It would be capable of housing up to ten more light aircraft.

The planning statement sent to P&K Council indicates that although the airfield currently has a number of consented uses, it 'still retains its aircraft use which is now largely limited to aircraft training and private light and rotary wing aircraft visits'.



The Balado site has aviation history, with RAF Balado Bridge, opened in 1942, playing an important role during the Second World War. The airfield would have been called 'RAF Kinross', however, the naming of airfields at the time was to avoid confusion with other places like RAF Kinloss at Forres.

Balado Bridge had two runways. The tower was of the Watch Office for Fighter Satellite Station type. There were two hangars; the larger a B1 type, designed as an aircraft repair shed, used mainly for heavy bombers and the smaller a 'Super Robin' type.

Following decommissioning as an RAF station, part of the site served as a NATO Communication Satellite Ground-station. It operated from 1985 to 2006. Now, there are a number of poultry farm buildings sited on parts of the old runways. The remaining section of the airfield, including the Control Tower, is used as a base for microlight flying.

The airfield attracts visitors to Kinross and has increased the variety of leisure pursuits that are available in the area.

A youth scholarship programme is currently being delivered by the team at Balado Airfield and FlyScotland, meaning the local community and businesses will benefit from this new development.

The new hangar could result in as many as 60 movements each week, but the statement says this is a 'maximum number' and that 'in most cases there would be fewer movements per day.'


Kinross-Shire Forum Of Community Councils

(Wednesday 2 December 2020: 7pm Via Zoom)

MB summarised this, excluding our Agenda Items 3 & 6, to which the following comments were subsequently made *viz* –

Addressing the o/s crime, environment & planning issues at Crook Moss Gypsy Traveller Site

MB stated that, although purely an issue for Fossoway CC, it was one of the worst planning decisions in his 20 years as a councillor and he continues to get representations from the community about it & PKC's inaction. He suggested at Fossoway CC on 1 December that he would make one final attempt to get Planning to bring a compliance report back to committee in advance of a possible petition in Drum (post-Covid-19) and adverse press coverage of PKC. AC &SBJ agreed that action was needed, CP referred to PKC's enforcement charter, WR stated 'light touch' approach of PKC to gypsy travellers & a query was raised on site residents paying council tax? It was agreed that MB would work on a joint letter to be sent to Planning from ward councillors & Fossoway CC.

Ochil Hills & Lomond Hills Regional Parks Creation & Extension

In response to PKC's lack of resources argument, DM suggested writing to Scottish Government regarding the Lomond Hills extension encompassing Fife & PKC authority boundaries & what external funding is available for Regional Parks? WR stressed the need for a political decision at PKC. MB to speak to Angus Forbes, Convenor of Enterprise & Infrastructure prior to Committee motion on further action.

Affordable Housing in Rural Communities of Kinross-shire

DM stated that existing policy mitigates against this even though we have a policy for on-site provision, which RW agreed was happening but this was due to lack of policy implementation at Committee (Development Management). WR suggested we need a policy amendment because developers get around it and FG asked how? Both MB & RW serve on member officer working groups that cover this, so will pursue it in 2021.

Kinross-shire Border Signage


General agreement on local fund-raising for this i.e. DC re Kinross CC funding & AC re Kinross-shire Fund. CP noted 'County of Kinross' sign at entrance to Keltybridge. MB offered to do survey of Kinross-shire border to evaluate requirements.

 $\mbox{\bf NOTE}$ MB disappointed that no comment was made in relation to following issues $\emph{\it viz}$

- Lack of PKC policy on maintaining sustainability of rural communities
- Ensuring the retention of a banking facility in Kinross-shire subsequently announced that Bank of Scotland are closing last branch in March 2021.
- Restoring the landscape designations for the Cleish Hills & Devon Gorge.
- Level of Housing Development in Kinross & Milnathort & their effect on Loch Leven, etc.

Kinross-shire Area Committee Proposal Update

CP stated that our draft scheme had not been assessed for competence by PKC Legal & that their suggestions on referral to another MOWG & for provision under the P&K offer were not



Kinross-shire Community Transport Group Update

MB outlined this & that the draft minutes of our meeting on 19/11/20 were to come to him for approval & circulation (subsequently done). There had been a subsequent exchange of emails between PKC's public transport unit & John Fallon of Rumbling Bridge. MB had been informed of a PKAVS contact to help achieve charitable status for group. MB had asked Margaret Roy if PKC would produce a Capital Budget Business Case for an electric mini-bus service in the shire.

Kinross-shire Community Speedwatch Initiative Update

WR stated that Cleish CC had met with the Police to discuss this, which has their support. Aim is to establish a Kinross-shire wide scheme, which would need funding because equipment costing around £1500 needed. FG pointed out that equipment has to be calibrated annually; it was queried whether his assertion that the presence of 3 witnesses would enable pursuance of a speeding offence; public liability could be obtained under PKC cover. DM felt that speeding control should be left to the Police but both SBJ & WR said the police were not enforcing same. WR stated that all pedestrian lighted crossings in PKC had now reverted to push-button operation (MB thought this correct with exception of Blairingone West as traffic calming measure). Both SBJ &LM said their CC's supported the initiative & WR wanted all CC's to let him know by next Forum meeting.

Perth & Kinross Offer

WR & CP stated that CC's should know that PKC were looking at different ways of doing things in ward areas, involving more use of voluntary groups in a new contract between communities & PKC. DM felt this was a distraction in dealing with an intransigent PKC with a culture of officers pursuing their own agenda; there was a need to get the basics right!

AOCB

WR felt there was a lack of a united front on issues at the Forum because of the attendance *viz* no show from Glenfarg & Milnathort CC's & only one member representing Cleish & Portmoak CC's respectively.

Cllr Barnacle opened the meeting and noted apologies from Andrew Warrington. All attendees then introduced themselves.

Kinross-shire Transport Survey 2019 Re-Cap

Councillor Michael Barnacle opened the meeting by recapping on the results of the results of the 2019 Kinross-Shire Public Transport/Community Transport Survey and highlighting that the 3 main reasons for public transport demand in the area were:

- Shopping
- Health
- Social Reasons

New Local Bus Services: Services X53 and 55

John Fallon advised that he had observed and travelled on Service 53X and his findings were that the patronage is good west of Dollar but very low numbers in the other direction. He added that the timetable was similar to the previous Service 23 in that you had a 2 hour wait in Kinross before you could make a return journey. JF shared details of a suggested re-cast of both Services X53 and X56. Cllr Barnacle asked that JF then email his proposals to MR so that consideration could be given for MR progressing these with First and Stagecoach East Scotland. Margaret Ponton advised that she had used Service 55 and that the facility to visit Sainsburys for 40 minutes before a return journey was welcome. MP shared that local feedback had been that the connections with the X Services were not working. MR queried if this was due to passengers expecting to connect in Milnathort rather than Kinross Park and Ride. MR clarified that timetable had been cast with Kinross Park and Ride as connecting point as that if X bus broke down etc, passengers would have opportunity to shelter and use facilities in nearby Sainsburys whereas in Milnathort they may not have that option. MR to email MP the timetable highlighting where and when all connections are for sharing with Glenfarg area residents. MP shared that young people in Glenfarg are using Service 55 to travel home from after school activities in Kinross.

MR confirmed that she receives passenger stats from Earnside Coaches re usage but all agreed that current numbers are not representative of potential demand in recovery due to current restrictions.

MR confirmed that she continues to liaise with Stagecoach regarding securing a off peak day return journey on Service 56 between Glenfarg and Perth

The Future of Public Transport in Kinross-shire

MR confirmed that Angela's Cars had re-commenced operating the DRT scheme but due to current restrictions and also provision of Service X23, the option of sourcing additional operators into this scheme were not being progressed at this time and this situation would be re-visited in the Spring.

Cllr Barnacle suggested that a small community bus is an option worth consideration for future transport provision in rural Kinrossshire.

Cllr Purves added that facility for North, West and East all linking into Kinross should be explored but was also happy to revisit an East/West service.

Cllr Barnacle highlighted that a pilot may be advisable to test if there was a genuine demand for such a community bus service and asked MR to establish a approximate cost of a group buying a vehicle or contracting out to a commercial bus operator so that the group can make an informed choice.

DA confirmed that the above suggested community bus would not impact on the work of KVG as KVG doesn't run a bus service but rather they offer a particular more bespoke and befriending transport solution.

Cllr Robertson noted that a concerted effort should be made to retain Service 55.

۸

Cllr Barnacle noted that if a group were to be formed then they would require a constitution and charitable status. MR advised that she had a contact at PKAVS in this regard who she would put in touch with Cllr Barnacle.

Group in agreement that a copy of the final agreed minutes should be submitted to the next *Kinross Newsletter*.

Group keen to connect with Kinross High School headteacher at next meeting in terms of establishing transport needs of young people.

Also wish to progress discussion with Doctor from Loch Leven surgery as to fitting appointments in with public transport times. Some members of Milnathort Community Council had issues accessing Microsoft Teams for the meeting and Zoom would be a preferable format. Councillor Purves confirmed that he had a Zoom account and could facilitate meetings in this format going forward.

Date of next meeting: Either Thursday 21 January or Thursday 28 January 2021. Cllr Barnacle will canvas opinion on most suitable date nearer the time.

IN MORE SOCIALLY ACTIVE times, we would now be coming to the end of the 'Burns Season' – our weel-swall'd kytes bent like drums, like the auld Guidman who, sitting back replete with haggis, 'Bethankit' hums.



Like so much else affected by the global pandemic, haggis-makers will doubtless have seen a drop in demand this year, but one local company has really gone above and beyond (or as Buzz Lightyear in Toy Story would say, to infinity and beyond) in promoting their product – by sending a haggis into outer space!

In an incredible entry into the culinary record books, the first ever haggis destined to travel into space came from Simon Howie's butchery business. It's hurdies, presumably, like a distant moon.

That interesting marketing ploy, however, is but a temporary distraction from the daily challenges still facing us in tackling Covid-19. As we pit vaccine against virus, the race continues.

If — and, these days, we always have to be aware of the 'if' — all is going as anticipated, then by the first week of this month, all of those in the first two priority groups identified by the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (the JCVI) will have received their first dose of the vaccine. That is, elderly residents in care homes, care home staff, front-line health and social care staff and those over 80 living in the community.

Looking ahead to the end of February, the intention is to have reached all over 70s and those in the over 65 age bracket who are regarded as clinically extremely vulnerable. That all means that in Scotland, by the start of next month, we will have covered priority groups 1-5 as listed by the JCVI, a total of just over 1.4 million people.



Gritting

Early January brought with it a particularly cold spell. While Council gritting teams were working hard, including undertaking night shifts, many roads remained impassable due to the snow and ice.



This is primarily due to the priority system that the Council uses for treating its roads and pavements. It ranks them by perceived usage and gritters work their way down the list. This system was introduced to deal with a reduction in the number of gritters in early 2017 as a result of a budget cut.

