Kinross - Cowdenbeath Railway Line

I, LIKE OTHERS WOULD welcome a train service from Kinross southwards. The Fife Circle railway is the nearest existing railway to connect with, most likely at Cowdenbeath. Putting aside for the moment the difficulties of financing and constructing that as a new section, another issue first needs resolving for the project to proceed; that involves the national train service.

Some years ago as a commuter to Glasgow I considered using the new railway service to it from Alloa. That had been instigated by Keith Brown the then convenor of Clackmannanshire Council. Soon afterwards the chance fell my way to ask him why there was only an hourly service. His answer was that the railway line along the north side of the Forth also carried coal and other freight away from the Forth Bridge, thereby freeing more time for trains, both passenger and commercial, between Aberdeen, Edinburgh and beyond.

When organising a student project in Ayrshire I had a similar response regarding rail usage there. Suffice to say that rail travellers tend to forget the complexities of co-ordinating the running of trains throughout a railway system.

One solution for trains from and to Kinross would be to transfer passengers at Cowdenbeath station onto the Fife Circle trains which do go to Edinburgh, and the reverse for the homeward journey. Would there be sufficient room on those existing trains to take the transferred passengers? If not could more carriages be added? That might depend on the length of the platforms at the stations, because people as at present would be getting on and off at all of them.

An alternative would be not to transfer passengers, thereby keeping the current trains' number of carriages and the same lengths of platforms. The resultant direct journey to Edinburgh might be rejected by the national rail service, considering it would add to the volume of trains over the Forth Bridge and the surrounding rail lines.

For those readers who don't know, a railway line is being reinstated to serve Leven, the neighbouring towns and those in the East Neuk to the Fife Circle via Thornton. Its campaign group also envisage a direct link through Kirkcaldy to Edinburgh. What transpires will be interesting for Kinross. However, as the Levenmouth project has just commenced, those in charge such as the national railway service could have some idea now whether the Kinross proposal would be acceptable in principle.

Only then can the Kinross project move forward. For anyone thinking that far ahead the Levenmouth Railway websites are worth looking at, setting the standard for obtaining a new public railway, with such matters as opportunities, constraints, demand, financing.

GERS Figures

I READ WITH INTEREST the two letters from Susan Forde and Lucille Henderson in which they expressed their lack of confidence in the figures produced by the Scottish Government. The figures show that Scotland enjoys a very generous financial settlement from the UK Government to the tune of £15 billion pounds per year.

I would ask them to consider that the SNP now take confident ownership of these figures.

Some other points:

 The Scottish Government's Independence White Paper in 2014 (page 67) states: 'GERS is the authoritative publication on Scotland's public finances'.

- They are the responsibility of the Scottish Government's Chief Statistician.
- As the GERS report itself explains: 'The United Kingdom Statistics Authority has designated these statistics as National Statistics, in accordance with the Statistics and Registration Service Act 2007 and signifying compliance with the Code of Practice for Official Statistics'.
- The Independence white paper cites GERS figures on no less than 15 occasions and used them as the basis for the economic case presented.
- Finally, during the independence campaign, Alex Salmond answered a question from a journalist with 'Alistair, you know that, because it's in the GERS figures.'

Why don't supporters of Independence recognise that the SNP trust these figures? Is it because the figures don't look good for an Independent Scotland that they wish to rubbish them?

LUCILLE HENDERSON SUGGESTS (Letters, May) that we should go to Facebook for 'detailed and well-researched information' on the financial prospects of an Independent Scotland. She suggests that we refer to 'Believe in Scotland' by Gordon McIntyre Kemp.

I'm not sure why anyone would refer to Facebook when the Scottish Government produce a detailed annual income and expenditure report, freely available on the government website. Of course, it does not illustrate the finances of Scotland after independence, but it does give an indication of the current £15 billion deficit in our spending, which is met by the UK Government. This would be the 'run rate' for Indy Scotland and the new government would have to explain what spending cuts and tax increases would be made.

She refers to Mr McIntyre Kemp as some sort of expert. He has been a director of three business – all have failed. Intelligise Limited, which was based at Mr Macintyre-Kemp's home in Jordanhill in Glasgow was 'dissolved via voluntary strikeoff' in February 2016. He put more than £50,000 into this social media consultancy that ended with net assets of £594.

The other two dissolved companies he was a director of are – Creative Learning Action ltd (SC210189) and Icosmart ltd (SC212158)).

Why on earth would we take financial advice from Mr McIntyre Kemp?

Susan Forde wrote (Letters, March) that Scotland gets a poor financial deal from the UK Government. She alleged that Scotland sends £1 to Westminster and only gets 57 pence back in spending.

I pointed out in April that Ms Forde was mistaken, and the truth is that Scotland gives £1 to UK Government and gets back £1.23 in spending. My source was the figures produced by the SNP Scottish Government on a voluntary basis by professional statisticians and economists.

Ms Forde writes again in the latest issue and doesn't challenge my figures. Therefore, I assume she agrees that her original suggestion was incorrect, and that Scotland gets a very good deal from being part of the UK.

Instead, she alleges that the figures produced by the SNP government are wholly misleading and close to false accounting.

Almost every single point she makes in her letter is incorrect. I have just selected a few so as not to make this letter too long.

- She says that the figures are mostly estimates. Is she suggesting that the Scottish Government do not know what they spend on Health and Education in Scotland or that the UK Government do not know what they spend on Pensions in Scotland?
- She says that the Scottish Government is not allowed to borrow. This is completely wrong. In fact, the Scottish Government will have accumulated £1.99 billion in capital debt by the end of 2020-21. This is not my opinion, this is from the ScotGov website.
- She then states that Scottish MPs are barred from voting on English matters such as Health and Education. Of course they are. How would she feel if Westminster MPs made decisions concerning devolved Scottish issues?
- Lastly, she says that NHS spending gets 30% less income than NHS England. This is simply nonsense. Health spending per head is higher in Scotland than in England due to our older population and the challenges of delivering care in Highlands and Islands.

We benefit greatly from being part of the UK. There is nothing wrong with arguing for Independence, but if it is such a good idea, you would think that supporters would use facts instead of fiction.

I WOULD LIKE TO COMMENT on Lucille Henderson's letter in the May issue of the Newsletter where she asserts that 'GERS was conceived as a political, not a statistical exercise'. I am not sure where she has gained this idea from but it is perhaps worth quoting from the Scottish Government themselves:

'GERS is produced by the Scottish Government statisticians. It is designated as a National Statistics product, which means that it is produced independently of Scottish Ministers and has been assessed by the UK Statistics Authority as being produced in line with the Code of Practice for Statistics. This means the statistics have been found to meet user needs, to be methodically sound, explained well and produced free of political interference.'

Lucille Henderson goes on to support the Scottish Government by referring to their 'growing and capable competence over the past 14 years.' Examples of their "competence" presumably includes the vast sums written off on poorly judged involvement in such ventures as Prestwick Airport, Ferguson Shipyard, BiFab, Lochaber Aluminium Smelter, the amalgamation of police forces etc. Billions of pounds squandered. Even the much lauded Queensferry Crossing which we were told would not have to close because of high winds like the Forth Bridge had to, has to be closed owing to icing of the overhead cables leading to lumps of ice falling on cars. Perhaps they didn't plan for Scotland having a colder climate than other warmer countries where a similar design was used. The steel to build it was also purchased from China.

On health the SNP have presided over a worse life expectancy than in much of Eastern Europe. A Glaswegian man has lower life expectancy than a man from Uzbekistan, Egypt, Venezuela, Libya or Bangladesh to name but a few. The record on drugs is appalling with Scotland's drugs death rate

being 3.5 times that of the UK, 15 times that of Germany and 35 times that of France. Our homeless death rate is the worst in the UK.

The record on Education is equally depressing. Scottish children used to excel in literacy and reading comprehension but that is no longer the case with standards falling year on year.

All the above is hardly an endorsement of 'capable competence.'

Scotland's Budget Deficit (pre Covid) was 8.6% of GDP compared to 2.5% of the UK as a whole and is now 22-25% of GDP compared to 14.5% for the UK. Although the SNP may wish to leave the 6th largest economy in the world to be ruled by the EU, the EU's own criteria for membership is that budget deficit must be 3% or less which Scotland has not managed to achieve for 20 years. The cry for Scotland to increase borrowing, even if it were possible, would be at very high interest rates, much higher than the UK can currently borrow at and would have to be paid for by the Scottish public in higher taxation and cuts in services. Austerity would be in a different league to what many people complained about under the Conservatives.

As a final note I have written to the SNP now on five separate occasions to ask how we would all benefit from Independence but they have either been unable to answer or declined to answer. They don't seem to have much confidence in their own policies. All I can say in conclusion is be very careful what you wish for.

Newsletter Editorial Policy

I NOTE FROM THE May edition that you say the newsletter is politically neutral. As you are aware, I changed my political allegiance at PKC in March and sent you my statement on the 3 reasons why, which you were originally going to publish in my column for May but then, on reflection, changed your mind, stating it was too political at election time. I note, however, that you allowed Councillor Watters to make political points in his column. I find it strange that you are happy to print reader's political opinions at election time but not those from all local Elected Councillors, most of whom are elected representing a political party and usually campaign for those parties at election time.

The above suggests it is not a level playing field. The idea that Elected Councillors should not be able to comment before an election to either Holyrood or Westminster, when national policies directly affect their local authority is quite frankly "a denial of democracy". I was particularly aggrieved that you did not, at the very least, print the opening paragraph of my statement and the principal reason for my change of allegiance, in relation to my successful lobbying of the Conservative Group to endorse my proposal for a funded "pilot" Area Committee for Kinross-shire that I have been campaigning for as an Elected Member since 1999; whilst allowing Councillor Watters to challenge the speed with which other Elected Members wish to bring this proposal to fruition (it has been frustrated by officer obfuscation for years), when his party made no such commitment in their failed budget motion. Whilst I am under no illusion that my statement would have made any difference to the eventual outcome in Perthshire South and Kinross-shire, I challenge above the way the newsletter have handled things for the May edition, by way of broader principle.

I assume you are the sole arbiter of editorial content and have not been influenced by others with a different political agenda. Finally, I believe this to be the first occasion in



NEW GRANT SCHEME FOR COMMUNITY HERITAGE PROJECTS



PERTH AND KINROSS HERITAGE Trust (PKHT) have launched a new Community Heritage Grant Fund and are inviting applications from local groups.

The aim of the fund is to support community projects which conserve or enhance the historic environment of Perth and Kinross.

The trust is hoping to give financial support to projects which fall into either of the following categories:

- Conservation of historic buildings or monuments in Perth & Kinross that have established and generally unhindered public access.
- Community based recording, research and interpretation of the historic environment in Perth & Kinross

'The Trust recognises how difficult it is for community groups to access funding for heritage projects' said Maggie Wilkins, Chair of the Board of Trustees.

'We are keen to assist groups in their efforts to deliver local heritage initiatives across Perth and Kinross and have designated £65,000 towards a Community Heritage Grant Fund. Through this fund we hope to support at least 15 eligible projects over the next two years.'

PKHT are inviting applications for grants of up to £5000 although larger sums may be considered in exceptional circumstances; a minimum award has not been set. Applications will be considered twice a year with the intention of committing up to £20,000 at each session until the fund is expended.

Initial deadlines for the receipt of applications are: 31 July 2021, 31 January 2022 and 31 July 2022.

Potential applicants are asked to check their eligibility before applying and to note that the fund is intended to support projects developed by community-based organisations or are for community benefit. Applications for domestic or commercial properties are unlikely to be eligible.

Date Set For Road Repairs

MUCH NEEDED ROAD REPAIRS are finally due to begin on the C495 at Lethangie in August.

Carriageway overlay and patching works will be undertaken when a temporary traffic regulation order takes effect from 16 August 2021 for a period of two weeks.

The order will temporarily prohibit all vehicles from driving and temporarily prohibit parking and loading (both sides) of the C495 from its junction with the private access to Kinross Campus (311964, 703545) to its junction with the A911 (313906, 704335), a distance of 2.51 kilometres or thereby. The alternative route for vehicles will be A911 - NEW ROAD - A922.

Local councillor Willie Robertson said, 'I am really pleased that the Lethangie Road is in the programme for much needed repairs. The Council are working hard to catch up with delayed roads maintenance works – an extra £7 million has been added to their budget to help them to do this. I am sure that the many motorists who use the Lethangie road will, like me, welcome this news.'

