Traffic On New Road, Milnathort

We live on New Road, Milnathort which runs through the middle of the village. While we are very lucky to live in such a lovely area, I have noticed more and more recently that people who drive to visit the shops in the village seem to be sitting with engines running while they eat ice creams, use their phones or just wait for people who are in the shops. New Road itself is getting busier, which I guess we can't do anything about, but I feel it is really inconsiderate of people sitting with engines running while they are parked. It's getting to the stage where I can't walk from our house to the cross in the middle of the village without passing 2 or 3 cars doing this. This is mainly in the area outside the local shops.

Kinross Railway: Practical Or Pie In The Sky?

WHILE IT MAY BE a wish for a rail link to the Fife circle from Cowdenbeath to Perth and thus link Kinross by rail to Edinburgh, there are major questions that need to be answered even before one is considered. Not least is the question as to the route to be taken and the actual cost, given what has happened to the course of the old railway line since its closure in the 1970s.

Where rail links have been re-established elsewhere the main advantage was that much of the route of the railway that had been closed as a result of Dr Beeching still existed, this is not the case with the Cowdenbeath to Perth link. The original line branched off outside Cowdenbeath at Lumphinnans, an area which has now been built upon in a number of places. It proceeded to stations at Kelty Junction close to the old Aiken Pits and mineral lines which served mining in the area, then on to Blairadam Station and Kinross Station to Milnathort and Mawcarse where it branched to go through to Glenfarg, Bridge of Earn and then Perth.

Looking at this railway, which I am old enough to remember and have used as a youngster, there appears to be major difficulties in re-establishing this route. The course of the line has been developed not only at Cowdenbeath but elsewhere on its route. To the north the embankments that were in place have been levelled, not least those that ran through or close to the Aitkin Colliery which is now part of Lochore Meadows Country Park. Further north, what was Blairadam Station is now a private house and other homes and buildings have been built on the course of the railway at the side of the B996 (old A90). The B909 Vane Farm Road (South Loch Road) went over a railway bridge close to the B906. This was removed years ago. While the bridge over the old railway line still exists at Bridge End in Kinross, houses have been built on this part of the route, as well as on much of Junction Road, Sainsburys, Davis Park and parts of the 'Wimpey Estate', Lathro Park, the Persimmons development and the list goes on.

The line branched to the north at Mawcarse and much of the original route through Glenfarg is now part of the M90. In Bridge of Earn there are again houses and housing developments built on the course of the old line with a large housing estate now existing where it meets the current line into Perth from North Fife.

Given this, it would appear that the cost of purchasing all the land required, creating new tunnels and embank-

ments could be prohibitive. New homes would need to be built to re-house people as not all the houses are private homes. This would be the case even if the line stopped at Kinross. Would such an expense justify the use to which the line would be put, especially if it did stop in Kinross-shire? Or is there another route being proposed? If so, from where?

Reopening The Train Line Through Kinross And Milnathort Is A Non-Starter

THIS IS BECAUSE OF THE UK ban on sales of new diesel and petrol car sales by 2030. The carbon cost of building a Kinross railway would be astronomical compared to the carbon savings. By the time it would be built all cars will be powered by renewable energy and not oil, so transport by electric train would have a negligible effect on the carbon usage of people going from Perth to Edinburgh.

With Scotland about to hit its 100% renewable electricity target, the carbon cost of construction becomes one of the primary issues and cannot be justified.

Two infrastructure projects that could benefit Kinross-shire would be a train halt at Halbeath Park & Ride and bringing the trams from Edinburgh airport over the old road bridge to Ferrytoll Park & Ride.

Of concern is the Kinross-shire power grid, as most houses are fused for 1 Phase 63 Amp, and ideally to charge a car without much waiting you need a house to have an extra 3

Phase 32A socket. This would require extra wiring for most houses and the street cabling. Do we need to provide grants for this to get it done?

There is also the need to provide far more public car charging points, and has the Kinross shire grid the ability to cope with the extra load.

So, if there is transport infrastructure money available, spend it on coping with car electrification, not on a rail link.

I MUST DECLARE MYSELF as having a love of trains and train journeys; in fact, most things train apart from the high price of tickets and crowded compartments. A train-link from Kinross, attractive as it is, may not be feasible in terms of practicability or cost, particularly in the coming period of inevitable economic pressure post-pandemic. Other priorities and pressures on the public purse will rightly be given precedence.

An alternative and perhaps more realistic option might lie in improving the already successful Park and Ride schemes by increasing space capacity. Increasing the number of direct Express services, particularly to Glasgow from Dunfermline, increasing the number of buses from Kinross and putting an end to long-stay holiday or overnight parking — Dunfermline — would be a good start. This would be a discussion more likely to bear fruit.

UK Government Spending In Scotland

I READ THE LETTER from Susan Forde in the March *Newsletter* about UK Government spending in Scotland.

She wrote; "Only 57% of the taxes paid by the people of Scotland is returned to Scotland. The other 43% is retained to pay for the House of Lords, HS2, nuclear power stations in England, and the vast expense of illegal weapons. Scotland is a net contributor to Westminster. For comparison: every £1 pro rata sent to the EU got back £17 – a better deal than 57p in the £1."

Ms. Forde is obviously unaware that the Scottish Government publishes something called Government Expenditure & Revenue (GERS) every year, prepared by qualified and independent statisticians. The publication is overseen, approved and published by the SNP ministers.

It tells us that in 2019/20, Scotland's economy raised £66 billion in revenue. Holyrood spent £48 billion, but here is the bit that Ms. Forde conveniently overlooks. The fact is that Westminster spends an additional £33 billion of spending both for and in Scotland (mainly pensions and benefits, but also network rail costs, research & innovation investment, R&D tax credits, Foreign Office costs, DWP and HMRC staff, etc.).

So, in fact, total government spending in Scotland is £81 billion versus our revenue of £66 billion, a deficit of £15 billion. Therefore every £1 sent to Westminster brings us back £1.23 in spending, and not 57 pence as Ms. Forde states.

Just to confirm, these are not my opinions. These are the facts as published by the Scottish Government.

The bottom line here is that no rational interpretation of

the data could conclude that Scotland gets back less than it sends to Westminster. Accepting this is not to deny the possibility of independence, but if independence is such a good idea, you would think that supporters would use facts instead of fiction.



Community Help Re-Build The Mill Hide

THE COMMUNITY has rallied round to help rebuild the Mill Hide, which was burned to the ground in February.

Neil Mitchell, from NatureScot, told the Newsletter:

'The sheer volume of positive thoughts and offers of help we have received is truly astonishing. Encouraged by the many offers of support from the community, we are leading a campaign to raise funds to re-build the hide through MyParkScotland, Scotland's only crowdfunding site specifically for nature reserves, parks and greenspaces.'

Their crowd funder for the hide repairs is available here: www.mypark.scot/projects/rebuild-the-mill-hide/

So far over £15,000 has been raised for the project. The original hide cost about £35,000 and it is anticipated that the replacement cost will be about the same. NatureScot hope to find the remaining funds to rebuild in 2021, and thanks to the generosity of the Kinross-shire community they are now off to a great start.

Meanwhile, local business Loch Leven Brewery have created a limited edition *Pheonix* beer; half of all sales of the beer will go to NatureScot.

Brewery director Thomas Moffat said, 'Like everyone else, we were shocked at the news of the fire. We wanted to help raise funds for the new bird hide. The name Phoenix came to me and it seemed perfect, because it was a bird rising from



a fire.' Interest in the Pheonix beer was recently boosted thanks to a re-tweet by author Ian Rankin.

NatureScot's Neil Mitchell said: 'We're really pleased that Loch Leven Brewery is supporting the Mill Hide rebuild project'.

£160,000 FOR LOCH LEVEN HERITAGE TRAIL

AS REPORTED BY COUNCILLOR Willie Robertson in his column last month, many residents of Kinross-shire are very concerned about the current condition of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail. Since the trail was officially opened in 2014, no major works have been carried out to repair it. The path has become badly eroded in several places and also requires widening in other sections. There are also some sections that are prone to flooding. Cllr Robertson made a bid as part of the Council's 2021/22 budget for £160,000 to help restore the path to an excellent condition.

He says, 'I am delighted to say that my bid was successful. The Heritage Trail is an extremely well-used community asset and it mustn't be allowed to deteriorate. The investment that has been secured will allow the damaged sections to be repaired and make the trail once more usable by everyone, including users of mobility scooters and cycling trishaws.'

A spokesperson from NatureScot told the Newsletter:

'NatureScot are pleased that Perth & Kinross Council are funding and undertaking much needed maintenance and improvement work on the Loch Leven Heritage Trail. With around 250,000 visitors each year, bringing an estimated £2m in economic benefit to the surrounding area, the NNR and the Trail will be valuable assets to Kinrosshire in our green recovery from the Covid crisis.

'We look forward to supporting and working with Perth & Kinross Council and TRACKS as they undertake this important work on the Trail.'

Milnathort School Covid Scare

MILNATHORT NURSERY SCHOOL was forced to close in March only a few weeks after re-opening, after several children and staff tested positive for Covid-19.


It was a bittersweet Monday for the school staff who were welcoming all their P4-P7 children back into the building on one hand but had to close the doors of the nursery with the other.

The school staff are currently working with NHS Tayside, Public Health Scotland and Perth & Kinross's education and children's services to contain the outbreak. Less than a week after schools returned, more than 200 pupils and staff members in the Perth & Kinross area have had to self-isolate.

'I appreciate that this will be an anxious and worrying time,' said headteacher, Sandra McColgan.

Families of nursery children were sent letters detailing their isolation dates. Close contacts may also have been asked to stay home for up to 10 days and were also asked to take a test at the start of the isolation period. Those who develop symptoms have also been asked to arrange a test.









LOCAL COUNCILLORS TO TRIAL DEVOLUTION FOR KINROSS-SHIRE

LOCAL COUNCILLORS HAVE PLEDGED to pilot a devolved decision-making committee for Kinross-shire.

The county of Kinross was established in the thirteenth century with the parishes of Kinross and Orwell (Milnathort). An Act of Parliament in 1685 expanded it to include the parishes of Cleish, Portmoak and Tullibole (Fossoway). Kinross-shire formed a joint county council with Perthshire in 1929 before being amalgamated into the new Perth and Kinross District Council in 1975 and its modern-day successor from 1996.

The scheme, which was part of the Perth and Kinross Council budget passed on 10 March 2010, would give Kinross-shire ward councillors more control over local decisions and budgets and will also seek to involve community councils and other local groups.

The scheme could consider taking local decisions on priorities such as local economic development, tourism, community transport, road safety, footpaths and local infrastructure projects. The initial pilot will not, however, cover quasi-judicial matters such as the determination of planning and licensing applications.

Plans to introduce a devolved decision-making committee have previously been backed by all six community councils covering Kinross-shire.

Commenting, Councillor Callum Purves, said: 'Despite becoming subsumed into Perth and Kinross Council a number of decades ago, Kinross-shire has retained its local identity: often the priorities of local residents differ from those across Perth and Kinross and the decisions made in Perth.

'I am delighted to have been able to secure funding for this scheme, which is a first step towards restoring some of the powers that were lost when Kinross-shire ceased to be a county in its own right. It will put Kinross-shire residents back at the heart of local decisions.'

MSP Liz Smith added: 'We believe that our local communities are best placed to make the decisions that most affect them. Kinross-shire has a rich history and a strong sense of community. This trial will empower local residents.'

Independent Councillor Mike Barnacle, who backed the plans, commented: 'I was glad to see that the Conservative budget motion included funding to support a pilot devolved committee for Kinross-shire. This is something that I have campaigned for throughout my term of office since 1999. Councillor Purves and I had more recently been working on



proposals for the scheme and this budget commitment will deliver on them.

'I think this proposal will be warmly welcomed across the Kinross-shire community.'

Councillor Willie Robertson had this to say. 'I am delighted that my colleague Councillor Mike Barnacle has managed to get the Council's Conservative administration to agree to fund a pilot area committee for Kinross-shire. It is a longheld ambition of his. The hard work will now begin. We must show that an area committee will work and is able to make a valuable contribution to service delivery and decision making in Kinross-shire. As I write this, I am still not sure what powers the committee will have or what budget will be set to be decided locally, but, as a Liberal Democrat, I believe that as many decisions as possible should be taken locally. As councillors we work with all our community councils and local organisations and are aware of the priorities of local people. We have a history in this county of working together to achieve shared objectives. A local area committee if it is adequately funded and supported by the Council will help to address local priorities quickly and effectively. If we can make a success of this, I am sure that local area committees will follow in other parts of Perth & Kinross. I will do my best to make our area committee a success.'

we have several cooks inducted and ready to start cooking. The befriending side is still on hold until the Government says it is safe to do so. Pictured is one of our newest P&K pairings: the diner looks forward to a homecooked meal each week and they both enjoy a distanced chat on the doorstep.

NEW PIER CAR PARK PLANS

THE KINROSS ESTATE COMPANY made a planning application just over a year ago to improve car parking facilities beside the Pier and Boathouse in Kinross. The car park, originally for anglers, has become more popular over the last ten years or so as one of the starting points for the Loch Leven Heritage Trail.

Unfortunately, it has never been upgraded from being a basic anglers' car park and does not create a good impression for visitors to Kinross and the loch.