While this might work when there is a short period of severe winter weather, it just does not cut the mustard during longer periods like the one we experienced in early January. The lower priority routes do not get covered as the gritting teams simply go back to the start to cover the top priority routes that have iced up again.

Another issue is due to staffing. I recently found out that lower priority routes are not covered at weekends or bank holidays at all, which meant that residential streets were completely ignored over the January bank holiday weekend.

While some staff were drafted in to do voluntary extra shifts, it is difficult to increase the level of staffing for gritting. This is because those who do winter maintenance are often drawn from other duties such as street cleaning and refuse collection. Given the Council's focus on main arterial routes, many local residents were keen to help out and grit their own section of pavement. The Council itself had encouraged this with the introduction of community hand gritters a few years ago.

But people were unable to help as most grit bins locally were empty. The Council also has a policy of not installing new grit bins and, shockingly if unsurprisingly, their system does not actually have a record of all local grit bins.

And this is one of the few cases in the Council where money is not really an issue. The winter maintenance revenue budget has been protected since I was elected back in May 2017. In bad years, extra money comes from the Council's reserves, and in better years, surplus from the allocated budget goes back into the reserves.

The problem here is one of poor policy. And this is a policy that has a real detrimental effect on people's day-to-day lives. In early January, PRI's emergency department treated 66 people for slipping or falling on icy roads and pavements. I expect a number of Kinross-shire residents may also have been treated by NHS Fife.

There are a few key things that I think we need to do to sort this problem. We need to reverse the cut to the number of gritters taken in the previous Council term. We need to look at more flexible staffing arrangements to allow residential streets to be treated at weekends and bank holidays. We need to make more community hand gritters available. We need to scrap the policy of not installing more grit bins and we need to make sure grit bins are filled more regularly.

These measures are not particularly costly, but as with all these things, we will need to secure the support of councillors across the rest of Perth & Kinross, which is easier said than done.

Cleish Primary School

Parents and the local community in Cleish have been extremely patient, but it is now more than four years since the primary school was included in the PKC School Estates Review back in November 2016. While Cleish was in one of the later phases of the review, a report on future options for the school was first promised for May 2019, but it is still yet to materialise.

Understandably Covid-19 has caused further delays, but we

now do seem to be making a little progress. Towards the end of last year, the Parent Council were able to meet with the Review Team to hear about their approach and the assumptions that they have made about the future school roll.

Like the community, I want to see a solution that ensures the long-term sustainability of a primary school in Cleish while addressing the issue of the life-expired buildings. I will continue to press the education department to publish its feasibility study and publicly present its options for the school as soon as possible.

Drum 20mph Speed Limit

We received and signed off plans for the Drum 20 mph speed limit in December. The lowering of the speed limit is something that local residents have been requesting for some time given the inconsiderate driving of some who use the hamlet as a rat run. The new limit should be installed in the near future.

The relaxation in the requirements around changing speed limits to take account of more pedestrian road users has allowed projects like these that have been refused in the past to progress — and quickly. It has been one of the few silver linings of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Lathro Meadows Appeal

At the time of writing, we still do not know the outcome of Persimmon Homes' appeal against the Council's refusal to grant permission for even more houses to be built on its Lathro Meadows site. The decision of the Scottish Government's Reporter to allow the Pitdownies development to go ahead on appeal has made many in the local community sceptical of the outcome.

It is simply undemocratic for an unelected Scottish Government Reporter to be able to overturn the decision of local councillors. Councillor Barnacle and I introduced a motion to the Council in 2019, that would have asked the Scottish Government to introduce a community right of appeal to address this imbalance, but we were overwhelmingly defeated by councillors from all parties.

I was therefore delighted when Douglas Ross MP, announced a new Scottish Conservative policy of legislating to prevent the Scottish Government overturning refusals of developments by local councillors. Had such a law already been on the statute book, the Pitdownies development would not now be going ahead. We may also hope such a law was already in place when we finally get the decision on Lathro Meadows...

Winter Maintenance: The prolonged period of icy weather in January showed deficiencies in the council's winter maintenance programme. Many low priority residential streets had little or no gritting and the council struggled to fill grit



bins. Also, it is council policy not to install any more grit bins. The argument for this is that the council are unable to keep the grit bins already installed filled during bad weather so adding more would just make matters worse.

However, the result of all this is that many people have fallen and injured themselves on the icy surfaces which is the last thing that we want. I have now written to the convenor of the Council's Environment and Infrastructure committee asking for a complete review of the policy with regards to grit bins. People are prepared to help keep their pavements clear but the Council must give them the resources to do this.

Snow Clearing Self-help: The village of Glenfarg have been supplied by the Council with a self-propelled gritting machine and this has helped the community keep their pavements gritted. Surely this is something that could be replicated in other areas. I mentioned this at the January meeting of Milnathort Community Council and they were keen to explore the idea. However, to work we need a few volunteers and somewhere to store the gritting machine. Please let me know if you can help. I would also like to hear from other Kinross-shire communities who are interested in this idea.

Local Businesses: I am delighted that despite the very difficult trading conditions caused by the Covid-19 pandemic that new businesses are opening in Kinross. The recent addition of a delicatessen and now a fishmonger to the Kinross High Street is very welcome. We must all do our best to support these new businesses and also our existing ones.

Recycling Site: The busy recycling site in Back Loan, Milnathort has been closed. This is because the collection vehicles were having great difficulty since the Thistle Hotel car park has been closed off. There are still glass recycling sites at Ba' Hill and the entrance to Fleming Court. Hopefully a new location for a larger recycling point can be found soon.





Priority groups all across the country are being vaccinated, with the oldest and most vulnerable first in line. Just as it should be. And while the first licensed vaccine from Pfizer remains a scientific marvel, the Oxford AstraZeneca has huge advantages - not least its ease of transportation, storage, and distribution. That's the one most of us will be getting when the letter from our doctor arrives.

We are not out of danger yet. Far from it. The experts warn us these next few weeks could be the deadliest yet. But if we follow the guidelines, keeping our distance, travelling only when strictly necessary, washing our hands - you know the drill - we can keep ourselves and loved ones safe until we all have the jag. And then finally the long nightmare will be over, though our memories of Henry and all the others we've lost will live on. Keep safe.

Drink Drug Driving Offences

Just over 500 motorists were reported for drink drug drive offences during the annual festive Drink Drug Drive campaign. During the campaign, which ran between December 1st 2020 and January 3rd 2021, Police Scotland officers carried out 4013 roadside tests. Overall, 508 drivers were detected for drink/drug offences.

Breakdown of results:

- 4013 roadside screening tests for drink and drugs carried out during the campaign
- 437 roadside drug screening tests carried out
- 508 people detected for drink/drug offences
- Of those 508, 28 were caught the morning after drinking. Assistant Chief Constable Mark Williams said 'It is extremely disappointing to see that people are still willing to take the risk and drive under the influence of alcohol or drugs.'

ACC Williams continued: 'The current pandemic has seen a decrease in the number of vehicles on the road, however our campaign to improve road safety has been as important as ever and was focused and intelligence led.

'Once again this year, a number of drivers were reported to us by colleagues, friends or family members and I wish to thank everyone who had the courage to report drink or drug drivers and I ask that you continue to report concerning driving behaviour to us. This information helps our officers to act quickly to stop drivers who are under the influence before they kill or seriously injure someone.

We will continue to take action against those who selfishly put others at risk by driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs.'

Recent Incidents

ATTEMPTED THEFT FROM FORMER MILITARY INSTALLATION, BALADO

We are currently investigating an incident which happened at the former radar station at Balado near Kinross (the 'Golf Ball' building).

Sometime before 4:30am on Tuesday 19 January, the building was broken into and electrical cables were cut with the intent to steal them. As is the case with many buildings which are thought to be empty or disused, the cables were still live. These cables were carrying 11,000 volts, and it can only be described as miraculous that nobody was killed or seriously injured in carrying out this incredibly dangerous act.

Their efforts were ultimately unsuccessful as nothing appears to have been stolen, however the damage caused has been valued as well into four figures.

Between Friday 1 and Tuesday 5 January, a property in Green Park, Kinross was broken into and a quantity of electrical equipment stolen. (CR/472/21)

About 11.50pm, Thursday 7 January, a window was smashed at a property in High Street, Kinross. (CR/666/21)

Between Thursday 7 and Sunday 10 January, a tyre was

slashed on a white Skoda Fabia parked in Dalwhammie Street, Kinross. (CR/1009/21)

An Eccentric Man

KINROSS HAS ALWAYS HAD its fair share of characters, some of whom could even be described as deeply eccentric. One of these was Andrew Nicol, a handloom weaver who lived in Piper Row over 200 years ago.

Not well off by any means, Nicol was proud of having a small stake in the land as one of the 'tofters' of Kinross. He was not affluent enough to be one of the crofters who were able to cultivate an 'acre' or two in the corn lands to the west of the town, his toft only amounting to a house and loomshop with a small kail yard attached. In addition to this, he laid claim to a small plot of land which was used as a middenstead or dunghill, an insignificant adjunct to his property but one that was to make him a 'man of renown' well beyond the bounds of Kinross.

Aspiring to be known as a 'laird', Andrew Nicol took to heart the adage in Fife and Kinross at the time that a laird was one who owned a 'bit of land, a doocot and a guid gangin' law plea.' When the Kinross Estate laid claim to his middenstead, Nicol took action in the local Sheriff Court with some success. The Estate continued litigation, launching a protracted appeal in the Court of Session in Edinburgh that was ultimately to bankrupt poor Andrew who was not equal to the expense of a series of law-suits that ultimately dragged on for nearly 30 years.

At the expense of his work as a weaver Andrew Nicol made the weekly journey to Edinburgh on foot to keep up with his case. While in the city he kept company with Mary Walker, described as an 'intolerable pest about the Parliament House,' and flax-dresser John Skene who was known as 'The Heckler'. Each of them was considered to be insane.

In the precincts of the Court of Session and the taverns of the Royal Mile Andrew earned the nick name 'Muck Andrew' and at home in Kinross, the local children cruelly called him 'Bogle-boo,' an unkind Scots expression for a hobgoblin or someone to be afraid of.

At the end of the day, Andrew Nicol lost his mind in addition to the little property he had in Kinross. He ended his days imprisoned in the debtors' room of the old Kinross Tolbooth where he survived until his death in 1817. Dr Ebenezer Erskine, in his *Annals of Kinross-shire*, quoted a contemporary notice on the death of Nicol, who for the last 30 years of his life had been celebrated 'as an eccentric man, a man of renown.'