Community Councillor Lynne Mackay said, 'I am really pleased to hear the long anticipated works to the road that runs from the Community Campus to Lethangie have finally been scheduled for August.

This has caused a lot of concern for the community and motorists who will no doubt be relieved a date has finally been set for resurfacing this particularly troublesome road.'





Broke Not Broken - Update For 2021



FOODBANKS ARE A SAD indictment of our times but, for many of us, they are a lifeline.

The Kinross foodbank charity Broke Not Broken has made sterling efforts to help keep people fed and clothed during the pandemic.

School Closure Vouchers

Since January, Broke not Broken have been posting out supermarket vouchers to families in need, who have been referred for support. While this has been accompanied with a 36% reduction in foodbank use, it was a spend of almost £18,000! This supported 117 children over 13 weeks. This was a huge outgoing, but the charity believe it was very important and the feedback has backed this up:

'Thank you so very much for your help with the vouchers. They have been so much help to us over this period they have not been at school. I understand they will be stopped when the kids go back to school and that is fine. They will be getting school dinners again so the need for us to buy as much food will reduce again. Once again, thank you so much for the support you have been able to give us. It has been appreciated.'

'These vouchers have been amazing. They have ensured X was able to have healthy and fresh food daily, fruit, veg and hot food, all thanks to you.'

'Hi, thank you so much for the

Sainsbury's vouchers. They really made a difference during such a difficult time for everyone.'

'Hi, thank you again for the vouchers we have been receiving. They have been made a great difference in our weekly food shop.'

Back To School Vouchers

The School Closure Vouchers project ended after the school Easter holidays, and at that point all recipients were contacted to ask, 'If you could have help with anything else, what would be your priority?' Food, and heating were common, but the most prominent need was asking for help buying school uniforms and clothing for children.

Broke not Broken acted on that and spent almost £4000 sending out vouchers for people to buy clothing and footwear for their children. They asked each household if they wanted vouchers for specific shops and so we were able to tailor the vouchers to what was most useful to them.

By asking clients what they need, and listening and being able to provide specific vouchers, they give them power and control back at a time where that is lacking.

Broke not Broken have applied for funding to duplicate this project at difference pinch points during the year.

Food Parcels

So far in 2021, they we have delivered food parcels to 470 households sup-

porting 1486 people, of whom 859 were children.

What Else Have The Charity Been Doing?

They continue to support any clients with a referral for fuel poverty to pay off arrears and get a significant top-up.

Their counselling services continue and places have increased from 12 up to 15, with funding now secured for the next 2 years for this project, with enormous thanks to The Whyte Trust.

They have extended the offer of counselling to our volunteers. They are aware they may find themselves involved in distressing scenarios, and want to make sure they are looked after.

They have also attended various Zooms and Teams meetings with Perth and Kinross Council's Community Partnership Conference groups working towards a Local Outcome Improvement plan, meetings with other Scottish and UK foodbanks sharing best practice Stronger Communities meetings where local community groups come together to share projects and information. All this is as well as a very enjoyable Volunteers Meet-Up which occurs every few months.

Annie said, 'We are making plans for the rest of the year and applying for funding to make sure these all go ahead where possible. We are so grateful for your support, thank you so much, we couldn't do it without you.' You can contact the charity at admin@brokenotbroken.org.

BEWARE OF THE DOG WALKER!

IT HAS COME TO the attention of local police that some members of the public are failing to control their dogs whilst walking in the local area.

We would like to remind all dog owners that they have a responsibility to control all dogs whilst enjoying the countryside. Farmers are legally entitled to protect their livestock which can result in the destruction of a dog by shooting it.

While no farmer wishes to resort to this option, it has been necessary for this action to be taken before, but it can quite easily be avoided if owners ensure that they have proper control of their dogs.

The advice to dog owners walking and exercising their dogs in the countryside is to ensure they are under control at all times, and avoid going into fields where livestock are grazing. The Scottish Outdoor Access Code says dogs shouldn't be taken into fields where there are lambs or other young farm animals.

While it is possible for people to be



prosecuted for these types of offences, the real message is please don't let it happen in the first place.

Never let your dog worry or attack farm animals. Don't take your dog into fields where there are lambs, calves or other young farm animals. If you do go into a field of farm animals, keep your dog(s) on a short lead and keep as far as possible from the animals.

If cattle react aggressively and move towards you, keep calm and take the shortest, safest route out of the field.

You should report to the police any incident that you witness where a dog attacks sheep or livestock.















HELP KIRSTY WALK AGAIN

KIRSTY MCCLOSKEY (20) from Kinross was in her final year of a nursing degree at Dundee University in November 2019 when she suddenly began to experience debilitating headaches, vomiting, visual distortion, numbness and difficulties balancing. She was diagnosed with severe migraines and the condition came and went, returning with a vengeance in January 2020.

A scan at Perth Royal Infirmary on 5 February 2020 discovered a tumour the size of a satsuma on her brain stem. An emergency operation at Ninewells Hospital in Dundee the next day saved her life, but it has left Kirsty needing a lot of rehabilitation to recover her movement and coordination. She needs intensive physiotherapy and will have to do a lot more hard work if she is going to walk again without help.




Friends of the family decided that they would do a fundraiser to help Kirsty

with the expensive rehabilitation. Keith Cuthbert, Simon Parsons, Nick Leslie and Ann Leslie set about organising the Loch Leven 24.

The Newsletter spoke to Keith Cuthbert, who told us, 'We wanted to incorporate our beautiful loch in the challenge and as keen cyclists we came up with the idea of cycling (or running, walking etc.) as a team for 24 hours non-stop.'

Previously, Keith, Simon and Nick cycled from Land's End to John 'O Groats in nine days, so they are no strangers to a good challenge.

Keith continued, 'We know rehabilitation is a marathon -

not a sprint. In particular, the access to physiotherapy care is critical and whilst Kirsty has worked really hard on her rehabilitation we are keen to support the cost of extra physio sessions and other treatments.

'So, we are planning to do laps of Loch Leven trail as a relay for 24 hours from midday on Saturday 5 June firstly to raise money to continue and enhance Kirsty's rehabilitation and secondly, to support the Brain Tumour Charity: www.thebraintumourcharity.org.

'The response from the local community and beyond has been superb so far. Literally within minutes of posting our intention to attempt this challenge, the Kinross Colts, Otters and Tennis Club had all contacted wanting to enter teams. We really do live in a special place.

Encouraged by the many offers of support from the community, a campaign began to raise funds with a goal of £35,000 to re-build the hide. NatureScot has committed to make up any shortfall in the costs of rebuilding the hide this year. They are pleased to report that the appeal has raised almost £30,000. This is an amazing effort by local businesses and the community which highlights how important Loch Leven is to both the Kinross Community and visitors near and far.

The hide won a Scottish Design Award in 2012. The same architects will be looking to see what measures may build-in to prevent a similar incident in the future. The foundations are undamaged and so to speed the process through planning major changes aren't being proposed, but small improvements to the hide would certainly be considered. 



Plant A Tree For The Jubilee

GREEN-FINGERED KINROSS-SHIRE CLUBS and groups will soon start thinking about how to participate in a new initiative.

His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, Patron, has planted a tree to launch The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) – a unique, UK-wide tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022, by inviting people to 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee.' Her Majesty The Queen joined The Prince of Wales for the first Jubilee tree planting in the grounds of Windsor Castle earlier this year, during the tree planting season.

He said: 'Our trees stand at the frontline of our fight against climate change and by sustaining our beautiful countryside for generations to come, The Queen's Green Canopy is a fitting tribute to Her Majesty's years of service to this country. Everyone from individuals to Scout and Girlguiding groups, villages, cities, counties, schools and corporates will be encouraged to plant trees from October 2021 when the tree planting season begins, through to the end of the Jubilee year in 2022. As well as inviting the planting of new trees, The Queen's Green Canopy will highlight and showcase 70 amazing and irreplaceable Ancient Woodlands across the United Kingdom and identify 70 Ancient Trees to celebrate Her Majesty's 70 years of service.

The QGC project will also create a pilot training programme for unemployed young people aged between 16-24 to plant and manage trees. From October, all planting projects can be uploaded onto an interactive map on the new QGC website so that



everyone can share and inspire others, as well as creating a green canopy of projects to cover the country.

The Environment Secretary, George Eustice, said: 'From individuals, schools, farmers, environmental groups and businesses, we want people to get involved, grow and protect our nation's trees, and mark the Platinum Jubilee.

Tackling the climate and biodiversity crises is a priority. Healthy and productive trees and woodland will play a crucial role in this — which is why we are committed to increasing tree planting across the UK to 30,000 hectares per year by the end of this Parliament, and investing millions of pounds to help deliver this through the "Nature for Climate Fund".

GETTING TRADESMEN IN FOR YOUR HOUSE OR GARDEN?

Whenever you respond to an advert (even a *Newsletter* one!) and invite a new tradesperson to your house, make sure you:

- Get at least three different quotes to compare costs.
- Always ask for references. If you can, ask to see examples of work or talk to previous customers.
- Don't accept an estimate. **Insist on a written quote**.
- Once you've accepted a quote, ask for a contract covering the work, the price, and the start and finish dates.

Company or Individual?

Using an established company should give you peace of mind as they will have a track record that you can check. On the downside, they may well charge more per hour. With a self-employed tradesperson, the most important thing is to find someone you can trust who will do the job well.

With both, you should ask for references. Even a novice should be able to provide you with the phone number of someone they have worked for. If you decide to take on someone who hasn't been in business long, try them out on a small job first, so that you can see the quality of their work.

It's sensible to check if they have Public Liability Insurance, If you're expecting them to use a chainsaw or pesticides, or to take away your green waste you should check if they hold the relevant certificates and licences.

Establish exactly what you expect them to do. If you need them regularly then agree with them how often they will come and how and when they will be paid.

Ask for a quote for specialist jobs such as tree work (make sure the surgeon is qualified and insured). Hourly rates are usual for gener-

ADVICE FROM KINROSS POLICE

Local Kinross Officers have been made aware that there is a growing concern over 'bogus workman' within the local area. We would like to remind householders to be on their guard against all bogus callers and rogue traders who may be operating in the area.

Always be alert when answering your door to unannounced visitors. Ensure all doors and windows are secure whilst within your property and do not leave any valuables on display. You may wish to install some additional safety measures such as a door chain, door viewer or obvious signs to deter any unwanted callers.

In every instance you are entitled to ask for identification as well as business name and contact information. All genuine, bona fide tradespeople should not be offended by this request and be happy to provide valid identification.

If you are interested in the service which is being offered please do not hand over any money, bank details or cash at your door and politely request a professional quotation for consideration.

al work but you will be charged extra for waste removal and use of pesticides. Jobs involving power tools might be more expensive too.

Payment

You might be asked to pay a deposit. **Never pay the whole amount of money before any work is done.**

Less reliable tradespeople are known to ask for upfront cash payments, so be careful. Work out a suitable stage payment plan which everyone is happy with.

It's always best to pay for segments of work once they're completed. That way, you can check the standard before parting with your money. You should've already agreed an overall price. But sometimes things can crop up that will mean paying out a little more than you first agreed. To make sure you're not getting overcharged, make sure that all labour and material costs are well-documented. Ask for VAT invoices, get a signed receipt for every payment you make, and keep all the paperwork for your records.


If possible, pay by credit card as it can provide extra protection if someone breaches a contract or if a firm goes bust.

Look out for tradespeople who try to set a daily rate rather than a fixed rate for the whole job. This can sometimes be an incentive for the job to overrun.

Before you make any final payment, make sure you're satisfied the work has been carried out properly and that it meets the terms of the contract. Your home insurance may not cover you for any damage caused to your home as a result of shoddy work or faulty materials, so make sure that work is done to a high standard.

DOLLAR MUSEUM REOPENS

DOLLAR MUSEUM WILL RE-OPEN on Saturday 5 June at 11am. We are very grateful to those who have supported us while we have been closed and we have prepared a lively selection of new exhibitions during lockdown.

As well as our permanent displays on the Devon Valley Railway, the Japanese Garden at Cowden, Prehistoric Dollar, Granny's Kitchen, etc., you may see a scary presentation on Local Witches – be careful going too near the Devil's Cradle in the Kelly Burn Glen or exploring Lochy Faulds, near Merlin Park.