Now planning permission and crucial funding is in place, the project can go ahead – thanks to PKC and their Town Centre Fund, without which this would not be possible.

The contract is signed and work is due to start. The project is scheduled to take 4 months and will, all being well, be complete by the end of July. In order to ensure that public access is maintained throughout, together with some car parking capacity, the project is being split into two main phases which are shown on the bottom photo. The 1st phase will be the pink shaded area furthest from the Boathouse beside the Car Auction fence. When that is complete, phase 2 will be the green shaded section closest to the Boathouse.







Jamie Montgomery, Director of the Kinross Estate Company said, 'One of the key aims has been to improve both pedestrian and vehicle access from the High Street. The road between Sandport and the car park is going to be widened but will only have its final surface laid towards the end of the project. However, one of the first things the contractor is going to do is to create a new path for pedestrians alongside the road to avoid them having to walk on the road itself and dodge the cars as has been the case until now.

'Once the car park is complete, it will hopefully be a facility that Kinross can be proud of and an appropriate gateway with which to impress visitors on arrival.

'The Boathouse Restaurant will definitely be reopened at some stage although in precisely which form is still being actively discussed.'

UNEXPLODED BOMB REMOVED FROM MILNATHORT GARDEN

FRIDAY 12 MARCH WAS no average start to the weekend for those living in Milnathort, following the discovery of an unexploded bomb in a garden. Police cordoned off an area on Victoria Avenue in Milnathort while specialist teams investigated. The item, believed to be an ordnance device dating back many years, was found on Friday afternoon.

A police spokeswoman said the homes were evacuated as a 'precaution', and Police Scotland reported that after specialist teams examined the item it was removed from the area. No one was injured by the incident and no damage was caused to any property.

At the time of the incident a Police Scotland spokesperson



said: 'Officers are in attendance in Milnathort after what is believed to be an unexploded ordnance device was found in the Victoria Avenue area. A cordon remains in place while specialist teams examine the item. A number of properties have been evacuated as a precaution.'

The official presence was, naturally, considerable. Three police vans were in attendance as well as other police vehicles, army bomb squad units, and a further emergency service vehicle arriving on the scene just after 7pm. All residents within 100 metres of the device were evacuated from their homes. Some residents were left outside their homes for several hours and were not able to return until 1am.

The device was discovered by Daniel Webster and Stewart Brown after moving a boulder, while renovating the back garden of a home owned by Mr Webster. The device was described as being heavy, about a foot long, and was initially thought to be a WW2 cylinder bomb.

One Milnathort resident told the *Newsletter*, 'When we saw the police cars outside our windows we rushed out to see what had happened. The entire New Road was blocked and a policeman was stopping all the cars. We didn't know at that point what had happened and I felt concerned as my daughter was out on a walk with a friend.

'The news about the bomb came from Facebook, but this



made me even more worried as we had no idea where exactly it was found. It could have been in our neighbour's garden. So, I started wondering why we were not evacuated and contacted my friends who live nearby to check if they were fine. I found out that the bomb was found on Victoria Avenue, so we were a good distance away. This explained why we were not evacuated, but it was surprising that the police did not inform us.

My daughter could not get home from the walk through the village so she had to walk along the golf course and cross the stream to get to the house from the back.

My husband said it made great news to tell friends at work! When I told my friend in Poland yesterday, she told me it had even been on the Polish news! So Milnathort became famous for a day, but it makes you wonder if I should be more careful from now on when digging in the garden.'

Much discussion on the bomb's origins ensued on social media groups after the event. One theory is that it was the among the last of the cargo of a German WWII bomber, disposed of at random after a bombing raid on Dundee.

The map (inset), showing where bombs were dropped in the local area was given to Portmoak Primary a few years ago. It gives a date of 1 November 1940 for bombing activity over Milnathort, although it is not known if the Victoria Avenue bomb is from that date.

A spokesperson for the Army bomb disposal section could not be contacted for comment.



Reminiscence Project For Care Homes

Participants will be invited to write or record memories, compile personal archives and audio playlists, as well as share messages of positivity — Pocket Positives — with local schoolchildren, from their own life experiences.

The project has been awarded more than £7000 from The National Lottery Community Fund and is being delivered in partnership with Culture Perth and Kinross, whose archive collections will add a rich resource of material to the project.

The films will be made available on the Generating Opportunity website (www.generatingopportunity.com) and You-Tube channel over the next 6-8 weeks. There will be written support materials and guidance for people to tell and share their stories, with support to access audio equipment as required. People who wish to share their living memories will be invited to contribute to an anthology of prose and poetry to be published later this year, called Brighter Days Ahead.

At the end of the project, recordings collected will be add-

ed to the Perth and Kinross Archive's oral history collection.

'We are delighted to be delivering a project that we hope will bring a sense of comfort, wellbeing and enjoyment to residents of care homes and others in our community who have suffered so much during the pandemic,' says Project Co-ordinator Linda Grant.

'In partnership with Culture Perth and Kinross and the fantastic community of artists and creative practitioners involved, we will record and celebrate the life stories of our participants. Their living memories and messages of positivity will create a sense of place, time and connection between people, that will enable us to help our community build back better. We would like as many people as possible to participate, including members of care and support groups and individuals in hospital or in the community, who have been isolated through their personal situations or health conditions.'

The National Lottery Community Fund Scotland Chair Kate Still commented: 'I would like to congratulate Generating Opportunity on their award. Theirs is an important project and will support people now and in the future when they can physically come back together to make great things happen in their community.'

Jordan Irvine, Senior Officer Communities and Learning at Culture Perth and Kinross added: 'We are excited to be a partner in this project supporting people to reminisce and record their living memories, with the opportunity for these to live on as part of the Perth and Kinross Archive. The world moves at such a fast pace now that we must not forget how the past has shaped the present.'

wants to do whatever he can to help with the renovations.



Kinross First Responders: Raising Defibrillator Awareness In Our Community

THE KINROSS FIRST RESPONDERS CHARITY, with support from the local community, has so far placed seven public access defibrillators around Kinross-shire. They hope to add to this later in the year and rely on donations to allow them to maintain the defibrillators that they look after on behalf of the community.

Defibrillators, or heart-restarters as they are known, can be used in the event of a cardiac arrest to restart a patient's heart. They cannot cause harm and will only administer a shock if needed. They require no training to use and talk you through the steps to take with simple and clear instructions that anyone can follow. Bystanders can do CPR (chest compressions) to keep blood flowing around the patient's body whilst a defibrillator is obtained, or an ambulance arrives.

As a local volunteer run charity, they are trying to increase awareness of the location of all public access defibrillators in Kinross-shire. These have been put in place by a combination of organisations including ourselves, private companies and community groups/organisations. Some are accessible 24h per day (You will likely need a code to access which can be obtained by calling 999) and others are only available during opening hours. Most importantly if you think you need one for a patient who is unresponsive and not breathing normally, remember to call 999 immediately. The call operator will talk you through the actions to take, and if there is someone else with you, they will tell you the location of the nearest defibrillator and the access code for the cabinet.



As we start to emerge from the pandemic we can reflect on the fantastic work done by local community groups in our area, including Broke Not Broken, Kinross Kindness, Kinross Centre, KYTHE, Crook of Devon Resilience Group, Glenfarg



Community Council, Ability Net, and Kinross Voluntary Group. All these groups have provided an amazing response to the challenges of the pandemic.

And each of these groups had access to crucial money through the Kinross Action Partnership—in a quick and relatively easy manner—to help them provide key services during the pandemic.

I'm sure that most residents of Kinross will share my concern that the Council Budget presented last month does not allocate any money to our Kinross Action Partnership (KAP). The KAP wants to continue providing funding to our local community groups so that those groups can continue supporting all of us as we slowly emerge from the pandemic.

But the only funding that can be provided is limited to money left over from last year. The SNP budget had £600,000 allocated for Action Partnerships to support communities emerging from the pandemic and extra money to fund Social Prescribing to aid mental and physical well-being. While there is also some money left over from previous budgets for the Community Investment Fund, I have enquired of the council over the last few months what access the Action Partnerships have to this money. I still await a full response to this.

It is essential that we support our groups on the front line in dealing with the after-effects of the pandemic and lockdowns, especially well-being and mental health.

It is also important that we provide adequate support to our local businesses that have been adversely affected by the lockdowns. Perth and Kinross Council have responded by directly distributing 56 million pounds from the Scottish Government to businesses throughout the Council Area. This includes a discretionary fund to plug any gaps in the funding.

In February I was informed by residents that raw sewage from the Lathro Meadows development was being pumped from a 30,000-litre tanker into drains at Lathro Park. I immediately raised the issue with the Council and with Scottish Water. This was followed a few days later by tankers pumping sewage out of the

drains in Lathro Lane. Investigations by Scottish Water don't seem to have been conclusive over exactly what happened.

This has highlighted the issue of the drains on the Lathro Meadows Development. I've made my views very clear to Persimmon and to the Council that we need to ensure these drains are brought up to an adoptable standard by Persimmon. When speaking to the Development Operations team from Scottish Water, I was given a commitment that they will continue to give as much help to Persimmon as needed to ensure this happens.

I'm delighted to see further progress on upgrading the car park at the Pier on Loch Leven, with work due to start immediately, thanks to Jamie Montgomery. This will be good use of the Scottish Government's Town Centre fund that is being used to fund this project, money that was suggested and sponsored by myself through council. The clear links between Loch Leven Pier and Kinross Town Centre, will provide a clear economic boost to local businesses in Kinross by maximising the tourist potential of Loch Leven within the town.

PKC budget debate on 10/3/21

At the Full Council meeting 24/2/21 we had received an update on the terms of the draft 2021/22 Scottish Government Budget, including funding for a Council Tax freeze. During the debate, when



all political groups except the Liberal Democrats agreed to that freeze for 2021/22, I said I was not a fan of council tax freezes and hope that accepting this one was not a precursor to future freezes like a previous 10-year freeze period under the SNP Government. Freezes are usually caveated by significant ring-fencing of Government funds allocated to local authorities, who increasingly become mere agents of government policy. However, as we exit the COVID lockdown it is probably appropriate to support a freeze and it is of course electorally popular before an election because all but the most discerning of the public do not make the connection between cuts in services resulting from council tax freezes.

Subsequently, having agreed a freeze, PKC had to debate how to adjust our provisional Revenue budget which had been based on a council tax increase of 4.28% in March 2020.

So, on 10/3/21 the Independent Group produced a budget which, unlike the other party groups, did not involve taking any money from earmarked Reserves for Covid-19. In my speech to the debate, I highlighted 3 main themes to our budget proposals for additional expenditure:

- 1. Post Covid-19 lockdown we felt there was a need to support children, youth and older people so made proposals for Youth Community Golf & Tennis (£75,000), the Equalities Fund (£40,000), Supporting Activities for Older People (£75,000) and Mental Health Initiatives (£70,000).
- 2. We made capital provisions totalling £31.75 million to be funded from Revenue by covering the annual cost of borrowing at current 'record' low interest rates; so effectively providing, amongst other things, a Rural Tourism Infrastructure Fund (£1m), a Town Centre Regeneration Fund (£3m), Local Roads (£3.5m + £40,000 from Revenue for unadopted roads that had been previously withdrawn, including provisions for pothole repairs & flood prevention i.e. ditch clearance and gully cleaning, the latter not mentioned by other groups), Loch Leven Heritage Trail (£250,000) and Active Travel Routes/Paths (£1m).

3. I also asked Members to note that most of our additional expenditure proposals were based on recurring expenditure, not just for one year, in a rolling programme for the future.


Finally, in relation to Kinross-shire Ward, we proposed 3 measures:

- 1. Funding to support administration costs (£40,000) for a 'pilot' Area Committee of PKC for Kinross-shire. I have been working for this since my first term of office began in 1999 and would like to see it come to fruition before I stand down in 2022. A scheme for devolving power to community level is particularly appropriate for the former county of Kinross-shire whose area population is so much greater than it was at re-organisation of local government in the 1970s. The concept is supported by the 4 local members and the Kinross-shire Forum of Community Councils, with ClIr Purves and myself having recently pursued a draft scheme with officers and happy to work further on an acceptable scheme that, initially, would not include quasi-judicial matters and would retain voting rights to local members only.
- 2. The Kinross Railway 'Feasibility Study' builds on a PKC unanimous decision of 4/10/17 made at our historic council meeting in Kinross and provides £50,000.
- Regional Parks (£50,000) need feasibility work on the creation of an Ochil Hills Regional Park and the expansion of the Lomond Hills Park, which is also supported by Kinross-shire Forum & Local Members.

Unfortunately, our budget did not pass but the proposals from the minority Tory Administration did and that included money for Local Roads (£4m including restoring the withdrawn funding for unadopted roads), Loch Leven Heritage Trail (£160,000), the provision of a new permanent ranger service that we had suggested and crucially our 'pilot' local decision-making committee for Kinross-shire Ward (£40,000). Our budget lost to the SNP amendment, which was then set against the Administration's budget and I voted for the latter because of the noted inclusions above.

If any reader wants further clarity on the budget debate and proposals, I am happy to provide it.

Council Tax

The main focus of the last month at the Council was the annual budgetsetting meeting. Last year, I was the only councillor to propose freezing the council tax, so I was pleased that this year



all councillors supported this move except those in the Liberal Democrats who proposed a rise of 4.28 per cent.