You might expect someone like Andrew Nicol to be largely forgotten after his death, but an encounter with the Edinburgh artist John Kay in 1802 immortalised this 'Parliament House worthy' in two biographical sketches published years later in 1842 in *A series of Original Portraits*. In the first sketch, Kay described the story of Andrew Nicol as a 'satire on judicial proceedings,' noting that when the caricature he had drawn

was first published 'no fewer than one hundred and sixteen subscribers were obtained among the gentlemen of the legal profession — so well acquainted were they with the proprietor of the middenstead.' In the second caricature — Three Legal Devotees — Nicol, newly arrived from Kinross with the plan of his middenstead, is seen in the company of Mary Walker and John Skene. Kay emphasised his 'simple face, and genuine Lowland garb.'

In 1824 the Edinburgh publishers W & R Chambers included a paragraph in *The Traditions of Edinburgh* recalling Kay's 1802 caricature of Andrew Nicol who is described as 'a sensible-looking man, with a large flat blue bonnet displaying with chuckling pride, a plan of his precious middenstead.'

Britain's Forgotten Disaster

MOST PEOPLE KNOW OF the Titanic, often cited as Britain's worst maritime disaster. Many are also familiar with the tragedy of the *Lusitania*, credited with bringing America into the First World War, after she was torpedoed by a German U-boat. But very few are aware that in 1940 Britain suffered a maritime disaster with more victims than the *Titanic* and *Lusitania* combined — one which, at the time, was hushed up to help public morale.

Fiona was only a baby when she lost her father in the disaster, and she

has spent much of her life trying hard to right the wrong of the cover-up. Many years ago, she made a promise to herself, and to the man she never knew.

'I pledge my word to do all in my power to ensure that my father, and the thousands who died with him on HMT *Lancastria*, are at last acknowledged, and remembered with

honour, for all time, by the country they gave their lives for.'

The Lancastria

This British ocean liner, almost 600 feet long and capable of carrying 2200 passengers, was built on the Clydebank and launched in Glasgow as the SS Tyrrhenia in 1920, making her maiden voyage to Montreal in 1922. She became the Lancastria two years later, as a result of passengers complaining that they found her name unpronounceable. For the next eight years, she sailed the Liverpool to New York route, before becoming a cruise ship sailing around the Mediterranean and Northern Europe.

At the outbreak of war, the Lancastria was in Nassau when news came that she had been requisitioned by the government as a troopship. Upon sailing to New York for a refit she was repainted in battleship grey, all unnecessary fittings were removed, her portholes blacked out, and an anti-aircraft gun installed.

First used to carry men and equipment between the UK and Canada, she then assisted in the evacuation of

troops from Norway and the British invasion of Iceland in May 1940.

She was sunk on 17 June, 1940, resulting in the loss of an estimated 4000 lives – possibly many more. This is considered to be the worst loss of life in the sinking of a single British ship, and the bloodiest single engagement for UK forces (in terms of lives lost) in all of WW2. She was sunk off the French port of St Nazaire, while taking part in Operation Ariel, the evacuation of British nationals and troops from France, only two weeks after the Dunkirk evacuation.



The Attack

After a short overhaul, Lancastria left Liverpool on 14 June, under Captain Rudolph Sharp, arriving in the mouth of the Loire estuary two days later and anchoring 11 miles south-west of St Nazaire. By the mid-afternoon of 17 June, an unknown number (estimates range from 4000 up to 9000), of civilian refugees (including embassy staff, employees of Fairey Aviation of Belgium), line-of-communication troops (such as Pioneers and RASC soldiers) and RAF personnel had embarked. While the ship's official capacity was 2200 (including the 375-man crew) such was the pressing need of the situation that Captain Sharp had been instructed by the Royal Navy to 'load as many men as possible, without regard to the limits set down under international law'.

One survivor of the disaster, James Cowan, remembers seeing the *Lancastria* from the quayside at St Nazaire. 'The sun was reflecting off the ship and it looked white,' he said. 'I thought, what a target, what an easy target.'

The ship was still in the lanes, nine

miles out to sea, when the harbour siren sounded and a stream of Junkers JU 88 bombers swooped down on it. Travelling at over 250mph, this specialist anti-shipping squadron descended on the helpless vessel and the thousands of passengers packed on its decks, staring up in horror at this nightmare that was pouring out of the sky.

Lancastria was bombed at 1548 hrs by Junkers Ju 88 aircraft from II. Gruppe/ Kampfgeschwader 30. Three direct hits caused the ship to list first to starboard, then to port; within 20 minutes she

rolled over and sank, with appalling loss of life.

Lifeboats were launched, but because of the overcrowding there were enough less than a third of those on board. Even if there had been enough, there was only time to launch about a handful, before the ship began founder. Thouto sands of men, wom-

en and children jumped into the oil-covered sea as the ship began to capsize. As the ship started to sink, thousands clambered onto the overturning hull. It is claimed that they sang 'Roll out the Barrel' in defiance of the bombers still buzzing overhead.

The *Lancastria* sank around 9.3km south of Chémoulin Point in the Charpentier roads, around 17km from St Nazaire. Over 1400 tons of fuel oil leaked into the sea and caught fire, possibly set alight by strafing German aircraft. Many drowned, were choked by the oil, or were mown down by the planes whilst fighting for their lives in the water.

Survivors were taken aboard other evacuation vessels, the trawler Cambridgeshire rescuing 900. There were 2477 survivors. Many families of the dead knew only that they died with the British Expeditionary Force (BEF); the death toll accounted for roughly a third of the total losses of the BEF in France. The Lancastria Association lists 1738 deaths. Other sources believe the number to be over 4000 lives, possibly many more.

Under the government's D-Notice

system Prime Minister Winston Churchill ordered a news blackout of the sinking. His opinion was that the British public was suffering enough with the news of the Dunkirk evacuations, so the Lancastria tragedy was to be hushed up in an attempt to lessen any further damage to public morale. Hence the ship's disappearance from public memory, and its appearance in very few history books. Due to the government-ordered cover-up, neither the survivors nor the crews of the ships that had gone to their aid would discuss the disaster, for fear of court martial.

The Lancastria Association of Scotland was set up in memory of those who died on that terrible day. Fiona Symon and her committee campaigned tirelessly for years for the recognition of this tragedy, and its massive loss of life, and to raise awareness of something, which has been erased from the British memory, like a childhood trauma. 'It is said that you never miss what you have never had. This is not true. I was ten months old when my father died in the Lancastria disaster, and all my life I have missed the presence of a father.' Fiona said in one interview.

The Lancastria Memorial Fund was set up to honour those who paid the supreme sacrifice aboard the troopship *Lancastria* that day, and after Fiona and her committee's long planning and fundraising campaign, a permanent memorial was erected and unveiled to the estimated 4000 souls, who were lost and effectively forgotten by history.

The Memorial – pictured below and unveiled in 2011 – is now a focus of remembrance for the thousands of relatives who lost fathers, family members and friends during the evacuation of France in June 1940. The site for the memorial in the grounds of the Golden Jubilee Hospital in Clydebank was deeply symbolic, as



it was there that the *Lancastria* was built and launched. An exciting, innovative Memorial was designed by Scottish sculptor Marion Smith, and finally erected on the banks of the River Clyde

The erecting of this significant memorial in Clydebank to those who were killed in action, completed the circle and marks the sacrifice, courage and determination of those who paid the ultimate price in defence of freedom.


The unveiling of the *Lancastria* memorial took place in October 2011 on the site where the ship was built in Clydebank, Scotland.

There were times when it seemed that the goals would never be achieved, and it is testimony to Fiona Symon's determination that so much was finally done. Finally, her efforts have been recognised with an MBE in the New Year's Honours list. Thanks to Fiona, her father (and his companions who also died that terrible day) are resting in peace, and their story has not been forgotten.

As Fiona says:

'As a small child it was a puzzled feeling of being somehow different – the only child in my class without this




person called a father. As a teenager, sad and angry at missing out of the relationship my friends enjoyed. Through the years, people who had known him would talk of him to me. But, my mother couldn't, as was the same for many, many other families.

'Before he sailed to France in February 1940, my father wrote in his diary of how he had always tried to maintain honour and the bond of his pledged word. I do know that, had he lived, he would have been in the forefront of our fight for justice. I have been grateful for the opportunity to work for justice for all those involved in the tragedy.'

We will remember them.

Into another winters day, lovers, cocooned in sensual warmth, hold tighter under a downie blankets refuge.


Unhurriedly meeting the dawn, rising eventually, to hot coffee, and the newspapers harsh- awakening.



BEE BEE SEE TEE VEE!



ON MONDAY 18 JANUARY 2021, local family-run bee farm Cloverlea Apiaries appeared on the BBC 1 programme *The Farmers' Country Showdown*.

Cloverlea Apiaries is based just north of Milnathort, nestled in the Ochil Hills, where Jeff (aka Dad), and sisters Tracy and Karen run their honey bee breeding farm. What started as a hobby some 15 years ago, has now become a full-on family business. The bee farm was set up four years ago, and have honey bee colonies around, Kinross, Perthshire, Fife, Clackmannanshire, and Stirling-shire.

Last year, the family were contacted by Sidney Street Productions of London, to ask if they would like to appear on the fifth series of the Farmers' Country Showdown. This series was to celebrate farming families and rural events including farmers markets where they



showcase their hard work, as they try to sell their produce. With trepidation, having never been on television before, the family decided to get involved and share with people their love for honey bees, the products they produce and the farmers' markets they attend.

After numerous emails, contracts, and schedules had been sent back and forth, the film crew from London arrived at Cloverlea Apiaries in September 2020, to complete two days of filming. Surprisingly, there were no make-up artists, or hairdressers which Jeff thought would be on hand, but there were three fantastic film producers, Shannon, Andy and not forgetting Ray with a van full of cameras and technical equipment. As each of the film crew tried to work out how to put a bee suit on, Jeff, Tracy and Karen all looked petrified as they were being wired up for sound with personal microphones and battery packs.

The film crew took footage of different areas of the farm; the wildflower meadows, the bees in their hives, and





even the red squirrels, who came to see what was happening.

As part of the filming, they visited one of Cloverlea's heather apiaries, where the bees were still collecting nectar to make Cloverlea Scottish heather honey. After

an off-road driving experience, it was clear the film crew weren't used to country driving, but persevered with Tracy at the wheel. The programme demonstrates how sealed honey is taken from the hive, and jarred ready for market.

On the second day of filming, the

film crew met Jeff,
Tracy and Karen
as they arrived at
Bowhouse Market, Fife. The programme shows
how the family set
up for the day, sell

their produce, interact with customers and launch their new range of honeys, including lemon and ginger infused honey.

The programme is filled with moments of laughter as the family work and live together, with their passion for honey bees and other pollinators, the environment in which they live, as well as their friendly approach to customer sales.



- 7. 60 years of age and over
- 8. 55 years of age and over
- 9. 50 years of age and over



Community Council News

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the December Meeting

Present at the Zoom meeting held on 22 December 2020 were Community Councillors (CCllrs) L Mckay (Chair), D Colliar, W Freeman, H Phillips, T Stewart, Councillors C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters. Mrs C Aird (minute-taker) and a member of the public.

