Electric Cars

HAS ANYONE THOUGHT ABOUT snow, traffic jams and electric cars?

If all our cars were electric and were caught in a three hour traffic jam... causing dead batteries! Then what? Not to mention the serious loss of range, if the heating or air con are switched on. Remember some of our Scottish winters to date. Cold reduces range considerably.

If you get stuck on the road at night, with no battery, no heating, no windscreen wipers, no radio, no sat-nav, no lights (because these would all drain the battery), you could try calling 999 to bring any women or children to safety, but the services cannot get to you because the roads are all blocked as no one can move and all the police cars will be electric too!

When the roads are finally unblocked, no one can move as their batteries are dead and they could not move anyway.

How would you recharge hundreds of cars in a large traffic jam? (Do we send in drones with spare batteries, and, if so, who would remove and install them?)

We would have the same problem in summer with holiday departures and miles of traffic jams.

You would have virtually no air con, as it would drain your battery very quickly*. This would make cars run out of 'fuel' and create a never ending traffic snarl up, not to mention tempers.

I think the single minded rush for electric has currently more problems than solutions.

Perhaps hydrogen or another fuel entirely can help as well!

Wild Camping

THERE WERE VARIOUS COMMENTS about wild camping in the last newsletter which need correction or clarification. It is wrong to suggest that the difficulties being encountered at many beauty spots around Scotland are because the Right to Roam legislation was 'poorly drafted'. In relation to camping, Part 1 of the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003, simply amended another piece of legislation, the Trespass (Scotland) Act 1865, so that camping was no longer a criminal offence, on any land where access rights applied. I doubt if many people would want to reverse such land reform progress and help landowners to regain the draconian powers they had in the 1800s.

The difficulties being encountered in roadside locations today have nothing to do with access rights. An abandoned mattress at Burleigh Sands, for example, is due to illegal flytipping, not camping. There are a large number of criminal offences relating to pollution, vandalism, dog control, lighting fires, poaching etc, all listed on four pages of the Scottish Outdoor Access Code. All that is required is proper enforcement. And road traffic legislation permits anyone to park their vehicle within 15 yards of the highway, so long as no damage is done to fences etc. That is an essential requirement for safety, rest and relaxation reasons.

The fundamental problem is not legislation; it is a failure to provide proper roadside facilities, from parking areas and toilets to picnic sites, rest and recreation areas. Travel through any other European country and you will find they are decades ahead of Scotland – compare the facilities in these other countries with the tiny laybys now being built along the newly dualled sections of the A9. These are the perfect example of how not to provide roadside facilities.

Of course local politicians are always being pressurised to 'do something'. At least we can be grateful that Perth and Kinross Council appear to have no intention of following the example set by the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park. Their camping bylaws have solved nothing — a very expensive and ineffective measure whose main achievement has been to push any problems onto other local authorities while they try to turn law abiding campers into criminals. Instead the focus needs to be on improved facilities, better infrastructure and more rangers to engage and educate. The Right to Roam legislation needs no amendment — it just requires more effort to manage our land and road systems so that they complement Scotland's world class access rights.

BLAZE CAUSES HIGH ST STANDSTILL



KINROSS HIGH STREET WAS closed off to pedestrians on Thursday 5 August as huge flames burned through the roof of a flat above the Fife Computers shop.

Firefighters were called to the scene of the blaze, in the top floor of the Category B listed building at 113 High St, shortly after 10am.

Horrified onlookers stopped to watch the thick grey smoke, which quickly turned to flames, spreading from the roof of the three-storey building which was on fire.

A Scottish Fire and Rescue Service spokesperson said: 'We were alerted at 10.12am on Thursday, August 5 to reports of a property on fire at High Street, Kin-

ross. Operations Control mobilised three fire appliances and one height vehicle.'

The fire caused extensive damage to the building. Inside access was deemed to be too difficult because of the narrow spiral staircase, and so a height appliance was brought in from Kirkcaldy in order to give the firefighters access to the top of the building. The area was cordoned off until about 1pm.

Thankfully, no casualties were reported and local shopkeepers rallied round to offer shelter and refreshments to those affected by the fire.

Locals took to social media to express their concerns for those involved. 'Fingers crossed for minimal damage and nobody is hurt,' said one.

Another assured everyone that the home's occupants were safe. He said: 'Everyone's safe, this is my friend's house and a bird's nest caught fire in the chimney causing the fire.'

Recycling Glass To Feed The Community

A GLASS RECYCLING BUSINESS, started in lockdown, is helping raise funds for local food banks, in the first of its kind in the area.

Doorstep Glass Recycling was launched during lockdown after noticing a gap in the market for people to conveniently recycle glass without having to travel to recycling points. This is a company with a difference as they donate a percentage of any proceeds to local foodbanks.

After a successful launch in Dundee, Perth and Fife in early 2021, the company are now expanding into new areas. The service is now available in Kinross, Milnathort, surrounding areas and all of the little places in between.

Collections are every four weeks and the company are always flexible with regards to collections. Customers are sent a text and email reminder of the collection date and they collect from all properties.

The business charge £6 pounds per month for one box and

Daniel said, 'We are aiming to improve recycling rates in all of the new areas we are operating in and our service will reduce the number of vehicles attending recycling centres, having a positive impact on local emission targets.

Our intention is to make Kinross and the surrounding areas one of our flagship communities and to lead by example what people can achieve through effortlessly recycling glass.'




THE TRAINS ARE BACK IN DOLLAR!

A NEW ATTRACTION HAS been added to the permanent exhibition on the Devon Valley Railway in Dollar Museum. It is a working model of Dollar Railway Station as it was around 1960.

The railway came to Dollar in 1869 as part of the Devon Valley Railway (DVR), which linked East and West Scotland. It closed to passengers in 1964, the year after the Queen travelled on it after her visit to Dollar. The section from Dollar to Kinross was dismantled, but the section from Alloa to Dollar Mine remained open until the Mine closed in 1973. This part of the track is now a popular walkway and cycle path.

In 1992 Dollar Museum was given over 700 negatives and photographs illustrating all aspects of the DVR line, taken by local railway enthusiast Peter Wilson. These were scanned and may all be seen on slide shows and in albums in the museum. They formed the basis of the Museum's DVR Collection, which has been added to over the years by many generous donations of railway items, such as the Rumbling Bridge to Kinross tablet giving the train driver access to that section of the single-line track, the drinking fountain

from Dollar Station, and tickets for the last train, including one for the passenger's bike.

During lockdown, Mick Rice, a retired design engineer with Mercedes and modelling enthusiast, lovingly created a scale model of Dollar Railway Station with its platform, signals and associated buildings, as well as the Dollar Burn, the Kelly Burn and the branch line leading to Dollar

Mine. The model also features the chicken farm which was situated in Lovers Loan, by the railway track.

The model has a working locomotive and carriages, which can be demonstrated during a visit to the Museum. As an extra attraction visitors can also hear the actual sounds of a steam train travelling from Alloa to Dollar, complete with shunting at Dollar Mine. The whole journey was recorded in the 1960s by Mike Jodeluk, who was on the footplate.

The model has already aroused a great deal of interest and sparked the memories of many visitors. A former worker at Dollar coal mine remembered that coal was delivered to the mine to provide power to work the machinery, whilst the locally mined coal, of inferior quality, was sent to Kincardine Power Station. A retired teacher at Dollar Academy recalled being responsible for organising the flowers for the Queen's departure from the station in 1963.

Dollar Museum is open on Saturdays from 11-1pm & 2-4.30pm, and on Sundays from 2-4.30pm. Entry is free and all visitors are welcome.



Doors To Be Thrown Wide For Open Studios Week

OVER 200 ARTISTS THROUGHOUT Perthshire are taking part in the 2021 Perthshire Open Studios event this September, with ten local venues around Kinross-shire forming the Turquoise Route.

Running from 4-12 September, the Open Studios event sees artists and makers opening up their workplaces — in many cases, their own homes — to showcase their work to visitors from far and wide.

Here in Kinross-shire, there is a wide variety of art and craft

Six individual painters are showing their work this year – *Barry Allan Scot* in Bridge of Earn (venue 45), *Richard Ibbotson* in Glenfarg (venue 46), *Kathryn Kirkwood* (venue 48), *Carol Barbour* in Kinross (venue 50), *Anne White* also in Kinross (venue 51) and *Nichol Wheatley* in Fossoway (venue 53). TULLIBOLE OPEN DAY



Tullibore Castle

On Sunday 5 September Tullibole Castle will be open for free, with guided tours available for visitors. Just turn up.

The castle also can be visited by appointment until 30 September: from Tuesday-Sunday, 1-4pm.

Completed in 1608, Tullibole Castle is a classic example of a 17th century Scottish tower house in a parkland setting. Its contents include a collection of 18th and 19th century paintings, and portraits of past owners of Tullibole Castle and their relations (including some by Raeburn), and furniture from the 18th and 19th centuries.

Visit the Witches Maze, a memorial to commemorate the Crook of Devon witch trials in 1662, when 11 people were strangled to death because they were believed to be witches.

The grounds also contain the ruins of a medieval church and old kirkyard, a moat and a doocot.

Now primarily used as a venue for weddings and events, the castle can be found on the B9097, one mile east of Crook of Devon, KY13 0QN.