I believe that it is incumbent on councillors to try to keep the tax burden on their constituents as low as possible and to seek to deliver high-quality public services as efficiently as possible. Freezing the council tax was particularly important this year given the strains that many people are under having reduced incomes or sadly lost their jobs as a result of the pandemic.

While we received the equivalent of offsetting a 3% council tax rise from the Scottish Government our overall grant from Holyrood only rose by 0.9%. This is despite the fact that the UK Government's block grant to the Scottish Parliament is rising by 9 per cent over the same period. While I believe there are still many ways Councils can be more efficient, whenever we make improvements it just goes into plugging the gap of the Scottish Government's underfunding. We really need local government to be given its fair share.

Kinross-shire Devolution

That being said, this was a strong budget for Kinross-shire.

With the support of Councillor Barnacle, I managed to secure a commitment from the Conservative administration to pilot a devolved decision-making committee for Kinross-shire. I share the frustration of many local residents at some of the decisions that are taking up in Perth. This is less about political differences, and more about the fact that what suits Perth or another part of Perthshire might not suit Kinross-shire.

I need to be clear, however, that this is not a panacea. The initial pilot will not cover some of the thorny issues like the determination of planning or licensing applications. There is still also a need for the whole of the Council to adopt a more 'Think Yes' approach to solving problems for local residents. But it is very much a step in the right direction and one that I am very much looking forward to progressing.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail

Recent severe weather has damaged the condition of the trail and there are problems with the path's surface and width and with drainage. Councillors Robertson, Barnacle and I all included funding for the maintenance of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail in our budgets and this finance was secured in the final vote.

The trail is a fantastic tourist attraction and a great draw for local businesses but is also much valued by local residents who have made even better use of it during the lockdown. It is essential that it is well maintained and while much capital funding has been secured over the years from external funding, it is more difficult to secure maintenance costs so it is welcome that the Council will step in.

Subject Choice

It was also a good budget for the whole of Perth & Kinross too.

We have seen a worrying reduction in the breadth of course choice at secondary schools across Scotland over the past few years. It is vitally important that our pupils have access to the subjects that they need and at the appropriate level so that they are not deprived of any future opportunities.

The Conservatives on the Council therefore pledged additional investment into the expansion of subject choice. Both through funding to accelerate the rollout of the virtual campus programme to provide more academic subjects and additional funding for the expansion of vocational courses, local young people will start to see an increased breadth of choice, which is a very welcome development.

Social Care

Social care can often be difficult to provide in more rural areas and we have had problems in recent years with private companies being able to provide services in Kinross-shire.

In Highland Perthshire, they have established a care and wellbeing co-operative. These co-operatives support self-employed carers and personal assistants to provide bespoke care packages for local people. These carers often live in the same communities as the services users and the co-operatives give local residents a greater degree of personal choice in the care they receive.

The Conservatives on the Council have invested funds to expand this model into other areas of Perth & Kinross. This will help us to reduce inequality of access to services that support care and wellbeing. It will also help to increase the employability of existing workers and potentially also to attract new people to work in the area of personal care.

Economic Development

Our local businesses have had had a difficult time over the past year. They have had to contend with multiple enforced shutdowns and the requirement to adapt by moving on-line or ensuring business premises are COVID compliant.

Local Conservatives on the Council have put forward a £1.3 million funding package to support economic development. It includes grants and loans for small businesses as well as incentives to get vacant properties back into use and to encourage local businesses to try establishing their own retail premises. It was disappointing that the SNP failed to include any money for economic development in their amendment.

I am sure these proposals will be welcomed by many of our hard-working business owners and employees across Perth & Kinross. In particular, I want to welcome the proposal for a skills passport. Many people have sadly lost their jobs as a result of the coronavirus restrictions and there is no certainty about what jobs will remain or return. When there are such changes in our economy, the state sometimes has a role to assist people retrain and reskill so that they can take advantage of different employment opportunities. This initiative will give a helping hand to get many local residents back into the workplace.

Roads

This state of the roads is one of the issues that is raised with me most often by constituents. The restrictions placed on works early in the pandemic and many staff who would usually have been fixing potholes being redeployed to support the coronavirus response has made the situation worse. On top of this, the recent severe winter weather has resulted in even more and larger potholes on our roads.

The Conservatives on Perth & Kinross Council are committed to tackling this problem and to putting our money where our mouth is. To that end, we announced an additional £4 million investment in roads maintenance for the new financial year on top of the £10 million already in the budget. This total pot of £14 million is the single biggest annual investment in our roads in Perth & Kinross Council history. I very much hope we shall be seeing improvements in the near future.

All in all, this is a good budget for Kinross-shire, particularly with the proposals for devolution. It will also benefit people across the whole of Perth & Kinross with its focus on recovery from the pandemic, while protecting the incomes of local families, and prioritizing key issues such as subject choice expansion, social care, and getting our roads up to standard.

Perth & Kinross Council Budget

The Council was agreed on 10 March and had some good news for Kinross-shire residents.

The highlights are;

- The Council Tax has been frozen
- Kinross-shire has been chosen to pilot a devolved area committee (see separate article on p.11)
- £160,000 awarded to carry out repairs to the Loch Leven Heritage Trail (see below)
- Road repairs budget increased from £10 million to £14 million!

Unsung Heroes

As many of you know many of the Council's staff responsible for clearing our verges and streets of litter have been transferred to other duties during the current pandemic. The reason that our paths and roadside verges are not now covered in litter is down to a few dedicated volunteer litter-picking teams in Milnathort and Kinross. Between them they have collected nearly 120 bags of litter. Since the start of the pandemic the Kinross group has grown to 26 volunteers, this includes Eco group, other volunteers and young people from Kythe. Plus there are a number who go out individually on a regular basis. The Kinross co-ordinator is Gillian Boardman who started in Lockdown April 2020 by clearing the community wood at Lathro, plus school campus area. She collected 39 bags of rubbish in total. Then in the summer last year she heard about the Eco church group that was being set up within Kinross Parish Church. Litter picking was one of their action points so Gillian, together with Susan Smith and Christine Reid took the lead in developing the group. One of the volunteers kindly donated £300 so the group could purchase additional litter pickers, high viz vests and gloves!

Milnathort also has a very active litter picking group that works in tandem with the Kinross one. They have cleared litter as far out as Mawcarse and down to the Milnathort Waste Water Treatment works.

Perth & Kinross Council have provided bags and 6 litter pickers and the local depot collects the full bags of litter on the organised picking days.

There are also other litter picking teams in other parts of Kinross-shire. I notice that all the roads around Dalqueich and Craigow have been litter picked recently. We all owe a big vote of thanks to everyone who is trying to keep our beautiful county litter free.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail

As I reported last month, I am very concerned about the condition of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail. There has been to major works done to the trail since it opened in 2014 and the path is now badly eroded in places and also requires widening in other sections. There are also sections prone to flooding. I made a bid as part of the Council's 2021/22 budget for £160,000 to help restore the path to an excellent condition. I am delighted to say that my bid was successful.

The heritage trail is an extremely well-used community asset and it mustn't be allowed to deteriorate. The investment that has been secured will allow the damaged sections to be repaired and make the trail once more usable by everyone, including users of mobility scooters and cycling trishaws.

Fly-tipping Junction 5

I am aware of the rubbish dumped beside the layby on the east side of junction 5 on the M90. BEAR Scotland have said that it isn't their land as does the Council so neither will remove the rubbish. I have now contacted the Council's Community Justice Service (CJS) and have asked if it can be cleared by offenders carrying out community service orders. All CJS staff have currently been transferred to help in the NHS but will resume their duties on the 26 April and have promised to see what they can do then.

Winter Maintenance

Another plus from the recent Council budget was an increase in the money available for supplying self-push gritters to communities. Glenlomond village has already successfully secured a self-push gritter from the Council for use in the village next winter. Please let me know if you are interested in this scheme and I will send you details on it.

Road repairs

Everyone is complaining about the condition of our roads. A combination of the winter weather and delays caused by the pandemic have led to a backlog in road repairs. The A911 is particularly bad and many of the road drains along this road between Milnathort and Scotlandwell are a danger to drivers and cyclists. The Council are working hard to get these repairs done. The extra £4 million in next year's budget will help the roads department to catch up with outstanding works.

THE ECONOMY OF KINROSS-SHIRE – and of that of the whole UK – will benefit from a range of positive measures rolled out in the Chancellor's Budget, which was recently announced.



Rishi Sunak highlighted just how serious the financial impact of Covid is, and, as a result, he set out a series of steps which will hopefully create a stable economy in Scotland and the rest of the UK as we come out of lockdown and return to some form of normality.

The measures, which will help businesses in Kinross-shire, included extending the extremely beneficial furlough scheme until the autumn and increasing the amount of Universal Credit by £20 a week – a move that the Scottish Conservatives had called for. The Chancellor also confirmed that more grants will be available to the self-employed and he unveiled a mortgage guarantee scheme to help Britons get on the housing ladder with small deposits.

Under this scheme, the Government will offer lenders a guarantee, incentivising them to boost the number of riskier 95% mortgages.

The UK Budget also saw an extension of the VAT cut to hospitality continuing until September at 5% as well as the setting up of a recovery loan scheme for businesses and the freezing of fuel duty and also on all alcohol duties, including whisky, which is vital to Scotland with 11,000 jobs protected as a result.

Other measures that will benefit Scotland include a £150 million community buy scheme which could allow communities to take over struggling pubs, sport clubs and theatre venues and a £520 million Help to Grow scheme, offering management training for firms to boost productivity, as well as providing £34 million towards various projects in north-east Scotland.

Another major announcement made as part of the Budget was a new UK Infrastructure Bank, which will provide loans that can be tailored to support the needs of renewable energy and carbon storage projects, and I believe the creation of this bank will provide significant benefits to Scotland.

The timing of this announcement couldn't have been better, being made ahead of the UK hosting the climate change COP Conference in Glasgow in November. The UK Infrastructure Bank promises to give a massive boost to green infrastructure projects in Scotland and across the UK.

It will mean that the bank will be able to offer equity, loans and guarantees which will support the needs of private sector infrastructure projects in sectors including energy, carbon capture and storage and transportation.

In addition, the bank will also offer infrastructure loans to local authorities at low rates which will help fund a range of projects right across the UK.

Scotland will benefit significantly from this move as it comes at a pivotal time for the country as we move forward with our aims to tackle climate change and tackle environmental issues in the country.

Businesses across Kinross-shire have all suffered from the devastating financial impact of this pandemic but hopefully many of these measures outlined in the UK Budget will go some way to protect jobs and livelihoods as we look to rebuild the economy.

WE'VE ALL BEEN HEARING a lot about 'Cancel Culture' recently. Apparently, right-wing commentators are finding it impossible to have their voices heard. The claim is that they've been rendered mute by a prevailing intolerance, now widespread on college campuses and elsewhere. The victims, more often than



not, tend to moan at great length about being silenced either in their three-hour radio shows or over double-page spreads in their *Daily Mail* columns. Silenced? Really?

It all rather echoes the tabloid hysteria a few decades back when we were warned that a plague of 'political correctness' was upon us. The tabloids screamed warnings about Council commissars descending on every toy shop in the land to rip muchloved playthings from the hands of babes, simply because the toys mocked minorities with racial epithets. Black bins bags were to go. No more blackboards. And the nation's youth was to be encouraged to adopt homosexuality immediately.

Back to 'cancel culture.' The Prime Minister has decided that there should be a 'free speech champion' to investigate any attempts to impose a collective view on campuses (as if there's ever been a collective view about anything on college campuses). But wait! Just as he's calling for more free speech, he also wants to prevent anyone 'rewriting history'. Now I worry when people say we can't rewrite history. As Churchill (and many others) have said: it's the victor who writes the first draft. It's the duty, surely, of further generations to interpret.

When the Museum of the Home in London recently conducted a survey to decide whether patrons thought its slave-trading founder Robert Geffrye should continue to be honoured with a statue on its front facade, the answer came back 'No. Put him inside with a plaque explaining how he acquired his wealth.' I'm sure Mr Geffrye would have been pleased that, 300 years on, no one in government is trying to 'cancel' his legacy.

What3Words

Members of the public calling 999/101 can now use a mobile phone app to identify their location when they are in an unknown or remote area.

From Tuesday, 9 March, Police Scotland will introduce What3Words as an additional location sharing tool.

What3Words grids the Earth into 3x3 metre squares by encoding GPS coordinates to give each square a unique set of three words. This means that when someone contacts Police Scotland, they have the option to use What3Words if they are in an unfamiliar area, rural location or one that is difficult to describe. However, Police Scotland service advisors will always ask for a postal address as default when someone calls 999/101 – this will not change.

The app is already in use by the majority of emergency services across the UK, including Scottish Fire and Rescue and Scottish Ambulance Service.

What3Words will also help to support local policing incidents and pre-planned operations and events.

Superintendent Iain MacLelland, Digitally Enabled Policing Programme, said: 'What3Words will help front line police officers and staff to locate members of the public quickly when they are calling from an unknown or rural area.

'The introduction of What3Words is a great additional resource for our communities and our officers who serve them.

