Elephants Not Hippos

THE LETTERS SECTION OF the last three editions of the Newsletter has, unsurprisingly, shown that Kinross-shire is an exact microcosm of the whole of Scotland. It seems we are either a Nationalist or a Unionist, a Yesser or a No Thanker, a Westminster fan or a Holyrood supporter! Everything that affects us has to be seen through the constitutional lens. This is as debilitating as it is depressing and it is only going to get worse.

Any political discourse is wrapped up in this divide, nothing can be discussed without reference to whose fault it is for things going wrong. The SNP are incompetent, the Tories are greedy, Westminster is full of self-serving cronies, Holyrood cannot do anything successfully, Sturgeon good/bad, Johnston good/bad (delete as appropriate) goes the narrative.

From discussion with friends and personal experience this issue has split families. Conversational topics are limited, or even completely ignored, humour is checked in case offence is taken. This is the sad reality of Scotland.

The referendum in 2014 confirmed to me that I was neither a Unionist or a Nationalist. I wanted a reformed UK, no one can deny that it needs altering. That is why I support Home Rule for Scotland. For those who do not know what this means it is a federal arrangement where there is mutual respect between the Edinburgh and London parliaments. Scotland would take control of all domestic powers, raising all its own money and taking full responsibility for the spending the resources, leaving Westminster with only those necessary for the maintenance of the Union, such as monetary policy, foreign policy and defence. This could be a precursor for a fully federal UK. Home Rule was supported by Robert Cunninghame Graham, who in 1934 became the first president of the Scottish National Party. Alex Salmond in 2014 even offered David Cameron the opportunity to put this structure as a third question on the referendum ballot paper. Cameron turning it down was not his only mistake during his premiership.

As a proud Scot it saddens me to see my country torn apart by the constitutional division. I have always found compromise is a great human positive, you might not get all that you want but the benefits of seeing worth in others ideas and working cohesively benefits everyone. Let's all become elephants, with big ears and small mouths instead of hippos, with big mouths and small ears. There is a third way.



FURY AT MESS LEFT BY DIRTY CAMPERS

THERE HAVE BEEN ONGOING issues with campers pitching up at Loch Leven, especially at Burleigh Sands, and leaving a trail of destruction behind them. While wild camping is perfectly legal, responsible wild campers pitch their tents in the wilderness, often completely unseen by others. They do not impose their presence on local beauty spots or leave litter. Camping right next to a car park or in the heart of a frequently visited beauty spot is not a fair definition of 'wild camping' which leaves no trace.

Local residents took to social media to express their outrage at the mess and litter left behind, with photos of overflowing bins and many concerned for the natural environment. There was even an old mattress dumped at Burleigh Sands. One person said they saw a campervan dumping waste into a car park drain. Another commented: 'People are slowly destroying it. We've not seen the otters or the kingfishers in ages and they were regulars here.'

Cllr Willie Robertson expressed his disapproval of the mess that wild camping and camper vanning is making of our beauty spots around Loch Leven and said 'I am aware that there are very limited powers to control these anti-social activities but we can't allow this unfettered access to continue.

'The Loch Lomond and the Trossachs



National Park Authority uses a camping permit system which appears to have had a beneficial impact.' See his column on p30 for his correspondence with the Council's Community Greenspace manager.

Neil Mitchell, NatureScot reserve manager at Loch Leven, said: "We areexperiencing a high volume of people camping in the area. NatureScot staff have been on site at the weekends engaging with visitors and reminding people to remove all litter and not to light fires or BBQs.

We want people to enjoy their visits but it's important that we all do our bit to keep our countryside as we would all wish to find it. Our message to visitors is to bag up all your litter and, if bins are full, take it home with you to dispose of.'

Recording The Pandemic

PERTH AND KINROSS COVID-19 COLLECTING PROJECT

THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC is one of the most significant historical events of recent times. For the last 18 months, the pandemic has impacted almost every aspect of our lives. It has been a time of enormous change for us all, full of new challenges, different ways of living, working and keeping in touch with friends and families – with many ups and downs along the way.

Good To Go For The Kinross Show!



KINROSS SHOW WILL GO ahead as planned on Saturday 14 August after the event licence was granted from Perth and Kinross Council. President of Kinross-shire Agricultural Society, Harold Greer, confirmed the show will take place as a predominately open-air event at RSPB Loch Leven near Kinross.

Harold commented, 'This year more than ever we look forward to welcoming exhibitors and visitors back to Kinross Show. We formed a Covid team a few months ago and the group has worked tirelessly to interpret the rules and keep up with the ever-changing regulations. The team recently achieved 'We're Good To Go' accreditation for the event and I'm delighted Kinross Show can go ahead and enable our local community and visitors from further afield to come together safely and enjoy a fantastic day out.'

Regular visitors will be pleased to learn the original format has been retained but the layout has been adapted to use as much outdoor space as possible. Judges are in place for the livestock and horse competitions; the vintage tractor display and dog show (please book through the website this year) will take place. The premium list is available online and entries are open until 2 August. Extra space has been allocated between the trade stands and the arts and crafts traders will operate in an out-

door zone alongside a farmers' market which will see artisan food producers and local farmers trade at the show for the first time. The Scottish Women's Institute has taken a break from running their competitions marquee this year; the committee look forward to their return in 2022.

Following on from last year's successful first ever Kinross Show Garden Competition it was decided to run this again as an alternative to the Flower Show which will also return in 2022. Claire Paton, Flower Show convenor, is encouraging every keen gardener to get involved and submit an entry. 'Whatever size or type of garden whether it be very large or very small, in the country or in the town please enter this year's competition. Just drop an email to the

secretary at kinrossshow@aol.com and we will then make arrangements to judge the garden.' says Claire.

The main ring will remain the focal point, look out for dairy cattle judging in the morning and fun events in the afternoon. A one-way system will operate to guide visitors from the entrance gate in a safe flow round the show ground. There will be sanitiser points at key locations, additional staff have also been employed to clean public areas. The measures mean that spectators will be able to safely view the events in the main ring.

After such a prolonged period of not seeing neighbours and friends the organisers anticipate many visitors will wish to socialise so have extended the picnic area up into the hillier part of the



showground. A quiet area will also be created for those that feel more vulnerable. 'Food and drink will be available so bring a picnic blanket, sit down and enjoy the spectacular view of Loch Leven,' comments Mr Greer. The Scottish Fiddle Orchestra will be playing on the entertainment stage and again in the main ring so it's likely the sounds of top quality Scottish music will add to the atmosphere. 'We are doing everything possible to make people feel safe and relaxed at Kinross Show,' he adds.

Tickets for the Kinross Show will be available to buy online from Monday 26 July at www.kinross-show.co.uk

Entrance to Kinross Show will be by ticket only. Please **do not** arrive at the Kinross Show without a ticket, as entry will be refused. Track and Trace information will be collected at point of sale, temperature checks will be carried out at entrance gates. Exhibitors and visitors are asked to familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions before purchasing tickets or entering competitions.

Fossoway Tennis Club had a very esteemed guest to open their new court – and to play some games with the kids!

STRAWBERRIES AND CREAM, big crowds and Murray on the court with racquet in hand; it can only mean one thing – Wimbledon? Well, yes, but this was also the scene in the Crook of Devon on a warm Sunday morning in July.

Judy Murray came to Fossoway Tennis Club to officially open the newly resurfaced and coloured court and to deliver coaching sessions to both the young and not so young! An initiative of the Judy Murray Foundation, Judy emphasised how important small community tennis courts are and the importance of making tennis fun and accessible for all. She described local tennis clubs as 'the lifeblood of Scottish tennis', praising them for being above all, welcoming.

The highlight of the day for many of the kids was seeing the water bombs explode as the adults batted them away only to be left drenched by the contents! There was a wonderful atmosphere on the day, with happy, smiling children to be seen everywhere, and although some of them got soaked, their adults also looked to have had a fantastic time.

Local mum Catherine Devanny said, 'We all enjoyed the session. It has given me so many fun ideas and games to play at home with Isla to help develop her tennis skills and reaction time. Isla loved all the different games! The relay races were her favourite, especially when the water balloons came out. I think smashing water balloons with the racquet will be a popular activity in our house this summer!'

Between sessions, Judy officially opened the new court surface by cutting the ceremonial ribbon, ably assisted by Sarah Cassels and Isla Campbell. Judy again spoke of the importance of the 'accessibility' to tennis and emphasised the part played by the community to ensure facilities are available for all to enjoy. After performing the opening ceremony, two of

the young members – Isla Bolton and Isla Devanny – presented Judy and Fiona with a bouquet of flowers and a memento of Crook of Devon. 

WHO DOESN'T LOVE AN adventure story? This is one which can carry you away to a far flung place, as well as being set in a period of history you may know little about and certainly could barely imagine living in. The hero of *The Tribute* is a young man living in Pictish Caledonia in 164CE, a period not often the subject of novels, probably because of the historical knowledge and imagination required to write about it well.

The debut novel of Kinross-shire's Gerry Marshall is an engaging story of a hero on a quest that encompasses work, war, love and overcoming difficult odds. The Tribute is set against the background of Caledonia (Scotland) at the time of the Roman occupation.

The Roman army of occupation of the last 40 years is in decline and retreat. Quarrelling local tribes compete for control and rebellion is in the air.

The weakened Romans are buying peace and time with bribes of silver – 'The Tribute'

- but even this is failing to retain control and pacify the country.


Against this background, the fortunes of two young people become entwined when their worlds collide: Aileen, a Pictish princess and Gaius, a young Roman officer.

For Gaius and Aileen, it is a battle to survive.



KINROSS KINDNESS STEMMED from a simple idea, a vision to want to help and do something for others at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic. The world had been suddenly turned upside down for all of us by a pandemic that changed all our lives. While some continued to work full-time, others found they had no job now to go to. Some began working from home and have still not returned to their offices. Many vulnerable people were left frightened and unable to leave their homes. Some people felt helpless and simply wanted to be of practical help to others, and that's when Kinross Kindness began to take shape.

Kinross Kindness sprang into action in the first few weeks of a very difficult time. Very quickly a system was established so that prescriptions and shopping could be delivered to those who were shielding or isolating and who needed help from members of their community. Those who lived alone

or who had no family nearby could now reach out for help to get their essentials delivered, from food shopping to prescriptions. Dedicated phone lines were set up to enable chat with people, which was really important to help prevent feelings of isolation. Leaflets were delivered through doors and word quickly spread that if you needed help, Kinross Kindness were there to deliver it.

This was all made possible with the collaboration, gritty determination and great energy and willingness from the entire local community.

Kerry Drummond was one of the volunteers who wanted to get involved. She told the Newsletter,

'I knew straight away that I wanted to be part of it. I was amazed how many other people also wanted to, and we quickly became what felt like a family. Volunteers from all

spectrums of experience, skills and backgrounds seemed to flood in.

'I went into this thinking I would be helping others that needed it. What I didn't appreciate is that I would also gain so much from the experience. The feeling of happiness and sense of humility you get back is immense and something that can't be bought. The people in the community who needed and used Kinross Kindness quickly became part of our family, chatting to us as our friends would. We talked about everything from what their favourite bread was, to checking in on them and hearing how they were getting on. I'm not sure our users ever knew that the volunteers got as much from them as they got from us. Getting something in return had never been part of the idea.

The whole experience for me has been fantastic. I've been truly in awe of the volunteers. I've learnt lots and, although only mostly met virtually, have made so many friends! To anyone that has ever considered volunteering I honestly cannot recommend it enough. I think for many of us, volunteering became the gift that gave back.'

Wendy McDonald told the *Newsletter*, "I thought I'd be helping with a few deliveries. Who would have known it would quickly become such a big part of my life?