NEW BUTTERFLY FOR LOCH LEVEN

THERE WAS EXCITEMENT AT Loch Leven NNR in July when a new species was recorded on the reserve for the first time! The Purple Hairstreak butterfly has been increasing its range in Scotland over the last few decades, and while they are common in the south of England they are much less common here, and have been in decline in the UK.

They are normally seen on the canopy of old oak trees. They are particularly hard to find as they spend most of their time on the tree tops. The colony at Loch Leven NNR can be seen on the oak trees next to the River Leven at Levenmouth. Simon from NatureScot said in his blog, counted 30-40 individuals. They are a butterfly that could be easily missed, as they only come out in the evening.

TEAM GB T-SHIRT UP FOR AUCTION

NOW HOME FROM THE Olympics, Milnathort's own Olympic medallist Laura Muir recently visited Mandy's Salon in Kinross High Street. She was there to deliver a signed Olympic team GB t-shirt. Laura kindly donated the signed shirt which will be auctioned later this year to raise money for the Kinross Day Centre.

A spokesperson from Mandy's Salon said, 'Thank you again Laura! You are an inspiration and well done on your silver medal in the Olympics.

The 28-year-old produced an exceptional run in the 1500m Olympic final in Tokyo and finished with a time of 3:54.50, which is a new personal best. Muir managed to hold off Sifan Hassan around 250m from the finish line as the two runners battled it out for silver and bronze. She shattered the British record to finish behind Kenyan Faith Kipyegon.

The culmination of a near-decade-long quest for a major medal hit Muir after the finish line as she slumped to the track.

At the Rio Olympics five years ago, she suffered disappointment in the final 200m dropping from third to seventh in the final. This time around, she got stronger as the final lap went on.

'I'm so happy that I was able to show what I'm capable of.' Muir said

'I've worked so hard for so long. I've been fourth, fifth twice, sixth and seventh every year in major championships since 2015 and with everything last year being postponed and not knowing what was going on — I got a silver.

That last 100m, I don't think I've ever been so scared in my life. Someone was going to come past me and I would drop to fourth. I just gave it everything in that last stretch.

'I don't know if that national record will be broken but that medal is mine.'

She paid tribute to her family and friends, including training partner Jemma Reekie, adding: 'I want to thank everyone supporting me: Mum, Dad, and Gran –

they're all supporting me at home.

Olympic heptathlon gold medallist
Denise Lewis added: 'Laura is one of

those athletes who just gives her absolute best every single day, in training and in competition.



Model Seaplanes Flying at Kirkgate Park



YOU MIGHT HAVE SEEN some very small planes at Kirkgate Park at this annual event which took place on the weekend of 14 & 15 August. it's been going for around 25 years and began as an addition to the Kinross Children's Gala. The weather was dry and windy on Saturday but perfect on Sunday with 32 fliers, some bringing three or four models, so there was plenty of interest from the other park users.

There were even people from Elgin and Cumbria, with models powered by petrol or glow-plug engines, electric motors and even a gas-turbine jet engine!

The Loch Leven Flyers fly from the beach in Kirkgate, over the loch, taking off and landing on the water. Radio control allows the participants to fly several models at the same time, and they vary in size from half-metre wingspan to over 3 metres, 80cc engines and needing a van for transport and several people to operate!

This is done with permission from the Council and a permit from NatureScot (Scottish Natural Heritage) who monitor the flights carefully to ensure no significant disturbance to wildlife.

Bill McDiarmid told the *Newsletter*, 'The Kinross-shire area is something of a hot-bed for model aircraft, more usually

LLC Re-Launch From The Boathouse!



AS AUTUMN FAST APPROACHES, Loch Leven Church (LLC) will be taking on a new challenge: meeting weekly in The Boathouse. Set in one of the most stunning locations in Scotland, this iconic view will surely inspire thoughts of Jesus calming the storm (Matthew 8:23-27), recruiting His faithful fishermen followers (Matthew 4:18-20) and even cooking a fishy BBQ on the shores of the Sea of Galilee after his resurrection (John 21:9-14). The Boathouse is a perfect location for the church's temporary home not only because of its unparalleled views, but also the large decking area for the option of outdoor services. Not to mention the proximity of Kirkgate Park for the children. The leader of LLC's flourishing youth group, Stephen Jones, said 'We want everyone in the community to feel welcome to come to The Boathouse and be a part of this opportunity'.

Historically, when Christians have been prevented from assembling (because of persecution rather than pandemic) they have always re-invented their worship. During the past 18 months of social restrictions, LLC has done just that. Last Autumn, they hosted Kinross's first ever drive-in service, amassing in the field at Loch Leven's Brewery, as they thought outside of the box (although not outside of their cars)! They also took part in a church-wide challenge to walk, cycle, run and swim the equivalent distance of climbing all of



the Munros, donating £2000 to our very own Rachel House (CHAS). In winter, they tackled the extreme winter conditions and took to streets for delivery of 500 advent calendars and Christmas boxes to local families and spread the good news of Jesus' birth. Members also sang and played instruments in an online multi-church musical montage along with others from churches from all over Perthshire. In the spring, LLC hopped into action to play Easter Bunny and deliver a total of around 250 chocolate eggs, sharing the sweetness of the resurrection message.

The group has certainly overcome the challenges of restrictions admirably, with their practical and personal approach to loving their neighbours (from a socially safe distance, of course!). They have stayed strong throughout the pandemic – and even grown in number – as they have met online weekly to explore the Bible, with local and guest speakers, to be encouraged that there is hope in Jesus despite any challenges we might all face.

During the summer holidays, members have been touring historic villages, fellowshipping in coffee shops, barbecuing and prayer-walking. And, of course, there have been plenty of activities to build the children's faith and friendships at activity centres, locally at Lendrick Muir and at Willowgate in Perth. This new generation of 'Covidnanters' have been cov-pliant all the way and it seems they have survived — nay, thrived — by re-thinking the concept of a church without walls — quite literally! This local reformation has been responsive to the needs not only of the church body but also the wider community. Leader Marc Heath explains, 'This is less about going to church and more about being the church.' All welcome, Sundays at 10.30am from 29 August.

AS REGULAR READERS OF my columns will know very well, environmental issues, particularly illegal waste disposal, is always something I am very keen to address.

Last summer, the cases of fly-tipping increased to devastating levels, likely exacerbated by the continued closure of recycling centres during lockdown. I



campaigned strongly for the recycling centres to reopen as the scale of the environmental damage was escalating. You did not have to look hard in the Kinross-shire countryside to see the hideous damage that was taking place and the subsequent need for those dumping this waste to be brought to justice; again, I strongly supported new legislation to make it easier for local authorities to prosecute the perpetrators of fly-tipping.

My parliamentary colleague, Mid Scotland and Fife MSP Murdo Fraser, is proposing introducing a Member's Bill in the Scottish Parliament to strengthen the current laws surrounding the prosecution of fly-tippers. Murdo has been in contact with a variety of stakeholders to discuss how the legal framework can be improved. I am very eager to get behind this Bill to ensure those who are responsible for the environmental damage are rightfully punished.

Likewise, this year, the period of great weather we have been having through July and August has also brought with it more issues for the Kinross-shire countryside. Dirty camping around Loch Leven, especially at Kirkgate Park and Burleigh Sands have been of particular concern to local residents. The extent of the damage is wide ranging, but includes cars parked and tents pitched on vast amounts of the available grass, scorched remains of BBQs, high levels of littering of both domestic and camping waste, to name just a few.

It is crucial that we find the correct balance between enjoying what Loch Leven has to offer and respecting the local people and environment. I am very aware that the vast majority of campers are respectful and tidy up after themselves, however there is without doubt an observable minority that completely disregard their responsibilities as wild campers. There has been a great amount of local action to tackle this and I am continuing to work closely with Councillor Callum Purves who I know is taking a prominent role in the collective community effort. Callum has contacted the Council's new visitor ranger service — formed to combat the problems associated with wild camping — and requested that Burleigh Sands is monitored closely.

Thankfully it is not all bad news, it is fantastic to see the effect that this rush of tourists is having on businesses in Kinross-shire. We all know of the enormous struggles that businesses have faced

throughout the pandemic, so it is just so satisfying – in addition to the reduction of restrictions from 9 August – to see small local businesses visibly full again.

The easing of restrictions also means a return of the familiar Kinross Show which we all missed last year. This small step towards normality in the usually very busy events schedule is fantastic to see and a reminder that all the events and celebrations that happen each year will return.

Green Park: I am pleased that the resurfacing of the pavements in Green Park has finally been finished. The work was partly done then due to Covid issues not completed. This was a job that was badly needing to be done.



Paths Group: Congratulations to the Milnathort Paths Group who have been established through Milnathort Community Council. They have now received their training from the Council on the use of the grass and scrub clearing machinery. One of their first jobs was to clear the path from Burleigh Castle through to the old railway line. This was a tough task as some of the vegetation was nearly 6 feet high! However the flail machine and strimmers supplied by the Council made short work of even the worst sections. I know the paths group are needing more volunteers so if you would like to get involved please let me know and I will give you the contact details.

Wild Camping: The Council's countryside rangers are doing their best to control the wild camping and overnight camper van stays at Burleigh Sands, Kirkgate and Findatie. The agencies involved in policing this issue are currently having discussions with the Scottish government to try and find long term solutions to control the problem. I have asked them to consider a permit system as is operated in the Loch Lomond & the Trossachs National Park. At least then we will know how many people are camping/staying and can both limit the numbers and identify those creating problems.