Apologies were received from CCllr M McFarlane, CCllr T Stewart and CCllr M Wood.

CCIIr L Mckay welcomed everyone to the last meeting of the CC for 2020.

Police Report

At the time of the meeting, there was no Police Report available as PC A Mitchenson had submitted her apologies due to work commitments. Cllr L Mckay advised members that she had spoken to Inspector Craig Stephen, who is part of a new team in the area, along with PC Mitchenson and Sergeant Mark Craig. The team are looking to work alongside the CC, and during her conversation with Inspector Stephen, CCllr L Mckay had welcomed the new members to Kinross and advised that knowing their time would be limited, the agenda could be adjusted to let the team provide their update and then leave the meeting.

Kinross Local Resilience Group

Cllr R Watters advised that both he and CCllr M McFarlane had attended the meeting on 8 December, with CCllr McFarlane's email of 22 December covering the points raised. Cllr Watters felt that it had been a positive meeting, with a good impetus to continue, with a few actions to prepare in advance of the next meeting on 12 January 2021. Paul Laidlaw, PKC has taken the lead in setting up the group as he is an expert in this field. Scottish Government have launched a consultation which will give both the CC and the community the opportunity to comment, prior to the consultation closing in June 2021.

Cllr C Purves advised that there was a PKC officers meeting scheduled for 6 January 2021 and he will raise the community's concerns in respect of the Council's response at that time. He also asked to be advised of any additional issues which he could raise at the meeting. Cllr Purves is to contact Will Wright to ascertain if there is anything he wishes to be raised at the meeting on 6 January.

Subgroups and Membership

Discussion delayed until January 2021 meeting.

Matters Arising

CCIIr W Freeman advised that Police Scotland had spoken to the lady concerned about youths throwing stones at windows. All matters arising were covered by the agenda.

Kinross Town Centre

CCIIr Colliar advised that work was continuing on the Windlestrae and Kirklands sites (the cones had now been pulled back at the Kirklands site).

CCIIr Mckay advised that she had attended the Juniper meeting and there had been concerns raised in respect of houses being sold in order to rent out to people aged 55 years and over.

In response to a question from CCIIr Colliar, CIIr Robertson advised that it had previously been agreed that a report be provided in respect of the High Street but having spoken to

Daren McHugh (PKC Road Safety Officer), this did not appear to have been completed. Cllr Robertson agreed to investigate this further and report back. Areas of specific concern remain the junction of Mill Street onto the High Street, outside the Salutation hotel and the turning into Avenue Road.

Cllr Robertson is to report back at a future meeting.

Cllr Purves advised that he had previously spoken to Mike Morgan who had confirmed he was happy to undertake a consultation in respect of the concerns around road safety and he was happy to go back to Mr Morgan if that was felt to be helpful.

CCIIr Mckay confirmed that she had witnessed cars speeding in the area of the Salutation Hotel and it was agreed to put a notice on the Facebook page asking for residents to raise their concerns.

Cllr Purves advised that there had been an issue with street lights in the town when Scottish Gas Network had been trying to carry out an upgrade. Whilst SGN did not require planning permission to carry out the work, they had been unaware that they had required planning permission to block off spaces etc. After discussion with SGN and the Road Superintendent the matter had been dealt with and closed.

Reports from PKC Councillors

Cllr Robertson raised the issue of tree felling in Sunnypark and understood that a TPO was in place but on checking this was apparently not completed by PKC in 2016 (approx.). He will continue to look into the matter and report back in due course. Cllr Purves gave an update on the Gigabit Kinross-shire. The project had intended to be launched in January with a press release etc. but had now gone live project in the Mill Bridge/Sandport area.

Cllr Purves reported that the IJB in PKC with responsibility for Mental Health Services in NHS Tayside now appeared to be working in a more joined up fashion but that we will need to wait to see if the strategy makes a difference.

In respect of Cleish and Blairadam CC boundary, Cllr Purves advised that they were still very keen to see the boundary

In response to a question from CCIIr Freeman, CIIr Purves advised that there would be around 20 people affected by the boundary change and that this should not affect the CCs numbers in terms of elections.

After discussion it was agreed to continue the discussion at the January 2021 meeting as a CC member not present at tonight's meeting lived quite close to the area concerned. It was also agreed that ClIr Purves would obtain a copy of the exact proposal and circulate to members to aid the discussion at the next meeting.

Cllr Watters raised the issue of a waste energy plant which is to be built in the community in order to burn non-recyclable products. He advised that, in his opinion, residents needed to be aware of this as he did not feel this was an effective way to create energy. In response to a question from CCllr Mckay, Cllr Watters advised that the schedule for change was around two years.

Reports from CC representatives

CCIIr Colliar advised that he had begun the process of updating the mandate for the bank account so that two signatories were required and he was waiting on the bank to confirm that this had happened.

In relation to the flooding at Springfield Road/The Muirs, CCllr Colliar advised that he was frustrated at the lack of progress following his email to Stuart Dall. It was agreed that he would forward his email to Cllr Robertson who would take up the issue with Stuart Dall and Jake Eadie.

CCIIr Colliar also raised the issue of the number of buses being parked in the High Street and wondered why they could not use the bus parking available at LLCC.

CCllr Freeman confirmed that a remittance advice had been

received from PKC for the sum of £418.60, with an invoice date of 18 December 2020. CCIIr Colliar confirmed that the funds should be sent by PKC by the end of January.

CCIIr H Phillips reported that a neighbour had contacted her in respect of trees and she agreed to send the communication to CIIr Robertson for him to follow this up.

CCIIr Mckay raised a number of issues around drains in Springfield Road/Wilson Court, and outside her home. She agreed to forward a photograph to CIIr Robertson for him to follow this up.

In respect of the recycling centre, cars are being parked on the corner (solid lines) making it difficult for traffic to get round. After discussion, it was agreed that ClIr Purves would raise the issue of parking in the surrounding areas.

Community Council News

Present at the meeting on 1 December were: Community Councillors (CCllrs) S Bruce-Jones, T Duffy, C Farquhar, C Haigh, M Haigh, N Marchant (Associate) and G Pye; Councillor M Barnacle.

Apologies: CCllrs A Cheape and R Young; Councillors C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters.

CCIIr Young will be taking a sabbatical from CC duties for personal reasons.

Police Report

There were three incidents to note in our area since the last CC Meeting from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch: Overnight on Sunday 1 November, a white Giant road bike and power tools were stolen from a shed in Main Street, Crook of Devon – this was noted in last month's minutes. Between 4pm on 8 November and 7.30am the following morning a red Case Farmall 115C tractor and a green Yamaha 450 Quad Bike were stolen from a secure outbuilding at a farm in the Blairingone area. About 12.50pm on Monday 16 November, a red Suzuki 400 motorcycle was stolen from Gelvan Farm, Fossoway.

Minutes Of The Previous Meeting

In the November minutes we noted that Peter Leach had resumed his taxi service. We did not make it clear that this was explicitly referring to his participation in the DRT service. We would like to emphasise that the CC did not intend to, and would never knowingly, promote one business over any other. The minutes of the March meeting (the last face to face meeting) will be signed off once normal meetings resume. Any significant decisions made during the virtual meetings held since then will be brought to the next physical meeting to be formally recorded and ratified.

Matters Arising

Bank of Scotland Kinross Branch Closure: CCllr Marchant reported that the Bank has now postponed the closure of the branch until 22 March 2021. The bank is also considering holding digital skills workshops. Residents have complained to the CC that the RBS mobile bank service in Kinross has been suspended whilst P&K is in Tier 3, making it even more important that the BoS closure is deferred. It's likely that the next meeting with the BoS will be January rather than December. The Post Office regional team don't foresee any capacity issues once the bank branch has closed, but they and the Co-Op will continue to monitor the situation.

A977 Mitigation: Cllr Robertson had asked the Highways Department when the resurfacing work outside the Powmill shop would be completed, and was told that it was scheduled for 11 November – the work has now been successfully concluded.

CCIIr Duffy had contacted Brian Cargill, PKC's Traffic and Network Service Manager to get an update on the A977 Mitigation works. CIIr Barnacle noted that he had also written to Brian Cargill requesting updates.

Blair Watt, PKC's Project Officer replied to the CC by email, explaining that development of a School Exclusion Zone at Crook of Devon has been suspended until the pedestrian crossing lights near the Village Hall have been installed, when traffic movements will be monitored to assess the requirement for an Exclusion Zone. Design work for the traffic lights is being done by an outside consultancy due to staff redeployment for Covid-19 work. The installation of the lights is likely to be during a school holiday, but there is no accurate timescale for this at the moment. Design of the A977/B9097 junction realignment is still to be finalised. Mr Watt also described proposals for temporary 20mph speed limits in Drum Village and Waulkmill in Crook of Devon. Details are due

to be circulated to local Councillors and the CC for comment, but had not been received at the time of the meeting.

All agreed that resurfacing in Powmill and Crook of Devon was done very well.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: Cllr Barnacle reported that the first (virtual) meeting of the Community Transport Group took place on 19 November. Margaret Roy from PKC attended as did CCllr M. Haigh. There was general discussion about how the bus service could be improved. John Fallon said in the meeting that he was trying to get public transport access to the P&R at Halbeath.

Cllr Barnacle has a contact who will help to establish charitable status for the group. There is a proposal to prepare a business plan to get a budget allocation from PKC to purchase an electric minibus. It was agreed that although the new bus service was welcome, it doesn't connect very well with ongoing services to Perth, etc.

The next meeting is planned to be held in two months.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: CCllr Duffy reported that the Hydro Fund Committee have compared the quotes for the Flood Risk Assessment and chosen Millard to do the survey. The Committee have requested funds to be released to finance this.

Hydro Scheme Fund: A grant of £300 has been given to help fund the defibrillator which is now placed on the side of the village shop in Powmill. CCllr Farquhar explained that the AED itself was donated by Kinross First Responders, sourced from the Forth Road Bridge. Local resident Isla Kerr raised funds to purchase the heated enclosure. Local Nurse Nicky Cledland initially funded the installation, but was repaid by the fund and there was sufficient to also enable purchase of a reserve battery and pads. Nicky is happy to provide training in use of the device, for no charge other than a small fee of £5 to cover disposables and PPE. She can be contacted through her website https://reactfastfirstaid.co.uk/ or via the CC. CCllr Farquhar added that the residents of Powmill expressed their gratitude for the grant from the fund.

Powmill in Bloom: CCllr Farquhar reported that members have identified an area opposite the Milk Bar that will be developed.