We talked online, quickly had a website in place, a contact telephone number, a Facebook page and volunteers just kept rolling in. We organised spreadsheets, and we got the help out there where it was needed. As things got busier we need-

ed rotas and we expanded the admin team to keep up with it all. All of this was done very quickly and without meeting any of the other people involved. The knowledge, commitment, strengths and personalities of every one of the volunteers enabled the group to become the success it was.

I am fortunate to now know (even though we haven't physically met) so many wonderful people who were like-minded and just wanted to help others in this time of crisis. I still look forward to the day when we can all get together in real life and celebrate our achievements together. I am thankful to lots of people for all the support they have given but a special mention goes to Shona who was always available to help point us in the right direction when we got stuck.

I am humbled by all the thanks and praise from so many of the people who have used our services to all our volunteers. I am so proud of what we all achieved.'

And what do the community say?

'What would we have done without them all? I do not know! They were delivering our meds when there were big queues at the chemist, as we could not stand that long in the cold. The cheery chats we had many a day – thank you for all the help. You are the best.'

"You all did a great job! Thank you all!"

"Fabulous initiative – well done all involved."

PARTNERSHIP FOR THE FUTURE

LAUNCHED IN 1998, as part of Scottish Government's Rural Partnership Scheme, the Kinross-shire Partnership is a volunteer run, not-for-profit limited company. Its objectives are to identify, promote and encourage opportunities in Kinross-shire for:

- Economic and Tourism Development
- Community Recreational Facilities
- Environmental Improvement
- Promotion of other projects for the wellbeing of the County and to support and co-ordinate groups currently engaged in such activities.

The Partnership acts as a 'think tank', a catalyst, and a co-ordinator of disparate groups; an umbrella organisation, and a facilitator to achieve substantial change.

So how has this played out over the past 23 years? The Partnership has been actively involved in numerous projects, and continues to act on behalf of local residents, organisations and businesses. Many groups' beginnings were supported by the Partnership, including The Friends of Kirkgate, KLEO, The Kinross-shire Fund and Aerospace Kinross. The Partnership continues to work with TRACKS, Nature Scot, Historic Scotland, Visit Scotland, Perthshire Tourism Partnership and RSPB, to name but a few.

Launched in 2002, the website www. kinross.cc, a joint project with Kinross Community Council, was one of the first community websites in Scotland. It continues to serve the community with comprehensive information for residents, businesses and visitors. It is currently undergoing a major upgrade.

Examples of other Partnership achievements include securing funding, and organising, electrification of Market Park; providing support and funding to help the Cricket Club move to Loch Leven's Larder; funding signage diverting HGVs off the M90 at Junction 5 to reduce lorries in Kinross before the ring road. 2014 saw the first Networking Breakfast at Loch Leven's Larder. Covid forced these onto virtual platforms, where they continue for now.

Tourism has always been a focus of the Partnership's activity, starting with the early creation of Visitor Information Points. In 2009 the mobility scooters scheme was initiated, funded and facilitated through the Partnership, allowing people with mobility issues to access the Heritage Trail.

The Tourism Forum was established as a sub-group and www.visitlochleven.org was created. The Forum con-

tinues today, playing an important role in keeping Kinross-shire's interests prominent with organisations like Visit Scotland and Perthshire Tourism Partnership. Members of the Forum meet with these and similar bodies to ensure information flows from and to the Shire.

The Partnership is actively looking for

new members, in particular for someone to coordinate the work of the Tourism Forum. Car Share Scheme Launch

LOCAL CHARITABLE ORGANISATION Kinross-shire Move Greener (KMGO) has partnered with Enterprise Car Club to launch a car share scheme for Kinross-shire.

The scheme is the first of KMGO's projects which are aimed at providing practical alternatives and opportunities for people to make a small but positive impact on the environment; promoting health and wellbeing; and generating sustainable local economic activity.

Malcolm McFarlane of KMGO, said; 'KMGO is delighted to be able to bring a car share scheme to Kinross-shire, made possible through the hard work of a small group of volunteers and with the support of Kinross Community Council, Perth & Kinross Council and grants from CoMo UK and the Kinross Common Good Fund.

Our first car, which is based at Old Causeway Car Park (Millbridge Hall) is a mid-size family car. For now, it is a hybrid (petrol/electric), but there is a request in with P&K Council for electric charging points. As soon as those chargers are in place, we will switch to a full electric vehicle. We plan to expand the fleet to include vans, wheelchair accessible vehicles and a minibus – all fully electric. So, in time, we will have a fleet of vehicles for just about every need.

KMGO can now offer residents, local businesses and organisations an alternative to running their own vehicles. Research shows that one well-utilised car share vehicle can reduce the environmental impact by the equivalent of 11 other vehicles. Renting the car share vehicle, just for essential journeys, reduces the number of non-essential journeys and gets people walking and cycling more, which has a positive effect on health and well-being. And we will involve local businesses in cleaning and maintenance – which has a small but, again, positive impact on the local economy.'

Far East POWs Honoured By Local Writer

LAST YEAR SAW THE 75th anniversary of the cessation of fighting in the Far East (VJ Day) but, as with so very many special occasions, Covid-19 restrictions were in place and the event was scaled down. This year an even larger VJ75+1 was planned to take place on 15 August at the National Memorial Arboretum, Staffordshire. I had intended to lay a wreath on behalf of the many Scottish descendants and families of former Far East Prisoners of War – but again, due to Covid-19, I won't be there.


Lockdown has been so difficult for so very many people but surprisingly gave me the opportunity finally to publish my late father's wartime diaries.

Over the past few years, I've regularly given talks about the Girl Guide quilt of Changi, and have often been asked 'What did your father do during wartime in Singapore?'

Lockdown gave me the time to answer the question fully... and to write.

Just over a year ago I floated the idea of a book to a publisher – and was, to be honest, astonished when the proposal was accepted within 24 hours!

The book Doctor Behind the Wire was published in July this year. It is a tribute to my late parents, Jack and Elizabeth Ennis,



and to all those who were caught in the conflict in the Far East. On 15 August this year and as every year, many will pause just to remember the conflict and sacrifices made in the Far East.

My parents were fortunate (they survived) and returned with mementos of their time in captivity – Jack's diaries, smug-

gled letters (they were in different gaols), postcards home, an aluminium letter knife made from aircraft wreckage, home-made wooden sandals and much more. Items from this collection are currently on display in the Kinross (Marshall) Museum and can be viewed in the Campus Library.

Copies of *Doctor Behind the Wire* can be purchased at the Museum Study Room in the Kinross Community Campus (Thurs 10am-7pm and Sat 10am-1pm) at the (discounted) pre-publication price. All royalties from the sale of the book will go to charity.



Frozen Meals for Primary Schools TWO YEARS AGO AT a full Council meeting. Councillors reiected recommendations to provide our children with frozen meals from a centralised production unit (CPU) in Dundee. There



was an agreement to look at other options going forward.

Given this, it was a surprise to all opposition councillors to find the same proposal in the papers of the Council's most recent Full meeting in June. There was no notice of this before the release of the papers.

Unfortunately, the Conservatives and their Lib Dem partners managed to get the policy through the committee and all primary school children in the area will now be fed frozen meals. The arguments against this still stand from two years ago.

Given the Scottish Government's rollout of free school meals to all primary school pupils, the challenge of feeding our children is real. But the Tories and Lib Dem have chosen to contract out the challenge to Dundee, so that Dundee gets the higher-skilled jobs that have previously existed in PKC school kitchens. They could have chosen a solution that enhances and increase higher-skilled jobs within our local area.

I agree fully with one of my colleagues who stated: 'I believe the citizens of Perth and Kinross want local cooks producing nutritional, tasty meals for their kids using fresh and locally sourced ingredients. Our catering staff know their kids and need flexibility in the way that they deliver these meals to best suit the individual needs of pupils. We need to keep these skills in Perth and Kinross. Shipping weekly frozen meals from a production unit in Dundee will not satisfy any of these needs.'

Two direct manifesto pledges by the SNP that are now being introduced in Scotland will have a positive impact on our

communities and will open up opportunities within Kinross-shire. £13 million pounds is being invested throughout Scotland to ensure all families won't face music tuition fees or core curriculum Loch Leven PROFESSIONAL MUSIC TUITION We are back to face-to-face lessons! charges such as in home economics or craft and design.

Councils in Scotland will also benefit from an increase of more than £541 million on the previous five year allocation, an uplift of more than 20% to £3.2 billion for affordable homes. Perth and Kinross Council's share of this money will help deal with some of the housing issues that I deal with on a regular basis.

I was saddened to see and hear of the mess left by 'Dirty Campers' at Burleigh Sands recently. Responsible campers, whether wild campers or roadside campers, should be following the Scottish Outdoor Access Code which is available at www. outdooraccess-scotland.scot.

The key point is to Leave No Trace. If you can carry it to the site, you can carry it away.

We need to find a workable solution to this problem, so that a few dirty campers don't spoil the enjoyment of camping for the majority of campers and for others who also enjoy the area. Finding a solution will be complicated and challenging.

I for one would hate to see draconian rules implemented that prevent individuals enjoying the experience of camping. The Scottish Government and other key agencies are looking into the issues and possible solutions on a countrywide level. Meanwhile it is important that we provide bins and appropriate signs—while also demonstrating our own commitment to leaving no trace.

LIKE SO MANY OTHERS, I am relieved that, after sixteen months of incredible difficulties, we are finally looking at a return to normality. The UK Government's programme for reopening the economy has helped businesses to plan ahead, yet many in the business sector feel these assurances have been



far less clear in Scotland. We have however, made some progress in recent days. On 13 July, the First Minister announced that she would now follow the four nations approach to the relaxation of travel restrictions – something that was met with relief by many, including within the aviation and tourist sectors, both of which had been very worried by the likely impression that Scotland, unlike other nations, was going to continue to be 'closed for business'.

Listening To Business Concerns

In my role as Shadow Cabinet Secretary, I have spent the last couple of months listening to the concerns of businesses, most specifically what they see as the greatest challenges as we move forward from the pandemic. Not surprisingly, this is all about people's jobs, their real disposable income and investment opportunities, especially those affecting infrastructure. There has also been concern expressed about the prospect of an SNP-Green deal and how this could hamper economic growth. The very last thing Scotland needs now is additional tax burdens which the Greens want to impose and which would put Scotland at a competitive disadvantage.

Investment In 4G Coverage

There is however, better news on the horizon for Kinross-shire, including the news from the UK Government that £1 billion investment will be delivered to enhance 4G coverage across the whole of Scotland. The investment will see 91% of Scotland's landmass in range of 4G and, more importantly, 74% in reach of all four mobile providers (EE, O2, Vodafone and Three) to eradicate the so-called 'not spots' which mean local people are forced to sign up with the provider that covers their area exclusively. I am very aware of the frustrations caused by poor broadband and I expect this will be eagerly welcomed by businesses and local people who experience these lacklustre connection speeds daily. This investment once again shows the positive difference that can be made to people's lives with the benefits of investment from the Scottish Government and the UK Government.

Council Support For Businesses

Likewise, a very welcome scheme has been introduced by Perth and Kinross Council which aims to tackle the problem of empty housing by providing advice to landlords. The Council can advise owners on selling, renting, repair work, or converting the property to a different use. In addition, they can provide advice on grants and financial incentives for bringing the property back into use, whether this is residential or commercial. If this is something that would be of interest to yourself or someone you know, there is further information at www.pkc.gov.uk/vacantproperty on the Council's website. The Council also has a grant scheme available to help businesses improve shop frontage.