Fly Tipping: There have been more instances of fly tipping in Kinross-shire. I would ask everyone to be vigilant and note the registration numbers of vehicles seen on country roads carrying garden, building and other waste materials. It could help in the quest to trace those responsible for dumping waste in our countryside. It can cost the Council (therefore us tax payers) and landowners a considerable amount of money to uplift and dispose of fly tipped waste especially if the waste contains dangerous materials such as asbestos. It is important that farmers and land managers keep all field gates locked to deter the fly tippers.

Pitdownies Site: Building work has now begun on this contentious site. There have been numerous complaints about noise and disturbance coming from the site as a result of the groundworks taking place. I have contacted the Council and asked them to use all the powers at their disposal to protect local residents from this nuisance. A further problem has been caused by the huge lorries carrying earthmoving machinery onto the site. Westerloan, Manse Road, and even North Street and Ba' Hill have been used by such vehicles to access the site. The concerns expressed by myself and the many, many people who objected to this development have been proved to have been based on fact.

Overgrown Hedges: Thank you to everyone who has contacted me about hedges/vegetation overgrowing pavements. As far as I am aware all the locations I have been notified about have now been cut back, so a thanks also needs to go to the householders who when made aware of the problem, have cut their hedges back.

WITH THE SCHOOLS NOW back after the holidays, I would like to take this opportunity to wish all our young people, but especially those starting in primary or secondary for the first time, all the very best for the coming year. Let us all hope that it will be far less disrupted than last year.



I am also delighted to welcome a really important investment from the Scottish Government. A £28 million commitment will deliver free school lunches during term time for all P4 children by August 2021 and to P5 children by January 2022 and a further £21.75 million will provide targeted free school meal support during school holidays in 2021-22.

Now, I have issues about the way in which school meals are prepared and provided here in Perth & Kinross – I would far rather see all food prepared fresh onsite in every school rather than shipped out frozen from central kitchens but, nevertheless, the provision of very nearly £50 million in new funding to local authorities demonstrates our support for the health and wellbeing of children and young people and our commitment to reduce the impact of poverty on thousands of families across the country.

Local produce, local production and local sustainability are very important to me. Not just in terms of school meals but in all sorts of ways, so I am also very pleased to note the launch of an important new fund by the Scottish Government last month. The 'Scotland Loves Local' Fund is part of the support being made available to help town centres recover from the impact of the pandemic which has hit local economies very hard indeed.

Match funding of between £5000 and £25,000 will be made available to local projects run by community and charity trusts as well as organisations such as town centre partnerships and chambers of commerce.

The sort of projects they are looking to support could range from things like community shops, local marketing schemes, or even enabling the delivery of larger construction projects.

I know that there has been some fantastic community effort right across the Perthshire South & Kinross-shire constituency

area over the course of the pandemic and I am certain there will be groups out there with plans in mind that can help our town centres out the other side.

We need local community projects designed to stimulate growth and footfall and this funding will enable such plans to come to fruition and so stimulate the local economy and help make our town centres more vibrant places.

Funding projects like this can kickstart a virtuous cycle whereby people shop locally and support local businesses, so boosting the local economy and ensuring that money spent in the local area benefits the local area.

I USED TO HATE going to the gym at school. I think it was the shouting that put me off. Our gym teacher had a voice in exact disproportion to his size. "Right, wee men," he'd bellow, whilst staring up at his adolescent charges, 'time for your burpees.'



Burpees, push ups, hanging upside down, and long runs in the rain are my memories of school PE. I'm sure I wasn't alone in finding the wall bars and ropes, leather horses and medicine balls forbidding. It never seemed to be about joy.

It wasn't until my twenties that I discovered the gym could be fun, and that music and a headset were a lot better motivation than puce-faced bellowing. Watching others' exertions from the sofa can be even better fun.

Like so many of you, I've been gripped by the Olympics. Every time I see Tom Daley dive, I think of how proud his Dad would have been. Tom's a powerful role model, speaking out against school bullying and answering homophobic abuse with worldbeating performances in the pool - not to mention Olympic speed-knitting caught on camera poolside. And what a result for Scotland with 11 medals coming home, and Alloa boy Duncan Scott becoming the first athlete from the UK to win four medals at a single Olympics. And what a result for the Wee County. Indeed, at one point an independent Clackmannanshire would have been 29th in the medal tables, ahead of Austria, Belgium, Poland, and Turkey. Of course, these athletes' extraordinary results have been years in the making. One factor in their success may well have been the Scottish Government's decision to reverse decades of school sport cutbacks and the selling-off of playing fields by previous administrations.

Twenty years ago, only ten percent of kids were able to enjoy two hours of physical education a week. Today ninety nine percent do. And I suspect they have a lot more fun than I did with much less shouty teachers. For many, the Olympics are about national pride. But for one team, that pride is bittersweet and shared with teammates from across the world. The Refugee Olympic Team competed for the second time in Tokyo, after making its debut in Rio five years ago. In the intervening years, it's tripled in size — a result, tragically, of the refugee crisis which has gripped the world.

The UN estimates that there are more than thirty-five million people displaced from their home countries as a result of conflict or natural disaster – more than one million having fled to Europe from Syria. To have escaped such trauma and yet remain focused on Olympic glory is awe-inspiring. And the Paralympics are only just beginning...

Vehicle Crime Awareness Campaign

Thefts from sheds, outbuildings and within the garden feature regularly in the list of recent crimes committed across Perth and Kinross. A number of these thefts could be prevented if home owners took some simple steps to secure their garden, shed and garage.

What can I do to stop thieves stealing from my garden?

- Keep hedges, walls and fences low at the front of the property to a maximum of 1.2 metres high and in a good state of repair to allow natural surveillance and make it hard for an intruder to work unseen. Prevent easy access to the back and sides by installing locked gates. Rear fences and walls should be a minimum 1.8 to 2 metres in height. Trellis topping or an intruder deterrent strip should also be considered to make climbing difficult.
- Consider nature's own defences grow aggressive shrubbery which is harder for intruders to climb through. Ideal plants include berberis, blue spruce, common holly, giant rhubarb, golden bamboo, firethorn, shrub rose, pencil Christmas tree, juniper and rubus (bramble).
- Security lighting around your property will act as a deterrent. Dusk to dawn low voltage LED lighting is cost effective to both install and run.
- Make sure bins are located in an area which doesn't allow them to be easily used as a step to climb over fences and walls or access windows.
- Lock away any garden implements, furniture or tools in a secure shed, garage or outside store. They may not only be an attractive target for theft, but also items such as ladders which are useful for breaking into your home.

What can I do to protect property in my shed and garage?

- Photograph valuable items of garden furniture and / or garden tools. Note and keep a record of make, model, colour and serial numbers and use a UV pen or similar to security mark them with your house number and postcode.
- You may wish to use a chain or other device to lock garden tools and furniture together to the structure which will make them harder to remove.
- Fit a good quality hasp and padlock to the door, fitted with dome headed or non-returnable screws to prevent tampering. Appropriate products that are approved as 'Sold Secure' or 'Secured by Design' should be considered. For more information visit www.securedbydesign.com
- Secure windows and don't give intruders the opportunity to see inside. Depending on the type of window, you could consider fitting internal window grills, heavy wire mesh or reinforced glass. You could also use curtains or opaque film. If the window opens, a window lock should be fitted.
- If you have an intruder alarm, consider extending it to cover sheds, garages and outbuildings and ensure that there is a visible external sounder box.
- If you do not have a secure shed then bring items inside

 don't leave them lying out.
- If your garage adjoins your home and there is a through door, keep it locked.

King of the Commons

THIS YEAR THE 250TH anniversary of the birth in 1771 of the noted Scottish novelist and poet Sir Walter Scott is being celebrated. One of his most famous romantic works, 'The Lady of the Lake', is all about the struggle between King James V and the powerful clan Douglas, with the king, disguised as a mysterious knight, searching out James Douglas, Earl of Bothwell and his daughter who have taken refuge in a castle on an island in Loch Katrine.

In reality James V (1512-42) was a master of disguises who liked to venture out from the safety of his royal palaces to meet ordinary men and women. By travelling incognito, dressed as the common man, he could find out more about life in Scotland from the perspective of his subjects, rather than just relying on what his nobles and clergy told him. Nicknamed the 'King of the Commons' he would sometimes identify himself as the 'Gudeman of Ballengeich,' a gudeman being a Scots word for the owner of a small holding. The Gaelic name Ballengeich is thought to be the name given to a road leading north-westwards into countryside from Stirling Castle.

There are several stories based in and around the Lomond Hills relating to the exploits of the 'King of the Commons' while staying at Falkland Palace, a favourite resort of the Stewart kings. One of these tales recalls a journey on foot to Milnathort where the disguised king was kidnapped by three itinerant vagabonds who were probably eyeing-up the lo-



cal scene with a view to breaking into houses and stealing what they could find that was of some value. Did they imagine that someone might be willing to pay a ransom for the gudeman or did they think he might be willing to join their gang?