A new feature is the Time-Line of Dollar History. This display extends round the entire exhibition area (some 25 metres) and transports you from geological times to the present day. In addition, there are displays on Floods in Dollar (Did you know that houses in East Burnside lost their fronts in 1877?), The Origin of the Place-name "Dollar" (We are often asked about this by visitors), Were the Romans in Dollar? (Well, were they? Let's look at the evidence), the History of the Dollar Academy Gardens (Did you know that Dollar Institution had a Botanic Garden and Nursery?) and Dollar Fair in Olden Times.

You may also see a selection of objects from Dollar Museum Collection. Among the chosen items are some connected to Castle Campbell and Local Churches (particularly interesting are the Communion Tokens) in our large Display Case. And a collection of artifacts illustrating local industries, such as Bleaching, Mining (coal and copper), and Brick- and Tile-making.

Keeping the best to last, we are delighted to show you a working model of Dollar Railway Station, as it was shortly before it was closed by Dr Beeching. Mick Rice spent a whole lockdown making this very fine model.

Unfortunately, we cannot put out extra material or allow children to play with the Dolls House or Victorian Toys, or dress up, until the restrictions are totally eased. The Reading Room will be closed during public opening hours, but you may make an appointment to do research at another time by emailing the Hon. Curator at dollarmuseum@btconnect.com

The present two-metre distancing rule allows to have five visitors at a time, along with our two volunteers on duty. We hope this will soon be reduced to one metre and we can then allow more visitors into the museum. Check our website for up to date information: www.dollarmuseum.org.uk

A Dam Fine Time For Christian Aid Week!

THE ORGANISERS OF Christian Aid Week in Kinross-shire are delighted with the response to their 'Water Bucket Challenge' held last Saturday to raise money to provide water dams in African countries hit by climate change.

The Challenge was for young people to experience a little of the task many people in Africa face on a daily basis by carrying a bucket with water from Loch Leven to Kinross Parish Church, with sponsorship from family and friends.

One of the organisers, Alisdair Stewart says: 'We worked with church youth organisations and KYTHE (Kinross-shire Youth Enterprise) and were delighted that no fewer than 41 young climate champions took part. "Great fun and laughter for a great cause", was one comment we've received. Our aim was to raise £907 - the cost of one earth dam, a project being supported by Christian Aid Week this year. The earth dam project in Africa is low-tech, helping local communities provide a local source of water for domestic and agricultural use. Remarkably, the Challenge has already raised £1931, more than twice our initial target. Our thanks to



the young people who took part, the volunteer stewards, those who donated, and Hunter's for supplying sausages for the sizzle at the end.'

The Christian Aid team in Kinross-shire, faced with a second year of disruption to Christian Aid week in May, came up with the Water Bucket Challenge and other ideas to help replace the £5000 normally collected in the county, mainly by door-to-door collection.

ROAD SAFETY: There are a number of outstanding road safety issues delayed by the pandemic. One is the request for a priority system to be introduced at the bridge over the North Quiech on the Lethangie road. There have been a number of near misses here. The bridge



has practically no pavement so pedestrians crossing the bridge are at considerable risk when cars are going over it. I have received a similar request for the new gullet bridge over the Leven cut which will now be considered.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS: Do you want to be kept informed of planning applications lodged with the council? I get sent a weekly list of all planning applications lodged and a list of the applications which have been determined. If you let me have your email address, I will send you a copy of these weekly lists so that you know what is happening locally, and can comment on applications which might concern you.

MILNATHORT FLOODING STUDY: You may have seen contractors digging holes in certain parts of Milnathort – namely Ba' hill and on the north side of Stirling Road. This is being done as part of works to safeguard Milnathort from the damaging effects of flash floods. Once the investigation works have been completed, it is hoped that a scheme will be designed to protect the village centre from the severe damage that can be caused by flash floods.

SPEEDING: The dangers caused by speeding traffic was raised at both Milnathort and Portmoak community councils. I have contacted our local community police officers and haver asked them to target the areas highlighted with speed checks. These are Burleigh Road, Milnathort and the A911 through Easter Balgedie. **GOOD DEEDS:** You will recall that last month, I praised a local farmer at Mawcarse who had cleared the pavement between the Arlary Road and Mawcarse of overgrown grass and vegetation, restoring the pavement to its original width. Well, since then, he has cleared the pavement eastwards towards Mawcarse crossroads and made a really good job. The cleared and widened pavements makes them usable by pedestrians, cyclists and people with disability buggies. Well done to him!

AS THE SIXTH SESSION of the Scottish Parliament gets underway, we are at long last feeling the warmth of spring. As we leave the frosts behind for another year, we can look forward with some optimism to months which will hopefully bring

Kinross Town Centre WiFi

Free public WiFi will soon be introduced in Kinross town centre for use by both residents and visitors. Many local people have raised issues with not being able to get an internet signal from some mobile



providers in the centre of the town, which this new service should solve.

Kinross was initially not included in the roll out of WiFi in Perth and other larger towns in Perth & Kinross, but I have pushed for our inclusion in the scheme. We have been able to secure funding for this project from the Town Centre, which has ensured that it is able to go ahead.

Easter Balgedie Speeding

Further concerns have been raised by residents about speeding through Easter Balgedie. This problem seems to have been exacerbated by speed mitigation measures along other parts of the A911 so there is a need for more urgent action to tackle this

The Council has previously agreed to lower the speed limit on the stretch to 30mph, and I am asking officers to expedite its introduction. In addition, residents have asked that the Council considers physical speed mitigation measures, which is something we shall look to explore.

Road Improvements

You may have noticed an increase in roads maintenance workers

across Kinross-shire over the past month or so. The Council is seeking to deliver repairs for which we secured funding in the March budget. There is still a very big backlog so it will take some time to get round everywhere. 

THE RESULTS HAVE BEEN finalised in the Holyrood elections and Nicola Sturgeon has been returned as First Minister. Whatever your politics, it has to be recognised that the SNP's feat in winning a fourth term is remarkable. And it wasn't a narrow win –the party secured the largest number of votes won by any party in Holyrood history.



Across the world, people are watching. Scotland's election results made front-page news in two of France's leading newspapers: Le Figaro and Le Monde. Both of which saw the outcome as 'plucky Scotland defying Boris Johnson and Westminster'. Meanwhile across the European Union, commentators have been speculating about how soon an independent Scotland could rejoin, with most agreeing that—post-Brexit—the welcome mat would be rolled out in a way it wasn't during our first independence referendum. Back then, Brussels wanted to be helpful to David Cameron. These days, the Conservative government doesn't have many friends in Brussels.

The First Minister has said that there will be no referendum legislation until the pandemic is over. But that seems unlikely to halt fevered speculation about the timing and result. Interestingly, Michael Gove has said that the UK Government will not mount any legal challenge to a referendum bill passed at Holyrood. And that, surely, is wise. If Holyrood votes for a referendum, it does so on behalf of the people who have returned MSPs with a mandate. That's how parliamentary democracy works. And all of us will then have our say subsequently in a yes/no ballot.

I'm looking forward to watching the debates at Holyrood in the upcoming session. Although Westminster is showier with its elaborate customs, wigs, and silk stockings, Holyrood's debates are frequently better attended and more informed. Long hours can pass on the floor of the House of Commons, with multiple MPs standing up to make virtually identical speeches before frontbenchers rise to summarise, offering florid self-congratulatory praise for the quality of the debate and the profundity of the arguments made.

In Holyrood, the speaking styles may fail sometimes to reach an oratorical peak. But speakers often have a wealth of pre-politics experience which they bring to bear. This upcoming parliament will look much more like Scotland, with more female MSPs than ever before. Not before time, we have the first minority-ethnic woman. We have all three of Scotland's national languages spoken by newly elected MSPs (and a big push to have Scots given equal status with Gaelic and English). The newly elected Angus Robertson, formerly SNP group leader at Westminster will burnish his EU credentials by taking his oath in his native German. There will be MSPs ranged in age from their early 20s to 70s. Holyrood now has its first permanent wheelchair user. And there are nine openly LGBT parliamentarians.

And just, as I write that last paragraph, I've had Le Monde on the phone. They want to interview me about 'Scotland's parliament – diverse and heading towards independence'. As I say, the world is watching.

Cycle Safety

The combination of lighter nights and warmer weather has resulted in a marked increase in cyclists on the roads of Perth and Kinross and we all must be aware of what we can do; as pedestrians, cyclists and drivers to ensure our highways remain safe for all road users.

Every week in Scotland, at least three people cycling suffer life-changing injuries and in most cases, it's the person driving, not the person cycling, at fault.

Close passes are an everyday experience for people cycling, according to the Near Miss Project every year people who regularly cycle will 'experience an event so frightening that it alone makes them consider giving up cycling.'

Making our roads safer for cycling requires a combined approach of engineering, education and enforcement.

Some key points to remember when passing people on bikes:

- Always give at least a car's width of space (1.5 metres)
 this will usually mean crossing into the other lane.
- If you're travelling above 30 mph, give more than 1.5 metres space.
- Wait at a safe distance until you have space and visibility to pass safely.
- Don't overtake at blind corners or if there's oncoming traffic.
- In towns and in slow-moving traffic, consider if there is any benefit to passing, especially if there are lights ahead.
- Don't feel pressure from the person in the car behind to pass before it is safe.

Driving too close when passing a cyclist is an example of careless driving which attracts a minimum fine of £100 and three penalty points.

Highway Code Rule 64 states 'you must not cycle on a pavement.' Generally anyone cycling on a footway or footpath in Scotland is committing an offence under Section 129(5) of The Roads (Scotland) Act 1984. It is however not an offence to cycle across a footway or footpath to access a cycle track, driveway or other land where cycling is allowed.

And whilst it is perfectly legal for cyclists to ride beside each other or in the middle of the road we all need to respect each other and I would hope that all road users would follow the letter of the law and the spirit in which it is intended to ensure that everyone can use our roads safely and without hindrance.

Hero Of A Forgotten War

IN RECENT YEARS WE have been remembering those who were killed in action during two World Wars in the 20th century, but there have been countless other wars in which local men have enlisted and died for a long forgotten cause. One such local hero is commemorated on a brass plaque in St Paul's Episcopal Church and a stone tablet on the mausoleum in the Kirkgate Churchyard – Captain Charles Bruce – 'killed in action in Somaliland 22nd April 1903.'

Born in Mauritius in June 1869, Charles Maurice Dundas Bruce was the eldest son of Sir Charles Bruce of Arnot, GCMG (1836-1920) and his wife Clara. Sir Charles at that time was Governor of the Indian Ocean island colony of Mauritius which was at that time a British possession. But for the Bruces of Arnot, home for the past century had always been Kinross-shire where they owned a small estate centred around Arnot Tower. In his retirement, Sir Charles was a Justice of the Peace and Deputy Lieutenant for the county of Kinross.

While his father pursued a career as a colonial administrator in distant territories ranging from British Guiana to the Windward Isles, his son was educated both at Harrow and at Gordon's School in Woking which was founded in 1885 as the National Memorial to Gordon of Khartoum. In 1891 Charles em-

barked on a military career in the Royal Field Artillery, earning himself a medal with two clasps while on active service on the North West Frontier of India in 1897-98. By 1900 he had reached the rank of captain just prior to his deployment as an officer in the first Somaliland Campaign.

The troubled Horn of Africa, often in the headlines today, was the scene of five British campaigns between 1900 and 1920, each of which attempted to maintain control of a strategically important routeway between the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean. Britain maintained two protectorates in Yemen and British Somaliland to the north and south of the Gulf of Aden, but not all of the local chieftains were cooperative. Each of the five Somaliland campaigns pitted British and colonial forces against Dervish warriors led by the Somali religious leader Mohammed Abdullah Hassan, better known to the British press as the 'Mad Mullah'.

By the end of March 1903 the British were beginning to take the offensive after occupying a line of wells where the Dervishes watered their livestock. On 17 April, however, disaster struck when a patrol of 500 men moving through high bush to tackle the enemy were surprised and overwhelmed at a place called Gumburru. Another

British column, hoping to intercept the Mullah's forces from the north, though better prepared were surrounded and outnumbered by the Dervishes, the commanding officer Major John Gough decided to retreat with the rearguard moving back being replaced by one of its flanking lines to ensure continuous fire. This encounter came to be known as the Battle of Daratoleh.