Community Development Trust: Cllr Barnacle has almost completed the collection of contact information in order to send out invitations and background information for the first meeting of the Trust, hopefully early in the New Year.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: CCllr Farquhar said that there are two new developments at the site that have been done well, but unfortunately there are other areas that still need substantial work to bring them up to a presentable condition. Cllr Barnacle still has concerns about the lack of landscaping on the northeast side of the site; the presence of a permanent building in the cordoned off area that doesn't have planning permission; and that numerous residents are complaining about the appearance of the scrap yard. CCllr Bruce-Jones reported that the local residents don't object to the travellers in principle, but think that PKC is not taking the issues at the site seriously. Cllr Barnacle will write to the new head of the Planning Department listing the issues. The CC will write to PKC's CEO about lack of action by the Planners.

Crook & Drum Growing Together: CCllr Duffy said that there will be a fundraiser on Monday 7 December. The group are making Christmas wreaths to order.

CCIIr Duffy is investigating the possibility of getting power sockets installed on village lamp posts, which would be used for Xmas decorations next year.

Aldie Road Vegetation: CCllr Marchant informed the meeting that the culverts have been dredged, which should hopefully resolve concerns regarding potential flooding of the road.

Blairingone War Memorial: The search for a stone mason continues.

Fossoway Gathering: The Gathering Committee's AGM will be on 2 December.

Crook of Devon Skate Park: Cllr Barnacle had written to Andy Clegg asking for a site meeting to identify a location in Crook of Devon.

New Business

Fly Tipping: A MoP had reported an incident of fly-tipping of building waste on the Arndean Road, and provided a photo of a label that may help to identify the culprit. Cllr Robertson had offered to pass the information to the Police.

Community Council Business

If the next meeting of this CC is virtual, as currently expected, we will be offering online attendance by members of the public. Anyone interested in attending should email the CC at fossoway.cc@gmail.com for details.

P&K Councillors' Reports

M Barnacle: The Kinross Forum meeting is on 2 December – Cllr Barnacle intends to discuss the issues he raised with the CEO. Forum meetings are planned to be held every two months. CCllrs Bruce-Jones and Cheape will attend from this CC.

There has been flooding in Back Crook near Schiehallion – Cllr Barnacle is going to contact the officer who is dealing with the Poplars flooding issue to see if this incident can be addressed at the same time.

In light of the rejection after appeal of the land north-west of Schiehallion (see below) CIIr Barnacle has written to Stuart Shand, the developer of the site (see below) proposing a dialogue before any further applications, but has not received a response as yet. The CC will write to Mr Shand on the same lines.

Planning

New Applications:

20/00976/FLL Erection of a dwelling house at land 90 metres southeast of Maiden Wells House, Rumbling Bridge, no CC comment.

Decided Applications:

20/01268/FLL Extension to dwelling house Machrie Cottage, Carnbo, Kinross. The application was approved, no CC comment.

20/01051/FLL Installation of 2 biomass boilers, 2 flues and associated works (in retrospect) Wharlawhill Farm, Carnbo. The application was approved, no CC comment.

Appeals:

19/01673/AML Land 100 metres northwest of Schiehallion, Crook of Devon. The appeal was rejected by the reporter, the CC had objected.

News from the January Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 5 January 2021 were: Community Councillors (CCllrs) S Bruce-Jones, A Cheape, T Duffy, C Farquhar, C Haigh, M Haigh, N Marchant (co-opted) and G Pye; Councillors M Barnacle, C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters; and three members of the public.

Declarations Of Interest: CCllrs Duffy, Cheape, Farquhar and Pye declared an interest in the first planning item discussed.

Membership: CCllr R Young had stepped down with immediate effect due to personal reasons. We thank him for his contribution over the past years and wish him all the best in the coming time.

The Council agreed to change the status of CCIIr Marchant from Associate to Co-opted in light of the resignation of CCIIr Young.

Planning

CCIIr Duffy welcomed the three members of the public who

were attending because of their direct interest in the first two planning matters being prioritised for consideration, which were ultimately for the District Council to determine. She then invited CCllr Marchant to outline the issues at stake, but undertook that those who had declared an interest in the first proposal (including herself) would take no part in the subsequent discussion.

New Applications

20/01642/FLL CCIIr Marchant advised that the proposal for this development at Easter Yetts hinged on whether or not it complied with Policy 19 of Housing in the Countryside and/ or would result in the formation of a ribbon development of more than five properties. The objector attending then detailed his views as to why the proposed development did contravene the policy, after which the applicant similarly rehearsed his contention that the proposal was in accord with the policy. ClIr Barnacle then indicated that he had previously conversed with both the applicant and the objector, and that a PKC official would make a site visit before the Planning & Development Committee of the Council made a decision. In light of the foregoing and the acknowledgment that the policy was capable of different interpretation the Community Council resolved to submit to PKC a neutral comment.

20/01660/FLL Erection of a dwelling house at Land East of Lynwood, Main Street, Crook of Devon. An objector whose property neighboured the proposed development then voiced her objection, chiefly on the grounds that, if constructed, the new house would be only a little over one metre away from her gable end wall, which would inhibit possible future maintenance work in that area. After discussion the Council decided on a neutral comment on the basis that, whilst it welcomed the prospect of new affordable housing, it was concerned that the proposed building could impact adversely on access to the neighbour's property.

20/01425/FLL Extension to dwelling house at Duanbrig, Naemoor Road, Crook of Devon, no CC comment.

20/01804/FLL Erection of a dwelling house on land 30m east of Vine House, no CC comment.

Appeals

19/01673/AML Land 100 metres northwest of Schiehallion, Crook of Devon. CCllr Marchant had written to Mr S. Shand suggesting either a Zoom meeting or a physical meeting (when feasible) between him and representatives of the CC, so that possibilities could be discussed. As yet she had received no response.

Police Report

A single-axle Hobby caravan was stolen from Hallhill Farm overnight on 2 December.

Matters Arising

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: It was expected that a further meeting of the group would be held on 21 or 28 January.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: CCllr Duffy had accepted a quotation in the sum of £5460 (including VAT but excluding costs) from Millard for flood risk assessment.

Crook Moss Travellers' Site: Responses were awaited to letters sent to the new head of the Planning Department and the CEO.

Crook & Drum Growing Together: It was reported that at the meeting held on 7 December the wreath-making fundraiser was a success, with about 20 wreaths sold.

Blairingone War Memorial: The arrangements envisaged had proved not to be feasible and therefore an alternative solution would need to be sought, possibly via the Community Development Trust.

Fossoway Gathering Committee: It was reported that at the AGM normal meeting held on 2 December the group would investigate whether an event in September might be possible.

Community Council News

Crook of Devon Skate Park: Cllr Barnacle had written to Andy Clegg asking for a site meeting to identify a location in Crook of Devon.

Bank of Scotland Kinross Branch Closure: Cllr Watters said he understood that the March closure of the Kinross branch was now definitive. The CC expressed dismay at this prospect, which CCllr Marchant said she would explore in general terms and perhaps consult Liz Smith MP.

A977 Mitigation: Discussions about the introduction of 20 mph speed limits at places both on and off the main road were ongoing.

Community Development Trust: Cllr Barnacle said he hoped the 15 people who formed the Trust could meet virtually in the first week in February. He had suggested issues which might be discussed, including the adoption of Drummond Park in Crook of Devon.

New Business

Gritting of Roads: There was concern about inadequate gritting of roads and pavements in the current icy conditions. It was believed, however, that PKC was aware of the threats to public safety and was doing its best to address the situation in difficult circumstances. The CC had been in touch with PKC about St Serf's Road after a complaint by a resident: this road and the pavements had now been gritted.

Kinross Forum: CCllr Bruce-Jones reported on the meeting on 2 December which she and CCllr Cheape had attended on behalf of the CC. Matters discussed included contacts with PKC senior officers, especially in the context of the Travellers' Site in Crook of Devon, the needs for affordable housing, community transport and speedwatch. quarterly meetings of the Forum were intended.

Community Council Business

CCIIr Pye reported that this year's grant had been received from PKC, although the amount was 8p short for some reason, probably an administrative error.

Insurance: CCllr Bruce-Jones advised that the CC's insurance policy was due for renewal. She undertook to deal with the matter in conjunction with CCllrs Pye and Duffy.

Data Control: CCIIr Pye said that changed circumstances required the password for the Fossoway email account to be changed and said he would do this immediately.

The next meeting of Fossoway Community Council will be held on Tuesday 2 February 2021 at Carnbo Village Hall if Government guidelines allow, otherwise it will be a virtual meeting. Members of public wishing to join please email the CC at fossoway.cc@gmail.com

Milnathort And Orwell Community Council News from the December Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 10 December 2020 were Community Councillors (CCllrs) M Thomson (chairman), A McCrae, C Williams; Councillors W Robertson and C Purves; associate member K Heneghan and four members of the public. Also in attendance for the first part of the meeting were two Police Scotland officers based in Kinross.

Apologies: CCllrs Colebourn and E Rougvie.

Police Matters

PC Ashley Mitchinson gave an update on issues affecting Milnathort as follows:

A white van seen in the area has aroused some suspicion. Members of the public are urged to be vigilant.

There had been several rural crimes in the area, including the theft of quad bikes and the theft of a tractor, which was subsequently recovered in Stirling.

There had been 22 traffic-related incidents, ranging in severity from not wearing a seatbelt to drink-driving and dangerous driving.

PC Mitchinson reported that a number of CCs in the area were looking to set up a community Speedwatch scheme, whereby volunteers were provided with speed guns and other equipment aimed at deterring speeders. Following discussion, it was agreed to explore this further.

The chairman raised the issue of drivers ignoring pedestrian crossings, while noting that Cllr Robertson had called for the one in South Street to be converted to a puffin crossing. PC Mitchinson will alert her team to the concerns.

It is important that members of the public notify the police of any incidents of anti-social behaviour rather than posting on Facebook. Primarily because of Covid-19, police resources are stretched at present and it may take some time to get a response to 101 calls, but nevertheless they should be contacted. The email address in the *Newsletter* can also be used if necessary. Logging incidents not only strengthens the case for more resources, but also helps the Council and the Community Safety Team.

A member of the public raised the issue of dog fouling in the village. PC Mitchinson advised that this was most appropriately dealt with by the dog warden service, who could provide signs and advice.

Sgt Mark Craig then briefly introduced himself as the new community police sergeant for Kinross, and both officers were thanked for their attendance.

Correspondence

Auld Mart: A letter was received from a resident of Auld Mart Lane public expressing concerns about the overgrown hedge on the public footpath to Auld Mart; the preponderance of non-native species in the area: the silt on the bed of the South Queich, which he feared may flood nearby properties, and the possibility of development taking place on the field near Auld Mart Road. CCIIr Robertson responded as follows:

Overgrown hedge: He will ask the appropriate PKC official to address the issue of the hedge by asking its owners, the Purves Group, to cut it back. The CC also thought this was something that the Core Paths Group could help with.

Non-native species: The giant hogweed at the bridge has been sprayed but this will have to be repeated as it is a very dangerous plant. NatureScot (formerly SNH) have an ongoing project to try to eradicate the Himalayan balsam, which is not toxic but can choke other plants.