Of the three two were men. rough characters who forced the gudeman to do menial work such carrying the heavy panniers that were probably laden with the goods they had stolen. The third man was at least decent enough to provide him with food and water. An opportunity to escape arose, how-



ever, when the gang of three were enjoying some alcoholic refreshment in a house on the east side of the village. Left on the nearby green to keep company with their donkey, the king wrote a note on a small scrap of paper which he passed to a young lad along with half a crown, telling him to go to Falkland with great speed to let his nobles know that the Gudeman of Ballengeich was in a state of captivity.

In due course help arrived and the three vagabonds were subjected to immediate rough justice. The man who had shown him at least some decency was set free but the oth-

er two, whose treatment had been most severe, were taken immediately to the Gallowes Knowe (Gallow Hill), the place of public execution midway between Milnathort and Kinross, where they were hanged.

As a result of this experience, King James is said to have straight away passed a law that whenever three vagabonds were found together, two of them should be hanged and the third given his liberty. Today the Gallow Hill, where the two vagabonds were hung nearly 500 years ago, is remembered in a farm name as well as in Kinross street names such as Gallowhill Road, Gallowhill Gardens and Gallowhill Wynd.

Twelve Years In Malaya

Andy Middlemiss continues his series on post WW2 conflicts, sometimes called the Colonial Wars. This month, he discusses the Malayan insurgency of 1948, that lasted twelve long years.

National Liberation War

THE FIRST SHOTS OF THE Malayan Emergency were fired at 8.30am on 16 June 1948, in the office of the Elphil Estate, 20 miles from Sungai Siput town, in the northern state of Perak. Three British rubber plantation managers, Arthur Walker, 50, John Allison, 55, and his young assistant, Ian Christian, 24, were shot and killed by three Chinese insurgents in the plantation office. This attack was followed by other attacks, on the same day, on other estates. Horrifically, this sometimes involved the shooting of unarmed people taken prisoner, who they referred to as 'Running Dogs', meaning British supporters. The Malayan National Liberation Army (MNLA) (the armed wing of the Malayan Communist Party, MCP) began attacking rubber plantations, mines and police stations, derailing trains and burning workers' houses. Murders became more frequent, and the plantation owners became alarmed, especially when their calls for armed protection fell on deaf ears. Eventually, protests forced the High Commissioner, Sir Edward Gent, to declare a state of emergency. Police were granted greater powers and quickly armed. The rebels continued to target tin mines and rubber plantations, as, if the Malaya economy collapsed, then the country would soon fall. At first the government was defensive, with small groups protecting mines and plantations, but police recruitment was soon stepped up, with new 'special constables', and by September 1948 there were 24,000. In June 1948 a state of emergency was declared in Malaya (now Malaysia). Bizarrely, the insurgency was described as an 'emergency' because insurers would not have compensated rubber plantation and tin mine owners, if it had been labelled a 'war'.

Who Were The Enemy?

- The communists of the MNLA jungle based
- Supported by the impoverished Chinese population
- Many Chinese lived in the cities, others known as 'squatters' lived at the fringes of the jungle and could aid the guerrillas
- The MLNA and its supporters called the campaign the Anti-British National Liberation War.

By 1948 they were ready to go to war. Their leader, Chin Peng, had learned his jungle warfare skills from the British. After Singapore fell to the Japanese in 1942, several British officers harassed the Japanese from the jungle, including the famous Colonel Spencer Chapman and his 'Force 136'. Eventually, supported by the Chinese, the force swelled to over 5000, and was known as The Malayan Peoples Anti-Japanese Army. The British trained them in jungle warfare and modern weapons, knowing they were mainly communists, but figuring 'the enemy of my enemy is my friend'; at least in the short term. This gave the rebels a handy striking force that easily just changed the name to the 'Malayan Peoples Anti-British Army'. Chin Peng had even marched in the London Victory parade, and had been awarded an OBE. The fighters were paid out of money extorted from the local population, following the Leninist principle that a small force, by the infliction of terror, can conquer a nation. They were split into eight regiments, spread across the country. Each would then split down further into small groups, who would carry out traditional Maoist style guerrilla warfare in the rural areas, to keep the element of surprise.

The Insurgents

Some have argued that the Malayan Emergency was part of a wider communist plan to gain power in South-East Asia. Certainly the Malayan communist party leaders attended various international conferences in Europe and India

during 1947/48. Apart from this, there is little evidence to support the theory it was part of a co-ordinated plan. More likely is the fact that the Malayan communist party was actually on the verge of collapse, having failed in any legal attempts, or to gain widespread popular support, insurrection may have been their last hope, and it was a case of now or never. A former very popular leader of the party, Loi Tek, had disappeared, and his successor Chin Peng was trying to make a name for himself. In fact Loi Tek had fled, taking much of the party's funds with him. Not only this, he was in fact working as a British agent.

Reinforcements

The initial British reaction to the crisis was to introduce emergency legislation, allowing suspects to be detained without trial. Curfews and movement restrictions were also imposed. Malaya's original military garrison consisted of six Gurkha, three British and two Malay battalions. Reinforcements were sent from August 1948 onwards. Many of these British soldiers were teenage, conscripted National Servicemen.

Stalemate

The newly arrived troops set up positions near villages, and then sent out patrols. The guerrillas had the benefit of local knowledge, while the British Army was initially hampered by a lack of good intelligence. The authorities were eventually able to prevent the guerrillas from disrupting the economy, overrunning towns





or controlling territory. But they were unable to completely stop their activities.

Squatters

The communists of the MNLA were jungle based and supported by the impoverished Chinese population. Although many Chinese lived in the cities, others, known as 'squatters', lived at the fringes of the jungle and could aid the guerrillas. The MNLA and its supporters called the campaign the Anti-British National Liberation War.

New tactics

In 1950 Lieutenant-General Sir Harold Briggs was appointed Director of Operations in Malaya. He realised the importance of isolating the guerrillas from their sources of food and creating a sense of security in populated areas so that people would be more willing to provide information.

He also persuaded the High Commissioner, Sir Henry Gurney, to set up committees containing representatives of all civil and military agencies involved in the campaign, so that a co-ordinated response to the guerrillas could be formulated. The Malayan Police and Special Branch were given the task of gathering information.

New Villages

In an effort to split the active insurgents from their passive supporters, Chinese squatters were re-housed in purpose built new villages. Clean water, proper housing, education and medical care were provided. By the end of 1951 over 400,000 people had been resettled in 500 new villages: a massive logistical operation. The guerrillas were frequently arrested or killed as they approached them in search of food. Many guerrillas surrendered, but these techniques took time to perfect, and the insurgents were able to continue their campaign. Despite British attempts to cut off the link between the guerrillas and the Chinese community, fighting continued.

Templer Takes Over

On 6 October 1951 the communists managed to ambush and kill the High Commissioner, Sir Henry Gurney. General Sir Gerald Templer was appointed both Director of Operations and High Commissioner shortly after. He embraced Briggs' ideas with energy, ensuring that a co-ordinated command structure was established. Templer placed great emphasis on the need to win the 'hearts and minds' of the population. He continued to build new settlements and promised independence

once the guerrillas had been defeated. This won him the support of many nationalists.

'The answer lies not in pouring more soldiers into the jungle, but in the hearts and minds of the Malayan people. The shooting side of this business is only 25% of the

trouble, and the other 75% lies in getting the people of this country behind us.'

General Sir Gerald Templer, 1952.

Templer also involved the local population in the fight against the guerrillas by increasing the number of Malay battalions, and strengthening the Home Guard raised to defend the new villages. These measures helped unite the racially divided Malayan people against the insurrection. When Templer finally left his post in October 1954 most of Malaya was secure. He was promoted to Field Marshal in 1956.

Who Were The Key Players?

Chin Peng, the insurgent leader. Sir Reg Gurney, ambushed and murdered in his car (British High Commissioner). Gen Templer. The King of Malaya. Gen Briggs, Director of Operations. The fabulous Tungku Abdul Rahman, Father of the Nation.'

Jungle Training

As Templer's new policies began to take effect, the flow of information to the security forces increased. This allowed the British to take the offensive against the MNLA in jungle operations, which called for stealth and a high degree of patience. Newly arrived troops had to be taught how to live and fight in the tropical forests. Training occurred at the Jungle Warfare School, in Kota Tinggi, which also taught the best tactics, based on experience gained in the field. British battalions normally spent three years in Malaya. Military tactics advanced using close air support and helicopters, to force the guerrillas deeper and deeper into the jungles, including constructing jungle forts and deep patrols - some by Special Forces, like the SBS and 22 SAS Regiment. Deep jungle is a hostile environment to live and operate in, regardless of the skill and training of the troops involved, which

meant the guerrillas were also operating in a very difficult environment.

Commonwealth At War

From 1954 there were normally 24 infantry battalions in Malaya from a wide variety of Commonwealth countries, including Australia and New Zealand. With a police force of 40,000 men, it was now possible to clear an area of guerrillas. When an area had been swept, it was designated a 'White Area' and restrictions on the local population were lifted, encouraging them to oppose the return of any insurgents.

Independence

In August 1957 the Federation of Malaya was granted independence – MERDEKA – and the insurrection lost its rationale as a war of colonial liberation. Many guerrillas gave up their fight. In 1960 the Emergency was declared to be over. More than 500 soldiers and 1300 police had been killed during the conflict. Communist insurgent losses are estimated at over 6000 killed and 1200 captured.