Good News On Road Safety

Lastly, I am very pleased with the progress being made in improving road safety around Kinross-shire. Councillor Callum Purves and I have been strongly pressing for the reduction of speed limits and have achieved numerous new 20mph stretches of road, in addition to this new limits have been installed in Easter Balgedie and Carnbo which have been reduced to 30mph. Road safety is of the highest importance, and I will continue to listen to local voices regarding speeding. While I can only commend efforts by local community officers for proactively

enforcing these rules, the reality is that since the centralisation of the police force by the Scottish Government, there has simply not been enough resources to do the number of speed checks that residents have been calling for. If you have any areas near you that you would like to raise concerns about then please do contact me

The Scottish Parliament is now in recess but please do not hesitate to get in touch if there are any local issues that you would like to see addressed.

Wild Camping Around Loch Leven

I have been contacted by many constituents concerned about the huge rise in wild camping around Loch Leven especially at Burleigh Sands and Findatie and the resulting mess that many of these



campers have left. I have raised the issues at Burleigh Sands with Nature Scotland (SNH) who manage the loch's environs. This is also a problem at other locations in Kinross-shire.

They told me that because of the access legislation there is not a lot they can do so I asked the Council's Countryside Ranger service for help. They are now visiting Burleigh Sands, Kirkgate and Findatie on a regular basis and speaking to 'wild' campers and camper van owners parking in these locations.

The Right to Roam legislation allows people to take responsible access to land. Neither the Council or the land manager can move people on unless they can prove that they are behaving irresponsibly. This is an almost impossible thing to monitor so by the time the damage has been done the culprits have most likely moved on leaving a mess behind that needs to be cleaned up. I, like all users of the Heritage Trail and Loch Leven get very upset to see our lovely countryside being trashed.

I think the problem lies with the Right to Roam legislation which is poorly drafted and has led to problems in beauty spots throughout Scotland. I contacted Nature Scotland and the Council to see if the camping permit system introduced within the Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park can be introduced here. Please see below the response I got back from the Council's Community Greenspace manager. As you will see he has given me an email address to report issues: visitormanagementgroup@pkc.gov.uk. So, if you want to report a problem please use this address.

In terms of Visitor Management we are looking at both the short term issues for this season and a more strategic medium and long term approach to facilities, infrastructure and staffing – all with an emphasis on welcoming responsible visitors, minimising the impacts on residents and maximising the opportunities for local businesses.

In terms of the specific issues you raise, we will review the bin provision and litter collection, encourage people to take litter home and get the new Visitor Rangers out to have a look. We have actioned this already. On the camping byelaws — I have been on the multi-agency group coordinated by Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park for over a year now and have a good knowledge of the situation there. They are also overwhelmed with numbers just now and whilst their approach has helped it isn't perfect. There are an enormous amount of resources required to bring it in and manage it thereafter.

All of this is being looked at at a national level with the Scottish Government and key agencies — VisitScotland, NatureScot, Police Scotland, the National Parks and others as it is now a Scotland wide issue. It would be best to see what comes out of that this year before we embark on any significant local solutions. In some ways it would be a lot clearer and consistent for everyone

in Scotland if the rules were the same everywhere and there was a more strategic approach to provision of infrastructure and facilities.

So we will feedback on the shorter term things we can do on the specific problems you have highlighted and also later in the year, on the medium to longer term issues. In the meantime, there is some information on the website which may be helpful if you wanted to direct people to that Perth & Kinross Council – Promoting responsible tourism in Perth and Kinross (pkc.gov. uk) and there is an email address included in it for people to report issues which is visitormanagementgroup@pkc.gov.uk

A911 Scotlandwell to Auchmuir Bridge Road: As reported last month Portmoak Community Council (PCC) and residents who live along this road are campaigning for the speed limit to be reduced from 60mph to 40mph. I and my fellow ward councillors and PCC have requested such a speed reduction for years without success. The need to reduce the speed limit on this section of road has become even more urgent following a fatal accident on it in the middle of July. All those seeking a new 40mph must redouble their efforts to make this happen.

Curate Wynd Car Park: I love it when someone comes up with a really good idea. On this occasion a resident of Curate Wynd has suggested that the car park there be expanded – there is an area of unused waste ground at the back of the car park – and along with extra spaces he suggested that an electric vehicle car charging points be installed. I thought this was an excellent idea and have written to the Council asking for it to be investigated.

Overgrown Embankment: The embankment between Mill Street and Coventry Place is very overgrown. I have contacted the Council and asked for it to be tidled up.

Overgrown Hedges: As always at this time of year can I ask everyone who has a hedge bordering a pavement to make sure that it is not blocking the way for pedestrians. Overgrown hedges makes life difficult for those who are partially sighted and pram and mobility scooter users.

REPLY FROM BRIAN Cargill, Traffic and Network Service Manager at PKC received on Thursday, 8 July.

Councillor Barnacle, firstly I must apologise for the delay in replying to you. It has been, and it still is a very busy time for our staff but we should have at least replied to your latest correspondence and this was an oversight on our part. I honestly do not recall a more challenging time during my career and our staff resources are absolutely stretched to the maximum. Our Traffic and Road Safety team are still fully employed trying to deliver the last of the 20mph speed limits and the School Exclusion Zones. Over 70 no. 20mph speed limits, 30 no. 40mph buffers and 10 School Exclusion Zones have and are being provided. I appreciate that you have heard this a number of times but because of our limited staff resources we really are still flat out dealing with these projects at this time. There is light at the end of the tunnel, these projects will soon be completed and we hope to make inroads into other priorities very soon.

A977 Gateway Signs

During the Covid pandemic we still managed to do some work on the A977 earlier this year and the gateway signs should now all be in place. This was a significant visual part of the project and we should now have a consistent signing approach along the route.

A977 School Road

Because of our limited staff resources we employed consultants to carry out the design work of the School Road junction on our behalf. Unfortunately due to Covid and the restrictions on essential travel the consultants were unable to carry out site investigation work as planned. This has resulted in a delay to the initial and final designs for the School Road project. We have been in regular discussions with the consultants and a further meeting is to be held tomorrow where we will get an update on their progress. It is hoped that the final design is very close and then a definite date can be programmed for delivery of this project. As advised previously a programme meeting was and still is to be held with Tayside Contracts to discuss and programme the School Road signals project. As soon as we have the final designs from the consultants we will discuss the project with Tayside Contracts and we will be able to advise you on the programme date.

A977/B9097 realignment

This project as always going to follow the above School Road project and because of the delays and our current work pressures and priorities this project will again have to be passed out to consultants. We will consider how best to address this and advise you in due course of likely timescales.

Available Budgets — In relation to the available budgets I can advise that when we have final designs for School Road we will be able to obtain more accurate costings. This will allow us to assess whether the current available funding for the remaining identified projects is adequate or not. It is our feeling just now that this wont be the case but until we have more accurate costings that is only speculation.

The Spaces for People project as well as the 20mph speed limit trial have taken up our staff resources for the last year. In addition staff redeployment has also decimated our teams and only last week we were once again requested to provide staff for redeployment to our colleagues in Social Care. From the outside worlds point of view the pandemic is nearly over but it certainly isn't from the Councils and our teams perspective. We will continue to try to deliver as best we can in the circumstances and hopefully we will have more positive news and dates for you in the coming weeks. As soon as we have more concrete information we will provide you with this at the earliest opportunity.

I trust that the above brings you up to date with the current position.

Update on Current Subsidised and Commercial Local Bus Services in Kinross-shire

KMGO





HE ARRIVED ELEVEN YEARS ago, all skin and bones. A six-month adolescent the vet said, with a head too big for his hungry body. He'd been living wild on some scrubland. Desperate to be rescued, he'd jumped into my friend Luis' van and refused to leave, sitting on the front seat until they got to mine. I agreed



to keep him while his microchip was checked but we found he had none. Within days I'd fallen for a ginger tom with a freckled nose and big green eyes. We called him Rojo.

Rojo melted hearts, wooing and winning even my most catresistant friends. It never seemed to cross his mind that people might not want his company. Each guest was greeted at the door, every delivery man escorted to the front-garden gate. He loved people and they responded in kind.

Rojo didn't have much time for climbing trees or days out on his own. He liked accompanied strolls and sitting with my partner and me under our big old tree. Always close, we'd become inseparable during lockdown. He'd call to see which room I was in if he'd been out for a comfort break. His was a rough love of ferocious kneading, human hair grooming and head bumps. If he felt attention-deprived, he'd tap my hand repeatedly until he got the strokes he wanted. Not one for social distancing, he'd learned from the cat sitter how to high five.

Last year, Rojo discovered zooming and, inevitably, photobombing. As soon as he heard voices, he'd be up on the desk mooning my fellow Parliamentarians. One appearance went viral. At the last count, it'd been viewed twelve million times, earning him appearances at the Taiwan Cat Film Festival and, any Youtuber's dream, the Jimmy Kimmel Show. He gets fan mail from Los Angeles to Lagos.

Two weeks ago, Rojo went for an evening stroll to our garden gate. I never worried when he was out. He was scared of cars, avoided roads, and never strayed far. Within moments, neighbours I didn't know were at our door. Rojo had been killed by a car, they said. A driver had handed them his body but hadn't stopped. Details were sketchy. Rojo was lying dead in their driveway when we went to their address, his head wrapped in a towel. A half hour after I'd given him his tea, we were leaving him, lifeless, at the vet.

There have been many tears since. The house is quiet without him. I long for his boisterous, demanding, constant presence when awake, and his trusting snoring beside me on the sofa when asleep. Some people will say he was just a cat. But he was my Rojo. I loved him, and I miss him.

Under current law, you must report to police any collision with certain types of animal, including dogs, horses, cattle, pigs, goats, and sheep. However, drivers are under no legal obligation to report accidents involving cats. John Nicolson MP is supporting a change in the law.

Dirty Camping

While most local residents and visitors have been enjoying the spell of good weather responsibly, it has also unfortunately attracted some people who have shown little regard for our local environment.



Several residents have raised concerns with me about wild camping and caravanning at Burleigh Sands. Some of the photos of littering, abandoned bin bags and even the fly tipping of larger items were appalling, and it is vital that action is taken to address this problem.

Earlier this year, the Council introduced a new visitor ranger service. They have been addressing the problems of wild camping mainly in Highland and Eastern Perthshire reasonably successfully.

Until now, they had not often been down to Kinross-shire, but given the recent spate of poor behaviour, I have asked them to attend Burleigh Sands and monitor areas around Loch Leven so that we can hopefully nip this problem in the bud.

Instrumental Music Service

At the last Holyrood elections in May, several parties – including my own – pledged to make the instrumental music service part of the core education, thereby eliminating music tuition fees.

The Scottish Government have recently confirmed that they plan to proceed with this policy, and new arrangements will be put in place for music tuition in Perth & Kinross before the start of the next academic year. The Council will contact parents about this change in due course.

This is often an area that causes concern when the Council sets its budget and officials in the past have suggested steep rise to fees so I am sure that this change will be broadly welcomed.

Mental Health Services

As many of you will know, NHS Tayside has come under fire for the provision of its mental health services and was subject to an independent inquiry by the former chief inspector of prisons, Dr. David Strang.

Dr Strang's original report was highly critical and made a series of recommendations. These were underpinned by the core principles of trust and respect: of service users, of carers and of staff.

Dr Strang recently published a progress report. While some improvements have been made, he said it was clear that NHS Tayside had not fully appreciated the cultural change that is required to deliver better mental health services.

Frustratingly, in 2019, the Integration Joint Board on which I sit was stripped of some of its responsibilities for these services by the Scottish Government who passed them to NHS Tayside (the very body responsible for the failings and who, at the time, was still in special measures).


Despite this, I will continue to do my best to hold those responsible for the delivery of these vital services to account.