'It's also important to highlight that, when Covid-19 restrictions begin to ease, we know that people may want to venture further from home, to remote or rural locations. Photographer Ross Mitchell has been a familiar sight on the paths around Loch Leven over the past year, photographing walkers against the backdrop of the changing seasons. Here he shares with us some of his favourite images and talks of this ongoing project, documenting the lockdown experience through the lens of his camera.

IT HAS BEEN A whole year now that I have been doing this project, capturing portraits of people and their four-legged companions whilst out on my daily walk, witnessing the contrast of the different seasons and changes in nature.

Who would have thought that a year on from when I first started, that I would still be doing this? If I'm honest, I did.

It has been such a journey through this pandemic. The one thing we know we are all experiencing just now is our 'new norm' but now, we are starting to see a glimmer of hope.

I know everyone looks forward to my daily posts on the Kinross Community page. You are what keeps me going, that, and my commitment and determination!

It has been a rollercoaster of emotions for me. I walk about 7 miles a day, and being a documentary photographer I have so far captured about 2500 portraits. There are pets that are no longer with us and, sadly, some people in my portraits that are no longer with us either.

I have encountered people that have had Covid-19 and, thankfully, recovered. I have met people that are struggling emotionally. Not only do I take their portrait, but I am someone for them to talk to. For some, I am the only person they have spoken to that day, because they live alone and are really struggling without human contact.

It gives me a feel good factor knowing I have touched people's hearts. That's what gives me the drive to keep on going, although it is physically demanding.

It has been a whole year after all!

The project gives me something to focus on every day. I didn't expect people's engagement in it would be so strong, helping to bring everyone together, even if it is from a distance.





Fontane Had A Fine Time

IN THE SUMMER OF 1858 a young German writer named Theodor Fontane made a journey to Scotland which he later described as 'one of the most beautiful in my life, at all events the most poetic.' A highlight of this Scottish pilgrimage was the opportunity to visit 'the Douglas Castle in the loch by Kinross.' Published in 1860, his account of this excursion from Edinburgh to Loch Leven – Beyond the Tweed: A tour of Scotland in 1858 – is still worth reading more than 160 years later.

Born in Neuruppin in the German state of Brandenburg, Theodor Fontane (1819-98) developed a fascination with Scotland that was prompted by reading the ballads and novels of Sir Walter Scott. His membership of a literary society in Berlin led him not only to translate English and Scottish Ballads into German but also to pen his own ballads, one of which — Archibald Douglas — was later put to music by the composer Carl Loewe, the 'Schubert of north Germany.'

Working as a freelance journalist for various German newspapers, Fontane was able to make several visits to London, eventually earning enough to allow him to travel north to Scotland in 1858. He prepared himself for the journey by reading Black's Picturesque Tourist of Scotland and on 9 August he set off from King's Cross Station in the company of the artist Bernhard von Lepel, a close friend and officer in the regular army of Prussia.

Using Edinburgh as a base for their travels, Fontane and Leper ventured south to the Borders, west to Linlithgow, Stirling, the Trossachs, Oban and Staffa, and north to Inverness. But top of Theodor Fontane's 'to do list' was a visit to Kinross where, he wrote, 'it had long been my wish to see Loch Leven Castle.'

The rail journey from Edinburgh to Kinross was, at that time, a lengthy and circuitous one that began with a short trip to Granton that was followed by a ferry crossing to Burntisland where the train journeyed first to Dunfermline then north-eastwards to Ladybank Junction before turning west along the Fife and Kinross Railway through Auchtermuchty, Strathmiglo, Gateside and Milnathort, the end of the line being Hopefield Station, Kinross. In all, this was a journey of three to four hours.

It is quite likely that Fontane and Leper were the first tourists to travel this route to the 'unpretentious little town' of Kinross since the line was only officially opened on 20 August 1858. Fontane notes that 'on the very day when we left to pay our visit to the old Castle the railway between Edinburgh and Loch Leven was opened.'

Stopping for lunch at the Salutation Hotel, the travellers enjoyed 'salmon-trout, which are a speciality in Loch Leven and must be eaten by everyone who visits Kinross.' The meal was so memorable that Theodor Fontane was to mention Loch Leven salmon-trout in one of his novels, *Cécile*, written nearly 30 years later. Guests served with trout at a lunch in a hotel in the Harz Mountains enter into a debate on where the best trout is to be found. Herr von Gordon, an engineer of Scottish origin praises the salmon-trout of Loch Leven as 'unreservedly finest of all'.

Fontane describes in detail the boat trip out to Castle Island with two boatmen who 'did not seem to be in any undue hurry.' One of the men who acted as guide, was described by him as 'a pale sickly looking man with a dreamy look in his eye.' This was the owner of the boat, David Marshall, tacks-

man of the Loch Leven fishing and well-known local historian whose name is remembered today in the Kinross (Marshall) Museum. Fontane went on to comment on the character of Marshall: 'What raised him far above those hundreds of guides whose acquaintance I have made was his unaffected enthusiasm for the lake and for the island castle towards which we were now rowing.'

A man of few words initially, David Marshall gradually began to appreciate Theodor Fontane's interest in local history, especially the story of Mary Queen of Scots and her imprisonment in the castle. Fontane went on to write 'No sooner, however, had he recognised in me an unsimulated interest and a certain familiarity with the history of the place than his heart overflowed, and in time with the strokes of the oars, as they went up and down, we now heard the verse-rhythms of all those who ever had sung a song in honour of Loch Leven.'

In writing his account of this visit to Loch Leven Castle in the company of von Leper, David Marshall and a broad-shouldered boatman, Fontane begins by quoting lines from Michael Bruce's poem Lochleven. The chapter concludes with the story of the escape Mary Queen of Scots from Loch Leven Castle as told to Fontane by Marshall who 'despised Sir Walter Scott's version'.

Fontane's companion, Bernhard von Leper, to whom the book *Beyond the Tweed: A tour of Scotland in 1858* is dedicated, made a number of pencil drawings which have been included in various editions of the work. His sketch of Castle Island includes, in the bottom right-hand corner, a small boat carrying the four men on an excursion that made perhaps the greatest impression on Theodor Fontane who went on to become one of Germany's most noted writers, lifting the German nineteenth-century novel from provincialism to the European mainstream.


This winter she was always present. I was mending the netting that protects the strawberries that had been torn by the snow. Before my lunch I went back to admire my work.

OLIO

PICTURE THE SCENE: you are off for three weeks of holidays abroad, but before all the suitcases are packed, your fridge needs to be cleaned out. Off you to see the neighbours, to offer them that bottle of milk, a few carrots and an unopened tub of cream cheese. Phew, no need to put them in our, already very full, landfill bin.

The idea of sharing (more often referred as 'getting rid of') is not strange, but it is only on rare occasions that we apply it to food. More often, perhaps, we share household goods and bric-a-brac. It might then not surprise us that annually in the UK, £15 billion tons of food goes to waste. 71% of that comes from private households (Guardian, 2019). The result is huge amount of waste, causing devastation of the environment and an increase in climate change. On the other hand, over 8 million people live in poverty and are malnourished. Is there a way to solve this by preventing such waste?

You might say there are already food banks and charities that address this problem. However, reducing food waste is a much more difficult problem than we can imagine and many types of food (perishable items) are not accepted by food banks. Hence in the middle of summer, when you grow too many courgettes or apples, they are a definite surplus not easily distributed among all your friends. Some of them might also hate courgettes. What then?

The answer is quite simple – OLIO.

OLIO was created in 2015 by Tessa Cook and Sasha Celestial-One in north London. It soon gained huge popularity in the UK and 46 other countries, with 900,000 users. In December 2018 OLIO received a climate action award at the UN climate change conference.

OLIO is a FREE app available to download on your mobile from the Play store. The app lets you list items like food (any food needs to be fresh or within sell by date) or non-food household products (any small and large everyday use). In order to list an item, just take a photo and give a very brief description. Pick-ups are arranged through private messages within the app. Once there are several local OLIO users it is a good way to share surplus food or unwanted household items with people who live locally.

In Kinross-shire there have been a few people trying to use OLIO, but the app needs a good number of users who regularly list items available locally. This requirement made it more popular in



larger cities, but the founders say it is now beginning to pick up in smaller towns.

Celestial-One, the founder said: 'Since we started Olio there has been a shift ... in awareness of the unsustainable problem of food waste. The message that small actions can lead to big change seems to be resonating with consumers more (Guardian, 1 April 2019).

Olio might be just another app, but it's a simple eco-friendly solution to food waste that connects members of the community and promotes a sustainable way of life. It can offer huge benefits to people in Kinross-shire moving us forward towards the future green economy. Why not give it a try?






Community Council News

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 23 February were: CCllr L Mckay (Chair), CCllr D Colliar, Cllr W Freeman, CCllr M McFarlane, CCllr H Phillip, CCllr T Stewart and CCllr M Wood, Cllr C Purves, Cllr W Robertson and Cllr R Watters and minute-taker Mrs C Aird.

Declaration Of Interest

CCIIr M McFarlane declared an interest in the Kinross-shire Move Greener Initiative.

Police Report

At the time of the meeting, there was no Police Report available but it was agreed that this would be forwarded to members when it was available.

Kinross-shire Flood Resilience Group

In the absence of Will Wright, CCIr M McFarlane advised that there were 3 options available to KCC in respect of the Group. The first was around co-opting Mr Wright onto the KCC which will enable him to have full voting rights, the second was to appoint Mr Wright as an associate which would allow him to attend meetings, get support from KCC but no voting rights. The final option was for KCC to send attendees to the Resilience Group meetings and then report back to KCC meetings. Having discussed the options with Mr Wright, CCIr McFarlane confirmed that the Groups preferred option would be to go down the associate route, with Mr Wright attending KCC meetings to report on this one particular item.

There is an issue around insurance costs for the Resilience Group (around £156 per annum) and after discussion it was agreed that Cllr Watters would speak to the Responsible Officer at PKC (Keith Colville) for further advice, and he would also speak to the Alyth Group.

There was also a discussion around data protection and again, it was confirmed that the Resilience Group would need to deal with this themselves.

In summary, CCllr McFarlane confirmed the following actions: KCC continue to offer support to the Resilience Group meantime

Cllr Watters to investigate the issue of insurance and report back to the next meeting

Cllr Watters commented that the Group may need to apply for funding for the insurance via charities etc.

Kinross-shire Move Greener Initiative

CCIIr M McFarlane advised that he has approached PKC in order to establish an approval for a permit in respect of one parking space for a pilot scheme. It is thought that by providing one car for the initiative that this could displace up to eleven cars. CCIIr McFarlane reported that he was working with commercial organisations, including Enterprise Car Club who will provide the vehicle and it was noted that whilst there would be no costs to KCC, the hirers of the vehicle would be charged £10 per hire. It is proposed to have the car placed in the Old Causeway/Millbridge car park – this had been chosen due to the fact that people will see the vehicle more often.

CCIIr Colliar advised that he could not support the suggestion to give up the parking space at Millbridge as this was the busiest car park in the town; he suggested Curate Wynd or School Wynd as alternatives. CCllr Mckay asked if it would make more sense for the parking space to be at the park and ride. CCIIr McFarlane confirmed that this was an option, but the proposal was for a hybrid car to be provided, giving the ability for the permit and the car around the town. CCllr Mckay reported that the park and ride was already set up for electric cars and Members were advised that there were two aims for the proposal, (a) to get more cars out of the town on a longer-term basis and (b) to park the car where residents will see it. Members confirmed their agreement in respect of the suggestion with regard to the two other car parks which could be used. CCIIr Freeman was disappointed that the vehicle would not be electric, especially since the Scottish Government are trying to move everyone to electric vehicles. He also commented that the town had managed without four parking spaces at Millbridge before so, in his opinion, he didn't see losing one space being an issue.

Cllr Watters reminded Members that the location of the electricity points would need to be carefully considered as they will take up pavement space but CCllr McFarlane advised that in terms of the hybrid car, the only requirement would be to put a sign on a lamppost.

After a long discussion, it was agreed that the trial be for a period of one year, with a review to be arranged at the end of that time. It was also suggested that another power point be in place within the year. CCllr McFarlane advised that the second car would be fully electric and based at the park and ride.

It was agreed that CCIIr Phillips would confirm KCC's position by letter to Claire Rogers at PKC.

CCIIr McFarlane advised that there were currently two applications for significant funding in respect of bringing a fleet of up to 24 bikes (electric/standard mix) but this scheme will probably not be in place until 2022. It is proposed to provide a range of bikes including tandems, rickshaws, wheelchair accessible etc. and these will be sited at the park and ride, the loch/Kirkgate Park as well as the other side of the loch, with a view to the scheme being extended to other areas in the Kinross-shire area.

In response to a question from CCIIr Mckay, CCIIr McFarlane confirmed that there was no advantage to himself in terms of bringing the pilot into the area.

Matters Arising

Cllr Watters advised that he had not yet been able to speak to the person at HES with regard to the Nato building at Balado. He feels that site would fit into quite a few elements in respect of an application for a heritage site. He will provide an update at the next meeting.

CCIIr Colliar advised that nothing could be done in respect of the location of the Provost's Lamp until Scott Denier returned to work at PKC. Members agreed that if the Lamp had to be moved, then it should be placed in front of the War Memorial. However, there were concerns that the Lamp be damaged by cars parking in the vicinity. CCIIr Colliar advised that a few years ago, Kinross in Bloom had agreed to place tubs to stop cars parking but these had recently been moved, allowing cars to be parked there. It was agreed that a letter be sent to Kinross in Bloom asking why the tubs had been removed as well as requesting that they be returned. CCIIr Phillips is to write to Kinross in Bloom.