Dredging: To dredge the queich would require a licence from SEPA, who would certainly refuse as it was not their policy to dredge waterways.

Field: There will be no development carried out in this location. **Invitation to the Scottish Open Government Conference.** CCllr Williams will attend.

Email about *Gig on a Truck*: This is an initiative by Perth Theatre whereby entertainment is brought into the community. The CC is keen to explore this, and, following discussion, it was agreed that CCllr Purves would take the idea forward through his connection with Perth Theatre. He will also speak to KLEO about the possibility of staging an event in Milnathort once restrictions are lifted.

It was noted that BT will be carrying out **maintenance works in Milnathort for 19 days** from January 4 and on March 2.

It was also noted that Milnathort Town Hall has now been equipped with Wi-Fi.

Planning Matters New Applications Change of house type on the site of the former Ochil Hills Hospital (20/01639/FLL), noted.

Applications Decided:

Alterations and extension to 24 New Road (20/01499/FLL), approved.

Alterations and extension and formation of raised decking at 2 Greenburn Field, New Road (20/01461/FLL), approved.

Alterations and extension to 6 Linden Park Terrace (20/01449/ FLL), approved.

Core Paths Group: Kevin Heneghan reported that the article about the group in the *Newsletter* had been successful in that a volunteer had come forward with a trailer. The group had been offered a grant of £500 with which to buy equipment and will take professional advice about what to choose.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Purves

Rural transport: The Community Transport Group is looking at ways of connecting rural parts of Kinross-shire, either by putting out to tender the creation of a new route or funding a minibus.

Devolution: The Kinross-shire Area Committee has proposed that more matters affecting the county be devolved as it's considered that the full council is too 'Perth-centric'. The committee is writing to group leaders on behalf of the ward councillors and CC's and MOCC will be kept informed of developments.

Regional park: The area committee also discussed the possibility of extending the boundary of the Lomond Hills regional park to include Loch Leven. While Fife Council is willing to provide funding for rangers and maintenance, PKC has thus far been reluctant. A motion is to be put to PKC's Environment and Infrastructure Committee requesting that officials from both local authorities engage in dialogue.

Gigabit Kinross-shire project: The first stage of this will involve BT Openreach providing free vouchers to around 100 households near Millbridge Hall in Kinross. A website is to be launched in January with further details.

Mental health services: Following a damning report earlier in the year about mental health services in Tayside, a strategy has been produced that takes in the views of service users and carers.

Cllr Robertson

Speedwatch: Cllr Robertson added his support for the Speedwatch scheme and hoped that MOCC would get on board in the new year. It was likely that grants would be available to cover costs, which would amount to around £1500.

TRACKS: A new project officer will take up his role in March.

Co-options:

Andrea Ward was co-opted on to MOCC, having been proposed by CCllr Williams and seconded by CCllr McCrae.

News from the January Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 14 January 2021 were Community Councillors (CCllrs) M Thomson (chairman); A McCrae, S Colebourn, C Williams, A Ward and E Rougvie; K Heneghan (associate member); Cllr W Robertson and three members of the public. Cllr C Purves joined the meeting later.

Police Matters

CCIIr Colebourn reported on the following recent incidents in Milnathort:

Between Friday, December 11 and Wednesday, December 16, 2020, a tyre was stolen from a grey Seat Leon parked in Bidgefauld Road.

Between Friday, December 11, and Monday, December 14, 2020, a quantity of power tools was stolen from a Volkswagen Crafter parked in Old Perth Road.

Four fixed penalty notices for breach of Coronavirus regulations

were issued after police were called to a house party in New Road on Sunday, January 10.

Planning matters

New Applications: Erection of a house (in part retrospect) on land 50 metres south west of Rosewood Cottage, Hattonburn (20/01720/FLL), noted.

Other Business

Gigabit Kinross-shire project: Kevin Heneghan advised that he and CCIIr Ward had attended an online meeting about the project, which is due to be officially launched on 29 January. This has begun in the Millbridge area of Kinross, with 113 properties (74 per cent of those eligible) so far taking up the offer of vouchers entitling them to have fibre optic broadband delivered to their premises. Following discussion, it was agreed that residents of Milnathort should be encouraged to register their interest when the scheme becomes available in the village. For more information, visit https://kinross-shire.org/gigawhat

Icy roads and pavements: Cllr Robertson advised that he had written to the convener of PKC's environment and infrastructure committee as he considered that the winter maintenance system was poor and he disagreed with the council's policy of not installing new grit bins. The CC agreed that gritting had been inadequate during the recent icy weather and, following discussion, it was agreed to pursue the idea of acquiring a hand-held gritter as had been done in Glenfarg. Cllr Robertson has written on the subject for the February edition of the *Kinross Newsletter*.

Bike stand: It was agreed that the bike stand in the centre of the village had been poorly situated and was causing an obstruction. Cllr Robertson has written to the council, who have agreed to move it.

Street names: The CC had been asked for their suggestions for names for two streets in the new Pitdownies development. Following discussion, it was agreed to suggest Glebe Park and Pitdownies Avenue.

Christmas tree: The CC expressed its thanks to Daniel Webster and Campbell Lawson for providing and erecting the Christmas tree outside Milnathort Town Hall in December.

Core paths: While landowners are happy to have core paths on their land, walkers are reminded to stick to the paths and not venture from them. A grant of £150 is available from Greenspace Scotland to improve signage. PKC's ranger service is to provide the local core paths group with £500 to buy basic equipment with which to maintain paths once spring arrives. An interactive map of local core paths can be found at www. pkc.gov.uk/corepathsmap

Defibrillator: It was agreed that money from the David Drysdale bequest could be used to buy replacement pads for the defibrillator in the village. CCllr Colebourn will also follow up other sources of funding.

Bank of Scotland: Cllr Purves advised that the Bank of Scotland branch in Kinross was due to close permanently on 22 March and it had not been possible to operate mobile branches due to the pandemic. He and Liz Smith MSP are looking at ways to mitigate the effects of the closure.

Co-Option

Michelle Kirkbright was co-opted as a member of Milnathort Community Council, having been proposed by CCllr Colebourn and seconded by CCllr Rougvie.

The next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council will be held via Zoom at 7pm on Thursday, 11 February, 2021. Any members of the public wishing to 'attend' can do so by emailing communitycouncilmilnathort@gmail.com.

Portmoak Community Council News from the December meeting

Present at the meeting held on Tuesday 9 December were CCllrs A Davidson, S Forde, S McGregor, D Morris; Assoc. Members K Donaldson and G Smith; Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson; and one member of the public.

Apologies: Cllr R Watters. **Portmoak Cemetery**

Former Cllr A Cragoe, who has been working on this item, had sent a report of her meeting on 19/11/20 with Willie Grieg of PKC. Cllr Morris summarised the report indicating most of the discussion appeared to be regarding increasing capacity of the existing cemetery with new lairs and casket space, but no further information on cemetery extension. The question of PKC strategy around cemetery extension was raised as discussed at previous CC meeting in November 2020. Cllr Robertson had contacted W Grieg on this subject. W Grieg said PKC policy was that burials would be done in large central cemeteries, but PKC are still prepared to look at extensions. The CC suspect that PKC will continue to try to centralise. Cllr Purves highlighted that policy cited by Andy Clegg (circulated in July20) indicated that if 20 years of lairs can be secured then PKC could potentially go ahead with a Portmoak extension. There was doubt expressed that PKC would accept a separate, new tract of land to be made into a cemetery. There was a short discussion about the results of test digs, and could the CC obtain this information. It was agreed that A Cragoe had worked very hard on this item for which the CC is grateful. A Cragoe has offered to continue to liaise with PKC as a resident, and will report to the CC.

Road Safety Action in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell

Daryl McKeown had responded with a follow-up email to the site visit on 28/10/20. This was understood to be a first step towards the creation of a more comprehensive road action plan. There were a great many positive outcomes, some guarantees, and some future planning. Cllr Purves read out some key points:

Wester Balgedie: a speed limit reduction will be done between the village nameplates and out along the B919, north of the Balgedie Toll for a short section, to be prioritised as the resources permit. Options for footpath widening will be surveyed and assessed. The B919 Balgedie Toll junction realignment will remain on the list of future schemes. The PKC signals programme is fully allocated this financial year. The Balgedie Toll site will be reviewed as part of the preparation for next year's programme and completion possibly beyond 2021/22. Proposal to extend the Footway at the southeast of the village. PKC propose to construct a footway across the 10m approx. of grassy verge of the lane along to Leven Cottage. This would not be a land purchase. CC to identify the landowner for permissions.

Easter Balgedie: the speed limit will be lowered to 30mph, to be prioritised as the resources permit (as in Wester Balgedie). Kinnesswood: a Priority System at shop will be designed to restrict traffic flow approaching the village shop. This would enable the footway immediately outside the shop to be widened. Site survey and assessment will be completed regarding road visibility. Additional speed reduction measures, such as ramps or speed cushions, will be considered as part of the design. A footway bollard had been discussed on the north side of the shop to discourage drivers from over-riding the low kerb and mounting the footway but instead protection of this area will probably be linked to the Priority System.

Scotlandwell: VAS signs – these had been reprogrammed to correspond with the 20mph speed limit. Additional VAS sites, on the hill between the church and the village, facing southbound traffic, had been identified; and these have been added to the

list of future VAS. These will be installed as resources permit in future years.

20Mph Speed Limit Signage: the size, frequency and prominence of the 20mph speed limit repeater signs will be increased to encourage better driver compliance. This work is now underway as part of PKC ongoing 'Spaces For People' speed limits project. Signs have been manufactured and will be installed. Village nameplate signs: at most villages, including the other approaches to Scotlandwell, these are combined to create more prominent signage to encourage better compliance with the lower speed limit. There are two options at this site:

1. Combine the Scotlandwell nameplate signs with the speed roundel signs, or 2. Erect Kilmagadwood nameplate signs beside the speed roundel signs and erect an additional set of nameplate signs for Scotlandwell — either at the top of the hill beside Portmoak Church or at the bottom of the hill entering the village. CC to consult with community on this item.

Puffin Crossing in Village Hall and Portmoak Church Area: The Urban Traffic Control team (within Traffic & Network) will assess the area to determine if a suitable location exists for a Puffin crossing (or crossings). This will be added to the list of future traffic signals and crossings to be assessed, ranked, and installed as resources permit.

Portmoak Church Footpath Link: will be progressed by the Community Greenspace Team as any potential route is separated from the public road and its verge. The Traffic & Network Team will liaise with Community Greenspace about how and where the footpath connects to the A911.