A911 Road Safety

Concerns have been raised for many years about the appropriateness of the national speed limit on the stretch of the A911 between Scotlandwell and Auchmuirbridge that includes Bowhouse and Arnot. Other parts of this road between settlements are set at 40 mph as is the stretch on the Fife side of the boundary to Auchmuirbridge.

I have made several representations over the years for the limit to be lowered, but the Council has said that there are not enough vehicular accesses onto this road. I have written to the Convener of the Council's Environment & Infrastructure Committee to ask him to review the Council's policy that is blocking this change.

Perhaps this tragedy will focus minds, but these issues have been pointed out to the council for many years and action is long overdue.

Kinnesswood 20mph

In Kinnesswood, representations over road safety have been listened to and a temporary 20mph speed limit was introduced along with the introduction of vehicle-activated signs. This trial is about to come to an end.

While we are yet to see the figures that will show whether there has been any reduction to the overall speed of vehicles, the feedback from residents has generally been positive.

A decision now needs to be taken about whether the limit is made permanent, and I have suggested to the council officials that it should be.

Carnbo 30mph Limit

Another village where concerns about road safety have been raised for many years is Carnbo, which remains at 40mph despite a significant increase in the number of properties in the village.

Residents have requested that the limit be lowered to 30mph, but this has up until now been rejected. Following another request I made, Council officials have now confirmed that the limit will be lowered later in this financial year, which is welcome news.

Verge Cutting

Several residents have raised concerns with me about problems with verges being overgrown, particularly at junctions, which was affecting sight lines for people trying to turn. This was particularly bad following the growth spurt in June.

By the time you read this, all verges and junctions across Perth & Kinross should now have been cut back. Junctions will receive a second cut to improve sight lines from the middle of August onwards.

FOR A SECOND SUMMER in a row, we have seen major local events cancelled because of concerns around Covid and being able to ensure that the events went ahead safely and in accordance with all appropriate guidance.



I know that the decision to cancel these events will not have been taken

lightly by the groups of dedicated volunteers who organise them and it will be a real sign that we are really and truly heading back to the long-awaited post-covid way of living when events like these can be part of our lives as a community once more.

There are all sorts of landmark events in the lives of a community, just as there are for a family and for an individual. One of the saddest things about the past year and half has been the extent to which young people — and their families — have missed out on being able to celebrate some of those landmarks in the way they might have expected.

I sincerely hope that this coming year will see a return to being able to do that.

August means the start of a new school year and I wish all the very best to all our young people as they embark on another stage of the adventure that we call growing up. In particular to those who are at one of those landmark moments – starting off in primary school for the first time, or moving on to secondary. These are big transitions in any child's life and emotional times for parents.

Of course, it can be a financially difficult time for some and I was pleased that the Scottish Government has increased the School Clothing Grant so that those eligible will have received £120 per child attending primary and £150 per secondary pupil.

Research indicates that the additional support through the School Clothing Grant is worth over a quarter of a million pounds across Perth & Kinross alone, with payments being made to an estimated 1850 children.

Yet again, we see in action a tale of two governments. Whilst the Scottish government is building a social security system built on dignity, fairness and respect, Westminster are preparing to cut Universal Credit, threatening to plunge 20,000 children in Scotland into poverty. The contrast is stark.

The commitment to ensuring the best possible outcomes for all young people attending Scotland's schools continues in other ways too, and I welcome the delivery – in time for this new school year – of a couple of important policies which were in our election manifesto.

Thanks to more than £7 million of funding from the Scottish Government, fees for children learning a musical instrument at school will be removed and a further £6 million will go towards waiving charges for things like materials for home economics or theatre trips associated with drama qualifications.

If an activity is important to a course, then the ability to pay for it should not be a hurdle at which anyone falls. This package of support means the removal of another obstacle to equality of opportunity and the stigma that can come from being left out or left behind.

Vehicle Crime Awareness Campaign

Police Scotland has launched an awareness raising campaign to prevent vehicles being targeted by criminals.

During the past year, when the country was subject to a range of coronavirus restrictions, including lockdown, recorded crime fell.

As crime rates return to pre-COVID levels, officers are seeing a rise in the number of cars, vans and motorcycles being stolen, or having items stolen from within.

Attempted theft of vehicles has increased across Scotland and in a number of divisions, there has been an increase in the number of vehicles successfully stolen too.

Officers are now urging the public to take appropriate security measures in respect of their vehicles and valuables within, to try and prevent further victims of these crimes.

Detective Superintendent Joyce Greenhorn, Police Scotland's Acquisitive Crime Lead, said: 'With people now able to spend increased time away from their homes again, be it to go on holiday, or returning to other activities, the number of instances of vehicles being subject to criminal activity has risen.

'We are treating this upward trend with the utmost seriousness and want to provide communities with all the information they require to help stop their vehicles and property being targeted.

'Please always remember to keep your vehicle locked when unattended and remove all valuables, or store them safely out of sight. If you are going on holiday, ask someone you trust to keep an eye on your home, car, van or bike and get them to report any suspicious activity they observe to police immediately.

'We will be using our social media channels to provide crime prevention advice over the coming week, so look out for these updates.

THE COUNTY CINEMA REMEMBERED

AS A YOUNGSTER IN the 1950s there was no better place to be on a wet Saturday afternoon than the County Cinema in Station Road, Kinross. Many will remember this grand Art Deco building which was opened in September 1938, almost exactly a year before the outbreak of World War II at a time well before we all had access to a television set.

'Cinematographic exhibitions' had taken place in Kinross since the early years of the twentieth century when silent films emerged as a new form of entertainment. Pioneers of early cinematography in the burgh were Maudie and Duncan Payne who opened the first cinema in Kinross in a tent situated at the junction of Curate Wynd and Montgomery Street. They later moved to the Town Hall where the ever-popular 'Paynes Pictures' attracted larger audiences, with "silents" being accompanied by Duncan playing the fiddle and Andrew Renton on the piano.

The first purpose-built cinema in Kinross opened its doors on Monday 12 September 1938 with a screening of the film Heidi starring Shirley Temple in the title role. Based on the story of a five-year-old orphan girl by the Swiss author Johanna Spyvi (1827-1901), this novel was first published in 1881. The main feature was preceded by the British Movietone News and the official Opening Programme concluded with The Jones Family in Hot Water.

After a rendering of 'God Save The King', the County Cinema was officially opened by Mrs G A Ramage Dawson of





Balado House who was introduced by Bailie Scott, chairman of the Board of Directors of The County (Kinross) Ltd. Found in the archives of Kinross (Marshall) Museum, a 20-page souvenir brochure of this event tells us that the first manager of the cinema was Francis B Carter who had previously worked for The New Century Pictures Ltd in Leeds before managing the Victoria Hall in Halifax, the New Picture House in St Andrews and the Tudor Cinema in Giffnock. The projectionist during the war years was Ella Ford and in the 1950s that role was taken by Alex Ross from Kelty with James Sneddon as the new Manager.

The architects and general contractors responsible for the design and erection of the iconic County Cinema were the Glasgow firm Stellmatics Ltd, with luxurious tub chairs supplied by L B Lockwood & Co., theatre furnishers in Bradford. The prices of admission in those early days were 6d, 9d and 1/- (2.5p-5p) in the stalls and 9d in the balcony.

With the arrival of televisions in everyone's front room the County Cinema began to lose its appeal. Changing its name to 'The Rio' and the introduction of Bingo made little difference and in the 1980s the cinema was finally demolished to make way for new housing in Station Road. The presence of the 'silver screen' in Kinross had come to an end after nearly five decades, leaving only the memory of films of



yesteryear, Pathe News and ice cream on a wet summer afternoon.

A Fine Life On The Lavender Farm



AS THE WARM AUGUST weather rolls in, The Scottish Lavender Farm is hard at work getting ready to harvest this year's crop. With six years of hard labour getting the farm established, father and son duo Graham and Rory have excitedly opened the farm up for tours of not only the beautiful fields but also an insight into the process of distilling lavender into high-grade oils.

The tour also explores other projects at work on the farm, such as their efforts to rethink modern-day Scottish farming by allowing arable fields to grow into meadows as well as encouraging the brown hares and roe deer to take residence there rather than chasing them away.

Additionally, the farm is free from pesticides, herbicides, and other nasties; the only thing touching these plants is rainwater. For Graham, harvesting his crop is a labour-intensive project, as he takes ten days to cut the lavender by hand with a sickle in the morning, while the afternoons are spent distilling, guaranteeing customers the highest quality. Not only does the manual harvest help protect the plants from damage, but it also preserves the existence of the near half-million bees living on the farm.

As well as new environmental projects, Graham hopes that it won't be just lavender that grows on the farm in the near future. 'It's amazing. Twenty years ago you would never have been able to grow lavender in Scotland, but the climate has changed – and, as it does, so does what we farm.' The father and son are now trialling other plants such as rosemary, chamomile, cornflower and various mints.

Due to lockdown restrictions, the pair have also had to get creative in their attempts to distil new oils as they could not purchase copper steam distillers from abroad. Instead, imagination and trial and error has been put into fashioning a homemade machine which has so far been a success.





As much as The Scottish Lavender Farm is a working farm, it is also an education centre. Experimenting with new farming concepts in Scotland, with the hope of encouraging other farmers to take on not only more sustainable methods but also new crops that have previously been considered unsuited to Scotland's challenging weather. There was so much to learn and explore on the tour as well as the modest opportunity to pose amongst rows of lavender for candid photos. There couldn't be a better way to spend an afternoon than roaming The Scottish Lavender Farm.

Rumble In The Jungle

Lieut Col Andrew Middlemiss has seen service in many theatres of action during his distinguished Army career. Here he talks about one of the more forgotten conflicts in which he was involved.

BETWEEN 1963 AND 1966, British and Commonwealth forces fought against Indonesia in a conflict that focused on the future of Brunei and North Borneo. The fighting consisted of tough, small scale clashes in the jungles on border areas, ending in a victory for the Commonwealth and UK Forces.

Borneo (Kalimantan to the Indonesians) is the second biggest island in the world. Along its northern coast lay three British dependent territories – the colony of Sarawak, the Sultanate of Brunei and, at the north easterly tip, the colony of North Borneo (now Sabah). The border of these with Indonesian territory, jungle and mountains, is a thousand miles long. In 1961, Tungku Abdul Rahman, Prime Minister of Malaya, proposed the formation of a Federation of Malaysia to combine Malaya, the colony of Singapore and the three (British) Borneo territories. Initially, all concerned accepted the idea, but eventually both Brunei and Singapore would drop out - Brunei first, because the Sultan was unwilling to become a constitutional monarch like the others in Malaya; much later (in 1965) Singapore left, reluctantly, because its Chinese majority and outlook did not chime with Malaya. The new Federation of Malaysia was formally born on 31 August 1963.

However, President Soekarno of Indonesia was wary of continued British influence in the region. He wanted to extend Indonesian control on the island, by adding these territories to the rest of Kalimantan.

Brunei Revolt

On 8 December 1962, pro-Soekarno rebels, known as the North Kalimantan National Army, tried to capture the Sultan of Brunei, and seize his state. He called on the British for help.

In a phenomenal effort of brilliant, speedy planning and execution, within hours, two companies of Gurkhas had been airlifted in from Singapore. Over the next few days, other units joined them, including the Queen's Own Highlanders



and 42 Royal Marine Commando. After rescuing a number of hostages and securing Brunei's key strategic points – such as its radio stations, government buildings and oil refineries – the rebellion was easily suppressed with low casualties.

North Borneo (now Sabah)

In April 1963, hoping to intimidate the local population, Soekarno authorised cross-border incursions into North Borneo by so-called volunteers. Five battalions of British and Gurkha troops, under the command of Major-General Walter Walker, were committed to defend a frontier that extended for nearly 1,000 miles of jungle-covered mountain.