Independence Square, Kuala Lumpur

The campaign was one of the few successful counter-insurgency operations undertaken by the Western powers. It provides many important lessons on how such campaigns should be conducted, most of which were then ignored by the US in the conflict

in Vietnam, shortly afterwards. Malaya managed to repel an organised communist insurrection, mainly due to the authorities getting organised, applying simple military principles, the determination and cour-

age of thousands of UK and Commonwealth servicemen and women, the influence of people like Briggs and Templer, and the communist terrorists mistakenly thinking they could win by military means.

Selamat Tinggal. (Malay for) goodbye for now.



WINNING WAYS

A PROFESSOR WAS INVITED to deliver a series of lectures in America. To reach the staff accommodation, he tried to take the lift to the third floor. He pressed the button marked '3'. The doors closed but nothing happened. He tried again, still nothing. He pressed the button to open the doors. Still nothing. He punched buttons '1' and '2' - still no result. He felt panic beginning to rise. On the verge of pressing the emergency button, he made a final try with button '4'. Much to his relief, the lift set off and deposited him on level 4, after which he walked down to his destination. On reporting the 'fault' he was asked, 'But don't you have the key?' Sure enough, when he checked the keys he had been given, there was a small one marked 'Elevator'. It would give him access to those floors not normally open to the public. He had the key, but he did not know it.

I heard this story recently, and it struck me as a very strong and appropriate metaphor for how we often look at what is going on our lives. We have the keys but do not know it, or the keys are easy to find, but we don't know where to look.

What keys can unlock our understanding of ourselves and of others. The best is AWARENESS.

A new study has uncovered the most dramatic rise in all things spiritual and alternative, including reiki, reflexology, and hypnotherapy. This interest seems to cross the intellectual, class and ethnic differences in society. It seems to me that it is about trying to understand oneself, in order to be less selfish and introspective, but also to feel that solutions come from within, rather than being imposed from the outside. If it is important to mention God - and I believe it is – then it is only important because God has to be within every cell of our body, and therefore within every cell of the bodies of others. That is why the Indian greeting Namaste is so gentle, yet utterly appropriate: 'The God within me greets the God within you.'

Without awareness, change, growth and development are impossible. Without it, we cannot know our strengths and weaknesses. We cannot be sensitive to the needs of others and, as Anthony De Mello says in his



wonderful book, AWARENESS, we stay asleep for most of our waking lives.

Priorities And Perspective

How many of you have experienced the sudden shock of a car accident, burglary, death of a loved one or partner losing their job? This is but a small list of the many things that can make a dramatic impact on our lives. While you live through the aftermath, you might describe yourself as feeling numb. However, I would venture that you are actually numb to the unimportant things of life. You are probably very much aware of the things that really matter. A sense of priority and perspective comes into everything. You just know that such things as dirty windows, not having everything you want, work, office politics, or whether or not you were invited to this or that event are suddenly not important any more. Your concentration zeroes in on love and pride, consideration and gratitude. You swear that you will not lose this clarity, and sense of perspective, but, life being life, this precious sense often slips out of your grasp without you even noticing.

Deciding to be aware is the starting point of the journey – keeping not only your eyes and ears open, but also your other senses – especially your sixth sense, that part of you which knows what is going on beyond the usual knowing.

Think about:

A new mother who always seems

- to know when her baby is crying, despite the crying of many other babies.
- Stepping into your workplace, and instantly sensing the atmosphere, friendly or otherwise.
- Asking yourself, with curiosity rather than criticism, what might have caused a strong reaction either in you or in others.
- The sudden instinct to make contact with someone.

This is a way of walking alongside yourself, as you live your life, and just gently observing your way of being. Don't beat yourself or others up about perceived mistakes, just be an observer – 'the watcher of the thinker'.

The awareness key does not take you out of circulation, but encourages you to be fully present in every moment. You will find your awareness grows simply because of your intention to be aware. From the position of awareness, understanding follows, and you learn to go with the flow of life, rather than being rigidly fixed to one point.

Kinross Community Council

News from the July Meeting

Present at the meeting on 27 July were Cllr Richard Watters, Cllr Richard Purves, CCllr David Colliar, CCllr Lynne McKay, CCllr Hannah Phillips, CCllr Bill Freeman, David, Sgt Mark Craig

Apologies: Cllr W Robertson, Mrs Caron Aird

Police Report

Sgt M Craig gave the Police Report. There had been about 100 calls to the Police last month. Offences ranged from careless driving, assaults, theft of a vehicle, shoplifting, possession of drugs to a dog bite. Speeders had been caught at Gairneybank and Crook of Devon. Pop up cops (speeding deterrents) are coming soon, hopefully to be stored at Kinross.

There had been a fatal motorbike accident in Scotlandwell. Camping/litter at Burleigh Sands was discussed and the Police notified about unacceptable parking in Kirkgate Park on the beach. It was suggested that the cadets could be used to raise awareness around camping issues and water safety at the loch. An open day for the Fire Station takes place on 7 August at Todd and Duncan car park from 12-4pm.

Matters Arising

Swansacre parking issues: R Watters will email an update. **Provost's Lamp:** Signage to be looked at and text made to fit. Sign should be vandal proof.

Hayfield Wildlife Garden: PKC took over care and maintenance of this 15-20 years ago. Hayfield Wildlife Group had handed it over to PKC but it seems to have been handed to Education dept. Used to have bird boxes but appears to be abandoned. CC keen to see it restored to community usage. Was left in trust for the community. DC to contact Campbell Watson re legal documentation.

Website: No update, Malcolm to report back after meeting with the Partnership. KNL meeting to be arranged (HP).

High Street: CP continuing to chase (there have been job changes in PKC).

Loch Safety: Currently no lifebelts and no notices about swimming safety or algae. Could PKC put something up to warn people of dangers, and fast? LM to contact RLSS. Suggestion of stall at Kinross Show but not enough time to organise. It was felt that speed was of the essence as tragedy waiting to happen.

Burleigh Sands /Campers: CP has asked the P&K visitor rangers to visit our area and patrol at weekends.

Suggestions: Bigger bins. Rubbish often bagged but left. Or more frequent emptying in summer months.

Primary School: Review of nurture provision. CP reassured CC that change to model but no loss of service.

Gallowhill Road: Update on discussions around crossing. Majority of respondents to the poll were against any crossing. Set amount from Persimmon £60,000 which will only cover one crossing (£50-55K per toucan crossing). This could be used for Lethangie crossing on the Muirs instead (more time pressure for this one).

Phase 2 residents could be surveyed on their opinions and use of crossing and location decided after their input. Concern that if we don't spend the money from the £60,000 it will be lost – it was suggested that any left over money could be spent on build outs (as in Kinnesswood) to slow traffic or other slowing measures. R Watters to speak to P&K roads about this.

Speed limits could also be reduced by 10mph to help with speeding on Muirs and turn into Springfield Road. A roundabout could work here at the junction. RW to investigate. This is an accident blackspot. 20mph possible but not easily achieveable. What happened to speed activation signs on Springfield Road? CP to investigate.

Pothole at Kirkgate: Reported and scheduled. Learning Centre sign to come down – to be chased.

Swansacre parking: One way up school wynd. *No Left Turn* sign here would be useful.

Town Centre

Loch Leven Garage Area at far end of High Street needing tidied up. Becoming an eyesore. Discuss walkabout next month.

Fossoway and District Community Council

News from the August Meeting

As it is still not possible to hold physical meetings of the CC we are continuing to publish this description of what was discussed in our Virtual meeting, including any updates that we are aware of. Members of the Public are encouraged to comment on and question the items below, by email to fossoway.cc@gmail.com or via the CC's Facebook page, which we will answer in our next meeting, be it virtual or physical, on Tuesday 7 September 2021.

Present at the meeting on 3 August were: CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, A Cheape, T Duffy, C Farquhar, C Haigh, M Haigh, N Marchant and G Pye; Cllrs M Barnacle, C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters.

Apologies: PC A Mitchinson.

We were sad to hear that Rob Young, who served on the Community Council until recently, passed away on 16 June. He was a good colleague; we wish his family all the best in this difficult time.

Police Report

There were two incidents to note in our area since the last CC Meeting: Overnight on Wednesday 26 May, an orange Stihl saw was stolen from a white Ford Transit parked in Gartwhinzean Feus, Powmill; Between 3am and 4.30am on Friday 4 June, Fossoway Stores and Post Office was broken in to.