Main Street Priority System: this was discussed on site regarding the position of the current priority system and island. Alternative locations were discussed to see if the island could be used as an extension of the footway to help pedestrians navigate a pinch-point. No suitable alternative was found but this will be investigated further as it may link to the church footpath. Junction realignment of the A911 to B920 junction: this was discussed but may create as many problems as it solves. It was agreed that the Traffic & Network Team would do some autotracking on a computer programme to identify the benefits and the hazards, but there has not been an opportunity to do this yet. Installation of a mini-roundabout at this junction was discussed, but it is likely there is insufficient space. A request from within the community to move the Western priority system to the other side of the road is included in the list of road safety schemes; but has not been progressed yet as there are still schemes of higher priority to be completed first.

Regarding speed enforcement, a member of the public mentioned that police had been seen in Kinnesswood apparently doing speed checks on vehicles. Cllr S McGregor thanked the police for their responsiveness to the CC's request for speed enforcement action.

Glenlomond Sewage: Migration of Responsibility to Scottish Water

Cllr A Davidson reported some good news: an expert drainage company had completed an assessment of the village and identified some unused drains in village from previous buildings, now demolished, which could be repurposed and reactivated to channel surface water. This would buy Glenlomond a bit of time re the sewage work. The Village Committee have commissioned someone to look at the long-term options for upgrade of the sewage works as Scottish Water have demanded that the system be upgraded to standard before they will adopt it.

Public Consultation – Use of Open Space, in Whitecraigs, Kinnesswood

The consultation period was now finished. The CC expressed some concern about open space and recreational use by young persons possibly being compromised by flower bed development.

Construction of Hill Track, Bishop Hill, Kinnesswood

Cllr Morris had provided an update report that had been circulated to the CC and subscribers. This confirmed that the landowner had failed to make a 'Prior Notification and Approval' request to PKC before construction started, as required by planning regulations. He had, however, received consent from Scottish Natural Heritage (now NatureScot) for these works to take place within the Site of Special Scientific Interest and had also discussed the proposed works with the then chairman of the CC, Graham Cox. The statement in the Nov report on this hill track construction was therefore incorrect in suggesting that there had been no consultation with the CC.

The CC noted that the surface of the track had improved considerably during the drier weather and PKC and the landowner had agreed on some limited drainage work to be carried out during the winter period on a few muddy sections. The CC welcomed the recommendation that further discussion should take place with the landowner in springtime to see if agreement could be reached on final restitution of the path surface and the extent to which the route should be available for vehicular use, or not. In the meantime, it was noted that it would probably not be necessary to proceed further with the suggested retrospective planning application as had been proposed at the previous meeting.

Kinross-shire Forum Meeting, 2 Dec 2020:

CCIIr Morris and the CIIrs had attended the meeting. CIIr M Barnacle had provided extensive information.

Discussion about Regional Parks. It was noted that there had been longstanding discussions about extending the Lomond Hills Regional Park to include Bishop Hill and the Loch Leven area, as was originally proposed as a joint Fife/ Perthshire initiative in the 1970s. PKC seem to have been reluctant to do this, possibly due to burden on finances e.g. Rangers etc. CCllr Morris to investigate the extent to which Regional Parks can attract external money from the Scottish Government and other sources before further representations are made to or within PKC.

Affordable Housing: general agreement between participants that good mechanisms are not in place to promote affordable housing. Portmoak always seems to see large size luxury housing being built. e.g. Lomond Inn site (5 new houses proposed), Levenmouth (10 new houses being built/proposed) with no affordable housing being constructed anywhere in Portmoak in recent years. Although some developers have to pay significant sums to support affordable housing this goes into a central pot in PKC with no requirement that it is spent in Portmoak. The CC also noted that planning officials appeared to be far too willing to approve large houses without any recognition of the way in which this unbalanced the housing stock in Portmoak, with no new property available for young people leaving home or old people wanting to downsize. Ward Councillors agreed to take this up at policy level in PKC.

Speed Watch Scheme: Cllr Robertson explained the Speed Watch Scheme which had been abandoned as Police Scotland were formed but the police are now keen to resurrect it. Problems with speeding occur all over Kinross-shire. In the Speed Watch Scheme, volunteers are issued with a speed gun ostensibly to collect data. Excessive speeding vehicles are then flagged to the police for follow up and a warning. Costs are high for the equipment. Request to PCC to indicate if they were in support of Speedwatch scheme. Problem areas for speeding can then be targeted, to make maximum use of funds.

Matters Arising:

CC Resignations and Next Steps: This item was fully discussed at the start of the CC meeting and agreed that the CC meeting would proceed. The Secretary had discussed the issue with the PKC Elections and Community Councils Officer who had indicated that the resignations would trigger a CC by-election

and the reduced numbers may make the CC unable to make representation because the CC was now composed of three elected, one co-opted and two associate members. The by election was triggered by the elected members falling below the required minimum for Portmoak of four elected members. The Cllrs indicated that there may have been an incorrect interpretation of the Scheme of Establishment guidance by the Officers as regards the ability of the CC to make representations, as the co-opted member had voting rights so the total able to vote on any issue was four. Cllr Purves offered to discuss the circumstances with the Elections & Community Councils officers and provide clarity. The CC welcomed this as the best way to ensure the correct action was taken for the benefit of the Community.

Covid-19 Resilience – Local Volunteer Support: The CC had taken some steps to contact the volunteer coordinators in each of the villages to confirm that volunteer support for anyone who was ill or isolating was still available should residents need it. Information on contact details had been circulated at the start of the pandemic, but if any resident would like information about who to contact in their area they should feel free to reach out to the CC at secretary@portmoak.org and the CC will pass on details of the local volunteer contact.

Planning

New Applications:

20/01611/LAW. Alterations to dwellinghouse (proposed). 4 Findatie Farm Cottage Kinross: Cllr Morris had looked at this application which has the suffix '-LAW'; this apparently meant that this was an application for a 'certificate of lawfulness. The Cllrs confirmed they had seen this type of application before but usually in the situation where a developer wanted confirmation that they had permitted development rights to carry out a specific development, ie that they did not require planning permission. 20/01611/LAW application is to create a dormer window which does not appear to fall within the scope of permitted development rights. A previous application which had been determined in October 2020, had been rejected by PKC planning as the dormer window was contrary to the Development Plan with respect to the place making criteria. It appeared that the details supplied in respect of the current application were identical to those of the previous, rejected application. This application for a certificate of lawfulness might therefore be a convenient way of sidestepping the planning process. The CC decided to make an objection to PKC, pending confirmation from Cllr Purves that the CC is able to make such a representation, given its reduced numbers. Otherwise, individual Community Councillors or members of the public can make their own representations.

Progress with Developments:

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Cllr Morris confirmed there had been no recent meetings of the committee, but he had been in some discussions with Hargreaves and the consultants about the proposed Westfield path network with an expectation that a report would be available by 21 February.

Treasurer CC Accounts

The Treasurer reported that the bank have not yet added the new PCC Treasurer as a signatory, mostly due to Covid-19 restrictions around the procedure for signatories to be present. As such there was no update on bank accounts for this month. There was no January meeting. The next meeting of Portmoak Community Council will be held at 7.30pm on Tuesday 9 February, 2021. 
Guide Dogs Kinross

- 2 small turnips
- 2 large carrots
- 1 large potato
- 1 sweet potato
- 1 tbsp cumin seeds
- 1 tbsp vegetable oil

For the sauce:-

- 1 tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 tsp cumin seeds
- 1 red onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 1 tbsp chopped ginger
- 1 tsp chilli powder
- ½ tsp turmeric
- 1 tbsp tomato puree
- 400g tinned tomatoes
- 1 tbsp garam masala
- 100g frozen peas

Method

Preheat the oven to 200 degrees celsius. Peel all the vegetables, chop into bite size pieces and place in a roasting tin. Add the cumin seed and vegetable oil and mix well. Cook for 30-45 minutes until soft. Stir regularly to stop them sticking.

While they are roasting, heat oil in large pan. Add onion and fry till soft. Add garlic and chopped ginger and fry for 1 minute. Add chilli powder, turmeric and tomato puree. Stir well and cook for another minute.

Add tin of tomatoes and stir well. Reduce heat and simmer. Just before vegetables are ready, add garam masala and peas. If sauce is too thick, add some water. Cook until the peas are warmed through then add the root vegetables. Mix well and season with salt and pepper.

Serve with rice, naan bread and pickles.




Normally our news at this time of year is dominated by what happened at the Burns

Ceilidh and how many turned up to the annual Christmas tree event. However, as everyone knows, there's been only 'one story in town'; namely Covid-19 and its impacts.

Despite having to cancel the Christmas trees we raised the amazing sum of £270 on our Just Giving page. The donations came from extremely generous people who simply wanted to thank us for the work we do and help us with ongoing expenses for equipment, as well as projects and events. We are very grateful to everyone who donated.

Since the first lockdown Portmoak Moss and Kilmagad Wood have been noticeably busier, with people going to them for much-needed walks. On New Year's Day an extraordinary number of people took advantage of the beautiful weather to head up through Kilmagad Wood to reach the top of the hill. Can you first foot a hill? Well, you can now and some folk brought champagne or drams to make a proper job of it!

Icy conditions made for difficult walking on the main paths in both woodlands but there were still plenty of 'off-road' alternatives. February should see some better weather and anyone who likes to break their walk or sit and watch birds will be pleased to hear that the Woodland Trust Scotland reports good progress with the new oak bench for Portmoak Moss. They will be putting it just off the main path, to replace the existing seat, which has become rotten. The group has discussed whether there are better places to locate it but



decided that the current position gives the best views and is not too close to the path.

You can also sit there and watch other people work; always a most relaxing pastime. The workers in question are likely to be volunteers from the group pulling up conifer and birch saplings as we do not want the saplings turning into full grown trees and taking water from the peat bog.

The success of the peat bog restoration should soon be evident again, as spring heralds one of the best sights on the Moss; the explosion of bog cotton, looking like a snowstorm. Roe deer are adept at sniffing out the new shoots so there should be good opportunities to see them too.

Other signs of spring in and around the Portmoak woodlands are the drumming of great spotted woodpeckers and brown hares boxing in the fields. If you are lucky or clever enough to get photos of either of these, or any other fauna in the woods, you might like to send them to us by email at info@portmoakcw.org.uk and we can add them to our nature notes.

Portmoak Primary School

Portmoak Primary School has been awarded a substantial grant from the Community Climate Asset Fund for the purchase of a polytunnel and other food-growing equipment. This is to help our pupils, along with members of our community, to reduce local carbon emissions by creating a sustainable food-growing programme.

We will be collaborating with Kinnesswood in Bloom who have much experience in food-growing and gardening. We currently have a small food-growing programme which benefits some of our pupils and we now plan to extend this to grow enough food for all classes to take home, use in class cooking lessons and to be able to issue food bags to the community. In doing so, we will be equipping our young people with the skills to



grow their own food and to teach others to do the same.