Jungle Warfare

Walker had experience fighting the Japanese in Burma and





the Communists in Malaya, and he was quick to put the lessons learned in those campaigns into effect. A keen advocate of the use of helicopters in modern military operations, he set out to dominate the jungle by patrolling, and placed great emphasis on the gathering of intelligence. Medical and agricultural projects were initiated to win the 'hearts and minds' of the local population. Locals were also recruited into an irregular force known as the Border Scouts. This was tough, close country to operate in, with extreme heat and almost 100% humidity. Patrolling visibility was a matter of yards, sores became infected, malaria was rife, and the enemy was cunning and ruthless. People say you love the jungle or you hate it. It's very claustrophobic if you let your mind think along those lines. Navigation is hard, and is all by contours or river beds on maps; there are no features like pylon lines or church spires. In some especially closed-in secondary jungle, I used to think I was doing well if I knew what grid square I was in! By and large, the soldiers adapted really well. A lot of them were just young boys, not long out of basic training and never east of Kinross in their lives.

Commonwealth Effort

By the time Walker handed over command to Major-General George Lea, his force had been increased to 13 battalions of infantry, the equivalent of a battalion of SAS, plus artillery and engineer support. Early in 1965 Troops were provided by Malaysia, Australia and New Zealand, as well as Britain. All eight battalions of Gurkhas were engaged in the confrontation, and once again showed their value as jungle fighters. Tours were of varying length; Gurkhas generally did 6 months, British battalions in the Far East did 4 months, while the UK-based units normally did 12 months.


Border Raids

In September 1963, Soekarno committed Indonesian regular troops to the conflict. Their tactics were to cross the frontier in bodies of up to 200 men, and establish bases in the jungle. Walker responded by setting up bases of his own near the border, which were supplied and reinforced by helicopter. He also received top level permission from Number 10 to mount secret cross-border raids into Kalimantan, to pre-empt Indonesian attacks -the famous 'Op Claret Raids'.

One Example

The best known 'Op Claret' operation occurred on 21 November 1965. A company from the 2/10 Gurkhas encountered a platoon sized force of Indonesians, in an entrenched position in Kalimantan, opposite Bau. The position was so situated that it allowed only one approach, which was along a ridge so narrow that only three men at a time could move up it in line-abreast formation.

Lance Corporal Rambahadur Limbu led a party of 16 men in an attack on the forward machine gun position, from where they were to provide support to the rest of the company, during their attack. They were about 10 yards away, when the Indonesian sentry opened fire, wounding one of the Gurkhas, and alerting the rest of the platoon. Seeing the danger that they were in, Rambahadur Limbu rushed the machine gun, and destroyed it with a grenade. Alerted, the rest of the Indonesian platoon began to fire on the forward pit, thus making it an untenable position, from which to provide support for the company attack. In order to report this fact to his platoon commander, Limbu exposed himself to enemy fire, before returning to pull two of his wounded comrades to safety. An hour-long fire-fight followed, which has since become known as the Battle of Bau, during which the Gurkha

company launched an assault on the Indonesian position. At least 24 Indonesians are believed killed in the attack, while the Gurkhas suffered three killed and two wounded.

L/Cpl Rambahadur Limbu received the Victoria Cross for his actions.

Op Claret operations continued and developed in scope; they were now undertaken by all UK and Gurkha battalions. The permitted depth of operations increased from the initial 5,000 yards to 10,000 and then to 20,000 yards, applied only to Special Forces. Regular infantry generally remained within range of artillery support. The Indonesians continued to remain publicly silent about these operations. By mid-year, the program of Claret operations had in effect established a 'cordon sanitaire' a few kilometres deep on the Kalimantan side of the border. The Indonesians then laid down thousands of anti-personnel mines against the Western Brigade.

The Battle Of Plaman Mapu.

President Soekarno wanted a 'spectacular'. Thus, a significant attack was made by the Indonesians against Plaman Mapu, the base of B Company, 2 PARA. It was identified as a target because it was barely 1 km from the border and lacked mutual support from any other Commonwealth base. The majority of B Company was out on patrols, and Plaman Mapu was only lightly held. It was composed of a company HQ element, an understrength platoon, and a mortar section, all commanded by the Company Sergeant Major — "Patch" Williams.

The attack started at 5am on 27 June 1965, made by three platoons of Indonesians. Read the amazing war diary account:

'Indonesian artillery fire continued to rain down on the camp, wounding several men and sending the defenders into disarray. Sergeant-Major Williams rushed to the headquarters to order the artillery officer to bombard the taken positions before attempting to organise a counterattack himself. Whilst under heavy Indonesian fire, Williams gathered a section of defenders, who had taken refuge in a slit trench, and led them towards the captured outer positions. A shell landed among the group, and wounded half of them, but Williams and the remainder engaged at least 30 Indonesian infantry, who had been firing into the base from the trench, in vicious hand-tohand combat, and managed to push them from it with minor casualties. Williams then looked to secure the perimeter, but seeing that the Indonesians were massing for a second attack, he sat down in a vacated machine gun nest, and sprayed the new wave of attackers, who attempted to seize the command bunker, with fire. This was not without cost, and Williams was

fortunate to have escaped with a single head wound, which nevertheless blinded him in one eye, though he did not notice this in the heat of battle. Williams then began to receive supporting rifle fire from other British troops in nearby trenches, as well bombardment from the single remaining mortar, and some 105mm artillery emplacements from a nearby camp.

After an hour and a half, the Indonesians launched a third and final attack up the slope towards the base, which the British responded to with artillery and grenade fire. This defence was remarkably effective, and eventually the barrage of Indonesian rocket fire halted and

the few remaining British soldiers rose from their hideouts and began to clear the perimeter. Soon afterwards, Gurkha soldiers and medical staff arrived at the base by helicopter, leaving the soldiers behind to secure the area, and airlifting the wounded to a nearby field hospital. By this point, however, Indonesian forces had withdrawn, effectively ending the battle.

Despite the sheer intensity of the fighting and the number of Indonesian troops, final British casualty numbers were low: 2 killed and 8 wounded. The British in turn inflicted at least 30 estimated casualties upon the Indonesians.

CSM Williams was awarded the DCM and went to on to become a Lt Col QM, an amazing soldier, with his distinctive eye patch. The Battle of Plaman Mapu is considered a turning point in the Confrontation. Never again was such a powerful and concentrated cross-border attack attempted by the Indonesian Army. Within months, Indonesia was convulsed by revolution, and peace was secured in the next 12 months as the conflict ground to a halt.

End Of Conflict

By late 1965, the Indonesians had lost control of the frontier. They were further undermined by internal strife. In October 1965, the Indonesian army crushed an attempted coup by the Indonesian Communist Party, the main supporters of Soekarno. The following March, the anti-Communist General Suharto overthrew Soekarno. He then withdrew Indonesian forces from the border areas and signed a treaty with Malaysia in August 1966. The confrontation was over. It had claimed the lives of 114 Commonwealth personnel, and wounded another 180. Nevertheless, it had been a striking success for Britain's new all-professional army.





is clearly not the answer, and that the situation is getting worse year by year, with apparent evidence from the UN Environmental Programme that indeed reports that Greenhouse Gas Emissions are still increasing, and that the world is headed for a excess of even 3°C breach of climate temperature. It is now close to six years since the Paris Climate Accord was signed by 189 nations, however no International progress has been made to reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions world-wide. Only if we work together and all move forward as a society to prior and achieve these goals will we succeed.

I believe it is best said that it would be Impossible to limit a rise in Global temperatures and avoid irrevocable crises throughout the world if the COP26 summit fails to impose and regulate climate, environmental, wildlife and humanitarian policies that are audacious, but balanced, under international law to protect the environment and all people.

Kinross Community Council

News from the June Meeting

Present at the meeting held on Tuesday 22 June 2021 were CCllrs W Freeman (Chair), D Colliar, M McFarlane, H Phillips and M Wood, Cllrs C Purves and W Robertson, David Alston and Mrs C Aird.

In the absence of CCIIr L Mckay, CCIIr W Freeman advised that he had been asked to Chair the meeting. **Apologies**: CCIIr L Mckay, CCIIr T Stewart and PCs A Mitchenson and M Gemmell.

Matters Arising

Davis Park

Cllr Purves advised that a greenspace team had been allocated to provide a sketch design in late autumn and a topographic report was still to be completed.

He also advised that the information in relation to waste management was still to be provided.

Kirkgate Park/Kinross House

Cllr Purves confirmed that, following a question at a previous meeting with regard to the funding received for the filming of 'Outlander' at Kirkgate Park, PKC had confirmed that the funds were deposited in a general fund for use in the Kinross area.

Seat at War Memorial

CCIIr Freeman confirmed that the seat required a bolt screw on one side and he would arrange for this to be fixed as soon as possible.

Kinross Town Centre

Provost's Lamp: CCllr Colliar confirmed that the lamp was now in place. It was agreed that a sign should be erected to advise visitors as to why the lamp was there. CCllr Colliar confirmed that the estimated cost of installation was £1350 + VAT, plus the cost of a sign. Funds were available for to pay for this work following the receipt of a grant.

The cost of installation meant that there were funds still available and it was agreed that CCIIr Colliar would speak to Scott Denyer at PKC in respect of levelling the lighting in the

Burns Begg Road/ Kirkgate Park Road: On behalf of CCIIr Mckay, CCIIr Freeman requested an update on the required repairs for the area as residents were now taking it upon themselves to fill potholes with gravel. There had also been a complaint received in respect of the traffic at the junction of Burns Begg Street and the High Street.

Cllr Purves advised that whilst he had chased again for an update, he had not heard anything from Mike Morgan. Both he and Cllr Robertson will chase for an update.

On a related point, CCIIr Freeman enquired as to when the public toilets would be reopened at the Church Centre. CCIIr Colliar advised that these toilets are only open when the day centre was open hence the reason for them being closed at the weekend.

Cllr Watters advised that the closure of public toilets was high on the list of things to consider when funding is being discussed. CCllr Colliar commented that it was now very difficult to find public toilets in towns in the area and gave an example of toilets in Perth City Centre. He advised that the toilets at The Inch were very difficult to access as the disabled parking spaces had now been turned into electric

parking points. Also, unless you have a disabled key, people cannot access these toilets. It was pointed out that this was particularly difficult for people who while not being registered disabled but had a temporary injury such as a broken leg, and had great difficulty using the public toilets. Cllr Watters agreed to contact his colleagues in Perth about this issue and would ask them to chase up these issues. CCllr Colliar advised that the disabled parking spaces at St Catherine's Retail Park now had a bollard at the end of them, causing access issues for anyone who reverses into the spaces and he felt that Councils needed to give thought as to the needs of the users when designing car parks.

CCIIr Mckay enquired as to when the signs for Kinross Learning Centre would be removed. Cllr Watters agreed to follow this up on receipt of the specific sign locations from CCIIr Mckay.

Pedestrian Crossings

Springfield Road Crossing: CCIIr Freeman advised that the traffic light on the left hand side near Sainsbury's had a fault with the amber light.

CCIIr M McFarlane advised that CIIr Robertson had been speaking to a resident in the Springfield Road with regard to the original request for a crossing at the junction with The Muirs

Proposed Gallowhill Road Crossing: David Alston thanked the CC for allowing him to attend the meeting to discuss his concerns in respect of the proposed crossing on Gallowhill Road. Mr Alston advised that he had been a resident for over 31 years and wanted to raise his concerns in respect of the crossing which was proposed for just outside the 30mph zone at Lathro Lane. He had a number of safety concerns about the placing of the crossing, not only the location but also the speed limit of the road and the fact that the residents of Phase 2 of the Persimmon development will have no say in the location of the crossing. Mr Alston agreed that there needs to be a crossing, but just not at that location.