Captain Charles Bruce, who was in command of the rearguard, was shot from 20 metres range by a Dervish who crept up close through the long grass. He fell to the ground and was unable to move, but his three fellow officers rushed to his aid and with the help of two Askari, a camel man and a Sikh Bruce was lifted onto a camel while accompanying troops provided covering fire. Unfortunately, Captain Bruce was shot once more, this time fatally. All of those who tried to save his life were awarded medals, the three officers each receiving the Victoria Cross.

Remembered by at least three memorials in Kinross-shire and on plaques at Gordon's School and Harrow, Charles Bruce's tragic end in Somaliland was the subject of a sketch published in The Graphic magazine with the title 'An Heroic Incident of the Battle of Daratoleh: The Rescue of Captain Bruce.'

Algal Bloom

Are Warming Waters Causing An Increase In Blue Green Algae At Loch Leven?

Despite the Covid-19 pandemic monopolising the headlines over the past year or so, we have all become aware that there is also a global climate emergency unveiling itself. The UK government declared a climate emergency in 2019, with the Scottish Government making a commitment to achieving net-zero carbon emissions by 2045. This year, Glasgow will host the United Nations Climate Change conference, known as COP26, which aims to unite the world in tackling climate change. However, as we undergo a 'green recovery' from Covid-19 – a sustainable economic recovery that helps us move towards those net-zero emissions targets – we will still need to adapt because our historic emissions have already changed our climate and will continue to do so for decades to come.

How Has Climate Change Played Out At Loch Leven So Far?

Scotland is seeing rising temperatures, heavier rainfall and milder winters with less snow cover on our mountains. Loch Leven has already been affected, with long term records showing that water temperatures have increased markedly, especially during winter and early summer. So much so, that this once popular curling venue rarely develops large amounts of ice anymore. There has also been an increase in heavy rainfall, which has caused localised flooding events in the last two years. These changes are already affecting the water quality, quantity and biodiversity of the loch.

For the past 3 years algal blooms have been occurring once the loch temperatures have reached 16-17 degrees for a day or more. Increased water temperatures are likely to have affected the ecology of the loch, potentially encouraging algal blooms that increase under warm conditions and low flushing rates. However, at some times of year, higher temperatures can also have a positive effect on water quality

by increasing the rate at which grazing by Daphnia removes algae from the loch (Carvalho et al., 2012).

Long Term Changes In Water Quality

In the 1980s and early 1990s, blooms of blue-green algae were a serious problem at Loch Leven. They resulted in recreational activities being cancelled and fish deaths being recorded. However, once inputs of pollution from the surrounding catchment had been reduced, at a present day cost of more than £7.6m, the water quality improved and local businesses began to benefit from the increased income that more visitors brought to the area.

However, over the last few years, algal blooms have started to become more common again. This has led to some people wondering if the change has been caused by more pollution entering the loch as runoff from the surrounding land and discharges from various waste water sources.

The UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology (UKCEH) has been monitoring Loch Leven for more than 50 years. Willie Wilson, part-time fishery manager, also collects data on water clarity, and levels of alae and cyanobacteria over the summer months.

What Is Algae And What Does It Look Like?

Blue-green algae naturally occur in bodies of water and are a type of bacteria, known as cyanobacteria, which can produce chemicals that are harmful if ingested. The recent warm summer weather has contributed to the problem. Algae grow faster when it is warmer, with concentrations increasing to form blooms and scums on the surface of the water. Often seen on the surface of the loch, blue-green algae looks like green or brownish-green scum. The algae blooms can make the water become green, blue-green or greenish brown and several species can produce musty, earthy or grassy odours. It can also cause foaming on the shoreline.

Why Have The Algal Blooms Returned?

Data collected by the UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology over the past 50 years show that annual average water temperatures in the loch have increased by more than 1.5°C since the 1970s. Such a large increase in temperature will have had a major impact on the biodiversity of the loch, and is likely to be one of the main drivers of the recent resurgence of algal blooms is climate change. Recent increases in water temperature have taken the loch waters above 16-17°C for several days at a time, causing phosphorus that has accumulated in the loch sediments over many years to be released back into the water column through a process known as internal nutrient cycling. This is a natural process but, when it happens, it allows the algae and cyanobacteria to grow more rapidly than loss processes such as zooplankton grazing and flushing rates can keep up with. This creates troublesome blooms like those that we have seen recently. It is very unlikely that the main cause of the problem is local, such as an increase in discharges or runoff, because these blooms are usually recorded in standing waters right across the UK, all at the same time.

How Can They Affect Human Health?

The blue-green algae (a type of bacteria) associated with these

algal blooms can produce toxins, and these can cause a range of health problems in people and animals that come into contact with them. These include skin rashes, eye irritations, vomiting and diarrhoea, fever and pains in muscles and joints. Blue-green algae have caused the deaths of dogs, horses, cattle, birds and fish across the UK. For the past 3 years, signs have had to be erected at Loch Leven advising people and their pets not to enter the water during such blooms.

What Can We Do About It?

We can try to prevent any additional phosphorus entering the loch from land runoff and waste water discharges so that we do not add to the phosphorus that has already accumulated in the loch. However, there is already a thick layer of phosphorus rich sediment in the loch.


We can try to reduce the effects of climate change by helping our Government work towards achieving net zero by 2045. Although this will help slow down, or even reverse, the current rate of increase in water temperature in the long term, it is not a short term solution.

Many different methods have been suggested for controlling algal blooms. These include using barley straw, filtering the algae out of the water or removing phosphorus rich sediment. Some of these methods have been scientifically tested, while others have not. Also, there is a risk that some of these approaches could release algal toxins into the water, while others are expensive to apply but completely ineffective. Much of this information is not readily available to water managers who need to decide how best to respond to algal blooms.

A meteorological station been put onto St Serf's island to capture weather data that will provide a more comprehensive understanding of climate change at Loch Leven.

Managing Our Scottish Lochs To Reduce Climate Change Impacts

The Centre of Expertise for Waters (CREW), a Scottish Government funded partnership, has recently approved a project proposal that was submitted by representatives of the Loch Leven Catchment Management Group. This project aims to explore ways of mitigating climate change impacts on the water quality of Scottish standing waters. The project will also consider how strong the body of evidence is that climate

change is increasing the incidence of algal blooms, and the extent to which these blooms are affecting recreational use, biodiversity and local economies across Scotland.

In addition, the study will investigate whether we can change the way that we manage our lochs to help alleviate such problems and improve water quality. For example, can flushing rates be changed – by releasing more water from managed reservoirs and lochs at key times of the year – to reduce the size of the blooms? A recent modelling study has suggested that even relatively small changes in flushing rate (10-15 per cent over 10-20 days) at key times of year might be able to reduce the size of an algal bloom by up to 40 per cent.

It is likely that the answer will not be a one size fits all solution and that different lochs will require different management approaches. However, by looking at data from Scottish lochs and other locally important water bodies that suffer from algal blooms, this project could help us to solve some of the water quality problems that we are now seeing at Loch Leven. The number of people visiting the outdoors increased markedly during Covid-19 restrictions, and may well continue to rise as more people realise the health and well-being benefits of being outside in natural surroundings. So, anything that we can do to reduce algal blooms at Loch Leven is likely to have a wide range of socio-economic benefits.

Watch this space for a future update on the results from the CREW funded project to see how it could help us improve water quality at Loch Leven!



You Never Know Just What Is Going To Happen...

some time ago, when I was our walking with my trusty spaniel, he suddenly became wildly excited by the sight of a red squirrel. Squirrels usually mocked him, before they raced up the nearest tall tree, but this one was unfortunately and unusually trapped in a folded over piece of wire fencing. If it stayed in the trap, the dog couldn't get it, if it tried to come out, the dog would have made short work of it. My intervention was very simple. I held the dog by the collar, prised back a small part of the fence, and the squirrel raced away. The dog was easily distracted from his disappointment. Peace and quiet returned to the area.

However, the whole scenario set me thinking. Who knows what the squirrel was thinking! Do squirrels think? It must have seemed like a bit of a miracle. From out of the blue, rescue appeared in the form of my hands. Needless to say, the squirrel did not stop to say thank you, or even look round to see from whence his rescue had come. How many times do we do that in life? Things are happening in our lives, we simply cannot see any way out of some dire situation. We've almost given the situation up for hopeless, no amount of worry and resourcefulness has made any difference. Suddenly something unexpected happens, the situation just seems to resolve itself, and we cannot see where that help comes from.

Do you believe in miracles? I do. I'm always expecting them, and they do turn up on a regular basis. I was at a business meeting — we were working out what it was we wanted from our new venture. When I said 'Let's have an expectation of miracles', I was told to come down off Planet Nonsense and to 'Dream on!' That's fine; everyone is allowed their own opinion. I could tell of many, many miracles. They are not usually dramatic, like a total cure from paralysis, or an illness disappearing, much to the amazement of doctors all around. No — they are much more ordinary, subtle and every day kind of miracles. A brother talking to a brother after 15 years, someone making a wedding speech, when he was so terrified that he thought he would be eaten alive, the little special needs child, who won a Christmas party game, because someone told him they thought he could.

Then my mind drifted to the whole miracle that is our own body. Many folk are not proud or pleased with their bodies, because they don't like something about the way they look: too fat, too thin, too tall, too short, too old, too spotty, too wrinkled etc. Pause for a moment and contemplate your eye. Hundreds of years of research and study have never managed to create anything as wonderful, or as expert at doing its job, as the eye. It adjusts according to situations, bringing the outside world into our brain, making sense of all the colours and lights, and shapes, and translating it all into some sort of pattern that we can understand. What about the heart? Beating away from about six weeks after conception, and never stopping, give or take the odd heart attack, until the day we die. No days off, no bank holidays. What about the poor old liver soldiering on, when assaulted with all sorts of

poisons most days of the week, filtering and protecting, and keeping the blood right. Then there are the lungs, performing a miracle every time we breathe in and out. The whole thing is just to be wondered at, and most of the time we don't even notice it, look after it, thank it or just give it a well-done pat! Just like the ungrateful, unaware squirrel.

When we lived up in North Angus, a car went careering into the wall just before the narrow, high, Gannochy Bridge over the fast flowing River North Esk. The car was stopped from plunging into the gorge 50 feet below, by the slenderest young sapling. Certain death avoided. There are not many trees that can claim to have saved a life. This one did though. The driver needed some medical attention, although he survived pretty much unscathed. One can only wonder at the shock he must have gone through. Trees do save our lives constantly. Without trees and plants, we would have no oxygen to breathe, and without oxygen, we would be dead. That is why it only makes sense to try and preserve trees. Trees definitely do deserve the odd hug or two, because they are a pretty good miracle in themselves.

In conclusion, when you apply an attitude of gratitude to everything, every day, you will start to notice that life is packed full of miracles, seen and unseen, noticed and unnoticed. No such thing as an ordinary day, an ordinary person, squirrel, spaniel or tree.

Kinross Community Council

News from the April Meeting

Present at the meeting held on Tuesday 27 April were CCllrs L Mckay (Chair), D Colliar, W Freeman, M McFarlane and H Phillips, one member of the public, Cllrs C Purves and W Robertson and minute-taker Mrs C Aird.

Apologies were received from from CCllr T Stewart, CCllr M Wood and PC A Mitchenson.

Police Report

Unfortunately, Police Scotland were unable to attend the meeting but had provided the following report:

25/03/2021: Male asking for money. Caller reporting an unknown male approached her and asked for some money. If anyone is approached in this manner please do not give out any sum of money to any persons.

27/03/2021: Youths in garden. Caller reporting youths in the

29/03/2021: Police generated activity – Warrant. Negative result.

31/03/2021: Bogus workman. A male was seen to do door to door in Kinross stating he was from the council and asking occupants to fix their roofs. Please always ask for ID and if you are unsure do not answer your door.

01/04/2021: Attempted theft by housebreaking. Kinross Stove and Cooker Centre has had an attempted housebreaking. Please remain alert and report any suspicious activity to the Police on 101.

03/04/2021: Youths gathering. Caller reporting youths gathering in the area.

07/04/2021: Youths/fire. Caller reporting as fire started by youths.

14/04/2021: Suspicious vehicle. A white panel van was seen to be loitering in the area of Clashburn Road, Kinross. Please report any suspicious activity to the Police on 101.

In respect of traffic statistics, there had been approximately 20 road traffic reports to Police Scotland in the past four weeks – these varied in nature from minor offences to more serious ones such as speeding and failing to insure.