Matters Arising

A977 Mitigation: Cllr Barnacle contacted Darren McKeown, PKC on 16 July about why the gateway signs into villages were not 20mph, and also what was happening about the junction works. Cllrs Purves and Robertson had also asked about the 20mph signs and had been assured that they would be changed to 20mph when the speed limit is introduced. CCIIr Bruce-Jones has been contacted by Drum residents who are asking about getting additional traffic calming measures - speed bumps, rumble strips, chicanes, model policemen, etc. Cllr Bruce-Jones asked Cllr Purves if there was going to be a pilot scheme of such measures; Cllr Purves has been talking to the Road Safety Team and they want indication of local support. Cllr Robertson said that 'Police Models' are available from the council for about £50 and the council wouldn't object to them being installed as long as they don't block the pavement, etc. CCIIr Bruce-Jones asked who would be responsible for the models, do they need to be taken in at night. All agreed that they needed to be moved to different places for maximum effect. Cllr Barnacle made the point that it was important to try the currently planned measures before installing speed bumps, which are not universally popular. CCIIr Marchant asked if there was going to be countdown markers before the 30mph limit at Powmill - Cllr Purves had previously asked for

Bank of Scotland Closure: Cllr Purves and CCllr Marchant are continuing to have discussions with Bank of Scotland regarding providing additional community banking support. Cllr Purves visited the banking hub pilot in Cambuslang which focuses on providing access to cash and basic banking to the community – a different bank is present on each day of the week. BoS will trial a banking hub for one day a week for three months, once a suitable location has been identified. The UK Government's

HMRC has an 'Access to Cash' paper out for consultation and Cllr Purves and CCllr Marchant will continue to pursue this.

Community Development Trust: Cllr Barnacle reported that three members of the original steering group have had to leave. The CDT will share a stall at the Fossoway Gathering with the Community Council. The event will be used to engage with the community and assess the interest in taking out a membership of the CDT.

Fossoway Gathering: CCIIr Duffy said it is increasingly likely that the Fossoway Gathering will go ahead on 4 September unless the Covid-19 regulations change dramatically. CCIIr Duffy proposed that the CC should take a Stall at the Gathering, which was unanimously supported. The fee for a stall is £25. CCIIr Duffy will prepare a draft of a handout describing the CC's activities to be given to members of the public at the Gathering.

Fossoway and District Community Council Benefit Fund (a.k.a. Hydro Scheme Fund): CCIIr Duffy reminded everyone that the fund is open for applications, but stressed that potential applicants must read all the conditions fully before applying.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: CCllr M Haigh reported from the Transport Group as follows: It seems that currently only one bus is being used for the present X53 service between Stirling and Kinross, whereas another would be required in order to provide an extension of the itinerary to Halbeath and this was not possible within existing resources. There was anecdotal evidence that the current timetable was somewhat tight, notwithstanding the low usage of the bus away from the Hillfoot towns, and that this might encourage speeding by the drivers.

The existence of the DRT service seemed to be little recognised within the community but in any event there was only one driver offering this service at present, despite efforts to recruit others.

On that basis the group agreed that it should aim to hold a further meeting towards the end of September.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: CCllr Farquhar reported that the paddock area has been cleared and she was delighted to see that the whole area has been tidied up. Cllr Barnacle stated that the improvements are partly as a result of pressure from the planning department. There is no movement on the turning circle at the end of the site. Cllr Barnacle suggested that the CC should continue to press for landscaping of the whole site, and any future planning applications should include such conditions.

Aldie Road Vegetation: Whilst the vegetation has been cut back the ditches are still full of mud and debris An email has been received from the owners of Hilton of Aldie regarding three blocked drains on Aldie Road which when it rains causes flooding in their garden. This has been repeatedly reported to PKC in the past, Cllr Robertson said that the drains have now been cleared. Cllr Barnacle has been told that the ditches will be cleared once the vegetation has died back, and machinery is available.

Drummond Park Fire Hydrant: CCllr C Haigh has discovered that responsibility for the Fire Service in our area comes from Dundee and she has contacted them.

Crook & Drum Growing Together: Powmill and Crook of Devon came jointly second in the Well Kept Village Competition. Most improved village was Powmill. Drum came jointly second with Maryburgh in the hamlet category. The CC wishes to congratulate both Powmill in Bloom as well as Crook and Drum Growing Together for their efforts, especially the work of Amanda James in driving this effort. The improvements in our environment since these groups came into existence are very noticeable.

Return to Physical CC Meetings: The CC has been advised by PKC that it is still not possible for meetings to be held inside school premises, and there has been no updated guidance about holding meetings. CCIIr Bruce-Jones has contacted the various Community Halls, but currently it is only possible to make bookings if the CC takes full responsibility for all COVID precautions. CIIr Robertson's view is that the CC should continue with virtual meetings as it's unreasonable for the CC members to expend effort meeting COVID Rules. CIIr Watters suggested that things may change after August 9 when the Scottish Government updates the rules.

Devonshaw Whinstone Quarry: The CC has been contacted by a potential new owner of the quarry, and has put them in touch with the current owners, with their permission.

Community Council Business

Minutes Secretary: CCIIr Duffy will write to PKC with a budget request.

CCIIr Marchant attended a meeting of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg Stronger Communities on 28 July where there were presentations from Tayside Hearing Voices and the Kinross Centre. The Kinross Centre is actively looking for volunteers especially anyone who could play some music for the visitors to the Centre. If anyone is interested please contact them at kinrossdaycentre@outlook.com

P&K Councillors' Reports

Clir Barnacle: Portmoak CC recently appealed for affordable housing at a local site — it appears that in rural areas developers are being allowed by the Planning Department to make a financial contribution instead of building houses, but this money is spent centrally and not in rural areas. Clir Watters noted that there could be some sign of this changing

as there has recently been an application that has been asked for justification for not including affordable housing in their plans.

Refurbishment of the Blairingone Playpark is acceptable to the land owner; which means that Dave Stubbs of PKC Greenspace can go ahead with this project.

Cllr Barnacle had written to David Littlejohn about the lack of enforcement of planning conditions at Dollar Equestrian, but did not receive a reply – he sent a further reminder today.

Could Drum be designated a potentially vulnerable area for flooding with SEPA then there would be finance available to implement flooding measures — could the current flooding consultation produce this? CCllr Bruce-Jones was concerned that such designation might increase house insurance costs for residents. On the other hand, there is a substantial problem with inadequate drains and ditch clearing and residents want something to be done.

Richard Watters: The Community Investment Fund has £53k to distribute to local organisations. The CC need to nominate a member to take part in the application assessments.

Willie Robertson and Callum Purves: Nothing not already mentioned.



September Project

Inter-Care offers long term support to health units in six of the poorest countries in sub-Saharan African; Cameroon, Ghana, Malawi, Sierra Leone, Tanzania and Zambia. A change in law means Inter-Care now has to access medicines from licensed pharmaceutical companies and medical manufacturers. However, fifty per cent of household goods (dressings, bandages etc) are supplied by the NHS. A big success story was their Shipping Container project, which saved them sixty per cent on transport costs. A third container of one hundred per cent donated medical goods recently arrived in Sierra-Leone, following two earlier ones sent to Malawi. Smaller boxes of medical aid are still being sent to the other four countries.

The charity's aim for 2021 has been to focus on sending potentially life-saving and diagnostic equipment.

Recipe





Joan's Summer Pudding

Ingredients

For the pudding:

800g mixed berries, including strawberries 100g caster sugar 120ml cassis or fruit cordial Butter to grease 400g brioche loaf (pre-sliced if possible)

For the elderflower cream:

100ml double cream 40g icing sugar 20ml elderflower cordial 120g crème fraiche

Method

Hull and chop strawberries and set aside. Put all the other fruit in a pan with the sugar and 70ml water. Cook over a medium heat for 5 minutes. Add the strawberries and simmer for 3 more minutes. Empty the mixture into a sieve set over a large bowl and allow to drip for 5 minutes. If juice is tart add a little more sugar. Add the cassis or cordial.

Lightly grease a 20cm cake tin and line with baking parchment. Dip the slices in the juice then lay in an even layer over the base of the tin. Tear slices to fit. Spoon over half the fruit in an even layer. Repeat with second layer of soaked brioche and fruit. Cover and chill overnight.

Whip the cream, icing sugar and cordial in a bowl till firm then fold in crème fraiche. Cover and chill.

To serve invert the pudding on to a serving plate and remove parchment. Spoon on the cream and decorate with the extra berries.

This recipe is recommended as a summer treat.


We were allowed one week off to relax but are back to our weekly work parties. We always welcome new members at our Saturday morning sessions.

The beautiful steep sided gorge and fast flowing water with its dramatic waterfalls is the perfect setting for some natural landscape shots and to practise long exposure techniques. A steep ascent to the upper part leads to a viewpoint overlooking Smuggler's Cave in the floor of the gorge.

A visit to the picturesque village of Falkland lying at the foot of the Lomond Hills provided members with countless photographic opportunities. Falkland is Scotland's first conservation village and is rich with historic and listed buildings providing fantastic opportunities for architectural photography. It is best known as the location of Falkland Palace which provides the best example of French influenced Renaissance architecture in Scotland. The village also has

examples of Neo-gothic buildings such as the Bruce fountain in the centre of the village. Many of the buildings have fascinating date and marriage stones or wedding lintels above the doorways which also provide great historical subjects to photograph.

To bring members all together to share our images from the last few weeks we enjoyed another Zoom evening where our photographs are shown as a slideshow. As well as images from our recent meet ups we were given two themes to work with; macro flower shots and minimalism. Our Zoom meetings are very popular and well attended giving us a chance to chat about our favourite shots and keep up to date with club news.

Bad news for Himalayan balsam: Portmoak Community Woodland Group are back in action and it's not going to sneak past us. Good news for nature: now that restrictions are easing and we can run some activities we're starting to hold events, to learn more about what's growing, flying and crawling in.

Portmoak Moss and Kilmagad Wood. The more we find, the more we value it, apart from the Himalayan balsam.