Cllr Robertson agreed with Mr Alston and commented that funding for the crossing has been provided under a Section 75 agreement between PKC and Persimmon Homes, and that this funding will be lost if it is not spent within a particular timescale

Mr Alston advised that, from reading the Reporter's letter of 21 January 2021, it would appear that the draft conditions placed on the agreement mean that the crossing will be in place prior to the residents of Phase 2 moving in, although Cllr Robertson did not think it was legal to have a crossing in a 60mph area as it would be too dangerous.

Cllr Purves advised that he had discussed the issue with Mr Alston and confirmed that there was a time limit in respect of spending the funding and as such, he had asked PKC officers whether the funding could be used for something else. He has not had a response to his questions.

He went on to advise that Persimmon Homes are trying to revise their plans for Phase 2 by building more houses and he supported Mr Alston and Cllr Robertson's suggestion that the crossing be moved further up Gallowhill Road.

It was noted that there would need to be a path created near to the lane in order to ensure that the crossing was en-route for users.

Members were advised that the application was due to be

discussed at the PKC meeting in July and an update would be given at a future meeting.

Hayfield Garden Community Garden

Cllr Robertson advised that he had spoken to PKC who had advised that apparently the Community Garden had been taken on by the school and the person that Cllr Robertson needed to speak to was on annual leave until the end of June. Cllr Robertson will confirm the situation and report back to a future meeting.

CCIIr Colliar advised that this should not have happened as it was meant to be a garden for use by the community. It was agreed that the item would remain on the agenda.

Other Planning Matters

Drains at Persimmon Homes Development

Cllr Purves gave an update on the situation in respect of drainage at Lathro Meadows advising that ward councillors had received a letter from Persimmon Homes taking full responsibility but blaming the contractors for defective workmanship. Persimmon Homes have a phased plan of repairs in place but there remain concerns re groundwater.

Update will continue to be given at future meetings.

Reports From CC Representatives Website

CCIIr Colliar advised that he had received an email from Colin Low in respect of the new website and expressed his reservations in how this work was being taken forward. Whilst accepting that the website needed to be modernised, he asked if the CC wanted to be 50% shareholders and continuing with the Newsletter.

Cllr Phillips advised that the *Newsletter* felt that the My Kinross website could be detrimental to the advertising revenue of the Newsletter and remained unconvinced that a website, rather than social media, was the best way to move forward.

There was a long discussion about whether the CC should continue the work with the My Kinross website and there were three options suggested which were then put to a vote.

Option 1 – Stay involved and explore further = 1 vote

Option 2 – Walk away completely = 3 votes

Option 3 – Continue with the original proposal to upgrade the website = 2 votes

Option 2 was carried.

It was agreed that CCIIr McFarlane would attend the meeting

on 8 July to explain the CC's decision and he would email the CC with what he was going to say at the meeting.

Transport Hub

CCIIr Colliar advised that an email had been received inviting the CC to get involved and it was agreed that CCIIr Phillips would respond advising that the CC were keen to be involved in any discussions. It was felt that the reinstatement of a rail link would be of huge benefit not only to the local residents but to the whole of central Scotland.

Kirkgate Park

CCIIr Colliar stated that whilst it was wonderful to see the park being used, visitors were parking on grass verges and therefore causing damage. He suggested that the CC should contact PKC to advise them of this and to ask for improved parking in the area.

CCIIr McFarlane advised that CIIr Purves had arranged to meet with Growbiz which may bring opportunities for the area and these should be taken forward if appropriate.

Electric Vehicles

CCllr McFarlane advised that funds had been transferred to the bank account. The first vehicle is in place and is regularly being used. CCIIr McFarlane will provide statistics for a future meeting.

Grass Cutting

On behalf of CCIIr Mckay, CCIIr Freeman advised that there had been a number of complaints received in respect of the grass cutting at Wester Balgedie – it was felt that this restricted the views of motorists and Cllr Purves agreed to look into this.

School Cuts

CCIIr Freeman, on behalf of CCIIr McKay raised the issue of cuts to education and asked why children were suffering and there appeared to be teachers leaving the profession.

Cllr Purves advised that there had been no cuts to education

The proposal for frozen meals being provided by PKC two years ago had been rejected as it would have resulted in job losses and recently the Scottish Government had announced that free school meals would be provided to all primary school pupils. PKC officials have advised that the current infrastructure was not able to cope with this. There was a meeting scheduled for the following day to discuss this matter in more detail.

AOCB

Gazebo

CCIIr Mckay had questioned whether a gazebo and/or a banner could be purchased to be used at the Market to ensure continued engagement with the public. CCIIr McFarlane confirmed that there were funds available and CCIIr Wood would look into the purchase/printing of such a gazebo.

Wild Swimming

It had been noted that there had been a number of wild swimmers and water sports enthusiasts in the loch recently and it was felt that there should be notices erected at various points around the loch advising that these activities were dangerous. CCIIr Phillips advised that there was a box at the end of the Pier which should have a safety ring in it, but this was empty. CIIr Purves agreed to look into getting notices erected.

Funding

CCIIr Colliar confirmed that funding from PKC would be received in August/September and would be dependent on funds in the account at that time.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be on Tuesday 27 July 2021 at 7.30pm. It is hoped that the meeting will be held face to face but this will be confirmed nearer the time.

Milnathort And Orwell CC

Due to a technical error, the July minutes of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council are not available.

Portmoak Community Council News from the July Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 13 July were Cllr C Purves, CCllrs A Davidson (Treasurer & Acting Chair), S McGregor (Secretary), D Morris, S Forde, K Donaldson, and 9 members of the public.

Apologies: Cllr R Watters and W Robertson, CCllr G Smith Approval of previous Minutes held on 8 June 2021:

Cllr D Morris: requested a procedural item to circulate final draft minutes to CC Members as they are sent to Kinross newsletter. Also, request to circulate previous month's draft minutes with the agenda for the next month's meeting.

Cllr A Davidson: flagged a correction. Minutes from 08/06/21 stated there was not a fire hydrant in Glen Lomond, when in fact there are fire hydrants but the hydrant require the water supply to function.

Matters Arising

Road Safety Action in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell

Cllr Purves gave an update:

Easter Balgedie: Road safety team had responded to confirm that the 30mph limit will be introduced. Drawings being for this, which will be forwarded to roads committee for approval. Likely implementation later this financial year. Other speed

mitigation measures in Easter Balgedie could be introduced but should be considered carefully.

An E Balgedie Resident commented that they thought this would be well received and offered to assist with garnering support for further speed mitigation measures.

W Balgedie: Cllr C Purves will pick up on the issues previous highlighted so they are not forgotten about.

Scotlandwell: speed bumps being potentially moved from Kinnesswood will be highlighted.

Golf course / Grahamstone: PKC road team had refused 20mph limit.

Speed limit trial across PKC: **D McKeown at PKC had promised** to feedback trial results once it was completed.

Scotlandwell: 20mph sign reorientation: a repair order had been raised and this should be completed quite soon.

Scotlandwell-Auchmuirbridge (and Bowhouse): representation had been made from residents about the possibility of better signage and speed limit lowering to 40mph limits, as was present on other sections and in Fife. The Road Safety team did not think there was a significant amount of development along the Bowhouse stretch to argue for this. Cllr C Purves was not in agreement with the policy that had led to this decision and planned to proceed this with the Road Safety team and Directors to see if the policy can be changed. The precedent on the rest of the stretch has been set and there is no real reason not to reduce the speed along the Bowhouse stretch.

A911 Road Safety Plan: Still pushing to get the route action plan, to assess and plan the whole strip holistically.

The CC highlighted the need for cutting back of hedge along A911 from E Balgedie to Kinnesswood, and verges from Portmoak Hall to Scotlandwell. Vegetation growth is making pavements extremely narrow.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie: CCllr A Davidson gave an update: Specialist team were due to assess sewage system this week. Scottish Water had as yet not responded. The issue had been raised with local MSPS and local MP. Glenlomond sewage system needs to be adopted by Scottish Water. There had been an overnight water outage again in the last month but water had been restored by 0730hrs. The Fire Service is aware of the issue and had confirmed that if there was an incident they would ensure they brought a tender full of water in case of outage.

Construction of hill track, Bishop Hill, Kinnesswood: drainage, gorse clearing, electric fencing: CCllr D Morris confirmed no further developments on this item. Recent heavy rain and runoff is still a serious problem possibly exacerbated by areas of dead vegetation due to bracken spraying.

CCIIr S Forde highlighted ragwort growing on the path up to the Bishop Hill at Scotlandwell. CIIr C Purves suggested that he could raise the subject to PKC possibly to Environmental Health as the plant can be poisonous to animals and livestock. Farmers and residents should be aware of the potential hazard and act accordingly.

Friar Place, Scotlandwell: hedge height reducing visibility: Cllr S Forde outlined the ongoing issue. Cllr C Purves confirmed that council can compel resident to cut back hedgeor complete the work and bill resident back for work. Gary McConnell from PKC had been on site and did not report a problem.

20 mph traffic sign reorientation in Scotlandwell: Secretary had reported this to PKC. As confirmed by Cllr C Purves a repair order had been raised and this should be completed in due course.

New Matters

Portmoak Community Council By-Election: Thursday 12 August 2021 to elect 5 members

The by-election is scheduled for Thursday 12 August 2021 to elect 5 members. Persons wishing to represent their

community council must be 16 years of age, reside in the community council area and be named on the electoral register for the community council area in which they are standing. A candidate's proposer and seconder must also be named on the electoral register and reside in the same community council area.

To stand as a candidate a completed nomination form, together with a supporting 50 word statement, must be submitted to the Returning Officer at the address below or by email to *communitycouncils@pkc.gov.uk* by 4pm on Thursday 22 July 2021.

Potential for reclassification of the A911 and B9097 roads: This item had been suggested by Cllr W Robertson and a number of local residents. The impetus was to reduce the use of the A911 by large lorries. Previous iterations of PCC had campaigned to the Road Haulage Association to have satnav on trucks reclassified so A911 could be flagged as not suitable for large vehicles.

Grahamstone Road signage for no vehicle access to LLHT and speed limit: Cllr W Robertson and residents in the Grahamstone area had highlighted the issue of vehicles travelling at speed down Grahamstone Farm track at speed expecting to access the LLHT. Google maps recommend this as a route for vehicular access to Loch Leven. This however is a private road with no public vehicular access or parking and only limited turning space. Public access is only for non motorised users, as per the Scottish Outdoor Access Code.Cllr C Purves highlighted that being a private road, Grahamstone residents would be primarily responsible for signage.

Portmoak Cemetery maintenance: The Secretary had received complaints from residents of poor maintenance of the cemetery. An approach to PKC had received a positive and quick response from the Burials team who manage maintenance. While under pressure from delays resulting from COVID situation, the team usually aim to mow grass every 2 weeks and strim undergrowth every 4 weeks. The team at PKC had confirmed the strimming had been completed and had provided photos.

Police Reports

PCC were pleased to welcome the Police Liaison Team to the meeting. PC A Mitchinson gave an overview of the last month, there were fortunately not many incidents.

30/08/21: Lochend Farm shop was broken into on some forensic evidence was found but no suspects as yet.

10/07/21: 2 males seen to be harassing campers at Burleigh Sands. They were traced walking along road and given a warning. No crimes committed.

13/07/21: Two young people broke into Portmoak Primary. Additionally there had been approx. 11 road traffic incidents. Cllr K Donaldson highlighted car abandoned in Westfield area on

Wed 07/07/21 at about 2am, this had been reported to the Police Scotland.