Cleish and Blairadam CC Boundary

In the absence of Cllr Purves, Cllr Robertson advised that CBCC are keen to resolve the issue as soon as possible. Members were advised by CCllr Phillips that an article is to be included in the next edition of the *Newsletter*, with a deadline of the end of March for any comments. If no comments are received the boundary change will happen automatically. It was agreed that CCllrs Mckay, Colliar and Phillips would compose a letter which would be distributed, along with a copy of the map, to the affected households in the area.

Cllr Purves confirmed that CBCC had already sent a letter to the affected households and everyone had confirmed that they were happy with the proposal. CCllr Mckay asked Cllr Purves to arrange for copies of the responses to be provided to KCC.

Kinross Town Centre

Cllr Robertson advised that he had not heard back from PKC in respect of the drainage issue at The Muirs/Springfield Road and would report back to a future meeting.

There were concerns raised about the amount of potholes and it was noted that, while the bad weather had not helped, this was mainly due to a lack of investment by PKC. CCIIr Phillips commented that the potholes were particularly bad between the two junctions of the M90.

CCIIr Colliar asked for the March agenda to include an item on the holes in the bollards outside the opticians.

Other Planning Matters

Cllr Purves advised that PKC had declined the suggestion of Market Park for the estate on the site of the Windlestrae Hotel and Members needed to agree on a name, otherwise PKC would choose something themselves.

After discussion, and various suggestions, it was agreed to suggest Sir Alan Smith Court / Place / Drive / Close / Avenue to PKC. This suggestion was made by CCllr Colliar as Sir Alan Smith used to own the Windlestrae, and it was he who converted it into a hotel.

Cllr Purves agreed to email members outwith the meeting for their approval of this suggestion.

Reports From PKC Councillors

Cllr Robertson advised that he had raised the issue of the condition of the Heritage Trail (path erosion/narrowed in places) at a recent Trax Committee and had requested funding be obtained to restore the path. He will provide an update at a future meeting.

CCIIr McKay suggested that perhaps the schools could help with this in terms of outdoor learning and CIIr Robertson confirmed he would contact Neil Mitchell at the Pier to discuss how children could help.

Cllr Watters raised issues around drainage at the Lathro site. There had been an issue recently where Enviroclean had removed 30,000 litres of sewage and placed this into Scottish Water drains. He commented that he was astounded that Enviroclean had not known that there were regulations to deal with this and he had contacted both PKC and Scottish Water to raise an action which has resulted in Persimmon Homes being told that this should not happen again. A report has been undertaken by Enviroclean and Cllr Watters has requested sight of this.

There had been ongoing drainage issues over the years and he had emailed PKC requesting an update. He had since received a response from the Head of Development Team at PKC who felt that there was no issue with the design of the drains and it was therefore a case that they had not been fitted correctly. PKC believe that Persimmon will spend whatever is required to resolve the issue. It was noted that Scottish Water would not adopt the drains until all issues had been resolved. Cllr Robertson confirmed that he and the remaining ward councilors were drafting a response to the Head of Planning at PKC which will hopefully get a resolution for the residents of the development. It was noted that PKC do not take into account any previous issues when deciding on planning applications.

An update will be given at a future meeting.

Reports From CC Representatives

CCIIr McFarlane confirmed following the recent fire at Mill Hide, the hide would be replaced and there was a lot of community support for this.

CCIIr McFarlane advised that KLEO were planning to have their first market on the last Saturday in April, and also have a full winter programme planned for 2021.

In respect of the Kinross Gigabyte, CCllr McFarlane confirmed that the first fully funded pilot had gone live earlier that day. Interest is definitely growing, despite a small issue with the Open reach website.

CCIIr Freeman reported a fault with a lamppost in The Muirs and CIIr Robertson agreed to report this to PKC.

Cllr Purves reminded Members that it was possible to report faults etc. on the 'mypkc' portal (https://my.pkc.gov.uk/)

CCIIr Freeman asked whether CIIr Mike Barnacle was OK as he hadn't attended meetings for a number of months. Members were advised that CIIr Barnacle was fine but was very busy in his other role as an accountant.

CCIIr Colliar advised that there was a meeting of the Kinrossshire Fund next Monday (1 March) to discuss the three applications which had been received.

CCIIr Mckay advised that a complaint had been received via the Facebook page in respect of dog fouling in the cemetery. Having spoken to the Dog Warden, they have confirmed that

dogs are now allowed in the cemetery and there was nothing that could be done.

CCIIr Mckay reported that a resident had fallen in Queen's Crescent and asked what could be done about this. CIIr Robertson commented that if the fall was on private land, then the homeowner was responsible for any repairs, but if the fall had been on a pavement, then it fell under the Council's jurisdiction.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be held on Tuesday 23 March 2021 at 7.30pm.

Police Report

There were no incidents to note in our area. The CC will write to the police requesting more frequent attendance at our meetings in future.

Matters Arising

Bank of Scotland Kinross Branch Closure: CCllr Marchant, Cllr Purves and David Siddle (Liz Smith MSP's assistant) met with Patrick Leavey from the Bank on 11 February. The Bank will definitely close on 22 March 2021. The mobile branch will start visiting Kinross on Tuesday 9 March at the Green Hotel car park. It will be there fortnightly (every other Tuesday) after that. Initially, it will be open from 10am until 1pm. It will then be open 10am to 12pm, closed for 45 mins at lunchtime, then open 12.45pm until 3pm.

A special phone number has been put in place for customers over the age of 70 years and those that are vulnerable to provide them extra reassurance and support when they use telephone banking. The bank is in the process of calling all of these customers to provide any additional support or training. CCllrs Duffy and M Haigh are concerned that vulnerable customers might think that the calls are scammers. CCllr Marchant replied that the Bank's response was that the website lists the special number, but it was generally agreed that it was quite likely that those customers wouldn't be online.

Mr Leavey confirmed that the Bank has a contract with the Post Office for customers to deposit and withdraw cash, although Cllr Purves has been contacted by some members of the community who had not been able to do this. SMEs that have a Business Account can arrange, at a cost, to deposit or withdraw cash outside of PO hours.

Mr Leavey promised to provide flyers regarding the closure and alternative service at the Post Office which will be displayed on noticeboards. Currently the Bank does not have a community banker service but they are part of the National Community Access to Cash Pilot. Cllr Purves has contacted the Cambuslang pilot, but they would prefer to run with the scheme for a while before we meet with them. If the pilots are successful, we should encourage banks to offer this service in Kinross.

A977 Mitigation: There has been discussion on the CC's FB page about the proposed 20mph limits in Crook of Devon, with opinions on both sides about including the main A977 in the scheme. CCllr Duffy stressed that there will be full consultation before the changes. CCllr Bruce-Jones added that it's important that people who are commenting on social media need to understand that they must answer the official consultation process if they want their concerns to be heard.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: The next Community Transport Forum Meeting is Thursday 18 March via Zoom. Cllr Barnacle's Kinross-shire Community Transport Group will be meeting on 1 April. CCllr M Haigh will attend.

Community Development Trust: CCllr Duffy reported that the first meeting of the Trust was on 3 February – 12 people from all over Fossoway attended this meeting. Topics discussed were the legal status of the Trust, the scope of the Trust, initial funding and engagement with the community. The Trust should move to a membership organisation and membership should be open to all members of the community. The Board will then be elected by the members – the current members are a steering group to get the Trust established.

Engaging with the community will not be an easy task, so having a 'winning project' to set it in motion would be most helpful. The Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge could be such a project – The CC Members present agreed to this.

Fossoway and District Community Council Benefit Fund (a.k.a. Hydro Scheme Fund): CCllr Duffy reported that Elspeth King (Board member of the Rumbling Bridge Hydro Co-op) wants to set up a funding scheme that covers Muckhart, and asked CCllr Duffy how the Fossoway Fund operates. Subsequently Ms King approached the Fund with a proposal that rather than set up a new fund it should extend the coverage of the current fund to include Muckhart. CCllr Pye asked how the funds would be handled – would they be ring-fenced per community. CCllr Duffy replied that the details weren't yet known. CCllr Bruce-Jones commented that in her opinion MoPs believe that the fund should be principally for the benefit of Crook of Devon as that was the area most impacted by the Hydro Scheme works. Since Muckhart is in Clacks and not PKC and the two councils have quite different models for public spending this might lead to problems with prioritising funding between the two areas. CCIIr Marchant added that as Fossoway District is in the process of establishing a Community Development Trust (CDT) and wants to encourage our Community to engage with it she felt that it would be confusing to set up a joint fund with Muckhart at the same time. Conversely it may be more beneficial to link the Fossoway Fund to the newly formed CDT. CCIIr Duffy suggested that it might be better to keep the CDT and Fossoway Fund at 'arm's length'.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: Cllr Robertson said that TRACKS were waiting for the CC to give the go-ahead for the surveys, whilst the CC thought this had already been done! CCllr Duffy will notify TRACKS formally, copying Cllr Robertson as chair of TRACKS.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: CCllr Farquhar reported that apparently there is an unauthorised septic tank on the site. Cllr Barnacle has been informed.

Planning Officer Site Visits: The CC continues to be concerned that these are not happening at the moment due to PKC's interpretation of the Covid-19 restrictions. The issue was reported in the press. A MoP who attended the meeting had her planning application turned down – in her view this was because without a site visit the officers were unable to appreciate the constraints affecting the design as a member of her household is disabled. Cllr Robertson described a similar situation near Kelty where it was proving very difficult to get a planning officer on site. None of us can understand why such visits are not considered to be acceptable under the current

rules allowing normal business to continue if it's not possible to perform it at home. Cllr Robertson suggested the CC should write to the Acting CEO Barbara Denton to say that we think PKC are not carrying out their statutory duty. CCllr Marchant said that if the 'due process' says a site visit should be made, then a decision should be deferred without one. Cllr Robertson explained that the Scottish Government is encouraging Councils to decide applications timeously – which surely means that the visits are essential and hence should be allowed!

Crook & Drum Growing Together: CCllr Duffy reported that the group have made plans for the spring.

Aldie Road Vegetation: CCllr Marchant said that there was no change, although some of the local famers have cleared sections of the ditches themselves. However, a new problem is that potholes are appearing. Cllr Robertson said that the easiest way to report any problem to the council is via https://my.pkc.gov.uk/. A registration process enables tracking of your reports, but reports can also be submitted without an account.

Fossoway Gathering: CCllr Duffy said that there is a provisional plan for an event on 4 September.

New Business

Royal Mail Deliveries: A MoP had raised concerns about lack of Royal Mail deliveries during bad weather, but this seems to be resolved now.

Community Council Business: CCllr Duffy will attend a meeting of the Scottish Rural Parliament on 8 March.

Minutes Secretary: A volunteer has kindly answered the advert on FB and offered to take on this role; they will be invited to the next meeting.

CCIIr M Haigh attended a training talk from **Kinross First Responders** about operation of the Powmill defibrillator.

PKC have notified us that any website remotely connected with receiving public money must conform to **Accessibility Regulations** and be usable by all abilities. The *fossoway.org* website has some information about this CC, but is not owned by this CC, and does not currently fully comply. CCIIr Duffy will speak to Jim Pritchard, who operates the site, and look into whether this can be addressed.

The next meeting of the **Kinross-shire Forum** was to have been Wednesday 3 March at 7pm via Zoom, but has now been postponed to 24 March. Information had been sent to CCllrs Bruce-Jones and Cheape rather than to the CC's email account. CCllr Bruce-Jones will ask the Forum to send the info to the CC's account in future.

The next meeting of **P&K Stronger Communities** is 10 March, CCllr Marchant will attend.

The Kinross-shire fund has not formally met, however CCIIr Cheape has discussed the applications with the other members and grants have been made to Friends of Wallace Park, Kinross First Responders and Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation.

P&K Councillors' Reports:

Willie Robertson: The roads department has lost six weeks of work due to weather, and are trying to catch up on pot holes. The roadside litter problem has got worse as the litter picking teams are being redeployed to Covid-19 activities. Perhaps some local schemes could be set up? PKC's Budget will be discussed next week, and is likely to require some tough decisions as money is tight.

Callum Purves: Although Cllr Purves could not attend the meeting, he reported by email that the road safety requests discussed last month, including the 20mph limits along the A977 have been entered into the system.

The new regulations are due to come into effect on 1st October 2021 – The CC commented that these consultations should be more inclusive and ensure that any pre-application meetings are accessible to the community – a view also expressed by other responders, but this has only been added as guidance not law.

Councillors' Reports

Budget meeting: All Cllrs expressed their positivity at the recently agreed budget.

There will be £160k for maintenance and improvement of the heritage trail at Loch Leven.

The road repair budget has been increased from £10m to £14m.

Plans are going ahead to create a devolved local committee for Kinross-shire where the four local ward councillors will have responsibility for decision making (not on planning or licensing).

£1m was secured for economic development (skill support and business grants).

Money was also secured to expand subject choice in secondary schools.