Most of the grant will be spent on the purchase of a polycarbonate tunnel called a 'polycrub', which is specially designed to withstand strong winds and adverse weather. Due to our school's location on the side of Bishop Hill, we have regular problems with damage to our greenhouses, with one being destroyed completely in a storm. We will also be purchasing the materials to build 12 raised beds, a substantial storage shed for our materials and equipment and some other bits and pieces to support our project.

Having just been awarded our fourth Green Eco Flag, this project will form part of our journey towards our fifth Green Flag in promoting the 'no food waste' message. Our pupils will also benefit from intergenerational knowledge exchange by engaging with older generations who have much more experience in food-growing.



Recent Meetings

Our last speaker of 2020 was Drew Drummond on 30 November. Drew is Managing Director of Drummond International, a family-owned leadership consultancy business which helps individuals and organisations deal with change, culture and conflict, emphasising the importance of value-led leadership. He helped us to reflect on the present position of our club and to consider the challenges we face. He saluted the core values of Rotary and that we provide opportunity for the community, for young people and for the international community. His advice of 'do whatever you can to help others be their best' certainly fits with our present practice and future plans for the club.

The feedback was amazing and really warmed our hearts. Our hope had been it would shift Christmas for people struggling from surviving to thriving, and at the same time support our local businesses.

Planning Matters

Pitdownies appeal: We can expect the final decision from the Scottish Government Reporter soon. In July 2020 the Reporter David Buylla issued a 'Notice of Intention' in which he said he was minded to allow Springfield's appeal for planning permission for 59 houses and eight flats at Pitdownies, which PKC had refused. He required Springfield and PKC to sign a Section 75 Agreement to cover matters such as the delivery of affordable units and education contributions. Although it took longer than the 13-week period stipulated, documents on the DPEA website indicate that a Section 75 Agreement has now been made.

Lathro Farm, phase 2: We also expect to hear soon the result of Persimmon's appeal over PKC's refusal for 169 houses on phase 2 of Lathro Farm. The target date for a decision was 29 December 2020 but the Reporter (David Buylla, the same as for Pitdownies) certainly has a lot of documents to plough through!

Facebook: Our planning group looks at the Kinross-shire applications that appear on PKC's planning list each week. We're thinking it might be useful to publish the Kinross-shire applications on our Facebook page, so if you want to keep an eye on local planning matters, follow our Facebook page.

Kinross-shire Raingardens Challenge

We have been working with Perth and Kinross Council in relation to the Park and Ride, with our Ecological Designer Jane Shields leading for us on how to overcome some technical issues and create proposals we can put forward consideration and hopefully implementation. Jane is also working closely with local businesses as we try and get some retrofit raingardens created and demonstrate what can be done. We have added making an input to new developments to Jane's remit. That is dependent on support from Scottish Water - the missing partner in this endeavour to date but that is about to change, we hope, following further discussions we've had in January. If successful ,that will allow us to extend the initiative into the next financial year and give us a fair chance to achieve our aims.

In parallel with the above work, Fiona Welch of Collective Architecture is working up a multi-layer set of maps, plans, and photographs showing the raingardens in and around Kinrossshire, in particular the proposed Raingardens Trail from the Park and Ride down to join with the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and possibilities for the High Street- Muirs through Kinross. The principal customer for that output is Perth and Kinross Council, who will then

be able to help us establish the Trail. The Council have been a positive partner in this endeavour from the outset and have recently established an information portal in the Council so each of the different departments can see what is happening and input according to their specific remits, i.e. roads; maintenance; planning (placemaking and development control); trees and biodiversity; and flood risk management.

We have also been in discussion with ecologists in NatureScot (formerly SNH), Perth and Kinross, RSPB and Tayside Wildlife, to participate in the various biodiversity and habitat protection and enhancement initiatives they have in hand or planned. We are natural allies with mutual interests.

Ever the optimists, we have also been seeking designs and quotes for awards for participating businesses and departments in Perth and Kinross Council (they seem excluded from many environment award schemes); the positive side of Kinross-shire Civic trust activities! We are grateful for the help of Jacquie Seller Ceramics.

The Covid crisis has hit us hard, making the many necessary site and office meetings difficult or impossible at various times during the year past and again now. But we are continuing to work as above and shall be in touch with key groups and businesses as soon as we

Goldeneye For The Ladies

WE ARE NOW INTO February and, for me, this is when spring starts to rear its weary head. The start of January was icy, snowy and cold and I am not saying February will be much better, but sometimes you can notice a little warmth in the sun. February is a great time to spot the first early flowers of spring. Look out for Primrose (Primula vulgaris) near woodlands and hedgerows, Lesser Celandine (Ficaria verna) along ditches and streams, Wood Anemone (Anemone nemorosa) on the woodland floor and Common dog violet (Viola riviniana) in grasslands and gardens.

Birds will start to think about pairing up again for the breeding season. Have a look out for mute swan pairs on the loch; they can be identified by feeding together. Watch out for their territorial displays. This is when there is a dispute over territory or personal space. The unhappy swans will swim towards each other with their wings in a 'V-Shaped' posture and will parade around until one of them moves off. Mute swans can also do a 'courtship display' in February. Pairs can be seen paddling around in circles together for minutes at a time as well as doing their well renowned 'heart-shape head movements'.

February is a great time to watch duck displays as well. What better way to show your love to a partner than to do some wicked (and sometimes frankly weird) dance moves. Potentially, one of the most well-known duck displays comes from the goldeneye. The drakes (males) extend their neck and flick their head right onto their back. It is an amazing sight! The UK's most common duck, the mallard can be seen displaying as well. Head to any local loch/pond/river where you see mallard duck and look out for their head pumping and tail docking.


Keep on the lookout for small birds pairing up. One of the most colourful small birds is the bullfinch. If you are lucky, you will spot them around the loch or maybe even in your garden! Mary's Knowe and Burleigh are good hotspots for them. The males are stunning birds with their bright red-pink breast and cheeks. They have a grey back and a black cap. The females are similar but instead of red-pink breast and cheek it is more of a mottled brown. They also have a lovely soft whistle call, one of my favourite wee birds.

Latest wildlife highlights around the reserve include; 1812 coot, 200 whooper swan, pygmy shrew, 4 scaup, 6 little egret, 450 goldeneye, 800 teal, lots of roe deer and a stoat!

As the grasps of winter start to loosen, make sure to get out on the reserve and make the most of the crisp weather. Spring will soon start to raise its head even more and before you know it sand martins will be flying and calling overhead... but hey, more about that next month!

Ducks Deluxe!

AS WE SHUT OUR doors to the outside world and settle in for another long month of lockdown, the wildlife at Loch Leven have been getting on with things in their usual fashion. Red squirrel activity has been especially good at the reserve in recent times, with several sightings down at the peanut feeders and in the larches.

The recent cold weather has kept our bird feeders busy too, with lots of hungry blue tits, great tits and coal tits visiting regularly. Treecreepers have also been spotted on the trees near the feeders scaling along the bark looking for insects. On the wetland

trail up to five little egrets have been spotted at one time, alongside several disgruntled looking grey herons.

A bit of an unusual sighting of a long-tailed duck has also been spotted on the loch. This bird is a small, neat sea duck. They have small round heads and steep foreheads. In winter, the male is mainly white with some brownish-black markings. He also has greatly elongated tail feathers – hence the name.

With much of the loch frozen over in the cold weather there was an amusing sighting of 80 curlew stood defiantly in the middle of the frozen loch. Two peregrines have also been spotted out on the wetland trail with a nice report of one being ambushed by the other during a squabble over some potential prey.

Our warden team have been hard at work monitoring wader numbers this month and are pleased to report good numbers of teal and wigeon at the flood. Habitat management continues in preparation for the breeding season. Staff and volunteers have been out cutting back rush to ensure that when the wader chicks arrive, they will have access to the scrapes and pools on the wetland. Lapwing and other waders will be arriving back



in March to breed, so it's all hands on deck to make sure the reserve is as good as it can be before they start nesting! Our project to improve the diversity of our bumblebee meadow (aka pollinator project) continues, but with a twist. We have just secured a new contractor to help us dig up the ground so we can sow wildflower seed into the soil... of the furry variety! We are utilising the wonderful earth that the

moles create for us in the wildflower meadow.

Now instead of spending lots of time turfing and rotavating areas of the meadow to re-seed, we are letting nature take its course by simply flattening and sowing seed into the freshly churned up ground and dotting this all over the meadow. Although judging by the size of some of the mole hills, we are starting to wonder if this is some new variety of ginormous teenage mutant ninja mole! This will hopefully create a burst of colour with new blooms of poppies and cornflowers.

Has Anyone Lost A Pig?

I THOUGHT THAT I WOULD start my first article of 2021 by writing about a subject I have been known to mention on the odd occasion — the weather.

The autumn turned very wet just after harvest time. It was just as well the potato harvest I help with (as featured in Fiona's articles) was started and finished earlier than usual, because the rain came on the day after that job was finished and didn't stop until just before Christmas. The change to drier cooler conditions was very welcome and although our road and yard were pretty icy at times, at least the temperatures generally weren't too extreme, so frozen pies weren't too much of a problem. Really hard frosts in December can cause problems here at Backward Farm. This is because we are on the 'dark side' of the valley, so, in December when the sun is at its lowest in

the sky, it only rises up above the hills behind us for two or three hours a day. The result is that we don't get much of a thawing effect on our farm buildings. Once we get well through January and into February the thawing effect of the sun's rays dramatically improves and the cold nights don't bite so hard. Already, midway through January, there is a noticeable difference to the daylight hours, which I always find very encouraging.

We are fully settled into the winter routine with all the cattle inside, even the hardy little Dexter cattle which are a recent

addition to the farm stock. The frosty conditions meant they were able to stay out longer than expected without damaging their field too much.

There has been plenty of grass to keep the sheep happy up till now, although I have given them an occasional bale of haylage recently in case they were a bit hungry due to the snow on the ground. They are mostly in good condition and they will be getting pregnancy scanned in a couple of weeks, so we will find out how many lambs to expect come the spring. We decided to delay lambing slightly this year so there should be more grass available at lambing time. That should reduce the cost of buying supplementary feeding for the sheep and we hope to lamb most of them outside. We will see how that goes.

The pigs' excavation antics have been slowed by the ground being frozen. Once they find a softer area, they can soon dig a new hole. They will no doubt be happy that it has thawed a bit for the moment as they will be able to dig more freely again. They are amazingly hardy creatures. They are out rooting about quite happily even on the most miserable of days.

We have been making some new paddocks for them and experimenting with a new 'super duper' style of fencing in an attempt (again) to keep them better contained. It is more expensive and more time-consuming to build, but early signs are encouraging and hopes are high. Time will be the judge.

Sjakie, one of the original Gloucester Old Spot boars found fame on social media the other day as he decided to 'go walk about' along the road. As if the 20-acre field he was in wasn't big enough! They are free range pigs, after all – very free range.