A resident asked the police about the issue of overtaking along 20mph section on the A911 with the suggestion that some unmarked vehicles would be useful. The CC agreed there is a lot of high-speed overtaking in speed restricted areas. The police confirmed they are aware of the issue and try to include this info into their response. Only traffic police have access to the unmarked vehicles. Pop-up policemen may become available for trouble spots.

The CC highlighted speeding along the Causeway and also at Golf Course and Woodmarch. These problems were supposed to have been flagged up to D McKeown during the A911 survey in 2020. Woodmarch remains problematic, a promised build out or other solution has never been built. The CC flagged this up again to PKC. The Head Teacher at Portmoak Primary is also concerned about this Woodmarch pinch point with its dangerous narrow pavement, with special care having to be taken on school trips along to Portmoak Village Hall.

Planning

New Applications:

Comments by Fri 30 Jul 2021.

The CC had only received notification of the planning application on the 12/07/21, one day prior to the PCC public monthly meeting. There was representations from residents with concerns about more houses and no infrastructure. There appears to be no affordable houses in the plan. Opinion from public highlighted concerns that the development will not contribute positively to the amenity of Scotlandwell. No amenity planned for children. Concerns about flooding on this piece of land. 22 homes correlates to a likely large increase in cars while there are still existing road traffic issues and limited public transport.

Planning Decisions:

Progress with Developments

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Cllr K Donaldson reported that work at the site was limited, but test drills were proceeding.





Paths Group: The Paths Group had been busy over the past month. Humid, warm weather has left many paths very overgrown. The Dryside Road path from Easter Balgedie to Springfield Farm has been strimmed and cleared, there is also a new fence, which is very useful, as it separates livestock from the path at Springfield Farm. Peat Loan has recently been flailed by PKC Community Greenspace and had soon become overgrown but the Paths Group had been working to clear it again. Also clearing of some of the informal paths in Stephens Field. Volunteers or extra help at this busy time would be appreciated: contact Alison on 07943 881181 or Anne on 07547 457046 for more info.



Recipe

Supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom



Mint, Blueberry and Lemon Cake

Ingredients

115g soft butter
25g fresh mint, leaves picked
250g fresh blueberries
Finely grated zest and juice of 1 large lemon
250g plain flour
2 tsp baking powder
Pinch of salt
225g caster sugar
2 large eggs
150g coconut milk
100g granulated sugar

Method

Preheat oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas mark 4. Grease a loaf tin (11cm x 22cm approx) and line with baking paper.

Finely chop a quarter of the mint leaves (1 tsp approx). Put the blueberries in a bowl and stir in 1 tsp lemon juice and the chopped mint. Set aside. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt in a bowl.

Cream butter and caster sugar until pale and fluffy. Beat in lemon zest. Beat in eggs one at a time, adding 1 tsp of the flour with the second egg. Add coconut milk gradually, folding in large spoonfuls of flour until the mixture is smooth.

Spoon one third of the cake mix into the prepared loaf tin and scatter one third of the blueberries. Repeat twice more, ending with a layer of blueberries. Bake for 60-70 minutes till a skewer inserted into middle of cake comes away clean.

Put the rest of the mint leaves and 2 tbsp of the granulated sugar into a small bowl and pound with pestle until you have a bright green paste. Stir in the remaining lemon juice and leave to infuse.

When the cake comes out of the oven, leave it to cool for 5 minutes. Strain the minty lemon juice into a bowl, pressing out as much as you can then stir in remainder of sugar. Spoon it over the cake and leave to cool. Serve cut into thick slices.

(Highly recommended! Ed.)

The portfolio has been completed and sent off along with entries for a couple of extra awards. We keep our fingers crossed.

It has been a challenge to produce an online entry for the RHS 'Britain in Bloom' competition. After the words and pictures, we looked at making videos to tell our story. Thanks should go to Andy Masson who took drone footage of the village and Gordon Vance who put together video and photographs to make excellent footage. These represent the community effort and the school growing project. We have all been learning new skills. The entries for 'Britain in Bloom' have been written and sent off so we await feedback in September. Andy Masson's video is on our Facebook page and, in due course, we will show the other videos.

A surveyor has visited Michael Bruce Cottage and identified possible places where water might be entering the building. We await her report and will have a better idea of the next steps in the process. The listening post is broken and Rory has sent the electronic part back to the manufacturers. We hope to have it up and running soon.

The art trail is complete and you can access it using your smartphone. Much of the work on coasts and waters done by the schoolchildren is either in the bus shelter, hanging on the park fence or on posts around the village. This will come down when school starts again. We have already had many visitors, local parents, grandparents and others from a wider area. It's a good way to spend a couple of hours exploring the village; why not stop for an ice cream at the shop when you've finished?



Through a chance meeting with senior youth worker Barry, Sam started to go along to the newly opened KYTHE hub. Another young volunteer, Jack, had previously set up 'Jack's Bar' and, as Jack had started a college course, the responsibility of running the bar was taken up by Sam. This opportunity included the responsibilities of placing orders and helped Sam to develop his leadership and retails skills which will help him in the future. Even during lockdown, Sam could be found online leading (with much hilarity) a virtual cooking session on Friday afternoons.

Abbie's grandfather had initially helped start up KYTHE so she was familiar with it. Abbie was also given individualised opportunities to reach her potential. Reflecting on her time with KYTHE, Abbie said, 'with KYTHE I've learnt more than I have in any other place, to be honest. I've learnt a lot about

other people, about youth work, about myself even.'

Abbie has lead groups and explained, 'This year I'm doing a Youth Achievement Award which is giving me a lot of training, such as mental health awareness, first aid, fire safety and that sort of thing. I think I've massively changed in a lot of different ways. I think confidence is one of them, that's been a massive part of my journey with KYTHE, and the ability to work with groups and understand other people as well.'

Abbie went on to say, 'I will always have KYTHE, no matter what I do in the future. I've a lot that I can take forward with me, with my Youth Achievement Award, transferable life skills that I can take forward to use for whatever job I get.'

Another young person who has been volunteering regularly for many years said, 'I gained a lot of confidence and a lot of new social skills, and belief in myself.'

When asked what KYTHE means to them and what they would tell others about KYTHE, this young person replied, 'It's a fun place to come and hang out and be yourself and no one will judge you.'

Sam agreed, '[KYTHE is] so much fun. It's a place for all young people, no matter your background or anything. You can always come and it's really inclusive, no matter who you are.' Abbie was similarly full of praise. She commented, 'I'd say it's one of the best places to go. It's a really homely place, it's really welcoming and it's so, so much fun. It's one of my favourite places to be.'

What Do You Do To Take Care Of The Environment?

On 21 June Malcolm Rooney, District 1010's Environmental Officer, addressed Rotarians on Zoom sbout 'Environmental Sustainability and Climate Change...The Power of One'. He reminded us that this is a topic for all of us to know about, to care about and to do something about. Malcolm presented an array of aspects and strategies for us to consider as a club, reminding us of our responsibility and duty of care to future generations. He also reminded us that each and every one of us has the 'power of one' to act. What do you presently do to protect the environment and what changes will you make?

New President

Outgoing president Brian Timms officially handed over the presidency of the club to George Lawrie by presenting him with the chain of office, filmed earlier in the day.

This is George's second period of office as club president and he is well known to members as a hard-working and dedicated member of Rotary. Brian and George staged a 'Desert Island Discs' style entertainment in which we learned more about his childhood, career in farming, involvement in local and national concerns and, most importantly, his family. We wish George well for his presidential year and look forward to working under his leadership.

Why I Became A Rotarian

Although our recent activities have focused largely on our local community, international service has continued to be an important part of what we do. Rotarian Alistair Smith details some of these in his account of why he became a Rotarian —

'I have been a member of Kinross Rotary for over 30 years and, in that time, I have enjoyed helping the club fulfil the aims of Rotary. Rotary assists projects in the local, national and international arenas. I have been particularly involved in the many international projects that the club has supported.

Rotary International has aimed to eliminate polio throughout the world – which it has very nearly

achieved. The next major project is water. Over 880 million people in the world do not have access to a pure, clean and safe supply of water. 10 babies die every 3 minutes in the world from water borne diseases. Too few people know about this.

I have been involved in Sand Dams projects in Malawi. This is a simple solution to a drastic problem. Rainstorms come twice a year in which the riverbeds are scoured and all the beds washed downstream. By supplying the local people with cement and guidance, they construct a concrete dam across the river about 8 to 10 feet high, which traps the sand from being washed away. The sand filters and cleans the water, which is taken off from a pipe at the bottom of the dam. The locals can obtain clean water for washing, cooking and irrigating their land for fresh vegetables for themselves and to sell to neighbours, making money for themselves and improving the economy. Each dam provides for about 1000 people in the community. Simple, cheap, but very effective.

Another international project I have been involved in is the Rotary International Shoebox Scheme which has been very well supported in Kinross-shire. We have had great help from the schools in this; some of you may have been involved yourselves. We provide the schools with purpose-made shoeboxes and ask everyone to fill them with presents for children. Last year, we were able to collect over 300 boxes, which were added to the boxes collected by all the other clubs in our district and these were then transported to identified destinations in Eastern Europe in time for Christmas, all of which enabled over 10,000 deprived children to have a happier Christmas.

We have also been involved in raising funds for a project in southern Ethiopia — the Ethiopia Medical Project — which treats uterine prolapse and podoconiosis. Both these widespread conditions carry a social stigma with sufferers reporting being ostracised from their families and communities. Yet both conditions can be treated, and in many cases reversed, with some simple treatments, which we are proud to support.



Thanks to their recent work, summer visitors to Kilmagad Wood have been enjoying the new, re-wilded appearance of the lower slopes. In the few weeks since contractors removed the old deer fence the grass has grown and started to soften the ruts and scars created by their machinery; a tractor and lifting equipment for dragging out all the fencing and the gorse that had grown through it.

The thousands of trees planted on the hillside by primary school children and other volunteers back in 2009/10 no longer need protection from deer and have grown so tall that they are beginning to form a proper woodland canopy. You can see young, green hazelnuts beginning to ripen on the bushes, while the other native species like oak, holly, rowan and birch are doing well. The only failures are the dead, skeletal ash trees which have succumbed to ash dieback disease; a horrible fungal infection which is predicted to kill 80% of our native ash trees. The disease originated in Asia, arrived in Europe

about 30 years ago, and was first recorded in the UK in 2012, probably coming in on imported ash saplings. Unfortunately, our native ash has no defence against it.

We are also dealing with another invader which native plants struggle against. It's the Himalayan balsam plant which grows vigorously and crowds out many of our own wildflowers. Places like damp ditches, which often host a great variety of plants, can be reduced to a monoculture of Himalayan balsam. Portmoak Community Woodland Group and volunteers have been pulling it out of ditches near the Scotlandwell entrance to Portmoak Moss and the results are excellent. Unfortunately, each flower produces so many seeds that we can't afford to relax and we'll be doing more Himalayan balsam 'bashing' as the summer goes on. We're making every effort to stop it getting into the Moss, where wildflowers are now being joined by an exciting range of fungi. Between the purple orchids growing beside the main path across the bog and the multicoloured toadstools and mushrooms springing up beneath the trees, it's well worth taking a look!



You can take part on your own or with family, friends, and colleagues. What you discover will provide valuable information on the current state of nature in Perth & Kinross and contribute new scientific data to help wildlife conservation and research. Record your observations of wild plants and animals that you see in your garden or park. A BioBlitz is a project to record all the species of an area over a short period.

The Shadow World will contain delicate evocations of endangered animals, questioning what will be left without positive change and intervention. These animals are currently on the red list of endangered animals, threatened with extinction from habitat loss and disruption to food chains.

The installation will provide a dark suggestion of the near future when these endangered animals are lost, existing instead in memory and trace.