Cllr Watters raised a concern at the lack of money for Action Partnerships which has effectively distributed funds to local charities during the pandemic. Despite support for Action Partnerships this was not allocated any money.

Other matters

Litter Pick: There will be a community litter pick at the end of March. It would be great if people could sign up to help the dedicated volunteers who have been cleaning up Milnathort recently. Please check Facebook and the Notice Board for details.

Cars Idling On New Road: Cllr Willie Robertson raised the issue of motorists idling in their cars on New Road, Milnathort. The Community Council would like to remind road users that idling contributes to harmful pollution, wastes fuel and is a ticketed offence if caught by the police. Please be considerate and turn your engine off when parked.

Dog Waste: Dog waste continues to be a widespread issue on the streets of Milnathort. If you witness a dog owner failing to clean up after their dog, you can report them at www.pkc. gov.uk/dogfouling. Rest assured that this is an anonymous process.

New Forestry At Stronachie: A concern was raised about an increase of forestry plantation at Stronachie totalling 250 hectares. Cllr Willie Robertson reiterated that the forestry operators pay a bond to the council to ensure roads are repaired and that the forestry vehicles must use preapproved routes (avoiding North St, Milnathort).

Victoria Avenue Parking: The scarcity of available parking on Victoria Avenue is causing considerable angst amongst residents. The Community Council would like to request that

homeowners restrict their use of parking on Victoria Avenue to two cars. If you require additional, longer term parking, there is ample space on Perth Road. This will allow all residents to park at least one car outside their homes.

Cleish & Blairadam Community Council

News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 22 February were: CCllr F. Principe-Gillespie (FG), CCllr P. Appleby (PA) CCllr C MacLaren (CM), CCllr F. Whalley (FW), Ccllr J. Leishman (JL) Cllr C. Purves (CP), Cllr W Robertson (WR) and 9 members of the public.

Apologies: M Traylor (MT, Treasurer). The Chair (FG) had received an update from MT.

Crime Prevention / Community Speedwatch update

There were no police officers in attendance. No update had been received from the police which was recognised as disappointing as there had been a number of crashes on the B996 which was perceived as an alarmingly regular occurrence. This prompted lively debate with WR advising a written communication to the police and the council. The summary findings were that excessive speed was the problem. There had been proposals to reduce the speed limit to 40mph at Blairforge and Blairfordel with the council to monitor. CP was to take this forward with the council. Lack of police resources was seen as a contributory factor.

The community speedwatch was positively received and was definitely worth trying. CM reported that although there was not any interest shown in the Boreland area there was an interest in traffic calming measures. (CM)'s report is under village updates later in this document.

WR suggested that it would be sensible to put the speedwatch issue to one side until the current pandemic was over and things returned to some semblance of normality.

Boundary Updates and discussion

There was lengthy discussion regarding extension the Cleish and Blairadam boundary with CP reporting that the issue had been live for a couple of years without clear resolution. The council appear to be unwilling to impose boundary changes without the agreement of the relevant community councils.

Broadband update and proposal for Maryburgh / Blairforge

The Maryburgh CFP was continuing albeit it slowly, the 26 properties involved should, within the next few weeks, be notified of the web site where the vouchers can be applied. PA advised of the website for other residents in the area to check their status for future fibre provision. www.scotlandsuperfast. com.

Drainage Update

CM provided an update on Cleish drainage.

A site meeting with Tilhill Forestry (TF) was held on 8 December. TF are sympathetic to local issues however are limited in what can be practically done in the immediate term as the forest is mature and there is little ability to operate machinery in a confined space. In the short to medium term a relatively modest drainage redesign might be possible subject to proper process being followed and consents achieved.

Key provisional dates that are relevant in this regard:

- Next community consultation 2022
- Harvesting 2023
- Replanting 2024

The time to reconsider drainage design would be at the consultation in 2022, with implementation being at the time of replanting in 2024. In addition, consultation should consider any potential drainage impairment during the 2023 harvest i.e., there might be some work needed to mitigate the short-term risk of flooding during that time.

A separate site meeting was held with Scottish Woodlands (SW) on 11 December. Timing is more beneficial as the SW block has recently been harvested and SW will be planning their drainage in early spring in advance of planting in Q2.

SW agreed to revert to share their proposed drainage scheme which will extend to approximately 1100m. Broadly SW intend to slow the peak flow in line with forestry management guidelines by reducing the hill drainage gradient to 3 degrees in a chicane style, with overspill to rough land / attenuation and also equalising the outflow to the various drainage points i.e., minimising the pressure on one drain at peak flow.

Separately FW updated that improvement to the culvert south of Cleish House had been agreed and work would commence shortly.

Financial Update

FG presented the financial report as below:

The CC top up for the year 1/9/20- 31/8/21 was £374.93 and was credited to the CC's Bank of Scotland A/C on 22/12/20. The balance now stands at £600.50.

All previous Community Councillors who held authorised signatory status on the Bank of Scotland Account have been removed, Paul Appleby as Vice Chair has now been added which means that the three authorised signatories on the account are: FG; MT & PA.

Planning

The Chairman thanked Cllr Willie Robertson for his work regarding the ongoing situation in Blairforge, WR explained at length that there is an active case running but council officials were currently not permitted to make site visits. There was lively discussion on the placement of static caravans/mobile homes in the fields to the east of Blairforge with particular emphasis on the level and type of traffic on the small unadopted access road. WR is taking residents concerns back to David Rennie, PKC Enforcement Officer.

Erection of a dwelling house in principle 90 mtrs south of Hillview, Blairadam (pending consideration)

Alterations to dwelling house (in retrospect) Beatha Cottage Maryburgh (pending consideration)

Alterations and extension to dwelling house and erection of garden buildings (in retrospect) 1 Blairfordel Steading Kelty (pending consideration)

Erection of replacement extension (proposed) Watergate Cottage Cleish (pending consideration)

Alterations and extension to dwelling house and associated works 2 Middleton Park Keltybridge (pending consideration) Erection of dwelling house (in principle) Land 30mtres west of Hollow Cottage Kinross (pending decision)

Erection of a dwelling house, garage and workshop/ temporary residential accommodation, installation of air source heat pump, erection of gates, formation of landscaping and associated works. Land 60 mtrs north of Craigbank House, Cleish (application approved)

Erection of a dwelling house and formation of vehicular access Gordon Bungalow, Benarty Rd Kelty (Application refused). The owner of the property was present at the meeting and sought advice as to reapplying and the reasons for refusal. FG and FW explained at length the community council's role in planning applications. It was noted that the applicant had a considerable level of support for her application. The CC had no objection in principle to a house development on the site and that it was PKC's Planning Officer who made the final decision rather than the CC. FW recommended that the applicant has a discussion with the Planning Officer before submitting a revised proposal.

Village Update - Blairadam

Thanks were forthcoming to Councillor Graham and Stuart D'All and his team at PKC from all residents, for all their help in arranging for the gritting carried out regularly in Keltybridge and Maryburgh on the treacherous pavements and roads in the area caused by the snowy, icy severe weather conditions we experienced from the New Year period and beyond. Their help enabled residents to get out for essential shopping or for their daily walk.

The placement of static caravans and groundwork in the fields to the east of Blairforge: keep on the agenda.

Litter and dog poo problems in Keltybridge all along the Sawmill Road and up towards the motorway bridge and beyond. This has been exacerbated by the volume of walkers using this route.

A neighbour decided to do a litter and poo clear up. She picked 3 large bags of litter. This is a part of the core path network but not an adopted road so not sure that PKC will offer to help with clearing up but one idea would be to obtain an official PKC litter bin to try to alleviate or help with the issue. Dog poo is a serious environmental and health issue. The Sawmill Road is directly next to the Keltyburn/Blackburn where heavy rain will wash it into the burn. These burns feed directly into Lochore Meadows. The issue of dog waste bins was discussed at length. One resident had written to PKC about the situation in Maryburgh and received a negative email from the Community Waste Team with the comment that the officer was unable to see a suitable location/need for a bin and also unable to see a requirement for one! WP advised to write to him or CP with a view to obtaining a bin. CP further advised that the council not provide additional bins.

Also, the amount of litter along the verges on the B996 to the junction of the B9097 is a disgrace, also at the layby on the B9097 before the M90 where illegal tipping seems to be happening again.

Problems with noisy trials motor bikes in the area again coming in from the Kelty area heading into Blairadam Forest. One resident has reported that they had saw what looked like a parent driving a vehicle with a trailer attached with trail bikes on it! The problem is no one is able to catch sight of any registrations to report them, and if they drive the bikes in through the village to get in the forest, there are no registrations on the bikes driven by youngsters. WR advised that this was a police issue.

Following the last meeting CP had arranged for Jim Mitchell, Community Warden, in touch with PA regarding the illegal tipping situation in the area. Jim met with PA and had produced some CCTV signs which have now been erected at the triangle in Maryburgh and in adjacent to the layby on approach to the B996. Since the placement of these signs no further tipping had been evident.

Several sightings of a suspicious white flatbed van. Reports mention attempts to take photos with their phone, but the van driver stopped, and they felt intimidated, so no one seems to be able to get the registration. They felt it was also watching for dogs! They were also concerned that it might be trying to illegally tip rubbish. There was a report on the Kinross and Fossoway Forum about a suspicious vehicle with a similar description and it was also thought that they might be looking for dogs. The police are warning about stolen dogs at the moment.

Concern was raised about Openreach telephone cables insecurely fixed adjacent to the bridge just north of Keltybridge, indeed one set of cables is not buried at all across the farm gates, it is clear that the tractor has been dragging these cables as it enters and leaves the field. PA agreed to take this up with Openreach.

Village Update - Cleish

With regard to broadband most of the Boreland area is eligible for the R100 programme, however work is not due to commence during 2021. There is no published map that identifies which properties are either included or excluded however residents can check their own address by using the online tool at *scotlandsuperfast.com*. In the interim if a property is included then vouchers of up to £400 per property are available to help prior to R100 delivering. Excluded properties may be eligible for vouchers up to £5000. Details of both schemes are available on the online tool.

Enquiries had been received about traffic calming, in the Boreland area, particularly speed bumps. It was noted that there were issues with speed bumps, however other options might be possible e.g., improved signage. CP agreed to ask Daryl from the roads department to undertake an assessment in the first instance.

A couple of Boreland residents had expressed an interest in street lighting being installed. However, there were mixed views locally with some residents preferring the status quo. Given the lack of unanimous support the idea would not be progressed at this time.

Residents had noted the increased incidence of potholes during winter and it was noted that the PKC online portal is the agreed method to report potholes to the Council.

An increase in dog waste was noted along the walk from the Church car park to Millennium Walk despite good signage and poop scoops being made available. The issue will be brought to the attention of PKC dog warden and in the interim dog walkers are asked to clean up appropriately.

FG asked about the provision of warning signs for the protection of red squirrels. WR advised that the council do not provide these and advised people to purchase them should they desire.

AOCB

FW raised the issue of lack of access to footpath at Flockhouse FG advised that the Community Council website is no longer available and that he was proposing to write a new front page with hyperlinks to minutes etc. The contract still had a year to run. FG offered condolences to the family of Chris Conn who passed away on 12 February.

Condolences were also offered to the family of Richard Crombie who also passed away recently.

The next meeting of Cleish and Blairadam Community Council will be on Monday 7 June 2021 (Zoom).

Matters Arising

Portmoak CC – PKC By-Election for PCC and next steps following Nov '20 resignations

The CC had not received any update from PKC about the proposed date of the by-election. Cllr CPurves commented that Glenfarg CC were also facing a by-election and given the forthcoming Scottish Parliament elections the PCC by-election may be held after this in May '21. PCC by-election date to be confirmed.

Portmoak Cemetery: The Secretary had spoken to A Cragoe who was continuing with the cemetery extension project. There was no update for this meeting but A Cragoe had a meeting with Willie Grieg on 10/03/21 so there would be an update for the PCC meeting on 13/04/21.

Road Safety Action in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell: Cllr CPurves did not have an update from Daryl McKeown regarding the A911 road plan. The installation of 20mph repeater signs between Scotlandwell and Kilmagadwood will be completed (no time estimate on this).

Cllr D Morris enquired about any forthcoming budget increase for active travel coming through from the UK government to proactively promote walking and cycling. It appeared that £430m was being allocated to Scotland. Cllr C Purves confirmed PKC did receive notice about extra money coming through across Scotland, of which £15m was for active travel in PKC. Cllr W Robertson mentioned he was in Perth & Kinross Countryside Trust but had received no indication yet of when money would come through. There are a lot of projects in PKC but the money hasn't come through for these yet. It can take a while for money to filter down to project level. The CC asked that the Westfield path network report could be flagged for allocation of funds as it is in the final stage of preparation. Cllr D Morris indicated that, at this stage, the report was confidential because landowner contacts had been limited due to Covid-19 restrictions, but he agreed to ask Hargreaves whether the report could be sent in confidence to the four ward councillors so that they were aware of the Westfield network possibilities when considering the active travel budget options.

Glenlomond Sewage: migration of responsibility to Scottish Water: Because of pandemic restrictions and the severe winter weather, actions had not progressed substantially. The village Residents' Association were currently waiting for quotes to do some urgent maintenance work with the long-term objective ultimately to get Scottish Water to adopt the sewerage system. Glenlomond Snow Clearing and Gritting: Glenlomond village have bought in coarse salt and sand to be able to grit and salt the road themselves. CIllr WRobertson suggested the village should approach PKC to obtain hand push gritters which may be available from PKC.