In the middle of July members returned to the balsam's previous hotspots, in the ditches around Portmoak Moss. It's an invasive species that we're very keen to root out. Once it takes a hold it tends to smother everything else.

On the plus side, if you start tackling it before it produces seed, you're in with a chance. The advice is to hit it hard for two years in a row. That's what we've done and we're pleased to say that this summer there's very little left.

Of course, what remains has been mostly in the hardest places to access; the deepest, wettest parts of the ditches where you also have to contend with nettles and brambles, not to mention clegs and wasps. We did a risk assessment and our equipment even included climbing rope, in case we struggled to get out of the water and thick mud.

By contrast, on a sunny afternoon in the middle of August, we had a lovely, guided walk in and around the community orchard in Kilmagad Wood, to check out our apple crop and to try to identify all the different species of native woodland trees planted by the Woodland Trust Scotland and many volunteers.

Marje Smith from Kinnesswood led the walk and opened our eyes to all the different trees; not only the familiar holly and rowan



but aspen, field maple and sessile oak, which is quite different to English oak. We identified at least a dozen tree species. Our next event will be 'walking with birds'; a stroll round Portmoak Moss, talking about the different species we have there and trying to spot some of them. Meet at 11am on Tuesday 7 September at the main gate at the Scotlandwell entrance.

The news on apples is that we have enough to hold our annual apple day on 3 October at 2pm. We had to cancel last year when new restrictions were introduced but, all being well, we can hold our usual celebration of all things appley, from making juice to offering apple-themed baking. Andrew Lear, aka appletreeman, will be with us to help identify any apples you bring from your gardens. Look out for more details on posters and social media.

In other news, the Woodland Trust Scotland are planning some extra bog restoration work in Portmoak Moss. If you see marked trees at the western end of the peat dome they're going to be felled, as part of the Trust's effort to reduce seeding onto the bog. Trees dry out the bog, which is why PCWG have been pulling out birch saplings and intend to do a lot more of this in the autumn and winter.

Our regular meetings, take place at 7.30pm on the third Tuesday of every month. We have now returned to the Well Country Inn, Scotlandwell, and anyone is welcome to attend.

Kinross-shire Climate Café


With summer ending we are resuming monthly meetings. Covid-19 restrictions are easing off and we are starting face to



face sessions in September. The meetings will take place on the first Monday of each month at 7pm in Milnathort Town

It is a special time as the UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP26) is due to start on 31 October in Glasgow. Our group is participating in a few events under the umbrella of Climate Fringe Week (18-26 September) alongside many events all around Scotland (details below).

The first climate café meeting will take place on Monday 6 September with focus on plastic and food waste. Back in April during the Eco Survey organised by KLEO at Kinross Farmer's Market many questions were raised in connection with waste management at PKC. Climate café group have now invited PKC Waste Team to present a talk about their recycling strategy. Eco Survey respondents were wondering what types of plastic are actually recyclable, where the recycling

processes take place and how we could minimise the waste. I hope we will find answers to those and other questions at the meeting.

In June Jeff Gunnell from Portmoak Community Woodland Group (PCWG) presented a very interesting talk about wetland conservation on Portmoak Moss and how their group have been involved. It was a very informative and inspiring presentation, which is now to be followed by a guided walk on the moss. The excursion will take place on Sunday 12 September in the morning (exact time and place to be confirmed on the KLEO website and Climate Café Facebook page. As part of the Climate Fringe Week in September our group is working to produce of a series of documentaries called 'Voices from Loch Leven' in collaboration with Oakford Media Company. The films will feature local people expressing their thoughts on climate change, what it means to them and whether they think it's preventable. The online screening is starting with a premiere on 20 September followed by successive parts screened daily during the Climate Fringe. As the COP26 summit approaches we would like this production to be our chance to voice local reaction to the climate change emergency and, through that, contribute to a wider debate on social media. The series will be published on YouTube and available to watch on our Facebook page and Twitter.

At the end of Climate Fringe Week we are also holding a stall at the Kinross Farmer's Market on 25 September with a pop-in friendly chat and a raffle of zero waste, homemade products to raise funds for future events.







The statue shows a sculpture of Lieutenant Herbert Brotheridge, thought to be the first allied soldier to lose his life on D-Day. The 4413 bullet shells represent the lives of those fallen comrades who died in the first 24 hours of battle. Instead of a hand grenade, the sculptor has used a dove as a symbol of peace. The statue was commissioned by the D-Day Story Museum.

Now that Covid-19 restrictions have eased, we look forward to planning with our twinning hosts, a programme for our official twinning visit to Gacé, due to take place at the end of July through to the beginning of August 2022. Final dates and travel arrangements have not yet been concluded and we will be working with our Gacé twinning committee to firm these up once we know our travel numbers in more detail.

Kinross and District Town Twinning Association initially hosted a group from Gacé back in 1975, when the Gacéans performed traditional Norman dances, in full costume, at Kinross Show. Since then there have been numerous trips back and forth across the channel to consolidate our own version


Since we reopened in May we have had a steadily increasing number of visitors to the museum, several with interesting research

Despite the rain the day was a huge success and enjoyed by all!











Recent weeks have successfully highlighted the community and competitive sides of Kinross Otters, the elements that — in our opinion — make it such a special wee club.



The wonderful camaraderie was clear when members, family and friends came together earlier this month for a charity swim to celebrate the life of Eilidh Neave and to help raise money for Meningitis Now. At the time of writing, the coaches are planning an assessment day to find the next Otters and, who knows, maybe the next Duncan Scott or Kathleen Dawson?

Speaking of which, the club was thrilled to learn of the unbelievable success of Otter Struan Bennett, who recently received the amazing news of his first call-up to represent Great Britain. He has been selected as one of only three male junior athletes from across the UK to compete at the 2021 Europe Triathlon Youth Championships Festival in Alanya, Turkey, at the end of September this year. Massive congratulations to Struan!



Time For Change

IT'S ANOTHER CHANGE OF season; meteorological autumn is upon us. It just feels like last week I was awaiting the start of spring, now it's officially autumn! Where does the time go? The skies are no longer full of screaming swifts, sky-dancing swallows or fly-catching martins. We await the arrival of our first pink-footed geese and the trees are beginning to change colour and bear fruit. It's my favourite time of year for so many reasons!

Firstly, the pink-footed geese; my absolute favourite. Nothing says autumn like their joyous 'wink-wink' call echoing from the skies. Last year, my first skein was on 10 September and the year before it was 2 September – so keep

your eyes and ears peeled! Depending on the winds, it can take the geese 12 to 22 hours to fly over the North Sea from Iceland to Scotland. They will spend the winter here, roosting on the loch and feeding in the surrounding fields.

September is the often the last month we see osprey fishing on the loch. The final stragglers will be feeding up for their mammoth journey down to West Africa. This journey of 3000 miles can be done in 14 days of continuous flying – truly remarkable! The female typically starts her migration first, leaving the nest once the chicks have hatched. The male then does the rest of the work, feeding and teaching the youngsters how to fish. He then departs and leaves the youngsters to fend for themselves. No one really understands how the young ospreys know where to fly, but they always begin their journey flying off in a south-westerly direction.

September is the start of autumn, and that means fungi season! Look out for amazing named specimens like; dogsick slime mould, scarlet elfcup, chicken-of-the-woods, giant puffball, penny bun, shaggy inkcap, jelly ear and everyone's' favourite red mushroom; fly agaric.

Numbers of wintering wildfowl are now increasing; mute swan, tufted duck, coot are now all well into the thousands. We are starting to welcome back our winter visitors; pochard, teal, wigeon, goldeneye and pintail numbers are starting to build up and the loch will be transformed into a wintering/migration hot-spot! In autumn, we can see peaks of up to 60,000 birds on the loch!

Speaking of which; a reminder that from 1 September, we ask that there is no water borne access (kayaking, paddle boarding, canoeing, swimming etc) at Loch Leven NNR through to 31 March. This is because huge numbers of wintering birds use this internationally important loch as a refuge and these birds are easily disturbed. Let's ensure that we safeguard these wintering populations for the future! Thank you for your co-operation.

Recent wildlife highlights at Loch Leven NNR include; purple hairstreaks (a new colony at Levenmouth – see p15 for more details), hobby, arctic tern, marsh harrier, 2117 tufted duck, osprey and small copper butterflies.

Preparing To Leave

WE HAVE HAD SOME lovely wildlife sightings reported this month at RSPB Loch Leven. Our infamous ospreys have gathered once more, spotted along the fence posts along the edge of Main Bay. In previous years we have had up to 12 of these birds seen altogether in one day. They use the loch as an opportunity to stock up on fish and refuel before their long migration south. Marsh harrier activity has also been good around the reserve, so keep your eyes peeled for birds of prey when you are visiting.

With the breeding season ended the lapwing have now dispersed away from the reserve into new areas, and a regular flock of curlew has emerged. With most of the gull population now fledged, an unusual calm has settled over the wetlands. The wind whispers over the fields almost to sigh a relief that all the hard work is over. Just a few families of great crested and little grebe chicks can be seen gliding elegantly over the water. As the lazy late summer settles, the constant hum of grasshoppers and dragonflies can be heard in amongst the wildflowers at our bumblebee meadow. Lots of different species of bumblebee can be seen here, and you can use our easy wildlife board guides to help you identify them as you walk through the field.