PCs Mitchenson and Gemmell had spent some time in the area on 23/24 April carrying out proactive patrols. These had included attending all local licensed premises and engaging with staff about selling alcohol to under age people, as well as any younger adults who might be purchasing alcohol in bulk. In addition to this, they had brought to their attention the importance of observing if any large groups of youths could be seen lingering in the area.

High visibility foot patrols had also been undertaken in designated 'hot spots', as well as making their presence obvious to anyone in the area.

There had been some positive engagement with the local youths and as a result there had been no reports of anti-social behaviour to police over that particular weekend (23-25 April).

Matters Arising

Kinross Flood Resilience Group

Cllr C Purves gave the following update:

- There had been discussions around vehicles
- Obtaining a supply of sandbags in order to keep a stock
- Obtaining a sensor which would indicate when water

levels rise in the burn.

- A conversation is to be arranged with PKC in respect of storage facilities (hopefully to be funded by PKC)
- A long conversation about the group's constitution and funding – CCllr Mckay had confirmed that the resilience group could not be a subgroup of KCC and therefore would not be insured via the KCC insurance. The group, however, could go through PKC for a separate insurance policy at a cost of around £156 approx.

Cllr Purves commented that the end of 2020, there had been a report due to the PKC Environment and Infrastructure Group but realistically it was likely to be around 2023 before the South Kinross flood work would start.

CCIIr Mckay confirmed she had spoken to Mr Wright about applying to local funding agencies as well as him joining KCC, which he would need to do as a full member – he could not be co-opted onto the Council. CIIr Purves suggested that Mr Wright join as a full member, with the resilience group being a formal subgroup of the KCC, which would then enable them to be included in PKC's corporate insurance policy. He also agreed to liaise with Mr Wright and PKC in respect of looking at alternative options, if required.

Kinross-shire Move Greener Organisation

Banking Update: CCIIr McFarlane confirmed that the organisation's bank account with the Bank of Scotland would be opened within 6 weeks, and he has asked their treasurer to chase this up. He wished to record his thanks for the help of the KCC.

Cleish and Blairadam CC Boundary

Cllr Purves advised that he had still not received copies of the letters but he would chase this again. He also confirmed that there had been no response to the Newsletter article and it should be taken as agreed that the move could now be confirmed.

He asked for the minutes of the meeting to show that the KCC were content for the change to go ahead and this was agreed. The move was proposed by CCllr B Freeman and seconded by CCllr D Colliar. Cllr Purves would progress this matter accordingly.

Kinross Town Centre

Cllr Purves confirmed that he had contacted Darryl and Mike Morgan again but had not yet had a response.

CCIIr Mckay reported that there had been a number of complaints in respect of parking in the High Street and CIIr Purves advised that there had been recent discussions around residents parking, especially those parking in the shared space. He was waiting to see if anything changed in this respect following the recent removal of the lockdown restrictions. It was agreed to keep the item on the agenda.

Flower Tubs at War Memorial

CCIIr Colliar advised that he had seen the response from Kinross in Bloom in respect of the flower tubs and commented that they (Kinross in Bloom) apparently did not intend to do anything about this issue.

CCIIr Colliar reminded those present that the tubs had been placed to stop cars encroaching onto the war memorial, and that if Kinross in Bloom did not intend to do anything about this, then a conversation was required with PKC about alternative options. CCIIr Mckay felt that there was enough

space for cars to park and not cause any damage but it was noted that there had been a recent issue with a 4 x 4 vehicle parked in the vicinity, and the tailgate had been over the flower tubs. There did not seem to be a resolution to the issue and it was proposed that a meeting, and site visit, be arranged with PKC and Kinross in Bloom to discuss this issue.

Provost's Lamp

It had been suggested that the Provost's Lamp be put in the war memorial area but CCIIr Mckay felt it would be more appropriate to be placed at the bottom of the town, although there were issues with the electricity cables in that area.

CCIIr Freeman commented that there had been an issue previously as to where the pole would be sited and ex-KCC Councillor Dave Cuthbert had previously reported this.

It was agreed that Scott Denier would be contacted to discuss options for placing the lamp with alternative suggestions being in front of the County Buildings or in front of the Church Centre. Cllr W Robertson agreed to arrange a meeting, which Cllr Purves would be invited to. An update will be given at a future meeting.

Springfield Road Crossing

Cllr Colliar asked if there had been any progress in a crossing being placed in Springfield Road. CCllr McFarlane confirmed that Cllr Robertson had spoken with his son-in-law and confirmed that there was a plan to put a crossing in place but at the moment there was no confirmed date.

Cllr Robertson advised that PKC had a backlog of works but that more resources had been put into PKC to try to resolve this, but it may take around 12 months.

CCIIr McFarlane advised that he had asked for a crossing near the Muirs junction and it was noted that people were also crossing on the roundabout in order to be able to see oncoming traffic.

Cllr Robertson suggested that KCC wait until a firm proposal

was received from PKC. He confirmed that the VAS will be done first via consultation process.

This was agreed and CCllr H Phillips would draft the letter, on receipt of the appropriate information from CCllr Colliar.

Planning Applications Determined

21/00118/FLL: alteration and extension to dwelling house at 6 Argyll, Road, Kinross, approved.

20/01972/FLL: alterations and extension to dwelling house and formation of raised decking at 16 Broom Road, Kinross, approved.

21/00249/LAW: extension to dwelling house (proposed) at Fidra, 33 Montgomery Street, Kinross, approved.

21/00037/FLL: part change of use from café/takeaway to retail (Class 1) at 157 High Street, Kinross, approved.

21/00183/FLL: extension to dwelling house at 45a High Street, Kinross, approved.

No comments were received on any of the planning applications.

Other Planning Matters

In response to a question about motorway closures, CCIIr Freeman was advised that these came under the jurisdiction of Transport Scotland. He went on to advise that the motorway had due to be closed for one night but had in fact been closed for three nights with no advance notification. CIIr Purves confirmed the extended road closure and reported that residents of Glenfarg had complained to him about the diversion, especially around the number of buses which had had to use the diversion. Glenfarg residents had questioned why the buses could not serve the area normally.

No other planning matters were raised.

Reports from PKC Councillors

Cllr C Purves: Local committee work is progressing and an update will be given at a future meeting. No news had been received in respect of the concerns relating to Lathro Meadows. A feasibility study had been undertaken in respect of the potential for a footpath connecting Kinross, Hatchbank and Gairneybank, down to Kelty, with costs expected to be around £200,000 per section. Interim solutions were being looked into which should allow funding options to be unlocked. CCllr Freeman suggested that if the path was being extended to Kelty, then Fife Council should be approached for funding assistance.

Cllr W Robertson: While the parking arrangements in Avenue Road had improved, and extra spaces had been created, there was still room for improvement. Antisocial behaviour had been reported around the swimming pool area. The area itself had been tidied up and police were patrolling the area more frequently. There was a particular issue with regard to lighting and it had been agreed that this lighting would be on all night, especially during the darker nights. CCIIr Mckay commented that she had noticed the increased police patrols and felt that these were making a difference.

In respect of the TPO at Sunnypark Wood, Cllr Robertson advised that this had not been completed prior to the pandemic. He has emailed PKC again today to advise that tree felling needed to stop.

Cllr Purves and himself had met with residents regarding the Pier car park and he believed that all issues had been resolved. CCllr McFarlane commented that he had spoken to a resident in Nan Walker Wynd who had advised him that the land belonged to Tulloch Homes, who had stopped all the work. Cllrs Robertson and Purves confirmed that they did not know that information. CCllr McFarlane will arrange for the resident to contact Cllr Robertson.

A preliminary meeting is to be arranged to discuss how funding for the Heritage Trail could be used. The improvements to the Trail will be actioned later in the year.

Reports From CC Representatives

CCIIr Freeman advised that he had been unable to attend the recent Partnership AGM and would provide an update at a future meeting, once the minutes had been received.

CCIIr Colliar advised that there had been a meeting of KCCNL/KCC and the following awards, totaling £6887, had been made:

Kinross Otters Training: £ 300
Kinross PTA (for musical instruments): £ 440
Kinross Move Greener Organisation: £2000
Crook of Devon Hall (for external work): £1257
Kinross 1st Responders (for AEDs): £1240
Swansacre Play Group (for repairs to fire alarm): £1650

CCIIr Colliar also advised that two applications had been declined:

Ms M Simpson, Kinnesswood – application for funding to allow Green Thumb to maintain grass. This application had been declined as the land referred to was owned and maintained by PKC.

Ms M Hardacre — application made under 'good causes' to allow a deeper ditch to be created to divert a burn around her house. This application had been refused on the condition that it was not of benefit to members of the public.

CCIIr Colliar also advised that there was a meeting of the website and partnership arranged for 6 May at 11 am, which required a member of KCC to attend. It was agreed that CCIIrs Colliar, McFarlane and Phillips would attend.

CCIIr McFarlane advised that following a request from CCIIr Mckay about the electric charging points at the park and ride, he had contacted PKC for an update as it was apparent that 2 points were not working. This had not been received as yet.

CCIIr McFarlane also advised that the first Farmer's Market had been held the previous weekend and there had been good attendance. The next Market is scheduled for 22 May.

CCIIr Mckay advised that she had been approached by a resident in Blairfordell about the purchase of land near to her property. CCIIr Mckay was advised that this was an issue for Cleish and Blairadam CC, and she confirmed that she would advise the resident accordingly. CIIr Purves commented that there had been a number of enforcement issues for the area in respect of a traveler site. CIIrs Purves, Robertson and Barnacle had all made representations against the application but PKC had refused to alter their decision.

CCIIr Mckay went on to comment that she felt the CC were not being advised of things happening in the area until very late. CIIr Purves agreed to follow this up and commented that while PKC had issued an engagement strategy, he agreed with CCIIr Mckay that the CC should be aware of things happening in the area.

AOCB

Gallowhill Road Crossing

CCIIr McFarlane noted his thanks to CIIrs Purves and Robertson in respect of the crossing.

Farmers' Market

CCIIr McFarlane advised that he had been approached by a resident with a question about recycling in the area and he had put the resident in touch with the appropriate PKC Department. CIIr Mckay advised that previously there had been a lady who attended the market to educate people on portion control, recycling and health eating. CCIIr McFarlane agreed to follow this up with KLEO.

Cllr Purves advised that he had raised the issue of a detailed analysis of recycling figures on a number of occasions and would ask again for this breakdown.

Kirkgate Park

CCllr McFarlane enquired as to what was happening in the area as it was blocked off. CCllr Mckay confirmed that filming was underway for a TV programme and she had been advised by

a member of the public that PKC had received a substantial amount of money to use the land. She went on to ask why PKC were not putting any money into the area. Cllr Purves confirmed PKC had received a fee and that the money could be ring-fenced to be used in the town.

Davis Park

CCIIr Freeman asked if an update could be provided at a future meeting. CIIr Purves agreed to look into the matter and provide an update.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be held on Tuesday 22 June 2021 at 7.30pm.

Fossoway and District Community Council

News from the May Meeting

As it is still not possible to hold physical meetings of the CC we are continuing to publish this description of what was discussed in our virtual meeting, including any updates that we are aware of. Members of the public are encouraged to comment on and question the items below, by email to fossoway.cc@gmail.com or via the CC's Facebook page, which we will answer in our next meeting, be it virtual or physical, on Tuesday 1 June 2021.

Present at the meeting on 4 May were CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, A Cheape, T Duffy, C Farquhar, C Haigh, M Haigh, N Marchant and G Pye; Cllrs M Barnacle and C Purves, P Cargill (Perthshire Advertiser) and PC A Mitchinson.

Apologies: P&K Councillors W Robertson and R Watters.

Police Report

PC Ashley Mitchinson attended the meeting and gave this update: On 10 April a person was reported selling TVs out of a van in Alloa. If anyone sees this again, please pass on any more details to the Police. There have also been several reports of bogus tradesmen – be aware! On 21 April sheep escaped onto the road in Glendevon. On 3 May 400 litres of fuel were stolen. There were 15 traffic related incidents in our area, some speeding, etc. and vandalism to a vehicle in Blairingone was reported.

CCIIr Duffy asked about the fire at Crook Moss – derelict caravans were set alight causing acrid smoke – were the police aware? Yes, but PC Mitchinson didn't know it was at the Travellers' Site, she will investigate, including contacting the Fire Service, and get back to us. CCIIr Bruce-Jones said that several fire engines were called and it took a long time to bring the fire under control, and it was close to the main road. CIIr Barnacle noted that we would like to know if the fire was accidental or deliberate.