Easter Balgedie – Wester Balgedie Footpath and Flooding: There was a brief discussion about the continued flooding of the footpath along the A911 between Easter and Wester Balgedie as a result of soil washing off the adjacent fields during heavy rain. The CC were appreciative of the efforts of local residents and farmers who had undertaken to dig gulleys and remove mud and silt to clear the footpath. The CC will approach local farmers and PKC once the weather improves.

New Matters:

New Rail Link at Kinross: There was a discussion about the potential project which had been featured in the Kinross Newsletter. MSP Liz Smith & Cllr C Purves were in support of this project and felt there was a strong case for this, with benefits to commuters, and bringing tourism to Kinross, and benefits to hospitality trade. A proper feasibility study is required to assess cost. Cllr W Robertson expressed concerns about the excessive cost and that priorities were health and housing. The route had not yet been confirmed but there was probably going to be only one station at Kinross and no more local stations. The CC commented that the Newsletter had suggested that it was possible for the public to voice their opinions on the project, but Cllr Purves confirmed there was not a public consultation at present. Any comments in support or objection could be made by writing to MSP Liz Smith. The CC commented that a direct rail link could potentially bring pressure on local housing and detrimentally

on the Loch Leven environment from new house building, Cllr Purves suggested these impacts would be assessed in the feasibility study.

Sledging at Bishopshire Golf Club, Kinnesswood: The CC had heard comments of upsetting confrontations between residents, with children who were sledging, and Bishopshire Golf Club members during the recent snowy weather. Bishopshire Golf Club had not approached the CC at all, but the CC Secretary had reached out to the Secretary of the Golf Club and another officer at the Golf Club to discuss the incident. The Golf Club Secretary had said the golf club accepted people sledging there and had taken measures to mark out the greens which they would prefer locals did not sledge across due to the damage caused and costs incurred in repair. Concern had also been expressed about dog walkers who were leaving excrement bags in rough ground alongside the fairways. Access rights and responsibilities apply across golf courses in Scotland with advice contained within the Scottish Outdoor Access Code. (www.outdooraccess-scotland.scot)

Police Reports

PC Ashley Mitchinson was in attendance.

Local incidents included a theft of diesel by siphoning which people should be aware of.

PC Mitchinson was keen to raise public awareness of the what3words app https://what3words.com/products/what3words-app/ which had proved useful recently in locating a walker who had slipped and been injured. Mountain Rescue had used the what3words app in locating the walker. The public can download this app for free. Reminder from the Police to exercise caution and have correct equipment for the terrain and weather if out walking, especially in winter.

The Police had been out doing mobile speed checks in villages. Unmarked traffic cars are also patrolling. The CC asked if it was possible to continue increased enforcement of the speed restrictions that PKC had recently applied to the area as it was generally observed that traffic was travelling in excess of the speed limits. The CC also enquired about the volunteer Speedcheck project, PC Mitchinson advised this was not possible at present due to pandemic restrictions, but as restrictions eased the Speedcheck project could potentially start again.

Cllr D Morris raised item regarding a confrontation with a landowner behaving in intimidating way. Another local resident had a similar confrontation. A Police Community Officer was supposed to have followed up but this hadn't happened. PC Mitchinson asked the Cllr to email her directly about this.

Cllr D Morris also raised concerns that some farmers in Kinrossshire were not treating core paths properly. The right to roam legislation allows for core paths in fields to be ploughed and planted but the core path surface must be restored for ease of public use within 14 days. Failure to do so is potentially a criminal offence. PC Mitchinson agreed to research on this item and report back.

The CC voiced their appreciation for PC Mitchinson attending at the meeting.

West Feal Barn, Auchmuirbridge, Leslie, Glenrothes: Note: the closing date for comments on this application is now past but PCC had subsequently been made aware of potential traffic issues along the Core Path that leads to the property in the application. The Planning Application has been withdrawn, but PCC will make a representation about the traffic situation along the road should a similar application be made again in the future. Any future approval should include a planning condition which required all traffic to proceed in a forward gear as the road is 2 miles long, single track and has a lot of walkers and cyclists in view of core path status. In addition, at or close to the property, the condition would require the provision of a turning circle which is suitable for use by all vehicles, of whatever length.

20/01958/FLL Erection of a dwellinghouse, Land 40 Metres North West of Bonaly Cottage, Main Street, Kinnesswood. The closing date for comments on this application is now past.

The CC has submitted their objection to the application. The objection explained why the planning application breached four policies contained within the Local Development Plan. There had also been 22 objections from individual members of the public to this planning application. There is a new Planning Officer responsible for this application and PCC agreed to send some supplementary information to provide a wider context to this planning application, including the previous planning situation regarding the site as a whole and progress regarding community right to buy efforts.

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee

Cllr D Morris confirmed there were no updates at present, there has been no further meeting.

K Donaldson was able to report there has been clearing of scrub on sides of roads at the site, possibly for landscaping and security are present.

Treasurer CC Accounts: The Treasurer reported no movement of any Accounts.

The former Treasurer will work with Cllr A Davidson to try to move to online banking for PCC due to issues of delay in transferring the accounts to the control of the Treasurer. Treasurer to set up a new online account.

Ward Councillors' Reports: Cllr W Robertson noted PKC are aware of surface issues on A911. PKC are behind with repair schedule given the recent bad weather. Council budget is being released on 10/03/21. A Council tax freeze will operate in 2021/22.

Cllr C Purves agreed the main item was the forthcoming budget. Cllr Purves is optimistic about the budget and will continue to promote value for money, alternative ways of working, and trying to reduce tax burden on constituents. The process of appointing a new PKC Chief Executive is underway and at shortlisting stage.

AOB:

Member of the public commented on the Visitor Information sign at the Kinnesswood bus-stop which is very tatty and has no information on it. Suggestion to remove the board or put something on it.

The next meeting of Portmoak Community Council will be held at 7.30pm on Tuesday, 13 April 2021.

Kinross and District Art Club





Project: Our project for April is an 'Out of Africa' project; The Free To Live Trust – Seema's Project. We last supported this charity in April 2016 and we were very fortunate to have a speaker from the charity, Dr Pam Cairns, come to a Project Lunch that month and tell us about their marvellous work.

The charity works in collaboration with an Indian Non-Governmental Organisation and is based in Bori, a village in the Indian district of Maharashtra. Established in 2014, the charity built a home for 40 children, the abandoned offspring of trafficked sex workers and rescued commercial sex workers who had been trafficked and wanted to live a life free from exploitation.

The charity has used funding to build two accommodation blocks and both are packed to capacity; these offer housing and a training facility for cottage industries and education in literacy and numeracy. There are now over 60 children in residence and Seema has taken on many extra staff and food bills have soared. Schools are closed in India, but the project staff have risen to the challenge and are educating the children in a structured way. The Free To Live Trust have been supported since 2018 by the Church of Scotland Guild; this partnership ends in April. Without this support the Trust

would not have been able to support Seema's critical work during the pandemic.



The heavy snow in early February gave the beavers (and the leaders!) the opportunity to create a virtual snowball fight video and everyone had great fun doing this.


The beavers had fun making pancakes for Shrove Tuesday. This was followed by a game of Pancake Dobble whilst eating

Portmoak Primary School

Amphibian ladder for Portmoak Primary School

Every year in spring, and again in autumn, amphibians (newts, toads and frogs) migrate to and then from their breeding ponds and are liable to fall through the grids over road gullies where they die of lack of food or due to the polluted, oily water in the road gully. Small mammals such as voles and field mice can also fall in and die there, so the classic grid by the side of a road, or in a car park or school playground, is a potentially lethal trap for local wildlife.

Trevor Rose, a professional engineer who is also Secretary



of the British Herpetological Society, (natural historians and scientists with interests in amphibians and reptiles) has designed and overseen the manufacture of 'amphibian ladders' to be fitted into road gullies, so that amphibians which would otherwise fall in and be trapped and die, can escape. Trevor has kindly supplied a ladder for a gully in the playground at Portmoak Primary School, Kinnesswood, which was installed on 1 March.

Some of our pupils had already been doing impromptu amphibian rescues from local street gullies last summer (not to be recommended from a road safety perspective), so when they told staff at school about their finds, an alternative opportunity to encourage their interest was welcomed. The gift of the amphibian ladder was accepted, and it was inserted at a gully in the school grounds; safe from traffic but still liable (prior to fitting the ladder) to have been a risk

for frogs, newts, toads and any small mammals too. The fine plastic mesh on the upper surface of the metal panel allows animals to climb up and out.

Amphibians, even frogs and newts, have been shown to climb up the ladders inside the gully chamber in trials elsewhere (undertaken before the product was finally approved) and seen to be able to climb out to freedom and dispersal to safety. The gully at Portmoak is not far from a breeding pond for amphibians, also on the school premises, so has a role to play in saving the local wildlife.

The Little Travelling Bookshop

We are always interested to hear about enterprise in the community and, on 15 February, Becca Flory was our speaker with her story. A former pupil of Kinross High School and Law graduate from Glasgow University, Becca had worked in both corporate law and in business before suffering sudden and unexpected ill health. This time last year, when we had no choice but to take exercise locally, Portmoak Community Woodland Group received so many interesting sightings of wildlife that we began compiling 'Nature Notes' to share with anyone who was interested.

We are also looking at some other areas where we could lift the grass to sow annual wildflowers, and will be planting flowering plants for bees and other pollinators in the grass verge at the back of Waulkmill path.

So there is plenty to look forward to and we hope the villages will become a welcoming sight for everyone, as well as encouraging local wildlife.

Broke Not Broken

So spring has sprung and schools are going back. Vaccinations are rolling out and we are all hoping for a new beginning. A wee update from us is overdue and we have lots to tell.



We recently gave a talk to the Kinross Beavers groups. We had a great time getting them to talk about food and what the food bank does. They were all so lovely, a credit to themselves, and we loved chatting to them and seeing drawings of their favourite foods.

We have been busy with food deliveries; here are some statistics. In January, we delivered to 150 households and supported 461 individuals (201 adults, 260 children). In February we delivered to 121 households and supported 379 individuals (157 adults, 222 children).

We have been sending vouchers out to help referred families during lockdown. To date, £7439 has been spent on this project. We have also been working on fuel poverty by helping people referred to us pay for the extra gas and electric used during cold spells and lockdown. To date, £4677.40 has been spent on this.

We have been very fortunate to receive funding from PKC CLD and Kinross-shire Action Partnership. This money has helped us to provide vital services, food and vouchers and we met with the funders to tell them about all the projects we have been running over the past 6 months.

We continue to make sure that our volunteers have access to

Easter Egg Cookies

Hopefully you'll have some visitors in the garden at Easter so here is a recipe for some cookies to share.

Ingredients

175g softened butter

200g light brown sugar

100g caster sugar

1 tblsp vanilla extract

1 large egg

250g plain flour

½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

50g white chocolate chopped into chunks

100g dark chocolate chopped into chunks

100g mini chocolate eggs, lightly crushed with a rolling pin

Method

Heat oven to 190 °C. Line two baking trays. Tip the butter, sugars and vanilla into a bowl. Beat until pale and fluffy. Add the egg and beat again. Tip in the flour, bicarbonate of soda then mix using a spatula before adding the chocolate chunks and half the mini eggs. Set aside the larger pieces to decorate.


Scoop golf ball sized mounds of cookie dough onto baking sheets, leaving plenty of space between each one. This should make about twenty cookies. Approximately 4-6 cookies fit on each tray so you will have to bake them in batches. Push remaining egg pieces into tops before baking for 15-18 minutes. For soft and chewy cookies, they should still be pale and soft in the middle. If you like them crunchy, bake for a little longer.

Kinross-shire Action Partnership

Kinross-shire Action Partnership is made up of Councillors, community reps and public services. Action Partnerships were established in Perth & Kinross to bring services and communities together, in order to tackle local issues and inequalities. The Partnership has continued to meet virtually during the pandemic, ensuring groups like Kinross Kindness and Broke not Broken were adequately funded.

KAP is chaired by community representative Dr Alistair McCracken, the Lead Officer is Police Inspector Craig Stephen and Lindsev Bailie, the South Locality Manager for P&K Health & Social Care Partnership, also attends. The other community representatives are Victoria Robb, Rosemary Tolson, Karole Swanson, Jaffrey Weir and Shona Fowler. Councillors Barnacle, Purves, Robertson and Watters are there as elected Councillors. The Partnership is guided and supported by PKC officers such as Roseanne Gray from Community Learning and Development and James Gardner, Community Empowerment Officer with Community Planning.

In the past we have been involved in funding local groups through Participatory Budgeting, Community Investment Fund and small grants. We have instigated and funded projects such as the Centre for Inclusive Living, shop accessibility ramp scheme and the installation of Wi-Fi to village halls. KAP have also provided funding to the local groups who supported the community throughout the pandemic to help them cover their costs. We endeavour to make this a very simple process for the groups, recognising how busy they are and how the pandemic has impacted on their service delivery.