Our reserve team have been hard at work managing vegetation along the footpaths to keep them nice and clear for visitors. They have also undertaken several insect surveys which will help to monitor our butterfly and bumblebee populations. This information is then shared with other organisations such as the Bumblebee Conservation Trust, to help develop a co-ordinated approach for informed management decisions for conservation.

We have some exciting events running this month including a trail for Big Green Week that will run from 18-26 September 10am-4pm. Big Green Week is a nation-wide week of events to celebrate action for nature on climate change. Drop in anytime during this week to take part in our climate themed family trail.

On 25 September 10am, Awaken your body, mind and senses in the beautiful surroundings of Loch Leven with a mindful movement and meditation ses-

sion. Offered by local yoga teacher, Orla Beaton, these monthly sessions will include gentle yoga and qigong, seated and walking meditation, and poetry to help us destress, connect and find balance. To book please visit *rspblochleven.* eventbrite.com. Work is progressing on the redevelopment project and some tricky construction tasks have now been completed on the visitor centre which should allow things to move along more

smoothly. As with most old buildings we hit a few unexpected snags and challenges along the way, and this has resulted in frustrating some delays! We are now hoping to be able to reopen again at the beginning of October. During this time, we are incredibly excited to have commissioned Edinburgh based artist Chris Rutterford to create a mural the reserve. at

The artwork, on the steps leading from the underpass to the visitor centre will showcase some of the amazing wildlife that can be seen on the nature reserve.



Pond Garden, Milnathort

OPENING FOR AUTUMN COLOUR in September, we are looking forward to welcoming visitors for the first time as part of Scotland's Garden Scheme. Pond Cottage, just a mile north of Milnathort, was derelict when we arrived 28 years ago, the pond



was silted up and a neighbouring dump filled the old quarry.

With Nature in charge, a wild woodland garden is growing and the pond attracts many different visitors — you won't always see them but through the seasons there are swans, ducks, moorhens, herons, red squirrels, deer and others among the trees, sedges, reeds and butterbur. There's a waterbank full of frogs,

bees and butterflies. And the old quarry is a grassy glade.

All trees have a story to tell so we are experimenting with a 'plant-hunters' trail for visitors of all ages to explore paths leading through mixed woodland plantations of conifers, beeches, oaks and rowans. Your task will be to find key trees along the trail, ending with afternoon tea with home baking and a chance to share discoveries. Nature is always full of surprises!

September Song

BY THE TIME YOU read this, it will be officially autumn and we'll be counting down to winter, but for now, those late-flowering plants are really coming into their own aren't they? And, having seen hardly any bees so far this year, my flowers are absolutely covered in them!

You should know by now that there's always stuff to do in the garden and September is no exception. Now's the time to dig up, divide, replant and generally tidy up your borders ready for next year.

It's not too late to sow some hardy annuals, such as calendulas, outside for next year as the ground is still quite warm. As I said before, I don't usually bother, preferring to



sow in the spring undercover so I can keep an eye on them.

September into October is the time to plant out flowers for next spring. I'm eagerly awaiting my delivery of tulip bulbs and polyanthus for flowering next spring. The tulips can go straight into pots to overwinter but the polyanthus will need to bulk out a bit before planting – I'm anticipating very small plug plants. So, I'll pot them on into cells (15-cell trays) and grow them on outside for a few weeks before planting into their final places. I

might leave some until the spring to plant out to fill any gaps.

in previous years. Of course, this isn't very cost effective (and I'm all about doing things cheaply) so next year I'm going to try and grow all basket plants from seed – I will let you know how that goes, I have high hopes!

Any plants in baskets or pots that can be saved for next year will be getting removed before there's any frost. Fuchsias will be going into buckets of compost in the greenhouse. Begonias will be getting lifted, dried out a little, flowers and leaves stripped, the corms wrapped in paper and going into my cool back bedroom, ready to emerge in the spring for another year of flowering.

Now's the time to lift and divide any overgrown perennials. This gives them a new lease of life... and free plants! I've got a few hostas and some lupins that could do with a bit of a

makeover, so I'll be out with a shovel dividing them in the next few weeks.

This is also a great time to cut back anything that has finished flowering and has died back, unless you want to leave the seed heads for the birds. Once borders have been tidied and plants divided it's usually a good idea to chuck some manure or similar on. This breaks down over



the winter and feeds the soil ready to start again next year.

I'll leave you this month with what's 'floating my boat' in the garden just now... echinops, dahlias and rudbeckia – beautiful displays and very attractive to bees! Have a great September and remember to stop gardening for copious cups of tea!

Reaping The Rewards

HARVEST FEVER IS ALREADY spreading through *Newsletter* country, and by the time you are reading this (weather permitting, of course) the combine harvesters should have a good chunk of their year's work completed. Even our own barley here at backward farm is ripening relatively quickly and should be ready to be cut in the first week of September, although one field looks like it could even be earlier.

The long, sunny days of July seemed to come at the right time for our crops as it suddenly transformed them from looking mediocre to looking very well by our standards. As ever, it is very dangerous to make predictions so we will wait and see until it is safely gathered into the grain store. When the torrential thunderstorms were sweeping the country I was very concerned that the crop would be flattened and ruined, but fortunately we missed the worst of the downpours and only a few pockets have brackled over. Hopefully Andrew will have worked his magic with his pre-harvest maintenance on the faithful old Dominator and it will soon be marching up and down the fields with the stoor fleein'.

This is the largest acreage of barley we have grown for a number of years and it will all be eaten on farm both by the pigs and also the bulls we rear for beef and the straw will be used for bedding, which is then returned to the land in the form of 'magic dung'. This follows the age old principle of returning as much organic matter to the land as possible to help encourage a healthy soil environment which grows healthy crops and



in turn stores carbon within its structure which helps in the climate change battle. The benefits of healthy soils are indeed wide and varied; it is a basic principle which has suddenly become very fashionable, although many farmers have been doing it for years.

The pigs have had quite a quiet time recently, so they must be saving up for a major event. Their digging has been slowed down by the hard, dry ground conditions, although the recent rain has softened the top slightly. They needed quite a lot of water carted out to them for wallows through July but they aren't needing so much at the moment as it has been cooler and damper.

The new approach to fencing them in seems to be quite successful, although it does need regular attention to keep it working properly.

The cows have been calving and I am pleased with how the calves are looking. They are to a new bull we got last autumn and he has certainly hit the ground running, or should that be jumping? This isn't such a common time to have cows calving (springtime tends to be more popular), but it looks like it could fit quite well for us, and there will be ones calving at other times, both in the commercial herd and the Dexters. Roll on harvest.



Obituary

Peter Flounders, Pastor of Kinross Christian Fellowship Born: 25 February 1939 Died: 22 July 2021



WE ALL HAVE MARKERS in our lives. Those mounds of stones that, when we look back, say that something significant happened in our lives. One such moment for me was when my family moved from Saline to Kinross. This was 27 years ago. It was a very significant moment because this was when Peter and Sheila came into our lives. They immediately struck us as a couple that were passionate about their Christian faith but more than that this was a deep personal faith that was very much a driving force in their lives.


Peter was the eldest of five siblings. He was born in Bridgend, South Wales. On leaving school he completed an electrical engineering apprenticeship. He met Sheila in Maidstone, Kent in 1958 and they were married in 1962. Their daughter, Jacquie, was born in 1963, and their two sons Andrew (in 1965) and Owen (in 1967) were both born in Liberia, where Peter worked in opencast iron ore mining from 1965 for five years. On returning to the UK, Peter worked in open-cast coal mining which eventually brought him to Kinross. At this time, he was responsible for the running of coal disposal in sites all over the UK.

Whilst living in Northumberland, Peter was an elder and then became pastor of Crossroads Church, Ashington. He was inspired by reading the Bible and wrote the words to two musicals. He

always spent time in God's presence and knew that God was telling him, on moving to Kinross, to change the course of his life and so he retired from his working life in open-cast mining. They trusted that God had a plan for their lives. They always had time to listen to the worries and concerns of others. They were good listeners; they prayed, and they offered practical support. Nothing ever seemed to be too much effort; nothing ever seemed to be more important than the people they knew. Kinross Christian Fellowship came into being 21 years ago and it was born out of a compelling need to reach people who were struggling with their lives. Peter responded to God's calling and became the pastor of the fellowship.

You will have noticed that it is very difficult for me to talk about Peter without mentioning Sheila. They were a dynamic team. They believed in action every bit as much as their faith was grounded in the words of Jesus Christ. The Word of God energised them to action – they believed that if we can't make time for people and help people then what on earth is the point of being a Christian. But this was not just nice people doing good things. No – they gave the glory to God because they believed that the only way to find lasting happiness on this planet was to find Jesus Christ.

Out of the burning passion to follow Christ came community outreach in all sorts of ways — the Christmas musical O Come Let Us Adore Him at Kinross Parish Church; the drop-in centre for 'T in the Park' festival goers at Kinross Church Centre; the Friday night youth club at the Millbridge Hall; the Talking Donkey café at the Millbridge Hall; the summer outreach in the Kirkgate Park and most recently the response to God's call that a Bible be distributed to every home in Kinross. What a dynamo for Christ! There is no more fitting way to conclude my appreciation of Peter's life than to quote Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians ...And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love. *Duncan MacLachlan*