Cllr Barnacle added that there is damage to an adjacent fence with rubbish on another landowner's ground. PC Mitchinson asked if there was anything else to be looked into – Cllr Barnacle replied that there was a meeting earlier in the year at which the Police were present, so information should be available. CCllr Farquhar reported that she is trying to improve relationships with the residents of the site – she has met with two of the residents who were happy to talk to her, and she complimented them on the development of their sites which are very well maintained, unfortunately some of the other areas are not!

Cllr Bruce-Jones noted that because unmarked white vans are being used by courier companies, people think that they might be suspicious, and sometimes they are, but not always! It is good for people to be aware. CClr M Haigh has seen reports that Amazon is asking the drivers to meet unrealistic schedules resulting in them speeding — is this a problem here? PC Mitchinson said it wasn't as far as she knew.

Return to Physical CC Meetings

There was some discussion about when this might be possible. CCllr Bruce-Jones suggested that August would be the most likely first date and we should initially use Crook of Devon Village Hall as it's bigger so will make social distancing easier. However

it's important that the Hall Committees are happy with their own risk assessments that will let us attend. Cllr Barnacle suggested that PKC will likely publish guidelines for CCs. CCllr Bruce-Jones will contact the Halls and provisionally book Crook of Devon in August and September and then move to a rotating location between Crook of Devon, Carnbo and Powmill.

Matters Arising

Bank of Scotland Kinross Branch Closure: CCllr Marchant visited the mobile bank this morning and met a number of customers as well as staff members. Customers missed having the convenience of a local bank and were sometimes frustrated at the length of time they had to wait. Their main banking purpose was paying bills and bank transfers with some withdrawal of cash. Staff members agreed with this and stated that some customers did have online banking but were worried about scams and did not like using it to transfer large amounts of money or pay bills.

CCIIr M Haigh asked if the Mobile Bank was secure. There is a professional security person present. CCIIr Bruce Jones asked if there was any progress on the Banking Hub idea – It's still early days for trials but CCIIr Marchant and CIIr Purvis are closely watching progress.

A977 Mitigation: Cllr Barnacle had written to PKC's Roads Department reminding them that the budget for the works has been available for a considerable time but not very much has been done yet – he's also concerned that there is insufficient budget to cover all the proposed schemes.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: Cllr Barnacle hopes that the next meeting will be on 27 May.

Community Development Trust: The next meeting will be on 5 May.

Fossoway and District Community Council Benefit Fund (a.k.a. Hydro Scheme Fund): CCIIr Duffy reminded everyone that the fund is open for applications.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: Nick Mainprize, the new TRACKS Project Officer has sent the invoice for the flood survey, which will be paid shortly.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: Discussed under Police report above. Cllr Barnacle stressed that there is a misconception that the residents have received their water and sewage connections without charge, but this is not true, they have in fact contributed to the cost.

Planning Officer Site Visits: Cllr Barnacle is going to write to David Rennie about various enforcement issues and stress that he doesn't understand why solo site visits are not allowed due to Covid restrictions.

Aldie Road Vegetation: Cllr Barnacle reported that the ditch clearance will be redone properly.

Fossoway Gathering: CCllr Duffy said that there is still a provisional plan for an event on 4 September – There is now a JustGiving page for donations at: https://www.justgiving.com/crowdfunding/fossowaygathering. Cllr Barnacle asked if there was a Covid mitigation plan? CCllr Duffy replied that one was in preparation by a recently retired expert.

Drummond Park Fire Hydrant: CCllr C Haigh had been unable to contact the Fire Service as yet.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle has forwarded the list of masons provided by Cllr Robertson to Profile Projects. Meanwhile Cllr Barnacle has recently discovered that Planning are now objecting to the movement – he is investigating.

Ivy Cottage Powmill: There is to be an online meeting on 5 May with the American owners – hopefully this will move things forward.

Community Council Business

Minutes Secretary: Another request for a volunteer has been posted on FB, but no response as yet. CCllr Duffy asked Cllrs Purves and Barnacle if there is any additional budget available to

pay a secretary — Cllr Purves says not. CCllr Bruce-Jones asked if the increased role of CCs in the Kinross Forum would mean that there would be budget for this sort of thing. Cllr Purves said that it depends on how the forum develops. CCllr Marchant asked if the Forum's Clerk could have secretarial support for CCs in their job description. Cllr Barnacle said that he thinks that there should generally be more money in the Council's budget for CCs. Cllrs Duffy and Pye will write to PKC asking for their suggestions on obtaining secretarial support. Cllr Purves noted that one of the problems is that the Council doesn't appreciate the value of CCs as the bedrock of local representation.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Cllr Barnacle: Has been advised that a minimum of 20 members are needed for the Development Trust. There appear to be some concerns about the Kinross Forum being developed too quickly.

Cllr Purves: Supports Cllr Barnacle's view about the Forum and added that it's important for it to be more than a talking shop and have some proper power to decide about things.

PKC have opened Enforcement Case 21/00074/UNAUSE to investigate. PKC later replied that a Building Warrant has recently been applied for, so work may be about to commence. The CC will continue to monitor the site.

Correspondence

Dave Stubbs, PKC Greenspace, had emailed the CC about the Blairingone play area to explain that as it is on private land it can't be updated by PKC other than to make it safe. Mr Stubbs asked for local knowledge of possible alternative locations. Cllr Barnacle said that as there is no plan for development in Blairingone this isn't going to be replaced. Blairingone School has not yet been marketed – PKC would give the CDT priority to lease or purchase – might that be a solution?

TRACKS: Nick Mainprize has taken over the role of the TRACKS Project Officer on 1 March from George Lawrie. George will remain involved with TRACKS as a member of the management committee.

Development Plan Consultation

SSEN Transmission East Coast 275kV Overhead Line Project

The site compound will be close to the U100 just outside Meigle in Perthshire. Phase 1 consists of overhead line works associated with the new Alyth substation, the construction of which commences in June.

Milnathort Flood Protection Scheme

Previous study work identified a surface water flood risk in Milnathort, and the need for a scheme was therefore included in the published Forth Estuary Local Flood Risk Management Plan. The consulting engineers, Sweco, have highlighted that a scheme is still required to manage the residual risk of surface water flooding. The proposals are still being developed and we now intend to carry out some ground investigation work to inform this exercise. The Council has appointed a contractor, ERS, to carry out some ground investigations. These works are due to commence on 10 May 2021 and take approximately ten days to complete. A further set of investigation works is also planned which will affect the road network in the town. These investigations will be around Ba'a Hill and Back Loan, and will require temporary road closures and diversions. We will update you in due course regarding the proposed details for these works.

Councillors' Reports

Budget meeting: All Cllrs expressed their positivity at the recently agreed budget.

There will be £160k for maintenance and improvement of the heritage trail at Loch Leven.

The road repair budget has been increase from £10m to £14m. Plans are going ahead to create a devolved local committee for Kinross-shire where the four local ward councillors will have responsibility for decision making (not on planning or licensing).

£1m was secured for economic development (skill support and business grants).

Money was also secured to expand subject choice in secondary schools.

Cllr Watters raised a concern at the lack of money for Action Partnerships which has effectively distributed funds to local charities during the pandemic. Despite support for Action Partnerships this was not allocated any money.

Other Matters

The Community Council were very saddened to hear of the death of Karol Swanson. Karol was a great supporter of the MOCC – our condolences to her family.

A member of the public wanted to raise the continuing issue of speeding on Burleigh Road, particularly at Burleigh Steadings. The CC agreed that the best deterrent is for the police to carry out speed checks. Cllr Robertson will make this request to Police Scotland.

The CC have declined the offer of hosting A Gig On A Truck in the village, until after the Covid-19 restrictions have been lifted. It was noted that there is a lot of broken glass on South Street, mainly around the bus stops.

Kevin Heneghan gave an update on the Core Paths maintenance initiative, discussing the Core Path routes. Scheduling of maintenance of the Core Paths by the community will follow shortly.

Matters Arising

Road Safety Action in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell

There was a discussion about the installation of speed cushions in Kinnesswood, particularly those placed in the centre of the village which are causing an increase in noise and vibration to the residents in houses immediately adjacent, especially during the night. The CC had received emails from a few residents on this issue. WCllr W Robertson had contacted Daryl McKeown at

PKC and they had agreed to take out the speed cushions in the centre of the village. There had been a suggestion by members of the CC to relocate them to the entrance on the South side of Scotlandwell around the existing traffic calming.

CPurves noted the consultation that had taken place prior to the speed cushion installation, the Secretary confirmed that PKC had consulted 66 addresses in Kinnesswood, out of which 14 had responded and 10 of those had been in favour.

A representation of 5 residents from Easter Balgedie attended the meeting with concerns about speeding through the hamlet. The CC had also received an email from a sixth resident with the same concerns.

Residents pointed to the dangers of the blind summit on the east side, blind corner on the west side, and traffic that had been regularly witnessed going through the VAS in excess of 40mph at all times of day but particularly during the pre-0900hrs and past-1600hrs commuter times.

It was felt that traffic speeds had increased in E Balgedie after the installation of the 20mph limit in Kinnesswood plus speed cushions, with drivers taking the opportunity to speed up once released from those restrictions. While it was noted that the police had been on location doing speed checks, this had occurred outside commuter times, and pre-9.00 police vigilance would be more useful.

Farmers in E Balgedie were largely in agreement with speed reduction measures as they were often crossing the road with tractors and large machinery. A larger number of school children now lived in E Balgedie and they needed to be able to safely cross the road to take the school buses and walk to Kinnesswood.

The CC agreed with all the noted concerns. Cllr WRobertson offered to approach the police to request further speed reduction measures. Cllr C Purves noted that PKC had agreed to lower the speed limit to 30mph but this was just working its way through priorities. He also offered the suggestion that speed cushions may be a possibility in addition to reduced speed limit. The CC highlighted the history of their involvement in road traffic discussions for well over 20yrs. PKC had promised a route action plan for the A911 in November 2020 following a location visit to meet with the CC and discuss key danger points along the A911 and in all the villages. This had been promising but had not yet been drafted.

Residents also made a strong argument for a complete off-road path between E Balgedie and Kinnesswood, especially because of the number of children going to the primary school. The CC asked if Active Travel funding could be directed to such a project. Cllr C Purves explained the A911 Route Action plan had not progressed because of operational difficulties due to the pandemic. The plan would progress and be prioritised based on high traffic volume flow or high collision activity. C Purves to ask for the priority status of this.

Additionally. Cllr C Purves supplied an update regarding a request from a resident to extend 20mph at the East end of Kinnesswood (towards Scotlandwell). The 30mph limit was shortened some years ago and recently the speed limit in Kinnesswood has been further reduced to 20mph.

In response it appeared that PKC would probably not agree that extending the 20mph limit would be appropriate as it was felt the 20mph and traffic calming were already visible on approach to the village. The CC pointed out that this section of roadside footpath was well used by residents and visitors accessing the LLHT at Grahamstone farm track and that extending the speed restrictions may be appropriate as crossing the A911 at the Grahamstone entrance was problematic with traffic approaching over the blind summit next to the golf course

It was noted that one disadvantage of the speed cushions was that they encouraged traffic to pass closer to the pavement. In the absence of the cushions, when traffic was proceeding in only one direction, it tended to move across the road, often straddling the centre line, to avoid going close to people walking on the narrow pavements.

The issue of pavement build outs was also raised, combined with the establishment of one way priority. Such an arrangement might be worthwhile in the centre of E Balgedie and at other settlements in Portmoak. This would force traffic to slow down and provide for wider pavements and a safe crossing point. Examples of such arrangements were evident in Fife and elsewhere.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie

The problems with the sewage works had been raised with Roseanna Cunningham MSP, but her successor was now expected to pick this up and move the item forward. Regarding planned and unplanned water outages Scottish Water had confirmed to the CC they did not legally have to supply water for firefighting but would supply tankers for drinking water. The CC will follow up with PKC Emergency Planning to find out if they have any input on the issue of water supply to fire hydrants. Cllr C Purves asked Cllr A Davidson to forward the information on to him.

Construction of hill track, Bishop Hill, Kinnesswood

Some action to mark out a path on the hill had been taken but appeared to lead into a wet and boggy area.