Examples of funding (totalling £22,780) during Covid include: Broke not broken, £5000 in March 2020, £3000 in March 2021; Kinross Centre, £2000 in April 2020, £3000 in March 2021; KVG & ROS, £3000 in March 2021; KYTHE in £3000 in March 2021; Kinross Kindness, £2000 in April 2020; Crook of Devon Resilience Group, £500 in April 2020; Glenfarg Community Council, £320 in June 2020, £260 in October 2020; AbilityNet (digital support to combat isolation), £700 in June 2020.

As we emerge from the pandemic, we are looking at ways of supporting local groups with any extra costs incurred due to Covid-19 guidelines. We would be keen to hear from groups about this, to see if we could support them financially going forward. 

Trust Challenges Reporter's Decision

The Trust has succeeded in getting the appeal for phase 2 of Lathro Farm paused, at least for a short time. The Scottish Government Reporter dealing with Persimmon's appeal for more housing on phase 2 issued a 'Notice of Intention' in January that he was 'minded' to grant the appeal subject to conditions and Persimmon and PKC drawing up a Section 75 Agreement to cover developer contributions.

The Trust challenged some of what the Reporter, David Buylla, had said in his Notice of Intention about drainage. We stressed the serious nature of the problems with the phase 1 sewers, evidenced by regular pumping and removal of waste by Enviro-Clean trucks. Our letter expressed concern about the risks to health of local residents and potential pollution of Loch Leven through leakage into groundwater if the waste pipes have not been installed correctly. We said that we believed a thorough investigation of the drainage problems must take place before planning permission for phase 2 is granted and asked that the Reporter consult directly with Scottish Water and SEPA on this matter.

The Reporter sent a copy of the Trust's letter to Persimmon's agent, Montagu Evans, and PKC, giving both parties two weeks to respond.

Well-Kept County Competition 2021

The Trust still intends to hold the annual 'Well Kept County' competition later this year. We are aiming for July but it will depend on the relaxation of the lockdown regulations. More information on this will follow.

Raingardens Challenge

Once again, we have been deluged with rain. The roads are awash with it, hiding deep potholes and sunken road gullies beneath the murky water. Our enthusiasm for the alternatives presented by the raingardens challenge is exemplified by the situation in the photograph below. The image shows the wildflower swale along the west

Kinross link road, doing its job in the heavy rain, filling up with water off the road – direct inflow, no grids and gullies or pipes to block – for slow release as the intensity of the rainstorm abates.

For managing community flood risks (and reducing sewer overflows) there is much that can be done on a private plot too. A simple action is to drain driveways into the garden, where that may be possible. We are working with living water biologist Jane Shields to develop a method for putting roof water into gardens. The idea is to create a 'raingarden soakaway'; a safe way to use the rainwater to create an attractive garden features. More on that in a subsequent update.

We are currently working on guidance for optimising wildlife value from the raingardens; taking advice from an informal group of local and national wildlife biologists. One of the management actions is to encourage less frequent mowing of the grass verges and parts of other grass amenity areas, with removal of cut material for composting.

Now is a good time for dialogue with both PKC and the general public on this as there will be massive pressure to reduce costs as the cost of the Covid-19 measure begins to hit us. Instead of simply cutting costs, a tidy strategic mix of conventional and pollinator-friendly wildflower features with some more conventional garden landscapes too, should be possible.

Hopefully these ideas will be welcomed as they develop. As always, any comments on the above will be welcome.



play', said James.



Friendly competitions have been devised to keep everyone on their toes ahead of pools being reopened in the — hopefully — not-too-distant future.

Having said pools are closed, one Otter has been resourceful in keeping training during lockdown. Struan Bennett's fitness regime was featured in *The Scotsman* after braving the cold to make the most of an outsized paddling pool in his back garden in a bid to keep in shape. With the pool at Live Active Loch Leven a comfortable 29°C, Struan's water has been a bit chillier at somewhere between 1°C and 4°C!

Covid-19 restrictions have denied Struan – ninth in the British Championships for Triathlons for his age group in 2019 – the chance to compete to qualify as an elite athlete, which in turn has meant he has not been allowed to use swimming facilities for training during lockdown. He is having to prove inventive in working towards a selection race in Wales in May for the junior ETU European Triathlon, which takes place in Austria a month later.

Another Otter, Emily Cumming, has similarly been denied a hard-earned opportunity because of the restrictions surrounding elite athletes.

Emily recently found out she had qualified for the British Championships in London – a magnificent achievement. The meet was cancelled last year but Emily was very excited to find out she met the qualifying criteria for the rescheduled competition this year. However, with the championships being restricted to only elite athletes, disappointingly, Emily will not be able to take up her place.

Everyone attached to the club is keeping their fingers crossed all the swimmers can pick up where they left off when we are all able to make a splash again.

Meanwhile, massive thanks go to Smith Street Motors in Kinross for donating £50 towards the purchase of land training equipment for Otters. The club will also be fundraising next month when they take part in the Virtual Kiltwalk Weekend on April 23-25.







There's A Real Buzz In The Air...

WELL FOLKS, ITS SPRING! April is a month of returning birds; swallow, blackcap, willow warbler, sedge warbler, whitethroat, house martin and many more will be arriving in Scotland from Africa. Osprey and sand martin have already made their way here. Out on St Serfs Island our greylag geese will have chicks and mallard ducks will be sitting on eggs awaiting the hatch of their young. It is truly a fantastic time of year! April is a great time to hear the dawn chorus; it is worth getting up at dawn with a cuppa and listening to the cacophony of bird song that fills the air!

April is also great time to spot the first butterflies feeding up and looking for a potential mate. April butterflies to look out for are: peacock; small tortoiseshell; small copper; greenveined white; orange tip and if you are somewhere with lots of blaeberry, green hairstreak.

There is something about observing butterflies that is extremely soothing; you can block out the worries of the world and spend some time watching these elegant insects. I highly recommend it.

Spring flowers are well out now. Look out for plants such as primrose, ragged robin, cowslip, bluebells, cow parsley, lesser celandine and much more. Often these early plants are a saviour for insects that are in desperate need for nectar. Another April insect to look out for is the humble bumblebee. The Queen bee is the only member of the colony that overwinters. It feeds up on pollen in autumn, and in the process gets very fat, this allows the bee to hibernate and survive over the winter. These Queen bees then emerge in spring and are on the lookout for another nest site in which to start a new colony. Bumblebee species to look out for in spring include: common-carder bee; red-tailed bumblebee; buff-tailed bumblebee and white-tailed bumblebee.

It is worth keeping a lookout for a fairly new coloniser on Scottish soil! The tree bumblebee was first recorded in the UK in 2001 and was first recorded in Scotland in 2013. It is thought the UK population originated from mainland Europe, where the species had undergone a large expansion. Its fast colonisation is probably due to its readiness to nest in a variety of places, including sheds, bird boxes and attics. They can be identified from their colouring; all tree bumblebees have a ginger thorax, black body and a white tail. They can be seen in early spring and are normally flying between April and July. It is certainly worth keeping an eye out; they have been seen at Loch Leven before!

The latest wildlife sightings on the loch include; 627 goldeneye, 38 great-crested grebe (looking stunning in

breeding plumage), 879 tufted duck and 49 whooper swan. Plenty of birds have started nesting as well. Red squirrels have been active around the reserve, as have the local foxes.

The warmer weather will hopefully be here to stay and spring will keep on springing!

Songs For A New Season

SPRING IS IN THE AIR at RSPB Loch Leven this month. Lots of birds have been warming up their voices in preparation for the breeding season. Highlights around the visitor centre include singing great tits, robins, blue tits, coal tits, dunnock and chaffinch. There have also been regular drumming noises from great spotted woodpeckers in the woods. The red squirrels have been active too, preparing for the breeding season by busily collecting peanuts from the feeder and scurrying along the leafy loop and wildlife garden. A wonderful sighting of a tawny owl was also noted by a latenight visitor from our car park.

On the wetland trail skylark have been performing their beautiful aerial songs and can be heard along the heritage trail. Wader numbers have also been good with 150 curlew, 40 lapwing and a few oystercatchers spotted on site. Many of the lapwing and oystercatcher will be breeding on the reserve soon, and some of the lapwing have already started to show off their mating displays. The black-headed gull population has begun to rise too, another regular breeder on the reserve that adds a lot more noise to the proceedings!

A lovely surprise in the form of an otter footprint was noted by the first hide this month. The print was spotted left behind in the snowfall. Despite having a camera trap, we did not manage to pick up any images of the otter but remain hopeful for a return visit. It is pleasing to see signs of them about and that they have made it through the cold winter. Other highlights have also included regular visits from peregrine falcon, kestrel and buzzard over the wetland. The first bumblebees of the year have also started to be spotted too.

Our wonderful volunteer team has been busy with brush cutting out on the reserve to bring the habitat into good condition for the breeding waders. The height of the

vegetation needs to be just right so that chicks can remain hidden from predators, but low enough they can still move about. The volunteers have also helped install three new small rafts out on the flood and have moved the large raft closer to the hide to improve the viewing area for visitors. We cannot thank our volunteers enough for all the hard work they have carried out to keep the reserve safe and running throughout the pandemic.

Gardening

Spring Forward And Brighten Up!

IT'S ALWAYS A SURPRISE every year that following the dark, cold winter, spring starts to appear with new growth and full of promise for the year ahead. No idea why it's such a surprise, but during the snow a few weeks back it was hard to believe it would ever happen.

The first signs of spring in any garden are usually early spring bulbs: snowdrops, crocuses and irises. I planted some irises in a tub many years ago around a buddleia and they always bring a smile to my face when they start to bloom — it's a sure sign that things are looking up and that winter is slowly losing its grip.

As things start to get going, there are of course many jobs to be doing in the garden and greenhouse/kitchen windowsill. March and April are ideal for starting off seeds to fill those gaps in the garden and tubs during the summer. I usually do this towards the end of March, or earlier for some such as alyssum and sweet peas — alyssum is quite slow growing and sweet peas can be planted out even when there is still a chance of frost. The alyssum in the picture opposite were started the first week in March (sown in groups so that they form a nice clump of flowers) and are coming along really well.

Other seeds I'll be starting soon (if I can get compost) are sunflowers, lavatera, calendula, aster, cosmos, dahlia and marigold. A few more varieties will no doubt catch my eye as the weeks go on. The method I use and have had great success with is to fill a small container (think egg-box-lid size) with compost, sprinkle the seed thinly and then top with vermiculite. If you don't have vermiculite, a very thin layer of compost is fine. Always read the seed packet though, as some





seeds don't like to be covered at all. I then water them lightly and cover the container with cling film or put it in a plastic bag and keep it somewhere light and warm. I use an electric propagator, but a sunny windowsill is ideal for the job.

Once the seedlings start to appear, whip off the plastic covering. When the seedlings have two sets of leaves, prick them out and plant them into seed trays. I use 15-cell seed tray inserts – they will grow quite happily in these until it is time to plant them out in your garden.

Spring is also an ideal time to tidy your flower borders. I don't know about you, but the autumn was so wet I didn't get around to taking out all my bedding plants from last year. So, my next few weeks will be filled with digging out dead plants and cutting back the perennials I didn't quite manage to sort out last year.

Soft fruit will also be getting a good 'seeing to' in the coming weeks. I have raspberry canes that are out of control and really need thinned out, and strawberry runners that are determined to make a break for it. I'll be potting up any strawberry runners I can find, clearing out any dead leaves and putting a yummy layer of manure down to give them a nice feed in the coming months. I might even get around to putting down a layer of straw under the plants this year, but let's not be too ambitious, eh?

Well, looks like that's me for this month. Wishing you a productive month ahead – and don't forget to leave some dandelions for the bees!

Look After Your Matbro!

They have been divided into their various groups according to the number of lambs they are expecting and how fat and thin they

are so that feed can be targeted to the ones who need it. Lambing time always brings a great burst of new life into the countryside and hopefully it will be complimented with some nice sunny days.

The cows are happily munching their way through their pile of silage bales and although we are probably a bit tight on supplies, we shouldn't be too bad. When you get nice sunny days at this time of year, you can see them getting restless and gazing out over the gates of their sheds, anxious to get out to the fields. They will have to be patient for a few weeks yet, however until there is some grass for them to eat. I think they would be very disappointed if I was to let them out to a field just now and it wouldn't be long until they were roaring to get back into their comfy shed with a pile of silage to eat! Every farm has an indispensable tool or piece of equipment

and in our case, it is our trusty old Matbro forklift. It is used almost every day of the year feeding and bedding the animals or doing various jobs about the farm. It is certainly not in its first flush of youth and is in need of some TLC and I have thought long and hard about how I could replace it. the backward farm budget! Even upgrading to something a bit more modern would incur quite a considerable cost and there is always the risk of buying something unreliable.

Therefore I have decided to give our faithful old machine a bit of a makeover since it is very simple and reliable as well as being cheap to run. Fortunately spare parts are easily sourced because Matbro was the market leader and thousands of these machines were sold through the 1990's. 



In order to undertake the installation of a Toucan crossing on the following road I recommend that a temporary traffic regulation order be prepared. It is to be effective on the 12th April 2021 for a period of four weeks.

The order will promote a temporary suspension of loading and parking on both sides of the carriageway on Gallowhill Road from its junction with Gallowhill Gardens (311419, 703336) to its junction with the private access leading to the property known as Achramore (311076, 703611), a distance of 433.39 metres or thereby.

Pedestrian & vehicular access to premises will be maintained.