Kirkgate Park

Elsewhere, the Perth and Kinross Council 'natural raingardens' modest swathes of marsh/wet grassland vegetation alongside the Loch Leven Heritage Trail through Kirkgate Park – have been allowed to grow and escape cutting this summer. They are at the edge of a narrow area of regularly mown wet grass, at the lower end of the extensive area of general amenity grassland that comprises most squelch - there's the water! of the park. It is still possible to wander into wet squelchy grass



(and get wet feet and shoes) in the mown zone; it might be worth extending the larger of the features a few extra metres to incorporate that area too?

After the disappointment of the destruction of early summer

flowers by the surprise spring mowing of the wildflower swales along the west Kinross link road/bypass, it is good to see that the parallel swale, through the undeveloped land around the Kipper premises, still offers a wealth of colour and a variety of wildflowers.

The swale is alive with the sound of buzzing bees and a closer look at the flowers reveals more pollinator insects too. In contrast to the oxeye daisies and wild geraniums, Knapweed is large leafy plant and could be seen as little more than a giant weed, prior to July flowering and the outbreak of colour. At least the insects appreciate it; it is at its most colourful now.

Loch Leven's Larder

Progress at Loch Leven's Larder has continued, albeit slower than hoped due to limited staff time. The original raingarden basin is now a mass of greenery, including ragged robin. The dry gravels around the edge featured an excellent show of tall ox eye daisies and poppies in June-July.

In the heavy rainstorms of last June-July, the new fence-line trenches and additional basins coped very well, intercepting scouring flows across the car park and diverting the peak runoff into the basins. Work has slowly continued to ensure the basins and the trenches are not simply straight in and straight out features, but hold the water long enough to slow the flow and avoid scour. A bit more excavation (especially the top trench and the lowest of the new basins) and the levels will be better. A wildflower mix from Scotia Seeds was sown in the lower trench, which has steep sections and





unfortunately many of the seedlings were swamped during high rates of water flow which mobilised soil from further up the trench. The problem recurred during the rainstorms too. Dense clumps of transported seedlings have survived at the lower end of the trench. Here and there too, some stubborn little seedlings are struggling up through the mounds of sand left by the rainstorms. So, the priority is restore the soil levels, and stabilise them with plants. In addition to the wildflower seedmix mentioned earlier, a set of plug plants was purchased from Celtica Wildflowers and planted in the two trenches and the upper raingarden basin, alongside other native wildflowers adding colour or quick fix to bind the soil (foxgloves, cat's ear, buttercups); anticipating the blooms which should appear next year from the surviving seedlings.

Several small bushes and climbers have also been dotted along the fences: cotoneaster, broom, honeysuckle, viburnum, ivy, variegated ivy, periwinkle; all grown from cuttings locally. Their survival and protection from washout depends on establishment of grass, clover and a variety of other meadow plants along the trenches, and around the woody plants. Not all the plants are native wildflowers however, in the interests of colour and accepting challenges of availability, planted colour has included garden familiars such as geraniums, and crocosmia.







Himalayan Summer

MID-SUMMER AT LOCH LEVEN means its Himalayan Balsam season! A lot of you may have noticed large, pink flowered, sweet smelling plants near the trail. This will probably be Himalayan Balsam. It is a non-native, extremely invasive plant hailing from the Himalayas. Himalayan Balsam was introduced to the UK in 1839 as a pretty plant to acquire for the garden. Sadly, its invasive properties were not known and now many wetlands and river banks are choked up by this expert spreader. Its scientific name is Impatiens Glandulifera; this basically translates to 'Impatient seed bearer'. This is well named, as in August when the plant is starting to seed, any movements of the plant (i.e. touch or wind) can send seeds flying in all manners of direction. Seeds can fly out of these seed pods as far as four metres, each plant can also disperse up to 800 seeds, so you can see how this is a master of colonisation.

We continue to control Balsam on NNR by hand pulling, slashing and strimming. Our main objective is to keep the Balsam at bay and ensure that it's not getting worse around the reserve. It can be a bit of a thankless and arduous task, but at the end of the day we are doing our bit here for conservation and it is satisfying when you can see your progress at the end of the day!

August at Loch Leven NNR is a fabulous time for wildlife! Congregations of hirundines (swallows and sand martins) are present around the loch in massive groups. A mix of juvenile and adult birds all feeding up and preparing for their migration back to Africa next month. Look out for common darter dragonflies when out and about near wetland areas. A butterfly to look out for in August is the painted lady. Migratory adults would have laid eggs two



weeks prior, and these eggs would have hatched caterpillars which have now pupated into adult butterflies, all in the space of 2-3 weeks!

Ospreys have been seen regularly now on the loch and in good numbers. August is the best month to see these charismatic raptors as it's the time where juvenile and adult birds feed up before their migration to western Africa in September. Look out for them 'fishing' on the loch; they will hover above the loch, spot a fish then dive into the water talon first. If they are lucky, they will leave with a big trout in their talons!

The Mill Hide Rebuild project is progressing. The plans have been submit-

ted for planning permission, whilst broadly the same it will have a more open design at the back so that the cameras and other visitors can see into the hide more easily from the trail. Discussions are underway to appoint contractors and to source materials including fire retardant treatments for the timber.

Recent wildlife highlights include; water vole, nuthatch, greenshank, red admiral butterflies, hundreds of ringlets and meadow brown butterflies, ospreys and large-flowered hemp nettle.

The Children Grow Up

WITH THE BREEDING SEASON

coming to an end and our lapwing chicks now fully fledged adults, it has been a busy month for wildlife at RSPB Loch Leven. Our very noisy neighbours at the black headed gull colony have had a lot of young on the go too, with lots of fledglings now fully developed into independence. The flood by the Carden hide has been occupied by hundreds of adult tufted duck, but we have also spotted plenty of young too, including gadwall chicks, shelduck chicks, little grebe, and coot chicks.

Some lovely sightings of marsh harrier and osprey have been spotted regularly on the wetlands, as well as reports of kingfisher and otter too. The swallows have started nesting in and around our coffee cabin, thankfully parents are on hand

to feed the chicks — a diet of cappuccinos and millionaire slices is probably not what they are after!

Our lovely bumblebee meadow will be open to the public soon and will be available to walk through around mid-August. Plenty of bumbles and butterflies are currently on show – including lots of ringlets and meadow browns, and lots of damselflies along the verges too. Not to mention the wildflowers popping up everywhere!

Our wonderful volunteer team have been hard at work adding plug plants to the bumblebee meadow, working on the decking by the ponds, and helping to maintain vegetation around the trails and the picnic area. A big thank you for all their help, we could not do what we do without you.

The project to renovate our café, reception, and toilet blocks continues. After all the demolishing, taking down and stripping out, we are finally putting the buildings back together again. As predicted the old buildings threw up a few challenges that we had to deal with, together with delays in some material and products, completion will now be in September. We are working with the contractors to get this date finalized.



The Garden In August



IS IT MY IMAGINATION, or is everything really late flowering this year? My lilies in pots are usually well over by now but some of them are still in bud. I'm blaming the very cold spring we had.

So, August. It's the last official month of summer before we start counting down through autumn and into winter again – but as you guessed, there's still plenty to be doing in the garden.

As well as the usual jobs of feeding, watering and weeding, August is a great time to be collecting seeds that you can use for next year. I usually wait until the plant is near the end of its life and no amount of deadheading is going to encourage any more blooms. I leave a few flower heads to produce seed and keep an eye on them. Once the seed head has ripened (starting to go brown) I nip it off and put in a paper bag. You can also put in a plastic box with kitchen roll. Once the seeds fall off the seed head (you may need to shake a little) store in a cool, dry place over the winter, ready for sowing next year. Dead-heading is very important this month to keep your flowers blooming for as long as possible. Go round your pots and garden regularly and just nip off those blooms that are

past their best. You don't want all their energy going into

seed production when they could be giving you extra flowers.

While the ground is still warm you can start sowing hardy annuals, such as calendulas and sunflowers for early summer colour next year. I've had a mixed experience from doing this, it sometimes works and sometimes doesn't, so I usually sow indoors in the spring. If you have a spare patch of garden, give it a go though; you may be more successful than me!

Now's the time to prune your rambling roses if you have any, the recommendation is that you remove up to a third of the stems that have flowered and tie the rest to supports. I have two against the house in the front garden. I must remember and do this to give them a good start for next year.

How are you getting on with your biennial seeds? I sowed some red and white sweet williams a couple of weeks ago and they're looking good – a couple more weeks and I can prick them out into cells and grow them on, ready for planting out in September. As usual, I've sown way too many and will need to give a lot of plants away – it's good to share!

Although there's a lot of tidying up to be done in the garden and preparation for next year, the garden's still looking great and there's lot of colour.

Late flowering plants are starting to bud and midsummer plants are in full bloom. I know I go on (and on) about lilies and what great value they are but take a look at these below. This was three plants a couple of years ago and they've multiplied in the pot to give this stunning display. They'll give a good few weeks of colour and joy to my patio.

So, watering, feeding, dead-heading, weeding and seed drying are the main things to be doing in August. Enjoy your garden, enjoy the sunshine and I'll see you again next month – the first month of autumn!

THE FUTURE'S IN SAFE HANDS

Our pup Luna, who was born before Christmas, is coming on. She's housetrained and walks okay on a lead, but is very keen on my flower pots. She gets herself into trouble almost daily, if given a moment alone, next to the trailing pansies. Each time I discover another flower pulled out I scold her and tell her it won't be long now until she leaves the comforts of the farmhouse. It will then be time to go out every day on the farm with our son who will teach her how to work with sheep. It may seem young to enter the adult world, but it's about the right time for a working collie to start learning more, and it will occupy her active brain meaning she will (hopefully) forget about pansies.

Starting young is important as there is so much to learn, and it struck me that this seems to happen a lot in farming with children and young people involved in a way that is not seen in other professions or businesses. Our son has been a vital support since I've not been so well and can't do the farm work like I used to. Charlie has taken on everything and made a brilliant job, he worked alongside me since he was a toddler, so I suppose I can say he had good training!

When I was recently asked to supply a reference for an eighteen-year-old making an application to agricultural college, I began by listing her farming experience, which similarly had started from an early age. Throughout primary school Sarah got involved at home by keeping hens in the farmyard, raising pet lambs and as she got older rearing calves.

Having taken on lambing work with me and a milking job locally, I was able to highlight her knowledge of livestock husbandry and her good attention to detail with animals. She is not alone in being so capable, her sister, Rachael, is a few years older and a confident lamber who can be left in charge of the whole lambing shed due to her exceptional ability and enthusiasm.

The ewes were sheared last week. It's such a relief when their fleece is removed. They feel so much better and the risk of couping on their back and becoming stuck is over for a few months. They are also less prone to fly strike and maggots after shearing so life is better for both flock and shepherd.

When talking of impressive young folk I'd like to give the shearing team led by Calum Shaw, a massive shout out. Calum has been coming to clip the ewes for 16 years but looking back him and his brother Alister were only teenagers then. On their first visit they sheared our whole flock in an afternoon under the guidance of their dad, an outstanding effort before either of them had even passed their driving test.

The following year Calum could drive, so he took on the organisation of the run, bringing in new shearers. Later on his girlfriend Emily, who is a superfast wool roller and expert packer, joined

them. Since then, he has sheared all over the world, competed and won the Scottish Open and National shearing competitions and grown his shearing business to see them shear over 20,000 sheep between St Andrews and Crieff each summer.

Funnily enough his nickname on the shearing circuit is 'The baby faced assassin'! Quite apt really, and a reminder that farming is in very safe hands when we have young men and women, such as the ones I am lucky enough to work with and many others like them, coming through.