Parking around Portmoak Primary

Cllr D Morris expected to meet with the Head teacher in the next 2 weeks.

Litter on LLHT:

Cllr W Robertson had approached the owners of Loch Levens Larder (LLL), who had been responsive. LLL say they are aware of the problem and do regular litter picks. Members of the CC said the path was quite clear at present. Local residents regularly litter pick in the area to try and keep it tidy which is greatly appreciated. The CC thanked Cllr W Robertson for making the approach and LLL for their awareness and response.

Sheep attacks, use of local paths and control of dogs

The CC noted that signs had been put up at the bottom of the Core Path PTMK115 just before Glenlomond on approach from W Balgedie. Cllr W Robertson had requested the police to add a note to their monthly bulletin newsletter, though it wasn't clear if this had been done in time for the most recent edition. The CC had posted a request on local Community Facebook pages in Portmoak, and also in Leslie and Glenrothes, to try and raise awareness.

New Matters Arising

PKC Consultation on The Ancillary & Annex Accommodation (draft) non-statutory guidance consultation. To run for 6 weeks from 30 April to 11 June 2021. The Secretary had received notice of this public consultation, and members of the public are invited to comment online, more information here:

Planning

New Applications

21/00534/FLL: Erection of a dwelling house (revised design - change of house type - plot 2) at land 20 metres east of Leven House, Scotlandwell. No comment

21/00580/FLL: Erection of a dwelling house at land 20 metres north of Bonaly Cottage, Main Street, Kinnesswood.

Correction – consultation closing date had been confirmed with PKC as 14/05/21. CC had previously agreed to object to this proposed development on the former Lomond Inn site. Cllr D Morris had subsequently circulated a draft objection. The

application is considered to be not much different to the one previously submitted and then withdrawn. The draft objection was approved, subject to any further comment received by the end of 12 May.

It was noted that additional information had been provided in the CC's representation which outlined the various planning consultations on the Lomond Inn site since the Inn became non-operational in 2012, subsequently derelict and finally demolished.

This information summarised efforts made to secure the public interest in the site, including the provision of public parking space, bus pull-off area, greenspace requirements and amenity protection, including the outstanding views over Loch Leven and the surrounding hills from this key part of the Kinnesswood Conservation Area. Past planning decisions had not taken adequate account of these local community requirements.

Cllr D Morris indicated that the establishment of the Kinnesswood Development Trust provided a potential way forward and their website outlined possible future options involving community buy-out or other public sector involvement. Progess had been considerably hampered by uncertainty in the ownership of the land and what appeared to be a longstanding failure to register land ownership change at the Lomond Inn site on the Scottish Land Register.

The CC agreed that, in the immediate future, the immediate priority was for PKC to reject the latest planning application and that would then open the door for negotiation with the owner or agent on the future of the site as a whole.

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: It was noted that the next meeting was on 18 May but no papers had so far been circulated.

Paths Group: The CC noted that the paths information board was due to be installed in Kinnesswood in the near future.

Treasurer CC Accounts:

Main Account: £1477.60 Michael Bruce Way: £ 662.80

The Treasurer noted that there were now no banks providing counter services in Kinross. The Treasurer had investigated and suggested to move the CC bank account to use the Credit Union in Kinross. The service was online, and there was a face-to-face presence. The Credit Union had confirmed they operate business accounts and can handle the CC accounts. The CC were in agreement with this action.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr C Purves: had had further meetings with PKC officers, hoping to progress budgets before June 2021

Cllr W Robertson: had received a request from residents in the south part of Portmoak who would like to see a one way priority system introduced at the Gullet Bridge. The CC agreed this was a good idea as the bridge is a tricky section if cars or large vehicles arrive at it at the same time, and is especially difficult in the dark. The bridge parapets have been damaged badly in the past by large vehicles.

The next meeting of Portmoak Community Council will be at 7.30pm on Tuesday, 8 June 2021.

After our appeal last month for drone footage of the village Andy Masson kindly came forward to offer his services and will be taking aerial footage during May and June. We now




need help with putting together our five minute presentation so, if anyone out there has the requisite skills, we'd be glad of your help.

Recipe





Strawberry Muffins

Ingredients

120g plain flour, spooned into measuring cup and levelled-off with knife, plus 2 tsps more for tossing with strawberries

2 teaspoons baking powder

3/4 teaspoon salt

60g unsalted butter, softened

120g caster sugar

2 large eggs

1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon almond extract

60ml milk

250g diced strawberries

2 tablespoons sugar for topping

Method

Preheat the oven to 190°C. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with paper liners. In a medium bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder and salt.

In an electric mixer, beat the butter and sugar for about 2 minutes. Add the eggs one at a time, scraping down the sides of the bowl and beating well after each addition. Beat in the vanilla extract and almond extract. With the mixer on low, add the flour mixture in 3 separate additions, alternating with the milk and ending with the flour.

Toss the strawberries with 2 teaspoons of flour (this will keep them from sinking to the bottom). Set 60g of the berries aside. Add the remaining berries to the batter and fold with a spatula until evenly distributed. Do not overmix.

Scoop the batter into the prepared muffin tin. They will be very full. Scatter the reserved berries evenly over the muffins, then sprinkle the sugar over the centre of each muffin.

Bake for about 30 minutes, until lightly golden and a cake tester comes out clean. Let the muffins cool in the pan for about 25 minutes.



deducted, all members are volunteers. From the onset it was decided to tackle one remote area at a time, these being the places that seemed to be neglected when international aid was shared out. Currently the charity is working in five chiefdoms within the Southern Province, developing and improving water, sanitation, health and education facilities. There are over 100 villages, 12 schools and 3 clinics with 4 health centres in the area. The charity has expanded all the schools and, in some cases, built new ones. A sponsor an orphan programme has been introduced. Reaching out to these remote areas has enabled hundreds of vulnerable children to receive a sound education. All the health centres receive support and a new centre has been added. A great deal of improvement can be seen with the addition of these new schools/clinics and access to safe water. One main aim is to help the fight against malaria. Once a community have these essentials in place it is vital to introduce incomegenerating activities in order to create sustainability.


Mental Health Outreach





Here's a hot tip for insomniacs; if you're awake before the dawn chorus, get up and make the

most of it. You'll either crawl back to bed an hour or so later and enjoy the best sleep of your life or be so exhilarated that adrenaline carries you through the day. Our second hot tip is to take a flask of tea and something seriously calorific, like pain au chocolat.

This doesn't pretend to be medical advice but it worked for a trio of us from the Portmoak Community Woodland Group, who marked International Dawn Chorus Day at the beginning of May by listening to the birds wake up in Portmoak Moss.

We couldn't run it as a public event this year because of Covid restrictions but, after the initial shock of getting out of bed not very long after getting in, it was good to tune into the extraordinary range and number of birds who inhabit the Moss and listen to them on a still and otherwise silent morning, without interruption from planes, cars, tractors and so on.

The Moss gave us the full range of voices; the high piping of goldcrest and treecreeper, the beautiful melodies of song thrush, blackbird, willow warbler and blackcap and the soft, low crooning of wood pigeon. All this punctuated by pheasants squawking in the surrounding fields. They had clearly failed the singing auditions but were not allowing that to put them off.

It pays to keep moving in a cold dawn but, if you prefer to

start the day at a more civilised hour and find somewhere to sit down, one of the best places to enjoy the Moss birds is the new bench seat beside the main path across the top of the peat dome. It's proving to be very popular with photographers hoping to get good shots of green woodpeckers.

You may not be lucky enough to see woodpeckers, but this spot is also a good one for enjoying the carpet of cotton grass, which looks like a summer covering of snow across the centre of the bog, while roe deer like to nibble the younger shoots. There have been quite a lot of them grazing in full view.

Over a year since the start of pandemic and the Moss continues to be busier than it used to be and people are exploring some of the paths away from the main circuit. We're pleased to say that Woodland Trust Scotland are going to repair a bridge out towards the south east corner, which will make it easier to take a longer walk round the outside edge. Their contractors are busy on both sites. In Kilmagad Wood they are removing several sections of deer fencing which was erected to protect the new tree planting back in 2009/10 and which is now in a poor state. They have agreed to leave the lower section of fencing, alongside the A911, because of our safety concerns for children and dogs. So much work had to be suspended last year so it is good to see a resumption of activity. Our group is also looking at what we might be able to do in the summer and autumn and we'll keep you posted.



their awards. All with the weight of a backpack, tent and equipment to carry.

Despite the limitations imposed on us all over the last 12 months or so, many of our young people have already achieved certificates towards their awards by completing the three other sections required; volunteering, skills and physical. We applaud their perseverance and resilience.

Collectively, in 2019-2020, our young people completed 663 hours developing a skill, 663 hours of physical activity and 753 hours volunteering in our community. Their volunteering amounted to a social value of £3,275.55 (as measured by the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Organisation).



Reporter Refuses Latest Evidence On Lathro Problems

The Trust has again written to the Scottish Government's Planning and Environmental Appeals Division (DPEA) with new evidence to support our view that the DPEA should refuse Persimmon's appeal for 169 houses on phase 2 of Lathro Meadows

The Trust obtained documents under The Environmental Information (Scotland) Regulations (EIRS), which is similar to Freedom of Information legislation.

The documents showed that in October 2019 a PKC Environmental Health officer was so concerned about the sub-standard condition of the foul drainage system in phase 1 of Lathro Meadows that the officer wanted to prevent any further houses being occupied. This course of action did not appear to be followed, however, as more houses continued to be occupied in the following months.

In February 2020 the Environmental Health officer contacted Scottish Water to say that there had been a case of an E. coli 0157 infection in the Lathro area that was allegedly linked to sewage leaking from a manhole cover.

Piecing together evidence from local residents and the EIRS emails, it appears that foul waste 'overtopped' the manhole cover three times between January and February 2020. The manhole cover in question is at the south end of Dalwhamie Street where it meets Lathro Lane. This is the area which was a planted border, then a muddy area, and now has a tarmac path going through it. Hundreds of people may have walked through this area when it had sewage debris in it. E. coli 0157 infections can lead to serious, and sometimes fatal, medical conditions.

If any measures were taken to deal with the root cause of the sewage leaks, they were ineffective, as yet another sewage 'overtopping' incident occurred at the same manhole cover a year later, on 19 February 2021.

As recently as April 2021, Scottish Water said that the phase 1 infrastructure requires 'significant remedial work to bring it up to the relevant standard'.

We also saw documents not made publicly available that indicated the groundwater on site could be as high as just 0.55 metres below ground level. High groundwater is a flood risk that we believe has not received sufficient consideration when evaluating this site for development.

We brought these matters to the attention of the DPEA and pointed out again that, as the phase 2 drainage is to be joined to the phase 1 drainage, the failings of the phase 1 system constitute a material consideration in deciding whether consent should be given for phase 2. We expressed the view that the defective drainage is not only a risk to public health but possibly also to the integrity of Loch Leven, a Special Protection Area.

The DPEA's response was: "The period for submissions on this appeal has passed and the reporter is satisfied that the points raised in this latest correspondence do not raise any new information that will be material to his final decision."

The reporter said in January that he was minded to grant Persimmon's appeal, but the final decision has not been issued yet as the decision is dependent on a legal agreement being registered and this has not yet happened.

Raingardens Challenge

We have spent much of May finalising details which are to be presented in a Phase 2 Completion Report to SEPA, Scottish Government, and Perth and Kinross Council (our core funders) and other supporters and stakeholders including NatureScot, our excellent local councillors (of all political persuasions), the In-bloom groups, Rotarians, Tayside Biodiversity Partnership, and the committee who manage the Kinross Community Newsletter Fund.

We shall be happy to present the findings and issues, opportunities and achievements to any community groups who might be interested as we all begin to emerge from lockdowns and tentatively resume meetings, walks along trails and so on.

Our Aims Were:

Creation or enhancement of existing raingarden features around Kinross-shire (where a raingarden is any green infrastructure feature designed to accept rainfall runoff), and promotion of the opportunities for rainwater management using raingardens for retrofits, new developments and redevelopments. In particular, we wanted to try and see if a Raingardens Trail could be agreed linking a variety of raingarden features through Kinross and connecting with the Loch Leven Heritage Trail.

The Main Highlights And Achievements Of The Past Year Are:

A route through West and South Kinross, with links to the Heritage Trail at either Todd and Duncan or in the town

centre has been identified for a Raingardens Trail, with help from Perth and Kinross Council and from TRACKS.

The Raingardens Trail starts at the Park and Ride (where recommendations have been developed for three raingarden features to replace the ruined grass strips there) and continues along the grass wildflower swales: visit in June-July when the red campions are in bloom on one side and the oxeye daisies on the other (road edge) side.

We are recommending double yellow lines and a white rumble strip along the edges of the grass swales to deter incursions and damage by traffic.

We are also recommending a rest place, incorporating a bench and a wheelchair turning area, be established at the excellent constructed wetland at the junction of link road swales 3 and 4. That location gives a view of the wetland in the foreground and the town centre beyond to the church clock-tower.

We completed a survey of the raingardens of the county and there are about 30 features, ranging from the long narrow grass swales (1-4) along the West Kinross link road, several constructed wetlands and ponds in Kinross and Milnathort, to the small scale raised bed raingardens in Kinnesswood (e.g. at Portmoak Primary School).

Some features are in need of serious restoration (for example at the Park and Ride).

The positive response of local businesses to the raingardens challenge has been particularly welcome, given the severe constraints faced during the period of this initiative.

Notable work to protect and, in some instances, enhance existing raingarden features has been done at Kipper Hire (clearing blockages) and Dance Connect (adding woodland flowers to the willow swale, creating bees and beetles refuges and also removing litter along their boundary with the public footpath).

Work to create new raingardens is planned or underway this year. For example, at the Boathouse car park Kinross, at RSPB's car park at Vane Farm, and a novel plot-by-plot provision of rainwater management systems is promised for 15 new houses to be built by Premier Properties at Balado.

Half a dozen completely new features are under construction





or being planted at Loch Leven's Larder. Torrential sustained heavy downpours in late April and May demonstrated the effectiveness of the design for attenuating the rainfall runoff and minimising erosion of the car park. The plants there (as elsewhere) will take a couple of seasons to establish so patience is needed but in the interim we hope visitors will park carefully and not drive into the raingardens or fences. Progress at other premises and new developments will be detailed in subsequent issues.

Discussions with Perth and Kinross Council about targeting their cost-saving cut-back in grass cutting have taken place so that habitat creation opportunities can be maximised. For example, three raingardens recommended for the wet grass margins alongside the path at Kirkgate Park, and for the swales in Burnbank Meadows, Kinross. The link road swales are already managed on a minimum mow frequency. We are also recommending however that the council invests in cut and remove machinery which favours wildflowers.

We have convened an ecological action group to advise and undertake raingardens work to enhance wildlife interest in raingardens and advance nature conservation through provision of biodiverse features in the landscape. Their advice has helped several of the actions noted here, including purchase of native marsh plants assisted by Tayside Biodiversity Partnership.

Unfinished business includes provision of raingardens signs; plans for a raingardens month this summer; ecological surveys; more detailed research on public willingness to retrofit raingarden measures on their own property (dependent on Scottish water funding); training and a workshop on how to advocate raingardens when commenting on planning applications (e.g. instead of enormous soakaway structures which have the potential to introduce traffic pollutants directly to groundwater).

We would like to undertake some of the raingardens retrofit work we have identified ourselves, as cost-effective community led improvements, if funds can be sourced and PKC are in agreement.




The swimmers were stunned to get something so inspirational from such a big hero of the swimming world.





Keep Your Eyes Open!

HELLO ALL - A CHANGE this month, as this is Seasonal Nature Reserve Officer lan writing! Over the past two months I have been acquainting myself with the loch and its ecological delights in particular - what a lucky bunch you Kinross-ians are. I have moved across to here from sunny Greenock on the west coast so I am fair appreciating the new found wind speeds of this part of the country too. Regardless of the new-found weather. I have certainly arrived here at a perfect time for nature and, by this June. the whole reserve will be fit to bursting!

Bird-wise, the goose goslings and duck broods will be maturing and easier to spot – now not far off their time to leave the support of the parents and make it on their own. The fantastic four of swallows, swifts, sand martins and house martins are all on show at once for those up for a challenge. Check out our Facebook post from early May for some ID-ing hints and tips. You'll have a fair chance of spotting an osprey and a plethora of little passerines all chirping away. Our two bird hides and viewing screen are ideal for a tranquil observation of what is on offer. As a novice birder, since starting here I've seen at least eight bird species I've never (knowingly) seen before.

By June just about all our plants are finally flowering in a wonderful spectrum of colour. The reserve has many meadows, marsh, heath and woodlands to choose from and there is always the chance of spotting something a bit rare – we are always happy to receive enquiries into something you might have not seen before or (even better) something we haven't seen either.

Naturally this is the perfect time for spotting different species of bee,



hoverfly, butterfly, dragonflies and damselflies. Take a wander through Mary's Knowe and count all the pinkypurple orchids (plus whoever is inside!), peer into the ponds just before Burleigh and listen to the hum of the dragonfly wingbeats, stroll through the dappled woodlands of Levenmouth and search for as many butterfly species as you can or look up from Burleigh woods and see if you can chance a look at a red squirrel springing from branch to branch in the Scots pine. Every part of the reserve offers something different.

As well as being able to welcome our

dedicated volunteers back, we love it when visitors and come to appreciate the loch and everything it has to offer too,

but by this time of year the numbers can be substantial. Do make sure you heed any signage dotted around, as well as remembering to keep yourself informed about the Scottish Outdoor Access Code, which relates to everyone from water users to dog walkers!



WE HAVE HAD SOME lovely wildlife this month at RSPB Loch Leven. Bird of prey action has been great on the wetlands with sightings of peregrine, kestrel, sparrowhawk and buzzard. Osprey have also been seen in flight over the reserve heading north. Lots of young chicks are now emerging from their nests on the wetlands, with fluffy lapwing and goslings making an appearance. Meadow pipit have nested in the long grass and a very lovely call of a song thrush has been heard across the woodland of the leafy loop.

The reserve team have been busy surveying wildlife and all its new arrivals for the breeding season. A big thank you to our lovely lapwing volunteers Molly and Gillian who have been busy logging and recording lapwing nests on the wetland. A total of 29 nests have been counted so far!

As you may know the visitor centre and car park here at Loch Leven are currently closed for renovation. However, we are pleased to say that improvements are well underway and most of our car park is set to open ahead of schedule from **Saturday 5 June**. Work will soon start on renovating the new café, however in the meantime our wonderful volunteers Ken and Dave have been hard at work building a new outdoor coffee cabin by the underpass. We hope to have this

open shortly, so please stop by for our usual fantastic RSPB coffee, tea, ice-cream, cold drinks, and snacks.

We are very excited to welcome back our visitors! It has not been the same without you. We now have toilet facilities in the form of portaloos, and we will be opening a mini shop on site that will sell bird food, feeders, binoculars, cards and gifts. Access to the trails will be via the Secret Garden path on the south side of the building while our courtyard is out of bounds during the building work.

the With first phase of this project nearly complete, the aim of the second phase is to finalise renovations in the café and shop, and to finalise the creation of a new welcome area. Once these have been completed, work can begin on the new toilet wing in August.

We have also undertaken some improvements to the Secret Garden path that we hope will provide an area for children to explore and learn something about the animal characters that have made it their home. We even have our own little hobbit house where you can pretend to live alongside the animals! We also hope to start running some new self-led activity trails in June. Gardening

IT'S OFFICIALLY SUMMER! Isn't it? I don't know about you, but I expected better of May; cold and rainy, not good at all.

The frosts have now passed and it's now safe to plant out those tender annuals you've all been growing and keeping frost-free and hardening off for the past few weeks. Hanging baskets can now go out, pots can be planted and bedding plants can go out in the garden – yippee for some stunning colour for the next few months.

It'll take a few weeks for plants to become established and start to bloom, which is why it's always a good idea to use biennials to bridge that gap between spring and summer. Honesty is a great plant for this — I planted half a dozen in a border about four years ago — it self seeds like crazy which results in a lovely display in late spring/early summer every year.

Sweet Williams and foxgloves are also good 'bridging' plants as far as biennials go while you're waiting for your summer bedding to bloom. Higgledy Garden (I'm in no way associated with the company) always have a cracking bunch of biennial seeds, you should check it out — an independent seed company run by one man and his dog. On a narrowboat.

Summer bedding is great, but we shouldn't ignore the less 'blousy' shrubs too, many of which give a lovely display of flowers and leaves at all times of the year. For example, I have a pieris in a large pot (there's a shocker) in a sheltered and shady part of the garden – it was an experiment to see how well it did there. I've been amply rewarded this year by a beautiful display of lovely red leaves.

These early flowering shrubs will also need to be pruned after flowering – this means that they have enough time this year

to develop new growth before winter comes around again.

With the planting of new plants comes the chore of clearing out the spring bedding. I've got about half a dozen pots of tulips that'll have to be lifted very soon. I've found that tulip bulbs start to deteriorate after the first year and the displays are never as good – even if they're lifted, dried out, replanted etc. I've taken to lifting them and then replanting in one of my cut flower beds (who wants to pay supermarket prices for flowers, am I right?). I plant with the leaves still on and cover with some manure to give the bulbs a good feed. The result is that I have a free crop of tulips the following year that I can cut and bring into the house.

Now's the time to keep on top of the weeds, they adore this time of the year – especially chickweed, I'm plagued with the stuff. A gentle fork while summer bedding is growing is fine, as your plants grow and fill out, they should stifle any weed growth – or at least minimise it.

You'll also need to start staking up and tying-in any tall plants as they grow, especially delphiniums and hollyhocks — the last thing you want is for them to snap if (when) it gets windy. A couple of garden canes will suffice — I usually try to do a 'wigwam' of canes so that I'm not tying all the stems to the same cane — 'cos that just looks weird.

I'll finish this month on feeding. I usually chuck some slowrelease plant food into the compost when doing baskets or pots, which seems to work quite well. Liquid feed is also excellent – every couple of weeks is usually enough to encourage growth and flowers. Oh, and don't forget to dead head!

Well, have a lovely June folks and see you on the other side of the longest day – that's quite depressing isn't it?

Farming

IT HAS BEEN A relatively kind spring, if quite slow to get off the starting blocks. Conditions dried up nicely to allow fieldwork to progress steadily but there have been enough periodic showers of rains to encourage growth and wash fertiliser into the soil. It's just a pity there were so many night-time frosts which stunted grass growth and slowed germination of new sown seeds, since soil temperatures were slow to rise.

Things are warming up a bit now so there is a bit of grass growth here at Backward Farm and our barley is making slow but steady progress. The first of the cattle have been let out to their summer grazing so they seem quite happy. The rest are still inside, unsettled by the 'spring fever' brought on by longer daylight hours and a bit of sunshine, especially the B&B cows but hopefully they should mostly be out by the time you are reading this.

Lambing is all finished and with the usual ups and downs along the way was a fairly quick, smooth event. There was a bit of a rude awakening on the official start date of lambing however, as there was a very unwelcome covering of snow. Fortunately there was no wind and it was a beautiful sunny morning, so the three ewes who had lambed were all fine.

There was great relief all round when pet sheep 'Millie' successfully produced a lamb towards the end of lambing. It is an unwritten rule in farming that any 'pet' animals or favourites are invariably the ones who end up having a disaster, so we were awaiting her lambing with great trepidation. This was especially so as she was a first time mother (a gimmer) due to have a single lamb and we had some difficult births with large lambs in the ewes bearing single lambs. But no, she confounded

the doom merchant (me!) much to the delight of her adoptive mother (Kerry) and produced a healthy lamb all by herself. Phew!

The pigs are in the process of being moved to their summer paddocks, so there has been a lot of time spent setting up new fencing and dismantling old pens. The new style of fencing

seems to be working well so hopefully it will continue that way.

Donald the Tamworth boar has come back from his winter boot camp clearing up a couple of rough areas on our neighbour's farm and he is in good shape. He has lost a bit of weight and is now in just right condition. Most people would talk about archaeological digs, but we have archaeological pigs. Incorporated in their winter paddock, the fattening pigs had access to a rough area between two barley fields.

This area just grew weeds and grass but I was also aware of the remains of an old dyke in the undergrowth. The pigs loved rooting this area and they perfectly exposed the foundation of the dyke. I was thinking that we could hire them out to the TV programme 'Time Team', although they would probably be quite inconsistent, sporadic excavators. If the bold Donald went on this experiment, Tony Robinson could introduce 'Time Team – The Big Pig'!
